On March 23, 2015, Ben Howland was introduced as Mississippi State's 20th head coach in school history.

Howland comes to MSU with an overall coaching ledger of 401-206 following successful stints at Northern Arizona, Pittshurgh and UCLA, where he led all three teams to the NCAA Tournament.
"Ben is someone who is ready to invest in the people of Mississippi and Bulldogs everywhere, while bringing championship basketball back to the Hump." athletics director Scott Stricklin said. "Mississippi State can compete at the highest level. just as other teams have done in recent years, and I'm excited to have Coach Howland lead us back to that level."

Howland is most known for his success at perennial powerhouse UCLA, where he led the Bruins to three-consecutive Final Four appearances (2006-08), the first Bruins coach since the late legendary John Wooden to achieve that feat.

Jim Ellis returns for his fifth year as the "Voice of the Bulldogs" after spending 28 years as the analyst with the late Jack Cristil. Joining Ellis is former MSU coach and Hall of Famer, Richard Williams.

Back for his fifth year behind the mic calling Mississippi State basketball games is Jim Ellis, who will be joined in the booth for the second year with Hall of Fame coach, Richard Williams.

This season marks the 33rd year for the award-winning Ellis, a West Point native who spent 28 years as the color commentator for the Jack Cristil, who retired in 2011 and passed away in 2014

Ellis, who also handles the play-by-play for football and baseball, was named the "Outstanding Broadcaster in Mississippi" in both 2002 and 1999. In 2007, he was honored by the Mississippi Chapter of the National Football Hall of Fame for his contributions to amateur football.

A 1969 Mississippi State alumnus, Ellis is probably best known as the ever-popular "Voice of the Baseball Bulldogs," serving as the producerdirector of one of the nation's largest collegiate baseball radio networks for the past 33 years. Ellis has also handled play-by-play chores for the Lady Bulldog basketball team, a job that has now belonged to Jason Crowder for two seasons.

## WILLIAMS NO STRANGER

Williams is certainly no stranger to Mississippi State.

Since retiring from MSU following the 1997 season, Williams coached professionally with the Memphis Hound Dogs of the ABL and the Jackson Rage of the WBA.

He also served as the director of operations at UAB before returning to the sidelines an assistant at Arkansas State under John Brady.

But it's his time at MSU fans will remember most.

After replacing Bob Boyd following the 1986 campaign, Williams directed the Bulldogs to 191 victories in 12 seasons to rank second all-time in school history.

But it's his team's accomplishment in 1996 that will never be forgotten.

That year, MSU posted a 26-8 ledger, won the SEC Tournament and then did the impossible - advance to the Final Four following upset wins against Cincinnati and UConn.

Three players from that squad were drafted in the NBA - Erick Dampier, Dontae' Jones and Darryl Wilson.
"I can't tell you how much I look forward to working with a professional like Jim Ellis," Williams said. "He's legendary and hopefully, I will be able to provide for our fans an insight about the game from a coach's perspective."

In July, Williams was inducted in the Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame.

## Ben Howland Head Coach | First Year

When it became public that Ben Howland would be Mississippi State's 20th head coach in school history, the nation quickly took notice.

After all, the California native brings with him an impressive resume that features 406 wins, three Final Four berths and an appearance in the NCAA title game.

Nearly as important, he brings with him a great reputation as one of the game's top recruiters, and he certainly didn't disappoint when he landed
a Top 20 class his first year in Starkville that was highlighted by the signing of Malik Newman.

Immediately, the Bulldog fan base became excited again with hopes of returning to the days where 20-win seasons and trips to the NCAA Tournament were the norm.

Basketball pundits even said his hiring was the best in all of college basketball, and it was a hiring that brought numerous national writers to campus looking to capture Howland's return to the court in hopes of making the Bulldogs a power again.

# HEAD BASKETBALL COACH BEN HOWLAND 


n three different stops as a head coach, Ben Howland has established himself as a proven winner en route to leading his teams to the NCAA Tournament. Now, he's been handed the task of getting Mississippi State back to the Big Dance for the first time since 2009.

On March 23, 2015, MSU athletics director Scott Stricklin announced the hiring of the highly-respected Howland as the 20th head basketball coach in school history.

Howland, 57, comes to MSU with an overall coaching record of 401-206 with stints at Northern Arizona (199599), Pittsburgh (2000-03) and UCLA (2004-13).
"We have a coach who is a proven winner that's taken three schools to the NCAA Tournament," Stricklin said "Ben is someone who is ready to invest in the people of Mississippi and Bulldogs everywhere, while bringing championship basketball back to the Hump. Mississippi State basketball can compete at the highest level, just as several of our other teams have done in recent years, and I'm excited to have coach Howland lead us back to that level."

In 10 seasons at powerhouse - UCLA, Howland led the Bruins to - the NCAA Tournament seven times, - highlighted by three-consecutive Final - Four appearances (2006-08) in ad-- dition to four Pac-10 regular-season - crowns (2006, 07, 08 and 13). He was

- the Bruins' first coach since the late
- John Wooden to win three-straight - conference titles (2006-08), and is
- the only head coach other than the
- legendary Wooden to have led UCLA
- to three consecutive NCAA Final Four
- appearances.
"I'm just so humble and grateful to be the new basketball coach at Mississippi State University," Howland said. "I'm elated and excited the opportunity build a consistent winner here at State. I know we have some of the greatest fans in the country and I look forward to making them proud of our team and our efforts. Hail State."


## Championship Game

In 2005-06, Howland's UCLA team advanced to the championship game - its first since winning the 1995 NCAA title - where it lost to Florida.

- The Bruins recorded 32 victories that season, tying the then-school record of 32 wins set in 1995.

During his illustrious tenure in Los - Angeles, Howland compiled a 233107 record (. 682 winning percentage), including a 121-59 mark in conference play. In his last nine years, the Bruins finished in the top three of the conference standings an impressive seven times.

In his 19-year career as a head coach, Howland has led his teams to the NCAA Tournament 10 times and to the "Sweet 16 " five times, in addition to the three Final Fours at UCLA. He has been a Conference Coach of the - Year in three different leagues - 2006,

- Pac-10 Coach of the Year at UCLA; - 2002, Big East Coach of the Year at - Pittsburgh; 1997, Big Sky Coach of - the Year at Northern Arizona.
"I am impressed with Coach How-- land's resume," MSU president Dr. - Mark E. Keenum said. "He has been - successful at the highest levels of - college basketball, and I have every - confidence he will bring that same - proven, winning formula to Mississippi - State as well. I know the MSU family - will embrace Coach Howland and his - family and will fully support his efforts
- to put our Bulldog basketball team - in position to compete for champion-- ships."


