2015-16 TEAM NOTES

TEAM

- Avery Johnson was introduced as Alabama's 20th head men's basketball coach on April 8, 2015. Johnson, who led the San Antonio Spurs to the 1999 NBA title and was named the 2006 NBA Coach of the Year, came to the Capstone after a successful coaching career in the NBA. He replaced former head coach Anthony Grant who compiled a record of 117-85 (.579) over six seasons at Alabama.
- Johnson brings a 254-186 (.577) career coaching record to the Crimson Tide after spending four seasons with the Dallas Mavericks and two-plus seasons with the Brooklyn Nets. During his time in Dallas, Johnson led the Mavericks to the postseason in each of his three-plus seasons as head coach. He led the Mavericks to a record of 194-70 (.735) and set an NBA record for reaching the 50-win plateau (62 games) and the 150-win plateau (191 games) the fastest of any head coach in league history. In 2005-06, Johnson led the Mavericks to their first appearance in the NBA Finals en route to earning NBA Coach of the Year honors.
- Alabama finished with a 19-15 overall record and an 8-10 mark in Southeastern Conference play. The Tide earned an at-large bid to the 2015 National Invitation Tournament where it won the opening round contest over Illinois, 79-58, before falling in the second round at Miami (Fla.), 73-66.
- Alabama made its 13th NIT appearance and 32nd postseason showing when it earned an at-large birth to the 2015 National Invitation Tournament. The Tide went 1-1 in last year's even, and now has a 24-16 (.600) all-time record in postseason NIT play.
- Alabama was one of eight SEC teams to earn a berth in either the NCAA Tournament or NIT in 2015. Joining the Crimson Tide in the NIT was Texas A&M and Vanderbilt, while Arkansas, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU and Ole Miss each earned a spot in the NCAA Tournament.
- Injuries were a major factor for the Crimson Tide throughout the season. Alabama played the final six-plus games of the year without two of its top four scorers in Ricky Tarrant (13.1 ppg - ruptured plantar fascia in left foot) and Shannon Hale (8.2 ppg - broken left foot). Together, the duo contributed 23.3 points per game to the Alabama offense. In fact, Alabama players missed a total of 26.5 games due to injuries (Tarrant - 14, Hale - 6.5, Retin Obasohan - 3, Michael Kessens - 2, Cooper - 1).
- Five of the Tide's 14 losses were decided by a single possession for a total of eight points. The defeats include 53-52 at then-No. 11 Wichita State, 68-66 at South Carolina, 93-91 in overtime at Arkansas, 52-50 to Florida and 66-65 in overtime to Georgia. For the season, the Tide was 3-5 on the year in games decided by a single possession.
- Alabama finished the year an RPI of No. 57 in the nation according to KenPom.com. The Tide was one of nine teams in the Southeastern Conference to who finished the season with a top 65 RPI, according to the website.

INDIVIDUAL

- Guard Retin Obasohan, who averaged 6.2 points per game, was one of the team's top players in the second half of the season. Over Alabama's final 14 games, Obasohan averaged 12.2 ppg, which ranked second on the team during the span, to go along with 4.7 points and 1.4 steals a game. In addition, he shot 46 percent from the floor and 41 percent from beyond the arc over the 14-game stretch. He had just one double-figure game in his first 20 contests (recovering from several minor injuries), compared to 11 double-figure scoring contests over the final 12 games in which he played (missed two games with a hand infection).
- Center Jimmie Taylor established himself as one of the premier defensive players in the SEC. Taylor blocked 59 shots, which were the most swats by an Alabama player since Jamychal Green in 2010-11. The 6-10, 240 pound big man ranked fourth in the league in blocks per game (1.7). Taylor is the only returning player to have started all 34 contests last year, and finished with averages of 5.5 points and 4.9 rebounds while shooting a team-leading 60.2 percent from the floor.
- Senior guard Levi Randolph was named a second team Academic All-American, which was announced on Feb. 26. In achieving the feat, Randolph became the first player in men's basketball program history to earn the honor. Randolph, who earned his undergraduate degree in marketing in just three years, is pursuing a master's degree of marketing. He boasted a 3.45 cumulative GPA as an undergraduate and finished the year with a 3.75 GPA as a graduate student. In addition, the senior captain led the Tide in points (15.4), assists (2.5), steals (1.5) and minutes (35.3) per game.

