

# JERRY STACKHOUSE

HEAD COACH | FIFTH SEASON

he 2023-24 season is the fifth for Jerry Stackhouse leading the resurgence of the Vanderbilt men's basketball program. He was named the program's 28th head coach on April 5, 2019.

Stackhouse has guided the Commodores to back-to-back winning seasons and NIT quarterfinals berths in 2022 and 2023, sent four student-athletes to the NBA and coached two SEC Scholar Athletes of the Year in his first four seasons in Nashville.

For the 2022-23 season, he earned SEC Co-Coach of the Year, Tennessee Sports Writers Association Coach of the Year and Ben Jobe National Minority Coach of the Year honors.

The team's 22 wins in 2022-23 were the most since a 25-win season in 2011-12. Vandy also finished tied for fourth in the SEC regular season standings, the best finish for the Dores since 2011-12. Under Stackhouse's guidance, Liam Robbins became the first student-athlete in program history to earn SEC Defensive Player of the Year. Robbins also secured first team All-SEC accolades before signing with the New Orleans Pelicans organization.

Stackhouse made an immediate impact with the Dores, as Vandy was the only SEC program to improve its NET ranking in three-consecutive seasons from 2019-22.

The third year of the Stackhouse era featured the Commodores securing an NIT bid — the program's first postseason appearance since the 2016-17 season. Stackhouse oversaw the three-year progression of Scotty Pippen Jr., who led the SEC in scoring in 2021-22 and went on to sign with the Los Angeles Lakers. Jordan Wright was named SEC Scholar Athlete of the Year for the 2021-22 season.

In his first season, two Commodores were selected in the NBA Draft, including lottery pick Aaron Nesmith who was chosen 14th overall by the Boston Celtics, and junior guard Saben Lee who was picked 37th overall by the Detroit Pistons. Stackhouse's creative offensive sets enabled Nesmith to lead the nation in 3-point field goals made and 3-point field goal percentage (before a foot injury sidelined him after 14 games) and propelled Lee to three 30-point games and a second-team All-SEC selection in 2019-20.

Pippen Jr. earned All-SEC first team honors and set the school scoring record for a sophomore in 2020-21. He finished second in the SEC in scoring (20.8 points per game) and assists (4.9), while sophomore forward Dylan Disu led the SEC in rebounding (9.2) and was named the conference's Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

Prior to Vanderbilt, Stackhouse served as an assistant coach with the Memphis Grizzlies which was preceded by two seasons as head coach of the NBA G League's Raptors 905. As head coach of Raptors 905, Stackhouse earned NBA G League Coach of the Year honors after he steered the team to a 39-11 regular season record and 6-1 playoff record in 2016-17, en route to the team's first NBA G League championship. The following season, Stackhouse led the Raptors 905 to a 31-19 regular season record and a second straight appearance in the NBA G League Finals.

Prior to taking the head coaching job in the G League, Stackhouse was an assistant coach for the Toronto Raptors during the 2015-16 season.

In his 18-year NBA career, Stackhouse appeared in 970 games (564 starts) for eight teams and averaged 16.9 points, 3.3 assists, 3.2 rebounds and

31.2 minutes. A two-time All-Star with the Detroit Pistons (2000, 2001), Stackhouse posted career highs of 29.8 points (second in the NBA) during the 2000-01 season, leading the league in total points and free throws made. He reached the 2006 NBA Finals as a member of the Dallas Mavericks.

After playing for legendary head coach Dean Smith and earning Sports Illustrated Player of the Year, All-America first team and All-ACC honors at North Carolina, Stackhouse was selected by the Philadelphia 76ers with the third overall pick in the 1995 NBA Draft. He was named to the 1995-96 NBA All-Rookie first team after leading all first-year players in scoring (19.8 points).

In 2011, Stackhouse launched Stackhouse Elite, an AAU program based in Atlanta, Georgia. The program captured numerous titles in the 15U, 16U, and 17U divisions.

Stackhouse prepped at Kinston (N.C.) High School and Oak Hill (Va.) Academy and was one of the most highly recruited athletes in college basketball history. He became just the third freshman in ACC history to earn most outstanding player honors at the ACC Tournament.

Stackhouse and the Tar Heels also reached the 1995 Final Four. Weeks later, he announced he would enter the NBA Draft.

Going to the NBA, however, did not mean the end of his educational pursuits. Stackhouse received his bachelor's degree from North Carolina in the fall of 1999, and completed the Business of Entertainment, Media and Sports at the Harvard Business School executive education program in 2017.



# **MEN'S BASKETBALL ASSISTANT COACHES**

ON THE BENCH

#### ANDY FOX

#### **ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH**

The 2023-24 season is Andy Fox's second as an associate head coach and fifth overall on Jerry Stackhouse's staff. Fox spent his first two seasons as the director of scouting and recruiting before serving as general manager in 2021-22.



Fox has been instrumental to the Commodores' improvement over the last four seasons, helping Vandy to back-to-back winning seasons

and two appearances in the NIT Quarterfinals.

During his career, Fox has coached six student-athletes who went on to the NBA. He has helped mentor 32 all-conference players and has experience working in a number of conferences throughout the Southeast

including the SEC, American Athletic Conference,

Conference USA and Southern Conference.

In his previous role as Vandy's general manager, Fox oversaw the Commodores' on-campus recruiting, underclassmen recruiting, off-campus recruiting, program enhancement and special capital projects, and he also coordinated nonconference scheduling games and ELITE camps. He also assisted with the oversight of the program's managers and graduate managers.

Fox arrived at Vanderbilt after serving as the director of basketball operations at Louisiana Tech for four seasons. For the Bulldogs, he handled team travel, coordination of student-athlete recruiting, directing summer basketball camps, game and practice planning, basketball analytics and team scheduling while serving as the program's compliance liaison and budget manager.

Louisiana Tech registered four consecutive winning seasons in his time in Ruston — including a pair of 23-win seasons. Fox was instrumental in the development of Bulldog forward Erik McCree, who went on to play for the Utah Jazz.

Prior to Louisiana Tech, Fox spent five years as an assistant coach and director of operations at Tulane. As an assistant, his primary role was recruiting, game preparation and player development. He helped Tulane to back-to-back postseason appearances with a trip to the CollegeInsider.com Tournament in 2012-13 and to the College Basketball Invitational in 2013-14. In 2012-13, the Green Wave posted a 20-15 record, the program's first and only 20-win season since 2000.

While at Tulane, Fox contributed to the recruitment and development of NBA players Cameron Reynolds (Minnesota Timberwolves) and Melvin Frazier (Orlando Magic). In 2018, Frazier became the first NBA draft pick from Tulane since 1997.

On the recruiting trail, Fox helped the Green Wave recruit Ricky Tarrant, the 2012 Conference USA Freshman of the Year. Tarrant became the second player in league history to earn Freshman of the Year and first team all-conference honors in the same season since Derrick Rose.