## 30 Wins Again

In 2008, Howland became one of - three coaches in NCAA Division I his-- tory to win at least 30 games in three - consecutive seasons, joining Adolph

- Rupp (Kentucky, 1947-49) and John
- Calipari (2006-08). His 97 victories
- from 2006-08 stand as the most by - any UCLA head coach in a three-year - span.

During his tenure at UCLA, How-- land had a Pac-12 best 18 players - selected in the NBA draft, a total - that ranked in the Top 5 nationally. - The Bruins' 13 NBA draft selections - ranked among the Top 5 nationally - from 2004 through 2013.

Prior to his stint at UCLA, How-- land spent four seasons building the - Pittsburgh men's basketball program - into one of the finest in the nation, - compiling an 89-40 ledger from 2000-

- 3. His final two seasons, he guided - Pittsburgh to a 57-11 mark, logging an . 83.8 winning percentage that ranked - second nationally during that period.

The Panthers reached the "Sweet - 16 " both years and captured the 2003 - Big East Tournament crown. In 2002-

On the day he was announced as Mississippi State's 20th head coach in school history, Ben Howland was joined by his wife, Kim, and daughter, Meredith.

03, Howland led Pittsburgh to a 28-5 overall record and a No. 4 ranking in the final Associated Press poll. Pitt held the nation's No. 2 ranking for eight weeks during the season.

In 2001-02, Howland guided Pittsburgh to a school-record 29 wins, surpassing the former school record of 25 victories set in 1973-74. He became the first Pittsburgh head coach in 26 years to garner National Coach of the Year honors as he earned nine coaching awards including the Associated Press, Naismith, Henry Iba and the Sporting News national accolades, along with Big East Coach of the Year honors.

## First Gig As Head Coach

Howland's first head coaching gig was at Northern Arizona, where he orchestrated one of the best turnarounds in NCAA history. His highly successful five-year tenure (199599) saw him transform the Lumberjacks from one of the nation's weakest programs into a consistent NCAA Tournament contender.

In his final season (1998-99), NAU posted a 21-8 record, its third-consecutive season with $20+$ wins. Howland's first two teams at Northern Arizona finished 9-17 (1994-95) and 7-19 (1995-96), finishing in seventh-place each season. However, his 1996-97 squad went 21-7, set the schoolrecord for wins and achieved the 10th best single-season

turnaround in NCAA men's basketball history.
Northern Arizona captured the Big Sky regular-season championship by three games and advanced to the Na tional Invitation Tournament (NIT).

Howland was named the conference's Coach of the Year.

## First NCAA Appearance

The following season (1997-98), Howland guided the Lumberjacks to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in school history after capturing the Big Sky Tournament championship and second straight regular-season title. In a first-round NCAA Tournament game against No. 2-seed Cincinnati, Northern Arizona led the heavily favored Bearcats for the majority of the game before losing, 65-62, on a last-second three-pointer.

Howland earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Weber State (1979) and a master's degree in administration and physical education from Gonzaga (1981).

Howland and his wife, Kim, a former Weber State cheerleader, have two children - Meredith and Adam - and one grandson, Benjamin Clark Howland II, the son of Adam and his wife, Brittney.

## ASSISTANT COACH, 6TH YEAR

Following a successful 12-year stint at the junior college ranks where he guided his team to numerous titles, George Brooks begins his sixth year at Mississippi State after being rehired by first-year coach Ben Howland on March 27, 2015.
Brooks, 42, needed little introduction to the MSU family upon his arrival, as he played for the Bulldogs from 1992-94 before earning his degree in 1997.

He was also a student-assistant under Richard Williams in 1996 when MSU advanced to the Final Four.

Brooks' main responsibilities at MSU are working with forwards, assisting with scouting reports and all aspects of recruiting.

A native of Lafayette, Ala., Brooks, who also coached under Rick Stansbury and Rick Ray, came to Mississippi State following a stellar prep career at Lafayette High School under coach John T. Woody.

A three-year starter, he was instrumental in guiding his team to a three-year composite record of 64-20, while leading his team to the Alabama Class 3A title in 1989 as a sophomore.

The All-State performer was also a three-time OpelikaAuburn News All-Area and Valley Times News All-Valley basketball honoree.

As a senior, he averaged 16 points, 14 rebounds, seven blocked shots and three assists en route to being named to the Birmingham Post-Herald's "Ten Most Wanted List."

Yet, he wasn't just a one-sport standout, as he was also a three-time All-State tight end in football. But when it came time to choose which sport to play in college, his heart led him to the basketball court.

From 1992-94, Brooks appeared in 67 games as a reserve backup.
But following the 1994 campaign, Brooks decided to transfer to West Georgia for his final season of eligibility, where he played for Braves coach Ed Murphy.

In his one season at West Georgia, Brooks started 22 of the 25 games he participated.

He averaged 6.5 points and scored in double-digits six times, while averaging 5.6 rebounds an outing.

He totaled a career-high of 13 points on three occasions, while his best outing on the boards was 11 rebounds.

Following his stint at West Georgia, he returned to Mississippi State as a student-assistant coach for one season.

Then the call came from Meridian Community College, where he spent his first year as an assistant.

But after just two seasons, he was promoted to head coach, where he spent 11 years overseeing the Eagles' program.

During his tenure, Brooks led Meridian to numerous Mississippi-Louisiana Conference titles and berths to the NJCAA Region 23 tournaments.

He was also instrumental in seeing more than 20 of his players sign with NCAA programs, including Jamal Edmondson who played at MSU from 2005-06.

In addition, he also coached two standouts that would go on to enjoy NBA careers - Jamario Moon and Ronald Murray.

At Mississippi State, he's helped developed forwards Arnett Moultrie, a first-round draft choice in the 2012 NBA draft. Brooks has also been key in the development of Gavin Ware, a senior who was named to the 2013 SEC

From a recruiting standpoint, he was instrumental in - the Bulldogs landing the highly-touted Craig Sword, the

- Alabama player of the year coming out of high school who - has since earned SEC All-Freshman honors while being - tabbed second-team All-SEC this past season as junior. In
- February, Sword cemented his place in school history when
- he became the 34 th Bulldog to reach 1,000 points for his - career.

Brooks also oversaw the recruiting of Demetrius Hous-

- ton, afreshman a year ago who saw ample playing time.
- This signing period, he was key in the signing of both Malik
- Newman and Quinndary Weatherspoon.

Newman was a five-star standout coming out of Cal-- laway and was listed as the top recruit out of Mississippi - and the best point guard in the country. Weatherspoon was

- a four-star recruit out Velma Jackson ranked as the No. 2
- prospect in Mississippi and the No. 32 shooting guard in the - country.

Brooks and his wife, Kalia, are the parents of two sons, - Garrison (16) and Justin (15) and two daughters, Katelyn - (9) and Karrie (7).

