INTRODUCTION: FROM THE COMMISSIONER



First and foremost, we at the Pac-12 hope everyone is doing well and keeping safe during such unprecedented times. As I write this introduction, our country is dealing with the immeasurable tragedy of the killing of George Floyd and other Black Americans that has led to a national groundswell of protests to support social justice and fight racism, alongside the continuing COVID-19 pandemic. At the Pac-12, we are in the process of, and committed to, working with our universities, student-athletes, coaches and other members of our community to develop action plans to end racism and discrimination. We are equally committed to prioritizing the health and safety of our student-athletes and our Pac-12 family as we take steps to chart a path to a return to play for our student-athletes.

Turning to the year that was unfortunately cut short by COVID-19, I am proud to say that for a 15th-consecutive year, we led all collegiate conferences in NCAA titles again this past season, bringing our leading total of championships to an astounding 529. Of course, this feat occurred with many of our championships and sports seasons ending early due to global concerns surrounding COVID-19. Regardless, the accomplishment continues to reflect our Pac-12 commitment to overall athletic and academic excellence, a commitment that continues to be a source of great pride across our Pac-12 footprint.

As the 2019-20 campaign came to an end prematurely in March, we certainly share in our student-athletes, coaches, staff and fans collective desire to know what might have been for several Pac-12 sports, including men's and women's basketball, gymnastics and our women's and Olympics sports. That being said, we cannot help but be amazed at the level of competition and performances of our teams and student-athletes this past year, including NCAA titles for Stanford men's water polo, women's soccer and women's volleyball.

In this Year in Review, you'll find a host of information on the performance of our teams in a variety of sports, including those that had their season end early or suspended. Also in this review, you will find information related to our Conference's and universities' efforts off the field with our Pac-12 Student-Athlete Health & Well-Being Initiative, our Pac-12 Team Green efforts and our work with Extra Yard for Teachers.

- Focus on Mental Health – Our Pac-12 Student-Athlete Health & Well-Being Initiative continued to focus on the mental health of our student-athletes this past year as evident by the first-ever Student-Athlete Mental Health Summit the Pac-12 held at UCLA's Luskin Conference Center in January 2020, in conjunction with UCLA and the NCAA. Continuing on mental health, our initiative also announced the formation of a Pac-12 Mental Health Coordinating Unit, signaling further and increased focus on this important aspect of the well-being of our student-athletes.

- Pac-12 Team Green – Along the same lines off the field, our Pac-12 Team Green efforts continued to evolve. At the third annual Pac-12 Sustainability Conference, hosted by the University of Washington, our Pac-12 Team Green announced the formation of an ambassador program with “Team Green Champions,” with founding members including Mary Harvey, Josh Rosen and Bill Walton, among many others.

- Extra Yard for Teachers – Culminating at our 2019 Pac-12 Football Championship Game, our collective efforts with “Extra Yard for Teachers,” in conjunction with the College Football Playoff Foundation, resulted this past year in the Pac-12 awarding over \$36,000 to 12 local teachers across Santa Clara County where our championship game was held. This work was in addition to awards and recognitions all across our Pac-12 footprint with our universities also recognizing local teachers in their communities.

To conclude, I would like to once again express my appreciation to our universities, staff, coaches and student-athletes whose collective vision and leadership continues to keep the Pac-12 in the forefront of athletics and academics, and continues to push our communities forward. I also want to express my appreciation and admiration to our Pac-12 council, including our athletic directors, senior woman administrators, faculty athletics representatives and members of our student-athlete advisory committee for their continued dedication to support our athletics programs and student-athletes.












Most of all, I want to congratulate all of our student-athletes on another great season on the field, on the court, in the pool and in the classroom. Including to those who had their season end prematurely, all of our student-athletes' dedication to excellence continues to inspire us all.

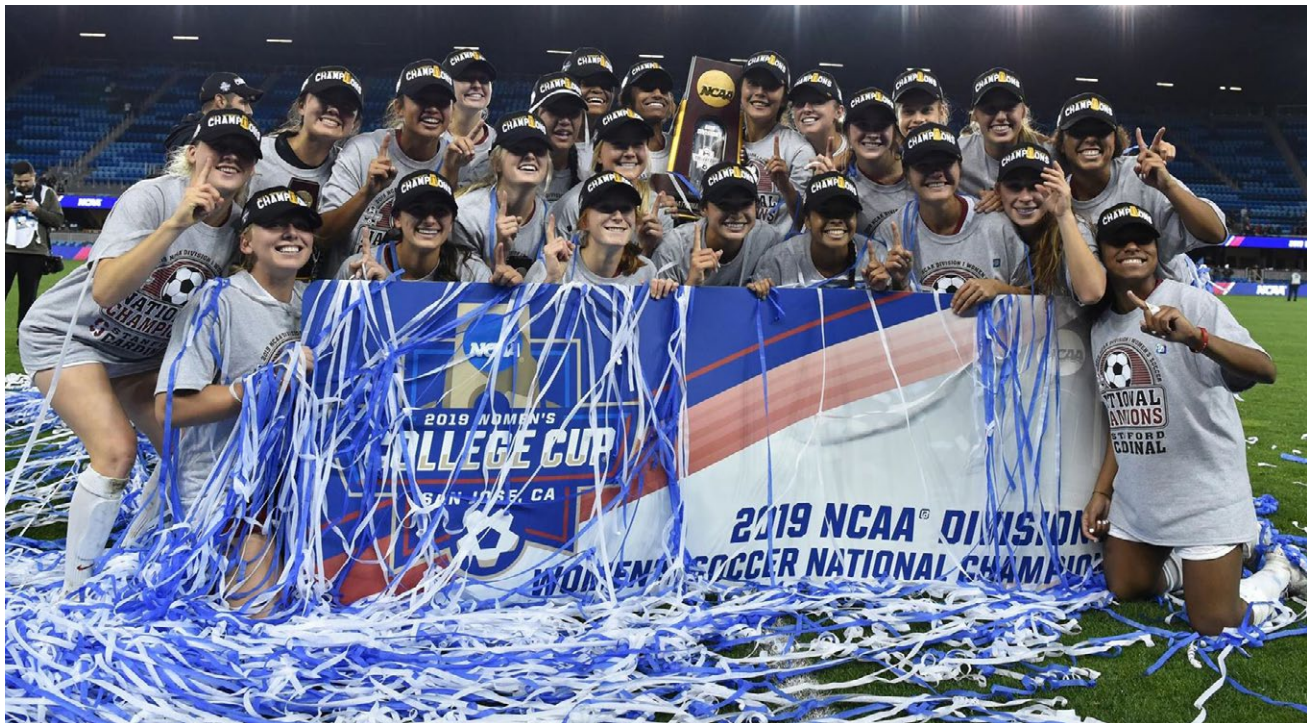

The Conference of Champions®



While the 2019-20 season ended early due to global concerns surrounding COVID-19, the Conference of Champions® continued to add to its all-time leading number of NCAA titles with Stanford capturing three championships in the fall in men's water polo, women's soccer and women's volleyball. Now with 529 NCAA titles all-time, the Pac-12 has led all conferences in NCAA titles in each of the last 15 seasons and 54 of the last 60.

Prior to the season ending early, both Pac-12 men's and women's basketball were enjoying strong campaigns with women's basketball holding a successful Conference tournament at Mandalay Bay Events Center in Las Vegas for the first time with near-sellout crowds. For women's basketball, the season ended with six Pac-12 teams ranked in the final *Associated Press* poll for the first time ever, as well as several individual highlights including Oregon's Sabrina Ionescu being named the consensus national player of the year, earning the honor from the *Associated Press* and Women's Basketball Coaches Association, among others. Men's basketball also enjoyed success with six teams reaching 20 total wins ahead of the season's cancellation.

The successes heading into the spring followed a strong fall campaign that, in addition to Stanford's three NCAA titles, saw multiple Pac-12 football programs finish in the final Top 25 CFP standings with Oregon (No. 6), Utah (No. 11) and USC (No. 22), also claiming thrilling bowl victories from Washington (Las Vegas Bowl), California (Redbox Bowl) and Arizona State (Sun Bowl), while capping the year off with an Oregon Rose Bowl victory. These team accomplishments are in addition to multiple lauded individual recognitions with Oregon's Justin Herbert winning the Campbell Trophy and Penei Sewell earning the Outland Trophy as the top interior lineman.

Focus on Mental Health



Continuing its practice of focusing on the health and well-being of student-athletes, the Pac-12 Student-Athlete Health & Well-Being Initiative held a first-ever student-athlete mental health summit in January 2020, in partnership with UCLA and the NCAA. The two-day event provided a unique opportunity for exchange among national and international leaders on important issues surrounding mental health in collegiate athletics. The event convened over 300 attendees from across the sports landscape, including coaches, team physicians, athletic trainers, athletics directors, and current and former student-athletes. In April, the Pac-12 also announced the formation of a Pac-12 Mental Health Coordinating Unit to support student-athlete mental health programs and research among Pac-12 universities.

Champions of Sustainability



Living up to its charge to promote the sustainability efforts on and around all 12 of its universities, Pac-12 Team Green held its third annual Pac-12 Sustainability Conference at the University of Washington in June. During the two-day event, the platform also announced the creation of a “Team Green Champions” program featuring ambassadors of Pac-12 Team Green that includes Arielle Gold, Taylor Graham, Mary Harvey, Adam Lowry, Roger McClendon, Josh Rosen and Bill Walton.

Extra Yard for Teachers



The Pac-12 again worked with the College Football Playoff Foundation and all 12 of its member universities to honor teachers with special grants across all the Pac-12 footprint. The work was showcased across Pac-12 Networks via feature vignettes of student-athletes and coaches recognizing teachers who made a difference in their lives. The work this past season culminated with the Conference awarding over \$36,000 to 12 teachers across Santa Clara County ahead of the 2019 Pac-12 Football Championship Game at Levi's® Stadium. Focusing on science, technology, engineering, the arts and math (STEAM), the partnership has produced over \$170,000 in grant funding over the past five years.

College Football 150th Anniversary



Throughout the 2019 season, the Pac-12 joined with others to celebrated the 150th anniversary of college football. The year-long celebration featured activities around major events, including the 2019 Pac-12 Football Media Day, opening week of the regular season and at the 2019 Pac-12 Football Championship Game. Chaired by Commissioner Larry Scott, the CFB150 initiative also featured a special midseason celebration week to commemorate the anniversary of the sport's first game (Nov. 6, 1869) that included a social media challenge which encouraged

influential individuals from throughout college football to go out and give a football to kids in their communities. Highlights of the campaign, via special vignettes, were also on display throughout the season across Pac-12 Networks TV and digital channels.

Premier West Coast Events



During the 2019 Pac-12 Men's & Women's Basketball Media Days, the Conference announced extensions to have both of its basketball tournaments remain in Las Vegas through the 2022 events, with the men's continuing at T-Mobile Arena and the women's taking place at Mandalay Bay Events Center where it was held for the first time in 2020. Also during media days in October, the Pac-12 announced the creation of the "Pac-12 Coast-to-Coast Challenge," presented by MGM Resorts International, a men's and women's basketball non-conference scheduling series slated to begin in December 2020 and featuring several Pac-12 programs against opponents from the Big 12.

On the football field, while the 2020 Pac-12 Football Championship Game is set to move to Las Vegas and Allegiant Stadium in the coming year, the Conference also announced the addition of the Los Angeles Bowl to its postseason lineup through 2025, beginning in 2020. The event will make its debut following the 2020 regular season at the new LA Stadium and Entertainment District and will feature a Pac-12 team facing against a Mountain West Conference opponent.

Pac-12 Networks – Where Champions Play



Pac-12 Networks brought fans extensive, multi-platform content during the 2019 football season under the new “Pac-12 on the Road” program umbrella. The season featured the Networks again taking the show on the road to each Pac-12 campus, with coverage beginning mid-week and content appearing across Pac-12 Networks’ digital and social channels leading up to “The Pregame” each Saturday. Coverage from the programming highlighted student life on campus, featuring the people and traditions that give each Pac-12 university its unique personality and culture. In addition, the Networks launched its Pac-12 Now app on Apple TV this past year, broadening visibility and accessibility of its coverage to subscribers across the country.”

AUGUST 30-31



Utah Volleyball Makes Big Statement to Open 2019 Campaign – Unranked Utah opened the 2019 campaign with a pair of top-25 wins marking the first time in program history it had beaten two AVCA-ranked teams in the opening weekend. The Utes topped No. 7 Kentucky (3-0) and No. 23 Cal Poly (3-2).



SEPTEMBER 21

UCLA Football Rallies for 67-63 Win Despite Record-Setting Performance by Washington State's Anthony Gordon – Trailing by 32 points (49-17) in the third quarter, UCLA mounted a furious rally to down Washington State, 67-63. The 130 points were a Pac-12 record for most combined points scored in a game, while WSU QB Anthony Gordon established a Pac-12 single-game record with nine touchdown passes.

OCTOBER 6



UCLA Soccer's Milan Iloski Scores School-Record Five Goals in a Game – UCLA forward Milan Iloski scored a school-record five goals in the Bruins' 5-2 win over San Diego State. The five goals tied for the most by any NCAA Division I player in 2019 and were the most by any Pac-12 player in at least 21 years.



OCTOBER 8

Pac-12 Announces Creation of Pac-12 Basketball Coast-to-Coast Challenge – The Conference unveiled its plans to host the Pac-12 Coast-to-Coast Challenge, a men's and women's basketball non-conference scheduling series to debut as a quadruple-header at T-Mobile Arena in Las Vegas in December 2020.

NOVEMBER 1



Colorado Cross Country Returns to Top of Conference – Colorado won the Pac-12 team championship for the seventh time in its nine seasons since joining the Conference, anchored by an individual title from senior Joe Klecker, the first Buff to win the men's race since CU joined the league in 2011.



NOVEMBER 1

Stanford Cross Country Sweeps Top 3 En Route to Dominant Pac-12 Title – Led by senior Fiona O'Keeffe's individual win, Stanford had the top-3 finishers and four in the top 10 to capture its first Conference title since 2010. The Cardinal's 27 points were the fifth-fewest in the event's 34-year history.



NOVEMBER 3

Washington State Volleyball Claims First Sweep in 30+ Years — Following a 3-2 win a month earlier in Los Angeles, Washington State completed its first regular-season sweep of USC since 1986, taking a 3-1 victory in Pullman. WSU was led by eventual AVCA National Freshman of the Year Magda Jehlarova, the first national freshman award winner in program history.

