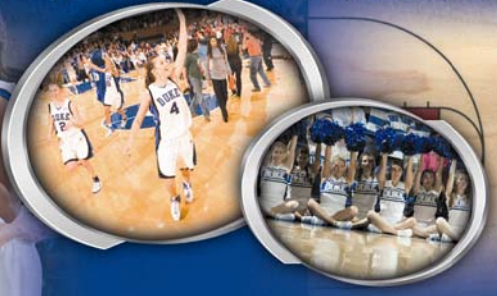
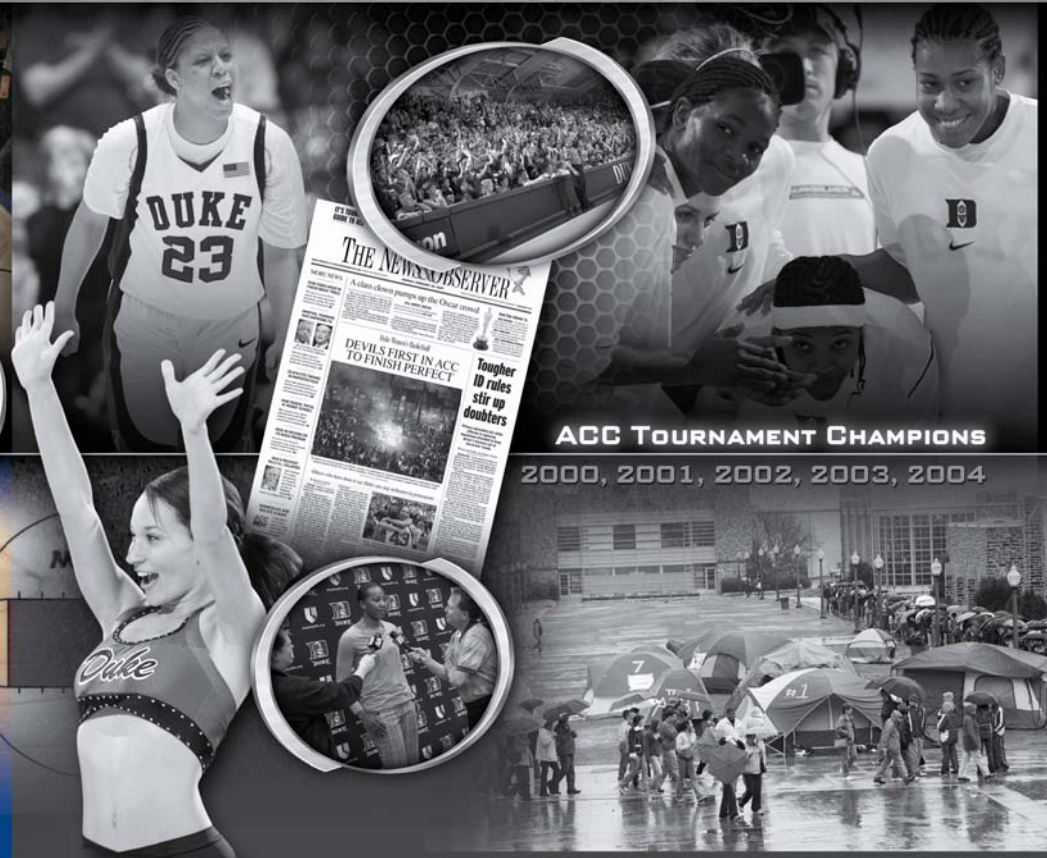
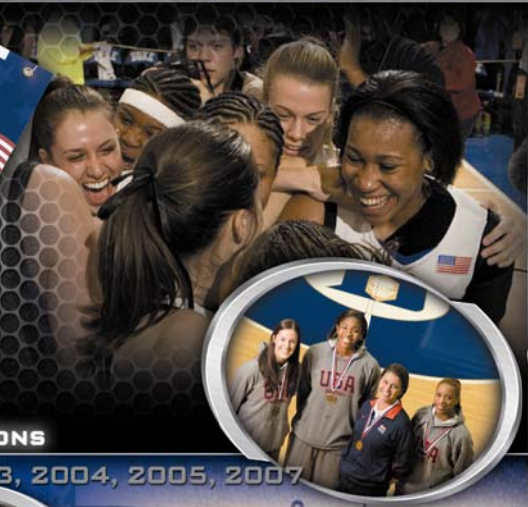

Blue Devil Coaches Win Gold In 2007

The Duke University Men's and Women's Basketball Head Coaches each led their respective USA Basketball squads to gold medals over the summer of 2007.

Joanne P. McCallie was the head coach of the U21 World Championship Team as she led the squad to an 8-0 record and the gold medal in Moscow, Russia. Mike Krzyzewski was the head coach of the USA Basketball Senior National Team. He led the USA Team to a 10-0 record and the gold medal at the FIBA Americas Championship in Las Vegas, Nev.

With both McCallie and Krzyzewski winning USA gold medals in the same year, they became just the second coaching tandem to accomplish the feat (Stanford, '96).



Duke Foursome Wins Gold In 2007

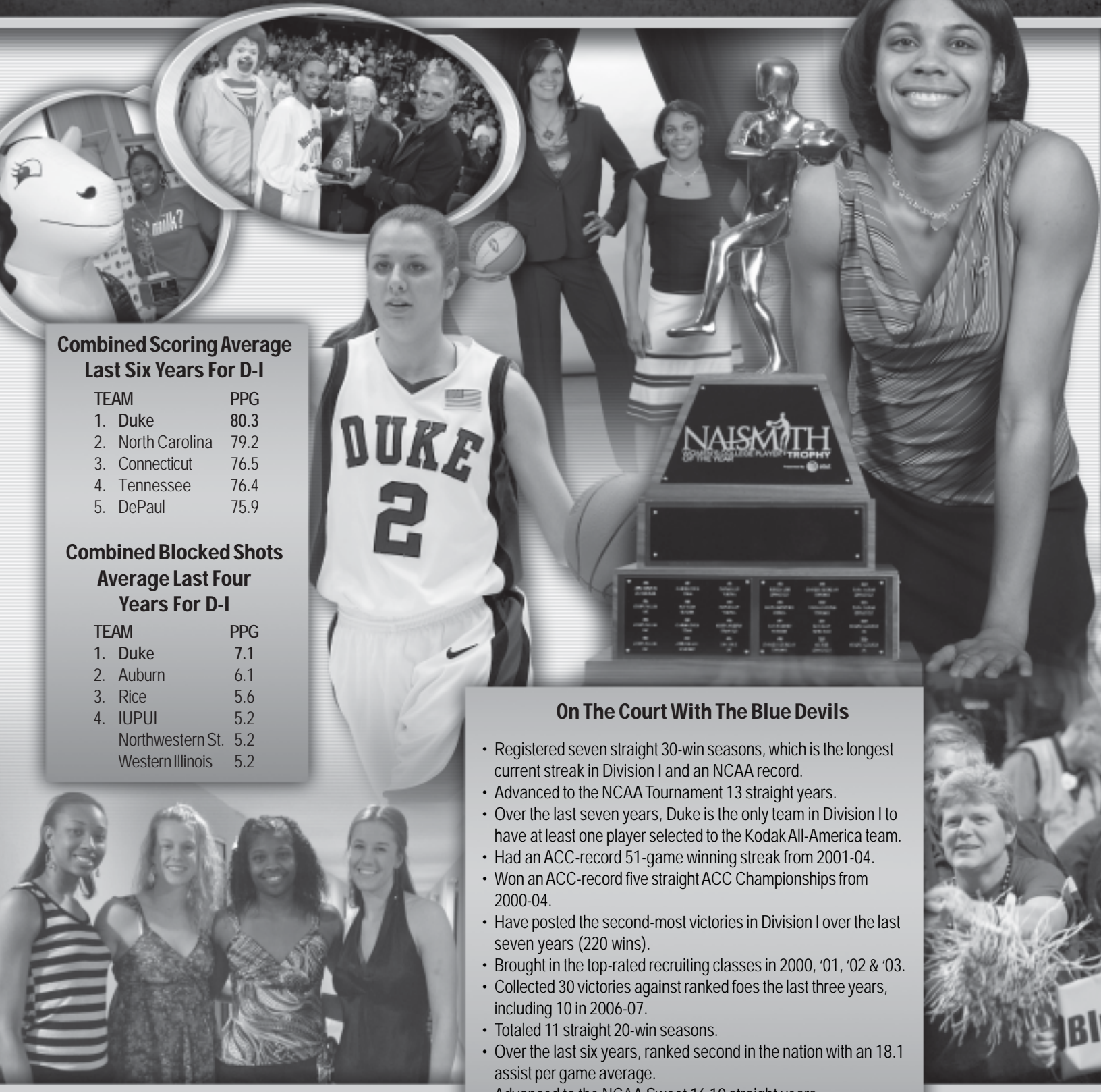
Head Coach Joanne P. McCallie and junior Abby Waner led the USA Basketball U21 World Championship Team to an 8-0 record and the gold medal in Moscow, Russia.

Freshmen Jasmine Thomas and Krystal Thomas guided the USA Basketball U19 World Championship Team to a 9-0 mark and the gold medal in Bratislava, Slovakia.

As a team, Duke's four gold medals tied for the most by any Division I team over the summer of 2007 along with Tennessee.



- Registered seven straight 30-win seasons, which is the longest current streak in Division I and an NCAA record.
- Advanced to the NCAA Tournament 13 straight years.
- Over the last seven years, Duke is the only team in Division I to have at least one player selected to the Kodak All-America team.
- Had an ACC-record 51-game winning streak from 2001-04.
- Won an ACC-record five straight ACC Championships from 2000-04.
- Have posted the second-most victories in Division I over the last seven years (220 wins).
- Brought in the top-rated recruiting classes in 2000, '01, '02 & '03.
- Collected 30 victories against ranked foes the last three years, including 10 in 2006-07.
- Totaled 11 straight 20-win seasons.
- Over the last six years, ranked second in the nation with an 18.1 assist per game average.
- Advanced to the NCAA Sweet 16 10 straight years.

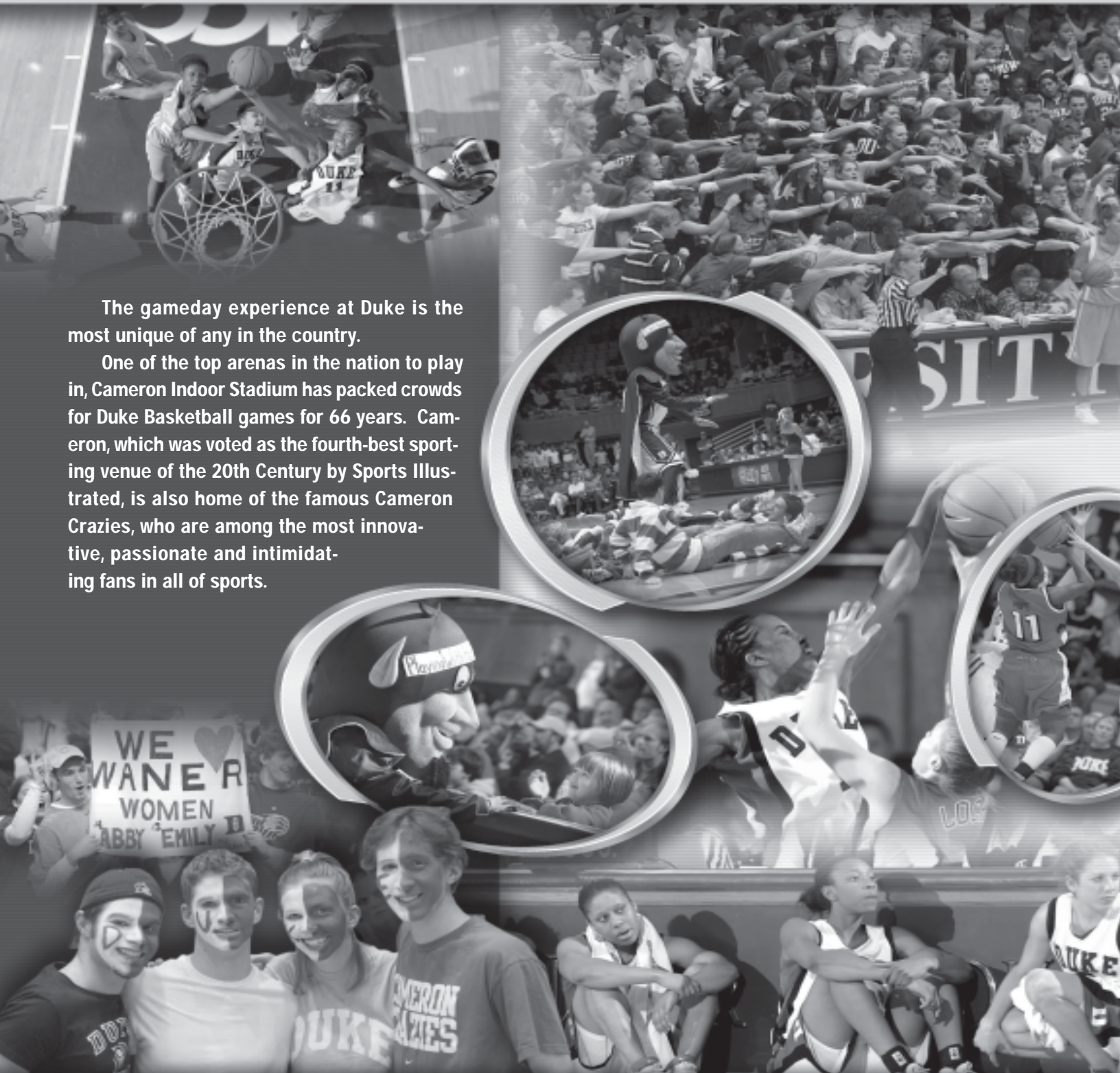




Gameday at Duke

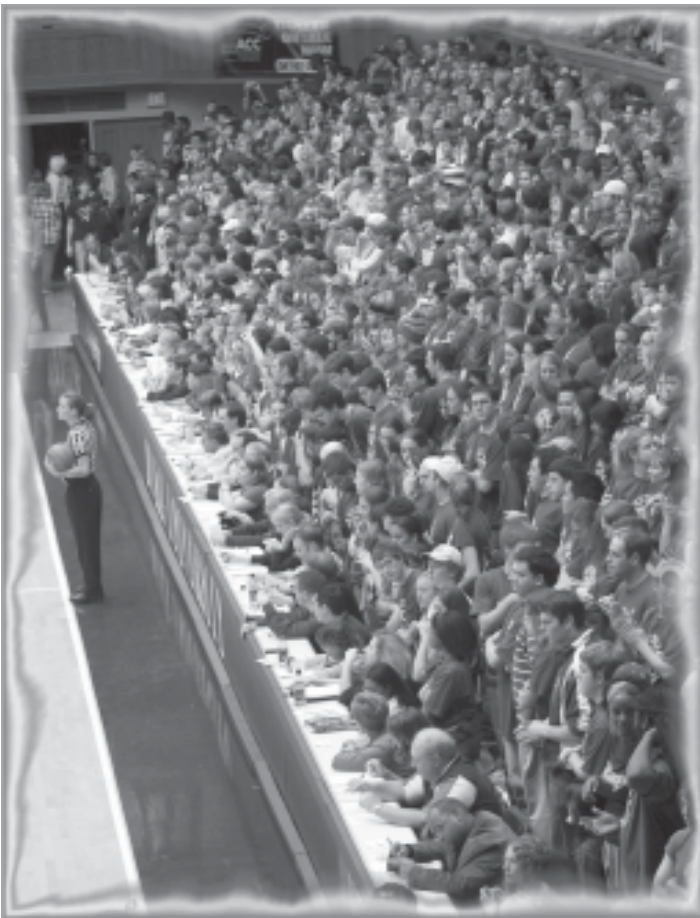

Ticket Information

Tickets to Duke Women's Basketball games can be purchased through the Duke Ticket Office by calling (919) 681-2583 or (877) 375-3853. Tickets can also be purchased online at www.GoDuke.com.

Credentials

All media and photographers attending Duke basketball home games must wear proper media credentials. Requests for credentials should be made in advance by mail, email or fax on company stationery and directed to Associate Sports Information Director Lindy Brown. Duke reserves the right to refuse any credential request deemed not to be in the best interest of the University.

Facilities

All home Blue Devil basketball games are played at Cameron Indoor Stadium, located at the end of Whitford Drive across from Wallace Wade Stadium. Cameron Indoor Stadium can also be reached from Towerview Road.

Parking

Parking for the media is available for home contests. Working press can request parking passes from Associate Sports Information Director Lindy Brown. All requests should be made in advance by mail, email or fax.

Media Accommodations

During the game, media will be seated at tables located on the floor level on the west side of Cameron Indoor Stadium. Media guides, notes and statistics, as well as work

areas, are located in the press room on the north side of Cameron. The room will be open prior to the game, at halftime and after the game for postgame interviews.

Working Media Filing Space

Print and electronic media planning to file postgame reports will work in the media room in Cameron Indoor Stadium. The work area has 10 phone lines available for local, charge card, toll free and collect calls only. Space is limited and is on a first-come, first-serve basis. Wireless internet service is also available in Cameron Indoor Stadium. The username and password will be posted in the press room for each contest.



Radio Information

The radio broadcast booths are located on the east side of the stadium and are suspended from the ceiling. Access to the booths is through section six off the upper concourse. One phone line with voice coupler and one business phone line will be provided by Duke free of charge to the visiting radio network as designated by that school's sports information office. ACC institutions will have Switch 56 capabilities at their site. Additional lines must be ordered directly from Tony Williams, Duke Tel-Com, at (919) 660-7221.

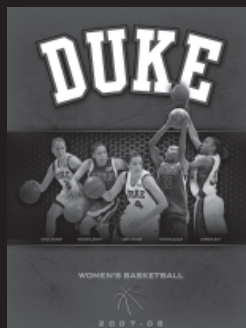
Post-Game Policies

Opposing head coaches and players will also be available for postgame interviews in the same room. 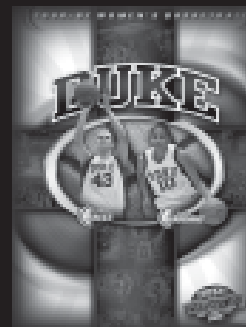

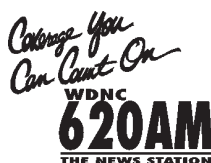

Throughout the last nine years, the Duke women's basketball program has become a national powerhouse. The Blue Devils have advanced to the national championship game twice, won five ACC championships and advanced to the NCAA Final Four four times.

With the success of the program, Duke has garnered a great deal of television coverage and 2007-08 will be no different with 13 regular season contests scheduled to be televised. Over the last nine years, the Blue Devils have been seen 128 different times on television.

The broadcast team for the 2007-08 ACC season will be the duo of **Debbie Antonelli** and **Beth Mowins** as well as **Charlene Curtis** and **Mike Hogewood**. They will handle all games on the regional sports networks. Antonelli, who has served as a color commentator for the WNBA and ABL while also working the sideline as a reporter for CBS at the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, will serve as the ACC's lead analyst for the 10th consecutive season.

Mowins, who enters her ninth season with ACC Live, is no stranger to the college basketball scene. She has made appearances on several national networks over the past 12 years and has also served as co-host of the NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament selection show and was a sideline reporter for CBS at the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament.

The McCallie Era Begins....

SEASON PREVIEW



The Blue Devil women's basketball team is poised for another successful season in 2007-08 under the direction of first-year head coach **Joanne P. McCallie**, as Duke welcomes back nine letterwinners, including three starters, from a 2006-07 squad that went 32-2 overall and a perfect 14-0 in regular season ACC play.

Despite the loss of All-America **Alison Bales** and National Player of the Year **Lindsey Harding**, the Blue Devils have the necessary tools in their returning core and the addition of three highly-touted freshmen to carry them through a triumphant regular season and deep into the NCAA Tournament.

With the departure of Bales, Duke's all-time blocked shots leader, there is a void to be filled in the post in 2007-08. But with the return of 6-5 center **Chante Black** – the junior red-shirted last season due to injury – the Blue Devils are in good position to dominate down low once again. Black will be aided down low by McDonald's All-America 6-4 freshman **Krystal Thomas**.

At the guard position, senior **Wanisha Smith** and junior **Abby Waner** return as floor generals after starting all 34 contests in 2006-07 alongside Harding. The experienced duo will also look to senior **Emily Waner** to run the point, while sophomore **Keturah Jackson** and freshmen **Karima Christmas** and **Jasmine Thomas** will also challenge for playing time. A handful of players will step up at the guard or forward position, including sophomores **Brittany Mitch** and **Bridgette Mitchell**, who each saw action in all but one contest last season.

Duke's third returning starter from a year ago is forward **Carrem Gay**, who stands 6-2 and is coming off a campaign in which she hit 58.1 percent of her field goals. Gay will be joined by sophomore **Joy Cheek**, who provided key minutes for the Blue Devils as a freshman and received All-ACC Freshman Honorable Mention accolades.

Duke will have a deep and talented bench in 2007-08, as all 12 players are athletic and have the flexibility to play multiple positions on the floor.

"I think it's going to be a great basketball laboratory," said McCallie of the ability for her players to play a variety of positions. "I don't think you should limit what people can do. I've never been a coach to do that. If a player tells me that they want to play three, well then play it. You want to play the four, play it. It is going to be fun to see our evolution.

"There is going to be great excitement and I also think that there is going to have to be some patience, because our very best is coming in March. It is not going to show up in December. We are going to peak naturally in March just due to some newness, timing and some issues that we have to work on with our team. Without question it is a versatile team, it's an athletic team and it's a very hungry team."

New Leadership

Duke will see a fresh coaching staff for the 2007-08 campaign, as McCallie was named Duke's fourth women's basketball head coach in April of 2007. McCallie will feature a new staff this season as **Shannon Perry** enters her fourth season with the Blue Devils, while **Al Brown** and **Samantha Williams** begin their first year. Brown arrives from Michigan State where he coached with McCallie for the last three seasons, while Williams arrives after spending the last three years as the top assistant at DePaul.

"I am so thrilled to have great diversity in our staff," said McCallie, who compiled a 149-75 ledger over the last eight years as the head coach at Michigan State. "In regards to Al and his many, many years; he's almost an institution. In regards to Shannon, she's somebody that's been at Duke and loves the Blue Devils, while also recruiting successfully at Duke. Samantha is a coach that has been successful at DePaul, while being the recruiting coordinator there. They are going to be a terrific staff; a great group that has lots of experience and is very driven to do great things here."

In addition to coaching leadership, McCallie expects all members of her team to contribute on and off the court, regardless of age or college class.

"I see a team of 12 where all 12 can lead in various ways," said McCallie. "We are not going to take away that opportunity from anybody. Freshmen can lead if they can be sharp about what they know: giving their game to the team, so to speak. Seniors can obviously lead from experience. Everyone in between has had their own share of experiences too. It's definitely leadership by team so to speak."

Seniors

With the loss of All-Americans **Alison Bales** and **Lindsey Harding** to graduation, Coach McCallie will look to a senior class of two in **Wanisha Smith** and **Emily Waner** to lead a Duke squad made up of two seniors, three juniors, four sophomores and three freshmen.

"We have fantastic seniors," said McCallie. "Emily has had a great summer and she is highly motivated. She's a savvy player, she's a smart player and she understands where the ball is supposed to be. That is a huge quality to have as a point guard, so we are going to look to her to provide that, to be smart, to take care of the basketball, to locate her teammates, to keep the tempo, and all those things that pure point guards are supposed to have knowledge about."

Waner saw action in 31 games last year and averaged 15 minutes a contest, as she scored 3.6 points per game and grabbed 1.5 rebounds per outing. Her 26 three-pointers were third-best on the squad.

Smith started every game at guard a year ago and averaged 9.4 points per game and 4.3 rebounds per contest. She dished out a team-best 135 assists and hit

36 percent from three-point range. Smith is 27 points shy of notching her 1,000th career point.

"Wanisha is an electrifying player because she can play multiple positions," said McCallie. "She is very effective at the wing spots and especially the three spot where she can rebound and get aggressive and get in there. Both Emily and Wanisha are excited as seniors for what they can do."

The Post

Junior **Chante Black** will look to be Duke's force underneath in 2007-08 following the departure of **Alison Bales**, who averaged 4.4 blocks per game in her senior campaign. Black red-shirted last season due to a knee injury and now has two years of eligibility remaining. She was a key part of the Blue Devils' success as a freshman and sophomore, as she averaged 7.0 points, 6.9 rebounds and 1.6 blocks per contest over 68 games.

"It's great to have Chante back," said McCallie. "I know that she's very, very hungry to play. I love her game; I love what she can do on the floor and she offers a great deal of poise in her game and in her movements and obviously her ability to get points in the paint."

The Blue Devils have a variety of options down low, as junior forward **Carrem Gay** brings experience back to the forward position having started every game a year ago. She averaged 8.8 points and 5.8 rebounds per game, while notching 21 blocks on the year. Sophomore forward **Joy Cheek** played key minutes last season especially down the stretch in postseason play, and classmate **Bridgette Mitchell**, who received All-ACC Freshman Honorable Mention honors alongside Cheek, pulled down the second-most offensive rebounds (70) while playing the second-fewest minutes (405) on the squad.

"It is going to be interesting to see how the post shakes out," said McCallie. "If people move to the three position, Bridgette might move out a little bit. Joy is going to look to give us more range in the post position in her ability to shoot the three-ball. Carrem is definitely a player in there to reckoned with."

Freshman **Krystal Thomas** will also provide depth in the post, as the center totaled 1,751 points, 1,357 rebounds and 268 blocks for her high school career at The First Academy in Orlando, Fla.

"Krystal is somebody that is going to push those post players because she is competitive, she is working on her strength and conditioning and she is very effective," said McCallie. "We see good depth for the post part of the rotation; a lot of good competition."

Guards

Serving as floor generals for the 2007-08 campaign will be senior **Wanisha Smith** and junior **Abby Waner**, while senior **Emily Waner** will look to have a part in anchoring the offense as well. The trio returns as Duke's top three-point shooters from a year ago, as the younger

Waner hit a team-best 68 treys as she led the Blue Devils in scoring last year with 14.1 points per game, while Smith notched 27 triples and the elder Waner recorded 26.

