Built on a firm foundation of academic excellence and superior athletic performance, the Conference ushered in a new era on July 1, 2011, officially becoming the Pac-12 Conference with the additions of the University of Colorado and University of Utah.

Just 27 days after the Conference officially changed its name, Commissioner Larry Scott announced the creation of the Pac-12 Networks on July 27, 2011, solidifying a landmark television deal and putting the Conference on the forefront of collegiate athletics. The Networks, including one national network, six regional networks, and a robust digital network marked the first-ever integrated media company owned by a college conference. In addition, the "TV Everywhere" rights allow fans to access Pac-12 Networks outside the home on any digital device, including smartphones and tablet computers.

That same year, the Pac-12 also launched its Globalization Initiative to proactively promote the Conference and member institutions through student-athlete exchanges and sport. In the first four years, Pac-12 student-athletes have enjoyed unique cultural and athletic experiences in China, fielding full university and Pac-12 all-star teams in women's volleyball and men's basketball, with the first-ever men's basketball regular season game schedule to be played in China between WASHINGTON and Texas to tip off the 2015-16 campaign. The Conference and its member schools have gained significant brand exposure for the future and set a foundation for growth.

On the field, the Pac-12 rises above the rest, upholding its tradition as the "Conference of Champions ®," claiming an incredible 140 NCAA team titles since 1999-2000, including nine in 2014-15, an average of nearly nine championships per academic year. Even more impressive has been the breadth of the Pac-12's success, with championships coming in 28 different men's and women's sports. The Pac-12 has led or tied the nation in NCAA Championships in 49 of the last 55 years, the only exceptions being in 1980-81, 1988-89, 1990-91 and 1995-96 when the Conference finished second, and only twice finished third in 1998-99 and 2004-05.

For the 10th-consecutive year, the Pac-12 had the most or tied for the most NCAA titles of any conference in the country, winning at least six every year since 2000-01. No other conference has won double-digit NCAA crowns in a single year, the Pac-12 doing so seven times, including a record 14 in 1996-97.

Spanning nearly a century of outstanding athletics achievements, the Pac-12 was the first conference to reach 400 championships in 2010-11. With the inclusion of Colorado and Utah, the Conference surpassed another major milestone, with league teams capturing 450 titles, outdistancing the next conference by nearly 200. In all, Conference teams have won 478 NCAA Championships (291 men's, 158 women's, 29 combined).

Pac-12 members have won 291 NCAA team championships on the men's side, 77 more than the next closest conference. Men's NCAA crowns have come at a phenomenal rate for the Pac-12 - 16 basketball titles by six schools (more than any other conference), 54 tennis titles, 47 outdoor track & field crowns, and 28 baseball titles. Pac-12 members have won 25 of 46 NCAA titles in volleyball, 41 of 46 in water polo, 29 in skiing, and 24 in swimming & diving national championships.

Individually, the Conference has produced an impressive number of NCAA individual champions. Over 2,000 (2,211) individual crowns have been won by Pac-12 student-athletes over the years with 1,334 by male student-athletes. Student-athletes have also captured 175 individual titles at combined championships (ie., skiing and fencing).

On the women's side, the story is much the same. Since the NCAA began conducting women's championships 34 years ago, Pac-12 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season on 25 occasions, including 15-consecutive years from 2000-2015. Overall, the Pac-12 has captured 158 NCAA women's titles, easily outdistancing the SEC, which is second with 97. Pac-12 members have dominated a number of sports, winning 23 softball titles, 21 tennis crowns, 14 volleyball titles, 16 of the last 26 trophies in golf, and 14 in swimming & diving.

Pac-12 women student-athletes shine nationally on an individual basis, as well, having captured an unmatched 702 NCAA individual crowns, an average of nearly 21 championships per season.

The Pac-12's excellence is further proven in the annual Division I Learfield Sports Directors' Cup competition, the prestigious award that honors the best overall collegiate athletics programs in the country. STANFORD continued its remarkable run and won a remarkable 21st-consecutive Directors' Cup in 2014-15 leading the Pac-12 to an unprecedented 1-2-3 finish in the final standings. Seven Pac-12 member institutions ranked among the top-30 Division I programs, tying for the most of any conference, and five were in the top 15: No. 1 STANFORD, No. 2 UCLA, No. 3 USC, No. 12 CALIFORNIA and No. 13 OREGON. At least five member institutions have been ranked in the top 20 in all but one year of the Director's Cup program, with seven appearing in the top 20 on five different occasions (1998, 2001, 2003, 2005 and 2006).