2015-16 PRESEASON TEAM NOTES

ALABAMA SET TO COMPETE IN 103RD SEASON OF BASKETBALL

- Alabama is set to compete in its 103rd season of basketball in 2015-16.
- The Tide has an all-time record of 1,600-984-1 (.619), which includes a 757-578 (.567) record in SEC play.
- Alabama ranks second in the SEC in league victories and all-time winning percentage.
- UA has made 32 NCAA (19) or NIT (13) appearances and has won seven SEC regular-season titles and six SEC Tournament championships.

AVERY JOHNSON NAMED ALABAMA BASKETBALL HEAD COACH

- Avery Johnson was introduced as Alabama's 20th head men's basketball coach on April 8, 2015. Johnson, who led the San Antonio Spurs to the 1999 NBA title and was named the 2006 NBA Coach of the Year, comes to the Capstone after a successful coaching career in the NBA.
- Johnson brings a 254-186 (.577) career coaching record to the Crimson Tide after spending four seasons with the Dallas Mavericks and two-plus seasons with the Brooklyn Nets.
- During his time in Dallas, Johnson led the Mavericks to the postseason in each of his three-plus seasons as head coach. He led the Mavericks to a record of 194-70 (.735) and set the record for reaching the 50-win plateau (62 games) and the 150-win plateau (191 games) the fastest.
- In 16 NBA seasons, he averaged 8.4 points, 5.5 assists, 1.7 rebounds and 25.3 minutes played in 1,054 career games with seven different teams. Known as "The Little General" for his on-court leadership and diminutive stature, Johnson helped guide the San Antonio Spurs to an NBA Championship in 1999.
- On March, 28 2003 as a member of the Mavericks, Johnson became the 75th player in league history to play 1,000 career games. At 5-11, he joined Calvin Murphy as the only other player under 6-feet in height to reach that milestone. He is still the Spurs' all-time leader in assists (4,474) and ranks 28th in NBA history in the same category. In recognition for his contributions to the Spurs organization, Johnson's No.6 jersey was retired in December, 2007.
- The New Orleans native played his final two collegiate seasons at Southern University, leading the NCAA in assists in each of his two years at Southern, and was named the Southwestern Athletic Conference Player of the Year and the MVP of the conference tournament as both a junior and senior.
- He still owns several NCAA Division I records, including most assists in a single game (22 – shared with two other players), most 20 or more assist games (4), the highest single season assist average (13.3) and the highest career assist average (12.0). As a senior in 1988, he averaged 11.4 points per game, making him the first men's Division I player ever to average double figures in points and assists in the same season.
- Johnson received a degree in psychology in 1988 from Southern University. He married his wife Cassandra in July of 1991 in New Orleans. They have two children, Christianne and Avery Jr., who transferred to Alabama from Texas A&M and will sit out the 2015-16 season due to NCAA transfer rules.

ALABAMA'S YOUTHFUL TEAM

- Due to graduation and transfers, Alabama not only lost five letterwinners off last season's 19-15 squad, but the Tide lost its top three scorers from a year ago in Levi Randolph (15.4 ppg), Ricky Tarrant (13.1 ppg) and Rodney Cooper (11.1 ppg).
- In all, Alabama returns six letterwinners and welcomes five newcomers who are eligible to play this season (another two players will sit out the 2015-16 season due to NCAA transfer rules).

- Junior Shannon Hale returns as the team's top scorer after averaging 8.2 points per game last season. Hale was playing some of his best basketball of the year prior to being sidelined the final six games due to a broken foot. Senior Retin Obasohan averaged 6.2 points per game, while junior Michael Kessens (5.9 ppg) and Jimmie Tayloe (5.5 ppg) also return to this year's squad.
- In all, the Tide returns approximately 52 percent of its total scoring, 65 percent of its rebounding and 49 percent of its assists from a year ago.

