JOHN BEAN

CHAIRMAN AND LEAD GOVERNOR

John Bean joined Calgary Sports and Entertainment Corporation (CSEC) in January 2010 in the role of senior vice-president, finance and administration and CFO. Bean was named the chief operating officer of CSEC in September 2013 and president in July of 2018 and president and CEO in July 2019.

In his role as president, Bean is responsible for all aspects of operations for all five teams owned by CSEC including the Stampeders, the Calgary Flames of the National Hockey League, the Calgary Roughnecks of the National Lacrosse League, the Calgary Hitmen of the Western Hockey League and the Calgary Wranglers of the American Hockey League.

Bean is Calgary's lead governor on the CFL board of governors and a member of the CFL audit and finance

committee. He is also on the NLL board of governors and serves as the chairman of the NLL audit, finance and compensation committee, is a governor on the WHL Board of Governors and an Alternate Governor on the NHL Board of Governors.

Prior to joining CSEC, Bean, a chartered accountant, held a variety of senior executive roles in the oil and gas services industry including vice-president, finance with CCS Corporation Ltd. and chief financial officer with Hazco Environmental Services Ltd.

Bean was born and raised in Saskatoon and attended the University of Saskatchewan. In 1988, he and his wife Rhonda moved to Calgary, where they have raised two children. Bean enjoys golfing and spending time with his family.



ALVIN LIBIN

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEMBER

Alvin G. Libin is a native Calgarian with business interests in real estate, oil and gas and financial services. Libin is the president and Chief Executive Officer of Balmon Investments Ltd., a private management services and investment company. He has a strong commitment to the city of Calgary and to the province of Alberta and has provided leadership in various volunteer positions.

In 2003, Libin and his wife, Mona, through the Alvin and Mona Libin Foundation, established the Libin Cardiovascular Institute of Alberta in partnership with the University of Calgary and Alberta Health Services. Its mission is to provide world-class cardiovascular health care, education and research for Southern Alberta.

Libin is a past chairman of the Alberta Ingenuity Fund, a foundation created by the government of Alberta to stimulate and support science and engineering research for the benefit of Albertans. He also serves as director of several corporate and community boards.

Libin is an Officer of the Order of Canada and holds an Honourary Doctors of Law degree from the University of Calgary. He was inducted into the Alberta Order of Excellence in 2004.



RUTH PETERS

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEMBER

Ruth Peters is a businesswoman and philanthropist based in Calgary. She became an executive committee member for CSEC in 2021.

Peters is the president of Rocky Mountain Ranches, Ltd. and Black Diamond Land & Cattle Co., a full-service horse boarding and training facility located in the Calgary foothills. She also serves as president of Black Diamond Ventures and RP2 Developments.

Peters is a board member of the Peters Family Foundation as well as both the Calgary Stampeders Foundation and Calgary Flames Foundation. She played a key role in the establishment and development of the award-winning Calgary community of Elbow Valley and was a founding contributor to the Haskayne Capital Expansion Project at the University of Calgary's business school.

Peters has two children – a son, Brennan, and a daughter, Rory.



DAVID SAPUNJIS

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEMBER

After an outstanding seven-year playing career with the Red and White, Sapunjis has enjoyed his switch from athlete to businessman.

He is currently the president of Reliance Metals Canada, a company he joined in 2011.

Sapunjis re-joined the Stampeders in 2005 when he was part of a group of local businessmen who purchased the club.

As a player with the Stamps from 1990-96, Sapunjis — known affectionately by fans and teammates as “Sponge” — was an all-star slotback and was twice named the CFL's Most Outstanding Canadian. He was runner-up for the CFL's Most Outstanding Player award in 1995 and remains among the leaders in all Stamps receiving categories. Sapunjis won a Grey Cup in 1992 and was named the game's top Canadian.

A Toronto native, Sapunjis chose to remain in Calgary after concluding his playing career. He is an alumnus of the University of Western Ontario.



JAY McNEIL

VICE-PRESIDENT, BUSINESS OPERATIONS

McNeil was appointed vice-president of business operations on Sept. 22, 2022.

It was a return to the organization for McNeil, who was a standout offensive lineman for the Stampeders from 1994 to 2007, earning Canadian Football League all-star recognition on three occasions and West Division all-star honours six times. McNeil was a member of Grey Cup-championship teams in 1998 and 2001 and was twice voted by teammates as the winner of the Presidents' Ring for excellence on and off the field.

After his playing career, McNeil remained in Calgary and built a strong business career, leading sales and business operations for a number of companies including Trinidad Drilling, Tervita, Secure Energy and most recently in the role of COO for Cleantek Industries.

McNeil also maintained strong ties to football, serving as a trustee for the CFL Players Pension Plan and as vice-president of the Canadian Football League Players Association. He also continued his association with the Stampeders, acting as a community ambassador for the team's alumni association.

McNeil has a Bachelor of Business Administration from Kent State University and a Masters of Business Administration from the University of Fredericton.

McNeil lives in Calgary, with his wife Tara and son Cuyler. The family enjoys travelling, skiing and Calgary's vibrant food scene.



JOHN HUFNAGEL

**PRESIDENT, FOOTBALL CONSULTANT
AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEMBER**

CFL · 24 | STAMPS · 23

John Hufnagel was named president of the Calgary Stampeders on Jan. 27, 2016. He served as the team's head coach and general manager

from 2008 to 2015 and held the dual roles of president and general manager from 2006 to 2022.

In his role as president, Hufnagel represents the Stampeders at the league level. He has been involved in professional football for 50 years including 36 in the CFL.

Hufnagel is a member of the 2020 class of the Canadian Football Hall of Fame in the builders' category and he was the 2019 recipient of the CFL's Hugh Campbell Distinguished Leadership Award.

On Dec. 11, 2022, he turned over general manager's duties to Dave Dickenson and took on the role of football consultant.