He earned his bachelor's degree in 2004 in economics and health science from Cornell (Iowa), where he played basketball for four years. Fox was fifth all-time in assists and seventh all-time in steals in school history. He was a two-year captain, earning All-Iowa Conference honors in 2004. Fox completed his master's in sports psychology from Tennessee's sports studies program in 2006.

Fox and his wife, Tiffany, have three children - Brendan, Emery and Camille.

#### **ANTHONY WILKINS**

#### **ASSISTANT COACH**

Anthony Wilkins serves as an assistant coach for the Vanderbilt men's basketball program. The 2023-24 season marks his first on Jerry Stackhouse's staff. A native of Atlanta, Wilkins arrived in Nashville after spending the last five seasons at Georgia



Tech – four as an assistant coach before one as the associate head coach.

"We are thrilled to add Anthony Wilkins to our Vanderbilt coaching staff," Stackhouse said. "He is an experienced teacher, recruiter and mentor who has proven experience at the highest levels of college basketball. My relationship with Anthony dates back to my playing days and I've enjoyed watching his growth into an outstanding coach. We are excited to welcome Anthony to our program and believe in his ability to impact in all facets of our program."

At Georgia Tech, Wilkins made major contributions in player and skill development – aiding in the on-court growth of future NBA players Jose Alvarado and Moses Wright. He helped lead the Yellow Jackets to the 2021 ACC Tournament championship and a spot in the NCAA Tournament.

While at Georgia Tech, Wilkins was one of a select group of assistant coaches invited to attend the Collegiate Coaching Consortium at the 2022 Final Four. The National Association of Basketball Coaches and Athletic Director U bring together the group of coaches and a group of Division I athletic directors in a two-day exercise in professional development and identifying top talent.

"Vanderbilt is a proud and accomplished community, whose values and integrity are the gold standard in academics and athletics," Wilkins said. "I'm thankful for the opportunity to support Coach Stackhouse, his leadership and demand of excellence sets an inspiring tone. I'm excited to contribute. Anchor Down."

Prior to arriving at Georgia Tech, Wilkins spent five seasons on staff at Tulane working under former Vandy associate head coach Ed Conroy as well as Mike Dunleavy Sr. He served as director of basketball operations for one season before four seasons as an assistant coach for the Green Wave.

Wilkins began his collegiate coaching career as the director of player development at his alma mater – Kent State in 2012-13.

At the AAU level, he co-founded and served as associate head coach of Stackhouse Elite AAU travel team in Atlanta in 2011.

As a player, Wilkins played professional basketball for six years in Sweden, Ukraine, Mexico and South Korea. He played in the NBA's Development League (now G League) for Fort Worth and Tulsa (2005-06) and Bakersfield (2007-08). Wilkins also participated in the Atlanta Hawks Vet Camp in 2005 and played on the organization's summer league team in 2006.

Wilkins earned a bachelor's degree in communications from Kent State in 2013.

#### **JAMES STRONG**

#### **ASSISTANT COACH**

Former Commodore standout James Strong returned to West End to join head coach Jerry Stackhouse's staff with the 2023-24 season marking his fifth overall and first as assistant coach. Strong served as the program's director of basketball operations in



2022-23, director of scouting and recruiting in 2021-22 and the previous two seasons as Vanderbilt's director of player personnel.

Strong, who previously spent eight seasons on Rick Byrd's staff at Belmont, played for the Commodores from 1996-2000 and spent six seasons as a member of Kevin Stallings' coaching staff from 2001-06.

Strong was a four-year letter winner for the Commodores (1997-2000), leading Vanderbilt to three postseason appearances. As a junior, Strong led the SEC and established a Vanderbilt single-season record in steals (77). He ranks fourth on the Commodores' career steals list (209) and served as team captain as a senior.

While at Belmont, Strong worked with five of the most productive and decorated players in program history — Ian Clark, Kerron Johnson, J.J. Mann, Craig Bradshaw and Austin Luke. Clark currently plays in the NBA with the New Orleans Pelicans.

Strong made a tremendous impact for Belmont, as his contributions in everything from scouting reports and winning attitude to defense and guard development helped Belmont reach four NCAA Tournaments during an eight-season stretch. The Bruins posted a record of 195-71 during his tenure, won six consecutive conference championships, received top 25 poll votes eight out of nine campaigns, earned victories over North Carolina, Marquette, Stanford, Georgia, and nationally-ranked Murray State, posted the nation's longest home court win streak and road win streak, and reached the quarterfinal round of the postseason NIT.

Prior to his time at Belmont, Strong spent five seasons as an assistant coach at Furman, where he served as associate head coach prior to the 2010-11 season. The Paladins completed one of their finest seasons in program history, posting a 22-11 record and earning an invitation to the 2011 CollegeInsider.com Postseason Tournament — the program's first postseason appearance since 1991. Furman's 22 victories marked the second-highest single-season total in school history, and most in 30 years. Perhaps most notably, the Paladins defeated South Carolina, 91-75, and won at eventual Southern Conference tournament champion Wofford. Furman senior Amu Saaka earned all-conference honors. Strong shouldered great responsibility at Furman, including on-the-floor teaching, player development, scouting and recruiting.

Originally from Huntsville, Alabama, Strong earned a bachelor's degree in human and organizational development from Vanderbilt in 2000. He and his wife, Tami, have two children—Kayla and JP.

#### **ADELL HARRIS**

#### CHIEF OF STAFF

Adell Harris joined the men's basketball program as its chief of staff in 2019. The 2023-24 season is her fifth at Vanderbilt. Harris works closely with head

coach Jerry Stackhouse to ensure program goals and initiatives are met. She acts as the primers are She acts as the primary support contact to all members of the Vanderbilt men's



Coordinates special events.

Harris has been instrumental in the program's continued academic progress, resulting in increased SEC Academic Honor Roll recognitions, back-to-back SEC Scholar-Athlete of the Year recipients as well as several CoSIDA Academic All-District

Prior to Vanderbilt, Harris served as head coach of the UNC-Wilmington women's basketball program from 2012-17 and was the head coach at Tusculum from 2009-12.

While at UNC-Wilmington, she became one of the nation's youngest NCAA Division I coaches at the age of 31. She amassed over 100 career wins as a head coach while also

graduating every senior she coached.

Harris is also a published author and public speaker.

Her book "Refuse to Lose – 7 Steps to Make Adversity Your

Advantage" is an Amazon best seller.

A four-year letter winner at Wake Forest, Harris played in 106 games during her career with the Demon Deacons from 1998-2002. She paced head coach Charlene Curtis' squad with 108 assists and averaged 4.6 points per game during her senior season as co-captain. Harris, who finished her career 10th on the Wake Forest career assists chart, graduated in 2002 with a bachelor's degree in sociology.

#### **NICKI GROSS**

#### **SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO** THE HEAD COACH

Nicki Gross joined the Vanderbilt men's basketball program as the special assistant to the head coach in April of 2019 and the 2023-24 season is her fifth with the Commodores, Gross arrived at Vanderbilt after spending the 2018-19 season as a basketball analyst with the NBA's Memphis Grizzlies.