## ASSISTANT COACH, 1ST YEAR

Entering his first year as an assistant at Mississippi State, Korey McCray was one of Ben Howland's first hires after becoming the 20th head coach in school history.

But the two are certainly no strangers.

Prior to spending the 2013-14 campaign at LSU, McCray spent two seasons under Howland as an assistant at UCLA.

In his first year with the Bruins, the team compiled a 19 14 overall record and an 11-7 record in the Pac 12. The Bruins followed that up with a 25-10 ledger in 2012-13 while going 13-5 in the league and winning the regular-season conference championship.

In 2012, McCray was also instrumental in UCLA landing the No. 1-ranked recruiting class in the country according to ESPN.com.

Before being hired at UCLA by Howland, McCray worked as a skill development trainer based in Atlanta, starting in 2004. In that capacity, McCray worked with and created tai lor-made offseason training programs for NBA talents such as Dwight Howard, John Wall, Javaris Crittenton, Anthony Morrow, Jarrett Jack, Jarvis Hayes, Von Wafer, Mario West and Damien Wilkins, among others.

McCray last served as an assistant coach at LSU on Johnny Jones' staff for the 2013-14 season. In his lone campaign in Baton Rouge, the Tigers finished 20-14 overall with a 9-9 mark in the SEC. The Tigers garnered a bid to the NIT, where they advanced by defeating San Francisco before dropping a 80-67 decision to SMU in the second round.

McCray has also spent time as an assistant in 2008 at his alma mater, Mercer University, after spending one season at Chipola Junior College in 2004-05.

In his lone season at Chipola, the team advance to the

Before landing at Chipola JC, McCray served as a grad-- uate assistant under head coach Leonard Hamilton at Flor-- ida State (2002-04). While at FSU, he earned a master's - degree in adult education with a minor in higher education.

McCray hails from Decatur, Ga., and played four sea-- sons (1997-2001) under head coach Mark Slonaker at - Mercer University in Macon, Ga. His final two seasons with

- the Bears he served as the team captain. He earned his - bachelor's degree in communications from Mercer in 2001 - with a major in theatre arts and a minor in Christianity.

Since 1999, McCray has served various stints as the - CEO and head coach of the Atlanta Celtics AAU travel - team. The team was co-founded by his father, Karl McCray, - and Wallace Prather in 1990. In 2009, he led his Atlanta - Celtics U-15 team to a national title, and has consistently - produced teams at all age levels that rank in the top 10 - nationally.

## ASSISTANT COACH, 1ST YEAR

W assemble his staff at Mississippi State, he searched for familiarity and someone he knew he could trust.

As it turned out, the search was short with the hiring of Ernie Zeigler, who was an assistant with Howland at both Pittsburgh and UCLA, where both teams garnered NCAA Tournament bids.
"I am very excited to be back with one of the top coaches in the country in Ben Howland," Zeigler said. "He's been a mentor as well as a friend. More than anything, he's been a great person to both myself and my family. Having the opportunity to help him for a third time pursue and compete at the highest level of college basketball is very intriguing to me. I'm looking forward to this privilege of being a Mississippi State Bulldog."

Zeigler comes to MSU after spending two seasons as an assistant on Ray McCallum's staff at Detroit Mercy.

Before arriving at Detroit, however, Zeigler earned his first chance as a collegiate head coach, spending six seasons at Central Michigan (2007-12), leading the Chippewas to two Mid-American Conference West Division titles and a pair of Michigan MAC Trophies. CMU won back-to-back West Division titles in 2009 and 2010 and captured the Michigan Sports Hall of Fame Michigan MAC Trophy for best head-to-head record among in-state league schools in 2010 and 2012.

The Chippewas reached the MAC Tournament quarterfinals in four of his six seasons at the helm and finished below third in the division standings just once. For three straight years (2009, 2010 and 2011) and four times overall (2007), CMU's recruiting classes were ranked atop the MAC by hoopscooponline.com.

During his tenure at CMU, Zeigler $(75-111, .403)$ mentored eight All-MAC selections, six that went on to play professionally.

Zeigler spent five seasons as an assistant under the tutelage of Howland at both Pittsburgh (2002-03) and UCLA (2004-06). The programs achieved great success with Zeigler on staff as Pitt reached the NCAA Sweet 16 both years and finished 2003 with a final Associated Press ranking of No. 4.

The 2002 squad won a school-record 29 games, while the 2003 team captured the Big East Tournament crown. Both years the Panthers won the Big East West Division championship.

When Howland took the UCLA job, Zeigler joined the Bruins' staff and helped the team to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances. The No. 2-seeded Bruins advanced to the 2006 NCAA championship game but fell to Florida, 73-57. That same season, UCLA won both the 2006 Pac-10 regular season and tournament championships.

Each season, UCLA posted a Top 15 recruiting class fourth by rivals.com in 2004, 13th by scout.com in 2005 and sixth by foxsports.com in 2006. The Bruins recruited three McDonald's All-Americans in the three years Zeigler was on staff.

Prior to joining Howland's staff, Zeigler had one-year stints at Kansas State (2000) and Bowling Green (2001).

Zeigler began his coaching career under his former prep coach, Robert Menefee, at his alma mater, Detroit Cody High School. Zeigler was an assistant at Cody from 1990-

In addition, Zeigler was the head coach of the Henan - Wildcats from 1996-97 and was named the Chinese Na -- tional Basketball Alliance International Coach of the Year in - 1997 after leading the Wildcats to their first winning season - in club history and their first playoff berth.

Zeigler received a bachelor's degree in business man-- agement from Cleary College (Ypsilanti, Mich.) in 1994. He - played collegiately at Schoolcraft College (Livonia, Mich.) - from 1984-86, Armstrong Atlantic State University (Savan-- nah, Ga.) from 1986-87 and Northwood University (Mid-- land, Mich.) from 1987-88.

Jason Ludwig is in his first year as Ben Howland's director of operations at Mississippi State after spending the past two seasons in the same capacity at Arizona State.
Ludwig and Howland know each other well, as Ludwig spent 10 years at UCLA in various roles, including the director of scouting and player development positions he held from 2009-13.

The native of Montebello, Calif., served two different stints with the Bruins, starting in 2005-06 as the assistant video coordinator before taking the video coordinator job at Santa Clara in 2008 under coach Kerry Keating. The following year, he was named director of operations, a title he held for one season before returning to UCLA in 2010.

Ludwig's contributions helped the Bruins to two NCAA Tournament appearances in 2010-2011 and 2012-2013 and a PAC-12 Championship in 2012-2013.

Ludwig's first stint with UCLA was for the 2005-2006 and 2006-2007 seasons as the assistant video coordinator documenting the Bruins' two consecutive Final Four appearances. He broke down film for scouts and player development edits. Similar to his second round with the Bruins, he dedicated his time to assisting current NBA athletes such as Russell Westbrook, Arron Afflalo, Darren Collison, Jordan Farmar, Ryan Hollins, and Luc Mbah a Moute.