Hufnagel is also a two-time winner of Annis Stukus Trophy as the CFL's coach of the year and led the Stampeders to Grey Cup victories in 2008 and 2014. He had a 102-41-1 career mark as a head coach and his winning percentage is best among coaches with at least 100 games on the sidelines.

The Stampeders have posted a winning record in 14 consecutive seasons since Hufnagel's return in 2008 and have accumulated seven first-place finishes in the West Division while qualifying for the post-season every year. Hufnagel served as GM for three Grey Cup-winning teams.

Hufnagel began his coaching career in 1987 with the Saskatchewan Roughriders as a player/coach. In 1990, he joined the Stampeders as offensive coordinator under Wally Buono. In this role, Hufnagel helped guide the team to three Grey Cup games, including a championship in 1992. His innovative offences were explosive under the direction of Doug Flutie, who received the CFL's Most Outstanding Player award three consecutive years (1992-1994) with the Stamps. Hufnagel also developed Jeff Garcia and enabled him to take over from Flutie in 1996. These high-powered offences produced future Hall-of-Famers such as Terry Vaughn, Rocco Romano, Allen Pitts and Flutie, along with players who received numerous league accolades such as Dave Sapunjis and Vince Danielsen. During Hufnagel's first seven seasons with the Stampeders, the team finished first in the West Division six times.

Following his early success in the CFL, he went to the Arena Football League as head coach/general manager of the New Jersey Red Dogs. In two seasons, he posted a 17-11 record. Hufnagel joined the Cleveland Browns in 1999 and spent two seasons as the team's quarterbacks

coach. In 2001, he was the quarterbacks coach for the Indianapolis Colts when Peyton Manning completed 62.7 per cent of his passes and threw for 4,131 yards. Hufnagel spent the 2002 season as quarterbacks coach for the Jacksonville Jaguars. That year, Mark Brunell threw just seven interceptions in 416 pass attempts and his 85.7 quarterback rating was his highest in four years.

Hufnagel spent the 2003 season as quarterbacks coach for the Super Bowl-champion New England Patriots. Under his tutelage, Tom Brady completed 60.2 per cent of his passes for 3,620 yards, 23 touchdowns and 12 interceptions and was named the Super Bowl MVP.

The next season, Hufnagel joined the New York Giants, with whom he spent three seasons as offensive coordinator. In 2004, the Giants scored 60 more points than they had the previous season. Running back Tiki Barber set a franchise record with 1,518 rushing yards and quarterback Eli Manning started laying a foundation that saw him emerge as the Super Bowl MVP for the 2007 season. In 2005, Barber upped his team record to 1,860 rushing yards and the Giants had the third-highest scoring offence in the NFL.

Hufnagel returned to the Stampeders on Dec. 3, 2007, when he was introduced as head coach and general manager.

Prior to coaching, Hufnagel starred at Penn State University. In his final two seasons as the starting quarterback, Hufnagel's record was 21-3. As a junior, he led the Nittany Lions to a 30-6 Cotton Bowl win over Texas and in his final season took his team to the Sugar Bowl. He finished sixth in Heisman Trophy voting in 1972.

In 1973, he was a 14th-round draft choice of the Denver Broncos. He spent three seasons with the Broncos before beginning a 12-year CFL career with the Stampeders (1976-79), Saskatchewan Roughriders (1980-83, 1987) and Winnipeg Blue Bombers (1984-86).

Hufnagel earned a Bachelor of Science degree in marketing from Penn State. John and his wife Sherry reside in Cochrane. He has two daughters, Neely and Lindsey, and a son, Cole.

COACHING STAFF



DAVE DICKENSON GENERAL MANAGER AND HEAD COACH

CFL • 15 | STAMPS • 15

Dickenson is in his 15th season on the Stampeders coaching staff, his seventh as the team's head coach and his first with the additional role of general manager. His regular-season record as head coach through six seasons is 73-29-2.

Last season, Dickenson helped guide the Stamps to a 12-6 record and a 17th consecutive playoff appearance. Calgary led the CFL with 562 points scored and ranked second in the league with 397 points allowed. Eleven Stampeders received West Division all-star nods and eight players were named CFL all-stars.

In 2021, the Stampeders rallied from a slow start to win six of their last seven regular-season games. The strong finish allowed the Stamps to continue their streaks of winning seasons and playoff appearances. Calgary finished in the top three in the CFL in both points scored and points allowed.

In 2019, the Stampeders finished second in the West Division with a record of 12-6 and earned the right to host a playoff game for a fourth consecutive year with Dickenson at the helm. The Stamps led the league with a turnover ratio of plus-15 and were the second-least penalized team in the CFL.

With Dickenson handling offensive play-calling duties, the Stamps finished second in passing yards, yards per play, completions, passing touchdowns and points off turnovers.

In 2018, Dickenson led the Stamps to their eighth Grey Cup title in franchise history as Calgary defeated the Ottawa Redblacks 27-16. The Stamps finished atop the West and advanced to the Grey Cup for a third straight season.

In 2017, Dickenson was the West Division finalist for the CFL's coach of the year award after receiving the award in 2016 when he guided the Stamps to a 15-2-1 mark for a franchise single-season record of 31 standings points.

In four seasons from 2012-15 under Dickenson's tutelage as offensive coordinator, the Stampeders led the CFL in cumulative points scored, finishing either first or second each year.

In his first season as offensive coordinator in 2011, Dickenson oversaw a Stamps offence that was among the league leaders in numerous categories.

He was named quarterbacks coach in 2010, the year Stamps quarterback Henry Burris was voted the CFL's Most Outstanding Player. When Dickenson first joined the coaching ranks in 2009, he tutored the Stampeders running backs and helped Joffrey Reynolds claim the CFL rushing crown.

Dickenson joined the Calgary coaching staff after an outstanding 13-year professional playing career. He spent 11 of his 13 seasons in the Canadian Football League, six of those with the Stampeders (1996-2000 and 2008).

