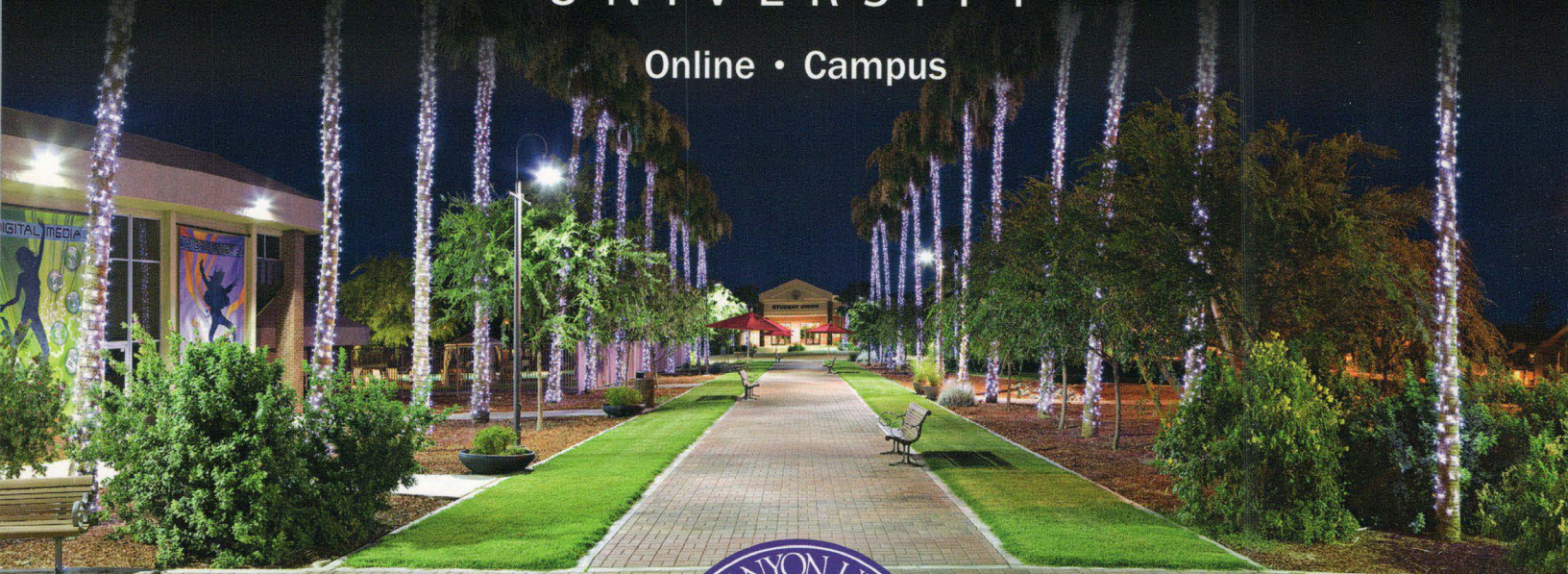

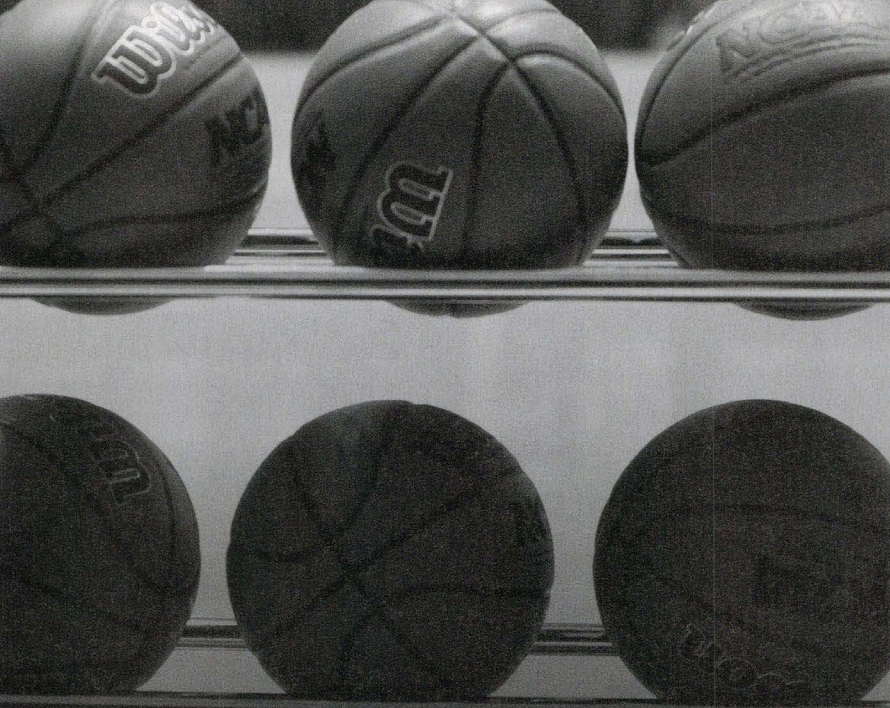

DRIVING DIRECTIONS

Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport To Grand Canyon University:

Start out going east on E. Sky Harbor Boulevard. Turn right toward Terminal 2/3 West Exit / 24th Street / Downtown Phoenix rental car return. Turn right onto E. Sky Harbor Boulevard. Stay straight to go onto I-10 W. Merge onto I-17 N via Exit 143A toward Flagstaff. Stay straight to go onto N. Black Canyon Hwy. Exit 203 on Camelback Road. Turn slight left onto W. Camelback Road. End at 3300 W. Camelback Road, Phoenix (13 miles).

Grand Canyon University To Crowne Plaza Hotel Phoenix:

Start out going east on Camelback Road. Turn slight left onto N. Black Canyon Hwy. Merge onto I-17 N toward Flagstaff. Take Exit 208 toward Peoria Avenue. Turn right onto W. Peoria Avenue. Go to stop light at top of hill. Turn left into parking lot. End at 2532 W. Peoria Ave., Phoenix (seven miles).

To The Media

Credentials

Requests for press/photo credentials should be faxed or e-mailed on official letterhead to the GCU Sports Information Office at 602.639.7811 at least 24 hours prior to event. Since space is limited, requests from media that cover GCU Athletics on a regular basis are given priority over those from visiting media. Working media with credentials are provided with a designated seat location at each event.

Event Services

Notes, lineups cards and cumulative statistics are furnished prior to each event. Final game statistics also will be available when complete after each contest. All information can be obtained by contacting the Sports Information staff or visiting the Sports Information office. Wireless Internet, telephone and fax services are available for each Grand Canyon University event and are located in the Sports Information office and athletic venues. Media outside of the metro Phoenix area may arrange to receive final statistics, event summaries and postgame quotes transmitted via facsimile or e-mail.

Event access will be available to photographers from media outlets which have received credentials from the GCU Sports Information Office.

Electronic media (radio and television) must obtain contact with the GCU Sports Information Office at least 48 hours in advance to ensure broadcast locations. A limited amount of radio broadcast lines are available and are assigned on a first-come, first-served basis.

