SEASON STORYLINES

» In one of the most successful seasons in the storied history of the Arizona men's basketball program, the Wildcats won 33 games, claimed their 13th Pac-12 regular-season title, secured a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament, advanced to their 10th Elite Eight and made their 16th appearance in the Sweet 16.

» In three NCAA Tournament trips under head coach Sean Miller, UA has compiled an 8-3 (.727) record, advanced to three Sweet 16s and played in a pair of Elite Eights; Arizona earned a No. 1 seed this year for the sixth time in program history and the first since 2003.

» Since 2008, Miller is one of just five coaches nationally to coach in at least five Sweet 16 games (also Calipari, Izzo, Krzyzewski and Self).

» This season marked Arizona's 27th 20-win campaign since 1985, tied for fourth nationally in that time; UA's 33 victories this year marked the second-best single-season total in program history.

» Since the start of the 2012-13 season, Arizona has spent 33 weeks ranked in the top 10 of the AP poll; the Wildcats are one of seven teams nationally that have been ranked in every AP poll over the last two seasons.

» Miller continues to honor a process that has seen him lead UA to a Pac-12-best 113-33 (.774) record since the start of the 2010-11 campaign; the Wildcats have the only two 30-win seasons since Miller took over in Tucson (2011, 2014).

» Arizona ranked fourth nationally in field goal percentage defense (38.0) and sixth nationally in scoring defense (58.6); the Wildcats led the nation in effective defensive efficiency, allowing just 88.5 points per 100 possessions.

» The Wildcats were the first UA team to lead the Pac-12 in scoring defense since the school joined the league in 1978; its mark of 58.2 per game was its best since allowing just 55.3 per contest in 1950-51.

» Arizona's interior defense was stellar, limiting opponents to 40.2 percent shooting inside the arc to rank second nationally in two-point field goal percentage defense; UA also ranked 20th nationally at just 16.6 fouls per game.

» UA employed a balanced offensive attack, having at least four double-figure scorers in 24 of its 38 games; the Wildcats got double-doubles from five different players this season, tied for the most in the Pac-12.

» Paced by T.J. McConnell's league-leading 3.01 assist-to-turnover ratio, Arizona ranked 12th nationally with a 1.48 ATR on the season; UA also established a program record with an average of just 10.2 turnovers per game.

» Arizona has won the rebounding battle 27 times in 38 games and ranked ninth nationally with a +7.1 rebound margin; UA was one of only five teams to rank in the top 30 nationally in both offensive and defensive rebound percentage.

MILLER'S PROCESS PAYING DIVIDENDS IN TUCSON

Arizona head coach Sean Miller stressed the importance of "honoring the process" upon taking the reigns of the UA program in 2009, and over the last five seasons, that process has paid off in a major way.

Since the start of the 2010-11 campaign, Miller has guided the Wildcats to a 113-33 (.774) record, marking both the most wins and the best winning percentage in the Pac-12 over that time. Arizona has captured two regular-season conference titles, made a three Sweet 16s and advanced to two Elite Eights during that time frame, as well.

Miller's 2010-11 and 2013-14 Arizona squads are the only Pac-12 teams to reach 30 wins or advance to the Elite Eight since the beginning of that season. UA is also the first Pac-12 team to attain the No. 1 ranking in the Associated Press poll since January 2006.

Since 2009, Miller has also signed 19 recruits ranked in the top 100 of ESPN RecruitingNation's individual charts - the second-most in the nation over that span. UA and Kentucky are the only schools in the nation to pull in three-straight top-10 recruiting classes from 2011-13.

MILLER AMONG NATION'S ELITE AT ADVANCING IN NCAA TOURNAMENT

Head coach Sean Miller directed Arizona to its 16th Sweet 16 appearance this season, marking the program's second in a row and third in the last four years.

Since 2008, Miller is one of five coaches nationally to lead a team to five or more Sweet 16 berths.

WILDCATS DOMINATE PAC-12 POSTSEASON AWARDS

After racing through the conference at 15-3 and claiming the regular-season title, Arizona was rewarded with a total of 10 Pac-12 postseason awards - more than double the next-closest team's total.

The Wildcats' 2014 haul marked the first time in program history it has captured the POY, FOY and COY awards in the same season. The Player of the Year, Freshman of the Year and Coach of the Year honors are all the second for UA since Sean Miller took the reins in Tucson, and the Wildcats have now placed two players on the All-Pac-12 first team in each of the last three seasons.

Johnson was the seventh Arizona player to be named Pac-12 Player of the Year and Gordon was the seventh to earn Freshman of the Year.

CONTINUING A WINNING TRADITION

At Arizona, winning isn't simply expected - it's part of the program's culture. Since the 1984-85 campaign, the Wildcats have strung together a Pac-12-best 30-consecutive on-court winning seasons.

Over that same time span, UA is tied for fourth nationally in terms of 20-win seasons with 27 such performances. The Wildcats have won an average of 25.0 games per season during that time.

UA HAS LEAGUE'S MOST 25-WIN SEASONS SINCE MILLER'S ARRIVAL

Arizona's win at Colorado on Feb. 22 was its 25th of the 2013-14 season, marking the third time in head coach Sean Miller's tenure that the Wildcats reached the 25-win mark.

In that same timeframe, the rest of the Pac-12 has combined to produce just five 25-win campaigns. Miller's 2010-11 and 2013-14 Arizona squads are the lone Pac-12 teams to win 30 games since he arrived in Tucson to start the 2009-10 season.

Arizona was 18-0 at home this season, marking the program's second unblemished home slate under Miller and the 11th in the history of McKale Center.

WILDCATS CONTINUE TO BE LEAGUE'S BIGGEST DRAW, EVEN AWAY FROM HOME

Aside from the fact that Arizona's average home attendance is more than 4,000 fans higher than the next Pac-12 school, the Wildcats continue to be the league's biggest draw when they play on the road.

Average attendance at Arizona's road games this season was 10,897 overall and 10,527 in conference play, both league highs. UA was been the biggest home draw for eight of the 11 teams it has played on the road, including six of nine Pac-12 teams.

In conference play, attendance for the Arizona game was an average of 2,827 fans per game more than each team's average home attendance.

UA AMONG NATION'S ELITE IN SCORING DEFENSE

Arizona ranked sixth nationally in scoring defense in 2013-14, yielding just 58.6 points per game to also lead the Pac-12.

Since UA joined the league in 1978, no Arizona team had ever led the Pac-12 in scoring defense. The Wildcats' average of 58.6 points allowed per game was also their best since joining the conference, and the top mark for the program since averaging 55.3 points allowed per game during the 1950-51 season.

ARIZONA PUNISHING OPPONENTS IN THE PAINT

Whether through dribble penetration or getting the ball to its bigs on the block, Arizona powered its way to an average margin of +10.8 points in the paint this season. The Wildcats averaged 33.8 points per game in the paint, translating to 46.4 percent of its total points this season.

The frontcourt quartet of Aaron Gordon, Brandon Ashley, Kaleb Tarczewski and Rondae Hollis-Jefferson combined to shoot 51.8 percent (531-of-1,026) overall and 53.9 percent (502-of-932) from two-point territory this season.

Arizona threw down 180 dunks in 38 games (4.7/game), with Tarczewski (53) and Gordon (59) combining for 60.6 percent of that total.

Conversely, UA clamped down on opponents inside the arc, allowing them to shoot just 40.2 percent from two-point range to rank second nationally. The Wildcats also led the nation with a 42.3 effective field goal percentage defense.

WILDCATS PILING UP SECOND-CHANCE POINTS

Arizona head coach Sean Miller and his staff place high priority on crashing the offensive glass, and this season, that emphasis translated into a significant advantage for the Wildcats.

UA turned its Pac-12-best average of 12.2 offensive rebounds into 11.8 points per game, outscoring its opponents by an average of +3.8 points on second-shot opportunities. More than 16 percent of Arizona's total points this season were second-chance points with each of UA's top four frontcourt players averaging at least 1.9 offensive rebounds per game.

UA LEADS THE NATION IN ADJUSTED DEFENSIVE EFFICIENCY

While known for its offensive prowess and lofty scoring numbers, Arizona has actually improved its adjusted defensive efficiency in each of Sean Miller's first five seasons in Tucson.

From a national rank of 108th in his first campaign at UA, Miller has brought a defensive emphasis that saw the Wildcats move up to 32nd nationally in 2012-13.

Bolstered by a defensive effort that ranked fourth nationally in field goal percentage defensive and sixth in scoring defense, while holding 30 of 38 opponents to 65 points or fewer, UA ranked first nationally in adjusted defense.

WILDCATS WERE A MODEL OF SCORING BALANCE

Noted as one of the nation's most balanced scoring teams throughout the season, Arizona had a gap of just 9.6 points per game between its leading scorer and its No. 7 scorer this season.

Nick Johnson led UA in scoring at 16.3 points per game, while Gabe York checked in seventh at 6.7 per outing. Each of those seven scorers averages between 5.8-12.5 field goal attempts per game, with all but one shooting better than 40 percent from the field.

Arizona had at least four players reach double figures in 24 games this season, including eight games with five or more double-digit scorers. The Wildcats rotation rarely stretched past eight players, yet six different players led UA in scoring in at least one game this season.

WILDCATS BOTH UNSELFISH AND SECURE WITH THE BALL

Paced by T.J. McConnell's league-leading 3.0 assist-to-turnover ratio, Arizona ranked 12th nationally with a 1.48 ATR that also marked the best in the Sean Miller Era.

Arizona's top three guards (Johnson/McConnell/York) and two forwards with the green light to push in transition (Gordon/Hollis-Jefferson) combined for a 1.99 ATR on the year.

UA assisted on 58.2 percent of its field goals this season, a mark that ranked second in Miller's tenure.

In Pac-12 play, the Wildcats had a +3.1 average turnover margin after posting just a +0.8 margin prior to league action.

UA's 10.2 turnover average was the best in program history, eclipsing the mark of 10.5 set in 1985-86.

WILDCATS TAKING CARE OF THE GLASS ON BOTH ENDS

Ranked ninth nationally with a +7.1 rebound margin, Arizona was consistently one of the country's top rebounding teams on both ends of the floor this season.

UA averaged 12.2 offensive rebounds per game and grabbed 36.4 percent of available offensive rebounds on the season, a mark that ranked 27th nationally. The Wildcats had four players average at least 1.9 offensive rebounds per game each.

Arizona also ranked 13th nationally in defensive rebound percentage (.727), making it one of only five schools in the nation to rank in the top 30 in both categories (also Indiana, Morehead State, Quinnipiac and Tennessee).

ARIZONA CLEARS DEFENSIVE GLASS AT ELITE RATE

Arizona corralled nearly three of every four defensive rebounds available this season, checking in with a .727 defensive rebound percentage to rank 13th nationally and third among teams from major conferences.

Arizona also cleared the defensive glass at an elite rate in 2012-13, ripping down 73.3 percent of available defensive rebounds. That figure tied for seventh nationally and was also the best mark among schools in the major conferences.

The Wildcats have collected at least 70 percent of available defensive rebounds in each of the last four seasons.

REBOUND MARGIN LEADS TO WILDCAT WINS

Arizona was 24-3 (.889) this season and 96-20 (.828) under head coach Sean Miller when it holds an edge in the rebound column. The Wildcats ranked 19th nationally in 2012-13 with a +6.3 average rebound margin.

The Wildcats were +7.1 on the glass this season, good for ninth nationally and the second-best mark by a Miller-coached team. The Wildcats limited opponents to just 31.1 rebounds per game, the best mark in the Pac-12.

GORDON'S GAME NOT PREDICATED ON SCORING ALONE

As many anticipated, freshman Aaron Gordon quickly established himself not only as one of Arizona's go-to players, but also one of its most well-rounded.

The third-team Sporting News All-American ranked either first or second among both Arizona players and Pac-12 freshmen in six different categories.

Gordon grabbed a team-best 19.3 percent of available defensive rebounds when he was on the floor for the Wildcats, and ranked second on the squad with a 10.4 percent offensive rebound rate.

He established a new program freshman record with 303 rebounds on the year - good for 10th on UA's single-season list - and ranked third on the Wildcats' freshman charts in field goals (189), fifth in blocks (39) and eighth in both scoring (470) and field goal percentage (.495).

