



AUBURNI UNIVERSITY

Auburn's beautiful main campus--graced by greenery and open spaces and highlighted by historic Samford Park--is made up of 375 buildings spread across 1,875 acres. Buildings in the main campus area are within walking distance of each other. Residence halls are only a short walk from classrooms, dining and athletic facilities. Auburn is located in the Southeastern United States in east-central Alabama about 30 miles from the Georgia border.

One of the state's fastest growing cities, Auburn has a population of about 47,000. An adjacent twin-city, Opelika, has a population of about 30,000. Atlanta, Ga., isonly 100 miles to the northeast via Interstate 85; Birmingham is 100 miles to the north via U.S. 280 or I-85/65; Montgomery is 50 miles to the west via I-85; and the Gulf beaches are about 200 miles away. The university enjoys the advantages of security, seclusion and clean air and water. Auburn is a clean city with a mild climate that offers many cultural opportunities.

Exceeding expectations. That is exactly what Tony Barbee has continued to do in his five seasons as a head coach.

Barbee, the 2010 Conference USA Coach of the Year, did just that last season in his first year at Auburn. He did this despite losing the entire starting lineup and the only returning player who had contributed the previous season in Frankie Sullivan.

Auburn finished 11-20 overall and 4-12 in the SEC in 2010-11 but won two of its last three games and went 3-4 in its last seven regular season games to finish fifth in the SEC's Western Division. The Tigers were a consensus preseason last place pick in the league and was called "the worst BCS conference team in the country" by some national prognosticators.

Barbee was being discussed as a candidate for SEC Coach of the Year by the media and league coaches in the latter part of the season.

The Tigers were one of the youngest teams in America with an average of 1.14 years of experience, ranked 315th out of 345 Div. I teams. There was not one senior on the roster and only 12 percent of Auburn's scoring returned from the previous season's team that finished 15-17 overall.

A trademark of each of Barbee's teams, it starts with defense as undermanned Auburn ranked second in the SEC with 7.8 steals per game.

The relentless Tigers, which took on the personality of their head coach, came back to win four games after trailing by 15 points or more, including wins over Mississippi State, Ole Miss and at LSU.

The 20-point comeback win over Ole Miss was the second largest in school history, just surpassing the 19-point comeback win over Mississippi State two weeks prior. Auburn also Florida State which eventually came within one point of the NCAA Tournament Final Four.

When Barbee was named Auburn's 20th head basketball coach on March 24, 2010, he had advanced to postseason play in 18 of his 19 seasons as a head coach, assistant coach and player.

Barbee, 40, brought his energetic, exciting and uptempo brand of basketball to the Tigers, who begin its second season in the sparkling

\$86 million Auburn Arena.

In addition, can he ever recruit? He recruits not only the top players in the state and the Southeast but the nation as well.

His recruiting efforts don't stop at the players either. Barbee recruits Auburn fans, Auburn students and even the media.

Barbee, who averaged 20.5 wins per season in four years as head coach at UTEP, exceeded expectations each season in El Paso. He steadily improved each year with the Miners, capped with a 26-7 record, Conference USA

regular season title and NCAA Tournament appearance in 2009-10. The Miners lost to eventual NCAA runner-up Butler in the NCAA Tournament.

The Miners finished 15-1 in Conference USA and had a 16-game winning streak and set a school record for consecutive road wins with seven while being ranked in the top 25 by both the Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll for the first time in 18 years.

Barbee, who was also named NABC District 11 Coach of the Year, coached C-

USA Player of the Year Randy Culpepper, All-CUSA second-team selection Derrick Caracter and C-USA All-Defensive Team member Julyan Stone.

Barbee coached Conference USA firstteam selections in each of his final three seasons at UTEP to go along with four players who earned 10 All-C-USA honors combined.

Despite losing all-time leading scorer Stefon Jackson from the year before, the 2009-10 Miners cemented their reputation as one of the nation's top teams with tenacious defense.

UTEP lowered its opponent scoring average from 71.9 points per game in 2008-09 to 64.6 ppg the following season -- the second best scoring defense for the Miners in the last 18 years. UTEP's field goal pct. defense (.392) was its best in 36 years, and its 3-point field goal pct. defense (.313) tied for first in school history.

