INTRODUCTION: FROM THE COMMISSIONER



We at the Pac-12 Conference are proud to present this review of the conference's 2016-17 academic year.

A year after we celebrated our centennial, the student-athletes and coaches of our 12 universities made clear that they intend our second century to be as illustrious as our first. They renewed the Pac-12's hold on the title "Conference of Champions®," winning 13 NCAA Championships and pushing the Pac-12 over the 500-mark in all-time NCAA team championships. In addition, our student-athletes distinguished themselves at the 2016 Rio Olympics, winning 55 medals and representing 47 different countries.

The Pac-12's West Coast mindset and commitment to excellence and innovation drives the vision of our 12 university presidents and chancellors, who together form the conference's governing board. That vision has led them to take a leadership role in providing the best possible experience to student-athletes. This year, in conjunction with the other four Autonomy Conferences, we enacted rule changes to rebalance the time demands placed on our student-athletes and give them more control over their schedules.

Pac-12 presidents and chancellors also continued to strongly support the Pac-12 Student-Athlete Health and Well-Being Initiative, which funds millions of dollars in research grants which are annually awarded to doctors, athletic trainers, and medical research professionals on our campuses who are studying everything from head trauma to hydration. For the first time this year, the Pac-12 co-hosted a national conference on sport-related concussion that included important discussions on new data from the largest concussion study in history.

Meanwhile, our universities' commitment to a truly independent Pac-12 Networks enabled us to provide exposure to far more women's and Olympic sports events than any other conference network, while expanding our distribution and embracing innovative ways of transmitting games to our fans.

Reflecting our universities' global reach, this year also saw the Pac-12 deepen and expand its globalization initiative as we hosted the second annual Pac-12 China Game and sent a team of basketball all-stars to Australia. Pac-12 Global continues to provide important learning and cultural opportunities for student-athletes and open doors for our member universities in promotional, research, and academic capacities.

So, as you read this annual report, I hope you will see why we take such pride what our conference is achieving – on the field, on the court, in the classroom, and around the world. These are the accomplishments of innumerable coaches, assistant coaches, administrators, doctors, athletic trainers, and faculty members, as well as our own staff at the Pac-12 and Pac-12 Networks. Most of all, they are the accomplishments of the remarkable young people who choose to play sports and pursue higher education at our 12 universities. They inspire me every day, and fill me with excitement and anticipation for the years ahead.

Our Student-Athletes: Champions on and off the field



The 2016-2017 was an incredible year for the conference both in competition and outside the lines. The “Conference of Champions” maintained its national dominance with an impressive 13 NCAA Championships won by seven different Pac-12 schools over the course of the school year, bringing the Pac-12’s all time total to 501 NCAA team titles, 192 more than any other conference.

Pac-12 teams made appearances on all of college sports’ biggest stages this year with Washington representing the conference in the College Football Playoff, Oregon earning a spot in the NCAA Men’s Final Four, Stanford competing in their 13th NCAA Women’s Final Four, Oregon State traveling to the College World Series in Omaha, and UCLA, Washington, and Oregon all making appearances in the Women’s College World Series in Oklahoma City.

Individual national awards were also abundant for Pac-12 student-athletes this year. Among those countless accolades were Washington’s Kelsey Plum being named unanimous national player of the year in women’s basketball, three Pac-12 student-athletes earning Elite 90 awards for having the best GPAs at NCAA Championships, and a record-tying four Pac-12 men’s basketball student-athletes being named AP All-Americans.

Pac-12 Championships



The 2017 Pac-12 Men's Basketball Tournament built on its successful reputation in Las Vegas this year, moving to the brand new T-Mobile Arena and selling out the final two sessions despite the 5,800-seat increase over the MGM Grand Garden Arena. The 2017 tournament marked the highest-attended Pac-12 Men's Basketball Tournament of all time with nearly 90,000 fans taking in the action. The tournament, sponsored by New York Life, was won by Arizona for the second time in three years as the Wildcats outlasted Oregon to get the 83-80 win and cut down the nets at T-Mobile.



In Seattle the week before, a sellout crowd of nearly 10,000 watched Oregon defeat Washington in a quarterfinal session in KeyArena, marking the largest crowd in the tournament's 16-year history. Stanford ended up defeating Oregon State for the Pac-12 tournament crown, before the Cardinal went on to cap off a historic season at the NCAA Women's Final Four.



The Pac-12 Football Championship Game returned to Levi's Stadium – the home of the NFL's San Francisco 49ers – for the third year in a row. Washington defeated Colorado en route to a College Football Playoff berth. It was the Huskies' first conference championship since 2000.

Pac-12 Global



Recognizing the conference's location on the Pacific Rim, the increasing international activities of Pac-12 member universities, and the rapid globalization of higher education and research, the conference deepened and extended its globalization initiative, known as Pac-12 Global. In November 2016, Stanford met Harvard in the second annual Pac-12 China Game, televised live in the U.S. on ESPN2. Alibaba Group, the world's largest online and mobile commerce company, sponsored the game, and extended its partnership with the Pac-12 for two more years.



The centerpiece of Pac-12 Global is its focus on educational programming for student-athletes. In addition to being the presenting sponsor of the Pac-12 China Game, Alibaba hosts the two participating teams at its headquarters in Hangzhou for high-level meetings with company leadership and an academic symposium on Chinese culture, business, and the future of ecommerce. This experience is a once in a lifetime chance for student-athletes to engage directly with young people and senior executives in perhaps the world's most important and exciting growth market in China.



Back in the U.S., the 2016-2017 school year marked the inauguration of a coach-education alliance between the Pac-12 Conference and Chinese coaches. The alliance brought together the Pac-12, the University of Utah, Arizona State University, the Federation of University Sports of China (FUSC), and the Chinese Scholarship Council. Over a three-month period, the program trained 200 Chinese coaches on techniques in men's and women's basketball, track & field, swimming, and cheerleading. This groundbreaking coaching education program was cited as one of the key achievements of the U.S. - China People-to-People Exchange program at the seventh annual U.S. - China Consultation on People-to-People Exchange, co-chaired by then Secretary of State John Kerry and Chinese Vice Premier Liu Yandong.



The 2016-17 season also marked Pac-12 Global's expansion to Australia. In July, a team of Pac-12 men's basketball all-stars toured Australia – the first-ever trip Down Under for all but one member of the team – and played (competitively) against the Australian National Team. Then in August, California kicked off their football season against Hawaii in Sydney, something Stanford will do this coming fall against Rice. The conference also embarked upon a multi-year partnership with Fox Sports Australia to televise 13 football and 21 basketball games annually, along with Game of the Week packages produced by Pac-12 Networks.

Olympians from Pac-12 schools were a major presence at the Rio Games, winning 55 medals in 12 sports, with the conference's women athletes winning 34 of them. If the Pac-12 were a country, it would have finished fifth in the medal count, just behind Russia, and fourth in the total number of gold medals.



The 277 Pac-12 Olympic athletes, coaches, and delegates represented 47 countries and competed in 23 different sports. Nine Pac-12 schools were represented on the medal podium throughout the Games, with Stanford claiming 27 individual medals, and California and USC earning 21 medals each. Pac-12 Olympians broke countless records and boldly reinforced the conference's role in developing Olympic-level talent.



The U.S. Olympic Committee recognized Pac-12 universities' long-standing commitment to Olympic sports during the 2017 Pac-12 Men's Basketball Tournament. The event featured Pac-12 Olympians, one from each school, honoring and thanking their athletics departments for helping them compete and train at the Olympic level while receiving a world-class education.

Pac-12 Networks and Digital Innovation



Now five years old but still innovative and unique, Pac-12 Networks grew to more than 75 distribution partners, reaching more Pac-12 fans than ever. Fulfilling its mission to provide exposure for traditionally under-exposed sports – a mission tied closely to its status as the only conference network that is completely owned by its member universities – Pac-12 Networks televised 850 live events, and 500 hours of studio programming. Pac-12 Networks also continued to embrace new digital platforms, using Facebook Live and Twitter to deliver more content to the Pac-12's increasingly mobile fan base. The flexibility to experiment with new channels and technologies is proving especially valuable as the sports broadcasting landscape rapidly evolves.

Student-Athlete Health And Well Being



The Pac-12 Conference has taken a leadership role in research and best practice sharing on several issues that affect student-athlete health and well being, including head trauma and brain injuries. At a Pac-12-sponsored conference on sport-related concussion this past January, researchers presented new findings from the largest concussion study in history, the NCAA-Department of Defense Grand Alliance.

This year also saw the Pac-12's Grant Program invest more than two million dollars in three new research projects to be conducted on Pac-12 campuses focusing on head trauma, return to sport assessment, and injury prevention. Ongoing research projects currently being funded by the Grant Program on topics such as cardiovascular screening, mental health, injury surveillance, overuse injuries, thermal management, and coach health education are already producing useful results.

The Modern Student-Athlete Experience



After extensive study of issues surrounding the demands intercollegiate athletics places on student-athletes' time, the Pac-12 and the other four Autonomy Conferences met in January and passed important rule changes. Starting at the beginning of the 2017-18 school year, student-athletes will have an additional 21 days away from athletics per year, and will be more involved in the establishment of their schedules, allowing for additional transparency and control for student-athletes.

The issue of time balance has been a major focus for the Pac-12, campus leadership, administrators, faculty, and coaches over the last two years. College represents a period of major personal growth and opportunity for student-athletes and these rule changes will help ensure they have the necessary time and flexibility to take full advantage of everything Pac-12 universities have to offer.

BASEBALL



Oregon State capped a historic season with a trip to the NCAA College World Series after capturing the Pac-12 regular-season crown. The Beavers posted a final winning percentage of .903 (56-6) making them just the fifth team in NCAA history with a .900+ winning percentage, tying for the fourth-best all-time. OSU was one of four Pac-12 teams to earn NCAA Tournament berths. The Beavs were the No. 1 overall seed and STANFORD also hosted a regional. Oregon State's Pat Casey earned national recognition and was named the NCBWA National Coach of the Year.

MEN'S BASKETBALL

Oregon earned its first trip to the NCAA Final Four since 1939, ending a 78-year drought while also putting a Pac-12 team in the national semifinal for the first time since 2008. The Ducks' run to the final weekend highlighted a postseason which included an Elite Eight participant for the fourth-consecutive year. Arizona defeated the Ducks in the Pac-12 Tournament in a three-point victory between the regular-season co-champions. Four Pac-12 teams earned NCAA Tournament bids and an additional three in the NIT.



WOMEN'S BASKETBALL



Stanford made its 13th all-time trip to the NCAA Women's Final Four, giving the Pac-12 a team in the national semifinalist for the ninth time in 10 years. The Conference had a league-record seven teams earn NCAA Tournament bids and a record 10 participated in postseason play. The season also marked historic moments, including Washington's Kelsey Plum becoming the NCAA's all-time scoring leader and Hall of Fame coach Stanford's Tara VanDerveer winning her 1,000th-career game, making her just the third men's or women's Division I head coach to reach the milestone.

MEN'S CROSS COUNTRY

USC was dominant in 2017, winning its second-straight NCAA Tournament title and Pac-12 Championship crown. Led by the top pair in the country, Kelly Claes and Sara Hughes, the Trojans lost just one match all season to UCLA in the Conference tournament, otherwise cruising all season. USC was the No. 1 team in the nation from wire-to-wire, with the Bruins joining them in the postseason. Claes and Hughes won their second-straight Pac-12 Pairs title.