Freshman **Jasmine Thomas** had invaluable experience with the USA Basketball U19 World Championship team this past summer and will look to establish her role in leading the Blue Devil offense immediately.

"We are excited about the guard spot," said McCallie. "Obviously we look to Wanisha, Emily and Abby to be the anchors of handling the basketball, but certainly Jasmine coming in as a freshman has had great experience with USA Basketball and has lots of confidence. Jasmine will find her way, but the key will be for everybody to be a handler. We need a couple different outlets to run a fast break, we need more handlers, people doing a better job with decision making and taking care of the basketball and also attacking with the basketball."

Sophomores **Brittany Mitch** and **Keturah Jackson** and freshman **Karima Christmas** will also look to contribute to the offense out front. Mitch averaged 14.9 minutes per contest a season ago, while Jackson saw 8.9 minutes a game.

"Brittany can do a lot of things with the one, two and three spot," said McCallie. "Karima, I look at to be more of that aggressive rebounding guard. I'm looking for the first three (Smith and the Waner sisters) to kind of lead in that area, but I can definitely see Jasmine and others stepping in to that role."

The Freshmen

Duke's freshman class of three ranks third in the nation, as the trio is made up of two McDonald's All-Americans in **Jasmine Thomas** and **Krystal Thomas**, and three WBCA High School All-Americans in the Thomas duo and **Karima Christmas**.

Jasmine Thomas led Oakton High School in Vienna, Va., to a 101-11 mark over four years, as she collected career totals of 2,598 points (23.2 ppg.), 910 rebounds (8.1 rpg.), 519 steals (4.6 spg.), 504 assists (4.4 apg.) and 181 blocks (1.6 bpg.). She received EA Sports, *USA Today*, *Street & Smith's* and *Parade* first team All-America accolades in 2007, and was tabbed Gatorade State Player of the Year, AP State Player of the Year and D.C. All-Met Player of the Year following her senior campaign. A McDonald's All-America selection, Thomas was named MVP of the McDonald's game with 16 points, nine rebounds and six assists.

Krystal Thomas, who hails from Orlando, Fla., collected career averages of 15.9 points, 12.3 rebounds and 2.4 blocks per contest while at The First Academy. She led First Academy to a record of 103-17 with two state championships, one state final four and one district semifinal appearance, and garnered Gatorade State Player of the Year, EA Sports and *Parade* first team All-America and McDonald's All-America accolades in 2007.

Christmas, a native of Houston, Texas, was tabbed a 2007 *Parade* Magazine fourth team All-America and is a three-time All-District and TABC All-Region honoree and two-time All-District 23-5A selection. As a senior at J. Frank Dobie High School, she averaged 16.9 points, 9.2 rebounds, 3.6 steals and 2.9 assists per contest.

"All three freshmen can give impact performances for this team," said McCallie. "They don't have to wait

on it. They just have to play their game, focus, be aggressive and they need to get after it."

International Experience

Freshmen **Jasmine Thomas** and **Krystal Thomas** gained experience at the international level this past summer, as the duo led the USA U19 World Championship Team to a 9-0 record and the gold medal in Bratislava, Slovakia.

Jasmine Thomas started all nine games for the United States and averaged 7.4 points, 4.1 rebounds, 3.0 assists and 1.0 steals per contest. She hit a team-best 44.0 percent from three-point range, a mark which ranked sixth in the World Championship statistics. Thomas' 3.0 assists per game ranked eighth.

Krystal Thomas averaged 7.8 points and 7.4 rebounds per game and hit 60.4 percent of her field goals, as she started one of nine games and registered two double-doubles. Her 60.4 field goal percentage ranked second for the World Championship.

"It is kind of a double-edge sword actually," said McCallie of her squad's youth and international experience. "It is going to kick-start them if they use it correctly and make sure they get themselves prepared properly. If they rest like they need to and then commit themselves to the weight room like they need to, then I think they will be great. We have to watch them and make sure that they also peak with the team in March."

Junior **Abby Waner** also spent time on the hardwood at the international level this past summer, as she played under Coach McCallie on the USA Women's Basketball U21 World Championship Team. Waner started two of eight contests, as she saw 18.5 minutes per game and held averages of 5.9 points, 2.4 rebounds and 1.6 assists a game.

Schedule

Duke will once again face one of the most challenging schedules in the country in 2007-08, as the Blue Devils could meet 14 teams that advanced to the 2007 NCAA Tournament, including seven squads that were either No. 1 or No. 2 seeds, in Tennessee, Vanderbilt, Rutgers, Purdue, Pittsburgh, Connecticut, Stanford, Old Dominion, Temple, North Carolina, Maryland, Florida State, Georgia Tech and N.C. State.

The Blue Devils, who open the season at the University of Denver on Nov. 11, are slated to have 13 television contests, as Duke will be on national television on seven occasions and on the Regional Sports Network for six games.

Two marquee home matchups will be against the squads that played for the 2007 NCAA Championship, as the Blue Devils will host Rutgers on Dec. 6 and Tennessee on Jan. 28 in tough early-season contests.

"It is so important to play good teams early," said McCallie. "You have to play the best to become the best and that is not going to change regardless of our roster. You have to get after it and that is the only way to prepare for March."

McCallie Takes Over Head Job...

After spending seven years at Michigan State, Joanne P. McCallie took over the helm at Duke on April 20, 2007. During her 15 years as a head coach, McCallie has registered a 316-148 mark for a 68.1 winning percentage.

McCallie began her head coaching career at Maine where she posted a 167-73 record along with six NCAA Tournament appearances. At Michigan State, McCallie collected a 149-75 mark, while advancing to five NCAA Tournaments. In 2004-05, the Spartans reached the NCAA title game, while posting a school-record 33 victories.

Preseason Rankings...

Duke has been preseason ranked eighth in the *Lindy's Slam Magazine's*, 10th in the *Women's Basketball Magazine* and 11th in the *Athlon Magazine* Pre-season polls.

Experience Returns...

Even though the Blue Devils lost seniors Lindsey Harding and Alison Bales, Duke returns three starters and nine letterwinners. Overall, Duke will boast a roster of 12 players in 2007-08.

Wanisha Smith, Abby Waner and Carrem Gay are the returning starters, while Chante Black, Emily Waner, Brittany Mitch, Keturah Jackson, Bridgette Mitchell and Joy Cheek are the returning letterwinners.

Black returns after missing last season due to an injury, but was key contributor as a freshman and sophomore averaging 7.9 points and 6.1 rebounds in 2005-06.

Overall, Duke returns 66.3 percent of its scoring and 72.2 percent of its rebounding from last year.

Third-Best Recruiting Class Arrives...

Duke brought in the third-best recruiting class in the nation that includes Karima Christmas, Jasmine Thomas and Krystal Thomas. All three played in the WBCA H.S. All-America game.

Christmas is a native of Houston, Texas, and played for J. Frank Dobie H.S. She led the squad to a 32-7 mark last season, while averaging 16.9 points, 9.2 rebounds, 3.6 steals and 2.9 assists.

Jasmine Thomas was both a WBCA All-America and McDonald's All-America as she earned MVP honors at the McDonald's game. A product of Fairfax, Va., Thomas averaged 26.2 points, 8.2 rebounds, 5.1 steals, 4.8 assists and 1.5 blocks as a senior at Oakton H.S.

A native of Orlando, Fla., Krystal Thomas was also a WBCA and McDonald's All-America last year at The First Academy. She averaged 20.1 points, 12.1 rebounds, 1.4 steals and 1.1 assists as a senior.

The Record Book...

Junior sharpshooter Abby Waner is coming off a season where she tied the school record with 68 three-pointers. She matched Jessica Foley's mark of 68 from the 2004-05 season.

A product of Highlands Ranch, Colo., Waner also attempted the second-most treys in a single season as she bombed 188 from downtown. In two years, Waner already ranks ninth on Duke's career charts for three-pointers attempted (319) and 10th for three-pointers made (118).

Entering her final year with the Blue Devils, senior Wanisha Smith owns 410 assists. She is only 169 shy of tying the Duke career mark set last season by Lindsey Harding. Smith, who is from Upper Marlboro, Md., currently ranks seventh on the Duke career list.

Black Returns After Missing 2006-07...

After turning in solid years as a freshman and sophomore, Chante Black entered the 2006-07 campaign looking for big results. Instead, the 6-5 junior got hurt in preseason action and then another time when attempting to make a comeback to the court.

A product of Winston-Salem, N.C., Black used the season to work on her jump shot and is expected to be fully healthy in 2007-08. She will have two years of eligibility remaining after taking a medical redshirt.

In two years, Black has started 15 of 68 games and is coming off a sophomore season where she averaged 7.9 points, 6.1 rebounds, 1.9 blocks and had four games with 10 or more rebounds.

Summer of Gold In 2007...

The summer of 2007 was golden for four members of the Duke Women's Basketball team. Head Coach Joanne P. McCallie and junior Abby Waner led the U21 World Championship Team to an 8-0 record and the gold medal in Moscow, Russia.

Incoming freshmen Jasmine Thomas and Krystal Thomas guided the U19 World Championship Team to a 9-0 mark and the gold medal in Bratislava, Slovakia.

The Sister Act...

Duke features its first set of sisters playing together for the third year in a row with Emily and Abby Waner suiting up. The natives of Highlands Ranch, Colo., will be a senior and junior, respectively, for the Blue Devils.

Looking across the nation, the Waners will be one of 15 sets of sisters playing together this season in women's basketball.

Gay & Cheek Have Surgeries...

Immediately after the 2006-07 season came to a close, Carrem Gay and Joy Cheek hit the operating room

to have shoulder surgery. Both had shoulder instability during the season, which forced them to wear a brace during practice and games.

The surgery for Gay, who is from New York, N.Y., marked the second straight offseason she has had shoulder surgery as she suffered from the same injury on her left shoulder as a freshman.

Cheek, a native of Charlotte, N.C., had her operation performed on her left shoulder.

Both were cleared for preseason practice.

30-Win Seasons...

Duke posted its NCAA-record seventh straight year with 30 or more wins in 2006-07. No other ACC school has ever posted more than three straight 30-win seasons, while the Blue Devils have won 30, 31, 35, 30, 31, 31 and 32 over the last seven years. In NCAA Division I history, only Louisiana Tech has registered six consecutive 30-win seasons.

Wins Last Six Years...

Duke owns 220 wins over the last seven years, which ranks second in the nation to Connecticut (228). Rounding out the top 10 are Tennessee (219), Stanford (192), North Carolina (190), LSU (189), Purdue (187), Baylor (183), Louisiana Tech (179), Oklahoma (179) and Tennessee-Chattanooga (179).

Waner Travels To Guatemala...

Senior **Emily Waner** traveled to Guatemala over the summer with the CAPE program, which is the Collegiate Athlete Pre-Medical Experience (CAPE). Her group worked with an organization called Helps International, which worked in a hospital providing medical care, surgery, medication and dental care to the rural population. They also worked for a week in an orphanage outside of Anitgua.

Gay Looks To Build Off Sophomore Campaign...

Coming off a solid sophomore year, junior **Carrem Gay** is primed for an even better season in 2007-08. A

6-2 forward, Gay averaged 8.8 points, 5.8 rebounds, 1.4 steals and 1.0 assists as she started all 34 contests last year.

This all came during her second straight season with an injured shoulder. Over the last two offseasons, Gay has had surgery to repair both her left and right shoulders.

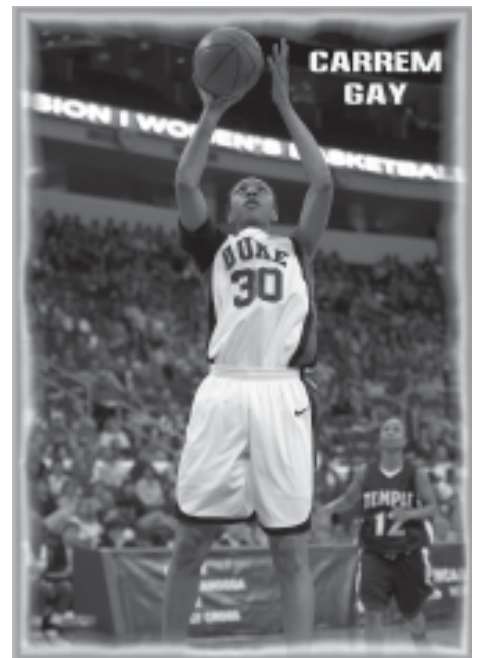
Last season, Gay hit 58.1 percent of her field goals and was the only Blue Devil to score double-figures in all three NCAA Tournament contests.

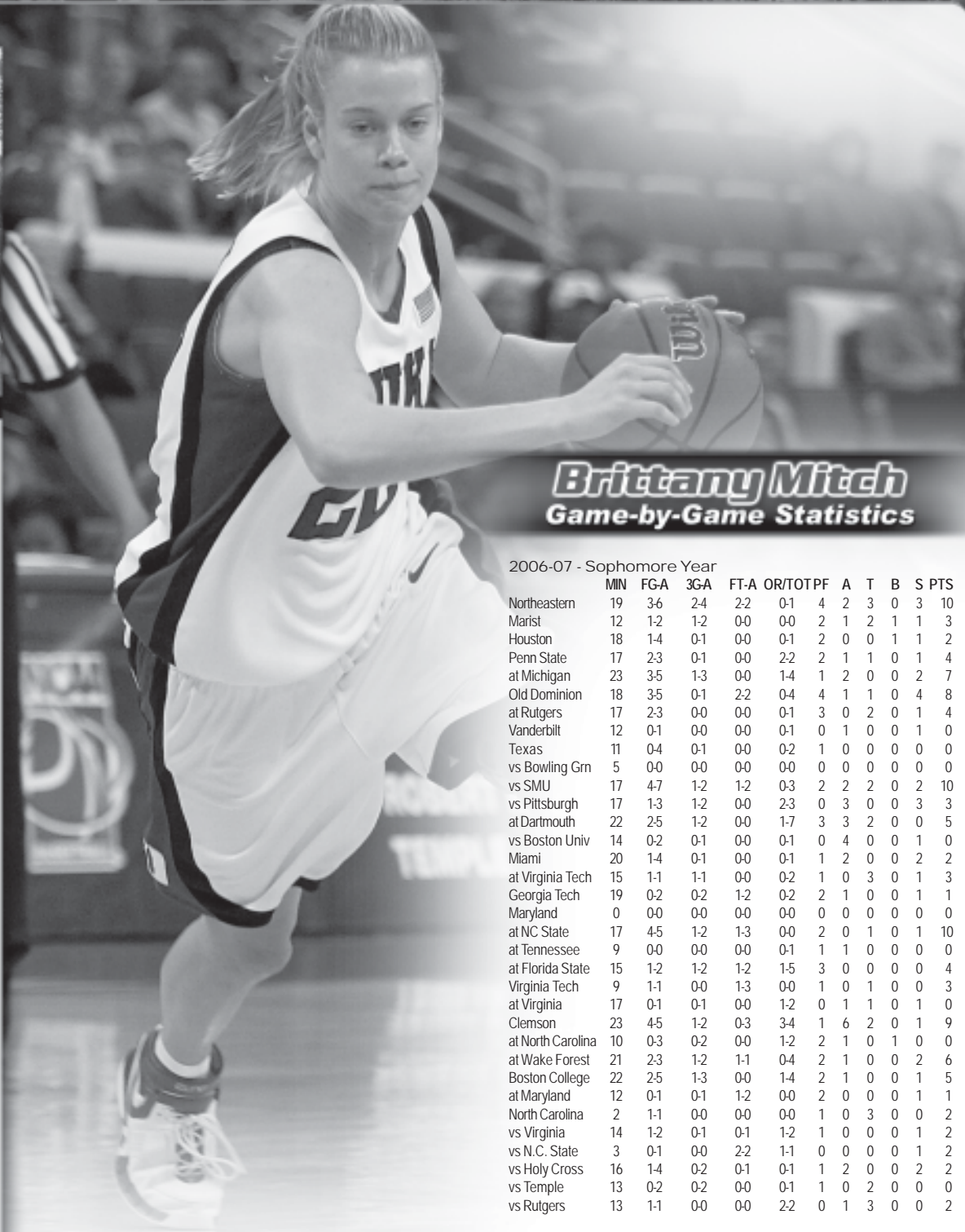

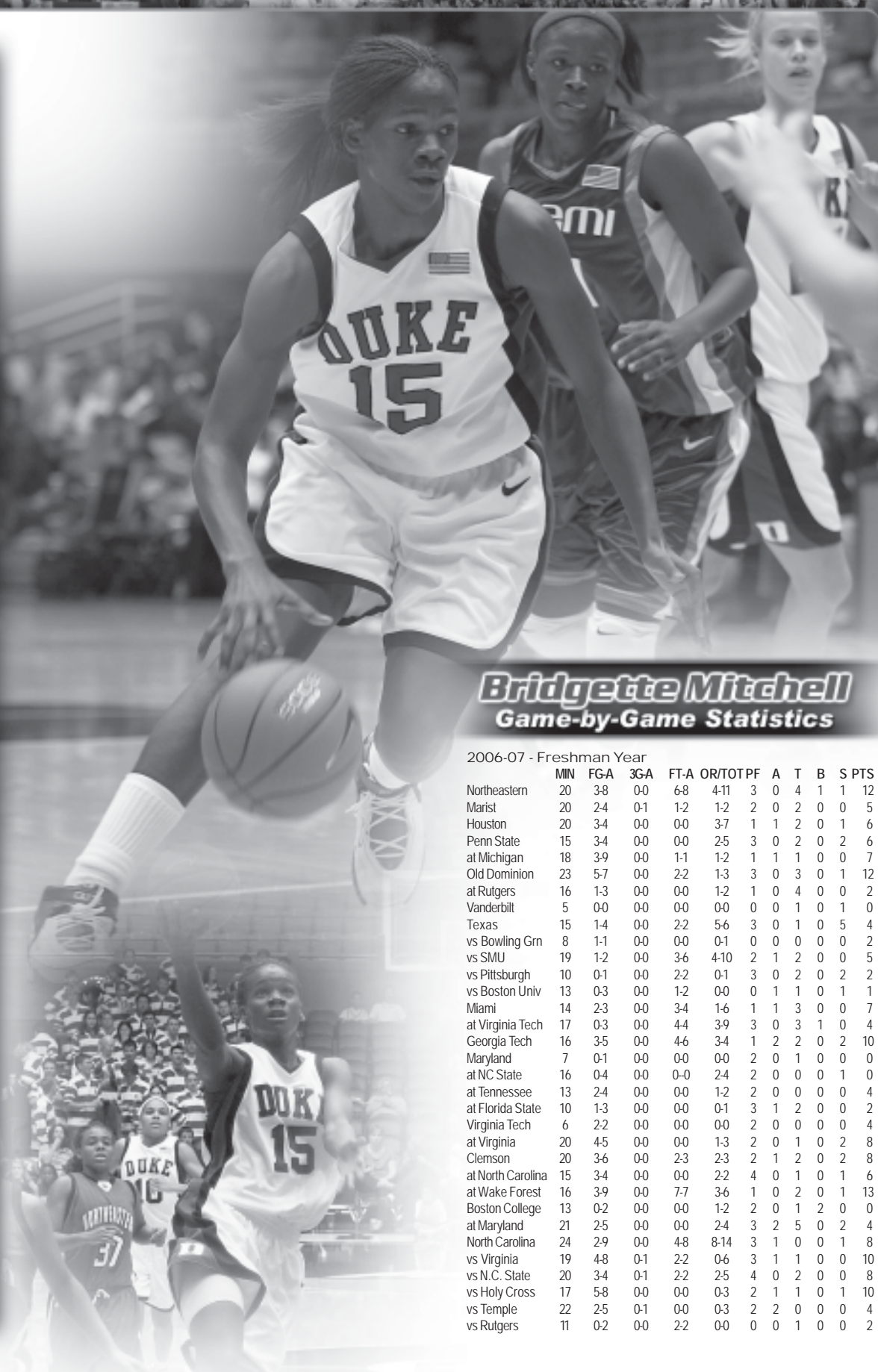

After elevating Michigan State to one of the nation's elite programs, Joanne P. McCallie was formally introduced as the Head Women's Basketball Coach at Duke University on Friday, April 20, 2007 in Cameron Indoor Stadium. She became the fourth head coach in Blue Devil history and secured her "Dream Job."

McCallie made her way to Durham via Michigan State where she spent the past seven seasons as head coach, leading the Spartans to a 149-75 mark. She led Michigan State to five straight NCAA Tournament appearances, four straight 20-win seasons and an appearance in the NCAA Championship game in 2005. She molded Michigan State basketball into one of the elite programs in the nation, with an 81-23 record over the last three years.

McCallie, 42, led the Spartans to a 24-9 record this past season, tied for the second-best total in school history. Michigan State advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, marking a school-record fifth straight NCAA appearance. Along the way, McCallie's squad beat two ranked conference teams on the road, at No. 13 Purdue and at No. 4 Ohio State. The Spartans beat all 10 conference teams during the league slate for the first time in program history. The team's 13-3 conference record was the second-best in program history and placed third in the Big Ten.

Over the summer of 2006, McCallie guided the USA Basketball U20 team to a 5-0 record and a gold medal in the FIBA Americas Championships in Mexico City. The squad outscored its opponents by 62 points per game and set 28 U20 records in the event. McCallie also coached the FIBA U21 World Championship team in Moscow, Russia this past summer from June 29 - July 8, where she led the USA squad to an 8-0 record and won the gold medal. Her team of college stars, including Blue Devil junior Abby Waner, registered a 30.0 average margin of victory during the championship.

In 2005-06, she led the Spartans to their third straight 20-win campaign - a program first - with a 24-10 overall record. MSU finished in a tie for third in the conference standings at 11-5, McCallie's second-best league finish at MSU, and advanced to the semifinals of the Big Ten Tournament for the third consecutive year.

The 24 victories in 2005-06 were the second most in a single season in school history. All of this was done while playing arguably the toughest schedule in school history, as MSU matched up against 11 NCAA Tournament teams and six teams ranked in the top 10. The Spartans posted victories over No. 16 Oklahoma and No. 8 Rutgers, who went on to be No. 2 and No. 3 seeds, respectively, in the NCAA Tournament. The Spartans were ranked in the top 20 all season, peaking at No. 9.

March is when it matters most, and McCallie guided MSU to its school-record fourth straight appearance in the NCAA Tournament and second straight berth in the Sweet 16 in 2005-06. The Spartans, a No. 4 seed, defeated 13th-seeded Wisconsin-Milwaukee in the first round and fifth-seeded Kentucky in the second round to earn a spot in the Bridgeport Regional. McCallie finished with a 9-5 in NCAA Tournament games at MSU, including an 8-3 record the past three years.

After guiding MSU to back-to-back NCAA Tournaments and upper-division Big Ten finishes in the previous two seasons, McCallie led Michigan State to a banner year in 2004-05. Michigan State advanced to its first National Championship game, won a school-record 33 games (10 more than the previous record), won a school-record 14 Big Ten games while sharing just its second Big Ten regular-season championship, won its first Big Ten Tournament title, finished 13-0 at home, had a school-record 17-game winning streak, and beat 13 nationally-ranked teams, including four teams ranked No. 1, No. 2 or No. 3 in the nation, including third-ranked Notre Dame, top-ranked Stanford, third-ranked Tennessee, 11th-ranked Connecticut, 11th and 12th-ranked Minnesota (twice), second-ranked Ohio State, 17th-ranked Boston College, 18th-ranked Vanderbilt, 18th-ranked Iowa, 23rd-ranked Penn State and 24th-ranked Purdue.

For her efforts, McCallie was named National Coach of the Year by the Associated Press, Basketball Times, and Nike, as well

as being voted Big Ten Coach of the Year by the league's media. It marked the first time an MSU women's basketball coach has been named national coach of the year and the second time a Spartan head coach earned the conference's coach of the year award. McCallie was also named the 2005 Basketball Coaches Association of Michigan College Coach of the Year.

The 2004-05 Spartans burst onto the national scene with non-conference victories at No. 3 Notre Dame and at No. 11 UConn and never slowed down en route to a 33-4 record. MSU moved into position for a Big Ten title with a 66-64 victory over No. 2 Ohio State in a nationally-televised game in front of a school-record crowd of 14,066.

After earning the program's first No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament, the Spartans marched to the Final Four, beating No. 1-ranked Stanford 76-69 in the Kansas City Regional Final. In Indianapolis at the Final Four, MSU staged an amazing second-half rally against No. 3 Tennessee, tying a Final Four record by overcoming a 16-point deficit during a 68-64 victory that propelled MSU into the title game.

In 2003-04, McCallie guided MSU to its first 20-win season since 1996-97 and just the fifth in school history. The Spartans, who finished 22-9 overall, advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament after a 72-60 win over Arizona in the opening round. MSU won 10 road games and six conference road games for the first time in school history, while also being nationally ranked for the first time since the 1996-97 season. The Spartans climbed as high as 15th in the ESPN/USA Today coaches poll, marking MSU's highest-ever national ranking at the time. The 22 wins tied for the second most in a single season for MSU in school history.

Michigan State recorded a 10-6 mark in the Big Ten that season, tying for fourth in the conference for a second straight year, and marking the first time in MSU history that the Spartans recorded double-digit wins in the Big Ten for two consecutive seasons.

During the 2002-03 season, McCallie guided a depleted MSU squad to a 17-12 overall record and its first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1997, as the Spartans earned a No. 8 seed in the East Regional. Despite numerous injuries that left MSU with a core of just six players getting nearly all of the minutes, she led Michigan State to its best Big Ten finish since 1997, as MSU tied for fourth in the league with a 10-6 record. The Spartans improved by four wins over the previous season's Big Ten win total - more than any other team in the conference.

Michigan State closed the 2001-02 season with a 19-13 record, and advanced to the semifinals of the Women's National Invitation Tournament for the first time in school history. The 2001-02 season saw MSU increase its win total from the previous season by nine victories, and included wins against three nationally-ranked opponents.

MSU finished the 2000-01 season, McCallie's first in East Lansing, with a 10-18 overall mark, as the Spartans struggled with injuries all year.