A potent combination of intelligence, athletic ability and courage, Dickenson set a number of CFL passing records and was named the league's Most Outstanding Player in 2000 after throwing for 4,636 yards, 36 touchdowns and only six interceptions while guiding the Stampeders to a 12-5-1 record.

After spending two seasons in the National Football League — with San Diego in 2001 and with Seattle, Miami and Detroit in 2002 — Dickenson returned to Canada and signed with the BC Lions. After five seasons with the Leos — including a 2005 campaign in which he established league records for highest completion percentage and quarterback rating in a single season and an MVP performance in the 2006 Grey Cup — Dickenson returned to Calgary in 2008 for what proved to be his final season.

Dickenson joined the Stampeders in 1996 after a stellar career at the University of Montana. He was a three-time conference MVP with the Grizzlies and in 1995 led the nation in passing while guiding Montana to the NCAA Division 1-AA national title. He was named a member of the College Football Hall of Fame's Class of 2018 and was part of the Big Sky Conference's inaugural Hall of Fame class in 2020.

He and his wife Tammy along with children Avery and Cooper live in Calgary year-round. His coaching role extends into the off-season as he annually operates the Dickenson Passing Academy to work with young quarterbacks and receivers.

MARK KILAM

SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR AND ASSISTANT HEAD COACH

CFL · 19 | STAMPS · 19

Kilam is in his 19th season with the Stampeders and his 14th as special teams coordinator. It is his fourth season with the additional title of assistant head coach.

In 2022, kicker René Paredes and punter Cody Grace both earned CFL all-star honours and as a team the Stampeders led the CFL in net punting average (39.0 yards) and blocked kicks (three). Calgary also ranked in the top three in several other categories including fewest big-play returns allowed, kickoff average and kickoff-return touchdowns.

Rookie Peyton Logan had 1,521 combined return yards and he scored one touchdown on a kickoff return and one on a missed-field goal return.

In 2021, the Stampeders led the league in field-goal percentage, net punting average, kickoff-return average and opponents' punt-return average and did not allow a kick-return touchdown. Grace was named a West Division all-star and Paredes was a finalist for the CFL's Most Outstanding Special Teams Player award.

The Stamps' special-teams unit was highlighted by several individual performances in 2019 as Paredes made the most field goals in the league from 40-plus yards, Terry Williams finished second with 2,147 combined yards and Nate Holley registered a team-leading 22 special-teams tackles – good for fourth-best in the CFL – and was named the CFL's Most Outstanding Rookie. In addition, the Stamps were tied for the CFL lead with three blocked kicks.

In 2018, the Stamps' special teams excelled as Calgary led the league in punt-return average (12.3 yards) and lowest opponent punt-return average (8.1 yards).

Calgary's special-teams unit played a key role in the Stamps' Grey Cup victory over Ottawa as Williams returned a punt for a touchdown and Riley Jones forced a fumble on a Redblacks punt return.

The 2017 special-teams unit included a record-setting performance by Roy Finch, who beat his own record for most punt-return yards in a season. Finch was named the CFL's Most Outstanding Special Teams Player and was also a CFL all-star alongside Paredes, who led the CFL with a 91.4-per cent success rate on field-goal attempts.

The Stamps led the CFL in 2016 with an average of 24.3 yards on kickoff returns. Paredes tied the franchise record with 56 field goals including a league-leading 18 three-pointers from 40 yards or longer. Paredes' season included a streak of 32 consecutive successful field goals. Rob Maver averaged a career-best 46.9 yards per punt.

In 2015, the group was led by Paredes, who made 41 of 47 field goals, 26 converts and seven singles for a West Division-leading total of 156 points. He earned West Division and CFL all-star nods and was the West's finalist for the Most Outstanding Special Teams Player award.

Maver earned all-star recognition for the third consecutive season in 2014 while Paredes' 2013 campaign featured two league records at the time – longest consecutive-field goal streak (39) and field-goal efficiency (94.7 per cent) – as well as the CFL's Most Outstanding Special Teams Player award.

In 2012, the Stamps ranked second in the CFL in big plays made in the return game while punter Burke Dales earned CFL all-star honours and both Dales and returner Larry Taylor were named West Division all-stars.

For a second consecutive season, the Stamps featured a rookie kicker in 2011 as Paredes converted on 38 of 48 field goals. In 2010, Kilam worked with Maver, who won the CFL scoring title and set the franchise mark for scoring by a rookie with 185 points.

Prior to assuming the special teams coordinator's position, Kilam worked in the dual roles of linebackers coach and strength and conditioning coach during the 2009 season.

In 2008, Kilam worked with a defence that allowed the fewest points and touchdowns in the CFL.

Kilam joined the team in 2005 as strength and conditioning coach and began assisting the defence during the season. The following year, he worked as the defensive quality control coach. In 2007, he coached the nickel and dime backs in the secondary before being promoted to linebackers coach during the year.

Before he joined the Stamps, Kilam coached on the defensive staff of the Southern Alberta All-Star Team in the Provincial Senior Bowl from 2003-05. Kilam also coached on the defensive staff with the Cochrane Cobras (2002-05) who went undefeated and won three provincial high school championships in that time.

Kilam played linebacker for the University of Alberta from 1997-2001 and was a team captain. He graduated with a Bachelor of Physical Education majoring in sport and performance.

Mark and his wife Andrea have two daughters.

BRENT MONSON

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Monson is in his 14th season as an assistant coach for the Stampeders and his fifth as defensive coordinator.

In 2022, the Stampeders led the CFL in sacks and allowed the league's second-lowest point total. The Calgary defence was No. 1 in fewest yards allowed per play, opponent second-down conversion rate and big plays allowed. The Stamps allowed the second-fewest rushing yards and allowed opponents the second-lowest pass-completion percentage. Defensive linemen Mike Rose and Shawn Lemon, linebacker Cameron Judge and defensive back Jonathan Moxey were named West Division all-stars and Rose, Lemon and Judge earned CFL all-star recognition.