MEN'S CROSS COUNTRY



Led by STANFORD's runner-up finish at the NCAA Championship, the Pac-12 turned in the top men's performance by a league in 2016 with three teams in the top 10 and five in the top 15. The Pac-12 also had a national-best six entries in the 31-team field, and had the most All-Americans - finishers in the top 40 at the NCAA meet - for the sixth consecutive year with nine.

WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY

Behind the fourth national championship in program history, OREGON led a banner postseason for the six Pac-12 women's programs in the NCAA field. The league recorded three top-5 finishes at the NCAA meet, the most for a conference since the Big East in 2013, along with WASHINGTON placing 12th and UTAH posting its best national finish ever at 20th. OREGON edged Michigan, 125-126, in the closest finish in event history.



FOOTBALL



The WASHINGTON Huskies continued the streak of keeping the Pac-12 North Division perfect at 6-0 in the Pac-12 Football Championship Game with their 41-10 victory over Pac-12 South Division champion COLORADO. UW claimed its first league title since 2000, and with it a spot in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl in the CFP semifinals. The Huskies posted their second-ever 12-win season, while Colorado posted its first 10-win season since 2001. The Pac-12 placed a pair of teams, No. 3 USC and No. 4 WASHINGTON, in the top four of the final *Associated Press* Top 25, and six teams earned bowl bids.

MEN'S GOLF



The Oregon Ducks captured their third Pac-12 Championship and first since taking the Pac-8 North Division crown in 1977. The defending NCAA Champions carried that success into the NCAA Championships where they reached the final round of match play before surrendering their crown to Oklahoma. UO's Wyndham Clark earned Pac-12 medalist honors at the Pac-12 Championships becoming the first Duck to claim the individual title since 1978. Stanford's Maverick McNealy won the prestigious Ben Hogan Award, which is presented annually to the nation's top collegiate men's golfer.

WOMEN'S GOLF

The high-caliber of Pac-12 women's golf was evident on selection day for the NCAA Regionals as all 11 teams earned postseason bids. Five teams advanced to the NCAA Championships where Arizona State, Stanford and USC qualified for Match Play. The Sun Devils knocked off Florida, the Cardinal and top-seed Northwestern to capture their eighth NCAA title, more than any other women's golf program in NCAA history.



GYMNASTICS



Utah claimed the Pac-12 Championship, winning the title for the third time in school history, and the third time in the last four years. Four teams participated in the NCAA Semifinals, six of the eight Conference teams being ranked in the top 25 in the national final rankings, and Pac-12 gymnasts winning three NCAA individual national championships.

MEN'S ROWING



Washington men's rowing successfully defended its Conference title at the Pac-12 Rowing Championships on Lake Natoma, hoisting the team trophy for the second year in a row. The Huskies captured first-place finishes in the second varsity eight, third varsity eight, and varsity four at the IRA Championships.

WOMEN'S ROWING



Washington became the first women's rowing program to sweep all three grand finals en route to the Huskies' fourth all-time NCAA Championship. The historic title win also marked another historic moment in the 101-year history of the Pac-12. UW's victory also marked the 500th all-time NCAA team title by Pac-12 institutions. California placed second at NCAA's.

WOMEN'S SOCCER

Three-time Pac-12 Champion STANFORD captured its second-consecutive NCAA title Wake Forest, 5-4 in penalty kicks in the national championship game. The Cardinal became the first repeat champion since 2003 and 2004. It was also the third team to win the title without allowing a goal during NCAA play and the first champion to go scoreless in the College Cup. The Pac-12 received four NCAA Tournament bids, tied for the second most of any conference.



MEN'S SOCCER



USC won its second all-time NCAA Championship defeating West Virginia, and the Pac-12's fourth all-time. Six Pac-12 teams received NCAA Tournament berths, Stanford earned the No. 1 seed for the third-straight year after winning the Pac-12 regular-season crown. The Trojans were the second overall seed.

SOFTBALL

Oregon, UCLA and Washington each advanced to the NCAA Women's College World Series with the Bruins and Ducks claiming spots in the semifinal. Eight teams received NCAA Tournament bids, tying a league record. Arizona was the regular-season champion, claiming its 11th conference championship in program history, and first since 2007.



MEN'S SWIMMING AND DIVING

Four teams earned top-14 finishes at the 2017 NCAA Championships with California leading the way in second place. Cal's Ryan Murphy. Ryan won both the 100-yard and 200-yard backstroke, an event where he owns the American, and U.S. open records. Stanford winning its second league crown in a row and its 33rd overall, winning two of three diving events and 12 of 18 races.



WOMEN'S SWIMMING AND DIVING



Stanford claimed its ninth NCAA Championship in record fashion and its first since 1998 and three Pac-12 teams finished in the top 10. Pac-12 teams topped the podium in 16 out of the possible 21 events that included five American Records, two new NCAA Records and five pool records being broken by Pac-12 student-athletes. The Cardinal won the Pac-12 title on the strength of Olympic swimmers Katie Ledecky and Simone Manuel.

MEN'S TENNIS

Six men's squads were selected to compete in the NCAA Team Championships. Four squads advanced to the round of 16 in the NCAA Championships with fifth-seeded UCLA advancing to the quarterfinals before falling. At the Pac-12 Championships, rivals UCLA and USC made it to the championship match and the Trojans pulled out the close victory.



WOMEN'S TENNIS



After pulling off two-consecutive upsets to get to the title match, seventh-seeded Stanford nearly pulled off a third to claim the NCAA Team Championship crown but were defeated by the Cardinal. Seven Pac-12 teams earned NCAA berths with fourth advancing to the round of 16. Its national title run was on the heels of capturing the first Pac-12 Tournament title in Ojai.

MEN'S TRACK AND FIELD



Oregon amassed 175 points, the third-most ever in the Conference meet and most since 1987, to win its 11th-consecutive Pac-12 Championship. With the championship, the Ducks' men moved past UCLA with their 18th overall Conference title. In his final Pac-12 Championships meet, UO's Edward Cheserek recorded his second consecutive 10,000-meter victory for his seventh career Pac-12 event title. An injury prevented him from competing at the NCAA Championships, capping his career as the most decorated NCAA Division I cross country and track & field athlete with 17 titles.

WOMEN'S TRACK AND FIELD

After winning its ninth straight Pac-12 Championship, the Oregon women's program went on to complete history as it became the first to complete the "triple crown" of NCAA cross country, indoor and outdoor track & field titles in the same academic year. USC pushed its rival Oregon to victory as both teams recorded collegiate record-breaking times in the 4x400. The Ducks finished by a less than two-point margin over Georgia to win the crown, while the Trojans placed third.



WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL



Stanford claimed its NCAA-record tying seventh national title as eight Pac-12 teams earned NCAA berths. The NCAA title also marked the fifth fall national championship for Pac-12 schools this season (including two for the Cardinal after winning the men's soccer title), and a record 15th women's volleyball crown for the Pac-12. Following the win, Hall of Fame Cardinal coach John Dunning retired. Washington won the Pac-12 crown outright, its second-straight league crown and the third in four years.

WRESTLING

Arizona State captured its 17th Pac-12 title and first since 2006 at the 2017 Pac-12 Wrestling Championships. The 12th-ranked Sun Devils posted 127.0 points behind five individual Pac-12 champions and 17th-ranked Stanford was runner-up. ASU's Zahid Valencia was the first Pac-12 wrestler to earn both Wrestler of the Year and Freshman of the Year.



MEN'S GYMNASTICS



Stanford and California finished second and third, respectively. The Cardinal also advanced to the NCAA finals where it finished fourth for the second time in program history. The team was led by senior Akash Modi who won the all-around and parallel bars titles, and took home the prestigious Nissen-Emery Award.

MEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

Oregon edged out USC for its third MPSF indoor track and field title, 89-83. The Ducks had six individual champions including heptathlon winner Mitch Modin. The Ducks went on to be the league's highest finisher at the NCAA Championships, boasting a third-place finish overall.



WOMEN'S INDOOR TRACK & FIELD



Oregon claimed its second-straight NCAA crown, which would eventually become the second of the "Triple Crown." The Ducks scored a meet-record 84 points to shatter the 29-year old record of 71, while four won individual crowns.

WOMEN'S LACROSSE

USC won its second-consecutive MPSF Tournament title. The top-seeded Trojans defeated second-seeded Colorado, 16-11. The Trojans' Gabby McMahon was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player. In its third-straight NCAA Tournament, USC advanced to the quarterfinal for the second-straight year, knocking off third-seeded Florida, 15-12.



MEN'S VOLLEYBALL

UCLA led the league with a final AVCA Coaches poll ranking of No. 6 in the country, followed by Stanford at No. 9 and USC at No. 11, all three teams earning a spot in the MPSF Tournament. The Bruins' Jake Arnitz and the Trojans' Lucas Yoder, the nation's kills leader, were tabbed second team AVCA All-Americans.



MEN'S WATER POLO



California won its 14th NCAA title, winning the all-MPSF final versus USC. The Golden Bears rallied for an 11-8 overtime win in their home pool, trailing in the first three periods of the match. Cal's road to the national championship match was not an easy one, having to overcome UCLA, 9-8, in the semifinal. Bears' head coach Kirk Everist was tabbed the ACWPC National Coach of the Year and McQuin Baron was named the national player of the year.

WOMEN'S WATER POLO

Stanford won its fifth NCAA title in seven years on a Maggie Steffens' goal in the final nine seconds of the match which proved to be the game winner over UCLA, 8-7. An Olympian, Steffens scored three goals in the title bout and was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

ZANE GONZALEZ BREAKS NCAA FIELD GOAL RECORD

Arizona State kicker Zane Gonzalez became the new NCAA record holder for field goals in a career. Gonzalez hit three in the Sun Devils' win over UCLA to reach 89 career field goals.

Built on a firm foundation of academic excellence and superior athletic performance, the Pac-12 Conference renewed its undisputed claim as the Conference of Champions® in 2016-17, becoming the first conference to win 500 NCAA Championships. Beyond the court's and fields, the Pac-12's accomplishments extend into the classrooms across 12 campuses, and outside its traditional geographic footprint into new corners around the world.

En route to becoming the first conference to win 500 NCAA Championships, the Pac-12 led the nation in 2016-17 with 13 NCAA crowns. This haul adds to the an incredible 158 NCAA team titles since 1999-2000 and 300 since 1981-82, the start of women's sports sponsorship, an average of over nine per year. Even more impressive has been the breadth of the Pac-12's success with championships coming in 29 different men's and women's sports. The Pac-12 has led or tied the nation in NCAA Championships in 51 of the last 57 years, the only exceptions being in 1980-81, 1988-89, 1990-91 and 1995-96 when the Conference finished second, and only twice finished third in 1998-99 and 2004-05.

For the 12th-consecutive year, the Pac-12 had the most or tied for the most NCAA titles of any conference in the country, winning at least six every year since 2000-01. No other conference has won double-digit NCAA crowns in a single year, the Pac-12 doing so nine times, including a record 14 in 1996-97.

