Jim Porter has loved the Pro Football Hall of Fame about as long as he has known his ABCs. As a boy growing up in Canton, Porter said he looked forward to sitting in a lawn chair and watching a new class of Hall of Famers be enshrined far more than he did to opening gifts on Christmas morning.

"The Canton Repository, which I used to deliver, always had a countdown in the bottom right-hand corner," said Porter, 57. "I was the kid who went and looked at the calendar to say, 'OK, I'm 190 days away.' I did it on the school bus. I did it because enshrinement was very cool for me."

Five decades later, Porter's love came full circle as he took over the stewardship of his hometown's most beloved landmark. Porter was named president of the Pro Football Hall of Fame in October 2021, stepping into the position with extensive executive experience and a deep understanding of the Hall's Mission and the needs of the Canton community.

As president, Porter's main responsibility is to ensure the Hall honors its Mission statement: "Honor the Heroes of the Game, Preserve its History, Promote its Values and Celebrate Excellence Together."

Previously, Porter was publisher of GateHouse Ohio Media and oversaw the management of The Canton Repository, The Massillon Independent, The Alliance Review, The Dover-New Philadelphia

Times-Reporter, About magazine, The Suburbanite and Jackson Suburbanite (weeklies) and all of those publications' related digital products, including the football-focused Friday Night Ohio.

Porter held several executive management positions over his 33 years at The Repository, serving as VP of Circulation, VP of Sales & Marketing and General Manager for GateHouse Ohio Media prior to being named group publisher in 2013.

During his newspaper career, Porter won the prestigious International Newspaper Marketing Award for "best overall marketing results." Under his leadership, The Canton Repository was recognized as Newspaper of the Year by The Associated Press five consecutive years (2015-19). He also received several Ohio Circulation Managers Association awards over his career.

Porter served as the chairman of the NFL Centennial Host Committee. He serves or has served on the following boards of directors: Pro Football Hall of Fame, Pathway Caring for Children, ArtsInStark, Better Business Bureau, Canton Regional Chamber of Commerce, Special Improvement District for City of Canton, Canton for All People, United Way of Greater Stark County and the City of Canton's Steering Committee.

Porter was co-chair of the Harvest for Hunger food campaign for the Akron-Canton Regional Foodbank for three consecutive years.

He is the founder and chairman of the Stark County High School Football Hall of Fame and executive director of the East-West All-Star Game in Stark County. He was inducted into the Plain Local Wall of Fame in 2004 as an individual and was inducted a second time, in 2018, as the past president of the Golden Eagle Athletic Association.

Porter resides in Jackson Township with his wife, Sarah. He has four daughters: Kaithlyn, Bayley, Emma and Reagan. He attended the University of Akron and Northwestern University's Kellogg School of Management.

In December 2020, Porter received the Clayton Horn Award, which recognizes an individual who positively impacts the Canton community and strives to move it forward. This award speaks to an individual with true character and integrity—both of which are essential qualities to being president of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

THE PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

The Pro Football Hall of Fame opened its doors nearly 60 years ago. From its humble beginnings in 1963 to today, the Pro Football Hall of Fame has grown in both size and stature. Recognized worldwide as America's premier sports Hall of Fame, it is doubtful that even the most optimistic of those who led the drive to bring the Hall of Fame to Canton, Ohio, could have envisioned the successes it would realize.

An exhilarating museum and attraction, the Hall of Fame pays tribute to the talents and triumphs of pro football's greatest stars. Chronicled within the walls of the Hall of Fame are the stories and circumstances of play that bring to life such words as Commitment, Integrity, Courage, Respect and Excellence.

The Pro Football Hall of Fame has welcomed more than 10 million fans. Each year, visitors travel from each of the 50 states in the United States and from upward of 70 foreign countries to tour the Hall of Fame.

Today, the Hall of Fame reaches tens of millions of additional football fans each year through broad outreach, such as nationally televised events, an in-depth website, educational and youth programs, social media, traveling exhibits and special events held around the country.

The Pro Football Hall of Fame works collaboratively with the pro football family – the National Football League, the 32 NFL clubs and other entities. The cooperative efforts of all these organizations have contributed greatly to the overall success of the Pro Football Hall of Fame. In turn, the Hall strives to serve as the best possible historical showplace and repository for the sport of professional football.

The Pro Football Hall of Fame, after a stringent review process, achieved accreditation by the American Alliance of Museums (AAM), the highest national recognition afforded the nation's museums, in 2017. Accreditation signifies excellence to the museum community, to governments, funders, outside agencies and to the museum-going public. The Hall of Fame is one of just over 1,080 of the estimated 33,000 museums (a mere 3%) in the United States to earn AAM accreditation. The Pro Football Hall of Fame is the first major sports museum to be accredited.

The Hall of Fame is a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit educational institution guided by its Mission to "Honor the Heroes of the Game, Preserve its History, Promote its Values & Celebrate Excellence Together."



HISTORY

The Pro Football Hall of Fame is located in Canton, Ohio, for three primary reasons: (1) the American Professional Football Association, later renamed the National Football League, was founded in Canton on Sept. 17, 1920; (2) the Canton Bulldogs were an early era pro football power, even before the days of the NFL. They were also the first two-time champion of the NFL, in 1922 and 1923. The great Jim Thorpe, the first big-name athlete to play pro football, played his first pro football with the Bulldogs, starting in 1915; and (3) Canton citizens early in the 1960s launched a determined and well-organized campaign to earn the site designation for their city.

The National Football League awarded the site for the Hall of Fame to Canton in 1961. Groundbreaking for the original construction took place on Aug. 11, 1962, and the Hall opened its doors for the first time on Sept. 7, 1963. Four expansions were completed over the years (1971, 1978, 1995 and 2012-13) that have resulted in the museum growing from its original 19,000 square feet to today's 121,000-square-foot football facility.

Jim Porter was named president on Oct. 16, 2021. Previous presidents or executive directors of the Hall of Fame were: Dick McCann (1962-67), Dick Gallagher (1968-1975), Pete Elliott (1979-1996), John Bankert (1996-2005), Steve Perry (2006-2014) and Dave Baker (2014-2021).

HOURS OF OPERATION

The Pro Football Hall of Fame is open every day of the year except for Thanksgiving and Christmas. From Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day, it is open daily from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. The hours for the remainder of the year are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily. INSIDE THE HALL

The Pro Football Hall of Fame is a world-renowned museum that represents its sport in many colorful and entertaining ways. The Hall of Fame continually enhances its exhibits and displays to provide guests with an immersive and experiential visit to "Football Heaven."

Visitors enter the museum through the grand lobby at the center of the building. This area also features a special exhibit gallery. Guests then begin their visit by walking through a time tunnel of images featuring players from current years spanning back to the beginning of the National Football League. The visitor experience explodes with a visually dynamic and interactive two-level exhibit area in the Hall of Fame's original rotunda.

The NFL's First Century Gallery ground level includes a towering bronze statue of Jim Thorpe, considered a legend of pro football dating back to his days with the Canton Bulldogs beginning in 1915. The exhibits on the first level present a panoramic view using high-tech interactives and one-of-a-kind artifacts to tell the story of professional football, from its humble beginnings in the early 20th century to the worldwide phenomenon it has become today.

The second floor of **The NFL's First Century** features historical information regarding professional football in several dramatic themes. Inspirational stories of the game's pioneers, great players, coaches, and circumstances are told in vivid detail. Pro football's societal impact is documented in "Road to Equality" and "Pop Culture." Bringing these themes to life are audio and video interactives and larger-than-life photographic murals.

Perhaps the most emotional stop during a tour of the museum is the **Hall of Fame Gallery** that houses the Bronzed Bust of each Hall of Famer. Visitors also have the opportunity to learn about each member of the Hall through touch screen kiosks that include bios, photos and videos on the inductees.



After the **Hall of Fame Gallery**, guests proceed to the "A Game for Life" holographic theater. This extraordinary cutting edge, multi-sensory immersive theater features holographic representations of Hall of Fame legends Joe Namath, George Halas and Vince Lombardi. The experience provides great inspiration to fans by showing them how the game of football also teaches lessons about life. The stories of numerous Hall of Famers – Jim Kelly, Steve Largent, Alan Page, Jim Brown, Warren Moon and Curtis Martin – are shared. "A Game for Life" was produced and created by some of the leading talent in the film industry and has been receiving rave reviews.

The **Pro Football Today Gallery** examines contemporary themes in the NFL. This area is filled with mementos from recent history-making performances, including many milestone moments from the current NFL season. Artifacts continually are placed on display as they added to the Hall's extensive collection.

The **Lamar Hunt Super Bowl Gallery** chronicles, in dramatic fashion, the exciting history of the game from Super Bowl I to present. The gallery uses one-of-a-kind artifacts, exciting game footage and interactive kiosks to help tell the story of how the Super Bowl has become a global phenomenon. **Road to the Super Bowl**, a turntable experience, presents the most recent NFL season and Super Bowl in spectacular fashion using the latest technology and the creative works of NFL Films.



HALL OF FAME STORE

A 7,500-square-foot Hall of Fame Store carries a broad selection of merchandise from all 32 NFL teams, including jerseys, T-shirts, hats, novelties and much more.

RALPH WILSON, JR. PRO FOOTBALL RESEARCH AND PRESERVATION CENTER

The Mission of the Pro Football Hall of Fame is to "Honor the Heroes of the Game, Preserve its History, Promote its Values & Celebrate Excellence Together." Nowhere is this mission more evident than inside the Ralph Wilson, Jr. Pro Football Research and Preservation Center, which is named after the Class of 2009 enshrinee and Buffalo Bills late founder/owner.

Here is where the documentary evidence of the history of professional football is preserved. Within this state-of-the-art, 10,000-square-foot facility, a vast archive of more than 40 million pages of documents and primary source materials are protected with a climate-controlled system. The archives collection includes rare documents, personal papers, game programs, special collections, publications, teams and league records, and oral and video histories relating to individuals and the history of professional football. It also archives a collection of more than six million photographic images.