'She's my right hand," said Vanderbilt head coach Jerry

Gross oversees the day-to-day organization of the head coach, assists with opponent scouting and special projects, organizes practice plans and facilitates staff execution.

Gross has extensive basketball experience in the NBA and G League, where she served as the assistant coach with the Iowa Energy in the 2015-16 season and the Raptors 905 franchise From 2016-18, where she was a member of Stackhouse's staff. She was also the Energy's head video coordinator in 2014-15 before being promoted to an assistant coach position. At the time in 2015, Gross was the only female coach in the NBA G League and third in its history, following assistant Stephanie Ready (2001-03) and head coach Nancy Lieberman (2009-11).

She also worked with the NBA Summer League for four seasons from 2013-16, where she helped in all matters of operations for the yearly event.

A 2011 magna cum laude graduate of Seton Hall, she was a four-year letter winner for the Pirates in women's soccer. Following her time at Seton Hall, she earned her master's in business administration from Monmouth, where she ran track and field in 2011-12 and worked with former Commodore assistant coach King Rice as a graduate manager in 2012-13 with the men's basketball team.

#### DAVID GALE

#### DIRECTOR OF SCOUTING

David Gale serves as the Vanderbilt men's basketball program's director of scouting. The 2023-24 season is his second on staff with the Commodores.

Gale has familiarity with Jerry Stackhouse, working on Stackhouse's Raptors 905 staff that won the NBA G

League championship in 2017.
Gale makes his way to Nashville after spending the 2021-22 season at

SEC opponent Georgia, serving as the associate to the head coach/director of strategy.

Prior to his time at Georgia, Gale spent the previous three seasons coaching in Europe. He was the head coach of BC Nevezis Opibet in Lithuania's Lietuvos krepšinio lyga (LKL)

for the 2020-21 campaign.

He was previously an assistant coach for MHP Riesen
Ludwigsburg in the Basketball Bundesliga (BBL), helping
the franchise improve from 10th during the 2018-19 season
to second place in the league standings in 2019-20, with an
appearance in the tournament finals. From 2018-20, Gale also was the head coach for Porsche BBA, which he led to the German U-19 National Championship in 2020 and was named NBBL Coach of the Year and Coach of the Year by Eurobasket.com.

Before his time in Europe, Gale spent more than a decade working within three NBA franchises – Los Angeles Clippers,

Throughout his coaching career, he served as head coach for the boys' programs at Northwood High School in North

Carolina, as well as a stint as the head coach of Denmark Tech Community College in South Carolina.

On the girls' basketball side, Williams has served as the head coach at Raleigh Charter High School, St. Mary's High School and Wakefield High School in Raleigh. During his time at Wakefield, Williams was twice named conference Coach of the Year while leading the team to the No. 1 ranking in North Carolina and No. 12 nationally according to USA Today.

As a high school student-athlete in North Carolina, Williams was named the state's player of the year in 1991. He was also a three-time McDonald's All-American (1989, 1990, 1991), in addition to Gatorade All-America and Parade All-

#### **THOMAS GRAY**

Thomas Gray is the director of recruiting for the Vanderbilt men's basketball program. The 2023-24 season is his first in the role.

Gray led the Bears to their third-consecutive season of at least 17 wins, the first time Southwest accomplished that feat

in three decades. During the 2016-17 campaign, Southwest finished runner-up in the MACJC South Division, the highest division finish since 2001, with an 18-9 record.

His team was named the NJCAA Men's Basketball Academic Team of the Year for the second consecutive year with a team GPA of 3.59, the second-highest cumulative GPA in the history of NJCAA Men's Basketball. The Bears became the first MACJC men's basketball team to ever win the award in 2015-16 hoasting a 3.4 CGPA. In just his second season as in 2015-16, boasting a 3.42 GPA. In just his second season as Southwest head coach, Gray led the Bears to a MACJC state championship for the first time in 53 years.

After spending three seasons as an assistant at SMCC, Gray was named assistant coach at UT Martin until he got the call back to Summit to become the school's head coach. hea Ralph was named the sixth head coach in Vanderbilt women's basketball history on April 13, 2021. The 2023-24 season marks her third leading the Commodores.

A seven-time national champion as a student-athlete or coach, Ralph arrived at Vanderbilt after spending the previous 13 seasons as an assistant coach alongside Geno Auriemma at the University of Connecticut. While serving as a coach at her alma mater, Ralph helped guide the Huskies to 12 Final Four appearances and six national championships, including a record four consecutive titles from 2013-16.

Vanderbilt was hit hard with a plethora of preseason injuries to begin the 2022-23 campaign. Coach Ralph was able to rally the Commodores and record a second-straight double-digit win season, marking the first time in six years that Vandy has posted back-to-back double-digit win campaigns.

During the 2022-23 campaign, Ralph guided Vanderbilt to a winning record inside Memorial Gymnasium for the 38th time in the last 40 seasons. The Commodores won nine games at Memorial Gym, which included victories over Texas A&M, Arkansas, and Kentucky.

Ralph was key in the development of Ciaja Harbison, who transferred into the program for her graduate season and become one of the most prolific scorers in the SEC. Harbison earned second team All-SEC honors after averaging 19.6 points per game and shot 40.6% from the field. The only player in the SEC to score 40 points in a game this season, Harbison had three outings with 30-plus points among the 23 times she has scored in double figures while recording

the highest scoring average of her collegiate career. Harbison has led the Commodores in scoring 16 times, assists on 20 occasions and steals in 15 games. Harbison tied a school record with 41 points and added five steals in a January win over Texas A&M

In her inaugural season, Ralph led Vanderbilt to its first postseason appearance since 2014. The Commodores reached the third round of the Women's National Invitation Tournament, their longest postseason run since 2013. Vanderbilt also recorded its first SEC Tournament victory in six years when it defeated Texas A&M 85-69 on March 2, 2022.

In all, Ralph accrued the third-most wins of any women's basketball coach in a debut season. That included a 63-59 victory against No. 15 Florida in Memorial Gymnasium on Feb. 24, 2022, the program's first win against a ranked opponent since 2020.

Ralph wasted no time helping individual studentathletes realize their full potential. Jordyn Cambridge, Iyana Moore and Sacha Washington earned All-SEC accolades during the 2021-22 campaign. Cambridge recorded the program's first postseason triple-double during the SEC Tournament, while she and Moore contributed to a program-record 17 3-pointers against Alabama State on Dec. 28, 2021.

Ralph was an instrumental figure in recruiting and player development with the Huskies. She mentored standouts like Paige Bueckers, who in 2020-21 became the first freshman to sweep the major national player-of-the-year awards: the Naismith Trophy, Associated Press Player of the Year, USBWA National Player of the Year, Lieberman Award and Wooden Award.

In all, Ralph worked with 21 WNBA draft picks at

UConn, including nine top-five picks and three No. 1 overall selections: Tina Charles, Maya Moore and Breanna Stewart.

