INTRODUCTION:

FROM THE COMMISSIONER



I am delighted to share with you this recap of the highlights of the 2018-19 academic campaign for our Conference and universities.

For the 14th-consecutive year, the Pac-12 led all collegiate conferences by winning 13 NCAA titles. This remarkable achievement, bringing the Conference's leading total NCAA championships to 526, earned for us the right to retain our title as the "Conference of Champions." That moniker is much more than just a title: it reflects our commitment to overall athletic and academic excellence, a commitment that extends to all our student-athletes, men and women, and their coaches and families. It is a source of great pride for our Conference.

The Pac-12 mission is to develop the next generation of leaders by championing excellence in academics, athletics and the well-being of student-athletes. As I think back on this past year – from the important governance role that our student-athletes continue to play through our Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, to the remarkable career of Miss Val at UCLA coming to a close, to the incredible success of our Women's Softball and Women's Basketball teams, to our continued groundbreaking work with our Student-Athlete Health and Well-Being Initiative, and commitment to mental health support in particular – I think we can all be proud of our collective efforts to achieve this mission for our student-athletes. One of the highlights for me each and every year is to listen to and watch our student-athletes in action off the field of play, be at our Council meetings, media days, at our China Game, or around our campuses – these remarkable young women and men inspire us with their talent, dedication and desire to make a positive impact, and make us all work harder to achieve our mission on their behalf.

In this Year in Review, you'll find an abundance of information on the performance of our teams in a wide variety of sports and, overall, the year was a great success. The results include several firsts: the first Pac-12 Women's Basketball Tournament to be held in Las Vegas (where our men's tournament was also held) and our first ever Pac-12 Women's Gymnastics Championships to be held at a neutral site. Each was a great success.

Beyond achievement on the field and the court, the Pac-12 made important advances in several areas. We extended our leadership in student-athlete health and well-being by funding additional research, with an emphasis on mental health, and we played a leadership role in achieving greater attention to mental health by all five major conferences. At our Pac-12 Sustainability Conference, hosted by the University of Colorado, we launched the first sustainability platform in college athletics with "Pac-12 Team Green," promoting environmental efforts taking place on and around our universities' campuses.

Once again, our global vision for the Pac-12 took us to China, where Cal took on Yale in the annual Pac-12 China Game, while providing a unique opportunity for cultural exchange as well as cultivation of new fans and relationships. Next season, for the first time, the China Game will feature an all-Pac-12 matchup: Arizona State and Colorado.

These and more highlights fill the pages that follow, and I hope you enjoy reading them.












Finally, I want to once again express my appreciation to the leaders of our member universities, who together form the governing council of the Conference. Our group's vision and leadership has kept the Conference in the forefront of intercollegiate athletics, athletically, academically and in their focus for the overall health and welfare of our student-athletes. I also want to express my appreciation and admiration to our athletic directors, senior women's administrators, and coaches and staff – as well as the Conference staff. Most of all, I want to congratulate all of our student-athletes on another great year on the field, on the court and in the classroom. You inspire us all.

Our Student-Athletes: Champions on- and off-the-field



The 2018-19 collegiate season once again renewed the Pac-12's claim on the title, Conference of Champions®. It is the 14th-consecutive season, and the 53rd out of the last 59, the Pac-12 led all conferences in NCAA titles, bringing its all-time total to 526 among its 12 universities. The 13 championships in 2018-19 is one shy of the Pac-12, and all-time, record of 14 for a single academic year.

Pac-12 teams had spectacular performances to claim national championships. Colorado raced to the finish line in first for the women's cross country crown and Stanford won its first of six NCAA titles with its nation-leading eighth volleyball national championship. The Conference swept the men's and women's swimming & diving titles each in dominant fashion, and had All-Pac-12 finals in men's and women's water polo, and beach volleyball. UCLA capped the season winning the softball title for the league's first trophy in the sport in eight years. Washington swept the grand finals at women's rowing and Utah was the skiing champion, both winning titles for the second time in three years.

The successes of Pac-12 institutions throughout the academic year was most evident in the Learfield Sports Directors' Cup where Stanford captured its 25th-consecutive title, and six teams placed among the top 25. The success of the Pac-12 in the Cup was bolstered by the seven different institutions claiming NCAA titles, most among all conferences. In addition, nine Pac-12 league members combined to post 32 top-four finishes in 24 NCAA championships.

The Conference of Champions®



The Conference demonstrated its commitment to excellence across the board not just by winning all those NCAA championships, but also by holding memorable Pac-12 Championship events in 2018-19, including two firsts — the 2019 Women's Gymnastics Championships was held at a neutral site for the first time, taking place in Utah at the Maverik Center; and the 2019 Pac-12 Women's Basketball Tournament was held in Las Vegas for the first time, highlighting a two-week stretch of Pac-12 basketball in Las Vegas along with the men's tournament. Pac-12 Networks also continued to take its show on the road, with on-site women's basketball coverage in Las Vegas for the first time and capturing the entire two-week stretch of Pac-12 postseason basketball.



Student-Athlete Health and Well-Being



The Pac-12 Conference continued its pioneering role in safeguarding and sponsoring research in student-athlete health and well-being. The Pac-12 CEO group voted to extend \$3.6 million in annual funding for another five years, and increased the resources devoted to mental health. The Conference’s emphasis on mental health extended to the fifth annual meeting of the five “autonomy” conferences (Pac-12, ACC, Big Ten, Big 12, SEC), which voted to require that institutions make mental health services and resources available for student-athletes. The Conference also announced seven new research projects with \$2.7 million in funding to address important student-athlete health issues, including head trauma, mental health and injury prevention.

Pac-12 Networks



Pac-12 Networks continued to provide more live coverage than any other conference network, fulfilling its mission to provide fans with high-quality coverage and provide student-athletes in all sports with well-deserved exposure. That effort was rewarded as Women’s Volleyball, Women’s Basketball, and Softball had their most-watched seasons ever. Networks also provided more live coverage of Pac-12 Championships than ever, airing the Men’s and Women’s Golf Championships live for the first time this past year. During the football season, the Networks took its show on the road with the all-new show “The Pregame” visiting all 12 campuses, while “The Drive” continued to provide unique inside perspectives and the new short-form “Pac-12 Playlist” made its debut across digital and linear platforms. Pac-12 Networks covered more games on more platforms than ever before.

Innovation

Pac-12 announced in November it extended a strategic relationship with Amazon Web Services, going all-in on the world's leading cloud and selecting AWS as its standard for machine learning and media workloads. The Conference will continue to leverage AWS's industry-leading services for a wide variety of production use cases, including its website, mobile applications and live television networks, in order to transform the collegiate sports experience for its millions of fans.

Pac-12 Global Initiative



The Pac-12 deepened its groundbreaking relationship with China, holding its annual China Game featuring Cal taking on Yale in men's basketball. The game is the centerpiece of a much larger program of educational and cultural exchange, and also is part of a growing media presence in China that promotes goodwill and showcases the conference in the world's most populous nation. The coming season's China Game will feature the first all-Pac-12 matchup in the Game's history, featuring Arizona State and Colorado.

Pac-12 Team Green



In another example of its innovative vision that expands beyond the playing field, the Conference launched the nation's first environmental sustainability platform in college athletics with "Pac-12 Team Green." Launched at the 2018 Pac-12 Sustainability Conference, hosted by the University of Colorado, the platform aims to enhance and promote sustainability efforts within college athletic departments, including the design of new initiatives and the sharing of best practices. Extra Yard for Teachers



During the 2018 Pac-12 Football Championship Game at Levi's Stadium, the Pac-12 recognized Pomeroy Elementary School teacher Stacy Butler (above) with a \$10,000 award in connection with the College Football Playoff Foundation's Extra Yard for Teachers initiative. The Extra Yard for Teachers Program aims to elevate teaching as a profession by inspiring and empowering quality teachers. In addition to the Conference's donation, each Pac-12 university donated \$10,000 to deserving local teachers in their communities over the course of the football season, totaling \$120,000 donated by Pac-12 universities to educators across the region.

On- and Off-the-Field Excellence



Student-athletes in each of the 24 sports the Conference sponsors are honored as Scholar-Athletes of the Year. Another 24 student-athletes were recognized with this year's Tom Hansen Medal winners and 700 Academic All-Pac-12 members named. In addition, the Conference this year boasted 22 Academic All-Americans and put forward two nominees for the prestigious NCAA Woman of the Year honor.



Over 450 student-athletes from Pac-12 institutions received All-American honors in 2018-19 and 12 received a national player or positional player of the year award. For the third-consecutive year and fourth time in five years, the prestigious Honda Cup was awarded to a Pac-12 student-athlete. The Conference has the most Honda Cup honorees, by far, of any other conference with 14 all-time. *[UCLA's Rachel Garcia won the 2019 Honda Cup, while Colorado's Dani Jones and Stanford's Kathryn Plummer were Honda Sports Award winners for their respective discipline.]*

Valorie Kondos Field announces she will retire after the 2019 campaign after 37 years on the UCLA staff, 29 as head coach of the Bruins. She led UCLA to seven NCAA gymnastics titles, was named national coach of the year four times and was selected the Pac-12 Gymnastics Coach of the Century.

UNDEFEATED STANFORD WINS PAC-12 TITLE FOR THE FOURTH YEAR IN A ROW

With a 2-0 win over Bay Area-rival California, Stanford clinched its fourth-straight and 13th all-time Pac-12 title with an undefeated regular season and league record. The Cardinal also extended its unbeaten streak to 45 games, the longest streak by any Pac-12 team in history.

CALIFORNIA IS BACK-TO-BACK PAC-12 CHAMPION WITH DOMINATING PERFORMANCE

California won its second-straight and sixth overall Pac-12 title by the largest margin of victory (232) at the championships since 2007. Pac-12 and CSCAA Swimmer of the Year Andrew Seliskar set the record for most individual titles at the Pac-12 Championships with 11.

Stanford wins its first-ever Pac-12 wrestling title, edging two-time defending champion Arizona State by just two points, making it the closest team race since 2010.

In its first season under head coach Fredrik Landstedt, Utah won its 12th NCAA Championship and its second overall title in three years.

TOP-10 SHOWDOWN IN LAS VEGAS GIVES STANFORD ITS 13TH PAC-12 TOURNAMENT TITLE

Stanford wins its 13th Pac-12 Tournament title held at MGM Grand Garden Arena in Las Vegas, defeating top-seeded Oregon and avenging a 20-point loss a month earlier. Both teams are ranked in the top 10 in the country at the time of the meeting.

OREGON WINS FOUR IN A ROW TO CLAIM PAC-12 TOURNAMENT CROWN IN LAS VEGAS

Oregon became just the second team to win four games in four days – and the first to topple the Nos. 1, 2 and 3 seeds – en route to capturing the Pac-12 Tournament title with a 68-48 win over Washington. The Ducks' defense was stifling, allowing just 57.0 points over the course of the four games.

The Bruins' Kyla Ross earned a Perfect 10 for the eighth week in a row, doing so on the uneven bars.

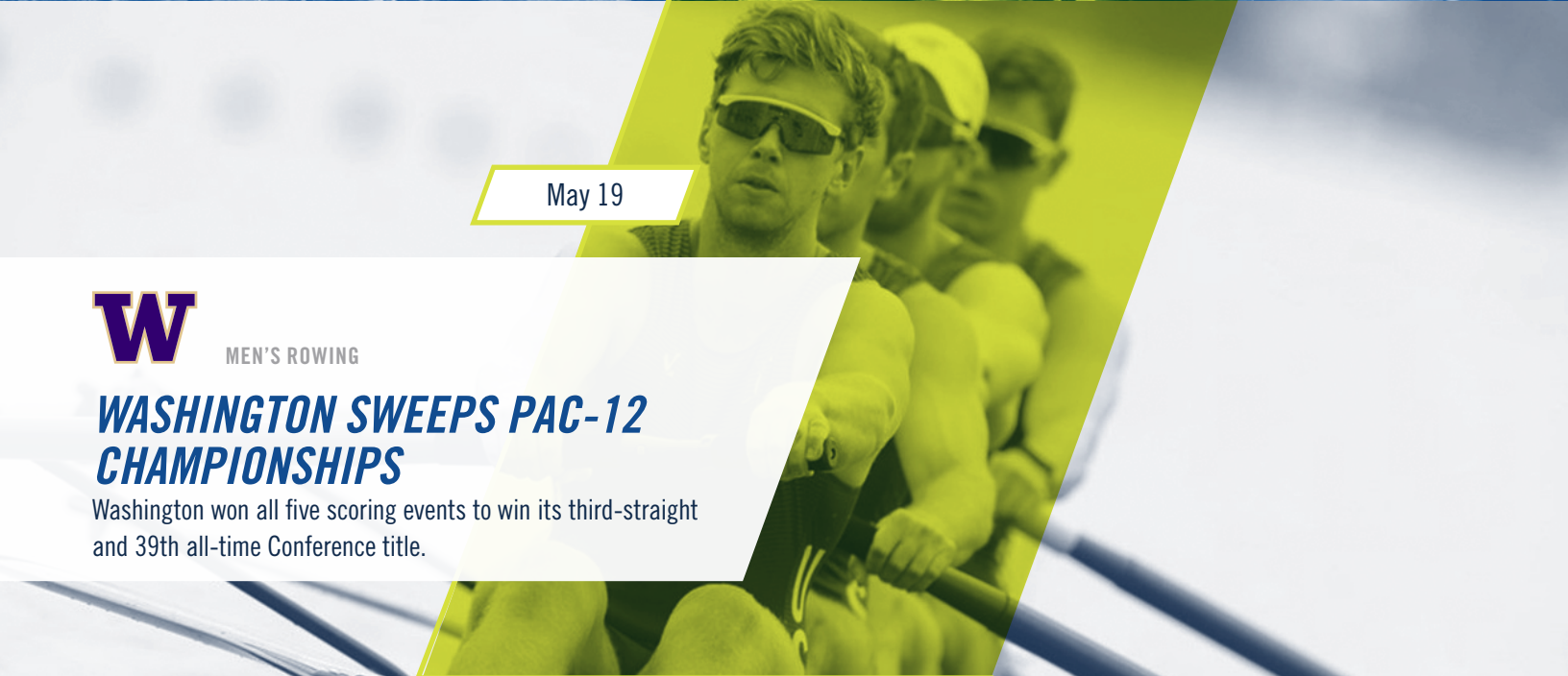

For the 14th year in a row and the 18th time in the last 19 years, the Pac-12 is the winningest conference in the country, leading all leagues in NCAA Championships won in 2018-19. Member institutions collected 13 NCAA titles this academic year with seven different institutions capturing at least one crown. The 13 titles nearly triples the next-closest conference (5 - ACC/Big 12).

