It may be a long way from the hardwoods of the NBA to a small Southern Baptist campus in Phoenix, Arizona, but for the time being, basketball to Paul Westphal and basketball to Grand Canyon College are one and the same. Westphal replaces John Shumate (who left to assume an assistant coaching position at the University of Notre Dame) and becomes the second consecutive former NBA player to coach at Canyon.

The 35 year old Southern California native becomes the seventh coach in Grand Canyon's 38 years of basketball.

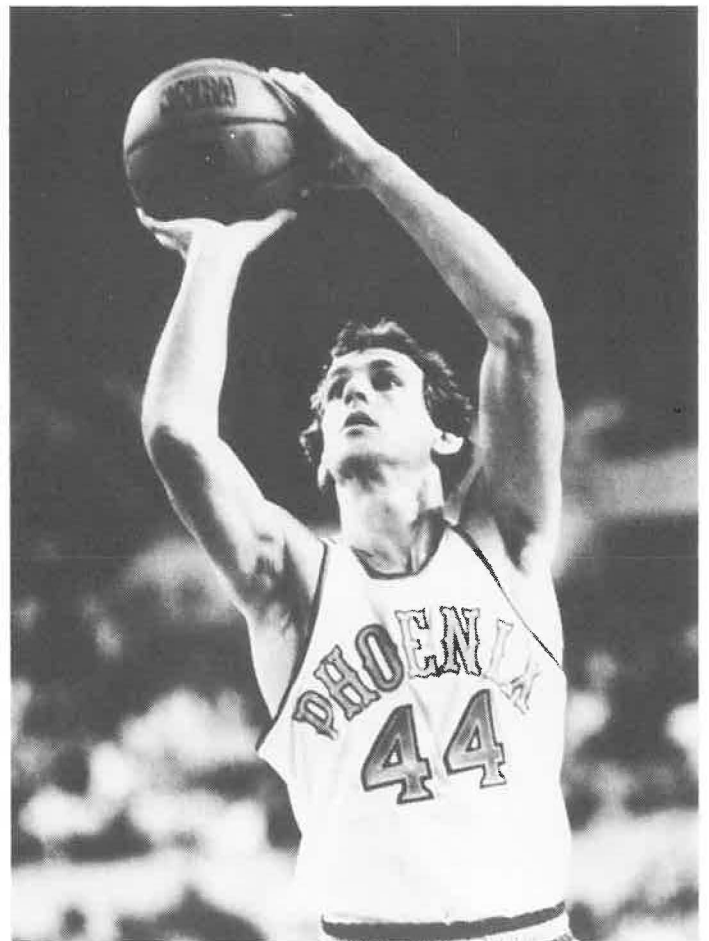
In Westphal, Canyon hopes to have found someone who will build for the future. The three previous coaches at Grand Canyon have all gone on to assume coaching positions at NCAA Division I institutions, the last two only staying a total of five years between them before moving on the division one positions.

Westphal's overall basketball experience is impressive and although he's only had one year of college head coaching under his belt, he seems primed and ready for this season. Westphal spent this past year at Phoenix's Southwestern Baptist Bible College where he finished 21-9, won the league championship, and earned a berth in the National Little College Athletic Association Tournament in Chattanooga, Tennessee.

Westphal entered the NBA in 1972 as a first round selection by the Boston Celtics after an outstanding collegiate career at the University of Southern California. He earned many awards in his 12 years in the NBA including being selected as an NBA All Star on five occasions and NBA All Pro four times. He was the NBA's Comeback Player of the Year in 1982-83 with the New York Knicks and also served as Vice President of the NBA Players Association. Overall, Westphal spent three seasons with Boston, six with the Phoenix Suns, one with the Seattle SuperSonics and two seasons with the Knicks.

On the collegiate level, Westphal was a three-time selection to the All Pacific-8 Conference team, and two-time NCAA All American. He played in 1970 on the United States Olympic development team and in 1971 for the U. S. Pan American Games team.

Paul and his wife, Cindy, have two children, Victoria and Michael Paul.



Garrick Barr Assistant Coach



Garrick Barr begins his first season at Grand Canyon College, coming with Paul Westphal from Southwestern College. Garrick's association with Westphal goes much farther than that however. Barr and Westphal were teammates in high school at Aviation High in Redondo Beach, California. Barr ranks second on Aviation High's Career Scoring list to, you guessed it, Paul Westphal.

Barr is a graduate of the University of California, Irvine where he played varsity basketball for four seasons. He was a part-time starter in each of his last two seasons, and graduated in 1973 with a bachelor of arts degree in philosophy.