Prior to returning to UConn as an assistant, Ralph spent five seasons at the University of Pittsburgh from 2003-08. She was instrumental in a period of unprecedented success, helping the Panthers improve from single-digit victories to at least 22 victories in each of her final three seasons. Pitt also reached the Sweet 16 for the first time in program history in 2008.

As one of the most celebrated student-athletes in women's basketball history, Ralph ranks eighth in UConn's storied record book with 1,678 points. She also ranks among the program's all-time top 10 in career assists (456), steals (252) and field goal percentage (57.9). Ralph graduated from Connecticut in 2001 with a degree in exercise physiology.

In leading UConn to a national championship in 2000, Ralph was named an All-American and Big East Player of the Year. She was selected at the most valuable player in the 2000 NCAA Women's Final Four. She also won the Honda Award, presented to the premier female student-athlete in 12 collegiate sports, and the "Sports Illustrated for Women" Player of the Year.

Ralph was selected by the Utah Starzz in the 2001 WNBA Draft, but was unable to pursue a professional career due to a knee injury.

Ralph and her husband, Tom Garrick, have one daughter, Maysen. Currently a member of the Vanderbilt coaching staff, Garrick served as head coach of the UMass-Lowell women's basketball program from 2018-21 and previously served as a Vanderbilt assistant from 2009-15.



### **WOMEN'S BASKETBALL ASSISTANT COACHES**

#### **TOM GARRICK**

#### ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH

For Tom Garrick, who has served as head coach at two schools and previously spent six seasons on the coaching staff at Vanderbilt, the 2023-24 season will be the third season of his second stint at Vanderbilt as associate head



coach. He rejoined the program in April 2021 with head coach Shea Ralph's staff.

On the Commodore bench from 2009-15, Garrick helped guide Vanderbilt to five NCAA Tournaments with four 20-plus win seasons and 120 victories along the way. In Music City, he tutored Jence Rhoads to honorable mention All-America honors in 2010-11 while Commodore guards garnered seven All-SEC accolades with three named to the SEC All-Freshman team.

Garrick also played an instrumental role in the success of Vanderbilt standouts Jasmine Lister and Christina Foggie. Lister shattered the program's record for minutes played and ranked No. 3 on Vandy's all-time list for career assists, while Foggie led the SEC in scoring as a senior, became the school's all-time leader in three-pointers and was a second-round pick in the 2014 WNBA Draft to Minnesota.

Before his return to Nashville in 2021, Garrick spent three seasons as an assistant coach at Boston College from 2015-18 before taking over as head coach at UMass Lowell. With the River Hawks, he guided a program that won just four games the season before his arrival to 16 victories in his second season in 2019-20.

A seasoned coach with a pair of head coaching stints, Garrick also led the Rhode Island women's program for six seasons from 2003-09 and finished his tenure with the second-most Atlantic 10 wins in program history. He took over following two years as an assistant coach from 2001-03, after which he started his coaching career with the Rhode Island men's program in 1998-99.

A four-year NBA veteran, Garrick was drafted by the Los Angeles Clippers in 1988 out of Rhode Island and played for the Clippers, San Antonio, Minnesota and Dallas. During his professional run, he also played overseas in Germany, Turkey and Spain across a five-year career in Europe.

As an athlete at Rhode Island, Garrick was nicknamed "The Chief" and finished his time in Kingston ranked among the school's top 10 in scoring (1,573 points), steals (189) and assists (407), and was inducted into the Rhode Island Athletic Hall of Fame in 1998.

#### ASHLEY EARLEY

#### **ASSISTANT COACH**

Ashley Earley returned to Vanderbilt for her second stint as an assistant coach with the Commodores in April 2021.

A member of Vanderbilt's 1,000-point club as a student-athlete from 2001-05, Earley returns to the program after being on the Vandy



bench from 2013-16. With a track record of success in Memorial Gymnasium as a student-athlete and a coach, Earley coached Vanderbilt to the NCAA Tournament in 2014 while working hard on the recruiting front to bring in a pair of top-20 classes, including the nation's sixth-best unit and the top class in the SEC in 2016.

During her time with the program as a coach, Earley also tutored Vanderbilt's 2014-15 frontcourt to ranking as one of the most efficient in the nation. At season's end, four players connected on better than 50 percent from the field while the team ranked 10th nationally at 45.4 percent.

An assistant at Penn State for the past two seasons, Earley also has coaching stops at Northern Kentucky (2017-19), Virginia (2012-13), Marquette (2010-12), Rhode Island (2009-10), Tennessee Tech (2007-09) and Alabama (2006-07).

An All-America, all-region and first team All-SEC honoree while a candidate for both the Naismith Trophy and the Wooden Award after the 2004-05 season, she closed her career leading Vandy in points, rebounds and steals for the season while shooting 64 percent from the floor. To this day, Earley is fifth in career field goal percentage (57.8) and eighth in single-season rebounds (300 in 2004-05) while ranking third for total games played (135). Along the way, she helped the Commodores to a pair of Sweet 16 appearances and the Elite Eight in 2002.

After her career at Vanderbilt, Earley was drafted by the Indiana Fever in the 2005 WNBA Draft and played professionally overseas for Maccabi Tel Kabir in the Safsal Israeli League.

#### KEVIN DEMILLE

#### **ASSISTANT COACH**

A member of Shea Ralph's inaugural coaching staff at Vanderbilt, the 2023-24 season is Kevin DeMille's third as an assistant coach after coming to Vanderbilt in April 2021.



With seven years of experience in various roles

with the UConn women's basketball program with Ralph and head coach Geno Auriemma, DeMille joins Vanderbilt after five seasons at George Washington and comes to the program with eight trips to the NCAA Tournament and five victories in the title game under his belt.

In Washington, D.C., DeMille worked his way up from an assistant director of operations role to assistant coach with a strong track record of developing talent. During his time in the nation's capital, DeMille guided GW's post players to first and second team all-Atlantic 10 honors, the A-10 Sixth Woman of the Year, two all-rookie selections and All-Atlantic 10 Tournament honors while guiding the team's primary scoring options in four of his five seasons. In 2020-21, DeMille helped A-10 all-rookie selection Ali Brigham lead all Atlantic 10 rookies — and the team — in scoring and field goal percentage while finishing second among rookies in rebounding.

Working for former UConn great Jennifer Rizzotti at George Washington, he also spent time as video coordinator for the women's national team at the 2014 FIBA World Championship in Istanbul, Turkey. DeMille was also on staff for the gold-medal winning women's national team in the 2016 Olympics in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

Off the court, DeMille is the team's liaison with the marketing and communication departments. Prior to Vanderbilt, he championed Diversity and Inclusion efforts at GW and orchestrated the program's Bigger Than Basketball Season of Action that generated support, funding and in-kind contributions for national and DC-based organizations supporting The Trevor Project, Martha's Table, Set the Expectation, The Hidden Opponent, So Others Might Eat and other social causes.