Spanning over a century of outstanding athletics achievements, The Pac-12 has claimed 501 NCAA Championships (297 men's, 174 women's, 30 combined), nearly 200 more than the next league. It was also the first to win 400 championships then surpassed 450 when Colorado and Utah joined the league in 2010-11.

Pac-12 members have won 297 NCAA team championships on the men's side, 81 more than the next-closest conference. Men's NCAA crowns have come at a phenomenal rate for the Pac-12 - 16 basketball titles by six schools, 54 tennis titles, 47 outdoor track & field crowns, and 28 baseball titles. Pac-12 members have won 25 of 47 NCAA titles in volleyball, 43 of 48 in water polo, 30 in skiing, and 24 in swimming & diving national championships.

Individually, the Conference has produced an impressive number of NCAA individual champions. Over 2,000 (2,292) individual crowns have been won by Pac-12 student-athletes over the years with 1,358 by male student-athletes. Student-athletes have also captured 185 individual titles at combined championships (ie., skiing and fencing).

On the women's side, the story is much the same. Since the NCAA began conducting women's championships 36 years ago, Pac-12 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season on 26 occasions, including a current streak of 17-consecutive years, dating back to 2000. Overall, the Pac-12 has captured 174 NCAA women's titles, easily outdistancing the SEC, which is second with 100. Pac-12 members have dominated a number of sports, winning 23 softball titles, 23 tennis crowns, 15 volleyball titles, 18 of the last 28 trophies in golf, and 15 in swimming & diving.

Pac-12 women student-athletes shine nationally on an individual basis, as well, having captured an unmatched 749 NCAA individual crowns, an average of over 20 championships per season, including 30 in 2016-17.

The Pac-12's excellence is further proven in the annual Division I Learfield Sports Directors' Cup competition, the prestigious award that honors the best overall collegiate athletics programs in the country. STANFORD won an unprecedented 23rd-consecutive Directors' Cup in 2016-17 to lead the Conference. Five Pac-12 member institutions ranked among the top-15 Division I programs, and a remarkable six institutions were in the top 20: No. 1 STANFORD, No. 3 USC, No. 8 OREGON, No. 9 UCLA, No. 12 CALIFORNIA and No. 20 WASHINGTON. At least five member institutions have been ranked in the top 20 in all but one year of the Director's Cup program, with seven appearing in the top 20 on five different occasions (1998, 2001, 2003, 2005 and 2006).

2016-17 REVIEW

The Conference's 13 NCAA titles came in the form of a record 10 women's crowns, two men's and one combined (skiing - UTAH). Seven members claimed at least one NCAA title and, of the six institutions in the country to have won multiples titles, three were from the Pac-12.

STANFORD was one of just two schools in the nation to claim four championships. The Cardinal extended its streak of winning an NCAA title to 41 years, holding up the national championship trophy in men's soccer, women's swimming and diving, women's water polo, and women's volleyball. The OREGON women made history completing the first-ever "Triple Crown," winning women's national titles in cross country and both indoor and outdoor track and field. USC also took home a pair of championships winning women's soccer and its second-straight beach volleyball title.

ARIZONA STATE won a record eighth NCAA women's golf title, CALIFORNIA won its 14th men's water polo national championship, defeating the Trojans in overtime, while UTAH won its first skiing crown since 2003, and

WASHINGTON also made history en route to claiming its fourth NCAA title in women's rowing, the first program in the 21-year history of the NCAA Rowing Championship to sweep all three grand finals.

In addition to the 13 national championships, the Pac-12 also had runners-up in nine NCAA Championship events: men's cross country (STANFORD), men's water polo (USC), skiing (COLORADO), men's swimming and diving (CALIFORNIA), women's swimming and diving (CALIFORNIA), men's golf (OREGON), rowing (CALIFORNIA), women's tennis (STANFORD) and women's water polo (UCLA). Overall, the Conference had 38 teams finish in the top four at 24 NCAA Championship events, including at least three teams in the top four in women's golf, and men's and women's water polo.

Participation in the postseason was a common occurrence for the Pac-12 in 2016-17. Of the 23 sports sponsored by the Conference, 21 witnessed at least half its teams participating in NCAA or other postseason action. The men sent 64 of a possible 100 teams into the postseason (64.0 percent), while the women sent 88 of a possible 126 teams (69.8 percent).

Six Pac-12 football teams earned bowl bids, producing a 3-3 record. Pac-12 Champion WASHINGTON provided the Conference with a College Football Playoff semifinalist for the second time in three years. The Huskies won their first-ever Pac-12 Football Championship Game, defeating South Champion COLORADO, 41-10, at Levi's® Stadium. USC had a dramatic 52-49 victory over Penn State in the Rose Bowl giving the Pac-12 eight of the last 10 Rose Bowl victories in which it was pitted against the Big Ten. UTAH edged Indiana in the Foster Farms Bowl, 26-24. STANFORD got a big defensive stop on North Carolina's attempt at a two-point conversion with 0:25 remaining in the game and pulled out a 25-23 victory in the Hyundai Sun Bowl. After posting the first 10-win season since 2001, Colorado made its first bowl appearance in nine seasons at the Alamo Bowl. WASHINGTON STATE participated in the third-lowest scoring game in Holiday Bowl history but fell, 17-12.

Four Pac-12 men's basketball teams earned postseason bids, including regular-season co-champions ARIZONA and OREGON. Pac-12 teams went 10-4 in the NCAA Tournament, buoyed by the Ducks' run to the NCAA Final Four, their first since 1939. It also marked the fourth-consecutive year a league team has advanced to the Elite Eight, the only conference in the country to accomplish the feat. Joining the Wildcats and the Ducks in the Big Dance were UCLA and USC. CALIFORNIA, COLORADO and UTAH participated in the postseason in the NIT. For the first time in the Conference's 101-season history, three teams had at least 30 wins, and had four 25-win teams for just the second time ever. Three teams finished ranked in the top 10 in the Associated Press and USA Today/ESPN Coaches Poll, the Ducks earning a No. 3 final ranking and the Wildcats a No. 4 rating by the coaches. The Bruins were ninth in that poll.

Pac-12 women's basketball continued to reestablish itself as a premier league in the sport. After sending two teams to the Women's Final Four in 2016 for the first time ever, it set the stage for another record-breaking season which saw a record seven teams earn NCAA Tournament berths and an additional three received WNIT bids. OREGON STATE won its second-consecutive Pac-12 regular-season title, but STANFORD emerged at the end of the season as the tournament champion in KeyArena in Seattle, then made its 13th all-time trip to the NCAA Women's Final Four. Cardinal Naismith Hall of Fame coach Tara VanDerveer cemented herself as one of the greats in NCAA men's and women's history, logging her 1,000th-career win and WASHINGTON's Kelsey Plum shattered the NCAA single-scoring record and was the unanimous national player of the year en route to becoming the all-time women's scoring record in NCAA history. The league had a record 15 NCAA Tournament wins, placing two teams in the Elite Eight for the second-straight year. The Pac-12 was also the best-represented conference in the Sweet Sixteen after a league-record five teams advanced. Four teams appeared in the final Associated Press poll, tying for the most ever for the Conference. Five earned rankings in the USA Today/WBCA poll for the second-straight year with Stanford leading the way at No. 4.

STANFORD won its NCAA-record-tying seventh women's volleyball national title with four freshmen in the starting lineup. WASHINGTON was the Conference's regular-season champion for the second-straight year and third time in four years. Eight Pac-12 teams earned NCAA berths, including ARIZONA, OREGON, UCLA, USC, UTAH and WASHINGTON STATE, along with the Cardinal and Huskies. It marked the 17th-consecutive year the league has received at least six bids. The Pac-12 has dominated the sport of women's volleyball, winning a record 15 NCAA volleyball titles since 1982.

OREGON STATE represented Pac-12 baseball in the NCAA College World Series after winning the Pac-12 regular-season crown which marked the program's third title in the last five years. The Beavers were awarded the No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament, but came up short of the championship series despite recording just the fifth .900+ winning season in NCAA history. OSU was joined by Arizona, Stanford and UCLA in the postseason. The Pac-12 has, by far, won the most baseball national titles of any conference in the country,

claiming 28 titles dating back to 1947.

The Pac-12 Conference has historically dominated the sport of softball where league teams have claimed 23 NCAA titles in the 36-year history of the championship. Pac-12 teams captured an unprecedented nine in a row from 1988-1997, then most recently claimed six-straight from 2006-11. Ten teams participated in the tournament in 2017, marking the 21st-straight season the Pac-12 has had five or more teams advance to the postseason, and has had at least three berths every year since the league began sponsoring the sport in 1987. OREGON, UCLA and WASHINGTON advanced to the Women's College World Series. ARIZONA claimed its 11th all-time Pac-12 regular-season title and first since 2007.

PAC-12 CONFERENCE HISTORY

The roots of the Pac-12 Conference date back more than 100 years, to December 2, 1915, when the Pacific Coast Conference (PCC) was founded at a meeting at the Imperial Hotel in Portland, Ore. The original membership consisted of four schools - the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Washington, the University of Oregon, and Oregon Agricultural College (now Oregon State University). All four are still charter members of the Conference.

Pacific Coast Conference play began in 1916 and, one year later, Washington State College (now Washington State University) was accepted into the league, with Stanford University following in 1918.

In 1922, the PCC expanded to eight teams with the admission of the University of Southern California (USC) and the University of Idaho. In 1924, the University of Montana joined the league roster and in 1928, the PCC grew to 10 members with the addition of UCLA.

The Pacific Coast Conference competed as a 10-member league until 1950, with the exception of 1943-45 when World War II curtailed intercollegiate athletic competition to a minimum. During that time, the league's first commissioner was named. Edwin N. Atherton was Commissioner in 1940 and was succeeded by Victor O. Schmidt in 1944. In 1950, Montana resigned from the Conference and the PCC continued as a nine-team Conference through 1958.

In 1959, the PCC was dissolved and the Athletic Association of Western Universities (AAWU) was formed with Thomas J. Hamilton was appointed Commissioner of the new league. The original AAWU membership included California, Stanford, USC, UCLA, and Washington. Washington State joined the membership in 1962, while Oregon and Oregon State joined in 1964. Under Hamilton's watch, the name Pacific-8 Conference was adopted in 1968. In 1971, Wiles Hallock took over as Commissioner of the Pac-8.

Ten years later, on July 1, 1978, the University of Arizona and Arizona State University were admitted to the league and the Pacific-10 Conference became a reality. In 1986-87, the league took on a new look, expanding to include 10 women's sports. Since then, the Conference has been considered the premier league in women's athletics, securing the most NCAA titles in women's sports of any conference nearly every year.

Thomas C. Hansen was named the Commissioner of the Pac-10 in 1983, a role he would hold for 26 years until 2009, when he was succeeded by current Commissioner Larry Scott.

The University of Colorado accepted its invitation to join the Pac-12 on June 11, 2010, and on June 17, 2010, the University of Utah agreed to join the Conference. The Buffaloes and Utes officially became the 11th and 12th members of the Conference on July 1, 2011, the first additions to the league since 1978.

It was during the 2010-11 academic year that Scott helped deliver monumental changes that transformed the Conference into a modern 12-team league. In addition to expanding to 12 teams, member institutions agreed to equal revenue sharing for the first time in the Conference's history, created two football divisions - the North and the South, and established a Football Championship Game for the first time. He also secured landmark media rights deals with ESPN and FOX that dramatically increased national exposure and revenue for each school, in addition to establishing Pac-12 Networks which guaranteed enhanced exposure across all sports.