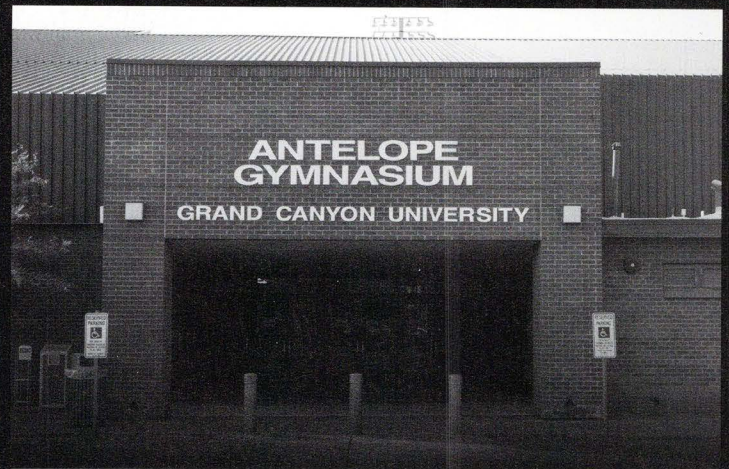


Antelope Gymnasium

Antelope Gymnasium opened in 1994 and hosts all of Grand Canyon University's NCAA contests in men's and women's basketball, men's and women's volleyball, wrestling and dozens of amateur tournaments, concerts and other year-round events.

The on-campus facility is a school color-coordinated purple & black 2,000-seat capacity venue, and is a part of a larger facility that encompasses the old Antelope Gymnasium. The Antelopes have been fortunate to display their share of banners in Antelope Gymnasium, remembering national- and league-championship seasons.

The newer gym also was the site of a celebrity basketball game headlined by the likes of Earvin "Magic" Johnson and Deion Sanders, as part of the Super Bowl XXX festivities in Phoenix in 1996. The Phoenix Suns have used Antelope Gymnasium for private workouts. Former University of Arizona head basketball coach Lute Olson also used the facility for one of his many successful basketball coaching videos. The University of Connecticut worked out in Antelope Gymnasium in preparation for its Sweet 16 appearance in the 2009 NCAA Tournament.



The facility is located on the northwest corner of campus at 3300 W. Camelback Rd. in Phoenix.

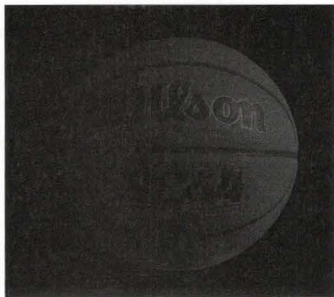


In The Community



The Grand Canyon University men's and women's basketball teams took part in the 29th annual Ensynch Stairclimb & Firefighter Challenge on Sept. 26 at Arizona Center in downtown Phoenix. The event is the only dual-building stairclimb in the nation, and donations are put to work in laboratories, where researchers are working to find a cure for the genetic disease Cystic Fibrosis that affects the lives of more than 30,000 children and young adults in the United States.

Just over three years ago, seven NCAA Division II programs banded together to revive a briefly dormant league, marking the rebirth of the Pacific West Conference.

In a short time the PacWest has been rocketing back to prominence thanks to national-caliber athletic programs, automatic qualifiers, the addition of baseball as a conference sport, and the rise to a nine-team league.

The largest geographic conference in Division II saw its rebirth begin in the fall of 2006 when the league began competition in men's and women's soccer for the first time. Women's basketball also became a league sport, complementing men's golf, women's tennis, men's and women's cross country, men's basketball and softball, which have been a staple of the league for several years.

Grand Canyon University in Arizona, Dixie State College of Utah and Notre Dame de Namur University in California teamed up with longtime Hawai'iian-based PacWest programs Chaminade University of Honolulu, Brigham Young University Hawaii, the University of Hawai'i at Hilo and Hawai'i Pacific University to re-form a conference that fell silent for one year.

In the fall, the Pacific West crowns champions in men's and women's soccer, women's volleyball, and men's and women's cross country, while the winter season is the domain of men's and women's basketball. In the spring, the league celebrates champions in women's tennis, men's golf, softball and, for the first time in 2009, baseball.

Following the 2004-05 campaign, the Pacific West Conference lost a pair of programs in Western New Mexico and Montana State-Billings to slip below the mandated six-team minimum that comprises an official NCAA Division II league. With it went the automatic qualifiers for post-season play.

However, the four schools off the mainland competed together as an unofficial conference, playing each other in the sport of basketball so many times that game films quickly became obsolete.

Although not officially recognized by the NCAA that year, the perseverance by Chaminade, BYU-Hawaii, HPU and Hawai'i Hilo kept

the core of a proud tradition intact until the three new schools put the league back on the Division II map.

And it is a big map.

From the Southwest to the Pacific Rim, the PacWest can redeem a lot of frequent-flyer miles, but its travel plans have its teams landing in major metropolitan markets that many established Division II leagues don't match.

The schools in Hawai'i have a natural appeal to the local media and community because they turn out quality athletic programs in a focused market. BYU-Hawaii tennis along with the Chaminade men's basketball team's prominent appearance in the Maui Invitational are just a couple of the highly-visible programs that compete outside the contiguous 48.

NDNU, who became a full-fledged Division II member this year, calls Belmont, CA, home and is situated midway between the two major media and population centers of San Francisco and San Jose. The addition of the Academy of Art University in San Francisco last year and Dominican University of California in 2009-10 gives the PacWest three schools in the Bay Area.

Dixie State is located in the southwest corner of Utah in St. George, not too far across the Nevada border from Las Vegas. The college draws interest from Salt Lake City and Provo as it became the first full-fledged NCAA Division II program in the state.

Grand Canyon University has been in the Division II bracket for a number of years. The Antelopes have a rich tradition of basketball and men's soccer, and have one of the largest markets in the nation with their location in Phoenix.

The PacWest conference is led by Bob Hogue, the former state senator from Hawai'i who is based in the island state. Hogue replaced Woody Hahn who retired after serving as the commissioner since the early 1990s.

2009 – 10 Season Preview

New floor. New bleachers. New lighting. New video system. New baskets and rims. New entrance.

Antelope Gymnasium has been completely refurbished for the 2009-10 season, and of all of the improvements one stands out above the rest – a whole new Grand Canyon University men's basketball team.

It's a completely new roster. Not one player from last year's team has returned. In their place are seven transfers from Division I schools, three freshmen who turned down Division I scholarship offers to attend GCU and three other talented freshmen.

