INTRODUCTION:

FROM THE COMMISSIONER



The academic year 2017-2018 was a great success for the Pac-12 Conference, on and off the field and court. Our extraordinary student-athletes, supported by their coaches and athletic departments, maintained our tradition as the Conference of Champions, bringing home 11 NCAA championships, more than twice the number of any other Division I conference.

They also excelled in the classroom and in research. Our Conference had 22 Academic All-Americans, and we honored Pac-12 Scholar-Athletes of the Year in each of our 24 sports. They illustrate our Conference's conviction that athletic and academic excellence can go hand-in-hand, and reaffirm our commitment to support the central academic mission of our member universities.

The Conference also maintained its tradition of leadership in other important areas: The Pac-12 Task Force issued a thoroughly researched and well-received report that recommended important reforms in college basketball – recommendations that were unanimously adopted by our 12 university presidents and chancellors, and which have been referred to the NCAA's Rice Commission. We continued our leadership role in student-athlete health and safety, committing another \$3.6 million to research projects as well as supporting the Brain Trauma Task Force and convening our annual Student-Athlete Health Conference.

Recognizing the increasing importance of global relationships, we expanded our Pac-12 Global initiative with a wide array of events and educational programs, and also expanding the availability of Pac-12 events on Chinese media through our partnership with Alibaba.

At Pac-12 Networks, we returned significant revenue to our member universities while fulfilling its mission of broadcasting not only marquee events in football and basketball but also a wide array of women's and Olympic sports, providing exposure to those student-athletes and their universities while at the same time enhancing recruitment. Looking to the future as technology transforms the media landscape, Pac-12 Networks worked with Google to produce immersive virtual reality content and is expanding its relationships with such new media companies as Facebook, YouTube, and others.

I want to express my appreciation for the support and vision of our Pac-12 CEO Group, which governs the Conference, as well as our athletic directors, senior women's administrators, and all the coaches and staff, at the Conference as well as our schools. Most of all, I want to express my admiration of our student-athletes, who inspire us every day to help them achieve their dreams.

Our Student-Athletes: Champions on and off the field



The 2017-2018 was an outstanding year for the Conference both in competition and outside the lines. The “Conference of Champions” maintained its national dominance with an impressive 12 NCAA Championships won by six different Pac-12 schools over the course of the school year, bringing the Pac-12’s all time total to 513 NCAA team titles, 203 more than any other conference.

Pac-12 teams made appearances on college sports’ biggest stages this year with USC and Washington representing the conference in the College Football Playoff. Oregon State capped the year with an exciting NCAA College World Series victory, winning six-consecutive elimination games to claim the trophy, while UCLA women’s gymnastics also had a thrilling come-from-behind win, sticking a Perfect 10 on the final routine of the event, to win its seventh all-time NCAA crown.

The successes of Pac-12 institutions throughout the academic year was most evident in the Learfield Sports Directors' Cup where Stanford captured its 24th-consecutive title, while UCLA and USC also placed seventh and fourth in the final standings. Six different institutions won NCAA titles in 12 different sports and nine Pac-12 league members combined to post 39 top-four finishes in 24 NCAA championships.

Pac-12 Leadership in College Athletics

The Pac-12 Task Force assembled an impressive roster of men and women with deep experience in college basketball and sports administration. It was tasked with identifying solutions that could be readily implemented at both the NCAA and Conference levels. In March, the Task Force presented its detailed report, which recommended a strengthened and more independent NCAA enforcement mechanism, together with major changes to rules governing eligibility and recruiting, and urged the NCAA to work with the NBA and its Players Association to end the “one and done” phenomenon. The NCAA’s own commission, headed by former Stanford Provost and Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice, made similar recommendations, and we look forward to working together on moving this important matter forward.



Continuing the Conference’s Student-Athlete Health and Well-Being Initiative that was begun in 2013, the Conference awarded \$3.6 million in new research grants into a range of issues including brain injury, mental health, injury prevention and detection, and more. The initiative also included the annual Student-Athlete Health Conference (pictured) and continuing work by the Brain Trauma Task Force on concussion protocols and other brain injury issues.



HONORING SCHOLARS AND ELEVATING THE STUDENT-ATHLETE EXPERIENCE



The vast majority of our student-athletes will go on to careers outside of sports. Through the discipline of intercollegiate sports, they build the character to succeed in a wide variety of endeavors, and we honor them for their success in the classroom and the laboratory.



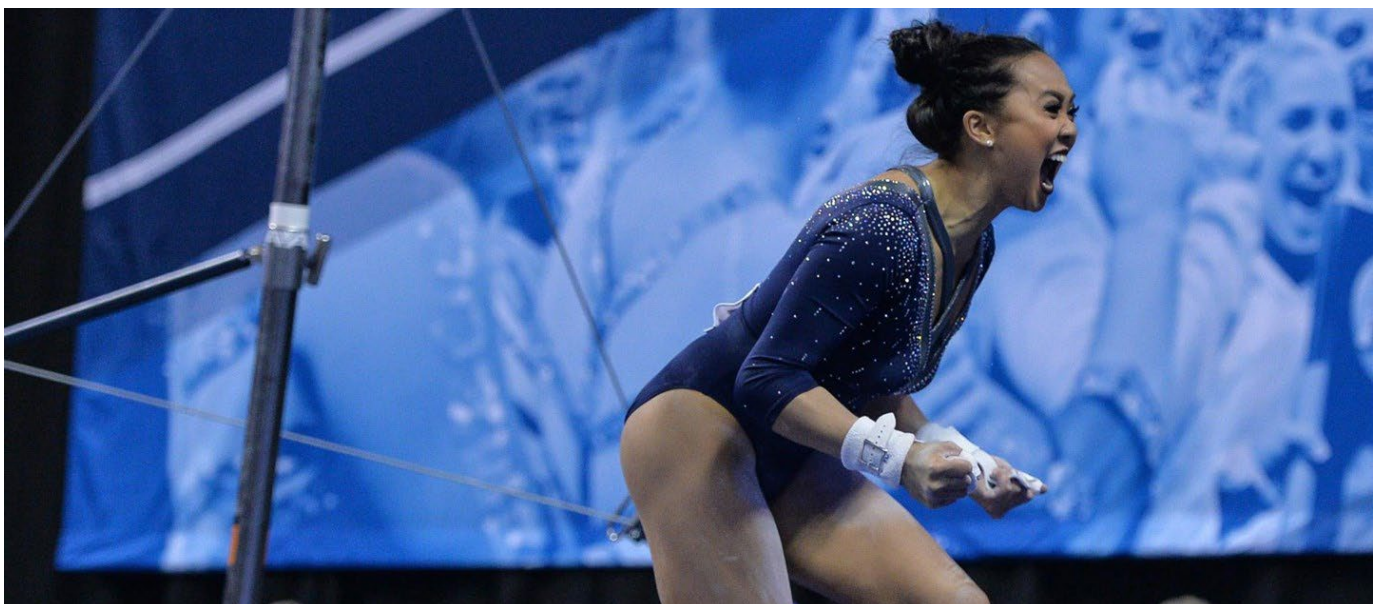
Each year the Conference honors Scholar-Athletes of the year in each of our 24 sports. recognized 24 student-athletes with this year's Tom Hansen Medal and awarded 24 student-athletes with scholarships for postgraduate work, and 700 Academic All-Pac-12 members named. In addition, the Conference this year boasted 22 Academic All-Americans. *[Stanford's and USA Olympic Gold Medalist Katie Ledecky wins CoSIDA Division I Academic All-America Team Member of the Year.]*

THE CONFERENCE OF CHAMPIONS

Our student-athletes and their coaches emphatically upheld the Pac-12's longstanding tradition as the Conference of Champions, with 12 NCAA titles, more than twice as many as any other Division I Conference.



The NCAA women's soccer final featured two Pac-12 teams, with the Stanford Cardinal defeating the UCLA Bruins. When the Stanford men won their third straight title, it was the first time ever that one school captured both the men's and women's soccer championships.



Two perfect tens propelled UCLA to its first title in gymnastics since 2010.



The University of Arizona claimed the Pac-12's fourth-straight NCAA Division I women's golf championship, clinching the program's fourth all-time and first since 2000.



USC won its second track & field crown all-time and first in 17 years with a come-from-behind win in the 4x400m, beating the second-place finisher by .07 seconds to claim the one-point team victory. It was the first time in NCAA history that the top three teams finished within two points of each other, with Stanford placing third just two points behind USC.

PAC-12 GLOBAL INITIATIVE

The benefits of using sports to build bridges between nations and cultures has never been greater, and the Pac-12 continues to expand its global initiative. Highlights this year included Arizona's wrestling team touring Cuba, Oregon's women's soccer team touring China, Stanford beating Rice in football in Australia, and this year's Pac-12 China Game, featuring UCLA and Georgia Tech.



The Global Initiative is more than just sports. It includes a coaches' training program that helped build skills for hundreds of coaches in China, and a sports and education summit with Chinese sport leaders and administrators. The Conference deepened its partnerships, and an expanded agreement with Alibaba will increase the number of Pac-12 events available to Chinese audiences.

Pac-12 Networks once again produced more than 800 live events, plus wrap-around shows, award-winning studio shows, and digital content that brought the excitement of Pac-12 athletics to millions of viewers, inside the Pac-12 footprint, across the U.S., and anywhere with an Internet connection.

In addition to providing important revenue to our member universities and the Conference, Pac-12 Networks gave a unique level of exposure – unmatched by any other conference network – to women's and Olympic sports, providing those student-athletes with well-deserved recognition and also aiding in recruiting.

Pac-12 Networks Ran Pilot Program of YouTube's VR180

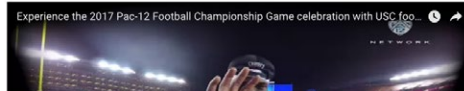

After USC football won last fall's conference championship, JuanPedro Huerta took a risk. As Pac-12 Networks' digital video features producer, he was tasked with capturing the Trojans' on-field celebration. Carrying an experimental 180-degree virtual reality camera from YouTube, Huerta found a spot in the end zone and defied a cameraman's prime directive to avoid interaction. The decision paid off.

"Usually as a camera operator, you want to be a fly on the wall to capture moments without being intrusive of the student-athletes and their family and friends as they celebrate," Huerta said. "But with the VR180 camera, I took the chance to let them know, 'Hey this is virtual reality right here,' and they responded with 'oh, word?' And then started getting around it and putting the trophy toward the camera, really engaging with the shot."



New technologies and rapidly changing economics are driving major transformations in sports media, and Pac-12 Networks is continuing to innovate and invest to ensure we stay in the forefront. As the Conference that counts both Silicon Valley and Hollywood within our footprint, we are working closely with Google, YouTube, Facebook and others to bring the excitement of college athletics to our fans in exciting new ways. One of them, a pilot program with Google, used 180-degree virtual reality to put fans right in the middle of championship celebrations, team huddles, and more.

The Bruins' six true freshmen, playing major minutes and also had a redshirt sophomore goalkeeper playing for the first time as a full-time starter in NCAA competition, defeated USC, 7-5, to win the national championship.

In only the 15th game of her sophomore campaign, and 48th of her career, Oregon's Sabrina Ionescu set an NCAA record with her eighth-career triple-double in a 94-83 win over Washington. She had 24 points, 14 rebounds and 10 assists. She had broken the Pac-12 career mark on Dec. 17.

GYMNASTICS MYKAYLA SKINNER SETS PAC-12 AWARD RECORD

Sophomore MyKayla Skinner was named Pac-12 Gymnast of the Week for the third time and for a Pac-12-record 10th time in her career. She holds the career and single-season records after winning the weekly nod seven times as a freshman. She went on to claim the weekly nod two more times.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL SOPHOMORE FORWARD SETS RECORD FOR CONSECUTIVE FIELD GOALS

Sophomore Ruthy Hebard set the NCAA record for both men and women for most consecutive field goals made, sinking a record-breaking 33 straight.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL JORDIN CANADA BREAKS PAC-12 CAREER ASSISTS RECORD

Senior Jordin Canada became the Pac-12's all-time assist leader, breaking a 27-year old record. She is the only player in Pac-12 history to eclipse 800 assists, finishing her career with 828 all-time.

WOMEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING STANFORD CAPTURES SECOND-STRAIGHT PAC-12 TITLE

Stanford captured its second-straight and 21st overall Conference title in record fashion, placing first in 20 out of 21 events, for a total of 1,776.5 points. Four American records and seven Pac-12 Championship records were broken over the four days of competition.

WRESTLING OSU'S AMAR DHESI NAMED MOST OUTSTANDING WRESTLER OF THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

Amar Dhesi of Oregon State was honored at this year's Pac-12 Wrestling Championships with the title of Most Outstanding Wrestler of the Championships. After defeating No. 8 Nathan Butler of Stanford, Dhesi became a two-time Pac-12 champion following his win in the 2016 conference championships.

MEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING CALIFORNIA WINS PAC-12 SWIMMING & DIVING CHAMPIONSHIP

California captured its fifth Pac-12 Conference title, winning by the largest margin of points since 2007. The Golden Bears scored 971 points ahead of second-place finisher Stanford (769).

Top-seeded Oregon wins its first-ever Pac-12 crown with ease, defeating perennial favorite Stanford, 77-57. Duck sophomore Sabrina Ionescu scored a career-high 36 points to carry her team to victory. It was also the first-ever No. 1 seed for UO in the history of the tournament.

More than 16,000 fans inside T-Mobile Arena witnessed one of the finest individual performances in Pac-12 Tournament history as Arizona's Deandre Ayton went for 32 points and 18 rebounds to lift the Wildcats past the Trojans.

WOMEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING STANFORD SETS THREE AMERICAN RECORDS EN ROUTE TO SECOND-STRAIGHT NCAA CROWN

Stanford won national titles in all five swimming events at the NCAA Women's Swimming & Diving Championships, en route to winning its 10th all-time national title and second-straight in record fashion. Pac-12 teams topped the podium in 15 out of a possible 18 swimming events and 15 out of 21 total events. That included six NCAA, six American, six U.S. Open, nine meet and 11 pool records by five Pac-12 teams and 10 Pac-12 individuals. Thirteen of the 15 titles were won by Stanford swimmers.

GYMNASTICS UCLA WINS PAC-12 CHAMPIONSHIP

Top-seeded UCLA claimed the 2018 Pac-12 Championship, winning the crown for the second time in three years. The Bruins' Peng-Peng Lee received the only perfect score of the night for her performance on beam to help her team score 197.350.

MEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING USC SWIMMER CLAIMS FIRST COMMONWEALTH GAMES MEDAL FOR TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO

Dylan Carter took home a silver medal in the 50 meter fly at the 2018 Commonwealth Games in the Gold Coast of Australia. Swimming for Trinidad and Tobago he won his country's first medal in the history of the Commonwealth Games.



GYMNASTICS ELIZABETH PRINCE WINS PRESTIGIOUS AAI AWARD

Elizabeth Prince became the first Stanford gymnast to win the coveted American Athletic, Inc. (AAI), Award, often called the “Heisman Trophy” of gymnastics, honoring the most outstanding female gymnast in the nation. She competed in all four events and tallied career highs on the balance beam (9.950), uneven bars (10.0) and in the all-around (39.775). A six-time All-American, she won the NCAA title on uneven bars.

TOP MOMENTS

BASEBALL



After a historic 2017 season that fell short, Oregon State came back in 2018 to finish the job it had started the year before, winning the program's third NCAA title all-time and first in 11 years. The Beavs fought off six-straight elimination games, including the final two in the championship series to defeat Arkansas. Stanford collected its 18th all-time Pac-12 crown and first in 14 years, leading four league teams into the NCAA Championship. Joining OSU in Omaha, Neb., Washington made its first-ever trip to the NCAA College World Series.

MEN'S BASKETBALL

The Pac-12 had eight postseason teams for the fourth time in six years, with Arizona, Arizona State and UCLA being selected for the NCAA Tournament. Utah enjoyed the deepest run of any Conference team, advancing to New York City and Madison Square Garden for the NIT title game. Seven Pac-12 teams reached the 20-win plateau, equaling the most-ever for the league, highlighted by regular-season and tournament champion Arizona's 27-win campaign.



WOMEN'S BASKETBALL



Oregon won its first Pac-12 regular-season title in 18 years and first-ever Pac-12 Tournament crown, earning the top seed in the league tournament for the first time. Six Pac-12 teams earned NCAA Tournament bids, with a league-record tying three advancing to the NCAA Elite Eight - UO, Oregon State and UCLA - marking the second time in three years the league has placed three teams in the NCAA quarterfinal. It also placed four teams in the Sweet Sixteen for the third-straight year. The Pac-12 boasts the most NCAA Tournament wins of any conference in the country over the last three years (41) and the best winning percentage among peer leagues (.695).

BEACH VOLLEYBALL



UCLA capped a historic season by winning the NCAA Championship for the first time in program history and became the first team to claim the crown going through the elimination bracket. The Bruins also claimed their first Pac-12 title by knocking off two-time defending league champion USC. Five conference teams finished the year ranked in the top 15 of the AVCA Poll and six players earned All-America honors.

MEN'S CROSS COUNTRY

Led by Stanford's 13th Pac-12 title, the Pac-12 had the most national championship qualifying teams for the fourth-consecutive season with six teams at the title meet. Stanford was the league's top finisher, coming in fourth. Oregon placed sixth and Colorado was eighth, giving the Pac-12 three in the top-10 for the second-straight year. The league finished with four individual top-40 finishers and All-Americans.



WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY



After a third straight Pac-12 Championship for Colorado, the Pac-12 finished the season with three teams ranked in the top five in the nation for the second consecutive year and third time in Pac-12 history: No. 2 Colorado, No. 3 Stanford and No. 4 Oregon. The league was also dominant on the individual front with a national-best and league-record 14 All-America finishes at the NCAA Championship meet.

FOOTBALL

USC became the first South Division team to capture the Pac-12 title with a 31-28 win over Stanford to claim their 39th conference crown. The Pac-12 placed nine teams in bowl games, including a pair of teams in the CFP with USC in the Cotton Bowl and Washington in the Fiesta Bowl. Stanford running back Bryce Love was named the Doak Walker Award winner as the nation's top running back. USC's Sam Darnold and UCLA's Josh Rosen were drafted No. 3 and No. 10 overall in the NFL Draft respectively, marking the third time in conference history that two Pac-12 quarterbacks were selected in the first round.



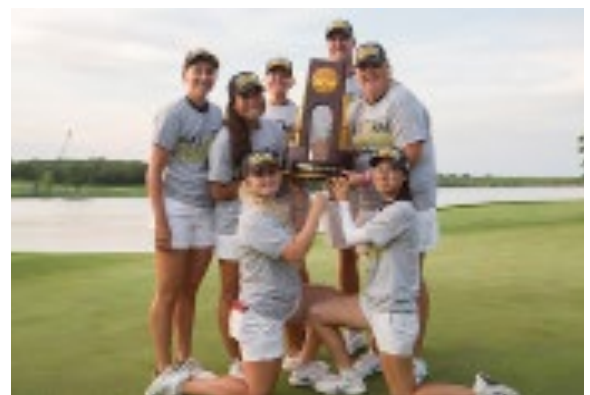
MEN'S GOLF



USC captured its 20th conference title behind the performance of Pac-12 Golfer of the Year, Justin Suh. Arizona State posted the Pac-12's highest finish with a tie for 13th at the NCAA Championships. Cal's Collin Morikawa, USC's Suh and Oregon's Norman Xiong were honored as First Team All-Americans and Xiong was awarded both the Fred Haskins award and Jack Nicklaus Award as the nation's most outstanding golfer.

WOMEN'S GOLF

Arizona captured its third NCAA title and the Pac-12's 19th NCAA title with a dramatic run at the NCAA Championships where they upended top-seeded UCLA, Stanford and Alabama. UCLA collected its seventh Pac-12 crown behind the play of Pac-12 Freshman of the Year Patty Tavatanakit and Pac-12 Golfer of the Year and WGCA Player of the Year Lilia Vu.



GYMNASTICS



Pac-12 Champion UCLA secured its seventh NCAA Championship in dramatic fashion as Christine Peng-Peng Lee scored a Perfect 10 on balance beam in the event's final routine to edge out defending champion Oklahoma. This was first national-championship victory for a Pac-12 team since the Bruins captured the title in 2010. Utah placed fifth at the NCAA Championship, marking a record 43rd-consecutive trip to the NCAA's Super Six.

WOMEN'S LACROSSE

In the inaugural season of Pac-12 Lacrosse, two teams advanced to the NCAA Tournament. Regular-season Pac-12 Champion Colorado and Pac-12 Tournament Champion Stanford made it to the second and first round of the tournament, respectively. In the final IWLCA poll, three teams are ranked. Colorado comes in at No. 14, Stanford is No. 16 and USC is No. 24.



MEN'S ROWING



For the third year in a row, Washington hoisted the Pac-12 trophy and for the 11th time in the last 12 years, the Huskies brought home the James Ten Eyck Trophy for most overall points at the IRA Championships. The Huskies finished second in the Eight Grand Final at the national championship and California placed third to round out the podium.

WOMEN'S ROWING

For the second time in the last three years, the California Golden Bears were crowned NCAA Champion behind wins in the first Varsity Eight and Varsity Four for its fourth title in program history. Three Pac-12 schools finished in the top five with Pac-12 Champion Washington finishing second and Stanford finishing fourth.



MEN'S SOCCER

Stanford captured its third-straight NCAA Championship and fourth-straight Pac-12 title, becoming only the second team in history to have three-consecutive NCAA titles and first since 1993, 1994 and 1995. California and Washington also earned berths to the NCAA Tournament. The Pac-12 now has seven national championships and eight second-place finishes.



WOMEN'S SOCCER



Stanford was crowned the NCAA Champion in the first-ever all-Pac-12 College Cup final. The Cardinal topped UCLA, 3-2, to claim its second title in program history and the second-straight women's soccer title for the Pac-12 (fifth all-time). Stanford won its 12th all-time Pac-12 crown after posting a undefeated 11-0 league record in the 2017 season. The Cardinal's Andi Sullivan was named the Hermann Trophy winner, presented to the nation's top collegian.

SOFTBALL

Seven Pac-12 teams earned berths to the NCAA Tournament, marking the 23rd-straight season the Pac-12 has had five or more teams advance to the postseason. Half the NCAA Women's College World Series team were Pac-12 teams with Washington remaining as the final Pac-12 team left standing, advancing to the championship series for the first time since 2009. Oregon claimed the regular season Pac-12 title for the fifth time in the last six years.



MEN'S SWIMMING AND DIVING



The Pac-12 had another dominant year in the pool as three teams earned top-10 finishes at the NCAA Championships. California earned a runner-up finish for the third-straight year, USC took fifth place while Stanford finished seventh. Cal led the nation with 15 All-American selections and captured its fifth Conference title and first since 2014.

WOMEN'S SWIMMING AND DIVING

Pac-12 Champion Stanford claimed its 10th all-time and second-straight NCAA Championship. The Cardinal has won more national titles than any program and has finished in the top three at the NCAA meet each of the last five years. Pac-12 teams and individuals topped the podium in 15 out of a possible 18 swimming events, setting several NCAA, American meet and pool records. California placed second at NCAA's, marking the 10th-consecutive year it has placed in the top 10.



MEN'S TENNIS



Pac-12 Champion UCLA advanced to the NCAA Tournament semifinal to lead the seven Conference teams in the postseason. The top-seeded Bruins defeated No. 2-seed USC to clinch the Conference crown. The Pac-12 was honored with nine men earning ITA All-America status and UCLA's Martin Redlicki earned the ITA Senior Player of the Year.