Additionally, the Research and Preservation Center is the repository for the Hall of Fame's artifact collections that includes more than 30,000 individual objects. Together, the archives and artifact collections serve to preserve an enduring record of the sport, its past and the Legends who made pro football America's most popular sport.

HOSPITALITY SPACE

The Pro Football Hall of Fame offers unsurpassed world-class hospitality opportunities with the spectacular Nash Family Event & Conference Center as well as the intimate James Allen Family Gold Jacket Lounge. The Hall of Fame is equipped to handle groups from those needing all-day meetings or an after-hours reception and/or dinner. The Nash Family Event & Conference Center, located on the main floor of the museum, can comfortably accommodate up to 360 guests for a sit-down dinner with an attached outdoor plaza perfect for cocktails. Groups up to 450 can be accommodated comfortably for presentations. The second-floor James Allen Family Gold Jacket Lounge is attached to an outdoor patio and can accommodate up to 120 guests for dinner. PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME ENSHRINEMENT WEEK POWERED BY JOHNSON CONTROLS

Each year, tens of thousands of fans, VIP guests and other dignitaries gather in Canton, Ohio, to celebrate the Enshrinement of the newest class of Enshrinees. The celebration has grown significantly in stature and now serves as a bookend to the NFL's regular season along with the Super Bowl. Last year, the Centennial Class of 2020 and Class of 2021 were honored.

The 2022 Pro Football Hall of Fame Enshrinement Week Powered by Johnson Controls (Aug. 4-7) kicks off Thursday night with the annual Hall of Fame Game (Las Vegas Raiders vs. Jacksonville Jaguars) at the spectacular Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium. The following night at the Gold Jacket Dinner, more than 100 Hall of Famers form a gauntlet for the Class of 2022 to make their way to center stage and receive the coveted Hall of Fame Gold Jacket created by Haggard. The Class of 2022 Enshrinement takes place Saturday, Aug. 6 at Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium and is televised live by the Hall's partners,



NFL Network and ESPN. The Enshrinees' Roundtable takes place Sunday afternoon. The festivities wrap up Sunday evening with the "Concert for Legends" featuring headliner Journey.

HALF OF FAME PROGRAMS

The Pro Football Hall of Fame achieves its Mission to "Honor the Heroes of the Game, Preserve its History, Promote its Values & Celebrate Excellence Together" through a number of events and programs.

The Hometown Hall of Famer is a national program of the Pro Football Hall of Fame sponsored by the Ford Motor Company. The program honors the support of a Hall of Famer's "Road to Canton" by their hometown. Hall of Famers return to their hometowns to present their high school, college or community with a historic artifact – a 45-pound, 3-foot-by-4-foot bronze plaque – during a ceremony in front of school assemblies or football halftimes.

The Heart of a Hall of Famer Program Connected by Extreme Networks educational series provides students the opportunity to learn first-hand what it took beyond athletic ability for legendary Heroes of the Game to achieve success on and off the field. 





Tony Boselli was selected by the expansion Jacksonville Jaguars as the second player overall in 1995 NFL Draft. The Southern California product quickly became the face of the franchise.

A superb pass protector with quick feet, long arms and fine balance, Boselli sat out his rookie training camp with a knee injury and did not see action until Week 4 of the 1995 season. The 6-7, 324-pound tackle started each of the remaining 12 games that season and allowed only one sack to earn All-Rookie honors.

Boselli was regarded as the elite left tackle in the NFL during his seven-year career and persevered through numerous injuries.

He was the leader of a Jaguars team that reached the AFC championship game in just the franchise's second season. That year marked the first of four straight playoff appearances as Jacksonville posted regular season records of 9-7, 11-5, 11-5 and 14-2 from 1996-99.

Boselli was tabbed as the team's Most Valuable Player in 1998 after helping the Jaguars to the team's first division title.

In 2001, Boselli started three games before suffering a severe shoulder injury which landed him on the injured reserve list for the rest of the season. The following year Boselli was selected by the Houston Texans with the first pick in that franchise's expansion draft but he never returned to the field.

Voted to five straight Pro Bowls (1997-2001), Boselli was named First-Team All-Pro three consecutive seasons (1997-99).







Cliff Branch, a 5'11", 170-pound wide receiver out of Colorado, was selected in the fourth round of the 1972 NFL Draft by the Oakland Raiders, where he spent his entire 14 season career. Not only was Branch a standout on the football team at Colorado, but he was also a world-class sprinter who set an NCAA championship meet record with a 10-second 100-meter dash in 1972.

Known for his speed and agility, Branch became a dominating receiver during the 1970s. His breakout year came in 1974, when he led the League with 1,092 receiving yards and 13 touchdowns. His next season surpassing 1,000 receiving yards came in 1976 (1,111) – for that era and the style of play, compiling two seasons with more than 1,000 yards was considered a feat.

Branch's career stats include 501 catches for 8,685 yards and 67 touchdowns in 182 regular-season games. He led the Raiders in receiving yards six times (1974-76, 1979-1980, 1982) and in touchdown receptions five times (1974-77, 1982). When he retired following the 1985 season, he held several Raiders team records, among them the longest reception (99 yards from Jim Plunkett at Washington on Oct. 2, 1983) and most games (22) with 100 or more receiving yards.

The Raiders dominated the AFC in the 1970s and early 1980s, earning a spot in seven AFC Championship Games (1973-77, 1980 and 1983) over 11 years. Branch helped lead the team to three Super Bowl appearances – XI, XV and XVIII – with a victory in each.

Branch is recalled as one of the game's top postseason performers. In 22 playoff games, he caught 73 passes for 1,289 yards (17.7 average) – both NFL records at the time of his retirement. He also scored five career postseason touchdowns – two coming in the 27-10 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles in Super Bowl XV.

In his career, Branch received first-team All-Pro nods three times (1974-76) and was voted to four Pro Bowls (1975-77, 1978).







LeRoy Butler, a 6'0", 197-pound safety out of Florida State, was drafted in the second round (48th overall) in the 1990 NFL Draft by the Green Bay Packers where he spent his entire 12-season career.

Butler was one of the most prolific defensive backs in the Packers' storied history and among the premier safeties of his era. He led the Packers in interceptions five times (1990-91, 1993, 1995, 1997).

A key member of defense that guided the Packers' resurgence that included seven playoff appearances in nine-season span, three straight division titles (1995-97) and two Super Bowl appearances. He started at strong safety in three consecutive NFC Championship Games and Super Bowls XXXI and XXXII making seven tackles and one sack in the Packers' 35-21 victory over New England Patriots in Super Bowl XXXI.

In 2001, he retired with 20.5 career sacks, 38 interceptions for 533 yards – he intercepted a pass in all but one season of his 181-game career. His only pick-six came on 90-yard return versus San Diego Chargers, Sept. 15, 1996.

Butler was selected to four Pro Bowls (1994, 1997, 1998, 1999), earned All-Pro honors four times (1993, 1996, 1997, 1998) and was named to NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1990s.

PRO: Already firmly entrenched in Packers history, freewheeling LeRoy Butler is poised to scale even loftier plateaus in 2001 – after being accorded new professional eminence last season when named a first-team selection to the 1990s NFL All-Decade Team, chosen by the Pro Football Hall of Fame Selection Committee...A starter at safety for the 10th consecutive season, the irrepressible Floridian forges into the '01 campaign as the fourth-ranking interceptor in team history with 38 and needing only two more to surpass third-place Herb Adderly (39), a long-time member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame...And, already having played more games in Green Bay's green and gold (172) than any other defensive back in team history, he can soar to new heights in the Packers' record book...Should he play in all 16 games, something he routinely has done over his career (nine times to date), he will vault past Hall of Famer Forrest Gregg (at 187 games) for third-most in team annals...His durability is further underscored by the fact that he enters the regular season having played in 107 consecutive games, second to only Brett Favre's 143 straight games played among the team's active streaks and a skein which dates back to the sixth contest of the 1994 season...From the

longevity standpoint, only five players in the Packers' 82-year history have worn green and gold longer than the 33-year-old Butler, the club's elder statesman now in his 12th season as a Packer...The short list includes Bart Starr (16 seasons), Ray Nitschke (15), Gregg (14) and Charles 'Buckets' Goldenberg and Dave Hanner (13)...Butler also is the only player to have played for each of Green Bay's last four head coaches (Lindy Infante, Mike Holmgren, Ray Rhodes and Mike Sherman) and just the ninth player in team history to play for four different head coaches...And there is more...Butler, long a perpetrator of the big play, enters the '01 season striving to become the first player in NFL history to record 40 career interceptions and 20 career sacks, needing two interceptions and one-half sack to reach that singular milestone...Has at least 1 sack in each of the past eight seasons...The effervescent Jacksonville native continues to rank among the premier safeties in the game, an eminence documented by four career Pro Bowl appearances, including starting assignments three successive years (1996-98)...His overall excellence at the position was underscored in '98 when his third consecutive hallmark season also earned him selection to the Associated Press All-Pro team for the fourth year in a row and the fifth time overall (he was named for the first time in 1993)...Having openly stated his intention to remain with the Packers for the balance of his playing days, harbors a desire to finish out his career with enough of a flourish that one day his play will win him election to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio...Has led or tied for the team lead in interceptions in five different seasons (1990-91, 1993, 1995), a feat surpassed in Green Bay history only by Bobby Dillon's seven times (1952-58) and equaled by Willie Wood's five times (1961-63, 1965, 1970)...With 38, is tied for eighth place among the NFL's active interception leaders entering the 2001 season...A cornerback in his first two NFL seasons before being transferred to safety, Butler also has other talents, having entertained Packer loyalists by executing impromptu dance 'routines' after making big plays, some of which have found their way into the team's highlight videos...His fancy footwork has provided a graphic illustration of how far Butler has come from a impoverished childhood in the Blodgett Homes project of Jacksonville, which once found him wheelchair-bound... There was a lime when dancing would have been impossible for him – because the bones in his feet were extremely weak, creating a misalignment which permitted him to walk only short distances and prevented him from running...For much of his childhood, his feet were in braces or casts, and there were periods when he was bound to a wheelchair...By the time he reached seventh grade, however, his feet had healed and he was on his way



to Florida State and the NFL...Although former teammate Robert Brooks and others have taken it to a new level, LeRoy was the originator of what has come to be known as the 'Lambeau Leap,' in which Packers players have made it a habit to soar into the stands after scoring a touchdown on home turf, a 'flight' Butler first attempted late in 1993 against the then-Los Angeles Raiders following the scoring return of a fumble recovery...Routinely named as one of the team's playoff captains, he enters the 2001 season tied with four others for the Green Bay postseason record for most career games played (14)...**2000:** Enjoyed the fourth 100-tackle season of his pro career, tying Darren Sharper for third on the team with 101 stops (75 solo), including 2 sacks and 7 tackles for loss (second on club)...Made 2 interceptions among 9 passes defensed...Also contributed 2 forced fumbles, 1 fumble recovery, 3 pressures and 2 QB hits...Started all 16 games (at strong safety) for the sixth straight season - and the eighth time in his 11 pro seasons - he stands seventh among active NFL defensive backs with 172 career games played entering 2001...Made a season-high 11 tackles (one off the club lead), along with 1 pass breakup, in overtime triumph over Minnesota (Nov. 6)...Began the year with 9 stops in opener vs. the N.Y. 