2014-15 REVIEW

The Conference's nine NCAA titles came in the form of four men's and four women's, and one combined team title. Five different league schools claimed NCAA titles and, of the seven NCAA institutions to have won multiples titles,

three were from the Pac-12. No other conference in the country had more than one team win multiple NCAA titles.

OREGON was one of only two programs in the country to win three NCAA titles this academic season. The Ducks successfully defended its indoor and outdoor NCAA Track & Field titles, and also won the women's outdoor crown for the first time in 30 years. It is the second straight year UO has won three national titles in an academic year. COLORADO and STANFORD each claimed a pair of titles, as well. The Buffaloes claimed the academic year's first NCAA title, taking home its second-straight men's cross country crown in dominating fashion, posting a 33-point margin of victory. Colorado then grabbed the hardware in skiing, their third in five years. STANFORD extended its streak of winning NCAA Championships to 39 years, winning the women's water polo championship for a second-straight year and the program's first-ever women's golf crown.

In addition to the nine national championships, the Pac-12 also had runners-up in 11 NCAA Championship events: men's cross country (STANFORD), men's soccer (UCLA), men's water polo (USC), women's gymnastics (UTAH), men's gymnastics (STANFORD), men's swimming (CALIFORNIA), women's indoor track & field (OREGON), men's golf (USC), rowing (CALIFORNIA), women's tennis (UCLA) and women's water polo (UCLA). Overall, the Conference had 31 teams finish in the top four at 19 NCAA Championship events, including an all-Pac-12 women's water polo final four.

Participation in the postseason was a common occurrence for the Pac-12 in 2014-15. Of the 22 sports sponsored by the Conference, 20 witnessed at least half its teams participating in NCAA or other postseason action. The men sent 67 of a possible 97 teams into the postseason (69.1 percent), while the women sent 79 of a possible 115 teams (68.7 percent).

Eight Pac-12 teams earned bowl bids with Pac-12 Champion OREGON reaching the inaugural College Football Playoff Championship Game. League teams produced a 6-3 record, equaling the record for wins achieved in 2013 when the Conference had a league-record eight teams play in bowl games for the second-straight year. Despite losing in the title game, the Ducks produced the only 13-win season on record in Pac-12 history. For the first time in league history, four teams won 10 or more games, while six had at least nine wins. A record-tying eight teams boasted a winning record for the third-consecutive year. UO claimed the Pac-12 crown for the second time in four years by virtue of a 51-13 win over South Division Champion ARIZONA. The Pac-12 Football Championship Game was held at a neutral site for the first time in the Game's brief four-year history and was played at the new Levi's Stadium in Santa Clara, Calif. The Wildcats went on to play in the VIZIO Fiesta Bowl. Also joining Oregon and UA in the postseason were UTAH (Royal Purple Las Vegas Bowl), ARIZONA STATE (Hyundai Bowl), USC (National University Holiday Bowl), STANFORD (Foster Farms Bowl), UCLA (Valero Alamo Bowl) and WASHINGTON (TicketCity Cactus Bowl). Six Pac-12 teams appeared in the final Associated Press poll marking the second time in league history that six teams were in the final ranking. The teams in the top 25 were: Oregon (2), UCLA (10), Arizona State (12), Arizona (19), USC (20) and Utah (21).

Seven Pac-12 men's basketball teams participated in the postseason with ARIZONA earning the Conference's automatic bid after winning the tournament title at the MGM Grand Garden Arena in Las Vegas, the team's first tournament title since 2002. The Wildcats also captured their 14th regular-season crown. OREGON, UCLA and UTAH were also selected to play in the NCAA Tournament. The Bruins and Utes reached the Sweet Sixteen while the Wildcats advanced to the Elite Eight for the second straight year. For the second-straight year, Pac-12 teams had eight NCAA Tournament wins. ARIZONA STATE and STANFORD participated in the NIT, and the Cardinal swept through the post-season and won its third NIT crown and second in four seasons. COLORADO was a participant in the CBI.

The Pac-12 women's basketball season also produced historic moments, including OREGON STATE capturing the program's first-ever Pac-12 regular-season title also claiming the No. 1 seed in the Pac-12 Tournament at KeyArena in Seattle, Wash. It was the first time in the history of the event STANFORD was not the top seed. However, the Cardinal still went on to win its 11th Conference title as the No. 3 seed overall. Five league squads earned NCAA Tournament berths for the second-consecutive year, while two more participated in the WNIT with UCLA claiming its first-ever WNIT crown. ARIZONA STATE reached the Sweet Sixteen and CALIFORNIA and WASHINGTON also participated in the Big Dance. Four teams appeared in the final top-25 of the Associated Press poll: ASU (9), OSU (10), Stanford (14) and Cal (24). It marked the first time the Beavers were in the final poll since 1995-96. WASHINGTON STATE also made its second-straight postseason appearance, joining the Bruins in the WNIT.