Currently, the Pac-12 sponsors 11 men's sports and 13 women's sports, with women's lacrosse a new addition for the 2017-18 academic year and beach volleyball having been added in 2015-16. Additionally, the Conference is a member of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) in four other men's sports and two women's sports.

The Pac-12 Conference offices are located in the heart of San Francisco in the SOMA district.

PAC-12 TOPS FINAL LEARFIELD DIRECTORS' CUP

SAN FRANCISCO - The STANFORD Cardinal captured their 23rd-consecutive Directors' Cup in leading the Pac-12 Conference to another impressive finish in the final 2016-17 Division I Learfield Sports Directors' Cup standings, the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) announced.

Led by four NCAA titles (women's volleyball, men's soccer, women's swimming and diving, and women's water polo), Stanford won its 23rd-consecutive Cup. In all, the Cardinal posted 11 top five finishes in tallying an impressive 1,563.00 points. That's 219.25 points more than runner-up Ohio State.

Behind a pair of NCAA titles (women's soccer and beach volleyball), USC finished fourth with 1,251.25 points for its fourth consecutive top 10 finish. OREGON placed ninth overall with 1,027.00 points, the best-ever finish by the Ducks in the Directors' Cup. Oregon collected three NCAA titles for the second straight season as it claimed the triple crown with titles in women's cross country, women's indoor track and field, and women's outdoor track and field. UCLA placed 11th overall with 1,007.00 points, while CALIFORNIA, aided by its men's water polo title, finished 14th with 916.75 points. That gave the Pac-12 five teams among the top 15, more than any other conference.

WASHINGTON added an NCAA title in women's rowing, the Pac-12's 500th NCAA title all-time, and placed 22nd with 801.25 points. COLORADO finished 34th (641.00), followed by ARIZONA at 42nd (545.50). ARIZONA STATE was right behind the Wildcats at 43rd (543.50), thanks in part to the women's golf program capturing their nation-leading eighth NCAA golf title. UTAH, which picked up its 11th NCAA skiing title, was 54th (459.50), followed by OREGON STATE (69th, 333.75) and WASHINGTON STATE (101st, 202.50).

The success of the Pac-12 in the Directors' Cup was bolstered by the capturing of 13 NCAA titles, the most among all conferences. In addition, 10 Pac-12 league members combined to post 39 top-four finishes in 24 NCAA championships.

The Directors' Cup was developed as a joint effort between the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and USA Today. Points are awarded based on each institution's finish in up to 20 sports - 10 women's and 10 men's.

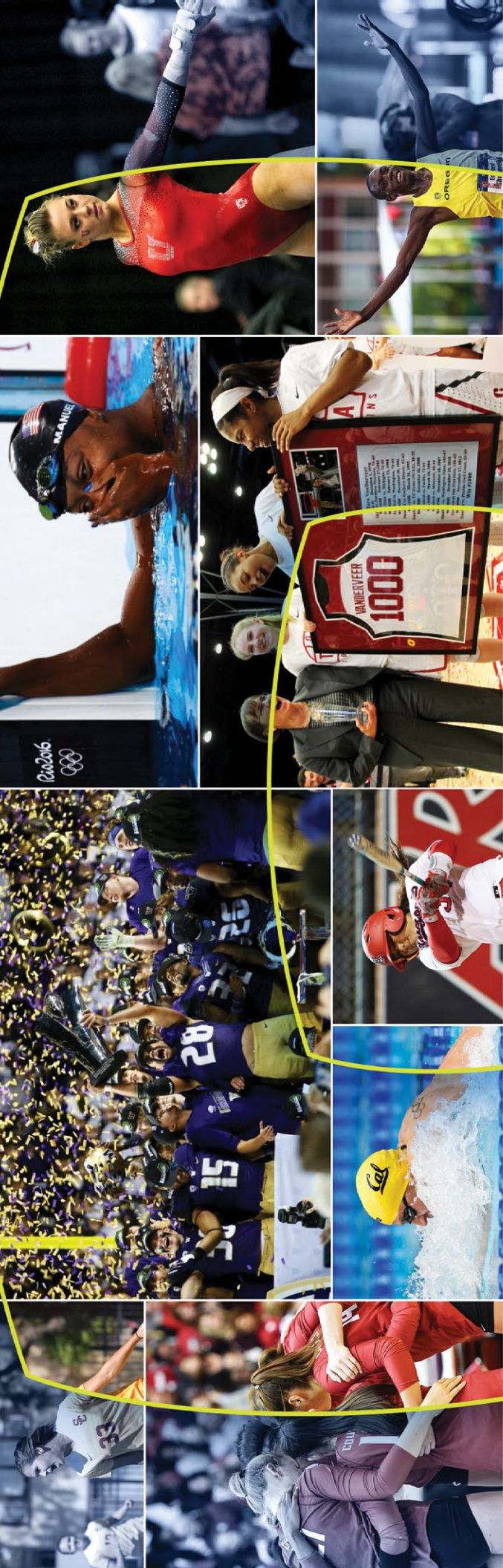

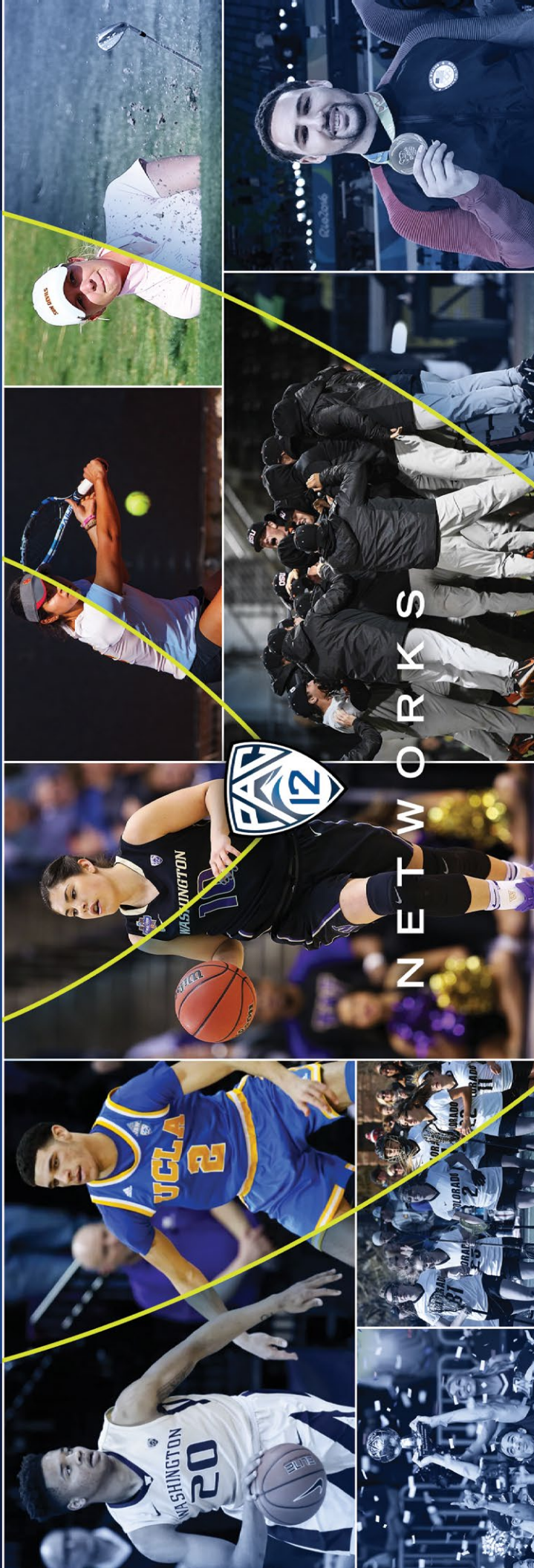

YEAR IN REVIEW



NETWORKS



The Conference had four NCAA Tournament berths and collected many postseason honors, including OREGON STATE's head coach **Pat Casey** winning NCBWA National Coach of the Year. Four Pac-12 baseball teams earned berths to the 2017 NCAA Tournament. No 1-seeded OREGON State was joined by ARIZONA, STANFORD and UCLA. Stanford and OSU both hosted NCAA Regionals, while the Beavs advance onto the Super Regional, eventually earning a spot in the NCAA College World Series.

Despite not advancing to the College World Series championship series, Pac-12 Champion Oregon State's season ended in historic fashion. OSU went 56-6 record and posted .903 winning percentage for the season making the Beavs the fifth NCAA Division I baseball team all-time to end the season with above a .900 winning percentage. It is also tied for fourth-best single-season winning percentage in NCAA history.

The Beavs ended the season with a No. 3 national ranking in the final polls and STANFORD was also in the top 20.

Oregon State's **Nick Madrigal** was voted Pac-12 Player of the Year and Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year by the Conference's head coaches. CALIFORNIA's **Andrew Vaughn** was named Pac-12 Freshman of the Year while OSU's **Luke Heimlich** was voted Pac-12 Pitcher of the Year. OSU head coach Casey was voted Pac-12 Coach of the Year. Arizona's **JJ Matijevic** was crowned the Pac-12 Batting Champion with a Conference-leading .389 batting average in regular-season play. The Beavers' **Max Engelbrekt** was named the Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

46 Pac-12 Baseball players were drafted in the 2017 MLB Draft with all 11 schools having at least one student-athlete drafted. Of the 46 players, six came from Arizona, one from Arizona State, two from California, three from Oregon, five from Oregon State, 10 from Stanford, six from UCLA, two from USC, four from Utah, four from Washington and three from Washington State. In the first round, four Pac-12 baseball players were drafted among the top 75 draft picks. Oregon's **David Peterson** was the first Pac-12 player to be drafted, taken with the 20th overall pick to the New York Mets. OSU's **Drew Rasmussen** was next at the 31st pick to the Tampa Bay Rays. UCLA's **Griffin Canning** was next as the 47th pick to the Los Angeles Angels of Anaheim. Arizona's **JJ Matijevic** was the final pick of the day at 75th to the Houston Astros.

The 2016-17 Pac-12 men's basketball season was one marked by historic strength at the top of the league. For the first time in the Conference's 101-season history, three teams reached at least 30 overall victories in ARIZONA, OREGON and UCLA. Add in a USC team that set a program record with 26 wins and the Conference boasted four 25-win teams in a single season for just the second time in history (2006-07).

Thanks to the success of the Wildcats, Ducks and Bruins, three Pac-12 teams finished the season ranked in the top 10 of the *Associated Press* and *USA Today/ESPN Coaches* polls in #9/3 OREGON, #4/7 ARIZONA and #8/9 UCLA. It marked the first time since the start of the USA Today Coaches postseason poll in 1994 that three Conference teams concluded the season in the top 10. Those three squads also spent seven weeks ranked in the Associated Press top 10, equaling the longest stretch in league history (1997-98).