The Miners held 14 of 16 C-USA opponents below their season scoring averages and in league road games, held their opponents to a mere 35.9 percent shooting from the field.

One of UTEP's biggest wins was a 72-67 victory at Memphis on Jan. 20, ending Memphis' NCAA record-tying 64 game conference winning streak.

Barbee's record improved each of his four season's at UTEP by going 14-17 in his first season in 2006-07, 19-14 in 2007-08, 23-14 in 2008-09 to 26-7 in 2009-10. His C-USA record improved each season as well from 6-10 to 8-8 to 10-6 to 15-1 and Conference USA Champions. The 2008-09 Miners advanced to the championship series of the College Basketball Invitational behind Stefon Jackson, who ended his prolific career as both UTEP's and Conference USA's all-time leading scorer with 2,456 points. UTEP went 23-14 overall and tied for fourth in C-USA at 10-6 as three players received All-C-USA honors: Jackson a first-team selection, Randy Culpepper a third-team pick and Arnett Moultrie an All-Freshman Team member.

In 2007-08, UTEP went 19-14 overall and tied for sixth in C-USA with an 8-8 record as Jackson was named first-team All-C-USA. Jackson led C-USA and was ranked seventh nationally in scoring at 23.6 ppg, eclipsing Dwyane Wade's C-USA junior scoring record with 778 points. Culpepper was selected the C-USA Sixth Man of the Year.

Despite being hired just two months prior to the start of practice and inheriting a roster with only three returning letterwinners, Barbee made UTEP competitive with a 14-17 record overall and 6-10 mark in C-USA, good for 10th in his first season. Jackson was an All-C-USA second-team selection.

Prior to his stint at UTEP, Barbee spent six highly successful seasons as an assistant coach at Memphis under John Calipari where he was considered one of the nation's top recruiters.

During Barbee's tenure as an assistant coach at Memphis from 2000-06, the Tigers won 148 games, an average of nearly 25 victories per season.

Memphis made six consecutive postseason tournament appearances (NCAA: 2003, 2004, 2006; and NIT: 2001, 2002, 2005). The Tigers earned three final AP top 25 rankings, fourth in 2006, 19th in 2003 and 24th in 2004.

In 2005-06, Memphis had a 33-4 record while reaching the NCAA Tournament Elite Eight. The Tigers won the C-USA regular season title and tournament championship while having two players chosen in the first round of the NBA Draft -- Rodney Carney (Philadelphia 76ers) and Shawne Williams (Indiana Pacers).

Memphis won a share of the 2004 C-USA regular season title, won the 2002 NIT and won the C-USA National Division in 2002 and 2003.

Barbee was named the top assistant in C-USA by *Street & Smith* in 2005-06 and was also honored by Rivals.com as the nation's No. 3 recruiter while at Memphis. HoopScoop magazine tabbed him as one of the nation's top assistant coaches in 2004.

Memphis produced top 10 recruiting classes in each of Barbee's six years, including the 2001 class that was ranked No. 1 in the country. The 2002 recruiting class would have been top-ranked had it not lost a player to the NBA.

Seven players coached by Barbee are currently in the NBA - Derrick Caracter (Los Angeles Lakers), Rodney Carney (Golden State Warriors), Joey Dorsey (Toronto Raptors), Chris Douglas-Roberts (Milwaukee Bucks), Earl Barron (Portland Trail Blazers), Shawne Williams (New York Knicks) and Marcus Camby (Portland Trail Blazers).

Barbee began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at UMass for the 1995-96 season under Calipari. The Minutemen went 35-2 en route to the Final Four of the NCAA Tournament as Barbee was also the team's radio color analyst.

He was promoted to assistant coach at UMass from 1996-98 under Bruiser Flint while the Minutemen went to a pair of NCAA Tournaments.

Barbee was an assistant coach at Wyoming under Steve McClain in 1998-99 as the Cowboys went 18-10 and reached the NIT second round.

Barbee went back to UMass under Flint for the 1999-2000 season and advanced to the NIT.