Under Coach McCallie, MSU saw its fan base increase dramatically. The team set season attendance records in four out of the last five seasons, including a school-record average of 6,787 fans in 2005-06, which

- Built MSU's attendance to an average of 6,787 fans in 2005-06, which ranked 10th nationally. Prior to McCallie's arrival, MSU averaged only 1,506 fans per contest.
- Led MSU to five straight 10-win seasons in the Big Ten for the first time in school history.
- Led MSU to 19 wins and its first-ever appearance in the WNIT Final Four in 2002 in just her second season.
- Left Maine as the school's all-time winningest women's basketball coach (167 victories)
- Appeared in two National Championship games as an assistant coach at Auburn

ranked 10th in the nation. The Spartans were second in the Big Ten last season with an average of 6,646 a game and ninth in the NCAA. While hosting the First and Second Rounds of the NCAA Tournament for the first time in school history on March 18 and 20, 2007, Michigan State attracted 21,340 fans for the six-game event, the most of any of the eight preliminary round sites. All of MSU's top 15 single-game crowds in program history came during Coach P's tenure, including a school-record 14,066 against Ohio State in a nationally televised game on Feb. 20, 2005. Prior to her arrival at MSU, the women's basketball program averaged only 1,506 fans per game in 1999-2000.

McCallie, who was named to the Michigan State post on March 27, 2000, became just the fourth head coach in Michigan State women's basketball history.

A native of Brunswick, Maine, McCallie owns a career mark of 316-148 during her 15-year stint as a head coach at Maine and Michigan State. As a coach and player, she has led her teams to 13 conference titles, 16 NCAA Tournament appearances, five NCAA Sweet 16 appearances, four NCAA Elite Eight appearances, three NCAA Final Four appearances and three NCAA Championship game appearances.

During her eight-year career at Maine, McCallie guided the Black Bears to seven straight 20-win campaigns, including a 20-11 overall record in 1999-2000 and their sixth-straight NCAA Tournament appearance. She was named coach of the year on three occasions, twice in the North Atlantic Conference (1995 and 1996) and once in the America East (1999).

Prior to becoming head coach at Maine in 1992-93, McCallie was an assistant coach at Auburn from 1988-92. As the team's primary recruiter, she helped sign the fourth-ranked class in the nation in 1990-91 and the 16th-ranked class in the nation in 1991-92. While at Auburn, McCallie and the Tigers appeared in two national championship games and made an appearance in the NCAA Elite Eight.

The former Joanne Palombo, prior to getting married to John McCallie, played her collegiate basketball at Northwestern from 1984-87. She still ranks seventh in Wildcat history with 378 career

assists. As a senior, she was an All-Big Ten honorable mention selection and helped lead the Wildcats to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. McCallie also was named Academic All-Big Ten First-Team as a senior.

McCallie graduated from Northwestern in 1987 with a degree in political science and earned a master's degree in business administration from Auburn in 1990.

Coach P is an active speaker within the community and for women's athletics. At MSU, McCallie created the "Choice Not Chance" philosophy, which focuses on making the correct choices in life. The philosophy has been widely used by McCallie, her staff and players, who have been very active in the area schools speaking about "CNC".

McCallie's community service includes working with the Big Brothers and Big Sisters "Jump" program and serving as the honorary chair of their annual golf outing; serving as the Honorary Chair for the Haven House — a shelter for homeless families in East Lansing, Mich.; serving as the Honorary Chair for the 2001 Crop



Walk and the 2001-04 Memory Walks for Alzheimer's; serving on the Board of Directors of the Governor's Council on Physical Fitness and Women Working Wonders; and holding the Joanne P. McCallie Golf Challenge benefiting children and adolescents with cancer.

McCallie was also an Honorary Chair for the MSU/Mid-Michigan Children's Initiative. She was a driving force behind the creation of MMCI, an MSU initiative designed to form partnerships within the Lansing area that benefits the health and well-being of children, focusing on research, education and clinical care.

McCallie has already made her presence felt out in the Durham and neighboring communities in her short time at Duke. She has spoken at the Durham Sports Club, Durham Chamber of Commerce - Professional Women's Network, the Duke Club of Washington, D.C., The Duke Children's Hospital and the Hays Barton United Methodist Church.

While at Maine, she organized an event called "Realizing the Dream: Celebrating Women in Athletics" that featured speakers Dr. Donna Lopiano and Sheryl Swoopes. During the 1997-98 season, Dana Rae Warren filmed a documentary of the Maine women's basketball season. McCallie was inducted into the New England Basketball Hall of Fame in 2004.

McCallie was named a conference captain by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association in 2002. In October of 2005, McCallie was inducted in the Maine Sports Legends Hall of Honors for her outstanding coaching efforts.

The McCallie family includes husband John, daughter Madeline (Maddie) and son John Wyatt (Jack). The family resides in Durham, N.C.



So What Does the P Stand For?

Those who have not known Joanne P. McCallie long may wonder why her players and those who know her well call her "Coach P." The "P" stands for Palombo, her maiden name. McCallie is proud of her Italian heritage, and early in her career found many similarities between herself and coaching legend Jim Valvano. She reasoned that if there could be a "Jimmy V", why not a "Joanne P?" Therefore, during her years as Joanne Palombo, she became known as "Coach P", and after her marriage to John McCallie, she decided to keep the "P" as a middle initial. But old habits die hard, so players, coaches, staff members and friends continue to refer to her simply as "Coach P."

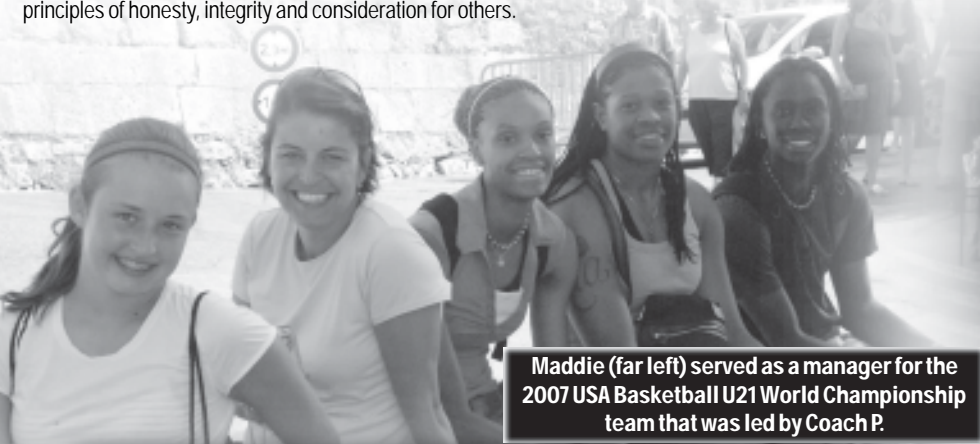
The McCallie Family

The McCallie family not only emphasizes education to the young women on the Duke team, but their own accomplishments further demonstrate their commitment to academics. Head coach Joanne P. McCallie holds a bachelor's degree in political science from Northwestern and a master's degree from Auburn in business administration.

John McCallie, Ph.D, Joanne's husband, was an Economics professor at MSU. But it should come as no surprise that the McCallies are well-educated, as the name McCallie has long been synonymous with the word "education." The McCallie School (pictured to the right) is a college preparatory school for boys located on Missionary Ridge near Chattanooga, Tenn. It was founded in 1905 by Spencer Jarnagin McCallie and James Park McCallie, the grandfather and great-uncle, respectively, of John McCallie.

The McCallie School accepts young men with above average to exceptional academic abilities and those students matriculate at some of the best colleges and universities in the nation. In recent years, the school has been recognized for its innovative educational programs and its overall standards of excellence. Recently, the *Atlanta Journal/Constitution* called McCallie "one of the leading secondary educational institutions in the United States."

In addition, John McCallie's great-aunt, Grace McCallie, was one of three founders of the Girls Preparatory School in 1906, also in Chattanooga. The school prepares girls for college through academic training, and instills in them high principles of honesty, integrity and consideration for others.

Joanne P. McCallie was the head coach of the U21 World Championship team where she led the squad to an 8-0 record and the gold medal in Moscow, Russia. Mike Krzyzewski is the head coach of the USA Basketball Senior National Team. He led the USA team to a 10-0 record and the gold medal over the summer at the FIBA Americas Championship in Las Vegas, Nev.

The Duke duo became only the second coaching tandem to register USA Basketball gold medals in the same year as head coaches (Stanford, '96).

During Joanne P. McCallie's 15 years as a head coach, many of her former players, coaches, managers and administrative assistants have gone into the coaching ranks or basketball administration. All credit Coach McCallie with helping them reach new professional heights. Five former players or coaches have now been appointed head coaches, while four are assistants and two are director of basketball operations.

Al Brown

Assistant Coach

1st Season At Duke • Purdue, '64

Al Brown will be entering his fourth season along the side of Joanne P. McCallie and the first on the Duke University staff after being hired on May 2, 2007. Since arriving in the coaching world 30 years ago, Brown has produced numerous winning teams and is thought of in the coaching world as having one of the best basketball minds in the game today.

He has been a part of three NCAA Championships, four NCAA runner-up teams, eight NCAA Final Four squads and 16 NCAA Tournaments. He has coached men's and women's basketball at 10 different schools including Purdue, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Western Michigan, Ball State, South Carolina, Tennessee, Cleveland State and Michigan State since taking his first assistant coaching position at Purdue in 1967.

His record in women's basketball speaks for itself as his squads have won 80.0 percent of their games, advanced to the NCAA Tournament in 11 of the 13 years, won three NCAA titles, appeared in the NCAA Championship game with two different squads a total of six times and won 79.0 percent of league contests.

Brown is known for his video breakdowns and opponent analysis, as well as his on-court teaching expertise, which has proven to be a valuable contribution to the success of every basketball team he has ever coached. He was recognized for his coaching expertise when he was named one of the top assistant coaches in the country in a poll conducted by Women's Basketball Journal.

He has had an interesting and unique career as he is the only coach in the history of intercollegiate athletics to have played an active role in national championship games in three different sports, including five appearances as a coach in the NCAA Women's Basketball Championship game. Brown is also the only coach to coach men's and women's basketball in the Southeastern Conference and the Big Ten Conference at two different schools in each conference. Also, he is the only coach in college basketball history to coach in the men's (1969, Purdue vs. UCLA) and women's national championship game (Tennessee, 1996-98, 2000; Michigan State, 2005).

Brown has 11 years of college coaching experience in the women's game and 16 years in the men's game. On the men's side, he has coached five teams at two schools in the NCAA Tournament, advancing to the Sweet 16 three times, the Elite Eight twice and the final game once.

Brown was the motivational speaker for the Tennessee football team throughout the 1998 season. Coach Phillip Fulmer, the head coach at Tennessee, asked him to speak to the team in Tempe, Ariz., before the Fiesta Bowl National Championship game. Brown was on the field in the coaching box during the Vols' victory over Florida State in the title game.

During his seven years in the women's program at Tennessee (1995-2002), the Lady Vols went to the NCAA Final Four five times, playing in the national title game four times, and won three national championships in a row (1996-98), which is an NCAA record. Over that seven-year period, the Lady Vols went 224-29, good for a winning percentage of 89 percent. He was a part of five consecutive Southeastern Conference championship teams, during which time Tennessee posted a league record of 67-3.

During his first year at Michigan State, the Spartans won the Big Ten regular season and tournament championships, went to the NCAA Championship game for the first time in school history, and won a school-record 33 games. Overall, during his three years at Michigan State the squad produced an 81-23 record and advanced to the NCAA Tournament each of those three years. In the Big 10, the Spartans notched a 38-10 mark and finished no lower than third each year.

A 1964 graduate of Purdue, Brown was a three-year letterwinner on the Boilermaker basketball team before making the switch to the coaching ranks as an assistant coach with his alma mater in 1967. Brown served three seasons at Purdue before moving to Ball State where he was an assistant for five seasons (1977-1982).

He then spent five years (1982-87) as the head coach at Ball State. His 1986 Cardinal team had a record-setting year, posting 21 wins en route to the Mid-American Conference tournament championship and the school's second berth in the NCAA Tournament. The first time Ball State advanced to the NCAA Tournament was when Coach Brown was an assistant.

After spending the 1987-88 season assisting at Western Michigan, Brown served on the staff at Minnesota for three years (1988-1991), where the Gophers advanced to two NCAA Sweet 16's and one NCAA Final Eight, before moving on to the men's program at Tennessee for the 1991-92 and 1992-93 seasons.

Coach Brown has recruited and coached some outstanding players. The first Walter Byers Scholarship winner and the 1984 Naismith Award winner, an award given to the best player in the nation under six feet, were two of Brown's recruits. He has coached 10 NBA players and 10 women who are playing in the WNBA, plus numerous players who have played overseas.

Brown and his wife, Karen, have one son, Edwin. Edwin and his wife, Erica, reside in Hopkinton, Mass., with their son Simon.

Shannon Perry enters her fourth season with the Duke women's basketball program in 2007-08. Prior to joining the Blue Devils, she spent four years with the University of Southern California.

Perry was named assistant coach on July 6, 2004 and is involved with all aspects of the Blue Devil program including recruiting, practice instruction, scouting and is in her third year of coaching the post players.

In her first year with the program, Perry helped bring in the second-best recruiting class in the nation with the addition of National Player of the Year Abby Waner, Keturah Jackson, Brittany Mitch and Carrem Gay.

Perry also played a key role in the Blue Devils bringing in the third-best class nationally in 2007 that included WBCA High School All-America selections Jasmine Thomas, Krystal Thomas and Karima Christmas.

While at USC, her responsibilities were national recruiting, practice instruction and academic liaison for the Women of Troy. She led Southern California to signing a top-10 recruiting class in 2004.

Prior to arriving at Southern California, Perry served as assistant coach at the University of Iowa for the 1999-2000 campaign. Perry was involved with daily practice instruction, coaching the post players, scouting, recruiting and monitoring academic progress of student-athletes.

A 1998 graduate of the University of Iowa, Perry received a Bachelor of Arts in journalism and communication studies, where she graduated with honors. She received the 1998 Robin Roberts/WBCA Sports Communication Scholarship award and 1998 NCAA Women's Enhancement Post-Graduate Scholarship award.

Perry was a four-year basketball letterwinner at Iowa from 1995-98 where she was a three-time All-Big Ten Academic selection. She played in 115 career games and was a member of Iowa's No. 1 rated recruiting class in 1994. During her time at Iowa, Perry was regarded as the team's leading defensive player. She led the Hawkeyes to the 1996 and 1998 Big Ten Regular Season titles and the 1997 Tournament title.

A 1994 graduate of Cerritos (Calif.) High, Perry played basketball and volleyball as a prep.

Perry is a member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association. She resides in Durham, N.C.

A former Auburn standout, Williams spent the last three years at DePaul as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator. She helped the Blue Demons through the most successful period in school history going a combined 72-25 for a 74.2 winning percentage. DePaul advanced to three NCAA Tournaments, including the schools first NCAA Sweet 16 appearance in 2005-06.

Williams came to DePaul after serving as an assistant coach at her alma mater, Auburn, in 2003-04, working with her former coach, Joe Ciampi. The Tigers posted a 22-9 record and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Williams worked with perimeter players and was also in charge of the strength and conditioning program.

She began her collegiate coaching career with Conference USA's Saint Louis University, serving as an assistant for one season in 2001-02 before moving on to Columbus State in 2002-03. Serving as the Division II school's recruiting coordinator and top assistant, Williams helped Columbus State to a 28-4 record.

As a student-athlete at Auburn, Williams was a four-year starter (1992-96) and two-time co-captain (1994-96) while leading the Tigers to three NCAA Tournament appearances and earning a bachelor of science degree in human sciences from Auburn in 1996. In those three NCAA appearances, Auburn reached the Sweet 16 twice and the Elite Eight once. Individually, Williams set Auburn's career three-point field goal record with 161 three-pointers.

Williams was recruited to Auburn by McCallie prior to Coach P taking over the reigns at Maine in 1992.

In 1993, Williams played for the U.S. Junior National Team that took the bronze medal at the R. William Jones Cup in Taipei, Taiwan.

Following her four-year collegiate career, she played for the San Jose Lasers of the American Basketball League in 1996-97. The Louisville, Ky., native attended Manual High School and was a first team Parade and Street and Smith All-America. She was also named to USA Today's Super 25.

Additionally, Rice served as the camp director this past summer for the Duke Girls Basketball Camps.

Rice, a 2000 graduate of Duke with a Bachelor of Arts in sociology and history, was a four-year letterwinner and member of Duke's first Final Four team in 1999 and first ACC Championship squad in 2000.

Missy Anderson returned to her alma mater in the summer of 1997 as Duke's first program coordinator and director of basketball operations for women's basketball, which she served as for 10 seasons. She enters her 11th year on staff with the Blue Devils and heads into her first year as Program Director.

She helps coordinate office activities, arranges team travel, schedules team practices and meals and assists with summer camps. Her responsibilities also include the production of alumni and coaches newsletters, as well as design of graphics and recruiting materials. In addition, Anderson is in her ninth year providing color commentary for all Duke women's basketball games broadcast on WDNC.

Anderson has traveled to four NCAA Final Four appearances for the Blue Devils in 1999, 2002, 2003 and 2006, while also being a part of five ACC Championship squads from 2000-2004.

Anderson was a point guard for former head coach Gail Goestenkors in her first two seasons from 1992-94, and she earned four letters during her Blue Devil career from 1991-94. Anderson led the Blue Devil squad in both assists and steals during her junior and senior seasons. She was also named Most Valuable Player of the 1993 Duke Classic and owns the Duke single-game record for steals (9).

A 35-year-old native of Maryville, Tenn., Anderson graduated from Duke in 1994 with a degree in sociology. She resides in Bahama, N.C.





Joe Alleva

Director of Athletics

28th Season At Duke • Lehigh, '75

Duke Director of Athletics Joe Alleva is in his 10th year leading one of the nation's most prestigious athletic programs. He has been at the University for 31 years.

Alleva has overseen unprecedented success and growth in the department that includes propelling Duke into a fixture among the nation's top all-around programs, posting graduation rates that consistently rank among the best in the country, enhancing community outreach efforts, establishing record-setting fundraising levels, initiating sizeable facilities construction and renovation, and increasing the department staff size by nearly 40 percent.

"Joe is unwaveringly loyal to Duke and to the educational values that undergird all of our programs, including athletics," Duke President Richard H. Brodhead said following Alleva's five-year reappointment to the position in August 2007.

Brodhead further explained the review confirmed that Alleva was well-recognized for sustaining high standards of integrity in the athletics program, his championing of Duke's concept of the student-athlete, the quality of coaches he has hired, and the high level of success that has been achieved across athletic programs at Duke under Alleva's leadership.

During Alleva's tenure as director of athletics, every one of Duke's 26 varsity sports and the Health, Physical Education and Recreation department have benefited from increased commitment. Simply put, the Duke Department of Athletics has never been as successful, whether in competition, the classroom, or the community.

Duke athletics has flourished under Alleva's direction. The Blue Devils finished fifth in the 2005 Division I Directors' Cup, which rates athletics departments based on the success of its teams. Duke followed up its impressive 2005 performance with an eighth-place finish in 2006 and an 11th-place showing in 2007. Prior to 1998-99, Alleva's first full year as director of athletics, Duke had never placed higher than 21st in the Directors' Cup standings. Since then, Duke has enjoyed six top 20 finishes, including four in succession (2004-07).

In the 2006 National Collegiate Scouting Association Power Rankings that combine a school's Directors' Cup finish, its athletic graduation rates and its academic ranking in *U.S. News and World Report*, Duke was the top-ranked Division I school in the nation, ahead of Stanford, Notre Dame, Princeton and Harvard. Duke also finished first in this listing in 2005 and second in 2004.

Six Duke teams — men's basketball in 2001, women's golf in 1999, 2002, 2005, 2006, and 2007 — have won national championships since Alleva's appointment as director of athletics. Since Alleva took over the helm at Duke, 44 Blue Devil teams notched ACC Championships, the second-highest total among ACC schools since 1997-98. Duke has won at least four ACC Championships in eight of the nine years Alleva has been the director of athletics (not counting spring of 1997-98). Eight of

Duke's top 10 seasons in regards to conference championships are under Alleva, including the school-record seven league titles in 2000-01.

While continuing its excellence in competition, Duke has not lost sight of its obligation to educate its student-athletes. Duke's graduation rates for its student-athletes continue to rank among the best in the nation (its most recent Federal Graduation Rate was 91%). In 2007, Duke finished first among league schools on the ACC Academic Honor Roll for the 20th consecutive year (394 Blue Devil student-athletes maintained a grade point average of 3.0 or better in 2006-07). During the 2006-07 academic year, 20 of Duke's 26 athletic teams posted grade point averages of 3.0 or higher. Alleva has augmented the academic support budget that is now 10 times higher in 2006-07 than it was during the 1997-98 year.

Additionally, Duke student-athletes continue to reach out to the local community through several programs such as Duke's award-winning Verizon Read with the Blue Devils. The program now enters its 16th year and assists Durham teachers by providing reading incentives to third and fourth graders. Other partnerships include SAAC (Student Athletic Advisory Committee) members serving in the Urban Ministries Soup Kitchen, adopting families through Project Share at Christmas, hosting students from the Oxford Housing Authority at home football games, visiting families the Ronald McDonald House, and partnering with E.K. Powe Elementary School to host

the annual Winter Fun Day in February of each year. There are dozens more outreach programs in which Duke student-athletes are involved. In 2006-07, Duke student-athletes volunteered nearly 3,000 community outreach hours.

Fundraising under Alleva has reached extensive heights. In nine years, Alleva and his fundraising team raised more than \$173 million in gifts and funded more than \$85 million in new facilities or renovation. Annual giving to the Iron Dukes has increased 50 percent since the year 2000, including a record \$11 million in the fiscal year ending in June 2007.

New facilities built under Alleva's watch include the Yoh Football Center, Sheffield Tennis Center, Schwartz-Butters Athletic Center, Ambler Tennis Stadium, Karcher-Ingram Golf Center, Rod Myers Teaching Center, the Skandalaris Fieldhouse at Koskinen Stadium and the fieldhouse at Williams Field. Facility upgrades have been made to Cameron Indoor Stadium, Wallace Wade Stadium, Jack Coombs Stadium, Koskinen Stadium, Williams Field, Murray Athletic Building, and Brooks Field at the football practice facility.

The latest major facility upgrades include the multi-million dollar Michael W. Krzyzewski Center Dedicated to Athletic and Academic Excellence, which will house three major components — the Jack Campbell Academic Support Center, the University Events Center providing all areas of the campus with a premier event space and a basketball training complex for both the men's and women's teams. Included in the facility will be vastly expanded academic space, new weight rooms, team and individual video rooms, meeting rooms and banquet facilities able to accommodate 300 people. Groundbreaking on the 56,000 square-foot center occurred in September 2006 and its completion date is January 2008.

Alleva also established a visionary Athletics Advisory Board in 1999 consisting of influential business and sports leaders throughout the country with interests in the Duke Athletics program.

Alleva is active on the national collegiate athletics scene, serving on the Football Bowl Certification Committee and the Gatorade Advisory Board. He sits on Atlantic Coast Conference committees on Finance, Infractions and Penalties, Television (chair), Football, and Men's Basketball. At Duke, Alleva is part of the Undergraduate Leadership Group, the Committee on Undergraduate Affairs and the University Athletic Council. Additionally, Alleva recently completed his service on the NCAA Division 1 Championships/Competition Cabinet.

A native of Suffern, N.Y., Alleva joined the athletics staff in 1980 and was named assistant director of athletics in July 1986. He has also served as assistant director of the Iron Dukes during his tenure. In 1987, Alleva was promoted to associate director of athletics, assuming a great deal of responsibility for all day-to-day operations of the department. He also served as the athletics business manager during Duke's rapid growth from the mid-1980s until 1998.

Alleva played football and baseball at Lehigh and was football captain in 1974. He received his bachelor's degree in 1975 majoring in finance and served as a graduate assistant football coach for Lehigh, earning an MBA in 1976. Alleva began serving Duke in 1976 working for the vice president for business and finance.

He has played a key role in Durham's community sports scene over the last several years. He started Little League Baseball in Durham over 15 years ago, and also began the American Legion baseball program in the area. Alleva is a member of the North Carolina American Legion Hall of Fame, Suffern H.S. Hall of Fame and the Rockland County Hall of Fame.

Alleva and his wife, Annie, have two sons, J.D. (Duke, '01) and Jeff (Duke, '03) along with a daughter, Jenny (Duke, '07). A 24th-round pick by the Kansas City Royals in the 2001 Major League Baseball Amateur Draft, J.D. played baseball in the Royals' minor league system. He is currently a professional scout for the Houston Astros. Jeff finished his baseball career at Duke in 2003 and signed a free agent contract with the Royals following his senior season. He recently graduated with his MBA from the prestigious Fuqua School of Business at Duke. Jenny, a four-year letterwinner on Duke's women's soccer team, will attend law school in the fall of 2007.