His passions off the court extend to assisting young coaches and underprivileged youth.

Ludwig co-founded the Young Coaches Social at the Final Four, an event geared towards networking hundreds of young coaches across the nation. Ludwig was part of the founding members for the Latino Association of Basketball Coaches, which provides support to Latino coaches worldwide, some members being Frank Martin (head coach South Carolina) and Orlando Antigua (head coach - South

## STRENGTH COACH

One year away from collegiate athletics was all it took for David Deets to realize he wanted to return. So when Mississippi State offered him the opportunity to be the Director of Basketball Performance for both the men's and women's basketball teams, he didn't hesitate to accept.

Deets, 39, begins his journey with the Bulldogs after spending the previous year in Oklahoma as the director of rehab and strength \& conditioning for the Tuttle Public School district. Prior to that position, he was on Mike Anderson's staff at Arkansas for three years as strength and conditioning coach.

Deets, who became a Master Strength Coach in 2013, is well-respected across the country for his innovative approach to strength and conditioning. He's been a featured speaker at national conferences and was one of seven individuals worldwide in Nike Basketball's SPARQ program, which develops testing measures for basketball.

During his time with the Razorbacks, he helped design a new weight room and was instrumental in the development of Jacorey Williams, Bobby Portis, the 2015 SEC Player of the Year, and Moses Kingsley.

Prior to his stint at Arkansas, Deets spent five years with Anderson at Missouri. He helped with the renovations of the Sally O. Nichols Weight Room and mentored four National Strength and Conditioning All-Americans. Deets' off-season regimen with the Tigers was key in Missouri's three NCAA tournament runs and Big 12 Tournament Championship in 2009.

After graduating from Northeastern State University in 2000, Deets went on to a graduate assistantship at Oklahoma State. After one year with the Cowboys, he landed his first full-time job at Northwestern State in Natchitoches, La. As head strength and conditioning coach, Deets oversaw all the aspects of strength training for NSU's 14 intercollegiate sports. His career path would then take Deets to Texas Christian and back to Oklahoma State before settling in at Missouri prior to the 2006-07 season.

Deets earned his degree from Northeastern State in Health and Human Performance in 2000. The Newcastle, Okla., native and his wife Angela have two daughters, Emery Rose (8), and Violet Beatrice (5).

## UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

Dr. Mark Everett Keenum became Mississippi State's 19th president Jan. 5, 2009, following a distinguished public service career.

Dr. Keenum has guided Mississippi State to unprecedented heights during his six-year tenure. The university has experienced record enrollment growth to more than 20,000 students. The freshman class of fall 2014 was almost 3,000 , and the average ACT score for 2014 was a record 24.4. During 2011-12, Mississippi State awarded more than 4,000 degrees at all levels for the first time in its history, and followed that with 4,222 degrees in 2014-15.

The campus has expanded and improved on Keenum's watch. Major renovations of historic Lee Hall and Davis Wade Stadium were completed by August 2014. Construction of a new classroom building with built-in parking and a Fresh Foods concept cafeteria began in 2014. In 2015, construction is under way on two new residence halls, the new G.V. "Sonny" Montgomery Center for America's Veterans, a Wise Center classroom building, and an expansion of Mitchell Memorial Library is set to begin this fall.

Since 2009, fundraising has reached all-time record levels, with private giving exceeding $\$ 80$ million a year in fiscal years 2011, 2012 and 2013 and grew to $\$ 108.8$ million in fiscal year 2014. In fall 2013, the university formally announced Infinite Impact: the Campaign for Mississippi State with a goal of $\$ 600$ million by 2018 . To date, more than $\$ 530$ million of that goal had been met. Dr. Keenum has also been instrumental in expanding the MSU Promise Program, which provides need-based scholarship assistance to Mississippi students whose families have limited financial means.

Mississippi State has strengthened its role as the flagship research university in the state. The most recent research success has been MSU's designation as the Federal Aviation Administration's National Center of Excellence in Unmanned Aerial Systems and Boeing's decision to locate a composite research center at MSU's Raspet Flight Lab. The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching classifies

MSU as a university with "very high research activity," the only such designation in Mississippi. Dr. Keenum travels frequently to Washington, D.C., meeting with Congressional leaders and federal agency heads to pursue research opportunities and broaden the university's influence on the national level. He has also worked closely with state leaders in support of higher education in Mississippi.

Keenum serves as vice-chairman of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools' Commission on Colleges' Executive Council. SACS-COC is the recognized regional accrediting body in the 11 U.S. Southern states (Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia) and in Latin America for those institutions of higher education that award associate, baccalaureate, master's or doctoral degrees.

He also is a member of the American Public Land-Grant Universities Board of Directors. Based in Washington, D.C., the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities (APLU) is a research and advocacy organization of public research universities, land-grant institutions, and state university systems with member campuses in all 50 states, U.S. territories and the District of Columbia. Keenum has

N
ow in his third decade in intercollegiate athletics, Director of Athletics Scott Stricklin has overseen a wave of momentum within the Mississippi State fan base during his tenure. From his first day on the job in May 2010, Stricklin, with a focus on the student-athlete, a commitment to great integrity, and a dedication to promoting MSU aggressively, has facilitated a stretch of unparalleled Bulldog success.

With an investment of over $\$ 130$ million in facilities, a strong roster of successful coaches, and significant increases in Bulldog Club membership and donations, MSU Athletics has achieved its highest-ever Learfield Director's Cup finish while consistently seeing the majority of its teams compete in post-season championships.

In an era that has seen 30 -consecutive sellouts at Davis Wade Stadium and impressive football facility enhancements, Coach Dan Mullen's team has played in five-consecutive bowl games, while the Bulldogs spent fivestraight weeks in 2014 ranked No. 1 in the polls for the first time in school history.

The sports of tennis, baseball, basketball, softball, men's and women's golf and track and field have each excelled and advanced to NCAA postseason play under Stricklin's leadership. During the 2014-15 academic year, 11 Mississippi State sports advanced to NCAA postseason play, with eight earning Top 25 rankings during the season, while the women's golf team ascended all the way to No. 1 in the fall. The year was capped by All-American Rhianwedd Price winning the 1500-meter run at the NCAA Outdoor Track \& Field Championships in Oregon, one year after Brandon McBride claimed the crown in the 800-meter run and two years removed from the baseball team playing for the national championship in Omaha.