Denver (Dec. 8), when he notched a sack of quarterback Bill Musgrave among his 5 stops and recorded a pass defensed...Contributed 5 stops, including a sack, in initial win over Detroit (Nov. 3)...Maintained his high performance level in the postseason, starting all three playoff games, including Super Bowl XXXI...Amassed 15 tackles overall in the postseason to tie Williams for the club lead...Had 7 stops in the Packers' 35-21 triumph over New England in the Super Bowl (Jan. 26), including a memorable sack of the Patriots' Bledsoe which saw him run over halfback Dave Meggett before pulling Bledsoe down with one arm...Knocked down 2 passes in divisional playoff win over San Francisco (Jan. 4)...Made a key fumble recovery vs. Carolina in the NFC Championship Game (Jan. 12), halting what might have been the Panthers' final serious effort to get back into the contest...**1995:** Started all 16 games en route to becoming the first Green Bay defensive back to lead the team in tackles (with 117) since Mark Murphy achieved that distinction in 1990...His 5 accompanying interceptions tied him for 10th in the NFC...Turned in excellent game at Chicago (Sept. 11), making 7 tackles and intercepting an Erik Kramer flea-flicker pass between two potential Bears wide receivers at the Packers' 1-yard line, wrestling the ball away from Curtis Conway and blunting a potential scoring drive (Green Bay scored on the subsequent possession – Favre to Brooks for a 99-yard TD)...Had 6 stops in front of friends and family Sept. 24 at Jacksonville...Recorded a season-high 13 tackles (also equaling his career high), including 12 solo stops, at Dallas (Oct. 8)...Intercepted a Kramer pass in the end



Art McNally served as an NFL official for nine years (Field Judge, 1959; Referee 1960-67) before he was hired as the NFL's Supervisor of Officials in 1968. McNally eventually headed a department of five individuals who coordinated and directed a staff of 112 game officials. He developed standards for the scouting, screening, hiring and grading of the crews that work each NFL game. He is credited with bringing technology to NFL officiating and introduced the highest level of training for the officials by using video and practice techniques that NFL teams used with players.

The training and officiating mechanics developed by McNally filtered down the entire profession of football officiating and remains the gold standard for how football officials conduct themselves to this day.

Known as the "Father of Instant Replay," McNally introduced the system to the NFL. Through his leadership, instant replay has become an accepted part of the game and has spread to all major sports in America.

McNally retired as the NFL's Supervisor of Officials in 1991 but quickly accepted a position as Supervisor of Officials for the World League of American Football in 1992. At the same time, he continued to serve as an NFL League Consultant through 1994.

In 1995, he returned to the NFL office to work as an Assistant Supervisor of Officials during each football season and continued in that capacity until 2007. He then continued as an NFL Officiating Observer until 2013.

In 2002, Commissioner Paul Tagliabue created the annual Art McNally Award, which honors an NFL game official who exhibits exemplary professionalism, leadership and commitment to sportsmanship on and off the field.

The 2015 NFL season marked McNally's 56th year of service to the NFL.

Mark Duncan, a former San Francisco 49ers coach and future Seattle Seahawks assistant general manager, oversaw the Officiating Department from 1964 to 1968. He required officials to take yearly tests and attend preseason clinics, but it wasn't until Art McNally assumed the head position that the level of officiating would truly blossom.

In 1968, McNally was named NFL supervisor of officials, a position he held until 1991. A longtime official from Philadelphia, he would become one of the key people in the Officiating Department's transformation.

During McNally's time with the league, his name became synonymous with officiating excellence. Under his leadership, the NFL's Officiating Department developed its modern evaluation and grading system for officials — a critical component in improving proficiency and boosting the game's integrity. He introduced the idea of weekly performance reviews and held his officials to strict standards.

When asked if an official in the right position on the field will make the right call nine out of 10 times, McNally responded: "Higher than nine times out of 10. It better be, or he'll be out of the business. He won't be around for long."

McNally, a former Marine, showed his officials tough love but was confident in their ability to do their job the right way. "Overall, the caliber of our officiating is excellent," he told the Philadelphia Daily News in 1990. "I grade the films, eight hours a day, so I should know."

The rigid, innovative and effective weekly evaluation system under McNally was as follows:

STEP 1

McNally and his aides reviewed the game film and noted every foul that was called and the official who called it.

STEP 2

The team graded each foul call on a seven-point scale, from poor (1) to excellent (7).

STEP 3


McNally then looked for any plays in which a foul should have been called but no whistle was blown.

STEP 4

In addition to each call or no-call, the team graded each official on mechanics and positioning.

McNally's wasn't the only evaluation; the referee, an NFL observer (watching from the stadium press box) and each team's coach also submitted numerical grades to the Officiating





Department. Once all the grades were filed, McNally condensed them into a single cohesive report — ready to send to the officiating crews each week.

McNally and his team were simply using a blank, white wall on which to project their film. But he envisioned something grander: a centralized officiating headquarters with even greater capabilities. His command center vision became a reality in the early 1990s.

McNally also recognized the importance of creating specialists at all seven officiating positions. He organized meetings by position to provide a chance for every crew member to discuss his specific challenges and solutions.

Technology — and the league’s use of it — also caused an evolution in officiating.

Referees were equipped with wireless microphones in 1975. The microphones allowed officials to explain on-field rulings to a much wider audience, and fans watching on television — along with those in the stands — got a sense of the officials’ personalities for the first time.

Colorful referees like Mason “Red” Cashion and Jerry Markbreit experienced unprecedented levels of fame and recognition. Anonymity had been viewed as a sign that the officials were doing

something right, but now, every Sunday, Cashion’s famous “First down!” call was heard in living rooms across America.

Beyond the entertainment value, the ability for fans to hear the calls added credibility to on-field rulings, increased transparency on rulings for fans and the media, and reinforced the integrity of the game.


Instant replay would do that too.

The league first experimented with instant replay in 1976. McNally, curious to determine how long a video review would delay a game, watched a “Monday Night Football” contest between the Dallas Cowboys and the Buffalo Bills with a stopwatch and a video camera. He saw a missed call involving O.J. Simpson that could have been corrected with replay review. Two years later, the league tested instant replay as an officiating aid during seven nationally televised preseason games.

It would take many years before instant replay would become an NFL fixture: adopted for the regular season in 1986, rescinded in 1992, then brought back for good in 1999. But McNally helped it take root.


After serving in the NFL’s Officiating Department for more than 20 years, McNally retired in 1991. His tenure modernized the evaluation and craft of officiating and led to an increase in football’s popularity across the United States.

“This has been a tough job,” McNally told The New York Times before his final season, “but I think we’ve accomplished a lot for the league.”

Told time and again he was too small to play professional football, Sam Mills kept pounding on the door until it finally opened. That "Keep Pounding" mantra lives on with the Carolina Panthers.

Undrafted despite earning Division II All-American honors at Montclair (N.J.) State, where he still holds the team record for career tackles 40 years after graduating, Mills signed a free agent contract with the Cleveland Browns in 1981. He was cut in the preseason. He met the same fate with the Toronto Argonauts in the Canadian Football League. The coaches' consensus: His was too short, at 5-foot-9 3/4, to take on NFL linemen and running backs.

A new league gave the diminutive Mills his big break. In 1983, Mills joined the Philadelphia Stars of the United States Football League. In the league's three seasons, Mills made 592 tackles, earning All-USFL honors three times and helping the Stars win back-to-back championships in 1984 and 1985 under Coach Jim Mora.

When the USFL folded after the 1985 season, Mora landed in New Orleans. He brought his middle linebacker with him, launching a 12-year NFL career that saw Mills play 181 career games (173 starts) and total more than 1,300 tackles, 20.5 sacks, 11 interceptions and 22 forced fumbles. He was named to five Pro Bowls and once as first team All-Pro.

After nine years in New Orleans, Mills jumped to the expansion Carolina Panthers. He scored the key touchdown in the franchise's first victory, 26-15 over the New York Jets, with a 36-yard interception return. In his three seasons with the Panthers, Mills started all 48 regular-season games and both games in the 1996 postseason, when the upstart second-year team reached the NFC Championship Game, falling to eventual Super Bowl winner Green Bay.

Following his playing career, Mills stayed with Carolina as an assistant coach. In his fifth season, 2003, he was diagnosed with cancer and given three months to live. As the Panthers prepared for the playoffs, he delivered an emotional speech, telling the team: "When I found out I had cancer, there were two things I could do: quit or keep pounding. I'm a fighter. I kept pounding. You're fighters, too. Keep pounding!" Mills would live 17 months longer than doctors predicted, dying in April 2005 at age 45.

Banging a huge "Keep Pounding" drum remains a tradition at Panthers games.