NOVEMBER 9



No. 1 Oregon Basketball Topples Worldwide No. 1 USA — Preseason No. 1 Oregon defeated Team USA, which included women's basketball legends Sue Bird, Diana Taurasi and Seimone Augustus, 93-86, in Eugene, Ore. Sabrina Ionescu scored 20 of her 30 points in the third quarter to propel the Ducks to a fourth-quarter lead and the eventual win. It was the first time in 20 years, and only the second time ever, that a collegiate team defeated Team USA.



NOVEMBER 10

Colorado, Arizona State Meet in Fifth Annual Pac-12 Basketball China Game — In what remains the only regular-season contest for a professional or collegiate sports team in the country, the Conference welcomed Colorado and Arizona State to Shanghai for the fifth annual Pac-12 China Game. The Buffaloes tipped off the season with an 81-71 victory over the Sun Devils.

NOVEMBER 14



Washington Men's Soccer Claims First Pac-12 Title Since 2013 — Washington earned the 2019 Conference title, the third all-time for the program and its first since 2013. The Huskies, who snapped Stanford's streak of five-straight league titles, went on to win the second-most matches (17) in program history and reach the NCAA Quarterfinals for the second time.



NOVEMBER 22

Arizona State Wrestling Knocks Off No. 1 Penn State — In front of a record-breaking crowd of 8,522 in Tempe, No. 5 Arizona State defeated No. 1 Penn State 19-18. It was the first loss in a dual for Penn State since 2015, ending a 60-match winning streak.

NOVEMBER 23



Pac-12 Cross Country Leads Way at 2019 NCAA Championships — The Pac-12 led all leagues with 14 combined All-America finishers and matched the national-high with a pair of podium teams (Colorado men, Stanford women), highlighting the Conference's showing at the 2019 NCAA Championships at Indiana State's LaVern Gibson Championship Course.

NOVEMBER 26



Stanford Volleyball Wins Outright Pac-12 Crown – Behind 21 kills from national player of the year Kathryn Plummer, the Cardinal swept Washington State to win its 19th all-time Pac-12 crown. Stanford went 18-2 in league play to claim its third-straight crown.



DECEMBER 5

Cal Swimmer Abbey Weitzeil Sets New American Record in 50-yard Freestyle – Cal senior Abbey Weitzeil became the first woman to swim the 50-yard freestyle in under 21 seconds. After Weitzeil touched the wall in 20.90 seconds, she lowered her own previous American, U.S. Open and NCAA record of 21.02.

DECEMBER 6



Three Pac-12 Soccer Teams Advance to NCAA Women's College Cup for the First Time – For the first time in league history, three Pac-12 teams advanced to the NCAA Women's College Cup. First-time participant and unseeded Washington State defeated the No. 1 and 2 seeds in its quadrant to join league powerhouses Stanford and UCLA.



DECEMBER 6

Stanford Soccer Advances to NCAA College Cup for Seventh Time – Stanford advanced to the NCAA College Cup behind goalkeeper Andrew Thomas' two saves in a penalty shootout on the road at No. 2 seed Clemson. It marked the Cardinal's seventh all-time appearance and fourth in the last five seasons.

DECEMBER 6



Oregon Football Wins Third Pac-12 FCG title – Utah successfully defended its Pac-12 South Division crown and climbed to No. 5 in the CFP rankings, but couldn't hold off No. 14 Oregon as the Ducks captured their third Pac-12 FCG title with a 37-15 win. Oregon's CJ Verdell earned FCG MVP honors as he rushed for 208 yards with a pair of long touchdown runs (70- and 31-yards).



DECEMBER 8

Stanford Soccer Wins Second NCAA Title in Three Years – After winning its fifth Pac-12 crown, Stanford edged North Carolina in penalty kicks to capture the 2019 NCAA Championship and cap one of the Pac-12's most successful campaigns in Conference history. The Cardinal's title was its third in program history and the sixth all-time for Pac-12 women's soccer programs, including the Conference's fifth in the last nine seasons.





DECEMBER 8

Stanford Men's Water Polo Wins First NCAA Title Since 2002 – Top-seeded Stanford recorded a dominant 13-8 win over No. 5 Pacific to win the NCAA title. The Cardinal grabbed its 11th national championship in the sport and its first since 2002. The victory also extended Stanford athletics' streak of having won at least one NCAA team championship per year to 44-consecutive years.

DECEMBER 10



Oregon Football's Justin Herbert Wins Campbell Trophy – Oregon quarterback becomes the second all-time recipient from the Pac-12 to earn the Campbell Trophy. The Campbell Trophy, considered the academic Heisman, recognizes the top scholar-athlete in football.



DECEMBER 12

Oregon Football's Penei Sewell Named Outland Trophy Winner – Oregon offensive tackle Penei Sewell was named the recipient of the 74th Outland Trophy, which is awarded annually to the nation's best college interior lineman on offense or defense.

DECEMBER 19



Trio of Pac-12 Football Standouts Earn Unanimous and Consensus All-America Honors – California linebacker Evan Weaver, who led the nation with 182 tackles (14.0/game), and Oregon offensive tackle Penei Sewell were unanimous All-America selections, while Utah defensive end Bradlee Anae earned consensus All-America honors.



DECEMBER 21

Stanford Volleyball Dominates NCAA Tournament for Second-Straight Title – Stanford swept Wisconsin, 3-0, to win its second-straight NCAA title and third in four years, and NCAA-leading ninth all-time. With five All-Americans in the lineup, the Cardinal dropped just two sets in the postseason to conference-foe Utah, sweeping all other tournament foes, 3-0. Kathryn Plummer, who was a two-time national player of the year and Pac-12 Player of the Year but was not eligible for 2019 honors because of injury, was named MOP of the national championship.

DECEMBER 27



Washington State Football QB Anthony Gordon Caps Record-Setting Season – In his only season as a starter, Washington State QB Anthony Gordon established Pac-12 single-season records with 5,579 passing yards and 48 touchdown passes.

JANUARY 1



Oregon Football's Herbert Leads Ducks to Rose Bowl Victory – Despite a career where he accounted for 10,541 passing yards and 95 touchdown passes, Justin Herbert used his legs to rush for three touchdowns as Oregon defeated Wisconsin, 28-27. Herbert, who earned Offensive Player of the Game honors, broke off a 30-yard touchdown run midway through the fourth quarter that capped the comeback for the Ducks.



JANUARY 3

Stanford Soccer's Catarina Macario Named MAC Hermann Trophy Winner – Pac-12 Midfielder of the Year Stanford's Catarina Macario won her second-straight, the Pac-12's sixth, MAC Hermann Trophy. The junior etched her name in the Pac-12 record books as she notched the most goals (32), assists (23) and points (87) in a season in Conference history. Macario's 87 points tied for the third-most in NCAA history behind Mia Hamm (97) and Christine Sinclair (88).

JANUARY 10-12



Arizona State Basketball Pulls Off Stunning Upsets – Arizona State women's basketball pulls off back-to-back stunning upsets against No. 2 Oregon (72-66) and No. 3 Oregon State (55-47) in Tempe, the first unranked team in NCAA history to beat top-five regular-season opponents in the same weekend.



JANUARY 11

Seven Selected in MLS SuperDraft, Including No. 1 – Seven Pac-12 men's soccer players were selected in the first two rounds of the 2019 Major League Soccer (MLS) SuperDraft with UCLA standout freshman Frankie Amaya picked number one overall by FC Cincinnati, becoming the sixth Bruin taken first-overall in the MLS draft and second in the last three years. Seven Pac-12 players selected in the first two rounds of the MLS SuperDraft is the most since eight league were picked in 2014.

JANUARY 13



Six Earn Freshman All-America Honors – Pac-12 Freshman Offensive Player of the Year USC QB Kedon Slovis headlined the Football Writers Association Freshman All-America Team. The six Pac-12 selections were most among all conferences. In addition to Slovis, UCLA OL Sean Rhyan, Oregon DE Kayvon Thibodeaux, Oregon State LB Omar Speights, Oregon DB Verone McKinley III, and UCLA PR Kyle Phillips were also recognized.



JANUARY 16

Eleven Pac-12 Standouts Selected in 2020 NWSL Draft – Eleven Pac-12 women's soccer standouts were selected in the 2020 National Women's Soccer League (NWSL) College Draft, the most of any conference and the most since 2017. Coming off a dominant 2019 season, the Pac-12 became the first league to have the top four picks in the draft, highlighted by NCAA Champion Stanford producing the No. 1 overall pick for the third-consecutive year when Sophia Smith was selected by the Portland Thorns FC.



JANUARY 31

Oregon Track and Field Sets New National Standard in DMR – Oregon’s distance medley relay team of James West, Jacob Miller, Charlie Hunter and Cooper Teare break the collegiate record with a time of 9:24.52 at the Razorback Invitational in Fayetteville, Ark.

FEBRUARY 19



Five Swimming Teams Ranked in Final Regular Season CSCAA Top-25 Poll – Five Pac-12 teams were ranked in the final regular season CSCAA Top-25 poll with No. 1 Stanford atop the season-ending poll for the fifth-straight year. Three Pac-12 teams rank in the top-10 to tie the most of any conference with the Cardinal joined by No. 4 California and No. 8 USC.



FEBRUARY 24

Oregon Basketball’s Sabrina Ionescu Reaches 2k-1k-1k – In one of the biggest games of the season, the Ducks’ Sabrina Ionescu became the first player in NCAA history to tally 2,000 points, 1,000 rebounds and 1,000 assists in a top-10 clash at Stanford. Earlier that day, she had spoken at former Lakers’ great Kobe Bryant’s memorial in Los Angeles.

FEBRUARY 28



Oregon Softball Posts 16-Game Win Streak, Second-Longest in Program History – The Ducks finished the shortened 2019-20 season 22-2, their record highlighted by a 16-game winning streak. Oregon went nearly perfect in the month of February, posting the second-longest win streak to begin a year in school history.



FEBRUARY 29

Stanford Swimming Wins Fourth-Straight Pac-12 Championship Title – Stanford won the 2020 Pac-12 Women’s Swimming and Diving Championships, notching its fourth-consecutive Pac-12 title. No other team has pulled off a four-peat since Stanford’s 13-consecutive titles from 1987-1999.

MARCH 1



Utah Gymnastics Captures Inaugural Regular-Season Championship – The Red Rocks traveled to Seattle to face the GymDawgs in a matchup for the sport’s first regular-season Conference title. The meet went down to the wire with Utah edging Washington, 197.675-197.600, to win the title in Alaska Airlines Arena and remain undefeated on the season.



MARCH 4



Pac-12 Named 2020 Hall of Honor Class – The 2020 Hall of Honor class is announced by the Pac-12, featuring a wide array of excellence across Pac-12 athletics history with NCAA champions, Olympic Gold Medalists, Super Bowl Champions, NBA and WNBA stars and collegiate athletics trailblazers.



MARCH 5

Tinkle Passes Payton to Become OSU's All-Time Scoring Leader – With 23 points in a victory over Stanford, Tres Tinkle became the all-time leading scorer in Oregon State Men's Basketball history, passing the legendary Gary Payton. Tinkle went on to finish his career with 2,233 career points, good for seventh on the Pac-12 all-time list.

MARCH 7



Arizona State Wrestling Reclaims Pac-12 Wrestling Crown – Arizona State captured its third Pac-12 title in four years, and 19th all-time, as five Sun Devils earned individual titles. ASU's Kordell Norfleet was named Co-Most Outstanding Wrestler of the Championships along with Stanford's Shane Griffith.



MARCH 7

California Swimming Claims Third-Straight Pac-12 Title – California captured its third-straight and seventh all-time Pac-12 Championship title after collecting 10 individual and four relay titles. Standout Ryan Hoffer was named Pac-12 Swimmer of the Year and Swimmer of the Meet after capturing six titles, setting two meet records and posting the fastest 50-yard freestyle in the nation.

MARCH 7



Oregon Men's Basketball Completes Rare Triple Crown– Oregon secured the Pac-12 regular-season outright title with an 80-67 victory over Stanford. UO became the first school in Conference history and just the second in Power Five conference history (Ohio State - 2005-06, 2006-07, 2009-10) to claim regular-season league titles in football, women's basketball and men's basketball in the same academic year.



MARCH 8

California Beach Volleyball Upsets Top-Five Team – In their last match of the weekend, the No. 11 Golden Bears upended No. 5 USC in a five-set thriller at the Pac-12 South Tournament, Cal's second-ever top-five win and first since 2018.



MARCH 8

Colorado Lacrosse's Charlie Rudy Ties Single-Game Pac-12 Record – Colorado attacker Charlie Rudy recorded eight goals as the No. 24 Buffaloes defeated Coastal Carolina, 19-8. Rudy's career-high day tied a program and Pac-12 record.

MARCH 8



Oregon Basketball Dominates in Pac-12 Tournament Run – Recording a nearly 24-points per game margin of victory, Oregon won its second Pac-12 Tournament crown in three years at Mandalay Bay Events Center in Las Vegas, cruising to an 89-56 victory over then-defending champion Stanford. Sabrina Ionescu was named MOP and was two rebounds shy of a triple-double in the championship game. Ionescu became the tournament's all-time scorer and assists leader.



MARCH 9

Pac-12 Gymnastics Dominate Poll – Pac-12 women's gymnastics, paced by No. 3 UCLA and No. 4 Utah, had five teams listed among the top 15 in the season's final RoadToNationals.com poll and all eight teams were among the top 27.

MARCH 9



Six Pac-12 Beach Volleyball Teams Ranked in Final AVCA Published Poll – Led by reigning NCAA Champion UCLA, two-thirds of the Conference was ranked in the final published poll of the season with the Bruins ending at No. 2. USC and California joined the Bruins in the top 10 at No. 6 and No. 9, respectively.



MARCH 9

USC Lacrosse's Riley Hertford Receives Fifth-Career Pac-12 Weekly Honor – In a shortened season that saw only four weeks of Pac-12 honors, USC goalie Riley Hertford earned two Defensive Player of the Week awards, giving her five for her career which is the most all-time at USC and tied for the Conference record.

MARCH 10



No. 1 USC Leads Three Pac-12 Men's Tennis Teams in Rankings – Three Pac-12 teams finished in the final ITA top-25 rankings including No. 1 USC, which maintained the top spot for five-consecutive weeks. Stanford was ranked No. 8 and UCLA finished at No. 22.

MARCH 10



Five Softball Teams Ranked Final Top-20 of USA Today/NFCA Coaches Poll – Pac-12 softball wrapped the 2020 season with five teams ranked in the final USA Today/NFCA Coaches poll — No. 1 UCLA, No. 2 Washington, No. 4 Arizona, No. 9 Oregon and No. 17 Arizona State. Following the preseason poll, all five teams were ranked in six-consecutive top-25 rankings.