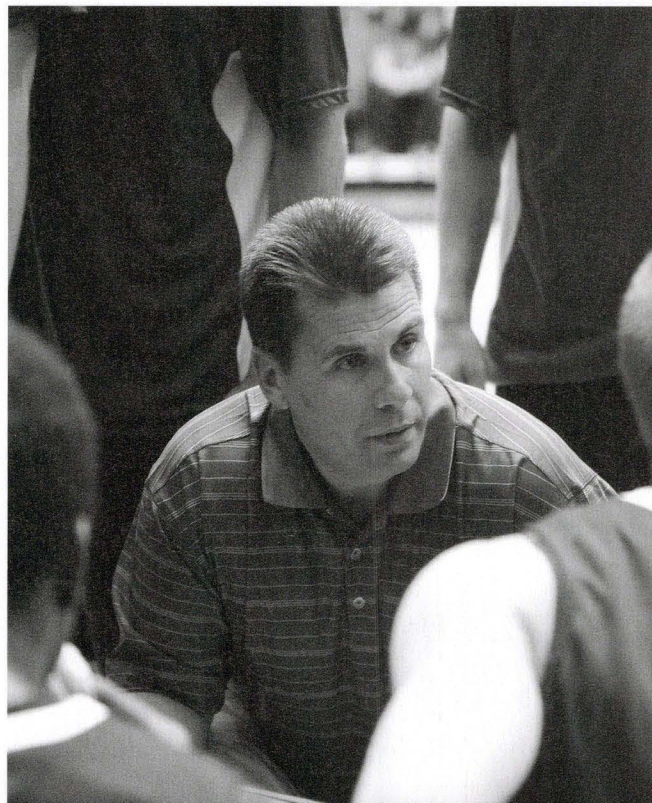
Among the Division-I transfers is Gaby Ngoundjo, a 6-foot-8 junior with an amazing 7-foot-5-inch wingspan who played the past two seasons at the University of North Carolina-Charlotte. He was the No. 1-rated prep out of Little Rock as a senior, and in his first season at UNC-Charlotte he set a freshman and arena record with six blocked shots against Farleigh Dickinson.

Joining him is Rony Tchatchoua, a 6-6 junior who spent the past two years at the University of New Hampshire. He played in 29 games and started seven at UNH, averaging 4 points and 3.2 rebounds in 15.5 minutes per game.

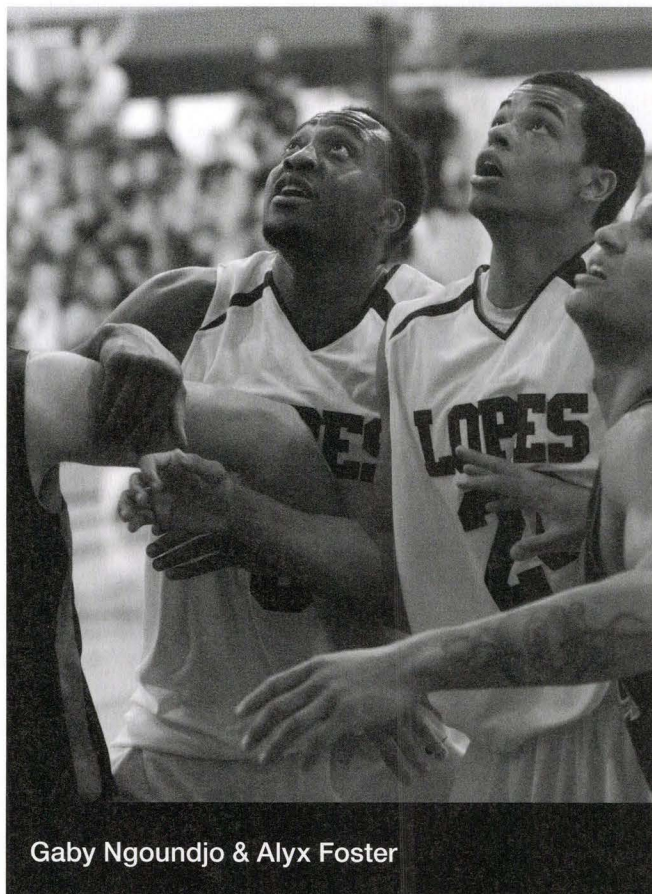
Ngoundjo and Tchatchoua, both natives of Cameroon, played for Dewey Pennell, the father of GCU's new head coach, Russ Pennell, at Little Rock Christian High School and won the Arkansas state championship in 2006.

Other transfers include:

- T.J. Benson, a 6-1 senior point guard from Corona del Sol High School in Tempe who played at Mesa Community College and Weber State University.
- Brad Carroll, who at 6-7 played point guard through high school at Corona del Sol and averaged 14 points and four assists per game as a senior. He came to GCU from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and has four years of eligibility remaining.
- Marco Ramos, a 6-6 senior who averaged 18 points and 10 rebounds, shot 67 percent from the field and was a two-time all-conference selection at Monterey Peninsula Junior College. He also played at Weber State.
- Justin Wesolowski, a 6-7 sophomore who came to GCU from the University of Northern Colorado. He was part of back-to-back state championship teams at Mountain View High School in Mesa.
- Nick Witherill, an all-state performer at Highland High School in Gilbert who scored more than 1,500 points in three seasons at Saguaro High School in Scottsdale before transferring to Highland. The 6-2 sophomore played last season at Washington State University in the Pac-10.

The freshmen who turned down Division I offers are:

- Brandon Duliakas, who at 6-11 is the tallest player in the recruiting class. He played at Ironwood Ridge High School in Tucson, where he won the state title in 2008 and was runner-up in 2009. He averaged 15.4 points, 10.4 rebounds and 3.8 blocked shots per game.
- Alyx Foster, a 6-3 all-state point guard who averaged 12.2 points, 5.8 assists, 5.4 rebounds and 1.7 steals per game at Thunderbird High School in Phoenix.
- Steven Morin, 6-4, one of the state's leading scorers last season at Saguaro, where he averaged 18.8 points, 5.5 rebounds, 2.8 assists, 1.6 steals and 1.3 blocks per game. He had 14 three-pointers and scored 56 points in one game.

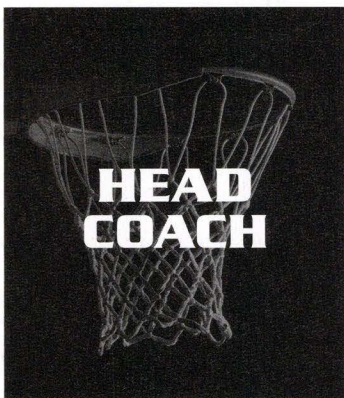
Other freshmen include:

- Travis Currier, a 6-5 guard who won the state championship in his junior year of high school, and was all-state and region player of the year his senior year.
- Cramer Doughty, a 6-2 guard from Thomas Jefferson High School in Lacey, Wash. He was named honorable mention All-South Puget Sound League North Division by The Seattle Times as a senior.
- Cooper Nelson, a 5-8 guard who played for Mesquite High School in Gilbert and for Arizona Premier club teams.

None of the new players have received as many rave reviews as the GCU administration for its hiring of Pennell to be the university's 12th men's basketball coach on April 9. Pennell is a familiar face in the Valley of the Sun, having been an assistant coach at Arizona State University and running the Arizona Premier Basketball Academy in Mesa, where he coached many of the players who have joined him at GCU. He guided the University of Arizona to a 21-14 record and Sweet 16 appearance in the NCAA Tournament last season, while serving as the interim head coach. He assumed the role of interim head coach at Arizona on Oct. 24, 2008, a day after Lute Olson announced his retirement. Pennell was hired as an assistant at Arizona on May 5, 2008, after assistant coaching stints at ASU, Ole Miss and Oklahoma State.

Pennell hired a new coaching staff that includes Mark Nelson, Anthony Boone and Phil Cullen, as well as graduate assistant Matt Brase, Olson's grandson.

GCU's CEO, Brian Mueller, chairman of the board, Brent Richardson, and the rest of the executive team are trying to build something big in Phoenix, and they expect their goals to be realized. So does Pennell, whose team opens its season on Oct. 30 at the Disney Tip-Off Classic in Anaheim, Calif.