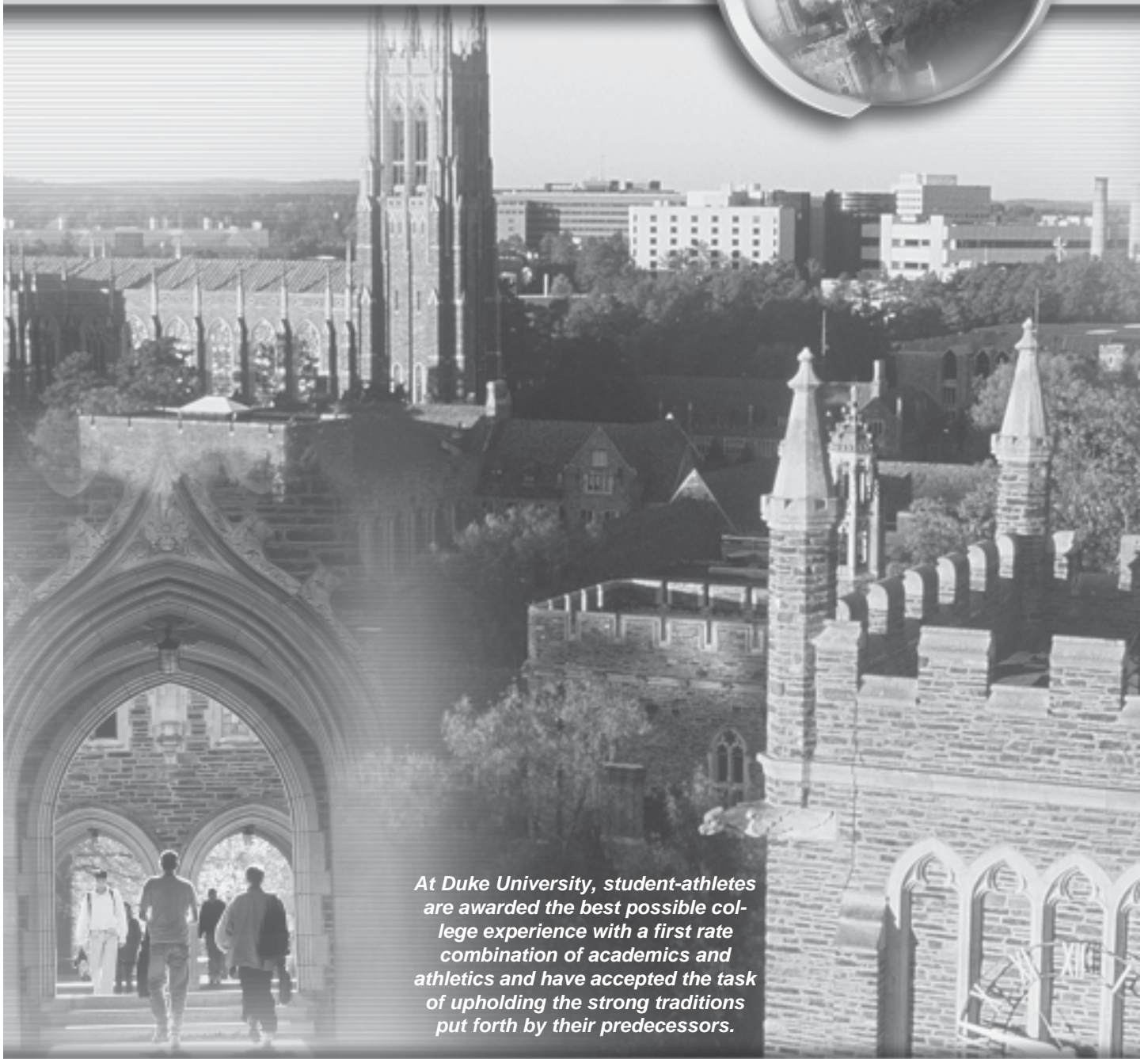

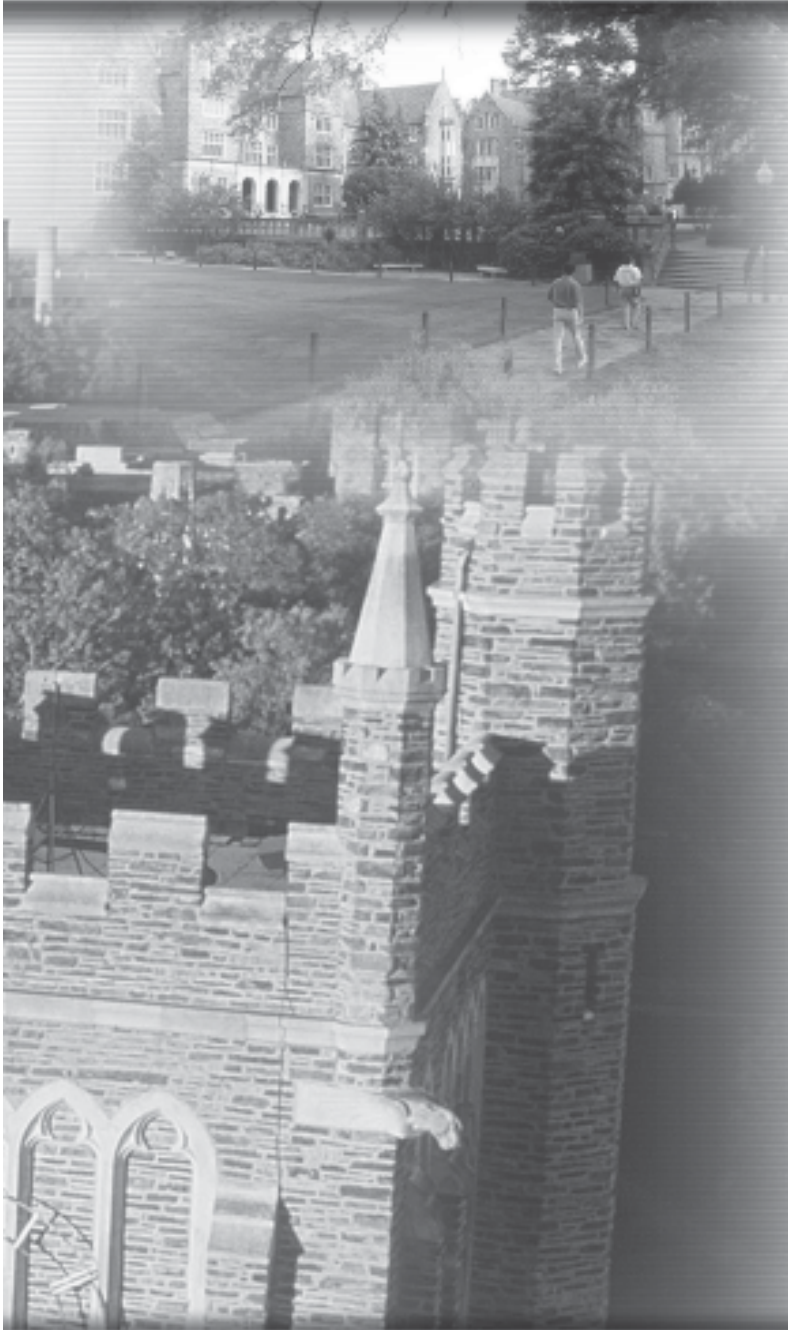

Duke University



At Duke University, student-athletes are awarded the best possible college experience with a first rate combination of academics and athletics and have accepted the task of upholding the strong traditions put forth by their predecessors.



Duke University was created in 1924 by James Buchanan Duke as a memorial to his father, Washington Duke. The Dukes, a Durham family who built a worldwide financial empire in the manufacture of tobacco and developed the production of electricity in the two Carolinas, had long been interested in Trinity College. Trinity traced its roots to 1838 in nearby Randolph County when local Methodist and Quaker communities joined forces to support a permanent school, which they named Union Institute. After a brief period as Normal College (1851-59), the school changed its name to Trinity College in 1859 and affiliated with the Methodist Church.

The college moved to Durham in 1892 with financial assistance from Washington Duke and the donation of land by Julian S. Carr. In December 1924, the school's trustees gratefully accepted the provisions of James B. Duke's indenture creating the family philanthropic foundation, The Duke Endowment, which provided, in part, for the expansion of Trinity College into Duke University.

As a result of the Duke gift, Trinity underwent both physical and academic expansion. The original Durham Campus became known as East Campus when it was rebuilt in stately Georgian architecture. West Campus, Gothic in style and dominated by the soaring 210-foot tower of Duke Chapel, opened in 1930. Academic expansion of the university included the establishment of new graduate and professional schools.

Modern times have seen Duke realize its founder's aspirations to become a major center of learning. The Duke University Medical Center has achieved international prominence, and many Duke schools and departments are consistently ranked among the nation's best.

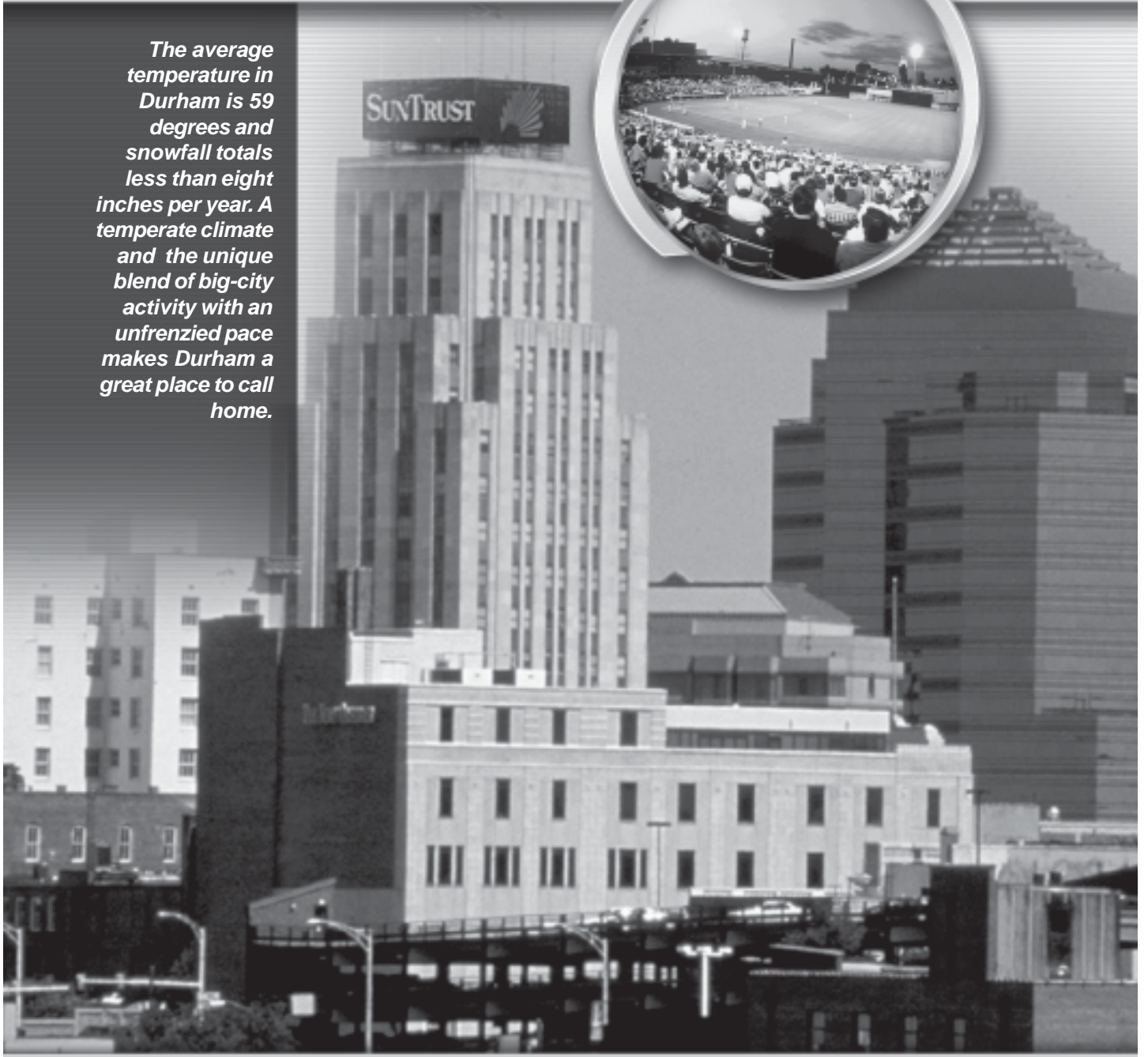



The average temperature in Durham is 59 degrees and snowfall totals less than eight inches per year. A temperate climate and the unique blend of big-city activity with an unfrenzied pace makes Durham a great place to call home.





In 2002, Employment Review Magazine ranked "The Triangle" area of Durham, Chapel Hill and Raleigh as the number one place in America to live and work. Money Magazine made the same selection in 1994.

The Durham Bulls, Tampa Bay's AAA baseball affiliate, are a popular attraction among area residents.

Located in the heart of North Carolina's rolling Piedmont region, Durham stands out as a gem among southern cities. Through the years, the city has evolved from a tobacco and textile town into an international center for medicine, scholarship, biotechnology and electronics.

Founded in 1853, Durham is widely recognized for its diversity. Originally a manufacturing center, the city now is known for excellence in medicine, education, research and industry. The wide range of activities available in the area lends the city a multifaceted appeal that strikes even first-time visitors.

Durham has a natural appeal as well, characterized by 98,000 acres of hardwood and evergreen forests including the only remaining old growth Piedmont bottomland forests and 7,800 acres of cropland. Hills and dales, meandering rivers and streams, several lakes, 26 rare plant species and several rare species of birds and animals can also be found here.

With 187,000 residents in the one-city county, Durham is the fourth-largest city in North Carolina. It is ideally located on the large and small scale. Within the immediate area it stands as the pinnacle of the "Triangle" region of North Carolina, a metropolitan population of 1,000,000 people that includes Chapel Hill to the south and west and Raleigh, the state capital, to the south and east. On a regional level, this area is the primary center of culture, sports, education and government between Washington, D.C., and Atlanta.

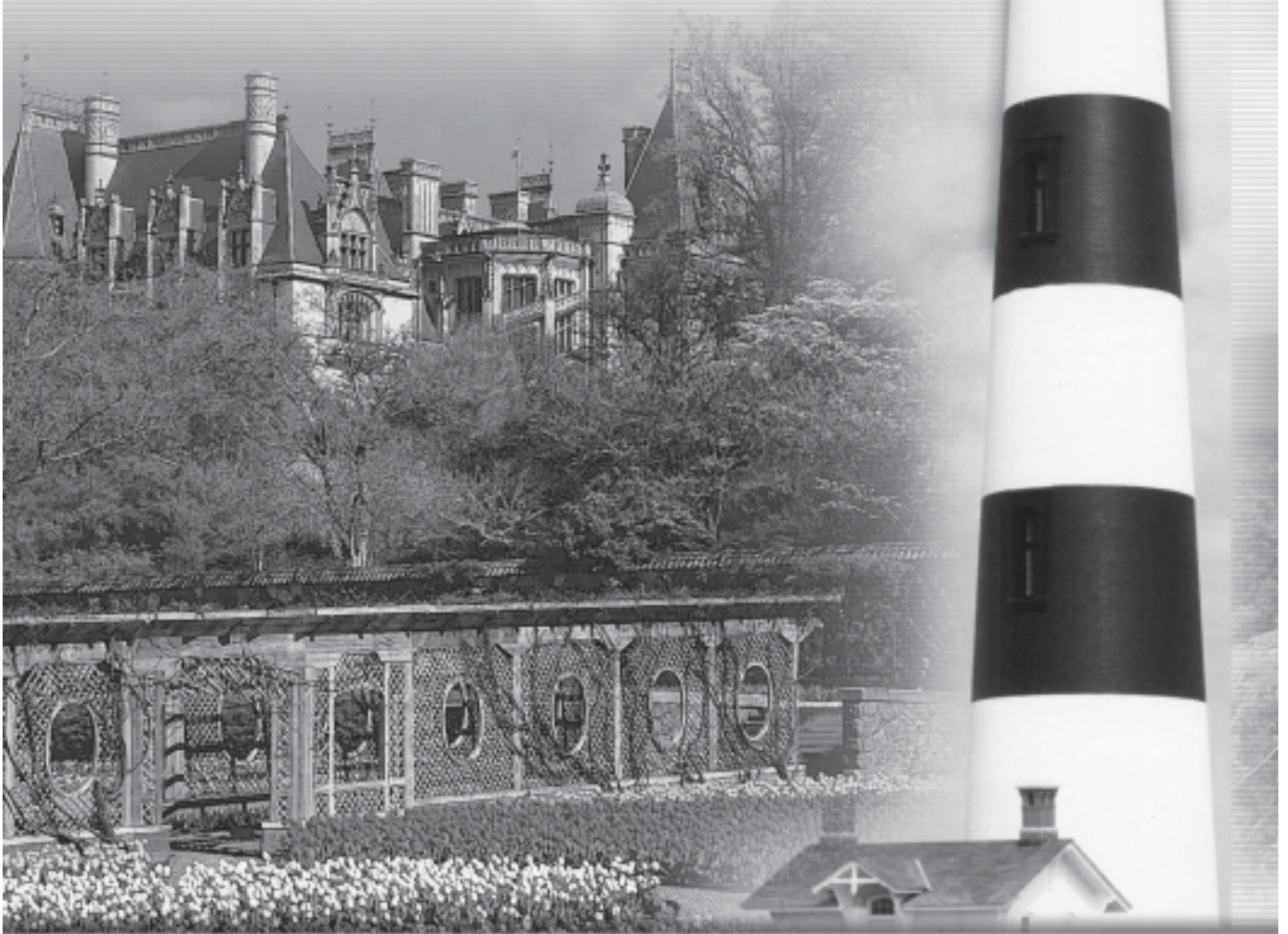

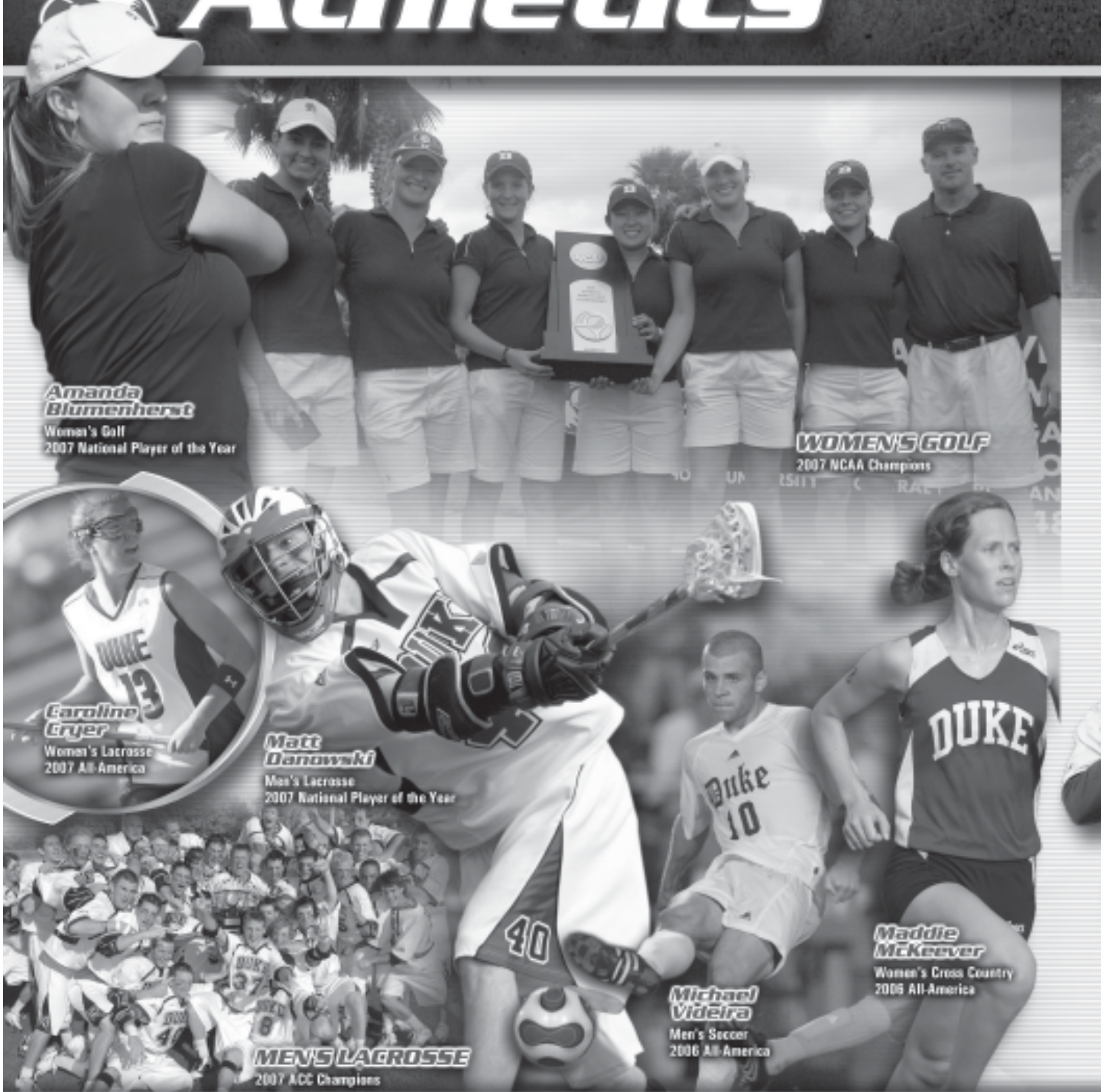

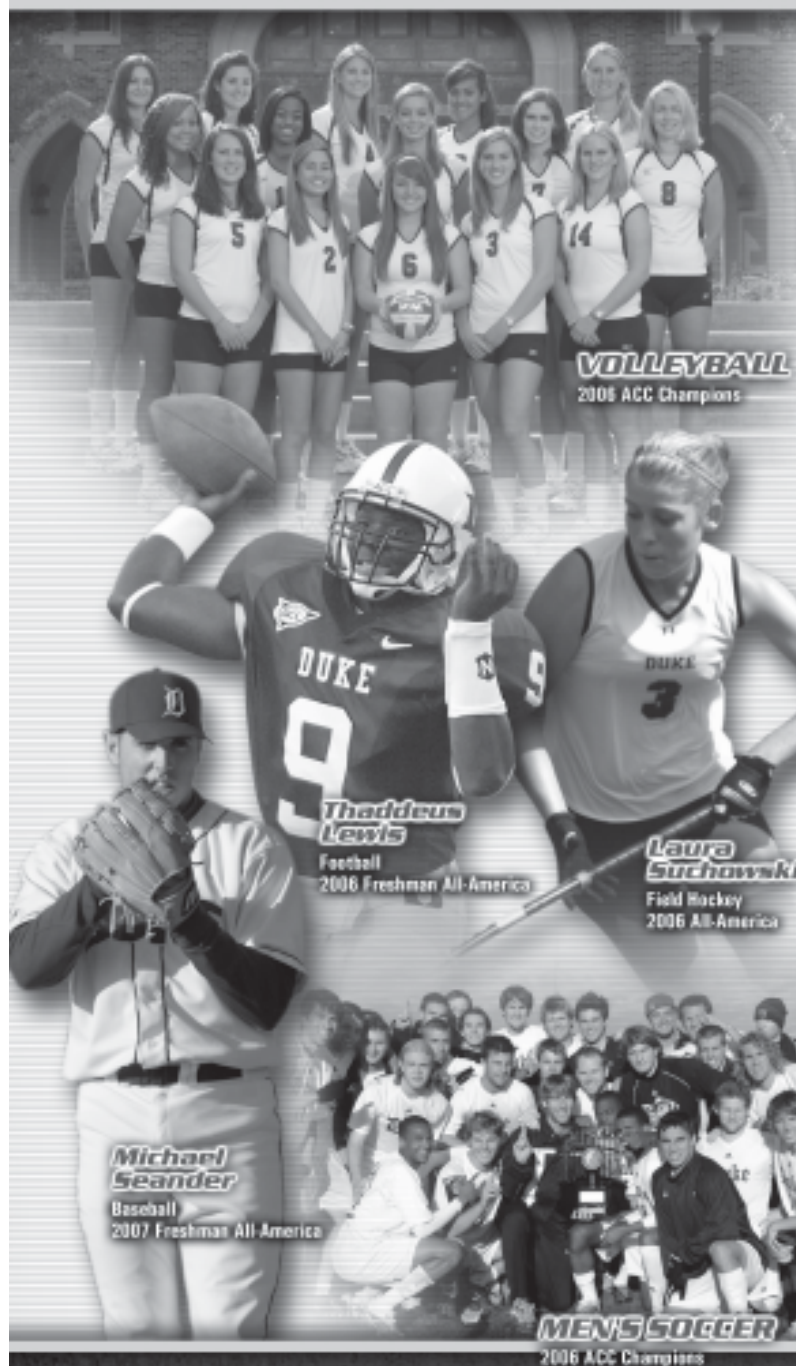

A mainstay among the elite Division I athletic programs, Duke University once again ranked near the top during the 2006-07 athletic year. The women's golf team collected its fifth NCAA Championship while the field hockey, women's lacrosse and men's lacrosse squads advanced to the NCAA Final Four.

The Blue Devils registered three ACC Tournament and five league regular season titles on the year.

Duke was also very successful nationally in 2006-07 as 17 teams competed in NCAA Tournament action. The Blue Devils had five teams finish in the top-10 of the national rankings. Here is a sampling of Duke's accomplishments:

- **Shannon Rowbury** became the first Blue Devil women's track & field member to claim NCAA Champion honors as she ran a 4:42.17 mile at the NCAA Indoor Championship.
- The Blue Devils had three National Player of the Year honorees (**Amanda Blumenherst**, **Matt Danowski** and **Lindsey Harding**), one National Defensive Player of the Year (**Harding**), one Rhodes Scholar (**Chas Salmen**) and one Lowe's Senior Class Award winner (**Alison Bales**).
- Fourteen Blue Devils were selected Academic All-America/National Scholar Athlete.
 - A total of 40 student-athletes were selected All-America during the season, while Duke boasted 54 All-ACC selections.
 - Four Blue Devils were named ACC Player of the Year— **Amanda Blumenherst** (women's golf), **Matt Danowski** (men's lacrosse), **Lindsey Harding** (women's basketball) and **Ali Hausfeld** (volleyball).
- Four Duke teams earned No. 1 national rankings during the season— women's basketball, women's golf, men's soccer and men's lacrosse— and four other teams achieved a ranking of No. 5 or better— field hockey (4), women's lacrosse (2), men's basketball (5) and women's cross country (5). Women's Basketball and women's golf each finished the season ranked No. 1 nationally.
- **Shannon Rowbury** and **Debra Vento** received NCAA Post graduate Scholarships.
- Women's soccer sophomore **Christie McDonald** was awarded the Wilma Rudolph Student Athlete Achievement Award after coming back from having brain surgery over the summer of 2006. She started 18 of 21 matches after returning.
- Duke student-athletes registered a 3.1 grade point average during the 2006-07 school year. A total of 26 varsity teams at Duke had a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher following the 2006-07 academic year.