As a player at UMass, Barbee was instrumental in the Minutemen posting a 91-39 record and earning four straight postseason tournament bids. UMass won back-to-back Atlantic 10 Conference regular season and tournament titles in 1992 and 1993.

Barbee still ranks among the school's all-time

leaders in nuAbbAmerous statistical categories, including scoring with 1,643 points. He was a second-team All-Atlantic 10 player in 1991 and 1993 and All-Atlantic 10 Freshman team selection in 1990.

The Indianapolis, Ind., native helped UMass reach the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 in 1992 and the NIT Final Four in 1991.

He played professionally in Spain and France after his playing career at UMass.

Born, Aug. 10, 1971, Barbee earned his B.A. in sports management from UMass in 1993, with a minor in African-American studies. He and his wife, Holly, have a daughter, Hayden Alexandra, and son, Andrew Marsh.



and his sixth season under head coach Tony Barbee. Madlock's coaching and recruiting played a key role during Barbee's first year at Auburn last year in landing top 100 players Willy Kouassi and Cedric McAfee along with Bernard Morena. In his four years prior at UTEP, he recruited 2010 C-USA Player of the Year Randy Culpepper and Arnett Moultrie, a 2009 C-USA All-Freshman Team selection.

A year ago, Auburn won two of its last three games and went 3-4 in its last seven regular season games to finish fifth in the SEC's Western Division. The Tigers were a consensus preseason last place pick in the league and was called "the worst BCS conference team in the country" by some national prognosticators

UTEP won the 2010 Conference USA Championship with a 26-7 record overall and a 15-1 league mark as they advanced to the NCAA Tournament before losing to eventual NCAA runner-up Butler.

The Miners averaged 20.5 wins during the four-year Barbee era and the Miners record steadily improved each season. UTEP reached postseason play

three straight years in El Paso. He coached Stefon Jackson, who is the all-time leading scorer in UTEP and Conference USA his-tory; C-USA Player of the Year Randy Culpepper, All-CUSA second-team selection Derrick Carracter, who was drafted by the two-time defending World Champion Los Angeles Lakers in 2010; and C-USA All-Defensive Team member Julyan Stone.

"Tony Madlock is a person who I have known for a long time," said Barbee. "Having worked at Memphis for six years and him being one of the outstanding former players from that university, we have developed a relationship through the years on the recruiting trail.

"He was a very key piece to my staff at UTEP and helped me bring in some talented members of our team there. His recruiting ties throughout the Southeast have been a valued piece to the puzzle. He has brought all those things here to us at Auburn."

Madlock spent six of his nine years at Arkansas State as the assistant head coach prior to going to El Paso. He helped Arkansas State to the 1998 Sun Belt Conference regular season championship and the 1999 Sun Belt Conference Tournament title as he re-cruited six junior college All-Americans to the school.

He also recruited the only junior college player in Arkansas State history to score 1,000 points in two seasons. He coached four all-conference players and the Sun Belt Conference Newcomer of the Year.

Adrian Peterson, Randy Rutherford and Brooks Thompson also garnered all-conference honors.

The Cowboys compiled a 128-65 record during Dickey's tenure under Eddie Sutton, making four postseason tournament appearances in five years with three of those in the NCAA Tournament in 1995, 1998 and 1999.

Dickey was an administrative assistant and basketball operations director at Oklahoma State for the 1993-94 season.

The Valley Springs, Ark., native started his collegiate coaching career as an assistant at Howard College from 1990-91 and Midland College from 1991-93. He began as a head coach at Lakeside High School in Hot Springs, Ark., from 1983-84 and was an assistant at Morrilton (Ark.) High from 1984-90.

He began his distinguished career in higher education administration in 1986 as associate director of the Office of University Research at Clemson University, where he also served as vice president for research and vice president/vice provost for agriculture and natural resources. Utah State University selected Gogue as provost in 1995.

Gogue met his wife, Susie, in the 8th grade, and they married during their undergraduate years at Auburn. Susie also earned two Auburn degrees. They are the proud parents of three children and have one grandchild.