Pac-12 volleyball also had an unprecedented season with a league-record 10 teams earning NCAA Tournament berths, a year after a then-league best nine teams advanced to the tournament in 2013. Five teams received a top-16 seed as STANFORD nabbed the top seed, while all 10 won their first-round match. The Pac-12 also set a new league record for most teams ranked in the final poll with nine teams appearing in the final AVCA top 25. The Cardinal won its 16th Pac-12 crown and advanced to the national semifinal for the first time since 2008 marking the 15th time in 17 years a Pac-12 team has advanced

that far. With 15-straight years of at least six Conference teams earning NCAA bids, the Pac-12 has dominated the sport, winning a record 14 NCAA volleyball titles since 1982, including 12 in the last 24 years.

In baseball, UCLA won its third regular-season title in five years and were the No. 1 overall seed at the 64-team NCAA Tournament. Five additional teams earned bids: OREGON STATE, USC, CALIFORNIA, ARIZONA STATE and OREGON. The Trojans, Bruins and Bears each reached the NCAA Regional finals. UCLA was ranked No. 7 by Baseball America in its final poll, one of three Pac-12 teams in the publication's final top-25, joining No. 20 USC and No. 22 California. The Pac-12 has, by far, won the most baseball national titles of any conference in the country, claiming 28 titles dating back to 1947, including two of the last four when the league had back-to-back champions in 2012 (Arizona) and 2013 (UCLA).

Another sport in which the Pac-12 Conference has dominated is softball where league teams have claimed 23 NCAA titles in the 34-year history of the championship. Pac-12 teams captured an unprecedented nine in a row from 1988-1997, then most recently claimed six-straight from 2006-11. Seven teams participated in the tournament in 2015, marking the 19th-straight season the Pac-12 has had five or more teams advance to the postseason, and has had at least three berths every year since the league began sponsoring the sport in 1987. Pac-12 Champion OREGON and UCLA advanced to the NCAA Women's College World Series, while ARIZONA advanced as far as the Super Regional.

PAC-12 CONFERENCE HISTORY

The roots of the Pac-12 Conference date back nearly 100 years to December 2, 1915, when the Pacific Coast Conference (PCC) was founded at a meeting at the Oregon Hotel in Portland, Ore. The original membership consisted of four schools - the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Washington, the University of Oregon, and Oregon State College (now Oregon State University). All still are charter members of the Conference.

Pacific Coast Conference play began in 1916 and, one year later, Washington State College (now Washington State University) was accepted into the league, with Stanford University following in 1918.

In 1922, the PCC expanded to eight teams with the admission of the University of Southern California (USC) and the University of Idaho. In 1924, the University of Montana joined the league roster and in 1928, the PCC grew to 10 members with the addition of UCLA.

The Pacific Coast Conference competed as a 10-member league until 1950, with the exception of 1943-45 when World War II curtailed intercollegiate athletic competition to a minimum. During that time, the league's first commissioner was named. Edwin N. Atherton was Commissioner in 1940 and was succeeded by Victor O. Schmidt in 1944. In 1950, Montana resigned from the Conference and the PCC continued as a nine-team Conference through 1958.

In 1959, the PCC was dissolved and the Athletic Association of Western Universities (AAWU) was formed with Thomas J. Hamilton was appointed Commissioner of the new league. The original AAWU membership included California, Stanford, USC, UCLA and Washington. Washington State joined the membership in 1962, while Oregon and Oregon State joined in 1964. Under Hamilton's watch, the name Pacific-8 Conference was adopted in 1968. In 1971, Wiles Hallock took over as Commissioner of the Pac-8.

Ten years later, on July 1, 1978, the University of Arizona and Arizona State University were admitted to the league and the Pacific-10 Conference became a reality. In 1986-87, the league took on a new look, expanding to include 10 women's sports. Since then, the Conference has been considered the premiere league in women's athletics, securing the most NCAA titles in women's sports of any conference nearly every year.

Thomas C. Hansen was named the Commissioner of the Pac-10 in 1983, a role he would hold for 26 years until 2009, and was succeeded by current Commissioner Larry Scott, who took on the new role in July 2009.

During the 2010-11 academic year, the University of Colorado accepted its invitation to join the Pac-12 on June 11, 2010, and on June 17, 2010, the University of Utah agreed to join the Conference. The Buffaloes and Utes officially became the 11th and 12th members of the Conference on July 1, 2011, the first additions to the league since 1978.

