## Media Information

### To The Media

Any questions or assistance arranging interviews can be obtained by contacting Steve Heath, basketball sports information director, at 602.639.6514. Athletes and coaches typically are available before and after practice. GCU student-athletes are not available for interviews on game days prior to game time. Requests for interviewing a student-athlete at a practice or after a GCU event should be brought to the attention of Steve Heath.

### Credentials

Requests for press/photo credentials should be faxed or e-mailed on official letterhead to the GCU Sports Information Office at 602.639.7811 at least 24 hours prior to event. Since space is limited, requests from media that cover GCU Athletics on a regular basis are given priority over those from visiting media. Working media with credentials are provided with a designated seat location at each event.

### Event Services

Notes, lineups cards and cumulative statistics are furnished prior to each event. Final game statistics also will be available when complete after each contest. All information can be obtained by contacting the Sports Information staff or visiting the Sports Information Office. Wireless Internet, telephone and fax services are available for each Grand Canyon University event and are located in the Sports Information Office and athletic venues. Media outside of the metro Phoenix area may arrange to receive final statistics, event summaries and postgame quotes transmitted via facsimile.

### Photographers

Event access will be available to photographers from media outlets which have received credentials from the GCU Sports Information Office.

### Radio and Television

Electronic media (radio and television) must obtain contact with the GCU Sports Information Office at least 48 hours in advance to ensure broadcast locations. A limited amount of radio broadcast lines are available and are assigned on a first-come, first-served basis.

# Director of Athletics

**B. Keith Baker**



## Grand Canyon College, 1982

Grand Canyon University Director of Athletics **B. Keith Baker** has worn multiple hats at the school he attended, competed for and has been employed by since the early 1980s.

A 1982 graduate of Grand Canyon College, Baker was hired in March 1983 as the school's full-time sports information director. Prior to that, he worked for Grand Canyon as a play-by-play announcer for the Antelopes' basketball broadcasts since his sophomore year at the school.

While working toward his bachelor's degree from Grand Canyon with a double major in business administration and communications, Baker pitched on the school's first three NAIA national championship baseball teams (1980-82). He also holds the distinction of throwing the program's most recent no-hitter against Nebraska Wesleyan University on March 11, 1982.

Baker served as Grand Canyon's SID until 1989 before becoming assistant athletic director. He succeeded former GCU President Dr. Gil Stafford as athletic director in 1994, and continues to hold that position. For six years during his reign as director of athletics, Baker also coached the men's golf team. He guided the Antelopes to three straight NCAA Division II national-championship tournaments from 2006-08, finishing in the top 12 in the nation in each of those seasons. His team finished 10th in the country in 2007 after winning the Pacific West Conference championship and placing second at the NCAA West Regional. In 2008, one of his golfers won the NCAA West Region individual title.

He also coached the women's volleyball team in 1984 and 1986.

During his tenure at Grand Canyon and to this date, Baker continues to offer his exceptional talents as a broadcaster, public-address announcer and photographer. He also served as a part-time faculty member by leading courses in sports broadcasting and golf.



He has been a model representative of the university, upholding its core values as a Christian institution, and has become an excellent spokesperson on behalf of the school, his church and the community in a variety of ways. He is constantly pushing his staff members and coaches to serve the Lord in their daily lives by the way they treat one another, in addition to upholding integrity and strong values as they represent themselves and the school in athletic competitions. He was recognized for his exceptional leadership in 2009 when he was named "Under Armour AD of the Year" for the Division II West Region.

A member of a family that has had numerous relatives attend the school, Baker and his wife, Amber, met and were married during their undergraduate years at Grand Canyon. They reside in Glendale and have two sons, Brian and Brandon, and a daughter, Brooke, who played for the GCU women's volleyball team from 2007 to 2009 and graduated in May 2010.

# Antelope Gymnasium

*Antelope Gymnasium opened in 1994 and hosts all of Grand Canyon University's NCAA contests in men's and women's basketball, men's and women's volleyball and wrestling, in addition to dozens of amateur tournaments, concerts and other year-round events.*

The on-campus facility has a capacity of 1,600, and is a part of a larger facility that encompasses the old Antelope Gymnasium. The newer gym also was the site of a celebrity basketball game headlined by the likes of Magic Johnson and Deion Sanders as part of the Super Bowl XXX festivities in Phoenix in 1996. The Phoenix Suns have used Antelope Gymnasium for private workouts. Former University of Arizona Head Basketball Coach Lute Olson also used the facility for one of his many successful basketball coaching videos.