Garrick's coaching experience includes a year at Glendale Community College (1984-85) as an assistant last year under Westphal at Southwestern College. He has also worked with the popular Adams/Westphal Camps during the summer.

Garrick is single and enjoys photography.

Scott Mossman Assistant Coach



Like Canyon's other two coaches, Scott Mossman begins his first season at Grand Canyon College. Scott will serve the 'Lopes on a part-time basis this season.

Mossman graduated from Phoenix's Sunnyslope High School in 1976 where he played varsity basketball. After two seasons at Scottsdale Community College, he moved on to Mid-America Nazarene College in Olathe, Kansas where he graduated with a bachelor of science degree in physical education in 1982.

Scott returned to the valley and was a volunteer assistant for Ralph Flores at Glendale Community College in 1984-85 (along with current Canyon assistant Garrick Barr). Last year, Scott was an assistant coach at Casa Grande High School where he was teaching.

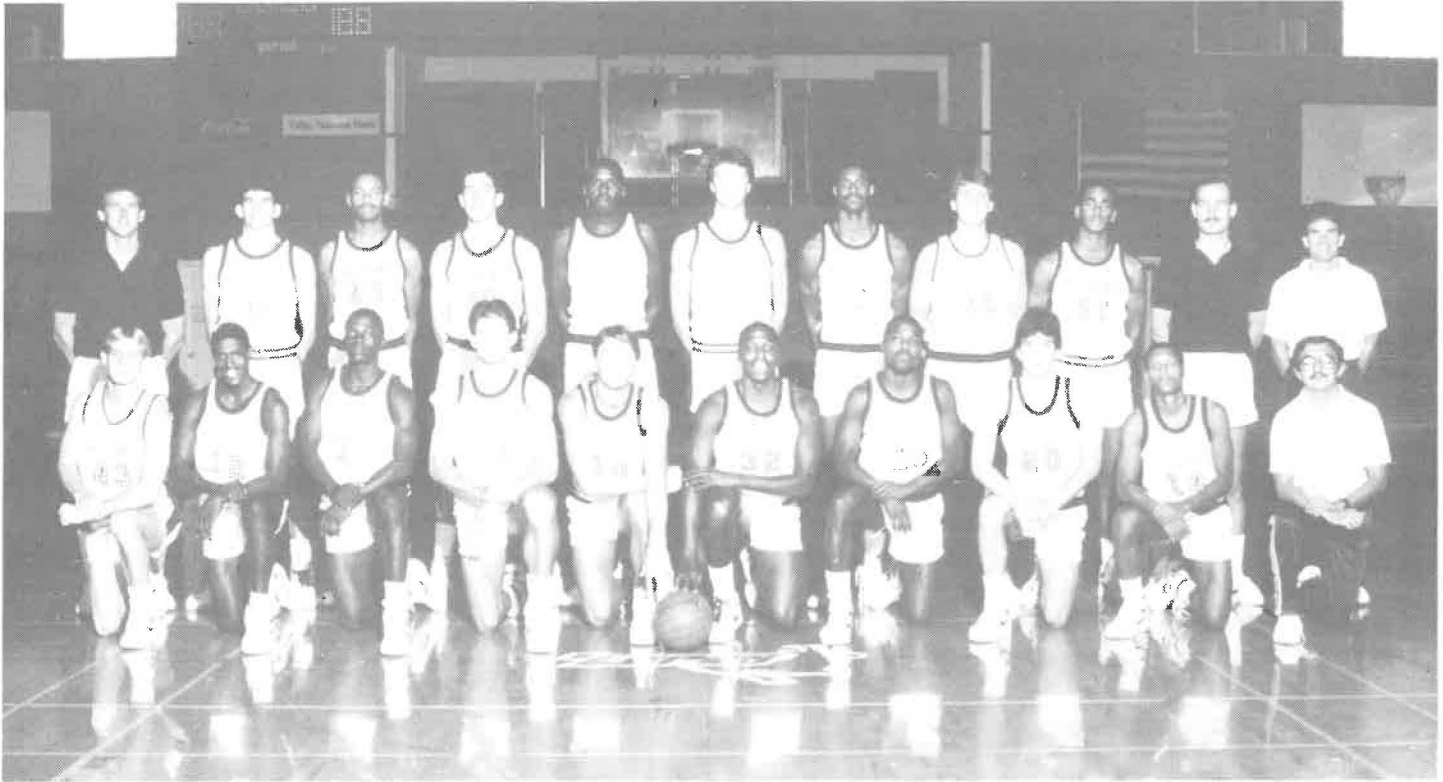

For first year head coach Paul Westphal and his staff, it will be a case of reestablishment for the Grand Canyon College basketball program this season.

