




Duke continues to receive national media attention. Each year the Blue Devils earn articles in national newspapers, magazines and over the internet, as well as extensive local and national television attention.



Alana Beard became the first Duke women's basketball player in school history to earn National Player of the Year accolades in 2003. Beard earned the Victor Award and ESPN.com National Player of the Year, after averaging 22.0 points, 6.9 rebounds, 3.0 assists, 2.8 steals and 1.3 blocks as a junior.

In 2004, Beard was named winner of the State Farm Wade Trophy, the inaugural Wooden Award, ESPN.com, Associated Press and USBWA National Player of the Year honors, after posting averages of 19.7 points, 5.4 rebounds, 3.9 assists and 2.4 steals.

Since 1999, Duke has registered at least one player on the Kodak All-America squad every year except one. Michele VanGorp earned the first Kodak selection for Duke in 1999 and since then Georgia Schweitzer, Beard, Iciss Tillis and Monique Currie and Lindsey Harding have each been selected.

VanGorp averaged 16.9 points, 5.5 rebounds, 1.1 assists and 1.0 blocks in 1999 as the Blue Devils advanced to the NCAA Final Four and ACC Championship game for the first time in school history. She played a huge role in defeating the three-time defending NCAA Champion Tennessee to advance to the Final Four.

In 2001, Schweitzer guided Duke to a 30-4 record and a trip to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16, while averaging 14.1 points, 4.7 rebounds, 4.1 assists and 1.5 steals. She hit a then school-record 65 three-pointers on the season.




Currie was the runner-up for numerous National Player of the Year awards in 2004-05 and challenged for a second straight season in 2005-06.

In 2006-07, Lindsey Harding was named Naismith and ESPN.com National Player of the Year after averaging 13.6 points, 4.0 rebounds, 3.0 assists and 1.5 steals. She helped guide Duke to a perfect 29-0 mark in the regular season, becoming the first ACC squad and 14th team in NCAA history to go undefeated in the regular season.

Harding was also selected the inaugural winner of the WBCA National Defensive Player of the Year award. Game in and game out she guarded the opponent's best scorer and held many of the top players in the nation under their scoring averages.

Also in 2006-07, senior Alison Bales was a finalist for the State Farm Wade Trophy as she blocked 151 shots, averaged 11.9 points, 7.8 rebounds and 4.4 blocks on the season. The 151 blocked shots was the second-most in NCAA history.

Duke was the only team in Division I to have at least one representative on each of the Kodak All-America teams from 2001-07.






The Duke Difference

- Duke head coach David Cutcliffe has enjoyed tremendous success in his 25 seasons on the sidelines. The 2003 SEC Coach of the Year, Cutcliffe helped Tennessee and Ole Miss to 22 bowl games and mentored the past two Super Bowl MVPs in Peyton and Eli Manning.
- Duke University is ranked eighth in the 2008 U.S. News & World Report listing for America's Best Colleges.
- The NCAA honored Division I sports teams with public recognition awards for their latest multi-year NCAA Division I Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores that ranked in the top 10 percent of all squads in their respective sports. Duke led all ACC institutions with 12 athletic teams achieving the top 10 percentile, including football. Nationally, Duke was one of 15 schools with at least 12 teams recognized for outstanding achievement and one of only two that competes in the Bowl Championship Series in football.






■ Duke University was created in 1924 by James Buchanan Duke as a memorial to his father, Washington Duke. The Dukes, a Durham family who built a worldwide financial empire in the manufacture of tobacco and developed the production of electricity in the two Carolinas, had long been interested in Trinity College. Trinity traced its roots to 1838 in nearby Randolph County when local Methodist and Quaker communities joined forces to support a permanent school, which they named Union Institute. After a brief period as Normal College (1851-59), the school changed its name to Trinity College in 1859 and affiliated with the Methodist Church.

■ The college moved to Durham in 1892 with financial assistance from Washington Duke and the donation of land by Julian S. Carr. In December 1924, the school's trustees gratefully accepted the provisions of James B. Duke's indenture creating the family philanthropic foundation, The Duke Endowment, which provided, in part, for the expansion of Trinity College into Duke University.

■ As a result of the Duke gift, Trinity underwent both physical and academic expansion. The original Durham Campus became known as East Campus when it was rebuilt in stately Georgian architecture. West Campus, Gothic in style and dominated by the soaring 210-foot tower of Duke Chapel, opened in 1930. Academic expansion of the university included the establishment of new graduate and professional schools.

■ Modern times have seen Duke realize its founder's aspirations to become a major center of learning. The Duke University Medical Center has achieved international prominence, and many Duke schools and departments are consistently ranked among the nation's best.






Durham, North Carolina

■ The average temperature in Durham is 59 degrees and snowfall totals less than eight inches per year. A temperate climate and the unique blend of big-city activity with an unfrenzied pace makes Durham a great place to call home.

■ The Durham Bulls, Tampa Bay's AAA baseball affiliate, are a popular attraction among area residents.



In 2002, Employment Review Magazine ranked "The Triangle" area of Durham, Chapel Hill and Raleigh as the number one place in America to live and work. Money Magazine made the same selection in 1994.



■ Brightleaf Square, shown above, in downtown Durham is a turn-of-the-century tobacco warehouse renovated as a unique shopping, dining and entertainment district.

■ Located in the heart of North Carolina's rolling Piedmont region, Durham stands out as a gem among southern cities. Through the years, the city has evolved from a tobacco and textile town into an international center for medicine, scholarship, biotechnology and electronics.

■ Founded in 1853, Durham is widely recognized for its diversity. Originally a manufacturing center, the city now is known for excellence in medicine, education, research and industry. The wide range of activities available in the area lends the city a multifaceted appeal that strikes even first-time visitors.

■ Durham has a natural appeal as well, characterized by 98,000 acres of hardwood and evergreen forests including the only remaining old growth Piedmont bottomland forests and 7,800 acres of cropland. Hills and dales, meandering rivers and streams, several lakes, 26 rare plant species and several rare species of birds and animals can also be found here.

■ With 187,000 residents in the one-city county, Durham is the fourth-largest city in North Carolina. It is ideally located on the large and small scale. Within the immediate area it stands as the pinnacle of the "Triangle" region of North Carolina, a metropolitan population of 1,000,000 people that includes Chapel Hill to the south and west and Raleigh, the state capital, to the south and east. On a regional level, this area is the primary center of culture, sports, education and government between Washington, D.C., and Atlanta.


■ With excellent sports and cultural activities in the area, Durham is a fun place to be. People from all walks of life — academic, industrial, professional, agricultural — blend to provide a warm, rich sense of hospitality and diversity.



North Carolina First In Flight

■ North Carolina is a state of diversity — diversity in its population, in its economic production and in its beautiful scenery. According to the 2000 census, North Carolina was the home to more than eight million people of many nationalities.

■ Known for its major production of tobacco, North Carolina is also a major producer of textiles and furniture, fueled by the thousands of acres of forests that cover the state. Among its other leading products are broilers, hogs, turkeys, greenhouse products, sweet potatoes, corn, soybeans, peanuts and eggs. In addition, there are hundreds of coastal fisheries that yield shrimp, menhaden and crabs as the primary catches.

■ The scenery throughout the state is diverse and beautiful. From the mountains to the west and the beaches adjoining the Atlantic Ocean to the east, North Carolina is one of the nation's most picturesque states. Some of the major attractions in the state include the Great Smoky Mountains, the Blue Ridge National Parkway, the Cape Hatteras and Cape Lookout National Seashores, the Wright Brothers National Memorial at Kitty Hawk, Guilford Courthouse and Moores Creek National Military Parks. This scenery, enhanced by a mild climate with enough rainfall to assist with the state's abundant greenery, attracts millions of visitors who come to North Carolina annually to take advantage of its clean and uncluttered beaches, its string of forests and the mountain ranges in the western part of the state.

■ In recent years, North Carolina has become a favorite place for the entertainment industry. Some of the television shows and movies filmed in North Carolina include *Cast Away* (2001), *The Green Mile* (1999), *Dawson's Creek* (1997-2003), *Kiss the Girls* (1997), *I Know What You Did Last Summer* (1997), *Forrest Gump* (1998), *The Fugitive* (1993), *The Last of the Mohicans* (1992), *Sleeping with the Enemy* (1991), *Bull Durham* (1988) and *Dirty Dancing* (1987).

Cameron Indoor Stadium has been a perfect home for the Duke University basketball program. Conceived on the back of a matchbook cover and renovated in the late 1980s at a cost of \$2 million, Cameron has been the site of 704 Blue Devil victories.