WOMEN'S TENNIS

Stanford captured the Pac-12 and NCAA crowns for its second national title in three years and its nation-leading 19th overall. Freshman Michaela Gordon collected the ITA National Rookie of the Year honor and head coach Lele Foad was named the Wilson ITA National Coach of the Year for the second time in her career. Four Pac-12 teams competed in the NCAA Tournament and eight women earned ITA All-America status.



MEN'S TRACK AND FIELD



USC finished fourth to reach the podium for the first time since 2014 to lead the Pac-12 contingent at the NCAA Championships. The Trojans were led by standouts Michael Norman and Rai Benjamin, who both set individual collegiate records in the 400-meter dash and 400-meter hurdles, respectively, and helped the 4x400 relay set a new collegiate standard. Oregon extended its record Pac-12 men's title streak to 12-consecutive years.

WOMEN'S TRACK AND FIELD

In one of the most dramatic finishes in NCAA Championships history, USC's Kendall Ellis overcame a 20-meter deficit over the final 100 meters of the 4x400 relay finale to give the Trojans the 10 points they needed to edge Georgia by a single point for the national team title. USC's victory - its second all-time and the third in four years for the Pac-12 - headlined a strong NCAA showing for the Conference, which had five teams finish in the top 15 as well as five additional event champions.



WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL



Pac-12 Champion Stanford led nine league teams earning NCAA Tournament bids, the Cardinal making its 21st all-time NCAA semifinal appearance. Stanford's Kathryn Plummer took home several awards, garnering national player of the year honors by the AVCA and ESPNW. It marked the 12th-consecutive year the Pac-12 had at least six teams earn tournament berths. Six Pac-12 teams appeared in the final AVCA poll.

WRESTLING

Arizona State successfully defended its Pac-12 crown, securing its 18th Pac-12 title. ASU's Zahid Valencia, the Pac-12 Wrestler of the Year, became the first Pac-12 wrestler since 2011 to earn a national title. Behind Valencia and All-Americans Jason Tsirtis and Josh Shields, the Sun Devils placed 10th at the NCAA Championships.



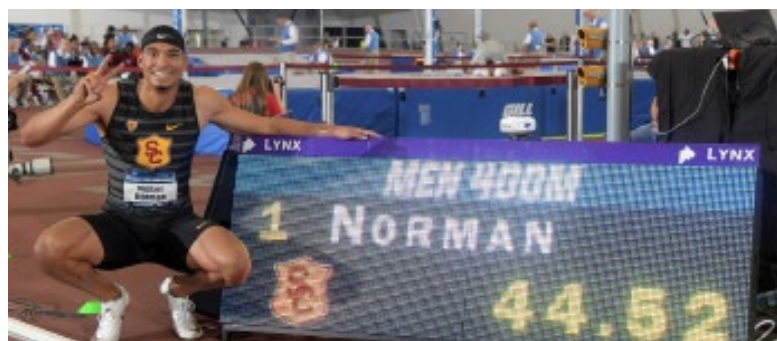
MEN'S GYMNASTICS



Stanford and California placed second and third, respectively, at the 2018 MPSF Championship meet. Both the Cardinal and Golden Bears advanced to the NCAA Championships qualifier. Stanford advanced to the NCAA Championships final where it placed fourth.

MEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

Powered by several world-best marks, the USC men's program recorded the league's top NCAA Championship finish coming in second place. Michael Norman set a world record in winning the 400-meter dash and anchored the Trojans' 4x400 relay team which ran the fastest time recorded in the event's history. The Trojans also captured the MPSF crown.



WOMEN'S INDOOR TRACK & FIELD



The Pac-12 recorded an impressive five top-20 team finishes at the NCAA Championships. Sabrina Southerland won the 800-meter run to lead the Oregon to its top-5 showing, while Kendall Ellis set an American record to win the 400-meter dash to headline the Trojans. USC also won its fourth MPSF title in the last five years, edging runner-up Stanford by 24 points.

MEN'S VOLLEYBALL

UCLA led the MPSF in the final AVCA Coaches poll, ranking No. 6 in the country after posting a runner-up finish in the NCAA Tournament. Stanford and USC joined UCLA as all three teams earned a spot in the MPSF Tournament. The Pac-12 produced eight AVCA All-Americans.



MEN'S WATER POLO



UCLA won the National Championship for the programs' 11th national crown in the sport. Pac-12 members comprised half of NCAA Tournament bracket and have won 20-consecutive titles, adding to 44 total championships in the 49-year history of the event. In the final CWPA poll, Pac-12 schools held the top four spots with No. 1 UCLA, No. 2 USC, No. 3 California and No. 4 Stanford.

WOMEN'S WATER POLO

USC won its sixth NCAA title in program history and third in the last six years with a thrilling 5-4 victory over Stanford. California and UCLA also received at-large bids for the NCAA Tournament. Trojan goalie Amanda Longan became the seventh USC female to win collegiate water polo's highest honor, the Peter J. Cutino Award for ACWPC National Player of the Year.



Built on a firm foundation of academic excellence and superior athletic performance, the Pac-12 Conference renewed its undisputed claim as the Conference of Champions® in 2017-18. Beyond the courts and fields, the Pac-12's accomplishments extend into the classrooms across 12 campuses, and outside its traditional geographic footprint into new corners around the world.

The only conference to win 500 NCAA Championships, the Pac-12 once again led the nation in 2017-18 with 12 NCAA crowns. This haul adds to an incredible 175 NCAA team titles claimed since 1999-2000 and 317 since 1981-82, the start of women's sports sponsorship, an average of over nine per year. Even more impressive has been the breadth of the Pac-12's success with championships coming in 28 different men's and women's sports. The Pac-12 has led or tied the nation in NCAA Championships in 52 of the last 58 years, the only exceptions being in 1980-81, 1988-89, 1990-91 and 1995-96 when the Conference finished second, and only twice finished third in 1998-99 and 2004-05.

For the 13th-consecutive year, the Pac-12 had the most, or tied for the most, NCAA titles of any conference in the country, winning at least six every year since 2000-01. No other conference has won double-digit NCAA crowns in a single year, the Pac-12 doing so 10 times, including a record 14 in 1996-97.

Spanning over a century of outstanding athletics achievements, the Pac-12 has claimed 513 NCAA Championships (300 men's, 183 women's, 30 combined), over 200 more than the next league.

Pac-12 members have won 300 NCAA team championships on the men's side, 83 more than the next-closest conference. Men's NCAA crowns have come at a phenomenal rate for the Pac-12 - 16 basketball titles by six schools, 54 tennis titles, 47 outdoor track & field crowns, and 29 baseball titles. Pac-12 members have won 25 of 48 NCAA titles in volleyball, 44 of 49 in water polo, 30 in skiing, and 24 in swimming & diving national championships.

Individually, the Conference has produced an impressive number of NCAA individual champions. Over 2,000 (2,334) individual crowns have been won by Pac-12 student-athletes over the years with 1,370 by male student-athletes. Student-athletes have also captured 186 individual titles at combined championships (i.e., skiing and fencing).

On the women's side, the story is much the same. Since the NCAA began conducting women's championships 37 years ago, Pac-12 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season on 27 occasions, including a current streak of 18-consecutive years, dating back to 2000. Overall, the Pac-12 has captured 183 NCAA women's titles, easily outdistancing the SEC, which is second with 100. Pac-12 members have dominated a number of sports, winning 23 softball titles, 24 tennis crowns, 15 volleyball titles, 19 of the last 29 trophies in golf, and 16 in swimming & diving.

Pac-12 women student-athletes shine nationally on an individual basis, as well, having captured an unmatched 778 NCAA individual crowns, an average of over 21 championships per season, including 29 in 2017-18.

The Pac-12's excellence is further proven in the annual Division I Learfield Sports Directors' Cup competition, the prestigious award that honors the best overall collegiate athletics programs in the country. STANFORD won an unprecedented 24th-consecutive Directors' Cup in 2017-18 to lead the Conference, leading a 1-2-4 finish for Pac-12 institutions. Five Pac-12 member institutions ranked among the top-25 Division I programs: No. 1 STANFORD, No. 2 UCLA, No. 4 USC, No. 19 CALIFORNIA and No. 24 OREGON. At least five member institutions have been ranked in the top 25 each of the Directors' Cup program, with seven appearing in the top 20 on five different occasions (1998, 2001, 2003, 2005 and 2006).

2017-18 REVIEW

The Conference's 12 NCAA titles came in the form of nine women's and three men's crowns. Six members claimed at least one NCAA title and, of the five institutions in the country to have won multiples titles, three were from the Pac-12.

STANFORD's four NCAA titles this year are the most won by any school, extending its streak of winning an NCAA title to 42 years, winning a third-straight championship in men's soccer, claiming women's swimming and diving for the second-straight year in record fashion, winning an All-Pac-12 final in women's soccer and the women's tennis crown for the second time in three years. UCLA claimed three national titles, winning the women's gymnastics crown for the first time since 2010 on a pair of perfect 10s, its first-ever beach volleyball title and its third men's water polo crown in four years.

USC won a pair of national championships this season, winning its fifth women's water polo title in a tense All-Pac-12 finale, and the women's track & field team needed a photo finish in the 4x400-meter relay to claim the team national crown, its first since 2001.

A playoff putt sealed the women's golf crown for ARIZONA, its first since 2000; CALIFORNIA won its second rowing national championship in three years; and OREGON STATE fought off six elimination games to win the baseball

title, its third all-time and first in over a decade.

In addition to the 12 national championships, the Pac-12 also had runners-up in 10 NCAA Championship events: women's soccer (UCLA), men's water polo (USC), skiing (COLORADO), men's swimming and diving (CALIFORNIA), women's swimming and diving (CALIFORNIA), men's indoor track & field (USC), softball (WASHINGTON), rowing (WASHINGTON), men's volleyball (UCLA) and women's water polo (STANFORD). In 11 sports, there were at least two teams among the final four and 39 teams finished in the top four at 23 NCAA Championship events, including all-Pac-12 finals in women's soccer, men's water polo and women's water polo.

Participation in the postseason was a common occurrence for the Pac-12 in 2017-18. Of the 24 sports sponsored by the Conference, 17 witnessed at least half its teams participating in NCAA or other postseason action. The men sent 63 of a possible 101 teams into the postseason (62.4 percent), while the women sent 82 of a possible 130 teams (63.0 percent).

USC became the first South Division team to capture the Pac-12 football title. After the North Division won the Conference's first six Pac-12 Football Championship Games, the Trojans ended the North Division streak with a 31-28 win over Stanford to claim their 39th conference crown. The Pac-12 placed nine teams in bowl games, including a pair of teams in the CFP with USC in the Cotton Bowl and WASHINGTON in the Fiesta Bowl. STANFORD running back Bryce Love became the fifth player in Pac-12 history to rush for 2,000 yards (2,118) and was named the Doak Walker Award winner as the nation's top running back. ARIZONA's Khalil Tate became the first quarterback in Pac-12 history to rush for 1,000 yards (1,411 yards) and set an FBS single-game rushing record by a quarterback with 327 yards vs. Colorado. USC's Sam Darnold was the No. 3 overall pick in the NFL Draft by the New York Jets, while UCLA's Josh Rosen was the No. 10 selection overall by the Arizona Cardinals. It marked the third time in Conference history that two Pac-12 quarterbacks were selected in the first round, and the sixth time ever that multiple quarterbacks from the same conference were selected in the first round.

Pac-12 men's basketball sent eight teams to postseason play for the fourth time in the past six seasons, with three teams - ARIZONA, ARIZONA STATE and UCLA - selected for the NCAA Tournament and a league-record five chosen to the NIT. All five NIT teams - OREGON, STANFORD, USC, UTAH and WASHINGTON - won their opening round games, and the Utes enjoyed the deepest postseason run of any Conference team, advancing to New York City and Madison Square Garden where they defeated Western Kentucky in the NIT semifinals before falling to Penn State in the title game. Seven Pac-12 teams reached the 20-win plateau, equaling the most-ever for the league, highlighted by regular-season and tournament champion Arizona's 27-win campaign.