The Stampeders gave up the second-fewest offensive touchdowns in the CFL in 2021 and allowed an average of fewer than 19 points per game, conceding 15 points or less on four occasions. First-year linebacker Darnell Sankey led the league with 87 defensive tackles and was named a West Division all-star while Rose earned CFL all-star honours for the first time in his career.

Monson previously served five years over two stints as linebackers coach (2010 and 2015-18), one year as defensive line coach (2011) and three years as running backs coach (2012-14). He also served as the team's strength and conditioning coach from 2010-14.

During Monson's first season as defensive coordinator, the Stamps allowed the fewest big plays in the CFL and were second in yards conceded per play and two-and-outs forced. Linebacker Wynton McManis finished tied for fourth in the league with 86 defensive tackles and opposing teams were held to fewer than 20 points in nine of 18 regular-season games.

In both 2017 and 2018, Monson helped oversee a defence that allowed the fewest points in the CFL. He worked with a linebacker group in 2018 that included standout Jameer Thurman on the weak side and CFL all-star Alex Singleton in the middle. Singleton was voted the CFL's Most Outstanding Defensive Player following a season in which he established a league record for most tackles in a season by a Canadian. He also set team marks for most defensive tackles and most total tackles in a season.

In 2016, outside linebacker Deron Mayo led the Stamps with 77 tackles while Singleton, as a rookie, emerged as the starter at middle linebacker.

The previous season, Monson began his second stint as linebackers coach and oversaw a group that was part of a defence that allowed just 16.1 points per game.

In 2014 when Monson was running backs coach, Jon Cornish led the league in rushing for a third straight season with 1,082 yards despite playing in only nine games. He was named a CFL all-star and the CFL's Most Outstanding Canadian. Cornish was one of four Stamps running backs to register a 100-yard rushing game during the season.

In 2013, the Stamps led the CFL in several rushing categories including most first downs (160), most net yards (2,547), highest average per-game yardage (141.5) and highest average gain per rush (6.2). Cornish was named the CFL's Most Outstanding Player, Most Outstanding Canadian and Lou Marsh award winner as Canada's top athlete.

In 2012, during Monson's first season instructing the running backs, the Stamps led the CFL in rushing touchdowns with 20 and were second in the league with 2,088 rushing yards.

In 2011, Monson was Calgary's defensive line and strength and conditioning coach.

In 2010, Monson handled a talented and accomplished linebacking corps that contributed to the Stamps defence allowing the fewest points in the West Division. In his first season at middle linebacker, Juwan Simpson shared the team lead with seven sacks, earned CFL all-star recognition and was a finalist for the league's Most Outstanding Defensive Player award.

Monson is a graduate of McMaster University.

PAT DELMONACO

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR AND OFFENSIVE LINE COACH

DeMonaco is in his 10th season as the Stampeders' offensive line coach and fourth with the additional title of offensive coordinator.

In 2022, the Stampeders led the CFL with 562 points scored and 135.3 rushing yards per game. Calgary allowed just 17 sacks, 12 fewer than the next-best team in that category. In nine seasons with DeMonaco as offensive line coach, the Stamps have never finished lower than second in fewest sacks allowed.

Three members of the offensive line – left tackle Derek Dennis, centre Sean McEwen and right guard Ryan Scaviour – made the West Division all-star team in 2022 along with receiver Malik Henry and running back and CFL rushing champion Ka'Deem Carey. Three Stampeders – Dennis, McEwen and Carey – were named to the CFL all-star team.

The Stampeders allowed just 20 sacks in 2021 – the second-lowest total in the league – despite nine different offensive linemen making a start including four who were making their first starts of their careers. Three different offensive players were named West Division all-stars in 2021 – Carey, McEwen and receiver Kamar Jordan. McEwen was also a CFL all-star.

In 2019, Calgary allowed the second-fewest sacks in the CFL with 34. Offensive lineman Shane Bergman was the Stamps' nominee for Most Outstanding Offensive Lineman and earned West Division and CFL all-star recognition.

In 2018, the Calgary offensive line tied for the league lead in fewest sacks allowed with 27 and Dennis earned West Division all-star honours.

In 2017, Ucambre Williams became the team's starting centre despite limited experience at the position and was Calgary's nominee for the CFL's Most Outstanding Offensive Lineman award.

The Stamps allowed the fewest sacks in the CFL for a third consecutive season in 2016. Two members of the offensive line – Dennis and Spencer Wilson – were named CFL all-stars and Dennis was voted the league's Most Outstanding Offensive Lineman.

In 2015, the offensive line paved the way for three different tailbacks to record 100-yard games. Pierre Lavertu and Wilson were West Division all-stars. The previous season, left tackle Stanley Bryant was a CFL all-star for the second straight year. Centre Brett Jones also received the league-wide honour in helping the Stampeders lead the league with 143.9 rushing yards per game.

The Stampeders did not allow a single sack in the 102nd Grey Cup game as Calgary beat Hamilton to win the seventh title in franchise history.

DeMonaco joined the Stamps in 2014 after spending the previous four seasons as the offensive line coach for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers. Under DeMonaco, members of the Blue Bombers offensive line earned a total of five division all-star honours and Winnipeg had a per-game rushing average of more than 100 yards in three of his four seasons.

DeMonaco joined the Blue Bombers in 2010 after a seven-year stint at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. He was RPI's offensive line coach for two seasons (2003-04) and the offensive coordinator for five years (2005-09).

He previously had stops at Hudson Valley Community College and as a graduate assistant at the University of Illinois. DeMonaco played offensive line for four seasons at the University of Albany and was a captain during his senior season. The Great Danes won two conference championships during DeMonaco's Albany career.

DeMonaco and his wife Kelly have two children – Julia and Pasquale III.

MARC MUELLER

QUARTERBACKS COACH

Mueller is in his 10th season with the Stampeders and his fourth as quarterbacks coach.

He served the previous five years as running backs coach after starting his CFL coaching career with one season as a defensive assistant.