It was during that 2010-11 academic year that Scott helped deliver monumental changes that transformed the Conference into a modern 12-team league. In addition to expanding to 12 teams, member institutions agreed to equal revenue sharing for the first time in the Conference's history, created two divisions - the North and the South, for football only and established a Football Championship Game for the first time ever. He also secured a landmark media rights deal that dramatically increased national exposure and revenue for each school, establishing the Pac-12 Networks and Pac-12 Digital Network that guaranteed enhanced exposure across all sports.

Currently, the Pac-12 sponsors 11 men's sports and 12 women's sports, with beach volleyball added in 2015-16. Additionally, the Conference is a member of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) in four other men's sports and three women's sports.

The Pac-12 Conference offices are located in the heart of San Francisco in the SOMA district.

PAC-12 TOPS FINAL LEARFIELD DIRECTORS' CUP

SAN FRANCISCO - The STANFORD Cardinal captured their 21st-consecutive Directors' Cup in leading the Pac-12 Conference to an unprecedented 1-2-3 finish in the final 2014-15 Division I Learfield Sports Directors' Cup standings, the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) announced.

Led by a pair of spring NCAA titles in women's golf and women's water polo, Stanford won its 21st-consecutive Cup. Six top three finishes, and eight top five finishes propelled the Cardinal in tallying an impressive 1,448.00 points.

UCLA finished second (1,236.00 points) for the seventh time and for the first time since a three-year run as runner-up from 2006-08. The Bruins captured the men's water polo title in the fall, and posted runner-up finishes in men's soccer, women's tennis and women's water polo. USC placed third overall, its best finish ever in the Directors' Cup, with 1,209.00 points. The Trojans collected top-four finishes in six championships during the 2014-15 year. Behind its national title in women's swimming, as well as runner-up finishes in rowing and men's swimming, CALIFORNIA placed 12th with 937.25 points. OREGON benefited with three NCAA titles (men's indoor track and field, men's and women's outdoor track and field) and placed 13th with 933.50 points, while WASHINGTON placed 24th with 756.75 points.

ARIZONA STATE and ARIZONA finished 30th (683.30) and 36th (566.25), respectively. COLORADO, which added a pair of NCAA titles in men's cross country and skiing, finished 43rd with 539.50 points, UTAH was 56th overall (445.00), followed by OREGON STATE (65th, 334.25) and WASHINGTON STATE (tied 170th, 91.00).

The success of the Pac-12 in the Directors' Cup was bolstered by the capturing of nine NCAA titles, most among all conferences. In addition, eight Pac-12 league members finished among the top four in 19 NCAA championships.

The Directors' Cup was developed as a joint effort between the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and USA Today. Points are awarded based on each institution's finish in up to 20 sports - 10 women's and 10 men's.

UCLA won its third regular-season title in five years and were the No. 1 overall seed at the 64-team NCAA Regional field. OREGON STATE, USC, CALIFORNIA, ARIZONA STATE and OREGON each earned an at-large bid as well into the NCAA field. The Trojans, Bruins and Bears each reached the NCAA Regional finals. Oregon was the last one into the NCAA's after winning five-straight weekend series to close out the year.

UCLA was ranked No. 7 by Baseball America in its final poll, one of three Pac-12 teams in the Durham publication's top-25, joining No. 20 USC and No. 22 California. Collegiate Baseball featured four in its final top-30, UCLA (No. 17), OSU (No. 18), Cal (No. 23) and USC (No. 24). Eight teams at one point or another were ranked in the top-25 this year.

Arizona's **Scott Kingery**, the first two-time Conference batting champion (.392) since Brett Wallace in 2007-08, was named the Pac-12 Player of the Year. UCLA closer **David Berg** was the Pitcher of the Year while his coach **John Savage** was named the Pac-12 Coach of the Year. RBI champion **KJ Harrison** from Oregon State was named the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year, while USC catcher **Garrett Stubbs** was the Defensive Player of the Year. Arizona's **Kevin Newman**, and Arizona State's **Ryan Kellogg** were both three-time first team picks, Berg was named to the first team all four seasons. WASHINGTON starter **Tyler Davis** was named baseball's Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

Berg was named a first team All-American in four of five publications while Kingery was a first teamer on three teams. Berg, Kingery and Newman were all named on all five teams.

Berg was named the NCBWA Stopper of the Year for the second-straight year, setting the NCAA record for appearances (175) and leading the Pac-12 in ERA (0.68). Stubbs was named the Johnny Bench Award winner for the nation's top catcher and along with Oregon third baseman **Mitchell Tolman** were both named to the nine-man ABCA Gold Glove team.

