Built on a firm foundation of academic excellence and superior athletic performance, the Pac-12 Conference renewed its undisputed claim as the Conference of Champions® in 2015-16. At the same time, its accomplishments and milestones extended beyond the fields and courts to the classrooms, and beyond its traditional geographic footprint all the way to Asia.

On the field, the Pac-12 rises above the rest, claiming an incredible 150 NCAA team titles since 1999-2000, including a nation-leading 10 in 2015-16, an average of nearly 10 championships per academic year. Even more impressive has been the breadth of the Pac-12's success, with championships coming in 29 different men's and women's sports. The Pac-12 has led or tied the nation in NCAA Championships in 51 of the last 56 years, the only exceptions being in 1980-81, 1988-89, 1990-91 and 1995-96 when the Conference finished second, and only twice finished third in 1998-99 and 2004-05.

For the 11th-consecutive year, the Pac-12 had the most or tied for the most NCAA titles of any conference in the country, winning at least six every year since 2000-01. No other conference has won double-digit NCAA crowns in a single year, the Pac-12 doing so eight times, including a record 14 in 1996-97.

Spanning nearly a century of outstanding athletics achievements, the Pac-12 was the first conference to reach 400 championships in 2010-11. With the inclusion of Colorado and Utah, the Conference surpassed another major milestone, with league teams capturing 450 titles, outdistancing the next conference by nearly 200. In all, Conference teams have won 488 NCAA Championships (295 men's, 164 women's, 29 combined).

Pac-12 members have won 295 NCAA team championships on the men's side, 77 more than the next closest conference. Men's NCAA crowns have come at a phenomenal rate for the Pac-12 - 16 basketball titles by six schools, 54 tennis titles, 47 outdoor track & field crowns, and 28 baseball titles. Pac-12 members have won 25 of 47 NCAA titles in volleyball, 42 of 47 in water polo, 29 in skiing, and 24 in swimming & diving national championships.

Individually, the Conference has produced an impressive number of NCAA individual champions. Over 2,000 (2,248) individual crowns have been won by Pac-12 student-athletes over the years with 1,352 by male student-athletes. Student-athletes have also captured 179 individual titles at combined championships (i.e., skiing and fencing).

On the women's side, the story is much the same. Since the NCAA began conducting women's championships 35 years ago, Pac-12 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season on 26 occasions, including a current streak of 16-consecutive years, dating back to 2000. Overall, the Pac-12 has captured 164 NCAA women's titles, easily outdistancing the SEC, which is second with 99. Pac-12 members have dominated a number of sports, winning 23 softball titles, 22 tennis crowns, 14 volleyball titles, 17 of the last 27 trophies in golf, and 14 in swimming & diving.

Pac-12 women student-athletes shine nationally on an individual basis, as well, having captured an unmatched 714 NCAA individual crowns, an average of over 20 championships per season.

The Pac-12's excellence is further proven in the annual Division I Learfield Sports Directors' Cup competition, the prestigious award that honors the best overall collegiate athletics programs in the country. STANFORD continued its remarkable run and won a remarkable 22nd-consecutive Directors' Cup in 2015-16 to lead the Conference. Six Pac-12 member institutions ranked among the top-15 Division I programs, and a remarkable seven institutions were in the top 25: No. 1 STANFORD, No. 4 USC, No. 6 UCLA, No. 10 OREGON No. 11 CALIFORNIA, No. 14 WASHINGTON and No. 25 ARIZONA. At least five member institutions have been ranked in the top 20 in all but one year of the Director's Cup program, with seven appearing in the top 20 on five different occasions (1998, 2001, 2003, 2005 and 2006).

2015-16 REVIEW

The Conference's 10 NCAA titles came in the form of four men's and six women's crowns. Half the membership schools claimed at least one NCAA title and, of the seven institutions in the country to have won multiples titles, three were from the Pac-12.

OREGON was one of just two teams in the nation to claim three championships, sweeping the men's and women's indoor track & field crowns for the second time in three years, then winning its first-ever title in men's golf. STANFORD and USC also took home a pair of titles each. The Cardinal extended its streak of winning a NCAA title to 40 years, holding up the national championship trophy for the first time ever in men's soccer, while also adding to its NCAA-record number of national championships in women's tennis, capturing the program's 18th all-time. USC made history winning the inaugural NCAA Beach Volleyball title, then won the women's water polo championship where three of the four semifinal teams were Pac-12 members.

WASHINGTON also won its first-ever golf title, taking home the women's crown, while UCLA, the nation's leader in all-time NCAA titles, upped its all-

time national championship count to 113 after successfully defending its men's water polo title. CALIFORNIA won the women's rowing championship, ending a 10-year drought, also giving the Conference a title in the sport for the first time since 2009.

In addition to the 10 national championships, the Pac-12 also had runners-up in 11 NCAA Championship events: men's and women's cross country (COLORADO), men's gymnastics (STANFORD), skiing (COLORADO), men's swimming (CALIFORNIA), women's swimming (STANFORD), baseball (ARIZONA), women's golf (STANFORD), women's track & field (OREGON), and women's water polo (STANFORD). Overall, the Conference had 38 teams finish in the top four at 22 NCAA Championship events, including three teams in the top four in men's cross country, women's golf, and men's and women's water polo.

Participation in the postseason was a common occurrence for the Pac-12 in 2015-16. Of the 23 sports sponsored by the Conference, 19 witnessed at least half its teams participating in NCAA or other postseason action. The men sent 73 of a possible 103 teams into the postseason (70.8 percent), while the women sent 79 of a possible 115 teams (68.7 percent).

The Pac-12 had a record number of bowl bids with 10 teams participating in the postseason also producing a 6-4 record, tying the Conference record for bowl wins in a season. Conference Champion STANFORD turned in a convincing 45-16 victory in the Rose Bowl to cap the Pac-12's history-making season. 2015 marked the third-straight year the Pac-12 has sent at least eight teams to bowl games. A record nine teams boasted winning records, besting the previous record of eight the previous three years, with 10 squads notching at least six victories. The Cardinal extended the Pac-12 North's undefeated streak to five, defeating Pac-12 South Champion USC, 41-22, in the Pac-12 Football Championship Game at Levi's Stadium in Santa Clara, Calif. While the Trojans lost a two-point heartbreaker in the Holiday Bowl, ARIZONA (New Mexico), CALIFORNIA (Armed Forces), UTAH (Royal Purple Las Vegas), WASHINGTON (Heart of Dallas Bowl) and WASHINGTON STATE (Hyundai Sun Bowl) each earned wins, along with the Cardinal. ARIZONA STATE (Motel 6 Cactus Bowl), OREGON (Valero Alamo Bowl) and UCLA (Foster Farm Bowl) all took part in bowl games, as well.

Eight Pac-12 men's basketball teams earned postseason bids, including a Pac-12-record seven NCAA Tournament bids. OREGON captured the regular-season crown then followed up claiming the Pac-12 Tournament title at the MGM Garden Grand Arena in Las Vegas. The Ducks advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight, making the Pac-12 the only conference to advance that far in each of the last three years. UO was joined by ARIZONA, CALIFORNIA, COLORADO, OREGON STATE, USC and UTAH in the Big Dance. WASHINGTON represented the Conference in the NIT, advancing to the second round.

Pac-12 women's basketball had its most competitive and historic season during the Conference's Centennial. The season was capped by OREGON STATE and WASHINGTON advancing to the NCAA Women's Final Four, the first-ever appearances by both teams and also the first time ever the Pac-12 had two representatives in the national semifinal. The Conference won a record 14 NCAA Tournament games, advancing four teams to the Sweet 16 and three to the Elite Eight, both also firsts for the Conference. OSU earned a share of the Pac-12 regular-season crown with ARIZONA STATE, the Beavers eventually capturing their first-ever Pac-12 Tournament title as the No. 1 seed at KeyArena in Seattle. ASU, STANFORD and UCLA nabbing NCAA Tournament berths with all but the Huskies earning the right to host first- and second-round games. OREGON and UTAH combined for six WNIT wins, giving the Pac-12 20 postseason victories, by far a league record. Four teams appeared in the final Associated Press poll, the most ever for the Conference, and all appeared in the top 15. Five earned rankings in the USA Today/WBCA poll, the Beavers leading the way with a program-record No. 2 rating. UW was ranked No. 8 in that poll, also a team record, Stanford was No. 11, UCLA was No. 13 and ASU was No. 16.