The league also boasted historic talent as four Pac-12 standouts (**Lonzo Ball**, UCLA, 1st Team; **Dillon Brooks**, ORE, 2nd; **Markelle Fultz**, WASH, 3rd; **Lauri Markkanen**, ARIZ, 3rd) were named to one of the three AP All-America Teams, which were the most selections of any conference in the country and tied for the most-ever by the Conference along with four AP All-Americans in 1975. Ball was the first Conference player to earn AP First Team All-America accolades since James Harden (ASU) in 2009. Additionally, Ball (1st Team) and Brooks (2nd) were the first pair of Consensus All-Americans from the Conference since Brandon Roy (WASH) and Leon Powe (CAL) in 2006.

ARIZONA and OREGON edged UCLA by one game to share the Pac-12 regular season title. The No. 2 seed Wildcats then avenged a regular-season loss to the top seeded Ducks to capture the Pac-12 Championship, 83-80, in its debut season in Las Vegas' new T-Mobile Arena. The event set records for highest-attended quarterfinal session (18,153, Session 4), highest-ever single-session attendance (19,224, Session 5), and total all-session attendance (86,910).

In the NCAA Tournament, the Pac-12 won its opening eight games en route to a 10-4 record, highlighted by three entries into the Sweet 16 and an Elite Eight participant for the fourth consecutive year - the only conference to accomplish that feat. OREGON defeated top-seeded Kansas, 74-60, in Kansas City to reach the NCAA semifinals for the first time since 1939. The Ducks were the first Final Four participant for the Pac-12 Conference since 2008.

The Pac-12 enjoyed a historic haul at the 2017 NBA Draft with a record 14 former players taken among the 60 overall selections, including six in the first round, three in the lottery and the Nos. 1 and 2 overall picks in WASHINGTON's **Markelle Fultz** and UCLA's **Lonzo Ball**.

Pac-12 women's basketball continues to reestablish itself as a premier conference, earning a league-record seven NCAA Tournament bids. The Pac-12 advanced a team to the NCAA Women's Final Four for the ninth time in 10 years after STANFORD made its 13th all-time trip to the national semifinal.

Pac-12 teams won a league-record 15 NCAA Tournament games (15-7), placing two teams in the Elite Eight for the second-straight year. Pac-12 teams were 7-0 in the first round also setting a Conference record. With a record 10 teams in the postseason, three in the WNIT, the Pac-12 combined for 22 wins (22-10). The Pac-12 was the best-represented conference in the Sweet Sixteen after a league-record five teams advanced that far with two teams earning a spot in the Elite Eight (OREGON and Stanford). WASHINGTON STATE advanced to the WNIT semifinal after winning its first-ever postseason game in the first round. All but one of its WNIT games was on the road.

Five Pac-12 teams earned a ranking in one or both final national polls, including five appearing in the last WBCA/USA Today Coaches poll of the season, tying a league record that was set last year. Four were ranked in the final Associated Press poll, also tying a league mark set last year.

For the fourth-consecutive year, the Pac-12 had at least five NCAA Tournament teams. OREGON STATE and Stanford each earned No. 2 seeds, and WASHINGTON was a No. 3 seed, earning its highest seeding since 1995. UCLA was also a No. 4 seed, the fourth time in seven years the Bruins have received a top-five seeding, and No. 10 seed OREGON received an invite for the first time since 2005. COLORADO, UTAH and WSU earned WNIT bids.

The 10th-seeded Ducks advanced to the Sweet 16 for the first time ever, upsetting No. 7-seed Temple and No. 2-seed Duke in Durham, N.C., to get to the third round. No. 8 seed ARIZONA STATE and No. 9-seed CALIFORNIA also made it out of the first round.

Washington's **Kelsey Plum** left as the most-decorated women's basketball player in Pac-12 history. She was the unanimous national player of the year, taking home the Wade Trophy, Naismith Award, John R. Wooden Award, and Associated Press, USBWA and ESPNW Player of the Year honors. She also claimed the Dawn Staley and Nancy Lieberman Awards for the top point guard in the nation. Plum also left her mark in the record books, breaking several marks including the NCAA's all-time scoring record.

This season also marked a historic milestone for Stanford's Tara VanDerveer, who claimed her 1,000th-career victory becoming one of only three men's or women's Division I head coaches to reach the milestone.

USC defended its NCAA Beach Volleyball title, cruising through the winners' bracket with 3-0 wins in the first three rounds before defeating Pepperdine, 3-2, at Gulf Shores, Ala. With the dual match tied at 2-2, USC pair **Terese Cannon** and **Nicolette Martin** claimed the final and deciding third set, 16-14, to give the Trojans their third-straight national championship (AVCA title in 2015) and second-consecutive NCAA crown.

USC's **Kelly Claes** was tabbed the Pac-12 Player of the Year for the second-consecutive year, while also claiming the Pac-12 Pair of the Year for the second-straight year with teammate **Sara Hughes**. UCLA's **Stein Metzger** was voted the Pac-12 Coach of the Year, leading the Bruins to a No. 2 seeding in the NCAA Tournament after snapping the Trojans' 62-match duals winning streak. STANFORD's **Kathryn Plummer**, who helped the Cardinal clinch the NCAA title on the hardcourt in December, was named the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year.

Claes and Hughes also led the Trojans to a second-consecutive Pac-12 title on the sand. USC outlasted the Bruins, 3-2, to win the crown after coming through the contenders' bracket to reach the championship match. It was, again, a two-point win in the final and deciding set of the fifth match of the dual. The All-American pair went on to win the Pac-12 Pairs title for the second-straight year, defeating USC teammates **Allie Wheeler** and **Sophie Bukovec**. To cap the season, Claes and Hughes also won the USAV Collegiate Beach Pairs Championship, their second-career national title for the duo after winning the 2015 AVCA pairs title.

Six players earned AVCA All-American honors, including four Trojans: Claes, Hughes, Bukovec and Wheeler. Twin pair of UCLA, **Nicole** and **Megan McNamara**, also earned individual accolades.

USC ended the 2017 campaign ranked No. 1 in the country in the final AVCA Coaches poll, a position it held all season. UCLA was ranked No. 5 and ARIZONA was No. 9. In the DiG final polling, USC and UCLA held the same positions with the Wildcats earning a No. 8 rating to end the season, followed by No. 18 ARIZONA STATE and No. 19 Stanford.

PAC-12 BEACH VOLLEYBALL SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Nicolette Martin, USC



Led by STANFORD's runner-up finish at the NCAA National Championship, the Pac-12 turned in the top men's performance by a league in 2016 with three teams in the top 10 and five in the top 15. The Pac-12 also had a national-best six entries in the 31-team field, and had the most All-Americans - finishers in the top 40 at the NCAA meet - for the sixth consecutive year with nine. While OREGON senior **Edward Cheserek** didn't capture an unprecedented fourth NCAA individual title, he did garner All-America honors for the fourth straight year.

Cheserek did make history as the first four-time Pac-12 men's individual champion in Conference history, passing distance legends and three-time league men's champs Steve Prefontaine (OREGON, 1970-71 & 1973) and Henry Rono (WASHINGTON STATE, 1976 & 1978-79) with his four-peat, joining ARIZONA alumna Amy Skieresz (1995-98) as the Conference's only four-time individual cross country champions.

The No. 7 COLORADO men won the team title for the sixth consecutive year – every year since joining the Pac-12 in 2011 – to match the Conference record set by STANFORD from 2000-05. Led by a quartet of top-10 showings, the Buffaloes totaled 41 points to narrowly defeat the No. 2 nationally ranked Cardinal (47).

PAC-12 MEN'S CROSS COUNTRY SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Ben Saarel, Colorado

Behind the fourth national championship in program history, OREGON led a banner postseason for the six Pac-12 women's programs in the NCAA field. The league recorded three top-5 finishes at the NCAA meet, the most for a conference since the Big East in 2013, along with WASHINGTON placing 12th and UTAH posting its best national finish ever at 20th. OREGON edged Michigan, 125-126, in the closest finish in event history. That margin was even more razor-thin when considering the Ducks' final scorer, **Maggie Schmaedick** (64th place, 20:38.1), beat out the Wolverines last scorer, Jamie Phelan (65th place, 20:38.2), by just one-tenth of a second.

The Ducks' title marked the 12th all-time for current Pac-12 members, which ties the Big East for the most national titles by a conference. The Pac-12 also had the most All-Americans, finishers in the top 40 at the NCAA meet, for the fourth time in the past six years with 10.

COLORADO amassed 33 points to coast to its second straight Pac-12 women's team crown. The Buffaloes are the first repeat conference champion since WASHINGTON accomplished the feat in 2008 and 2009. WASHINGTON's **Amy-Eloise Neale** captured the Pac-12 individual crown in 20:22.9, out kicking COLORADO's **Erin Clark** and **Dani Jones** to the finish by just 0.4 and 1.5 seconds, respectively.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Erin Clark, Colorado



The WASHINGTON Huskies continued the streak of keeping the Pac-12 North Division perfect at 6-0 in the Pac-12 Football Championship Game with their 41-10 victory over Pac-12 South Division champion COLORADO. Washington earned its first league title since 2000, and with it a spot in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl opposite Alabama in the CFP semifinals. The Huskies posted their second-ever 12-win season, while Colorado posted its first 10-win season since 2001 and just the eighth such season in school history.

The Pac-12 placed a pair of teams, No. 3 USC and No. 4 WASHINGTON, in the top four of the final Associated Press Top 25. It's the third time two Pac-12 members appeared in the top four of the final AP Top 25. This also occurred in 2010 (No. 3 Oregon, No. 4 Stanford) and 2000 (No. 3 Washington, No. 4 OREGON STATE). And for the third time in four years, the Pac-12 placed five or more teams in the final AP poll.

Pac-12 teams finished the bowl season with a 3-3 mark, which included USC's dramatic 52-49 victory over Penn State. UTAH edged Indiana in the Foster Farms Bowl, 26-24, behind the leg of place kicker Andy Phillips who connected on four field goals. STANFORD got a big defensive stop on North Carolina's attempt at a two-point conversion with 0:25 remaining in the game and pulled out a 25-23 victory in the Hyundai Sun Bowl.

Washington quarterback **Jake Browning** completed 61.2 percent of his passes for 3,420 yards and a Pac-12 record-tying 43 TDs and was named the Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Year. USC cornerback **Adoree' Jackson** earned the Pat Tillman Defensive Player of the Year. The dynamic three-way performer posted 51 tackles and four interceptions to go with 11 pass breakups. In his role as a PR/KR, Jackson has 19 punt returns for 302 yards (15.9 avg) and two TDs, and 22 kick returns for 671 yards (30.5 avg) and two TDs. Trojan teammate **Sam Darnold** collected Pac-12 Offensive Freshman of the Year as he completed 67.2 percent of his passes for 3,086 yards and 31 TDs. Washington cornerback **Taylor Rapp** collected Pac-12 Defensive Freshman of the Year as he picked up four interceptions, including two in the Pac-12 Football Championship Game to earn FCG Most Outstanding Player honors. Following the greatest one-season turnarounds in Pac-12 history, Colorado coach **Mike MacIntyre** earned Pac-12 Coach of the Year after leading the Buffaloes to a 10-2 record overall and a 8-1 mark in Conference play, claiming the school's first South Division title. After completing the 2015 season with a 1-8 Pac-12 record and a 4-9 mark overall, the Buffs were picked to finish last in the Pac-12 South as they entered the 2016 campaign.