Pac-12 women's basketball has enjoyed historic performances over the last four years, establishing the Conference as a premier league in the sport. Six teams earned NCAA Tournament bids, marking the fifth-consecutive year at least five teams garnered bids. Four teams advanced to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen for the third-consecutive year and a record-tying three teams were in the NCAA Elite Eight. It was the second time in three years that at least that many teams advanced that far. OREGON won its first Pac-12 regular-season title since 1999-2000 and first-ever Pac-12 Tournament crown. The Ducks earned their highest NCAA Tournament seed, garnering the No. 2 seed in the Spokane Regional. ARIZONA STATE, CALIFORNIA, OREGON STATE, STANFORD and UCLA joined UO in the "Big Dance," with UTAH earning a bid in the WNIT. For the first time in Pac-12 history, three teams were ranked in the final top-25 of the USA Today/WBCA Coaches poll, the Ducks finishing with their highest-ever final ranking at No. 5. UCLA was at No. 7, OREGON STATE was No. 8 and STANFORD was No. 13, appearing in the final poll for the 17th-consecutive year. Four teams also appeared in the final Associated Press poll, the fourth-straight year the Conference had at least four teams in the final ranking. The Pac-12 boasts the most NCAA Tournament wins of any conference in the country over the last three years (41) and the best winning percentage among peer leagues (.695).

STANFORD won its 17th all-time Pac-12 women's volleyball title, advancing to its 21st all-time NCAA semifinal in 2017. The Cardinal headlined nine league teams to earn NCAA Tournament bids, marking the fourth time in the last five years at least eight Conference teams participated in the postseason event. Along with Stanford, COLORADO, OREGON, OREGON STATE, UCLA, USC, UTAH, WASHINGTON and WASHINGTON STATE punched their tickets to the tournament. Eleven student-athletes were selected AVCA All-Americans, with seven of those being sophomores or juniors on the first or second teams. Six teams appeared in the final AVCA Coaches poll, five of them in the top 15. The Pac-12 has won a NCAA-record 15 of the 37 NCAA titles awarded.

OREGON STATE baseball recorded the Pac-12's 12th and final NCAA title of the 2017-18 campaign, the Beavers winning the last two of the three-game championship series versus Arkansas to claim their third all-time College World Series title and first since 2007. The Beavers had their backs against the wall since losing their opening game of the CWS, winning four-straight elimination

games to get to the championship series, before winning two more versus Arkansas to claim the crown. STANFORD claimed the Pac-12 crown for the first time in 15 years and received the Conference's automatic bid as four league squads earned berths. UCLA and WASHINGTON rounded out the four post-season teams, the Huskies advancing for the first time ever to the CWS as well. The Pac-12 has, by far, won the most baseball national titles of any conference in the country, claiming 29 titles dating back to 1947.

The Pac-12 Conference has historically dominated the sport of softball where league teams have claimed 23 NCAA titles in the 37-year history of the championship. Pac-12 teams captured an unprecedented nine in a row from 1988-1997, then most recently claimed six-straight from 2006-11. OREGON picked up its fourth Pac-12 title in six years and seven league teams earned berths to the 2018 NCAA Tournament, marking the 23rd-consecutive year the Conference has had five or more teams advance to the postseason and has had at least three berths every year since the league began sponsoring the sport in 1987. Half of the eight-team Women's College World Series field was comprised of Pac-12 teams, with WASHINGTON, ARIZONA STATE, OREGON and UCLA advancing that far. The Huskies played in the championship series, marking the 29th time at least one Pac-12 team reached the finale.

PAC-12 CONFERENCE HISTORY

The roots of the Pac-12 Conference date back more than 100 years, to December 2, 1915, when the Pacific Coast Conference (PCC) was founded at a meeting at the Imperial Hotel in Portland, Ore. The original membership consisted of four schools - the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Washington, the University of Oregon, and Oregon Agricultural College (now Oregon State University). All four are still charter members of the Conference.

Pacific Coast Conference play began in 1916 and, one year later, Washington State College (now Washington State University) was accepted into the league, with Stanford University following in 1918.

In 1922, the PCC expanded to eight teams with the admission of the University of Southern California (USC) and the University of Idaho. In 1924, the University of Montana joined the league roster and in 1928, the PCC grew to 10 members with the addition of UCLA.

The Pacific Coast Conference competed as a 10-member league until 1950, with the exception of 1943-45 when World War II curtailed intercollegiate athletic competition to a minimum. During that time, the league's first commissioner was named. Edwin N. Atherton was Commissioner in 1940 and was succeeded by Victor O. Schmidt in 1944. In 1950, Montana resigned from the Conference and the PCC continued as a nine-team Conference through 1958.

In 1959, the PCC was dissolved and the Athletic Association of Western Universities (AAWU) was formed with Thomas J. Hamilton appointed Commissioner of the new league. The original AAWU membership included California, Stanford, USC, UCLA, and Washington. Washington State joined the membership in 1962, while Oregon and Oregon State joined in 1964. Under Hamilton's watch, the name Pacific-8 Conference was adopted in 1968. In 1971, Wiles Hallock took over as Commissioner of the Pac-8.

Ten years later, on July 1, 1978, the University of Arizona and Arizona State University were admitted to the league and the Pacific-10 Conference became a reality. In 1986-87, the league took on a new look, expanding to include 10 women's sports. Since then, the Conference has been considered the premier league in women's athletics, securing the most NCAA titles in women's sports of any conference nearly every year.

Thomas C. Hansen was named the Commissioner of the Pac-10 in 1983, a role he would hold for 26 years until 2009, when he was succeeded by current Commissioner Larry Scott.

The University of Colorado accepted its invitation to join the Pac-12 on June 11, 2010, and on June 17, 2010, the University of Utah agreed to join the Conference. The Buffaloes and Utes officially became the 11th and 12th members of the Conference on July 1, 2011, the first additions to the league since 1978.

It was during the 2010-11 academic year that Scott helped deliver monumental changes that transformed the Conference into a modern 12-team league. In addition to expanding to 12 teams, member institutions agreed to equal revenue sharing for the first time in the Conference's history, created two football divisions - the North and the South, and established a Football Championship Game for the first time. He also secured landmark media rights deals with ESPN and FOX that dramatically increased national exposure and revenue for each school, in addition to establishing Pac-12 Networks which guaranteed enhanced exposure across all sports.

Currently, the Pac-12 sponsors 11 men's sports and 13 women's sports, with women's lacrosse a new addition for the 2017-18 academic year and beach volleyball having been added in 2015-16. Additionally, the Conference is a member of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) in four other men's sports and two women's sports.

The Pac-12 Conference offices are located in the heart of San Francisco in the SOMA district.

PAC-12 TOPS FINAL LEARFIELD DIRECTORS' CUP

SAN FRANCISCO - The STANFORD Cardinal captured their 23rd-consecutive Directors' Cup in leading the Pac-12 Conference to another impressive finish in the final 2016-17 Division I Learfield Sports Directors' Cup standings, the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) announced.

Led by four NCAA titles (women's volleyball, men's soccer, women's swimming and diving, and women's water polo), Stanford won its 23rd-consecutive Cup. In all, the Cardinal posted 11 top five finishes in tallying an impressive 1,563.00 points. That's 219.25 points more than runner-up Ohio State.

Behind a pair of NCAA titles (women's soccer and beach volleyball), USC finished fourth with 1,251.25 points for its fourth consecutive top 10 finish. OREGON placed ninth overall with 1,027.00 points, the best-ever finish by the Ducks in the Directors' Cup. Oregon collected three NCAA titles for the second straight season as it claimed the triple crown with titles in women's cross country, women's indoor track and field, and women's outdoor track and field. UCLA placed 11th overall with 1,007.00 points, while CALIFORNIA, aided by its men's water polo title, finished 14th with 916.75 points. That gave the Pac-12 five teams among the top 15, more than any other conference.

WASHINGTON added an NCAA title in women's rowing, the Pac-12's 500th NCAA title all-time, and placed 22nd with 801.25 points. COLORADO finished 34th (641.00), followed by ARIZONA at 42nd (545.50). ARIZONA STATE was right behind the Wildcats at 43rd (543.50), thanks in part to the women's golf program capturing their nation-leading eighth NCAA golf title. UTAH, which picked up its 11th NCAA skiing title, was 54th (459.50), followed by OREGON STATE (69th, 333.75) and WASHINGTON STATE (101st, 202.50).

The success of the Pac-12 in the Directors' Cup was bolstered by the capturing of 13 NCAA titles, the most among all conferences. In addition, 10 Pac-12 league members combined to post 39 top-four finishes in 24 NCAA championships.

The Directors' Cup was developed as a joint effort between the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and USA Today. Points are awarded based on each institution's finish in up to 20 sports - 10 women's and 10 men's.

OREGON STATE won the 2018 NCAA College World Series for the program's third national title, and first since winning back-to-back crowns in 2006 and 2007. OSU defeated Arkansas in three games as **Kevin Abel** threw a complete game shutout, striking out 10 Razorbacks in the Championship game to set a new CWS record with four victories. The Beavers went 11-2 overall in the NCAA Tournament, including a perfect 6-0 in CWS elimination games, to claim the Conference's record 29th NCAA baseball national title. Pac-12 baseball members have now reached the CWS title series in four of the last seven years (Oregon State 2018; Arizona 2016, 2012; UCLA 2013), eight of the last 15, and 12 of the last 20.

Four Pac-12 baseball teams earned berths to the 2018 NCAA Tournament. No. 2 overall seed STANFORD and No. 3 overall seed Oregon State both hosted NCAA regionals for the second consecutive year and were joined in the field by UCLA and WASHINGTON. It marked the eighth time since the NCAA began the national seeding format in 1999 that the Pac-12 secured multiple top-8 seeds, including only the second time with national top-4 seeds (2001).

The Huskies advanced to the Super Regionals for the first time in program history and went on to make their first College World Series appearance. The trips to Omaha for OSU and UW marked the 100th and 101st all-time CWS appearances for current Pac-12 members and the 66th time in the 72-year history of the event that at least one Conference program has reached the CWS. Stanford was crowned the 2018 Pac-12 Champion and finished with a 22-8 league mark to earn the program's 18th Conference title and first since 2004. Stanford earned the program's 34th all-time postseason appearance, tied for the 10th-most in NCAA history (1954-present).

The Conference amassed many postseason honors, including Oregon State's **Pat Casey** being tabbed ABCA National Coach of the Year and Collegiate Baseball's National Coach of the Year and **Luke Heimlich** earning National Pitcher of the Year by the College Baseball Foundation. Heimlich recorded the most wins in the country with 16 victories and set a school-record 159 strikeouts that finished second nationally. OSU junior **Cadyn Grenier** won the 2018 Brooks Wallace Award, presented annually to the nation's top collegiate shortstop and California's **Andrew Vaughn** earned the Golden Spikes Award as the nation's top amateur baseball player.

49 Pac-12 student-athletes were selected in the 2018 Major League Baseball Draft with all 11 programs having at least one player drafted. Beavers' **Nick Madrigal** was the No. 4 overall pick for the highest draft selection in program history. Stanford had two players selected in the first round and leads the NCAA with 25 first-round selections since the first MLB Amateur Draft began in 1965.

For just the fourth time in the Conference's 102-season history, seven Pac-12 teams reached the 20-win plateau in 2017-18 led by ARIZONA's 27-win campaign.

The league experienced several highlights during non-conference play, totaling a league-record four in-season tournament titles (ARIZONA STATE - Las Vegas Invitational; COLORADO - Paradise Jam; WASHINGTON STATE - Wooden Legacy; USC - Diamond Head Classic) as well as four top-10 upsets during the month of December (UCLA vs. #7 Kentucky; ARIZONA STATE at #2 Kansas; WASHINGTON vs. #2 Kansas; ARIZONA vs. #7 Texas A&M). ASU went a perfect 12-0 in non-conference play to rise as high as No. 3 in the national top 25.