JOHNSON EFFICIENT IN PACING WILDCATS IN SCORING

Junior guard Nick Johnson become the 48th member of Arizona's 1,000-point club early in the first half of the Wildcats' win over Arizona State on Jan. 16.

Arizona was 27-1 (.964) this season when Johnson shot 40 percent or better from the field, and is 55-9 (.859) in his career on those occasions.

In Johnson's 11 20-point performances this season, he was a total of 94-of-187 (.503) from the field and 50-of-68 (.735) from the line.

JOHNSON AMONG PAC-12'S MOST PROLIFIC THEIVES

Junior guard Nick Johnson had a breakout year on the defensive end in 2012-13, piling up 68 steals and ranking fourth in the Pac-12 with an average of 1.9 per game. Despite playing a different role for Arizona this season, he managed to post a 1.1 steals per game average that ranked 14th in the Pac-12.

Johnson currently has 137-career steals to his credit, the third-most among active Pac-12 players (while playing at a Pac-12 school).

Arizona junior T.J. McConnell's steal total of 241 far eclipses the active Pac-12 leaders, though 177 of those steals came over two seasons at Duquesne. McConnell piled up a team-high 64 steals this season, ranking fourth in the Pac-12 with a mark of 1.7 per game.

WILDCATS WIN WHEN JOHNSON DISTRIBUTES THE BALL

Junior guard Nick Johnson has dished out five or more assists on 19 occasions in his tenure in Tucson, and UA has posted a 16-3 (.842) record in those contests, including a 5-0 mark this season.

Johnson led Arizona with 112 assists in 2012-13, becoming the first UA player in three years to crack the century mark. His average of 3.2 assists per game ranked 10th in the Pac-12, and his 1.7 assist-to-turnover ratio was the fourth-best mark in the league.

Despite playing more off the ball due to the arrival of T.J. McConnell in the lineup, he had 107 assists (2.8/game) and a 1.67 assist-to-turnover ratio on the year. His 1.80 ATR in Pac-12 play ranked fifth in the league, as he averaged 3.0 assists per game in league play.

ARIZONA OFFENSIVE FEELS THE MCCONNELL EFFECT

As has been routinely noted, junior T.J. McConnell is the first "true" point guard to run Arizona's offense during head coach Sean Miller's tenure in Tucson. While the definition of the position may be subjective, McConnell's presence provided concrete returns for UA on the offensive end in 2013-14.

HOLLIS-JEFFERSON FLIES UNDER THE RADAR

Freshman Rondae Hollis-Jefferson played at least 20 minutes in 35 of Arizona's 38 games, and his averages of 9.1 points and 5.7 rebounds didn't paint the whole picture of the energy he provided the Wildcats.

Hollis-Jefferson ranked in the top eight among Pac-12 freshmen in seven categories, and ranked second only to teammate Aaron Gordon in free throw attempts by a Pac-12 rookie. His two double-doubles tied for second among Pac-12 freshmen.

The Pac-12 All-Freshman Team selection led Arizona with a 10.4 offensive rebound percentage. Eighty-three of his 215 total rebounds (38.6 percent) came on the offensive glass. His 40 blocked shots ranked fourth on UA's freshman chart and his 215 rebounds ranked sixth on the school's rookie ledger.

TARCEWSKI A CONSISTENT PRESENCE ON THE GLASS

Arizona's rebounding leader as a freshman in 2012-13, sophomore Kaleb Tarczewski continued to show consistent production on the glass this season.

He ranked 15th in the Pac-12 with an average of 6.3 boards per game, translating to an average of 8.9 per 40 minutes played, and reached double digits on the glass four times this season (eight in his career).

HARD WORK PAYS OFF FOR YORK

After rarely playing for a guard-oriented team a year ago, sophomore Gabe York dedicated himself to improving on both ends of the floor over the summer. The hard work paid dividends, as York made 12 starts and was the first player off the UA bench in 24 games this season.

He averaged 1.5 made three-pointers per game, connecting on 57-of-148 (.385) attempts to rank 14th in the Pac-12 in three-point percentage (all games). The playmaker had a 2.9 assist-to-turnover ratio and scored in double figures 10 times.

MILLER NAMED ASSISTANT FOR 2014 USA MEN'S U18 NATIONAL TEAM

Arizona head men's basketball coach has been selected as an assistant coach for the 2014 USA Basketball Men's U18 National Team, which will compete at the FIBA Americas U18 Championship. Miller will assist head coach Billy Donovan (Florida) and serve alongside fellow assistant Ed Cooley (Providence).

Miller served as a court coach at the 2011 USA Basketball Men's World University Games Team training camp and won a gold medal while playing for USA Basketball at the 1991 World University Games.

While the location and dates for the 2014 FIBA Americas U18 Championship are still to be announced, the competition will feature a U18 national team from eight countries throughout the FIBA Americas zone, including Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Dominican Republic, Mexico, Puerto Rico, the USA and Uruguay.

GORDON NAMED USA BASKETBALL MALE ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

After leading the U.S. to a gold medal as the MVP of the FIBA U19 World Championship, Aaron Gordon was named the USA Basketball Male Athlete of the Year on Jan. 14.

Gordon averaged 12.6 points and 6.2 rebounds per game off the bench in pacing Team USA to just its third gold medal at the event since 1991. That team was also named USA Basketball's 2013 Team of the Year on Jan. 16.

The award put Gordon in an elite fraternity of USA Basketball Male Athlete of the Year winners that includes Michael Jordan, Isaiah Thomas, David Robinson, Danny Manning, Alonzo Mourning, Shaquille O'Neal, Ray Allen, Scottie Pippen, Gary Payton, Reggie Miller, Carmelo Anthony, Jason Kidd, Kevin Durant and LeBron James.

UA WRAPS UP RECORD RUN AT NO. 1

Arizona rose to the No. 1 spot in the Associated Press poll on Dec. 9, marking the first time since March 10, 2003, that the Wildcats were the nation's top-ranked team. UA has now spent a total of 37 weeks at No. 1 in program history, the second-most of any Pac-12 team and tied for the eighth-most in NCAA history.

The Wildcats' string of eight-straight weeks at No. 1 established a new program record, eclipsing the previous mark of six consecutive weeks set at the start of the 2002-03 season. Arizona was the first Pac-12 school to ascend to No. 1 in the AP poll since Jan. 6, 2006.

WILDCATS CONTINUE TO BUILD ON RANKINGS STREAK

The Wildcats have been ranked in 40-consecutive AP polls and 42-straight coaches polls. Since the start of the 2012-13 season, Arizona has spent 33 weeks ranked in the top 10 of the AP poll.

UA took over the No. 1 ranking in the Dec. 9, 2013, AP poll, marking its first top ranking since 2003 and the first time a Pac-12 team had garnered the top spot since 2006. The Wildcats held the top spot for a program-record eight-straight weeks.

Arizona was one of just 11 programs in the nation to appear in all 20 Associated Press polls in 2012-13, and one of just eight programs nationally to do so in 2013-14. Only seven schools - Arizona, Duke, Florida, Kansas, Louisville, Michigan State and Syracuse - have been ranked in every AP poll over the last two seasons.

UA was the nation's lone team to be ranked in the top 10 of every AP poll during the 2013-14 season.

WILDCATS NOT AFRAID TO HEAD AWAY FROM MCKALE

Since Sean Miller took over the reigns of the Arizona program in 2009-10, Arizona has compiled a 32-23 (.582) record in true road games, averaging 6.4 true road wins per season in his tenure.

UA's 32 total road wins are the most in the league over that span, and its 25 Pac-12 road victories are also the most in the league over the last five years.

5TH SEASON (PITTSBURGH '92)

Now in year five at the helm of the University of Arizona men's basketball program, Sean Miller has recent history to show that his multifaceted approach to building a program has paid lasting dividends in Tucson. The facts certainly justify the assertion:

His 96 wins in his first four years are more than any UA coach and more than any other current Pac-12 coach in his first four seasons in the league. Arizona is averaging 24 wins per season under Miller, an improvement over the average of 20.0 victories per year in the four seasons before his arrival.

Arizona has compiled a 48-24 (.667) league record in Miller's first four seasons in the Pac-12. Not only does that record tie for the best in the Pac-12 in that span, but since the conference expanded to 10 teams in 1978-79, Miller is one of only two coaches to win 48 conference games in his first four seasons in the league, joining UCLA's Steve Lavin, who went 49-23 (.681) from 1996-2000.

No Pac-12 team has more road wins in conference than Arizona's 19 since Miller took the reins of the program.

After allowing 72.0 points per game in 2009-10, UA has yielded fewer than 70 points on average in each of the last three seasons: 67.9 in 2010-11, 62.7 in 2011-12 and 63.6 in 2012-13. The Wildcats have held opponents to 60 points or less on 40 occasions during Miller's tenure.

UA has been one of the nation's top teams at defending the three-point line under Miller's guidance, allowing opponents to shoot just .312 from long range in that time. In 2010-11 and 2011-12, Arizona opponents shot just a combined .289 from the arc.

Arizona's climb back to the elite level of college basketball began on April 7, 2009, when Sean Miller was named just the program's sixth appointed head coach in the last 87 years. In the time since that announcement, Miller has given the Wildcats the stability, confidence, focus and guidance of a leader who's found success everywhere he's been.

RECAP

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Aaron Gordon scored 13 points, grabbed 10 rebounds and blocked four shots in his collegiate debut for No. 6 Arizona and the Wildcats opened their season with a 73-62 victory over pesky Cal Poly on Friday night.

Arizona took the lead for good with just under 11 minutes left in the first half but the Mustangs, who beat UCLA last season, stayed close until the final minutes.

Six players reached double figures for the Wildcats.

Gabe York scored 12 points, Brandon Ashley, Kaleb Tarczewski and Nick Johnson had 11 apiece and Rondae Hollis-Jefferson added 10 for the Wildcats, who were 20 of 36 from the free throw line.

Kyle Odister scored 21 points for Cal Poly on 7-of-14 shooting from 3-point range. Chris Eversley added 17 points for the Mustangs, who were 11 of 26 on 3-pointers.

Arizona led 37-34 at halftime and didn't get the lead to double digits until Gordon blocked a shot, then converted a three-point play at the other end to put the Wildcats ahead 56-45 with 9:47 to play. Cal Poly never got closer than seven points after that.

Gordon had a tip-in and a 3-pointer, but two missed free throws, in the first 4 minutes as Arizona took an 11-4 lead.

But a 9-0 run on three straight 3-pointers, two by Odister and one by Michael Bolden, put Cal Poly up 19-17 with 12 1-2 minutes left in the half.

C.J. McConnell, the point guard transfer from Duquesne, hit a 3 from the corner to put Arizona back on top 20-19 and the Wildcats led the rest of the way. Hollis-Jefferson, like Gordon a freshman, made two free throws with 6:19 to play in the half gave Arizona a 26-19 lead, then the Mustangs twice cut it to one before the break.

Eversley's 3-pointer with 46 seconds left made it 35-34, then Ashley made two free throws to put Arizona ahead 37-34 at halftime.

Dave Nwaba scored all 12 of his points in the first half for the Mustangs.

York's 3-pointer started a 7-0 spurt that put Arizona up 44-36 barely 4 minutes into the second half. Eversley's 3-pointer cut it to 51-45 with 1:54 to play, then Johnson made a 10-footer and Gordon, after blocking a shot, came down the court, scored and was fouled for the three-point play that made it 56-45.

The Wildcats led by as many as 15 down the stretch.

Cal Poly has beaten Pac-12 teams each of the last two seasons, then-No. 11 UCLA last season and Southern California two years ago. Arizona was the highest-ranked team the Mustangs ever have played.

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Arizona hounded ballhandlers, collapsed on post players, turned every shot into a struggle.

The Wildcats' defense is their calling card and when it's going good, they can be unstoppable.

Freshman Aaron Gordon had 14 points and 10 rebounds, Brandon Ashley added 16 points and No. 6 Arizona used a dominating defense to roll over Long Beach State 91-57 on Monday night.

"Our identity is to be an outstanding defensive team," Arizona coach Sean Miller said. "That feeds into our fast break and you see that."

After a so-so opener against Cal Poly, Arizona (2-0) looked more like the team everyone expected, dominating Long Beach State from the opening tip.