For the fourth time in league history, the Pac-12 crowned co-champions in volleyball. USC won its fifth title in program history while WASHINGTON captured its fourth all-time, including its second in the last three years. Seven teams earned NCAA Tournament berths, the 16th-consecutive year the league has received at least six bids. The Trojans were the No. 1 overall seed in the tournament, while UW (No. 5), STANFORD (No. 8) and UCLA (No. 14) garnered one of 16 seeds. ARIZONA and OREGON also participated in the 64-team field. A record nine teams appeared in the AVCA Preseason Coaches poll, UW and USC both occupied the No. 1 spot in the polling during the season, and the four seeded teams were in the final polling of the season. The Pac-12 has dominated the sport of women's volleyball, winning a record 14 NCAA volleyball titles since 1982.

Pac-12 baseball also recorded historic moments as UTAH earned its first-ever Pac-12 regular-season crown after finishing last in the league standings the year before. The Utes earned the Conference's automatic bid, with ARIZONA, ARIZONA STATE and WASHINGTON earning at-large NCAA Tournament

bids. Ranked No. 2 in the final national rankings, the Wildcats made a run at the national title as it reached the College World Series championship series in Omaha, Neb., before coming up short. The Pac-12 has, by far, won the most baseball national titles of any conference in the country, claiming 28 titles dating back to 1947. The Wildcats were ranked second in the final Baseball America poll after entering the postseason unranked.

The Pac-12 Conference has historically dominated the sport of softball where league teams have claimed 23 NCAA titles in the 35-year history of the championship. Pac-12 teams captured an unprecedented nine in a row from 1988-1997, then most recently claimed six-straight from 2006-11. Eight teams participated in the tournament in 2016, marking the 20th-straight season the Pac-12 has had five or more teams advance to the postseason, and has had at least three berths every year since the league began sponsoring the sport in 1987. OREGON claimed its fourth-consecutive Pac-12 regular-season title, while UCLA made its 27th appearance in the NCAA Women's College World Series.

PAC-12 CONFERENCE HISTORY

The roots of the Pac-12 Conference date back 100 years to December 2, 1915, when the Pacific Coast Conference (PCC) was founded at a meeting at the Imperial Hotel in Portland, Ore. The original membership consisted of four schools - the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Washington, the University of Oregon, and Oregon Agricultural College (now Oregon State University). All still are charter members of the Conference.

Pacific Coast Conference play began in 1916 and, one year later, Washington State College (now Washington State University) was accepted into the league, with Stanford University following in 1918.

In 1922, the PCC expanded to eight teams with the admission of the University of Southern California (USC) and the University of Idaho. In 1924, the University of Montana joined the league roster and in 1928, the PCC grew to 10 members with the addition of UCLA.

The Pacific Coast Conference competed as a 10-member league until 1950, with the exception of 1943-45 when World War II curtailed intercollegiate athletic competition to a minimum. During that time, the league's first commissioner was named. Edwin N. Atherton was Commissioner in 1940 and was succeeded by Victor O. Schmidt in 1944. In 1950, Montana resigned from the Conference and the PCC continued as a nine-team Conference through 1958.

In 1959, the PCC was dissolved and the Athletic Association of Western Universities (AAWU) was formed with Thomas J. Hamilton was appointed Commissioner of the new league. The original AAWU membership included California, Stanford, USC, UCLA and Washington. Washington State joined the membership in 1962, while Oregon and Oregon State joined in 1964. Under Hamilton's watch, the name Pacific-8 Conference was adopted in 1968. In 1971, Wiles Hallock took over as Commissioner of the Pac-8.

Ten years later, on July 1, 1978, the University of Arizona and Arizona State University were admitted to the league and the Pacific-10 Conference became a reality. In 1986-87, the league took on a new look, expanding to include 10 women's sports. Since then, the Conference has been considered the premiere league in women's athletics, securing the most NCAA titles in women's sports of any conference nearly every year.

Thomas C. Hansen was named the Commissioner of the Pac-10 in 1983, a role he would hold for 26 years until 2009, and was succeeded by current Commissioner Larry Scott, who took on the new role in July 2009.

During the 2010-11 academic year, the University of Colorado accepted its invitation to join the Pac-12 on June 11, 2010, and on June 17, 2010, the University of Utah agreed to join the Conference. The Buffaloes and Utes officially became the 11th and 12th members of the Conference on July 1, 2011, the first additions to the league since 1978.

It was during that 2010-11 academic year that Scott helped deliver monumental changes that transformed the Conference into a modern 12-team league. In addition to expanding to 12 teams, member institutions agreed to equal revenue sharing for the first time in the Conference's history, created two divisions - the North and the South, for football only and established a Football Championship Game for the first time ever. He also secured a landmark media rights deal that dramatically increased national exposure and revenue for each school, establishing the Pac-12 Networks and Pac-12 Digital Network that guaranteed enhanced exposure across all sports.

Currently, the Pac-12 sponsors 11 men's sports and 12 women's sports, with beach volleyball added in 2015-16. Additionally, the Conference is a member of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) in four other men's sports and three women's sports.

The Pac-12 Conference offices are located in the heart of San Francisco in the SOMA district.

PAC-12 TOPS FINAL LEARFIELD DIRECTORS' CUP

SAN FRANCISCO - The STANFORD Cardinal captured their 22nd-consecutive Directors' Cup in leading the Pac-12 Conference to another impressive finish in the final 2015-16 Division I Learfield Sports Directors' Cup standings, the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) announced.

Led by a spring NCAA title in women's tennis, and a pair of runner-up finishes in women's golf and women's water polo, Stanford won its 22nd-consecutive Cup. The Cardinal grabbed another NCAA title in men's soccer and posted eight top five finishes in tallying an impressive 1,526.50 points. That's 220 points more than runner-up Ohio State.

USC finished fourth (1,196.25 points) for its third consecutive top 10 finish. The Trojans captured a pair of spring titles in women's water polo and beach volleyball. UCLA placed sixth overall, its 20th top 10 finish in the Directors' Cup, with 1,091.50 points. The Bruins collected a title in men's water polo and posted six other top-five finishes during the 2015-16 year. Behind its three national titles in men's golf, and men's and women's indoor track and field, OREGON posted its highest finish ever in the Directors' Cup at 10th with 973.75 points. CALIFORNIA added a national title in women's rowing and placed 11th with 966.00 points. WASHINGTON added an NCAA title in women's golf and placed 14th with 951.50 points, while ARIZONA posted a national runner-up finish in baseball and collect 740.75 points giving the Pac-12 Conference a phenomenal seven teams among the top 25.

ARIZONA STATE finished 37th (595.25), followed by COLORADO which finished 46th (483.75), UTAH was 51st overall (433.75), followed by OREGON STATE (84th, 245.25) and WASHINGTON STATE (102nd, 172.00).

The success of the Pac-12 in the Directors' Cup was bolstered by the capturing of 10 NCAA titles, most among all conferences. In addition, 10 Pac-12 league members combined to post 38 top-four finishes in 22 NCAA championships.

The Directors' Cup was developed as a joint effort between the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and the USA Today. Points are awarded based on each institution's finish in up to 20 sports - 10 women's and 10 men's.