MARCH 10

Three Pac-12 Women's Tennis Teams Ranked in Final ITA Top-25 – Three Pac-12 women's tennis teams finished the season in the ITA top-25 after making their Pac-12 debut just before the season was cut short. Leading the way was UCLA at No. 3, 2019 NCAA Champion Stanford at No. 6 and Arizona State ranked 18th.

MARCH 11



Utah Basketball's Plummer Sets Conference Three-Point Record – In the opening game of the Pac-12 Tournament, Utah's Alfonso Plummer set both the tourney and league record with 11 three-pointers. Oregon State's Jarod Lucas made the most important triple of the game, though, as his shot with 1.8 seconds left lifted the Beavers to a 71-69 victory.



MARCH 12

Pac-12 Men's Basketball Tournament, NCAA Sports Canceled Due to Coronavirus Pandemic – The Pac-12 announced it would cancel the remainder of the Pac-12 Men's Basketball Tournament due to national and global concerns stemming from the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. Hours later, the NCAA canceled March Madness and the remainder of all winter and spring collegiate sports seasons, and eventually all sports worldwide were halted.

MARCH 14



Pac-12 Suspends All Competitions and Championships Due to Coronavirus Pandemic – Following decisions by the NCAA to cancel the Division I men's and women's 2020 NCAA basketball tournaments and all remaining winter and spring NCAA championships, the Pac-12 announced the decision to cancel all Conference and non-conference sport competitions and championships through the end of the academic year, including spring sports that compete beyond the academic year.

MARCH 16

UCLA Baseball Headlines Pair of Pac-12 Teams in Top 10 of Final Coaches Poll – Off to a 13-2 start, UCLA checked in at No. 4 in the final USA Today Coaches poll of the shortened 2020 season. Arizona State also finished in the top 10, closing at No. 10 following a 13-4 start.



MARCH 19

USC Lacrosse Finishes at No. 7 in Final IWLCA Poll— USC, which was ranked every week in the 2020 season, finished the season ranked No. 7. The Pac-12's highest ranked team boasted a Conference-best record of 6-0 and was one of eight remaining undefeated teams in the country.

MARCH 20



Stanford Wrestling's Shane Griffith Hodge Trophy Finalist – Stanford freshman Shane Griffith completed the season with a 28-0 record, was named the Pac-12 Wrestler of the Year and named one of eight finalists for the prestigious Hodge Trophy given to the nation's top collegiate wrestler.



MARCH 22

Pac-12 Claims Nation's Top Golf Teams – USC claimed the top spot and five other Pac-12 women's golf teams were among the top 15 in Golfweek's last poll of the shortened season. In men's golf, Arizona State concludes the shortened season as the top-ranked conference team at No. 7 in the Golfweek's final poll. No. 17 Washington and No. 21 Arizona round out the top 25.

MARCH 30



Pac-12 Announces Extension of Suspension of Organized Team Activities – The Pac-12 announced the decision to extend its suspension of organized team activities through May 31, with certain limited exceptions based upon student-athlete well-being and with periodic re-evaluations during the suspension.



APRIL 6

Pac-12 Basketball Claims Four Naismith Starting Five Winners – Four of the five Basketball Hall of Fame/WBCA Naismith Starting Five awards went to the Pac-12 with three going to Oregon, including Sabrina Ionescu claiming her third-straight Nancy Lieberman Point Guard Award. Teammates Ruthy Hebard (Katrina McClain Award) and Satou Sabally (Cheryl Miller Award) were also winners. Arizona's Aari McDonald claimed the Ann Meyers Drysdale Award.

APRIL 6



Oregon Basketball's Sabrina Ionescu is Consensus National Player of the Year – Oregon's Sabrina Ionescu wins every major national player of the year award, including from the Associated Press, Wade Trophy and John R. Wooden Award. She led the Ducks to a 30-win season and the Pac-12 title. She ends her career shattering the NCAA's triple-double records, more than doubling any other men's or women's player in history, and broke the Pac-12 all-time men's and women's assists record, while being one of only five women's basketball players in NCAA history with 1,000 assists.

APRIL 7



Oregon Basketball's Payton Pritchard Named Bob Cousy Point Guard of the Year – A consensus first team All-American and the Conference's Player of the Year, Payton Pritchard became the second Pac-12 player to win the Naismith Memorial Hall of Fame's Point Guard of the Year honor joining Utah's Delon Wright in 2015. Pritchard led the Ducks to the Pac-12 regular-season title while pacing the league in both scoring and assists.



APRIL 15

Five Pac-12 Student-Athletes Win Honda Sport Awards – For the second time in three years, five Pac-12 student-athletes were named Honda Sport Award winners. Oregon's Sabrina Ionescu, UCLA's Kyla Ross, Stanford's Catarina Macario, California's Abby Weitzeil and Stanford's Jenna Gray were recognized as their respective sport's top student-athlete. Since 1976-77, 132 student-athletes from Pac-12 institutions have won the honor.

APRIL 17



Oregon Basketball's Sabrina Ionescu Picked No. 1 WNBA Draft Pick – After a record-breaking season and career, Sabrina Ionescu became the first Duck and fifth Pac-12 women's basketball player all-time to be selected No. 1 overall in the WNBA Draft when she was picked by the New York Liberty. Teammate Satou Sabally was selected No. 2 by the Dallas Wings as five in all were chosen from the Pac-12.



APRIL 23

Arizona Golf's Hou Named WGCA Freshman of the Year – Despite a stellar first season cut short by the COVID-19 pandemic, Arizona's Vivian Hou still garnered WGCA Freshman of the Year honors. Hou finished among the top four in five of her six events and posted a 70.68 scoring average. It was the ninth time in the last 12 years a Pac-12 golfer has earned the award.

APRIL 23-25



Pac-12 Finds 32 Names Announced in NFL Draft – Oregon quarterback Justin Herbert was the first Pac-12 player off the board in the 2020 NFL Draft, picked sixth overall by the Los Angeles Chargers. USC offensive lineman Austin Jackson (18th selection - Miami Dolphins) and Arizona State wide receiver Brandon Aiyuk (25th selection - San Francisco 49ers) joined Herbert in the first round as the Pac-12 has now had three or more first round selections in each draft since 2011. Overall, 32 players were selected in the NFL Draft giving the Pac-12 30 or more selections for the sixth consecutive draft.



APRIL 27

Pac-12 Announces Formation of Mental Health Coordinating Unit – Pac-12 announces the formation of a Pac-12 Mental Health Coordinating Unit as part of the Conference's student-athlete health and well-being initiative, in addition to other research projects selected for funding by the initiative.



APRIL 28

Three from Pac-12 earn Tennis ITA All-America Recognition – USC, UCLA and Stanford each had a student-athlete earn 2020 ITA All-America honors and finish in the nation's top 10, tied for the most of any Conference. No. 1 Daniel Cuckierman of USC, No. 3 Keegan Smith of UCLA, and No. 7 Alexandre Rosaert of Stanford were among those receiving All-America honors.

APRIL 28



ITA Recognizes Five from Pac-12 with Tennis All-America Honors – UCLA led the way with three ITA All-America honors, with five in total from the Pac-12 earning national nods. California's Haley Giavara, Stanford's Michaela Gordon, and UCLA's Abigail Forbes, Elysia Bolton and Jada Hart were among those recognized.



MAY 26

Pac-12 Announces Voluntary In-Person Workouts Allowed Starting June 15 – Pac-12 announces that it will allow for voluntary in-person athletic workouts for all sports to commence on June 15, 2020, subject to the decision of each individual campus and where permissible by relevant governmental entities.

JUNE



Oregon's Renovated Hayward Field to Host Future Championships – Long considered the Mecca of track and field venues in the United States, construction of the University of Oregon's new Hayward Field was completed in the spring. Originally scheduled to host the 2020 Pac-12 Track & Field Championships, the world-class venue is slated to host the 2021 NCAA Championships, 2022 World Athletics Championships, as well as future Pac-12 Championships.

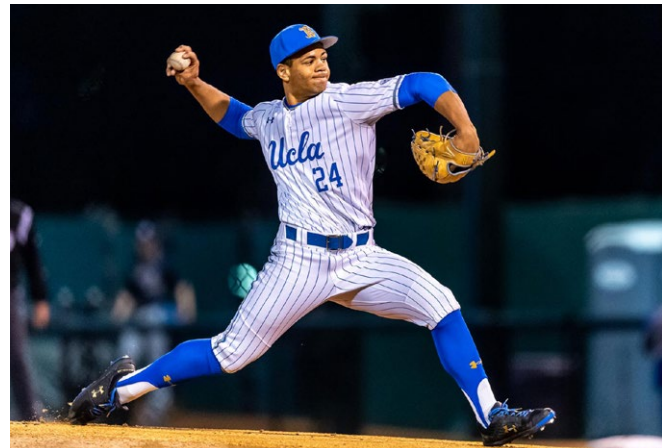


JUNE 12

Pac-12 Produces Record Eighth No. 1 Overall Pick in MLB Draft – Despite the shortened season, five Arizona State Sun Devils were selected in the 2020 MLB Draft, including No. 1-overall pick Spencer Torkelson who was selected by the Detroit Tigers. He is the fourth Sun Devil all-time to be selected No. 1 and the eighth from the Pac-12, the most of any conference. Six different schools were represented in the Draft, including Arizona and UCLA, which each had a pair. Oregon State, USC and Washing had one student-athlete selected.

BASEBALL

Two Pac-12 teams earned spots in the final *USA Today* Baseball Coaches top 25 including UCLA at No. 4 and Arizona State at No. 10. The league was off to a hot start before the season came to a halt due to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, recording eight top-25 wins, five upsets and 17 series wins, nine of which were perfect sweeps. Two of those wins came from USC and then-No. 2 UCLA after each posted a win over defending NCAA Champion and fifth-ranked Vanderbilt in the Southern California College Baseball Classic. The Conference finished in the top-15 nationally in ERA (No. 3 UCLA, 1.88), shutouts (No. 12 UCLA, 3) and on-base percentage (No. 13 Arizona, 0.417).



MEN'S BASKETBALL



The dominance of Payton Pritchard and the Oregon Ducks, and the global pandemic that prematurely halted the season will mark a memorable 2019-20 season. Conference Player of the Year and consensus first team All-American Pritchard became the second player to lead the league in scoring, assists and threes in a season, propelling the Ducks to the outright regular-season title by a game over runner-up UCLA. Oregon never had an opportunity to defend its 2019 Pac-12 Tournament title though, as the event was canceled on March 12 due to national and global concerns stemming from the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

The Pac-12 had six teams reach the 20-win plateau during the 2019-20 regular season, equaling the most ever for the Conference.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

Oregon won the Pac-12 Tournament in the first year at the Mandalay Bay Events Center in Las Vegas before the NCAA Tournament was canceled due to the global pandemic. Throughout the season, the Conference was touted for its strength and depth, evident in the final NCAA Top-16 reveal in March. Five teams were projected to earn top-16 seeds with six in total expected to earn NCAA Tournament berths. The Ducks' Sabrina Ionescu garnered plenty of attention, turning out triple-double after triple-double. She was named a unanimous national player of the year and won her third-straight Nancy Lieberman Award. A record number of student-athletes earned national recognition, including four of the five Naismith Starting Five hailing from the Pac-12. A Pac-12-record six league teams appeared in the final *Associated Press* poll.



BEACH VOLLEYBALL



Six of nine Pac-12 teams were ranked in the final AVCA Coaches poll announced because the season was halted due to global concerns over COVID-19. Two-time defending NCAA Champion UCLA was ranked No. 2, starting the season as the preseason No. 1 team in the country. USC was ranked No. 6 in the final week and California was ranked No. 9, building on successes from the previous season which saw the Golden Bears record their best-ever campaign. The Bruins were off to a dominant start as they looked to defend their Pac-12 and NCAA titles, with 10 of their 13 wins of the season coming against ranked teams. At 10-2, No. 17 Arizona was the only other Pac-12 team with double-digit wins.

MEN'S CROSS COUNTRY

Colorado proved to be the class of the league once again, capturing its seventh Conference crown in nine seasons since joining the Pac-12. The Buffaloes also paced the league at the NCAA Championships with a third-place team finish. CU senior Joe Klecker capped his standout career with his first Pac-12 individual title, as well as a runner-up showing at the NCAA meet. The Pac-12 paced the nation in men's All-Americans for the second-consecutive year and eighth time in the last nine years, boasting seven top-40 finishers, tying with the Big Ten for the most in the 2019 field.



WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY



Stanford recorded one of the most dominant women's seasons in Conference history. Led by first-time Pac-12 individual champion senior Fiona O'Keeffe, the Cardinal had the top-three finishers and four in the top-10 en route to 27 points - the fifth-fewest in the 34-year history of the league title meet - and its first Conference crown since 2010. Stanford went on to a third-consecutive top-5 showing at the NCAA Championships by placing third, its best finish since 2012. The Pac-12 accounted for seven top-40 finishers to lead all conferences in All-Americans for the fourth-consecutive year.

FOOTBALL

Pac-12 Champion Oregon capped a 12-2 season with a Rose Bowl Game victory as the Pac-12 went 4-3 in the postseason. Oregon was ranked No. 5, while Utah finished at No. 16 in the final polls as 13 Pac-12 players garnered All-America honors. Oregon OT Penei Sewell and California LB Evan Weaver were consensus All-Americans, while Utah DE Bradlee Anae was a unanimous pick. Sewell won the Outland Trophy as the nation's top interior lineman and Weaver led the FBS in tackles with 182 (14.0 per game). Combining both on-field and off-field performances, Oregon QB Justin Herbert was recipient of the Campbell Trophy, honoring the college football's top scholar-athlete. He was also a first team Academic All-America for the second-straight year, repeating as the Academic Team Member of the Year.



MEN'S GOLF



Pac-12 teams captured 15 tournament titles during the shortened season with Oregon State and Washington each winning four. Arizona State paced the Pac-12 in the final *Golfweek* rankings at No. 7. In addition to the Sun Devils, the *Golfweek* Top 50 included No. 17 Washington, No. 21 Arizona, No. 26 USC, No. 29 UCLA, No. 31 Stanford, No. 32 California, and No. 36 Oregon State. USC freshman Yuxin Lin, one of the top amateurs in the world, was the top-ranked Pac-12 golfer by Golfstat at No. 24, leading USC in its season-opening event before traveling back to China to compete in the Asia-Pacific Amateur Championship, which he won for the second time in a two-hole playoff.