In 2022, Mueller tutored Jake Maier as he claimed the team's No. 1-quarterback role in Week 12. Maier completed 74.7 percent of his passes and had a two-to-one touchdown-interception ratio. The quarterbacks helped Calgary lead the CFL with 562 points scored.

In 2021, Maier stepped in for an injured Bo Levi Mitchell and became the first player in CFL history to pass for 300 yards in each of his first three starts. As a team, the Stamps finished second in both passing yards and completions of at least 30 yards.

In 2019 when Mueller coached the running backs, injuries forced the Stamps to use four different starting tailbacks. First-year CFLer Ka'Deem Carey led the team in rushing and had a 143-yard performance in the Labour Day Classic.

The previous season, first-year Stamps running back Don Jackson had three 100-yard games and was second among the league's feature backs with an average of 5.8 yards per carry. When Jackson was sidelined by injury, Romar Morris stepped in and delivered a four-touchdown game in the Labour Day rematch against Edmonton.

In 2017, the Stamps running back group featured tailback Jerome Messam, who cracked the 1,000-yard plateau and missed out on a second consecutive CFL rushing title by just 20 yards. In 2016, Messam won the CFL rushing title with 1,198 yards and was voted the league's Most Outstanding Canadian.

In 2015, Mueller's first year as running backs coach, three different players — Jon Cornish, Matt Walter and Messam — recorded 100-yard games and the Stamps ranked second in the CFL with 14 rushing touchdowns.

The Stamps finished among the top two in team rushing touchdowns three times during Mueller's stint as running backs coach and the blocking provided by the Calgary tailbacks and fullbacks helped the Stamps rank either first or second in fewest sacks allowed all five seasons.

In 2014, his first with the Stampeders, Mueller served as a defensive assistant and worked closely with the

linebackers. The Stamps defence ranked second in the CFL with an average of 19.3 points allowed per game and also finished second in takeaways with 43.

Mueller began his coaching career in 2013 when he served as quarterbacks coach for the University of Regina Rams, his alma mater. Under Mueller's guidance, the Rams led Canada West in passing offence with 359.4 yards per game.

The Regina native played six seasons (2007-2012) at the University of Regina and was the Rams' starting quarterback for three seasons.

He left Regina with several school records including career pass-completion percentage (62.1), single-season records in pass attempts (310 in 2009), pass completions (182 in 2010) and pass-completion percentage (67.8 in 2012) and single-game records in most attempted passes (55 in 2012 against Manitoba) and pass-completion percentage (78.4 in 2012 at Saskatchewan).

Mueller was invited to the 2011 CFL Combine and attended training camp with Edmonton that June, seeing playing time at quarterback in one pre-season game.

The business administration major quarterbacked the Sheldon-Williams Spartans to the 2006 Saskatchewan 4A high school championship. Marc is the grandson of CFL Hall of Fame quarterback Ron Lancaster and he, wife Jenaya, daughter Sawyer and son Wallace call Calgary home year-round.

NIK LEWIS

Lewis is in his first season on the Stampeders staff and his second as a CFL coach.

In 2019, Lewis served as running backs coach for the BC Lions and oversaw a group that included John White IV, who achieved the only 1,000-yard rushing season of his career under Lewis' tutelage.

Prior to becoming a coach, Lewis was a decorated player as he is the CFL's all-time leader in receptions with 1,051 and was inducted into the Canadian Football Hall of Fame in 2021. Lewis played 11 seasons with the Stampeders (2004-14) before concluding his career with three seasons with the Montreal Alouettes. He accumulated 13,778 receiving yards and 71 touchdowns during his 14 seasons in the CFL.

Lewis holds the Stampeders record with 165 consecutive games played with at least one catch and surpassed the 1,000-yard mark in receiving in each of his first nine seasons with the Red and White. He was a CFL all-star three times as a member of the Stampeders and a West Division all-star on five occasions. Lewis was a Grey Cup winner in 2008 and 2014 with Calgary.

While an active player, the Jacksboro, Tex., native started working with young football players to help them advance their careers. In 2020, Lewis founded Athlete Owned Sports, a media-content platform.

Prior to coming to the CFL, Lewis starred at Southern Arkansas University. By the end of his career with the Muleriders, Lewis owned the school's career receiving records for touchdowns (36), yards (2,852) and receptions (162). He was enshrined into Southern Arkansas' Hall of Fame in 2018.

Lewis is married to Alison and has five children – Aurelia, Madison, Kealan, Isaac and Hudson.

Davies in his first as running backs coach. Prior to joining the coaching staff, he had served as a regional scouting consultant for the Stampeders since 2012.

Davies started his coaching career in 2007 as receivers coach at his alma mater, Simon Fraser. He went on to work at the high-school level in Texas, culminating with a stint as offensive coordinator at Lehman High School in 2022.

As a player, Davies was a standout quarterback at Port Moody (BC) Secondary School before starting his collegiate career at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas. He then transferred to Simon Fraser and graduated as the school's all-time leading passer in completions, yards and touchdowns. He was a conference all-star in 2003 and led Simon Fraser to the first two playoff victories in school history. In the first post-season win on Nov. 4, 2003, against Regina, Davies set a Simon Fraser single-game mark with 482 passing yards.

After Simon Fraser, Davies went on to play in Arena Football 2 for the RGV Dorados.

Davies is a member of the British Columbia Football Hall of Fame.

Simpson is in his first season as a Stampeders coach after previously spending eight seasons as a player for the Red and White.

In between his stints in Calgary, Simpson coached high-school football in his home state of Alabama, most recently as defensive coordinator at Westminster Christian Academy.

Simpson joined the Stamps in 2008 and became the starting middle linebacker in 2010. From 2008-15, the Decatur, Ala., native played 115 regular-season games for the Red and White as well as 11 post-season contests and was a member of Grey Cup-winning teams in 2008 and 2014.