It was on the cover of a book of matches that Eddie Cameron and Wallace Wade first sketched out the plan for Duke’s Indoor Stadium in 1935. The story may be a myth (the matchbook has never been found), but then the Indoor Stadium that emerged from those first scribbles lends itself to the propagation of myths.

For 68 years, spectators, players and coaches have understood the unique magic of the Indoor Stadium. The building was dedicated to longtime Duke athletic director and basketball coach Eddie Cameron, a legend in his own right, on Jan. 22, 1972. An unranked Duke team upset then third-ranked North Carolina, 76-74, after Robby West drove the length of the court to hit a pull-up jumper to win the game.

It’s the intimacy of the arena, the unique seating arrangement that puts the wildest fans right down on the floor with the players. It’s the legends that were made there, the feeling of history being made with every game. And it’s something more than either of these, something indescribable that comes from the building itself. No one who has experienced it will ever forget it.

The Stadium was ready to be opened by the first of the new year in 1940. The final cost: \$400,000 (which Duke finished paying after the football team won the Sugar Bowl in 1945).

Duke’s new Indoor Stadium was officially opened on Jan. 6, 1940. Touring the building before the evening ceremony and subsequent game, local city officials were “speechless.” Said Chamber of Commerce President Col. Marion B. Fowler, “It is so colossal and so wonderful ... This building will not only be an asset to the university, but to the entire community as well.” Chamber Secretary Frank Pierson concurred, “There are no superlatives for it.”

The building was dedicated before a crowd of 8,000, the largest ever in the history of southern basketball. President William P. Few and Dean William H. Wannamaker presented the Stadium to the University. The Blue Devils beat the visiting Princeton Tigers that night, 36-27.

Renovations to the arena began in 1987. The lobbies and concourse were remodeled during the summer of 1987. Then, in 1988, work began on the interior of the arena. A new electronic scoreboard, new sound system and decorative wood paneling gave Cameron an updated look, while maintaining the original elegance.

The addition of 750 new student seats, increasing Cameron’s capacity to 9,314, gave the Cameron Crazies, the Duke students who have made a name for themselves as Duke’s exceptional “Sixth Man,” a little more room to practice the art of supporting their team creatively.



Home Sweet Home

Cameron Indoor Stadium celebrates its 69th season in 2008-09 as one of the greatest homecourts in all of college basketball.

Cameron has been a friendly home arena for the Duke women's basketball team over the last 33 seasons. The Blue Devils played the first two home games of their inaugural campaign, 1975-76, in the gym on East Campus, but moved over to Cameron for the third home game of that season and have played 425 home contests there since. The team heads into the 2008-09 campaign with a 322-107 (.787) all-time record at home. The Blue Devils posted a 20-game home ACC winning streak from 1997-2000.




Basketball Facilities

The Duke basketball program has one of the top facilities in the country, featuring the \$15.2 million Michael W. Krzyzewski Center - Dedicated to Academic & Athletic Excellence and the Schwartz/Butters Athletic Center.

The Krzyzewski Center, which opened in February of 2008, is a first-class athletics complex designed to inspire, enhance and celebrate Duke University's extraordinary student-athletes. The three-story, 56,000-square-foot complex contains three vital components — the department's academic support center, a premier campus banquet space and a basketball training facility.

"It's a great building. It's not a good one, it's a great building," says the namesake, Mike Krzyzewski. "It's uplifting. Everybody — the players, the coaching staff, the support staff — when you walk into it, it makes you feel better."

The academic support center features extensive computer resources, classrooms, computers, tutoring and counseling rooms and a team study space, while the banquet facility can host more than 300 people with additional room in the outdoor plaza, which is highlighted by quiet seating areas and beautifully landscaped terrain. The academic center is open 24 hours a day for all student-athletes.

The basketball training area features two full-court practice areas, a world class weight and conditioning room, an alumni locker room and a state of the art theatre-style video room. There are also four baskets positioned around the sides of each court, giving the facility 12 total baskets.

The K Center is located next to Cameron Indoor Stadium and the Schwartz/Butters Athletic Center.

Complementing the Krzyzewski Center is the Schwartz/Butters Athletic Center. The building, which is adjacent to Cameron Indoor Stadium, was dedicated on April 15, 2000. It is named after Alan D. Schwartz, a former Duke baseball player and the current executive vice president of Bear Stearns and Companies, Inc.,

and Tom Butters, Duke's long-time athletics director.

The six-story building overlooks Blue Devil Plaza, an open grassy area that connects several of Duke's athletic facilities, including Cameron Indoor Stadium, Card Gym, the Wilson Student Recreation Center, the Sheffield Indoor Tennis Center and Ambler Stadium. During basketball season, Blue Devil Plaza transforms into Krzyzewskiville, the tent village of hundreds of Duke students waiting to get into games at Cameron Indoor Stadium.


The Schwartz/Butters Athletic Center is the anchor of the vast athletics complex, housing the Duke Sports Hall of Fame in addition to new offices, locker rooms and player lounges for both the men's and women's basketball programs.

On the fourth floor, the women's basketball coaches and staff offices are located with easy and quick access to Cameron Indoor Stadium and the K Center.

The women's basketball locker room and lounge was renovated in the summer of 2007 and comes equipped with a jacuzzi, coaches locker room, coaches office, lounge, two big screen televisions, Nintendo Wii and a kitchen area. There are also training facilities and an equipment room with state-of-the-art equipment for the basketball team.

"The practice facility is magnificent and extremely well done -- it is the best in the country," said Joanne P. McCallie. "Pride, tradition and excellence come to mind, immediately, when I think about the K Center. This will give our student-athletes an opportunity to become great players at Duke. It is a celebration of excellence."

Both facilities, part of a \$75 million athletic facilities renovation project at Duke, are perfect complements to historic Cameron Indoor Stadium and provide the Blue Devils with one of the finest complexes in all of college basketball. It is tangible evidence of the university's commitment to providing its student-athletes with top-notch facilities.





“Duke Athletics is very much about the grandeur that it provides for athletics in general, and it’s not just through basketball, but basketball is definitely a vehicle that propels Duke forward throughout the nation in terms of athletic programs. The K Center is a very big symbol of that. It’s one of the elite, if not the elite, facility in the country, and it symbolically stands for what Duke stands for, and that’s perfection. Former Atlantic Coast Conference track champion and All-America Jeff Howser is in his ninth season as Duke's speed and conditioning coach.

A 1971 graduate of Duke, Howser was a six-time ACC champion with the Blue Devils. Recently named an ACC 50th Anniversary top 50 athlete in indoor track, he went on to earn a bronze medal at the 1969 World Championships in the 110-meter high hurdles and was an alternate on the 1968 United States Olympic Team. Howser ran track on the international level from 1968-82, and was a four-time U.S. Olympic Trials qualifier and two-time U.S. Olympic Trials finalist.

Howser served previous track and field assistant coaching stints at Florida (1971-74), N.C. State (1974-77), Duke (1977-79 & 1989-90) and North Carolina (1979-80).



William Stephens
Assistant Strength & Conditioning Coach
11th Year at Duke

Assistant strength and conditioning coach William Stephens is in his 11th season with the Duke athletics program, including working closely with the basketball team in the weight room.

The 43-year-old is a native of Elizabethtown, N.C., and a 1987 graduate of N.C. Central University with a degree in criminal justice. He is an accomplished weightlifter, as he was a three-time state powerlifting champion from 1991 to 1993. He also held the state record in the deadlift (661 lbs.) and was a gold medal winner at the World Championships for Law Enforcement in 1994.

Stephens also serves as a reserve deputy for the Durham County Sheriff's Department. He and his son, P.J. (11), reside in Efland.



Sports Medicine

Led by nationally renowned physicians and certified athletic trainers, Duke's sports medicine program is widely considered one of the best in the nation. In essence, the mission of the sports medicine program at Duke is to combine the latest innovations and technology in injury recognition, prevention, treatment and performance enhancement with an outstanding collection of doctors, certified athletic trainers and other support personnel to give the Blue Devil student-athlete a quality experience while at Duke.