WOMEN'S GOLF

The Pac-12 was leading the charge heading into the postseason before the COVID-19 pandemic halted the Conference's chance at a fifth NCAA title in six seasons. Six teams were among *Golfweek's* final top 15, led by No. 1 USC, No. 5 Arizona State, No. 8 Arizona, No. 9 Stanford, No. 11 UCLA, and No. 15 Oregon. Highly-touted freshmen did not disappoint in their debut season as three were ranked among Golfstat's top 10: No. 4 Vivian Hou, Arizona; No. 7 Emma Spitz, UCLA; and No. 8 Linn Grant, Arizona State. Another five golfers were among the top 25. Arizona's Hou was named WGCA National Freshman of the Year. It was the ninth time in the last 12 years a Pac-12 golfer has earned the honor.



GYMNASTICS



Utah went undefeated in the regular season, claiming the league's first regular-season title. Led by first-year head coach Tom Farden, the Utes improved each week and brought their best to hostile environments, including at UCLA's Pauley Pavilion and Washington's Alaska Airlines Arena. The Pac-12 Championships were gearing up to be a battle for conference supremacy before it was canceled due to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. Bright stars, including 2019 Pac-12 Gymnast of the Year in Kyla Ross and was poised to win the award again for the second year in a row. The league finished with two teams in the top five in the country and five teams in the top 10 of the national standings.

LACROSSE

Despite the shortened season, Pac-12 lacrosse was able to play its non-conference slate in its entirety, as well as several Conference matchups. No. 7 USC led the league in the standings and boasted a 6-0 record before the season was brought to a halt because of the COVID-19 pandemic. Ranked No. 16 in the preseason IWLCA Coaches Poll, the Trojans steadily climbed up the rankings. Three of USC's wins came over ranked opponents, including No. 9 Michigan. USC goalie Riley Hertford was a standout in the early weeks of play, picking up three Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Week honors. Two more teams joined USC in the final top 25, No. 23 Stanford and No. 25 Colorado.



MEN'S ROWING



Washington men's rowing looked promising this year before the spring season was cut short after capturing sweeping all five races at the Head of the Lake Regatta in the fall, an event that featured over 450 entries from 83 teams. The Huskies were coming off an extremely successful 2019 campaign, winning their third-straight and 39th-program Pac-12 title, and were awarded the James Ten Eyck award at the 2019 IRA National Championships.

WOMEN'S ROWING

Five Pac-12 women's rowing teams were ranked in the CRCA/US Rowing Preseason Coaches top 20, including 2019 Pac-12 and NCAA Champion Washington at No. 1. Last year, the Huskies swept all three grand finals to win its fifth all-time NCAA Championship. Stanford earned a No. 2 ranking after coming in second at last spring's league championship and placing fourth at the national championship. California was voted No. 6, USC came in at No. 18, and UCLA rounded the poll out at No. 20.



MEN'S SOCCER



In 2019, the Washington Huskies ran away with the Pac-12 title for the first time since 2013, also the Conference's automatic bid. With Washington joined by Stanford and California in the NCAA Tournament, the Conference has sent at least three teams to the postseason for the fourth-straight year. Stanford advanced to its 21st all-time appearance in the NCAA Men's College Cup and finished No. 4 in the final United Soccer Coaches national poll. The Cardinal ranked in the top 10 in each of the 13 editions of the poll; Washington

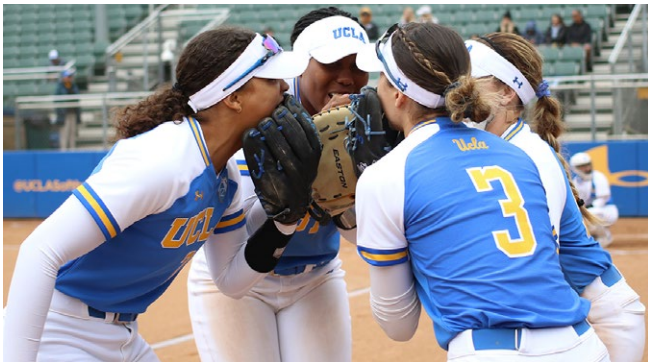
finished No. 6 after a 17-4-0 season, the most wins for the program since 1983. UCLA forward Milan Iloski tied for fourth in the nation with 17 goals on the year, leading the country with 1.06 goals per game.

WOMEN'S SOCCER

Stanford captured its third NCAA Championship, and sixth all-time, in penalty kicks to cap one of the most successful campaigns in Pac-12 history. The Cardinal went undefeated in Conference play to earn its unprecedented fifth-straight Pac-12 crown. Pac-12 teams were dominant throughout in 2019, boasting the nation's best record during non-conference play and in the postseason (.696, 19-8-1). For the first time ever, the Pac-12 sent three teams to the NCAA Women's College Cup, marking just the third occurrence by one conference in NCAA history. Making its ninth College Cup in 12 years, UCLA made its 11th appearance and Washington State advanced that far for the first time in program history. Stanford's Catarina Macario won her second-straight MAAC Hermann Trophy after a record-setting season.



SOFTBALL



In the shortened season, Pac-12 softball still dominated in the national statistics and top-25 polls. The final NFCA/*USA Today* Coaches poll was dominated by the Pac-12 as three teams were listed among the top four teams with No. 1 UCLA, No. 2 Washington and No. 4 Arizona. UCLA (.962), the Huskies (.920) and the Ducks (.917) had the top-three winning percentages in the country, respectively. Oregon's record was nearly perfect in the month of February, posting the second-longest win streak to begin a season in school history. Washington freshman Kelley Lynch broke the program record for most RBI in a freshman's first 20 games, a record that stood since 2000. The Conference finished 24-15 against ranked opponents and 180-43 overall.

MEN'S SWIMMING AND DIVING

California men's swimming captured its third-straight and seventh all-time Pac-12 Championship after collecting 10 individual and four relay titles. Standout Ryan Hoffer was named Pac-12 Swimmer of the Year and Pac-12 Swimmer of the Meet after capturing six titles, setting two meet records and posting the fastest 50-yard freestyle in the nation (18.87). Arizona State's Youssef Selim was voted Pac-12 Diver of the Year after earning eight individual wins this season, and finishing in the top five in the 1-meter and 3-meter to tie for the most individual points (47) at the Pac-12 Championships. Overall, Conference swimmers posted 21 NCAA 'A' cut times, set five Pac-12 Championship records and recorded three of the nation's fastest times.



WOMEN'S SWIMMING AND DIVING



In the final regular-season CSCAA Poll, defending national champion Stanford was ranked No. 1 for the fifth-straight year, winning the Pac-12 title for the fourth-consecutive year and notching its fifth-consecutive undefeated campaign. The Pac-12 tied for the most schools in the final top 10 with California at No. 4 and USC at No. 8. Cal senior Abbey Weitzeil set a new American, U.S. Open and NCAA record of 20.90 in the 50-yard freestyle. She was named the Honda Award winner, as well. USC's Louise Hansson was named the Pac-12 Swimmer of the Year, and her three individual and two relay titles in one Pac-12 Championship meet is a Trojan record. The Pac-12 had 55 student-athletes qualify for the 2020 NCAA Championships though the event was canceled.

MEN'S TENNIS

Three Pac-12 men's tennis teams finished in the final ITA top-25 rankings, including USC which maintained its No. 1 mark for five-consecutive weeks. Stanford was ranked No. 8 and UCLA was No. 22. The three schools each had a student-athlete earn ITA All-American honors, ranking in the nation's top 10, tying for the most of any conference. Leading the way was the Trojans' Daniel Cuckierman after recording a team-best 26-2 record this season, including an 11-1 dual-match mark. The league took down a total of 14 ranked teams this season, including 10 in the top 15.



WOMEN'S TENNIS



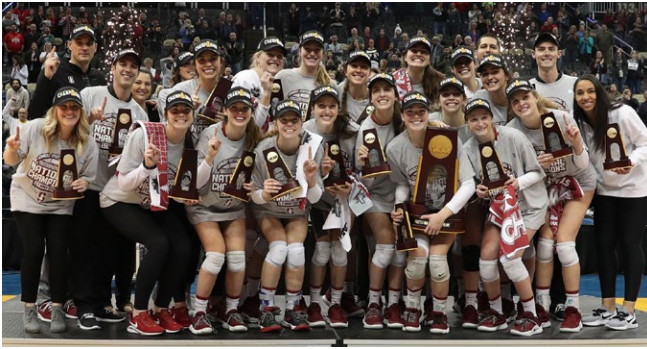
Three Pac-12 women's tennis teams finished the season in the ITA top 25 after opening the brief league slate just before the season was halted. Leading the way was UCLA at No. 3, 2019 NCAA Champion Stanford came in at No. 6 and Arizona State was ranked 18th. Six Conference teams earned national rankings throughout the season, with at least one team appearing in the top 10 every week. Five student-athletes were named to the ITA All-American team, including Haley Giavara of California, Michaela Gordon of Stanford, and UCLA's Abigail Forbes, Elysia Bolton, and Jada Hart.

MEN'S AND WOMEN'S TRACK & FIELD

Only two programs - California and USC - managed to compete in meets prior to the COVID-19 pandemic that brought the remainder of the highly-anticipated men's and women's outdoor track & field seasons to a halt. The Oregon men and USC women were the expected front-runners to defend their Conference crowns from 2019, with the Trojans also being heavy favorites for a second NCAA title in three years. The 2020 campaigns were to conclude on a historic note as the Pac-12 Championships were slated to be held at the University of Oregon's brilliantly renovated Hayward Field, which is now scheduled to host the 2021 NCAA Championships and 2022 World Athletics Championships, as well as future Pac-12 title meets. A combined 13 Pac-12 track & field student-athlete were voted CoSIDA Academic All-Americans with USC's Anna Cockrell earning the prestigious Team Member of the Year honor.



VOLLEYBALL



Winning its 19th all-time Pac-12 crown, Stanford showed complete domination in the postseason, dropping just two sets (both against Utah in the final 16) in the NCAA Tournament, en route to its second-straight national championship, third in four years, and NCAA-leading ninth all-time. Kathryn Plummer was named the tournament’s Most Outstanding Player after posting 48 kills in just six sets in the final two matches of the season. Six teams earned NCAA Tournament berths, the 20th-consecutive year at least that many teams earned postseason invitations. 12

Pac-12 student-athletes were named AVCA All-Americans. Washington State’s Magda Jehlárová was tabbed the AVCA National Freshman of the Year, the first-ever Coug to receive the honor. Stanford’s Jenna Gray was selected Honda Award winner.

WRESTLING

Arizona State earned its third Pac-12 title in four years, claiming its 19th Pac-12 overall, posting five individual titles. Stanford’s Shane Griffith (165) was tabbed Pac-12 Wrestler of the Year, as well as the Pac-12 Freshman/Newcomer of the Year, becoming the third Cardinal ever to be named Pac-12 Wrestler of the Year. Griffith was a perfect 28-0 and carried the second-longest winning streak in school history. Arizona State’s Zeke Jones was tabbed by his peers as Pac-12 Wrestling Coach of the Year for the third time (also 2017, 2018). Arizona State posted a 15-2 record, the first 15-win season in 31 years (1988-89), posting seven wins against top 25 teams, including a victory over then-No. 1 Penn State that ended the Nittany Lions 60-match win streak. Despite the absence of an NCAA Championships, Woods, Griffith, Valencia, Hall and Arizona State’s Joshua Shields (165) earned first team All-America honors.

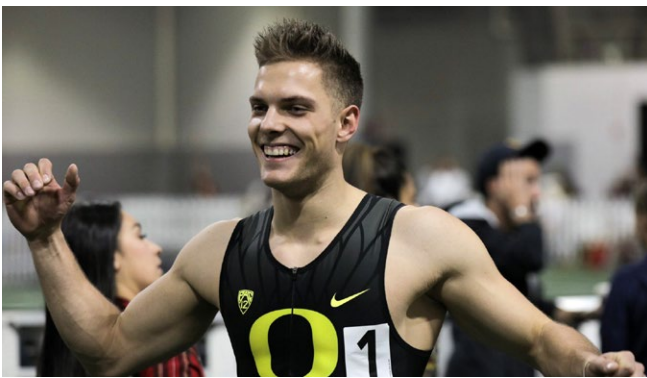


MEN'S GYMNASTICS

Two Pac-12 men's gymnastics teams were ranked in the nation's top-11 by the College Gymnastics Association, led by No. 1 Stanford. The reigning 2019 NCAA Champion posted six first-place finishes during the regular season as the Cardinal was looking to capture its seventh all-time national title. California finished the shortened season at No. 11 after recording four second-place and three third-place marks in regular-season meets.



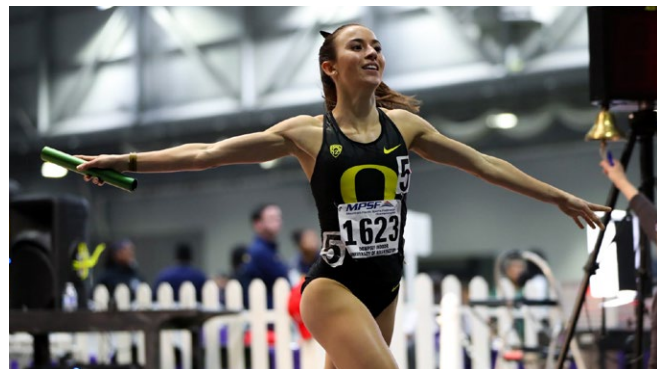
MEN'S INDOOR TRACK & FIELD



Oregon's Max Vollmer broke the MPSF Championships record in the heptathlon while teammate Rieker Daniel was named Athlete of the Meet after scoring 18 of the Ducks' 50 total points. Arizona (76 points) narrowly missed knocking off two-time champion BYU (80). The NCAA Championships were canceled due to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

WOMEN'S INDOOR TRACK & FIELD

Despite capturing just one (DMR) of the 17 events, the women of Oregon (104.5 points) captured the MPSF Championship by a healthy margin over defending champion and runner-up USC (73). USC's Bailey Lear (400m, 400m relay) earned Athlete of the Meet honors thanks to her role in setting two meet records. Washington's Olivia Gruver broke the MPSF mark in the pole vault and UCLA's Alyssa Wilson won both the shot put and weight throw to highlight top individual performances from the meet. The NCAA Championships were canceled due to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.