Last year, the 'Lopes failed to qualify for post-season play for the first time since the 1970-71 season when Ben Lindsey's team went 10-17 in a rebuilding year. Even though Canyon posted an adequate 19-8 record, they snapped a string of 14 consecutive years in playoff action when they finished fifth according to the NAIA District VII rating system that establishes post season qualifiers. Only four teams in the 14 team District VII can qualify for District Tournament play.

Only six players return for Westphal to work with and the departed players accounted for 73% of the scoring output for the Antelopes last season. Of course, close to 50% of the team's scoring left when All-District VII performers Kevin Warren and Rod Monteverde graduated. Warren and Monteverde averaged 23.3 and 19.2 points per game respectively last season. Of the six returning players, Bob Gallagher is the leading scorer and rebounder back. The 6-6 forward scored 8.6 points and grabbed 5.9 rebounds per game in 1985-86.

One of the biggest potential problems for the 'Lopes this season is the lack of inside players. Of the 15 players on the pre-season roster, eight are listed as guards and two others as possible swing-men. Both Cecil Scroggins and Bob Henige, who split duty at center last year, are back while Gallagher returns at one forward. The tallest of Canyon's players is Henige, who stands 6-8. The average height for the roster is just under 6-3.

As you would expect, a host of newcomers will be on the roster this year.

Early in the pre-season, nine newcomers were on the roster. That number is now down to seven players as transfers Gary Ware and Mike Ledbetter will redshirt this season. Freshman Ron Dalessio and sophomore Gary Ware are also being considered as redshirt candidates even though they remain on the regular season roster. As long as they don't participate in competition, they would retain their season of eligibility for future use.

The newcomers still should have a profound and immediate impact on Canyon success this season. Guards Ron Singleton and Chris Williams will be counted upon to carry some of the scoring load lost on Warren

and Monteverde's exit. Rodney Johns will also be asked to contribute heavily from the guard slot if he can fully recover from arthroscopic knee surgery he had earlier this fall.

At the forward position, Canyon will depend on Mike Greene and Ron Akre to add scoring and rebounding strength. Greene redshirted last year while Akre led Phoenix College in scoring last season.

Rounding out the roster are returners Darrell James and Danny Young and newcomer Dawaine Yokley. James has been a defensive ace for Canyon in his first two seasons while Young has shown much improvement. If Young can shake an injury to his arm that he suffered late in the pre-season, he could be a key in the 'Lopes success. Yokley is a transfer from South Mountain Community College where he averaged 16 points per game in his two year career. He could be a sparkplug off the bench.

In a nutshell, even though the 'Lopes were picked by Street and Smith Magazine to win the NAIA District VII Title, they still have a rough road ahead. There are many question marks as to how well the 'Lopes will gel and how healthy they can stay. Gallagher and Henige were out parts of last season with injuries and Johns will still have to test his knee in game situations. On top of this, the 'Lopes face several Top NAIA teams in Westmont, Wayland Baptist and Fort Hays State.

One thing however is almost a sure thing. Paul Westphal has promised that the 'Lopes will play an exciting brand of basketball. With that, Canyon hopes to rebuild the memories of years gone by and bring top notch NAIA Basketball back to Phoenix.

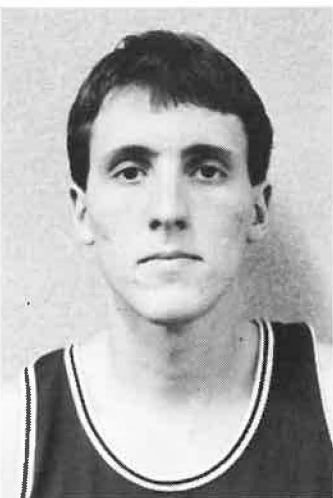


RON AKRE, Forward-Guard, 6-5, 200, Jr., Phoenix, AZ

COLLEGIATE CAREER: An All-Region I selection last year at Phoenix College . . . led the Bears in scoring with a 17.0 ppg average . . . helped guide PC to a 20 win season for the first time since 1969 as PC finished with a 22-9 mark and a second place finish in the N.J.C.A.A. Region I Playoffs . . . scored 821 career points for a 13.9 career average . . . led PC in scoring in 19 of 31 games last year, topping 20 points in 13 of those games . . . played in ACCAC Sophomore All Star game . . . set record for career free throw percentage (163-199, .819).