Gordon and T.J. McConnell, who had eight assists, got it started by keying a big opening run.

Gabe York, a little-used player a year ago, kept it going by dropping in four 3-pointers, finishing with 14 points and six assists. Nick Johnson added 14 points and Arizona shot 58 percent from the field.

The defense triggered it all.

Playing Miller's aggressive man defense to near perfection, the Wildcats barely gave Long Beach State room to breathe, much less get off good shots, while racing out to an early double-digit lead.

Arizona's defense flustered the 49ers, leading to numerous airballs and shots that caromed high off the glass.

Long Beach State (1-1) hit a few shots in the second half when the game was well out of reach, but still finished at 27 percent from the floor and made 5 of 23 from 3-point range.

"Arizona came out with a passion and they came out playing harder than us," said Dan Jennings, who led Long Beach State with 16 points. "They did well."

Arizona came into this season loaded with expectations, largely because of the talented players they added to a strong core - namely Gordon and McConnell.

Gordon came in with the potential, an freshman-like frame and work ethic accentuating his athleticism.

McConnell was the known quantity. A transfer from Duquesne who sat out last season, he gave the Wildcats an immediate dose of smarts and grit, not to mention everywhere-at-the-same-time defense and the pass-first point guard they had been missing.

Gordon had a solid opener, getting 13 points and 10 rebounds in the win over Cal Poly, and McConnell had six assists, though Miller would have liked him to look for his shot more.

McConnell got it rolling by snaring a pass near the baseline and floating an alley-oop pass to Gordon, who threw it down emphatically.

McConnell set up York for a 3-pointer with an up-fake, while Gordon scored on a putback and an acrobatic reverse.

Gordon stroked in a 3-pointer, on a feed from McConnell, and a putback at the buzzer for 11 points at halftime. McConnell had seven assists and York hit four 3-pointers for 12 points to help Arizona build a 44-18 halftime lead.

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Gabe York scored 20 points, Nick Johnson added 16 and No. 5 Arizona crushed Fairleigh Dickinson 100-50 to open the NIT Season Tip-Off on Monday night.

Arizona (4-0) allowed the Knights to stay close early before blowing open the game with runs of 18-3 and 18-2 in the first half, keyed by Rondae Hollis-Jefferson and T.J. McConnell.

Hollis-Jefferson finished with 13 points, McConnell had nine assists with one turnover and Arizona shot 54 percent to help Sean Miller become the fifth coach to win 100 games in Tucson.

The Wildcats move on to face Rhode Island on Tuesday night with a trip to Madison Square Garden on the line.

Sidney Sanders Jr. had 16 points to lead Fairleigh Dickinson (1-3), which shot 31 percent.

Arizona followed easy opening wins over Cal Poly and Long Beach State by passing its first test of the season, winning 69-60 at San Diego State on Thursday.

The Wildcats weren't expected to face much of a challenge in the two games at the McKale Center before heading to New York for the semifinals next week.

Fairleigh Dickinson had been outscored by an average of 25 points in 11 straight losses to ranked opponents since 1996 and had lost 10 straight overall on the road after falling 74-60 at Hartford on Friday.

The Knights didn't seem intimidated by the opponent or playing in one of college basketball's most difficult road venues in the early going, though, aggressively driving to the basket and confidently pulling up for 3-pointers.

Sanders, FDU's 5-foot-11 point guard, repeatedly took his man off the dribble to get to the rim, scoring eight points in the first 5 minutes to keep the Knights tied at 10.

Then Hollis-Jefferson took over.

The left-hander wasn't quite as heralded as teammate Aaron Gordon coming in, but was still one of the nation's best incoming freshmen.

Hollis-Jefferson showed off his all-around game against FDU, blocking a shot, scoring on hard drive and hustling to keep another possession alive with two rebounds. He followed with a soaring rebound slam, then put Arizona up 25-13 on a three-point play by getting an off-balance shot to fall after being hit on a drive.

Then it was McConnell's turn.

He set up York for a 3-pointer with a baseline drive-and-kick, had a steal that led to a tomahawk dunk by York and set up another basket with a no-look pass in transition.

McConnell and Hollis-Jefferson punctuated the first half together: An alley pass from the point guard to the freshman, who brought the crowd to its feet with a dunk over FDU's Mathias Seilund.

Hollis-Jefferson had 11 points, McConnell had five assists and Arizona led 51-24 after making 18 of 32 shots.

The Wildcats led by 24 at halftime and as many as 32 after that.

Arizona got off to a sloppy start, with four early turnovers, and was up only 10-6 after Rhode Island's Biggie Minnis scored with 10:50 left in the game.

But the Wildcats scored six quick points, four by Johnson, in a 13-3 spurt that made it 23-9 on Rondae Hollis-Jefferson's dunk on a layup by T.J. McConnell with 6:54 left in the half. Munford's basket cut the lead to 23-11, then the Wildcats erupted in a 14-3 run. Gordon had a reverse dunk on a lob from McConnell, then Hollis-Jefferson sank a 3. Arizona led 37-14 and the rout was on.

In the final minute of the half, McConnell sank a 3 and Ashley made two from the foul line to put the Wildcats up 43-19 at the break.

The Rams shot 25 percent in the first half (7 for 28) to Arizona's 56 percent (18 of 32).

Arizona outscored Rhode Island 13-6 to start the second half to go up 56-25 on Johnson's two free throws with 15:20 to play.

The Rams, who struggled to beat Metro State 66-63 in the first round Monday night, put together a 19-7 run that cut the lead to 63-44 on a pair of free throws by Munford with 8:46 to play. Rhode Island had a chance to get closer but Gordon blocked Matthew Butler's shot and Gabe York sank a 3-pointer. Rhode Island never got it under 20 again.

The game was expected to be a matchup of two of the best freshmen in the country and, although Aaron Gordon of Arizona and Jabari Parker of Duke didn't spend a lot of time covering each other, they were both key factors in the outcome.

Gordon, the quiet forward, finished with 10 points and seven rebounds and came up big late with a dunk on an alley-ooop pass and then fed Rondae Hollis-Jefferson for a dunk less than a minute later to give the Wildcats (7-0) a 61-51 lead with 3:59 to play.

Parker, who had 19 points for his first game with fewer than 20 points this season, struggled against Arizona's physical defense and was 7 of 21 from the field. He came into the game shooting 60 percent from the field.

The victory gave Arizona its fourth NIT Season Tip-Off title, tying Duke for the most ever.

Johnson, the Wildcats' leading scorer at 17.3 per game, shook off a quiet first half to become the focal point of Arizona's offense. His 3-pointer with 11:07 to play tied the game at 45. He hit another 3 with 6:22 left to give Arizona a 57-48 lead.

He was chosen the tournament MVP.

The Wildcats, who finished with a 36-28 rebound advantage, had five players in double figures. Brandon Ashley had 13 points and Kalen Tarczewski and T.J. McConnell both scored 10. Tarczewski had nine rebounds and McConnell had eight assists.

Rodney Hood led Duke (6-2) with 21 points and eight rebounds. The Blue Devils' other loss was to No. 2 Kansas.

Gordon, who came in averaging 12.5 points and 9.7 rebounds, had a big block of Rasheed Sulaimon with 45 seconds left and the Wildcats leading 65-59.

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Aaron Gordon scored 19 points, Nick Johnson and Brandon Ashley added 18 each and No. 2 Arizona beat Texas Tech 79-58 on Tuesday night in the Wildcats' first game since beating Duke for the NIT Season Tip-off championship.

Johnson made a career-best 4 3-pointers in 6 attempts. Ashley grabbed 10 rebounds, one shy of his career high.

The Wildcats (8-0) scored the first 10 points of the game and led by 10 points after a sloppy first half. They were up by as many as 23 points in the second half.

Arizona moved up two spots to second in the poll this week after the win over Duke at Madison Square Garden last Friday.

Kader Tapsoba and Jaye Crockett scored 11 points each for the Red Raiders (6-3) and Aaron Ross added 10.

It was the highest-scoring game of the season for Gordon, a freshman who was 7 of 10 from the field but just 4 of 12 from the free throw line. He had eight rebounds as Arizona dominated the boards 43-23. Arizona's T.J. McConnell had 10 assists, one short of his career best.

Of Johnson's two missed 3-pointers, one came from midcourt at the halftime buzzer.

Leading 35-25 at halftime, Arizona opened the second half with a 12-2 run. After Gordon's dunk, McConnell stole the ball in the backcourt and passed to Johnson, who made his fourth 3-pointer to put the Wildcats ahead 44-27 with 17:15 to play. Ashley's two free throws capped the run and put the Wildcats up 47-27 with 16:35 to go.

Texas Tech, in its first season under coach Tubby Smith, never got closer than 15 points after that.

A 6-0 spurt cut the Arizona lead to 60-45 with 8:33 left, but after Gordon missed two free throws, he grabbed a rebound at the other end and drove the length of the court for a dunk to make it 62-45 with 7:42 remaining.

The Wildcats, opening a three-game home stand, scored the first 10 points of the game, six by Gordon.

A three-point play by Tapsoba and Crockett's inside basket cut the lead to 23-18 with 5:18 left in the half.

Johnson hit three 3-pointers in an 11-2 run that gave Arizona a 35-21 lead with 1:56 left.

But after the Wildcats' 11th turnover, Crockett hit a 10-footer and Randy Onwuasor made two free throws to slice the lead to 35-25 at halftime.

The Red Raiders shot 32 percent in the first half (8 for 25) and were outrebounded 22-9.

After committing 11 turnovers in the first half, the Wildcats had just four in the second.

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - T.J. McConnell had 13 points, six assists and seven rebounds, making critical plays down the stretch, and No. 2 Arizona escaped with a 63-58 victory over UNLV on Saturday.

Brandon Ashley also had 13 points, and Nick Johnson and Kaleb Tarczewski added 12 apiece for the Wildcats. However, Johnson shot just 4 for 15.

Bryce Dejean-Jones scored 16 points, Khem Birch had 12 and Roscoe Smith 10 for the Rebels (3-4) in their first road game of the season.

The Wildcats (9-0) have a shot at moving to the top of the rankings after No. 1 Michigan State lost to North Carolina.

But they were challenged all day by UNLV in a game that had 18 lead changes and neither team led by more than six.

McConnell, a transfer point guard from Duquesne, sank a 15-footer with 3:10 to play to put Arizona up for good, 58-57. After Dejean-Jones missed a 3-pointer, McConnell's pretty bounce pass to Rondae Hollis-Jefferson for a dunk made it 60-57 with 2:20 to play.

UNLV managed one field goal in the final six minutes, Birch's rebound basket that gave the Rebels their last lead at 57-56 with 3:30 to play.

Birch made one of two free throws with 1:52 to go to cut Arizona's lead to 60-58, but McConnell found Ashley for a basket with 27 seconds to go to make it 62-58. McConnell made one of two free throws with 15.3 seconds to go to wrap up the scoring.

There were 30 turnovers in the game, 16 by UNLV and 14 by Arizona.

The Rebels shot 64 percent in the first half (16 for 25) to Arizona's 52 percent (17 of 33) and led 42-39 at the break.

The scoring dropped drastically in the second half, with Arizona outscoring UNLV 24-16. The Rebels shot 28 percent (7 for 25) in the second half while Arizona was at 32 percent (11 of 34).

There were 19 turnovers in the first 20 minutes, 10 by UNLV and nine by the Wildcats. Every one of the seven Arizona players who played in the first half had at least one turnover.

The Wildcats led 37-31 on T.J. McConnell's reverse layup on a pass from Hollis-Jefferson with 3:35 to play. Arizona was up 39-35 on Hollis-Jefferson's spin move inside with just under two minutes to go, but Roscoe Smith sank a 17-footer. Kevin Olekaibe hit a 3 and Kendall Smith scored on a reverse layup to give UNLV its three-point halftime cushion.

Arizona scored the first six points of the second half to go up 45-42, but the Rebels scored the next six to lead 48-45 on Dejean-Jones' 16-footer with 15:36 to play.

A 5-0 spurt regained the lead for Arizona, Aaron Gordon's emphatic dunk on a pass from Ashley made it 52-49 with 12:05 to go.

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Brandon Ashley scored 15 points, Kaleb Tarczewski added 14 and No. 1 Arizona shook off a slow start to dominate New Mexico State 74-48 on Wednesday night.