Duke student-athletes have access to some of the top doctors with vast experience in athletics at the college and professional levels, all of whom are affiliated with the Duke Sports Medicine Center. Dr. Claude T. Moorman III, former head team physician for the NFL's Baltimore Ravens, serves as the center's director and head team physician. A 1987 graduate from the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine, he returned to Duke after serving as the Director of Sports Medicine at the University of Maryland Medical Center from 1996-2001. Moorman, a Duke football letterman from 1980-82, heads the Sports Medicine Center staff, which also includes:

- **Alison Toth, MD** - Director, Duke Women's Sports Medicine Program; Assistant Professor of Surgery (Orthopaedics). Assistant team doctor for the NFL's New York Giants and the Iona College Gaels during the 2000-2001 season. Toth, a New Fairfield, Conn., native, graduated from Yale in 1990, where she played varsity basketball. Toth was the 1994 Valedictorian of her medical school class. She completed her orthopaedic surgery residency at Duke University Medical Center in 2000, and her Sports Medicine and Shoulder Surgery fellowship at the Hospital for Special Surgery at the Weill Cornell Medical Center in New York City in 2001. She is in her eighth year as Team Physician for Duke Women's Athletics. Toth is also currently serving as the N.C. Central Orthopaedic Physician. The Duke Women's Sports Medicine Program is one of the first programs in the country dedicated to the care of active women.

- **Debbie Squire, MD** - Pediatric Physician in the Duke Children's Faculty Practice and attending physician with the Duke Sports Medicine Clinic; In her 31st year at Duke and 25th as a team physician for the Duke women's basketball team. Squire, a Pittsburgh, Pa., native, graduated from Wheaton (Ill.) College and received her medical degree from Northwestern University. She completed her pediatric residency at Duke University Medical Center, where, during her year as chief resident and two years as Robert Wood Johnson Fellow, she served as a clinical fellow in sports medicine under the direction of Dr. Frank Bassett III, then team physician for Duke athletics. She is a founding member and former member of the Board of Directors of the American Medical Society of Sports Medicine (AMSSM) and served as President of the AMSSM from 1999- 2000.

- **Jeffrey R. Bytomski, DO, FAOASM** - Medical Team Physician. Bytomski completed a fellowship at the Duke University Sports Medicine Center in 2002. During the fellowship, he worked with the women's soccer and women's basketball teams. He was also the medical team physician for North Carolina Central University and Carolina Cobras (Arena Football). Now in his sixth year at Duke, Bytomski is a 1993 graduate of San Diego State University. He completed his medical training at Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine in 1998 and family medicine residency at

The Duke athletic training staff is headed by Dave Engelhardt, now in his 27th year at Duke, and Summer McKeehan, who is the head women's basketball trainer.

McKeehan, now in her eighth year at Duke, works year-round with the Blue Devil women's basketball program. She also assists with the Duke fencing and cheerleading programs.

A 1998 graduate of Utah State with a degree in Exercise and Sport Science, McKeehan enters her fourth year with women's basketball after serving as the trainer for the women's soccer and track & field squads at Duke. McKeehan also received a Master's in Sports Psychology in 2000 from the University of Utah.

Kerry Mullenix serves as the director of athletic rehabilitation in the Duke training room. He has a bachelor's degree with an emphasis in athletic training from Nebraska in 1993 and a master's degree in physical therapy from the Nebraska Medical Center in 1997. Prior to arriving at Duke in 1998, the Woodbine, Iowa, native worked at Jennie Edmundson Sports Medicine in Iowa and at Healthworks Rehabilitation Center.

Other certified athletic trainers on staff who assist in the care of Duke student-athletes include Hap Zarzour, Jen McCollum, Joe Ferraro, Jose Fonseca, Kristi Hall, Nicole Gehrich, Nick Potter, Jennie Serenelli, Alan Duncan, Kyle Beatty and Emily Norcross.

Other facets of the sports medicine program include the very best training meals, monitored by sports nutritionist Franca Alphin, access to sports psychologists, and the ability to utilize the resources of the Duke Sports Medicine Center. Those resources include The Duke Sports Medicine Clinic, Michael Krzyzewski Human Performance Lab (K-Lab) and the Duke Sports Performance Program. Each program brings an important element to the care of Duke student-athletes.

In the summer of 2002, Duke opened its newest training room in the Yoh Football Center. It is a 5,500 square-foot facility, featuring extensive hydrotherapy system, rehabilitation and treatment areas. The hydrotherapy area includes a 10 x 20 multidepth rehabilitation pool featuring an underwater treadmill, an 8 x 8 chiller pool and an 8 x 8 warm whirlpool. The treatment area is highlighted by modern modalities and the latest technological equipment. Duke's new rehabilitation equipment ensures constant monitoring and thoughtful progression through every stage of rehabilitation. An unweighted treadmill and Biodex muscle testing and rehabilitation equipment are also featured in Duke's rehabilitation area.








Leslie Barnes

- Barnes is a native of Nebraska and obtained a Bachelor of Science degree in Psychology from Nebraska Wesleyan in 1996. She also received a Masters of Education in Counseling/Psychological Services from Springfield College in 1998.



Duke student-athletes are an integral part of their community. In addition to hosting several "Meet the Blue Devils" events on campus, the Department of Athletics community outreach efforts continue with its highly successful reading program entering its 15th year of existence in the Durham Public School System. Intended to aid area teachers by providing reading incentives for third and fourth graders in Durham, the program touches area youth.

Verizon remains the title sponsor of the Read with the Blue Devils program. Verizon uses the Duke program as a model for other schools and organizations across the nation.

For the past six Christmas holidays, members of the women's basketball team have purchased gifts for families in need, wrapped the gifts and taken the presents to the families prior to heading home for the holiday. It has provided gifts to those families that need help the most.

Ever since the early 1990s, the women's basketball team has visited the Ronald McDonald House of Durham. The team annually cooks a meal for the children and makes many other trips to visit during the year.

The Blue Devils also made frequent trips to the Durham Soup Kitchen, the Bone Marrow Transplant Center and also traveled to Camp Kaleidoscope, which is a summer camp program for the Duke Children's Hospital. Several members of the 2008-09 squad tutor children through a program in education service learning course they are taking. The student-athletes travel to local elementary schools each week.



Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 56th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 109 national championships, including 57 in women's competition and 52 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 145 times in men's competition and 92 times in women's action.

Since 1977, when the league adopted women's basketball and a tradition of excellence was established, the ACC has continued to soar to new heights. The 2005-06 season marked the first time in NCAA history that a conference sent three teams to the same Final Four. The title game pitted an automatic ACC winner as second-seeded Maryland faced No. 1 seed Duke. The Terrapins claimed their first national title in school history and the league's second with a thrilling 78-75 overtime game at the TD Banknorth Garden in Boston, Mass., on April 4, 2006. Following the 2006-07 season, Duke became the first ACC team and only the 14th in NCAA history to finish a regular season undefeated (29-0), while the 34 wins for North Carolina marked the most in program history.

The 2007-08 season was no different in the continuation towards excellence as eight ACC teams earned postseason bids, including six NCAA Tournament berths. It also marked the sixth consecutive year the league has sent at least six to the Big Dance. Joining North Carolina and Maryland as representatives of the ACC in the NCAA Tournament were Duke, Florida State, Georgia Tech, and Virginia.

Over the years, ACC women's basketball teams have gained global recognition through their television exposure. The 2007-08 schedule featured 57 televised games and included 96 television appearances. In addition, the ACC broadcasted nine games on ESPN2 and seven on Fox Sports Net and affiliates. Twenty-seven match-ups were featured on the league's regional sports network, which includes Comcast SportsNet, Fox Sports Net South, SunSports and New England's Sports Network (NESN). To conclude 2007-08, the ACC finished 64-54 (.542) in front of a national televised audience, including a 23-12 mark against non-conference foes.

The league's women's basketball programs continue to rank among the best in the country in terms of the NCAA Tournament, having made 144 appearances and won 194 games in the last 31 years, including 32 wins by a number one seed. In addition to sending three teams to the same Final Four for the first time in history, the league has boasted such national accomplishments as sending at least one team to the "Sweet 16" for 20 consecutive years and at least one to the Final Four in 11 of the last 20 years. The conference has also made 14 trips to the Final Four in the last 27 years with three teams finishing second and North Carolina and Maryland capturing National Championships in 1994 and 2006, respectively.

Since the inaugural season of the Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA) in 1997, the ACC has been a recognizable presence in the league. Sixty-nine former ACC stars have played on the hardwood in the WNBA, while five former players have worked the sidelines as coaches. Four ACC players were selected in the first round of the 2008 WNBA Draft as the foursome was selected in the first 14 picks of the round. In all, eight league players were selected in the 2008 WNBA Draft, while the league tabbed a league-record of nine selectees in 2006 and 2007.



Duke Athletics

A mainstay among the elite Division I athletic programs, Duke University once again ranked near the top during the 2007-08 athletic year. The women's golf and men's lacrosse teams won ACC Championships, while the women's lacrosse and men's lacrosse teams advanced to the NCAA Final Four. The women's golf team turned in a third place finish at the NCAA Championship to go along with NCAA Sweet 16 appearances by the women's soccer, women's basketball and women's tennis squads.