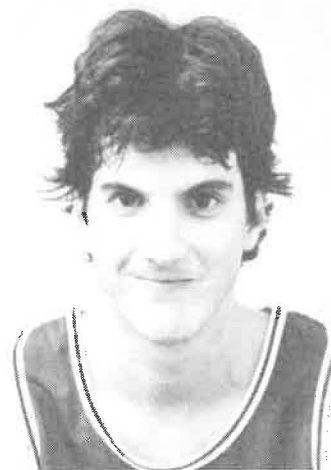
HIGH SCHOOL: Graduated from Paradise Valley High School . . . was a mainstay in the Trojan lineup . . . as a senior (1983-84) was selected to All Skyline Division 1st Team.

PERSONAL/MISC: Born 3-24-66 in Phoenix, AZ . . . majoring in business and minoring in social science.

**RON DALESSIO**, Guard, 6-0, 160, Fr., Phoenix, AZ

HIGH SCHOOL: One of the first signees for the 'Lopes before John Shumate resigned to take a position at Notre Dame . . . had a fine prep career at Paradise Valley High School . . . a three year varsity letterwinner, he started since the midway point of his sophomore season . . . last year he helped lead PVHS to a 20-6 record and a berth in the semi-finals of the AAA-I State Tournament where they lost to the eventual state champion by one point . . . averaged 13.5 points and eight assists per game . . . selected Arizona Republic First Team All State and played in the Arizona Coaches Association All Star game for the North Squad . . . was All Conference, All Central Division and Central Division Co-Player of the Year . . . also named Honorable Mention Converse All American.

PERSONAL/MISC: Born 9-27-67 in Phoenix, AZ . . . majoring in education and minoring in business.

**BOB GALLAGHER**, Forward, 6-6, 190, Jr-1L, Chicago, IL

GRAND CANYON: Probably the 'Lopes top returning player from 1985-86 . . . was third on the team in scoring in 1985-86 with a 8.6 ppg average . . . led the team in rebounding as a sophomore last year with 5.9 rpg . . . started in 18 of 23 games he played a year ago, he missed the final four games of the season with an injury to his hand . . . was second on the squad with 13 blocked shots (0.6 avg) . . . even though he led in rebound average, he led the team in rebounding in only three games.

COLLEGIATE CAREER: Spent freshman season at St. Thomas U. in Houston, TX . . . transferred to cancelled athletic programs . . . was the Celts second leading rebounder as a frosh.

HIGH SCHOOL: Graduated from Marist High School in Chicago, . . . lettered in basketball, golf and track . . . two time All Conference and All Area in basketball . . . also selected All City in Chicago and was Special Mention All Illinois as a senior.

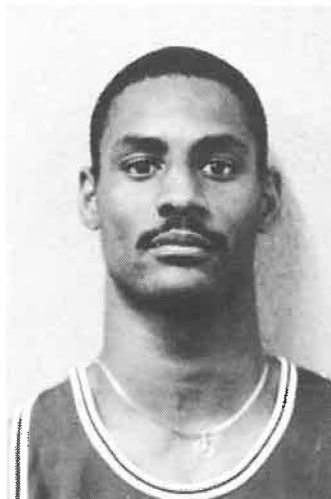
PERSONAL/MISC: Born 2-24-66 in Evergreen Park, IL . . . majoring in marketing, minoring in business administration.

**MIKE GREENE**, Guard-Forward, 6-6, 205, Sr., Norristown, PA

COLLEGIATE CAREER: Not totally new to the program, Mike was a redshirt last year . . . a transfer from St. Thomas University in Houston, TX . . . led the fighting Celts with a 9.0 rpg average and was second in scoring with a 14.5 ppg average . . . holds St. Thomas single game rebound record with 23 total rebounds and 14 offensive rebounds . . . also played two years at Lock Haven State University where he lead the Eagles in scoring and rebounding as a sophomore (16.5 ppg and 7.6 rpg) . . . was 2nd Team All Pennsylvania Conference, Western Division.

HIGH SCHOOL: Graduated from Milton Hershey High School in Hershey, PA . . . was a standout performer in football, basketball and track . . . 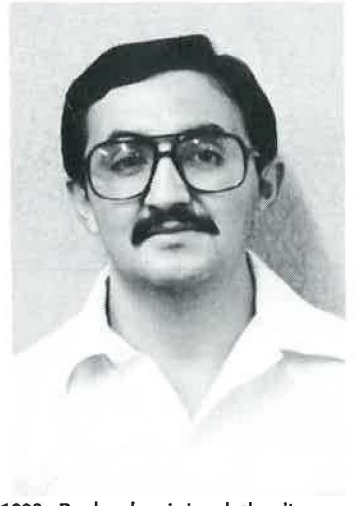
RUDY SANCHEZ, Trainer/Equipment Manager