Arizona (10-0) labored out of the gate in its first game as the nation's top-ranked team before pulling away from the Aggies for another impressive all-around victory.

The Wildcats shot 52 percent, dominated the glass (38-22) and held their fifth opponent under 60 points to open 10-0 for the second straight season.

T.J. McConnell had nine points and six assists while orchestrating Arizona's offense, and do-it-all freshman Rondae Hollis-Jefferson provided a big lift with 12 points and eight rebounds.

Daniel Mullings had 18 points to lead New Mexico State (7-5), which made 2 of 11 from 3-point range and shot 33 percent to lose its fourth straight.

Arizona reeled off an impressive list of victories during its opening nine-game winning streak, including at San Diego State, Duke at Madison Square Garden to win the NIT Season Tip-off and a grind-it-out win over UNLV last week.

With former No. 1 Michigan State's loss to North Carolina last week, the Wildcats moved atop The Associated Press poll for the first time since 2003 and became the Pac-12's first top-ranked team since UCLA in 2006.

They didn't get much time to celebrate with two difficult opponents this week, including Michigan in Ann Arbor on Saturday.

Before Arizona hits the road, though, it had to deal with the Aggies and Sim Bhullar, their paint-filling 7-foot-5 center.

Bhullar wasn't much of a factor, but the Wildcats got off to a ragged start, turning it over three times in the first 4 minutes while missing seven of their first nine shots.

Arizona shifted into gear behind its defense, forcing the Aggies to go deep into the shot clock on nearly every possession and force up difficult shots during a 13-3 run.

Ashley keyed the Wildcats' offense early - 10 points in 10 minutes - and Hollis-Jefferson provided an energy boost after that.

The freshman hit a pull-up jumper, tracked down a rebound and throwing a ball off a New Mexico State player to keep a possession alive, then found Aaron Gordon for a reverse layup.

Hollis-Jefferson followed with one of the most spectacular dunks so far this season, throwing down a left-handed tomahawk over Renaldo Dixon that drew a huge "Ohih!" from the McKale Center crowd and earned him a three-point play.

New Mexico State tried to keep it close, but was hurt by rebounding again.

Opponents averaged 16 offensive rebounds against the Aggies the previous three games and Arizona had nine by halftime, leading to 10 points and a 32-24 lead.

The Wildcats extended the lead after halftime by dominating both ends.

McConnell hit a 3-pointer and pull-up jumper, Nick Johnson hit another jumper, then Ashley hit a 3 and found Tarczewski for a dunk that made it 46-31.

Arizona made 17 of 29 shots in the second half while holding the Aggies to 5-of-21 shooting.

Johnson punctuated the runaway with about 5 minutes left, throwing down a two-handed, 360 dunk on a breakaway to put Arizona up 67-45.

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) - Nick Johnson made six free throws over the final 25 seconds, and No. 1 Arizona held on for a 72-70 victory over Michigan on Saturday after rallying from an 11-point deficit in the second half.

The Wolverines (6-4) led by one when Johnson drew a foul on a drive with 24.6 seconds left. He made both free throws, and Michigan's Nik Stauskas missed at the other end. After a tie-up, the possession arrow gave the Wildcats (11-0) the ball with 9.5 seconds remaining.

Johnson pushed the lead to three with two more free throws, and Arizona fouled Spike Albrecht at the other end. Albrecht made only one of two free throws, and after two more free throws by Johnson made it 71-67. Albrecht made a 3-pointer with 2 seconds left. Arizona's Gabe York added a free throw to end the scoring.

Brandon Ashley scored 18 points for Arizona, which finally wore down Michigan inside in the final minutes. The Wildcats finished with 17 offensive rebounds, and although they only outscored the Wolverines 34-28 in the paint, that was enough.

Glenn Robinson III had 20 points for Michigan, but he did most of his damage in the first half. Caris LeVert contributed 15 points for the Wolverines, but this game was decided by Arizona's late free throws and the one miss by Stauskas when Michigan had a chance to go back ahead.

Michigan led 37-28 at halftime, and Mitch McGary pushed the lead to double digits with a dunk for the first points of the second half. But Arizona went on an 11-2 run to pull within two.

Michigan led 58-50, but the Wildcats again had an answer. Aaron Gordon and Ashley made consecutive baskets, and a dunk by Ashley cut the lead to two.

Johnson, Gordon and Kaleb Tarczewski had 14 points each for Arizona. Tarczewski went down with what looked like a right leg injury around the midpoint of the second half, but he was able to return.

It's been a quiet start to the season for Robinson, who showed enough potential in 2012-13 that he considered a jump to the NBA after his freshman year. Against Arizona, he showed why he's a definite candidate to play at the next level.

Robinson made all seven of his shots from the field in the first half, including a contested 3-pointer in the final seconds that gave Michigan the nine-point halftime lead.

Opponents were shooting only 27 percent from 3-point range against Arizona coming into the game, but the Wolverines were 6 of 11 in the first half. They finished 8 of 17.

The Wildcats rallied late when they finally started converting around the basket. A three-point play with 2:32 to play by Rondae Hollis-Jefferson gave Arizona its first lead of the second half at 63-62.

The lead changed hands four more times after that - for good when Johnson made it 67-66 with the first of his six late free throws.

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Aaron Gordon scored 21 points, Nick Johnson added 17 and Arizona opened its second week at No. 1 with a 69-43 rout over Southern on Thursday night.

Arizona (12-0) had no trouble with the Jaguars early on, racing out to a 15-point halftime lead while playing without injured center Kaleb Tarczewski. The second half wasn't quite as smooth and the Wildcats went 22 of 37 on free throws, but it was good enough to get them to 12-0 for the second straight season.

Brandon Ashley had 11 points and 10 rebounds for Arizona.

Southern (3-8) fought back after a miserable first half, but fell in too deep of a hole to make a game of it. Malcolm Miller and Calvin Godfrey had 11 points each for the Jaguars.

Arizona moved to the top of The Associated Press poll last week for the first time since 2003 and immediately faced two difficult tests.

The Wildcats passed both, racing past New Mexico State after stumbling early against the Aggies' quirky defenses, then rallying from an 11-point deficit to beat Michigan on the road for what may be their biggest win of an already impressive season.

Arizona's task over its next two games - the Wildcats face Northern Arizona on Monday - was to avoid complacency and looking ahead to the holiday break and the Pac-12 season.

Southern didn't figure to pose much of a threat to the long, athletic Wildcats.

The Jaguars nearly pulled off a monumental upset in the first round of last year's NCAA tournament, leading No. 1 Gonzaga late before losing to the Zags.

Southern is a much different team this year after losing four seniors and with Godfrey ailing because of an elbow injury.

It went about as expected early.

Even without Tarczewski, who sprained his ankle against Michigan on Saturday, Arizona dominated Southern from the start, building a

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Nick Johnson scored 20 points, Rondae Hollis-Jefferson added 14 and top-ranked Arizona rolled over Northern Arizona 77-44 on Monday night to complete its second straight undefeated non-conference season.

Arizona (13-0) played its second straight game without injured center Kaleb Tarczewski, but didn't really need him, grabbing control with a 27-4 first-half run.

The Wildcats dominated the small-program Lumberjacks defensively, holding them to 36 percent shooting while scoring 18 points off 23 turnovers. Arizona has won 27 straight non-conference games.

Brandon Ashley had 11 points and nine rebounds for the Wildcats, who don't play again until their Pac-12 opener against Washington State on Jan. 2.

Aaseem Dixon had nine points for Northern Arizona (3-8).

Northern Arizona is plenty familiar with trip south, playing in Tucson every season but one since 2002.

It hasn't gone too well for the Lumberjacks. Other than a five-point game in 2010, Arizona has beaten Northern Arizona in routs, including a 93-50 runaway last season.

The Lumberjacks faced an even bigger hill this time around.

Northern Arizona had a huge setback just before the season started, when sophomore guard Dwayne Russell, the team's top returning scorer, decided to transfer.

The Lumberjacks managed to play close games against Southern California and Fresno State, but those teams are nothing like what they were up against at the McKale Center.

Arizona had rolled through its non-conference schedule to this point, knocking off teams like Duke and Michigan to move atop The Associated Press poll two weeks ago. The Wildcats are long, athletic, versatile and one of the best defensive teams in the country.

Northern Arizona held its own early while Arizona struggled on offense, playing to an 11-all tie with the Wildcats in the opening 8 minutes.

Arizona turned into a rout after that, scoring 17 straight points during its big run to go up 38-15.

Johnson keyed it, hitting consecutive 3-pointers at the start and adding another to put the Wildcats up 15. The junior guard had 14 points by halftime to help Arizona to a 41-17 lead.

The Lumberjacks managed to hit a few shots early to hang with Arizona before succumbing to the Wildcats' relentless pressure.

Northern Arizona had two field goals over the final 10 minutes and shot 7 of 19 from the floor. Worse for the Lumberjacks, they had no assists in the half and 12 turnovers that led to 18 points for Arizona.

Arizona filled the second half with dunks, layups and a few more 3-pointers to keep NAU from mounting any kind of run.

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Kaleb Tarczewski scored 11 points and No. 1 Arizona opened its Pac-12 season with a 60-25 rout of Washington State on Thursday night, shattering the McKale Center record for fewest points by a team.

The 25 points were the fewest for Washington State since the Cougars had that many at Idaho on Jan. 15, 1938.

The previous McKale record for fewest points was 37 by Northern Arizona in 1989.

The Wildcats (14-0, 1-0) took a 21-2 lead and were up 28-7 at halftime.

The Cougars (7-6, 0-1) shot 9 for 45 from the field and they needed to make a series of shots late to reach that.

Washington State was without leading scorer DeVonte Lacy, who underwent an emergency appendectomy on Saturday. Junior Longrus led the Cougars with six points.

Tarczewski, back after missing two games with a sprained ankle, was the only Arizona player to score in double figures.

Washington State's nine field goals were also a McKale record, breaking the previous mark of 13, also set by Northern Arizona in that 1989 game. So was the Cougars' 20 percent shooting, breaking the mark of 20.3 percent set by NAU that night 24 years ago.

The Cougars missed their first 17 shots before Royce Woolridge made a layup with 6:42 left in the half. Arizona led 21-2 on Johnson's 3-pointer with 8:18 to go until the break.

Washington State made it 21-7 before the Wildcats scored the final seven points of the half to lead 28-7.

The Cougars were 2 of 20 from the field in the first half, breaking the McKale record of four field goals set twice, most recently by Arizona State in 1991. It was also a record for fewest points by a team in a half and fewest combined points in a half. The old record was 37 against Oregon in 1985.

The 9.5 percent shooting percentage was also an arena record for a half.

Washington State officials were unsure what the team records for fewest points or field goals in a half were but said Thursday's totals were the lowest since at least 2001. Arizona officials didn't know if the Washington State marks were an opponent low for any Wildcats' game, including those before McKale was built.

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Nick Johnson scored 24 points, Aaron Gordon had 18 points and 11 rebounds, and top-ranked Arizona pulled away late to hold off Washington 71-62 on Saturday.

Arizona (15-0, 2-0 Pac-12) had a hard time shaking the Huskies before stretching the lead behind its defense in the final three minutes. The Wildcats had 10 dunks among their 44 field goals and hit 7 of 8 free throws in the final two minutes to remain undefeated. They're off to their best start since the 1931-32 team set a school record by opening with 16 straight wins.

T.J. McConnell overcame a poor shooting game with six assists, five rebounds and four steals while teaming with Johnson to hound the Huskies at the top of Arizona's defense.

Washington (9-6, 1-1) kept up with the bigger Wildcats well into the second half behind good shooting and strong inside play.

The Huskies went cold down the stretch, though, shooting 10 of 33 in the second half while missing all seven of their 3-point attempts.

C.J. Wilcox led Washington with 20 points. Perris Blackwell had 12 points and 12 rebounds and knocked around Kaleb Tarczewski inside, helping to hold Arizona's center to seven points on 2-of-10 shooting.

Washington had a tough non-conference schedule and opened Pac-12 play with an impressive road win, racing past Arizona State early for a 76-65 victory.

The Huskies faced a much stiffer challenge against Arizona.

The Wildcats have been No. 1 for a month and have one of the nation's best defenses behind a group of versatile, athletic players.