*The facility is located on the northwest corner of campus at 3300 W. Camelback Road, Phoenix.*

## DRIVING DIRECTIONS

### Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport to Grand Canyon University:

Start out going east on E. Sky Harbor Boulevard. Turn right toward Terminal 2/3 West Exit / 24th Street / Downtown Phoenix rental car return. Turn right onto E. Sky Harbor Boulevard. Stay straight to go onto I-10 W. Merge onto I-17 N via Exit 143A toward Flagstaff. Stay straight to go onto N. Black Canyon Hwy. Exit 203 on Camelback Road. Turn slight left onto W. Camelback Road. End at 3300 W. Camelback Road, Phoenix (13 miles).

### Grand Canyon University to Crowne Plaza Hotel Phoenix:

Start out going east on Camelback Road. Turn slight left onto N. Black Canyon Hwy. Merge onto I-17 N toward Flagstaff. Take Exit 208 toward Peoria Avenue. Turn right onto W. Peoria Avenue. Go to stop light at top of hill. Turn left into parking lot. End at 2532 W. Peoria Ave., Phoenix (seven miles).



# GCU New Athletic Facilities



## ▲ Events Center

Grand Canyon University's 5,000-seat Events Center promises to fill a void in athletic and performance facilities in the Valley, with a "just-right" capacity for mid-size sporting events, musical performances, speaking engagements and conferences. With its main purpose to host GCU's men's and women's basketball, the Camelback Road location of the 135,000 square-foot venue will be an ideal location for Christian concerts and outside performances. The facility broke ground earlier this summer and is anticipated to be complete by the 2011-12 basketball season.

For the ‘wow’ factor junior guard Nick Witherill waited until the ribbon-cutting ceremony to see GCU’s new Student Recreation Center.

It was worth the wait.

On Oct. 8, Grand Canyon University welcomed media, faculty, staff and students to the place for fitness and fellowship.

Housed with three full-size basketball courts, a large wrestling room, a weight room for athletes, a gym for staff and non-athletes and a dance studio to be used for fitness classes, the rec center – as could be expected – met rave reviews.

*“At my old school (Division I Charlotte), we had only one court, and now this team has three courts! It’s beautiful!”* said senior Gaby Ngoundjo.

*“Seeing things like this just lifts your spirits, because it shows that people really care and want you to succeed,”* said GCU head basketball coach Russ Pennell.

*“The courts, in and of themselves, are an incredible recruiting tool,”* said Bob Machen, GCU’s campus development project manager. *“This is an NBA-quality court. The Phoenix Suns don’t have a better one.”*

The new 55,000-square foot facility is open from 6 a.m. to 1 a.m. Monday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 1 a.m. Saturday and Sunday.

Just over four years ago, seven NCAA Division II programs banded together to revive a briefly dormant league, marking the rebirth of the Pacific West Conference.

In a short time the PacWest has been rocketing back to prominence thanks to national-caliber athletic programs, automatic qualifiers, the addition of baseball as a conference sport, and the rise to a nine-team league.

The largest geographic conference in Division II saw its rebirth begin in the fall of 2006 when the league began competition in men's and women's soccer for the first time. Women's basketball also became a league sport, complementing men's golf, women's tennis, men's and women's cross country, men's basketball and softball, which have been a staple of the league for several years.

Grand Canyon University in Arizona, Dixie State College of Utah and Notre Dame de Namur University in California teamed up with longtime Hawai'iian-based PacWest programs Chaminade University of Honolulu, Brigham Young University Hawai'i, the University of Hawai'i at Hilo and Hawai'i Pacific University to re-form a conference that fell silent for one year.

In the fall, the Pacific West crowns champions in men's and women's soccer, women's volleyball, and men's and women's cross country, while the winter season is the domain of men's and women's basketball. In the spring, the league celebrates champions in women's tennis, men's golf, softball and, for the first time in 2009, baseball.