In addition, 2015 also saw two MSU coaches earn SEC Coach of the Year honors in Mullen and Vic Schaefer, who led the Bulldogs to a school record 27 wins en route to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

In the classroom, Bulldog students continue to excel. In the 2014-15 academic year, Mississippi State's men and women athletes posted a combined GPA of 3.0, the highest in school history. Also in 2015, Bulldog students again excelled in the NCAA's Academic Progress Rate, with all 16 sports far exceeding the minimum standard.

Stricklin has overseen record fundraising for Bulldog Athletics, which has produced new facilities such as the $\$ 11.7$ million Mize Pavilion at Humphrey Coliseum, the $\$ 25$ million Leo W. Seal Jr. Football Complex, as well as $\$ 75$ million in expansion and upgrades to Davis Wade Stadium that were completed prior to the start of the 2014 campaign.

The Davis Wade Stadium expansion and renovation pushed capacity to 61,337 , making it the largest on campus football stadium in the state of Mississippi. In addition to innovative premium seating options, a new brick facade and updated west concourse, complete with renovated restrooms and concessions, now greets fans attending games at historic Scott Field.

In the spring 2015, a $\$ 6$ million renovation began on both the tennis and softball complexes, while a $\$ 40$ million upgrade to Dudy Noble Field is in the planning process. In addition, construction is nearly completed for the new \$2.2 million Mississippi State Golf Center at Old Waverly, one of the South's premier golf courses. The project includes
a 6,300-square foot team clubhouse with locker rooms

- players' lounge, coaches' offices and indoor putting center,
- along with a 2,431-square foot indoor hitting bay.

Stricklin's vision also drew attention when he announced - the university is partnering with financial guru Dave Ramsey - to help educate student-athletes in the area of personal - finance. Ramsey's "Foundations in Personal Finance - College Edition" curriculum is now being incorporated into - teaching MSU student-athletes the basics of finance.

His attention to detail has also proven to be vital in the - hiring process, as he received rave reviews with the hiring - of men's basketball coach Ben Howland, who comes to - MSU after leading Northern Arizona, Pittsburgh and UCLA - to the NCAA Tournament, including 3 straight Final Four - appearances with the Bruins.

In addition to engaging with Bulldog fans through - personal interactions and social media, Stricklin has also - emerged as a regional and national leader in college - athletics. He serves as chair of the SEC's Working - Group on Fan Experience, and has served as the SEC's - representative on the NCAA Division I Leadership Council.

Stricklin certainly wasn't a stranger to the Bulldog family or college athletics when he took over the reins at - State in 2010.

A 1992 graduate of Mississippi State, the Jackson, - Miss., native's resume is highlighted by 25 years of - experience on the collegiate level in various capacities at - five different universities. In the two years prior to becoming - athletic director, he served as Senior Associate Athletics - Director for External Affairs at his alma mater, overseeing - fundraising, football and men's basketball scheduling, - managing MSU's all-sport agreement with Adidas, facility - planning, and serving as the administrative sport liaison for - men's basketball and softball.

It was those types of day-to-day tasks that prepared - the personable Stricklin to take over the top seat in the - Mississippi State athletic department. Yet it's a journey - that started during his formative days as a dedicated and - tireless worker in the Mississippi State media relations - department that has led to his highly-respected career - coming full circle.

Prior to graduating, Stricklin's stint in the MSU media - relations office included three seasons (1990-92) as the - media contact for the nationally-renown baseball program. - Upon graduation, he was named Assistant Media Relations - Director at his alma mater.

In 1993, he was named Associate Media Relations - Director at Auburn, where he served from 1993-98. In 1998, - Stricklin left Auburn to become Assistant Athletics Director - at Tulane, where he served as the primary media contact - for the Green Wave's 1998 12-0 football team. Next came - a four-year run in the Big 12 Conference at Baylor (1999-- 2003) as Assistant AD for Communications and Marketing.

In 2003, Stricklin returned to the Southeastern - Conference at Kentucky and spent five seasons as the - Associate AD for Media Relations, where he oversaw the - day-to-day publicity of the tradition-rich Wildcat basketball - program. It was his last stop before returning to Mississippi - State in the spring of 2008.

Stricklin, 45, is married to the former Anne Howell, the - youngest daughter of Basketball Hall of Fame member - Bailey Howell. The couple has two daughters, Abby and Sophie.

Mississippi State ushered in its 103th season of basketball Friday by knocking off Western Carolina, 66-56. And in the process, the Bulldogs collected their 400th win at Humphrey Coliseum.
Roquez Johnson paced MSU with 16 points, while Fred Thomas added 15. Gavin Ware recorded his 10th-career double-double with 14 points and 10 rebounds.
Mississippi State went into the break up 31-30 on a putback by Ware at the buzzer.
The Bulldogs jumped out to the quick 4-0 lead, but the Catamounts hit a couple of 3-pointers to take an 18-15 advantage.

MSU responded, however, when Dunlap drained back-to-back treys to put his team up
At the half, the Bulldogs led, 35-26.
Mississippi State opened up the second half with an $8-2$ run to extend its lead to 39-32. The Catamounts would cut the Bulldogs lead to five, but a pair of free throws by Thomas and a jumper by Travis Daniels put the Bulldogs up seven at the halfway mark.
MSU pushed its lead to double digits for the first time at 57-47 thanks to a pair of free throws from Johnson. WCU would cut it as close as six in the final moments of the game, but clutch free throw shooting by the Bulldogs would seal the contest.

Fred Thomas scored 17 points on 4 -of-7 shooting, with three 3 -point baskets as MSU rolled past Mississippi Valley State, 89-68.

MSU shot 59.6 percent from the floor and held a plus-22 rebounding advantage.

Travis Daniels hit a 3 -point basket and Fred Thomas followed with back-to-back 3's as MSU quickly built an 11-5 advantage. The lead was stretched to 13 at 21-8 when Thomas hit four free throws on one possession after a flagrant foul.

A layup by Trivante Bloodman ran the lead to $25-8$ with 14:35 left in the first half.

MSU shot 69.0 percent in the opening half and led 58-34 at halftime.

In the second half, MSU stretched the lead to $73-40$ after back-to-back baskets by Roquez Johnson. Johnson joined Ware in the dominance of the inside game, as he led the Bulldogs with a game-high 20 points.

For the contest, the Bulldogs hit 31 of 52 shots from the field ( 59.6 percent), 4 of 15 shots from 3 -point range (26.7 percent) and 23 of 32 shots from the foul line ( 71.9 percent). Behind 15-point efforts from both Fred Thomas and Roquez Johnson, Mississippi State rallied in the second half to beat Utah State 71-63.
In a game that featured 18 lead changes and 9 ties, the Bulldogs found themselves trailing 38-34 at the break.

The Aggies quickly extended the lead to 41-34 on a 3 -pointer by Chris Smith, but the Bulldogs slowly chipped away and went up 42-41 on a 3 -pointer by Thomas.