The University of Alabama product was a three-time West Division all-star and was a CFL all-star and a finalist for the CFL's Most Outstanding Defensive Player award in 2010 after a season in which he recorded 71 defensive tackles, seven sacks, three fumble recoveries, one forced fumble and one interception.

In the regular season, Simpson accumulated 395 career tackles, 24 sacks, three interceptions and seven forced fumbles. He added 43 tackles and one sack in 11 post-season contests.

Prior to coming to Calgary, Simpson was standout at the University of Alabama. He was a starter at linebacker for his final 24 games with the Crimson Tide and was a defensive captain his senior season. He was an academic all-Southeastern Conference selection in 2005 and was on the all-SEC freshman team in 2003.

He signed with the National Football League's Green Bay Packers as an undrafted free agent in 2007.

Simpson has a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Alabama. He has two children – daughter Laila and son A.J.

BOB SLOWIK **LINEBACKERS COACH**

Slowik is in his third season with the Stampeders after a stint as defensive coordinator for the Montreal Alouettes. He served as Calgary's defensive assistant in 2021 and was named linebackers coach prior to the 2022 season.

In 2022, starting linebackers Cameron Judge and Jameer Thurman played an integral role in a Calgary defence that allowed the second-fewest points in the CFL. Both players finished top 10 in the league in tackles and Judge earned West Division and CFL all-star honours after leading the league in both fumble recoveries with five and big plays (a combination of interceptions, forced fumbles, fumble recoveries, blocked kicks and tackles, sacks or knockdowns leading to a turnover on downs).

With the assistance of Slowik in 2021, the Stampeders ranked third in the CFL in team defence and held their opponents to fewer than 300 yards of net offence five times.

In 2019, the Alouettes allowed the second-fewest points in the East Division and were led by linebacker Henoc Muamba, who won the CFL's Most Outstanding Canadian award. Five members of Slowik's unit – Muamba, John Bowman, Patrick Levels, Tommie Campbell and Greg Reid – were voted division all-stars while Muamba and Reid received league all-star recognition.

Prior to coming to the CFL, Slowik had a lengthy and distinguished career in the NFL including stints totaling 10 years as defensive coordinator with the Chicago Bears, Cleveland Browns, Green Bay Packers and Denver Broncos. During that time, six different players earned a combined total of 11 Pro Bowl honours and he coached two players – Champ Bailey and John Lynch – who went on to be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

His 21 consecutive years as a coach in the NFL started with a position as defensive assistant on the Dallas Cowboys' Super Bowl-winning team following the 1992 season and concluded with four seasons with Washington from 2010-13.

Slowik coached 11 years in the collegiate ranks including five seasons in charge of the secondary at Rutgers, two seasons as outside linebackers coach at East Carolina and four seasons at Florida as a part-time defensive backs assistant.

During his playing days, he was a cornerback for the University of Delaware. He is an alumnus of Pittsburgh's Baldwin High School.

Cameron is in his fourth season on the Stampeders' coaching staff. In addition to coaching the defensive backs, he serves as Calgary's CFL draft coordinator.

In 2022, the defensive backs were part of a unit that allowed the second-fewest points in the CFL. The Stamps allowed a league-low 7.7 yards per pass attempt, the opponents' 66.0-percent completion rate was the second-stingiest in the CFL and Calgary was tied for second with 19 interceptions. The secondary produced results despite a series of injuries that resulted in 13 different players making a start and several players playing multiple positions. Jonathan Moxey earned West Division all-star honours while making starts at three different positions – boundary corner, field corner and boundary half.

In 2021, the Stampeders finished third in the league in opponents' average yards per pass and completions of 30 or more yards. Five different players recorded an interception for the Stamps including a pick-six by Moxey.

Prior to joining the Stamps' coaching staff, Cameron served as a regional scout for the club.

Cameron had two stints at Wilfrid Laurier University, serving as the Golden Hawks' defensive backs coach and strength and conditioning coordinator from 2004-09 and as defensive backs coach, special-teams coordinator and recruiting coordinator from 2013-19. He was part of Wilfrid Laurier's Ontario conference championship teams in 2004, 2005 and 2016 and the Golden Hawks' Vanier Cup championship team in 2005.

In between his stints at Laurier, Cameron served as a defensive and special teams assistant on the Hamilton Tiger-Cats coaching staff in 2010 and 2011. On three occasions, he was head coach for Team Ontario at the International Bowl in Arlington, Tex.

During his playing career, the Guelph, Ont., native played safety at the University of Louisiana-Monroe.

Cameron and his wife Lisa have three children – sons Greg and Darian and daughter Kiana.

In his current role, Mahoney is involved in all player-personnel matters including the negotiation of player contracts and free-agent evaluation. He oversees the scouting department and the evaluation of national players from U Sports and international players from the NFL and all other professional leagues as well as the NCAA.

Hailing from nearby Cochrane, Mahoney joined the club during the 2005 season as a member of the practice roster.

Hopkins enters his 52nd season with the Red and White. On Aug. 5, 2022, Hopkins celebrated a major milestone with his 1,000th game – including pre-season, regular season and playoffs – working the Stampeders sideline.

He has worked 867 regular-season games, 47 playoff contests and 12 Grey Cups – including six championships – with the Red and White through the 2022 campaign.

Hopkins was added to the Stampeders Wall of Fame in the builders' category in 2014.

Hopkins' foremost responsibility is the safety of players by fitting each team member with a customized array of equipment designed to provide maximum protection. He orders and issues all equipment – everything from chewing gum to shoes and cleats – and also coordinates the transport of the club's equipment to and from each road site.

Each off-season, Hopkins helps coordinate an equipment inspection program for amateur football in the province. Run under the auspices of Football Alberta, Hopkins visually inspects equipment and gives recommendations

on storing, cleaning, reconditioning and disposal to Pee wee, Bantam, Midget and high school teams. Hopkins also sits on the board of directors for the Calgary and Area Midget Football Association.

In 1995, Hopkins was honoured at the Stamps' annual dinner as the recipient of the Art Evans Memorial Award for perseverance, contribution and dedication to the football club.