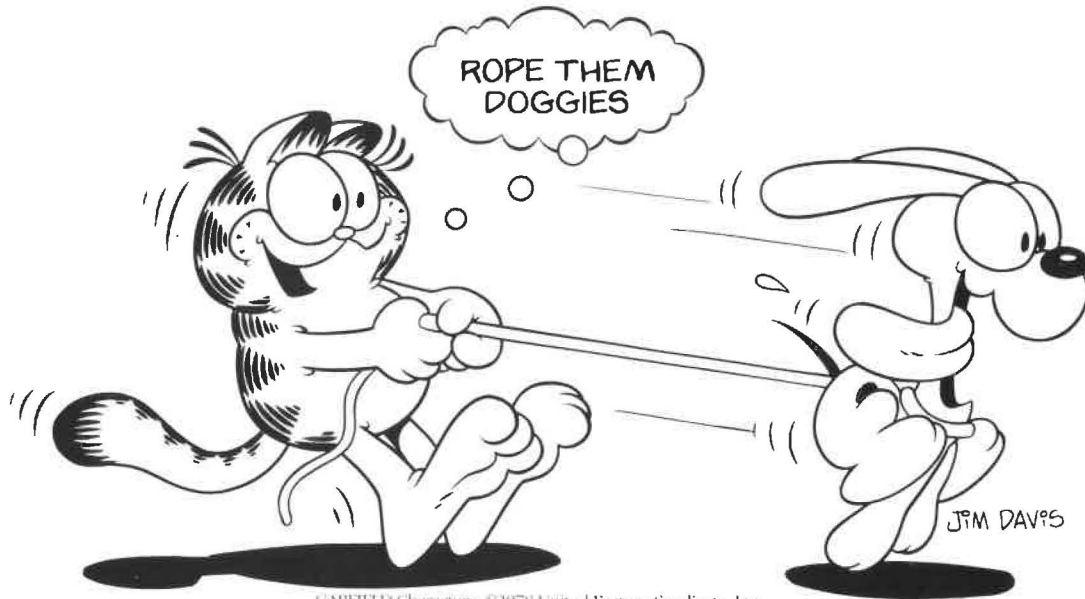

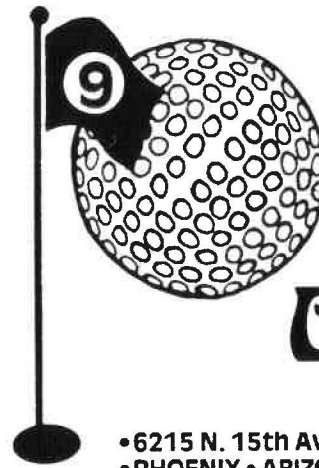

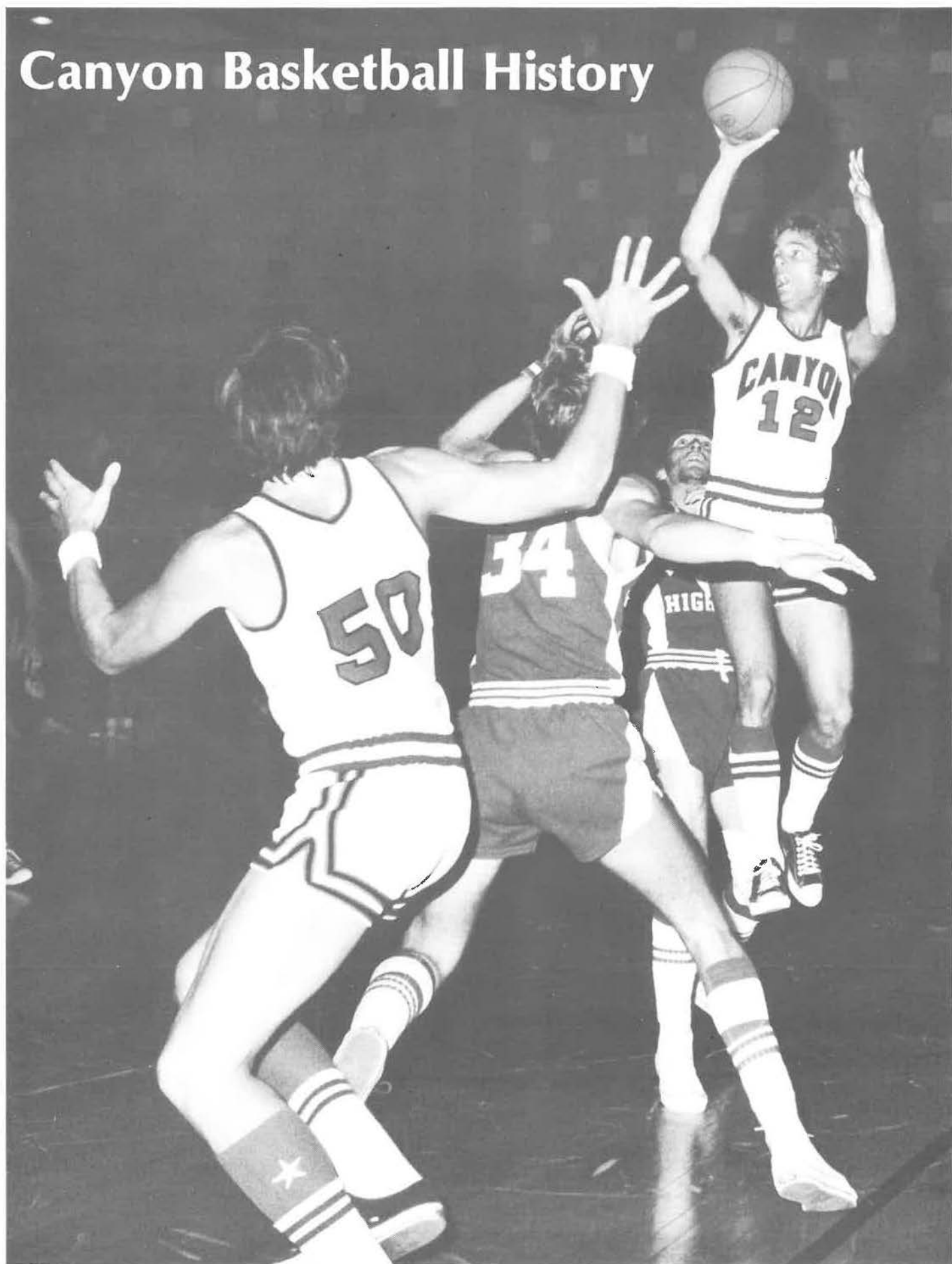

Canyon Basketball History



GRAND CANYON COLLEGE BASKETBALL HISTORY

Grand Canyon College basketball has come a long way. This is only a brief look at what has happened in the Antelope's first 37 years.

When reviewing the history of Grand Canyon College Basketball, words like "winning" and "success" immediately come to mind. The tradition has been rich for the Antelopes, winning a pair of NAIA National Titles during the 1970's and being recognized annually as having a fine and competitive program. In recent years, though, some say that the 'Lopes are living on past laurels of championships in years gone by. It's the old "what have you done for me lately?" routine. Whether that is true or not doesn't really matter, but for now, take a look with me briefly at Grand Canyon's Basketball history.

THE EARLY YEARS 1949 THROUGH THE 50's

It was the fall of 1949 when Grand Canyon College first opened its doors to students. The first team was fielded that fall semester and was the school's only athletic team. The first team went 0-8 in their first season, a season that probably should be remembered more for what it started than for what their record was. Possibly the best description of the team comes from the 1949-50 Canyon Trails (the college yearbook). The two pages allotted to the basketball team included individual photos, a team picture and the following paragraph:

"The first hoopmen ever to represent Grand Canyon College may not have gained world-wide fame, but they set and example of sportsmanship, courage, and determination that will long be remembered. From a group of only ten candidates, including six preachers, only one even had high school basketball experience. Of the ten men, all held part-time jobs, and practice was held in 'shifts'."