Duke was also very successful nationally in 2007-08 as 13 teams competed in NCAA Tournament action. The Blue Devils had 10 teams ranked in the top 10 of the national rankings during the season.


Listed below are some facts from the 2007-08 athletic year:

- The Blue Devils had two National Player of the Year honorees - Amanda Blumenherst (women's golf) and Matt Danowski (men's lacrosse); one National Rookie of the Year -- Emma Hamm (women's lacrosse); and one National Coach of the Year -- Kerstin Kimmel (women's lacrosse).
- Amanda Blumenherst (women's golf) won her third straight National Player of the Year award as well as winning the Golf Honda Award for the second consecutive season and picked up her second straight Nancy Lopez award as the top amateur women's golfer in the nation. No other women's golfer in history has won three National Player of the Year honors and no amateur golfer has won the Nancy Lopez award in back-to-back years.
- Twenty-two Blue Devils were selected Academic All-America/ National Scholar Athlete.
- A total of 39 student-athletes were selected All-America, while six were Freshmen All-America honorees.
- Duke boasted 47 All-ACC selections and 34 were All-Region.
- Twenty student-athletes received ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District honors.
- Three Blue Devils were named ACC Player of the Year-- Amanda Blumenherst (women's golf), Matt Danowski (men's lacrosse) and Carrie DeMange (volleyball).
- Amanda Blumenherst claimed her third straight ACC Champion honor in women's golf, while Maddie McKeever was the ACC Champion in women's indoor track & field for the 5000m.
- Three Duke teams earned No. 1 national rankings during the season — women's golf, men's soccer and men's lacrosse -- and five teams finished the season ranked in the top 10





• Four Blue Devils earned ACC Rookie of the Year honors -- Emma Hamm (women's lacrosse), Mike Manley (men's lacrosse), Ellah Nze (women's tennis) and Kyle Singler (men's basketball).

• The Duke wrestling team was announced as the 2007-08 National Wrestling Coaches' Association All-Academic champion for a second straight year. With a cumulative GPA for selected team members of 3.335.

• The women's soccer, men's tennis and men's lacrosse teams received the 2007-08 sportsmanship awards from the ACC.

• The NCAA honored Division I sports teams with public recognition awards for their latest multi-year NCAA Division I Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores that ranked in the top 10 percent of all squads in their respective sports. Duke led all Atlantic Coast Conference institutions with 12 athletic teams achieving the top 10 percentile: Baseball, Men's Basketball, Men's Cross Country, Men's Football, Men's Golf, Men's Soccer, Men's Indoor Track, Men's Outdoor Track, Women's Fencing, Women's Golf, Women's Soccer and Women's Volleyball. Nationally, Duke was one of 15 institutions with at least 12 teams recognized for outstanding achievement and one of only two (Navy) that competes in the Bowl Championship Series in football.

• Four Blue Devils were recipients of postgraduate scholarships given by the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) -- Patrick Bailey (football) and Ali Hausfeld (volleyball) were named recipients of the Weaver-James-Corrigan Award while Jennifer Pandolfi (women's golf) was a recipient of the Weaver-James-Corrigan Honorary Award and Tony McDevitt (men's lacrosse) received the Jim and Pat Thacker Award.

• With a total of 388 student-athletes selected, Duke placed second on the 52nd annual ACC Academic Honor Roll, which notes academic excellence by student-athletes for the 2007-08 school year. The Honor Roll is comprised of those student-athletes who participated in a varsity-level sport and registered a grade point average of 3.0 or better for the full academic year. Duke has led the honor roll in 20 out of the last 21 years.



Noting The 2008-09 Blue Devils...

McCallie Enters Second Campaign...

After securing her "Dream Job" in April of 2007, Joanne P. McCallie guided the Blue Devils to a 25-10 overall record in her first season, while leading Duke to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16, the ACC Championship game and a top 12 national ranking or better in 16 of the 20 weeks in 2007-08.

In her 16 years as a head coach, McCallie has led 12 teams to the NCAA Tournament, registered a 341-158 overall record, notched a 68.3 winning percentage, was the 2005 National Coach of the Year, won five conference championships and collected 12 20-win seasons.

Preseason Rankings...

Duke has been tabbed fifth nationally in the *Athlon* Magazine preseason poll, while also being listed sixth by *Slam* Magazine and seventh by *Lindy's* Magazine.

Experience Returns...

Duke returns four starters and nine letterwinners from last season, while losing seniors Wanisha Smith and Emily Waner.

The Blue Devils return 85.5 percent of their scoring, 91.2 percent of rebounding and 73.7 percent of their assists from last year.

Of the nine returning letterwinners from last year, all saw action in 29 or more games in 2007-08 and seven of them started at least six contests a year ago.

Chante Black, Joy Cheek, Jasmine Thomas, and Abby Waner are the four returning starters, while Carrem Gay, Keturah Jackson, Bridgette Mitchell, Karima Christmas and Krystal Thomas are returning letterwinners.

Fifth-Best Recruiting Class Arrives...

Duke continues to bring in some of the top talent nationally each year and the 2008-09 freshman class is no different. The trio of Chelsea Hopkins, Shay Selby and Kathleen Scheer were tabbed the fifth-best recruiting class nationally.

Listed as high as 13th in the recruiting rankings, Selby averaged 24.3 points, 8.1 rebounds, 7.2 assists and 4.4 steals as a senior. The combo guard from Cleveland, Ohio was a *Parade* Magazine All-America selection and played in the WBCA All-America game.

Hopkins, a point guard out of Las Vegas, Nev., averaged 28.5 points, 7.3 rebounds and 7.9 assists as a senior at Mojave H.S. Ranked as high as 34th nationally, Hopkins led the state of Nevada in scoring as a junior and senior.

Scheer, who is from New Haven, Mo., averaged 28.2 points, 12.9 rebounds, 5.2 blocks, 3.2 assists

and 2.0 steals as a senior. She collected 23 double-doubles and one triple-double in her final year, while earning Four Rivers Conference Player of the Year three times.

Tri-Captains...

Duke will feature tri-captains in 2008-09 with Chante Black, Carrem Gay and Abby Waner expecting to provide key leadership for the Blue Devils this season.

The trio have played in a combined 298 games, made 175 starts, led Duke to three NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 appearances -- including the National Championship game in 2006, guided the Blue Devils to a total of 88 wins and led their team to 45 weeks ranked in the top 10 nationally over the last three years.

The Record Book...

In the Duke career charts, both Chante Black and Abby Waner are making their way up the top 10 lists in a number of various categories.

Black ranks fifth in rebound average (7.0), third in blocked shots (192), 10th in field goal percentage (52.9) and her 717 rebounds is nine away from moving into a tie for 10th place. In the ACC career charts, Black's 192 blocked shots are 12th.

Waner enters the season fourth in three point field goals made (167), first in three-point field goals attempted (507) and fifth in steals (230). Her 507 three-point field goals attempted ranks 22nd on the ACC career list, while her 167 three-pointers made are four away from 25th on the list.

Black Returns For Fifth Year...

Chante Black returns to the Blue Devil program for her fifth year in 2008-09, after receiving a Bachelor of Arts degree in biological anthropology & anatomy and women's studies in May of 2008.

She will be obtaining a Bachelor of Science in

biological anthropology & anatomy in 2008-09.

Black, a native of Winston-Salem, N.C., was one of the most improved players in the nation last year as she came back from redshirting the 2006-07 season.

As a junior, she started all 35 contests, while earning Associated Press Honorable Mention All-America honors and was named to the John R. Wooden Award top 20 and Naismith top 30 lists for National Player of the Year.

Black averaged 14.1 points, 7.1 rebounds, 2.3 blocks, 1.4 steals and 1.4 assists last year.

Thomas Has Offseason Surgery...

Sophomore Krystal Thomas underwent successful surgery on her left knee on April 4, 2008 at the Duke Ambulatory Surgery Center by Dr. Alison Toth. Thomas is progressing well and is expected to be at full strength when practice begins in October.

Native of Orlando, Fla., Thomas injured her knee in the Nov. 28, 2007 contest at Vanderbilt and went on to miss the next five contests. Thomas played in a total of 30 games last season, averaging 4.3 points, 3.5 rebounds and 1.2 blocks, while hitting 46.4 percent of her field goals. Her 35 blocked shots ranks fifth on the single season freshman charts at Duke.

In just her third collegiate game, Thomas registered 20 points and 10 rebounds against UNC Greensboro, while notching three steals and two blocks in only 20 minutes of action. For her efforts, the 6-4 center was named ACC Rookie of the Week.