ABOUT ALABAMA'S NEWCOMERS

- Alabama has six newcomers to the 2015-16 team who are eligible to compete this season. Transfers Nick King (Memphis) and Avery Johnson Jr. (Texas A&M) will sit out the upcoming season due to NCAA transfer rules. Below is a breakdown of the six newcomers who are immediately eligible to compete this year for the Crimson Tide:
- Brandon Austin** | 6-5 | 180 | G: Played at Carver-Montgomery High School under head coach and former Crimson Tide basketball player J.J. Jackson ... was named the 6A state-tournament MVP and led his team to the 2015 state championship ... was selected to the 2015 Alabama Boys All-Star Basketball Team ... named as a 6A First Team All-State honoree by the Alabama Sports Writers Association ... nominated to play in the McDonald's All-American Game ... ranked No. 2 in the state of Alabama by MaxPreps and No. 5 by 247Sports ... was invited to Nike's Elite 100 camp ... averaged 18 points per game as a senior including a 16 point performance in the Alabama-Mississippi Classic to lead the Alabama squad ... averaged 15 points, seven rebounds and four assists a game as a junior ... led his team to the state Final Four all four years ... played in the 2014 AHSAA North-South All-Star game and was named the MVP of the South team with a game-high 15 points.
- Arthur Edwards** | 6-5 | 210 | G: A fifth-year graduate transfer who will be immediately eligible to suit up and give the Crimson Tide some valuable on-court veteran leadership ... played in 38 contests during his two seasons for the Lobos, including 22 games during the 2014-15 season ... missed eight games last season due to an injury midway through the non-conference portion of the schedule ... averaged 3.9 points and 2.0 rebounds in 12.0 minutes per game ... scored a career-high 10 points versus Air Force (1/14)... tallied a then-career high eight points in second career start vs. Texas A&M before suffering an injury in the second half of the game ... set another career high against Air Force (2/4) with eight rebounds ... scored eight points in three different games (vs. Texas A&M, at UNLV, vs. Air Force) ... also had a career-high three steals at UNLV (1/21) ... appeared in 15 games in his first season at New Mexico in 2013-14 ... scored four points against Alabama A&M (11/9/13) in season opener ... played a season-high 18 minutes versus New Mexico State (12/17/13) ... had four blocks in his 15 appearances.
- Donta' Hall** | 6-10 | 205 | PF: Will come to Alabama after a standout career at Luverne High School under head coach Richard Dorsey ... rated as the No.1 player in the state of Alabama by AL.com ... rated the No. 81 recruit nationally and No. 25 in the region by ESPN.com ... tabbed the 2A Player of the Year by the Alabama Sports Writers Association ... named as a 2A first team all-state honoree for the second straight season ... averaged a triple-double during his senior season with 22.6 points, 18.1 rebounds and nearly 12 blocks per game ... is the first student-athlete from Luverne High School to earn a D-I scholarship ... selected to the 2015 Alabama-Mississippi All-Star game where he 15 points ... was the Class 2A District 3 Regional Winner of the Bryant-Jordan Student Achievement Regional Scholarship, awarded annually to the top student-athletes in the state ... during his junior season, the 6-8, 205-pound power forward averaged 11.7 points, 10.1 rebounds and 6.7 blocks per game. Last season, he led his team to a 25-3 overall record and a state runner-up finish. Hall is a two-time ASWA all-state honoree, including first-team all-state accolades in 2014.

FILLING THE VOID

- Due to several injuries to key players throughout the 2014-15 season, Alabama needed someone to step up and fill a void on offense. In the final 14 games, guard Retin Obasohan was that player.
- Obasohan's numbers improved significantly throughout the entire season after dealing with an injury himself in the early part of the year. Despite missing two of the Tide's last 14 games due to a hand injury of his own, Obasohan averaged 12.2 ppg, which ranked second on the team during the span. In addition, Obasohan's shooting percentages, as well as rebounds and minutes per game saw a significant jumps.
- Finally, Obasohan had just one double-figure game in his first 20 contests (missed one game due to injury), compared to 12 double-figure scoring contests over the final 13 games he has played missed two with an injury).

TIDE REACHES 1,600 WINS

- As a program, Alabama became the 34th program in Division I to reach the 1,600-win plateau with a 79-58 win vs. Illinois on March 17 in the opening round of the 2015 NIT.
- The Tide owns an overall record of 1,600-984(.619). Alabama joined Missouri State, Georgetown, Ohio State Arkansas and Michigan State as programs who have achieved the feat last season.

LEVI RANDOLPH BECOMES PROGRAM'S FIRST ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICAN

- For the first time in program history, Alabama men's basketball has an Academic All-American as Levi Randolph was selected to the 2014-15 Capital One Academic All-America Second Team.
- For Randolph, who is the only player from the Southeastern Conference to earn the honor in the sport of men's basketball, it was a goal he had been working toward his entire collegiate career since the moment he walked on campus.
- Earlier in the year, Randolph was selected to the Capital One Academic All-District 4 First Team for a third consecutive year – the first Crimson Tide men's basketball player in program history to achieve the feat.
- Randolph earned his undergraduate degree in marketing in August of 2014, completing the requirements for graduation in just three years while earning 3.45 grade point average.

RANDOLPH NAMED SEC SCHOLAR ATHLETE OF THE YEAR, 2ND TEAM ALL-SEC

- Guard Levi Randolph was named the 2015 SEC Scholar Athlete of the Year. In addition, the Madison, Ala., native earned his first career all-conference accolade, as he was tabbed as a second team All-SEC honoree.
- Randolph became the second men's basketball player in program history to earn the league's Scholar Athlete of the Year award, joining former standout Justin Knox who claimed the recognition in 2009.