At UConn, DeMille spent his four undergraduate years as a practice player and student manager before serving one semester as a graduate assistant. He was then hired as the assistant director of operations before moving on to George Washington with Rizzotti.

He earned his degree in social science of sport from UConn in 2013 and a master's degree in media and strategic communication at George Washington in 2020.

Chris Brann was named Vanderbilt women's basket-ball's Director of Operations by head coach Shea Ralph on May 10, 2021, and the 2023-24 season is his third season on staff with the program.

Brann joins Vanderbilt's staff after spending six seasons as the director of operations

with Boston College women's basketball. The run marked his second stint with the program after serving in the same capacity from 2006-09 under BC's all-time winningest coach Cathy Inglese.

A native of Jacksonville, Fla., Brann brings 15 years of experience to the role. He's previously served as the director of operations for Boston College (2006-09, 2012-18), Miami (Fla.) (2011-12), Denver (2009-11) and Wright State (2003-06).

In addition to his time as a director of operations, Brann spent the last three years as the senior vice president for STM Stay – a division of Short's Travel Management – and oversaw hotel travel for more than 400 college athletic programs.

A 2003 graduate of Florida State, Brann started his career in women's basketball as the head manager for the Seminoles. He also later completed his master's in sports administration from Florida State.

#### CHRISTINA FOGGIE

#### CHIEF OF STAFF

Christina Foggie was named Vanderbilt women's basketball's Chief of Staff by head coach Shea Ralph on May 4, 2021, the 2023-24 season is her third season on staff with the program.

One of the most decorated women's basketball players in Vanderbilt history, Foggie

makes her return to Vanderbilt after spending portions of the last six seasons at St. Joseph's in Philadelphia.

Most recently, Foggie has spent the last two years as director of special projects and special assistant for athletics director Jill Bodensteiner from 2019-21. She also worked with the St. Joe's women's basketball program from 2018-19 as the team's director of operations after previously spending a season as the video coordinator in 2015-16 while earning her master's degree in organizational development and leadership.

Foggie stands as Vanderbilt's seventh-leading scorer with 1,743 points during her playing days working with current associate head coach Tom Garrick during his first stint on the Commodore bench. As a senior, she was named a WBCA All-American Honorable Mention after leading the SEC in scoring with 19 points per game and helped the Commodores to the NCAA Tournament for the 15th straight season.

Holding Vanderbilt's all-time record for 3-pointers (276), Foggie was selected 24th overall by the Minnesota Lynx in the 2014 WNBA Draft.

After her playing days, Foggie spent one season coaching the Philadelphia Belles AAU team and working in the private sector before joining St. Joseph's.

Coach Ralph on Foggie: "Christina was a legendary student-athlete at Vanderbilt and we could not be happier to welcome her home. She has spent her years after

graduation dedicated to collegiate athletics. Christina is so passionate about Vanderbilt and is ready to contribute to our program in every way possible. She is completely invested in the success of our student-athletes on and off the floor, and we are thrilled to have her on board."

# DIRECTOR • INTERNAL OPERATIONS/ON-CAMPUS RECRUITING COORDINATOR

Koko Nelson joined head coach Shea Ralph's staff as the Vanderbilt women's basketball director of recruiting, in January of 2022 and the 2023-24 season is her third on staff with the program.

Nelson will be responsi-

ble for aiding the coaching staff in all areas of recruiting including travel, correspondence, campus visits, and sharing what makes Vanderbilt women's basketball an elite program among the SEC and national competition.

She served in a similar capacity with first-year head coach Clark Lea and the Vanderbilt football program as the recruiting operations coordinator. She joined the Commodores in 2021, guiding the program to one its best recruiting classes in program history.

Nelson spent the 2019 and 2020 two seasons with the Minnesota football program as a recruiting and graphics design assistant. During her time with the Golden Gophers the team went 14-6 and won the 2019 Outback Bowl with a 31-34 victory against Auburn.

A Notre Dame graduate, Nelson was a 2018 NCAA national champion with the women's basketball program. She was a student-athlete from 2013-18 and a two-time ACC All-Academic honoree.

While at Notre Dame, Nelson also worked as a graphic design intern, creating graphics for all sports to use on UND.com, emails and social media. She also worked as an intern with Winning Edge Leadership and made custom social media graphics for leadership retreat participants.

#### KATIE LOU SAMUELSON

## DIRECTOR • PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

One of the most decorated players in recent women's college basketball history joined Vanderbilt's women's basketball staff with the announcement in January 2023 by head coach Shea Ralph that Katie Lou Samuelson has been named the program's director of player development.

As director of player development, Samuelson will assist the women's basketball staff in a non-coaching capacity in all areas of the program, including game preparation, player development and on-campus recruiting. She will remain an active member of the Los Angeles Sparks during the WNBA season while still performing her duties, and return to Nashville with the Commodores during the WNBA offseason.

Samuelson is about to enter her fifth season in the WNBA after averaging a career-high 9.7 points and 3.0 rebounds per game for the Sparks in 2022, her first with the franchise. She scored in double figures in 18 of 32 games, highlighted by a career-best 15 against the Washington Mystics last August. A first-round draft pickgoing fourth overall to the Chicago Sky in 2019—Samuelson has also played for the Dallas Wings and Seattle

Storm while also helping lead Perfumerías Avenida to the 2021 Euroleague Final and a Spanish league championship during her professional career.

A two-time first-team All-American and the American Athletic Conference Player of the Year in both 2017-18, Samuelson became the 10th student-athlete in Connecticut's history to record 2,000 points in a career before ending her time with the program fourth on the Huskies' all-time scoring list. She was named the ESPNW national Freshman of the Year and was selected to the AAC All-Freshman Team in 2016 after helping UConn win the national championship.

Samuelson earned national Player-of-the-Year honors

Samuelson earned national Player-of-the-Year honors from Gatorade, USA Today, McDonald's, WBCA and Naismith at the high school level as well.

Internationally, Samuelson has represented the United States at various competitions dating back to 2013 when she was a was part of a team that claimed the FIBA Americas U16 championship. #### KYLA IRWIN

Kyla Irwin was named Vanderbilt women's basketball's Director of Player Development & Community Relations by head coach Shea Ralph on May 4, 2021, and the 2023-24 season is her third season on staff with the program.



A four-year athlete at Connecticut from 2016-20, Irwin comes to Vanderbilt after a professional career overseas playing for SNP Bascats USC Heidelberg in Germany for one season.

A consistent presence on the floor throughout her career with the Huskies, Irwin played in 120 games and made 20 starts. In her four years she shot 47.8 percent from the floor, served as a team captain as a senior and helped UConn reach the Final Four in all three NCAA Tournaments the team played in.

While suffering a season-ending injury in 2020, Irwin missed just one game down the stretch due to the COVID-19 pandemic canceling the 2020 NCAA Tournament.

Coming to Vanderbilt, Irwin brings extensive experience with Team IMPACT which is a national non-profit that connects children ages 5 to 16 facing serious and chronic illnesses with college athletic teams. In her final two years with the Huskies, Irwin developed a close relationship with Daniela Ciriello who was a staple at UConn home games.