For just the fourth time in Conference history, four student-athletes earned unanimous All-America honors - **Cody O'Connell**, OG, WSU; **Adoree' Jackson**, CB, USC; **Zane Gonzalez**, PK, ASU; **Mitch Wishnowsky**, P, Utah. Additional national honors went to Jackson (Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's top defensive back), Gonzalez (Lou Groza Award as the nation's top place kicker), and Wishnowsky (Ray Guy Award as the nation's top punter). Gonzalez concluded his career as the FBS career record holder for career field goals (96) and the Pac-12 career record holder for most points scored (494). Colorado's MacIntyre also raked in national Coach of the Year honors by the AP, FWAA, Walter Camp, AFCA and Eddie Robinson.

The OREGON Ducks captured their third Pac-12 Championship, and first since taking the Pac-8 North Division crown in 1977. The defending NCAA champions carried that success into the NCAA Championships where they reached the final round of match play before surrendering their crown to Oklahoma.

OREGON's **Wyndham Clark** posted a 4-under (206) in a shortened 54-hole Pac-12 Championship to earn Pac-12 medalist honors. He was the first Duck to claim the individual title since Brent Murray earned co-medalist honors in 1978. Weather hampered the Pac-12 Championships at the Boulder Country Club in Boulder, Colo., where 4 inches of snow canceled the second day of competition, reducing the Championship from 72 to 54 holes. It was the first Pac-12 Men's Golf Championships to have been shortened due to inclement weather.

The Ducks opened the final round with a nine-stroke lead over Washington, and 11 strokes better than Stanford. However, Oregon had to hold off a fast-charging Cardinal squad that cut the lead to one stroke several times in the final round. The Ducks finally pulled off the victory with a 15-over (1067), to edge Stanford by three strokes (18-over, 1068).

Four individuals found themselves ranked among the top seven in Golfstat's final individual statistical rankings, led by CALIFORNIA's **Colin Morikawa** at No. 2 (69.94), Clark at No. 4 (70.05), Stanford's **Maverick McNealy** at No. 5 (70.09) and ARIZONA STATE's **Jared du Toit** at No. 7 (70.38).

Clark was named the Pac-12 Men's Golfer of the Year, teammate **Norman Xiong** was tabbed Pac-12 Freshman of the Year and OREGON coach **Casey Martin** picked up Pac-12 Coach of the Year honors for the second time in his career (also in 2010).

Stanford's McNealy won the prestigious Ben Hogan Award, which is presented annually to the nation's top collegiate men's golfer, taking into account all collegiate and amateur competitions during the past 12-month period. The All-America teams were littered with players from the Pac-12. Earning PING GCAA First Team honors were McNealy, Clark and Morikawa. Xiong, duToit and USC teammates **Sean Crocker** and **Rico Hoey** picked up Second Team honors, while USC's **Justin Suh**, Oregon's **Ryan Gronlund** and Stanford's **Franklin Huang** were tabbed Honorable Mention.

UCLA collected its sixth Pac-12 Conference title, posting a 54-hole total of 862 (-2), to claim the league crown. With a decisive 21-stroke victory over runner-up COLORADO (296-286-301 – 883), the Bruins claimed the seventh largest margin of victory in the tournament's 31-year history. The Bruins claimed the top two spots in the individual race as well with sophomore **Lilia Vu** (-7) posting three birdies in her final round to clinch Pac-12 medalist honors over teammate **Mariel Galdiano** (-1).

The high-caliber of Pac-12 women's golf was evident on selection day for the NCAA Regionals as all 11 teams earned postseason bids. Five teams (ARIZONA STATE, CALIFORNIA, OREGON, STANFORD, USC) advanced to the NCAA Championships where Arizona State, Stanford and USC qualified for Match Play. The Sun Devils knocked off Florida, the Cardinal and top-seed Northwestern to capture their eighth NCAA title, more than any other women's golf program in NCAA history.

Sun Devil senior **Monica Vaughn** birdied two of her final four holes to capture the NCAA individual title with a final score of 1-over 217. Vaughn was tenth nationally with a 71.61 stroke average and posted 20 rounds under par, with 11 rounds of 69 or better. For her season-long efforts, which included five top-three finishes in her last six collegiate tournaments. Vaughn was named the Pac-12 Women's Golfer of the Year. Stanford's **Andrea Lee**, who finished sixth at the NCAA Championships, secured Freshman of the Year honors and All-Pac-12 First Team honors. Arizona State head coach **Missy Farr-Kaye** was named Pac-12 Coach of the Year after guiding the Sun Devils to their eighth national championship. Farr-Kaye became the first to win three national championships – first as a player in 1990, then as an assistant coach in 2009 and as a head coach in 2017. The Sun Devils are the eighteenth Pac-12 women's golf program to collect a national crown.

The Pac-12 had another strong year in women's gymnastics, with four teams participating in the NCAA Semifinals, six of the eight Conference teams being ranked in the top 25 in the national final rankings, and Pac-12 gymnasts winning three NCAA individual national championships.

UCLA, UTAH, WASHINGTON, and OREGON STATE traveled to St. Louis to compete for the 2017 NCAA Women's Gymnastics Championship. WASHINGTON made their first appearance in the national championships since 1998. All four Pac-12 competitors competed in the same semifinal session in which UCLA finished second, UTAH finished third, WASHINGTON finished fourth, and OREGON STATE finished sixth. UCLA and UTAH then moved on to the NCAA Super Six where they came in fourth and fifth place respectively, trailing national champions Oklahoma as well as LSU and Florida.

Pac-12 gymnasts won at least a share of the individual national titles in three events during the national semifinals. UTAH's **MyKayla Skinner** was named the co-national champion on floor and UCLA's **Kyla Ross** won the NCAA beam title and a share of the NCAA bars title. This marks the third season in a row in which a UCLA gymnast has been crowned the NCAA beam champion, following Samantha Peszek in 2015 and Danusia Francis in 2016. Skinner was also the national runner-up in the all-around.

UTAH claimed the 2017 Pac-12 Women's Gymnastics Championship, winning the title for the third time in school history, and the third time in the last four years, after also claiming the title in 2014 and 2015. The Red Rocks recorded a 197.925 to capture first place overall. OREGON STATE came in second place with a 197.400 total team score, followed by WASHINGTON and UCLA who tied for third place with a 197.100. STANFORD took home fifth with a 196.625. CALIFORNIA placed sixth earning a 196.300, and ARIZONA (196.275) and ARIZONA STATE (195.600) took home seventh and eighth place, respectively.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S GYMNASTICS SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Madeline Gardiner, Oregon State

WASHINGTON men's rowing captured first place finishes in the second varsity eight, third varsity eight, and varsity four at the IRA Championships. The men's varsity eight took second to Yale by just one foot. The Huskies did regain the Jim Ten Eyck Memorial Trophy as the overall points champion, their 10th in the last 11 years, thanks to national titles in the other three categories. Washington finished with 211 points (points were awarded for the three eights races only), while Yale came in second with 195. CALIFORNIA took second in the second varsity eight and varsity four races, while the third varsity eight took bronze, helping the Bears finish fourth in the overall team standings. The Bears varsity eight finished fifth in the Varsity Challenge Cup. STANFORD, which raced three entries in the national championship regatta, placed 16th in the final team standings at the IRAs. Along with the second-place finish in the third level final by the Cardinal's top boat, Stanford's second varsity eight placed fifth in its third level final and the Cardinal third varsity eight finished fourth in its third level final. OREGON STATE's varsity eight finished first in the fourth final. The Beavs placed 20th overall in the team standings.

Washington men's rowing successfully defended its Conference title at the Pac-12 Rowing Championships on Lake Natoma, hoisting the team trophy for the second year in a row. Washington collected 72 team points for the title, winning three of the four scoring races. California came close in second place with 65 points and Oregon State totaled 50 points to round out the podium placing. With the Conference title on the line in the varsity eight race, the Huskies held on strong throughout the entire course and finished in 5:36.321. California crossed the line second in 5:40.567 and Stanford was third in 5:51.972.

The 2017 Pac-12 Rowing All-Conference honors, including All-Pac-12 teams, were announced by the Conference office. California junior **Natan Wegrzycki-Szymczyk** garnered Men's Rowing Athlete of the Year honors for the second-straight year. Stanford's **Brennan Wertz** received Men's Rowing Newcomer of the Year recognition. Washington's **Michael Callahan** was named Men's Rowing Coach of the Year.

The WASHINGTON women's rowing team became the first program in the 21-year history of the NCAA Rowing Championship to sweep all three grand finals, earning the Huskies their fourth NCAA rowing title. The trophy also marked the 500th all-time NCAA title captured by Pac-12 institutions, a milestone no other conference has come close to matching.

Washington posted victories in three of four races at the Pac-12 Championships on Lake Natoma, but fell short of winning the Conference title. Instead, CALIFORNIA won the varsity eight and captured the overall team championship for the seventh time in the last eight years. Washington finished second overall, after a second-place finish in the varsity eight and a first-place finish in the third varsity eight, the second varsity eight, and the varsity four. Washington State finished third at the Conference regatta after a second-place finish in the varsity four and third-place finishes in the second and third varsity eights. Stanford took fourth with a silver medal in the varsity eight. USC finished fifth overall, while UCLA came in sixth followed by OREGON STATE in seventh.

At the 2017 Pac-12 Rowing championships, Washington won all four scoring races. The Huskies claimed the team title with 45.5 points, followed by California in second place (39 points) and Stanford in third with 31.5 points.

It marked the Huskies' first Pac-12 women's title since 2003. UW capped the day with a win in the varsity eight, crossing the finish line in a time of 6:11.638, followed by California in second in 6:15.398 and Stanford in third in 6:19.576.

Stanford senior **Ruth Narode** was named the Pac-12 Women's Rowing Athlete of the Year. Women's Rowing Newcomer of the Year was honored to California's **Juliane Faralisch**. Head coach **Yasmin Farooq** of Washington earned Women's Rowing Coach of the Year honors.

After their successful nationals, four Huskies earned Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association first-team All-American and Yasmin Farooq was named Division I National Coach of the Year, the CRCA announced.

Three-time Pac-12 Champion STANFORD captured its second-consecutive NCAA title in men's soccer defeating Wake Forest, 5-4 in penalty kicks in the national championship game. The Cardinal became the first repeat champion since Indiana in 2003 and 2004. Stanford became the third team to win the title without allowing a goal during NCAA play, and became the first champion to go scoreless in the College Cup.

WASHINGTON earned a berth to the Tournament advancing to the third round of play for the fourth time in program history. The Huskies ended their postseason run to Denver, 1-2, and finished the regular season placing second in the Conference standings with at 6-4 record. UCLA made its 34th consecutive appearance and 44th overall appearance in the NCAA Tournament. SAN DIEGO STATE earned its first postseason berth since 2006 and tie 9-4-6 overall record marked the program's best since 2011.

The Pac-12 received four NCAA Tournament bids, tied for the second most of any conference. The Huskies, SDSU and the Bruins, along with the Cardinal, all earned postseason bids.

UCLA's **Jose Hernandez** and Stanford's **Foster Langsdorf** were voted Co-Pac-12 Players of the Year. Langsdorf's teammate **Tomas Hilliard-Arce** was tabbed Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year, Washington's **Handwalla Bwana** was voted Pac-12 Freshman of the Year and Cardinal head coach **Jeremy Gunn** was voted Pac-12 Coach of the Year. Hilliard-Arce was also selected a first team NSCAA All-American, and **Andrew Epstein** and Langsdorf were second team.