Challenging Schedule Awaits...

Duke will once again face a very challenging schedule in 2008-09 as the slate is made up of 13 teams that advanced to the 2008 NCAA Tournament, including four that were either No. 1 or 2 seeds -- Tennessee, North Carolina, Maryland and Stanford.

Duke is also slated to have 12 television games, not including the postseason. The Blue Devils will

appear on national television on six occasions, and locally an additional six. The regional games will be aired on Fox Sports Net (FSN) South and Fox Sports Net West. Duke will play nationally on ESPN2 four times, on Fox Sports Net twice and on ESPN once.

In addition to tough conference competition, the Blue Devils' schedule is highlighted by two teams that fought for a national championship a season ago, with Duke hosting Stanford in a marquee match-up at Cameron Indoor Stadium Dec. 16, then traveling to take on the reigning champion Tennessee Lady Vols in Knoxville Feb. 16.

Other non-conference opponents include Oklahoma State, Maine, Hartford, DePaul or Southern, Western Kentucky, Iowa, Michigan, Southern California, Siena, Quinnipiac, Providence and Temple.

Stellar In The Classroom...

The women's basketball program had a stellar year in the classroom in 2007-08 as seven of the 12 members of the team posted 3.0 grade-point averages or better. The senior class of **Chante Black**, **Carrem Gay** and **Abby Waner** compiled a combined 3.34 grade-point average last year.

Summer Work...

Several Blue Devils held very interesting jobs over the summer of 2008. **Chante Black** volunteered at a hospital in Hartford, Conn., between the Emergency Department and the St. Francis Foundation Office.

Carrem Gay participated in DukeEngage, which is a new program that allows students to travel the world to participate in internships that advocate social change. She chose to apply for the Durham part of it so she could be around campus, work out and be around her teammates.

Abby Waner worked at ESPN for the summer as an intern in Studio Production. She watched games, while keeping track of what happened, picked the best video or story for the highlight, wrote the script and gave it to the talent for the show.

The junior class of **Keturah Jackson**, **Joy Cheek** and **Bridgette Mitchell** all stayed around campus to help work camps, attend summer school and worked extremely hard to get better on the court and in the weight room.

Karima Christmas also stayed around Duke attending classes and working out, while **Krystal Thomas** and **Jasmine Thomas** each went home for the first session.

The freshmen trio of **Kathleen Scheer**, **Shay Selby** and **Chelsea Hopkins** each attended the second session of summer school to get adjusted to college life.

Brickey & Smoak Added To Staff...

Duke Head Coach **Joanne P. McCallie** has brought in **Robert Brickey** and **Sarah Smoak** to the women's basketball staff. Brickey joins the Blue Devils as the Assistant Director of Basketball Operations, while Smoak will serve an internship in 2008-09.

Brickey rejoins the Blue Devil family after a three-year stint as the Head Men's Basketball Coach at Shaw University. He will coordinate off-campus camps, on-campus recruiting and various marketing efforts. A 2006 Lynchburg College graduate, Smoak will assist in the day-to-day operations of the program, co-direct the ball kids club, aid with in-office recruiting efforts, assist with game operations, community service projects and outreach efforts as well as internal university events at Duke.

Joanne P. McCallie

Head Coach

2nd Season At Duke • Northwestern, '87

There was no better fit for the helm of the Duke University Women's Basketball program than head coach Joanne P. McCallie. After elevating Michigan State to one of the nation's elite programs, Joanne P. McCallie was formally introduced as the Head Women's Basketball Coach at Duke University on April 20, 2007 in Cameron Indoor Stadium.

She became the fourth head coach in Blue Devil history.

In her first season with the Blue Devils in 2007-08, McCallie led Duke to its 10th straight 25-win season with an appearance in the ACC Championship game and a trip to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 in Oklahoma City. The trip to the NCAA Tournament marked the 11th straight appearance in the regional semifinals for the program, which received its 14th straight and 15th overall tournament bid. McCallie coached Duke's 11th player drafted to the WNBA, Wanisha Smith was selected in the second round (27th overall) by the New York Liberty.

While leading Michigan State to a nationally elite level, McCallie, the 2005 Associated Press Coach Of the Year, guided the Spartans to their first ever NCAA Final Four and National Championship game appearance as well as their first ever NCAA Elite Eight and repeat Sweet Sixteen appearances, the programs second Big Ten Regular Season title and first ever Big Ten Tournament Championship in 2005. Under McCallie the program collected four consecutive 20-win seasons and a 81-23 record over her last three years in East Lansing.

Known for raising attendance throughout her career, McCallie made a statement early at Duke as the Blue Devils registered a school-record by averaging 6,764 fans in 13 home contests last year. Duke landed three sellout crowds in her first season against Tennessee, North Carolina and Maryland. The Blue Devils also ranked 10th nationally in average attendance during McCallie's first season.

Under McCallie, Michigan State saw its fan base increase dramatically as well, including a rise of 78% since her arrival. The team set season attendance records in four out of her last five seasons, including a school-record average of 6,787 fans in 2005-06, which ranked 10th in the nation. The Spartans were second in the Big Ten in McCallie's final season with an average of 6,646 a game and ninth in the NCAA.

At the time of McCallie's departure from MSU, all of the Spartan top 15 single-game crowds in program history came during Coach P's tenure, including a school-record 14,066 against Ohio State in a nationally televised game on Feb. 20, 2005. Prior to her arrival at MSU, the women's basketball program averaged only 1,506 fans per game in 1999-2000.

Coach P is a very active community spokesperson. McCallie has already made her presence felt in the Durham and neighboring communities as well as on campus in just a year at Duke. She has been the key note speaker for the Durham Sports Club, Durham Chamber of Commerce - Professional Women's Network, the Duke Club of Washington, D.C., Special Olympics, N.C. High School Coaches Association, Hospice, the Hays Barton United Methodist Church and the Raleigh Sports Club. She participated in the Duke Children's Hospital Radiothon as well as being a spokeswoman for Duke Women's Health. McCallie also participated in the inaugural 4Kay Golf Classic in Dallas, Texas on Sept. 8, 2008 to raise money for breast cancer research. Being a huge advocate for youth development, McCallie and the Duke Women's Basketball team have developed a relationship with a

local non profit organization, The Emily K Center, by participating in after school leadership programs.

During her first season, McCallie kicked off two initiatives within the Durham community. She created the "Choice Not Chance" kids club whose philosophy focuses on making the correct choices in life. The philosophy is widely used by McCallie, her staff and players, who are very active in the community speaking about "CNC." In its inaugural year the program received membership of over 100 children who are entering the eighth grade or under.

The second was the first ever coaches show for women's basketball at Duke, which was featured on 620 AM The Bull and hosted by Morgan Patrick. Among airing weekly, the show was performed live once a month at Satisfactions Restaurant, which featured standing room only attendance. During the broadcast of the show the fans had the opportunity to ask Coach P about upcoming games and events with in Duke Women's Basketball.

McCallie's community service while at Michigan State included working with the Big Brothers and Big Sisters "Jump" program and serving as the honorary chair of their annual golf outing; serving as the

Honorary Chair for the Haven House — a shelter for homeless families in East Lansing, Mich.; serving as the Honorary Chair for the 2001 Crop Walk and the 2001-04 Memory Walks for Alzheimer's; serving on the Board of Directors of the Governor's Council on Physical Fitness and Women Working Wonders; and holding the Joanne P. McCallie Golf Challenge, which benefited children and adolescents with cancer.

McCallie was also an Honorary Chair for the MSU/Mid-Michigan Children's Initiative. She was a driving force behind the creation of MMCI, an MSU initiative designed to form partnerships within the Lansing area to benefit the health and well-being of children, focusing on research, education and clinical care.

During McCallie's seven seasons as head coach at MSU, she led the Spartans to a 149-75 mark. She led Michigan State to five straight NCAA Tournament appearances, four straight 20-win seasons and a spot in the NCAA Championship game in 2005. She molded Michigan State basketball into one of the elite programs in the nation with an 81-23 record over her last three years in East Lansing.

Over the summer of 2006, McCallie guided the USA Basketball U-20 team to a 5-0 record and a gold medal in the FIBA Americas Championships in Mexico City. The squad outscored its opponents by 62 points per game and set 28 U-20 records in the event. McCallie also coached the FIBA U-21 World Championship team in Moscow, Russia from June 29 - July 8, 2007, where she led the USA squad to an 8-0 record and won the gold medal. Her team of college stars, including Blue Devil senior Abby Waner, registered a 30.0 average margin of victory during the championship.