- Voted a Pro Bowl starter after the 1996 season, Sam has been selected to the Pro Bowl five times (1987, 88, 90, 91, 96). At the age of 37, he also became the oldest non-kicker ever to start in the Pro Bowl.
- In 14 professional seasons, Sam has led his teams in tackles 10 times. (Twice with Carolina, five times with New Orleans and three times with the USFL's Baltimore/Philadelphia Stars).
- Sam is the only player who has started every game in the Panthers two-year history.
- For his 1996 performance. Sam was named to the All-Madden team, first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press, Sports Illustrated, and Pro Football Weekly/Pro Football Writers of America; All-NFC by the Football News and UPI, and second-team All-Pro by College & Pro Football Newsweekly and Football Digest .
- Sam was named Defensive Player of the Month for November in 1995 and 1996. He also received the distinction for play during September of 1991.
- Sam earned his second career Defensive Player of the Week award for the divisional playoff round after recording nine tackles, an interception and a pass defensed in the win over Dallas that marked the first playoff triumph in team history and the first of his 11-year NFL career.
- Sam won his first career NFC Defensive Player of the Week award for his performance versus the New York Jets (10/15/95), when he intercepted a Bubby Brister shovel pass and returned it 36 yards for a touchdown in the Panthers inaugural win.
- With a team-leading 138 stops (108 solo) last season, Sam registered the second-highest total of his career. In 11 NFL seasons he has recorded over 1,200 career tackles.

PRO CAREER: At every crossroads in the Panthers brief history, Sam Mills has stepped up and taken the lead. His memorable 36-yard interception return for a touchdown against the Jets triggered the first victory in team history in a play widely regarded as the turning point of the inaugural season. With the team holding a fragile 5-4 record in 1996, Sam's play earned NFC Defensive Player of the Month honors for November as the team embarked on an eight-game winning streak. He was named NFL Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts against Dallas as the Panthers notched their first-ever playoff win and the first of his 11-year career. His interception at Green Bay in the NFC Championship set up the team's only touchdown.

Sam is much more than a five-time Pro Bowler who makes the defensive calls and has led the team in tackles for the past two seasons. Through his perseverance, thorough preparation and tireless work ethic, Sam has come to represent the spirit of the Panthers, both on and off the field. He returns for his 15th professional and 12th NFL season to lead the Panthers defense.

1996: Sam appeared in his fifth Pro Bowl after recording a team-high 138 tackles, the second highest total of his NFL career, in addition to a career-high 55 sacks, an interception, 10 quarterback hurries, five passes defensed and two fumble recoveries, including one returned for a touchdown, for a defense that led the league in sacks and finished second in points allowed. At the age of 37, Sam earned his second career Pro Bowl start and became the oldest non-kicker ever to be named a starter in addition to being selected first team All-Pro by Associated Press, Sports Illustrated and Pro Football Weekly/Pro Football Writers of America. He was an All-NFC choice by the Football News and UPI and second-team All-Pro by College and Pro Football Newsweekly and Football Digest after recording at least 10 tackles in eight contests and leading the team in stops in six games. He received his third career NFC Defensive Player of the Month award after a November in which he registered 37 tackles, 15 sacks and returned a fumble 41 yards for a touchdown. He was named

NFL Defensive Player of the Week during the divisional playoffs versus Dallas (1/5/97) after collecting a team-high nine tackles, an interception on the Cowboys final possession and a pass defensed in the franchise's first Postseason win and the first of his NFL career. Sam led the defense with 11 tackles versus Atlanta (9/1) in the season opener, registered five tackles and a pass defensed at New Orleans (9/8) and had a team-high 12 tackles, a sack and a quarterback hurry versus San Francisco (9/22). He had 11 stops and a sack at Jacksonville (9/29) before dehydration forced his exit in the fourth quarter, and at Minnesota (10/6), Sam recorded 10 tackles, a quarterback hurry and a pass defensed before a calf strain forced him out in the fourth quarter. Versus St. Louis (10/13), he had an interception along with six tackles and a pass defensed before registering a team-high 10 tackles and a quarterback hurry versus New Orleans (10/20). After posting five tackles at Philadelphia (10/27), Sam made his 150th career start at Atlanta (11/3), and had three tackles before garnering a team-high 10 tackles and a sack versus the New York Giants (11/10). Accumulating a season-high 14 tackles and a half a sack at St. Louis (11/17), Sam had the second-highest tackle total in team history. Sam scooped up a fumbled snap and returned it 41 yards for his fourth career touchdown, third via fumble recovery, and the longest fumble return of his career at Houston (11/24) in addition to notching a team-high 10 tackles. He had seven tackles and two quarterback hurries as the defense produced first shutout in team history versus Tampa Bay (12/1). Sam tied for team honors with eight tackles in addition to two quarterback hurries and a pass defensed in a key road win at San Francisco (12/8) and totalled nine tackles, a quarterback hurry and a fumble recovery versus Baltimore (12/15). In the regular season finale versus Pittsburgh (12/22), Sam contributed a sack, tied for the team lead with seven stops, and had a quarterback hurry in the win that clinched the NFC West title. He collected nine tackles, a pass defensed, and a game clinching interception and 24-yard return to the one yard line versus Dallas (1/5/97) in the NFC Divisional Playoff before gathering a team-high 14 tackles and an interception which set up the Panthers only touchdown at Green Bay (1/12/97) in the NFC Championship. **1995:** Sam had a team-high 130 tackles and set career bests in interceptions, forced fumbles and fumble recoveries, and led the team with six forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries while finishing second with five interceptions and third with 45 sacks. He had a hand in 15 of the team's 37 takeaways. One of five defensive players to start every game, he also had six passes defensed, nine quarterback hurries

and returned an interception for a touchdown. For his efforts, Sam was named to the All-Madden team and was a UPI All-NFC second-team selection. In November, Sam received his second career NFC Defensive Player of the Month award after accumulating 29 tackles (23 solo), three fumble recoveries, two forced fumbles, one sack and two quarterback pressures in four games. He had his first interception of the season and tied for team honors with eight tackles at Buffalo (9/10). In October, he was a finalist for NFC Defensive Player of the Month honors with 43 tackles (32 solo), two interceptions (one returned for a touchdown), two forced fumbles, two passes defensed and a sack. Sam earned his first career NFC Defensive Player of the Week award versus the Jets (10/15) in the team's first win, intercepting a Bubby Brister shovel pass and returning it 36 yards for a touchdown just before the half to give the Panthers a 13-12 lead. Sam also had a team-high six tackles along with a sack, quarterback pressure and a pass defensed as the defense allowed just 25 rushing yards. Versus New Orleans (10/22), Sam had an interception in the end zone and tipped a pass that was intercepted by Brett Maxie in addition to nine stops and a quarterback pressure against his former team. Sam had a season-high 11 tackles at New England (10/29) and deflected a pass along with two key forced fumbles in Carolina territory, helping the Panthers to their first road win. He had seven tackles, two fumble recoveries and a forced fumble at San Francisco (11/5) and tied for the team lead with eight stops, adding a sack and forced fumble, at St. Louis (11/12). He contributed three tackles versus Arizona (11/19) as the defense yielded 96 yards of total offense, the second-lowest 1995 league total. Sam equalled his season high with 11 tackles in addition to a fumble recovery at New Orleans (11/26), and he recorded nine tackles and half a sack versus Indianapolis (12/3). Versus San Francisco (12/10), he collected his fourth interception of the year and had eight tackles, a sack, two quarterback pressures, a forced fumble and fumble recovery. Sam had his career-high fifth interception versus Atlanta (12/17) in addition to his nine tackles, forced fumble and quarterback pressure. **1994:** Sam led the Saints in tackles for the fifth time in his career, totalling a career-high 155 tackles. He was the only Saint with 100-plus tackles in 1994, and he had nine games with 10 or more tackles. Sam made 14 tackles and forced a fumble versus the 49ers (11/28) and also had 14 tackles versus the Cowboys (12/19). Sam had 12 tackles versus the Chiefs (9/4) and 13 stops and a forced fumble against the Redskins (9/11). He had 11 tackles and notched his lone sack of the year versus the Giants (10/2) and recorded 11 stops at Chicago

(10/9). He recorded his only fumble recovery of the year against the Raiders (11/20) and collected his only interception of the season against Atlanta (12/11). **1993:** Sam missed significant playing time for the first time in his career, sitting out seven games with a staph infection in his knee. He started seven of nine games and finished with 85 tackles and two sacks. He had eight tackles and a sack in the season opener versus Houston (9/5) and nine tackles against the Falcons (9/12) before missing time. Sam was inactive versus Detroit (9/19), missing his first contest in 92 games. He returned from injury to Francisco (11/22), regained his starting spot at Cleveland (12/5) and proceeded to lead or tie for the team lead in tackles over the