MEN'S VOLLEYBALL



UCLA and Stanford appeared in the final AVCA Coaches poll published before the 2020 campaign was halted, coming in at No. 9 and No. 14, respectively. Each team placed one student-athlete on the All-MPSF first team - the Bruins' Daenan Gyimah and the Cardinal's Jaylen Jasper. Adam Flood represented USC in the postseason honors, earning a spot on the All-Freshman team. A senior, Gyimah was also a first team AVCA All-American for his third-straight All-America honor.

MEN'S WATER POLO

Stanford claimed the NCAA title, its 11th national championship and first since 2002. All four Pac-12 teams finished in the top eight in the final CWPA rankings with No. 1 Stanford, No.2 USC (tied), No. 5 UCLA and No. 8 California. The Cardinal finished 21-2, the best record in the MPSF, and its winningest season since 2001 (22-1). The ACWPC named Stanford's Ben Hallock National Player of the Year and named John Vargas the National Coach of the Year. A Pac-12 institution has captured every men's water polo NCAA title every year since 1998 — California (14), Stanford (11), UCLA (11) and USC (10).



WOMEN'S WATER POLO



In the season's final polling that was published on March 17, the top-three spots were occupied by MPSF squads led by No. 1 USC, and Stanford and UCLA tied for second in the poll. Two more teams - No. 6 Arizona State and No. 9 California - appeared in the top 10, rounding out the ranked league teams. The MPSF slate was just getting underway when the season was cut short due to the global pandemic. The 2019 NCAA finalist Trojans were considered the preseason favorite to win the league, edging out the Bruins for the top spot in the MPSF Preseason Coaches poll by only two points. Defending NCAA Champion Stanford was picked third in the polling.

Built on a firm foundation of academic excellence and superior athletic performance, the Pac-12 Conference renewed its undisputed claim as the Conference of Champions® in 2019-20. Beyond the courts and fields, the Pac-12's accomplishments extend into the classrooms across 12 campuses, and outside its traditional geographic footprint into new corners around the world.

The only conference to win 500 NCAA Championships, the Pac-12 captured three of the seven national championships contested in 2019-20 before all sports competition was canceled due to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic adding to a legacy that includes 193 NCAA team titles claimed since 1999-2000 and 333 since 1981-82, the start of women's sports sponsorship, an average of over eight per year. Even more impressive has been the breadth of the Pac-12's success with championships coming in 28 different men's and women's sports. The Pac-12 has led or tied the nation in NCAA Championships in 54 of the last 60 years, with the exceptions coming no lower than third.

The Pac-12 has won the most or tied for the most NCAA titles for 15-consecutive seasons, winning at least six every year from 1999-2000 to 2018-19, winning a record 14 in 1996-97. No other conference has won double-digit NCAA championships in a single year.

Spanning over a century of outstanding athletics achievements, the Pac-12 has claimed 529 NCAA Championships (305 men's, 193 women's, 31 combined), over 200 more than the next league.

Pac-12 members have won 305 NCAA team championships on the men's side, 78 more than the next-closest conference. Men's NCAA crowns have come at a phenomenal rate for the Pac-12 - 16 basketball titles by six schools, 54 tennis titles, 47 outdoor track & field crowns, and 29 baseball titles. Pac-12 members have won 25 of 49 NCAA titles in volleyball, 46 of 51 in water polo, 31 in skiing, and 25 in swimming & diving national championships.

On the women's side, the story is much the same. Since the NCAA began conducting women's championships 39 years ago, Pac-12 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season on 29 occasions, including every year since 2000-01 except two (2012-13 and the 2019-20-shortened campaign). Pac-12 teams have captured 193 NCAA women's titles, easily outdistancing the SEC, which is second with 106. Pac-12 members have dominated a number of sports, winning 24 softball titles, 24 tennis crowns, 17 volleyball titles, 19 of the last 30 trophies in golf, and 17 in swimming & diving.

Individually, the Conference has produced an impressive number of NCAA individual champions. Over 2,000 (2,379) individual crowns have been won by Pac-12 student-athletes over the years with 1,383 by male student-athletes. Pac-12 women student-athletes have captured an unmatched 808 NCAA individual crowns, an average of nearly 21 championships per season. Student-athletes have also captured 188 individual titles at combined championships (i.e., skiing and fencing).

The Pac-12's excellence is further proven in the annual Division I Learfield IMG College Directors' Cup competition, the prestigious award that honors the best overall collegiate athletics programs in the country. STANFORD won an unprecedented 25th-consecutive Directors' Cup in 2018-19 to lead the Conference with at least five member institutions earning scores in the top 25 each year of the Directors' Cup program. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Directors' Cup was not awarded in 2019-20.

2019-20 REVIEW

Seven NCAA Championships were contested during the 2019-20 campaign before the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic led to the cancellation of competition in mid-March, including the remainder of the national championships. Stanford alone was en route to a special season, claiming three of the seven titles as no other school claimed multiple titles. Nine Pac-12 teams finished among the top four out of a possible 28 at the championships, representing five different Pac-12 institutions. The Cardinal won titles this season in men's water polo, women's soccer and women's volleyball, extending its streak of at least one NCAA team title to 44 years.

Stanford also posted top-four finishes in women's cross country and men's soccer, while Colorado came in third at the men's cross country national meet and USC placed in a tie for third in men's water polo. Three-quarters of the NCAA Women's College Cup hailed from the Pac-12 for the first time ever with WASHINGTON STATE making its first-ever appearance in the national semifinal, joining the Cardinal and UCLA.

The Pac-12 Champion OREGON Ducks capped a 12-2 season with a one-point Rose Bowl Game victory over Wisconsin, 28-27, as the Conference went 4-3 in the postseason. The Ducks finished the season ranked No. 5, while UTAH came in at No. 16 in the final polls. Oregon handily won its third Pac-12 Football Championship Game at Levi's Stadium in Santa Clara, Calif., defeating the Utes, 37-15, as CJ Verdell was named the game's Most Valuable Player. In the postseason, ARIZONA STATE was a winner at the Tony the Tiger Sun Bowl in El Paso, Texas, (vs. Florida State, 20-14), CALIFORNIA won the Redbox

Bowl in Santa Clara, Calif. (vs. Illinois, 35-20) and WASHINGTON had a commanding win at the Mitsubishi Motors Las Vegas Bowl (vs. Boise State, 38-7). Postseason bids were also extended to USC (SDCCU Holiday Bowl), Utah (Valero Alamo Bowl) and WASHINGTON STATE (Cheez-It Bowl). As many as 13 Pac-12 student-athletes were named All-Americans at season's end. Combining both on-field and off-field performances, Oregon quarterback Justin Herbert was recipient of the Campbell Trophy, honoring the college football's top scholar-athlete. He was also named first team Academic All-America for the second straight year and repeated as the Academic Team Member of the Year completing a school-record 827 passes for 10,541 yards and 95 touchdowns for his career while earning his degree in general science with an emphasis in biology. Oregon offensive tackle Penei Sewell and California linebacker Evan Weaver were consensus All-America selections, while Utah defensive end Bradelee Anae was a unanimous selection. Sewell was honored with the Outland Trophy as the nation's top interior lineman, while Weaver led the FBS in tackles with 182 (14.0 per game). Herbert was the Pac-12's top selection in the NFL draft as a first round pick/sixth overall by the Los Angeles Chargers.

The 2019-20 men's basketball campaign was also cut short, with the season coming to an abrupt end on March 12, 2020, prior to the start of the Pac-12 Tournament quarterfinals, due to national and global concerns stemming from the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. Prior to that, OREGON and Payton Pritchard dominated the hardwood. The Conference's Player of the Year and consensus first team All-American, Pritchard became the second player to lead the league in scoring, assists and threes in a season to propel the Ducks to the outright Pac-12 regular-season title by a game over runner-up UCLA. Pritchard was also named the Bob Cousy Point Guard of the Year by the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame and the Lute Olson National Player of the Year. Another outstanding Pac-12 career came to close as OREGON STATE's Tres Tinkle concluded his four years in the Conference's all-time top 10 in scoring (overall and Conference-only), field goal attempts, and free throws made and attempted. The remainder of the NCAA Division I season, including March Madness, was subsequently canceled with the Pac-12 projected to have at least six NCAA Tournament berths. Six teams reached the 20-win plateau during the 2019-20 regular season, equaling the most ever for the Conference.

With wins in football, men's basketball and women's basketball during 2019-20, Oregon became the first school in Conference history to sweep the three league titles in the same season.

Pac-12 women's basketball has established itself as a premier league in the sport, riding a wave of success in recent years that includes winning the most NCAA Tournament games of any conference in the last four postseasons. In 2019-20, the Pac-12 was the most talked about conference in women's basketball beginning with OREGON's historic exhibition win over Team USA before the season started. Led by consensus national player of the year and three-time Pac-12 Player of the Year Sabrina Ionescu, the Ducks went on to win the regular-season for the third year in a row and cut down the nets of the Pac-12 Tournament for the second time in three years in the event's new home at the Mandalay Bay Events Center in Las Vegas. The league boasted the No. 1 conference RPI and five teams were expected to receive top-16 NCAA Tournament seeds, as was announced in the final NCAA reveal in the first week of March. For the first time ever, six Pac-12 teams were ranked in the final Associated Press poll with Oregon (No. 2), STANFORD (No. 7) and UCLA (No. 10) appearing in the top 10. A record number of Pac-12 student-athletes were also nationally recognized this season, including four that were tabbed Naismith Hall of Fame/WBCA Starting Five winners, three alone coming from Oregon, with Ionescu winning the Nancy Lieberman Award for the third-straight year. Ionescu's stellar collegiate campaign included becoming the first-ever men's or women's player in NCAA history to tally 2,000 points, 1,000 rebounds and 1,000 assists. She is, by far, the NCAA leader in triple-doubles, recording 26 for her career. She broke the Pac-12 all-time assists record, passing Hall of Famer Gary Payton, and finishing fourth all-time in NCAA women's history. A record number were also tabbed All-Americans with as many as five receiving national recognition including three from Oregon, ARIZONA and UCLA. Pac-12 teams have advanced to 10 of the last 12 NCAA Women's Final Fours. In 2019, the Pac-12 went a combined 11-1 in the first two rounds, the best record for a conference since 1997.

Four years ago, the STANFORD freshman class came in with plenty of expectations and they did not disappoint. With Kathryn Plummer leading a team with no less than four All-Americans, the Cardinal won its NCAA-leading ninth NCAA title and third in four years. The Cardinal, and Plummer, were dominant in the postseason after winning its 19th all-time Pac-12 title, dropping just two sets in the tournament to fellow league-opponent UTAH, who also had a record season. Joining the Cardinal and Utes in the postseason were UCLA, USC, WASHINGTON and WASHINGTON STATE. Twelve student-athletes were tabbed All-Americans by the American Volleyball Coaches Association with WSU's Magda Jehlarova becoming the first-ever Cougar to be named AVCA National Freshman of the Year. Four teams also appeared in the final AVCA Coach-



es poll. The Pac-12 has won a NCAA-record 17 of 39 NCAA titles awarded.

The Pac-12 baseball and softball seasons abruptly came to an end just before league play got underway because of the COVID-19 pandemic. UCLA was leading the country with the lowest hits allowed per nine innings average (4.97) and best WHIP (0.87). Six Pac-12 student-athletes were named to the 2020 Golden Spikes Award watch list and two were named to the NCBWA Stopper of the Year preseason watch list. The Pac-12 has had nine Golden Spikes Award winners all-time, leading all other conferences. The Pac-12 has, by far, won the most baseball national titles of any conference in the country, claiming 29 titles dating back to 1947 when the first NCAA Championship was contested, including 2019 winner Oregon State.

The Pac-12 has historically dominated the softball field, as well, claiming a national record 24 NCAA titles in the 38-year history of the championship, the most recent coming in 2019 when UCLA captured its 13th all-time. Pac-12 teams captured an unprecedented nine in a row from 1988-1997, then claimed six-straight from 2006-11. At least one Pac-12 team has reached the NCAA Women's College World Series championship series 30 times. Three teams were among the top-five in the national polls when the season was cancelled in mid-March, including UCLA and WASHINGTON occupying Nos. 1 and 2 in the USA Today/NFCA poll, with ARIZONA ranking in the top five. Twelve student-athletes across five schools were named to the USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year Watch List, 10 in total were tabbed preseason All-Americans.

PAC-12 CONFERENCE HISTORY

The roots of the Pac-12 Conference date back more than 100 years to December 2, 1915, when the Pacific Coast Conference (PCC) was founded at a meeting at the Imperial Hotel in Portland, Oregon. The original membership consisted of four schools - the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Washington, the University of Oregon, and Oregon Agricultural College (now Oregon State University). All four are still charter members of the Conference.

Pacific Coast Conference play began in 1916 and, one year later, Washington State College (now Washington State University) was accepted into the league, with Stanford University following in 1918.

In 1922, the PCC expanded to eight teams with the admission of the University of Southern California (USC) and the University of Idaho. In 1924, the University of Montana joined the league roster and in 1928, the PCC grew to 10 members with the addition of UCLA.

The Pacific Coast Conference competed as a 10-member league until 1950, with the exception of 1943-45 when World War II curtailed intercollegiate athletic competition to a minimum. During that time, the league's first commis-

sioner was named. Edwin N. Atherton was Commissioner in 1940 and was succeeded by Victor O. Schmidt in 1944. In 1950, Montana resigned from the Conference and the PCC continued as a nine-team Conference through 1958.

In 1959, the PCC was dissolved and the Athletic Association of Western Universities (AAWU) was formed with Thomas J. Hamilton appointed Commissioner of the new league. The original AAWU membership included California, Stanford, USC, UCLA, and Washington. Washington State joined the membership in 1962, while Oregon and Oregon State joined in 1964. Under Hamilton's watch, the name Pacific-8 Conference was adopted in 1968. In 1971, Wiles Hallock took over as Commissioner of the Pac-8.

Ten years later, on July 1, 1978, the University of Arizona and Arizona State University were admitted to the league and the Pacific-10 Conference became a reality. In 1986-87, the league took on a new look, expanding to include 10 women's sports. Since then, the Conference has been considered the premier league in women's athletics, securing the most NCAA titles in women's sports of any conference nearly every year.

Thomas C. Hansen was named the Commissioner of the Pac-10 in 1983, a role he would hold for 26 years until 2009, when he was succeeded by current Commissioner Larry Scott.

The University of Colorado accepted its invitation to join the Pac-12 on June 11, 2010, and on June 17, 2010, the University of Utah agreed to join the Conference. The Conference became the Pac-12 and officially began competition on July 1, 2011.