In 2005-06, McCallie led the Spartans to their third straight 20-win campaign - a program first - with a 24-10 overall record. MSU finished in a tie for third in the conference standings at 11-5, McCallie's second-best league finish at MSU, and advanced to the semifinals of the Big Ten Tournament for the third consecutive year.

The 24 victories in 2005-06 were the second most in a single season in school history. All of this was done while playing arguably the toughest schedule in school history, as MSU matched up against 11 NCAA Tournament teams and six teams ranked in the top 10. The Spartans posted victories over No. 16 Oklahoma and No. 8 Rutgers, who went on to be No. 2 and No. 3 seeds, respectively, in the NCAA Tournament. The Spartans were ranked in the top 20 all season, peaking at No. 9.

March is when it matters most, and McCallie guided MSU to its school-record fourth straight appearance in the NCAA Tournament and second straight berth in the Sweet 16 in 2005-06. The Spartans, a No. 4 seed, defeated 13th-seeded Wisconsin-Milwaukee in the first round and fifth-seeded Kentucky in the second round to earn a spot in the Bridgeport Regional. McCallie finished with a 9-5 record in NCAA Tournament games at MSU, including an 8-3 record the past three years.

After guiding MSU to back-to-back NCAA Tournaments and upper-division Big Ten finishes in the previous two seasons, McCallie led Michigan State to a banner year in 2004-05. Michigan State advanced to its first National Championship game, won a school-record 33 games (10 more than the previous record), won a school-record 14 Big Ten games and shared just its second Big Ten regular-season championship, won its first Big Ten Tournament title, finished 13-0 at home, had a school-record 17-game winning streak, and beat 13 nationally-ranked teams – including four teams ranked No. 1, No. 2 or No. 3 in the nation, including third-ranked Notre Dame, top-ranked Stanford, third-ranked Tennessee, 11th-ranked Connecticut, 11th and 12th-ranked Minnesota (twice), second-ranked Ohio State, 17th-ranked Boston College, 18th-ranked Vanderbilt, 18th-ranked Iowa, 23rd-ranked Penn State and 24th-ranked Purdue.

For her efforts, McCallie was named National Coach of the Year by the Associated Press, *Basketball Times*, and Nike, as well as being voted Big Ten Coach of the Year by the league's media members. It marked the first time an MSU women's basketball coach was named national coach of the year and the second time a Spartan head coach earned the conference's coach of the year award. McCallie was also named the 2005 Basketball Coaches Association of Michigan College Coach of the Year.

The 2004-05 Spartans burst onto the national scene with non-conference victories at No. 3 Notre Dame and at No. 11 UConn, and never slowed down en route to a 33-4 overall record. MSU moved into position for a Big Ten title with a 66-64 victory over No. 2 Ohio State in a nationally-televised game in front of a school-record crowd of 14,066.

After earning the program's first No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament, the Spartans marched to the Final

So What Does The P Stand For?

Those who have not known Joanne P. McCallie long may wonder why her players and those who know her well call her "Coach P." The "P" stands for Palombo, her maiden name. McCallie is proud of her Italian heritage, and early in her career found many similarities between herself and coaching legend Jim Valvano. She reasoned that if there could be a "Jimmy V", why not a "Joanne P?" Therefore, during her years as Joanne Palombo, she became known as "Coach P", and after her marriage to John McCallie, she decided to keep the "P" as a middle initial. But old habits die hard, so players, coaches, staff members and friends continue to refer to her simply as "Coach P."

Four, beating No. 1-ranked Stanford 76-69 in the Kansas City Regional Final. In Indianapolis at the Final Four, MSU staged an amazing second-half rally against No. 3 Tennessee, tying a Final Four record by overcoming a 16-point deficit during a 68-64 victory that propelled MSU into the title game.

In 2003-04, McCallie guided MSU to its first 20-win season since 1996-97 and just the fifth in school history. The Spartans, who finished 22-9 overall, advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament after a 72-60 win over Arizona in the opening round. MSU won 10 road games and six conference road games for the first time in school history, while also being nationally ranked for the first time since the 1996-97 year. The Spartans climbed as high as 15th in the ESPN/USA Today coaches poll, marking MSU's highest-ever national ranking at the time. The 22 wins tied for the second most in a single season for MSU.

Michigan State recorded a 10-6 mark in the Big Ten that season, tying for fourth in the conference for a second straight year, and marking the first time in MSU history that the Spartans recorded double-digit wins in the Big Ten for two consecutive seasons.

During the 2002-03 season, McCallie guided a depleted MSU squad to a 17-12 overall record and its first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1997, as the Spartans earned a No. 8 seed in the East Regional. Despite numerous injuries that left MSU with a core of just six players getting nearly all of the minutes, she led Michigan State to its best Big Ten finish since 1997, as MSU tied for fourth in the league with a 10-6 record. The Spartans improved by four wins over the previous season's Big Ten win total – more than any other team in the conference.

Michigan State closed the 2001-02 year with a 19-13 record, and advanced to the semifinals of the Women's National Invitation Tournament for the first time in school history. The 2001-02 season saw MSU increase its win total from the previous season by nine victories, and included wins against three nationally-ranked opponents.

A native of Brunswick, Maine, McCallie owns a career mark of 341-158 during her 16-year stint as a head coach at Maine, Michigan State and Duke. As a coach and player, she has led her teams to 13 conference titles, 17 NCAA Tournament appearances, six NCAA Sweet 16 appearances, four NCAA Elite Eight appearances, three NCAA Final Four appearances and three NCAA Championship

game appearances.

During her eight-year career at Maine, McCallie guided the Black Bears to seven straight 20-win campaigns, including a 20-11 overall record in 1999-2000 and their sixth-straight NCAA Tournament appearance. She was named coach of the year on three occasions, twice in the North Atlantic Conference (1995 and 1996) and once in the America East (1999).

Prior to becoming head coach at Maine in 1992-93, McCallie was an assistant coach at Auburn from 1988-92. As the team's primary recruiter, she helped sign the fourth-ranked class in the nation in 1990-91 and the 16th-ranked class in the nation in 1991-92. While at Auburn, McCallie and the Tigers appeared in two national championship games and made an appearance in the NCAA Elite Eight.

The former Joanne Palombo, prior to getting married to John McCallie, played her collegiate basketball at Northwestern from 1984-87. She still ranks seventh in Wildcat history with 378 career assists. As a senior, she was an All-Big Ten honorable mention selection and helped lead the Wildcats to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. McCallie also was named Academic All-Big Ten First-Team as a senior.

McCallie graduated from Northwestern in 1987 with a degree in political science and earned a master's degree in business administration from Auburn in 1990.

While at Maine, McCallie organized an event called "Realizing the Dream; Celebrating Women in Athletics" that featured speakers Dr. Donna Lopiano and Sheryl Swoopes. During the 1997-98 season, Dana Rae Warren filmed a documentary of the Maine women's basketball season. McCallie was inducted into the New England Basketball Hall of Fame in 2004.

McCallie was named a conference captain by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association in 2002. In October of 2005, McCallie was inducted in the Maine Sports Legends Hall of Honors for her outstanding coaching efforts.

The McCallie family includes husband John, daughter Madeline (Maddie - 14) and son John Wyatt (Jack - 8). The family resides in Durham, N.C.




THE McCALLIE FAMILY

The McCallie family not only emphasizes education to the young women on the Duke team, but their own accomplishments further demonstrate their commitment to academics. Head coach Joanne P. McCallie holds a bachelor's degree in political science from Northwestern and a master's degree from Auburn in business administration.

John McCallie, Ph.D, Joanne's husband, was an Economics professor at MSU. But it should come as no surprise that the McCallies are well-educated, as the name McCallie has long been synonymous with the word "education." The McCallie School (pictured to the right) is a college preparatory school for boys located on Missionary Ridge near Chattanooga, Tenn. It was founded in 1905 by Spencer Jarnagin McCallie and James Park McCallie, the grandfather and great-uncle, respectively, of John McCallie.

The McCallie School accepts young men with above average to exceptional academic abilities, and those students matriculate at some of the best colleges and universities in the nation. In recent years, the school has been recognized for its innovative educational programs and its overall standards of excellence. Recently, the *Atlanta Journal/Constitution* called McCallie "one of the leading secondary educational institutions in the United States."

In addition, John McCallie's great-aunt, Grace McCallie, was one of three founders of the Girls Preparatory School in 1906, also in Chattanooga. The school prepares girls for college through academic training, and instills in them high principles of honesty, integrity and consideration for others.

Al Brown

Assistant Coach
2nd Season At Duke • Purdue, '64

Al Brown enters his fifth season alongside Joanne P. McCallie and second on the Duke University staff after being hired on May 2, 2007. Since arriving in the coaching world 30 years ago, Brown has produced numerous winning teams and is thought of as having one of the best basketball minds in the game today.