Coach Ralph on Irwin: "Kyla is the type of person who impacts you the moment you meet her. Her energizing presence and her knowledge of what is needed to compete and win at the highest level is exactly what our program needs. We are very lucky to have her working with our student-athletes every day."

She has been a part of various presentations, articles and educational sessions over the years and is currently focused on advancing current measures in lower extremity injury prevention.

#### STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH


Dr. Allison Randall is in her fifth season in 2023-24 as Vanderbilt women's basketball's head strength and conditioning coach.







# **ABOUT MEMORIAL GYMNASIUM**

The Southeastern Conference's most historic venue for college basketball, Memorial Gymnasium serves as the home court for the Vanderbilt Commodores.

Dedicated in 1952 as a memorial to all Vanderbilt men and women who served in World War II, the arena was built as a combination gymnasium and concert hall by the late master architect Edwin Keeble.

Nearly 70 years later, the unique style of Memorial Gymnasium (capacity 14,316) — with its benches situated on the baseline, a playing court that sits above portions of the crowd and deafening acoustics — continues to make the Commodores' home a dreaded stop for opponents.

Vanderbilt's men's and women's teams have combined to win more than 75 percent of their home games.

In 2021 Memorial Gymnasium went through its most recent upgrades, which included new LED videoboards, an advanced playing surface, brand new locker rooms for the men's and women's basketball teams and an updated staff and student-athlete entrance. In recent years, the facility also underwent several other renovations highlighted by a refurbished three-court practice gym, coaching offices and donor room.

Capacity has fluctuated throughout the history of the building. It reached its highest number of 15,646 in 1969 when 4,000 seats were added in the east and west ends. When chairback seats in the end zones and suites on the north side were installed in the late 1990s capacity lowered to 14,316.





# VANDERBILT UNIVERSITY

ornelius Vanderbilt, known as "the Commodore," was in his 79th year when he decided to make the gift that founded Vanderbilt University in the spring of 1873.

In athletics, Vanderbilt is a charter member of the Southeastern Conference and is the conference's only private school. The Commodores have claimed five national championships, in bowling (2007, 2018), women's tennis (2015) and baseball (2014, 2019). Vandy also owns two individual national championship with Ryan Tolbert's 400-meter hurdles crown in 1997 and Gordon Sargent's men's golf title in 2022.

The \$1 million that he gave to endow and build the university was Vanderbilt's only major philanthropy. Methodist Bishop Holland N. McTyeire of Nashville, husband of Amelia Townsend who was a cousin of Vanderbilt's young second wife Frank Crawford, went to New York for medical treatment early in 1873 and spent time recovering in the Vanderbilt mansion. He won the Vanderbilts' admiration and support for the project of building a university in the South that would "contribute to strengthening the ties which should exist between all sections of our common country."

McTyeire chose the site for the campus, supervised the construction of buildings and personally planted

many of the trees that today make Vanderbilt a national arboretum. At the outset, the university consisted of one Main Building (now Kirkland Hall), an astronomical observatory and houses for professors. Landon C. Garland was Vanderbilt's first chancellor, serving from 1875 to 1893. He advised McTyeire in selecting the faculty, arranged the curriculum and set the policies of the university.

For the first 40 years of its existence, Vanderbilt was under the auspices of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. The Vanderbilt Board of Trust severed its ties with the church in June 1914 as a result of a dispute with the bishops over who would appoint university trustees.

From the outset, Vanderbilt met two definitions of a university: It offered work in the liberal arts and sciences beyond the baccalaureate degree and it embraced several professional schools in addition to its college. James H. Kirkland, the longest serving chancellor in university history (1893-1937), followed Chancellor Garland. He guided Vanderbilt to rebuild after a fire in 1905 that consumed the main building, which was renamed in Kirkland's honor, and all its contents. He also navigated the university through the separation from the Methodist Church. Notable advances in graduate studies were made under the third chancellor, Oliver Cromwell Carmichael

(1937-46). He also created the Joint University Library, brought about by a coalition of Vanderbilt, Peabody College and Scarritt College.

Remarkable continuity has characterized the government of Vanderbilt. The original charter, issued in 1872, was amended in 1873 to make the legal name of the corporation "The Vanderbilt University." The charter has not been altered since.

The university is self-governing under a Board of Trust that, since the beginning, has elected its own members and officers university's general governance is vested in the Board of Trust. The immediate government of the university is committed to the chancellor, who is elected by the Board of Trust.

The original Vanderbilt campus consisted of 75 acres. By 1960, the campus had spread to about 260 acres of land. When George Peabody College for Teachers merged with Vanderbilt in 1979, about 53 acres were added.

Vanderbilt's student enrollment tended to double itself each 25 years during the first century of the university's history: 307 in the fall of 1875; 754 in 1900; 1,377 in 1925; 3,529 in 1950; 7,034 in 1975. In the fall of 1999 the enrollment was 10,127.

In the planning of Vanderbilt, the assumption seemed to be that it would be an all-male institution. Yet the

board never enacted rules prohibiting women. At least one woman attended Vanderbilt classes every year from 1875 on. Most came to classes by courtesy of professors or as special or irregular (non-degree) students. From 1892 to 1901 women at Vanderbilt gained full legal equality except in one respect — access to dorms. In 1894 the faculty and board allowed women to compete for academic prizes. By 1897, four or five women entered with each freshman class. By 1913 the student body contained 78 women, or just more than 20 percent of the academic enrollment.

National recognition of the university's status came in 1949 with election of Vanderbilt to membership in the select Association of American Universities. In the 1950s Vanderbilt began to outgrow its provincial roots and to measure its achievements by national standards under the leadership of Chancellor Harvie Branscomb. By its 90th anniversary in 1963, Vanderbilt for the first time ranked in the top 20 private universities in the United States.

Vanderbilt continued to excel in research, and the number of university buildings more than doubled under the leadership of Chancellors Alexander Heard (1963-1982) and Joe B. Wyatt (1982-2000), only the fifth and sixth chancellors in Vanderbilt's long and distinguished history.

From 1954-64, Vanderbilt enrolled its first black students, all of whom showed both courage and determination. These changes would not have happened when they did without the support of others, such as Chancellors Branscomb and Heard, who understood the tenor of the times, and as leaders they helped guide Vanderbilt through these years of challenge.

In 1954, when Bishop Joseph Johnson graduated from Vanderbilt after a year of baccalaureate work as a special student (with the approval of the Board of Trust), his year of hard work and triumph was against a backdrop of a nation amidst social upheaval.

On Dec. 2, 1967, Perry Wallace made history in a basketball game against Southern Methodist University by becoming the SEC's first black basketball player to compete in a varsity game. He played in his first SEC varsity basketball game two days later against Auburn. Wallace was a member of the All-SEC second team and an SEC Sportsmanship Award recipient. He graduated with a bachelor of engineering in 1970.