Russ Pennell was named Grand Canyon University's 12th men's basketball coach on April 9, 2009.

Pennell guided the University of Arizona to a 21-14 record and Sweet 16 appearance in the NCAA Tournament in 2008-09, while serving as the interim head coach. He assumed the role of interim head coach at Arizona on Oct. 24, 2008, a day after Lute Olson announced his retirement. Pennell was hired as an assistant at Arizona on May 5, 2008.

Pennell served as an assistant coach for Arizona State from 1998-2004 under Rob Evans. While at ASU, the Sun Devils went 108-103 with one trip to the NCAA Tournament in 2003 and three trips to the National Invitation Tournament.

Prior to his assistant coaching job at Arizona State, Pennell served on Evans' staff at the University of Mississippi for six seasons from 1992-98. In that span, the Rebels went 86-81, advancing to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances in 1997 and 1998. In those two seasons, Mississippi won the Southeastern Conference West Division championship, winning at least 20 games both years. The Rebels went 42-16 in those two seasons, and were ranked as high as No. 10 in the nation. It was the first time Ole Miss posted consecutive 20-win seasons in 60 years.

He began his coaching career at Oklahoma State University from 1990-92. In those two seasons, the Cowboys went 52-16 under coach Eddie Sutton. During the 1990-91 season, the Cowboys shared the Big Eight Conference championship with a 24-8 overall record and advanced to the NCAA Tournament. The following year, OSU posted a 28-8 record, and was ranked as high as No. 2 in the Associated Press Top 25 poll. The Cowboys advanced to the NCAA Tournament's Sweet 16 in both of Pennell's seasons in Stillwater.

Pennell also coached with Evans in the summer of 2001 on the USA Basketball preliminary staff, assisting in the selection of the Junior World Championship team.

Pennell provided color commentary for the Arizona State University radio network during the 2007-08 season. He also ran the Arizona Premier Basketball Academy, offering instruction to high school and youth players in the Phoenix area.

Pennell played collegiately at Arkansas under Eddie Sutton in 1979-80. The Razorbacks finished second in the Southwest Conference that year. Pennell transferred to Central Arkansas in 1981, and was

a two-year starter at point guard. As a senior, he led the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference with 8.2 assists per game. He was a teammate of former Chicago Bulls star Scottie Pippen in 1983-84.

Pennell, 47, earned a Bachelor's degree in Physical Education from Pittsburg State University in 1989. He received his Master's in Physical Education from PSU in 1990.

Before joining the coaching profession, Pennell played for the Spirit Express, a traveling exhibition team based out of Memphis, TN, from 1984-88.