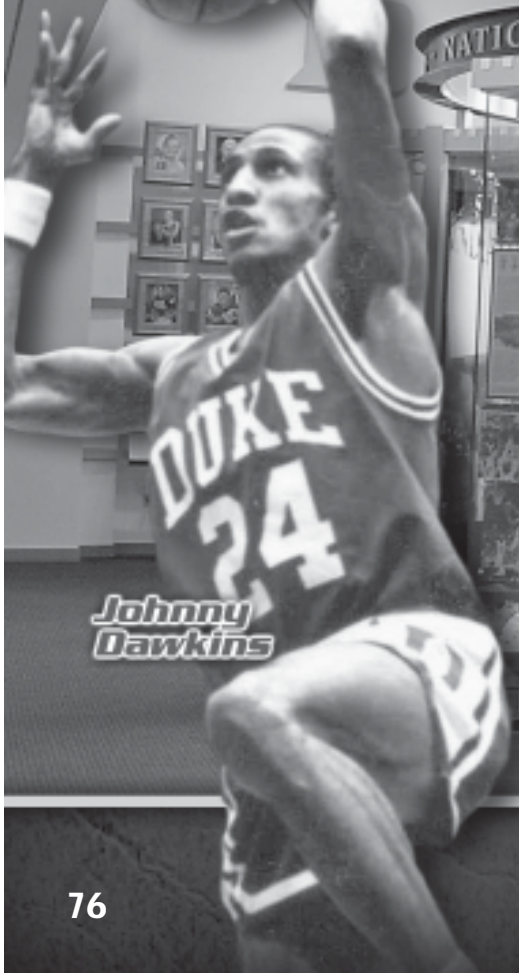

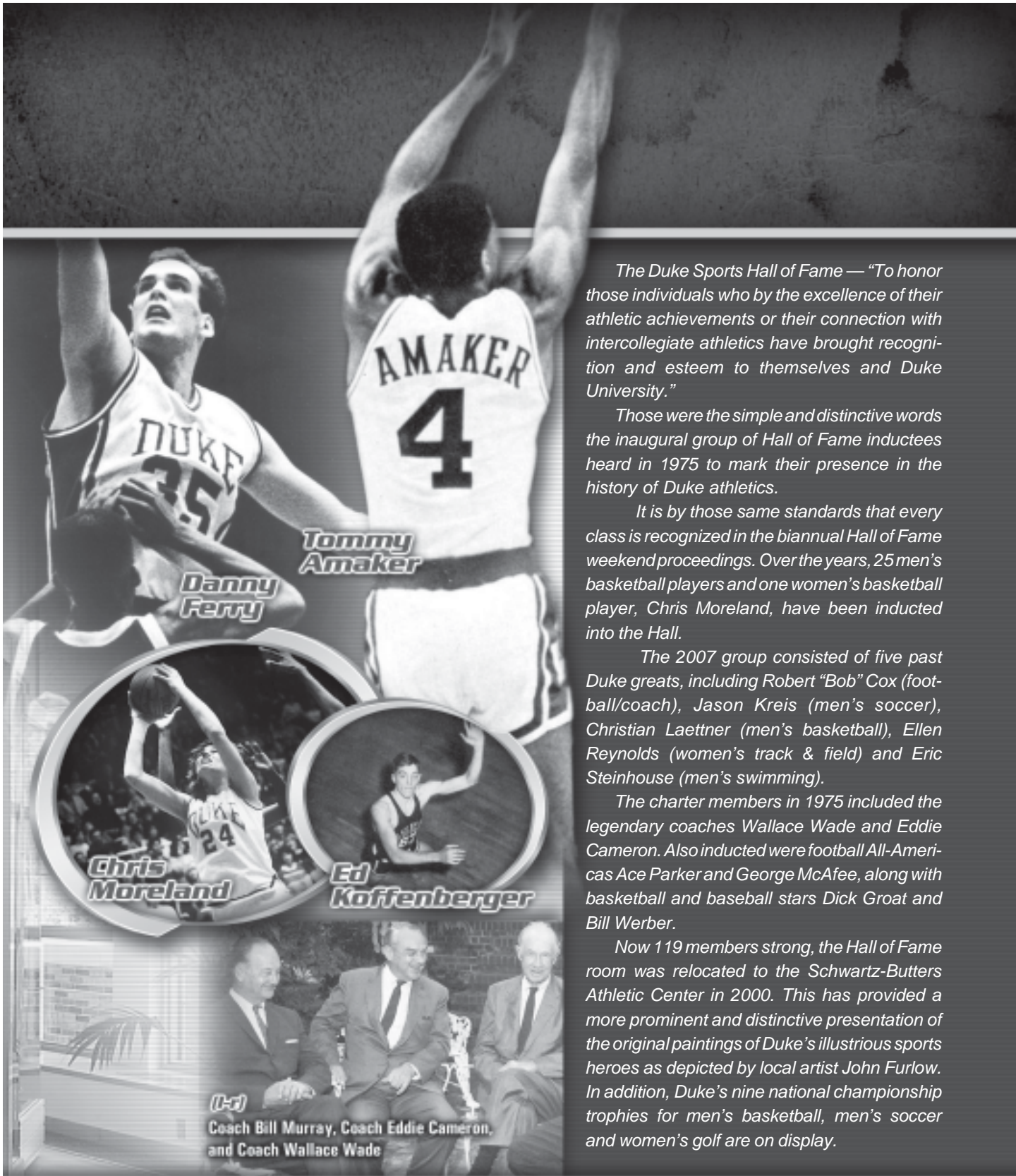

The Duke Sports Hall of Fame — “To honor those individuals who by the excellence of their athletic achievements or their connection with intercollegiate athletics have brought recognition and esteem to themselves and Duke University.”

Those were the simple and distinctive words the inaugural group of Hall of Fame inductees heard in 1975 to mark their presence in the history of Duke athletics.

It is by those same standards that every class is recognized in the biannual Hall of Fame weekend proceedings. Over the years, 25 men’s basketball players and one women’s basketball player, Chris Moreland, have been inducted into the Hall.

The 2007 group consisted of five past Duke greats, including Robert “Bob” Cox (football/coach), Jason Kreis (men’s soccer), Christian Laettner (men’s basketball), Ellen Reynolds (women’s track & field) and Eric Steinhouse (men’s swimming).

The charter members in 1975 included the legendary coaches Wallace Wade and Eddie Cameron. Also inducted were football All-Americans Ace Parker and George McAfee, along with basketball and baseball stars Dick Groat and Bill Werber.

Now 119 members strong, the Hall of Fame room was relocated to the Schwartz-Butters Athletic Center in 2000. This has provided a more prominent and distinctive presentation of the original paintings of Duke’s illustrious sports heroes as depicted by local artist John Furlow. In addition, Duke’s nine national championship trophies for men’s basketball, men’s soccer and women’s golf are on display.

Cameron Indoor Stadium has been a perfect home for the Duke University basketball program. Conceived on the back of a matchbook cover and renovated in the late 1980s at a cost of \$2 million, Cameron has been the site of 298 women's basketball victories.

It was on the cover of a book of matches that Eddie Cameron and Wallace Wade first sketched out the plan for Duke's Indoor Stadium in 1935. The story may be a myth (the matchbook has never been found), but then the Indoor Stadium that emerged from those first scribbles lends itself to the propagation of myths.

For 66 years, spectators, players and coaches have understood the unique magic of the Indoor Stadium. The building was dedicated to longtime Duke Athletic Director and basketball coach Eddie Cameron, a legend in his own right, on January 22, 1972. An unranked Duke team upset then third-ranked North Carolina, 76-74, after Robby West drove the length of the court to hit a pull-up jumper to win the game.

It's the intimacy of the arena, the unique seating arrangement that puts the wildest fans right down on the floor with the players. It's the legends that were made there, the feeling of history being made with every game. And it's something more than either of these, something indescribable that comes from the building itself.

The Stadium was ready to be opened by the first of the new year in 1940. The final cost: \$400,000 (which Duke finished paying after the football team won the Sugar Bowl in 1945).

Duke's new Indoor Stadium was officially opened on January 6, 1940. Touring the building before the evening ceremony and subsequent game, local city officials were "speechless." Said Chamber of Commerce President Col. Marion B. Fowler, "It is so colossal and so wonderful ... This building will not only be an asset to the university but to the entire community as well." Chamber Secretary Frank Pierson concurred, "There are no superlatives for it."

The building was dedicated before a crowd of 8,000, the largest ever in the history of southern basketball. President William P. Few and Dean William H. Wannamaker presented the Stadium to the University. The Blue Devils beat the visiting Princeton Tigers that night, 36-27.

Renovations to the arena began in 1987. The lobbies and concourse were remodeled during the summer of 1987. Then, in 1988, work began on the interior of the arena. A new electronic scoreboard, new sound system and decorative wood paneling gave Cameron an updated look, while maintaining the original elegance. The addition of 750 new student seats, increasing Cameron's capacity to 9,314, gave the Cameron Crazies, the Duke students who have made a name for themselves as Duke's exceptional "sixth man," a little more room to practice the art of supporting their team creatively.

In the early 1990s, the time was right to give Cameron an addition with new locker rooms, coaches' offices, an academic center and a new Sports Hall of Fame. Several years later, ground was broken for the new Schwartz-Butters Athletic Center after the end of the 1997-98 season. That complex now houses the men's and women's basketball programs, as well as Duke's athletic academic center.

The first part of that expansion and improvement project was the installation of a new floor in Cameron Indoor Stadium after the 1996-97 season. The latest advancements in floor technology were utilized to give the Blue Devils one of the finest playing surfaces in the entire country. Prior to the 1999-2000 season, a new press row was added. The latest renovation at Cameron is the addition of air conditioning, completed in 2002.

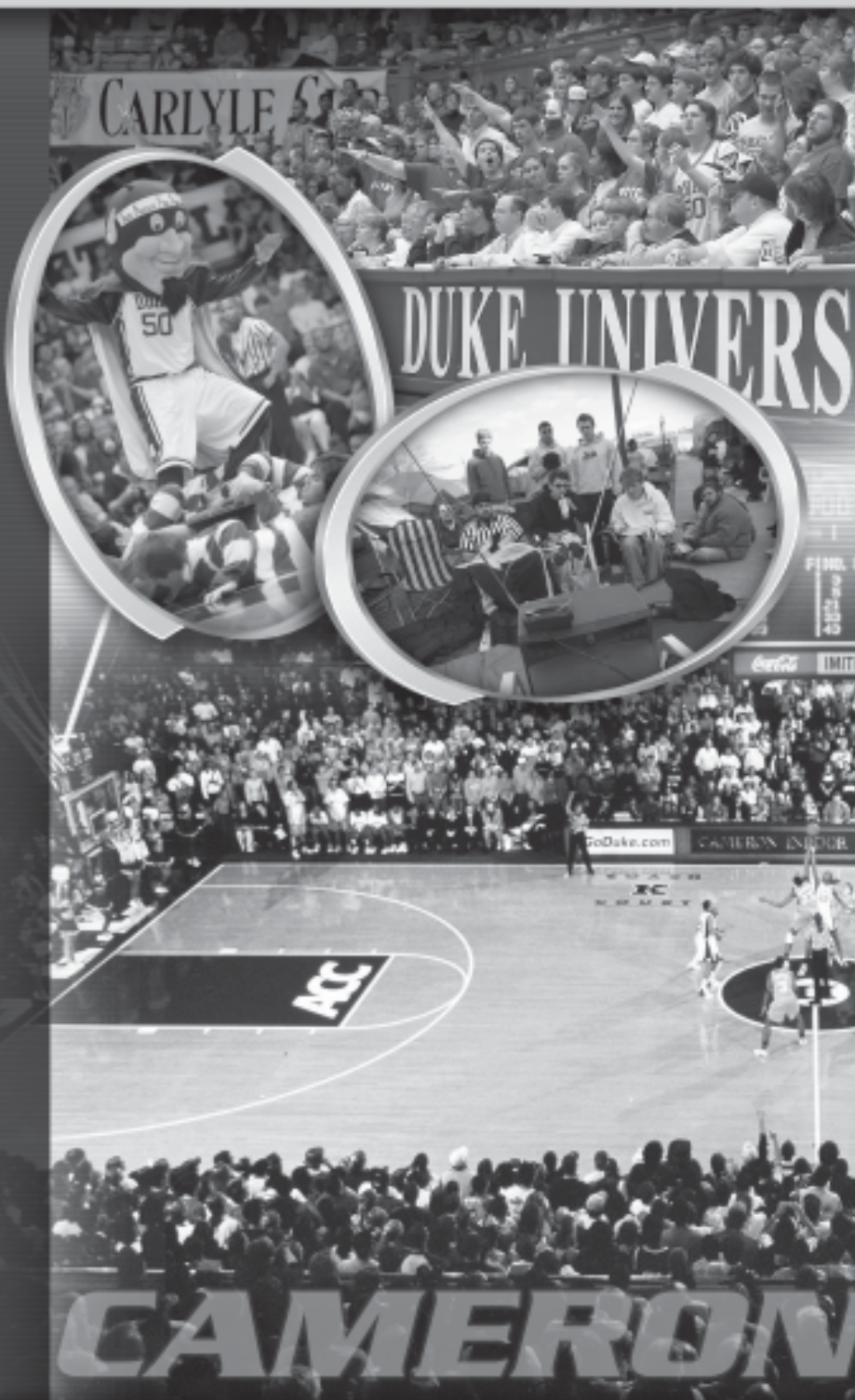

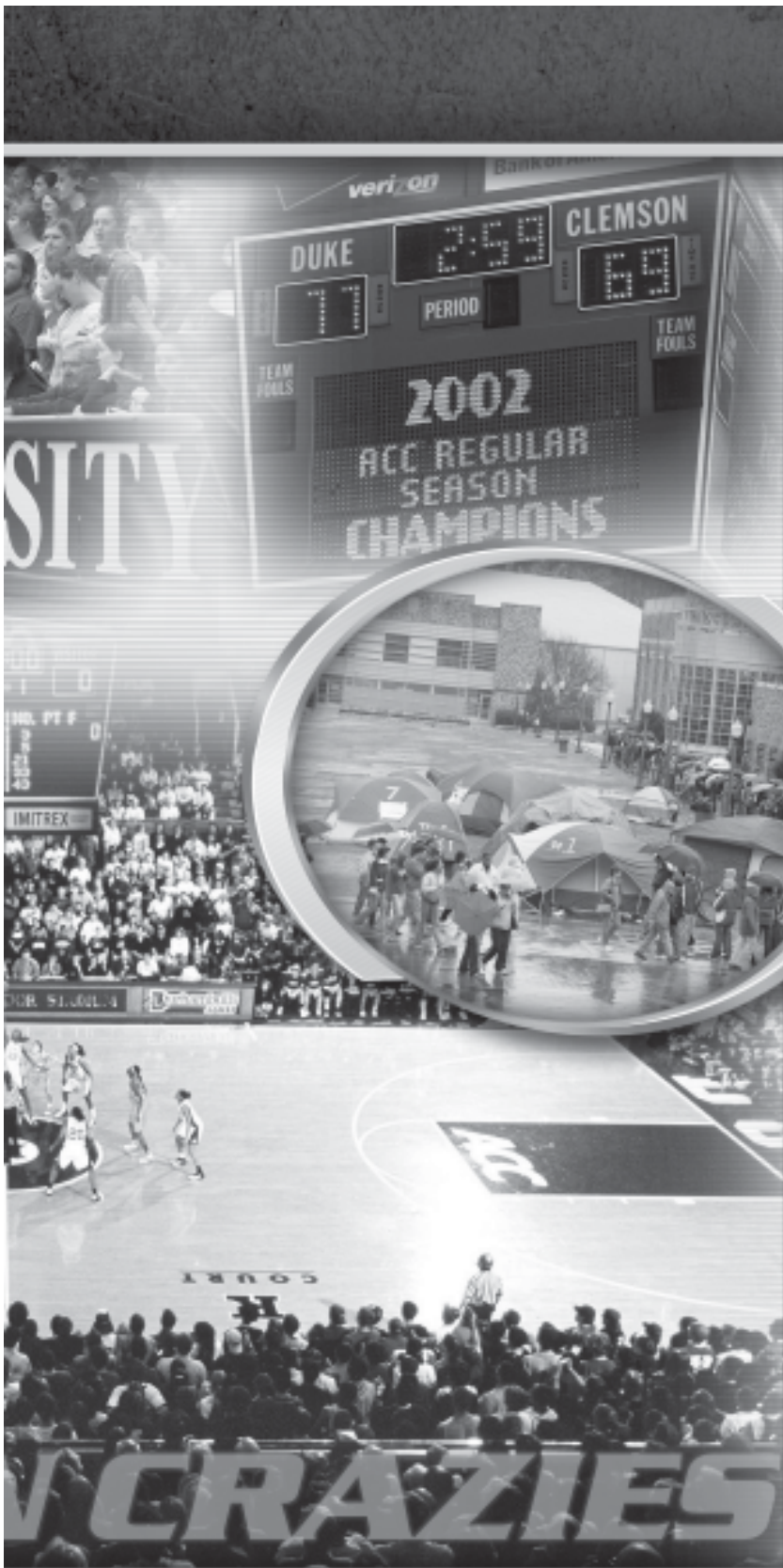

Home Sweet Home

Cameron Indoor Stadium celebrates its 68th season in 2007-08 as one of the greatest homecourts in all of college basketball.

Cameron has been a friendly home arena for the Duke women's basketball team over the last 32 seasons. The Blue Devils played the first two home games of their inaugural campaign, 1975-76, in the gym on East Campus, but moved over to Cameron for the third home game of that season and have played 412 home contests there since. The team heads into the 2007-08 campaign with a 312-104 (.750) all-time record at home. The Blue Devils posted a 20-game home ACC winning streak from 1997-2000.

Basketball Facilities



The \$15.2 million Center for Athletic Excellence (CAE) will be a first-class athletics complex designed to inspire, enhance and celebrate Duke University's extraordinary student-athletes in all 26 intercollegiate sports. The CAE will contain three vital components, all different in their use, but all three providing Duke University's student-athletes and the entire University community with a superior mental and physical training and preparation facility.

The first area, serving as the gateway to Duke's athletics campus and facing Wallace Wade Stadium will be the Johnson/Campbell Academic Support Center. This key area will serve as the home to over 600 student-athletes and their pursuit of academic excellence. The Support Center will be nearly double the existing space to expand tutoring, computer resources, one-on-one counseling and ample team study space.

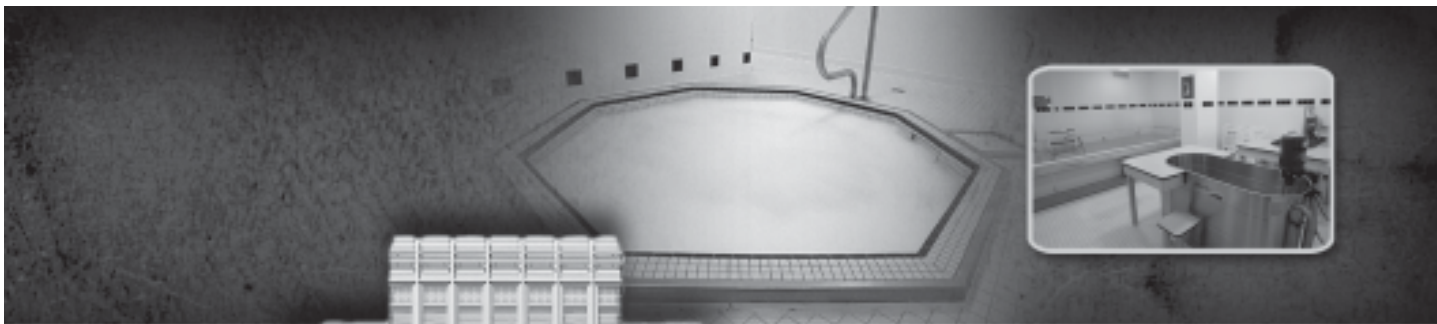
On the side facing the sparkling new David Rubenstein Center on Duke's West Campus will be a large gathering space — the Gil & Ruth Scharf Event Hall. This banquet space for over 300 people will be one of the most unique areas on all of Duke's campus.

The centerpiece of the 56,000 square foot Excellence Center will be two full-sized basketball courts in the Spike & Mary Yoh Practice Gymnasium to enhance year-round training for Duke's basketball programs. The gem of the basketball training facility will be the Player Development Wing featuring a world-class weight and conditioning room, and a state-of-the-art team and individual video viewing complex. Additionally, the Wing includes a Legacy Locker Room, an area for Duke's past players to call home for their offseason training. It will link Duke's past with the present in a private access training area to help keep Cameron Indoor Stadium a year round tourist and visitors destination point as well as keeping the arena open for large University gatherings, student concerts, as well as intercollegiate volleyball and wrestling competitions.

Gathering space in and around the Center for Excellence is another crucial piece of the project as the CAE will link Duke's many athletic facilities — baseball, soccer, tennis, lacrosse, football and basketball — within a short walking distance from one another. The Aubrey & Katie McClendon Plaza and Terrace will be a leisure and activity space highlighted by sitting benches, trees, bushes, and upscale landscaping with possible water features.

Construction on the Center began in September 2006 as fundraising for the building continues. The first-class and unparalleled Center is expected to be open in January 2008.





The home of Duke basketball is the Schwartz/Butters Athletic Center. The building, which is adjacent to Cameron Indoor Stadium, was dedicated on April 15, 2000. It is named after Alan D. Schwartz, a former Duke baseball player and the current executive vice president of Bear Stearns and Companies, Inc., and Tom Butters, Duke's long-time athletics director.

The six-story building overlooks Blue Devil Plaza, an open grassy area that connects several of Duke's athletic facilities, including Cameron Indoor Stadium, Card Gym, the Wilson Student Recreation Center and the Sheffield Indoor Tennis Center. During basketball season, Blue Devil Plaza transforms into Krzyzewskiville, the tent village of hundreds of Duke students waiting to get into games at Cameron Indoor Stadium.

The Schwartz/Butters Athletic Center is the anchor of the vast athletics complex, housing the Duke Sports Hall of Fame in addition to new offices, locker rooms and player lounges for both the men's and women's basketball programs. The 5,890 square-foot women's basketball locker room comes equipped with a Jacuzzi and sauna. There are weight/aerobic (1,475 square feet) and training facilities (1,075 square feet) with state-of-the-art equipment for the basketball team.

Additionally, the student-athlete academic center, under the direction of Brad Berndt, associate director of athletics, is housed on the third floor of the building. The academic floor was financed by a gift from Jack H. Campbell. Both the weight room and academic center will be moving to the Center For Athletic Excellence.

The Schwartz/Butters Athletic Center, part of a \$75 million athletic facilities renovation project at Duke, provides the Blue Devils with one of the finest facilities in all of college basketball. It is tangible evidence of the university's commitment to providing its student-athletes with top-notch facilities.

Sonny Falcone serves as Duke's strength and conditioning coach. The 51-year-old native of Durham has been on the Duke staff since 1980 and works with all varsity athletes in their conditioning and strength needs.

Falcone, a 1976 graduate of Duke University with a bachelor's degree in history, lettered three seasons as a defensive tackle on the football team.

Working from his office in the Duke football and training complex, he oversees the Blue Devils' modern weight training center. The weight room contains Nautilus, HydraGym, Universal, and over three tons of free weights.

Falcone resides in Durham and has a daughter, Christina (19), who is a sophomore on the Duke volleyball team.

Former Atlantic Coast Conference track champion and All-America Jeff Howser is in his eighth season as Duke's speed and conditioning coach.

A 1971 graduate of Duke, Howser was a six-time ACC champion with the Blue Devils. Recently named an ACC 50th Anniversary top 50 athlete in indoor track, he went on to earn a bronze medal at the 1969 World Championships in the 110-meter high hurdles and was an alternate on the 1968 United States Olympic Team. Howser ran track on the international level from 1968-82, and was a four-time U.S. Olympic Trials qualifier and two-time U.S. Olympic Trials finalist.

Stephens also serves as a reserve deputy for the Durham County Sheriff's Department. He and his son, P.J. (10), reside in Efland.

Sports Medicine

Led by nationally renowned physicians and certified athletic trainers, Duke's sports medicine program is widely considered one of the best in the nation. In essence, the mission of the sports medicine program at Duke is to combine the latest innovations and technology in injury recognition, prevention, treatment and performance enhancement with an outstanding collection of doctors, certified athletic trainers and other support personnel to give the Blue Devil student-athlete a quality experience while at Duke.

Duke student-athletes have access to some of the top doctors with vast experience in athletics at the college and professional levels, all of whom are affiliated with the Duke Sports Medicine Center. Dr. Claude T. Moorman III, former head team physician for the NFL's Baltimore Ravens, serves as the center's director and head team physician. A 1987 graduate from the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine, he returned to Duke after serving as the Director of Sports Medicine at the University of Maryland Medical Center from 1996-2001. Moorman, a Duke football letterman from 1980-82, heads the Sports Medicine Center staff, which also includes:

• **Alison Toth, MD** - Director, Duke Women's Sports Medicine Program; Assistant Professor of Surgery (Orthopaedics). Assistant team doctor for the NFL's New York Giants and the Iona College Gaels during the 2000-2001 season. Toth, a New Fairfield, Conn., native, graduated from Yale in 1990, where she played varsity basketball. Toth was the 1994 Valedictorian of her medical school class. She completed her orthopaedic surgery residency at Duke University Medical Center in 2000, and her Sports Medicine and Shoulder Surgery fellowship at the Hospital for Special Surgery at the Weill Cornell Medical Center in New York City in 2001. She is in her seventh year as Team Physician for Duke Women's Athletics. The Duke Women's Sports Medicine Program is one of the first programs in the country dedicated to the care of active women.

• **Debbie Squire, MD** - Pediatric Physician in the Duke Children's Faculty Practice and attending physician with the Duke Sports Medicine Clinic; In her 30th year at Duke and 25th as a team physician for the Duke women's basketball team. Squire, a Pittsburgh, Pa., native, graduated from Wheaton (Ill.) College and received her medical degree from Northwestern University. She completed her pediatric residency at Duke University Medical Center, where, during her year as chief resident and two years as Robert Wood Johnson Fellow, she served as a clinical fellow in sports medicine under the direction of Dr. Frank Bassett III, then team physician for Duke athletics. She is a founding member and former member of the Board of Directors of the American Medical Society of Sports Medicine (AMSSM) and served as President of the AMSSM from 1999-2000.

• **Jeffrey R. Bytomski, DO, FAOASM** - Medical Team Physician. Bytomski completed a fellowship at the Duke University Sports Medicine Center in 2002. During the fellowship, he worked with the women's soccer and women's basketball teams. He was also the medical team physician for North Carolina Central University and Carolina Cobras (Arena Football). Now in his fifth year at Duke, Bytomski is a 1993 graduate of San Diego State University. He completed his medical training at Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine in 1998 and family medicine residency at Phoenix Baptist Hospital.