June 28

STANFORD CLAIMS 25TH-STRAIGHT DIRECTORS' CUP; SIX PAC-12 TEAMS PLACE IN TOP 20

Stanford captured its 25th-consecutive Directors' Cup with USC and UCLA finishing fifth and sixth, respectively, in leading the Pac-12 Conference to another impressive finish in the final 2018-19 Division I Learfield IMG College Directors' Cup standings. The Pac-12 placed a nation's-best six teams among the top 20.



BASEBALL



UCLA won its 10th Pac-12 title and was the No. 1-overall seed in the NCAA Tournament behind its dominant pitching staff, which led the nation in ERA (2.60) and shutouts (11). The Bruins headlined five NCAA Tournament teams, the most for the Conference since 2015. UCLA and Stanford battled through the elimination bracket to win three-straight games and advance to the NCAA Super Regional, the second-straight year two Pac-12 teams have advanced that far. Oregon State junior catcher Adley Rutschman had one of the most memorable seasons in collegiate baseball history winning nearly every major national award and national player of the year honor and was selected No. 1 overall in the MLB Draft.

MEN'S BASKETBALL

Oregon won four games in four days to claim the Pac-12 Tournament crown and the Conference's automatic bid, highlighting three tournament teams and an additional in the NIT. The Ducks advanced to the NCAA Sweet 16 for the third time in four seasons while Colorado reached the NIT quarterfinals. Led by the Naismith Defensive Player of the Year and two-time Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year Matisse Thybulle, Washington claimed the Pac-12 regular-season title, the Huskies' 12th overall and first since 2011-12.



WOMEN'S BASKETBALL



Led by national player of the year Sabrina Ionescu, Oregon made its first-ever trip to the NCAA Women's Final Four highlighting another outstanding Pac-12 women's basketball campaign. The Pac-12 went 11-1 in the first weekend marking the best outing by a league since 1997. Half the league earned NCAA Tournament bids for the third-straight year, culminating with the two-time regular-season champion Ducks becoming the fifth-different league squad to advance that far since 2013. Stanford claimed its 13th Pac-12 Tournament crown after winning a top-10 showdown. Arizona, having recorded the best turnaround in the country, won the WNIT in front sold out crowd, setting the Pac-12 all-time attendance record.

BEACH VOLLEYBALL



UCLA won an all-Pac-12 final to claim back-to-back NCAA Championships, defeating crosstown-rival USC one week after the Trojans upset the the Bruins in a 3-2 thriller at the Pac-12 Championship. The LA teams, who are the only teams to have won the NCAA title, occupied the top-two spots in the national polls all season. California earned its first-ever top-10 ranking and Arizona State made its first appearance in the top 20 in program history. Arizona was in the final poll for the fourth-straight year.

MEN'S CROSS COUNTRY

Stanford won its second-straight Pac-12 crown, placing three runners in the top four, including senior Grant Fisher defending his individual crown by less than a second. He then helped the Cardinal to a fifth-consecutive top-five showing at the NCAA Championships. Colorado had three runners in the top 11 to finish fourth at the national meet, marking the 13th-consecutive year the Pac-12 reached the podium. Washington had its best season in three decades, placing sixth, to give the Pac-12 three in the top 10 for the third time in the past four years.



WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY



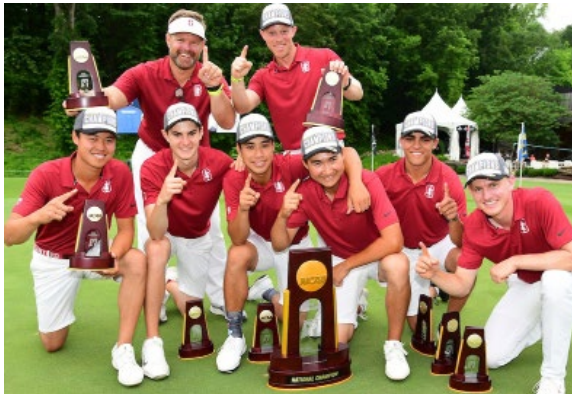
Senior Dani Jones led Colorado to the top of the podium, highlighting a dominating outing by Pac-12 teams at the NCAA Championships with four teams placing in the top nine, including three in the top five as Pac-12 Champion Oregon and Stanford placed third and fifth, respectively. Oregon State made its first-ever appearance at the meet. Jones became the Conference's fourth individual national champion and first in 17 years. She also defended her Pac-12 individual crown.

FOOTBALL

Washington defeated Utah to win its second-consecutive Pac-12 Football Championship Game, giving the North Division its seventh league title. Washington State, which tied UW in the North standings, was victorious in the Alamo Bowl to get to 11 wins. Led by quarterback Gardner Minshew II, the Cougs set a program record for wins and Minshew established a new Pac-12 single-season passing mark. Stanford and Oregon each picked up bowl wins in the Sun Bowl and the Redbox Bowl, respectively, to finish with identical 9-4 records. It is just the second time that four or more teams in one division recorded nine or more wins.



MEN'S GOLF



Stanford claimed its 11th Pac-12 Championship, paced by a trio of top-10 finishers, then captured its ninth NCAA title all-time. The underdog Cardinal knocked off three higher seeds to claim the national championship. Stanford highlighted eight teams in the postseason, including Arizona State, California and USC joining Stanford to advance out of the NCAA Regional Championships. Cal's Collin Morikawa earned Pac-12 medalist honors and was named Pac-12 Men's Golfer of the Year.

WOMEN'S GOLF

For the sixth time ever and fifth time in 12 years, USC stood atop the podium at the Pac-12 Championships, defeating the field by 11 shots. Arizona State's Olivia Mehaffey and Stanford's Albane Valenzuela finished tied atop the leaderboard at 4-under, but Mehaffey prevailed on the first playoff hole to earn medalist honors. Nine teams were selected for NCAA Regionals and six advanced to the NCAA Championships where Arizona, Stanford and USC advanced from stroke play to match play. The depth of talent in the Pac-12 was evident by the selection of 14 individuals to the WGCA All-America teams.



GYMNASTICS



A legend in the sport, UCLA's Valorie Kondos Field led UCLA to its 19th Pac-12 Championship in her final season after 37 years on the staff. The Bruins claimed three of the four major awards, including Kondos Field garnering Pac-12 Coach of the Year honors for the fifth time. UCLA went on to place third overall at the NCAA Championships as all eight Pac-12 teams earned a spot in the postseason. At the conclusion of the season, Utah's Megan Marsden also announced her retirement from the sport. She led the Utes to six NCAA Championships in 35 years as a coach and a student-athlete.

WOMEN'S LACROSSE

In just the second season of Pac-12 women's lacrosse, a league-record three teams out of six earned NCAA Tournament bids. USC won the Pac-12 regular season and outscored league foes, 28-8, to claim the Pac-12 Tournament crown. Colorado was in the NCAA Tournament for the third-straight year, advancing to the second round. Pac-12 Freshman of the Year Rachel Hall of Oregon led the nation in saves (246) and saves per game (13.67).



MEN'S ROWING



For the third-consecutive year and ninth time in 10 years, Washington claimed the Pac-12 crown sweeping all five events for the first time since 2005. Four teams participated at the IRA Championships with the Huskies taking home the James Ten Eyck Trophy for the most total points at the regatta with California finishing third. UW head coach Michael Callahan earned Pac-12 Coach of the Year honors for the 11th time, the most of any coach in the history of the league.

WOMEN'S ROWING

For the second time in three years, Washington swept all three grand finals to give the Huskies the NCAA Championship and the Pac-12 placed three teams in the top six. The Huskies won their third-straight league title by just a half point over Stanford for the smallest margin of victory since 2010.



MEN'S SOCCER



Stanford claimed its Conference-record fifth-straight Pac-12 title and four teams earned NCAA Tournament bids for the fourth time in six years. Oregon State equaled its best finish in program history, coming in second place, its best showing since 2009. UCLA made its 45th all-time NCAA appearance, led by Frankie Amaya, the No. 1 overall pick in the MLS Draft after just his freshman campaign. Washington reached the postseason for the third year in a row.

WOMEN'S SOCCER

Stanford went undefeated in league play to claim its fourth-straight Pac-12 title and advanced to the NCAA Women's College Cup for the second year in a row. Stanford was led by Catarina Macario who became the second-straight Cardinal to win the MAC Hermann Trophy, the sports' top honor. With five teams earning postseason bids, three ended in the top six of the final poll (No. 3 Stanford, No. 5 UCLA, No. 6 USC), the most top-10 ranked teams of any conference.



SOFTBALL



For the first time since 2010 and a NCAA-leading 12th time, UCLA claimed the NCAA title, snapping an eight-year drought for the Pac-12. The Bruins were dominant in the championship series, led by two-time national player of the year Rachel Garcia, who also claimed the prestigious Honda Cup. The Bruins and Washington tied atop the league standings for the Pac-12 title. Five teams earned NCAA Tournament bids with three advancing to the NCAA Women's College World Series.

MEN'S SWIMMING AND DIVING

California won its sixth all-time NCAA title, the 25th for the Conference all-time. Cal's Andrew Seliskar won three NCAA titles and was named CSCAA Swimmer of the Year while head coach David Durden was named CSCAA Coach of the Year. Five of the six Pac-12 teams finished in the top 25 at NCAA's. The Bears also captured the Pac-12 crown in dominating fashion, posting the largest margin of victory since 2007.



WOMEN'S SWIMMING AND DIVING



The first three-straight Pac-12 Champion since 2004, Stanford won its third-consecutive NCAA crown while Cal placed second overall. The Cardinal's Ella Easton became the first woman in history to win four-straight 400 IM individual crowns. Maria Polyakova became the first-ever Bruin diving national champion and her coach, Tom Stebbens, was tabbed National Diving Coach of the Year.

MEN'S TENNIS

For the second-straight year and the fifth time ever, seven Pac-12 men's teams earned NCAA Tournament bids and four reached the super regional. USC won the Pac-12 Tournament crown, defeating crosstown-rival and regular-season champion UCLA in Ojai. For the second-straight year, a Bruin duo won the NCAA Doubles crown as Maxime Cressy and Keegan Smith completed their perfect campaign.



WOMEN'S TENNIS



Three-time Pac-12 Champion Stanford defended its NCAA title, its 20th all-time out of a possible 38, highlighting seven postseason bids for the Conference. Four earned top-16 seeds and Washington State returned to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2012. UCLA's Gabby Andrews and Ayan Broomfield secured the program's seventh NCAA doubles title, the first time a school has swept the doubles championships since 1988. Washington enjoyed its best season in program history, recording a team record eight of league victories.

MEN'S TRACK AND FIELD

Oregon maintained its win streak, claiming its 13th-consecutive Pac-12 Championship crown but Stanford led the league at the NCAA Championship placing fifth, its best finish at since 2001. Stanford earned USTFCCA Men's Program of the Year honors for the first time since the award's creation, which takes into account performances at the cross country, and indoor and outdoor track & field championships. Stanford's Steven Fahy won the 3,000-meter steeplechase as the Pac-12 amassed 45 All-Americans.