CALIFORNIA's senior **Christian Thierjung**'s had one of the year's highlights notching a single-game school-record and Conference-leading five goals in the Golden Bears' 6-2 win over Harvard.

PAC-12 MEN'S SOCCER SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

USC women's soccer is the 2016 NCAA Champion for the second time in program history, defeating West Virginia at Avaya Stadium in San Jose, Calif. It is the Pac-12's fourth title in the sport all-time.

Six Pac-12 teams earned berths to the 2016 NCAA Championship. STANFORD earned the No. 1 seed for the third-straight year and was joined in the field by No. 2-seeded USC, No. 4-seeded UCLA, COLORADO, CALIFORNIA, and UTAH. The Utes advanced to the third round for the first time in program history.

Stanford's **Andi Sullivan** was voted Pac-12 Player of the Year, while USC's **Mandy Freeman** was tabbed Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year. Colorado's **Taylor Kornieck** was named Pac-12 Freshman of the Year while USC's **Sammy Jo Prudhomme** was voted Pac-12 Goalkeeper of the Year. For the seventh time in nine years, Stanford head coach **Paul Ratcliffe** was named Pac-12 Coach of the Year.

The Pac-12 holds an all-time record of 184-121-28 (.595) in the NCAA Tournament with four national championships and five second-place finishes, including USC taking the national crown in 2016.

The Pac-12 had six NSCAA/Continental Tire Division I All-America honorees, more than the last two years when there were five representatives. Stanford's **Maddie Bauer** and **Andi Sullivan** were named to the first team, while their teammate **Jane Campbell** and USC's **Mandy Freeman** and **Morgan Andrews** on the second team. **Jessie Fleming** of UCLA earned third-team honors.

OREGON, UCLA and WASHINGTON all advanced to the NCAA Women's College World Series in Oklahoma City. UCLA fell to Washington, 1-0, on June 3rd while the Bruins and Ducks made it to the semifinal matches where Oregon fell to LSU, 4-1, and Washington fell to the eventual NCAA Champion Oklahoma, 3-1.

Eight league teams earned berths to the NCAA Tournament, marking the 21st-straight season the Pac-12 has had five or more teams advance to the postseason. The eight selections are tied for the most in league history each being accomplished in 1999, 2000, 2003, 2005, 2007, 2012, 2013, 2016, and 2017.

ARIZONA took the regular season title totaling its 11th conference championship in program history, and first since 2007. Arizona closed out the season with a 52-9 (18-6 Pac-12) record, its highest regular-season win total since 2004 (53).

Utah's **Hannah Flippen** and Arizona's **Katiana Mauga** were named the 2017 Pac-12 Softball Co-Players of the Year. Arizona senior **Danielle O'Toole** was voted Pitcher of the Year. Flippen also garnered Defensive Player of the Year honors and was crowned the Pac-12 Softball Batting Champion. UCLA's **Rachel Garcia** was tabbed Freshman of the Year and Arizona head coach **Mike Candrea** was voted Coach of the Year.

Ten Pac-12 softball players earned NFCA Division I All-American recognition. First team honorees were Arizona's Danielle O'Toole and **Jessie Harper**, Utah's Hannah Flippen, and Oregon's **Nikki Udria**. Second team honorees were Oregon's **Megan Kleist**, Arizona's Katiana Mauga and **Mo Mercado**, and UCLA's Rachel Garcia. Third team honorees were Oregon's **Danica Mercado** and Washington's **Ali Aguilar**.

Pac-12 men's swimming & diving teams had another dominant year in the pool, setting multiple new records while adding to the trophy case with national individual titles. Four teams earned top-14 finishes at the 2017 NCAA Championships with CALIFORNIA who led the way in second place and earned a top-two finish for the eighth-straight year. Pac-12 swimmers and divers accounted for 53 of the CSCAA All-America teams (30 first-team honorees, 23 honorable mention honorees).

California's **Ryan Murphy** took home Pac-12 Men's Swimmer of the Year accolades for the third-straight year. ARIZONA STATE's **Cameron Craig** was voted Pac-12 Men's Swimming Freshman/Newcomer of the Year and his coach **David Durden** was selected as Men's Swimming Coach of the Year. USC completed the sweep of the diving awards with **Dashiell Enos** taking home Men's Diver of the Year, **Henry Fusaro** was voted Men's Diving Freshman/Newcomer of the Year and **Hongping Li** was selected as Men's Diving Coach of the Year.

California (349) earned a runner-up finish for the second-straight year while STANFORD (242) took fifth place, USC (237) finished in sixth and Arizona State (100) ended up in 14th place overall. ARIZONA finished with 36.5 points for 24th place. Collectively, Conference swimmers and divers totaled two NCAA individual titles, both of which came from California's Ryan Murphy. Ryan won both the 100-yard and 200-yard backstroke. He set the NCAA, Championship, American, and U.S. open records in the event the previous year with a time of 43.49. His time in the event this year was just shy of that, 43.99. He also set NCAA, Championship, American, and U.S. Open record in the 200-yard backstroke the previous year with a time of 1:35.73. His time of 1:36.75 was just shy of that, but still good enough for the national title.

The 2017 Pac-12 Championship saw another record-breaking year, with Stanford winning its second league crown in a row and its 33rd overall. The Cardinal scored 784 points to beat California's 767 points in second place. Depth was a key factor in Stanford winning the title, earning two of three diving first places and getting on the podium in 12 of 18 races. Arizona State freshman **Cameron Craig** was named Swimmer of the Meet, an honor voted on by the coaches at the end of the meet after he won two individual events and one relay title over the four days of competition. California senior **Ryan Murphy** was also honored at the end of the meet as the 2017 Pac-12 Men's Swimming and Diving Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

PAC-12 MEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Ryan Murphy, CAL

It was yet another remarkable year for Pac-12 women's swimming and diving as three teams finished in the top 10 at the 2017 NCAA Championships and six total in the top-30. Fresh off a Pac-12 Championship, STANFORD claimed its ninth NCAA Championship in record fashion and its first since 1998. CALIFORNIA followed closely behind, finishing second. Pac-12 teams topped the podium in 16 out of the possible 21 events at the 2017 NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships that included five American Records, two new NCAA Records and five pool records being broken by Pac-12 student-athletes over the four day competition.

Lead by 2016 Olympians **Katie Ledecky** and **Simone Manuel**, the Cardinal claimed its first NCAA Championship since 1998. In her first NCAA Championship, Ledecky earned three individual titles and two relay titles. The multiple Olympic gold medalist broke the American Record in the 500 free (4:24.06) and tied for first with a new pool record in the 200 free (1:40.36). Simone Manuel went two-for-two in record-breaking swims in both the 50 and 100 free, stopping the clock in a new American Record time of a 45.56 in the 100 and a new NCAA record of a 21.17 in the 50. Sophomore **Ella Eastin** defended her 400 IM title breaking Ledecky's American Record standard of 3:57.57, and a new pool record of a 1:51.35 in the 200 fly. The Cardinal relay team of Manuel, Ledecky, Eastin and Lia Neal captured an American Record in the 800 free relay on night one and closed out the meet with another American Record in the 400 free relay on the final night, touching with a 3:07.61.

Stanford captured its 20th overall women's swimming and diving Conference title in record fashion at the 2017 Pac-12 Women's swimming and men's and women's diving championships, placing first in 15 out of the 21 events totaling 1,587.5 points. The Cardinal squad lead by Team USA Olympic Coach Greg Meehan topped the podium in all four relays as well as the 50, 100, 200, 500 and 1650 freestyle, the 200 and 400 IM, the 100 backstroke, the 200 fly, and three-meter diving.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Six men's squads were selected to compete in the NCAA Team Championships. Four men's squads advanced to the round of 16 in the NCAA Championships. No. 3 seeded USC was able to clinch the underdog win against No. 1 seeded UCLA after battling through both the singles and doubles at the 2017 Pac-12 men's tennis championship. No. 1 STANFORD captured the inaugural 2017 women's tennis team championship with a 5-1 win over No. 2 California at Libbey Park in Ojai, Calif.

The Pac-12 Conference announced the men's tennis All-Pac-12 honors for the 2017 season, as determined by a polling of the Conference coaches. Stanford's **Tom Fawcett** was voted Pac-12 Singles Player of the Year. UCLA's **Evan Zhu** and **Martin Redlicki** were tabbed the Pac-12 Doubles Team of the Year. USC's **Brandon Holt** was named the Freshman/Newcomer of the Year. Oregon head coach **Nils Schylander** was named Pac-12 Coach of the Year.

National honors also poured in for Pac-12 tennis, as six men earned ITA All-America status. Men's players earning All-America honors were: California's **Florian Lakat** and **Filip Bergevi**; Stanford's **Tom Fawcett**; UCLA's **Martin Redlicki** and **Evan Zhu**; USC's **Brandon Holt**.

Six teams earned berths to the 2017 NCAA Championship. Washington was defeated in the first round by Clemson. Oregon was defeated in the second round by No. 12 Texas A&M, after beating Memphis in the first round. No. 8 California, No. 16 Stanford, and No. 4 USC were bested in the third round.

No. 8 California beat Tennessee Tech in the first round, Northwestern in the second round, before losing to No. 9 North Carolina in the third round. No. 16 Stanford beat Idaho in the first round, Michigan in the second round, but lost to No. 1 Wake Forest in the third round. No. 4 USC defeated Denver in the first round, Wisconsin in the second round, but lost to No. 13 Georgia in the third round.

No. 5 UCLA was the last Pac-12 team standing on the men's side. The Bruins beat Army West Point in the first round, Mississippi in the second round, No. 12 Texas A&M in the third round, but was bested by No. 13 Georgia in the quarterfinals.

The STANFORD women has a hard fought battle in the NCAA Tournament, but ultimately ended as the NCAA runners-up. Seven women's teams were selected to compete in the NCAA Championships. Two women's squads advanced to the round of 16 in the NCAA Championships.

No. 1 Stanford captured the inaugural 2017 women's tennis team championship with a 5-1 win over No. 2 CALIFORNIA at Libbey Park in Ojai, Calif.

No. 7 Stanford was the final remaining Pac-12 women's tennis team in the NCAA tournament, taking its journey all the way to the championship match. The Cardinal defeated Idaho in the first round, TCU in the second round, No. 10 Michigan in the third round, No. 2 North Carolina in the quarterfinals, and No. 3 Ohio State in the semifinals. Stanford battled with No. 3 Ohio State for the spot in finals, taking the match all the way to the final singles court, which ended in a win for the Card, 4-3, after overtime. In the championship match, No. 1 Florida came in strong taking the doubles point, but Stanford fought all the way to the end. No. 1 Florida ended up winning the match 4-1.

ARIZONA STATE (vs. Florida State), Oregon (vs. NC State), USC (vs. Denver), and Washington (vs. Clemson) lost in the first round. UCLA lost to No. 12 Pepperdine in the second round, after defeating UC Santa Barbara in the first round. No. 13 California lost in the third round, after defeating San Jose State in the first round and LSU in the second round.

Eleven individual women competed in the singles competition and four pairs compete in the doubles competition.