During this year's draft, the Pac-12 saw 53 players drafted headlined by first-round picks UCLA starter **James Kaprielian** (16th overall) and Kingery (19th). Twenty-four players were drafted over the first 10 rounds. The Pac-12 also saw a first round pick for the 19th-straight year (1997-2015).

Arizona Coach **Andy Lopez**, after 33 years, announced his retirement on Memorial Day. He led the Wildcats for the past 14 years, including two CWS appearances and the 2012 national title. A three-time National Coach of the Year, Lopez also led Pepperdine to the 1992 title. He finished with a career record of 1177-742-7 (.613). Arizona hired Nevada Head Coach **Jay Johnson** to replace Lopez. Long-time Oregon State assistant and former Oklahoma State assistant **Marty Lees** was tabbed to lead the WASHINGTON STATE program in his first head coaching assignment.

The ARIZONA Wildcats captured their 14th Pac-12 regular season title, and then won their fifth Pac-12 Tournament title as they defeated OREGON in the championship game, 80-52. It was their first Pac-12 Tournament crown since 2002.

Seven teams participated in the postseason. ARIZONA, OREGON, UCLA and UTAH were selected to participate in NCAA Tournament where the Wildcats advanced to the Elite Eight for the second straight year. ARIZONA STATE and STANFORD were selected for the NIT. Stanford swept through the postseason and earned its third NIT title, and second in four seasons. COLORADO was a participant in the CBI.

Pac-12 Player of the Year honors went to Oregon's **Joseph Young**, who averaged 20.7 points, averaged 2.5 three-point field goals per game and shot 92.5 percent from the free throw line. Arizona's **Stanley Johnson** picked up Freshman of the Year honors after he led the Wildcats with 13.8 points per game, while pulling down 6.5 rebounds per game. OREGON STATE junior G **Gary Payton II** earned Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year after recording a league-best 95 steals (3.1 spg). His father earned the same honor for the Beavers in 1987. WASHINGTON STATE sophomore F **Josh Hawkinson** led the Pac-12 in rebounds (10.8 avg) and collected Most Improved Player of the Year honors. STANFORD senior G **Chasson Randle** earned Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year, and went on to earn CoSIDA Academic All-America honors. Oregon coach **Dana Altman** was tabbed Pac-12 Coach of the Year. Altman led Oregon to its fourth consecutive 20-win season and third straight NCAA Tournament appearance.

Utah senior G **Delon Wright** was named the Bob Cousy Award winner honoring the nation's top point guard. Arizona's Stanley Johnson was named the Julius Erving Award winner honoring the nation's top small forward. Wright earned numerous All-America honors including The Sporting News First Team and John Wooden All-America Team selections. Johnson, Oregon's Young and Stanford's Randle also picked up All-America accolades.

Seven Pac-12 players were selected in the 2015 NBA Draft, third among all conferences, including four in the first round. Arizona's Johnson led the way as the No. 8 overall pick going to Detroit. Over the last three drafts, a total of 23 Pac-12 players representing nine of the Conference's 12 member institutions have been selected, including 13 first round picks.

The Pac-12 closed another successful chapter with another history-making campaign. OREGON STATE captured the program's first-ever Pac-12 regular-season crown, while STANFORD claimed its 11th Conference tournament title. Five Pac-12 teams earned NCAA Tournament berths for the second-consecutive year, while two more participated in the WNIT with UCLA claiming the WNIT title. Four players were tabbed Associated Press second- or third-team All-Americans and four were picked in the WNBA Draft.

Four league teams appeared in the final top-25 polls. Advancing to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen, ARIZONA STATE ended the season ranked in the top 25 for the first time since 2008-09, ranking No. 9 by the AP poll and No. 8 in the WBCA Coaches poll. It is the first time since 2006-07 the Sun Devils were in the top 10 in the final polls. OSU was No. 10, its first time in the final polling since 1995-96, and No. 13 in the coaches poll. The Cardinal was No. 14 in both, and CALIFORNIA was tabbed No. 24 by the writers.

Cal's **Brittany Boyd** earned national recognition, beginning with second-team AP All-America honors and was selected a member of the WBCA All-America squad. Teammate **Reshanda Gray**, OREGON's **Jillian Alleyne** and OSU's **Ruth Hamblin** were third team honorees. Hamblin is the first OSU player to nab All-America nods in nearly two decades. Beavers head coach **Scott Rueck** repeated as the WBCA Region 8 Coach of the Year.

The league's coaches voted Gray the Pac-12 Player of the Year, the first Golden Bear to earn the honor since 2007. The media differed in their player of the year pick, voting Oregon State's Ruth Hamblin. The coaches and media agreed on their other major awards, selecting UCLA's **Jordin Canada** the Conference's Freshman of the Year; Hamblin was the Defensive Player of the Year and Rueck was the Coach of the Year.