A career night for Mississippi State's Roquez Johnson wasn't enough as Georgia rallied to win, 72-66.

Johnson scored a career-high 25 points and pulled down 12 rebounds to post his second career double-double.
Keying Georgia's efforts was J.J. Frazier, who scored 37 points.
Georgia led by 12 points early in the second half. However, back-to-back 3-pointers by Fred Thomas and another by I.J. Ready brought the Bulldogs back within a point with 2:27 left.
Johnson and Gavin Ware (gamehigh 12 rebounds) combined for 29 points and 23 rebounds.
MSU quickly built a $7-2$ lead after a basket by Ware. A basket by Johnson extended the lead to 14-6 with 14:07 left in the first half.
UGA pulled even at 17-all on a Frazier 3. MSU took the lead back on a Johnson putback. A 3-pointer by Craig Sword extended the lead to $29-24$ with 5:33 left in the half.
MSU managed one field goal the rest of the way and Georgia ended the half on a 12-2 run to grab a 36-31 lead. econd half, Georgia extended the lead to $48-36$ with $15: 16$ left.
A steal and dunk by Johnson brought MSU back within 48-43. Georgia extended the lead to 59-51 on a 3-pointer by Frazier.

Craig Sword scored a season-high 27 points and drained a career-best five 3 -pointers, but it wasn't enough as Ole Miss rallied to win, 79-73.

MSU shot 55.6 percent from the field - its first game above 50 percent in league play and fourth overall.

Gavin Ware overcame early foul trouble to add 12 points for the Bulldogs, while I.J. Ready was also in double figures with 10 points.

MSU started strong and built a 16-4 lead. Ole Miss responded with a 17-2 run to take a brief first-half lead. MSU surged back ahead to carry a 32-28 lead into the locker room at halftime.

The Bulldogs again started strong in the second half and stretched the lead to a game-best advantage of $45-32$ with 16:29 left in the contest. Ole Miss still trailed by nine points at $54-45$ before putting together a game-changing run. The teams were tied at 60 before Ole Miss took the lead for good at 64-62 after two free throws by Jarvis Summers.

The game's critical play took place minutes later when Summers drew a foul on a made 3-point shot attempt. The four-point play pushed the UM lead to 71-65 with 3:15 left to play.
MSU held a 34-31 rebounding advantage. The Maroon and White have now out-rebounded five straight conference opponents. The Bulldogs had 15 assists and 16 turnovers.

0ne of the more electrifying players ever to donn the Maroon \& White, Jeff Malone left Mississippi State as the school's all-time leading scorer with 2,142 points, a stat that ranks eighth all-time in SEC history.

And that was before the inception of the 3-point line in college basketball.

But his scoring ability wasn't limited to just MSU. It was a trend he continued in the NBA, where the two-time All-Star totaled 17,231 points in a 13-year career.

He finished his NBA days ranking in the Top 10 of two team's all-time scoring list 2nd in the history of the Washington Bullets and 9th in the history of the Utah Jazz.
"To me, Jeff was probably as good as a pure shooter as Mississippi State has ever had. If the 3-point line existed when he played, there's no telling how many points he would have averaged. He made a lot of shots from 22 feet out. That's where he made his money. He was a great college player."

Bailey Howell is not only one of the greatest players to ever play at Mississippi State, he's one of the best players the Southeastern Conference has ever produced.

The Tennessee native, who now calls Starkville home, dominated the league on both ends of the court from 1957-59, scoring 2,030 points and grabbing what still remains a school record 1,277 rebounds.

After MSU, he went on to be a six-time NBAAII-Star in his 12 years and was a member of two World Championships with the Boston Celtics.

The pinnacle of his career, however, came in 1997 when he was elected into the National Basketball Hall of Fame.

## HALL OF FAMER BAILEY HOWELL

Bailey Howell, the greatest name in MSU basketball history, was enshrined into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., on Sept. 29, 1997.

Listed below are some of the many accomplishments achieved by Bailey Howell during his record-setting collegiate stint at Mississippi State and productive 12year NBA career:

* Member of the Tennessee, Mississippi and MSU Sports Halls of Fame.
* Namesake of the Cellular South Howell Trophy, presented annually to the top male basketball player among Mississippi's four-year senior colleges.
* Two-time All-American and three-time first-team AllSEC selection.
* Consensus first-team All-American as senior (1958-59) and consensus second-team All-American as a junior (1957-58).
* Ranked among the nation's Top 10 statistical leaders in both scoring and rebounding during all three varsity seasons (1957-59).
* Ranked fourth nationally in scoring during junior (27.8 ppg ) and senior ( 27.5 ppg ) years.
* Led the NCAA in field-goal percentage (56.8\%) as a sophomore, and was second in rebounding as a senior (15.2 rpg).
* Owns career records for scoring average (27.1), rebounds ( 1,277 ), rebounding average ( 17.0 rpg ), free throws made (682) and free throws attempted (892). Ranks second at MSU with 2,030 points.
* Owns MSU's single-game scoring (47 points vs. Union in 1958) and rebounding (34 rebounds vs. LSU in 1957) marks.
* Served as co-captain as a junior and tri-captain as a senior, helping lead coach Babe McCarthy's teams to a three-year composite record of 61-14, including an SEC title during his senior campaign.
* Starred for 12 years in the NBA, having ranked among the all-time Top 10 leaders in nine statistical categories upon his retirement in 1971.
* Six-time NBA All-Star named to the All-NBA Second Team in 1963.
* Member of two NBA World Championship teams (1968 \& 1969) with the Boston Celtics.
* Selected by the Detroit Pistons in the first round (second pick overall) of the 1959 NBA Draft.

# MSU ALL-TIME RESULTS 





Mississippi State is a comprehensive land-grant institution and the largest university in Mississippi, with a statewide enrollment of more than 20,484 students.

Established in 1878 as the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Mississippi, the university has traditional strengths in engineering and scientific agriculture but has evolved into a comprehensive institution with a diverse array of programs in teaching, research, and service.

## ACADEMICS AND STUDENT LIFE

Mississippi State students consistently earn honors such as the prestigious Harry S. Truman Scholarship, awarded for those who will enter public service, and, with 16 Truman Scholars to date, the university has been recognized as a Truman Honor Institution. In the past year, a student team competed for and won first place in a national Challenge $X$ competition to redesign a fuel-efficient and environmentally-friendly SUV.

Recently initiated programs are providing opportunities to develop leadership potential and global study options.

The university's Global Leadership Continuum provides "cradle-to-CEO" programming designed to develop leadership across a "global" spectrum that begins with high school and continues through the university experience and into professional life. Included are the Young Guns Leadership Camp for rising high school seniors; the Day One Leadership Community for incoming freshmen, focusing on shared academic and service experiences; and the highly competitive Appalachian Leadership Honors Program for sophomores and juniors.