Saints final five games. Sam returned a fumble recovery 30 yards for his second career touchdown versus the Rams (12/12), and he had a season-high 15 tackle performance versus the Bengals (1/2) in the season finale. **1992:** Sam was voted to his fourth Pro Bowl in five years after gathering 130 tackles and three sacks. He was named to the Pro Football Weekly/PFWA and College and Pro Football Newsweekly All-NFL teams, The Sporting News and USA Today NFL All-Pro Teams, and the Associated Press All-Pro second team. Versus the Jets (12/26), Sam had his most spectacular play of the year, stripping the ball from quarterback Browning Nagle and racing 76 yards for his first career NFL touchdown. At Atlanta (9/20), Sam had


nine tackles, a sack and two forced fumbles. He tallied seven tackles, one fumble recovery and an interception at the Rams (12/13), following with a career-high 19 tackles versus Buffalo (12/20). **1991:** Sam went to his third Pro Bowl and first as a starter after leading the Saints in tackles for the third consecutive year with 102. He also defended a career-high eight passes and was named to the Pro Football Weekly All-NFL team, the Sports Illustrated All-Pro team, the College and Pro Football Newsweekly All-Pro team, the Football Digest All-Pro team, the PFWA All-Pro team and the Sporting News All-Pro team in addition to second-team honors by the Associated Press. He was named NFC Defensive Player of the Month after an epic September during which he recorded 41 tackles, two interceptions, three passes defensed, a forced fumble and a sack. In September, he registered 13 tackles versus Seattle (9/1) in the season opener; his first career interception at the Chiefs (9/8) halted a potential game-tying drive late in the game. He followed with his lone sack of the year versus the Rams (9/15) before closing out the month with 11 tackles, an interception and a forced fumble against the Vikings (9/22). **1990:** Sam led the Saints in tackles for the second consecutive year, posting 112 tackles, half a sack, three passes defensed, a fumble recovery and two forced fumbles. He started 14 of 16 games, missing starts against run-and-shoot offenses at Houston (10/21) and versus Detroit (10/28). He made 11 stops at the Vikings (9/16), at Houston (10/21) and versus the Steelers (12/16). Additionally, Sam collected a game-high 12 tackles at Chicago (1/6/91) in the Saints playoff game. **1989:** Sam escaped Pro Bowl selection for the first time in three years after leading the team in tackles with 95 and posting three sacks, two passes defensed, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery for the year. He started 15 of 16 games, missing a start versus Indianapolis (12/24) when the Colts opened in a four wide receiver set. Before the Colts game, Sam had made 56 consecutive starts for the Saints. He recorded his first career sack at Tampa Bay (9/24) while registering a season-high 11 tackles against the Redskins (10/1) and 49ers (10/8). He also recorded sacks against the Rams (11/26) and at Detroit (12/3). **1988:** Elected to his second Pro Bowl, Sam finished second on the Saints with 105 tackles and contributed three fumble recoveries and two passes defensed. He had a season-high 14 tackles at Washington (11/6) after putting up 11 stops versus the Rams (10/30). **1987:** Sam went to his first Pro Bowl and started all 12 non-replacement games for the Saints. He had his lowest career tackle total with 58, finishing fourth on the team, in addition to recovering three fumbles.

His biggest play of the year came against Pittsburgh (11/29), when he was in the middle of a defensive stand that kept the Steelers out of the end zone late in the game, assuring the Saints of their first winning season in franchise history. **1986:** Sam joined the Saints following the break-up of the USFL as the Stars leading tackler for the third consecutive season. He started the Saints last 13 games at inside linebacker. He finished second on the team with 92 tackles in 16 games and registered an 11-tackle outing versus the Rams (11/9), 13 stops at the Rams (11/23) and 12 versus Miami (12/7). **1985:** Sam posted 185 tackles (105 solo), six sacks, two fumble recoveries and three interceptions for 32 yards in a championship effort for the USFL title-winning Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars, earning a spot on The Sporting News All-USFL team. **1984:** Sam was a consensus All-USFL selection for the second straight season after recording 211 tackles (93 solo), leading the Philadelphia Stars in tackles for the second straight year. He was the team's leading tackler in 15 of 18 regular season games and had at least 10 stops in 13 contests. He also led the team with three fumble recoveries and ranked second on the squad with five sacks and fourth in interceptions with three. Dominant all season, Sam notched 17 tackles versus Michigan, 19 versus Arizona, 15 versus Memphis and Washington, and 14 stops versus New Jersey, San Antonio and Pittsburgh. Sam maintained his hot pace in the playoffs, leading the team with 27 tackles, including 12 versus New Jersey and 10 versus Birmingham. **1983:** A consensus All-USFL selection, Sam started all 18 games and both playoff contests while leading the team with 196 tackles (141 solo). He tied for the team lead with five fumble recoveries, including two versus Oakland to go along with 13 tackles (10 solo), an interception and a forced fumble.

COLLEGE: At Division II Montclair State, Sam was team captain his junior and senior years, and his 501 career stops still stand as a school record. Sam was a 1980 Kodak All-America and was selected to the COSIDA All-America team following his junior (1979) and senior (1980) seasons. A three-time selection as Defensive Player of the Year by the New Jersey Collegiate Football Writers Association and four-time New Jersey Athletic Conference (NJAC) First Team All-Star, Sam was voted "Best in the East" by the New York Times. As a sophomore (1978), Sam set a school record with 142 tackles while helping Montclair State to a New Jersey Athletic Conference title. He posted another school mark with 22 tackles versus Southern Connecticut (10/27/79), helping Montclair State to another NJAC championship.



The New England Patriots selected University of Georgia defensive All-American lineman Richard Seymour in the first round (sixth overall) of the 2001 NFL Draft. At 6-6, 310 pounds, Seymour was a versatile player who spent time as both a defensive end and defensive tackle. He was feared by quarterbacks throughout the league as he recorded three or more sacks every year of his career except one.

Seymour was named to the NFL All-Rookie Team in 2001 and was an integral member of a New England team that earned the franchise's first world championship with an upset victory over the St. Louis Rams in Super Bowl XXXVI. The win was the first of three championship teams Seymour played on as he also helped the Patriots to Super Bowl XXXVIII and XXXIX titles.

Seymour spent his first eight seasons with the Patriots (2001-08) before he was traded to the Oakland Raiders in 2009 where he remained for the final four years through his retirement after the 2012 season. His success continued in Oakland as Seymour posted remarkable stats on the field.

In all, Seymour played 164 career games. He recorded 57.5 sacks and his team's record when

he recorded a sack was an astonishing 46-8-0. He amassed a total of 496 tackles (324 solo), intercepted two passes, and forced four fumbles. Seymour also made eight fumble recoveries, one of which he scored on a franchise record 68-yard return.

A seven-time Pro Bowler, Seymour was named First-Team All-Pro three straight times. In addition to being named to the NFL All-Decade Team of the 2000s, Seymour is a member of the Patriots 50th Anniversary Team and the Patriots All-2000s Team.







Dick Vermeil was head coach of three National Football League franchises over 15 seasons. He mastered the three-year turnaround, leading the Philadelphia Eagles, St. Louis Rams and Kansas City Chiefs to the postseason after years – nearly two decades for the Eagles – on the outside looking in.

Vermeil's climb to an NFL job was a steady ascent that played out in his native California – from high school coach to junior college coach to four years (1965-68) as an assistant at Stanford.

In 1969, Vermeil became the NFL's first designated special teams coach as a member of Hall of Famer George Allen's staff with the Los Angeles Rams. He then spent the 1970 season as an assistant at UCLA before returning to the Rams as an assistant (1971-73).

UCLA offered Vermeil its head coaching job in 1974. In two seasons, he posted a 15-5-3 record that culminated in an upset of Ohio State in the 1976 Rose Bowl, denying the Buckeyes the national championship and making Vermeil a hot prospect for an NFL job.

He got it in Philadelphia. By Year 3 (1978), the Eagles made the playoffs – their first postseason appearance since winning the 1960 NFL Championship Game. Two seasons later, the Eagles won the NFC title and reached Super Bowl XV. Vermeil coached two more years in Philadelphia,

then abruptly resigned following the strike-affected 1982 season, citing "burnout."

He spent the next 14 seasons as an NFL and college football analyst for CBS and ABC.

The St. Louis Rams lured Vermeil back to the sidelines in 1997. He took over a team that had not posted a winning record in seven seasons. By Year 3, the Rams went 13-3 and won Super Bowl XXXIV with "The Greatest Show on Turf." He won the AP's Coach of the Year Award.

Vermeil retired 11 days after that victory and stayed out of the League for one season.

He returned to coach the Chiefs, and in Year 3 ended the franchise's five-year playoff drought with a 13-3 record.

Vermeil finished his NFL coaching career with a 126-114 record, including 6-5 in the playoffs.

2005 Kansas City Chiefs Media Guide biography (before Vermeil's last season)

A new crusade was officially inaugurated on January 12, 2001 when Chiefs President Carl Peterson named Dick Vermeil as the ninth head coach in the history of the franchise. The 2005 season marks the fifth year of the Vermeil era in Kansas City. This highly-respected coach returned to the NFL ranks in Kansas City after taking a one-year football hiatus following his victory in Super Bowl XXXIV with the St. Louis Rams.

"Sooner or later, it was probably going to happen that Carl and I would be back together again, rejoined to initiate a new crusade," Vermeil said upon accepting his third NFL head coaching post. "Every time we've done it, we've been successful."

In their two previous collaborations Peterson and Vermeil unquestionably forged a winning combination. While the teams, the years and the uniforms have changed, the commitment and trust shared by this dynamic football duo has never wavered. Whether it was upsetting #1 ranked Ohio State 23-10 in the Rose Bowl following the '75 college season or resurrecting a long-dormant Philadelphia Eagles franchise to claim the '80 NFC Championship and a berth in Super Bowl XV, Peterson and Vermeil's gridiron triumphs have been well-documented.

That strong personal bond and history of past successes easily explains why Vermeil was Peterson's top choice for the Chiefs head coaching job, not only in 2001, but dating back to '89 when Peterson originally came to Kansas City to steer the franchise's fortunes.

"When I came to the Chiefs over 12 years ago, there was only one individual I wanted to hire as the head coach of the Kansas City Chiefs, Dick Vermeil," Peterson observed upon hiring Vermeil. "So it is with a great deal of pleasure that after 12 years I have finally been able to accomplish what I set out to do at that time. I'm not concerned about my bias – and I am biased – but I firmly believe that Dick Vermeil is the premier football coach in the entire National Football League."

Unquestionably one of the finest innovators and motivators the game has ever known, Vermeil's style has truly stood the test of time. Whether it was coaching championship football and swimming teams as a high school coach in California, re-establishing UCLA as a national collegiate powerhouse, or reaching the highest echelon of the pro profession by coaching a club to a Super Bowl championship, there's been virtually no challenge Vermeil hasn't stepped up to during his illustrious career.