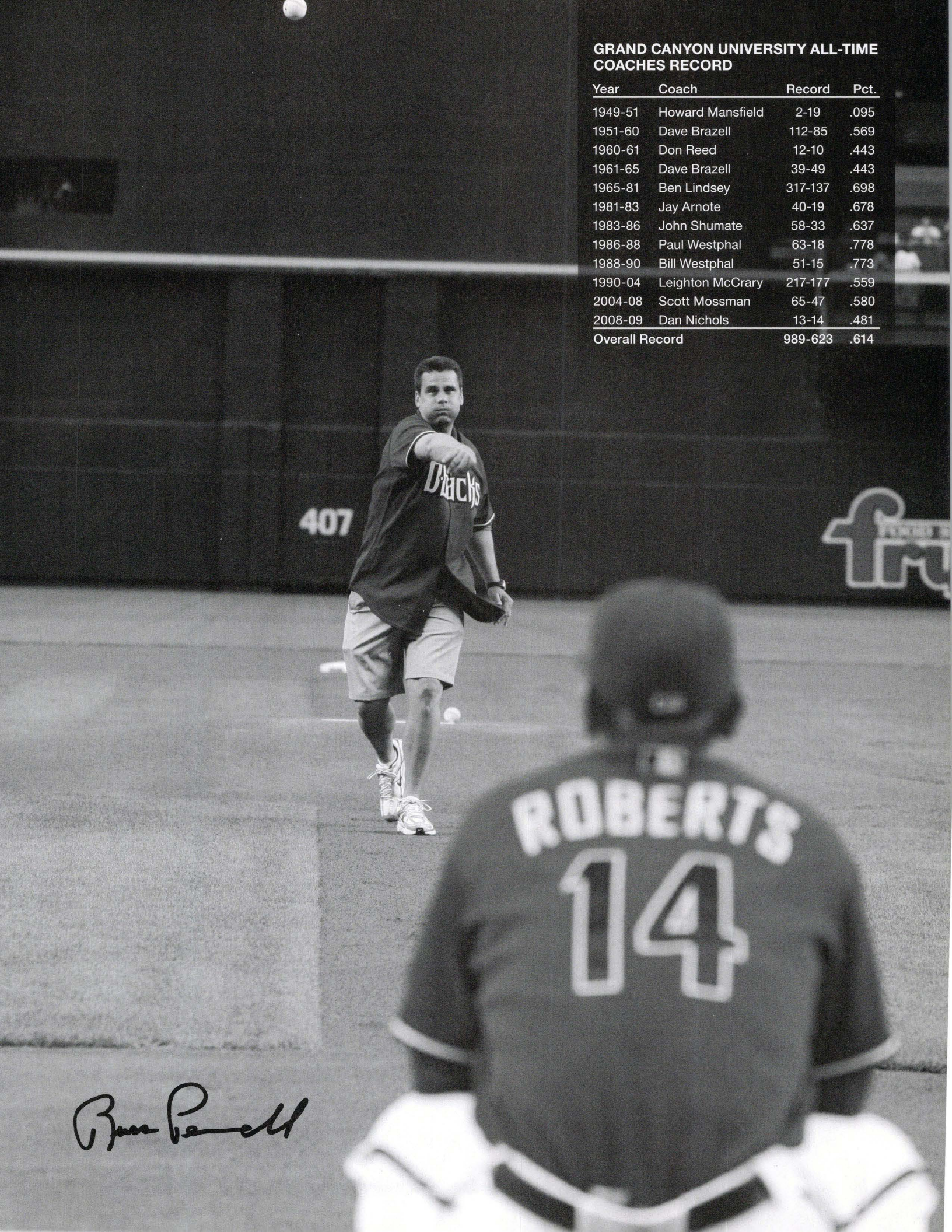

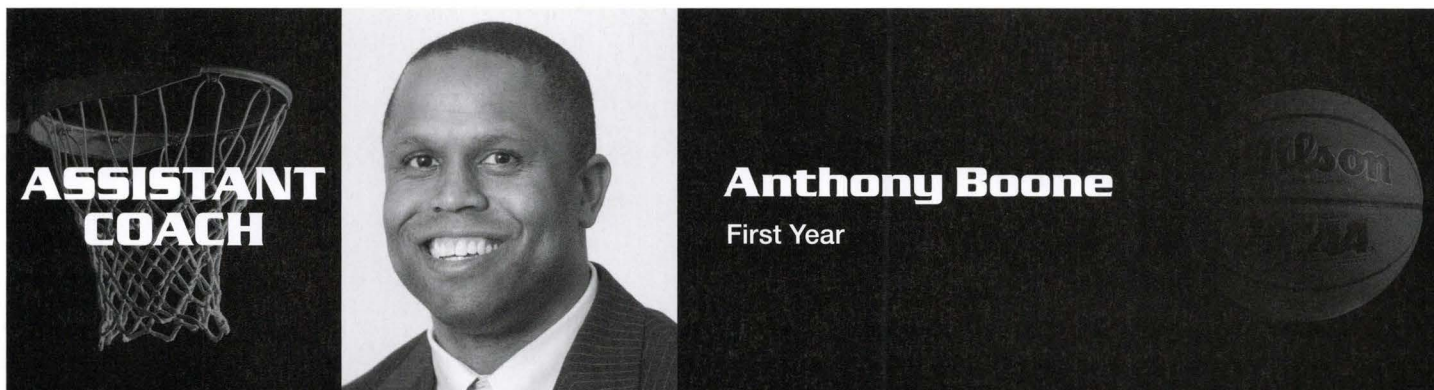


Mark Nelson brings 16 years of college and USA Basketball coaching experience to his position as a full-time assistant at GCU. In 11 years as a head coach at the junior-college level, he won 243 games at Butler County and Cowley County in Kansas and at Wabash Valley in Illinois. In 2001-02, he guided Wabash Valley to a 32-6 record and a berth in the NJCAA Final Four. In the summer of 2002, he was selected as a coach for the U.S. Junior National Team, which included future NBA stars Carmelo Anthony, Chris Bosh and Deron Williams. He was the junior-college coach of Tony Allen, who also went on to the NBA.

In mid-2005, Nelson and Russ Pennell opened the Arizona Premier Basketball Academy in Gilbert, which quickly became the pre-eminent basketball training facility in the Southwest. Several of GCU's players are products of the academy and its travel teams, which experienced national success because of their sound fundamentals and unselfish style of play. Because of his abilities as an instructor and trainer, Nelson has been sought out by college and pro players for skill-development workouts in the offseason. At GCU, he works primarily with the team's guards.

Nelson is a native of Pittsburg, KS, who played at Independence Community College and then at Kansas State. During Nelson's two years at K-State playing for Head Coach Lon Kruger, the team won 45 games and twice played in the NCAA tournament, reaching the Elite Eight once. He has a degree in physical education from K-State. Nelson and his wife, Sherry, have three children: 18-year-old twins Cooper and Katie, both part of the GCU program, and 14-year-old Chase.





Anthony Boone arrives at GCU as a full-time assistant after 10 years of coaching at the Division I level and an outstanding playing career at the University of Mississippi that saw the school retire his uniform number. Boone was a graduate assistant coach at Ole Miss, then an assistant coach for three seasons at Murray State and six seasons at Jackson State. As a player for Ole Miss, where Rob Evans was the head coach and Russ Pennell his top assistant, Boone led the Rebels to back-to-back 20-win seasons for the first time in 60 years. He was a senior on the team that lost in the 1998 NCAA tournament to Valparaiso on a memorable last-second shot.

Despite undergoing four knee surgeries, Boone started 79 of 94 games at Ole Miss. Even with relatively modest career averages of 7.2 points and 4.8 rebounds, his inspirational play was recognized by the retirement of his number (41) – only the second student-athlete to be so honored by the school. (Quarterback Archie Manning, the father of NFL quarterback Peyton Manning, was the first.) After his senior season, Boone was one of seven finalists for the Chip Hilton Award, given annually by the Basketball Hall of Fame to a player who demonstrates character on and off the court. He is a member of the Ole Miss Hall of Fame and twice was selected for the Southeastern Conference Academic Honor Roll.

Boone has a bachelor's degree in chemical engineering and a master's in mathematics, both from Ole Miss. He was class salutatorian at Central High School in West Helena, AR, where he was an all-state athlete. At GCU, he works primarily with the team's big men. He and his wife, Jennifer, have a daughter, Rebecca, 6.

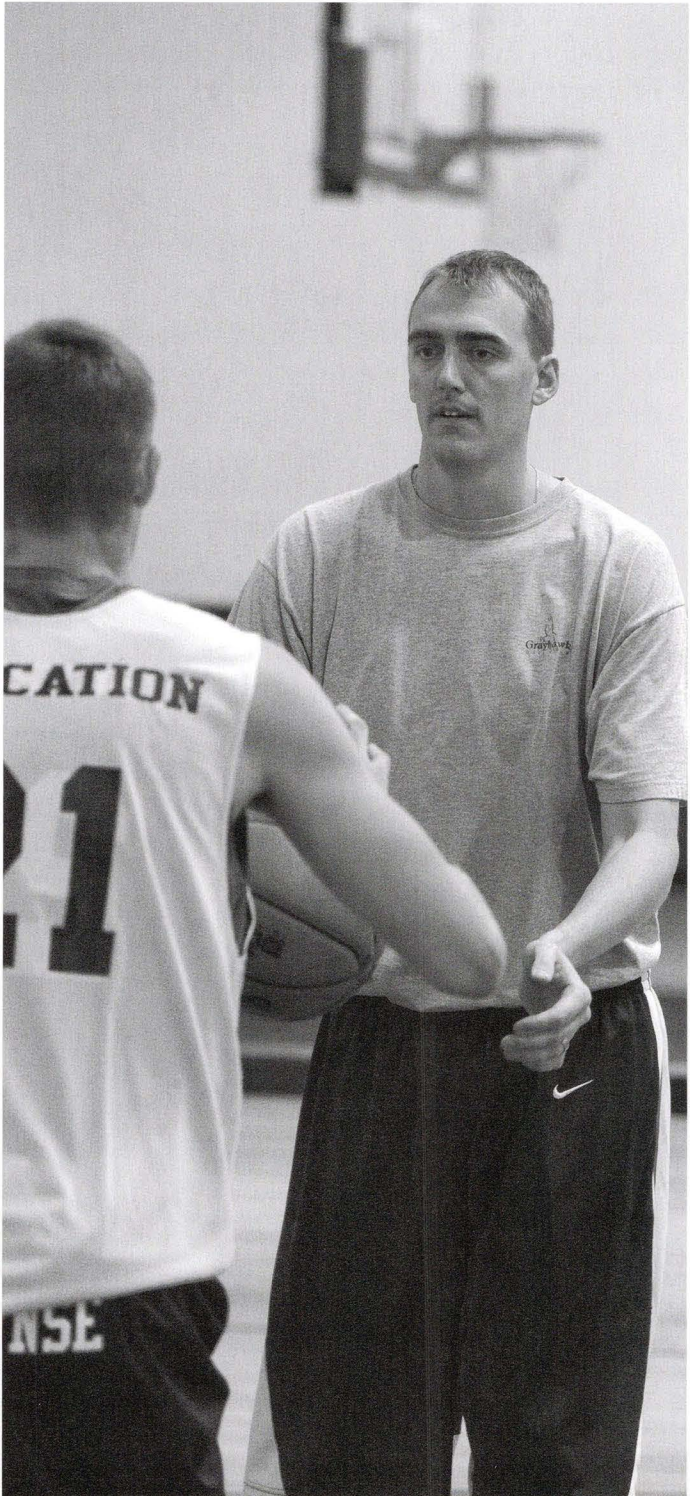




Phil Cullen joins the GCU staff as a full-time assistant after a distinguished two-sport athletic career. In four years at the University of Utah, he played for Head Coach Rick Majerus on teams that went 90-35, including 28-5 in 1998-99.