WOMEN'S TRACK & FIELD



Four Pac-12 teams finished in the top 10 at the NCAA Championships, led by Pac-12 Champion USC's runner-up showing. Oregon was fifth, while Colorado recorded its second-best showing ever at the meet in ninth, and Stanford tied for 10th. The Pac-12 won an astounding seven of the 21 events, tied for the most and the most for the league since 2012, including repeat national titles from USC's Anglerne Annelus (200m) and Stanford's Mackenzie Little (javelin).

VOLLEYBALL

Stanford won its nation-leading eighth NCAA title and second in three years, led by two-time National Player of the Year and Pac-12 Player of the Year Kathryn Plummer. Eight Pac-12 teams earned NCAA Tournament bids, the fifth time in the last six years at least that many league teams earned berths. The Cardinal were perfect in league play, claiming its 18th all-time title. Six teams earned final national rankings.



WRESTLING



Stanford won its first-ever Pac-12 crown after competing for the wrestling crown since 1963. The Cardinal edged Arizona State by two points for the closest margin of victory in nine years. ASU's Zahid Valencia defended his NCAA title at 174 pounds and was tabbed All-American for the third-straight year. He was also named Pac-12 Wrestler of the Year for the third time.

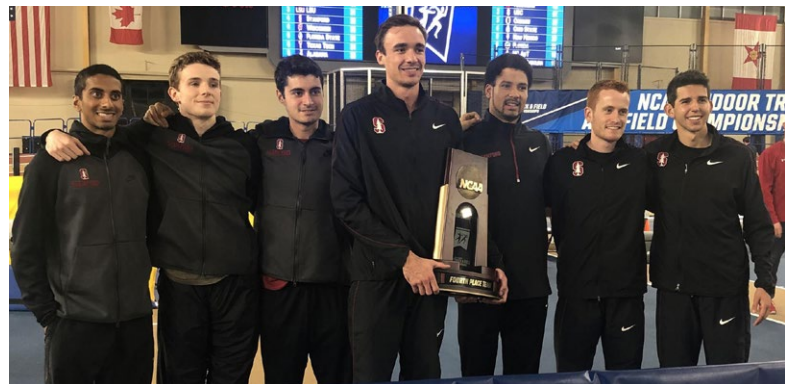
MEN'S GYMNASTICS



Stanford unseated four-time defending champion Oklahoma to win its sixth all-time NCAA title and first since 2011. Only a freshman, the Cardinal were led by Brody Malone, who won individual national titles in the all-around, floor and high bar. California sent two to compete individually at the NCAA Championships - Darren Wong and Aaron Mah.

MEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

Stanford had its highest NCAA Championships finish (fourth) and posted its highest point total since 2000 (30). Harrison Williams won the heptathlon with a school-record 6,042 points for the program's first indoor individual trophy in five years. At the MPSF Championships, USC's 4x400-meter relay team ran a 3:06.40 to break a 14-year-old conference record.



WOMEN'S INDOOR TRACK & FIELD



National runner-up USC and Oregon placed in the top three at the NCAA Championships. A trio of Trojans won individual national titles and Oregon had a couple, as well. Arizona State's Samantha Noennig claimed the shot put national title. The Trojans also won their fifth MPSF title in six years with head coach Caryl Smith Gilbert earning her seventh MPSF Coach of the Year honor.

MEN'S VOLLEYBALL

USC made its first NCAA Tournament appearance since 2012, more than doubling its win total from the previous year and posting the most wins since 2015 (18). Playing the toughest schedule in the country, the Trojans defeated seven ranked teams and won 11 of their last 15 going into the postseason.



MEN'S WATER POLO



USC capped 2018 with its 10th all-time NCAA title in the sport, defeating Stanford, 14-12. The Cardinal and Trojans were embattled in another close affair for the MPSF title, which Stanford won, 12-10. A Pac-12 team has won the NCAA title every year 1998, and all but five years since the championship was contested in 1969. Stanford sophomore won the Peter J. Cutino Award, recognizing the nation's most outstanding player.

WOMEN'S WATER POLO

With a thrilling, sudden death 9-8 victory, Stanford defeated defending champion USC in the NCAA Championship game. Only Pac-12 schools have won the national championship in women's water polo, dating back to 2001. Stanford's Makenzie Fischer, a three-time ACWPC All-American and Olympic gold medalist, was named NCAA Tournament MVP, the Peter J. Cutino Award winner and was selected as the 2019 Google Cloud Academic All-America Team Member of the Year for Division I at-large programs. The Trojans won the MPSF title, defeating Stanford by a score of, 9-8.



Built on a firm foundation of academic excellence and superior athletic performance, the Pac-12 Conference renewed its undisputed claim as the Conference of Champions® in 2018-19. Beyond the courts and fields, the Pac-12's accomplishments extend into the classrooms across 12 campuses, and outside its traditional geographic footprint into new corners around the world.

The only conference to win 500 NCAA Championships, the Pac-12 once again led the nation in 2018-19 with 13 NCAA crowns. This haul adds to an incredible 188 NCAA team titles claimed since 1999-2000 and 330 since 1981-82, the start of women's sports sponsorship, an average of nearly nine per year. Even more impressive has been the breadth of the Pac-12's success with championships coming in 28 different men's and women's sports. The Pac-12 has led or tied the nation in NCAA Championships in 53 of the last 59 years, with the exceptions coming no lower than third.

For the 14th-consecutive year, the Pac-12 had the most, or tied for the most, NCAA titles of any conference in the country, winning at least six every year since 1999-2000. No other conference has won double-digit NCAA crowns in a single year, the Pac-12 doing so 11 times, including a record 14 in 1996-97.

Spanning over a century of outstanding athletics achievements, the Pac-12 has claimed 526 NCAA Championships (304 men's, 191 women's, 31 combined), over 200 more than the next league.

Pac-12 members have won 304 NCAA team championships on the men's side, 85 more than the next-closest conference. Men's NCAA crowns have come at a phenomenal rate for the Pac-12 - 16 basketball titles by six schools, 54 tennis titles, 47 outdoor track & field crowns, and 29 baseball titles. Pac-12 members have won 25 of 49 NCAA titles in volleyball, 45 of 50 in water polo, 31 in skiing, and 25 in swimming & diving national championships.

On the women's side, the story is much the same. Since the NCAA began conducting women's championships 38 years ago, Pac-12 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season on 29 occasions, including every year except one since 2000-01. Overall, the Pac-12 has captured 191 NCAA women's titles, easily outdistancing the SEC, which is second with 103. Pac-12 members have dominated a number of sports, winning 24 softball titles, 24 tennis crowns, 16 volleyball titles, 19 of the last 30 trophies in golf, and 17 in swimming & diving.

Individually, the Conference has produced an impressive number of NCAA individual champions. Over 2,000 (2,379) individual crowns have been won by Pac-12 student-athletes over the years with 1,383 by male student-athletes. Pac-12 women student-athletes have captured an unmatched 808 NCAA individual crowns, an average of over 21 championships per season, including 29 in 2018-19. Student-athletes have also captured 188 individual titles at combined championships (i.e., skiing and fencing).

The Pac-12's excellence is further proven in the annual Division I Learfield IMG College Directors' Cup competition, the prestigious award that honors the best overall collegiate athletics programs in the country. STANFORD won an unprecedented 25th-consecutive Directors' Cup in 2018-19 to lead the Conference, leading a 1-5-6 finish for Pac-12 institutions. Six Pac-12 member institutions ranked among the top-25 Division I programs: No. 1 STANFORD, No. 5 USC, No. 6 UCLA, No. 18 CALIFORNIA, No. 19 ARIZONA STATE and No. 24 WASHINGTON. At least five member institutions have been ranked in the top 25 each year of the Directors' Cup program.

2018-19 REVIEW

The Conference's 13 NCAA titles came in the form of eight women's, four men's crowns and one from a combined sport. Seven Conference members claimed at least one NCAA title and, of the five institutions in the country to have won multiple titles, two were from the Pac-12.

STANFORD's tied the single-season NCAA record for most NCAA titles with six, a record the Cardinal had set in 1996-97. The Cardinal extended its streak of winning an NCAA title to 43 years with the women's volleyball team capturing its second crown in three years and NCAA-leading eighth national championship all-time. The Cardinal women's swimming and diving team won a third-straight title, won its sixth men's gymnastics crown, captured its NCAA-leading seventh women's water polo national championship, claimed its nation-leading 20th women's tennis title, wrapping up the year with men's golf winning its first NCAA Championship since 2007, upsetting three higher-seeded teams along the way. Stanford was one of just five teams in the nation to win multiple NCAA Championships in 2018-19 and the only one to win more than a pair.

Also a multiple championship winner, UCLA defended its beach volleyball title winning an All-Pac-12 final and claimed its NCAA-leading 12th softball crown, the Conference's first since 2011.

Led by senior Dani Jones who claimed the individual crown, COLORADO dominated the women's cross country field to claim its third all-time title. USC won its 10th national championship in men's water polo, playing in its NCAA-record 14th-consecutive final. UTAH skiing won its second title in three years and 12th all-time while CALIFORNIA men's swimming and diving built a commanding 85-point cushion over the second-place team to win its first national crown since 2014 and sixth in program history. WASHINGTON women's rowing swept all three grand finals to win the NCAA Championship for the second time in three years.

In addition to the 13 national championships, the Pac-12 also had runners-

up in six NCAA Championship events: men's water polo (STANFORD), women's swimming (CALIFORNIA), women's indoor track & field (USC), women's water polo (USC), beach volleyball (USC) and women's track & field (USC). In nine sports, there were at least two teams among the final four and 33 teams finished in the top four at 21 NCAA Championship events, including all-Pac-12 finals in beach volleyball, men's water polo and women's water polo.

Participation in the postseason was a common occurrence for the Pac-12 in 2018-19. Of the 24 sports sponsored by the Conference, 19 witnessed at least half its teams participating in NCAA or other postseason action. The men sent 63 of a possible 95 teams into the postseason (66.3 percent), while the women sent 79 of a possible 130 teams (60.8 percent).

WASHINGTON won its second Pac-12 Football Championship Game in three years, and 17th overall, with a 10-3 win over UTAH. It was the seventh time in the last eight seasons where the North Division won the Conference championship. With Utah's participation in the Championship Game, the South Division has now sent all six teams to the Pac-12 Championship Game in its eight-year existence.

Washington LB Ben Burr-Kirven was named the Pac-12's Pat Tillman Defensive Player of the Year and earned first team All-America status by the Football Writers' Association and the Associated Press. He was also recognized as the Pac-12 Football Scholar-Athlete of the Year. WASHINGTON STATE, which tied Washington atop the North Division, was victorious in the Alamo Bowl to cap an 11-2 season. Quarterback Gardner Minshew II, the Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Year, led the Cougars to their most wins in a season in school history, establishing a new Pac-12 single-season passing mark as he threw for 4,779 yards. OREGON DB Ugochukwu Amadi received the Lombardi Award honoring the top FBS player regardless of position. It is the second-straight season a Pac-12 player earned the award. Three players earned Google Academic All-America Honors — Oregon QB Justin Herbert was named a first team selection, and tabbed as the Academic All-America Team Member of the Year; UW LB Ben Burr-Kirven and OREGON STATE WR Timmy Hernandez were second-team honorees. A total of 33 Pac-12 players were selected in the NFL Draft and now have had three or more players selected in the first round since 2011.

Led by OREGON's surprising four-wins-in-four-days run to the Pac-12 Tournament title in Las Vegas at T-Mobile Arena, Pac-12 men's basketball sent three teams to the NCAA Tournament (ARIZONA STATE, OREGON and WASHINGTON) and a fourth to the NIT (COLORADO) in 2018-19. The Ducks continued their postseason success into the Sweet 16 for the third time in four seasons before bowing out to eventual national champion Virginia, while the Buffaloes reached the NIT quarter-finals before falling on the road to eventual champion Texas. The Huskies claimed the outright Pac-12 regular-season title, clinching the crown in late February thanks to the fifth-best start in Conference history at 10-0 en route to a 15-3 league mark. It marked just the ninth time in Conference history the same school won outright league titles in both football and men's basketball in the same academic year.

Pac-12 women's basketball has been riding a wave of success over the last five years, establishing itself as a premier league in the sport. After defending its Pac-12 regular-season title, OREGON advanced to its first-ever NCAA Women's Final Four marking the 10th time in 12 years a league team has reached the national semifinal. With at least half the league earning a NCAA Tournament bid for the third-straight year, the Pac-12 went a combined 11-1 in the first two round, the best record for a conference since 1997. Five teams advanced to the Sweet 16 for the second time in three years and was the only league to have at least two teams in the Elite Eight the last four years. Joining the Ducks in the postseason were ARIZONA STATE, CALIFORNIA, OREGON STATE, STANFORD and UCLA. ARIZONA represented the Conference in the WNIT, capturing the tournament crown in front of a Pac-12 record and sold out crowd of 14,644. The Wildcats recorded the best turnaround in the country, going from six wins to 24 in 2018-19. The Cardinal claimed its 13th all-time Pac-12 Tournament crown which was held for the first time in Las Vegas at the MGM Grand Garden Arena. For the first time ever, five Pac-12 teams appeared in the Associated Press final poll, with two ranked in the top 10, extending the Conference's streak of two top-10 ranked teams to five-consecutive years. UO junior Sabrina Ionescu continued to set NCAA triple-doubles records, owning the most in a career by any man or woman (18), and also set the single-season mark. She was tabbed the WBCA and John R. Wooden National Player of the Year. Cal's Kristine Anigwe was selected the WBCA National Defensive Player of the Year.