The Duke athletic training staff is headed by **Dave Engelhardt**, now in his 26th year at Duke, and **Summer McKeehan**, who is the head women's basketball trainer.

McKeehan, now in her seventh year at Duke, works year-round with the Blue Devil women's basketball program. She also assists with the Duke fencing and cheerleading programs.

A 1998 graduate of Utah State with a degree in Exercise and Sport Science, McKeehan enters her second year with

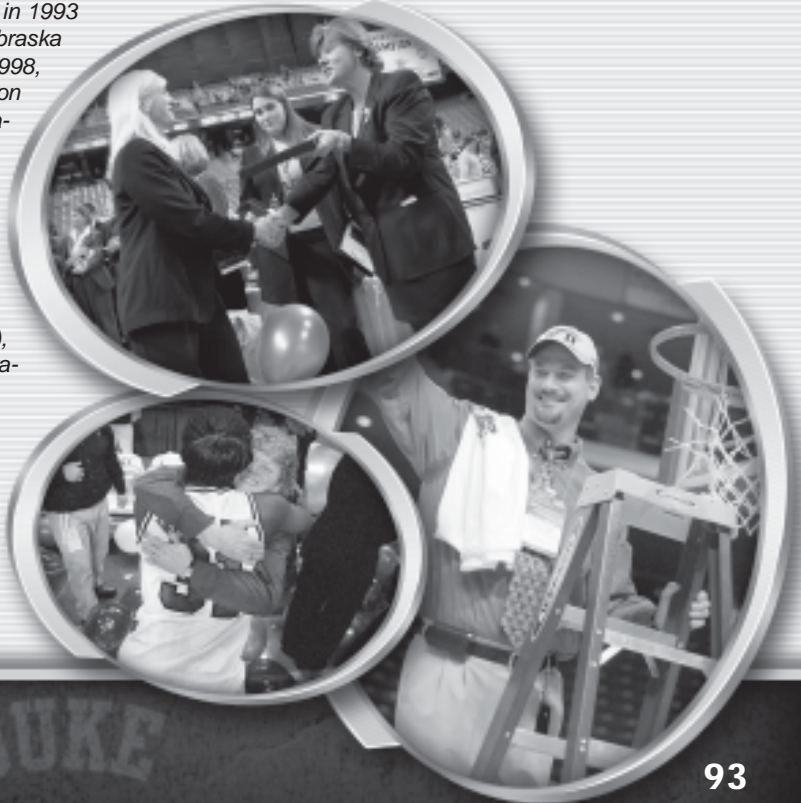
Kerry Mullenix serves as the director of athletic rehabilitation in the Duke training room. He has a bachelor's degree with an emphasis in athletic training from Nebraska in 1993 and a master's degree in physical therapy from the Nebraska Medical Center in 1997. Prior to arriving at Duke in 1998, the Woodbine, Iowa, native worked at Jennie Edmundson Sports Medicine in Iowa and at Healthworks Rehabilitation Center.

Other certified athletic trainers on staff who assist in the care of Duke student-athletes include **Hap Zarzour** (football), **Jen McCollum** (women's lacrosse), **Joe Ferraro** (men's lacrosse, men's and women's golf, men's track & field), **Jose Fonseca** (men's basketball, men's tennis), **Andrew Norden** (baseball, men's soccer), **Kristi Hall** (rowing, wrestling), **Nicole Gehrich** (volleyball), **Nick Potter** (physical thera-

pist) and **Jennie Serenelli** (field hockey, women's tennis).

Other facets of the sports medicine program include the very best training meals, monitored by sports nutritionist Franca Alphin, access to sports psychologists, and the ability to utilize the resources of the Duke Sports Medicine Center. Those resources include The Duke Sports Medicine Clinic, Michael Krzyzewski Human Performance Lab (K-Lab) and the Duke Sports Performance Program. Each program brings an important element to the care of Duke student-athletes.

In the summer of 2002, Duke opened its newest training room in the Yoh Football Center. It is a 5,500 square-foot facility, featuring extensive hydrotherapy system, rehabilitation and treatment areas. The hydrotherapy area includes a 10 x 20 multidepth rehabilitation pool featuring an underwater treadmill, an 8 x 8 chiller pool and an 8 x 8 warm whirlpool. The treatment area is highlighted by modern modalities and the latest technological equipment. Duke's new rehabilitation equipment ensures constant monitoring and thoughtful progression through every stage of rehabilitation. An unweighted treadmill and Biodex muscle testing and rehabilitation equipment are also featured in Duke's rehabilitation area.

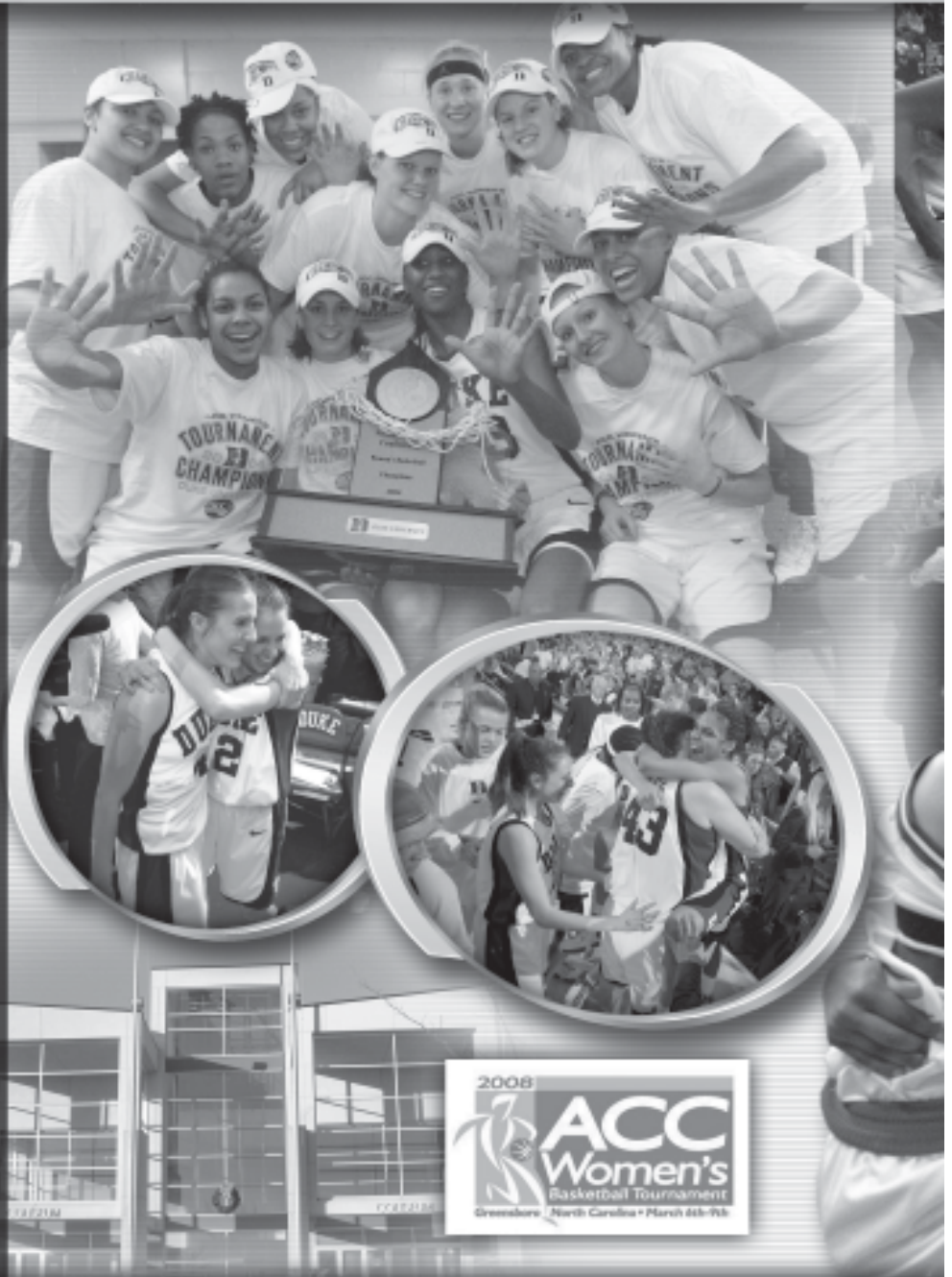

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 55th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 105 national championships, including 56 in women's competition and 49 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 139 times in men's competition and 86 times in women's action.

Since 1977, when the league adopted women's basketball and a tradition of excellence was established, the ACC has continued to soar to new heights. The 2005-06 season marked the first time in NCAA history that a conference sent three teams to the same Final Four. The title game pitted an automatic ACC winner as second-seeded Maryland faced No. 1 seed Duke. The Terrapins claimed their first national title in school history and the league's second with a thrilling 78-75 overtime game at the TD Banknorth Garden in Boston, Mass., on April 4, 2006.

Following the 2006-07 season, Duke became the first ACC team and only the 14th in NCAA history to finish a regular season undefeated (29-0), while the 34 wins for North Carolina marked the most in program history.

Eight ACC teams earned postseason bids in 2007, including six NCAA Tournament berths. It also marked the fifth consecutive year the league has sent at least six to the Big Dance. With 67 percent of its membership competing in postseason play, the ACC boasted the highest league participation in the nation.

Over the years, ACC women's basketball teams have gained global recognition through their television exposure. The 2006-07 schedule featured 54 televised games, the most in ACC women's basketball history. The television package included 97 television appearances. In addition, the ACC broadcasted nine games on ESPN2 and five on Fox Sports Net and affiliates. Thirty matchups were featured on the league's regional sports network, which includes Comcast SportsNet, Fox Sports Net South, SunSports and New England's Sports Network (NESN).

The league's women's basketball programs continue to rank among the best in the country in terms of the NCAA Tournament, having made 138 appearances and won 184 games in the last 30 years, 26 of them as a number one seed. In addition to sending three teams to the same Final Four for the first time in history, the league boasts such national accomplishments as sending at least one team to the "Sweet 16" for 19 consecutive years and at least one to the Final Four in 11 of the last 19 years. The conference has also made 14 trips to the Final Four in the last 26 years with three teams finishing second and North Carolina and Maryland capturing National Championships in 1994 and 2006, respectively.

Since the inaugural season of the Women's National Basketball Association in 1997, the ACC has been a recognizable presence in the league. Sixty-one former ACC stars have played on the hardwood in the WNBA, while five former players have worked the sidelines as coaches. Three ACC players were selected in the first round of the 2007 WNBA Draft as the trio was selected in the first 11 picks of the round. In all, nine league players were selected in the 2007 WNBA Draft, matching the league's draftee total of 2006.

In addition, ACC women's basketball players have earned first team Academic All-America honors 10 times, including Virginia's Val Ackerman in 1981, the former President of the WNBA. In 1997, NC State's Jennifer Howard was tabbed GTE CoSIDA Academic Player of the Year after posting a flawless 4.0 grade point average throughout her career. Thirteen players have earned ACC postgraduate scholarships, while three others were named NCAA Postgraduate Scholars.

Duke in the Community

Duke student-athletes are an integral part of their community. In addition to hosting several "Meet the Blue Devils" events on campus, the Department of Athletics community outreach efforts continue with its highly successful reading program entering its 14th year of existence in the Durham Public School System. Intended to aid area teachers by providing reading incentives for third and fourth graders in Durham, the program touches area youth.

Verizon remains the title sponsor of the Read with the Blue Devils program. Verizon uses the Duke program as a model for other schools and organizations across the nation.

From day one of the program, school visits by Duke student-athletes have been a major component. Duke athletes from nearly all 26 sports, including many women's basketball players, adopt a school and make periodic visits to classrooms, working with the kids on reading and goal-setting. By pairing male and female athletes to make the visits, Duke student-athletes provide positive role models for both boys and girls at elementary schools.

For the past five Christmas holidays, members of the women's basketball team have purchased gifts for families in need, wrapped the gifts and taken the presents to the families prior to heading home for the holiday. It has provided gifts to those families that need help the most.

Ever since the early 1990s, the women's basketball team has visited the Ronald McDonald House of Durham. The team annually cooks a meal for the children and makes many other trips to visit during the year.

The Blue Devils also conducted the Duke Women's Basketball Classic, which benefitted the Durham Ronald McDonald House for 12 years. Prior to running the tournament, Duke set aside one home game during the season from which proceeds benefitted the Ronald McDonald House.

As a senior in 2005-06, Mistie Williams started a program called "Read For The Cure" in which she purchased books and took them to the Ronald McDonald House where she would read them to the children. After she was done reading, Williams would leave the books for them to start a library.

Duke's athletic program ranks among the finest in the entire nation. Duke ranked 11th in the 2007 final Directors' Cup standings, a measure of a school's all-around athletic success.

Nine Blue Devil teams have captured national championships — men's basketball in 1991, 1992 and 2001, women's golf in 1999, 2002, 2005, 2006 and 2007, and men's soccer in 1986.

Duke was very successful nationally in 2006-07 as 17 teams competed in NCAA Tournament action with three advancing to the Final Four. Three Duke squads earned ACC championships, bringing its total to 41 over the past nine years. Individually, Duke boasted 40 All-America selections and three National Players of the Year.

The Blue Devils also dominated the league awards, notching 54 All-ACC selections, four Players of the Year and four Coaches of the Year.

Off the playing fields and courts, Duke continued to excel academically. In the 2007 ACC Academic Honor Roll awarded to student-athletes for a GPA of 3.0 or higher, Duke led all schools for the 20th consecutive year with 394 honorees.

Storylines...

- ▶ During the season, the Blue Devils knocked off six teams which ended up winning their tournament championship games— Bowling Green, Marist, North Carolina, Old Dominion, Rutgers and Vanderbilt.
- ▶ Duke entered the NCAA Tournament with only one loss (30-1), becoming the 26th team in NCAA history to advance to the tournament with only one loss. The Blue Devils had only one loss in 2003 and advanced to the NCAA Final Four.
- ▶ The Blue Devils notched nine victories against teams in the top 25 of the NCAA RPI, which was the second-most for the season— Tennessee (12), Duke (9), Purdue (5), Connecticut (5), North Carolina (5), Georgia (5), Maryland (4) and Vanderbilt (3).
- ▶ With Duke's win versus UNC on Feb. 25, the Blue Devils finished the year with a 14-0 mark in Cameron Indoor Stadium. It was the first time in school history Duke has gone undefeated at home in a single season.
- ▶ For the first time in the 32-year history of Duke Women's Basketball, the Blue Devils opened the season with a 30-0 mark, which was also an ACC record. Duke finally got over the 20-0 hump after winning the first 20 contests in both 2002-03 and 2005-06 before losing the 21st game.
- ▶ The members of the 2006-07 Duke team never lost to eight of the 12 ACC teams. The Blue Devils own win streaks against the following schools— North Carolina (2), Maryland (2), Florida State (3), Miami (4), Boston College (4), Virginia Tech (7), Clemson (10), Virginia (13), Georgia Tech (27) and Wake Forest (30). Duke's senior class of **Lindsey Harding** and **Alison Bales** only suffered losses to Florida State, Maryland, N.C. State and North Carolina over their ACC careers.
- ▶ Duke was the only team in the ACC who had started the same lineup in all of its games in 2006-07.
- ▶ With a victory against Boston College on Feb. 15, Duke posted its ACC-record 10th straight 12-win ACC season.
- ▶ Duke was No. 2 in the NCAA RPI in 2006-07. Tennessee was first followed by Duke, Connecticut, North Carolina and Rutgers. The Blue Devils posted 21 wins against teams ranked in the top 68, six in the top eight, 11 in the top 24 and 16 in the top 48 of the NCAA RPI.
- ▶ As a team, the Blue Devils owned a 777-391 advantage in points off turnovers on the year.
- ▶ After being picked third in the preseason with no first place votes, Duke registered its eighth overall ACC regular season title and its sixth out of the last seven years by going 14-0 in league play. Overall, the Blue Devils have claimed the regular season title in 2006-07, 2004-05, 2003-04, 2002-03, 2001-02, 2000-01, 1998-99 and 1997-98. Duke's eight regular season titles ranks as the second-most to Virginia (11) in ACC history.

Trends...

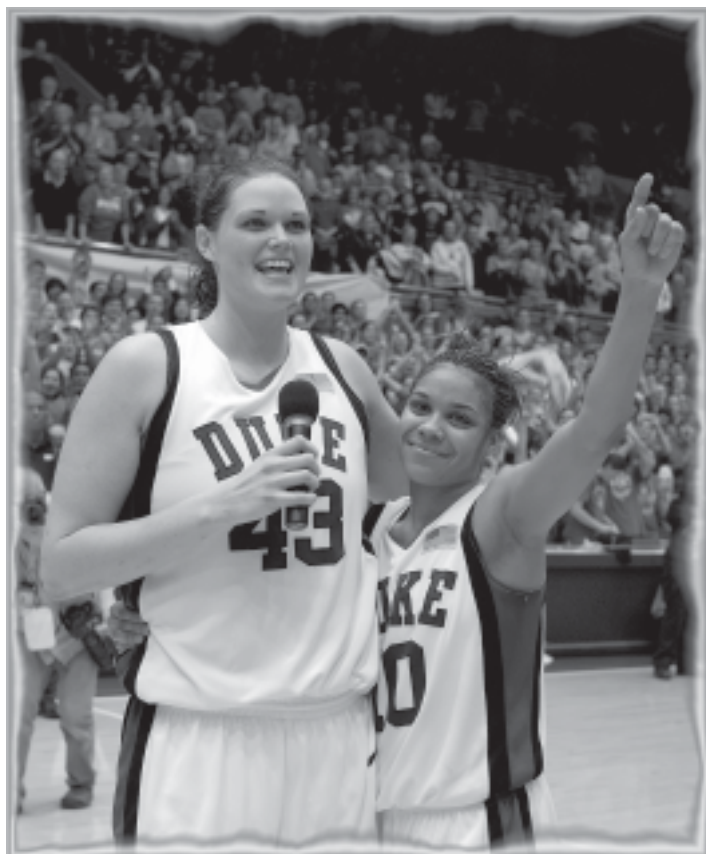
- ▶ **Alison Bales** blocked more shots (151) in 2006-07 than Duke's opponents (117), and more than nine of the other 11 ACC opponents. Only 21 players in the ACC (besides Bales) have blocked at least 140 shots in their careers.
- ▶ After playing only 23 minutes and scoring four points in three NCAA Tournament contests in 2006, sophomore **Carrem Gay** provided Duke with key post play in the "Big Dance" in 2007. Gay averaged 11.0 points, 6.3 rebounds, 1.7 steals and 0.3 blocks, while hitting 71.4 percent of her field goals. She was the only Duke player to register double-digit points in all three contests as she registered 10, 13 and 10 points.
- ▶ **Joy Cheek** played key minutes off the bench for the Blue Devils, averaging 5.3 points and 3.8 rebounds, but was especially effective towards the end of the season. She had a career-high 14 rebounds versus UNC to close out the regular season in a season-high 24 minutes, and in the ACC Tournament quarterfinal contest against Virginia and NCAA Tournament game against Holy Cross, she scored 10 points. On the season, Cheek totaled double-digit scoring a total of six games, including one double-double which came in her first collegiate game versus Northeastern on Nov. 11, 2006

- ▶ Senior **Lindsey Harding** was the second Duke player to notch 1,000 points and 500 assists for their career— Alana Beard had 2,687 points and 509 assists from 2001-04. She was also the second Duke player and ninth ACC player to post 1,000 points, 500 assists and 250 steals in a career— Donna Holt (UVA), Dawn Staley (UVA), Alana Beard (DU), Pam Leake (UNC), Debbie Lytle (MD), Angie Armstrong (NCSU), Deanna Tate (MD) and Nikki Teasley (UNC).
- ▶ Duke freshman **Bridgette Mitchell** ranked second on the Blue Devil squad with 70 offensive rebounds even though she played the second-fewest minutes on the team (405). Mitchell averaged 4.0 boards while playing just 12.3 minutes a contest.
- ▶ Senior **Lindsey Harding** earned 128 wins in a Blue Devil uniform, which was the most in school history, as she moved past Mistie Williams, who won 127 games over the previous four years. Fellow senior **Alison Bales** ranked seventh on the overall wins list with 122 victories.

Trey Tallies...

Over the final five games of the season, **Abby Waner** broke out of a three-point shooting skid as she nailed 19-of-32 (59.4 percent). In those contests, she hit 12-of-12 in the first half from downtown at one point. In the previous five games, Waner had hit 4-of-29 from three-point range. During the season, she nailed a career-high six treys in a single game on four occasions.

Waner ended the season one three-pointer shy of setting Duke's new single season record for treys made, as she connected on 68 attempts in 34 games, which tied Jessica Foley's mark of 68 in 2004-05. Waner broke the Duke record for most three-pointers in a game in NCAA Tournament play against Holy Cross in the first round with six.

Duke As A No. 1 Seed...

The Blue Devils were a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament for the sixth time in school history and the sixth time out of the last seven years in 2006-07. The Blue Devils previously earned top seeds in the 2001, 2002, 2003, 2004 and 2006 tournaments, while advancing to the NCAA Final Four in 2002, 2003 and 2006. The six selections as a No. 1 seed since 2001 is the most in the NCAA.

Duke owns an all-time record of 20-6 when seeded No. 1. and owns an overall 72.5 winning percentage in the tournament.

Consecutive NCAA Appearances...

The Blue Devils were one of only seven teams competing in their 13th straight NCAA Tournament in 2007 — Tennessee (26), Stanford (20), UConn (19), Old Dominion (16), Purdue (14), Duke (13) and Georgia (13). The NCAA regional appearance marked the 10th consecutive for Duke, which ranks as the third-longest current streak in the NCAA behind Tennessee (26) and Connecticut (14). Duke has posted the third-best win total in the last nine years of the NCAA Tournament. The Blue Devils own 30 victories and rank only behind Connecticut (38) and Tennessee (37). The Blue Devils are one of only three teams (Tennessee & Connecticut) that have advanced to the Sweet 16 the last 10 consecutive years.

The Record Book...

Senior **Alison Bales** notched a Duke single-season record 151 blocks on the year to move into a tie for second place (with Texas Southern's Michelle Wilson, 1989) on the NCAA single-season charts, just one rejection shy of Jackson State's Amie Williams' total of 152 swats (2003). Her 434 career blocks rank third on the NCAA career list and first in both the Duke and ACC record books, while her 804 rebounds rank fifth on the Blue Devil career charts. Bales' 265 boards in 2006-07 ranked seventh on the Duke single-season list.

Senior **Lindsey Harding** totaled 579 assists to her credit for her career, a mark which ranked seventh in the ACC record book and first on the Duke charts. In the same category, junior **Wanisha Smith** ranks seventh on the Blue Devil charts (410 assists) and ranks 10th on the single-season list (133 assists in 2006-07). Harding has tallied 1,298 points over her career, a total that ranks 12th all-time at Duke. She also ended her career in third place on the school's career steals list with 261 swipes.

Sophomore **Abby Waner** tied the top mark for the most three-pointers made in a season at Duke with 68 on the year, and now sits in 10th place on the school's career charts with 118 treys made. Waner's 85 steals in 2006-07 ranked fourth-best on the Blue Devil single-season charts.

In The NCAA Stats...

The final version of 2006-07 NCAA stats were released on April 3, 2007, and the Blue Devils once again were a consistent presence in the majority of the statistical categories. Duke came out on top in won-lost percentage (94.1) and ranked second in both scoring defense (51.4), scoring margin (24.1) and free throw percentage (33.6). The Blue Devils blocked 6.6 shots a game for a ranking of No. 3 at season's end, while, individually, senior **Alison Bales** ranked first in the nation with 4.4 swats per outing. As a team, Duke managed 17.1 assists per game to rank ninth and posted 8.4 rebounds

a game to rank 12th in the NCAA. The Blue Devils also were No. 12 in scoring offense (75.5 points per game) and ranked 13th in field goal percentage (45.8 percent).

Bales' Swat Club...

In six games in the 2006 NCAA Tournament, 6-7 center **Alison Bales** blocked 30 shots, which ranks as the best NCAA Tournament output in its history. In three games in the 2007 NCAA Tournament, Bales added 11 rejections to her career total for tournament play, as she finished with 62 blocks in 15 NCAA Tournament games, which is a 4.1 per game average, to her credit.

Bales is the all-time blocks leader in the NCAA Tournament — **Alison Bales** of Duke (62), Ruth Riley of Notre Dame (39), Rebecca Lobo of Connecticut (38), Cheryl Miller of USC (37), Katrina McClain of Georgia (27) and Cindy Brown of Long Beach State (24).

30 Wins Once Again...

With its victory over Virginia on March 2, the Blue Devils became the first team in NCAA history to register its seventh straight 30-win season. The previous record was Duke (2001-07) and Louisiana Tech, which had six straight 30-win seasons on two different occasions (1979-84 and 1996-2001).

The Blue Devils reached the 20-win mark for the 10th straight season on Jan. 22 at Tennessee. The ACC record for most consecutive 20-win seasons is 14 by Virginia and the second-best streak is Duke's current 10-straight mark.

Regular Season Perfection...

Duke went undefeated for the third time in school history in ACC action with its 14-0 record this season against ACC opponents. In 2001-02 and 2002-03, the Blue Devils posted 16-0 records for the first time in school history. Only Duke in 2001-02 and 2002-03, Virginia in 1994-95 (16-0) and 1990-91 (14-0) and N.C. State in 1979-80 (9-0) and 1977-78 (9-0) had posted undefeated regular seasons in ACC action prior to 2006-07. The Blue Devils also became the 14th team in NCAA history to go undefeated in the overall regular season and the first since Connecticut in 2003.

Non-Conference Winning Streak...

The Blue Devils posted a 35-game winning streak against non-conference opponents over the last two years prior to the Rutgers loss in the NCAA Tournament. Duke went 17-0 against non-conference foes in 2006-07 prior to the Rutgers loss and last lost to a non-conference opponent on March 28, 2005 (Louisiana State, 59-49, in the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament). The previous longest non-conference winning streak was 14 in 2000-01.

Holding Opponents Down Low...

Duke's held its opponents to 50 points and under a total of 16 times in 2006-07, which is a new school record. This broke the previous record of 12 which was set in 2004-05 and 2002-03. Duke also held 28 foes to under the 60-point mark, which ties the single-season record from the 2002-03 campaign.