He is a member of Phi Kappa Phi and Golden Key honor societies, Sigma Chi Fraternity, Sigma Xi scientific research society and the National Society of Scabbard and Blade, the honorary military society for all branches of service. Gogue previously served as an accreditation reviewer for the Pacific Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges.





Auburn Director of Athletics Jay Jacobs has a vision of leading Auburn Athletics to becoming the nation's preeminent Athletics Department.

In his tenure at the helm of the Tigers' program, the department has prospered athletically, academically and financially.

Under Jacobs' leadership, Auburn Athletics has made major strides benefitting Auburn student-athletes, coaches and fans. The department has focused on five strategic goals under his leadership: Winning, graduating student-athletes, managing the department's fiscal affairs, complying with SEC and NCAA rules and providing a positive game day experience.

The Auburn Athletic Department has consistently ranked in the top 10 percent of the NACDA Directors Cup and has claimed 10 national championships under Jacobs, including a school-record four titles in 2005-06. The Auburn men's athletics program finished third nationally in the inaugural Capital One Cup for 2010-11. In 2010, the football program claimed the BCS National Championship, its first national title since 1957. The Auburn equestrian team also won its second national title in 2011. Under Jacobs' watch, Auburn's athletic programs have captured 19 Southeastern Conference titles.

Academically, Auburn has earned seven public recognitions by the NCAA for scoring in the 90th-100th percentile nationally in the Academic Progress Rate (APR).

Jacobs served as the Senior Associate Athletics Director for Tigers Unlimited prior to his appointment as Director of Athletics and has initiated several successful business ventures for the Athletics Department, including a lucrative contract with Under Armour Performance Apparel, which was extended in 2009, and a nine-year extension with multimedia rights holder IMG Sports. During Jacobs' tenure, Auburn has also moved forward with numer-

During Jacobs' tenure, Auburn has also moved forward with numerous facility projects designed to benefit Tiger athletic programs and their fans, most notably, the construction of the state-of-the-art Auburn Arena and basketball practice facility for the 2010-11 season. The most recent facilities upgrade was a \$16 million multipurpose 100-yard indoor practice facility. Completed in August 2011, the facility allows Auburn teams to practice indoors during inclement weather. Jacobs was named Auburn's 14th Director of Athletics on Dec.

Jacobs was named Auburn's 14th Director of Athletics on Dec. 22, 2004, after working in almost every area of the Auburn Athletic Department for the previous 20 years. Jacobs earned his undergraduate and master's degrees in business administration from Auburn in 1985 and 1988, respectively, and was a member of the Auburn football team, earning two letters as an offensive tackle in 1982 and 1983.

He is married to the former Angie Sapp of Dublin, Ga. The couple has three daughters, Haley, Meagan and Jayne. They are also foster parents.



HONORS THE PAST DEFINES THE PRESENT AND INSPIRES THE FUTURE



Lovelace Athletic Museum

When the original Jonathan B. Lovelace Museum & Hall of Honor first opened at the Auburn Athletics Complex, it had a bigger purpose than housing memorabilia and banners.

"The purpose of the Lovelace Museum was to honor the past, define the present and inspire the future," said David Housel, former Auburn Athletics Director and the unofficial historian of Auburn Athletics. "If we don't know where we come from, we really don't know who we are. If we don't know who we are, we really don't know where we have a chance to go."

While the newly opened Lovelace Hall of Honor at Auburn Arena holds true to the museum's original intent, it presents Auburn's history and defines the Auburn Family in a more colorful, interactive and perhaps even more inspiring way.

Fans who visit the Lovelace Hall of Honor at Auburn Arena will take an interactive walk through Auburn Athletics history. They will hear and feel what it must be like to experience Tiger Walk. They are sure to learn facts about Auburn Athletics history they didn't know.

Whether those visiting the Hall of Honor are life-long Auburn fans, the young children of Auburn alumni or even visiting fans from other schools, Randy Byars hopes they will come away knowing what makes the Auburn experience unique.

"The most important thing that we are trying to communicate is what it is like to be a part of the Auburn Family," said Byars, who oversaw the development of the Hall of Honor with help from a consulting firm.