It has been said, by whom I'm not quite sure, that even the longest of journeys begins with one step. Grand Canyon's first step may have been a small one in the overall

picture, but it was a big step for a small Baptist college just establishing it's roots.

HOORAY FOR THE ANTELOPES AND THE BROWN AND GOLD?

Brown and Gold? I thought the Antelopes were purple and white. Quite true NOW, but THEN the Antelopes were brown and gold. By a vote of the student body when the school opened, the antelope was chosen as the official school mascot, and the colors brown and gold was chosen to be the school colors. The colors were changed to purple and white by a vote of the students in the early 1950's after the campus moved to Phoenix. But the Antelope stuck. The antelope was a very natural selection. They were very prominent in Arizona and not a bad selection when informed of one alternative. Consider this story from Dr. J. Niles Puckett, professor emeritus in Grand Canyon's Department of Religion and a member of Canyon's first faculty.

Dr. Puckett explained that during an early chapel service at the college, one student rode a . . . we'll call it a beast of burden, into the service. When confronted with the choice of the antelope and the so-called beast of burden, Dr. Puckett and I agree that the better choice prevailed.

In the early years, Canyon opponents were made up mostly of junior college teams, military base teams and freshmen level teams at Arizona's larger universities. But, as the years went by, so did most of those opponents. The first winning season occurred in 1955-56 when Dave Brazell's troops won 14 of 23 games. Probably the first major step in establishing the program came when Canyon went undefeated during the 1958-59 season, notching 20 straight wins.