Pac-12 Champions for the first time in program history, Utah had a remarkable run in league play, with a record of 19-11 (26-29 overall) to clinch the Pac-12's automatic berth into the NCAA Championships. The Utes became the first team since Stanford in 1993 and 1994 to finish in last place in the Conference then the following year win the league title. Utah made its first postseason appearance since 2009. Four Pac-12 baseball teams earned berths to the 2016 NCAA Baseball Championship. UTAH was joined by ARIZONA, ARIZONA STATE and WASHINGTON who earned at-large selections. Arizona made a run at its fifth national title as it reached the College World Series championship series in Omaha, but came up short to Coastal Carolina.

Arizona was ranked No. 2 in the final polls by both *Baseball America* and *USA Today* (coaches poll). It's the highest ranking for the Wildcats since 2012 when they captured the national title. *Collegiate Baseball* also featured Arizona at No. 2 in its final top-30, along with WASHINGTON (No. 22) and ARIZONA STATE (No. 29).

CALIFORNIA's **Brett Cumberland** was voted Pac-12 Player of the Year, while OREGON STATE's **Logan Ice** was tabbed Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year. Fellow Beaver **Nick Madrigal** was named Pac-12 Freshman of the Year while WASHINGTON's **Troy Rallings** was voted Pac-12 Pitcher of the Year. UTAH head coach **Bill Kinneberg** was named Pac-12 Coach of the Year. USC's **David Oppenheim** was crowned the Pac-12 Batting Champion with a Conference-leading .387 batting average. **Nick Halamandaris** of California was named the Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

Rallings was an All-American in all four publications and was a finalist for NCBWA Stopper of the Year. OREGON outfielder **Austin Grebeck** earned a spot on the nine-man ABCA Gold Glove team.

In the 2016 MLB Draft, every Pac-12 school had at least one student-athlete drafted: Arizona (6), Arizona State (5); California (7), Oregon (5), Oregon State (5), Stanford (4), UCLA (5), USC (12), Utah (1), Washington (3) and Washington State (3). ASU leads all NCAA schools with 414 total MLB draft picks, and at least one Sun Devil has been drafted every year since the draft's inception in 1965.

The Pac-12 celebrated its Centennial with one of its best seasons of men's basketball in Conference history. The league was historically deep with a record seven teams earning bids to the 2016 NCAA Tournament and concluding the season ranked third in the nation in Conference RPI, equaling its highest ranking since 2000, with nine teams in the RPI Top 100 and 11 in the Top 110.

The OREGON Ducks became the ninth team in league history to accomplish the double championship, claiming the Pac-12 regular season title outright with a 14-4 record, as well as capturing the program's fourth Pac-12 Tournament title with an 88-57 victory over UTAH in the championship game.

OREGON was joined by ARIZONA, CALIFORNIA, COLORADO, OREGON STATE, UTAH and USC in the NCAA Tournament, while WASHINGTON was selected to participate in the NIT. The Pac-12 became the only conference to advance a team to the NCAA Elite Eight in each of the last three seasons as the Ducks defeated Holy Cross, St. Joseph's and Duke to reach the West Region final.

Utah sophomore **Jakob Poeltl** was chosen the Pac-12's Player of the Year as well as a consensus second team All-American and the Kareem Abdul-Jabbar Award recipient as the nation's best center. The 7-0 forward/center from Vienna, Austria, led the Conference in field goal percentage (.646) and finished second in the league in scoring (17.2 ppg), fourth in rebounding (9.1 rpg) and eighth in blocks (1.6 bpg).

Cal forward **Jaylen Brown** averaged 14.6 points and 5.4 rebounds to earn Pac-12 Freshman of the Year honors. OSU senior guard **Gary Payton II** became the first player in league history to repeat as Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year after pacing the Conference in steals (2.5 spg) for the second-straight season. Buffs redshirt sophomore guard **George King** was selected Pac-12 Most Improved Player of the Year after averaging 13.6 points while hitting 68 three pointers at a league-best 45.6 percent clip. The Utes' senior guard **Brandon Taylor** was voted the Pac-12 Student-Athlete of the Year. UO's **Dana Altman** was named Pac-12 Coach of the Year for the second-straight season and third time in the last four years.

Joining Poeltl in earning All-America honors were Wildcat senior forward **Ryan Anderson**, Oregon sophomore forward **Dillon Brooks** and Payton II.

The Pac-12 had five players selected in the NBA Draft, including three lottery selections - California's Jaylen Brown (No. 3 - Boston), Washington's **Marquese Chriss** (No. 8), Utah's Jakob Poeltl (No. 9) - most among all conferences.

It was a historic season for Pac-12 women's basketball, capped by first-time appearances by OREGON STATE and WASHINGTON in the NCAA Women's Final Four, the first time ever the league had placed two teams in the national semifinals.

The Conference enjoyed success early on, earning the No. 1 Conference RPI in December and never relinquishing it. Five teams went on to earn NCAA Tournament bids, ARIZONA STATE, STANFORD and UCLA each participating in the Big Dance, in addition to the Huskies and Beavers. The Conference went 5-0 in the first round, equaling a Pac-12 all-time best of nine tournament wins after just the first weekend. Pac-12 teams went on to win a record 14 NCAA Tournament games, achieving multiple firsts along the way. The Pac-12 had four teams advance to the NCAA Sweet 16, the first time that many league teams had advanced that far. Another first for the Conference was placing three teams in the NCAA Elite Eight for the first time ever setting up an All-Pac-12 regional final between the Huskies and the Cardinal marking the first time since 1992 Pac-12 teams had faced each other in the Regional final. Conference teams won 20 postseason games in all, six coming in the WNIT coming from OREGON and UTAH.

The Beavers and Sun Devils were crowned Pac-12 regular-season co-champions, the second-straight year OSU claimed the title and the first for ASU since 2000-01. In what was one of the most competitive seasons in Conference history, Oregon State went on to win its first-ever Pac-12 Tournament crown, defeating UCLA in the final as seven of the 11 games in Seattle were decided by 10 points or less, including two overtimes.

Four teams earned final rankings in the *Associated Press* poll, the most ever for the Pac-12, all of them earning a top-15 rating. Five were in the final *USA Today/WBCA* Coaches poll with OSU finishing at No. 2 in the for its highest-ever rankings. The Huskies' No. 8 final coaches poll ranking was also a program best.

UW's **Kelsey Plum** and OSU's **Jamie Weisner** were tabbed WBCA and AP All-Americans, UO's **Jillian Alleyne** joining the duo on the AP squad. Plum scored 960 points to lead the country and became one of the fastest to 2,000-career points in NCAA history. Alleyne broke the Pac-12's all-time rebounding record, grabbing 1,712 over her career, which also ranks third in NCAA history. She shattered the Conference's career rebounding average mark at 14.3 rpg. OSU's **Ruth Hamblin** broke the Pac-12's career blocks record, becoming the only one with three 100-block seasons in league history. CALIFORNIA's **Kristine Anigwe** won the USBWA National Freshman of the Year honor.

Pac-12 coaches selected Weisner the Pac-12 Player of the Year, Hamblin the Defensive Player of the Year and Anigwe the Freshman of the Year. ASU's **Charlie Tuner Thorne** was the Coach of the Year for the second time in her career.

As the Pac-12 celebrated its storied past throughout the Centennial campaign, the Conference looked to the future while also adding to its history in 2015-16 with the addition of Beach Volleyball as the league's 23rd sponsored sport. In conjunction with the first year of sponsorship by the NCAA, the Pac-12 was among four other beach volleyball conferences in the sport's inaugural season along with the Atlantic Sun Conference, Big West Conference, Coastal Collegiate Athletic Association, and West Coast Conference.

The first-ever Pac-12 Beach Volleyball Championships were held at USC's Merle Norman Stadium in Los Angeles and dominated by the host Trojans as Pac-12 Pair of the Year **Kelly Claes** and **Sara Hughes** captured the Pairs title and top seeded USC rolled to the Team crown.