Arizona was at its defensive best in its conference opener Thursday, setting McKale Center records by holding Washington State to 25 points, nine field goals and 20 percent shooting.

The Huskies were able to keep up with the Wildcats in the first half, scoring inside and rebounding them to lead 35-33.

Washington took a quick six-point lead in the second half, but Arizona turned up the defensive pressure, holding the Husk

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Nick Johnson scored 22 points and No. 1 Arizona withstood UCLA's late 15-1 run to beat the Bruins 79-75 Thursday night, equaling the best start in school history at 16-0.

The Wildcats (3-0 Pac-12) held on despite blowing a 13-point lead with 6:16 to play and committing a season-worst 17 turnovers.

Kaleb Tarczewski made all six of his field goal attempts and scored 16 points for the Wildcats, who snapped a three-game skid against the Bruins in the lone regular-season meeting between the longtime conference powers.

The 1931-32 Wildcats also began the season 16-0.

Freshman Zach LaVine hit a 3-pointer that got UCLA to 77-75 with 15 seconds left, but he missed another one with 2 seconds to go that would have left the Bruins down one.

Kyle Anderson had 16 points and 11 rebounds, and Jordan Adams added 12 points and 11 rebounds for the Bruins (12-3, 1-1). They haven't beaten a top-ranked team since March 13, 2003, when they took down Arizona in overtime in the Pac-12 tournament.

Buoyed by loud chants of "U of A" in Pauley Pavilion, the Wildcats pulled away to a 12-point lead midway through the second half after UCLA kept it close in the first 20 minutes. Arizona starters Aaron Gordon, Brandon Ashley and T.J. McConnell all played with four fouls in the second half.

Johnson's dunk gave Arizona its largest lead of the game, 68-55.

That's when the Bruins reeled off a 15-1 run, including 13 consecutive points, to take their last lead at 70-69.

Adams hit a 3-pointer for a 68-all tie. He, Anderson and Bryce Alford combined to outscore the Wildcats, who made just one free throw during that stretch. Alford finished with 12 points.

The Wildcats were limited to one field goal over the final 1:27, when they went 8 of 10 from the free throw line to hang on.

The Bruins' 79 points were the most scored by an Arizona opponent this season. They missed five straight free throws before their big run.

Arizona controlled the boards, 37-36, as it has done in all 16 games so far.

Arizona tied 42-38 at the break, hitting three 3-pointers over the final 2:56, when UCLA twice led the game.

Retired Lakers coach Phil Jackson and Clippers coach Doc Rivers attended the game, along with former Bruins Baron Davis, Jordan Farmer and Ryan Hollins. Injured Lakers guard Steve Nash, actor John Lithgow, who sat with Jackson, and Red Hot Chili Peppers bassist Flea were there, too.

LOS ANGELES (AP) - For all of Arizona's decorated basketball history, the 2013-14 Wildcats have done something none of their predecessors accomplished.

Brandon Ashley and T.J. McConnell each scored a season-high 19 points and No. 1 Arizona beat Southern California 73-53 Sunday night to improve to 17-0 but the best start in school history.

"We're really excited about it, we really are," Arizona coach Sean Miller said. "We talked about it and it's something I think all of us will really cherish. Any school record you break at Arizona in the basketball program is a real record because of the great tradition that we have."

The 1931-32 Wildcats held the previous record for best start at 16-0.

"It feels great to know we got the record," said McConnell, who also had six assists. "But we have to move on because we have another game on Thursday."

Arizona didn't pull away and secure the record until the final minutes. The Wildcats led just 34-31 at halftime and 48-43 with nine minutes to play, but then they reeled off an 18-6 run - highlighted by eight points from McConnell - to finally put USC (9-7, 0-3 Pac-12) away.

All in all, Arizona outscored the Trojans 25-10 over the final 8:33 to turn the close game into a rout and improve to 4-0 in the conference.

"We were just trying to stay poised the last few minutes of the game and really just had a defensive mindset to really lock down," guard Nick Johnson said. "They're a good team and we knew that coming in. They gave us their best shot and they had us for a little bit, but we rallied back and stayed with it."

Johnson chipped in 15 points and Aaron Gordon had 12 for the Wildcats, the second straight game they've had four players reach double figures in scoring.

Arizona didn't rebound its opponent for the first time this season, with each team getting 30 boards apiece. But the Wildcats shot 46.6 percent (27 of 58) from the field, including 50 percent in the second half, to pick up the victory.

Ashley shot 7 of 10 from the field and McConnell was 7 of 12, including 5 of 7 from 3-point range, to pace the Wildcats.

"Usually I try to set up the offense and get other people the ball, but tonight they were playing off me and I just hit shots," said McConnell, a junior point guard. "If they don't think I can shoot I'm going to try and prove them wrong, and if they close out I'll go around them and get other people the ball."

Byron Wesley scored 18 points and reserve Strahinja Gavrilovic added a career-high 10 points to lead the Trojans, who have lost three straight and four of their last six.

The Trojans were held to a season-low 53 points by Arizona, which entered the game allowing the fifth-fewest points per game in the country. USC also took a season-low eight free throw attempts and turned the ball over 18 times.

"We definitely turned the ball over too many times and had too many possessions where we didn't score," Trojans coach Andy Enfield said. "Against a good team like Arizona, you have to convert ... They wore us down a bit. When we cut it to five midway in the second half we had a chance to stay in the game, but we didn't do that."

Arizona completed its first road sweep of the conference's Los Angeles schools since 2004-05, having beaten UCLA 79-75 Thursday night.

The Wildcats entered the game fourth nationally in scoring at 56 points per game, seventh in field goal percentage at 37 percent and 13th in 3-point shooting at 28 percent.

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Nick Johnson scored 18 points, Brandon Ashley added 15 and top-ranked Arizona remained unbeaten with a 69-57 win over Colorado on Thursday night.

Arizona (19-0, 6-0 Pac-12) had a week off after blowing out rival Arizona State and raced out to an early 14-point lead.

Aaron Gordon added 12 points for Arizona, which overcame a 3-for-15 night from 3-point range and some missed free throws down the stretch to extend the best start in school history.

A year after nearly pulling off an upset in the desert, Colorado (15-5, 4-3) had no chance for late-game heroics in its third game without leading scorer Spencer Dinwiddie.

The Buffaloes struggled to slow Arizona's bevy of scorers and couldn't overcome the big early hole, falling to 0-16 all-time against No. 1 teams.

Xavier Johnson led Colorado with 21 points and Josh Scott added 15.

The Buffaloes split their first two games without Dinwiddie, losing to UCLA and beating Southern California after the junior sustained a season-ending left knee injury against Washington on Jan. 12.

Arizona was a much stiffer challenge without Dinwiddie, Colorado's scoring and assists leader.

The nation's top-ranked team for seven straight weeks, Arizona entered the game fifth in scoring defense (56.7 points) and shooting percentage against (37 percent) and was 22nd at defending 3-pointers (29 percent).

Colorado needed someone to step up and no one was able to do it early against Arizona's relentless pressure.

Barely able to get passes off much less good shots, the Buffaloes missed their first five shots and had four turnovers in the opening six minutes.

Arizona also missed its first five shots, but started dropping them in from all over, building a quick 18-4 lead.

The Buffaloes settled down for a little bit, cutting the lead to six with a 10-2 run.

All that seemed to do was make the Wildcats play harder.

Ratcheting the defensive pressure back up, Arizona hounded the Buffaloes into more missed shots and turnovers, leading to breakdowns and 3-pointers at the other end.

Starting with a 12-2 run, the Wildcats built the halftime lead to 39-24, holding Colorado to 8-of-27 shooting while forcing nine turnovers. Johnson had 12 at the half and Ashley nine.

Colorado had a little more success shooting to start the second half, hitting three of its first four shots.

Problem was, the Buffaloes couldn't stop the Wildcats.

Arizona hit its first six shots, including one by Ashley that bounced off Scott and into the basket and a reverse dunk off a spin move by Gordon that put the Wildcats up 51-31.

The Wildcats made 12 of 22 shots in the second half to prevent Colorado from cutting the lead under double digits.

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Nick Johnson scored 22 points and Aaron Gordon provided a huge boost despite a rough shooting night, helping top-ranked Arizona pull away from Utah 65-56 Sunday night for its school-record 20th straight win.

Arizona (20-0, 7-0 Pac-12) struggled early in both halves before Gordon made key plays with his hustle during a deciding second-half run. He finished with 10 points on 3-of-13 shooting and grabbed 12 rebounds.

The Wildcats offset a 3-for-14 night from 3-point range with 20 offensive rebounds that led to 19 second-chance points.

Utah (14-6, 3-5) kept it close before wearing down in the closing minutes, unable to keep the athletic Wildcats off the glass or from scoring inside to remain winless on the road.

Delon Wright had 19 points and Jordan Loveridge added 13 for the Utes, who were outrebounded 40-29 and outscored 38-24 in the paint.

Utah has been good at home, earning all 14 of its wins in Salt Lake City, including a 74-69 victory over then-No. 25 UCLA on Jan. 18.

The road has been a different story for the Utes. They've yet to win away from the Huntsman Center, the previous loss 79-75 to Arizona State on Thursday after Utah allowed the Sun Devils to shoot 59 percent in the second half.

Utah clearly wasn't intimidated by Arizona or the atmosphere of playing the nation's top-ranked team in one of college basketball's most difficult road arenas.

The Utes opened with a 12-2 run, punctuated by Wright's steal and fast-break layup, and the Wildcats couldn't get anything to go in, missing shots at the rim and perimeter while starting 1-for-12. Gordon also left a free throw about a foot short.

A hustle play by Rondae Hollis-Jefferson got Arizona rolling.

Scrambling after his own missed free throw, the freshman dived on the floor and hit the ball off Wright before falling out of bounds.

With the crowd cheering instead of groaning with every possession, the Wildcats found their rhythm, using a 12-0 run to take the lead.

Both teams settled down after that and traded baskets and physical play the rest of the half. Arizona went up 33-26 at halftime after Kaleb Tarczewski threw down a two-handed rebound slam at the buzzer.

The Utes didn't back down, scoring the first six points of the second half and hitting seven of their first 11 shots while the Wildcats managed to tie despite continuing to struggle on offense.

Gordon helped turn the tide for the Wildcats.

The freshman missed 10 of his first 12 shots, many of them on wild drives to the basket, but kept playing hard.

Gordon broke Arizona out of its funk with a two-handed dunk over Dallin Bachynski, followed with a blocked shot on a jumper by Loveridge, and then grabbed an offensive rebound to keep possession alive, leading to a runner by Johnson.

Johnson added two more baskets, one a dunk on a baseline drive, to cap a 12-2 run that put Arizona up 59-49.

PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP) - Nick Johnson kept Arizona's perfect season going for another game, hitting a go-ahead 3-pointer with 51 seconds left and a pair of free throws with 5.8 seconds to go as the top-ranked Wildcats survived for a 60-57 victory over Stanford on Wednesday night for their school-record 21st straight win.

After Johnson hit a jumper in the middle of the key with 2:36 remaining to make it 55-53, Dwight Powell answered on a baseline drive with 1:21 to go before Johnson delivered once more.

Johnson finished with 16 points, five rebounds and four assists and T.J. McConnell added 11 points, eight rebounds and four assists for Arizona (21-0, 8-0 Pac-12), off to the program's best start in conference play in more than a decade.

Arizona is one of three unbeaten teams left in Division I basketball, joining No. 2 Syracuse, which also won Wednesday night. Fourth-ranked Wichita State hasn't lost either.

Powell and Josh Huestis each scored 13 points for Stanford (13-7, 4-4), which outshot Arizona 38 percent to 36 percent.

Johnson missed a free throw with 28 seconds left and Stanford called timeout. Huestis missed a 3 from the left wing and Aaron Gordon secured the rebound, but he also missed a free throw giving the Cardinal one final shot.

Chasson Randle missed a long 3 just before the final buzzer for Stanford, which went cold down the stretch and were held scoreless for nearly nine minutes.

After a 3-pointer by Huestis with 10:03 remaining, Stanford didn't score again until Powell's layin at 1:21 - and Powell missed a pair of free throws at 4:36 that would have put his team ahead.

Arizona, ranked No. 1 for a school-record eighth consecutive week, overcame a slow start on the way to an eighth straight win against Stanford.