In addition to Stanford and Oregon State participating in the Big Dance, ASU, Cal and WASHINGTON earned NCAA Tournament bids. The Sun Devils were joined by the Cardinal in the Sweet Sixteen. The Huskies' NCAA tourney appearance this season was their first since 2007. WASHINGTON STATE also participated in the postseason, earning a spot in the WNIT.

Hamblin and UTAH's **Taryn Wicijowski** were also just as impressive off the court this season, earning a place on the Capital One CoSIDA Academic All-America team with Wicijowski being voted to the first team and Hamblin to the second team. Wicijowski was also named the Pac-12 Women's Basketball Scholar-Athlete of the Year. A biology and psychology major with a 3.98 grade point average, she became just the sixth player in school history to tally at least 1,700 points and 900 rebounds in a career.

Ranked No. 1 in the country every week of the season, COLORADO won its fifth NCAA title all-time, all coming since 2001 under head coach **Mark Wetmore**. The Buffaloes put three runners in the top 10 to easily claim their second-straight crown with 65 points, the lowest winning score since 2005. The Buffs outpaced second-place STANFORD, which scored 98 points. OREGON finished sixth while UCLA (19) and WASHINGTON (20) also had top-20 finishes.

Oregon sophomore **Edward Cheserek** and senior teammate **Eric Jenkins** crossed the finish line 1-2, respectively, a first for any program in 25 years. Cheserek repeated as champion making him the first repeat winner since the legendary Steve Prefontaine did so in 1970 and 1971.

The Buffaloes had all five scoring runners finish in the top eight to win the Pac-12 crown for a fourth-straight year. Colorado has not lost the men's title since joining the Conference in 2011. Cheserek also defended his 2013 individual crown, en route to earning Pac-12 Athlete of the Year honors. WASHINGTON's **Colby Gilbert** was tabbed the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year after becoming the highest-freshman finisher.

Cheserek was voted the USTFCCA National Athlete of the Year and Wetmore was named USTFCCA National Men's Coach of the Year.

A race that featured six ranked teams, including three in the top 10, OREGON won its second Pac-12 Championship in three years as all of its runners placed in the top 20, including five in the top 15. The Ducks scored 54 points, 20 points better than second-place STANFORD and COLORADO was third with 82 points. ARIZONA STATE's **Shelby Houlihan** was the individual winner, becoming the first Sun Devil to win the league crown since Amy Hastings in 2004. Houlihan was also the Conference's top finisher at the NCAA Championships, placing ninth overall.

Houlihan was named the Pac-12 Athlete of the Year and Stanford's **Elise Cranny** was the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year for being the top freshman placer. Four freshman crossed the finish line in the top six of the Pac-12 meet. The league's coaches also voted UO's **Robert Johnson** the Pac-12 Women's Coach of the Year.

Houlihan was named the USTFCCCA West Region Athlete of the Year and COLORADO's **Mark Wetmore** was named the USTFCCCA Mountain Region Women's Coach of the Year.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Stephanie Bulder, Arizona

Pac-12 football was a major factor in the debut season of the College Football Playoff as the Pac-12 Champion OREGON Ducks reached the inaugural CFP Championship Game following a convincing 59-20 victory over Florida State in the CFP Semifinal hosted by the Rose Bowl. Despite dropping the CFP Championship Game to Ohio State (42-20), Oregon produced the first 13-win season in Pac-12 history.

The Pac-12 Football Championship Game was played at a neutral site (Levi's Stadium, Santa Clara) for the first time in the FCG's brief four-year history. Oregon, representing the North Division for the second time in four years, rolled to a 51-13 victory over ARIZONA. Junior QB **Marcus Mariota**, the FCG's Most Valuable Player, completed 25-of-38 passes for 313 yards and 2 TDs, while running for 33 yards and another 3 TDs. The Wildcats, who had knocked off Oregon earlier in the season, made their first FCG appearance. Despite the loss in the FCG, Arizona remained in the CFP top eight and were selected to play in the Fiesta Bowl. In all, eight Pac-12 teams participated in the postseason and produced a 6-3 record, equaling the record of six wins achieved in 2013. For the third consecutive season, a record-tying eight teams produced winning records. And for the first time in league history, four teams won 10 or more games, while six teams won nine or more games.