Arizona edged runner-up USC by two games to earn the Pac-12 regular season title outright, the 16th league crown in program history. The No. 1 seed Wildcats then posted double-digit victories in all three Pac-12 Championship games to capture their second straight tournament title. The event's second year in Las Vegas' new T-Mobile Arena saw the fourth-highest total attendance (80,550) in event history and just the fourth time breaking 80,000 fans in 21 stagings of the tournament. Arizona freshman **Deandre Ayton** averaged 24.7 points and 12.7 rebounds in three tournament games, including 32.0 points and 16.0 rebounds in the semifinals and finals over No. 4 seed UCLA and No. 2 seed USC, to become the first player in league history to win Pac-12 Player and Freshman of the Year and Tournament MVP accolades.

Ayton went on to add Karl Malone Power Forward of the Year and consensus First Team All-America honors. It marked the fifth consecutive year a Pac-12 player earned consensus First or Second Team honors, tied with the ACC for the longest streak in the nation, and along with UCLA's Lonzo Ball in 2017 was the first time the Pac-12 had back-to-back AP First Team honorees since 2008 and 2009.

The season was capped by eight teams qualifying for postseason play for the fourth time in the past six seasons, with three teams - Arizona, Arizona State and UCLA - selected for the NCAA Tournament and a league-record five chosen to the NIT. All five NIT teams - OREGON, STANFORD, USC, UTAH and Washington - won their opening round games, and the Utes enjoyed the deepest postseason run of any Conference team, advancing to New York City and Madison Square Garden where they defeated Western Kentucky in the NIT semifinals before falling to Penn State in the title game.

Seven former Pac-12 standouts were selected in the 2018 NBA Draft, including the No. 1 overall selection in Arizona's Ayton to the Phoenix Suns. It marked the first time in Conference history the league has had the No. 1 pick in the NBA Draft in back-to-back years.

Pac-12 women's basketball has established itself as a premier conference, earning six NCAA Tournament bids in 2017-18, marking the fifth-consecutive year the Conference has garnered at least five berths. Four teams advanced to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen, the third-consecutive year at least four Pac-12 teams advanced that far, and a record-tying three teams were in the NCAA Elite Eight. It was the second time in three years at least that many teams advanced that far.

The Pac-12 boasts the most NCAA Tournament wins of any conference in the country over the last three years (41) and the best winning percentage among peer leagues (.695). The Pac-12 tied for the most teams in the Sweet Sixteen this season (4) and had the most in the Elite Eight (3). Pac-12 teams went 11-6 in the tournament, the third-straight year league teams posted double-digit NCAA Tournament victories.

OREGON won its first Pac-12 regular-season title since 1999-2000 and first-ever Pac-12 Tournament crown, advancing to the NCAA Elite Eight for the second-straight year, along with OREGON STATE and UCLA. ARIZONA STATE, CALIFORNIA and STANFORD joined the Ducks, Bruins and Beavers in the tournament. UTAH also joined in the postseason, earning a WNIT bid, advancing to the second round.

For the first time in Pac-12 history, three teams were ranked in the final top-25 of the USA Today/WBCA Coaches poll. The Ducks earned their highest-ever final ranking at No. 5 and UCLA finishes at No. 7, its highest since the 1998-99 final poll. OSU was No. 8 for its second-straight top-10 final rating. STANFORD was No. 13, appearing in the final poll for the 17th-consecutive year. Four Pac-12 teams appeared in the final *Associated Press* poll, the fourth-straight year the Conference has at least four teams in the final ranking. The Ducks were No. 6, UCLA was No. 9, OSU was ranked 13th and Stanford was 15th.

Oregon's **Sabrina Ionescu** won the Nancy Lieberman Award, presented to the nation's top point guard, the second year in a row a Pac-12 student-athlete has claimed the top honor, and teammate **Ruthy Hebard** nabbed the inaugural Katrina McClain Award for the nation's top power forward. UCLA's **Jordin Canada**, Oregon State's **Marie Gulich** and Stanford's **Brittany McPhee** were tabbed All-Americans by at least one organization. Ionescu was the Pac-12 Player of the Year, teammate **Satou Sabally** was the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year and Canada was the Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year. Stanford's **Tara VanDerveer** was tabbed the John R. Wooden Coach of the Year.

Canada set the Pac-12's all-time assists record that had stood since 1991, while Ionescu has claimed every triple-double record in the Pac-12 and NCAA, including the season and career marks. Ionescu also broke the Conference's single-season assist record that was set in 1996. Also setting records was Hebard, whose 33-consecutive field goals were a NCAA all-time best. Her shooting percentage this season is also a single-season mark.

UCLA capped a historic season winning the NCAA Championship for the first time at Gulf Shores, Ala., becoming the first team to claim the crown through the elimination bracket. The Bruins, who were the No. 1 seed for the first time, as well, defeating fourth-seeded Florida State in the championship dual, 3-1, avenging a loss earlier in the tournament.

The Bruins also claimed their first Pac-12 title, going 4-0 at the Pac-12 Beach Volleyball Championship hosted by Stanford at the Stanford Beach Volleyball Stadium. UCLA knocked off two-time defending league champion USC, 3-1, to take the trophy.

UCLA twins **Nicole** and **Megan McNamara** were voted the Pac-12 Pair of the Year by the league's coaches. The junior duo recorded the most pair wins in the country, finishing the season with a 35-7 record. Nicole was also named the Pac-12 Player of the Year. It is the first time Bruins have claimed the awards. USC's **Tina Graudina** was named the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year, playing at the No. 1 position for the Trojans all season with partner **Abril Bustamante**.

For the second-straight year, UCLA's **Stein Metzger** was voted the Pac-12 Coach of the Year by his league peers, leading UCLA to the program's first conference title, and first No. 1 seed in the Pac-12 Championship and NCAA Championship. The team also won a program-record 40 wins. He was also tabbed the AVCA National Coach of the Year for the second-consecutive year.

The 2018 Pac-12 Championship had the deepest field of the event, to-date. Five teams were ranked in the top 20 heading into the event, making it the most competitive championship in its three-year history. At season's end, the Bruins were the nation's top team for the first time, while USC was ranked No. 5 in the final AVCA Coaches poll. CALIFORNIA, STANFORD and ARIZONA were Nos. 12, 13 and 14, respectively. in the DiG polling, the Trojans (No. 4) and Golden Bears (No. 10) were one spot better.

The McNamara's were named to the NCAA's All-Tournament team on court one, and **Izzy Carey** and **Megan Muret** were all-tournament on court five. USC's Graudina and Bustamante, along with the McNamara twins were tabbed AVCA All-Americans.

PAC-12 BEACH VOLLEYBALL SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

STANFORD carried the banner for Pac-12 cross country throughout the 2017 campaign as the Cardinal captured the Conference team title by unseating six-time defending champion COLORADO and recorded the league's best finish at the NCAA National Championship in fourth place.

It marked the fourth straight top-four finish at the NCAA meet for the Cardinal, who were one of four teams with at least three All-Americans – **Grant Fisher**, **Alex Ostberg** and **Steven Fahy** – along with champion NAU, runner-up Portland and third-place BYU. OREGON came in sixth and Colorado was eighth to give the Pac-12 three in the top 10 for the second time in the past three years.

Since expanding to the Pac-12 in 2011, the Conference's men's programs lead the nation with a combined 12 top-five team finishes and 60 All-Americans at the NCAA Championship.

Along with his Conference-best fourth-place showing at the national meet, Stanford's Fisher won the Pac-12 individual title, while his fellow All-America teammates Ostberg and Fahy finished in the top five at the league meet to help the Cardinal end Colorado's longtime title reign.

COLORADO carried the banner for the Pac-12 in 2017, capturing its third straight Conference title and posting the league's best NCAA Championships finish in third place.

At the NCAA Championship, the Buffaloes reached the podium with a third-place finish, followed by STANFORD in fourth and OREGON in fifth. It marked the second straight year and just the third time (2007) in event history that Conference members recorded a trio of top-five team national finishes.

Individually, the Pac-12 led the way with 14 All-Americans – finishers inside the top 40 overall – which was more than double the next closest conference (Mountain West – six). The 14 All-Americans set a new record for the league, besting the previous mark of 12 from 2003.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Kaitlyn Benner, Colorado

USC became the first South Division team to capture the Pac-12 title. After the North Division teams (OREGON, STANFORD and WASHINGTON) won the Conference's first six Pac-12 Football Championship Games, the Trojans ended the North Division streak with a 31-28 win over Stanford at Levi's Stadium to claim their 39th conference crown.

The Pac-12 placed nine teams in bowl games, including a pair of teams in the CFP with USC in the Cotton Bowl and Washington in the Fiesta Bowl.

Stanford running back **Bryce Love** rushed for a Cardinal record 2,118 yards and 19 TDs to earn Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Year honors. He was second in the FBS, averaging 162.9 yards per game. Love set a single-game record 301 rushing yards on 25 carries (12.0 ypc) vs. ARIZONA STATE. He's rushed for 100 or more yards in 12 games this season and posted an FBS record with 13 runs of 50 or more yards. Washington defensive end **Vita Vea** earned the Pat Tillman Defensive Player of the Year. Vea anchored a Husky defense that was fourth in the nation in rushing defense (100.8 yards allowed/game), while the team's total defense (298.0 yards allowed/game) paced the Pac-12 and was eighth in the FBS. Behind Vea, who tallied 44 tackles and 3.5 sacks, the Huskies gave up just eight rushing touchdowns during the regular season. ARIZONA running back **J.J. Taylor** and Stanford offensive tackle **Walker Little** earned Pac-12 Offensive Co-Freshman of the Year. Taylor played in all 13 games and was the Pac-12's top freshman rusher with 847 yards (5.8 yards/carry), 65.2 yards/game and five TDs. Little was the first true freshman to start at tackle for Stanford in 17 years. He was part of an offensive line that led the Cardinal to an average of 205.8 rushing yards per game. Behind Little, the Cardinal allowed a league-low 16 sacks (1.23 sacks allowed per game). Arizona linebacker **Colin Schooler** collected Pac-12 Defensive Freshman of the Year as collected 95 tackles and was 11th in the Pac-12 averaging 7.3 tackles/game. In Pac-12 games only, Schooler recorded 81 tackles and was fourth in the league averaging 9.0 tackles per game. His 13.5 tackles for loss were most by an FBS freshman during the season. Stanford coach **David Shaw** earned Pac-12 Coach of the Year after leading the Cardinal to a 9-5 record overall and a 7-2 mark in Conference play. After opening the season 1-2, Stanford won eight of its final nine regular season games, including victories over No. 9 Washington and No. 8 Notre Dame over the final three weeks of the season. Stanford clinched the North Division and made its fourth Pac-12 Football Championship Game under Shaw.

Love earned unanimous All-America honors, while four additional Pac-12 student-athletes picked up consensus All-America honors - **Cody O'Connell**, OG, WSU; **Hercules Mata'afa**, DL, USC; **Matt Gay**, PK, UTAH; **Dante Pettis**, PR/AP, Washington. Love was named the Doak Walker Award winner (nation's top running back) and was the Heisman Trophy runner-up. Additional national honors went to Gay (Lou Groza Award as the nation's top place kicker), Mata'afa (Polynesian Player of the Year), Washington State's **Luke Falk** (Burlsworth Trophy - started career as a walk-on) and Shaw (Dodd Trophy for coach of the year).

Several student-athletes set FBS and Pac-12 records during the 2017 season... Washington's Pettis set an FBS record with nine career punt returns for TDs ... Washington State's Falk set Pac-12 career records with 14,486 passing yards and 119 TD passes ... Arizona's **Khalil Tate** not only set a FBS single-game rushing record for a quarterback (327 yards at Colorado), but a Pac-12 season rushing record for a quarterback (1,411 yards) ... Oregon's **Royce Freeman** set a Pac-12 career record with 60 rushing TDs ... Utah's Gay set a new Pac-12 single-season record with 30 field goals.