Vermeil enters his 15th season as an NFL head coach in 2005, after producing a 110-103 regular season record in his 14 previous campaigns. He went 22-26 with the St. Louis Rams (97-99), posted a 54-47 record with the Eagles ('76-82) and has produced a 34-30 slate in four seasons with the Chiefs (2001-04). Those 34 regular season wins with Kansas City are the third-highest total by a coach in franchise history, trailing only Hank Stram (124) and Marty Schottenheimer (101). His four-year record with the Chiefs is also one victory better than the 33-31 mark he compiled during his first four seasons in Philadelphia ('76-79). Vermeil boasts a 6-5 career postseason record, including a perfect 3-0 mark during the '99 campaign with the Rams giving him an overall NFL record of 116-108 (.518). In total, Vermeil will embark on his 19th season as an NFL coach after originally entering the league with the L.A. Rams in '69.

In 2004, Kansas City rebounded from an 0-3 start and constructed a late-season, four-game winning streak to finish the year at 7-9. In the process, the Chiefs set a league record with 398 first downs and led the NFL in total offense for the first time in franchise history, averaging 418.4 yards per game. Although the 2004 campaign fell short of Vermeil's own lofty expectations, he hopes to put the Chiefs back into contention for the NFL's ultimate prize in 2005.

In 2003, he guided Kansas City to a 13-3 record, marking the club's first postseason berth since '97. The Chiefs began the season with a 9-0 record, becoming the first team in franchise history and just the ninth squad since the AFL-NFL merger to accomplish that feat. During that season, Kansas City extended its regular season winning streak at Arrowhead Stadium to a franchise-record 13 games as the Chiefs became the first AFC squad to lead the NFL in scoring offense in back-to-back seasons since San Diego in '81-82. Among many notable honors, Vermeil was named Co-Sportsman of the Year by The Sporting News along with Florida Marlins manager Jack McKeon. The NFL Alumni Association inducted Vermeil into its prestigious Order of the Leather Helmet in April of 2004, while the Touchdown Club of New Orleans bestowed

the Chiefs head coach with its 2004 Rozelle Award, a pair of honors that recognize substantial contributions to the game of professional football.

Vermeil etched his name amongst some of the NFL's coaching elite in 2003, becoming just the fourth head coach in league history to take three different teams to the playoffs, joining Chuck Knox (Rams, Bills and Seahawks), Dan Reeves (Broncos, Giants and Falcons) and Bill Parcells (Giants, Patriots, Jets and Cowboys). Marty Schottenheimer (Browns, Chiefs and Chargers) became the fifth coach to accomplish that feat in 2004. That quintet of coaches also represent the only men in NFL history to record a 10-victory season with three different teams.

With a 17-10 win at Baltimore (9/28/03), Vermeil became the 31st coach in NFL history to record 100 career victories (regular and postseason). He registered his 100th regular season NFL win in a 27-24 triumph vs. Oakland (11/23/03), making him the 27th coach in NFL history to accomplish that feat. Just one of eight active NFL coaches with 100 regular season victories, only Marty Schottenheimer (177), Parcells (154), Bill Cowher (130), Joe Gibbs (130) and Mike Holmgren (125) own more regular wins than Vermeil (110).

Vermeil is also just one of four coaches in NFL history to lead two different teams to the "Big Game," joining the illustrious likes of Parcells (Giants and Patriots), Reeves (Broncos and Falcons) and Don Shula (Colts and Dolphins). Vermeil was granted entry into that prestigious group after leading St. Louis to a win in Super Bowl XXXIV following the '99 season. He also guided Philadelphia to an appearance in Super Bowl XV at the conclusion of the '80 season. Vermeil is one of just eight active NFL head coaches (Bill Belichick, Brian Billick, Gibbs, Jon Gruden, Holmgren, Parcells and Mike Shanahan) who have guided a club to a Super Bowl win.

After taking a 14-year sabbatical from the coaching profession from '83-96, Vermeil returned to the league as President of Football Operations and head coach of the St. Louis Rams on January 22, 1997. Vermeil took over a St. Louis team which had suffered seven consecutive losing seasons and hadn't been to the postseason since '88. In just his third season as head coach of that club in '99, he guided the Rams to a 13-3 regular season record and a thrilling 23-16 victory vs. Tennessee in Super Bowl XXXIV. St. Louis contained its opponents to 21 points or less in all 13 of those regular season victories, winning those contests by an average margin of 22.9 points per game.

Nineteen years after winning the NFL coach of the Year honor for the initial time with the '80 Philadelphia Eagles, Vermeil was once again honored

as the NFL's Coach of the Year following the '99 season with St. Louis and was a consensus "Coach of the Year" selection among pro football publications and by virtually every major event in the country, including Kansas City's own "101 Banquet."

Despite losing current Kansas City QB Trent Green to a season-ending injury in the preseason, a former Arena League and NFL Europe quarterback named Kurt Warner emerged to lead St. Louis to the promised land. While Vermeil was the season's most decorated coach, Warner was the league's most honored player, taking home the NFL Most Valuable Player and Super Bowl MVP trophies. Just 11 days following that Super Bowl victory, Vermeil announced what would be a short-lived retirement from the Rams on February 1, 2000 and joined the Chiefs less than a year later.

The national respect for Vermeil truly transcends football. In fact, it eclipses the sports world entirely. In addition to his impressive litany of accomplishments as a coach, he has served as a widely-acclaimed broadcaster and has long been a highly-coveted motivational speaker. Yet even though he is just one of 21 NFL head coaches ever to claim a Super Bowl ring – joining Hank Stram as the only other Chiefs head coach to own that distinction – Vermeil approaches the challenge of becoming the only head coach in NFL history to lead three separate teams to the Super Bowl with little bravado and much humility.

In '76, Vermeil was named head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles, while Peterson served as the club's receivers, tight ends coach and administrative assistant to the head coach. The duo of Peterson and Vermeil helped lead the Eagles to their first playoff appearance in 18 seasons in '78. In six seasons together with the Eagles from '76-81, Peterson and Vermeil combined to engineer four playoff appearances with Peterson serving as Director of Player Personnel beginning in '77. The highlight of that four-year playoff run came in '80 when Philadelphia claimed its first division title since claiming the NFL Championship in '60, won the NFC Championship Game and advanced to Super Bowl XV in January of '81.


After spending seven seasons ('76-82) with Philadelphia, Vermeil retired from coaching during an emotional farewell speech on January 10, 1983. He finished his Eagles career as the second-winningest head coach in that franchise's history, compiling a 54-47 (.535) record. Only Andy Reid (69-36) and Pro Football Hall of Fame inductee Earl "Greasy" Neale (66-44-5) have produced more regular season victories as head coach of the Eagles. In an ironic twist, Vermeil became the first two-time winner of the Earl "Greasy" Neale Award in 2003, an honor presented annually by

Philadelphia's Maxwell Club to the NFL Coach of the Year. He previously received that accolade with the Rams in '99.

During his many years in the Philadelphia area – where his family still maintains a residence – Vermeil has found the time to help many worthy causes. Numerous Philadelphia-area organizations have benefited from his involvement including: The Mary Campbell Center, The Second Mile Center

and The Boy Scouts of Chester County whose golf tournament which bears Vermeil's name annually earns \$100,000 for the organization.

Shortly after departing the sidelines in Philadelphia, he began a 14-year broadcasting career, serving as an NFL and college football analyst for CBS and ABC from '83-96. Although he declined the opportunity to become Kansas City's head coach in '89, he did provide color commentary

for the Chiefs preseason television broadcasts from '89-96. In addition to being the only head coach to lead his team to victories in both the Super Bowl and the Rose Bowl, he is also the only individual to coach a team in the Rose Bowl and later broadcast a Rose Bowl contest.

Vermeil also owns the rare distinction of being named "Coach of the Year" on four levels: high school, junior college, NCAA Division I and the NFL. He began his coaching career at San Jose's Del Mar High School in '59 and received his initial head coaching assignment at Hillsdale High School in San Mateo, California in '60. After a one-year stint as an assistant at San Mateo College, he produced an 8-1 mark in his lone season as the head coach at Napa Junior College. Vermeil began his NCAA Division I coaching tenure at Stanford from '65-68 working under head coach John Ralson. That star-studded staff included five other future NFL head coaches: Ralson (Denver '72-76); Bill Walsh (San Francisco '79-88), Jim Mora (New Orleans '86-96, Indianapolis '98-01) and Rod Rust (New England '90), as well as current Chiefs Director of Football Administration Mike White (Oakland '95-96).

Vermeil entered the pro ranks in '69 when he was designated as the first special teams coach in NFL history working for the L.A. Rams under Pro Football Hall of Famer George Allen. After a one-year stint on Tommy Prothro's staff as offensive coordinator at UCLA in '70, he moved with Prothro back to the Rams, where he served as offensive coordinator from '71-72. He then coached running backs and special teams for Rams head coach Chuck Knox in '73 before taking over the head coaching reins at UCLA the following year. He compiled a 15-5-3 (.717) record in two seasons

as head coach at UCLA ('74-75), including a 9-2-1 record in '75 when Vermeil led the Bruins to their first Pac 8 Championship.


Born in Calistoga, California, at the northern end of the world-renowned Napa Valley, Vermeil was a four-sport star at Calistoga High School and was also employed in the auto repair garage of his father, Louis Vermeil. The younger Vermeil applied that work ethic learned in "The Garage" for one season at Napa Junior College, before moving on to San Jose State. He graduated from San Jose State with degrees in physical education (B.A. '58, M.A. '59) after serving as a collegiate quarterback for the Spartans. In 2000, he was inducted into the San Jose State Hall of Fame. True to his wine country roots, Vermeil partners with OnTheEdge Winery to produce his own self-proclaimed "Garage Cabernet" named in honor of his grandfather, Jean Louis Vermeil. Vermeil's great-grandfather – also named Jean Louis Vermeil – once owned the land where the fruit utilized for this Cabernet Sauvignon vintage is grown.

Vermeil and his wife, Carol have three children and 11 grandchildren. Their son Rick and his wife Colleen are parents of grandchildren Kelly, Rick, Michael and Megan. Their son Dave and his wife Janet are parents of grandchildren Jack, Amy and Andy. Their daughter Nancy and her husband Steve Barnett are parents of grandchildren James, Tommy, Stevie and Christopher.

The Vermeils make their home in the historic Country Club Plaza district of Kansas City, Mo. When not in Kansas City, the entire Vermeil family enjoys spending time and working on "The Ranch," a 114-acre homestead located outside Philadelphia in rural Chester County, Pa.