To complement these efforts, the university has launched a minor in leadership studies open to students in all majors. A university honor code adopted in 2007 institutionalizes a campus culture of integrity and personal responsibility in academic studies. Through the Global Leadership Program, students may experience significantly expanded studyabroad opportunities.

## RESEARCH

Mississippi State faculty researchers attracted $\$ 186.5$ million in external funding for 2006-07, up from about \$155
million during the previous year. This funding supported 1,691 sponsored projects in 2007.

Based on the latest rankings available from the National
Science Foundation, MSU ranks seventh in the nation in agricultural sciences research expenditures and 44th in engineering. Last year MSU faculty and staff disclosed 80 new - technologies resulting in three new start-up companies, - nine licenses, and 22 patent applications. The university - now holds 77 patents.

In recent years, MSU has established the Thad Cochran

- Endowment for Entrepreneurship, as well as collaborating with federal agencies and industries to help increase tech-nology-oriented start-up companies. Among the collabora-- tors and sponsors are the U.S. departments of Defense - and Energy, NASA, General Electric, Northrop Grumman, EADS/American Eurocopter, Boeing, Raytheon, General Dynamics, Israeli Aerospace Industry, and the Mississippi - Technology Alliance.

In a key area of economic interest to Mississippi, MSU's - Center for Advanced Vehicular Systems, established in 2001, continues research and development supporting a goal of attracting automotive industries to the state. The center is conducting research in areas that include materials processing, human and systems engineering, alternative power systems, computational manufacturing and design, and advanced learning technologies.

## THE BULLDOG

Mississippi State University's athletic teams are called Bulldogs, a name earned and maintained over the decades by the tough, tenacious play of student-athletes wearing the Maroon and White. The official school mascot is an American Kennel Club registered English Bulldog, given the inherited title of 'Bully.'

As with most universities, Mississippi State University teams answered to different nicknames through the years. The first squads representing Mississippi A\&M College

were proud to be called Aggies. When the school officially became Mississippi State College in 1932, the nickname Maroons, for MSU's uniform color, gained prominence. Bulldogs became the official title for State teams in 1961, not long after State College was granted university status.

Yet references to school teams and athletes as Bulldogs actually go back to early in the century, and this nickname was used almost interchangeably with both Aggies and Maroons, since at least 1905.

On November 30 of that year, the A\&M football team shut out their arch-rivals from the University of Mississippi 11-0 in Jackson, Miss. The campus newspaper, The Reflector, reported: "After the game, filled with that emotion that accompanies every great victory, there was nothing left for the cadets to do but to complete the great victory by showing sympathy for the dead athletic spirit of the University, by having a military funeral parade.
"A coffin was secured, decorated with University colors and a bulldog pup placed on top. It was then placed on the shoulders of a dozen cadets, and the procession started down Capitol Street, preceded by the brass band playing a very pathetic funeral march."

Other newspaper reports of the victory commented on the 'bulldog' style of play by the A\&M eleven, and the Bulldog was soon publicly accepted as a school athletic symbol. Accounts of a 1926 pep rally in Meridian, Miss., had another bulldog parading with students.

Use as an official game mascot began in 1935 when coach Major Ralph Sasse, on 'orders' from his team, went to Memphis, Tenn., to select a bulldog. Ptolemy, a gift of the Edgar Webster family, was chosen and the Bulldogs promptly defeated Alabama 20-7.

A litter-mate of Ptolemy became the first mascot called 'Bully' shortly after Sasse's team beat mighty Army 13-7 at West Point that same year - perhaps the greatest victory in MSU football history. But Bully I earned other fame the hard way, in 1939 when a campus bus cut short his career.

Days of campus mourning followed, as Bully lay in state in a glass coffin. A half-mile funeral procession accompanied by the the Famous Maroon Band and three ROTC battalions went to Scott Field where Bully was buried under the bench at the 50 -yard line. Even Life magazine covered the event. Other Bullys have since been buried by campus dorms, fraternity houses, and also at the football stadium.

For years Bully was a target for kidnappers, the last incident occuring prior to the 1974 State-Ole Miss game. The Bulldog team won anyway, 31-13. While early Bullys once roamed campus freely or lived in fraternities, today the official university mascot is housed at the School of Veterinary Medicine when not on duty at State home football games. For all their fierce appearance and reputation, today's mascot bulldogs are good-natured, friendly animals and favorites with children.

A student wearing a Bulldog suit, also answering to Bully, is part of the MSU cheerleading team and assists in stirring up State spirit at games and pep rallies.

## THE COWBELL

The most unique and certainly the most resounding symbol of Mississippi State University tradition is the cowbell. Despite decades of attempts by opponents and authorities to banish it from scenes of competition, diehard State fans still celebrate Bulldog victories loudly and proudly with the distinctive sound of ringing cowbells.

The precise origin of the cowbell as a fixture of Mississippi State sports tradition remains unclear to this day. The best records have cowbells gradually introduced to the MSU sports scene in the late 1930s and early 1940s, coinciding with the 'golden age' of Mississippi State football success prior to World War II.

The most popular legend is that during a home football game between State and archrival Ole Miss, a jersey cow wandered onto the playing field. Mississippi State soundly whipped the Rebels that Saturday, and State College students immediately adopted the cow as a good luck charm.

Students are said to have continued bringing a cow to football games for a while, until the practice was eventually discontinued in favor of bringing just the cow's bell.

Whatever the origin, it is certain by the 1950s cowbells were common at MSU games, and by the 1960s were established as the special symbol of MSU. Ironically, the cowbell's popularity grew most rapidly during the long years when State football teams were rarely successful. Flaunting this anachronism from the 'aggie' days was a proud response by students and alumni to outsider scorn of the university's 'cow college' history.

In the 1960s two MSU professors, Earl W. Terrell and Ralph L. Reeves, obliged some students by welding handles on the bells sothey could be rung with more convenience and authority. By 1963 the demand for these longhandled cowbells could not be filled by home workshops alone. So, at the suggestion of Reeves, the Student Association bought bells in bulk and the Industrial Education Club agreed to weld on handles. In 1964, the MSU


Bookstore began marketing these cowbells with a portion of profits returning to these student organizations.

Today many styles of cowbells are available on campus and around Starkville, with the top-of-the-line being a heavy chrome-plated model with a full Bulldog figurine handle. But experts insist the best and loudest results are produced by a classic long-handled, bicycle-grip bell made of thinner and tightly-welded shells.

Cowbells decorate offices and homes of Mississippi State alumni, and are passed down through generations of Bulldog fans. But they are not heard at Southeastern Conference games - not legally, at least - since the 1974 adoption of a conference rule against 'artificial noisemakers' at football and basketball games. On a 9-1 vote, SEC schools ruled cowbells a disruption and banned them.