THE BEN LINDSEY YEARS THE 1960's AND 70's

The 1960's presented another transition in Canyon basketball, the move into the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). Grand Canyon obtained Associate Member status for the 1961-62 season, and gained full membership in the 1968-69 academic year when Canyon attained regional accreditation as an institution. Even

though the Antelopes would not see post-season play during the 1960's, the foundation was laid for future promise.

Ben Lindsey took over the coaching reins from Dave Brazell in the mid 60's. What was to follow during his tenure at Canyon certainly deserves much recognition. In the ten years from the 1969-70 season through the 1978-79 season, the 'Lope won 226 games and lost only 69 for a .766 winning percentage. What's even more impressive is the final six years of that decade when Lindsey's teams won 159 and lost only 24 for a .869 winning percentage. During those six years, Canyon won five NAIA District VII Titles and two NAIA National Championships. Since Lindsey's departure, the 'Lopes have yet to reach the NAIA National Tournament.

If one player were mentioned as being responsible for much of the 'Lopes' success, it would undoubtedly be Bayard Forrest. The 6'10" center was a three time NAIA 1st team All America pick and practically rewrote the Canyon basketball record book. Forrest starred for the Antelopes from 1972-76 and was a model of consistency. He never averaged more than 18.2 points per game and never less than 17.2 per game. His rebounding average was likewise, never averaging more than 14.8 and never less than 10.8.

CHANGING TIMES, THE 1980's

Changing times is certainly the keynote phrase of the 1980's for Grand Canyon Basketball. For a team that knew only two permanent coaches since Canyon settled in Phoenix in the fall of 1951, the program seemed slightly unsettled as the head coaching position seemed to be a revolving door. Since Lindsey left the following the 1980-81 season, no coach has stayed more than three seasons. Although it should be noted that each of the coaches that departed during this time have gone on to be associated with NCAA Division I positions. Lindsey took a leave of absence from Canyon during the 1981-82 season and was an advisor to the Philippines regarding their basketball programs. He sub-

sequently accepted a head coaching position at Fort Hays State University in Hays, Kansas before accepting the head coaching job at the University of Arizona without ever coaching a game in Hays. Jay Arnote succeeded Lindsey at Canyon and had two fine seasons. Arnote then moved on to become the head coach at Flagstaff's Northern Arizona University. John Shumate followed Arnote and served three seasons at Canyon. Shumate took Canyon to the NAIA District VII Championship game in 1984-85, his second season. After a 19-8 record last year, Shumate returned to his alma mater, the University of Notre Dame, where he will be the top assistant for Digger Phelps' Irish.

Canyon basketball has come a long way. The question is, how long is the road ahead.

National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics



The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) is a completely autonomous association, currently administering programs of intercollegiate athletics to nearly 500 fully-accredited colleges and universities of moderate enrollment. The fundamental tenet of the NAIA is that intercollegiate athletics is an integral part of the total educational program of the institution. This belief is strongly reflected in the governing documents, activities and organizational structure of the Association.

HISTORY AND PURPOSE

Established in 1940 as the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball (NAIB), the NAIA emanated from a "National Small College Basketball Tournament" inaugurated in 1937 in Kansas City, Missouri. The conversion of the NAIB to the NAIA came in 1952 when the organization expanded beyond basketball and added national championship events in golf, outdoor track and field and tennis. Football, cross country, baseball and swimming were added to the championship event calendar in 1956, and wrestling (1958), soccer (1959), bowling (1962-78), gymnastics (1964-84), indoor track and field (1966), ice hockey (1968-83) and volleyball (1969-1980) were later additions.

Of major significance to the NAIA, was the establishment of the women's division within the Association on August 1, 1980. The NAIA decision to offer competitive opportunities and championships in women's athletics was passed by the membership following two years of study and proposals by an ad hoc committee on the implementation of a women's division in the NAIA. Currently, the Association conducts ten championship event programs for women in the sports of basketball, cross country, gymnastics, indoor and outdoor track and field, softball (fast pitch), soccer, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The initial purpose of the NAIA — to provide national championship athletic opportunities to institutions below the so-called "major" level — has indeed been well served. The Association clearly outlines its own responsibilities and those of its members: a sound athletics program, administered and controlled by those responsible for the administration of the institution. This means direct supervision in caliber of competition, financing of the program and taking steps to assure that financial assistance is made available only through the institution and under the same general policies as aid to all students. In short, the basic premise is that the athletics program is a basic component of the overall educational process and not an entity apart.

