## A STRONG FOUNDATION

Always a place of high ambition, this was one of the first institutions west of the Mississippi River to award doctoral degrees—the first being granted in 1896. The University of Nebraska

established the world’s first undergraduate psychology laboratory. The discipline of ecology was born here, and the campuses reflect that tradition, being recognized as botanical gardens and arboreta. An early institutional interest in literature and the arts provided the foundations for today’s Prairie Schooner literary magazine, the University of Nebraska Press, and the Sheldon Museum of Art, which houses one of the world’s most significant collections of 20th century American art.

Today, Nebraska is one of the nation’s leading teaching institutions, and a research leader with a wide array of grant-funded projects aimed at broadening knowledge in the sciences and humanities.

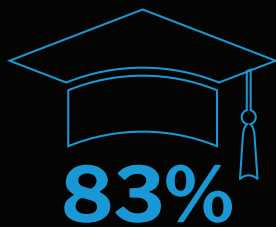

Penn State's historic mission of teaching, research, and public service — launched under the most modest of circumstances more than 150 years ago — now reaches into virtually all parts of Pennsylvania. Consider, for example, that the University now has 24 campuses across the Commonwealth, putting a Penn State education within practical reach of nearly every Pennsylvanian. In fact, about 70 percent of Penn State's undergraduates are Pennsylvania residents.

Penn State is Pennsylvania's largest nongovernmental employer and has employees and expenditures in every one of its 67 counties. The University generates a total economic impact across the Commonwealth that surpasses \$11.6 billion annually.

Part of that impact is derived from Penn State's research program, which brought more than \$593 million in federal funds to Pennsylvania last year, and an additional \$101 million from private industry. The Community & Impact team will engage, educate, and empower Big Ten student-athletes, coaches, administrators, alumni, and partners through strategic initiatives and programming.

As part of our commitment to positively affecting communities, this academic year the conference has conducted two student-athlete led sports clinics (Tennis and Softball). These youth clinics, conducted

in Selma, Ala. (the site of the Big Ten Big Life trip), not only enhances the traditional benefits of youth clinics but also brings a unique blend of mentorship, inspiration, and community pride. They serve as a positive force for both the community and the young participants, fostering a holistic approach to personal and athletic development.

At the Tennis clinic, the Big Ten partnered with USTA to provide each participant a

## COMMUNITY IMPACT: TWO NEIGHBORHOOD RECREATION CENTERS, CONTINUING LEGACY THROUGH IMPACT

**T**he history of B1G Ten athletes in Minnesota is one that is synonymous with legacy. What happens when young inspiring athletes are met with nurturing environments and coaches who provide high quality skill-building that drives them in to their highest potential? B1G student athletes come to life.

Over the last 20 years the Farview Recreational Center in north Minneapolis has produced dozens of B1G athletes. From collegiate track records to professional careers, the foundation of an athlete's beginnings is essential. B1G will invest

back into Farview Recreation Center and continue to pave the way for future collegiate athletes by upgrading the gym's scoreboard and tournament equipment.

Just down the river, the MLK Recreation Center in the prominent Rondo neighborhood in St. Paul, MN, holds a unique triangular building partnership with the Black-owned Penumbra Theater and the Hallie Q. Brown Community Center. This partnership allows for cross-collaboration and engagement across youth sports, arts and culture.

MLK Center has been coined as a place

with true potential. Limited resources in the basketball gym have prevented courts and hoops that accommodate elementary aged children. B1G's Community Impact team will upgrade the gym with adjustable basketball hoops and provide basketball training equipment that supports elementary age kids.

By collaborating with Minnesota Sports and Events, the partnership has provided opportunities for impact that lives beyond the tournament in Minnesota. It's always been more than the game.