The Pac-12 set the tone on the sand as it sent a national-best three teams to the first-ever NCAA Championship in No. 2 seed USC, No. 4 seed UCLA and No. 6 seed ARIZONA. The Trojans won all four of their dual matches at the event, including two triumphs over No. 1 seed Florida State, en route to a 34-2 final record and the inaugural NCAA team championship, while UCLA finished third and ARIZONA sixth.

The Conference also led the nation with six AVCA All-America selections in USC's Claes and Hughes, ARIZONA's **Madison Witt** and **McKenna Witt** and UCLA's **Megan McNamara** and **Nicole McNamara**.

PAC-12 BEACH VOLLEYBALL SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Justice Magraw, WASHINGTON

The 2015 campaign was a historic one for the Pac-12. Having never lost a Conference title since joining the league, COLORADO won a fourth-consecutive crown at the Pac-12 Championships. OREGON's **Edward Cheserek** claimed an unprecedented third-straight title, a feat which had never been accomplished. He joined an elite company of three-time champions that includes UO's Steve Prefontaine (1970-71, 73) and WASHINGTON STATE's Henry Rono (1976, 1978-79), neither of which had won three straight.

The Pac-12 had a league-record seven men's teams earn NCAA berths. Four placed in the top eight, the most top-10 finishes for member teams in Pac-12 history, dating back to 1938. The Buffs led the way in second place, unable to win a third-straight national title, placing behind Syracuse by a mere nine points. STANFORD was third and OREGON was fourth.

Cheserek was named the Pac-12 and USTFCCCA National Men's Athlete of the Year, while Colorado's **Mark Wetmore** was voted the Men's Coach of the Year by his peers in the Pac-12 and by the USTFCCCA. WASHINGTON's **Greg Metcalf** was named the USTFCCCA West Region Coach of the Year. Colorado's **John Dressel** was the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year as the top freshman finisher at the Pac-12 Championships.

STANFORD's **Aisling Cuffe** won her second individual crown in three years, bouncing back after sitting out the 2014 season with an injury.

Five Pac-12 teams earned NCAA Tournament berths, the fifth-straight year the Conference had sent at least five teams to the national meet. The Buffs and OREGON placed in the top three, going second and third, respectively. UTAH had its best season ever. After posting its best finish at the Pac-12 Championships, the Utes earned their first-ever national championship berth.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Aisling Cuffe, Stanford

STANFORD kept the Pac-12 North Division perfect at 5-0 all-time in the Pac-12 Football Championship Game with its 41-22 victory over USC, earning its 15th-Conference championship. While the Trojans were the fourth different Pac-12 South Division champion to appear in the Conference's fifth championship game, they could not overcome Stanford's **Christian McCaffrey**. The sophomore running back earned MVP honors after he posted a school-record 461 all-purpose yards (207 rushing, 144 receiving, 149 return yards) and scored two touchdowns. For good measure, he connected with QB **Kevin Hogan** with an 11-yard TD pass. McCaffrey and Hogan each rushed for a touchdown, threw for a touchdown and caught a touchdown.

The Pac-12 sent a record 10 teams to the postseason and produced a 6-4 bowl record. The six bowl wins tie for most in Pac-12 history. Conference Champion Stanford capped the Pac-12's postseason with a convincing 45-16 win over Iowa in the Rose Bowl Game behind another stunning performance from McCaffrey. All he did was post a Rose Bowl Game record 378 all-purpose yards (172 rushing yards, 105 receiving yards and 101 return yards) that featured a 63-yard punt return for a touchdown.

McCaffrey, who established an FBS record with 3,864 all-purpose yards, was named the Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Year. OR-EGON defensive end **DeForest Buckner** was named the Pat Tillman Defensive Player of the Year after leading the conference with 10.5 sacks and added 17.0 tackles for loss. UCLA quarterback **Josh Rosen** threw for a Bruin freshman record 3,669 yards and 23 TDs to earn Pac-12 Offensive Freshman of the Year honors. USC linebacker **Cameron Smith** led the Trojans with 7.8 tackles per game and was tabbed the Pac-12 Defensive Freshman of the Year. Pac-12 Co-Coaches of the Year went to Washington State's **Mike Leach** and Stanford's **David Shaw**. Leach led the Cougars to a nine-win season and their first bowl game since 2003. Shaw picked up his third coach of the year honor in five seasons and led the Cardinal to a final national ranking of No. 3 in both the AP and Coaches polls.

McCaffrey, who was the Heisman Trophy runnerup, was recognized as the AP Player of the Year. He also earned the Hornung Award as the nation's most versatile player, while teammate **Joshua Garnett** won the Outland Trophy as the nation's top interior lineman. UCLA's **Ka'imi Fairbairn** was tabbed the Groza Award winner as the nation's top kicker and UTAH's **Tom Hackett** defended his status as the nation's top punter by earning his second straight Ray Guy Award. Garnett and Hackett were tabbed unanimous All-America, while McCaffrey and Fairbairn were consensus selections. Garnett and Buckner were named the Morris Trophy winners. The Morris Trophy is given annually to the most outstanding offensive and defensive linemen in the Pac-12 Conference. What makes the award unique is the selection procedure, in which the league's starting offensive linemen vote for the defensive winner and vice versa.

OREGON made it a clean sweep of the NCAA men's golf titles on its home course as **Aaron Wise** took home the individual championship with a 5-under 275 and the Ducks defeated Texas in dramatic fashion to capture the team title. Wise edged out USC's **Rico Hoey**, who finished second at 3-under 277, and ARIZONA STATE's **Jon Rahm**, who tied for third at 1-under 279. The team title came down to extra holes as **Sulman Raza** knoced in a six-foot putt on the 21st hole to give the Ducks their first national title in men's golf. In addition to Oregon, USC managed to advance from stroke play to match play where it knocked off Vanderbilt in the quarterfinals before falling to Texas in the semifinals.

STANFORD won its third consecutive Pac-12 title by posting a 29-stroke margin of victory at The Country Club in Salt Lake City, Utah. Arizona State's **Rahm** brought home the Pac-12 individual crown for the Sun Devils as he posted a 12-under 272. ARIZONA's **Jordan Gumberg** finished second (8-under 276). CALIFORNIA's **KK Limbhasut**, who was the third round leader after firing three consecutive rounds of 66, and Stanford's **David Boote** finished tied for third (7-under 277).

Three individuals found themselves ranked among the top four in *Golfstat's* final individual statistical rankings, led by Arizona State's **Rahm** at No. 1 (69.41), Stanford's **Maverick McNealy** at No. 2 (69.57) and Oregon's **Wise** at No. 4 (69.80). All three were also among the top six in the World Amateur Golf Rankings (WAGR), with **Rahm** at No. 1, **McNealy** at No. 2 and **Wise** at No. 6.

Stanford's **McNealy** was named the Pac-12 Men's Golfer of the Year, **Collin Morikawa** of California was tabbed Pac-12 Freshman of the Year and Stanford coach **Conrad Ray** picked up Pac-12 Coach of the Year honors for the third time in his career (also in 2007, 2014). **McNealy** repeated as the Pac-12 Golfer of the Year after posting four victories during the season, including an impressive performance at the Western Intercollegiate at Pasatiempo GC where he shot a tournament record 194 (66-64-64). For the second straight year, Arizona State's **Rahm** won the prestigious Ben Hogan Award, which is presented annually to the nation's top collegiate men's golfer, taking into account all collegiate and amateur competitions during the past 12-month period. **Rahm**, **McNealy** and **Wise** were named Division I PING First Team All-Americans. Second Team honors went to USC's **Hoey** and California's **Limbhasut**, while California's **Morikawa** picked up Third Team honors.

USC collected its fifth Pac-12 Conference title, posting a 54-hole total of 846 (-18), to claim the league crown. With a six-stroke lead entering the final round, USC was able to hold off its league rival, UCLA, by three strokes to capture the Pac-12 Championship title. The race for the individual title proved to be close as the top two individuals both shot 66 in their final round. ARIZONA STATE freshman **Linnea Strom** (-11) posted a birdie on the 18th hole to clinch the individual title by one stroke over UCLA's **Bronte Law** (-10). Strom also claimed the Pac-12 individual record for lowest total score of 205, edging OREGON's Caroline Inglis, who set last year's record (206).