The Pac-12 Conference announced the women's tennis All-Pac-12 honors for the 2017 season, as determined by a polling of the Conference coaches. UCLA's **Ena Shibahara** was voted Pac-12 Singles Player of the Year and Freshman/Newcomer of the Year. UCLA's pair of **Jada Hart** and **Terri Fleming** were named Pac-12 Doubles Team of the Year. USC's head coach **Richard Gallien** was named Pac-12 Coach of the Year.

National honors also poured in for Pac-12 tennis, as five women earned ITA All-America status. Women's players earning national recognition were: California's Karla Popovic, Maegan Manasse and Maya Jensen; Stanford's Melissa Lord; UCLA's Ena Shibahara.

OREGON amassed 175 points, the third-most ever in the Conference meet and most since 1987, to win its 11th consecutive Pac-12 Men's Track & Field Championship. With the championship, the Ducks' men moved past UCLA with their 18th overall Conference title. Additionally, with OREGON's ninth consecutive men's and women's Pac-12 Championship sweep, the Ducks surpassed the Bruins' total of eight dual men's & women's titles.

Oregon's **Kyree King** amassed a meet-best 22.5 points by winning the 100- and 200-meter dashes – the first Oregon man to dual in those events at the Pac-12 title meet – and running the second leg of the Ducks' victorious 4x100 relay. He narrowly edged UCLA freshman **Isaiah Holmes** (22 points) and UO teammates **Damarcus Simpson** (20.5) and **Marcus Chambers** (18.5) for athlete of the meet honors.

In his final Pac-12 Championships meet, Oregon's **Edward Cheserek** recorded his second consecutive 10,000-meter victory for his seventh career Pac-12 event title. An injury prevented him from competing at the NCAA Championships, capping his career as the most decorated NCAA Division I cross country and track & field athlete with 17 titles (3 XC, 14 T&F).

King doubled as the Pac-12 and USTFCCA West Region Track Athlete of the Year, while USC's **Eric Sloan** received West Region Field Athlete of the Year honors after Holmes earned the award from the Pac-12.

Oregon totaled 19.5 points to lead the nine Pac-12 teams in the NCAA Championships field in ninth place. Cardinal sophomore **Grant Fisher** was the Pac-12's lone individual men's event winner, becoming the first American underclassman in 28 years to win the 5,000-meter run (14:35.60). It helped extend the Conference's streak of at least one event champion at the NCAA outdoor meet dating back to 1960.

PAC-12 MEN'S TRACK & FIELD SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

C.J. Albertson, Arizona State

After winning its ninth straight Pac-12 Championship in May, the OREGON women's program went on to complete history in June as it became the first to complete the "triple crown" of NCAA cross country, indoor and outdoor track & field titles in the same academic year.

Oregon's attempt for history at the NCAA Championships came to an epic conclusion in front of its Hayward faithful - the 400-meter relay finale, which the Ducks needed to win to overcome an 8.2-point deficit to Georgia. **Raevyn Rogers**, who earlier in the meet became the first athlete ever to win three 800-meter NCAA outdoor titles, closed the final 4x400 leg in 49.77 seconds to edge USC's **Kendall Ellis** (despite her 49.63 final leg) and give Oregon the victory and the 10 points it needed to claim the crown. USC pushed its rival Oregon to victory as both teams recorded collegiate record-breaking times in the 4x400, the Ducks clocking in at 3:23.13 and Trojans at 3:23.35 to better Texas' 13-year old mark of 3:23.75. The Ducks finished with 64 points to narrowly top the Bulldogs' 62.2 points, while the Trojans placed third with 43 points.

Also from the Pac-12, ARIZONA's **Sage Watson** led a 1-2-3 Conference finish in the 400-meter hurdles, winning the event with a time of 54.52 seconds to beat USC's **Anna Cockrell** and **Amalie Iuel**. **Maggie Ewen** totaled 21 points in three throwing events to help ARIZONA STATE to a 10th-place showing. Ewen won the hammer throw with an NCAA-record toss of 73.32 meters (240'-7"), placed sixth in the shot put and added a runner-up finish in the discus.

Oregon's **Deajah Stevens** and Ewen were named the Pac-12 and USTFCCA West Region Track and Field Athletes of the Year, respectively. Along with her NCAA performance, Ewen dominated the Pac-12 Championships with titles in the hammer (in meet-record fashion), shot put and discus to earn Athlete of the Meet honors. Stevens set an all-time Conference record in the 200 and added 100 and 4x100 crowns to lead the Ducks to a dominant league title effort.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S TRACK & FIELD SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Keyasia Tibbs, Arizona State

STANFORD claimed its NCAA-record tying seventh national title as eight Pac-12 teams earned NCAA berths. The NCAA title marks the fifth fall national championship for Pac-12 schools this season (including two for the Cardinal after winning the men's soccer title), and a record 15th women's volleyball crown for the Pac-12.

At least six Conference teams have earned NCAA Tournament berths for the 17th-consecutive season, also marking the 17th time three Pac-12 teams advanced to the regional semifinal round. Stanford's appearance in the national semifinal was 32nd time a Pac-12 team had advanced that far.

Three of the eight NCAA Tournament teams were seeded, the Cardinal earning a No. 6 seed, WASHINGTON was the No. 8 seed and UCLA was the 10th seed.

The Huskies won the Pac-12 crown outright, their second-straight league crown and the third in four years. UW's Courtney Schwan was tabbed the Pac-12 Player of the Year.

Stanford head coach John Dunning and Kathryn Plummer received national honors, Dunning garnering AVCA National Coach of the Year honors while Plummer was voted the AVCA National Freshman of the Year. Dunning earns the nod for the second time at Stanford and first since 2001, while Plummer is the second-straight Cardinal to receive the freshman award.

Plummer was also voted the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year with ARIZONA's Penina Snuka receiving the Conference's Setter of the Year award. UCLA's Taylor Formico was the Pac-12 Libero of the Year for the second-straight year. WASHINGTON STATE's Jen Greeny was voted the Pac-12 Coach of the Year after leading the Cougs to their best finish since 2002.

10 Pac-12 players were named to AVCA All-America teams. It is the 15th-consecutive year the Pac-12 has had at least eight student-athletes on AVCA All-America teams. Two seniors, seven juniors and a sophomore comprised the Pac-12's national honorees.

The Pac-12 has won 15 of 36 NCAA titles awarded, including 13 of the last 26.

ARIZONA STATE captured its 17th Pac-12 title, and first since 2006, at the 2017 Pac-12 Wrestling Championships. The 12th-ranked Sun Devils posted 127.0 points behind five individual Pac-12 champions - **Josh Maruca** (149), **Josh Shields** (157), **Anthony Valencia** (165), **Zahid Valencia** (174) and **Tanner Hall** (HWT). Zahid Valencia was named the Most Outstanding Wrestler of the Championships after posting a pair of falls in three matches, including one in the semifinals that took just 16 seconds. Host, and 17th-ranked STANFORD, finished runner-up with 122.5 points. CSU BAKERSFIELD finished in third with 92.0 points, followed by OREGON STATE in fourth with 91.5 points, BOISE STATE in fifth with 79.0 points and CAL POLY in sixth with 78.0 points.

Pac-12 Wrestler of the Year **Zahid Valencia** finished third overall in the 174 pound class at NAAs in leading the Sun Devils to a 14th-place finish. Teammate **Tanner Hall** also placed third in the heavyweight division. Valencia was the first Pac-12 wrestler to earn both Wrestler of the Year and Freshman of the Year. Arizona State's **Zeke Jones** was tabbed Coach of the Year.

PAC-12 WRESTLING SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Peter Galli, Stanford

(Capsule Reviews of 2016-17 Pac-12 Highlights in the MPSF)

MEN'S GYMNASTICS

STANFORD and CALIFORNIA finished second and third, respectively, behind three-time NCAA Champion Oklahoma at the MPSF Championships. The Cardinal also advanced to the NCAA finals where it finished fourth for the second time in program history. The team was led by senior **Akash Modi** who won the all-around and parallel bars titles. He ended his career winning the prestigious Nissen-Emery Award, which goes to the top-collegiate gymnast in the country. Teammate **Robert Neff** also claimed an individual honor, winning his first-career NCAA high bar crown.

MEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

OREGON edged out USC for its third MPSF indoor track and field title, 89-83. The Ducks had six individual champions including heptathlon winner Mitch Modin who scored a career-high 5,747 points. The Trojans had four individual winners for the second-place finish. The Ducks went on to be the league's highest finisher at the NCAA Championships, boasting a third-place finish overall. **Edward Cheserek** won his 16th-career national title, the most ever by any NCAA track and field or cross country athlete. He claimed a pair of titles in one day, winning the mile and the 5,000 meters a few hours later.

WOMEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

OREGON claimed its second-straight NCAA crown, which would eventually become the second of the "Triple Crown." The Ducks scored a meet-record 84 points to shatter the 29-year old record of 71, while four won individual crowns. USC ran a NCAA-record 4x400-meter relay to win the crown, edging out the Ducks by a mere .04 seconds. The Trojans won the MPSF title by a margin of 20 points over the Ducks, posting 120 points for the win. Both teams dominated the event as the only teams to score over 100 points, with third-place finisher STANFORD notching 57 points. The 4x400-meter relay sealed the victory for the Trojans, putting up a meet and track record in the final event of the weekend.

WOMEN'S LACROSSE

USC won its second-consecutive MPSF Tournament title, earning the league's automatic bid into the NCAA Tournament. The top-seeded Trojans defeated second-seeded COLORADO, 16-11. The Trojans' **Gabby McMahon** was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player. In its third-straight NCAA Tournament, USC advanced to the quarterfinal for the second-straight year, knocking off third-seeded Florida, 15-12. The Buffs had a season for the history books, opening the season with an 11-game winning streak and earned as high as a No. 6 national ranking. In just their fourth season as a program, the Buffs earned their first-ever NCAA Tournament bid, falling in the first round to UMass.

MEN'S VOLLEYBALL

UCLA led the league with a final AVCA Coaches poll ranking of No. 6 in the country, followed by STANFORD at No. 9 and USC at No. 11, all three teams earning a spot in the MPSF Tournament. The Bruins' **Jake Arnitz** and the Trojans' **Lucas Yoder** were tabbed second team AVCA All-Americans. Yoder was the nation's leader in kills per set (4.85) and points per set (5.22).

MEN'S WATER POLO

CALIFORNIA won its 14th NCAA title, winning the all-MPSF final versus USC. The Golden Bears rallied for an 11-8 overtime win in their home pool, trailing in the first three periods of the match. Cal's road to the national championship match was not an easy one, having to overcome UCLA, 9-8, in the semifinal. Bears' head coach **Kirk Everist** was tabbed the ACWPC National Coach of the Year and **McQuin Baron** was named the organization's national player of the year. The Trojans claimed the MPSF crown with the help of Baron's 17 saves, defeating the Bruins' 17-14, in the title match.

WOMEN'S WATER POLO

No. 2 STANFORD won its fifth NCAA title in seven years on a **Maggie Steffens'** goal in the final nine seconds of the match which proved to be the game winner over No. 1 UCLA, 8-7. An Olympian, Steffens scored three goals in the title bout and was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player. It was a rematch of the MPSF title game where the top-seeded Bruins were victorious, 6-2. UCLA's **Rachel Fattal**, also an Olympian, was the MPSF Tournament's MVP.