ADMINISTRATION

The NAIA is governed by two bodies. The Council of Presidents, composed of one president from each district, is responsible for fiscal matters, academic standards and supervision of the national staff. The 10-person Executive Committee, elected by the membership, is responsible for organizing championship events and overseeing the committees and associations. The Executive Director conducts the day-to-day operation of the National Office, headquartered in Kansas City, Missouri. A full time staff of fifteen serves the membership from the National Office.

The District is the basic unit of the NAIA. The Association is organized into 32 geographical districts spread over the 50 states and part of Canada. Each District is governed by a District Executive Committee, headed by the District Chair. The District Executive Committee establishes district playoff events, the champions of which qualify to compete in NAIA Area and National Championship competition.

Eligibility rules within the NAIA govern all play in all sports recognized by the Association, not just post-season play. All eligibility guidelines must be adhered to by all members, including those holding dual affiliation with other associations. Certification of eligibility of all NAIA participants is accomplished through a network of people including faculty athletic representatives, District Eligibility Chairs, and the National Eligibility Committee.

MEMBERSHIP

Any four-year college or university and upper level two-year institution in the United States and Canada that awards the bachelor's degree or equivalent, may hold active NAIA membership. Active member institutions must be fully accredited by an appropriate accrediting agency or commission.

OBLIGATION OF MEMBERSHIP

Member institutions must conduct their intercollegiate athletics programs with the standards of the regulatory associations in which they hold membership, and the NAIA. They must pay their annual membership dues and be in support of the policies of the NAIA. Where institutional rules and standards are more stringent than those of the regulatory group or the NAIA, those rules and standards of the institution are recognized and supported by the NAIA.

NAIA Celebrates Golden Anniversary Tournament

March marks a very special anniversary for the NAIA as the association will celebrate its 50th National Men's Basketball Championship Tournament. Basketball players at more than 470 colleges and universities across the country will have their hearts set on reaching Kansas City, Missouri, for this week long event, March 11-17, 1987 at Kemper Arena. The journey will be long and hard with the 32 district champions vying for the national title, a crown claimed by winning five games in six days.

The NAIA tournament (until 1952, the NAIB) holds the distinction of being the first organized effort to establish a national collegiate championship through tournament play. "The Daddy of Them All" and "The Toughest Tournament There Is" are labels often attached to this event. Since the tournament tipped off in 1937, athletes representing more than 470 institutions have played 1536 games. No other basketball tournament can boast of such an accomplishment.

The NAIA tournament gives players from all over America and part of Canada the chance to be in the national spotlight for a week. This year will be greater than ever with ESPN showing an interest in broadcasting the event. For 49 years, more than 3 million fans have enjoyed watching college basketball the way it was meant to be played. The likes of Jack Sikma, Willis Reed, Earl "The Pearl" Monroe, Rick Mahorn and Terry Porter have played their hearts out to give us some of college basketball's greatest moments. Prepare now to join in all the color, pageantry and non-stop action as 32 teams descend on Kansas City to decide which team is the cream of the crop.

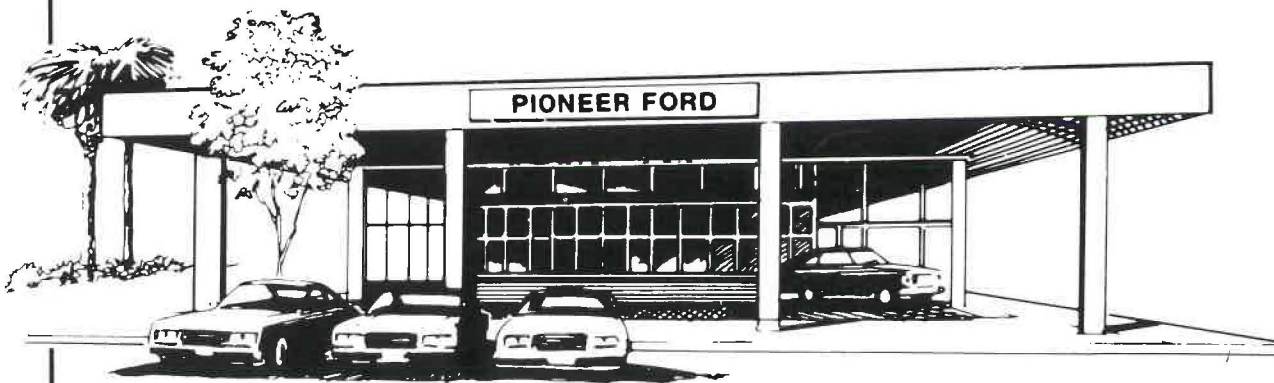