The Pac-12 continued its dynamic play into the NCAA Regionals with nine teams earning bids; ARIZONA, ARIZONA STATE, CALIFORNIA, COLORADO, OREGON, STANFORD, UCLA, USC, and WASHINGTON. Six teams advanced to the NCAA Championship where five then qualified for Match Play; Oregon, Stanford, UCLA, USC, and Washington. In a match that was extended to extra holes against the defending champion Cardinal, the Huskies became the sixth Pac-12 team to tally a women's national golf title.

Law was named Pac-12 Golfer of the Year for the second consecutive time. The top-ranked golfer recorded a nation's best 70.61 stroke average and posted 20 rounds under par, with 11 rounds of 69 or better. UCLA's **Lilia Vu** secured Freshman of the Year honors after posting five top-10 finishes, 13 rounds under par, and seven rounds in the 60s. Vu also secured All-Pac-12 First Team honors. WASHINGTON's head coach **Mary Lou Mulflur** was named Pac-12 Coach of the Year after guiding the Huskies to their first national championship. Mulflur led a team of five freshmen and two seniors to the title where they had to take down top-ranked UCLA in the semifinals and Stanford in the championship match, to earn the 2016 NCAA Championship. The Huskies are the sixth Pac-12 women's golf program to collect a national crown.

National honors were bestowed upon Law and Mulflur as Law pulled in three player of the year awards (ANNIKA, PING WGCA and *Golfweek*), while Mulflur was named national coach of the year by the WGCA and *Golfweek*.

Law, Vu, Strom and Stanford's **Lauren Kim** were honored by the WGCA as First Team All-America selections, while second team honors went to Arizona State's **Monica Vaughan**, Colorado's **Esther Lee**, Stanford's **Mariah Stackhouse**, USC's **Tiffany Chan** and **Robynn Ree**, and Washington's **Charlotte Thomas**.

The Pac-12 had another strong year in women's gymnastics, with four teams participating in the NCAA Semifinals and seven of the eight Conference teams being ranked in the top 25 in the nation in the final rankings.

UCLA continued its legacy of national titles on the balance beam as Danusia Francis captured the Bruins' third beam national title in the last six years. In addition to Francis, seven other Pac-12 gymnasts earned All-America honors at the NCAA Championships. In their 19th Super Six appearance, UCLA finished in fifth place (196.825), while UTAH, STANFORD, and CALIFORNIA all competed in the NCAA Semifinals but did not advance to the Super Six.

The Golden Bears of CALIFORNIA made their first appearance at NCAA Championships in 24 years, and did so without sophomore standout Toni-Ann Williams who was busy qualifying to represent Jamaica at the 2016 Olympics. Even without their star, CALIFORNIA finished 7th in the nation overall and just missed qualifying for the Super Six. The best finish in program history was a fitting end to a record-breaking season for the Bears.

In addition to the team's success, CALIFORNIA coaching duo Justin Howell and Liz Crandall-Howell were recognized with the nation's highest honors after leading the Golden Bears to their best-ever seventh-place finish and first NCAA appearance since 1992. Howell was voted the National Association of Collegiate Gymnastics Coaches/Women (NACGC/W) National Head Coach of the Year, and Crandall-Howell is the Assistant Coach of the Year.

UCLA claimed the 2016 Pac-12 Women's Gymnastics Championship, winning the title for the 17th time in school history, and the first time since 2012. The Bruins recorded a 197.250 to capture first place overall. OREGON STATE and UTAH tied for second place, each scoring 196.925 total team points.

California men's crew concluded its 2016 season with a national title at the 114th annual Intercollegiate Rowing Association (IRA) National Championships held on Mercer Lake in West Windsor, N.J. Cal started the day off with a resounding victory in the varsity eight, winning the team's 17th Varsity Challenge Cup in team history. A silver medal in the freshmen eight, bronze medals in the varsity four and second varsity eight, and a fifth place finish in the third varsity eight combined with the varsity title, brought the Ten Eyck trophy back to Berkeley for the second time in program history.

The Golden Bears took home the Pac-12 title and For the first time since 2009, California claimed the Pac-12 Men's and Women's Rowing Championship in the same year. The men snapped a six-year drought en route to Cal's 15th Pac-12 title. California collected 72 team points for the title, winning three of the four scoring races. WASHINGTON came close in second place with 65 points and OREGON STATE totaled 47 points to round out the podium placing.

Natan Wegrzycki-Szymczyk, the Pac-12 Men's Athlete of the Year, is in the middle of a breakout year on the collegiate and international stage. While leading Cal's Varsity 8+ to a Pac-12 Championship, an IRA title and maintaining a 3.5 GPA, Wegrzycki-Szymczyk will also represent Poland in the Single this summer at the Rio Olympics. As stroke of the Varsity 8+, Wegrzycki-Szymczyk has played an integral role in the team's success this year.

The Pac-12 Men's Newcomer of the Year, Joachim Sutton has quietly become a major part of the Cal Varsity 8+ in his freshman year. Overcoming two significant injuries this year, Sutton has stayed focused on getting faster every day. He has been a solid member of the Varsity 8+ for every race this spring and a huge contributor to the Golden Bears' Pac-12 and IRA titles.

After guiding the Cal men to a Conference title and an IRA title, head coach Mike Teti has been named Pac-12 Men's Coach of the Year. This is the first honor for Teti, first for Cal since 2005 and 10th in Golden Bear history. A fixture on the U.S. rowing national team as a coach and as a competitor, U.S. national crews have produced 28 total medals under Teti's guidance.

CALIFORNIA women's rowing claimed the ninth NCAA team title for the Pac-12 of the 2015-16 campaign and the third NCAA rowing crown in program history, winning the championship with 126 points at Lake Natoma. The Golden Bears won their third national title in program history and the seventh for a Pac-12 institution. California now leads Pac-12 schools alongside WASHINGTON with three titles apiece.

The Golden Bears won their eighth Pac-12 title in the last nine years. California won three of the four scoring races, taking the title in the Varsity 8, 2V8 and Varsity 4 events. WASHINGTON took home the gold medal in the 3V8+, topping the Golden Bears by seven seconds.

Kendall Chase, the Pac-12 Women's Athlete of the Year, stroked the Cal Varsity 8+ to victories at the San Diego Crew Classic, Lake Natoma Invitational, a dual win over Washington, a Pac-12 Championship and an NCAA title. Chase is a team captain and has a 3.5 grade-point average. Chase, the Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year, becomes the first back-to-back Pac-12 Athlete of the Year since the award was enacted in 2008.

Two rowers garnered Pac-12 Women's Co-Newcomers of the Year in **Charlotte Wesselman** (California) and **Katy Gillingham** (Washington). Wesselman is the freshman stroke of Cal's Second Varsity 8+. She took a year off between high school and college to have significant surgery on both knees. When she came to Cal she was still rehabbing for the whole fall. She spent some time in the Varsity 8+ and stroked the 2V8+ to a win at the Pac-12 Championships and the NCAA Championships. The NCAA title in the 2V8+ was the first national crown in the event for the Golden Bears.

After a long summer with the U.S. Junior National Team, Gillingham jumped right in to the fall season and was the fastest pair for the entire fall season. Gillingham hit a rough patch and took two weeks off for a mental rest in the winter. She then came back after two weeks with a fury and seat raced her way into the varsity and was the top starboard on her side in the pairs. She now is 7 seat in the Varsity 8+ and has been a positive leader for the team.

California's **Al Acosta** earns his second Pac-12 Women's Coach of the Year honors in as many seasons with the Golden Bears. He guided California to two-straight Pac-12 titles and an NCAA crown this season. Acosta is a Cal graduate himself, he was named National Coach of the Year five times while leading the STANFORD women's lightweight team. Acosta started the Stanford lightweight program in 2001 and guided the Cardinal for 13 consecutive years, including four straight IRA national titles from 2010-13 before the school posted a runner-up finish in 2014.