Following the 2004-05 campaign, the Pacific West Conference lost a pair of programs in Western New Mexico and Montana State-Billings to slip below the mandated six-team minimum that comprises an official NCAA Division II league. With it went the automatic qualifiers for post-season play.

However, the four schools off the mainland competed together as an unofficial conference, playing each other in the sport of basketball so many times that game films quickly became obsolete.

Although not officially recognized by the NCAA that year, the perseverance by Chaminade, BYU-Hawai'i, HPU and Hawai'i Hilo

kept the core of a proud tradition intact until the three new schools put the league back on the Division II map.

And it is a big map.

From the Southwest to the Pacific Rim, the PacWest can redeem a lot of frequent-flyer miles, but its travel plans have its teams landing in major metropolitan markets that many established Division II leagues don't match.

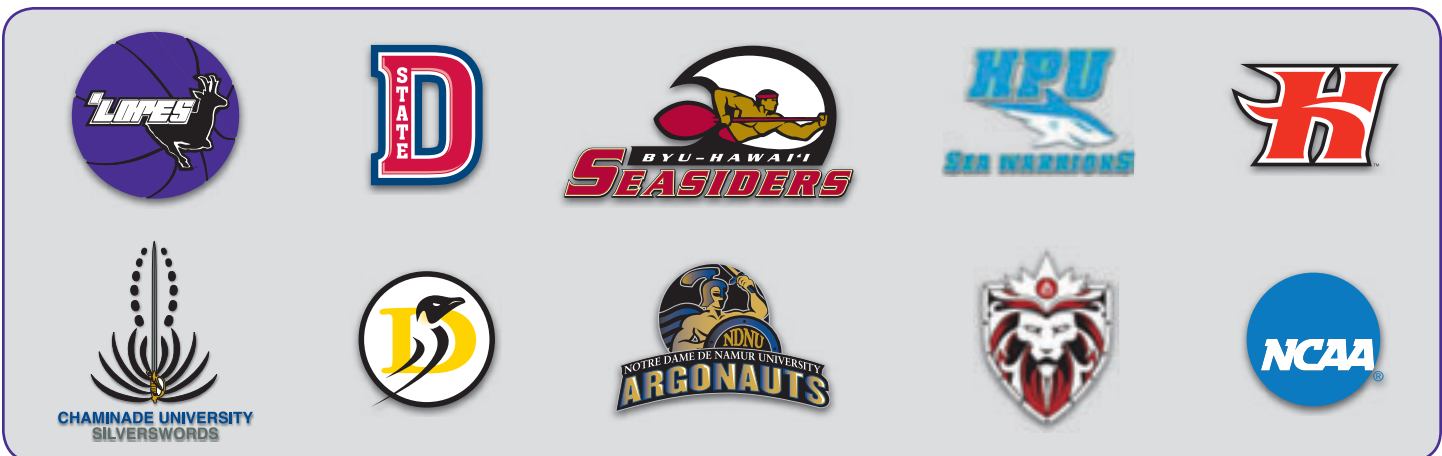
The schools in Hawai'i have a natural appeal to the local media and community because they turn out quality athletic programs in a focused market. BYU-Hawai'i tennis along with the Chaminade men's basketball team's prominent appearance in the Maui Invitational are just a couple of the highly-visible programs and, in 2010, Hawai'i Pacific's softball program grabbed the conference's second national title (BYU-Hawai'i won in women's tennis in 2007) since the league's rebirth.

NDNU calls Belmont, Calif. home and is situated midway between the two major media and population centers of San Francisco and San Jose. The addition of the Academy of Art University in San Francisco in 2008-09 and Dominican University of California in 2009-10 gave the PacWest three schools in the Bay Area.

Dixie State is located in the southwest corner of Utah in St. George, not too far across the Nevada border from Las Vegas. The college draws interest from Salt Lake City and Provo as it became the first full-fledged NCAA Division II program in the state.

Grand Canyon University has been in the Division II bracket for a number of years. The Antelopes have a rich tradition of basketball, baseball and men's soccer and have one of the largest markets in the nation with their location in Phoenix.