The Blue Devils held opponents to 51.4 points a game, which ranks seventh among scoring defenses in NCAA history. LSU registered an NCAA-record 49.0 scoring defense in 2006-07, breaking Delaware State's previous record of 49.6 in 2005, Utah (51.0 in 2003), Utah (51.1 in 2001) and New Mexico (51.1 in 2004) round out the top five.

In terms of field goal percentage defense, Duke's 33.6 percentage ranks as the tied for 14th-best in NCAA history. Connecticut's 31.5 percentage in 1995 is the record with Montana's 31.7 (1993), Connecticut's 32.1 (2002), South Carolina State's 32.2 (1991), Jackson State's 32.2 (2003), LSU's 32.5 (2007), Liberty's 32.8 (1995) rounding out the top seven.

Balanced Scoring...

For the first time since the 1997-98 campaign, the Blue Devils did not have a player averaging over 15.0 points a contest. Duke had three players averaging double-figure points — **Lindsey Harding** (13.6), **Abby Waner** (14.1) and **Alison Bales** (11.9). Only three times in the Gail Goestenkors era has a squad not had at least one player averaging more than 15.0 points a contest (1997-98, 1993-94, 1992-93).

In 34 contests, all 10 players scored double-figures in at least one game. Eight of the 10 Blue Devils who played last year led Duke in scoring in at least one game.

Against Ranked Opponents...

The Blue Devils collected a 10-2 record against ranked opponents as Duke won its first 10 contests before falling to 24th-ranked N.C. State in the ACC Tournament Championship game and 15th-ranked Rutgers in the NCAA Sweet 16.

Duke played five ranked opponents over a six-game span prior to the Christmas holiday and recorded a 5-0 record against those opponents. What is more amazing was the 23.8 scoring margin in those contests, as four Blue Devils averaged double-figure points—**Lindsey Harding** (16.3), **Abby Waner** (12.9), **Alison Bales** (12.6) and **Wanisha Smith** (11.1).

Taking on four straight ranked opponents in the regular season was a first in the Duke record books. (Duke faced four consecutive ranked foes in the NCAA Tournament in 2001-02 and 2005-06). Duke posted a record of 88-64 in games against ranked opponents under Gail Goestenkers, but over the last six years the Blue Devils were 60-20 against ranked teams. The Blue Devils are 19-4 against ranked foes at home since 2000-01.

The 1,000 Point Mark...

Senior **Alison Bales** became the 21st player in Duke history to reach the 1,000-point mark with her 16 points against North Carolina on Feb. 25. Classmate **Lindsey Harding** registered her 1,000th point on Dec. 29 at Dartmouth and junior **Wanisha Smith** ended the season 27 points shy of collecting 1,000 points.

Bales Going Double And Dishing The Rock...

All season long, senior **Alison Bales** came close to posting double-doubles as she notched 10 games this year coming up one or two rebounds shy of a double-double. On the season, the 6-7 center secured a team-best five double-doubles, including four over the final 14 contests. All five double-doubles came over the last 17 games.

Over her career, Bales totaled 12 double-doubles. Ten of the 12 came during her junior and senior campaigns. Her 7.8 rebounding average in 2006-07 was the best of her career, but her numbers got even better in ACC action with an 8.9 average, which ranked third in the league. Bales ranked fifth on Duke's all-time rebounding list (804).

Not only was Bales effective in blocking shots and rebounding over her career, but was one of the best passing post players in the ACC. Bales dished out 187 assists for her career, including 67 helpers during her senior campaign for a 2.0 average.

Blue Devils Return To No. 1...

For the fifth straight year, the Duke Women's Basketball team was tabbed No. 1 in the nation by the Associated Press poll. On Jan. 15, the Blue Devils received 37 of 50 first place votes and moved to the top slot, after collecting an 81-62 victory over previously unbeaten and No. 1 Maryland on Jan. 13. Duke was ranked No. 1 for nine straight weeks and in the final poll, released on March 12, Duke received 46 of 50 first place votes.

Overall, Duke has been ranked No. 1 in the Associated Press poll a total of 34 weeks over the last five years and has collected a record of 53-6 while being ranked No. 1. The 34 weeks is tied for fifth with Old Dominion in the all-time rankings.

Looking Up...

In ranking all of the Division I women's basketball teams as far as height, Duke ranked as the sixth-tallest team in the nation at 72.55 average inches - Wake Forest (73.27), Marquette (72.82), Illinois (72.75), Auburn (72.62), Texas (72.57), Duke (72.55), Florida State (72.42), UCLA (72.21), Stanford (72.11) and Purdue (72.10). The Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) was the tallest league with a 71.44 with the Big Ten ranking second at 71.41.

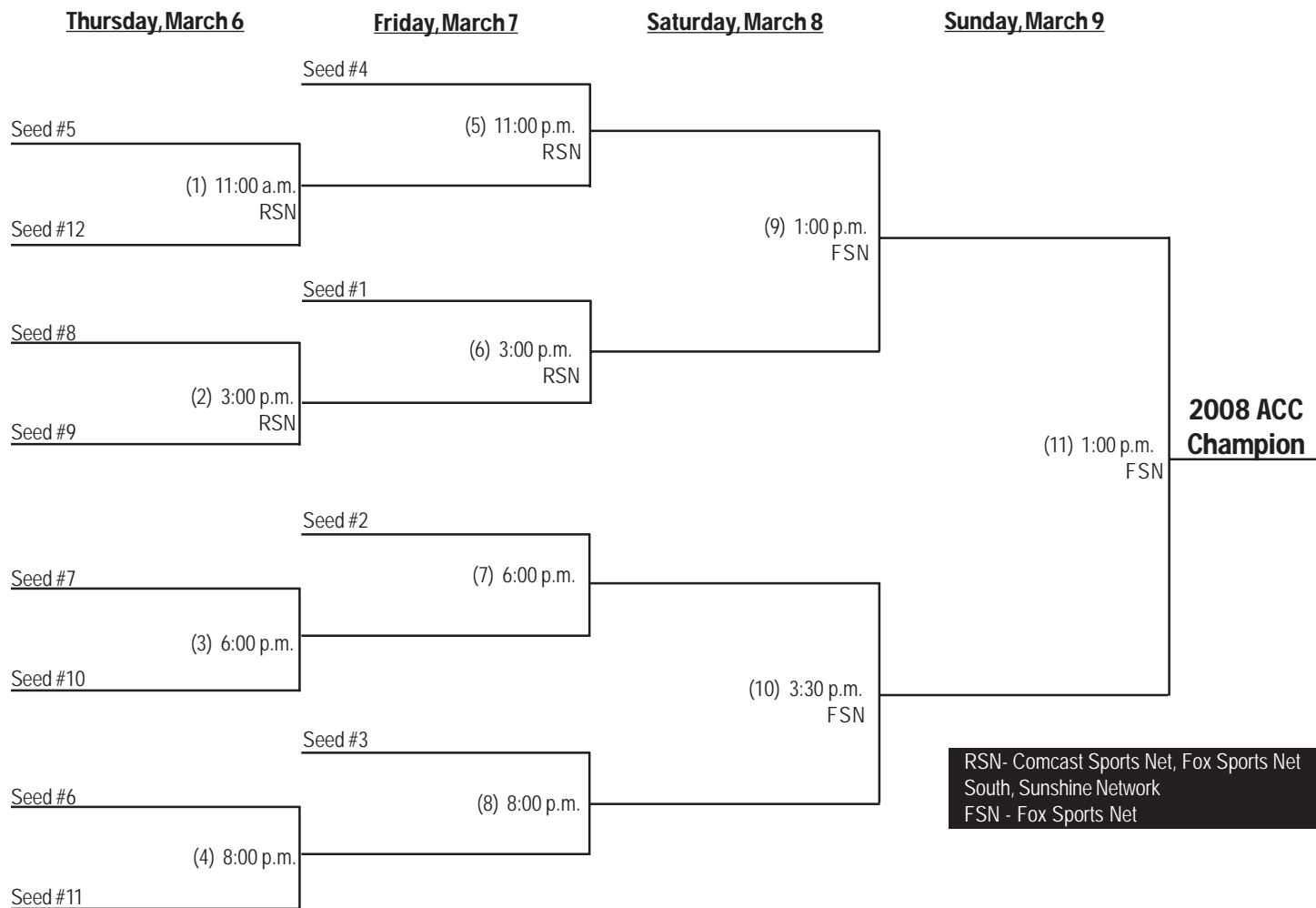

ACC Tournament Building History

In the past 30 years of the ACC Women's Basketball Tournament, there have been eight different sites. The inaugural tournament was held in 1978 at University Hall on the campus of the University of Virginia in Charlottesville. The Tournament then moved to Reynolds Coliseum in Raleigh, N.C., in 1979, hosted by North Carolina State University. The University of Maryland's Cole Field House in College Park was the site of the 1980 Tournament, while Clemson University's Littlejohn Coliseum, was home to the 1981 event. It returned to Reynolds Coliseum in 1982.

The Conference Tournament remained in North Carolina from 1983 to 1991, hosted by Fayetteville's Cumberland County Memorial Arena. The Tournament then moved to Winthrop Coliseum in Rock Hill, S.C., for a four-year span (1992-96), until the 1997 Tournament moved to Independence Arena in Charlotte, N.C., which hosted the event for three years. Over the last eight years, the ACC Women's Basketball Tournament was held in the Greensboro Coliseum, which will also serve as its home through the 2009 Tournament.

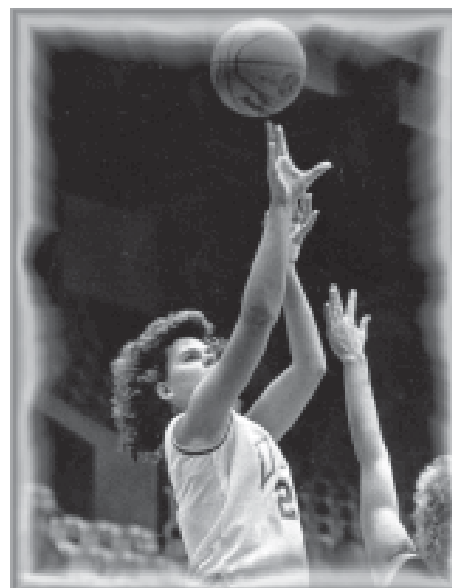

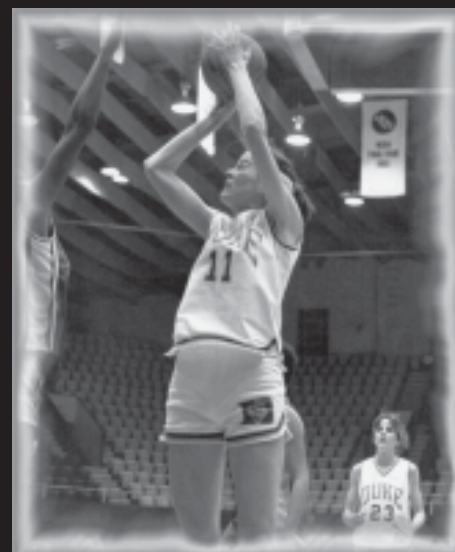

WBCA Defensive Player of the Year

Lindsey Harding, 2007

Alana Beard became the first Duke women's basketball player in school history to earn National Player of the Year accolades in 2003. Beard earned the Victor Award and ESPN.com National Player of the Year, after averaging 22.0 points, 6.9 rebounds, 3.0 assists, 2.8 steals and 1.3 blocks as a junior.

In 2004, Beard was named winner of the State Farm Wade Trophy, the inaugural Wooden Award, ESPN.com, Associated Press and USBWA National Player of the Year honors, after posting averages of 19.7 points, 5.4 rebounds, 3.9 assists and 2.4 steals.

Since 1999, Duke has registered at least one player on the Kodak All-America squad every year except one. Michele VanGorp earned the first Kodak selection for Duke in 1999 and since then Georgia Schweitzer, Beard, Iciss Tillis and Monique Currie and Lindsey Harding have each been selected.

VanGorp averaged 16.9 points, 5.5 rebounds, 1.1 assists and 1.0 blocks in 1999 as the Blue Devils advanced to the NCAA Final Four and ACC Championship game for the first time in school history. She played a huge role in defeating the three-time defending NCAA Champion Tennessee to advance to the Final Four.

In 2001, Schweitzer guided Duke to a 30-4 record and a trip to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16, while averaging 14.1 points, 4.7 rebounds, 4.1 assists and 1.5 steals. She hit a then school-record 65 three-pointers on the season.

Currie was the runner-up for numerous National Player of the Year awards in 2004-05 and challenged for a second straight season in 2005-06.

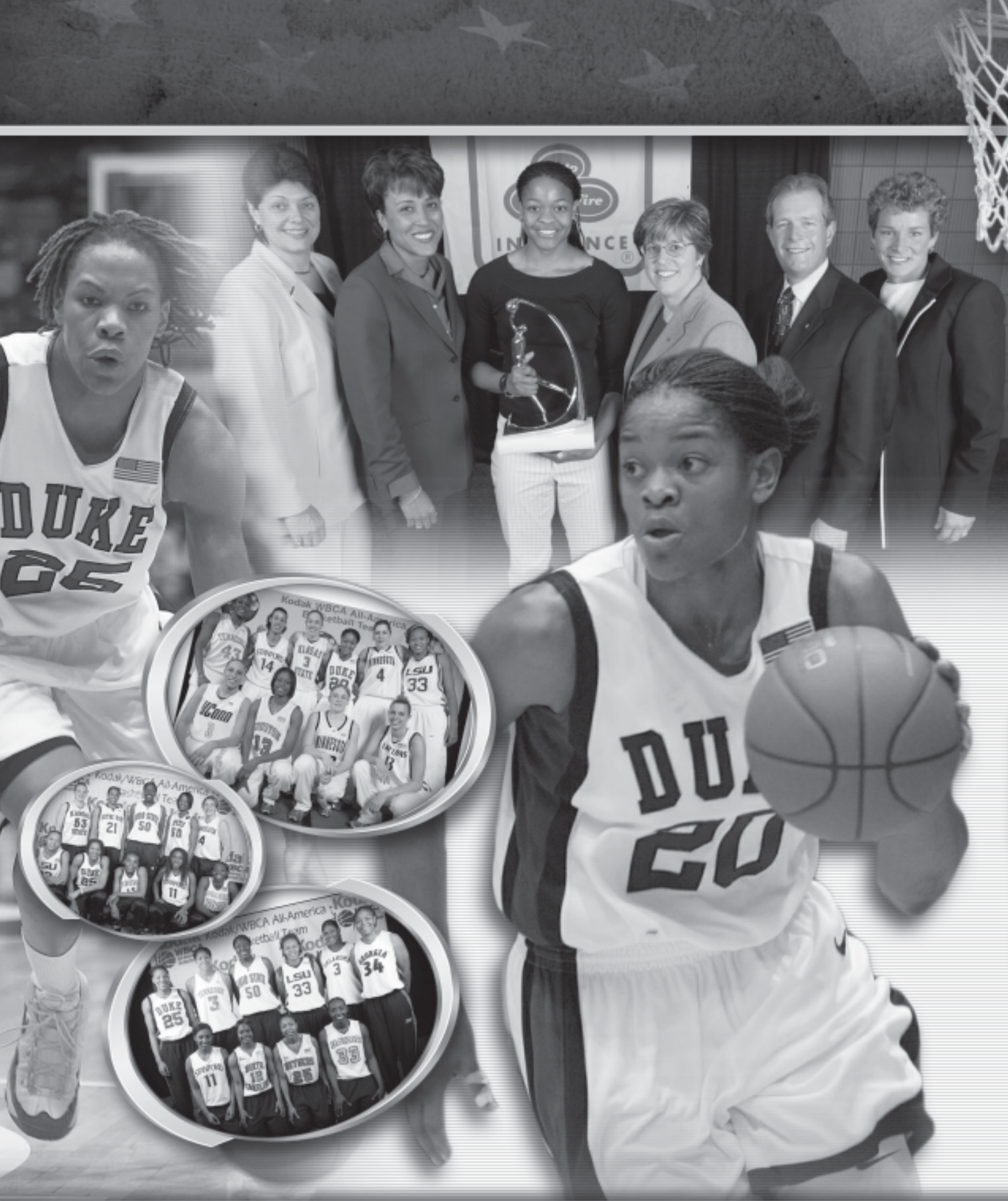

In 2006-07, Lindsey Harding was named Naismith and ESPN.com National Player of the Year after averaging 13.6 points, 4.0 rebounds, 3.0 assists and 1.5 steals. She helped guide Duke to a perfect 29-0 mark in the regular season becoming the first ACC squad and 14th team in NCAA history to go undefeated in the regular season.

Harding was also selected the inaugural winner of the WBCA National Defensive Player of the Year award. Game in and game out she guarded the opponents best scorer and held many of the top players in the nation under their scoring averages.

Also in 2006-07, senior Alison Bales was a finalist for the State Farm Wade Trophy as she blocked 151 shots, averaged 11.9 points, 7.8 rebounds and 4.4 blocks on the season. The 151 blocked shots was the second-most in NCAA history.

Duke is the only team in Division I to have at least one representative on each of the Kodak All-America teams since 2001.

The number 20 jersey is one of the most iconic in Duke's history. It's worn by legends like Christian Laettner and Grant Hill. Now, it's being worn by Alana Beard, a star player who has led Duke to the top of the ACC. Beard's leadership and skill on the court have made her a fan favorite. Her jersey is being retired as a testament to her impact on the program.



BEARD 20 JANUARY 24, 2004



On Jan. 24, 2004, Alana Beard became the first women's basketball player at Duke to have her jersey retired. The number 20 will hang from the rafters in Cameron Indoor Stadium and won't be worn again by a Blue Devil.

A sellout crowd of 9,314 packed Cameron Indoor Stadium to view the ceremony in a contest versus Tennessee. Beard, a native of Shreveport, La., joined the 11 men's basketball players who have had their jersey retired.

In attendance along with Alana were her parents LeRoy and Marie Beard.

Over her career, Beard was the 2002-03 and 2003-04 National Player of the Year, was a three-time ACC Player of the Year, three-time Kodak All-America, three-time Associated Press All-America, four-time All-ACC Defensive selection and we could go on and on...

Beard left Duke scoring an amazing 2,687 points, which is more than any women's player in Duke history. For her career, Beard registered averages of 19.8 points, 5.8 rebounds, 3.7 assists, 3.0 steals and hit 52.7 percent of her field goals.

Over the four years, she was selected ACC Player of the Week an ACC-record 18 times, which is 11 more than any other player in the 29-year history of the ACC. Beard was also the first player in ACC history to be named ACC Player of the Year for three straight years.

On Sunday, Jan. 20, 2008, Lindsey Harding will have her jersey retired during the contest against N.C. State. Over her career, Harding scored 1,298 points, had a school-record 579 assists, 565 rebounds and 261 steals.

Harding became only the second Duke player (Alana Beard) and sixth ACC player in league history to notch over 1,000 points, 500 assists, 500 rebounds and 250 steals over their career.

Duke has been a springboard for student-athletes going from Durham to the professional ranks after graduation. From playing overseas, in the American Basketball League (ABL) and the Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA), the Blue Devils have been well-represented.

Kira Orr was the first Duke player to be drafted professionally in the ABL in 1997 by the Seattle Reign in the fourth round, while Michele Van Gorp was the second player from the class of 1999 selected in the 1999 WNBA draft. Van Gorp was picked in the second round with the 18th overall pick by the New York Liberty.

In 2000, Peppi Browne was drafted by the Charlotte Sting in the WNBA with the 43rd overall pick in the third round. Due to a knee injury she never played for the Sting.

For the third consecutive year, Duke had a player picked in the 2001 WNBA draft as Georgia Schweitzer was selected in the second round by the Miami Sol with the 21st overall selection. Schweitzer was then traded to the Minnesota Lynx where she played in 70 games in three years.

In the 2004 WNBA Draft, Duke was represented in the first round with two players being picked-- Alana Beard second by the Washington Mystics and Iciss Tillis 11th by the Detroit Shock. Beard became the highest player drafted from the Atlantic Coast Conference and Duke was the only school to have two players drafted in the first round.

Beard has gone on to be named to the WNBA All-Star team three straight years.

Monique Currie was selected third in 2006 by the Charlotte Sting, Mistie Williams was 21st by the Phoenix Mercury before being traded to the Houston Comets, while Jessica Foley was picked 38th by Indiana.

Currie came out in 2006 and was named to the WNBA's All-Rookie Team, after averaging 10.5 points and 3.9 rebounds for the Charlotte Sting. Currie was traded in 2007 to her hometown team -- Washington Mystics.

Last year, Lindsey Harding became the ACC's first No. 1 pick in the WNBA Draft as she was selected by the Phoenix Mercury, before being traded to the Minnesota Lynx. Harding was on her way to being named WNBA Rookie of the Year in 2007 before suffering a torn ACL injury.

Also in 2007, Alison Bales was picked ninth by the Indiana Fever and ended up playing in 17 contests. The Fever advanced to the semifinals of the WNBA playoffs.

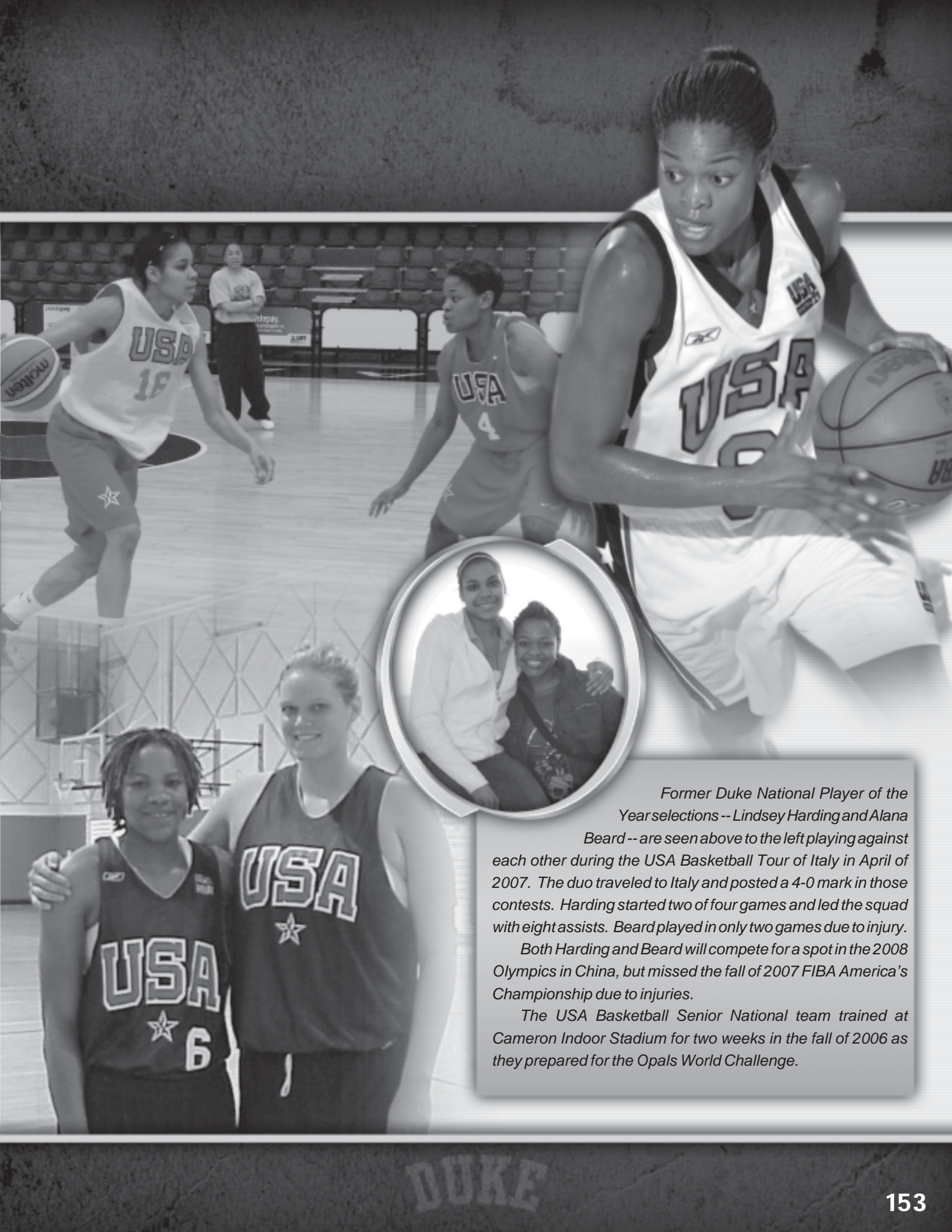

Beard started eight of 11 contests in the 2006 spring training session and led USA to a 10-1 mark. She led the squad with 25 steals and 25 assists as she played the second-most minutes on the team.

In the 2006 Opals World Challenge, Beard started all five games as the USA squad posted a 4-1 record and finished in first place. She averaged 8.6 points, 4.0 rebounds, 2.2 assists and 1.9 steals in the challenge.

She also played in the 2007 Tour of Italy and averaged 8.0 points in two contests before being injured.

The duo traveled to Italy and posted a 4-0 mark in those contests. Harding started two of four games and led the squad with eight assists. Beard played in only two games due to injury.

Both Harding and Beard will compete for a spot in the 2008 Olympics in China, but missed the fall of 2007 FIBA America's Championship due to injuries.

The USA Basketball Senior National team trained at Cameron Indoor Stadium for two weeks in the fall of 2006 as they prepared for the Opals World Challenge.



Jessica Foley, Australia

Growing up in Australia, 2006 graduate Jessica Foley has played on numerous Australian National teams since 1999 and is currently a member of the Senior National team, the 'Price Attack' Opals.

This past summer, Foley played in the World University games and led the squad to a gold medal, while averaging a team-best 16.6 points.

Over the summer of 2005, Foley was selected to play for the World University Games team and the 'Price Attack' Opals squad, but was unable to participate due to an injury.

Foley now plays professionally in Australia for Adelaide in the WNBL.