STANFORD, the 2015 Pac-12 champion, captured its first NCAA title, defeating Clemson, 4-0. The Cardinal matched the largest margin of victory in the history of the title match in the win. Stanford finished the year at 18-2-3. Stanford's **Jordan Morris** was named Pac-12 Player of the Year, while his teammate **Brandon Vincent** was tabbed Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year. Freshman of the Year honors went to UCLA's **Jose Hernandez**, and Cardinal head coach **Jeremy Gunn** was honored as Pac-12 Coach of the Year. Vincent also earned Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year honors. With Stanford's NCAA title this year, the Pac-12 is 123-96-11 with five national championships and eight second-place finishes. Stanford's F Jordan Morris and D Brandon Vincent earned honors as MAC Hermann semifinalists. Morris was named as one of three finalists for the trophy, the highest individual intercollegiate award administered by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA), and presented annually at the Missouri Athletic Club in St. Louis. This year's trophy presentation and banquet will take place Friday, Jan. 8 2016. The Conference had three student-athletes earn NSCAA All-America honors. Morris and Vincent were named to the first team, while Washington GK Ryan Herman earned third team accolades. UCLA earned a berth to the NCAA Tournament, advancing to the second round of play. The Bruins postseason run came to an end in a 1-0 loss to No. 13-seed Seattle U. UCLA finished the season with a mark of 11-9-1. WASHINGTON placed third in the Conference standings, finishing one point behind the Bruins. The Huskies were led by NSCAA All-American **Ryan Herman** who led the league with 85 saves on the year, helping the team to a record of 8-5-6. CALIFORNIA ended the year fourth in league standings (9-6-2, 4-4-2 Pac-12), one point behind the Dawgs. The Golden Bears ranked seventh nationally in assists per game (2.12) with the help of Jose Carrera-Garcia's 0.59 mark of assists per game. OREGON STATE (8-9-1) started the year strong, winning its first five games and earning its highest ranking of No. 8 in the NSCAA poll. Three different Beavers earned weekly Conference honors, the most of any team. SAN DIEGO STATE rounded out the league and finished the season with an 8-8-3 record, their best mark since 2011.

Six Pac-12 women's soccer teams earned berths to the 2015 NCAA Women's Soccer Championship. STANFORD was a No. 1 seed for the second-straight year and it was joined in the field by No. 3-seeded CALIFORNIA, No. 4-seeded USC, ARIZONA, WASHINGTON and WASHINGTON STATE.

California junior forward Arielle Ship was named the Pac-12 Player of the Year, while USC junior Kayla Mills took home Defensive Player of the Year nods. Stanford junior Jane Campbell was tabbed Goalkeeper of the Year and her teammate Alana Cook was named Freshman/Newcomer of the Year. Stanford head coach Paul Ratcliffe was voted the Coach of the Year for the sixth time in the last eight years.

The Pac-12 holds an all-time record of 174-118-25 (.588) in the NCAA Tournament with three national championships and five second-place finishes.

The Pac-12 had five NSCAA/Continental Tire Division I All-America honorees for the second-straight year. STANFORD's Andi Sullivan was named to the first team, while CALIFORNIA's Arielle Ship was joined by USC's Kayla Mills and Morgan Andrews on the second team. Samantha Witteman of California earned third-team honors.

The final NSCAA rankings had four Pac-12 teams ranked in the top 25 with six teams receiving votes overall. Stanford led the league at No. 6.

Oregon head coach **Mike White** earned Coach of the Year. Thirteen Pac-12 softball players earned NFCA Division I All-American recognition.

Pac-12 men's swimming & diving teams had another dominant year in the pool, setting multiple records while adding to the trophy case with national individual titles.

CALIFORNIA's **Ryan Murphy** took home Pac-12 Men's Swimmer of the Year accolades for the second-straight year while his teammate **Andrew Seliskar** was voted Men's Swimming Freshman/Newcomer of the Year and their coach **David Durden** was selected as Men's Swimming Coach of the Year. ARIZONA's **Rafael Quintero** took home Men's Diver of the Year while UTAH's **Connor Cain** was voted Men's Diving Freshman/Newcomer of the Year and USC's **Hongping Li** was selected as Men's Diving Coach of the Year.

Pac-12 men's swimming and diving teams competed at the 2016 NCAA Championships, held at the McAuley Aquatic Center hosted by Georgia Tech. CALIFORNIA (351) earned a runner-up finish while USC (117) took 13th place, STANFORD (112.5) finished in 14th and ARIZONA (87) ended up in 16th place overall. UTAH finished with nine points in a tie for 35th place and ARIZONA STATE tied for 44th place with 2 points. Collectively, Conference swimmers and divers totaled three NCAA individual titles, all of which came from the Golden Bears. Josh Prenot claimed the 400 yard individual medley title with a pool-record time of 3:35.82. One day after setting the American, NCAA and U.S. Open record with a 43.51-second backstroke leg in the 400 medley relay, Ryan Murphy broke his own record in the 100 yard backstroke with a time of 43.49. Murphy broke his own American, NCAA and U.S. Open record in the the 200 yard backstroke as well with a winning time of 1:35.73.

The 2016 Pac-12 Championship saw another record-breaking year, with Stanford winning its first league crown since 2012 and its 32nd overall. The Cardinal 808 points to beat USC's 700 points in second place. Depth was a key factor in Stanford winning the title, earning top-three finishes in 12 of the 18 swimming events and each of the three diving events. The Cardinal claimed three individual swimming championships, two of which came on Saturday night with sophomore **Liam Egan** winning the 1,650 freestyle in 14:44.85 and sophomore **Sam Perry** taking the 100-yard freestyle in 42.72. Perry also won the 50-yard freestyle on Thursday in 19.30.

PAC-12 MEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Gray Umbach, Stanford

It was yet another remarkable year for Pac-12 women's swimming and diving as three teams finished in the top 10 at the 2016 NCAA Championships and six total in the top-20. The Conference of Champions won the NCAA total team points battle, with league teams collecting 1,185.5 points combined. The point total is an impressive feat, as six Conference schools scored at NCAA Championships compared to the SEC's nine teams (1,149.5 combined team points). Pac-12 swimmers and divers collected 43 CSCAA All-America honors with their impressive finishes.

In a year of historic accomplishments, USC captured its first-ever Pac-12 title at the 2016 Pac-12 Women's Swimming & Diving Championships with 1481 points. The Trojans assembled a complete performance, where each USC student-athlete scored to contribute to the win. The Championship was remarkable, as multiple records were set at the Weyerhaeuser King County Aquatic Center in Federal Way, Wash. STANFORD assembled two relays which proved to be the fastest in American history. The Cardinal opened the first day of competition with a record-setting performance in the 200-yard medley relay with **Ally Howe, Sarah Haase, Janet Hu and Lia Neal** (1:34.15). The quartet combined again two days later to set the American record in the 400 medley relay (3:26.15).

Cardinal rookie **Ella Eastin** took home three individual titles and contributed to one relay victory. She became the youngest swimmer to go sub-four minutes in the 400 IM (3:58.40), easily setting a NAG record in the process. Despite coming into the championships undefeated, Stanford placed second at the Conference championships with 1344 points, followed up by CALIFORNIA in third with 1306 points. Two weeks later, the Cardinal claimed a runner-up finish at NCAA Championships with 395 points.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Rachael Acker, California

Pac-12 tennis student-athletes swept the singles and doubles titles at the 2016 NCAA Tennis Championships. **Mackenzie McDonald** of UCLA won the men's singles crown and then paired with **Martin Redlicki** to take home the men's doubles championship. McDonald's singles title was the second in the last three years for UCLA after Marcos Giron won it in 2014 and is the Pac-12's 45th all-time. The duo claimed the Conferences' first men's doubles championship since USC in 2008 and the first for UCLA since 1996. The Pac-12 has now claimed 57 all-time NCAA doubles titles.