- Owns a 34-30 (.531) regular season record as head coach of the Chiefs, the third-highest victory total in franchise history, trailing only Hank Stram (124) and Marty Schottenheimer (101).
- Has guided Kansas City to a 20-12 (.625) regular season record over the past two seasons. New England (28-4), Philadelphia (25-7), Indianapolis (24-8) and Pittsburgh (21-11) are the only clubs with better records over that span.
- Produced a 22-26 (.458) regular season record with St. Louis from '97-99 and was 3-0 in playoff action with the Rams.
- Owns a 6-5 career playoff record as an NFL head coach, 0-1 with the Chiefs, 3-0 with the Rams and 3-4 with the Eagles.
- Relationship with Chiefs President Carl Peterson and Vice President of Football Operations/Player Personnel Lynn Stiles dates back to '74 when Vermeil was the head coach at UCLA. Peterson and Stiles were both members of the Bruins coaching staff.

- Has been named "Coach of the Year" at four different levels - high school, junior college, NCAA Division I and has earned the honor twice in the NFL.

- Is the only individual to coach a team in the Rose Bowl and to broadcast a Rose Bowl.
- Named NFC Coach of the Year in '78 after guiding Philadelphia to a 9-7 record and a Wild Card berth. It marked the Eagles first winning season since '66.
- Named NFL Coach of the Year in '80 after leading the Philadelphia Eagles to a franchise-best 12-4 record and a berth in Super Bowl XV.
- Nineteen years after initially winning the award, Vermeil was once again named NFL Coach of the Year in '99 after leading the St. Louis Rams to a franchise-best 13-3 record and a victory in Super Bowl XXXIV over Tennessee.
- Originally entered the NFL in '69 with the L.A. Rams and was designated as the league's first special teams coach.
- Compiled a 15-5-3 (.717) record in two seasons as head coach at UCLA ('74-75), including a 9-2-1 record in '75 when Vermeil led the Bruins to their first Pac 8 Championship. UCLA made its first Rose Bowl appearance in 10 years as the Bruins upset #1 ranked Ohio State 23-10.
- Served as an assistant coach on head coach John Ralston's staff at Stanford from '65-68 that included six future NFL head coaches: Vermeil (Philadelphia '76-82, St. Louis '97-99, Kansas City 2001); Ralston (Denver '72-76); Bill Walsh (San Francisco '79-88), Mike White (Oakland '95-96), Jim Mora (New Orleans '86-96, Indianapolis '98-01) and Rod Rust (New England '90).

Joining the San Francisco 49ers after an accomplished collegiate career at the University of Notre Dame, Bryant Young was expected to anchor the interior of the team's defensive line.

He met that challenge and also anchored the locker room with a presence that was reflected in the numerous team-issued awards he piled up over his 14 NFL seasons.

The 49ers selected Bryant with the seventh overall pick of the 1994 NFL Draft. His impact was immediate: six sacks in 16 starts and a spot on the NFL All-Rookie Team.

By 1996, he had blossomed into a dominant force at defensive tackle, turning in his best season statistically: 84 tackles, four passes defensed, two safeties and 11.5 sacks, a figure that led the team and shared the NFL lead for all defensive tackles. As a result, he earned first-team All-Pro honors and the first of his four Pro Bowl nods.

He also received the team's Len Eshmont Award, given annually since 1957 for "inspirational and courageous play." Considered the 49ers' most prestigious honor, Bryant won the award eight times (1996, 1998-2000 and 2004-07). No other member of the 49ers has won it more than twice.

In 1998, Bryant was well on his way to another magnificent season. In 12 games, he had registered

9.5 sacks – best in the NFL among defensive tackles – along with eight tackles for loss and two forced fumbles. But a devastating leg injury ended his season – and threatened his career.

Bryant rebounded in stunning fashion, however, and returned to action by the 1999 season opener. He recorded 11 sacks and 19 tackles for loss on his way to winning the Comeback Player of the Year Award from both the AP and PFWA. He also was named the 49ers' winner of the league-wide Ed Block Courage Award and won the team's Matt Hazeltine Award for inspirational play.

For his career, Bryant totaled 89.5 sacks and three safeties. He was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1990s.





SELECTION PROCESS

Charged with the vital task of continuing to be certain that new enshrinees are the finest the game has produced is the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 49-person Selection Committee.

The Committee consists of one media representative from each pro football city with two from New York and Los Angeles, inasmuch as those cities have two teams in the National Football League. A 33rd member is a representative of the Pro Football Writers of America and there are 16 at-large delegates.

The Selection Committee meets annually to elect new members. There is no set number for any class of Enshrinees, but the Committee's current ground rules do stipulate that between four and nine new members will be selected each year. The 1973 and 1976 classes of three were the smallest named.

Every candidate is carefully scrutinized and must receive at least 80% approval of the Committee at the annual meeting before he can be elected. A scale of negative votes for elimination that will vary depending on the number of Selectors in attendance is used.

When the Selectors met in January to name the Class of 2022, they had before them a roster of 18 final candidates, along with detailed biographies on each. To assure that older players will be considered along with the more recently retired, the Seniors Committee – made up of veteran members of the overall Selection Committee – named a nominee from the pre-1997 era to be included on the final list.

A bylaws change to the selection process was approved by the Pro Football Hall of Fame's Board of Trustees in August 2014 by which a Contributor – defined as an

individual who has "made outstanding contributions to professional football in capacities other than playing or coaching" – automatically will be included among the annual list of Finalists for election. The Contributor Finalists also were voted on for election independent of all other Finalists.

In 2022, the Board of Trustees agreed to combine Coaches and Contributors into one category.

For the Classes of 2023, 2024 and 2025, there will be one Coach/Contributor Finalist and up to three (3) Senior Finalists.

The other Finalists will be the survivors from a preliminary list of Modern-Era candidates that the Committee will have screened by mail ballot. That original list will have been in part provided by the fans themselves.

Any fan may nominate any qualified person who has been connected with pro football in any capacity simply by writing to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The only restriction is that a player and coach must have last played or coached at least five seasons before he can be considered. For example, a candidate for the 2022 class must have concluded his career no later than the 2016 season.

There is no mandatory retirement period for a Contributor. Every nomination received will be processed and forwarded to the Selection Committee.

It is important to emphasize that the Hall of Fame itself has no say whatsoever as to who is or is not elected to membership. The only function of the staff is to process the nominations as they arrive and to coordinate all reduction voting and Committee Meetings, including the annual meeting.

FAQ ABOUT THE PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME'S SELECTION PROCESS

Does the Hall of Fame Nominate individuals?

The Hall of Fame receives nominations but does not make them. Any person, including the 49 elite members of the Selection Committee may place in nomination any eligible players, coaches or contributors.

What Happens After Someone is Nominated as a Modern-Era Nominee?

A nomination is NOT a vote for election. The Hall of Fame's selection process includes multiple steps in which the nominees are scrutinized. The Hall facilitates the procedure of three successive reviews of increasing scrutiny with its 49 selectors. The first is a vote to reduce the long list of Modern-Era nominees (typically around 100) to 25 Semifinalists, followed by a later vote to reduce to 15 Finalists. At the annual Selection Meeting, the Finalists are scrutinized even further by the Selectors, who after a thorough discussion of each nominee reduce the list from 15 to 10 and then 10 to 5. At that point, the five remaining nominees are voted on for membership on a yes or no basis. A minimum positive vote of 80% is necessary for election.

Who Selects New Hall of Fame Members?

The Pro Football Hall of Fame's 49-person Selection Committee is charged with the vital task of continuing to be sure that new enshrinees are the finest the game has produced.

The Committee consists of one media representative from each pro football city with two from New York and Los Angeles, inasmuch as those cities have two teams in the National Football League. There are 17 at-large selectors, all of whom are also active members of the media. That group includes one representative of the Pro Football Writers of America and four members of the Hall of Fame.

The Selection Committee meets annually to elect new members to the Hall of Fame. There is no set number of new enshrinees, but the Committee's current ground rules do stipulate that between four and eight new members will be selected each year. Every candidate is carefully scrutinized and must receive at least 80% approval of the Committee at the annual meeting before he can be elected.

How Are New Enshrinees Selected?

Any fan may nominate any player, coach or contributor who has been connected with pro football simply by writing to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The only restriction is that a player and coach must have been retired at least five years before he can be considered. There is no mandatory retirement period for contributors before they may be considered. Every nomination of an eligible candidate received will be processed and forwarded to the Hall of Fame's Selection Committee.

Each year, the Selection Committee will be polled three times before the final list of Modern-Era preliminary nominees is determined. The initial preliminary list of nominations is compiled and sent to the Hall of Fame's Selection Committee by March 1. The list is provided so that the Selectors can study the nominees and then request the addition of any other candidates that may have been overlooked. Included on this list are first-time eligible candidates who have strong enough credentials to give them even a remote chance of eventual Hall of Fame election. Also included are all other eligible candidates nominated by any person. Additionally, those Modern-Era nominees from the previous year's final preliminary list who received at least four votes in the balloting to determine the Modern-Era Finalists are automatically included on this preliminary list.

The second preliminary list is sent to the Selectors during the month of July and includes all the nominees named on the initial list plus any additional nominations received from any source since the first list was compiled.

The third preliminary list of eligible candidates is sent to the Selection Committee during the month of September for the purpose of the selection of the Modern-Era Semifinalists for election. From the third preliminary list, the Selection Committee is asked to vote for 25 Modern-Era Nominees who become Semifinalists for election.

The final preliminary list of 25 Modern-Era nominees plus all ties—if any—for the 25th position shall be distributed to the Selection Committee during the month of November for the purpose of the selection of 15 Modern-Era Nominees. The 16th, 17th, 18th, and 19th Finalists (potentially) are the recommended candidates of the Seniors Committee and Coach/Contributor Committee.