STANFORD won its won its 18th all-time Pac-12 women's volleyball title en route to winning its NCAA-leading eighth NCAA title in the sport with two-time AVCA National Player of the Year and Pac-12 Player of the Year Kathryn Plummer leading the way. Eight league teams earned NCAA Tournament bids, marking the fifth time in the last six years at least eight Conference teams participated in the postseason event. Along with Stanford, COLORADO, OREGON, USC, UTAH, WASHINGTON and WASHINGTON STATE punched their tickets to the tournament. Thirteen student-athletes were selected AVCA All-Americans, with eight of those being sophomores or juniors. Six teams appeared in the final AVCA Coaches poll. The Pac-12 has won a NCAA-record 16 of the 38 NCAA titles awarded.

UCLA won its 10th all-time Pac-12 baseball title, setting new program records for wins (52) and league wins (24). The Bruins led the country with a .855 regular-season winning percentage, earning the No. 1 overall seed in the NCAA

Tournament. The league earned five tournament berths for the most since 2015, with invitations given to ARIZONA STATE, CALIFORNIA, OREGON STATE and STANFORD, in addition to the Bruins. OSU's Adley Rutschman had one of the most memorable seasons in collegiate baseball history, winning nearly every major award this season, including becoming the second-straight Pac-12 student-athlete to claim the Golden Spikes Award and ninth all-time in Pac-12 history, the most for any conference. The Pac-12 has, by far, won the most baseball national titles of any conference in the country, claiming 29 titles dating back to 1947.

UCLA softball recorded the Pac-12's 13th and final NCAA title of the 2018-19 season. The Pac-12 Conference has historically dominated the sport, claiming 24 NCAA titles in the 38-year history of the championship. Pac-12 teams captured an unprecedented nine in a row from 1988-1997, then claimed six-straight from 2006-11. The Bruins and WASHINGTON shared the Pac-12 crown, earning the No. 2 and No. 3 seeds, respectively, in the NCAA Tournament. Five Conference teams earned trips to the NCAA Tournament, the 24th-consecutive year the Pac-12 has had five or more teams advance to the postseason, including at least three berths every year since the league began sponsoring the sport in 1987. The Pac-12 had the most representation in the NCAA Women's College World Series with the Huskies and ARIZONA joining the Bruins in Oklahoma City. ARIZONA STATE and STANFORD also earned postseason bids. Led by two-time national player of the year Rachel Garcia, UCLA's appearance in the championship series marked the 30th time at least one Pac-12 team reached the finale.

PAC-12 CONFERENCE HISTORY

The roots of the Pac-12 Conference date back more than 100 years, to December 2, 1915, when the Pacific Coast Conference (PCC) was founded at a meeting at the Imperial Hotel in Portland, Ore. The original membership consisted of four schools - the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Washington, the University of Oregon, and Oregon Agricultural College (now Oregon State University). All four are still charter members of the Conference.

Pacific Coast Conference play began in 1916 and, one year later, Washington State College (now Washington State University) was accepted into the league, with Stanford University following in 1918.

In 1922, the PCC expanded to eight teams with the admission of the University of Southern California (USC) and the University of Idaho. In 1924, the University of Montana joined the league roster and in 1928, the PCC grew to 10 members with the addition of UCLA.

The Pacific Coast Conference competed as a 10-member league until 1950, with the exception of 1943-45 when World War II curtailed intercollegiate athletic competition to a minimum. During that time, the league's first commissioner was named. Edwin N. Atherton was Commissioner in 1940 and was succeeded by Victor O. Schmidt in 1944. In 1950, Montana resigned from the Conference and the PCC continued as a nine-team Conference through 1958.

In 1959, the PCC was dissolved and the Athletic Association of Western Universities (AAWU) was formed with Thomas J. Hamilton appointed Commissioner of the new league. The original AAWU membership included California, Stanford, USC, UCLA, and Washington. Washington State joined the membership in 1962, while Oregon and Oregon State joined in 1964. Under Hamilton's watch, the name Pacific-8 Conference was adopted in 1968. In 1971, Wiles Hallock took over as Commissioner of the Pac-8.

Ten years later, on July 1, 1978, the University of Arizona and Arizona State University were admitted to the league and the Pacific-10 Conference became a reality. In 1986-87, the league took on a new look, expanding to include 10 women's sports. Since then, the Conference has been considered the premier league in women's athletics, securing the most NCAA titles in women's sports of any conference nearly every year.

Thomas C. Hansen was named the Commissioner of the Pac-10 in 1983, a role he would hold for 26 years until 2009, when he was succeeded by current Commissioner Larry Scott.

The University of Colorado accepted its invitation to join the Pac-12 on June 11, 2010, and on June 17, 2010, the University of Utah agreed to join the Conference. The Buffaloes and Utes officially became the 11th and 12th members of the Conference on July 1, 2011, the first additions to the league since 1978.

It was during the 2010-11 academic year that Scott helped deliver monumental changes that transformed the Conference into a modern 12-team league. In addition to expanding to 12 teams, member institutions agreed to equal revenue sharing for the first time in the Conference's history, created two football divisions - the North and the South, and established a Football Championship Game for the first time. He also secured landmark media rights deals with ESPN and FOX that dramatically increased national exposure and revenue for each school, in addition to establishing Pac-12 Networks which guaranteed enhanced exposure across all sports.

Currently, the Pac-12 sponsors 11 men's sports and 13 women's sports, with the most recent additions coming in the 2017-18 (women's lacrosse) and 2015-16 (beach volleyball) academic years. Additionally, the Conference is a member of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) in four other men's sports and two women's sports.

The Pac-12 Conference offices are located in the heart of San Francisco in the SOMA district.

PAC-12 TOPS FINAL LEARFIELD DIRECTORS' CUP

SAN FRANCISCO - The STANFORD Cardinal captured its 25th-consecutive Directors' Cup with USC and UCLA finishing fifth and sixth, respectively, leading the Pac-12 Conference to another impressive finish in the final 2018-19 Division I Learfield IMG College Directors' Cup standings. The Pac-12 placed six teams among the top 25 as only the 14-member SEC had more with eight.

Led by six NCAA titles (women's volleyball, women's swimming and diving, men's gymnastics, women's water polo, women's tennis, men's golf), Stanford won its 25th-consecutive Cup. In all, the Cardinal posted 16 top five finishes in tallying a record 1,567.75 points. It's the fifth time Stanford has eclipsed 1,500.00 points.

Behind one NCAA title (men's water polo) and four runner-up finishes on the women's side (indoor track and field, beach volleyball, outdoor track and field, water polo), USC finished in the top 10 for the eighteenth time in the history of the Directors' Cup, coming in fifth with 1,075.75 points. UCLA posted a pair of national titles (beach volleyball and softball) to place sixth with 1,056.50 points for its 23rd top-10 finish. CALIFORNIA placed 18th overall with 835.75 points, aided by a national title in men's swimming and diving, to claim its 20th consecutive top-20 finish. Coming in at 19th with 821 points, ARIZONA STATE posted its first top-20 finish since 2013.

Thanks in part to a women's rowing title, WASHINGTON posted its second-most points with 801.00 to finish 24th. OREGON placed 27th (762.25 points), ARIZONA was 41st (572.50), followed by COLORADO in 50th (511.00) as the Buffs captured their third NCAA women's cross country title. OREGON STATE placed 65th (364.35), followed by UTAH in 79th (278.75) after the Utes took home the NCAA skiing title, and WASHINGTON STATE rounds out the team scoring for the Pac-12, finishing 88th (206.50).

The success of the Pac-12 in the Cup was bolstered by the capturing of 13 NCAA titles, most among all conferences. In addition, nine Pac-12 league members combined to post 32 top-four finishes in 24 NCAA championships.

The Directors' Cup was developed as a joint effort between the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and *USA Today*. 19 sports - four of which must be baseball and men's basketball, women's basketball and women's volleyball. Then the next highest 15 (max.) sports scored for each institution, regardless of gender, will be used in the standings.

UCLA won its 10th all-time Pac-12 baseball title and fourth since Pac-12 Coach of the Year **John Savage** took over in 2005. The Bruins set new program records for wins with 52 and conference wins with 24. The team also broke the school record with an .855 regular-season win percentage, which led the country. The Bruins were the No. 1 team in the nation in the *USA Today* poll for a program-record 11 straight weeks and earned the No. 1 overall seed in the NCAA Tournament for just the second time in school history. UCLA found success behind its dominant pitching staff, which led the nation in ERA (2.60) and shutouts (11). The Pac-12 Pitcher of the Year, UCLA's **Ryan Garcia** led the league and ranked fourth in the country with a 1.44 ERA, the second-best national WHIP at .83 and a league-best 117 strikeouts.

Along with UCLA, No. 11 STANFORD, No. 16 OREGON STATE, CALIFORNIA and ARIZONA STATE also earned NCAA tournament appearances for the most NCAA bids for the Conference since 2015 when six teams were selected. The Golden Bears notched their first appearance since 2015, while Stanford and Oregon State are two of only four teams in the nation to be named a NCAA Regional host the last three years with the Beavers earning a national seed for a team-best third-consecutive year. UCLA and Stanford battled through the elimination bracket of the regional round and won three-straight games to clinch a spot in the NCAA Super Regional, the second-straight year two Pac-12 teams have advanced to the second weekend.

Oregon State's **Adley Rutschman**, the Pac-12 Player of the Year and Pac-12 Co-Defensive Player of the Year, had one of the most memorable seasons in collegiate baseball history. The junior catcher won nearly every major national award this year: Golden Spikes Award, Dick Howser Trophy, and National Player of the Year by *Collegiate Baseball*, *Baseball America*, *Perfect Game* and *D1Baseball.com*. He became the second-straight and ninth all-time Pac-12 student-athlete to win the Golden Spikes Award, the most of any conference. The 2019 Buster Posey Award winner, Rutschman was selected No. 1 overall in the 2019 MLB Draft, giving the Pac-12 a NCAA-best seven No. 1 draft picks all-time.

A Conference-record 70 student-athletes were selected over three days of the 2019 MLB Draft, including three top 10 picks for the first time since 2006. For the eighth-straight year, every Pac-12 team had at least one player drafted. UCLA's 13 selections tied for the most of any school in the nation.

Also earning Pac-12 honors was Co-Defensive Player of the Year Stanford catcher **Maverick Handley**, the first Cardinal to win the award, after leading the Conference in pickoffs with nine. Arizona freshman **Austin Wells** also made history, becoming the first Wildcat to win Pac-12 Freshman of the Year since the award started in 1999. Wells was pivotal in Arizona's highly-productive offense, leading all Division I freshmen with 72 runs scored.

Led by OREGON's surprising four-wins-in-four-days run to the Pac-12 Men's Basketball Tournament title, the Conference sent three teams — ARIZONA STATE, OREGON and WASHINGTON — to the NCAA Tournament and a fourth — COLORADO — to the NIT in 2018-19. The Ducks continued their postseason success into the NCAA Sweet 16 for the third time in four seasons before bowing out to eventual national champion Virginia. The Buffaloes reached the NIT quarterfinals before falling on the road to eventual champion Texas.

The Huskies claimed the outright Pac-12 regular-season title, clinching the crown in late February thanks to a 10-0 start, the fifth-best start in Conference history, en route to a 15-3 league mark. It marked just the ninth time in league history the same school won outright league titles in both football and men's basketball in the same academic year.

Washington's **Matisse Thybulle** became the Pac-12's career steals leader, passing Oregon State's Gary Payton, with his 322nd career steal in the Pac-12 Tournament title game against Oregon. Thybulle finished his career with 331 steals, the 17th-most in NCAA Division I history. Thybulle was named the 2019 Naismith Defensive Player of the Year. The two-time Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year finished the season with 126 steals to break the Conference's single-season record previously held by Jason Kidd of Cal (1992-93), and was the 10th most in a single-season in NCAA history.