The Cardinal beat two top-25 teams already with victories at then-No. 10 Connecticut and at then-No. 17 Oregon earlier this month.

But not this time given their struggles in the waning moments at Maples Pavilion, which hosted a No. 1 men's team for the first time since losing 72-69 to Arizona on March 1, 2003.

Arizona missed two shots - both by Johnson - from close range in the opening minute and began the game 1 for 9 against a smothering Stanford man-to-man defense that made it tough for the Wildcats to get good looks. Stanford also took a quick 7-3 rebounding advantage.

In a sloppy start, Arizona was whistled for a pair of offensive fouls, Aaron Gordon air-balled a 3-point try, while Rondae Hollis-Jefferson missed a pair of free throws at the 14:11 mark.

The Wildcats had a large contingent of fans in the crowd cheering "U of A! U of A!"

McConnell's jumper at 10:58 gave Arizona its first lead of the opening half. Gordon, from nearby San Jose, scored his first points midway through the half and Arizona missed four of its initial five 3-point attempts.

Brown beat the halftime buzzer with a basket to put Stanford ahead 31-30 at the break. Arizona had trailed at halftime several times already this season only to produce a big second half.

The Wildcats shot 8 for 22 and made only 12 of 21 free throws in a first half featuring eight lead changes.

Stanford's last home win against a No. 1 team came against Arizona, 82-74, on Feb. 4, 1988.

RECAP BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) - Justin Cobbs hit a step-back jumper with 0.9 seconds left, and California stunned No. 1 Arizona 60-58 on Saturday night to hand the Wildcats their first loss of the season.

Cobbs dribbled to his left and beat Nick Johnson, then pulled up in front of a defender to sink the winning shot that sent a raucous, gold-shirt wearing crowd at Haas Pavilion spilling onto the court. Cal coach Mike Montgomery and security had to usher fans away before the final play.

Gabe York's full-court pass was knocked down after the timeout to give the Golden Bears (15-7, 6-3 Pac-12) their first victory over a top-ranked opponent since Jan. 30, 1994, when they beat UCLA 85-70 at the Oakland Coliseum.

Arizona (21-1, 8-1), which had won a school-record 21 straight games, was one of just three unbeaten teams left in Division I. Now only second-ranked Syracuse (21-0), which outlasted No. 17 Duke 91-89 in overtime Saturday, and No. 4 Wichita State (23-0) remain.

Cobbs finished with 19 points and seven assists, David Kravish had 14 points and 11 rebounds and Richard Solomon scored 12 points to propel Cal to one of the biggest wins in school history. The Bears improved to 2-24 against teams ranked No. 1 in The Associated Press poll, and they had never beaten a top-ranked team in Berkeley.

Kaleb Tarczewski scored a career-high 18 points and grabbed six rebounds, and T.J. McConnell scored 13 points for the Wildcats, who shot just 32.3 percent from the floor. Cal shot 44.6 percent.

The game attracted quite an audience, too.

There were 21 scouts from 14 different NBA teams in attendance. Former Wildcats coach Lute Olson sat in the stands behind Arizona's bench, and Oakland Athletics manager Bob Melvin - a Cal alum - also supported his Bears.

The Wildcats rallied from nine points down in the first half and eight in the second to set up a furious finish.

Arizona took the lead twice in the final minutes, and twice Cobbs came back with a tying score - first on a runner in the lane and then on a pair of free throws.

On the final sequence, Johnson missed a short jumper in the lane and Cal corralled the rebound. Cobbs let the clock tick down, then beat Johnson for a shot that will long be remembered in Berkeley.

Fans had to be pushed back off the court in a weird and wild scene, with the public address announcer screaming for them to get back. The Bears soon gave them reason to celebrate, keeping Arizona's big front line at bay - just at it had from the start.

Kravish found Solomon for an alley-ooop on Cal's first possession. The pair took advantage even more on the inside after Arizona forward Brandon Ashley turned his right ankle going for a rebound and sat out on the bench the remainder of the game with a walking boot on his foot.

Solomon made his first six shots, including a short jumper that put the Bears ahead 28-19 late with 5:18 remaining in the first half. Arizona answered back by converting steals into easy baskets, closing the half on a 10-2 run to cut Cal's lead to 30-29.

It was the seventh time Arizona has trailed at the half this season.

Both teams had to overcome adversity after the break. Johnson seemed to be bothered by an injury to his left hand - repeatedly shaking his wrist after shots and grimacing - and Solomon was stuck in foul trouble.

The Bears began to pull away, taking a 50-42 lead on a pair of free throws by Cobbs with 11 minutes to play. But Arizona, just like it did all game, came back and tied the game at 54 with 6 minutes left to set up a wild sequence down the stretch.

RECAP TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Nick Johnson scored 18 points, Rondae Hollis-Jefferson had 14 points and 10 rebounds in place of injured starter Brandon Ashley and No. 2 Arizona grinded out a 67-65 victory over Oregon on Thursday night.

Coming off its first loss of the season, Arizona (22-1, 9-1 Pac-12) labored offensively in its first game without Ashley, who is out for the season with a foot injury.

As they have so many times this season, the Wildcats pulled out a victory by turning up the defensive pressure late to overcome a 4-for-16 effort from 3-point range and 16 missed free throws.

T.J. McConnell hit a 3-pointer with 90 seconds left and Johnson went 5 of 6 from the free throw line in the final minute to prevent the Wildcats' first losing streak of the season.

Oregon (15-7, 3-7) kept up with Arizona and led late in the second half, but stumbled down the stretch.

Joseph Young and Jason Calliste had 14 points each and Darnay Dotson added 12 for the Ducks, who missed key free throws in the closing seconds and a desperation 3-point attempt at the buzzer.

Forced to shuffle his lineup with Ashley out, Arizona coach Sean Miller moved Hollis-Jefferson from his sixth-man spot into the starting lineup and long-range shooter Gabe York slid into his first-off-the-bench role.

The new-look rotation was solid early, dropping in 3-pointers and flying in for dunks while Kaleb Tarczewski had his way inside.

The Ducks started double-teaming Tarczewski later in the half and McConnell picked up his third foul late, upsetting the Wildcats' offensive rhythm. It didn't help that Arizona struggled - again - from the free throw line, making 11 of 19 in the first half.

Arizona continued to labor offensively to open the second half, missing seven of its first eight shots as Oregon pushed the lead to 46-40.

The Wildcats pulled within 60-59 on a putback by Tarczewski. McConnell, who missed seven of his first eight shots, put Arizona ahead on 3-pointer with 1:30 left and Johnson made it 64-60 with two free throws.

Oregon, the defending Pac-12 tournament champion, has been in a downward spiral since conference play started.

Ranked as high as 10th, the Ducks will likely need to start stringing together wins to get back to the NCAA tournament.

Oregon opened the Pac-12 with an overtime win over Utah, but followed with five straight losses before winning two of its past three, the latest a 78-66 win over USC behind a Matthew Knight Arena-record 16 steals.

The nation's fourth-best scoring team, the Ducks had a hard time getting good looks against the long, athletic Wildcats, missing 11 of their first 15 shots.

Oregon started to find the range late in the first half behind Calliste (11 points) and Dotson (10), taking a 38-37 lead.

After some early struggles, the Ducks started dropping in shots midway through the second half, building a 50-43 lead.

Even when Arizona rallied by turning up the defensive pressure, Oregon had an answer, keeping just ahead of the Wildcats until the closing minutes.

But the Ducks couldn't hold the lead, falling behind by four after a shot-clock violation and a wild 3-point attempt by Young.

Oregon pulled within 64-62 on Dominic Artis' shot in the lane, but had a string of missed free throws and turnovers before missing on a final 3-point attempt.

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) - Jermaine Marshall scored eight of his 29 points in the second overtime and Jordan Bachynski blocked T.J. McConnell's layup attempt with 6 seconds left, sending Arizona State to a 69-66 victory over No. 2 Arizona on Friday night.

With both teams struggling offensively most of the night, Arizona State (19-6, 8-4 Pac-12) turned to Marshall when it counted. He went over 20 minutes without a field goal, but hit consecutive 3-pointers and scored on a drive with 14 seconds left to put the Sun Devils up 67-66.

McConnell then tried to drive the lane, but Bachynski swatted his shot away, leading to Jahni Carson's breakout dunk.

Arizona State's fans rushed the court, had to be cleared because there was 0.8 seconds left, then poured out of the stands again after Nick Johnson missed a 3-pointer at the buzzer.

McConnell led Arizona (23-2, 10-2) with 17 points and five rebounds. Kaleb Tarczewski had 13 points and 13 rebounds, and Aaron Gordon had 13 points and 10 rebounds for the Wildcats, who shot 35 percent and went 4 of 14 from 3-point range.

Carson finished with 17 points and six assists. Bachynski had 13 points, seven rebounds and blocked eight shots.

Arizona turned the first desert rivalry game into a rout, racing away from the Sun Devils for a 91-68 win in Tucson on Jan. 16.

A lot has changed in a month.

Arizona lost one of its best players in its only loss of the season when forward Brandon Ashley injured his right foot against California two weeks ago.

The Wildcats managed to win their first two games without the versatile sophomore, against the two Oregon schools last week, but had to rejigger their lineup to compensate for his absence.

Arizona State has been on a roll since that loss, winning five of its past six games to get back into the NCAA tournament picture.

The Sun Devils also had Marshall, their second-leading scorer, back in the lineup after he missed the first game with a groin injury and Bachynski has been playing better after missing all three of his shots in Tucson.

Marshall made a huge difference in the rematch after an ugly start that featured more combined fouls (11) than points (nine) the opening eight minutes.

Marshall scored 12 of the Sun Devils' 19 points in the first half, hitting 5 of 10 shots while the rest of the team 3 for 17.

Arizona led 26-21 at halftime after dominating the glass, outrebounding Arizona State 26-15, including 9-3 on the offensive end.

Marshall continued to carry the Sun Devils early in the second half, scoring on a three-point play on a turnaround shot in the lane and earning a chance at another on a hard drive before missing the free throw.

Then it was Carson's turn.

He had two points on 1-of-5 shooting in the first half, but started to assert himself more midway through the second half, scoring six straight points to put Arizona State up 47-41.

Arizona managed to keep the Sun Devils close despite struggling at the free-throw line, but Carson added a step-back jumper and Bachynski hit a free throw to make it 51-46.

The Wildcats fought back, though, with Aaron Gordon scoring on a three-point play and McConnell on a breakout lead layup to tie it at 51-all with 49 seconds left.

Both teams had a chance to take the lead at the end of regulation, but got off poor shots to send the game to overtime.

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) - Gabe York and Nick Johnson each scored 15 points, Rondae Hollis-Jefferson added 13 and No. 4 Arizona escaped with a 67-63 overtime victory against Utah on Wednesday night.

The Wildcats (24-2, 11-2 Pac-12) beat Utah for the ninth straight time since a loss in the 1998 NCAA tournament. Arizona also held onto sole possession of first place in the Pac-12, one game ahead of UCLA.

Brandon Taylor had 13 points and Dallon Bachynski and Delon Wright each scored 12 for the Utes (17-9, 6-8), who lost at home for the second time this season.

The score was tied at 58 before Hollis-Jefferson made two baskets to give the Wildcats a four-point lead with 1:52 left in overtime. His second bucket came after Taylor, an 86 percent free throw shooter, missed three straight from the line to prevent Utah from taking the lead.

Wright made a pair of free throws to cut it to 62-60, but threw the ball away with 33.9 seconds left. Johnson and T.J. McConnell each made free throws to help secure the victory in the final seconds.

Utah lost despite outrebounding Arizona 37-31 and finishing with a 34-23 edge in points in the paint.

Arizona started strong, making its first four field goal attempts and taking a 9-8 lead.

Utah kept pace by hitting seven of its first 10 shots from the field. Princeton Onwas stole the ball from Hollis-Jefferson and dunked it on the other end to cap a 6-0 spurt.

Arizona went on a 14-0 run later in the half. York capped the surge by hitting a 3-pointer and then taking his own steal from Taylor in for a layup, giving the Wildcats a 25-16 lead.

Utah briefly trimmed the deficit to five after baskets from Taylor and Bachynski. Arizona quickly answered, pushing the lead to double digits with 3s from York and Hollis-Jefferson that made it 35-24.