The project has been a labor of love for Byars, who spent months sifting through artifacts from the old museum while also working to obtain new mementos and items never seen before.

The museum features 17 interactive sports cases highlighting each sport at Auburn. LCD screens display pictures of past champions and historical moments, and artifacts in each case complement the stories told on the screens, such as the women's track and field case. It features the National Championship trophy the team won in 2006. Look above the trophy, and a bar is mounted at a height of 6-2.25, the distance school record-holder Raevan Harris cleared in 2009.

"When we set a new record, I'll have to move the bar up," Byars quipped.

Visitors browsing the sports cases can also view Bo Jackson's Heisman Trophy, Jeff Beard's track shoes from the 1932 season and a football signed by the 1937 football team, which won the Bacardi Bowl, Auburn's first bowl game that was played in Havana, Cuba. Auburn and Villanova fought to a 7-7 tie in a game that was almost canceled because Cuban Dictator Fulgencio Batista's picture was not in the game program. The names scribbled on the ball are those of Auburn legends like Walter Gilbert and Billy Hitchcock.

No Auburn Hall of Honor would be complete without Auburn's 17-16 win over Alabama in the 1972 Iron Bowl. And while many Auburn



fans know that David Langner scooped up two blocked punts on nearly identical plays to score the winning touchdowns, few may remember the name Gardner Jett. Jett was the placekicker who kicked the go-ahead extra point to seal the victory. His black kicking cleats from the game are featured in one of the cases.

Other walls at the Hall of Honor feature great Auburn players, teams and coaches. The "Great Auburn Moments" wall presents a chronological history of watershed moments, beginning with Auburn's first football game against Georgia in 1892. Dr. George Petrie was the coach, and the price of admission was 50 cents.

The Auburn Spirit Theater, as Byars calls it, is sure to be a fan favorite. A 16-foot wide screen features 25 brief videos that tell the Auburn story in a compelling, even moving, way. One clip features legendary Coach Pat Dye and the men who played for him. They reminisce about the brutal practices early in the Dye era and how playing for Coach Dye taught them more about life than about football. The "Punt Bama Punt" piece features video and audio highlights of that day that will forever live in Auburn lore.

"These video clips," Byars said, "are not meant to just be the greatest Auburn sports highlights. They tell the story about what makes Auburn special--the Auburn Family and the Auburn spirit."

Another display that Byars calls the "Celebration Area" symbolizes Toomers Corner after an Auburn victory. A ring of white streamers hangs down from the ceiling along with orange and blue banners honoring Auburn's championship teams. Look up, and Nova is circling overhead on a blue-sky canvas.

Another unique feature at the Hall of Honor features pictures of every Auburn studentathlete who has competed for Auburn over the past six years. From a distance, the mosaic shows the eagle soaring above the turf of Pat Dye Field above the inter-locking Auburn symbol. Up close, fans will see some familiar faces and some they may not know that create the mosaic.

When Auburn men and women, their children and grandchildren stroll through the Hall of Honor on Saturdays this fall or throughout basketball season, Housel hopes--knows, reallythat something important will be happening.

"Knowing who we are, knowing where we've come from puts flesh and blood and spirit on the words 'hopes, dreams and aspirations.' It gives those words a humanity that is often lacking when people talk about them. The thing that separates Auburn from other schools is the fact that most people who are Auburn fans became aware of Auburn or were brought to Auburn by someone who loved them and cared about them. That's what makes the Auburn experience special."

And that's what makes a visit to the Lovelace Hall of Honor at Auburn Arena worth every minute of it.







The SEC is one of just two conferences in the nation to have all of its teams ranked at least one week in the AP top 25 since 1999-2000.

• The RPI has ranked the SEC the No.1 overall conference in all of college basketball in five of the past 11 seasons.