The PacWest conference is led by Bob Hogue, the former state senator from Hawai'i who is based in the island state. Hogue replaced Woody Hahn, who retired after serving as the commissioner since the early 1990s.

# 2010 - 11 Season Outlook

## Be excellent today.

Those three simple words are the “battle cry” of the Grand Canyon University men’s basketball team, focusing on the now for the 2010-11 season.

Though the *now* is the focus, the team still wants to pick up where it left off from the 2009-10 season. Winning the final six, 10 of the last 13 and returning six of the top seven scorers, being excellent today should lead to a promising tomorrow.

Eight players return from last season and seven new recruits add optimism for the upcoming year.

With all the experience coming back, there still are only two seniors. The Cameroonian Connection of 6-foot-7 **Gaby Ngoundjo** and 6-5 **Rony Tchatchoua** will wrap up their collegiate careers playing for Russ Pennell. They wrapped up their high school careers in Little Rock, Ark., playing for Russ Pennell’s father, Dewey Pennell, where they won a state title in 2006.

The two provide ample experience. Ngoundjo averaged 8.3 points and 6.0 rebounds to go with a team-best 1.2 blocked shots per game. Tchatchoua was the team’s top field goal shooter (54.6 percent) and averaged 7.0 points per game and was second in steals.

Ngoundjo, who along with the other seven returnees either transferred from another school or were freshmen, said having a year in the coach’s system will benefit the team.

*“Our defense will be the key to how we do,” said the team’s shot-blocking leader.*

Like the senior pair, 6-7 junior **Justin Wesolowski** and 6-2 junior **Nick Witherill** bring back experience and productivity. Wesolowski averaged 8.3 points and a GCU-best 6.1 rebounds. Witherill tied a school record when he went 6-for-6 from 3-point range in a win over CSU Dominguez Hills. He averaged 8.5 points.

Sophomore guards **Brad Carroll** (6-6) and **Steven Morin** (6-5) took advantage of their first full seasons on the floor. A transfer from Milwaukee, Carroll was selected to the All-Pacific West Conference second team. He averaged 9.0 points – 11.4 in conference play – and led the team in free-throw percentage (80.9), steals (1.1) and minutes played (32.7). Morin was coach Russ Pennell’s first Arizona high school recruit. A 3-point marksman, he made 50 as a frosh and averaged 6.8 points per contest.

*“I think we’ll be deeper than last year and have a lot of guys competing for minutes,” said Carroll. “Being deeper, I think we’ll be able to sustain our intensity for the entire game.”*

With the skill and familiarity returning, Pennell has added a talented group of newcomers, creating depth and a lot of interchangeable parts.

*“We improved our basketball team through recruiting,” said the second-year coach. “The way we play, we need versatility and numbers, and I think we have both of those.”*

Speed and Wynn are what every team wants from a recruiting class and that’s just what the Antelopes got. (OK, it’s not w-i-n, but you get the point.)

Six-foot guard **Kyle Speed** and 6-2 **Fletcher Wynn** are a pair of junior college transfers with two years of eligibility remaining. Speed is a true point guard who’s been a part of a NJCAA national championship team. Wynn, too, comes from a very successful junior college team.

Two more JUCOS, 6-9 **Braylon Pickrel** and 6-7 **Barret Robbins**, will each have three years left in the purple and black. Pickrel is a big man with impressive perimeter skills, while Robbins, the son of former Phoenix Cardinals lineman “Tootie” Robbins, adds more toughness to the inside.

Six-foot-7 freshman **Chris Johnson** is the son of former Arizona State standout Joey Johnson and nephew of former GCU star Craig Johnson, who played on the 1988 national championship team, and late Hall of Famer Dennis Johnson.

Six-foot frosh newcomer **Micah Fetters**, the son of former Arizona Diamondbacks popular reliever Mike Fetters, will likely be redshirted due to an off-season injury.

**Travis Currier**, a 6-6 sophomore, and **Cooper Nelson**, a 5-8 sophomore, along with 6-3 freshman **Paul Newendyke** are eager to get their opportunities to aid Pennell’s second GCU group.