It was during the 2010-11 academic year that Scott helped deliver monumental changes that transformed the Conference into a modern 12-team league. In addition to expanding to 12 teams, member institutions agreed to equal revenue sharing for the first time in the Conference's history, created two football divisions - the North and the South, and established a Football Championship Game for the first time. He also secured landmark media rights deals with ESPN and FOX that dramatically increased national exposure and revenue for each school, in addition to establishing Pac-12 Networks which guaranteed enhanced exposure across all sports.

Currently, the Pac-12 sponsors 11 men's sports and 13 women's sports, with the most recent additions coming in the 2017-18 (women's lacrosse) and 2015-16 (beach volleyball) academic years. Additionally, the Conference is a member of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) in four other men's sports and two women's sports.

The Pac-12 Conference offices are located in the heart of San Francisco in the SOMA district.

Two Pac-12 baseball teams earned spots in the final USA Today Baseball Coaches top-25 including UCLA at No. 4 and ARIZONA STATE at No. 10. The league was off to a hot start before the season came to a halt, recording eight ranked wins, five upsets and 17 series wins, nine of which were perfect sweeps. Two of those ranked wins came from USC and then-No. 2 UCLA after defeating then-No. 5 and 2019 NCAA Champion Vanderbilt in the Southern California College Baseball Classic. The Conference finished in the top-15 nationally in ERA (No. 3 UCLA, 1.88), shutouts (No. 12 UCLA, 3) and on-base percentage (No. 13 Arizona, 0.417).

The Bruins were top contenders this year as their 13-2 record led the league heading into Pac-12 play. UCLA premiered the spring with a 12-game win streak, the program's best season-start since 2010. Arizona State was in second after going 13-4 in non-conference competition with the help of standout Spencer Torkelson as he led the country in walks (31) and walks per game (1.82), and had the fourth-most runs (24) in the nation. ARIZONA and USC were tied for third with a 10-5 record.

The USA Today Preseason Coaches Poll featured four Pac-12 teams as 2019 Pac-12 Champion UCLA led the way at No. 8, followed by Arizona State at No. 13, STANFORD at No. 15, and OREGON STATE at No. 25. The Pac-12 had nine total preseason All-America selections from three different schools. Four student-athletes were named to all five preseason All-America lists, including Arizona's Austin Wells, Arizona State's Spencer Torkelson, and UCLA's Holden Powell and Garrett Mitchell. Junior infielder Torkelson was selected first team for all five lists and was also named the 2020 Collegiate Baseball Projected Player of the Year. Junior pitchers Erik Tolman of Arizona State and UCLA's Powell were selected to NCBWA Stopper of the Year Watch List.

Six Pac-12 student-athletes were named to the 2020 Golden Spikes Award Watch List, including consensus preseason all-americans Wells and Torkelson. The list is further highlighted by fellow Sun Devil infielders Alika Williams and Gage Workman, Mitchell and Powell.

Twelve Pac-12 student-athletes were selected in the 2020 MLB Draft including Torkelson, who was the No. 1 overall pick by the Detroit Tigers. The Pac-12 has produced four No. 1 overall picks in the last 10 drafts and a NCAA-best eight all-time.

Despite this year's shortened draft Arizona State had five picks for the third-straight year while six Pac-12 institutions were represented in the draft. Arizona and UCLA also had a pair of student-athletes chosen, with Oregon State, USC and Washington State each having one pick.

The 2019-20 Pac-12 campaign will be remembered for two things - the dominance of **Payton Pritchard** and the Oregon Ducks, and the global pandemic that prematurely halted the season. Conference Player of the Year and consensus first team All-American Pritchard became the second player to lead the league in scoring, assists and threes in a season (Damon Stoudarmire, ARIZ, 1994-95), propelling the Ducks to the outright Pac-12 regular-season title by a game over runner-up UCLA.

Oregon never had an opportunity to defend its 2019 Pac-12 Tournament title though as the event - as well as the remainder of the NCAA Division I season including March Madness - was canceled on March 12 due to national and global concerns stemming from the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. The Pac-12 had six teams reach the 20-win plateau during the 2019-20 regular season, equaling the most ever for the Conference.

Coupled with its crowns in football and women's basketball during 2019-20, Oregon became the first school in Conference history to sweep the three league titles in the same season.

Along with his league and All-America honors, Pritchard was also named the Bob Cousy Point Guard of the Year by the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame and the Lute Olson National Player of the Year. Another outstanding Pac-12 career came to close as OREGON STATE's **Tres Tinkle** concluded his four years in the Conference's all-time top 10 in scoring (overall and Conference-only), field goal attempts, and free throws made and attempted.

ARIZONA's **Zeke Nnaji** was voted the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year. COLORADO's **Tyler Bey** was selected Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year, UCLA's **Chris Smith** earned Most Improved Player of the Year and ARIZONA STATE's **Alonzo Verge Jr.** was tabbed Pac-12 Sixth Man of the Year. In his first season on the UCLA bench, **Mick Cronin** became the seventh head coach to win the Conference's John R. Wooden Coach of the Year award in his debut season.

Led by consensus national player of the year **Sabrina Ionescu** of Oregon and despite the abrupt end to the season, Pac-12 women's basketball still achieved the highest levels of success equal to the achievements of recent seasons when it became the winningest conference in the last four NCAA Tournaments. The Ducks swept the Conference crowns, winning the regular season for the third year in a row and the tournament title for the second time in three years.

For the first time ever, six Pac-12 teams were ranked in the final *Associated Press* poll. Three appeared in the top-10, also a first for the league, with the Ducks posting their highest-ever final ranking at No. 2. STANFORD finished No. 7, placing in the top-10 for the second-straight year. UCLA (No. 10) garnered its third top-10 final ranking in five years. ARIZONA ended at No. 12, making its first appearance in the final poll since 2003 and its highest final ranking since 1998. At No. 14, OREGON STATE is in the final AP poll for the sixth year in a row, appearing in the top-15 in each of those years, and ARIZONA STATE rounded out the poll at No. 25.

Ionescu claimed all the hardware, taking home the WBCA Wade Trophy, Naismith Trophy and John R. Wooden Trophy, also winning the Associated Press' and USBWA's national top honor. She is the second consensus national player of the year in four seasons from the Pac-12.

A record number of Pac-12 student-athletes were recognized nationally beginning with four of the Naismith Hall of Fame/WBCA Starting Five coming from the Conference, including Oregon's trio of Ionescu, **Ruthy Hebard** and **Satou Sabally**. Arizona's **Aari McDonald** also nabbed the top shooting guard honor while Ionescu is just the second point guard in the history of the Nancy Lieberman Award, along with UConn great Sue Bird, to win the honor three times. A record number of All-Americans were selected from the Pac-12 with as many as five receiving national recognition including three from Oregon (Ionescu, Hebard and Sabally), Arizona (McDonald) and UCLA (**Michaela Onyenwere**).

Five Pac-12 teams appeared in the NCAA women's basketball committee's final Top-16 reveal announced on March 2, with Oregon, Stanford, UCLA, Arizona and Oregon State presumably receiving top-16 seeds. The Conference was projected to have six NCAA Tournament teams with Arizona State joining the field.

Ionescu was the Pac-12 Player of the Year for the third-consecutive year, the first in league history to claim the honor three-straight years and the second to win it three times. USC forward **Alissa Pili** was the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year, the first Trojan in 10 years to win the award. McDonald was the Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year and the Ducks' **Taylor Chavez** was tabbed Pac-12 Sixth Player of the Year. For the second-straight year, Oregon's **Kelly Graves** was the Pac-12 Coach of the Year.

Two-time defending NCAA and Pac-12 beach volleyball champion UCLA appeared to be on its way to making a run for a third-consecutive crown. As the highest-ranked league team in the final AVCA Coaches poll at No. 2 when the season came to an abrupt end due to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, the Bruins, who were the preseason No. 1 team in the country, had already recorded 10 wins over ranked opponents, going 13-2 so far.

Six of nine Pac-12 teams were ranked in the final published top-20 poll of the season on March 9, including three in the top 10. In addition to UCLA earning a No. 2 ranking, USC was No. 6 and CALIFORNIA was No. 9, followed by ARIZONA at No. 17, STANFORD at No. 19 and ARIZONA STATE at No. 20. The Bears were coming off a record 2019 campaign and well on their way to making a strong case for a NCAA Tournament bid. The Trojans were under the direction of first-year head coach **Dain Blanton** who took over the reins after legendary head coach **Anna Collier** retired at the conclusion of the 2019 campaign.

UCLA took the season's first Pac-12 Pair of the Week honor on Feb. 25 with the duo of **Savvy Simo** and **Abby Van Winkle** earning the nod after playing at the No. 1 position for the first time in their careers. Cal's **Madison Dueck** and **Alexia Inman** claimed the weekly nod the following week.

Anchored by national runner-up Joe Klecker, COLORADO reached the podium for the second-straight year to lead the Pac-12's performance at the 2019 NCAA Championships. It marked the 14th year in a row the league landed a men's program on the podium, and coupled with STANFORD's sixth-place finish and OREGON in ninth, the Conference posts a trio of programs in the top 10 for the fourth time in the past five years.

The Pac-12 paced the nation in men's All-Americans for the second-consecutive year and eighth time in the last nine years as the league boasted seven top-40 finishers, tied with the Big Ten for the most in the field. Since expanding in 2011, Pac-12 men's cross country leads all leagues with 75 total All-Americans and 15 top-five team finishes.

Along with his career-best showing at the national meet, CU's Klecker captured his first Pac-12 individual title to lead the Buffaloes to their seventh league championship in their nine seasons in the Conference.

2019 Pac-12 champion STANFORD posted its third consecutive top-5 showing at the NCAA Championships by finishing third behind first-time national titlist Arkansas (96) and runner-up BYU (102). Notably, UTAH placed a program-best 16th in its third-ever NCAA Championship appearance to cap its best campaign in school history.

As a league, the Pac-12 accounted for seven women's top-40 finishers to lead all conferences in All-Americans for the fourth consecutive year. Since expanding in 2011, the Pac-12 now leads all leagues with 84 total women's All-Americans, more than double the next closest conference, and 18 top-5 women's team finishes.

Noteworthy on the individual side, a trio of Pac-12 women's runners capped their outstanding careers as four-time All-Americans in COLORADO's Sage Hurta, Stanford's Fiona O'Keeffe and WASHINGTON's Katie Rainsberger.

The Cardinal cruised to the Pac-12 title behind a 1-2-3 finish from O'Keeffe, Ella Donaghu and Jessica Lawson. Stanford's victorious 27 points – which included a fourth top-10 showing from Jordan Oakes (eighth) – tied for the fifth-fewest in the 34-year history of the women's Championship and were the fewest since Washington's record-setting mark of 15 in 2008.

The Pac-12 Champion OREGON Ducks cap a 12-2 season with Rose Bowl Game victory as the Pac-12 goes 4-3 in the postseason. The Ducks finish the season ranked No. 5, while UTAH comes in at No. 16 in the final polls.

Thirteen Pac-12 players garnered All-America honors for their on-field performance. Oregon sophomore offensive tackle **Penei Sewell** and CALIFORNIA senior linebacker **Evan Weaver** were consensus All-America selections, while UTAH defensive end **Bradlee Anae** was a unanimous selection. Sewell was honored with the Outland Trophy as the nation's top interior lineman, while Weaver led the FBS in tackles with 182 (14.0 per game).

Combining both on-field and off-field performances, Oregon senior quarterback **Justin Herbert** was recipient of the Campbell Trophy, honoring the college football's top scholar-athlete. Herbert, who carried a 4.01 gpa, was also named first team Academic All-America for the second straight year and repeated as the Academic Team Member of the Year. He earned his degree in general science with an emphasis in biology, while completing a school record 827 passes for 10,541 yards and 95 touchdowns during his career. Joining Herbert on the Academic All-America team was WASHINGTON STATE senior wide receiver **Brandon Arconado**. Arconado, who carries a 3.65 gpa, owns a bachelor's degree in management information systems and is working towards his master's degree in business administration. On the field, Arconado had 78 receptions for 1,109 yards (Pac-12 leading 100.8 ypg) and seven touchdowns.

WASHINGTON STATE senior quarterback **Anthony Gordon** set Pac-12 single-season records for completions (493), passing yardage (5,579), most yards gained (5,579) and touchdowns (48). For good measure, Gordon also set the Pac-12 single-game record with nine touchdown passes (vs. UCLA).

USC freshman quarterback **Kedon Slovis** set an FBS record for completion percentage by a freshman as he connected on 282-of-392 pass attempts for 71.9 percent, 3,502 yards and 30 touchdowns. ARIZONA STATE freshman quarterback **Jayden Daniels** completed 205-of-308 pass attempts for 66.5 percent, 2,943 yards and 17 touchdowns. In the process, Daniels threw just two interceptions to set a Pac-12 record for lowest percentage of passes had intercepted with fewer than 350 attempts (0.59), and rushed for 355 yards ... Six Pac-12 freshmen, which was more than any other conference, were named to the Football Writer's Association of America Freshman All-America Team - USC's Slovis, UCLA OL **Sean Rhyan** and PR **Kyle Phillips**, OREGON DL **Kayvon Thibodeaux** and DB **Verone McKinley III**, and OREGON STATE LB **Omar Speights**.

UTAH senior quarterback **Tyler Huntley** established a Pac-12 single-season record for completion percentage as he completed 220-of-301 for 73.1 percent, while senior running back **Zack Moss** set a school career record with 4,067 rushing yards and 38 rushing touchdowns. The duo carried the Utes to back-to-back Pac-12 South Division crowns.

In addition to the Sun Devils, the *Golfweek* Top 50 included No. 17 WASHINGTON , No. 21 ARIZONA, No. 26 USC, No. 29 UCLA, No. 31 STANFORD, No. 32 CALIFORNIA, and No. 36 OREGON STATE.

USC freshman **Yuxin Lin**, one of the top amateurs in the world, was the top-ranking Pac-12 golfer in *Golfstat's* individual rankings at No. 24. His freshman season got off to a bang by leading USC in its season-opening event before traveling back to China to compete in the Asia-Pacific Amateur Championship, which he won (for the second time) in a two-hole playoff. Pac-12 women's golf was leading the charge heading into the postseason before COVID-19 ended the Conference's chance at a fifth NCAA title in six seasons. Six teams were among *Golfweek's* top 15, led by No. 1 USC, No. 5 ARIZONA STATE, No. 8 ARIZONA, No. 9 STANFORD, No. 11 UCLA, and No. 15 OREGON. Pac-12 teams won 11 tournaments and 49 times finished among the top five as each team posted a top-five finish during the season.