The 6-foot-9 Cullen, known for his shooting stroke, made seven consecutive three-pointers in a first-round NCAA tournament game against Indiana in 2002, tying a tournament record on the way to a 25-point performance. It came in his final game at Utah. In his junior season, he scored in double figures 12 times and averaged 9.1 points. Cullen also was a pitcher for five years in the Seattle Mariners organization before his career was cut short by an arm injury.

As a high school senior in tiny Chelan, WA, Cullen was named Washington Athlete of the Year by the Associated Press. His father played baseball and football at Eastern Washington, and his 6-foot-3 sister played volleyball at Gonzaga. Cullen comes from a family of coaches and has been an instructor and coach at the Arizona Premier Basketball Academy in Gilbert. At GCU, he works primarily with the team's big men and coordinates scheduling and travel. He has a degree in civil and environmental engineering, and he passed the Principles and Practice of Engineering (PE) examination in 2008. Cullen and his wife, Tara, are expecting their first child in November.

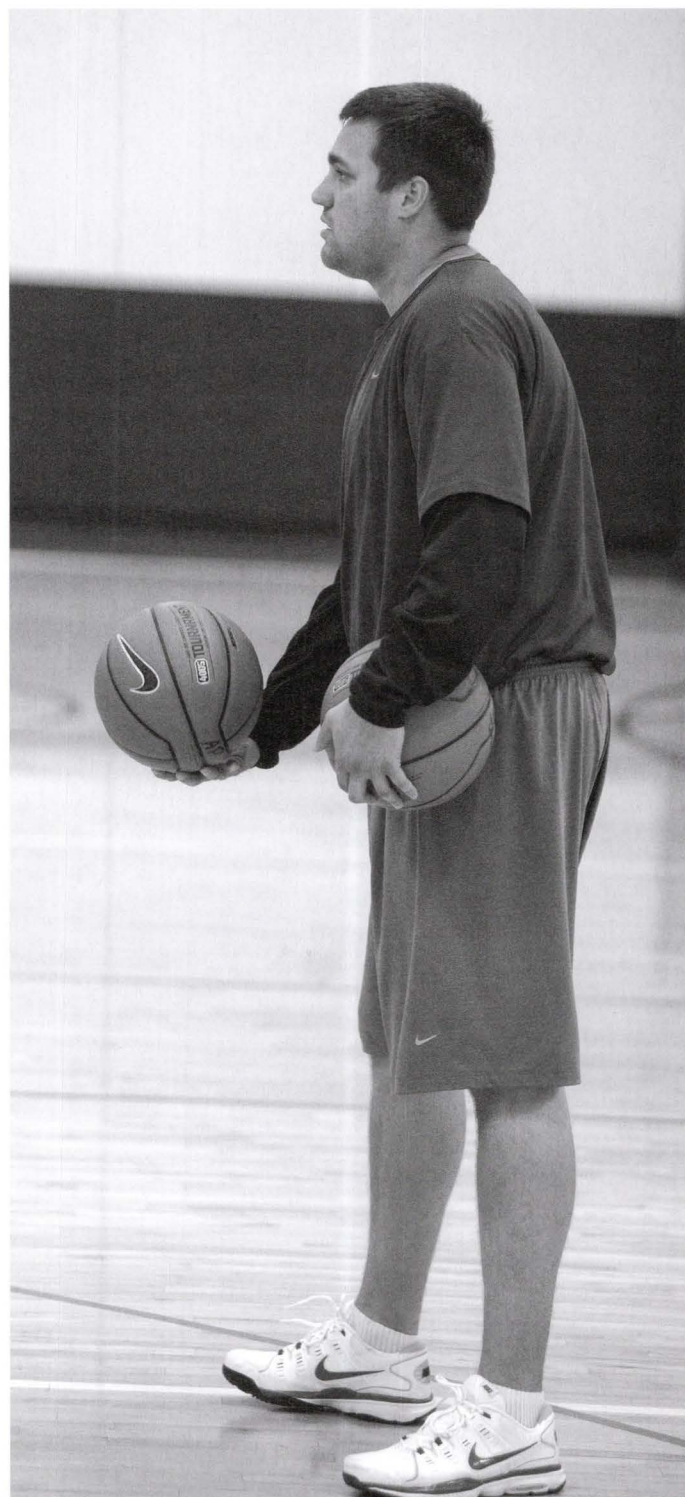

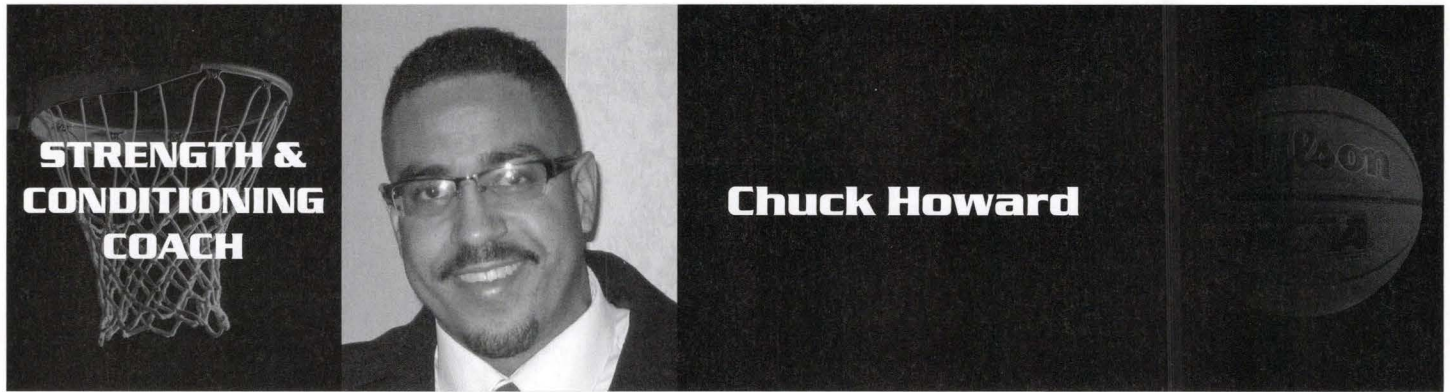

The Lute Olson coaching tree has a sturdy branch at GCU in Matt Brase (BRAH-see), who joins the program as a graduate assistant coach. Brase, who is Olson's grandson, spent the 2008-09 season as an assistant coach at the University of Arizona under Russ Pennell. He was the program's administrative assistant and video coordinator for two seasons previously.

Brase played for his legendary grandfather as a walk-on at the U of A in 2003-04 and 2004-05. Those two Wildcat teams went 50-17 overall and 26-10 in the Pac-10 Conference, reaching the NCAA tournament Elite Eight in 2005 before a heartbreaking overtime loss to Illinois. 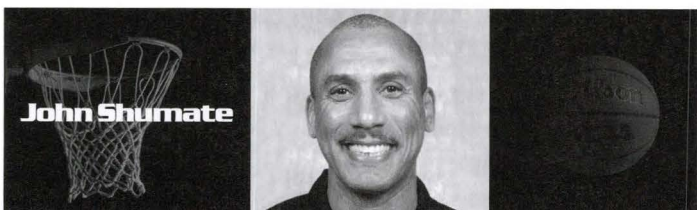
Grand Canyon to Grand Stage



Bayard Forrest became the first Antelope to go from Grand Canyon University to the NBA. He played for the Phoenix Suns from 1977-1979. Forrest played in 139 regular-season games and 15 playoff games before retiring in 1980 with a back injury. He averaged 4.1 points and 4.1 rebounds, logging 15.3 minutes per game in his two seasons with the Suns. The Suns made a playoff appearance each season Forrest was in the NBA.