In advance of the Hall of Fame Selection Meeting, the Selectors are provided detailed biographies on each Finalist. At the annual meeting, each Finalist is thoroughly discussed by the committee before a series of reduction votes are taken. First, the Seniors and Coach/Contributor candidates are discussed and voted on for election. They must receive the same 80% affirmative vote as the Modern-Era candidates. Next, there is a vote that reduces the Modern-Era Finalists list from 15 to 10. Following that, a vote is taken to reduce the list from 10 to five names. The five remaining candidates for Hall of Fame election are then voted on individually (yes or no) for membership.

In order to be elected, a Finalist must receive a minimum of 80% of the vote. All ballots are collected and counted by the firm EY. No vote totals are announced – only the winners of the various reduction ballots are revealed to the Selectors and the Hall's representatives.

How Are Seniors and Coach/Contributor Candidates Chosen?

To assure that older players, whose active careers have been completed at least 25 years, as well as those individuals who contributed to the game in ways other than playing and coaching will be considered along with the Modern-Era players and coaches, a Seniors Committee and a Coach/Contributor Committee, have been established. Both of these committees are made up of 12 members of the overall Selection Committee.

Like the full Committee, the members of the Seniors Committee and the Coach/Contributor Committee are provided a preliminary list of eligible nominees. The list, which is compiled and mailed to the Selectors, includes carry-over nominations from the previous year, first-time eligible candidates and nominations from any outside source.

By way of a mail ballot, the Seniors Committee and Coach/Contributor Committee members reduce their respective lists to 25 Semifinalists in July. In second reduction votes, the committees will determine 12 Finalists. Meetings to select up to three (3) Seniors and one (1) Coach/Contributor for possible election to the Hall of Fame are held in late August.

In advance of both meetings, each Selector is provided with detailed biographical information on the candidates.

Seniors Committee members are assisted during their annual meeting by two Hall of Fame consultants, chosen by the Hall's president, who were contemporaries of the majority of the nominees. The consultants offer only their opinions and are not entitled to vote. After each candidate is discussed thoroughly, the consultants are excused from the meeting. Additional discussion is conducted followed by a series of reduction votes that results in the naming of the Seniors nominees.

Coach/Contributor Committee members are also assisted during their annual meeting by two consultants and follow the same guidelines as described above for the Seniors Committee consultants.

Although the Seniors and Coach/Contributor Nominees will be presented to the full Selection Committee as Finalists, their election to the Hall of Fame is not automatic. Each must receive the same minimum 80% of the vote as a Modern-Era candidate to be elected.

Is a New Hall of Fame Member Enshrined as a Member of a Team?

Obviously, teams take great pride in the accomplishments of individuals who have been a part of their organization. Often individual teams and even the Hall of Fame will list enshrinees according to the team or teams on which they spent a significant period of time. An enshrinee, however, is not asked to "declare," nor does the Hall of Fame "choose" a team under which a new member is enshrined. When elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, an individual is recognized for accomplishments as a player, coach or contributor.

ELIGIBILITY CHART

A player or coach must not have played or coached for five full seasons before he is eligible for election to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The chart below can be used as a quick reference to determine when a player or coach will be, was, or is first eligible for the Hall of Fame. For instance, 2014 enshrinee Andre Reed last played in 2000. Therefore, he was first eligible for the Class of 2006. Counting upward from 2006, one can determine that he was elected in his ninth year of eligibility.

FINALISTS BY YEAR

Since 1970. In 2007, bylaws were changed to stipulate 17 Finalists that include 15 Modern-Era nominees and two Senior Candidates. **BOLD CAPS INDICATE THOSE ELECTED TO THE PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME.** ~ indicates Old-timer/Senior nominee. Selection of Old-timer/Senior candidate began in 1972. No nominee was picked in 1975. Two Senior nominees selected starting in 2004. # Subscript number indicates the number of times as finalist. No subscript number indicates a person's first time as finalist. NOTE: In some cases, there were 16 Finalists due to a tie in the voting. In 1975, there were only 14 Finalists. Contributor Finalists were added with the class of 2015. * Indicates Contributor Finalist.

Beginning with the Class of 2021, there was one Senior, one Contributor and one Coach Finalists.

In 2020, the Hall of Fame elected a special Centennial Class of 20 members. The Centennial Class included 10 Seniors, three Contributors and two Coaches and were voted on from a list of 38 Finalists. ^ Indicates a Coaches Finalist.

Reduction votes during annual Selection Meeting. From 2007-2019, the selection process includes a cutdown of the 15 Modern-Era Finalists during the annual selection meeting separate of the two Senior nominees. The Selection Committee first pares the list from 15 to 10; then 10 to 5. At that point, a yes or no vote is tabulated of the final five finalists. An individual is elected to the Hall of Fame if he receives at least 80% affirmative vote. The reduction votes have varied over the years. Included with this list are the reduction votes that took place under the rules at the time. In the past, the Finalists numbered 15 that included 13 Modern-Era candidates and the two Senior nominees and the Senior nominees were included in the reduction vote.

FINALISTS - BY YEAR

The Centennial Class was voted upon during two separate meetings. A special Blue-Ribbon Panel voted on the Seniors, Contributors and Coaches. There were 20 Senior Finalists. A reduction vote pared the list to 15 and a second vote was utilized to determine the final 10 Seniors elected to the Hall of Fame. The Panel voted on 10 Contributor Finalists with the top three vote-getters earning election. Finally, eight Coaches candidates were voted with the top two vote-getters earning election. The Hall's regular selection meeting determined the five Modern-Era Hall of Famers. The Selection Committee first pared the list from 15 to 10; then 10 to the final 5.



Twenty-two members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame have earned Most Valuable Player honors in a Super Bowl. Three of them – Bart Starr (2), Terry Bradshaw (2), and Joe Montana (3) – have earned the award more than once.

BART STARR – QB – Green Bay Packers – MVP of Super Bowls I and II

HALL OF FAME GAME



TOM BENSON HALL OF FAME STADIUM

In the Beginning The original stadium was built from 1937-1939 at an estimated cost of \$500,000. The federal government in the form of man power, the WPA, paid for \$400,000 while a school board bond issue paid for the materials. The stadium originally seated 15,000 and was the largest high school stadium in the country at that time. Formerly known as Fawcett Stadium after John A. Fawcett, a community leader, member of the Canton City school board, and a gifted athlete, the stadium was renamed Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium in 2014.

The Future A key component of the Hall of Fame Village powered by Johnson Controls project is Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium. The venue is a world-class sports and entertainment sports complex that includes a permanent stage built into the stands at the 50-yard line. The stadium is designed by HKS, a world-renowned architectural firm that previously developed AT&T Stadium for the Dallas Cowboys and U.S. Bank Stadium for the Minnesota Vikings.

Enshrinement The Pro Football Hall of Fame's Enshrinement is one of the great events in sports. In 2002, the annual Enshrinement was moved from the Hall's front steps back to the stadium, where it had been held from 1963 to 1965.

Hall of Fame Game

The Hall of Fame Game series began in 1962, one year before the museum opened. A National Football League preseason game has been played in Canton each year except three since that inaugural game. No game was played in 1966 as the preseason schedule was not set in time to include Canton for a neutral site game. The game was canceled in 2011 due to a lockout and in 2016 due to respect for player safety based on the condition of the field.

Beginning in 1971, following the AFL-NFL merger, an AFC vs. NFC format was adopted for the Hall of Fame series. Preset schedules were created that called for each team to make a visit to Canton over 14- and 15-year periods through

1994. In 1995, the Hall of Fame Game showcased the debut of the league's newest expansion teams: the Carolina Panthers and Jacksonville Jaguars. Since that time, the teams for the Hall of Fame Game normally includes teams with significant milestones (such as the return of the Cleveland Browns in 1999 and the Houston Texans inaugural game in 2002) or a connection to the Hall's class of enshrinees.

The inaugural game (1962) and those from 1967 through 1997 were played on Saturday afternoons. The Hall of Fame games were played on Sunday afternoons from 1963 to 1965. In 1998, the Hall of Fame Game was switched to primetime with kickoff moved to Saturday evening. One year later, the game moved to Monday night. From 2006 to 2016, the Hall of Fame Game was played on Sunday night. In 2017, the game was switched to Thursday night.

The Hall of Fame Game was televised nationally by ABC from 1971-2005. In 2006, NBC broadcast the game followed by the NFL Network in 2007. The game returned to NBC in 2008. The game was broadcast by NFL Network in 2012. FOX broadcast the 2021 game. The 2022 game is returning to NBC.

The **Las Vegas Raiders** and **Jacksonville Jaguars** will kick off the National Football League's season in the city where the league was born. The Raiders and Jaguars are scheduled to face each other in the 2022 Hall of Fame Game on Thursday, Aug. 4 at 8 p.m. ET in Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium, adjacent to the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

The game marks the fourth appearance by the Raiders and the second by the Jaguars in the annual preseason classic. The Raiders are 3-0 in the Hall of Fame Game, while the Jaguars are 0-1.

HALL OF FAME GAME FACTS



The Cincinnati Bengals, who beat the Los Angeles Rams in 1988, became the first team to play in the Hall of Fame Game and advance to the Super Bowl in the same season. The 2001 St. Louis Rams are the only other team to play in Canton to start a run to the Super Bowl.

Teams that have won or tied the Hall of Fame Game have qualified for the playoffs that same season 24 times. Included in the number are 14 teams that claimed division titles after leaving Canton without a loss.

During one particular 14-year stretch from 1980-1993, all but two of the teams that won or tied the Hall of Fame Game advanced to the postseason that year.

Hall of Famers Chris Hanburger (1965), John Hannah (1973), Marvin Harrison (1996) and Jack Youngblood (1971) all made their NFL debuts in the Hall of Fame Game.

HALL OF FAMERS WHO'VE PLAYED OR COACHED IN THE HOF GAME

Since its inception in 1962, there have been 181 members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame who have either played or coached in a Hall of Fame Game.

Five members of the Class of 2022 participated in the game as a player or coach.

The record for the most Hall of Fame Game appearances by a Hall of Fame member is three, shared by Charlie Joiner and Terrell Owens.