Mariota, the Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Year and a unanimous All-America honoree, became the league's most decorated player with six individual awards - Heisman Trophy, Davey O'Brien Award, Walter Camp Award, Maxwell Award, Associated Press Player of the Year and the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award. ARIZONA sophomore LB **Scooby Wright III** was named the Pac-12's Pat Tillman Defensive Player of the Year. Wright was a unanimous All-America selection and was bestowed national defensive player of the year honors with the Bednarik Award and Bronco Nagurski Award. The league also recognized Oregon RB **Royce Freeman** (1,365 rushing yard/18 TDs) as the Pac-12 Offensive Freshman of the Year and USC DB **Adoreé Jackson** (45 tackles/10 PBU/29.7 KOR avg/2 KOR TDs) as the Pac-12 Defensive Freshman of the Year. ARIZONA STATE senior QB **Taylor Kelly** was recognized as the Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year (3.31 gpa - Educational Studies (U.)/Legal Studies (Grad.)). UTAH senior DE **Nate Orchard** was presented with the Morris Trophy as the league's top defensive lineman (voted on by the Pac-12 offensive lineman), while STANFORD junior LT **Andrus Peat** was honored with the Morris Trophy as the league's top offensive lineman (as voted on by the Pac-12 defensive lineman). Arizona head coach **Rich Rodriguez** was named the Pac-12 Coach of the Year after guiding the Wildcats to their first Pac-12 South Division title and the school's first 10-win season since 1998. Fourteen different players earned first team All-America honors, which is believed to be a record for the Pac-12. Among the major All-America teams selections, the 14 Pac-12 players honored were more than any other conference (SEC - 11, Big Ten - 8, ACC - 6, Big 12 - 6).

The Pac-12 continued to make a name for itself on the collegiate golf scene as the Conference advanced six teams to the NCAA Championship for the second straight year. The USC Trojans had their sights set on capturing the school's first-ever men's golf title as they advanced to the championship match, but fell to LSU. Six teams were ranked among the top 20 in the final *GolfWeek* rankings (No. 5 STANFORD, No. 10 ARIZONA STATE, No. 13 USC, No. 14 UCLA, No. 16 OREGON, and No. 17 WASHINGTON). Additionally, three individuals found themselves ranked among the top four in *Golfstat's* final individual rankings, led by Washington's **Cheng-Tsung Pan** at No. 2, Stanford's **Maverick McNealy** at No. 3 and Arizona State's **Jon Rahm** at No. 4. USC's **Sean Crocker** was the nation's highest-ranked freshman coming in at No. 14 overall. Pan was the Pac-12's top individual finisher at the NCAA Championship, finishing second (7-under, 281).

Stanford successfully defended its Pac-12 title by posting a 14-stroke victory at the Palouse Ridge Golf Club in Pullman, Wash. The Cardinal trailed by 14 strokes heading into the fourth round, but were led by McNealy's course record-tying final round of 9-under 61 to cruise to victory. McNealy posted a Pac-12 Championship record four round low score of 262 (18-under) to earn Pac-12 medalist honors with a 10-stroke victory over OREGON freshman **Aaron Wise** (8-under 272).

McNealy was named the Pac-12 Men's Golfer of the Year, Crocker of USC was tabbed Pac-12 Freshman of the Year and Arizona State coach **Tim Mickelson** picked up Pac-12 Coach of the Year honors for the first time in his career. McNealy also became Stanford's third recipient of the Jack Nicklaus Award, which recognizes the top players at the Division I, II, III, NAIA and NJCAA levels, joining former Stanford golfer Tiger Woods, who earned the honor in 1996, and last year's winner Patrick Rodgers. He also picked up the Fred Haskins Award as the College Golfer of the Year. Arizona State's Rahm won the prestigious Ben Hogan Award, which is presented annually to the nation's top collegiate men's golfer, taking into account all collegiate and amateur competitions during the past 12-month period. McNealy and Rahm were joined by Washington's Pan and Arizona State's **Max Rottluff** in being named Division I PING First Team All-Americans. Second Team honors went to UCLA's **Jonathan Garrick**, while USC's Crocker picked up Third Team honors.

Pac-12 Women's Golf excelled at a high level during the 2014-15 campaign. Six Pac-12 teams advanced to the NCAA Championships, with four of those finishing amongst the top eight, and it was STANFORD who took home the coveted national championship for the first time in school history.

The NCAA introduced match-play format to this year's NCAA Championships where the top eight teams after four rounds of stroke play advanced to match play. Four Pac-12 teams were pitted against each other in one half of the bracket, with USC against Washington and Stanford facing Arizona in the opening round. The Cardinal and the Trojans proceeded to the national semi-finals, where a 3-2-0 score advanced Stanford to the final day. Back-to-back birdies on the final two holes from two-time All-American, **Mariah Stackhouse**, forced a sudden death playoff ultimately leading to the team's championship.