Ten additional golfers were among the top 50, led by No. 13 **Aline Krauter**, Stanford; No. 15 **Allisen Corpuz**, USC; No. 18 **Yusang Hou**, Arizona; No. 19 **Angelina Ye**, Stanford; No. 24 **Sofie Nielsen**, Oregon; No. 26 **Alyaa Abdulghany**, USC; No. 30 **Emilie Paltrinieri**, UCLA; No. 31 **Amelia Garvey**, USC; No. 35 **Olivia Mehaffey**, Arizona State; and No. 45 **Alessandra Fanali**, Arizona State.

Arizona's Hou was named WGCA National Freshman of the Year. The ninth time in the last 12 years a Pac-12 golfer has earned the honor.

WGCA NATIONAL FRESHMAN OF THE YEAR: Vivian Hou, Arizona



UTAH went undefeated in the sport's inaugural year of having a regular-season Conference champion. The Pac-12 Championships were positioned to be a battle before it was canceled due to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. The league had many bright stars including 2019 Pac-12 Gymnast of the Year UCLA's **Kyla Ross**, Pac-12 Specialist of the Year Utah's **Kim Tessen** and Pac-12 Freshman of the Year CALIFORNIA's **Neveah DeSouza**. The league finished with six teams in the WCGA top 25 led by No. 3 UCLA.

Ross earned the league's Gymnast of the Year title in back-to-back years becoming just the second Pac-12 gymnast to accomplish THE feat. The senior has completed a historic collegiate career with 22 perfect 10s and was the only student-athlete this season to be named to the All-Pac-12 in each event. Ross secured three career-bests on vault (10.0), bars (two 10.0s) and in the all-around (39.825), also leading UCLA with 34 individual titles out of a possible 45 this season.

Team captain Tessen had a breakout season, capturing the Pac-12 Specialist of the Year title while helping to lead the Ute's to their first undefeated regular season since 1993 and first-ever Pac-12 regular-season title. She also guided Utah in knocking off the three-highest ranked league teams on the road. Tessen recorded a team-high 10 event victories this winter including a career-high perfect score on vault helping her become one of just six gymnasts in the NCAA to score a 10 on apparatus this year.

California's DeSouza completes her first-collegiate season with a league-best three Pac-12 Freshman of the Week honors. She was named Pac-12 Freshman of the Year after posting the highest all-around score by a Conference freshman (39.475) this year while earning a spot on the All-Pac-12 All-Around team. DeSouza has competed in the all-around in each of the 10 Golden Bears' meets and has posted season-high totals of 9.90 or above on vault (9.925), bars (9.90) and beam (9.90).

Pac-12 Coach of the Year **Tom Farden** led Utah to its second-ever undefeated regular season (11-0 overall, 7-0 in the Pac-12) in his first year as head coach, mentoring his squad to claim the first-ever Pac-12 regular-season crown.

Despite the shortened season, Pac-12 lacrosse was able to play much of its non-conference slate and several Conference matchups. No. 7 USC led the league in the standings and was one of the country's eight remaining undefeated teams, boasting a 6-0 overall record. The Trojans steadily climbed the rankings throughout the season after being ranked No. 16 in the IWLCAs Coaches Preseason Poll. Three of USC's wins came over ranked opponents, including No. 9 Michigan, No. 15 Boston College and No. 25 STANFORD.

USC goalie **Riley Hertford** was a standout in the early weeks of play, nabbing three Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Week honors. Hertford received her fifth-career Pac-12 weekly honor, a Conference record.

In the national statistics rankings, Hertford finished the season ranked second in the country in save percentage (.561) and helped the Trojans finish third in the country in save percentage (.544). ARIZONA STATE goalie **Berkeley Bonneau** finished fifth in ground balls per game (4.38).

COLORADO attacker **Charlie Rudy** recorded a career-high eight goals as the then-No. 24 Buffaloes defeated Coastal Carolina, 19-8, on March 8. Rudy tied a program and Conference single-game record as she improved upon her previous-high of five goals. Stanford's **Ali Baiocco** set a Pac-12 single-game record with 15 shots at Northwestern on March 1. Arizona State set a Pac-12 single-game mark in points after tallying 36 points against Detroit Mercy on Feb. 14, and scored a Conference-record 24 goals in the game.

Three teams were ranked in the final IWLCAs Coaches Poll, with No. 7 USC, No. 23 Stanford and No. 25 Colorado. It marks the third-consecutive season and third time ever that three Pac-12 schools rank in the final top-25.

WASHINGTON (17-4-0) posted an 8-2-0 Conference record and the Huskies earned UW's first Pac-12 men's soccer title since 2013. UW's 17 victories were the second-most in program history and the team's eight league wins were the most for the Huskies since the Pac-12 began sponsoring men's soccer in 2000. Washington earned the No. 6 overall seed in the NCAA Tournament and picked up postseason victories over Boston College (2-0) and Marshall (4-1) before bowing out to eventual champion Georgetown in the quarterfinals.

STANFORD finished the season 14-3-5 and reached the NCAA College Cup for the fourth time in five years. Stanford earned the No. 7 overall seed in the NCAA Tournament and advanced past Seattle U (1-1, 2-1 PKs), Virginia Tech (2-1), and Clemson (1-1, 5-4 PKs) before falling in the national semifinal to eventual champion Georgetown.

OREGON STATE finished 8-6-2 overall and 5-3-2 in Conference play to finish third in the league. Head coach **Terry Boss**' first two years at the helm have seen the Beavers record consecutive seasons of at least five league wins (2018: 6-3-1) for the first time since 2000.

CALIFORNIA finished the year 8-7-3 and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the 20th time in program history. Cal secured road victories against then-No. 1 Washington (Nov. 7) and then-No. 4 Stanford (Nov. 14) ahead of postseason play. The Bears' upset win over Washington was historic for head coach **Kevin Grimes** as he became Cal's all-time winningest head coach in men's soccer with 203 wins.

UCLA finished 6-9-3 overall in head coach **Ryan Jorden**'s first year at the helm. UCLA picked up a big early-season victory (Sept. 6) over 2018 national champion Maryland. Junior midfielder **Milan Iloski**, a First Team All-Pac-12 honoree, led the Conference with 17 goals, the most a Bruin has scored in a single-season since 2011.

Two Pac-12 players were selected in the first two rounds of the 2020 MLS SuperDraft, including Stanford's **Tanner Beason** at No. 12 overall and Cal's **Simon Lekressner** at No. 30 overall.

STANFORD went undefeated in Conference play to earn its unprecedented fifth-straight Pac-12 crown. The Cardinal also captured its third program and league's sixth all-time NCAA title to cap one of the Pac-12's most successful campaigns in league history.

Pac-12 women's soccer was dominant throughout the 2019 season as it accounted for the nation's best record during non-conference (.815, 77-14-9) and in NCAA Tournament play (.696, 19-8-1). The Conference had nine NCAA Tournament participants, equaling the most in league history (2014), tying for the most in the tournament field. Seven teams advanced to the second round, equaling the most in for the Conference since 2014, and four teams made it to the third round and quarterfinal round, the most in the nation and for the first time in Pac-12 history.

For the first time ever, three Pac-12 teams earned a spot in the NCAA Women's College Cup, also marking just the third time by one conference in NCAA history (ACC - 2011, 2013). WASHINGTON STATE made program history advancing to its first-ever College Cup while UCLA and Stanford met for the first Pac-12 semifinal match in league history.

Earning her third-straight major Conference award with the league's coaches voting her the Pac-12 Midfielder of the Year (named the Forward of the Year in 2017 and 2018), Stanford's **Catarina Macario** won her second-straight and the league's sixth MAAC Hermann Trophy. The prestigious honor is presented annually to the nation's top-collegiate women's soccer player. Fellow Cardinal **Naomi Girma** was selected Pac-12 Defender of the Year and USC's **Tara McKeown** was voted Pac-12 Forward of the Year. California's **Angelina Anderson** was tabbed Pac-12 Freshman and Goalkeeper of the Year, and **Lesle Gallimore** of WASHINGTON was voted Pac-12 Coach of the Year for the second time in her career and first time since 2000.

Pac-12 softball dominated in national statistics and rankings, including the top-25 polls, throughout the entire shortened season. Three Pac-12 teams were among the top four in the final published USA Today/NFCA Coaches poll with No. 1 UCLA atop the poll, followed by No. 2 WASHINGTON and No. 4 ARIZONA. Two more were in the top 15 with OREGON coming in at No. 9 and ARIZONA STATE at No. 15. A Pac-12 team occupied the top spot in the poll in all six weeks of the season.

UCLA (.962), Washington (.920) and Oregon (.917) posted the top-three win percentages in the country, respectively. Oregon's record was nearly perfect in the month of February, recording the second-longest win streak to begin a year in school history.

Freshmen were a highlight to the shortened campaign. Earning three Pac-12 Freshman of the Week honors, Washington freshman Kelley Lynch was on her way to having a dominating collegiate debut, breaking the program record for most RBI in a freshman's first 20 games, a record that stood since 2000. UCLA freshman Maya Brady opened the season claiming Pac-12 Player and Freshman of the Week nods.

In the circle, the Pac-12 is again home to some of the top throwers in the country. The Bruins' Megan Faraimo was tabbed the Pac-12 Pitcher of the Week three times and was leading the country in strikeout-to-walk ratio (29.80), and ranked second with 149 KOs and victories (13) when the season was ended. OREGON STATE pitcher Mariah Mazon was the Conference's shutout leader and ranked third in the country. She was named the Pac-12 Pitcher of the Week on Feb. 24. At the plate, ASU's Maddi Hackbarth was the nation's leader with six sacrifice flies.

12 Pac-12 student-athletes were named to the USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year Top 50 Watch list, by far the most of any conference in the country. UCLA lead all teams in the country with four, while five member schools were represented, tied for the most of any conference.

The Conference finished 24-15 against ranked opponents and 180-43 overall.

CALIFORNIA men's swimming captured its third-straight and seventh all-time Pac-12 Men's Swimming & Diving Championship in Federal Way, Wash. The Golden Bears collected 10 individual and four relay titles to earn a total score of 856, outdistancing second-place ARIZONA, which finished with 578 points. The No. 13 Wildcats had nine podium appearances propelling it to its second-place finish and No. 16 STANFORD took third place with a score of 573.5. Combined, the league's swimmers recorded three national-best times with six in the top-10, and posted 21 NCAA 'A' cut times and set five Pac-12 Championship records.

Cal's **Ryan Hoffer** was named Pac-12 Swimmer of the Year and Swimmer of the Meet after capturing six titles and setting two meet records at the Conference championship. The junior took first in the 50-yard freestyle with the fastest time in the country (18.87) and helped Cal set new Pac-12 Championship records with wins in the 200-yard medley relay (1:22.16) and the 400-yard freestyle relay (2:46.92). **Jack Dolan** of ARIZONA STATE was voted Pac-12 Freshman of the Year after taking the podium four times at the Pac-12 Championships, the most of any freshman.

California Head Coach **David Durden** was tabbed Pac-12 Swimming Coach of the Year for the third-straight year, marking his ninth award all-time (2010-14, 2016, 2018-20). Durden capped a perfect 6-0 season by leading California to its third-straight and seventh all-time Pac-12 Championships victory.

Arizona State's **Youssef Selim** was voted Pac-12 Diver of the Year, becoming the ninth Sun Devil to earn the honor and the first since 2011. The senior took second in the 1-meter springboard (380.25), and fourth in both the 3-meter (387.85) and platform (347.15) to tie for the most individual points (47) at the Pac-12 Championships.

Arizona's **Bjorn Markentin** was named Pac-12 Freshman Diver of the Year as he was just one of two freshmen to finish in the top-eight in all three events at the league championships, including two podium finishes to help give the Wildcats an early lead heading into the swimming competition. The freshman finished first in the platform with a score of 384.70, third in the 3-meter springboard (384.70) and eighth in the 1-meter (341.15).

USC's **Hongping Li** was voted Pac-12 Diving Coach of the Year for the fifth time in his career (2009, 2016-18, 2020) after leading the Trojans to six top-eight finishes for a total of 95 points and a tie for first in the diving portion of the Conference Championships.

STANFORD won the 2020 Pac-12 Women's Swimming and Diving Championships, its fourth-consecutive Pac-12 title and fifth-consecutive undefeated season. No other team has pulled off a four-peat since Stanford's 13-consecutive titles from 1987-1999. The Cardinal won the event with 1,598 points, CALIFORNIA finished second (1,224.5) and USC came in at third (1,212).

In December, Cal senior **Abbey Weitzel** set a new American, U.S. Open and NCAA record of 20.90 seconds in the 50-yard freestyle. She owns the top-three times ever, and four of the top five, in the 50 free event.

USC Trojans **Louise Hansson** was named the Pac-12 Swimmer of the Year and **Dave Salo** was voted Pac-12 Swimming Coach of the Year. Hansson won three individual titles at the Pac-12 Championships, the most of any swimmer at the meet. Her three individual and two relay titles in one conference meet is a Trojan record.

Stanford's **Emma Wheal** was named the Pac-12 Swimming Freshman of the Year after helping the Cardinal collect its fourth-straight league title while teammate **Mia Paulsen** was named Pac-12 Diver of the Year and the Cardinal's **Patrick Jeffrey** earning Pac-12 Diving Coach of the Year honors. USC's **Nike Agunbiade** was tabbed Pac-12 Diving Freshman of the Year. Stanford picked up its 10th Freshman Swimmer of the Year honor, marking six-consecutive, and added its ninth Diver of the Year award. Agunbiade was the only unanimous postseason award winner and gave USC its first Diver of the Year honor since 2013.

The Pac-12 had 55 student-athletes qualify for the NCAA Swimming & Diving Championships including ARIZONA (5), ARIZONA STATE (8), California (14), Stanford (15), UCLA (3), USC (9) and UTAH (1). Top-ranked Stanford topped the season-ending poll for the fifth-straight year. Three Pac-12 teams ranked in the top-10 to tie the most of any conference. That Cardinal was joined by No. 4 Cal and No. 8 USC. The Trojans won their final dual meet of the season to jump from No. 24 to a top-10 spot. No. 17 Arizona State and No. 24 UCLA also made the jump from previously unranked to finishing in the top-25, and Arizona received four votes.

Three Pac-12 men's tennis teams finished in the final ITA top-25 rankings, including USC which maintained its No. 1 mark for five-consecutive weeks. STANFORD was ranked No. 8 and UCLA finished at No. 22. The league took down a total of 14 ranked teams this season, including 10 in the top 15.