Six teams advanced to the postseason, with UCLA seeded third, USC seeded 10th, CALIFORNIA seeded 13th in the NCAA Tournament bracket, while OREGON, STANFORD and WASHINGTON also earned at-large berths in the tournament. Four teams advanced to the round of 16 while UCLA made it to the national quarterfinal and California went to the national semifinal. Individually, seven singles players qualified for the tournament, three of which made it to the second round. Three doubles teams earned berths and along with UCLA winning the title, **Filip Bergevi** and **Florian Lakat** of California made it to the national quarterfinal.

The 2016 Pac-12 Championships showcased some of the top collegiate tennis talent in Ojai, Calif., for the 71st year for the men. UCLA, the regular-season champions, also won the tournament title by defeating No. 3 seed California, 4-1. It marked UCLA's third tournament championship since the team format was established in 2012.

The men's coaches voted UCLA junior **Mackenzie McDonald** as the Men's Singles Player of the Year for the second-straight year. McDonald and Redlicki were selected as the Men's Doubles Team of the Year and **Logan Smith** of USC was the Men's Freshman/Newcomer of the Year. California head coach **Peter Wright** was the Men's Coach of the Year.

Men's players earning All-America honors were: McDonald, UCLA (Singles and Doubles); Martin Redlicki, UCLA (Doubles); Tom Fawcett, STAN (Singles); Filip Bergevi, CAL (Doubles); Florian Lakat, CAL (Doubles). McDonald was also named the 2016 ITA National Men's College Player of the Year.

STANFORD, the 2016 Pac-12 champion, claimed its 18th NCAA title in women's tennis and the Conference's 22nd by defeating No. 12 seed Oklahoma State, 4-3. After dropping the doubles point and facing the 3-1 deficit, the No. 15 seed Cardinal rallied for the win. It was the Cardinal's fourth win in the NCAA Tournament when losing the doubles point. This is Stanford's first title since 2013 and the Pac-12's third in the last four years. No. 1 seed CALIFORNIA made it to the national semifinal but fell short to the Cowgirls.

The Cardinal went 9-1 in Pac-12 play on the year, defeating USC in a make-up match the day before action began at the Pac-12 Championships to clinch the title. The Cardinal won, 4-2, and claimed its first Pac-12 Championship since 2012 and 25th overall.

Five teams picked up bids for the NCAA Tournament. Stanford won the title while California made it to the national semifinal. ARIZONA STATE, UCLA and USC all made it to the second round. On the women's singles side, California's **Maegan Manasse** and ARIZONA STATE's **Desirae Krawczyk** both made it to the round of 16. In the doubles competition, Manasse and teammate **Denise Starr**, the No. 4 seed, made it all the way to the championship match but came up short against Brooke Austin and Kourtney Keagan from Florida. UCLA's **Catherine Harrison** and **Kyle McPhillips** made it to the national semifinal but also lost to the Florida duo.

The Pac-12 Women's Championships saw California's Manasse win the singles title while Arizona State's **Alexandra Osborne** and **Ebony Panoho** won the doubles title.

The women's coaches voted California's Manasse as the Women's Singles Player of the Year, and voted Manasse and her teammate, **Denise Starr**, the Women's Doubles Team of the Year. California's **Olivia Hauger** was selected Women's Freshman/Newcomer of the Year, and Sun Devil head coach **Sheila McInerney** was the Women's Coach of the Year.

OREGON won the Pac-12 Men's Track & Field Championship for the 10th year in a row, winning in convincing fashion. Pac-12 Men's Track Athlete of the Year **Devon Allen** helped to lead the Ducks to the top of the podium claiming two individual titles and setting a meet-record in the 110-meter hurdles, en route to being named Pac-12 Men's Athlete of the Meet.

Three Pac-12 teams placed in the top 15 at the NCAA Championships, the Ducks finishing fourth after winning back-to-back titles in 2014 and 2015. USC was 12th in the final standings, followed by STANFORD at No. 13.

ARIZONA's **Pau Tonnesen** was voted the Pac-12 Men's Field Athlete of the Year for the second-straight year. Competing in the decathlon at the Rio Olympics this summer for Spain, he won the decathlon at the Pac-12 Championships for the second-straight year. A Wildcat has won the field honor for three-straight years and is the fourth time in the last five years. UO's Matthew Maton was the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year, becoming the third Duck in five years to win the honor.

OREGON's **Edward Cheserek** is one of three finalists for the prestigious Bowerman Award for the third-straight year. Cheserek has been impressive in his career, to say the least. Despite nagging injuries this season, he doubled in the 5,000-meter and 10,000-meter races for the second-straight year at the NCAA Championships, winning the 10k for the third year in a row.

Several from the Pac-12 received USTFCCA West Region recognition. WASHINGTON's **Izaic Yorks** was named Men's Athlete of the Year and Tonnesen was the Men's Field Athlete of the Year. UCLA coach **John Frazier** was the region's Men's Assistant Coach of the Year. UW's **Greg Metcalf** was named West Region Men's Coach of the Year and was voted Pac-12 Men's Coach of the Year by his peers, leading the Huskies to a second-place finish at the Pac-12 Championships, their best finish in 40 years.

PAC-12 MEN'S TRACK & FIELD SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Justin Brinkley, Stanford

OREGON won the Pac-12 Championships for the eighth-consecutive year then fell short of a second-straight NCAA title, just 10 points out of first place. Three Pac-12 women's teams placed in the top 10, STANFORD placing in a tie for seventh and USC was tied for ninth.

Oregon's **Hannah Cunliffe** was the Women's Athlete of the Meet at the Pac-12 Championships, pulling off an impressive performance that saw the transfer win individual titles in the 100-meter and 200-meter races. She was a member of the 4x100-meter squad that set the Conference-meet record, posting a winning time of 42.71. It was the same squad that earlier in the regular season recorded the third-fastest 4x100-meter time in NCAA history. Cunliffe was also voted Pac-12 Women's Track Athlete of the Year.

USC's **Amalie Iuel** was named Pac-12 Women's Field Athlete of the Year, becoming the first Trojan to win the honor since the inception of the award in 2005. Iuel won the Pac-12 heptathlon title for the second time in three years, also becoming just the seventh heptathlete in Pac-12 history to break the 6,000-point barrier.

Pac-12 Women's Freshman of the Year **Ariana Washington** had a historic ending to her collegiate debut. She became the first freshman to double in the 100 and 200 meters at the NCAA Championships, and was just the second for any class. She was the first freshman to win two individual events, the first freshman to win the 200 and was also just the second freshman ever to win the 100.

Stanford's **Olivia Baker** was named the USTFCCA West Region Athlete of the Year after recording the fastest collegiate time in the country this season in the 800. UO's Robert Johnson was voted the Pac-12 and West Region Women's Coach of the Year and **Curtis Taylor**, an assistant coach under Johnson, was named West Region Women's Assistant Coach of the Year.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S TRACK & FIELD SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Jaide Stepter, USC

For the fourth time in Pac-12 history, co-champions were crowned in women's volleyball with USC and WASHINGTON claiming a share of the regular-season title. The Trojans won the title for the fifth time in the program's history, while the Huskies claimed their fourth, including their second in the last three years.

Seven Pac-12 teams earned NCAA Tournament berths, marking the 16th-consecutive season at least six Conference teams advanced to the NCAA Tournament. USC garnered the No. 1 overall seed with four league teams in all earning a top-16 seed, including UW (No. 5), STANFORD (No. 8) and UCLA (No. 14).

Four teams ended the season ranked in the final AVCA Coaches poll, USC ending the season at No. 5 to lead the Conference. The Trojans started the season with a No. 22 preseason ranking but quickly moved up the poll to No. 1, spending four-consecutive weeks and six overall at that spot. All four teams were in the top 15 of the final poll, UW earning a No. 6 final ranking, while UCLA and STANFORD were No. 12 and 14, respectively. UW was No. 1 in the final regular-season poll and a Pac-12-record nine Conference teams were ranked in the preseason poll.