Birmingham, Ala. Gerald White calmly sank two free throws with 10 seconds left in overtime to give eighth-seeded Auburn its first SEC Tournament Championship. The Tigers, who reached the 20-win plateau for the second straight year, became the first team win four games in four days in SEC Tournament history. Frank Ford punctuated Auburn's upset win with a slam dunk at the buzzer. Auburn, which scored the first basket of the game, didn't regain the lead until the closing seconds of overtime. Two free throws by Buck Johnson gave Alabama a 46-40 lead with 7:36 left in regulation. Ford hit the front end of a one-and-one to cut the Tide lead to 49-47 with 58 seconds left. A baseline jumper by Ford with :10 left sent the game into overtime tied at 49. Auburn limited starters Buck Johnson and Bobby Lee Hurt to just eight second half points, all from the free throw line. Tournament MVP Chuck Person scored 12 of his game-high 16 points in the first half. Auburn defeated Ole Miss 68-60 in the SEC Tournament first round, beat LSU 58-55 in the quarterfinals and slipped by Florida 43-42 in the semifinals.







Charles Barkley (1982-84) had his #34 Auburn jersey retired March 3, 2001. Barkley, one of the NBA's 50 All-Time Greatest, was a two-time Olympic Gold Medalist, SEC Player of the Decade for the 1980s, All-American, SEC Player of the Year in 1984 and an All-SEC selection.

The 34 Charles Barkley Retired Jersey

No 32 Rex Frederick Retired Jersey

Rex Frederick (1957-59), pictured at midcourt, had his #32 Auburn jersey retired Mar. 4, 2006. The Birmingham, Ala., native was a Helms Athletic Foundation selection in 1959 and was a three-time All-SEC selection. He is Auburn's all-time leading rebounder with 14.3 rebounds per game while his 904 career rebounds ranks fifth on the Tigers' all-time rebounding chart. Frederick left as Auburn's all-time leading rebounder and scorer with 937 points.

The 15 John Mengelt Retired Jersey

John Mengelt (1969-71) became the first Tiger to have his Auburn jersey retired (#15), January 6, 2001. He played only three varsity years, finishing his career as Auburn's all-time leading scorer with 1,920 points. An All-American and All-SEC selection, Mengelt's 60 points vs. Alabama is still an AU record. Chuck Person (#45) and his brother Wesley Person (#11) both had their jerseys retired Feb. 18, 2006. Chuck Person (1983-86) was a two-time All-American in 1985 and 1986 and a three-time first-team All-SEC selection. "The Rifleman" is Auburn's all-time scoring leader with 2,311 points (without the 3-point shot). The Brantley, Ala., native led the Tigers to their greatest run in history reaching the 1986 NCAA Tournament Elite Eight with wins over No. 1 seeded St. John's and fourth-seeded UNLV before falling to eventual National Champion Louisville.

Wesley Person (#11), pictured with Athletics Director Jay Jacobs, and his brother Chuck Person (#45) both had their jerseys retired Feb. 18, 2006. Pictured with Auburn Athletics Director Jay Jacobs, Wesley Person (1991-94) was a 1994 Associated Press All-American, three-time All-SEC selection and is third on Auburn's all-time scoring chart with 2,066 points and all-time leader in 3-pointers made (262) and 3-point percentage (.441).







In 1956, the league coaches began selecting a 10-man All-SEC roster and United Press International started its all-conference picks in 1965. When the conference tournament resumed in 1979, members of the working press once again began selecting an all-tournament squad in addition to a tourney MVP.

Wes Flanigan was presented the United States Basketball Writers' 'Most Courageous Award" at the 1997 NCAA Final Four in Indianapolis. Flanigan, an All-SEC point guard as a junior at Auburn in

1995-96 season, was diagnosed with bone cancer and underwent successful four-hour surgery in May 1996 before his senior season.

He returned to the court five months later and ended up leading the 1996-97 Tigers in scoring (11.0) and assists (4.5). Flanigan's story was featured on CBS, ESPN, CNN, FOX SportsSouth, Intersport Television, Atlanta Journal-Constitution, Memphis Commercial Appeal, Louisville Courier-Journal, Arkansas-Democrat Gazette, The State (Columbia, S.C.), every major newspaper in the state of Alabama among others. In fact, Tommy Hicks, a columnist for The Mobile Press-Register, won the Alabama Sports Writers Association's "Herby Kirby Award" in 1997 for the