USC's shortened season was one of its best yet, posting a 13-1 record including two league wins, six against ranked opponents, including a victory over 2019 NCAA Champion Stanford. UCLA earned two league victories bringing its overall record to 9-4 and ARIZONA wrapped up the spring with an 11-3 record.

USC, UCLA and Stanford each had a student-athlete earn ITA All-American honors and finished in the nation's top 10, tying for the most of any conference. Trojan **Daniel Cuckierman** earned All-American honors for the first time in his career after recording a team-best 26-2 individual record this season, including an 11-1 dual-match mark. The junior finished as the top-ranked player in the country, the first player at USC to do so since 2012. UCLA's **Keegan Smith** became a three-time All-American after posting a 16-5 individual record this spring, 8-3 in dual matches, and finishing ranked No. 3 in the nation. Sophomore **Alexandre Rosaert** earned his first-career All-America honors after going 13-7 in singles play, including a team-best eight wins over ranked opponents.

Five Pac-12 student-athletes from five different institutions earned 2020 ITA Regional Playing Awards. UTAH earned the Mountain Region ITA Community Service Award and teammate **Franco Capalbo** was named Mountain Region ITA Rookie of the Year. **Jack Davis** of WASHINGTON earned the Northwest Region **Arthur Ashe** Leadership & Sportsmanship Award and the Rafael Osuna Sportsmanship Award. Stanford's **Neel Rajesh** was named Northwest Region ITA Rookie of the Year and fellow Cardinal **Alexandre Rotsaert** was selected the region's ITA Player to Watch. **Govind Nanda** of UCLA was tabbed Southwest Region ITA Player to Watch and USC's **Brandon Holt** was named Southwest Region ITA Senior Player of the Year.

Three Pac-12 women's tennis teams finished the season in the ITA top-25 after briefly opening Pac-12 league play just before the season was cut short. Leading the way was UCLA at No. 3, 2019 NCAA Champion STANFORD came in at No. 6 and ARIZONA STATE was ranked 18th. Six Conference teams were nationally ranked throughout the season, with at least one team appearing in the top 10 every week. The league recorded nine wins over ranked opponents, including two upsets over top-10 teams.

UCLA was bound for a successful 2020 campaign as it led the pack with a perfect 12-0 record this season, 2-0 in the Pac-12. The Bruins captured over half of this season's Pac-12 Women's Tennis Player of the Week honors with the help of standouts **Elysia Bolton**, **Sasha Vagramov**, **Abbey Forbes**, and **Abi Altick**. WASHINGTON and WASHINGTON STATE were also off to hot starts, both recording an 11-3 overall records and a 2-0 league mark.

Five Pac-12 student-athletes named to the 2020 ITA All-American team and nine student-athletes earned ITA national and regional awards. CALIFORNIA's **Haley Giavara** was tabbed an ITA All-America and was selected the ITA Northwest Region Rookie of the Year. **Michaela Gordon** of Stanford earned her fourth ITA All-America nod, and fellow Cardinal **Emily Arbuthnott** and **Emma Higuchi** were awarded ITA Most Improved Senior and the ITA Cissie Leary Sportsmanship Award for the Northwest region, respectively.

UCLA's **Abigail Forbes**, **Elysia Bolton**, and **Jada Hart** received ITA All-American recognitions. Bolton was also selected the ITA National Player to Watch and Forbes was named the Northwest Region ITA Rookie of the Year. UTAH's **Whitney Hekking** was selected as Mountain Region's ITA Most Improved Senior and the program was given an honorable mention ITA Community Service Award honoree. In the Southwest Region, USC's **Angela Kulikov** was voted ITA Most Improved Senior and fellow Trojan **Rebecca Weissmann** received the ITA Cissie Leary Sportsmanship Award. WSU's **Melisa Ates** earned the Northwest Region Arthur Ashe Leadership & Sportsmanship Award and the program earned the region's ITA Community Service Award.

STANFORD successfully defended its NCAA title, winning back-to-back crowns for the first time since 1996 and 1997. The NCAA leader with nine all-time, it is the Cardinal's third title in four years. Stanford dropped just two sets in its title run, with only UTAH pushing the eventual champs to five sets in the regional semifinal. Stanford's Kevin Hamby became the seventh head coach all-time to lead a school to back-to-back titles. Senior Kathryn Plummer was tabbed the NCAA Tournament's Most Outstanding Player. Pac-12 teams have won a NCAA-record 17 of 39 NCAA titles awarded.

Six Pac-12 teams earned NCAA Tournament bids. In addition to Stanford earning a top-16 seeding, WASHINGTON was tabbed the No. 8 seed, advancing to the regional final for the 15th time. UCLA, USC, Utah and WASHINGTON STATE earned at-large bids, as well. It marked the 20th-consecutive year at least six Pac-12 teams have participated in the "Big Dance."

The Cardinal became the first Pac-12 team to win back-to-back NCAA titles since USC won in 2002 and 2003. With Stanford winning in 1996 and 1997, UCLA is the only other league team to win back-to-back, doing so in 1990 and 1991.

Four Pac-12 teams were ranked in the final AVCA Coaches poll, the Cardinal claiming the No. 1 spot with all 64 first-place votes. Washington was ranked No. 6, its highest final ranking since 2015. At No. 9, Utah has its highest-ever final ranking, and UCLA is in the last poll for the first time since 2017, coming in at No. 25.

Stanford won its 19th all-time Pac-12 crown. UCLA junior Mac May was named Pac-12 Player of the Year, the first Bruin to win the honor since 1994. Stanford seniors Jenna Gray and Morgan Hentz were tabbed Pac-12 Setter of the Year and Pac-12 Libero of the Year for the third-straight years, respectively. WSU's Magda Jehlárová became the first Cougar to be named Pac-12 Freshman of the Year.

12 Pac-12 student-athletes earned AVCA All-America honors, marking the 12th time in 16 years at least 10 from the Conference earned national nods. Gray, Hentz and Audriana Fitzmorris were three-time honorees with teammate Madeleine Gates joining them on the national award list. Utah had three selections, Washington had a pair, and UCLA, USC and Washington State each had one.

Jehlárová made more history, becoming the first Cougar to be named AVCA National Freshman of the Year, and the first from the Pac-12 since Plummer won in 2016. Trojans to six top-eight finishes for a total of 95 points and a tie for first in the diving portion of the 2020 Conference Championships.

The ARIZONA STATE Sun Devils earned their third Pac-12 title in four years as it topped host STANFORD at the Pac-12 Wrestling Championships. The Sun Devils, who claimed their 19th Pac-12 crown overall, posted 141.5 points behind five individual titles claimed by **Brandon Courtney** (125), **Jacori Teemer** (157), **Anthony Valencia** (174), **Kordell Norfleet** (197) and **Tanner Hall** (HWT). The Cardinal posted 122.0 points behind two individual Pac-12 Champions – **Real Woods** (141) and **Shane Griffith** (165). CSU BAKERSFIELD finished third for the fourth time in five years with 99.5 points as the Roadrunners had two individual champions - **Russell Rohlfing** (149) and **Josh Loomer** (184). OREGON STATE's **Devan Turner** (133) picked up the remaining title in leading the Beavers to a fourth-place finish with 92.5 points. CAL POLY was fifth with 90.0 points and LITTLE ROCK, making its Pac-12 Championships debut, came in sixth with 62.5 points.

Stanford's Griffith and Arizona State's Norfleet were named Co-Most Outstanding Wrestlers of the Championships, while Cal Poly's **Thomas Lane** earned the Most Falls Award with two, the quickest coming in 1:25.

Griffith was tabbed Pac-12 Wrestler of the Year, as well as the Pac-12 Freshman/Newcomer of the Year. He becomes the third Cardinal ever to be named Pac-12 Wrestler of the Year, joining Nick Amuchastegui (2012) and Matt Gentry (2004). Griffith was a perfect 28-0 on the season, including a 13-0 mark in dual matches, and carries the second-longest winning streak in school history. At 28-0, it was the best start by a Stanford wrestler in program history. Arizona State's **Zeke Jones** was tabbed by his peers as Pac-12 Wrestling Coach of the Year for the third time (also 2017, 2018). Jones led Arizona State to its third Pac-12 title in four years, producing five Pac-12 Champions. Arizona State posted a 15-2 record this season, the first 15-win season in 31 years (1988-89). The Sun Devils posted seven wins against top 25 teams, including a victory over then-No. 1 Penn State that ended the Nittany Lions' 60-match win streak.

Despite the absence of an NCAA Championships, Woods, Griffith, Valencia, Hall and Arizona State's **Joshua Shields** (165) earned first team All-America honors.

(Capsule Reviews of 2019-20 Pac-12 Highlights)

Winter and spring NCAA competition and championships were suspended on March 12, 2020, impacting spring regular-season and championships competition in rowing and outdoor track & field.

MEN'S ROWING

WASHINGTON men's rowing looked promising this year before the spring season was cut short after capturing a win at the Head of the Lake in the fall. The Huskies were coming off an extremely successful 2019 campaign as they won their third-straight and 39th-program Pac-12 title and were awarded the James Ten Eyck award at the IRA National Championships.

WOMEN'S ROWING

Five Pac-12 women's rowing teams were ranked in the final CRCA/US Rowing Coaches top-20 including 2019 Pac-12 and National Champion WASHINGTON at No. 1. Last year, the Huskies swept all three grand finals to win its fifth all-time NCAA Championship. STANFORD earned a No. 2 rank after coming in second at last spring's league championship and placing fourth in Indianapolis. CALIFORNIA was voted No. 6, USC came in at No. 18, and UCLA rounded the poll out at No. 20. UCLA recorded a win over San Diego State, Stanford topped OREGON STATE, and Washington defeated USC in the first week of action before the spring season came to a halt.

MEN'S & WOMEN'S TRACK AND FIELD

Only two programs - California and USC - managed to compete in meets prior to the COVID-19 pandemic that brought the remainder of the highly-anticipated men's and women's outdoor track & field seasons to a halt. The Oregon men and USC women were the expected front-runners to defend their Conference crowns from 2019, with the Trojans also being heavy favorites for a second NCAA title in three years. The 2020 campaigns were to conclude on a historic note as the Pac-12 Championships were slated to be held at the University of Oregon's brilliantly renovated Hayward Field, which is now scheduled to host the 2021 NCAA Championships and 2022 World Athletics Championships as well as future Pac-12 title meets. 10-time All-American and 2019 NCAA 400m hurdles champion **Anna Cockrell** of USC was voted CoSIDA Academic All-America Team Member of the Year after carrying a 4.0 grade point average in the public policy graduate program. Ten Pac-12 women's track & field student-athletes were named CoSIDA Academic All-Americans, eight earning a spot on the first team. Five men's track & field student-athletes were Academic All-Americans, including three on the first team.

Winter and spring NCAA competition and championships were suspended on March 12, 2020, impacting postseason competition in men's gymnastics, indoor track & field, men's volleyball and women's water polo.

MEN'S GYMNASTICS

Two Pac-12 men's gymnastics teams were ranked in the nation's top-11 by the College Gymnastics Association, led by No. 1 Stanford. The reigning 2019 NCAA Champion posted six first-place finishes this season as the Cardinal was looking to capture its seventh all-time national title. The Cardinal swept the MPSF top honors with sophomore **Brody Malone** repeating as the Gymnast of the Year and 18th-year head coach **Thom Glielmi** earned his fourth Coach of the Year award. California finished the shortened campaign at No. 11 after recording four second-place and three third-place marks in regular-season meets.

MEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

Oregon's **Max Vollmer** broke the MPSF Championships record in the heptathlon while teammate **Rieker Daniel** was named Athlete of the Meet after scoring 18 of the Ducks' 50 total points. Despite a win in the distance medley relay (9:34.95), Arizona (76 points) narrowly missed knocking off two-time champion BYU (80). The NCAA Championships were canceled due to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

WOMEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

Despite capturing just one (DMR) of the 17 events, the women of Oregon (104.5 points) captured the MPSF Championship by a healthy margin over defending champion and runner-up USC (73). USC's **Bailey Lear** (400m, 400m relay) earned Athlete of the Meet honors thanks to her role in setting two meet records, Washington's **Olivia Gruver** broke the MPSF mark in the pole vault and UCLA's **Alyssa Wilson** won both the shot put and weight throw to highlight top individual performances from the meet. The Huskies' Hannah Rusnak won the indoor pentathlon with a score of 4,190.

MEN'S VOLLEYBALL

UCLA and Stanford appeared in the final AVCA Coaches poll published before the 2020 campaign was halted because of the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, coming in at No. 9 and No. 14, respectively. Each team placed one student-athlete on the All-MPSF first team - the Bruins' **Daenan Gyimah** and the Cardinal's **Jaylen Jasper**. **Adam Flood** represented USC in the postseason honors, earning a spot on the All-Freshman team. A senior, Gyimah was also a first team AVCA All-American for his third-straight All-America honor.

MEN'S WATER POLO

Stanford claimed the NCAA title, its 11th national championship and first since 2002. All four Pac-12 teams finished in the top eight in the final CWPA rankings with No. 1 Stanford, No.2 USC (tied), No. 5 UCLA and No. 8 California. The Cardinal finished 21-2, the best record in the MPSF, and its winningest season since 2001 (22-1). The ACWPC named Stanford's **Ben Hallock** National Player of the Year and named **John Vargas** the National Coach of the Year. The Pac-12 adds to its list of NCAA Championships with a Pac-12 institution capturing the men's water polo every year since 1998 — California (14), Stanford (11), UCLA (11) and USC (10). USC also represented the MPSF and Pac-12 at the national championship and nearly advanced to the final, but fell to the eventual champion Cardinal, 15-14, in the semis. While Hallock and Vargas claimed the league's top honors, California's **Nikolaos Papanikolaou** was tabbed the MPSF Newcomer of the Year.

WOMEN'S WATER POLO

In the season's final polling that was released on March 17, the top-three spots were occupied by MPSF squads led by No. 1 USC, and Stanford and UCLA tied for second in the poll. Two more teams - No. 6 Arizona State and No. 9 California - appeared in the top 10, rounding out the ranked league teams. The MPSF slate was just getting underway when the season was cut short. The 2019 NCAA finalist Trojans were considered the preseason favorite to win the league, edging out the Bruins for the top spot in the MPSF Preseason Coaches poll by only two points. Defending NCAA Champion Stanford was picked third in the polling. 13 student-athlete from the MPSF were named ACWPC All-Americans, representing five Pac-12 teams. USC led the way with four selections, while Stanford had three, including **Emalia Eichelberger** earning first-team honors at the goalie position. ASU's **Itzahiana Baca** was second team All-American at goal.