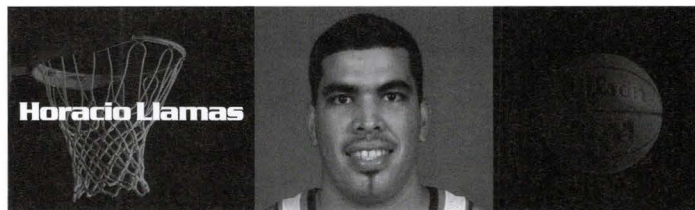
Forrest was a member of Grand Canyon's team from 1972-1976, and still has his name atop many of the school records. His 2,195 career points and 1,544 career rebounds have been untouchable since his departure from campus in 1976. Forrest also has the career marks in field goals made and free throws made. In addition to his career rebound record, he holds three of the top five rebounding season total high marks, his school-record 420 set in the 1972-73 season when he was a freshman. In 1974-75, Forrest helped lead the 'Lopes to their first of three NAIA National Championships. He was a three-time NAIA First-Team All-American from 1974-76.

The Forrest tradition continued at GCU with his youngest daughter Mandy attending the school on a volleyball scholarship. Mandy was a four-year volleyball letterwinner, and in 2003 earned First Team All-California Collegiate Athletic Association honors.



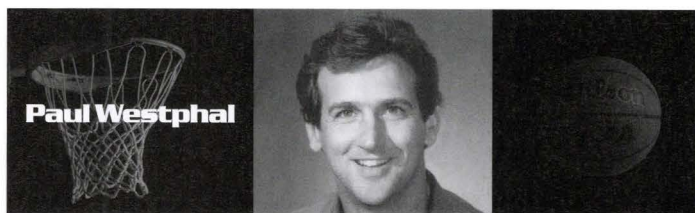
John Shumate had a five-year career in the NBA with the Buffalo Braves, Phoenix Suns, Detroit Pistons, Houston Rockets, San Antonio Spurs and Seattle SuperSonics. He averaged 12.3 points and 7.5 rebounds in his NBA career. He was named to the NBA all-rookie squad in 1975-76.

A college player at Notre Dame, Shumate coached at Grand Canyon University from 1983-1986, compiling a 58-33 record that included two trips to the postseason. Shumate also served as an assistant coach at Notre Dame for two seasons prior to taking the GCU job and two seasons after leaving GCU. Following his second stint as assistant coach at Notre Dame, Shumate was named head coach at Southern Methodist University in 1988. He then returned to the NBA as an assistant coach with the Toronto Raptors in 1995. In 1998, he joined the Suns' Community Relations staff before being named a Suns' college scout in 2001. In 2003, Shumate coached the Phoenix Mercury of the WNBA. In 2004, he returned to the Suns' staff as a college scout.



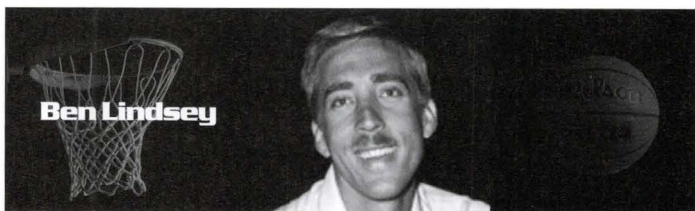
Horacio Llamas joined Bay Forrest as the second Antelope to jump to the NBA ranks as a player. He was a member of the Phoenix Suns from 1996-1998. Llamas became the first Mexican-born player to play in the NBA. Llamas hailed from El Rosrio Sinaloa, Mexico. He played in 28 games over his two-year NBA career, seeing time in 20 games during the 1997-1998 season.

Llamas was a two-year letterwinner at GCU from 1994-96. During his senior year, Llamas earned *Basketball Times* Division II Player of the Year honors, in addition to being named a First Team All-American. Llamas holds two blocked-shot records at GCU, and had 172 in his two years. His 106 blocks in a season and 10 in a game remain as school bests. Llamas earned First-Team All-CCAA honors twice and was MVP of the CCAA Tournament in 1995.



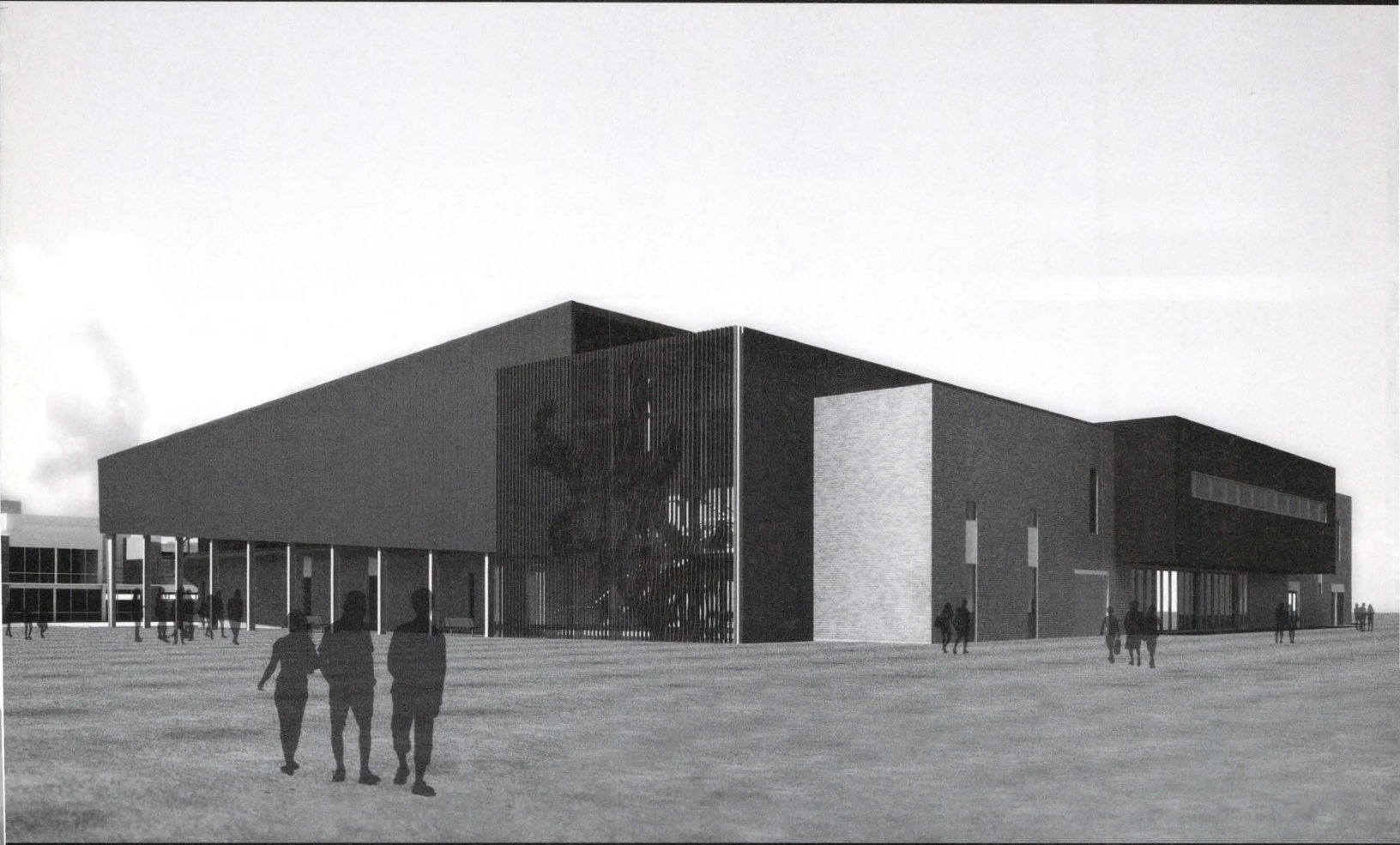
Paul Westphal enjoyed a 12-year NBA career with the Boston Celtics, Phoenix Suns, New York Knicks and Seattle SuperSonics (he was a five-time All-Star) before joining GCU as the head coach of the basketball program in 1986. In two years as head coach at GCU, Westphal went 63-18 and won the NAIA National Championship in 1988. In 1993, Westphal was named head coach of the Phoenix Suns. The Suns went 62-20 his first season, losing to the Chicago Bulls in the NBA Finals.