In addition to his integration efforts, Heard added three schools (Blair, the Owen Graduate School of Management and Peabody College) to the seven already existing and constructed three dozen buildings. During Wyatt's tenure, Vanderbilt acquired or built one-third of the campus buildings and made great strides in diversity, volunteerism and technology.

The university grew and changed significantly under its seventh chancellor, Gordon Gee, who served from 2000 to 2007. Vanderbilt led the country in the rate of growth for academic research funding, which increased to more than \$450 million and became one of the most selective undergraduate institutions in the country.

In March 2008, Nicholas S. Zeppos was named Vanderbilt's eighth chancellor. The appointment came following Zeppos' many years of service to the university, where he started as an assistant law professor in 1987, and went on to serve as dean of the law school and Vanderbilt's provost.

Shortly after his appointment, Zeppos led the university through the most challenging economic times since the Great Depression, a period from which Vanderbilt emerged relatively unscathed. A mark of the university's commitment to positive change, even amid economic calamity, Zeppos implemented Opportunity Vanderbilt in 2008 — a pioneering initiative that would fund loan-free tuition for the nation's most deserving students, regardless of their background or financial means.

That same year, another transformation took hold for undergraduates: in 2008, Vanderbilt opened the Martha Ingram Commons, a living-learning residential hall that enables a fully holistic approach to education. The Commons marked the first of Vanderbilt's Residential College system, followed by Warren and Moore colleges, which opened in 2014 and E. Bronson Ingram College in 2018. This priority of educating the whole student — intellectually, socially and emotionally — is also reflected in the university's long-term campus development plan, FutureVU, which aims to align Vanderbilt's physical spaces with its academic mission.

Zeppos also oversaw the separation of Vanderbilt University and Vanderbilt Medical Center in 2016, a prescient decision that positioned both institutions for long-term success and independence.

In August 2019, Zeppos became chancellor emeritus after serving as Vanderbilt's top leader for more than 11 years. Provost and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs Susan R. Wente served as interim chancellor until July 1, 2020, becoming the first woman to lead the university.

Daniel Diermeier, an internationally renowned scholar of political science and managerial leadership, began his tenure as the ninth chancellor of Vanderbilt University on July 1, 2020. Formerly provost and dean of the Harris School of Public Policy at the University of Chicago, and a longtime professor at Stanford University and Northwestern University's Kellogg School of Management, Diermeier was selected by the Vanderbilt Board of Trust after an extensive worldwide search.

Today, Vanderbilt University is a private research university with approximately 7,000 undergraduates and more than 6,400 graduate and professional students. Comprised of 10 distinct schools and colleges on one

centralized campus in downtown Nashville, Vanderbilt spurs — and is optimized for — cross-disciplinary research, fostering discoveries that impact society for the better.

Vanderbilt is consistently ranked as one of the nation's top 15 universities by publications such as U.S. News & World Report, with several programs that consistently rank in the top 10.

Testament to the current leadership, faculty, staff and students, Vanderbilt was ranked #1 for both financial aid and students loving their college by the Princeton Review in 2021, and was recently ranked No. 19 in Reuter's assessment of the World's Most Innovative Universities. Cutting-edge, cross-disciplinary research and liberal arts, combined with strong ties to a distinguished medical center, create an invigorating atmosphere where students tailor their education to meet their goals and researchers collaborate to solve complex questions affecting our health, culture and society.

Vanderbilt, an independent, privately supported university, and the separate, non-profit Vanderbilt University Medical Center share a respected name and enjoy close collaboration through education and research. Together, the number of people employed by these two organizations exceeds that of the largest private employer in the Middle Tennessee region.





# DANIEL DIERMEIER

CHANCELLOR

aniel Diermeier was named Vanderbilt University's ninth chancellor in late 2019 after an extensive search by the Board of Trust. A visionary leader and internationally renowned political scientist and management scholar, Diermeier stepped into the role in July 2020 and immediately committed to safely and successfully bringing students back to campus during the COVID-19 pandemic. Vanderbilt was one of a very small number of the nation's best universities to do so. In the years since, Chancellor Diermeier has led an ambitious program of expansion and improvement in the spirit of Vanderbilt's motto, Crescere aude, or "dare to grow." Under his leadership, the university has risen in stature, topped the \$1 billion mark in research expenditures, successfully launched a \$300 million capital campaign for Vanderbilt athletics and reaffirmed its long-standing commitment to free expression and civil discourse. Diermeier has driven efforts to become the destination for leading faculty and the most promising students, to create a culture of radical collaboration and personal growth for Vanderbilt's faculty, students and staff and to expand Vanderbilt's global presence. In 2022, Vanderbilt launched the Discovery Vanderbilt initiative, a multimillion-dollar investment to catalyze and expand the university's capacity for innovation and discovery across disciplines.

Diermeier has worked to increase Vanderbilt's innovation partnerships with corporations and the U.S. military, as well as collaboration with Nashville and other communities in Middle Tennessee. He drove development of the Vanderbilt Project on Unity and American Democracy and the annual Vanderbilt Summit on Modern Conflict and Emerging Threats. Under his leadership, Vanderbilt was selected as the host of the Clinton Global Initiative University in early 2023 and launched a yearlong celebration of the university's Sesquicentennial.

In addition to his role as chancellor, Diermeier is University Distinguished Professor in the Owen Graduate School of Management and Distinguished University Professor of Political Science in the College of Arts & Science. He is a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and the Guggenheim Foundation. He has published five books and more than 100 research articles in academic journals—mostly in the fields of political science, economics and management, but also in linguistics, sociology, psychology, computer science, operations research and applied mathematics.

Throughout his career, Diermeier has proven to be a bold innovator, combining excellence as a leader, researcher and teacher with an entrepreneurial mindset.

His first faculty position was as an assistant professor at the Stanford Graduate School of Business in 1994. In 1997, Northwestern University recruited him to its Kellogg School of Management to build its political economy program. He rose quickly through the ranks at Kellogg, receiving promotion to professor just four years after earning his Ph.D.

In 2000, he was appointed Kellogg's IBM Professor of Regulation and Competitive Practice. Later, he was appointed director of the Ford Motor Company Center for Global Citizenship. He also held appointments at Northwestern in economics, political science, linguistics and law. He won multiple teaching awards, including the L.G. Lavengood Outstanding Professor of the Year Award and the Alumni Professor of the Year Award. He was a 2007 recipient of the Aspen Institute's Faculty Pioneer Award, called "the Oscars of the business school world" by the Financial Times.

Diermeier co-founded the Northwestern Institute on Complex Systems and served as the founding academic director of the CEO Perspectives program, one of the leading development programs for C-level executives. He also served as chairman and co-founder of the Northwestern Global Health Foundation, a nonprofit dedicated to developing low-cost medical devices.