A graduate of the Mount Royal College (now University) Business Administration program, Hopkins worked as assistant press chief at Canada Olympic Park for the 1988 Winter Olympics in Calgary.

In 2012, Hopkins missed a two-game eastern road trip following surgery for a torn rotator cuff. Hopkins had previously only missed one game during his 40 years with the team – when his wife Cathy delivered their first child, daughter Jorde, in 1992. Hopkins, a native Calgarian, also has a son Hunter and a grandson Malcolm.

During this time, he and his family – which included the arrival of son Zak in 2002 – lived in Guelph, Ont. Taillefer continued to work as the visiting team clubhouse attendant during these years.

Away from the stadium, Taillefer stays busy assistant coaching his son's hockey teams, playing and listening to music, woodworking and following the San Francisco Giants, Kansas City Chiefs and University of Tennessee Volunteers.

Folan and his staff work closely with amateur football in the Calgary area. The video department films all local high school and spring-league games. The amateur video program films more than 150 youth games yearly.

In 2019, Folan was the first winner of the Jane Mawby Tribute Award, a CFL honour which recognizes a longtime team or league employee who demonstrates consistent high performance and resilience while working tirelessly behind the scenes. The award honours the memory of

Jane Mawby, who was a member of the Stampeders organization for 28 years before passing away in 2015.

In 2022, Folan was honoured by Football Alberta for his involvement in high school and minor football in the Calgary area as he received the Rob and Grace Zittlau Media Award.

Folan joined the Stampeders in 1990 and three years later became responsible for providing the coaching and player personnel staffs with their video and technology. In between stints with the Stamps, Folan attended Utah State University while working for their football and athletic programs.

With 211 points, he won the league's scoring title for the third time in his career. 2021

(Calgary) Paredes played all 14 regular-season games and accounted for a league-leading 155 points, going 44-for-48 on field-goal attempts (a CFL-best 91.7-per cent success rate) and 23-for-24 on extra points. He was a West Division and CFL all-star as well as the Stamps' nominee and West Division finalist for the Most Outstanding Special Teams Player award. In Week 1 against Toronto, he became the 10th player in CFL history to kick 400 career field

goals and in Week 3, he surpassed the 1,600-point milestone. In Week 6, he set a new career single-game high by kicking six field goals in a win at Edmonton. He matched that figure in Week 11 at BC and in the process earned the CFL's top-performer-of-the-week award. In Week 10 at Saskatchewan, Paredes' 44-yard field goal with no time left on the clock gave Calgary a 22-19 victory. He had another game-winning last-play field goal in a 13-12 win over Winnipeg in Week 16.

Paredes averaged 60.8 yards on 54 kickoffs with a long of 81 yards. In the Western Semi-Final, he went five-for-eight on field-goal attempts and made both convert attempts.

2020

(Calgary) Paredes was under contract with the Stampeders but the season was cancelled because of the global pandemic.

2019

(Calgary) Paredes played in all 18 regular-season contests – including the 150th of his career – as well as the Western Semi-Final against Winnipeg. During the regular, he was good on 43 of 52 field-goal attempts and 30 of 31 converts. Paredes had five field goals in Week 7 at Ottawa including the game-winner on the final play of the game. He had four other games with four field goals including four-for-four performances in Edmonton in Week 13 and at BC in Week 21. He was three-for-three including a season-best 50-yarder in Week 4 at Saskatchewan. Paredes also kicked off 80 times for an average of 64.4 yards. In the playoff game, he was successful on both of his extra-point attempts.

2018

(Calgary) Paredes played all 18 regular-season games and achieved a 91.1-per cent success rate on field goals (41 for 45). That made him the first player in CFL history to have four different seasons with a field-goal success rate of at least 90 per cent. Paredes was four-for-four on field goals of at least 50 yards and he was second in the league with an average of 66.1 yards on kickoffs. Paredes booted 41 field goals, 36 converts and two singles for a total of 161 points. Paredes' 43-yard field goal on the final play of the game lifted the Stamps to a 23-20 win over Edmonton in the Labour Day Classic. He played both post-season games and accounted for 12 points with two field goals and six converts while kicking off nine times for 573 yards. With two field goals in the championship-game win over Ottawa, he improved to a perfect 11-for-11 in his career during Grey Cup play.

2017

(Calgary) Paredes played 18 games and made 53 of 58 field goals (for a league-best 91.4-per cent success rate with a long of 48 yards) and 35 of 41 converts. He also had 78 kickoffs for 5,096 yards (for an average of 65.3 yards with a long of 95) and five singles. He kicked for a total of 199 points and also had three special-teams tackles.

Paredes had four games with five field goals – against Montreal in Weeks 4 and 15, against BC in Week 9 and against Saskatchewan in Week 14. With three converts and two singles, he accounted for five points in the Western Final and averaged 70.4 yards on five kickoffs in that game. He was one-for-one on extra points, one-for-one on field goals and had five kickoffs for 258 yards in the Grey Cup. Paredes was a West Division and CFL all-star.

Paredes was good on 40 of his 43 field-goal tries including his final 18 in a row. He was named

the CFL's special teams player of the month after going a perfect 14-for-14 on field goals in five games during October and November including a game-winner on the final play Nov. 2 in Edmonton. GREY CUP HISTORY

The Calgary Stampeders have made it to the Grey Cup 17 times in their history and have eight championships to their credit.

The Stamps won their first championship in just their fourth year of existence, claiming the 1948 title. They returned to the Grey Cup in 1949 but this time lost the match to Montreal.

That would mark the end of the Stamps' participation in the big game until nearly two full decades later in 1968. Calgary lost the '68 contest but the appearance started a run in which the Red and White advanced to the Grey Cup three times in four seasons, culminating with a victory in 1971.