The schedule creates a lot of challenges. GCU opens with exhibitions against two NCAA Division I tournament teams, UNLV and Utah State, then open the regular season at Division I Utah.

The home opening weekend includes a contest against No. 3 St. Cloud State and, of course, the Pacific West Conference provides some of the best Division II competition in the country.

*“I think our conference is underrated and doesn’t get the respect it deserves,” said Pennell.*

Both BYU-Hawai’i and Dixie State were tournament teams, while national champ Cal Poly Pomona had its toughest game of the tournament against BYU-Hawai’i.

*“Last year, we were all new to the league,” said Carroll. “We know what to expect (this year) at difference places. Wherever we go, we know we’ll have to bring our ‘A’ game.”*

**R**uss Pennell begins his second season as Grand Canyon University's head men's basketball coach.

Less than one month after leading the University of Arizona – as its interim head coach – to the Sweet 16 of the 2009 NCAA Division I Basketball Championships, Pennell was named GCU's 12th men's basketball coach, April 9, 2009.

With no returning players from the 2008-09 season, a pre-Pacific West Conference schedule that saw the 'Lopes play 12 of 16 games on the road, Pennell's initial GCU team overcame more than its share of obstacles to finish 16-16, winning 10 of the final 13 games, including the last six.

Pennell took over as Arizona's interim head coach after legendary U of A coach Lute Olson announced his retirement, Oct. 24, 2008. He had been hired in May of 2008 to be a Wildcat assistant coach. Along with leading U of A to the national tournament, Pennell's team went 21-14 overall.

From 1998-2004, Pennell was an assistant coach at Arizona State University under Rob Evans. The Sun Devils went 108-103 during that time with one NCAA bid (2003) and three trips to the National Invitational Tournament.

Pennell was on Evans' staff at the University of Mississippi for six seasons from 1992-98. In that span, Ole Miss went 86-81, including back-to-back trips to the NCAA Tournament in 1997 and 1998. The Rebels won the Southeastern Conference West Division titles in each of those seasons combining to go 42-16 and climbing to No. 10 in the nation. It was the first time Mississippi had posted consecutive 20-win seasons in 60 years.

He began his coaching career at Oklahoma State University from 1990-92. In those two seasons, the Cowboys went 52-16 under head coach Eddie Sutton. During the 1990-91 season, the Cowboys shared the Big Eight Conference championship with a 24-8 overall record and advanced to the NCAA Tournament. The following year, OSU posted a 28-8 mark, and was ranked as high as No. 2 in the

Associated Press Top 25 poll. The Cowboys advanced to the NCAA Tournament's Sweet 16 in both of Pennell's seasons in Stillwater.

He provided color commentary for the Arizona State University radio network during the 2007-08 season. He also ran the Arizona Premier Basketball Academy, offering instruction to high school and youth players in the Phoenix area.

Pennell played collegiately at Arkansas under Eddie Sutton in 1979-80. The Razorbacks finished second in the Southwest Conference that year. Pennell transferred to Central Arkansas in 1981, and was a two-year starter at point guard. As a senior, he led the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference with 8.2 assists per game. He was a teammate of former Chicago Bulls star Scottie Pippen in 1983-84.

Pennell, 48, earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from Pittsburg State University in 1989. He received his master's in physical education from PSU in 1990. A native of Pittsburg, Kan., he is a 1979 graduate of Pittsburg High School, where he played for his father, Dewey, and was an all-state selection. As a senior, he helped his school maintain the No. 2 ranking in the state throughout the season.

Pennell is a member of the National Association of Basketball Coaches and is extremely active in Fellowship of Christian Athletes. He and his wife, Julie, were married in 1986 and have two daughters, Morgan Rachel and Emily Katherine.

2<sup>nd</sup> Year

**M**ark Nelson brought 16 years of college and USA Basketball coaching experience to his position as a full-time assistant when hired by Grand Canyon University for the 2009-10 season. In 11 years as a head coach at the junior-college level, he won 243 games at Butler County and Cowley County in Kansas and at Wabash Valley in Illinois. In 2001-02, he guided Wabash Valley to a 32-6 record and a berth in the NJCAA Final Four. In the summer of 2002, he was selected as a coach for the U.S. Junior National Team, which included future NBA stars Carmelo Anthony, Chris Bosh and Deron Williams. He was the junior-college coach of Tony Allen, who also went on to the NBA.