This has done little harm to the cowbell's popularity,

however, or to prevent cowbells from being heard outside stadiums in which the Bulldogs are playing. They can still be heard at non-conference football contests, as well as other sporting events on campus. And bold Bulldog fans still risk confiscation for the privilege of keeping a unique Mississippi State tradition alive and ringing at SEC affairs.

## MAROON \& WHITE

Maroon and White are the distinctive colors of Mississippi State University athletic teams, dating back over a century to the very first football game ever played by the school's student-athletes.

On November 15, 1895, the first Mississippi A\&M football team was preparing for a road trip to Jackson, Tenn., to play Southern Baptist University (now called Union University) the following day. Since every college was supposed to have its own uniform colors, the A\&M student body requested that the school's team select a suitable combination.

Considering this choice to be an honor, the inaugural State team gave the privilege to team captain W.M. Matthews. Accounts report that without hesitation Matthews chose Maroon and White.

In the 112 years since, every Mississippi State athlete has donned the Maroon and White in some sort of combination. Often a shade of gray has been added to the scheme, such as for the numerals. Briefly in the 1980s, the men's and women's basketball teams wore all-gray uniforms with maroon and white trim, while football has at times sported silver game pants, and baseball will often wear all gray road outfits.

Only once has an MSU team appeared in any other color combination. In 1938, football coach Spike Nelson secretly had cardinal and gold uniforms made for State, a selection that did not sit well with the team or the college at the first game. Neither the uniforms nor Nelson were back for the next season.

Humphrey Coliseum, the largest on-campus basketball arena in the state of Mississippi, will be the home of Bulldog Basketball for the 40h season during the 2015-16 campaign. Opened in 1975 ,the arena has undergone many modifications during recent years to rank as one of the finest multi-purpose facilities in the Southeastern Conference.

On the heels of MSU's record-setting 2003-04 basketball campaign, in which the Bullldogs posted a 26-4 ledger and claimed the overall SEC championship and won a second-straight SEC Western Division crown en route to making another NCAA Tournament appearance, Humphrey Coliseum underwent a major renovation.

Thanks to the generous contribution from the Henry Mize Foundation, a new four-sided, center-hung video scoreboard was added this past summer. The state-of-the-art, multi-purpose scoreboard features four main video displays and two ring displays suspended above the court to keep fans informaed and entertained.

This display is 50 percent larger than the previous video board that was installed in 2005.

## THE MIZE CONTRIBUTIONS

The late Henry Mize hailed from Booneville, Miss., and was a 1938 MSU alumnus and lifetime supporter of Mississippi State Athletics, while his nephew, Paul "Buzzy" Mize of Tupelo, Miss., and a 1978 State graduate, has served as the executor of the Henry Mize Foundation.

The M ize Foundation also funded the addition of approximately 1,000 maroon theatre-style chairback seats to increase the Coliseum's permanent seating capacity to
nearly 10,500 . This improvement to the Bulldogs' basketball arena was accomplished with the realignment of the lower-deck seats plus the addition of permanent foldout chairback seats at courtside.
In addition to the Coliseum's re-configured seating plan that now features chair back seats courtside often found at NBA arenas, an improved lighting system was installed two years ago to enhance the electric atmosphere at "The Hump." Additional restrooms were also added to the east side of the facility.

## THE NEW-LOOK FLOOR

In 2000, Humphrey Coliseum was graced with the arrival of a new hard maple floor, courtesy of the Horner Flooring Company of Dollar Bay, Mich. MSU's basketball playing surface measures 112 feet long and 60 feet wide.

Also added in recent years has been rotating corporate sponsorship signage at the scorer's table.

Four years ago new, attractive banners honoring the Bulldogs' and Lady Bulldogs' SEC championships and postseason tournament appearances, were unveiled, while the latest enhancements came in the summer of 2011 with new lower-level seats, complete with cupholders.

Since Humphrey Coliseum opened in 1975, the Bulldogs have won more than 70 percent of their battles at "The Hump." After ushering in the Humphrey Coliseum era of MSU basketball with an 85-82 victory over Indiana State back on Dec. 1, 1975, the Bulldogs have compiled an impressive 408-166 home record.

In 1990-91, Mississippi State went over the 1-million

mark for overall home basketball attendance with the Bulldogs drawing 100,000-plus fans (102,072; 7,852 per game) in a single season for the first time in school history during MSU's SEC Championship campaign. On Feb. 23, 2002, at Humphrey Coliseum, a then-state of Mississippirecord 10,645 fans attended State's 61-59 home win against the Ole Miss Rebels in a crucial SEC contest. After nearly drawing 100,000 total fans during the 2002-03 season and setting a new single-season school record by averaging 9,165 fans per home SEC game, the 2003-04 Bulldog squad shattered all existing MSU basketball attendance records en route to capturing the school's first outright regular-season league championship since 1963.

In recording 12 or more home wins in a year for the fourth-straight year, the 2003-04 Bulldogs established new single-season Coliseum attendance standards for most total fans $(111,940)$, highest per-game average for overall games $(7,996)$, highest per-game average for SEC contests $(10,209)$ and most crowds $(6)$ of $10,000+$ fans, along with setting a new mark for the largest single-game crowd $(10,735)$ for MSU's 80-56 home triumph over Ole Miss on Feb. 7, 2004.

In a home win streak that began the year prior, the 2003-04 State squad also set a new all-time Coliseum record with 14 consecutive homecourt victories over the course of two years.

Eleven years ago, State's attendance boom and home success continued as it went over the 100,000 mark for attendance $(103,031)$ for the second-straight season.

## MORE RECORDS SHATTERED

Eight years ago en route to advancing to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, MSU established singleseason school standards for home attendance $(139,305)$ as it claimed 12 victories. Five years ago, records were shattered again as a total of 157,111 fans came through the turnstiles to witness the Maroon \& White claim 13 victories.

Last year, nearly 107,000 fans made their way into the Hump as MSU posted a 9-8 ledger.

MSU has registered 10 or more home wins in a season 20 times over the last 23 basketball campaigns dating back to 1992-93.

Prior to the start of MSU's anticipated 1995-96 Final Four campaign, the capacity of State's home basketball arena was increased to 10,000 with the addition of permanent seats around the Coliseum's inner concourse. During the summer of 1996, the Coliseum underwent major renovations to accommodate the MSU athletic department's growing need for additional locker room availability.

Standing the equivalent of a seven-story building (84 feet), Humphrey Coliseum is 318 feet long and 268 feet wide and was originally constructed from approximately 450,000 red Mississippi-made bricks.

Named in honor of George Duke Humphrey, a former Mississippi State president (1934-45), the Coliseum also serves as the home for the Lady Bulldog basketball team, in addition to housing some administrative offices and Oympic sport coaches' offices.