2018 NFL Draft – Pac-12 selections

A total of 30 players from the Pac-12 were selected in the NFL Draft, third among all conferences in terms of selections per member (2.50). The Pac-12 had four selections among the first 15 picks, the most of any conference. With USC's Sam Darnold and UCLA's Josh Rosen taken in the first round, it marked the third time in Pac-12 history that two quarterbacks were selected in the first round. It's happened just six times in the common era of the draft (since 1967) where multiple quarterbacks from the same conference were drafted in the first round.

The USC Trojans captured their first Pac-12 Championship since 2011 and 20th overall with a four-stroke victory over COLORADO. USC's **Justin Suh** paced the way for the Trojans, earning medalist honors with a score of 16-under (268). The second-place showing for the Buffaloes was the highest finish for the CU program since joining the Pac-12.

Eight teams (ARIZONA, ARIZONA STATE, CALIFORNIA, COLORADO, OREGON, STANFORD, UCLA, USC) participated in the NCAA Regional Championships where the Sun Devils, Ducks, Cardinal and Bruins advanced to the NCAA Championships. Arizona State was the Pac-12's highest finisher, coming in tied for 13th.

Three individuals found themselves atop the Golfstat's scoring average rankings all season - California's **Collin Morikawa** at No. 1 (68.68), Suh at No. 2 (68.73), and Oregon's **Norman Xiong** at No. 3 (69.05). Morikawa's scoring average is the lowest ever posted in one season in NCAA history. Suh's is the second lowest, while Xiong's is tied for fourth lowest. That trio combined for 14 wins during the 2017-18 season as Morikawa picked up three victories, while Suh and Xiong posted school single-season records with five and six wins, respectively.

Suh was named the Pac-12 Men's Golfer of the Year, teammate **Kaito Onishi** was tabbed Pac-12 Freshman of the Year and California coach **Walter Chun** picked up Pac-12 Coach of the Year honors for the first time in his career.

Xiong earned a couple of postseason accolades with the Fred Haskins Award (Outstanding Golfer) and the Jack Nicklaus Award (Division I Player of the Year), while Morikawa was tabbed *Golfweek* Player of the Year. It was the sixth consecutive year a Pac-12 golfer earned *Golfweek's* honor. Xiong, Morikawa and Suh were named PING GCAA First Team All-Americans, as well as All-Nicklaus Team selections. Earning PING GCAA Second Team All-America honors was Arizona's **George Cunningham**, while Stanford's **Isaiah Salinda** collected Honorable Mention honors.

UCLA collected its seventh Pac-12 Conference title, posting a 54-hole total of 860 (-4), to claim the league crown. With a decisive 12-stroke victory over runner-up USC (291-288-293 – 872), the Bruins claimed the seventh largest margin of victory in the tournament's 31-year history. The Bruins claimed the top two spots in the individual race as well with freshman **Patty Tavatanakit** and sophomore **Lilia Vu** both posting a score of 8-under for the tournament, with Tavatanakit taking the top spot in dramatic fashion through a one-hole playoff.

The high-caliber of Pac-12 women's golf was evident on selection day for the NCAA Regionals as 10 teams earned postseason bids. Six teams earned a seed of No. 4 or higher (ARIZONA, ARIZONA STATE, STANFORD, UCLA USC, WASHINGTON). Five teams (ARIZONA, STANFORD, UCLA, USC, WASHINGTON) advanced to the NCAA Championships where Arizona, Stanford, UCLA, and USC qualified for Match Play. The Wildcats knocked off UCLA, Stanford, and Alabama to capture their third NCAA title, and first since 2000. Wildcat junior **Haley Moore** sunk a clutch birdie putt on the first playoff hole to secure the NCAA team title for Arizona. It was the 19th women's NCAA golf title for the Pac-12.

UCLA junior **Lilia Vu** was named both the Pac-12 Women's Golfer of the Year and the WGCA Player of the Year. UCLA's **Patty Tavatanakit**, who won the 2018 Pac-12 Championships, secured Freshman of the Year honors, All-Pac-12 First Team honors, and was named WGCA Freshman of the Year. UCLA head coach **Carrie Forsyth** was named Pac-12 Coach of the Year after guiding the Bruins to the 2018 Pac-12 championship, and a No. 1 seed in the NCAA tournament.

Stanford's **Andrea Lee** and UCLA's duo of Lilia Vu and Patty Tavatanakit were honored by both the WGCA and Golfweek as First Team All-America selections, while both the WGCA and *Golfweek* bestowed second team honors to Arizona State's **Olivia Mehaffey**, USC's **Jennifer Chang**, and UCLA's **Mariel Galdiano**. *Golfweek* also tabbed third team honors to Colorado's **Robyn Choi**, Arizona's Haley Moore, and Stanford's **Albane Valenzuela**. USC's **Andrea Gaston** picked up Coach of the Year honors by *Golfweek*.

UCLA used a pair of Perfect 10s from UCLA's Christine Peng-Peng Lee for a come-from-behind victory to claim the NCAA Championship, the program's first since 2010. The Bruins jumped ahead of two-time defending champion Oklahoma on Lee's and the team's final routine of the night, winning by a 198-0.750-198.0375 margin.

The Bruins headlined four NCAA semifinal teams, including CALIFORNIA, UTAH and WASHINGTON, the Utes advancing to the Super Six for the 43rd-consecutive year. UCLA captured the Columbus Regional title to get to the semifinal in St. Louis, Mo., while Utah was the Salt Lake City Regional Champion, placing ahead of Cal.

There was a Pac-12 gymnast individual title at every apparatus. Utah's MyKayla Skinner and UCLA's Kyla Ross placed in the top three of the all-around individual competition, placing second and third, respectively. Skinner went on to win an individual co-national championship on the vault. Peng-Peng Lee scored a 10.000 on the balance beam to win an individual title, while STANFORD's Elizabeth Price was also perfect on the uneven bars to claim the national co-title, as well. UCLA's Katelyn Ohashi was a co-NCAA Champion on the floor.

The Bruins won the Pac-12 Championship at McKale Center on the campus of the University of Arizona. It was its second conference title in three years. The Bruins edged out the Utes, 197.500-197.350. Skinner used a perfect score on the floor to give her the edge in the all-around, winning the individual title with a 39.725.

Price was tabbed the Pac-12 Gymnast of the Year for the second time in her career, last winning in 2016. ASU's Cairo Leonard-Baker was named the Pac-12 Freshman/Newcomer of the Year, becoming the first-ever Sun Devil to earn the honor. UCLA's Katelyn Ohashi was the Pac-12 Specialist of the Year marking the second-consecutive Bruin to receive the award. Peng-Peng Lee was the Honda Sports Award winner for gymnastics.

HONDA AWARD WINNER

In the inaugural season of Pac-12 Lacrosse, two teams advanced to the NCAA Tournament. Pac-12 regular season champion COLORADO and Pac-12 Tournament champion STANFORD made it to the second and first round of the tournament, respectively.

Colorado clinched the first-ever Pac-12 regular season title in the second-to-last weekend of the season after defeating Stanford (11-10) in overtime to break the tie for first in the Conference standings. In just its fifth year of existence, the Buffs solidified a No. 1 seed in the inaugural Pac-12 Tournament by defeating OREGON in the final weekend of play. CU was led by senior Darby Kiernan, a five-time Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Week, including claiming the last three-straight from Apr. 9-Apr. 23. She also picked up an IWLCA Offensive Player of the Week nod on April 18.

In the inaugural championship game, No. 2-seed Stanford defeated regular season champion Colorado to become the first-ever Pac-12 Women's Lacrosse Tournament Champion. The Cardinal dominated offensively in the championship game, coming out strong in the first half to build a strong lead that continued through the remainder of the game. Stanford's offensive change led to a 15-6 win. With the win, the Cardinal received the automatic bid to the NCAA tournament.

Two Pac-12 teams earned bids to the NCAA Women's Lacrosse Tournament. Stanford earned the league's automatic bid, while Colorado earned an at-large bid.

The Buffs defeated Jacksonville in the first round (23-18), but the Cardinal were defeated by Virginia (12-3). Colorado advanced to the second round to face Florida, but was bested, 13-9.

In the final IWLCA poll, three teams are ranked. Colorado comes in at No. 14, Stanford is No. 16 and USC is No. 24.

WASHINGTON men's rowing captured its second consecutive Pac-12 Rowing Championship by taking three-of-four scoring races to total 72 points. Recording its eighth title in the last 10 years, it marked the 38th Conference title in program history since the first Conference championship was awarded in 1960. CALIFORNIA came close in second place with 65 points and STANFORD totaled 54 points to round out the podium.

The Conference title came down to the varsity eight race as the Huskies held on strong throughout the entire course and finished in 5:51.24. The Golden Bears crossed the line second in 5:52.69 and the Cardinal was third in 6:09.29. The Huskies claimed the second varsity eight and third varsity eight as the races finished in a similar fashion with California and Stanford taking second and third in each race, respectively. Cal took home the novice eight title in 6:07.17 for its top place finish of the day. In the varsity four, Washington stroked in first, recording a time of 6:41.90, Cal placed second in 6:43.75, and OREGON STATE took third in 7:22.66.

At the Intercollegiate Rowing Association (IRA) national championship at Mercer Lake, the Huskies took home the James Ten Eyck Trophy as the overall points winner (211) for the 11th time in the last 12 years. Yale captured its second consecutive national championship, winning the premiere heavyweight men's eight event in 6:01.68 followed by Washington in second at 6:04.33 and California took third at 6:08.91. UW won the second varsity eight with a time of 6:23.40 and took home the third varsity eight grand final at 6:33.54. California recorded top three finishes in all three events, taking silver in the second varsity eight (6:25.42) and third place in the third varsity eight (6:42.55).

California's **Natan Wegrzycki-Szymczyk** garnered Pac-12 Rowing Athlete of the Year honors for the third-straight year and was also tabbed Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year. The senior boasted a 3.69 cumulative grade-point average as a sociology major and received a Pac-12 Postgraduate Scholarship. Washington's **Chris Carlson** received Men's Rowing Newcomer of the Year recognition and **Michael Callahan** was named Men's Rowing Coach of the Year.

The CALIFORNIA women's rowing team captured the 2018 NCAA Rowing Championship for the second time in the last three years at Sarasota's Nathan Benderson Park. The Golden Bears recorded the program's fourth NCAA team title and tie for the second most in NCAA Rowing history. Cal was led by wins in the varsity eight and varsity four, as well as a crucial second-place finish in the second varsity eight to earn 130 points. Pac-12 teams accounted for three of the top four finishes. Runner up WASHINGTON secured 128 points after winning the second varsity eight and STANFORD finished fourth with 104 points. With the national title on the line, it all came down to the varsity four as Washington and California battled it out all the way to the finish. Cal crossed the line at 7:00.79, less than a second ahead of Washington at 7:01.62.

Washington won the 2018 Pac-12 Championships at Lake Natoma for its second straight league title. The Huskies swept all four scoring races to earn their 16th Conference crown in program history and receive the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Rowing Championship. The Huskies earned the team title amassing 45.5 points, followed by California in second place with 36 points and Stanford in third with 35.5 points. UW capped the day with a win in the varsity eight, crossing the finish line in a time of 6:30.12, followed by Stanford in second in 6:33.45 and California in third in 6:34.53.

After a successful finish at nationals, four Huskies earned Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association first-team All-American and **Yasmin Farooq** was named Division I National Coach of the Year for the second straight season, the CRCA announced. The Pac-12 totaled 12 All-Americans with Washington receiving the most, followed by Stanford with three selections and Cal, OREGON STATE, UCLA, USC, and WASHINGTON STATE all earning one honoree.