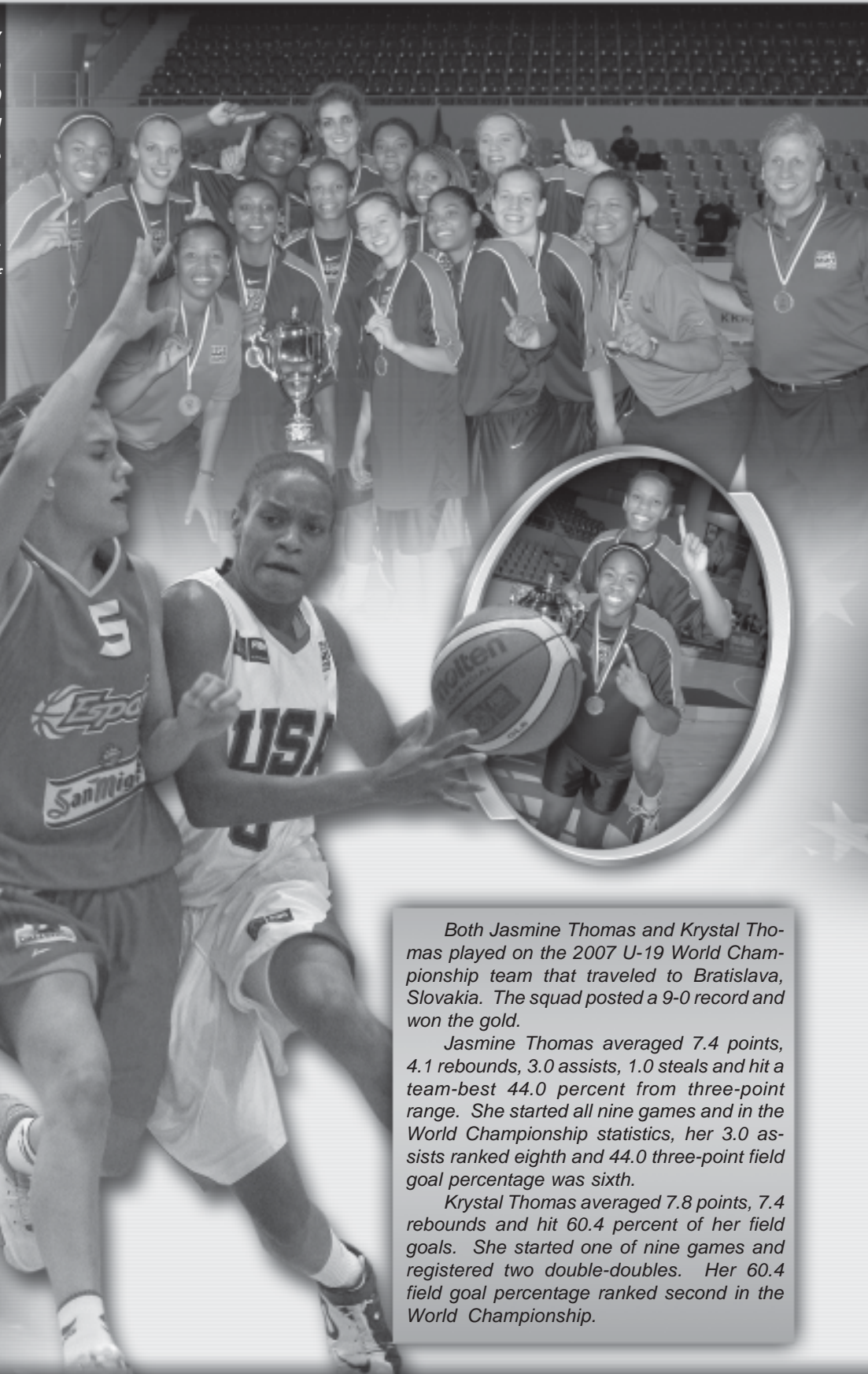


Chris Moreland (left) was Duke's first player to play for USA Basketball in 1986 as she was selected to the 1986 U.S. Olympic Festival squad. Since 2000, the Blue Devils have had at least one representative each summer travel with USA Basketball and has won a total of 14 gold medals in that time. Overall, Duke has garnered 25 medals with USA hoops since 1988.



The Blue Devils have been a mainstay with USA Basketball over the years. In this decade, Duke has registered 20 representatives on USA Basketball squads as players and coaches, the most of any team in the nation.

In 2007 a total of four Blue Devils earned gold medals, tied for the most of any team in the nation (Tennessee).



Both Jasmine Thomas and Krystal Thomas played on the 2007 U-19 World Championship team that traveled to Bratislava, Slovakia. The squad posted a 9-0 record and won the gold.

Jasmine Thomas averaged 7.4 points, 4.1 rebounds, 3.0 assists, 1.0 steals and hit a team-best 44.0 percent from three-point range. She started all nine games and in the World Championship statistics, her 3.0 assists ranked eighth and 44.0 three-point field goal percentage was sixth.

Krystal Thomas averaged 7.8 points, 7.4 rebounds and hit 60.4 percent of her field goals. She started one of nine games and registered two double-doubles. Her 60.4 field goal percentage ranked second in the World Championship.

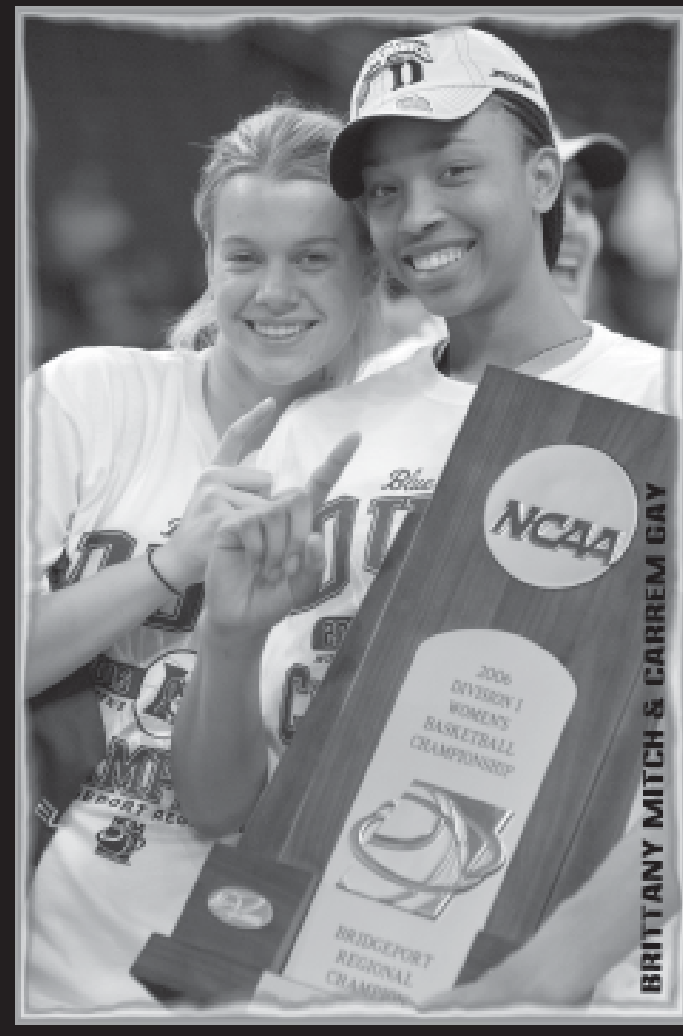

NCAA Tournament Tidbits...

• *The Basics*...Duke has made 13 consecutive and 14 overall trips to the NCAA Tournament. The Blue Devils made their first appearance in 1987 and since 1995 have advanced to the "Big Dance" each year. Duke now owns an all-time record of 37-14 in NCAA Tournament play and is 38-15 in all postseason action, including the NCAA & WNIT. The Blue Devils have hosted NCAA Tournament games eight times out of 14 appearances.

• *The History*...Each time Duke has been in the NCAA Tournament, it has won at least one game. The Blue Devils have advanced to at least the Sweet 16 the past 10 consecutive years, advanced to the Elite Eight in eight of the last 11 years and to the Final Four three out of the last six seasons. Duke advanced to the Elite Eight in 1998, the National Championship game in 1999, the NCAA Final Four in 2002 and 2003, the Elite Eight in 2004 and 2005 and the National Championship game in 2006. The Blue Devils own a 31-9 record in their last 40 NCAA Tournament games.

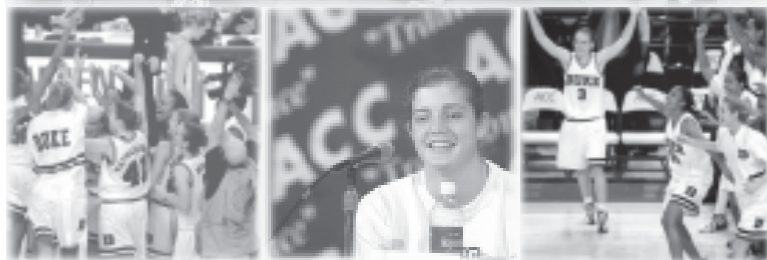

Looking Back on an Incredible Journey...

From the season's opening tip to the last tick of the clock at the national championship game, the 1998-99 Duke women's basketball team established its place in Duke history and, in the process, earned the respect of the entire country. The Blue Devils entered the season with extremely high expectations, returning all five starters from the 1997-98 squad that advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight for the first time in school history. Expectations were so high, in fact, that Duke started out with its highest ranking ever at fourth nationally in the preseason polls.

Although the season didn't start off as planned, the Blue Devils quickly got back on track, rattling off a school-record 16-game winning streak and barreling through the Atlantic Coast Conference with a 15-1 mark, setting yet another school record. Along the way, Duke also managed to tie or set several other school records, including those of 23 regular-season wins, 29 total wins, 11 victories against ranked opponents and a 15-1 record in Cameron Indoor Stadium.

However, the Blue Devils saved the best part of the journey for last. Entering the NCAA tournament as the No.

3 seed in the East, the team recommitted itself to its goal of a national championship. Playing in the comfort of home for the first and second rounds, Duke took care of business against both Holy Cross and St. Joseph's. Next, the Blue Devils traveled just an hour down the road to compete in the East Regional in Greensboro, N.C. Duke's first opponent, Old Dominion, was tough, but 57 percent shooting by the Blue Devils along with solid, well-executed basketball gave Duke the upper hand and they advanced with a 13-point win. The victory set up an Elite Eight match up with three-time defending national champion Tennessee.

With most of the women's basketball experts across the country calling for the Lady Vol dynasty to win its fourth straight national title, very few people predicted what would happen in the East Regional Final. The game began with Duke's Peppi Browne blocking a Tamika Catchings shot, and the Blue Devils had established control early. The two teams continued to trade baskets, but after Tennessee held an 11-10 lead at the 13:24 mark of the first half, it never led again, with Duke building as much as a 13-point lead in the first half and

heading into the locker room ahead by 11.

The Blue Devils continued to execute the best basketball of their season, withstanding Tennessee rallies and never letting the Vols tie or take the lead. Duke's Georgia Schweitzer emerged as the hero of the game, earning East Regional MVP honors along the way. Faced with the daunting task of defending national Player of the Year Chamique Holdscaw, Schweitzer held her to just eight points on 2-18 shooting while scoring a career-high 22 of her own. In defeating the Lady Vols 69-63, the vision of cutting down the nets became a reality. The Blue Devils celebrated the East Regional title and their first trip to the NCAA Final Four, held in San Jose, Calif.

With a loyal following and thousands of "new" Duke fans behind them in the San Jose Arena, the Blue Devils responded with an impressive performance in the national semifinals against the Georgia Lady Bulldogs.

Duke again shot better than 50 percent and,

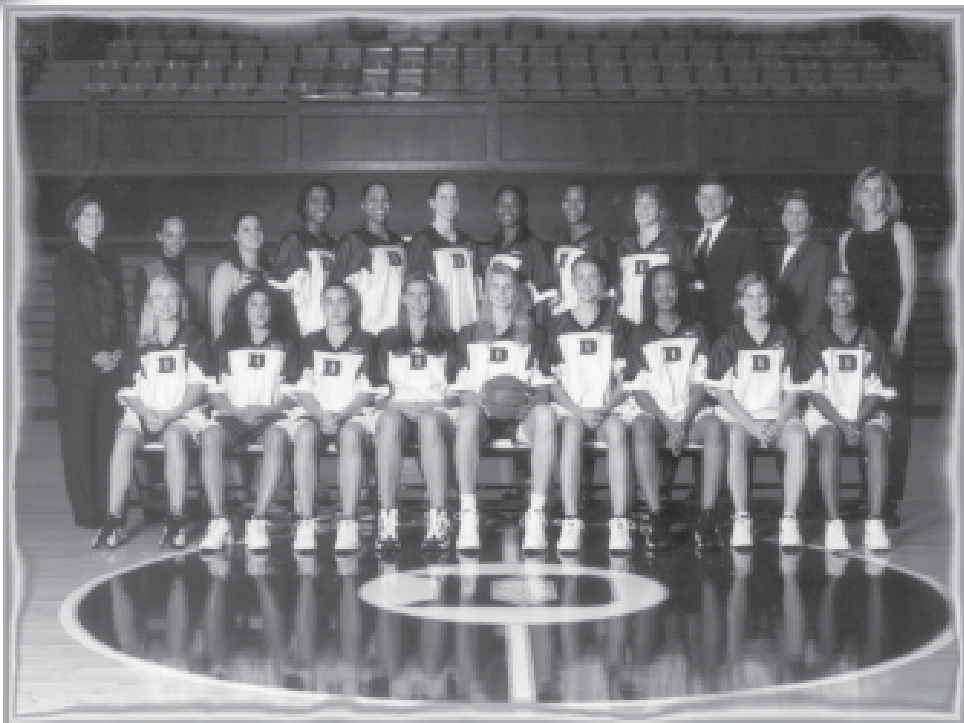
paced by Nicole Erickson's 22 points and Michele VanGorp's 20 points, Duke defeated the 'Dogs comfortably, 81-69.

With five games down and one to go, the only other team left playing in the country was top-ranked Purdue. The Boilermakers, 33-1 on the year, also had a win over Tennessee to their credit, as well as a 31-game winning streak. With neither team playing its best basketball in the title game, Duke held a 22-17 advantage at the half.

In the second half, however, Purdue's highly-rated backcourt, unable to produce in the first half, came alive and sparked a 12-1 Boilermaker run as the game grew out of Duke's reach.

In coming so close to achieving the ultimate goal of a national title, it was disappointing to come up just a few minutes short. However, nobody can ever take away the many outstanding accomplishments of the 1998-99 Blue Devils. The team raised the standard

of the program and created a lasting legacy...

Eight Was Truly Enough...



When you talk about small numbers but large accomplishments, the 2001-02 Duke women's basketball team would fit right in there with the best. The Blue Devils started the season with 10 players and a very young team with only one senior, two juniors, five sophomores and two freshmen.

Duke opened with a bang, knocking off seventh-ranked Texas Tech in the State Farm Tip-Off Classic, but then went through some growing pains. The Blue Devils lost two games to unranked opponents and then assistant coach Joanne Boyle was stricken with an AVM (an arteriovenous malformation).

Another shocker came in the first week of December as two sophomores, Rometra Craig and Crystal White, decided to transfer from Duke right before the team left for its first ACC contest of the year at Virginia. Down two players and an assistant coach, the Blue Devils would have to face the critics who said they couldn't win with only eight players.

Boy, did Duke prove them wrong. The Blue Devils came out of Virginia with a 34-point victory and steamrolled into a six-game winning streak heading into Christmas break. Just two days after break ended, Duke faced second-ranked Tennessee and lost, which proved an eye-opening experience.

The Blue Devils then went on one of the best streaks in the history of the ACC. Duke won its first four ACC contests by an average margin of 25.0 points. For the month of January, sophomore Alana Beard was selected WBCA National Player of the Month after leading Duke to an 8-0 record and averaging 22.1 points, 7.0 rebounds, 3.5 assists, 2.3 steals and 0.6 blocks. The Blue Devils also welcomed Boyle back to the bench in January. The month of February was no different as the Blue Devils

registered only the second perfect 16-0 mark in ACC history.

During the season, Duke dominated the weekly ACC honors as Beard was named ACC Player of the Week five times, while freshmen Monique Currie (five) and Wynter Whitley (once) were selected ACC Rookie of the Week six of the 15 weeks.

The Blue Devils then headed to Greensboro, N.C., for the ACC Tournament in their home away from home-- the Greensboro Coliseum. Duke had recorded an 8-0 record in previous games played there and went on to improve the unbelievable mark to 11-0 after downing Florida State, Virginia and North Carolina to win its third

consecutive ACC Tournament title. Currie was selected MVP of the tournament after registering career highs in points (30), rebounds (12) and free throws made (14) in the championship game.

In the week after the tournament, the honors kept coming in as four Blue Devils were selected All-ACC-- Beard (first), Tillis (first), Currie (second) and Sheana Mosch (HM). Beard & Tillis were named to the ACC All-Defensive team and Currie & Whitley to the All-Freshman team, while Beard was named Player of the Year and Gail Goetsenkos was selected Coach of the Year.

Next, Duke entered the NCAA Tournament as a No. 1 seed for the second consecutive year. The Blue Devils were placed in the East Region and made quick work of Norfolk State and TCU before traveling 25 miles down the road to the Entertainment & Sports Arena. Duke may have found a second home away from home as the Blue Devils knocked off Texas and South Carolina to advance to the second NCAA Final Four in school history.

The Blue Devils proved all the critics wrong with the accomplishment and were set to travel to San Antonio, Texas for a date with second-ranked Oklahoma. The game didn't go the way Duke wanted, but it was still a true season to remember.

In just two seasons, Beard established herself as one of the best players in college basketball. She became the first ACC women's or men's player to notch over 600 points, 200 rebounds, 150 assists, 100 steals and 20 blocks in a single season.

Duke accomplished many things no other Blue Devil squad had done before-- went a perfect 19-0 in ACC contests, won a third consecutive ACC Tournament title, broke 24 school records, including the mark for wins with 31, and they did it with only eight players.

One Team, One Dream...

As each year passed under the direction of head coach Gail Goestenkors, more records were broken and history was made. This was no different in 2002-03 as the Blue Devils once again broke more than 30 team and individual records on their way to an ACC record 35 wins.

Goestenkors, concluding her 11th season at Duke, guided the Blue Devils to a third NCAA Final Four, fourth consecutive ACC Tournament title, third straight ACC Regular Season title and more wins than any other ACC women's team in history. For all of this, the leader for the Blue Devils received National Coach of the Year accolades for the fourth time in her career.

One thing most people forgot about during the 2002-03 season-- Monique Currie. The Blue Devils lost the 2002 ACC Tournament MVP and All-America candidate in the first minute of the first exhibition contest on Nov. 5 and still managed to accomplish more than any ACC team in league history.

Duke kicked off the season ranked No. 1 in both polls even though the Blue Devils were to be without the services of Currie. The Blue Devils didn't let anyone down early as they cruised to victories over second-ranked Tennessee in the Jimmy V Classic, while also picking up Paradise Jam, Duke Classic and South Padre Tournament titles.

The Blue Devils made quick work of the first half of the ACC slate and then came the matchup with second-ranked Connecticut in Durham, N.C. Cameron Indoor Stadium posted its first sellout in women's



basketball history at Duke, but the Blue Devils couldn't get anything going for the first 30 minutes and fell 77-65.

Duke came back strong from the loss winning the next 15 games in a row and advancing to the NCAA Final Four. During that stretch, the Blue Devils posted their second straight undefeated ACC Regular Season, won yet another ACC Championship and won the Midwest Regional.

All season long junior Alana Beard led the Blue

Devils as she posted incredible numbers, including the eighth-best scoring average in the nation at 22.0. Beard was selected ESPN.com National Player of the Year, Kodak All-America, ACC Player of the Year, Midwest Region MVP and many others. She became only the second Duke player to reach the 2,000 point mark and broke eight Duke game or season records.

Duke received key production from its freshmen as Lindsey Harding started the final 16 contests, Mistie Bass started 15 games for the Blue Devils, Jessica Foley was a key threat from three-point land and Brooke Smith displayed some flashy post moves during the season.

The senior tandem of Michele Matyasovsky and Sheana Mosch provided key leadership for the Blue Devils over the course of the season. Matyasovsky started 36 games for the Blue Devils, while Mosch came off the bench to give an offensive and defensive spark in her final year. Mosch finished off her career as one of 17 players to reach the 1,000 point mark for the Blue Devils.

The Blue Devils garnered a great deal of honors as Beard, Iciss Tillis and Vicki Krapohl were named All-ACC, Bass and Harding were named ACC All-Freshman and Beard was named ACC All-Defensive. Beard and Tillis each received Kodak All-America honors and were on the watch lists for the Wade Trophy and Naismith award. Goestenkors also earned her fifth ACC Coach of the Year award and collected Naismith & WBCA National Coach of the Year accolades.

Banner Year...

From the opening tip to the final buzzer, the 2005-06 Duke women's basketball campaign was one of the most exciting seasons in school history. The Blue Devils began the year ranked No. 1 in the nation and finished No. 2 as Duke fell, 78-75, to third-ranked Maryland in the National Championship game.

Advancing to the NCAA Final Four for the fourth time and the title game for the second time in school history, Duke concluded the season with 31 victories. This marked the sixth straight year the Blue Devils have notched 30 or more victories, which tied an NCAA-record.

As a team, Duke also broke or tied 20 records during the year. Of the 20 records that were broken or tied this season, some of the highlights were Monique Currie's 43 points at Miami, Abby Waner's 50 three-pointers breaking the freshman single season mark, Duke's 36 assists at San Diego, the Blue Devils' 86-point margin of victory against Ball State as well as the single season records for points, field goal percentage, assists and for the second straight year posting a NCAA-record 267 blocks.

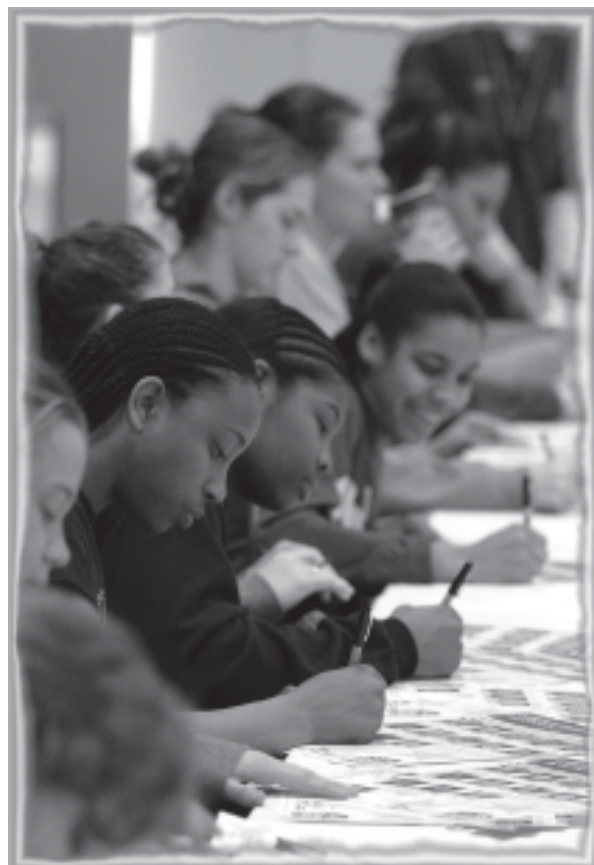
The Blue Devils opened with 20 straight wins to tie the school-record for best start in the history of the program and went on to knock off eight ranked opponents, while falling to four teams all ranked in the top-four in the nation. During the 20-game win streak, the Blue Devils thumped

top-ranked Tennessee, 77-57, knocked off sixth-ranked Maryland in College Park in front of 16,097 fans and defeated 22nd-ranked Boston College, 66-52, on the road.

Duke received well-deserved honors during the season as Currie garnered Kodak All-America accolades for the second straight year as well as earning Associated Press second team, John R. Wooden Award and USBWA All-America. Currie and Lindsey Harding were named to the All-ACC first team, while Mistie Williams was selected to the second team. Harding went on to be named ACC Defensive Player of the Year and Waner earned All-ACC Freshman team honors.

A trio of seniors -- Currie, Williams and Jessica Foley -- closed out their careers with the Blue Devils in style, while all three made their mark in the Duke record book. Currie became the first player in ACC history to register over 2,000 points, 800 rebounds, 400 assists and 200 steals in a career and finished ranking third on the Duke scoring chart with 2,122 points. She became only the third Duke player to reach the 2,000 career point mark and was 10th on the ACC career scoring list.

Williams became the fifth player in Duke history to notch over 1,400 points and 800 rebounds and concluded her excellent career with 1,409 points, which ranked eighth. Foley



was one of the top three-point shooters in school history finishing second on the career charts in both three-pointers made (175) and attempted (490). She also ranked 21st on the ACC charts in three-pointers made and 22nd in attempts.

Junior Alison Bales made some of the biggest strides during the season and especially in the NCAA Tournament as the 6-7 center broke out on the national scene averaging 13.5 points, 9.0 rebounds, 5.0 blocks, 2.2 assists and 1.5 steals during the six contests. For her efforts, she was named the Bridgeport Regional MVP and earned NCAA Final Four All-Tournament team accolades. She broke the NCAA Tournament record for blocks in a tournament (30) and blocks in a career (51).

The key aspect to the success of the 2005-06 Blue Devils was the total team effort as nine players averaged 5.4 points or more and no player averaged more than 28.9 minutes a contest. Duke led the nation in scoring (86.0), assists (20.5), blocked shots (7.6), field goal percentage (49.8) and scoring margin (27.7).

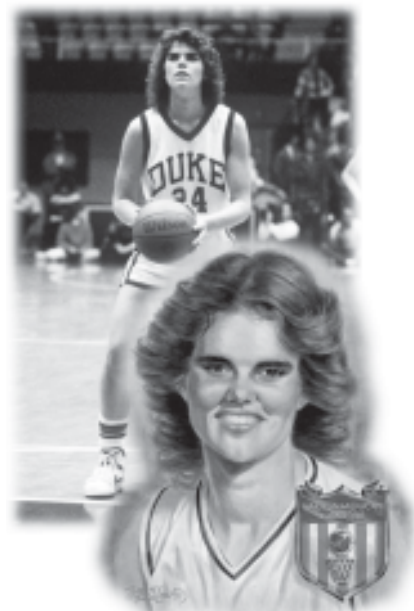