UW sophomore **Jaylen Nowell** was voted the Pac-12 Player of the Year becoming the ninth underclassmen to win the award all-time, including the sixth since 2007-08 and third in the last four seasons. ASU's **Luguentz Dort** became the Sun Devils' fifth recipient of the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year honor after leading all rookies and ranking in the top 10 overall in scoring and steals. The Buffs sophomore **Tyler Bey** was tabbed the league's Most Improved Player of the Year and UTAH sophomore **Danny Tillman** was selected the Pac-12 Sixth Man of the Year. The Huskies' **Mike Hopkins** earned his second-straight Pac-12 John R. Wooden Coach of the Year honor, guiding UW to its 12th league title and first since 2011-12.

Six former Pac-12 standouts were selected in the 2019 NBA Draft, highlighted by a pair of first-round selections and multiple picks from 2018-19 Pac-12 regular-season champion WASHINGTON. The six selections coupled with the 21 picks from the 2017 (14) and 2018 (seven) drafts matches the Conference's three-year record total of 27 from 2007-09. The Pac-12 has had 39 total draft picks over the last five seasons, tied for the second-most of any league.

OREGON's first-ever trip to the NCAA Women's Final Four and ARIZONA's WNIT Championship victory in front of a record crowd capped another historic Pac-12 women's basketball campaign. The Ducks won the Pac-12 regular-season crown for the second year in a row, while Stanford won its 13th Pac-12 Tournament title which was held in Las Vegas for the first time at the MGM Grand Garden Arena.

For the 10th time in 12 years a Pac-12 team was in the national semifinal, the Ducks becoming the fifth-different league squad to advance that far since 2013. No other conference has sent as many different teams to the Final Four during that span. The Ducks (No. 2), OREGON STATE (No. 4) and Stanford (No. 2) each received top-16 seedings. Joining them in the NCAA Tournament were ARIZONA STATE, CALIFORNIA and UCLA, marking the third-straight year at least six Pac-12 teams earned bids. The Conference went 11-1 in the first two rounds, the best record for a conference since 1997, while going undefeated in the first round for the third time in four years. The Pac-12 placed five teams in the Sweet 16 for the second time in three years and was the only league to have at least two teams in the Elite Eight the last four years.

Arizona recorded the best turnaround in the country, going from six wins in 2018 to 24 in 2018-19, marking UA's first 20-win season in eight years. Averaging over 7,200 in attendance during its postseason run, Arizona set the Pac-12's all-time single-game attendance mark in the WNIT final (14,644).

UO's **Sabrina Ionescu** was named the WBCA Wade Trophy and John R. Wooden Award Trophy winner, presented to the nation's top-collegiate women's basketball player, also winning the Pac-12's top honor. She broke the NCAA's single-season triple-doubles record, and became the NCAA's men's and women's career record holder. California's **Kristine Anigwe**, who was voted Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year, was tabbed the Naismith National Defensive Player of the Year while Ionescu won the WBCA's Nancy Lieberman Award (presented to the nation's top point guard) for the second-straight year. For the first time since 1993, three from the Pac-12 were tabbed USBWA All-Americans - Anigwe, Ionescu and Stanford's **Alanna Smith**. OSU's **Aleah Goodman** won the inaugural Pac-12 Sixth Player of the Year honor and Oregon's **Kelly Graves** was voted Pac-12 Coach of the Year for the first time. UTAH's **Dre'Una Edwards** was named Pac-12 Freshman of the Year.

For the first time ever, five Pac-12 teams appeared in the *Associated Press* final poll, with two ranked in the top 10, extending the Conference's streak of two top-10 ranked teams to five-consecutive years. For the first time ever, five Pac-12 teams are in the top 15 of the final USA Today/WBCA Coaches poll, also making the second time in three years five teams are in the final ranking. Additionally, it marks the first time three teams are ranked in the coaches' final top 10.

UCLA avenged its Pac-12 Championship loss going 4-0 at the NCAA Championship to upset top-seeded USC in an all-Pac-12 final, 3-0, to win back-to-back beach volleyball national titles. In the four years of the NCAA Beach Volleyball Championship, USC (2016, 2017) and the Bruins are the only two teams to have ever claimed the trophy.

The top seed in the NCAA Championship for the second time in the history of the event, the Trojans were upset in the first dual but dominated in the elimination bracket to reach the championship bout before falling to the second-seeded Bruins. That was a week after USC defeated top-seeded and then-top ranked UCLA twice at the Pac-12 Championship, 3-2. The Trojans knocked off the defending Conference champion Bruins, hosting the league tournament for the second time at Norman Merle Stadium.

USC's **Tina Graudina** was tabbed the Pac-12 Player of the Year, as voted on by the league's coaches, and the duo of **Abril Bustamante** and Graudina were voted the Pac-12 Pair of the Year. USC's **Anna Collier** was voted the Pac-12 Coach of the Year for the first time, while CALIFORNIA's **Jordan Polo** was selected the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year, the first Golden Bear to earn the honor.

Collier was voted the AVCA National Coach of the Year for the second time in her career and the first time since 2014. Four pairs and nine individuals from the Conference received national recognition, including UCLA's pairs of **Megan** and **Nicole McNamara**, and **Lily Justine** and **Sarah Sponcil**, and USC's duos of Bustamante and Graudina, and **Terese Cannon** and **Sammy Slater**. Cal's **Mima Mirkovic** was an honorable mention All-American.

The Bruins and the Trojans were the Nos. 1 and 2 teams, respectively, in the AVCA Coaches poll all season except the week of April 29, heading into the NCAA Championship where USC briefly took over the top spot and UCLA was at No. 2. After earning its first-ever top-10 national ranking in the national coaches poll, No. 11 CALIFORNIA is in the final polling for the second-straight year, registering multiple wins over top-10 programs for the first time this season, while No. 20 ARIZONA STATE entered the poll for the first time ever after posting a record number of team wins this year. No. 13 ARIZONA is in the final top 15 for the fourth-consecutive year.

PAC-12 BEACH VOLLEYBALL SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Izzy Carey, UCLA

A Pac-12 men's cross country teams reached the NCAA Championships podium for the 13th-consecutive year as COLORADO (178 points) had three runners place in the top 11 to finish fourth overall behind now three-time defending champion Northern Arizona (83), runner-up BYU (116) and third-place Portland (160). It was the Buffs' best finish since a runner-up showing in 2015.

In his final collegiate cross country race, senior **Grant Fisher** was narrowly edged at the tape by half a second by Morgan McDonald of host Wisconsin to lead STANFORD to a fifth-place team finish. It was the Cardinal's fifth-consecutive top-five showing at the NCAA meet and Fisher's fourth All-America honor.

WASHINGTON completed its best season in three decades with a sixth-place finish, bettered only by a fourth place in 1989, to give the Pac-12 three in the top 10 for the third time in the past four years. Eight from the Pac-12 finished in the top 40 to earn All-America honors, the most of any league in the meet. Since expanding to the Pac-12 in 2011, the Conference's men's programs lead the nation with a combined 14 top-five team finishes and 68 All-Americans at the NCAA Championship.

Along with his league-best runner-up showing at the national meet, Stanford's Fisher repeated as Pac-12 individual champion to lead the Cardinal to a second-consecutive Pac-12 crown.

PAC-12 MEN'S CROSS COUNTRY SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Grant Fisher, Stanford

Led by senior **Dani Jones'** individual victory, COLORADO women's cross country won the NCAA team title to headline a dominant performance by Pac-12 programs at the 2018 NCAA Championships at Wisconsin's cold and snowy Thomas Zimmer Championship Course. Pac-12 and NCAA West Regional Champion OREGON made the podium in third place to give the Pac-12 half of the event's podium spots.

Jones, who also repeated as Pac-12 individual champion, became only the fourth women's individual national champion in Conference history and the first in 17 years by beating out New Mexico's Weini Kelati by 2.5 seconds. All five of Colorado's scorers – and six CU runners in total – earned All-America honors as the Buffaloes posted the fourth-lowest point total (65) under the NCAA Championships' current 6k format (since 2001) to knock off two-time defending champion New Mexico (103). Along with Oregon in third, STANFORD recorded a third-straight top-five finish, WASHINGTON came in ninth for its best NCAA showing since 2012 and OREGON STATE came in 27th in its first NCAA appearance to cap the best season in program history.

The Pac-12's 13 women's All-Americans were just one shy of the league-record of 14 set in 2017. Since expanding to the Pac-12 in 2011, the Conference has amassed 77 All-Americans, by far the most of any league with the ACC second with 35.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Elise Cranny, Stanford

The WASHINGTON Huskies won their second Pac-12 Championship Game in three years, and 17th league title overall, with a 10-3 win over Utah. It was the seventh time in the last eight seasons the North Division has won the Conference championship. With Utah's participation, the South Division has now sent all six teams to the Pac-12 Championship Game in its eight year existence.

Washington LB **Ben Burr-Kirven** was named the Pac-12's Pat Tillman Defensive Player of the Year and earned first team All-America status by the Football Writer's Association and the *Associated Press*. He was also recognized as the Pac-12 Football Scholar Athlete of the Year. WASHINGTON STATE, which tied Washington atop the North Division, was victorious in the Alamo Bowl to cap an 11-2 season. Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Year quarterback **Gardner Minshew II** led the Cougars to their most wins in a season in school history. Minshew established a new single-season passing mark in the Pac-12, throwing for 4,779 yards. WSU's **Mike Leach** was not only tabbed the Pac-12 Coach of the Year, but earned AFCA Coach of the Year honors, as well. STANFORD and OREGON each picked up bowl wins in the Sun Bowl and the Redbox Bowl, respectively, to finish with identical 9-4 records. It is just the second time that four or more teams in one division recorded nine or more wins (also in 2014, South Division). Oregon DB **Ugochukwu Amadi** received the Lombardi Award honoring the top FBS player regardless of position. It is the second-straight season a Pac-12 player earned the award (Stanford's Bryce Love in 2017). UTAH won its first South Division crown and completed the season with a 9-5 record, marking the fourth time in five seasons the Utes have posted nine or more wins. OREGON STATE RB **Jermar Jefferson** was named the Pac-12 Freshman Offensive Player of the Year, leading all FBS freshmen in rushing with 1,380 yards and 12 TDs. ARIZONA STATE LB **Merlin Robertson** was tabbed Pac-12 Freshman Defensive Player of the Year after he led the Sun Devils with 77 tackles, 8.5 tackles for loss and 5.0 sacks.

Three Conference standouts were named Senior CLASS second team All-Americans: CALIFORNIA's **Patrick Laird**, Stanford's **Bryce Love**, Stanford, and USC's **Cameron Smith**. CLASS is an acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School. The award honors the attributes of senior student-athletes in four areas: community, classroom, character and competition. Three additional players were recognized for their work in the classroom earning Google Academic All-America Honors. Oregon QB **Justin Herbert** was named a first team Academic All-America selection, and tabbed as the Academic All-America Team Member of the Year. Earning second team honors were Washington LB **Ben Burr-Kirven** and OSU WR **Timmy Hernandez**.

STANFORD won its final five tournaments and ended the season with its ninth NCAA title. It entered the postseason having won its 11th Pac-12 title after navigating the Eugene Country Club course to post a four-round team score of 7-under (1413), edging second-place UCLA (even par) and third-place CALIFORNIA (1-over). The Cardinal were paced by a trio of top-10 finishers at the Pac-12 Championships in **Isaiah Salinda** (5th, -3), **Brandon Wu** (T7th, -1), and **Daulet Tuleubayev** (T7th, -1).

Eight teams (ARIZONA, ARIZONA STATE, California, OREGON, OREGON STATE, Stanford, UCLA, USC) participated in the NCAA Regional Championships where the Sun Devils, Golden Bears, Cardinal and Trojans advanced to the NCAA Championships. Oregon's **Edwin Yi** and UTAH's **Kyler Dunkle** earned spots at the NCAA Championships as individuals. Stanford advanced to match play as the No. 6 seed where it went on to upset No. 4 Wake Forest, No. 3 Vanderbilt and No. 2 Texas to post the Pac-12's 16th NCAA title in men's golf.

California's **Collin Morikawa** earned Pac-12 medalist honors after he posted a 72-hole career-best 12-under, edging Utah's Dunkle (-8) and UCLA's **Cole Madey** (-5). Morikawa was named the Pac-12 Men's Golfer of the Year for his season-long effort that included nine top-5 finishes and a pair of victories as he posted par or better in 32 of 38 rounds. Morikawa finished the year ranked No. 2 by Golfstat with a 69.00 average, with Arizona State's **Chun An Yu** at No. 4 (69.20 avg) and USC's **Justin Suh** at No. 6 (69.37).

Arizona State's **Cameron Sisk** was tabbed Pac-12 Freshman of the Year and Sun Devil coach **Matt Thurmond** picked up Pac-12 Coach of the Year honors for the third time in his career, his first at the helm of the Sun Devils.

Morikawa, An Yu and Suh were recognized for their season-long performances and were tabbed first team All-Americans by the Golf Coaches Association of America and *Golfweek*. Earning PING GCAA second team All-America honors were Stanford's **Isaiah Salinda** and **Brandon Wu**. Stanford's **Conrad Ray** was named the Dave Williams Award winner as the Division I Coach of the Year. Arizona State's **Armen Kirakossian** was recipient of the Jan Strickland Outstanding Assistant Coach Award as selected by the GCAA.