In mid-2005, Nelson and Russ Pennell opened the Arizona Premier Basketball Academy in Gilbert, which quickly became the pre-eminent basketball training facility in the Southwest. Several of GCU's players are products of the academy and its travel teams, which experienced national success because of their sound fundamentals and unselfish style of play. Because of his abilities as an instructor and trainer, Nelson has been sought out by college and pro players for skill-development workouts in the offseason. At GCU, he works primarily with the team's guards.

Nelson is a native of Pittsburg, KS, who played at Independence Community College and then at Kansas State. During Nelson's two years at K-State playing for Head Coach Lon Kruger, the team won 45 games and twice played in the NCAA tournament, reaching the Elite Eight once. He has a degree in physical education from K-State. Nelson and his wife, Sherry, have three children: 19-year-old twins Cooper and Katie, both part of the GCU program, and 15-year-old Chase.



**Anthony Boone**  
2<sup>nd</sup> Year

**A**nthony Boone is in his second season as a GCU assistant men's basketball coach. He arrived at GCU as a full-time assistant after 10 years of coaching at the Division-I level and an outstanding playing career at the University of Mississippi. Boone was a graduate assistant coach at Ole Miss, then an assistant coach for three seasons at Murray State and six seasons at Jackson State. As a player for Ole Miss, where Rob Evans was the head coach and Russ Pennell his top assistant, Boone led the Rebels to back-to-back 20-win seasons for the first time in 60 years. He was a senior on the team that lost in the 1998 NCAA tournament to Valparaiso on a memorable last-second shot.

Despite undergoing four knee surgeries, Boone started 79 of 94 games at Ole Miss. Even with relatively modest career averages of 7.2 points and 4.8 rebounds, his inspirational play was recognized by the retirement of his number (41) – only the second student-athlete to be so honored by the school. (Quarterback Archie Manning, the father of NFL quarterback Peyton Manning, was the first.) After his senior season, Boone was one of seven finalists for the Chip Hilton Award, given annually by the Basketball Hall of Fame to a player who demonstrates character on and off the court. He is a member of the Ole Miss Hall of Fame and twice was selected for the Southeastern Conference Academic Honor Roll.

Boone has a bachelor's degree in chemical engineering and a master's in mathematics, both from Ole Miss. He was class salutatorian at Central High School in West Helena, AR, where he was an all-state athlete. At GCU, he works primarily with the team's big men. He and his wife, Jennifer, have two daughters, Rebecca and Lyndsey.

**Phil Cullen**  
2<sup>nd</sup> Year

**Phil Cullen** joined the GCU staff as a full-time assistant, in 2009-10, after a distinguished two-sport athletic career. In four years at the University of Utah, he played for Head Coach Rick Majerus on teams that went 90-35, including 28-5 in 1998-99. The 6-foot-9 Cullen, known for his shooting stroke, made seven consecutive three-pointers in a first-round NCAA tournament game against Indiana in 2002, tying a tournament record on the way to a 25-point performance. It came in his final game at Utah. In his junior season, he scored in double figures 12 times and averaged 9.1 points.

Cullen also was a pitcher for five years in the Seattle Mariners organization before his career was cut short by an arm injury. As a high school senior in tiny Chelan, WA, Cullen was named Washington Athlete of the Year by the Associated Press. His father played baseball and football at Eastern Washington, and his 6-foot-3 sister played volleyball at Gonzaga.

Cullen comes from a family of coaches and has been an instructor and coach at the Arizona Premier Basketball Academy in Gilbert. At GCU, he works primarily with the team's big men and coordinates scheduling and travel. He has a degree in civil and environmental engineering, and he passed the Principles and Practice of Engineering (PE) examination in 2008. Cullen and his wife, Tara, have one daughter, Josie.

His mother, Jody, Olson's daughter, is the athletic director at Catalina Foothills High School.