He has been a part of three NCAA Championships, four NCAA runner-up teams, eight NCAA Final Four squads and 17 NCAA Tournaments. He has coached men's and women's basketball at 11 different schools including Purdue, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Western Michigan, Ball State, South Carolina, Tennessee, Cleveland State, Michigan State, and Duke since taking his first assistant coaching position at Purdue in 1967.

His record in women's basketball speaks for itself as his squads have won 80.0 percent of their games, advanced to the NCAA Tournament in 12 of the 14 years, and won three NCAA titles. Brown has led three teams to the NCAA Championship game a total of seven times and won 79.0 percent of league contests.

Brown is known for his video breakdowns and opponent analysis, as well as his on-court teaching expertise, which has proven to be a valuable contribution to the success of every basketball team he has ever coached. He was recognized for his coaching expertise when he was named one of the top assistant coaches in the country in a poll conducted by Women's Basketball Journal.

He has had an interesting and unique career as he is the only coach in the history of intercollegiate athletics to have played an active role in national championship games in three different sports, including five appearances as a coach in the NCAA Women's Basketball Championship game. Brown is also the only coach to coach men's and women's basketball in the Southeastern Conference and the Big Ten Conference at two different schools in each conference. Also, he is the only coach in college basketball history to coach in the men's (1969, Purdue vs. UCLA) and women's national championship game (Tennessee, 1996-98, 2000; Michigan State, 2005).

Brown has 12 years of college coaching experience in the women's game and 16 years in the men's game. On the men's side, he has coached five teams at two schools in the NCAA Tournament, advancing to the Sweet 16 three times, the Elite Eight twice and the final game once.

Brown was the motivational speaker for the Tennessee football team throughout the 1998 season. Coach Phillip Fulmer, the head coach at Tennessee, asked him to speak to the team in Tempe, Ariz., before the Fiesta Bowl National Championship game. Brown was on the field in the coaching box during the Vols' victory over Florida State in the title game.

During his seven years in the women's program at Tennessee (1995-2002), the Lady Vols went to the NCAA Final Four five times, playing in the national title game four times, and won three national championships in a

row (1996-98), which is an NCAA record. Over that seven-year period, the Lady Vols went 224-29, good for a winning percentage of 89 percent. He was a part of five consecutive Southeastern Conference championship teams, during which time Tennessee posted a league record of 67-3.

During his first year at Michigan State, the Spartans won the Big Ten regular season and tournament championships, went to the NCAA Championship game for the first time in school history, and won a school-record 33 games. Overall, during his three years at Michigan State the squad produced an 81-23 record and advanced to the NCAA Tournament each of those three years. In the Big 10, the Spartans notched a 38-10 mark and finished no lower than third each year.

A 1964 graduate of Purdue, Brown was a three-year letterwinner on the Boilermaker basketball team before making the switch to the coaching ranks as an assistant coach with his alma mater in 1967. Brown served three seasons at Purdue before moving to Ball State where he was an assistant for five seasons (1977-1982).

He then spent five years (1982-87) as the head coach at Ball State. His 1986 Cardinal team had a record-setting year, posting 21 wins en route to the Mid-American Conference tournament championship and the school's second berth in the NCAA Tournament. The first time Ball State advanced to the NCAA Tournament was when Coach Brown was an assistant.

After spending the 1987-88 season assisting at Western Michigan, Brown served on the staff at Minnesota for three years (1988-1991), where the Gophers advanced to two NCAA Sweet 16's and one NCAA Elite Eight, before moving on to the men's program at Tennessee for the 1991-92 and 1992-93 seasons.

Coach Brown has recruited and coached some outstanding players. The first Walter Byers Scholarship winner and the 1984 Naismith Award winner, an award given to the best player in the nation under six feet, were two of Brown's recruits. He has coached 10 NBA players and 11 women who are playing in the WNBA, plus numerous players who have played overseas.

Brown and his wife, Karen, have one son, Edwin. Edwin and his wife, Erica, reside in Hopkinton, Mass., with their son, Simon.



“Al is an excellent teacher of the fundamentals of the game and I think he is the best post coach in the country. I would put him up against anybody and I think he is a terrific coach overall. What makes him special is his ability to develop players, to really nurture and work with those players. He mainly does player development and scouting for us, while dabbling in some recruiting when necessary. He has experience with a lot of different kinds of players and I like the diversity of somebody who has been on both the men’s and women’s side of the game.”





of the NCAA Tournament. Williams worked with perimeter players and was also in charge of the strength and conditioning program.

Following her four-year collegiate career, she played for the San Jose Lasers of the American Basketball League in 1996-97. The Louisville, Ky., native attended Manual High School and was a first team *Parade* and *Street and Smith's* All-America. She was also named to *USA Today's* Super 25.

Kevin White

Vice President & Director of Athletics
1st Season At Duke • St. Joseph's College, '72



Kevin White was named the seventh director of athletics in Duke University history on May 30, 2008, when he was also appointed as a vice president of the university by President Dr. Richard H. Brodhead.

White previously served as director of athletics at the University of Notre Dame since 2000. During White's eight years at Notre Dame, the Irish claimed four national championships — women's basketball (2001); fencing (2003 and 2005) and women's soccer (2004).

White led Notre Dame's athletics program to success both on the playing fields and in the classroom. He also has held a number of prominent national leadership roles within intercollegiate athletics, including his service in 2006-07 as president of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and in 2005-06 as president of the Division I-A Athletic Directors Association.

On the academic front, all of Notre Dame's 26 athletic programs achieved at least a 3.0 grade-point average in 2005-06, the first time this occurred in school history. The university received a 2002 *USA Today*/NCAA Academic Achievement Award for graduating 90 percent of its student-athletes within a certain time frame, and also received the 2003 award for highest overall student-athlete graduation rate (92 percent).

White added a number of varsity scholarships and commissioned a facilities master plan that guided Notre Dame's subsequent upgrading or opening of several athletics facilities. He also administered a comprehensive intramural, club sport and campus

recreation program, with 95 percent of the student body participating. *Sports Illustrated* On Campus rated the Irish intramural program tops in the nation in 2004.

White, who holds a Ph.D. in education, has taught graduate-level classes since 1982 and taught a sports business course in the management department of the Mendoza College of Business as part of Notre Dame's MBA program.

In August 2003, SI.com (the *Sports Illustrated* web site) listed White third in its rankings of the most powerful people in college football. In January 2004, *The Sporting News* listed him in its Power 100 as third among five names in the "front office" category (and the lone college athletics director among the 100).

White currently is a representative with the football Bowl Championship Series. He previously served on numerous NCAA committees, including the NCAA Coalition on Intercollegiate Athletics (COIA) that deals with academics, fiscal reform and student-athlete well-being. He also was an ex-officio member of the NCAA Committee on Academic Performance and a member of its Penalty and Rewards subcommittee.

Prior to joining Notre Dame in 2000, White served as athletic director at Arizona State University, Tulane University, the University of Maine and Loras College in Iowa, where he originated the National Catholic Basketball Tournament.

Before becoming an administrator, White served as head track and field coach at Southeast Missouri State (1981-82) and assistant cross country and track and field coach at Central Michigan (1976-80). He began his coaching career at Gulf High School in New Port Richey, Fla., coaching cross country and track and assisting in football and wrestling.

White earned his Ph.D. from Southern Illinois University in 1983 with an emphasis on higher education administration. In 1985, he completed postdoctoral work at Harvard University's Institute for Educational Management. He earned his master's degree in athletics administration from Central Michigan University in 1976 and his bachelor's degree in business administration in 1972 from St. Joseph's College in Rensselaer, Ind., where he also competed as a sprinter.


White and his wife, Jane, a former college track and field coach, have five children.

Retired Jerseys

On Jan. 24, 2004, Alana Beard became the first women's basketball player at Duke to have her jersey retired. The number 20 will hang from the rafters in Cameron Indoor Stadium and won't be worn again by a Blue Devil.


A sellout crowd of 9,314 packed Cameron Indoor Stadium to view the ceremony in a contest versus Tennessee. Beard, a native of Shreveport, La., joined the 11 men's basketball players who have had their jersey retired.

In attendance along with Alana were her parents LeRoy and Marie Beard.

Over her career, Beard was the 2002-03 and 2003-04 National Player of the Year, was a three-time ACC Player of the Year, three-time Kodak All-America, three-time Associated Press All-America, four-time All-ACC Defensive selection and we could go on and on...