The USC Trojans captured their sixth Pac-12 title, and fifth in the last 12 years, with a 54-hole total of 851 (-1), 11 shots clear of second-place ARIZONA at the Pac-12 Women's Golf Championships at Palos Verdes Golf Club. ARIZONA STATE's **Olivia Mehaffey** and STANFORD's **Albane Valenzuela** finished tied atop the leaderboard at 4-under, before Mehaffey prevailed on the first playoff hole to earn medalist honors.

Nine teams were selected for NCAA Regionals (Arizona, Arizona State, CALIFORNIA, OREGON, OREGON STATE, Stanford, UCLA USC and WASHINGTON). Six advanced to the NCAA Championships where Arizona, Stanford and USC advanced from stroke play to match play. The Cardinal and Trojans were eliminated in the quarterfinals, while the defending NCAA Champion Wildcats bowed out in the semifinals.

Stanford junior **Albane Valenzuela** was named the Pac-12 Women's Golfer of the Year after collecting five top-8 finishes during the 2018-19 season and capping the year with a sixth-place showing at the NCAA Championships. USC's **Malia Nam** secured Pac-12 Freshman of the Year honors, while Arizona head coach **Laura Ianello** and USC's **Justin Silverstein** were named Pac-12 Co-Coaches of the Year. Ianello led the Wildcats to either a first- or second-place finish five times this season, including runner-up showings at the Pac-12 Championships and the NCAA East Lansing Regional. A year after leading the Wildcats to the NCAA title, she led the team to the semifinals at this year's Championships before bowing out to eventual national champion Duke. In his first season as head coach, Silverstein led USC to seven tournament wins, including the Pac-12 Championships and NCAA Cle Elum Regional. He extended USC's streak of top-five NCAA stroke play finishes to 14 after finishing third at this year's NCAA Championships.

The depth of talent in the Pac-12 was evident by the selection of 14 individuals to the WGCA All-America teams. USC's **Jennifer Chang**, UCLA's **Patty Tavatanakit**, Stanford's **Andrea Lee** and **Albane Valenzuela** earned first team recognition. Arizona's **Yu-Sang Hou** and **Bianca Pagdanganan**, USC's **Malia Nam** and **Gabriela Ruffels**, and Arizona State's **Mehaffey** earned second team honors. Honorable mention selections included USC's **Alyaa Abdulghany** and **Amelia Garvey**, UCLA's **Mariel Galdiano**, Stanford's **Aline Krauter** and Arizona's **Haley Moore**.

UCLA defended its Pac-12 title with a season-high 198.400 at the first-ever neutral-site Pac-12 Gymnastics Championships, edging second-place UTAH (198.025) by .375 points. UCLA's **Kyla Ross** won Pac-12 Gymnast of the Year and set several NCAA records in 2019, including recording the most perfect 10s in a season (14: six on bars, four on vault, and two each on beam and floor), most consecutive meets with a perfect 10 (10) and most perfect 10s on uneven bars in a season (6) and in a career (9). She also made history by becoming the first gymnast to record two Gym Slams in one season, earning at least two perfect 10s in all four events. UCLA's **Katelyn Ohashi** was voted the Pac-12 Specialist of the Year, finishing her collegiate career by becoming just the fourth gymnast in history to record a NQS score of 10.0, doing so with her viral floor routine that amassed over 120 million views on social media. Ohashi has 11 perfect 10s in her career (9 on floor, 2 on beam).

The Pac-12 Freshman of the Year was CALIFORNIA's **Milan Clausi** who qualified for the NCAA Championship event as a vault specialist and performed a 9.825 Yurchenko 1.5. Clausi finished the season with a perfect 15-for-15 record on vault.

All eight Pac-12 teams qualified for NCAA Regionals and seven finished in the WCGA Top 25. UCLA placed third at the NCAA Championships finals scoring a 197.5375 to finish behind Oklahoma (198.3375) and LSU (197.8250). Utah's season finished in the first NCAA semifinal with a team score of 196.725, while OREGON STATE finished third in its semifinal with a 196.900, coming within .475 points of earning a spot in the team finals. UCLA's top-three finish at NCAA's is its 16th all-time coming under head coach **Valorie Kondos Field's** final season at the helm. For her efforts this season and after announcing her retirement, Kondos Field was recognized as the Pac-12 Coach of the Year, capping a 28-year career where she led the Bruins to seven NCAA team titles. Utah's **Megan Marsden** also retired following the 2019 season after 35 years on the Utah coaching staff where she led the Utes to six NCAA team titles.

Ross cleaned up on All-America honors, collecting first team recognition in the all-around and in all four events, while Utah's **MyKayla Skinner** picked up first team honors in the all-around, vault, floor and bars.

In the second season of Pac-12 women's lacrosse, a Conference-record three teams advanced to the NCAA Tournament after four-consecutive seasons with a pair of league teams earning postseason bids, dating back to the MPSF. Pac-12 regular-season champion USC won the Pac-12 Tournament, claiming the league's automatic bid, while COLORADO and STANFORD earned at-large berths in the 28-team field.

Guided by Pac-12 Coach of the Year **Lindsey Munday**, USC was a near perfect 9-1 in league play to claim the regular-season crown, then dominated in the league tournament, outscoring its opponents, 28-8, in two games to claim the crown. Trojans' back-to-back Pac-12 Midfielder of the Year, **Kerrigan Miller**, led the league in caused turnovers (41) and caused turnovers per game (2.05) for the second-straight season, while teammate **Jackie Gilbert** was voted Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year. USC made its fourth NCAA Tournament appearance in the last five years.

Colorado was in the NCAA Tournament for the third-straight year after advancing to the Pac-12 Tournament championship game for the second-straight year. The Buffs were the last Pac-12 team remaining in the NCAA Tournament after defeating No. 18 Dartmouth, 16-13, in the opening round before falling to No. 2 seed Boston College, 21-9.

Stanford made its ninth all-time NCAA appearance and was led by a league-best six All-Pac-12 members, including a pair of first team honorees in **Ali Baiocco** and **Julia Massaro**.

CALIFORNIA earned the No. 4 seed in the Pac-12 Tournament after going 3-7 in Conference action and posting a 7-12 overall mark. In only its second season as a varsity program, ARIZONA STATE went 2-8 in Conference play and 6-12 overall, facing six top-25 opponents this year. Oregon was led by Pac-12 Freshman of the Year **Rachel Hall**, who led the nation with 246 saves in her rookie season, an astounding 29-saves margin over the second-ranked goalkeeper in the category,

Three teams were ranked in the final IWLCA poll for the second consecutive season and second time ever with No. 13 USC, No. 21 Colorado and No. 23 Stanford.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S LACROSSE SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Carolyn Lee, Stanford

WASHINGTON won its third-straight Pac-12 title in dominant fashion, winning all five of its events to score 72 points, marking the first time since 2015 it swept all five events. It was the Huskies' 39th all-time league crown and ninth in the last 10 years. CALIFORNIA placed second with 63 points for the third-straight year, placing second in every event except for the Novice Eight. Cal's Varsity Eight has come in either first or second place at the Pac-12 Championships for eight-straight years. Stanford rounded out the podium in third with 54 points.

Through stormy conditions at Lake Natoma, Washington won the Varsity Four with a time of 6:18.298, with a 4.503 margin over second-place finisher Cal at the league championships. The V8 was the closest race of the day with UW edging Cal by just about three seats after the Golden Bears moved to within a seat with 150 meters to go before the Huskies made a final push to the finish line. Washington went on to win the second V8 (6:05.059), third V8 (5:55.887) and novice eight (5:50.809).

Washington, Cal, OREGON STATE and Stanford all earned bids to compete at the Intercollegiate Rowing Association (IRA) national championships also at Lake Natoma. UW took home the James Ten Eyck Trophy as the overall points winner (207) for the third-straight year and 12th time in the last 13 years. The Huskies won the third varsity eight and varsity four trophies, and took the silver medal in both the second varsity eight and the varsity eight. Cal, which won the second varsity eight final, finished third in the Ten Eyck standings. Stanford ended up finishing with the 14th-most points (55) and Oregon State accumulated the 17th-most points (31).

Washington's team captain **Ben Davison** garnered Pac-12 Men's Rowing Athlete of the Year honors. During his accomplished career at UW, Davison won three-straight Pac-12 Championships, an IRA National Championship his freshman year and four James Ten Eyck trophies. Stanford's **James Wright** was named the Pac-12 Men's Rowing Newcomer of the Year, the first Cardinal to earned the honor since 2012 and second all-time. For the third-straight year and ninth time in the last 10 years, UW head coach **Michael Callahan** was named the Pac-12 Men's Rowing Coach of the Year. With his 11th all-time honor, he surpasses previous Washington head coach Bob Ernst for most Conference coach of the year honors.

WASHINGTON swept all three grand finals to win its fifth all-time NCAA Championship. It was also the Huskies' second crown in the three-year tenure of head coach **Yasmin Farooq** after the Huskies won the NCAA title in 2017. Two years ago at Mercer Lake in New Jersey, the UW became the first team ever to sweep all three NCAA finals and two years later, Washington did it again. Additionally, the Huskies broke the NCAA regatta record in all three race categories, breaking their own record in the fours.

The varsity eight finish was nearly unprecedented as the six crews were separated by less than four seconds from first through sixth. Washington's time of 6:07.284 beat Texas' 6:07.971 with Michigan was less than a second back in third at 6:08.659. The Huskies' time broke the old NCAA regatta record (6:11.95; Stanford, 2009) by more than four seconds. STANFORD recorded a podium finish for the fourth time in six years, placing fourth. All three of CALIFORNIA's boats earned points for a sixth-place finish overall.

UW won its third-straight Pac-12 Championship by just a half a point over Stanford accumulating 39.5 points, the smallest margin of victory since 2010. It won four of five events to claim its 17th all-time Pac-12 title. It was the Cardinal's first second-place finish since 2016. California came in a close third with 38.5 points. It was a close competition throughout, as Cal won the women's V8 with a time of 6:11.901, Stanford came in second at 6:12.824 and Washington took third clocking in at 6:13.214. UW went on to win the second V8 with a time of 7:10.967. Halfway through the championships, Washington, California and Stanford were locked in a three-way tie for first place before the Huskies pulled away with three-straight victories in the V4 (7:26.553), third V8 (6:39.054) and novice eight (6:28.972). On top of its victory in the V8, Cal finished in the top three in all five events. Stanford placed second in all four events it raced in.

California's **Dana Moffat** was named Pac-12 Women's Rowing Athlete of the Year and **Kelsey McGinley** earned Stanford's first Pac-12 Women's Rowing Newcomer of the Year honor since 2002. Washington head coach **Yasmin Farooq** was tabbed Pac-12 Women's Rowing Coach of the Year for the third-straight season.

STANFORD claimed its Conference-record fifth-straight Pac-12 title and tied a program best with a sixth-consecutive NCAA Tournament berth and 17th all-time appearance. The three-time defending national champion (2015-17) Cardinal fell one win short of the NCAA College Cup in a narrow 3-2 loss to Akron, the eventual national runner-up.

Joining Stanford in the postseason were OREGON STATE, UCLA and WASHINGTON, marking the seventh time since the Conference started sponsoring men's soccer in 2000 that four teams qualified for NCAA play, including the fourth time in the last six seasons. At least two Pac-12 teams have earned a NCAA Tournament bid in all but one season dating back to 1997, with 2011 the lone exception.

The Beavers placed second in the Pac-12, equaling its best league finish in program history. Washington reached its sixth postseason in the last seven years, marking the Huskies' 25th all-time appearance. UCLA made its Conference-leading 45th all-time NCAA appearance and owns the most DI wins in NCAA history with 979 total victories and ranks second all-time by win percentage (.760).

Stanford's **Tanner Beason** became the first player in league history to earn both Pac-12 Player of the Year and Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year honors in the same season since the defensive award's inception in 2014, and was tabbed a semifinalist for the 2018 MAC Hermann Trophy. OSU's **Sofiane Djefal** earned Pac-12 Freshman of the Year and first-year OSU head coach **Terry Boss** was voted Pac-12 Coach of the Year.

Seven players were selected in the first two rounds of the 2019 MLS SuperDraft. UCLA standout freshman **Frankie Amaya** was selected No. 1 overall, becoming the sixth Bruin taken first-overall in the MLS draft and second in the last three years.

STANFORD went undefeated in Conference play to earn its fourth-consecutive and 13th all-time Pac-12 crown. Stanford was the final league team in the Tournament, earning its ninth all-time and second-straight NCAA Women's College Cup appearance. It was also the third-straight year at least one Pac-12 team was among the final four.