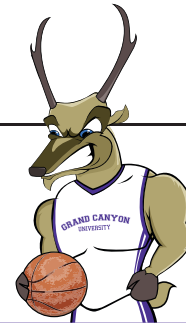

# Grand Canyon's History of Hoops



**1958-59**

Three national championships and 16 national tournament appearances speak volumes of the accomplishments of the Grand Canyon University men's basketball program.

The first team stepped on the floor in 1949 and in nine years (1958-59 season) the program had an undefeated season. Under the tutelage of coach Dr. Dave Brazell, the 1958-59 team went 20-0.

It is still the only basketball team to go unbeaten. It averaged 82.4 points per game and beat opponents by an average of nearly 19 points per game.

Sixteen years later, Grand Canyon won the first of three championships in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics. The 1974-75 and 1977-78 clubs were coached by Ben Lindsey. The 1987-88 title team was mentored by Paul Westphal.

The team went to the NAIA tournament 11 times from 1973 to 1991. In 1992, Canyon went to its first NCAA tournament. Its other NCAA tournament bids came in 1996, 1997, 1998 and 2007.

Bayard Forrest, who later went on to play for the Phoenix Suns, led Grand Canyon to the 1975 title, a 65-64 win over Midwestern State. The team won its final 12 games and Forrest was a three-time NAIA first-team All-American. During his time at Grand Canyon, the Antelopes went 104-18.

The 1978 team finished 30-3 (the same record as the first national championship squad), and though it beat Kearney State 79-75 in the final, it was the route that made the title memorable. In the quarterfinals, after five overtimes, Grand Canyon beat Central State 88-82.

In 1988 and in front of an ESPN national broadcast audience, Grand Canyon hoisted its third NAIA banner. An 88-86 win over Auburn University-Montgomery finished off a 37-6 season and senior guard Rodney Johns was named the tournament MVP.

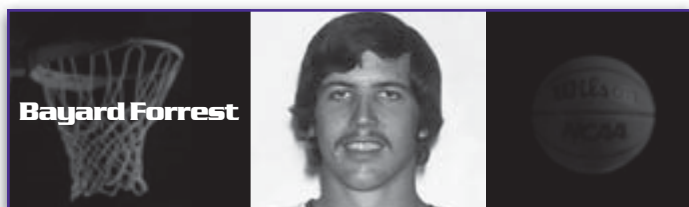

# Grand Canyon to Grand Stage



**B**ayard Forrest became the first Antelope to go from Grand Canyon University to the NBA. He played for the Phoenix Suns from 1977-1979. Forrest played in 139 regular-season games and 15 playoff games before retiring in 1980 with a back injury. He averaged 4.1 points and 4.1 rebounds, logging 15.3 minutes per game in his two seasons with the Suns. The Suns made a playoff appearance each season Forrest was in the NBA.

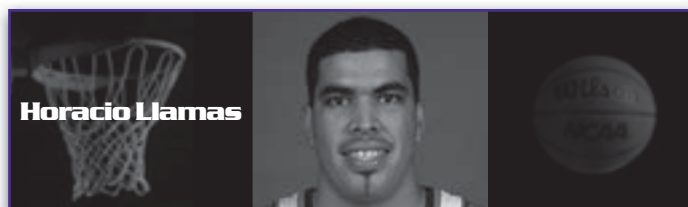
Forrest was a member of Grand Canyon's team from 1972-1976, and still has his name atop many of the school records. His 2,195 career points and 1,544 career rebounds have been untouchable since his departure from campus in 1976. Forrest also has the career marks in field goals made and free throws made. In addition to his career rebound record, he holds three of the top five rebounding season total high marks, his school-record 420 set in the 1972-73 season when he was a freshman. In 1974-75, Forrest helped lead the 'Lopes to their first of three NAIA National Championships. He was a three-time NAIA First-Team All-American from 1974-76.

The Forrest tradition continued at GCU with his youngest daughter Mandy attending the school on a volleyball scholarship. Mandy was a four-year volleyball letterwinner, and in 2003 earned First Team All-California Collegiate Athletic Association honors.



**J**ohn Shumate had a five-year career in the NBA with the Buffalo Braves, Phoenix Suns, Detroit Pistons, Houston Rockets, San Antonio Spurs and Seattle SuperSonics. He averaged 12.3 points and 7.5 rebounds in his NBA career. He was named to the NBA all-rookie squad in 1975-76.