For the fifth time in six years, the AVCA's National Player of the Year was given to a Pac-12 player, USC's **Samantha Bricio** earning the honor this season. She became just the seventh player in Pac-12 history to record over 2,000 career kills. Entering the season already owning the Conference's career aces record, she shattered the career mark and became the only player in league history to get to 300. She was also voted the Pac-12 Player of the Year. Stanford's **Hayley Hodson** was the Conference's and AVCA's National Freshman of the Year, the first Cardinal to win the award and the second Pac-12 player in three years.

In addition to Bricio and Hodson's honors, league coaches voted Stanford's **Madi Bugg** the Pac-12 Setter of the Year and UCLA's **Taylor Formico** the Conference's Libero of the Year. Bugg is the recipient of the setter honor for the third-consecutive year. USC's **Mick Haley** was voted the Pac-12 Coach of the Year by his peers after leading the Trojans to a share of the title one season after finishing .500 on the season.

Eight player were named AVCA All-Americans, marking the 14th-straight year the Pac-12 had at least eight players selected: Bricio and **Lianna Sybeldon** of Washington were named to the first team; Hodson, Stanford's **Merete Lutz** and USC's **Alicia Ogoms** were on the second team; and third-team honors went to Bugg, Formico and Stanford's **Brittany Howard**.

OREGON STATE successfully defended its championship, winning its fifth-consecutive Pac-12 title in a year where 25 Pac-12 wrestlers earned berths to the NCAA Championships. The Beavers were tied with ARIZONA STATE and STANFORD with six qualifiers, CSU BAKERSFIELD had five, and BOISE STATE had two.

Pac-12 Wrestler of the Year **Amarveer Dhesi** finished fifth overall in the heavyweight class at NCAAs. Stanford's **Connor Schram** placed eighth in the 125 class. Pac-12 Wrestling Freshman/Newcomer of the Year **Joey McKenna** of Stanford took third place overall at 141 pounds and became the first freshman in program history to earn All-America accolades.

The Beavers claimed their fifth-straight title at the Pac-12 Championships despite only having one individual champion. That one champion, Dhesi, was also named the Outstanding Wrestler of the Meet. Head coach **Jim Zalesky** earned his fifth-consecutive Pac-12 Wrestling Coach of the Year honor and sixth in the past seven seasons as the Beavers claimed their fifth-straight Pac-12 title. The win marked the seventh Conference title in Zalesky's 10 seasons at the helm. Stanford (Schram, McKenna and **Jim Wilson**) and Arizona State (**Dalton Brady**, **Blake Stauffer** and **Josh DaSilveira**) each claimed three individual titles while Boise State won two (**Chris Castillo** and **Geordan Martinez**) and **Bryce Hammond** claimed CSU Bakersfield's lone title.

PAC-12 WRESTLING SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

(Capsule Reviews of 2015-16 Pac-12 Highlights in the MPSF)

MEN'S GYMNASTICS

Stanford earned its 10th top-three finish at the NCAA Championships in the past 11 seasons, as the Cardinal completed the season with a second-place finish at the national championships. Stanford went 24-3, registering 18 wins over top-10 opponents, and finishing in second place at MPSF Championships. California was ranked in the top ten throughout the season and finished third at MPSF Championships but ended their season at NCAA qualifiers.

MEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

OREGON won its third-straight NCAA indoor title. **Edward Cheserek** successfully doubled in the 3K and 5K and also ran the mile leg for the Distance Medley Relay team, having a hand in 30 of the team's 62 points. Cheserek was named the USTFCCCA National Track Athlete of the Year. **Devon Allen** won the NCAA Championship in the 60-meter hurdles, the first Duck to ever win the title in the event and in school-record fashion, clocking a time of 7.56. **Jax Thoires** of Washington won the NCAA title in the pole vault, helping Washington to a sixth-place finish in the event. USC won the MPSF Championship with five individual champions, including **Eric Sloan** who doubled in the long and triple jump.

WOMEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

Oregon was the MPSF Indoor Track & Field Champions and went on to win the NCAA Indoor Championship, its sixth title in the last seven years. The Ducks only had one individual champion at the NCAA Championships in **Raevyn Rogers** who won the 800-meter title. But the squad's depth proved to be the deciding factor with 12 different student-athletes scoring in seven events. The team race came down to the final event of the meet, the 4x400-meter relay. The Ducks had a mere five-point lead over Arkansas but were able to preserve the lead with their third-place finish. At the MPSF Championships, Oregon claimed five individual titles and dominated the meet, topping second place by 34.25 points.

WOMEN'S LACROSSE

USC made history as the MPSF's first NCAA quarterfinalist as a five-seed. The Trojans fell, 12-11 in an overtime decision to fourth-seeded Syracuse, giving USC its first loss (20-1) of the season. Joining the Trojans in the NCAA Tournament was STANFORD. The Cardinal fell, 14-8, to the Trojans at the L.A. Coliseum. Senior Trojan defender **Courtney Tarleton** was tapped as MPSF Player of the Year. USC allowed an NCAA best 5.41 gpg in the regular season, holding its opponents to fewer than 10 goals in 15 games. Tarleton led the MPSF in caused turnovers with a program record 44. MPSF Rookie of the Year honors went to Stanford's **Anna Salemo** as she led first-year players in the league in goals per game (1.94) and points per game (2.60). USC head coach **Lindsay Munday** won her second-straight MPSF Coach of the Year award, leading the Trojans to a program-record 20 wins. It was the longest streak in MPSF history and first 20-win campaign in league history as well.

MEN'S VOLLEYBALL

UCLA advanced to the national semifinal before losing to eventual champion Ohio State, 3-2. Stanford's **James Shaw**, a senior setter, was named MPSF Player of the Year. Shaw and UCLA's duo of Micah Ma'a and Jake Arnitz earned All-MPSF First-Team honors. Stanford's **Madison Hayden** and **Evan Enriquez** earned All-MPSF Second-Team honors along with UCLA's **Mitch Stahl**. Enriquez, Conrad Kaminski, Ma'a and Shaw earned AVCA Division I First-team All-America honors. Arnitz and Stahl claimed second-team All-America accolades.

MEN'S WATER POLO

It was one-two-three finish at NCAA Championships as UCLA brought home its 10th national title, USC finished second and CALIFORNIA finished third. The Bruins won their second-straight crown with a thrilling, 10-7 decision over six-time champion USC on the heels of multi-goal performances from **Ryder Roberts** and **Patrick Fellner**. Redshirt Junior **Garrett Danner** garnered MPSF Player of the Year honors, becoming UCLA's all-time saves leader. He helped the Bruins to a 31-game win streak and second-straight unbeaten MPSF season. The Golden Bears bested UC San Diego with a 20-9 victory for the third-place title.

WOMEN'S WATER POLO

USC won its fifth NCAA title, taking the throne from defending champion STANFORD in an 8-7 decision in favor of the Women of Troy. Junior driver **Stephania Haralabidis** scored the game-winning goal with six seconds left in the match to give USC its second undefeated season in program history and 125th all-time national championship. Haralabidis was tabbed as the NCAA Tournament MVP. Four Pac-12 squads claimed top-five finishes. Joining USC and Stanford was UCLA, who took third place, 5-4 over Michigan, and ARIZONA STATE took fifth place. The Pac-12 swept MPSF honors, as USC 22 year head coach **Jovan Vavic** was selected as Coach of the Year for the fifth time in his career, tying for most all-time in MPSF Women's Water Polo history. Freshman 2MD/Driver **Kat Klass** of Stanford was honored as MPSF Newcomer of the Year after tallying 41 goals and 1.58 goals per game in her rookie season. She joins five other Cardinal honorees in program history who have garnered the honor.