Prior to this season, Westphal had coached seven seasons in the NBA, compiling a 267-159 record for a .626 winning percentage with the Suns and SuperSonics. Westphal coached at Pepperdine University from 2001-06, guiding the Waves to an overall 76-72 mark (.514). In 2007, he was named as an assistant coach with the Dallas Mavericks. He currently is the head coach of the Sacramento Kings.



Ben Lindsey, GCU's all-time winningest coach, coached the USA Men's Basketball Olympic Festival West Team in 1978. Lindsey's teams went 317-137 (.698) from 1965-81 at Grand Canyon University. His Antelope teams won two NAIA national championships, going 30-3 each year in 1974-75 and 1977-78. His Grand Canyon team's run to the 1978 national title featured an 88-82, five-overtime win over Central State in the NAIA quarterfinals.

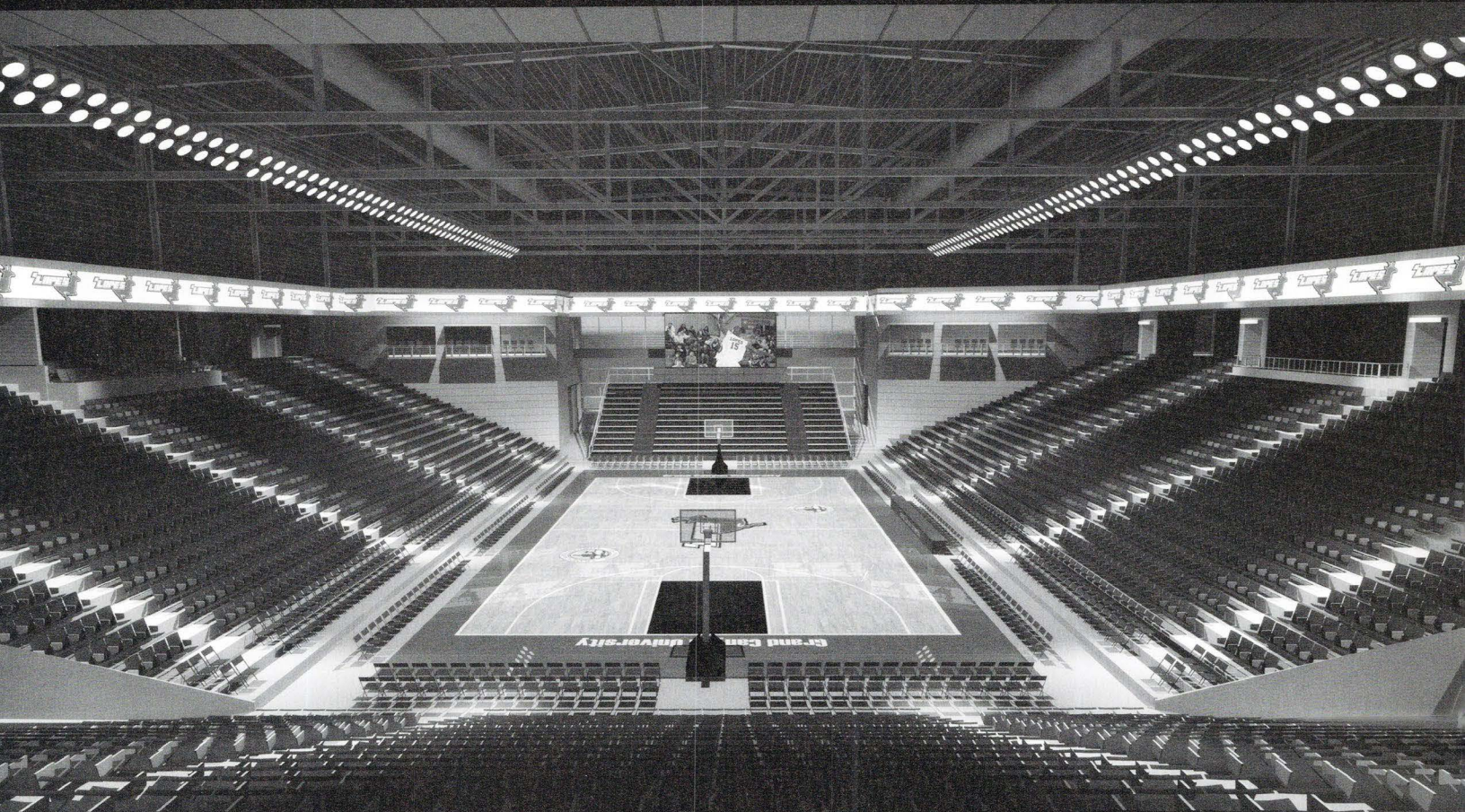
GCU New Athletic Facilities



▲ Student Recreation Center

Grand Canyon University's new student recreation center will be a 55,000 square-foot playground featuring three basketball courts and practice facilities for wrestling, basketball and volleyball. Located on the northwest side of campus and behind Kaibab Hall, the facility will feature state-of-the-art men's and women's locker rooms, athletic training facilities and a student fitness center for use by all campus residents. Construction is scheduled to begin in February 2010 with completion anticipated in fall 2010.

The student recreation center and events center are being designed by Kansas City-based 360 Architecture, a design firm with vast credentials in sports arenas, with local representation by Tempe-based Architekton.



▲ Events Center

Grand Canyon University's 5,000-seat events center promises to fill a void in athletic and performance facilities in the Valley, with a "just-right" capacity for mid-size sporting events, musical performances, speaking engagements and conferences. With its main purpose to host GCU's men's and women's basketball, the Camelback Road location of the 135,000 square-foot venue will be an ideal location for Christian concerts and outside performances. The facility is anticipated to break ground in the summer of 2010 and is anticipated to be complete by the 2011-12 basketball season.