The Utes cut it to single digits again when Onwas took another steal in for a dunk to make it 35-26. Arizona had a chance to take a 12-point lead into the locker room when Jordan Mayes nailed a 3-pointer at the buzzer, but the officials waved it off during halftime.

Utah cut the lead to 40-33 when Taylor stole the ball from Johnson and took it in for a layup. The Wildcats thwarted the rally for a time, going back up by 12 on McConnell's jumper.

But the Utes ripped off a 10-2 run to get back into the game. A pair of big baskets from freshman Ahmad Fields cut the deficit to 48-44. Arizona endured a short cold spell after a layup from McConnell made it 52-44 with 6:41 left, going 3-13 without a field goal.

Utah took advantage with an 11-2 run and went ahead 55-54 on a runner from Jordan Lovridge with 3:09 remaining.

Arizona regained a one-point lead on Johnson's jumper with 2:21 left. Utah tied it when Lovridge made one of two free throws with 28 seconds to go. McConnell had a chance to win it for the Wildcats in regulation, but missed a runner in the lane as time expired.

BOULDER, Colo. (AP) - Freshman Aaron Gordon scored 21 of his season-best 23 points in the second half and Nick Johnson added 20 points as fourth-ranked Arizona won at Colorado for the first time since 1973, routing the Buffaloes 88-61 Saturday night.

It was a rare breather for the Wildcats (25-2, 12-2 Pac-12), who scrapped their way through a series of close games since beating Colorado by 12 in Tempe, Ariz., on Jan. 23. They since had a two-point loss at Cal and a three-point loss in double-overtime at archrival Arizona State.

The Wildcats needed overtime to win at Utah in their previous game and they led this one by just four points early in the second half before running away with it.

Coming off an emotionally draining win over the Sun Devils on Wednesday night that tarnished their NCAA tournament credentials, the Buffaloes (20-8, 9-6) came out ice cold, missing their first 10 shots.

After a horrendous start, the Buffaloes were in this one before Gordon sank three straight layups and Johnson's jumpers helped the Wildcats pull away. Kaleb Tarczewski added 13 points for Arizona.

The only field goal by a Buffaloes starter before halftime came on Askia Booker's jumper with 2 seconds left in the first half.

The Buffaloes didn't score a bucket for the first 10 minutes, 10 seconds. Colorado fell behind 22-5 before Jaron Hopkins sank a 3-pointer from the left side.

That sparked a 16-4 run by Colorado - with seven points coming from the free throw line - to make it 26-21 and force an Arizona timeout. The Wildcats settled down thanks to a baseline drive by Rondae Hollis-Jefferson and a pull-up jumper by T.J. McConnell.

In celebration of senior night, Colorado coach Tad Boyle gave 7-foot center Ben Mills his first start of his career. He took the place of Josh Scott, who had started every game since Feb. 27, 2013, when he was dealing with a concussion.

Scott's absence was quickly felt as Colorado was outrebounded 6-1 and fell behind 8-1 before Scott replaced Mills 2:49 into the game. But the Buffaloes didn't turn things around right away, as the Wildcats built those advantages to 10-3 on the boards and 14-3 on the scoreboard by the 14:39 timeout.

Thanks to a 12-3 advantage at the stripe, however, the Buffs trailed just 31-25 at the half after shooting 6-for-27 from the floor (22 percent) compared to Arizona's 41 percent clip.

Scott led the Buffs with 18 points. His jumper to open the second half made it a four-point game, but the Buffs couldn't get any closer and the Wildcats began to pull away when Tarczewski's 3-pointer made it 40-33.

Tarczewski's bucket capped a 13-2 run that made it 64-43 and turned this one into a laugh.

RECAP TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Nick Johnson scored 22 points, Kaleb Tarczewski added 16 and No. 3 Arizona quickly turned its rematch with California into an 87-59 rout Wednesday night.

Cal won the first meeting 60-58 on a last-second jumper by Justin Cobbs that sent the students pouring onto the court.

Arizona (26-2, 13-2 Pac-12) ran away from the Bears early in the rematch, using a big first-half run and good shooting (50 percent) all game to prevent the season sweep.

T.J. McConnell had 13 points and six assists, and Rondae Hollis-Jefferson provided a lift off the bench with 12 points and 10 rebounds. Johnson also had seven rebounds and five assists after struggling the first game against the Bears.

Cal (18-10, 9-6), struggled at times against Arizona's defensive pressure and had little chance of stopping the Wildcats at the other end to lose for the 17th time in 19 games at McKale Center.

Cobbs led the Bears with 12 points.

Arizona wanted a little revenge after what happened in the first meeting against Cal.

The Wildcats entered the Feb. 1 game with the No. 1 ranking and a school-record 21-game winning streak. They left Berkeley with their first loss of the season - thanks to Cobbs' stepback jumper with 0.9 seconds left - and with forward Brandon Ashley in a walking boot after he injured his right foot going up for a rebound in the first half.

Ashley is done for the season, but Arizona has found ways to win without him, picking up three victories in four games, including Sunday's 88-61 blowout at Colorado.

The Wildcats started slowly in the rematch against Cal, opening 1 for 6 to miss more shots in the first 3 1-2 minutes than they did the entire half against Colorado (22 for 36).

Once they got rolling, the Bears couldn't keep up.

Triggered by its defense, Arizona went on a 12-2 run, building its lead to 39-23 on a series of steals and dunks.

Johnson had one dunk in transition after a steal and Aaron Gordon had another, racing off for a head-above-the-rim reverse dunk that triggered a roar inside McKale Center.

Hollis-Jefferson had a high-flying dunk on an alley-oop pass on an inbound play, then threw down a tomahawk in transition after Johnson tracked down Cobbs to block his layup from behind at the other end.

Arizona made 18 of 36 shots to lead 44-29 at halftime. Johnson had 12 points on 5-of-8 shooting, four rebounds and three assists after scoring four points on 1-of-14 shooting the first game against Cal.

The Wildcats quickly built the lead to 20 points in the second half, but Cal showed a little resiliency, going on an 11-0 run that cut Arizona's lead to 53-44.

That was as close as the Bears would get.

Arizona turned up the pressure again, McConnell hit a 3-pointer in transition and Gordon soared in for another dunk, putting the Wildcats back comfortably ahead, 70-52.

RECAP TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Aaron Gordon scored 19 points and grabbed a career-high 15 rebounds to help No. 3 Arizona clinch the Pac-12 regular-season title with a 79-66 victory over Stanford on Sunday night.

The Wildcats (27-2, 14-2), who won by just three at Stanford a month ago, completed an unbeaten home season in what also could have been the final McKale Center game for two other players: junior Nick Johnson and freshman Rondae Hollis-Jefferson.

T.J. McConnell scored 14 points, Gabe York 12, Johnson 11 and Kaleb Tarczewski 10 for Arizona.

Josh Huestis matched his career high with 22 points and grabbed 12 rebounds for Stanford (18-10, 9-7).

Anthony Brown added 14 points and Chasson Randle and Dwight Powell had 12 apiece for the Cardinal, who trailed by as many as 18 points in the first half and 25 in the second.

The Wildcats scored the first four points of the game and never trailed.

After consecutive dunks by Gordon, Hollis-Jefferson made one of two free throws to make it 13-4. Powell's inside basket sliced the lead to 14-11, but Stanford never got that close again.

Elliott Pitts' 3-pointer started a 9-2 spurt that put Arizona ahead 23-13 when Johnson scored on a drive. Randle scored on a runner to cut it to 23-17, but Johnson sank a 3-pointer, then blocked Randle's shot at the other end. That led to Gordon's fast-break basket on a pass from Hollis-Jefferson, and it was 28-17.

McConnell's 14-footer in the lane followed by a pair of free throws from Matt Korcheck gave Arizona its biggest lead of the half, 41-23, with 1:27 to go.

Randle scored the final five points of the half on a 16-footer and a 3-pointer from the corner, cutting it to 41-28 at the break.

Brown's basket reduced the margin to 43-32 with 18:06 left but he missed the free throw for what would have been a three-point play.

Tarczewski's three-point play, on Stefan Nastic's fourth foul, put Arizona up 48-32 with 17:14 left. Nastic fouled out with 8:47 to go.

York's three 3s in a 2-minute span helped Arizona take its biggest lead, 68-43, on Hollis-Jefferson's basket 10:08 from the finish.

The Cardinal made it respectable with a 19-5 run that cut it to 73-62 on Huestis' stuff with 2:45 left.

Depth-shy Stanford sent Nastic to the bench with three fouls with 5:54 left in the half.

Randle, Stanford's leading scorer, got his fourth foul with 13:29 left.

Gordon and Johnson got a standing ovation from the packed house when they were removed from the game with 1:02 left.

Jordin Mayes, Arizona's only senior, started in what was his 127th game with the Wildcats.

RECAP LAS VEGAS (AP) - Nick Johnson scored 14 points, T.J. McConnell added 13 and No. 4 Arizona overwhelmed Utah defensively in a 71-39 rout on Thursday to match the most lopsided game in Pac-12 tournament history.

After playing two close games against Utah during the regular season, top-seeded Arizona (29-3) opened the tournament with a spirit-crushing defensive performance.

Enraged by a raucous crowd that made it feel like the McKale Center, the Wildcats provided a glimpse of what can happen when one of the nation's best defenses gets rolling.

Arizona ran through the record book against Utah (21-11), setting marks for fewest points allowed, fewest field goals (12) and lowest shooting percentage (25).

The Wildcats held the Utes to 13 points in the first half, another record, and matched UCLA's 32-point win over Oregon State in 2006 to move into Friday's semifinals against Colorado or California.

Jordan Loveridge and Delon Wright, Utah's leading scorers, combined for seven points on 1-of-4 shooting.

Arizona had hoped to make a statement in the Pac-12 tournament to earn a No. 1 seed in the NCAA tournament.

The Pac-12's regular-season champion Wildcats certainly did in their tournament opener, playing with an intensity Utah had no chance of matching after playing a close game against Washington the night before.

The crowd at MGM Grand Garden Arena started chants of "U of A! U of A!" long before the opening tip and the Wildcats turned the game into a rout not long after the ball went up.

Racing out for dunks and 3-pointers in transition set up by their climb-in-your-jersey defense, the Wildcats stormed past the Utes with an 18-2 run that put them up 22-6.

Arizona kept its foot on the Utes behind its defense, contesting every shot, pass and dribble.

The Wildcats held Utah to 5-of-19 shooting while forcing eight turnovers in the first half. Loveridge and Wright, who combine for over 31 points per game, took four shots and had no points between them.

McConnell typified Arizona's effort late in the half, diving for a steal, getting back after he missed it and racing off for a layup after Aaron Gordon picked the ball off.

Second half, more of the same.

Utah missed its first 11 shots - its first field goal came 9:15 in - and at one point had five players on the court who had yet to score in the game.

RECAP LAS VEGAS (AP) - Nick Johnson scored 16 points, Rondae Hollis-Jefferson added 12 and Arizona ran away from tired Colorado in a dominating second half to rout the Buffaloes 63-43 in the Pac-12 tournament semifinals Friday night.

Unlike its last win over Colorado, Arizona (30-3) started slow, allowing the Buffaloes to keep it close at halftime.

Playing its third game in as many days, Colorado had no chance at stopping the Wildcats once they got rolling, succumbing to Arizona's defensive pressure and string of highlight-reel plays.

Arizona shot 60 percent in the second half and held Colorado (23-11) to 5-of-22 shooting in the final 20 minutes to earn a spot Saturday's championship game against UCLA or Stanford.

T.J. McConnell added 12 points, five assists and four rebounds for the Wildcats in front of a pro-Arizona crowd at MGM Grand Garden Arena that made it feel like McKale Center West.

Askia Booker had 20 points to lead Colorado, which has a two-day wait to see if the NCAA tournament selection committee deems them worthy of the bracket.

Arizona put on a show in its tournament opener, flexing its defensive muscles for everyone to see with an overwhelming quarterfinal victory over Utah.

The Wildcats held the Utes to 13 first-half points, 39 overall, 12 field goals and 25 percent shooting - all tournament records. The 32-point margin also matched the largest in tournament history.

Arizona pulled a similar smothering act on Colorado in the team's last meeting.