Five Pac-12 teams earned NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament berths, all five advancing to the second round, the first time since 2007 that Pac-12 teams went undefeated in the first round. With USC, UCLA and Stanford in the third round, three Conference teams were among the final 16 teams in the tournament for a third-straight year. Stanford earned a No. 1 seed, UCLA a No. 2 seed, and USC a No. 4 seed, while WASHINGTON STATE and ARIZONA clinched at-large bids.

The Conference was at the top of the national poll all season, finishing the season with three teams ranked in the top 10 in the United Soccer Coaches final poll. No. 3 Stanford, No. 5 UCLA and No. 6 USC gave the Pac-12 the most teams ranked in the top 10 of any other conference. Stanford held a stronghold over the No. 1 overall spot for 19-consecutive weeks before the final rankings. The Conference also occupied the top two spots in the nation 10 of 12 weeks this year.

Only a sophomore, **Catarina Macario** led the Cardinal this season, winning the MAC Hermann Trophy, the second Cardinal to win the honor. Stanford also nabbed the Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year (**Jordan DiBiasi**) and Pac-12 Defensive of the Year (**Alana Cook**) nods, and USC's **Kaylie Collins** was voted the league's top freshman and **Penelope Hocking** was the top goalkeeper.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S SOCCER SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Michelle Xiao, Stanford

UCLA capped a stellar Pac-12 softball season by winning its NCAA-leading 12th all-time NCAA Championship and the program's first since 2010. Making its fifth-straight NCAA Women's College World Series and national-best 29th all-time, second-seeded UCLA swept No. 1-seed Oklahoma in the championship series to win the crown. UCLA, No. 3 seed WASHINGTON and No. 6 seed ARIZONA all swept their respective NCAA Super Regionals, marking the 23rd time at least three Pac-12 teams advanced to the WCWS. This season also marked the 30th time at least one Pac-12 team was in the final series.

ARIZONA STATE and STANFORD received at-large bids, the 24th-straight season five-or-more Conference teams participated in the postseason. Three teams finished in the top five of the final USA Today/NFCA and USA Softball/ESPN polls with unanimous No. 1 UCLA, No. 3 Washington and No. 5 Arizona.

The Bruins and Huskies tied for the Pac-12 regular-season title, both teams finishing with a 20-4 league record. It was UCLA's 10th all-time while UW claimed its fourth and first since 2010. It was just the second time co-champions were crowned in Conference history, the last time coming during the 2005 season when Arizona, California, Oregon State and Stanford all tied for the top spot in the standings.

UCLA's **Rachel Garcia** garnered a trio of major national awards for the second-consecutive year. She was named the USA Softball Collegiate Player of the Year, espnW Player of the Year and Honda Sport Award winner. She went on to become the fifth UCLA student-athlete to win the prestigious Honda Cup, presented to the top-collegiate female student-athlete across all sports. Thirteen Pac-12 student-athletes appeared on NFCA Division I All-America teams, the second-most of any conference and most league representatives since 2015.

Garcia became the first-ever to be voted Pac-12 Player of the Year and Pac-12 Pitcher of the Year, earning the player honor for the second-consecutive year. Her teammate **Megan Faraimo** was tabbed the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year and Washington's **Sis Bates** was awarded the Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year. Stanford's **Jessica Allister** was voted the Pac-12 Coach of the Year after guiding the Cardinal to its most wins since 2013.

The Pac-12 owns the most national titles of any Conference, claiming 24 out of 38 possible NCAA titles with a NCAA-best five different programs winning at least one. League teams own the top-three most WCWS appearances in NCAA history with No. 1 UCLA (29), No. 2 Arizona (23) and No. 3 Washington (14) followed by ARIZONA STATE and CALIFORNIA in a five-team tie for fourth (12).

CALIFORNIA men's swimming and diving claimed its sixth all-time NCAA Championship in record fashion, as Cal's point total (560) and margin of victory (85) were both the most in its history. It marked the 25th NCAA team title by a Pac-12 team, second most of any conference. The Golden Bears' **Andrew Seliskar** earned his first three NCAA titles in the 200-yard individual medley, 200-yard freestyle and 200-yard breaststroke, setting new Pac-12 records in both the 200 IM (1:38.14) and 200 free (1:30.14). He was named CSCAA Swimmer of the Year while head coach **David Durden** was named both CSCAA Coach of the Year and Pac-12 Men's Swimming Coach of the Year. Four of the Bears' six national team titles have come under Durden (2011, 2012, 2014 and 2019).

Five of six Pac-12 programs finished in the top 25 at NAAs. STANFORD placed 15th with 96 points and ARIZONA finished right behind at 16th with 95 points. USC placed 20th with a total of 81 points and ARIZONA STATE finished 21st with 75.5 points.

California also dominated at the Pac-12 Championships, winning its second-straight and sixth overall title with 918 points. With Stanford finishing in second place with 716 points, the Bears secured the largest margin of victory (232) at the championships since 2007.

The Bears won every event on the final night of competition in Federal Way, Wash., and was victorious in every relay event at the meet. Arizona collected 570 points for third place, earning its highest team finish since 2012. It was another exciting championships as four meet records were shattered and a new Pac-12 record was set. Seliskar earned his second-straight and third-career Pac-12 Swimmer of the Meet. He owns the record for most individual titles at the Pac-12 Championships with 11.

Pac-12 swimmers and divers accounted for 123 CSCAA All-America selections (63 first-team honorees, 60 honorable mentions), including 12 from Cal, accumulating 42 first team All-America honors.

After winning the NCAA Championships, The Bears swept the Pac-12 postseason honors. Seliskar was named the Pac-12 Swimmer of the Year and teammate **Reece Whitley** was tabbed the Pac-12 Freshman Swimmer of the Year. Head coach **David Durden** earned his second-consecutive and eighth all-time Pac-12 Swimming Coach of the Year honor. In diving, Stanford claimed all three postseason awards, highlighted by **Noah Vigran** winning both Pac-12 Diver of the Year and Pac-12 Freshman Diver of the Year. He is the first Pac-12 diver to win both postseason awards in his first year since 2010. Vigran's coach **Patrick Jeffrey** was voted the Pac-12 Diving Coach of the Year for the second time in his career.

PAC-12 MEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Matt Anderson, Stanford

STANFORD women's swimming claimed its 11th all-time NCAA Championship, the most of any program. The Cardinal dominated the competition with a total score of 456.5, followed by CALIFORNIA in second place with 419 points for its third-consecutive NCAA runner-up finish. Cal has finished among the top three teams in the country each of the last 11 years for the longest current streak in the nation.

Stanford became the first school to win three-straight NCAA titles since 2004 and has finished in the top three in each of the last six years. It last won three-consecutive titles during its five-year run from 1992-96 and has recorded 15 top-five showings in the last 16 years. Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year Stanford's **Ella Eastin** became the first woman in NCAA history to win four-straight titles in the 400-yard individual medley titles.

Pac-12 teams and individuals topped the podium in 10 out of the possible 21 total events at the NCAA Championships, including six individual winners and four relay teams that broke four NCAA records and three American records. A total of 58 Pac-12 student-athletes earned CSCAA All-American honors - Arizona 12; Arizona State 7; California 10; Stanford 18; UCLA 2; and USC 9.

California's **Teri McKeever** garnered her fifth all-time CSCAA Coach of the Year nod, tied for the second-most nationally, while league coaches have won nine of the last 12 honors. UCLA head coach **Tom Stebbens** was named the CSCAA Diving Coach of the Year, only the third time a Pac-12 coach has earned the honor. UCLA senior **Maria Polyakova** became the first-ever UCLA diver to win an individual NCAA Championship title and earned the fourth CSCAA Diver of the Year award in Conference history. The trio also claimed the Conference's top honors, as well.

The Cardinal captured its third-straight and 22nd overall Pac-12 crown with six individual titles and 20 podium finishes. Stanford's 1,775 total points was the third-most by a team at the Conference championships, following its own records set in 1992 (1804) and 2018 (1776.5). Stanford is the first school to win three-consecutive Pac-12 Conference titles since ARIZONA from 2006-08.

Cal's **Abbey Weitzel** was named Pac-12 Swimmer of the Year and McKeever was voted Pac-12 Swimming Coach of the Year for the eighth time in her 27-year tenure. Stanford's **Taylor Ruck** was voted Pac-12 Swimming Freshman of the Year. For the third-straight year, UCLA's Stebbens was voted Pac-12 Diving Coach of the Year and Polyakova earned her second Pac-12 Diver of the Year honor. Stanford's **Carolina Sculti** was tabbed Pac-12 Diving Freshman of the Year.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Janet Hu, Stanford

For the second-straight year and the fifth time ever, the Pac-12 sent seven men's tennis teams to the NCAA Championships. Four Pac-12 teams reached the NCAA Team Super Regionals, including Pac-12 regular-season champion UCLA, Pac-12 Tournament Champion USC, CALIFORNIA and STANFORD. ARIZONA, ARIZONA STATE and UTAH also earned NCAA bids.

Nine individuals were also selected to compete in the NCAA Singles Tournament, with USC's **Brandon Holt** advancing to the quarterfinals, and four pairs competed in the NCAA Doubles Championship. UCLA's won its second-straight NCAA Doubles Championship with **Maxime Cressy** and **Keegan Smith** ending victorious, the 14th NCAA double title in program history. Cressy-Smith completed a perfect season with the win, its 21st without a loss. The win also gives head coach **Billy Martin** and the UCLA men's tennis program three of the last four NCAA doubles titles.

USC earned its fourth Pac-12 Tournament title after defeating No. 4 seed California, 4-0. The Trojans fourth Pac-12 Tournament title ties for the most with UCLA since the format moved to a team tournament title in 2012.

No. 4 California made history in the semifinals by upsetting top-seeded and defending Pac-12 Champion UCLA, 4-1. It was the Golden Bears' second time reaching the final (2016) and the lowest seed to reach the finals in the history of the team championship (since 2012). It also marked the first time the No. 1 seed did not reach the championship dual.

Holt was voted Pac-12 Singles Player of the Year, California's **Yuta Kikuchi** was voted Pac-12 Freshman/Newcomer of the Year and the duo of Cressy and Smith were tabbed the Pac-12 Doubles Team of the Year. Arizona's head coach **Clancy Shields** was voted Pac-12 Coach of the Year in just his third year at the head of the program. Additionally, five student-athletes earned ITA All-American recognition, including Holt, Cressy, Smith, Oregon's **Thomas Laurent** and Stanford's **Axel Geller**.

STANFORD defended its NCAA Women's Tennis Championship with a 4-0 victory over Georgia. The most decorated program in college history, the Cardinal has won 20 of the possible 38 NCAA championships, appearing in four-consecutive finals. The Cardinal improved to 50-5 during the month of May since 2010, a stretch that has produced five NCAA titles (2010, 2013, 2016, 2018, 2019).

The Pac-12 earned seven NCAA bids for the first time since 2017, with four earning top-16 seeds and hosting privileges. Including No. 3 Stanford, No. 7 UCLA, No. 10 WASHINGTON, No. 13 USC, ARIZONA STATE, CALIFORNIA and WASHINGTON STATE all competed in the team tournament. The Cougars earned their first appearance since 2012.

UCLA's duo of **Gabby Andrews** and **Ayan Broomfield** secured the seventh NCAA doubles championship in program history and the first since 2008. With Maxime Cressy and Keegan Smith's win on the men's side, UCLA completed a sweep of the doubles championships, the only program to accomplish this feat, doing it for the first time in 1988.

Stanford captured its third-consecutive Pac-12 Championship tournament title and its fourth-straight NCAA Tournament automatic bid with a 4-2 comeback victory over No. 2 seed UCLA. Washington put together one of the best seasons in program history, winning a record number of Conference matches, equaling the second-best win total in dual matches, and finishing with its third-highest final ITA ranking. UW reached the Pac-12 Tournament semifinals for the first time in history, the NCAA round of 16 for fourth time in program history, and hosted the NCAA Tournament first and second rounds for the first time in 15 years. Guiding the team was fifth-year head coach **Robin Stephenson**, who became just the second Husky coach to earn Pac-12 Coach of the Year honors.

A year after winning Pac-12 Freshman/Newcomer of the year, Stanford's **Michaela Gordon** claimed the Pac-12 Singles Player of the Year honor. She is only the third student-athlete to be awarded Singles Player of the Year just one year after winning Freshman/Newcomer of the Year. UCLA's **Elysia Bolton** was tabbed Pac-12 Freshman/Newcomer of the Year, and ARIZONA STATE's **Lauryn John-Baptiste** and **Ilze Hattingh** earned Pac-12 Doubles Team of the Year, the first Sun Devil duo all-time to win the award.

Nine women earned ITA All-America status, including NCAA Doubles Champions UCLA's Andrews and Broomfield, UCLA's Bolton and **Jada Hart**, Stanford's Gordon, Arizona State's John-Baptiste and Hattingh, and USC's doubles duo **Angela Kulikov** and **Rianna Valdes**.