Beard left Duke scoring an amazing 2,687 points, which is more than any women's player in Duke history. For her career, Beard registered averages of 19.8 points, 5.8 rebounds, 3.7 assists, 3.0 steals and hit 52.7 percent of her field goals.

Over the four years, she was selected ACC Player of the Week an ACC-record 18 times, which is 11 more than any other player in the 29-year history of the ACC. Beard was also the first player in ACC history to be named ACC Player of the Year for three straight years.





"When I first got here, no woman had had their jersey retired. I didn't come in and say, I'm going to go to Duke and get my jersey retired. I had different goals and never thought about it until my senior season with all these awards and all this talk. This is the biggest accomplishment I've ever had. Graduating was huge, of course, but this will be here forever. When Alana left and I looked up there and saw the jersey, it was a bit of an inspiration knowing that she changed history. I would love it if another player comes through and says, Alana Beard did this, Lindsey Harding did this - two different players, but both found a way to impact this program - and provide inspiration to future Duke players. It's a pretty cool feeling and it's definitely an honor."

When Lindsey Harding arrived at Duke, no Blue Devil had ever had the honor of a retired jersey. She went on to watch Alana Beard's jersey be hung in the rafters in 2004 and wanted to have hers next to Beard's one day.

This dream became a reality on Jan. 20, 2008, as Harding's jersey was raised among the other great Duke Basketball players at halftime of the N.C. State game.

In attendance along with Harding was her father, Michael Harding, her mom Lillian Andrews and her step mom Carlotta Harding.

Over her career, Harding scored 1,298 points, posted a school-record 579 assists, 565 rebounds and 261 steals.

Harding became only the second Duke player (Alana Beard) and sixth ACC player in league history to notch over 1,000 points, 500 assists, 500 rebounds and 250 steals over their career.

As a senior, Harding earned the Naismith Award and ESPN.com National Player of the Year, while also taking home the inaugural Defensive Player of the Year award from the WBCA.

A first team All-America as a senior, Harding also won the Nancy Lieberman Award as the nation's top point guard, won the ACC Player of the Year, ACC Defensive Player of the Year and earned the Frances Pomeroy Naismith Award.



Lindsey Harding (1st) and Alison Bales (9th) were taken in the top nine picks of the 2007 WNBA Draft. Harding was selected No. 1 by the Phoenix Mercury before being traded to the Minnesota Lynx. Bales was taken by the Indiana Fever.

Duke has been a springboard for student-athletes going from Durham to the professional ranks after graduation. From playing overseas, in the American Basketball League (ABL) and the Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA), the Blue Devils have been well-represented.

Kira Orr was the first Duke player to be drafted professionally in the ABL in 1997 by the Seattle Reign in the fourth round, while Michele Van Gorp was the second player from the class of 1999 selected in the 1999 WNBA draft. Van Gorp was picked in the second round with the 18th overall pick by the New York Liberty.

In 2000, Peppi Browne was drafted by the Charlotte Sting in the WNBA with the 43rd overall pick in the third round. Due to a knee injury she never played for the Sting.

For the third consecutive year, Duke had a player picked in the 2001 WNBA draft as Georgia Schweitzer was selected in the second round by the Miami Sol with the 21st overall selection. Schweitzer was then traded to the Minnesota Lynx where she played in 70 games in three years.

In the 2004 WNBA Draft, Duke was represented in the first round with two players being picked-- Alana Beard second by the Washington Mystics and Iciss Tillis 11th by the Detroit Shock. Beard became the highest player drafted from the Atlantic Coast Conference and Duke was the only school to have two players drafted in the first round.

Beard has gone on to be named to the WNBA All-Star team three straight years.

Monique Currie was selected third in 2006 by the Charlotte Sting, Mistie Williams was 21st by the Phoenix Mercury before being traded to the Houston Comets, while Jessica Foley was picked 38th by Indiana.

Currie came out in 2006 and was named to the WNBA's All-Rookie Team, after averaging 10.5 points and 3.9 rebounds for the Charlotte Sting. Currie was traded in 2007 to her hometown team -- Washington Mystics.

In 2007, Lindsey Harding became the ACC's first No. 1 pick in the WNBA Draft as she was selected by the Phoenix Mercury, before being traded to the Minnesota Lynx. Harding



Also in 2007, Alison Bales was picked ninth by the Indiana Fever and ended up playing in 17 contests. The Fever advanced to the semifinals of the WNBA playoffs. Bales was traded to the Atlanta Dream midway through the 2008 campaign.

Last year, Wanisha Smith was taken with 13th pick the second round and 27th overall by the New York Liberty.




Former Duke three-time All-America Alana Beard (above) is currently in the pool of players who are selected to represent the USA Women's Basketball Senior National Team.

Beard started eight of 11 contests in the 2006 spring training session and led USA to a 10-1 mark. She led the squad with 25 steals and 25 assists as she played the second-most minutes on the team.

In the 2006 Opals World Challenge, Beard started all five games as the USA squad posted a 4-1 record and finished in first place. She averaged 8.6 points, 4.0 rebounds, 2.2 assists and 1.9 steals in the challenge.

She also played in the 2007 Tour of Italy and averaged 8.0 points in two contests before being injured.

In 2007, Foley played in the World University games and led the squad to a gold medal, while averaging a team-best 16.6 points.

Over the summer of 2005, Foley was selected to play for the World University Games team and the 'Price Attack' Opals squad, but was unable to participate due to an injury.



The Blue Devils have been a mainstay with USA Basketball over the years. In this decade, Duke has registered 20 representatives on USA Basketball squads as players and coaches, the most of any team in the nation.

In 2007 a total of four Blue Devils earned gold medals, tied for the most of any team in the nation (Tennessee).



Both Jasmine Thomas and Krystal Thomas played on the 2007 U-19 World Championship team that traveled to Bratislava, Slovakia. The squad posted a 9-0 record and won the gold.

Jasmine Thomas averaged 7.4 points, 4.1 rebounds, 3.0 assists, 1.0 steals and hit a team-best 44.0 percent from three-point range. She started all nine games and in the World Championship statistics, her 3.0 assists ranked eighth and 44.0 three-point field goal percentage was sixth.

Krystal Thomas averaged 7.8 points, 7.4 rebounds and hit 60.4 percent of her field goals. She started one of nine games and registered two double-doubles. Her 60.4 field goal percentage ranked second in the World Championship.

NCAA Tournament Tidbits...

• *The Basics...*Duke has made 14 consecutive and 15 overall trips to the NCAA Tournament. The Blue Devils made their first appearance in 1987 and since 1995 have advanced to the "Big Dance" each year. Duke now owns an all-time record of 39-15 in NCAA Tournament play and is 40-16 in all postseason action, including the NCAA & WNIT. The Blue Devils have hosted NCAA Tournament games eight times out of 15 appearances.

• *The History...*Each time Duke has been in the NCAA Tournament, it has won at least one game. The Blue Devils have advanced to at least the Sweet 16 the past 11 consecutive years, advanced to the Elite Eight in eight of the last 12 years and to the Final Four three out of the last seven seasons. Duke advanced to the Elite Eight in 1998, the National Championship game in 1999, the NCAA Final Four in 2002 and 2003, the Elite Eight in 2004 and 2005 and the National Championship game in 2006. The Blue Devils own a 33-10 record in their last 43 NCAA Tournament games.

• *The Seedings...*The last 13 seasons, Duke has been no lower than a No. 5 seed. From 2001 through 2004 and in 2006 and 2007, Duke was a No. 1 seed. The Blue Devils were a No. 2 seed in 1998, 2000 and 2005. Duke is coming off being seeded No. 3 in 2008.






Post-Game Policies



ACC Tournament Building History

In the past 31 years of the ACC Women's Basketball Tournament, there have been eight different sites. The inaugural tournament was held in 1978 at University Hall on the campus of the University of Virginia in Charlottesville. The Tournament then moved to Reynolds Coliseum in Raleigh, N.C., in 1979, hosted by North Carolina State University. The University of Maryland's Cole Field House in College Park was the site of the 1980 Tournament, while Clemson University's Littlejohn Coliseum, was home to the 1981 event. It returned to Reynolds Coliseum in 1982.

The Conference Tournament remained in North Carolina from 1983 to 1991, hosted by Fayetteville's Cumberland County Memorial Arena. The Tournament then moved to Winthrop Coliseum in Rock Hill, S.C., for a four-year span (1992-96), until the 1997 Tournament moved to Independence Arena in Charlotte, N.C., which hosted the event for three years. Over the last nine years, the ACC Women's Basketball Tournament was held in the Greensboro Coliseum, which will also serve as its home through the 2010 Tournament.