After a 12-point loss in Tucson, Colorado's Xavier Johnson proclaimed Arizona wasn't that good and that the Buffaloes would beat the Wildcats by 20, even with leading scorer Spencer Dinwiddie out for the season.

The Wildcats turned the slight into a fury, holding Colorado without a field goal for the opening 10 minutes and shooting 84 percent in the second half an 88-61 win - their first in Boulder since 1973.

The Buffaloes got off to a better start this time, scoring 8 1/2 minutes sooner.

Colorado still had trouble with Arizona's amoebic defense, though, going 10 of 29 from the floor in the first half.

But the Buffaloes had something up their sleeve: A little defense of their own.

Contesting shots and digging down on the post for steals, Colorado made life much more difficult than it had back in Boulder, allowing them to stay in the game. The Buffaloes held Arizona to 11-of-29 shooting and forced eight turnovers - five by center Caleb Tarczewski - that led to 11 points.

Colorado held Arizona scoreless for over 4 minutes during a 10-2 run that helped the Buffaloes trim Arizona's nine-point lead to 27-24 at halftime.

The second half looked more like the game in Boulder.

Arizona picked up the defensive intensity even more and started pouring out the highlights to extend the lead.

Johnson had one, flying in for a reverse alley-oop dunk and Hollis-Jefferson matched him with a tomahawk dunk over Josh Scott. Gordon provided one on the defensive end not long after that, soaring up for a clean swat on Johnson's one-handed dunk attempt that sent Arizona's fans bursting out of their seats.

In just a couple of minutes, the Wildcats were up 51-32 thanks to a 13-0 run, well on their way to the Pac-12 title game.

LAS VEGAS (AP) - Kyle Anderson had 21 points and 15 points, Jordan Adams hit a huge 3-pointer in the final minute, and UCLA outlasted No. 4 Arizona 75-71 in a spirited Pac-12 championship game on Saturday.

The Pac-12's two best teams during the regular season, UCLA (26-8) and Arizona (30-4) put on a show in the tournament final, trading big plays and floor burns.

Offense ruled the first half and defense the second until Adams dropped in his contested 3-pointer to put the Bruins up 71-68 with 45 seconds left.

David Wear and Norman Powell combined to hit four free throws down the stretch, giving UCLA the Pac-12 title in its first year under coach Steve Alford.

Adams finished with 19 points and Powell had 15 for the surging Bruins.

Nick Johnson had 22 points and Kaleb Tarczewski added 12 for Arizona, which may have lost out on a No. 1 seed in the NCAA tournament with the loss.

After 10 games in three days, the Pac-12 tournament came down to UCLA and Arizona, the top two seeds, on a big roll since arriving in Sin City.

Arizona, the conference's regular-season champion, overwhelmed its first two opponents with its don't-let-them-breathe defense. The Wildcats raced into the tournament record books with their 32-point win over Utah in the quarterfinals and cranked up the highlight reel in the second half of its semifinal rout over Colorado, allowing 82 combined points in the two games.

UCLA swamped Oregon in its opener, turning what was supposed to be a track meet into a stomping. The Bruins did the same thing to Stanford in the semifinals, all but putting the game out of reach in the opening five minutes.

These teams met once during the regular season, Jan. 9 in Westwood. Arizona ended a three-game losing streak to the Bruins in that one, escaping with a 79-75 win despite 17 turnovers and blowing a 13-point lead in the final 6 1/2 minutes.

UCLA had the advantage early in the rematch by doing what two previous tournament opponents couldn't: Score on the Wildcats.

Getting shots seemingly wherever and whenever they wanted, the Bruins used a 12-0 run to go up 14-3 and kept pouring 'em in against one of the nation's best defenses.

UCLA hit 18 of 31 shots and scored 43 points in the first half - more than Utah did the entire game against Arizona and matching Colorado's total.

The Wildcats kicked their offense into gear to get back in it, shaking off a string of questionable shots in the opening minutes with a bunch of 3-pointers, including three by Gabe York. Arizona shot 16 of 30, including 5 of 8 from the arc, to close to 43-40 at the half.

The game turned from an offensive show to a defensive shutdown in the second, every possession a struggle to get off a pass, much less a good shot.

UCLA went nearly six minutes without a field goal until Adams' 3-pointer and Arizona went nearly five without one until Johnson hit a 3-pointer with 2 seconds left.

The Bruins got the victory despite shooting 7 of 27 in the second half.

SAN DIEGO (AP) - Arizona opened the NCAA tournament with a victory, exactly what a No. 1 seed is supposed to do.

Anxious early and a bit too comfortable late, top-seeded Arizona pulled out a 69-59 win over Weber State in the West Regional on Friday, a victory that's unlikely to change predictions that the Wildcats will lose in the next round.

The first full day of the NCAA tournament was a wild one filled with upsets, and the bracket-busting trend continued early Friday, when Mercer, a No. 14 seed, knocked off mighty Duke.

Arizona (31-4) appeared to be next in line, falling into an 8-point hole in the opening 6 minutes.

Arizona closed in around Weber State (19-12), shutting down the Wildcats during two big first-half runs, seemingly putting the fairy tale to bed.

Instead of running away, the Wildcats backed off, allowing Weber State to trim a 21-point lead down to nine in the closing minutes.

Arizona pulled out the victory, but it was merely solid, not great, particularly since the next game - against Gonzaga or Oklahoma State on Sunday - is the spot the Wildcats have been picked to go down.

Nick Johnson had 18 points, Aaron Gordon added 16 and Arizona blocked 11 shots while holding Weber State to 30 percent from the floor.

The Wildcats jumped on Arizona early and clawed back when they could have folded, at least making the Wildcats uncomfortable before losing steam.

Davion Berry scored 24 points, Joel Bolomboy has 11 points and 16 rebounds, and Richard Gittens added 12 points while triggering Weber State's second-half comeback.

"We came in expecting to win, trying to win," Weber State coach Randy Rahe said. "The guys did a tremendous job. I thought we could have pulled in the tents and our guys got a little more tough and showed resilience like they have all year."

Arizona had been in this spot before, facing a quick-trigger 3-point shooting team in the opening round.

A year ago, Belmont was a popular bracket buster pick against the Wildcats because of its ability to shoot the 3, but Arizona turned the slight into motivation and ran over the Bruins.

Even after an opening day of upsets in the bracket, there were no calls for one against Arizona this year.

But just as Mercer was busy taking down Duke, Weber State gave the 16-over-a-1-seed miracle a glimpse of life, holding Arizona without a field for nearly 5 minutes during a game-opening 10-2 run.

The dream popped with a flurry of blocked shots, steals and runouts the other direction.

After falling into the early hole, one of the nation's best defenses flexed its muscles against the Big Sky-champion Wildcats, jumping into passing lanes, swatting shots, turning nearly every possession into a fight against the shot clock.

Weber State missed 12 of 13 shots as Arizona went on two big runs and shot 6 of 24 in the first half with nine turnovers that Arizona turned into 12 points.

The desert Wildcats shook off their early offensive funk with an array of dunks and 3-pointers, racing past Weber State with runs of 14-2 and 13-3 to go up 32-20 at halftime.

Arizona looked as if it was going to run away with it early in the second half, only to watch Weber State scratch a huge lead to under double digits with 4 1-2 minutes left.

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) - Nick Johnson scored all of his 15 points in the last 2:45, after missing his first 10 shots, and Arizona rallied to beat San Diego State 70-64 Thursday night and advance to the final eight of the NCAA tournament.

Aaron Gordon and Rondae Hollis-Jefferson scored 15 points each for the top-seeded Wildcats (33-4). They next play Wisconsin in the West Regional final Saturday.

Xavier Thames scored 25 points and Dwayne Polee added 13 points for the Aztecs (31-5). Those two tried to bail out SDSU in the final minute, each hitting 3-pointers before Thames' basket cut the deficit to 65-61 with 38 seconds left.

The drama wasn't over yet in a game featuring tenacious defense and rabid intensity by both teams.

SDSU got called for a 10-second violation, and the Wildcats regained the ball. Johnson got fouled and made both for a 67-61 lead with 26 seconds to go. Thames got fouled on a 3-point attempt, and he sank all three shots to leave SDSU trailing 67-64.

The Aztecs had Johnson trapped near their bench, but he passed out of the double team and Gabe York got fouled at the other end. He missed the first and made the second, keeping Arizona ahead 68-64. Thames missed, and Johnson went to the line again where he ended the scoring with two free throws.

Hollis-Jefferson fouled out with 4:42 to play, but Johnson made his first basket a couple minutes later and carried the Wildcats across the finish line after they trailed much of the second half.

Arizona coach Sean Miller joined his brother Archie in the final eight. The younger Miller coached Dayton to an 82-72 victory over Stanford of the Pac-12 in the South Regional semifinals.

The Aztecs controlled the boards 37-29, with three of them often battling at once on the defensive end. Josh Davis had 14 rebounds for SDSU.

Johnson, the Pac-12 player of the year, finished 2 of 12 from the field, but made all 10 of his free throws.

T.J. McConnell's layup gave Arizona its first lead, 50-49, of the second half after the Wildcats got within one three times. SDSU answered with baskets the first two times, but couldn't stop McConnell, who finished with 11 points.

The Wildcats started getting some of the offensive rebounds that eluded them much of the game, and Kaleb Tarczewski scored after his teammates grabbed two on the same possession to keep Arizona ahead 54-51.

The Aztecs built their lead back to eight points early in the second half, with Thames scoring six of their first eight points. The Wildcats scored six in a row, capped by Gordon's one-handed dunk off York's alley-oop pass on a turnover by Davis, and Hollis-Jefferson added two free throws to leave them trailing 42-40.

Polee's defense helped keep Johnson scoreless in the first half, when he went 0 for 7 and missed all three of his 3-point attempts. He finally hit a jumper at the buzzer, but typical of Arizona's early luck, it was ruled no good. Tarczewski picked up his third foul with 5:13 to go, leaving the Wildcats without their 7-footer to protect the basket.

Neither team led by more than four points until the Aztecs closed the half on a 12-6 run to lead 32-28. Polee ignited the SDSU fans when he stepped in front of Johnson, swiped the ball and tore downcourt for a huge dunk. He and Skylar Shepard had four points each in the spurt.

Kaminsky had 11 rebounds and scored from all over, including three 3-pointers, for the No. 2 seed Badgers (30-7). It's Wisconsin's first Final Four appearance since 2000, and first for 69-year-old coach Bo Ryan, who earned his 70th career victory.

Nick Johnson had the ball with a chance to win, but he missed a shot that came just after the buzzer for Arizona (33-5), the top-seeded team that has yet to win a West Region final in Anaheim in four tries. Johnson led the Wildcats with 16 points, and Aaron Gordon had 18 rebounds in the relentlessly physical game.

Johnson stood with his hands on his hips, staring straight ahead, while Kaminsky and the rest of the Badgers rushed to celebrate.

Traevon Jackson added 10 points for the Badgers, and Kaminsky was chosen as most outstanding player of the West Region.

Kaleb Tarczewski scored 12 points and Rondae Hollis-Jefferson had 10 points for the Wildcats, who were trying to get coach Sean Miller to the Final Four for his first time. Instead, Miller was sent to the sidelines on the same day his younger brother Archie's Dayton Flyers lost to Florida in the South Region final.

The first 40 minutes were a back-and-forth struggle between the only 1-2 seeds remaining in the regionals, with neither team leading by more than three points over the final 12:09 of regulation.

Overtime was even more dramatic, with Arizona having an answer for just about everything Wisconsin did.

Ben Brust hit a 3-pointer to put the Badgers up at the start of the extra session; Gordon answered with a 3 to tie it up again at 57. Kaminsky scored inside and Gordon dunked at the other end for another tie.

Kaminsky's jumper and a free throw by Josh Gasser gave Wisconsin a 62-59 lead. Tarczewski's two free throws and Jordin Mayes' tip-in drew the Wildcats to 64-63 with 58 seconds left.

T. J. McConnell's jumper missed, but Arizona got the offensive rebound and found Johnson, who missed and got called for the push-off on Gasser with 3 seconds left.

Wisconsin inbounded on the baseline, but turned the ball over in a play reviewed by the referees.

That set up the final play, with Pac-12 player of the year Johnson unable to bail out the Wildcats.