In 2014, Diermeier was appointed dean of the Harris School of Public Policy at the University of Chicago, where he was also named the David Lee Shillinglaw Distinguished Service Professor. As dean, he led the transformation of the Harris School into the third-ranked public policy school in the nation. His achievements



included launching a strategy that doubled enrollment while increasing selectivity; a 50 percent growth in faculty; a major fundraising effort that included funding for the Keller Center, the school's \$80 million, LEED Platinum-certified home; and the recruitment of diverse students, faculty and staff, including bridge programs that led to a notable increase in minority students.

After his successes at the Harris School, the University of Chicago named Diermeier provost in 2016. In that role, Diermeier was responsible for all academic and research programs, as well as oversight of the university's budget. His first priority was to improve the university's financial performance without impeding its progress toward greater eminence. Another major theme of his tenure was the expansion of diversity and inclusion. He appointed more women to leadership positions, engaged in a faculty-led initiative to increase the numbers of underrepresented minorities and women in the STEM faculty pipeline, and significantly increased the number of African American and Hispanic undergraduates who were the first in their families to attend college.

Diermeier also led major expansions of the University of Chicago's faculty in engineering and applied science, while continuing improvements in economics, policy, business and urban studies. He oversaw sustained investment in the humanities and social sciences. During his tenure, the university's undergraduate college experienced significant growth, while increasing selectivity and yield. Diermeier also focused on improving doctoral and non-degree education.

With Diermeier as provost, the University of Chicago increased its level of global engagement, culminating in the opening of the Francis and Rose Yuen Campus in Hong Kong. The university also increased engagement locally with the City of Chicago and neighboring communities through initiatives including the Urban Labs, a faculty-led research center working with city governments to address urgent issues.

Over the course of his career, Chancellor Diermeier has served as a board member for the University of Chicago Medical Center, Argonne National Laboratory, the Civic Consulting Alliance, the Marine Biological Laboratory, the National Opinion Research Center, the Field Museum of Natural History and the Management Board of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. He has been an adviser to governments, nonprofits and leading companies, including Abbott, Accenture, Allianz, the City of Chicago, the Government of Canada, Ernst & Young, Exelon, the FBI, Hyatt, Johnson & Johnson, Medtronic, Metro Group, PricewaterhouseCoopers, State Farm, UnitedHealth Group and the United States Olympic and Paralympic Committee.

A first-generation college graduate, Diermeier earned a Ph.D. in political science from the University of Rochester. He also holds master's degrees in political science from the University of Rochester and the University of Munich, and he earned a master's degree in philosophy from the University of Southern California.

# CANDICE STOREY LEE

# VICE CHANCELLOR FOR ATHLETICS AND UNIVERSITY AFFAIRS & ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

andice Storey Lee is Vanderbilt's vice chancellor for athletics and university affairs and athletic director and was reappointed to a new five-year term in summer 2023.

Named to the position on May 21, 2020, Lee is Vanderbilt's first female athletic director and the first Black woman to head an SEC athletics program.

A former member of the Vanderbilt women's basketball team, Lee has earned undergraduate, masters and doctorate degrees from Vanderbilt

Peabody College of education and human development and has been an inspirational leader in athletics and the wider Vanderbilt community ever since arriving on campus as a first-year student in 1996.

Lee began her athletics administration career at Vanderbilt in 2002, serving first as an academic adviser and then compliance director. Working under the late athletic director David Williams, Lee was named the department's senior woman administrator in 2004, a responsibility she held until 2020. She also assumed the title of deputy athletic director in 2016, overseeing the day-to-day operations of the athletic department and serving as the sport administrator for football and women's basketball.

A team captain, four-year letter winner, and five-time SEC Academic Honor Roll selection as a member of the Vanderbilt's women's basketball team, Lee battled through knee injuries and helped lead the Commodores to an SEC Tournament championship in her final season (2002). She graduated from Vanderbilt with a bachelor of science degree in human and organizational development in 2000, received her master's degree in counseling in 2002 and her doctorate in higher education administration in 2012.

A model student-athlete at Bob Jones High School in Madison, Alabama, she was named to the 2022 class of the Huntsville-Madison County (Ala.) Athletic Hall of Fame.

Beyond her duties at Vanderbilt, Lee is a leader in college athletics at a national level. She serves on the Southeastern Conference's Council on Racial Equity and Social Justice and on the executive committee of the Black Athletic Directors Alliance, an organization created in 2020 to promote the growth, development and elevation of Black athletics administrators. She formerly served as a member of the NCAA Women's Basketball Rules Committee and as chair of the NCAA Division I Women's Lacrosse Committee and of SEC Senior Woman Administrators.

Lee has been recognized by peers and media as one of the leading young administrators in college athletics. In 2022, she was named Athletic Director of the Year at the Black Student-Athlete Summit. The Sports Business Journal named her to its college sports "Power Players" list in 2019, and Adidas named her to its "NEXT UP" class in 2018. In addition, Lee was the recipient of the John McClendon Scholarship for Black administrators in 2017

Lee has also built deep roots as a longtime fixture in the Nashville community. She currently serves or has served on the boards of directors for the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame, Nashville Sports Council, YWCA of Middle Tennessee and The Family Center. She was named a 2019–20 fellow of the Tennessee Independent Colleges and Universities Association's executive leadership institute and is a graduate of the 2012 class of Leadership Nashville and the 2012 Vanderbilt Leadership Academy. In 2021, Lee received Peabody College's Distinguished Alumna Award. Members of Vanderbilt's student-athlete advisory committee awarded Lee their inaugural staff appreciation award in 2002 in recognition of her leadership through the COVID-19 pandemic.

Lee is committed to a vision that one of the world's preeminent academic institutions in one of the nation's best cities can thrive in the most competitive athletic conference in college sports. Working in partnership with Chancellor Daniel Diermeier, she led development of the Vandy United Fund in 2021. The \$300 million investment in athletics reflects the university's commitment to empowering student-athletes to realize their full potential on and off the field.

During Lee's time at Vanderbilt, student-athletes have won five national championships in baseball (two), bowling (two) and women's tennis. Vanderbilt teams have also won more than 20 conference championships and tournament titles, including baseball, men's and women's basketball, bowling, women's cross country, men's and women's golf, women's lacrosse, women's soccer and women's tennis. Additionally, the football team has played in six bowl games since breaking a 26-year bowl drought in 2008.

In 2020-21, Vanderbilt finished with an overall NCAA Graduation Success Rate of 97, the highest of any SEC program, for the sixth straight year. During the 2010–22 season, student-athletes also exceeded a 3.0 grade-point average for the 16th straight year.

Lee is married to Sean Lee, the executive director of a Middle Tennessee housing authority. They have an adult son, Andrew.

Letter winners and student-athletes who have made major contributions to the university athletic program through personal time, effort, interest and through many years of continued service, or have distinguished themselves as exceptional in their chosen field of endeavor. Nominees are not eligible until six years after they last participated in intercollegiate athletics at the university.

Individuals, coaches, athletic officials, staff members and other university officials, who were not letter winners or student-athletes at Vanderbilt University, yet have rendered outstanding service to the intercollegiate athletics program through personal time, effort, interest and through many years of continued service.