Washington swept the Pac-12 Women's Rowing All-Conference awards as **Brooke Mooney** was named the Pac-12 Rowing Athlete of the Year, **Sofia Asoumanaki** was tabbed Newcomer of the Year and Yasmin Farooq earned Women's Rowing Coach of the Year honors for the second consecutive year. USC senior **Gørtz Jacobsen** was named Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year with a 3.88 cumulative grade-point average, majoring in global studies and comparative literature. Jacobsen competed in every varsity eight race throughout the season and helped then-No. 12 USC place fifth out of 21 crews at the Clemson Invitational.

Stanford captured its third-straight NCAA Championship (2015-17), joining Virginia (1991-94) in the history books as the only teams to have three-consecutive NCAA titles. No. 9-seeded Stanford and No. 2-seeded Indiana met in the College Cup final, battling through scoreless regulation time before redshirt junior **Sam Werner** netted the game-winning goal in double overtime. The 1-0 shutout marked Stanford's 12th-straight College Cup game without allowing a goal.

The Pac-12 has an all-time record of 132-101-12 (.563) in the NCAA Tournament, with seven national championships and eight second-place finishes. CALIFORNIA and WASHINGTON also earned berths to the NCAA Tournament.

Stanford, which also won its fourth-straight Pac-12 title, raked in the postseason honors with **Foster Langsdorf** named Pac-12 Player of the Year and **Tomas Hilliard-Arce** named Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year, both for the second-straight year. Stanford head coach **Jeremy Gunn** received Pac-12 Coach of the Year for the fourth-straight year. UW's **Blake Bodily** was selected the 2017 Pac-12 Freshman of the Year, bringing home the honor to Seattle for the second year in a row with his teammate **Handwalla Bwana** winning the year before.

PAC-12 MEN'S SOCCER SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

STANFORD was crowned the 2017 NCAA Women's Soccer Champions, capturing the national championship for the second time in program history. In the first-ever all-Pac-12 final, the Cardinal topped UCLA, 3-2, at the Orlando City Stadium, Orlando, Fla. Stanford's title marked the fifth women's soccer crown for the Pac-12 and the 502nd NCAA team national championship for the members of the Conference of Champions.

Stanford and UCLA's appearances marked the fourth time two Pac-12 programs reached the College Cup in the same season (2007, 2008, 2009, 2017). The Pac-12 is now one of three leagues to capture consecutive NCAA women's soccer national titles (ACC, WCC) with USC claiming the 2016 championship.

Seven Pac-12 teams earned berths to the NCAA Tournament with STANFORD earning a No. 1 overall seed for the fourth-straight year and joined in the field by No. 2-seeded UCLA, No. 3-seeded USC, ARIZONA, COLORADO, CALIFORNIA and WASHINGTON STATE. Six teams advanced to the second record and three making the Sweet Sixteen.

The Pac-12 now holds an all-time record of 198-126-31 (.601) in the NCAA Women's College Cup, with five national championships and five second-place finishes with the inclusion of 2017. The Conference finished the regular season with five teams ranked in the top-25 RPI, which was the second-most of any conference.

WASHINGTON was the final remaining Pac-12 team in the Women's College World Series, advancing to the final where the Huskies fell to Florida State. UW finished the season second in both the USA Today/NFCA and USA Softball/ESPN poll.

Half of the eight team Women's College World Series field was made up of Pac-12 teams. Joining Washington was ARIZONA STATE, OREGON and UCLA. UCLA was eliminated by eventual National Champion Florida State after losing 3-1 and 12-6. The Sun Devils lost to Oregon (11-6) in the first game of the WCWS and also lost to Oklahoma (2-0) leading to their elimination. The Ducks lost to the Huskies (6-2) and Florida State (4-1).

All four Pac-12 teams in the WCWS hosted and won their super regionals. Joining the four WCWS teams in the NCAA Tournament was ARIZONA, CALIFORNIA and OREGON STATE. UCLA eliminated fellow Pac-12 team No. 14-seed Arizona (2-0) in the Los Angeles Super Regional final. Oregon State and California ended their postseason journeys in the regionals, going 2-2 and 1-2 in postseason, respectively. Seven league teams earned berths to the NCAA Tournament, marking the 23rd-straight season that the Pac-12 has had five or more teams advance to the postseason and the fifth time in seven years that seven Conference teams earned bids.

In the final week of the regular season, Oregon claimed the Pac-12 title after sweeping then-No. 24 California in its three-game series. UO picks up its fourth title in six years. The Ducks and UCLA went into the final week of the regular season tied at the top of the Pac-12 standings. UCLA went 2-1 against then-No. 6 Arizona State, earning second in the Pac-12.

The 2018 Pac-12 postseason awards were announced as voted on by the league's coaches. UCLA's **Rachel Garcia** was named the Pac-12 Player of the Year. Oregon junior **Megan Kleist** was voted Pac-12 Pitcher of the Year. Washington's **Sis Bates** garnered Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year. UCLA's **Aaliyah Jordan** was tabbed Pac-12 Freshman of the Year and also was the Pac-12 Batting Champion. Arizona State head coach **Trisha Ford** was voted Pac-12 Coach of the Year.

Pac-12 men's swimming & diving teams had another dominant year in the pool as three teams earned top-10 finishes at the 2018 NCAA Championships and five finished in the top-20. CALIFORNIA who led the way in second place with 437.5 points, has earned a top-two finish for the ninth-straight year. Pac-12 swimmers and divers accounted for 59 of the CSCAA All-America teams (33 first-team honorees, 26 honorable mention honorees) including a nation-leading best 15 selections from California.

California captured its fifth overall Conference title at the 2018 Pac-12 Men's Swimming and Diving Championship with 971 total points for the largest margin of victory since 2007. The Golden Bears won five relay events, seven individual first place finishes and totaled 17 podium appearances. **Andrew Seliskar** set a new Pac-12 Championship record in the 400 individual medley with a time of 3:38.65 and in the 200 breast with a time of 1:51.30 en route to his second Pac-12 Swimmer of the Meet award after earning the honor in 2016 as a freshman. California senior **Pawel Sendyk** was also honored at the end of the meet as the 2017 Pac-12 Men's Swimming and Diving Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

STANFORD's **Abraham DeVine** took home Pac-12 Men's Swimmer of the Year accolades and USC's **Robert Glinta** was voted Pac-12 Men's Swimming Freshman/Newcomer of the Year. California's **David Durden** was selected as Men's Swimming Coach of the Year for the second consecutive season. USC diving claims back-to-back yearly Conference awards as **Dashiell Enos** takes home Men's Diver of the Year and his coach **Hongping Li** repeats as Men's Diving Coach of the Year. California's **Jonathan Robinson** was voted Men's Diving Freshman/Newcomer of the Year.

At the NCAA Championship California (437.5) earned a runner-up finish for the third-straight year while USC (253) took fifth place and Stanford (205) finished in seventh. DeVine claimed the 400-yard individual medley and Seliskar placed third. In the 100 breaststroke Cal's Connor Hoppe took home a sliver followed by Carsten Cissering from USC in third. USC's relay team of Glinta, Vissering, Dylan Carter and Santo Condorelli took home the 200 medley relay national crown.

PAC-12 MEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Pawel Furtek, USC

STANFORD claimed its 10th all-time and second-straight NCAA Championship in record fashion, claiming the Pac-12's 505th all-time. Pac-12 teams and individuals topped the podium in 15 out of the possible 18 swimming events and 15 of 21 total events at the 2018 NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships that included six NCAA, six American, six U.S. Open, nine meet and 11 pool records by five Pac-12 teams and 10 Pac-12 individuals. Thirteen of those 15 titles came from NCAA Champion Stanford.

Stanford dominated the team competition, winning by over 200 points with a total score of 593. CALIFORNIA finished second with 373 points, USC finished 12th with 127 points, ARIZONA finished 20th with 46 points, ARIZONA STATE finished in 23rd with 34 points and UCLA finished 26th with 31 points.

Led by 2016 Olympians **Katie Ledecky** and **Simone Manuel**, the Cardinal claimed its second-straight NCAA Championship, the first time the Cardinal has won back-to-back championships since winning five-straight from 1992-1996. The Cardinal has won more national titles than any program (nine NCAA, one AIAW) and has finished in the top three at the NCAA meet in each of the last five years, including runner-up in 2014 and 2016. Stanford claimed all five relays, all in record fashion, including three races clocking new NCAA, American, U.S. Open, meet and pool records and another two pool records in the first and last relays of the meet. The Cardinal also claimed 8 individual titles, each one breaking records. The 13 NCAA titles tied the record for the most at an NCAA Women's Swimming and Diving Championship.

The Golden Bears took home one NCAA title and visited the podium nine times, just missing the podium with three fourth places, to finish second with 373 points. California has finished among the top three teams in the country each of the last 10 years - the longest current streak in the nation. 2016 Olympic silver medalist Kathleen Baker won the 200-yard backstroke in a new NCAA, American, U.S. Open, meet and pool record time of 1:47.30. The Golden Bears were on the podium for all five relays, finishing with three second-place finishes and two third-place finishes.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Janet Hu, Stanford

Pac-12 men's regular-season and tournament champion UCLA advanced to the NCAA Tournament semifinal and Bruins' duo of **Martin Redlicki** and **Evan Zhu** won the 2018 NCAA Men's Tennis doubles title. Seven men's teams were selected to compete in the NCAA Championship, while six men's pairs competed in the NCAA Doubles Championship and seven men earned spots in the NCAA Singles Tournament.

No. 2 seeded UCLA swept Idaho and San Diego and topped No. 15 Michigan, 4-2, and fell to Ohio State, 4-1 in the semifinal. UCLA faced fellow Pac-12 foe No. 10 USC in the NCAA Quarterfinals in a similar matchup to the Pac-12 Tournament finale, as the Bruins advanced with a close 4-3 victory. The Trojans bested UC Santa Barbara, 4-1 and swept Harvard, 4-0, in their postseason tour. Other Pac-12 victories include OREGON defeating Dartmouth, 4-0, STANFORD over New Mexico State, 4-0, and CALIFORNIA topping NC State, 4-1.

At the 2018 Pac-12 Men's Tennis Championship, No. 1 seed UCLA avenged its 2017 Conference runner-up finish by besting No. 3 seed USC, 4-1, to clinch the team title.

UCLA swept all four individual awards of the men's tennis All-Pac-12 honors for the 2018 season, as determined by a polling of the Conference coaches. The Bruins' Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year **Martin Redlicki** was voted Pac-12 Singles Player of the Year and after consistently being the No. 1 singles player in the ITA National rankings. Redlicki highlighted the national singles competition reaching the semifinals to earn ITA Senior Player of the Year.

Redlicki and **Evan Zhu** were tabbed the Pac-12 Doubles Team of the Year for the second straight season as the pair totaled the 13th NCAA doubles crown in program history. **Keegan Smith** was named the Pac-12 Freshman/Newcomer of the Year and **Billy Martin** earned Pac-12 Coach of the Year. Stanford's **Brandon Coupe** won Performance ITA Assistant Coach of the Year as the Cardinal finished 22-4 overall this season for its best record in 15 years.

National honors also poured in for Pac-12 tennis, as nine men earned ITA All-America status and two student-athletes earning honors for both singles and doubles play.

STANFORD (24-3, 9-0 Pac-12) captured the 2018 NCAA Tennis crown for its second national title in three years (2016) to add to their nation-leading 19 overall NCAA championships. Four women's teams were selected to compete in the NCAA Championship -No. 12 UCLA, No. 15 Stanford, ARIZONA STATE and OREGON. Three women's squads advanced to the second round and two reached the round of 16.

Stanford earned the Conference's automatic bid to the NCAA Championship for the third consecutive year after winning the inaugural team tournament crown in 2017 and the league's regular-season title in 2016. The Cardinal swept through the first three rounds of the NCAA tournament and only conceded five total points through the postseason. Stanford matched its improbable 2016 NCAA title run as the lowest-seeded team at No. 15 to win it all, defeating higher seeds in No. 2 North Carolina, 4-1, No. 7 Georgia, and 4-0, No. 3 Duke, 4-3, and No. 1 Vanderbilt, 4-3, in the title match. Stanford rallied in the singles competition with three two-set victories after Vanderbilt took the doubles point as **Melissa Lord** clinched the title on the second court with a three-set victory over Vandy's No. 10 ranked opponent.