OH SO CLOSE!

- Five of Alabama's 15 losses came down to a final possession (for a total of eight points), four of which came during SEC play.
- Alabama lost at No. 11 Wichita State by one point (53-52) on Dec. 16, which was the only non-conference one-possession loss.

DIFFERENCE IN WINS AND LOSSES

- There were a couple of keys for the Tide when it came to determining the outcome of a game last season. The biggest was on the backboards. In Alabama's 19 wins, it owned a rebounding margin of +1.9, however, that number fell to -3.4 in UA's 15 losses. In addition, the Tide allowed opponents to score 16.1 more points a game in games lost (73.1 in losses vs. 57.0 in wins).

HOME SWEET HOME

- Over the last six years, Alabama has a record of 86-22 (.796) on Alabama's home floor. During the 2013-14 season, the Tide finished with a 13-4 mark at home and outscored teams by an average of 9.5 points a game (73.4-63.8). In 2014-15, Alabama finished with a 14-5 record in home games and outscored the competition by 7.2 points per game (67.3-60.1).
- Since the start of the 2010-11 campaign, the Tide has won 75 of the last 91 games played under the arched roof of Coleman Coliseum (75-16; .824).
- Overall, Alabama owns a record of 544-125 (.813) in the facility's 47th season of use.
- Since 2009, Alabama owns a home record of 38-13 (.745) against SEC competition. Since 2011, the Tide boasts a 34-9 (.791) mark at home against the conference.

TIDE'S TRENDS

- There were few noticeable trends when it comes to the 2014-15 Alabama men's basketball team.
- One of the biggest trends to keep in eye on was the field goal percentages throughout a game. The Tide owned a record of 14-1 when it held the opposition to 40 percent or less shooting from the field. The only two losses came when Alabama fell to Georgia in overtime (2/21) after missing a shot at the buzzer to win the contest and against Miami (3/21) in the NIT.
- Below is a list of other key factors during a game. Alabama was:
 - 14-1 when it held the opposition to 40% or less field goal percentage
 - 14-5 when it led at the half
 - 4-9 when it trailed at half
 - 15-3 when it committed the same or fewer turnovers than the opposition

 - 7-9 when getting outrebounded in a game
 - 16-5 when it shot the ball better than the opposition
 - 16-5 when it attempted more free throws than the opposition
 - 3-10 when it attempted fewer free throws than the opposition
 - 13-2 when it held opponents to 60 points or less in a game

- 15-6 when it held opponents to 70 points or less
- 16-9 in games that were decided by more than three points
- 3-5 in one possession games

FREE THROW ADVANTAGE

- Alabama ranked fifth in the SEC and 87th the nation in free throw shooting percentage. As a team, the Tide connected on 539-of-752 (.717) free throws, which averaged out to nearly 16 points a game from line.
- On average, Alabama was able to get to the foul line an average of 22.1 times a game. The Tide boasted more free throw attempts than the opposition on 21 occasions for the year, resulting in 16 wins when that happened.
- Alabama's top three players in terms of free throw percentage (Levi Randolph, 146-of-174; Ricky Tarrant, 81-of-101; Rodney Cooper, 64-of-79) were a combined 82.1 percent (291-of-354) from the free throw stripe on the season.

SIXTY IS SWEET, BUT 50 IS BETTER

- Alabama held 15 opponents last season to 60 points or less in a game, and picked up 13 wins in the process.
- Over the past six years alone, Alabama has held the opposition to 60 or below a total of 98 times, going 81-17 (.826) when achieving the feat.
- The Tide held five opponents to 50 or fewer points last season, winning all five contests.
- Over the past six seasons, Alabama teams have held opponents to 50 or fewer points a total of 39 times. The Tide is 37-2 (.949) when hitting that mark.

DOUBLE-DOUBLES

- Alabama had six different players record eight double-doubles for the Tide last season.
- Michael Kessens (17 points, 10 rebounds vs. Appalachian State and 18 points and 12 rebounds vs. North Florida) and Jimmie Taylor (15 points, 10 rebounds vs. Western Carolina and 13 points and 11 rebounds vs. Ole Miss) led the Tide with two double-doubles apiece.
- Levi Randolph (15 points, 10 rebounds vs. Towson), Shannon Hale (12 points, 11 rebounds vs. Southern Miss), Riley Norris (12 points and 12 rebounds at LSU) and Retin Obasohan (16 points, 12 rebounds vs. Georgia) each recorded one double-double on the season.