Then came another drought, this one lasting exactly 20 years before Calgary reached the Grey Cup in 1991. While the Stamps lost the 1991 Grey Cup game to Toronto, the contest nevertheless marked the dawn of an era of Stampeders excellence. The Red and White reached the Grey Cup game six times in the next 11 years and won three titles.

After a relatively short lull of six seasons, the Stamps returned to the pinnacle in 2008 and won again in 2014 and added another title in 2018.

PRESIDENTS' RING



The Presidents' Ring is presented annually to the Calgary Stampeders player deemed by his teammates to have best combined excellence on the football field with leadership, inspiration and motivational skills.

Defensive lineman Derek Wiggan was the 2022 winner of the award. Wiggan is a seven-year veteran who has played 120 career regular-season and post-season games for the Red and White. In 2018, he played all 18 games and was part of a defensive unit that led the Canadian Football League in sacks and is among the top teams in run defence and fewest points allowed. Wiggan had 22 tackles including a team-leading four tackles for loss, one sack and one fumble recovery.

The Queen's University alumnus was one of the Stampeders' captains in 2022 and was also the team's representative for the CFL Players Association.

The Presidents' Ring was established in 1967 by team president George McMahan and general manager Rogers Lehew.

HERM HARRISON MEMORIAL AWARD

Honouring the memory of one of the legendary figures in Stampeders history, the Herm Harrison Memorial Award was instituted in 2014 and recognizes a Stampeders player who distinguishes himself in the field of community service. Harrison passed away on Nov. 2, 2013, at the age of 74.

One of the franchise's all-time greats, Harrison played for the Stampeders from 1964-72 and was a West Division all-star on six occasions and a CFL all-star three times. Harrison settled in Calgary after his playing career and was an active member of numerous community initiatives as an alumnus. Among the many causes he supported, the Special Olympics were a particular favourite. He was added to the Stampeders Wall of Fame in 1988 and inducted into the Canadian Football Hall of Fame in 1993.

In 2022, receiver Colton Hunchak received the award. A Calgary native and an alumnus of Notre Dame High School, Hunchak was an active participant in numerous community initiatives, most notably with the Every Yard Counts program with the Alberta Children's Hospital, Brown Bagging for Calgary's Kids, the Leading Change partnership with the Alberta Council of Women's Shelters and the Big Time Players 7v7 football program.

As a regular member of the Every Yard Counts program, Hunchak and several of his teammates visited the Alberta Children's Hospital the day before home games to spend time with young patients. In addition, the Stampeders invited a patient and their family to attend a game at McMahon Stadium and meet with players afterwards.

Hunchak's work with Brown Bagging for Calgary's Kids consisted of preparing school lunches for students from families with inadequate access to food due to financial constraints. A reported one in 10 households in Alberta faces food insecurity.

The partnership between the Stampeders and the Alberta Council of Women's Shelters dates back to the 2014 season and is dedicated to raising awareness about the violence faced by women and girls.

ATTACK IN BLACK

The Stampeders have an all-time record of 35-11 (regular season and post-season) while wearing their black jerseys, good for a .761 winning percentage.

The Stamps were the first Canadian Football League team to introduce a permanent third jersey when they unveiled black jerseys for the Labour Day Classic on Sept. 6, 1994. They capped the occasion with a 48-15 win over Edmonton.

Calgary played its first black-jersey playoff game in the 1998 West Division final and defeated Edmonton. A week later, while again sporting black, the Stamps beat Hamilton 26-24 in the Grey Cup.

LABOUR DAY CLASSIC

Since 1982 and for all but two seasons since 1969, the Calgary Stampeders have been hosting Edmonton in the Labour Day Classic. The Labour Day edition of the Battle of Alberta was first played in Calgary in 1959 and the clubs have met a total of 56 times, with the Stamps holding a record of 29-26-1.

While there is a lot of Labour Day history between Calgary and Edmonton, there is more to the Red and White's tradition on the September holiday than the rivalry with their provincial counterparts.

As a matter of fact, the first Labour Day game was the first regular-season contest the Stampeders ever played. The historic Sept. 2, 1946, game was against the Regina Roughriders at Calgary's Mewata Stadium, with the Stamps winning 9-0.

It was in 1949 that the now-familiar Calgary-Edmonton Labour Day matchup was born. The Alberta teams played five straight years in Edmonton before the series was briefly abandoned. Then, in 1959, the Red and White's rivalry with the Green and Gold was renewed. This time, Calgary was the site of the game and, with only a few exceptions over the years, it is in this form the tradition continues to exist today.

A total of 66 Labour Day games have been played in Calgary over the years, with the Stamps posting a 39-26-1 record. Calgary is 29-26-1 against Edmonton and undefeated against the Blue Bombers (6-0), Argonauts (2-0), Roughriders (1-0) and Lions (1-0).

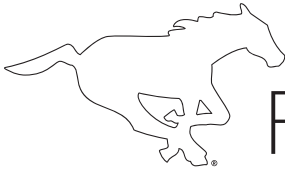
WLG LLP – and is the head of the firm's corporate finance and private equity group. He and his wife Deborah are the parents of three children.

The Stampeders Foundation is a community and charitable initiative dedicated to supporting sports, recreation and football at all levels. The Stampeders Foundation consolidates and strengthens the club's longstanding commitment to many charitable endeavours and allows the organization to build upon its relationship with the community.

Through 50/50 ticket sales at Stampeders home games and other fundraising initiatives and events, the Foundation supports grassroots and amateur football programs in southern Alberta. This year, a new football program was introduced by the Stampeders Foundation – The Stampeders Learn to Play Football Camp. The camp promotes the

introduction of football to new participants and supports the health and future of amateur and grassroots football teams and associations in our community.

More than \$260,000 was committed to minor and amateur football projects throughout southern Alberta in 2022 and more than \$4 million since 2012. This includes a \$600,000 donation to the Shouldice Shelter at the Shouldice Athletic Park. The Grey Cup Legacy Project – the Shouldice Athletic Park Seasonal Shelter – officially opened in late 2022, giving sports groups a place to play year-round.