No. 12 UCLA advanced to the third round with two shutout wins over Fresno State, 4-0, and Baylor, 4-0, before a close 4-3 loss to No. 4 Georgia Tech. ASU battled against Wake Forest in the first round and dropped a 4-2 decision. Oregon advanced to the second round with a 4-2 victory over Tennessee and fell to No. 3 seed Duke, 4-2.

Stanford's **Michaela Gordon** was named Pac-12 Freshman/Newcomer of the Year and then collected the ITA National Rookie of the Year honor. Gordon and No. 1 court partner **Emily Arbuthnott** earned Pac-12 Doubles Team of the Year and received the No. 3 overall seed in the NCAA Women's Tennis Doubles Championship. UCLA's **Ena Shibahara** was voted Pac-12 Singles Player of the Year for the second straight year. Stanford's **Lele Foorod** was named the Pac-12 Coach of the Year for the sixth time in her 18 seasons and also earned Wilson ITA National Coach of the Year for the second time in her career (2003, 2018).

Four Pac-12 women's pairs competed in the NCAA Doubles Championship while 13 women earned spots in the NCAA Singles Tournament. Arizona State's pair of **Ilze Hattingh** and **Lauryn John-Baptiste** advanced to the quarterfinals while **Ena Shibahara** from UCLA and **Emily Arbuthnott** from Stanford advanced to the singles round of 16.

National honors also poured in for Pac-12 tennis, as eight women earned ITA All-America status and two athletes earned the honor for both singles and doubles competition.

While the OREGON men maintained their dominance over the Pac-12 Championship, it was the USC men who capped the 2018 campaign with the best Conference finish at the NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships.

USC posted its first trophy finish at the NCAA outdoor championship since 2014, placing fourth with 34 points to lead the Pac-12 at the national meet. STANFORD tied for eighth, its best showing since placing sixth in 2011, to finish third in the USTFCCA Program of the Year standings behind winner Alabama and runner-up Arkansas. Oregon, which extended its record Pac-12 men's title streak to 12 consecutive years, tied for 35th at the NCAA meet.

Four event national titles were won by Pac-12 athletes or relay teams, extending the league's streak of at least one event champion at the NCAA meet to 59 consecutive years dating to 1960. Additionally, two all-time Pac-12 records and a trio of collegiate records were set, all by USC in winning event titles at the NCAA Championship: 400-meter dash - **Michael Norman**, USC (collegiate record); 5,000-meter run - **Sean McGorty**, STANFORD; 400-meter hurdles - **Rai Benjamin**, USC (Pac-12 & collegiate record); 4x400-meter relay - USC (Pac-12 & collegiate record). Athletes from the Pac-12 amassed 22 First Team All-America accolades, highlighted by two honors for both USC's Norman and Benjamin.

ARIZONA freshman sensation **Jordan Geist** earned Pac-12 Championship Athlete of the Meet honors by scoring 22 points at the event, including becoming the first rookie to win the league's shot put and discus titles. Geist added USTFCCA West Region Field Athlete of the Year honors, while USC's Norman earned both West Region and National Track Athlete of the Year accolades from the USTFCCA. Norman and Benjamin represented the Pac-12 on the final list of 10 semifinalists for the Bowerman to be awarded in December 2018.

PAC-12 MEN'S TRACK & FIELD SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Ben Saarel, Colorado

The Pac-12 enjoyed a banner 2018 women's outdoor track & field season, both from a team and individual standpoint.

USC led the way from a team perspective as the Trojans captured both the Pac-12 and NCAA Championships for the first time in program history. While the Women of Troy ran away with the Pac-12 title in May - unseating nine-time defending champion Oregon in the process - their fight for the NCAA crown was one of the most dramatic in event history. Needing a victory in the 4x400-meter relay finale to win the national title, Trojans' senior **Kendall Ellis** erased a 20-meter deficit over the final 100 meters of the anchor leg to beat Purdue to the tape and score the 10 points necessary to narrowly edge Georgia for the team title. The championship was the second all-time for the USC women and ninth overall for Pac-12 women's programs, including the second straight, third in the last four years and sixth since 2001.

STANFORD placed third at the NCAA meet, just two points shy of USC in the closest top-three finish in Championship history, to equal its best finish in program history. The Cardinal was named the Terry Crawford Women's National Program of the Year by the USTFCCA, ahead of league rival and runner-up OREGON. It marked the 10th consecutive year a Pac-12 program earned USTFCCA national program of the year distinction.

The podium finishes for USC and Stanford headlined a strong NCAA showing for the Conference, which had five teams finish in the top 15 (USC 1st, Stanford 3rd, Oregon 7th, Arizona State 9th, UCLA T14th) as well as six combined event champions, headlined by two from ASU's **Maggie Ewen** (shot put, discus).

Ewen cemented her legacy as one of the greatest throwers in Pac-12 and NCAA Track & Field history with her two national titles, a second straight treble of Pac-12 throwing titles (hammer, shot put, discus), and a pair of collegiate records set during the spring season (hammer, shot put). Ewen and Ellis represented the Pac-12 on the final list of 10 semifinalists for the Bowerman to be awarded in December 2018.

Pac-12 Champion Stanford led nine league teams earning NCAA Tournament bids, the Cardinal making its 21st all-time NCAA semifinal appearance. It marked the 12th-consecutive year the Pac-12 had at least six teams earn tournament berths. League teams went 8-1 in the first round this season, eventually advancing five teams to the round of 16, the 18th time at least three Pac-12 teams reached the regional semifinal round.

Six Pac-12 teams appeared in the final AVCA poll, with the Cardinal spending the entire season in the top five and finishing at No. 4. USC ended up in the top 10 at No. 7 after starting the season unranked, while Utah received its highest final rating at No. 11. UCLA (No. 14), Washington (No. 15) and Colorado (No. 19).

Stanford won its 17th all-time Pac-12 crown and first under head coach **Kevin Hambly**, who was in his first season on the Cardinal bench. Sophomore **Kathryn Plummer** nabbed several awards, garnering national player of the year honors by the AVCA and ESPNW. Plummer is the sixth Pac-12 student-athlete to earn the AVCA honor in the last eight years, and the first Cardinal since 2007. Plummer was also tabbed the Pac-12 Player of the Year one year after being voted Pac-12 Freshman of the Year and AVCA National Freshman of the Year. She is just the second player in league history, and first since 1989, to earn Conference freshman and player of the year honors in back-to-back seasons.

Cardinal sophomore teammates **Jenna Gray** and **Morgan Hentz** were also voted the Pac-12 Setter and Libero of the Year, respectively. Joining the list of honorees were Oregon State's **Mark Barnard** who was tabbed the Pac-12 Coach of the Year after a campaign the saw the Beavers accomplishments not seen in decades. OSU's **Kylee McLaughlin** was picked the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year.

11 Pac-12 student-athletes were selected AVCA All-Americans with seven of those honored being sophomore or juniors on the first or second teams. Stanford was the most represented with five All-Americans. An additional received honorable mention status. Eight different teams were represented, in all.

Joining Stanford among the top-16-seeded teams in the NCAA Tournament were No. 8-seeded UW, No. 10-seeded USC, No. 11-seeded Utah and No. 15-seeded UCLA. Colorado, Oregon, Oregon State and Washington State earned bids, as well.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

ARIZONA STATE successfully defended its Pac-12 crown, capturing its 18th Pac-12 title at the 2018 Pac-12 Wrestling Championships. The ninth-ranked Sun Devils posted 96.0 points behind six individual Pac-12 champions - **Ali Naser** (133), **Jason Tsirtis** (149), **Josh Shields** (157), **Anthony Valencia** (165), **Zahid Valencia** (174) and **Kendall Norfleet** (184). CSU BAKERSFIELD's **Sergio Mendez** (125) was honored with the most falls at the Pac-12 Championships, while OREGON STATE's **Amar Dhesi** (285) was named the Most Outstanding Wrestler of the Championships. OREGON STATE, host of the Championships, finished runner-up with 70.0 points. CSU Bakersfield finished third with 52.5 points, followed by STANFORD with 47.5 points and CAL POLY with 37.0 points.

Pac-12 Wrestler of the Year Zahid Valencia became the first Pac-12 wrestler since 2011 to earn a national title. Valencia avenged a semifinal loss in last year's championships to Penn State's Mark Hall by dominating Hall with a 8-2 decision in this year's championship bout. Behind Valencia and All-Americans Jason Tsirtis (7th at 149) and Josh Shields (7th at 157), the Sun Devils placed 10th at the NCAA Championships. Teammate Kordell Norfleet was tabbed Pac-12 Freshman/Newcomer of the Year. Arizona State's **Zeke Jones** repeated as Coach of the Year. In addition to the three Sun Devils, Oregon State's Amar Dhesi earned All-America recognition with his third-place finish at the NCAA Championships.

(Capsule Reviews of 2017-18 Pac-12 Highlights in the MPSF)

MEN'S GYMNASTICS

STANFORD and CALIFORNIA finished second and third, respectively, behind seven-time NCAA Champion Oklahoma at the MPSF Championships. Cal's **Yordan Aleksandrov** won the individual title on the high bar. The Cardinal placed third at the NCAA Championships with a score of 408.725, continuing a streak of top-five finishes at the national championship meet dating back to 2006. The Cardinal's **Robert Neff** closed out his career with a second-straight national title on the high bar.

MEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

Powered by several world-best marks, the USC men's program recorded the league's top NCAA National Championship finish in second place. **Michael Norman** set a world record in winning the 400-meter dash (44.52) and anchored the Trojans' 4x400 relay team which ran the fastest time recorded in the event's history (3:00.77). **Randall Cunningham** also claimed a national title in the high jump for USC. The Trojans also captured the MPSF crown.

WOMEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

The Pac-12 recorded an impressive three top-10 (OREGON 5th, USC 7th, STANFORD 8th), four top-15 (ARIZONA STATE 13th) and five top-20 (COLORADO T-20th) team finishes at the NCAA National Championship. **Sabrina Southerland** won the 800-meter run to lead the Ducks to their top-5 showing, while **Kendall Ellis** set an American record to win the 400-meter dash and anchored the victorious 4x400 relay to headline the Trojans. ASU's **Maggie Ewen** captured a national title in the shot put. USC also won its fourth MPSF title in the last five years, edging runner-up Stanford by 24 points.

MEN'S VOLLEYBALL

Unseeded UCLA advanced to the national-championship match on its home floor. The Bruins, however, could not pull off the final upset and fell to Long Beach State, 3-2. UCLA also advanced to the MPSF title match where it received help from All-Tournament performers **Micah Ma'a** and **Daenan Gyimah**. USC was the sixth seed overall in the tournament and Stanford was the seventh seed.

MEN'S WATER POLO

UCLA capped the season with its 11 NCAA title in the sport, all-time, despite six true freshmen and a redshirt sophomore goalkeeper in the net. The Bruins defeated crosstown-rival USC, 7-5. Head coach **Adam Wright** was the MPSF Coach of the Year, while senior attacker **Luca Cupido** from California was named the MPSF Player of the Year. Stanford's **Ben Hallock** was the MPSF Freshman of the Year. The national championship battle was a rematch of the MPSF title tilt, which also had the Bruins coming out on top, 7-5.

WOMEN'S WATER POLO

Top-seeded USC defeated second-seeded Stanford, 5-4, for the program's sixth all-time NCAA title. It was the Trojans second NCAA title in three years. The Trojans won their fifth MPSF leading a contingency of four teams to the NCAA Tournament, as they were joined by California and UCLA, as well. USC swept the conference honors, taking the MPSF Player of the Year (**Amanda Logan**), MPSF Newcomer of the Year (**Paige Hauschild**) and MPSF Coach of the Year (**Jovan Vavic**). Vavic claimed the award for the sixth time in his career.