A college player at Notre Dame, Shumate coached at Grand Canyon University from 1983-1986, compiling a 58-33 record that included two trips to the postseason. Shumate also served as an assistant coach at Notre Dame for two seasons prior to taking the GCU job and two seasons after leaving GCU. Following his second stint as assistant coach at Notre Dame, Shumate was named head coach at Southern Methodist University in 1988. He then returned to the NBA as an assistant coach with the Toronto Raptors in 1995. In 1998, he joined the Suns' Community Relations staff before being named a Suns' college scout in 2001. In 2003, Shumate coached the Phoenix Mercury of the WNBA. In 2004, he returned to the Suns' staff as a college scout.



**H**oracio Llamas joined Bay Forrest as the second Antelope to jump to the NBA ranks as a player. He was a member of the Phoenix Suns from 1996-1998. Llamas became the First Mexican-born player to play in the NBA. Llamas hailed from El Rosrio Sinaloa, Mexico. He played in 28 games over his two-year NBA career, seeing time in 20 games during the 1997-1998 season.

Llamas was a two-year letterwinner at GCU from 1994-96. During his senior year, Llamas earned *Basketball Times* Division II Player of the Year honors, in addition to being named a First Team All-American. Llamas holds two blocked-shot records at GCU, and had 172 in his two years. His 106 blocks in a season and 10 in a game remain as school bests. Llamas earned First-Team All-CCAA honors twice and was MVP of the CCAA Tournament in 1995.



**P**aul Westphal enjoyed a 12-year NBA career with the Boston Celtics, Phoenix Suns, New York Knicks and Seattle SuperSonics (he was a five-time All-Star) before joining GCU as the head coach of the basketball program in 1986. In two years as head coach at GCU, Westphal went 63-18 and won the NAIA National Championship in 1988. In 1993, Westphal was named head coach of the Phoenix Suns. The Suns went 62-20 his first season, losing to the Chicago Bulls in the NBA Finals.

Prior to this season, Westphal had coached seven seasons in the NBA, compiling a 267-159 record for a .626 winning percentage with the Suns and SuperSonics. Westphal coached at Pepperdine University from 2001-06, guiding the Waves to an overall 76-72 mark (.514). In 2007, he was named as an assistant coach with the Dallas Mavericks. He currently is the head coach of the Sacramento Kings.



**B**en Lindsey, GCU's all-time winningest coach, coached the USA Men's Basketball Olympic Festival West Team in 1978. Lindsey's teams went 317-137 (.698) from 1965-81 at Grand Canyon University. His Antelope teams won two NAIA national championships, going 30-3 each year in 1974-75 and 1977-78. His Grand Canyon team's run to the 1978 national title featured an 88-82, five-overtime win over Central State in the NAIA quarterfinals. In 2010, he was enshrined into the GCU Hall of Fame.

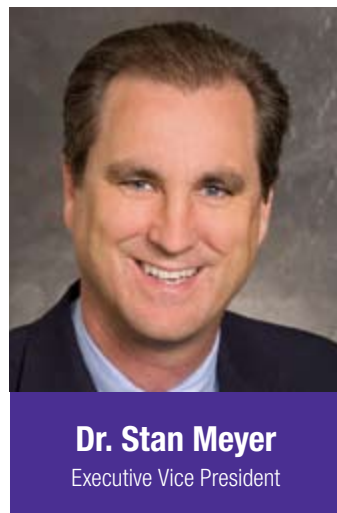
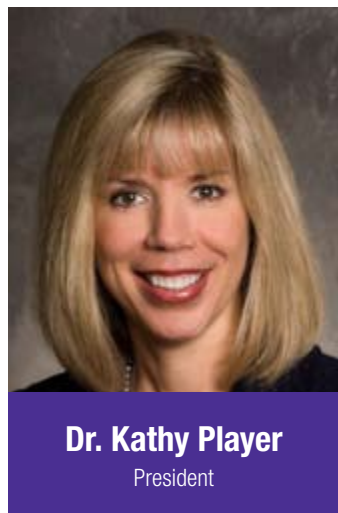