OREGON maintained its Conference dominance by capturing its 13th-consecutive Pac-12 Men's Track & Field Championship crown, but it was STANFORD which led the league at the NCAA Championship as the Cardinal totaled 32 points for fifth place - its best finish at the national meet since 2001 (fourth). Stanford, based on top five finishes across the cross country, indoor and outdoor track & field seasons, earned USTFCCCA Men's Program of the Year honors for the first time since the award's creation in 2008-09. Oregon, which tied for 12th at the NCAA meet, finished fourth in the Program of the Year standings.

Stanford's **Steven Fahy** was the lone individual champion from the Pac-12 with a victory in the 3,000-meter steeplechase. Fahy's win extended the Conference's streak of at least one NCAA men's event title to 60-consecutive years dating to 1960.

The Pac-12 amassed seven podium finishes and 45 All-America nods, including 23 first team honorees, highlighted by Fahy's triumph, runner-up finishes from Oregon's **Cravon Gillespie** in the 100m (9.93) and 200m (19.93) — the third-fastest times in Conference history in both events — and UCLA's **Dotun Ogundeji** in both the discus (fourth) and shot put (5th).

Led by Gillespie's double in the 100- and 200-meter dashes which included a Championships-record tying 9.97 in the 100, Oregon matched a program-best with seven event victories en route to 173 points and a 13th straight Pac-12 title. Coupled with his second leg in the victorious 4x100 meter relay, Gillespie amassed a meet-best 22.5 points for the Ducks to earn Men's Athlete of the Meet accolades. He would go on to earn Pac-12 and USTFCCCA West Region Athlete of the Year honors. Pac-12 Field Athlete of the Year honors went to ARIZONA's **Jordan Geist** and USC's **Ayden Owens** received Pac-12 Freshman of the Year nod. UCLA's **Avery Anderson** was voted Pac-12 Coach of the Year.

PAC-12 MEN'S TRACK & FIELD SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Harrison Williams, Stanford

Four Pac-12 women's teams finished in the top 10 at the NCAA Championship, led by Conference champion USC's runner-up showing with 57 points as the Trojans were edged for the team title by Arkansas (64 points) in the 4x400 relay finale. OREGON placed fifth with 34 points, COLORADO recorded its second-best showing ever at the national meet in ninth with 24 points, and STANFORD tied for 10th with 20 points.

Coupled with third-place finishes at both the NCAA Cross Country and Indoor Championships, Oregon was awarded USTFCCCA Program of the Year honors for the 10th time in the 11 years of the award. Stanford finished fifth, Colorado sixth and Washington 11th in the final standings.

The Pac-12 won a whopping seven of the 21 events at the NCAA meet, tied for the most and the most for the league since 2012, including repeat national titles from USC's **Anglerne Annelus** in the 200-meter dash (22.16, second-fastest in Conference history) and Stanford's **Mackenzie Little** in the javelin. CALIFORNIA's **Camryn Rogers** registered the second-best hammer throw (71.50m/234-7) in Conference history to capture the event, while USC's 4x100m relay posted the second-fastest mark (42.21) in league annals. Oregon's **Jessica Hull** (4:06.27) set a Conference record en route to a runner-up finish in the 1,500-meter run. Hull, Annelus and USC teammate **Chanel Brissett** were among the 10 semifinalists for The Bowerman at the conclusion of the NCAA Championships.

All totaled, Pac-12 student-athletes reached the podium 15 times and garnered 54 All-America honors, highlighted by 35 who earned first team recognition. Three from the Pac-12 collected a trio of first team honors in USC's Annelus (100m, 200m, 4x100) and **Anna Cockrell** (100mH, 400mH, 4x400), and UCLA's **Alyssa Wilson** (discus, hammer, shot put).

USC won seven events and scored all of its 154 points on Sunday, highlighted by 20.5 points apiece from Cockrell and Annelus, en route to a second-consecutive Pac-12 Championship crown. UCLA's Wilson collected Pac-12 Women's Athlete of the Meet accolades with 26 points, headlined by a win in the discus.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S TRACK & FIELD SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Kaitlyn Benner, Colorado

STANFORD claimed its nation-leading eighth NCAA title and second in three years, with a five-set thrilling victory over Nebraska. Juniors **Kathryn Plummer** and **Morgan Hentz** were tabbed NCAA Tournament co-Most Outstanding Players. The win gave the Pac-12 its 16th women's volleyball title all-time, the most for any conference. The Cardinal, which return five of its six starters in 2019, highlighted eight Pac-12 teams that earned NCAA Tournament bids this season, the most of any league, marking the 19th-consecutive year at least six teams have participated in the "Big Dance" and the fifth time in the last six years at least eight received postseason invitations.

Six Pac-12 teams ended the season ranked in the final AVCA Coaches Poll with Stanford claiming the top spot while OREGON was No. 9, the first time the Ducks finished in the final top 10 since 2012 and just the fourth time ever. WASHINGTON STATE ended at No. 16, its highest final ranking since 2002 and just the third time it appeared in the final ranking since that year. WASHINGTON was No. 18, USC was No. 21 and ARIZONA was tied for 25th.

Stanford was the No. 1 overall seed, marking the first time since 2009 the top-seeded team in the tournament won the national championship. USC was also seeded, earning the No. 11 seed, Oregon was the No. 15 seed and WSU was the No. 16 seed. It was the Cougs' highest seeding since 2002. Arizona, COLORADO, UTAH and WASHINGTON received NCAA Tournament bids, as well.

Stanford won its 18th all-time Pac-12 crown going a perfect 20-0. Plummer was tabbed the Pac-12 Player of the Year for the second-straight year. Teammates **Jenna Gray** and Hentz repeated as Pac-12 Setter and Libero of the Year, respectively. Stanford's **Kevin Hambly** was tabbed the Pac-12 Coach of the Year and USC's **Raquel Lázaro** was named the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year.

Plummer was selected AVCA National Player of the Year for the second-straight year, becoming the first player since 2001 and 2002 to win the honor in back-to-back seasons and just the fourth overall. Plummer headlined a list of 13 AVCA All-Americans from the Pac-12, representing seven teams.

Arizona's **Dave Rubio** joined an elite company after claiming his 500th victory while at Tucson on Sept. 14. In his 27th season at the Wildcat helm, he is only the second head coach in Pac-12 history to reach the milestone.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Tami Alade, Stanford

After competing for the Conference wrestling title since 1963, the STANFORD Cardinal finally earned its first-ever Pac-12 crown, edging host ARIZONA STATE by two points. It was the closest team competition since Oregon State edged Boise State by two points in 2010. The Cardinal posted 81.5 points behind two individual Pac-12 Champions – **Requir Van Der Merwe** (149) and **Nathan Traxler** (197). ASU picked up 79.5 points behind individual titles from **Christian Pagdilao** (157), **Josh Shields** (165) and **Zahid Valencia** (174), while OREGON STATE finished third just two points behind the Sun Devils with 77.5 points. The Beavers had four individual winners: **Ronnie Bresser** (125), **Grant Willits** (141), **Bob Coleman** (184) and **Amar Dhesi** (285). CSU Bakersfield, behind **Sean Nickell**'s (133) second Conference title, finished fourth with 49.5 points. CAL POLY was fifth with 15.0 points. Valencia was named the Most Outstanding Wrestler of the Championships after he posted a pair of wins, both by technical falls.

Valencia becomes the third all-time to be named Pac-12 Wrestler of the Year three times. The junior successfully defended his NCAA title at 174 pounds to finish the year with a 31-2 record. The three-time All-American became the seventh Pac-12 wrestler to post back-to-back NCAA titles. He was recipient of The Hammer award presented by *Amateur Wrestling News*. The award is presented to the wrestler who wins the national title at what the writers at *AWN* decide is the most competitive weight class. OSU's Wilits was named Pac-12 Freshman of the Year after capturing the Pac-12 title at 141 pounds and qualified for the NCAA Championships. He finished with a 18-9 record. Stanford's **Jason Borrelli** was named Pac-12 Coach of the Year by his peers after leading the Cardinal to its first-ever Pac-12 title. Along the way, the Cardinal defeated three ranked opponents during the season and sent five wrestlers to the NCAA Championships.

PAC-12 WRESTLING SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Paul Fox, Stanford

(Capsule Reviews of 2018-19 Pac-12 Highlights in the MPSF)

MEN'S GYMNASTICS

STANFORD won the 2019 NCAA Championship, marking the sixth national title in program history and first since 2011. The Cardinal scored 415.222 points to knock off four-time defending champion Oklahoma, 414.556. College Gymnastics Association Rookie of the Year and MPSF Gymnast of the Year **Brody Malone** became the first Stanford gymnast to win three individual titles in one championship meet, claiming the floor exercise, high bar and all-around. With its win, Stanford continued its streak of top-five finishes at the national championship meet dating back to 2006. Stanford and CALIFORNIA finished second and third, respectively, behind Oklahoma at the MPSF Championships. Golden Bears' **Darren Wong** and **Aaron Mah** advanced to the NCAA Championships finals in the all-around competition and finished as top-15 competitors nationally.

MEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

STANFORD tied for fourth place with 30 points at the NCAA Championships for its highest finish since 2007 and most points since 2000. COLORADO, USC and OREGON all placed in the top-20 going Nos. 16, 17, 18, respectively. **Harrison Williams** recorded Stanford's first NCAA indoor track and field championship in five years by capturing the heptathlon with a school-record performance of 6,042 points. UCLA finished second at the MPSF Championships trailed by CALIFORNIA, OREGON and USC in a tie for third place. USC junior **Isaiah Jewett** ran for USC's first-place 4x400-meter relay (3:06.40) that broke a 14-year-old conference and facility record. Jewett is the third-straight Trojan to earn Men's MPSF Athlete of the Meet (Rai Benjamin-2018; Randall Cunningham-2017).

WOMEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

Two Pac-12 teams finished in the top-three at the NCAA Championship led by national runners-up USC and OREGON in third place followed by STANFORD tied for 12th. A trio of Trojans won individual national titles as **Twanisha Terry** won the 60-meter dash, **Kaelin Roberts** won the 400m and **Chanel Brissett** claimed the 60m hurdles. Oregon won the women's distance medley relay title and **Jessica Hull** claimed the 3,000m crown. ARIZONA STATE's **Samantha Noennig** claimed the shot put national title. USC won its fifth MPSF Championship title in just six years with the conference by an incredible 52.5-point margin after sweeping the sprint championships. USC head coach **Caryl Smith Gilbert** earned her seventh MPSF Coach of the Year award and fifth on the women's side while senior **Dior Hall** became the third Trojan to earn Athlete of the MPSF Championships meet honors.

MEN'S VOLLEYBALL

USC earned its first bid to the NCAA Tournament since 2012 and more than doubled its win total from 2018 by going 18-11 overall (most wins since 2015) and finishing third in the MPSF at 7-5 (highest league finish since 2012). The Trojans, playing the nation's toughest schedule, had seven wins over teams ranked in the AVCA top 10 at the time and won 11 of their last 15 matches. UCLA claimed two spots on the AVCA All-America first team, with **Daenan Gyimah** earning his second-straight first team honor and **Micah Ma'a** earning his third-straight first team honor, while USC's **Jack Wyatt** garnered second team recognition.

MEN'S WATER POLO

USC capped the 2018 season with its 10th all-time NCAA title in the sport, defeating Stanford, 14-12, in the championship match. A Pac-12 school has won the NCAA title every year since 1998 and has claimed the crown in all but five years since the championship was first contested in 1969. With the Trojans and Cardinal competing in the championship match also marks the fifth-straight year of an All-Pac-12 title game. Stanford sophomore **Ben Hallock** was named the MPSF Player of the Year and Cardinal head coach **John Vargas** was voted the MPSF Coach of the Year, while USC freshman **Hannes Daube** was tabbed the MPSF Newcomer of the Year. Hallock was also tabbed the national player of the year, earning the Peter J. Cutino Award.

WOMEN'S WATER POLO

No. 2-seed STANFORD won its seventh all-time NCAA title with a thrilling 9-8 victory over defending champion and top-seeded USC. A Pac-12 institution has claimed the national crown every year since the NCAA began sponsoring the championship in 2001. The championship match has been a battle between two Pac-12 schools every year except 2004. USC won its sixth-straight MPSF title with a 9-8 sudden-death victory over the Cardinal to earn the NCAA automatic bid. Stanford swept the MPSF postseason awards with junior **Makenzie Fischer** earning Player of the Year honors, **Ryann Neushul** named Newcomer of the Year, and Cardinal coach **John Tanner** winning his sixth Coach of the Year award. Stanford's Fischer, a three-time ACWPC All-American and Olympic gold medalist, was named NCAA Tournament MVP, the Peter J. Cutino Award winner and was selected as the 2019 Google Cloud Academic All-America Team Member of the Year for Division I at-large programs. Tanner is the only coach in the nation who has taken his team to every NCAA Tournament since its inception in 2001.