The Pac-12 Women's Golf Championships were played on the lengthy Boulder Country Club course which challenged the field. With four teams within three strokes entering the final round, ARIZONA was able to come away with the program's eighth Conference championship and first in five years. Landing in second, Oregon had its best finish ever in the Pac-12 Championship. That effort was led by individual medalist, **Caroline Inglis**, who led after the first round with a career-best 4-under par 67 and then matched that total in the third round to finish 7-under par 206 (67-72-67). She became the first golfer in Pac-12 Women's Golf Championship history to shoot 206, besting the standing record by one stroke.

UCLA sophomore **Bronte Law** was named Pac-12 Golfer of the Year. She posted 16 rounds under par, with nine rounds of 69 or better. Her 71.91 stroke average led the Pac-12 and was seventh nationally. ARIZONA's **Krystal Quihuis** took home Freshman of the Year honors after posting five top-10 finishes and was named All-Pac-12 Honorable Mention. In only her third year in the role, Stanford head coach **Anne Walker** was named Pac-12 Coach of the Year. Her mentoring of some of the nation's best talent lead her team to their first ever national title in 2015. The Cardinal are the fifth Pac-12 women's golf program to collect a national crown.

Law, Stanford's **Lauren Kim** and Arizona State's **Monica Vaughn** were honored by the WGCA as First Team All-America selections.

The Pac-12 had a strong year in women's gymnastics with four teams participating in the NCAA Semifinals and seven of the eight Conference teams being ranked in the top 25 in the nation in the final rankings.

Three of the four individual event national championships went to Pac-12 gymnasts with UTAH's **Georgia Dabritz** winning on the bars, UCLA's **Samantha Peszek** winning on the beam, and STANFORD's **Elizabeth Price** winning on the vault. Peszek also claimed a share of the all-around national title as well. In addition to Dabritz, Price, and Peszek, 14 other Pac-12 gymnasts earned All-America honors at NCAA Championships.

Utah finished a very close second (197.800) in the NCAA Super Six Team Finals and held the No. 3 spot in the final rankings. Stanford also participated in the Super Six, finishing fifth in the nation. OREGON STATE and UCLA were present at the NCAA Semifinals but did not advance to the Super Six.

Utah claimed the 2015 Pac-12 Women's Gymnastics Championship for the second year in a row and the second time since joining the Pac-12. The Utes won the title in front of their home crowd at the Huntsman Center on the campus of the University of Utah. The Utes recorded a 198.150 to capture first place and UCLA came in second with a total of 197.350, while Stanford took third with a 197.175.

Utah was lead to victory by senior standout Dabritz who won the 2015 All-Around Pac-12 title with a total of 39.775. Dabritz also was part of a three-way tie for first on the floor, tied for second on the beam, tied for second on the bars, and claimed second on the vault. Fellow Utah senior Tory Wilson scored a 10.0 on vault to win the Pac-12 vault title but was later injured during her floor exercise and was unable to finish the meet. Additionally, Utah senior Corrie Lothrop came away with the Pac-12 title on the uneven bars with a score of 9.950.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S GYMNASTICS SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Georgia Dabritz, Utah

WASHINGTON continued its dominance of men's collegiate rowing, capturing its fifth-straight national title by sweeping the grand finals at the IRA National Championships. The sweep marked only the third time in regatta history that the races have been won by one team. The championship was the 18th for the Huskies, whose five titles in a row mark a feat unmatched by any other collegiate rowing team in history. Washington also claimed the Ten Eyck Trophy for an unprecedented eighth-straight season, extending its IRA record. CALIFORNIA medaled in four of the five races during the IRA Grand Finals, including a second-place finish in the varsity eight, the freshman eight, and the varsity four, and a third-place finish in the third varsity eight. Washington and California were the only two teams in the regatta to qualify for participation in all five IRA Grand Finals. STANFORD also medaled in the national championship, earning bronze in the Varsity Four Grand Final.

Washington successfully defended its Conference title at the Pac-12 Rowing Championships on Lake Natoma, hoisting the team trophy for the sixth year in a row. The Huskies swept every race of the day and came away with a total of 72 points. California finished second overall at Pac-12 Championships for the second year in a row, with a point total of 63. The Golden Bears placed second behind the Huskies in each of the five races of the day. OREGON STATE placed third in team standings for the second year in a row, earning 50 points and third place in three of the five races on the day. Stanford finished just behind Oregon State with a total of 49 points and a third-place finish in the varsity eight, followed by WASHINGTON STATE in fifth and COLORADO in sixth.

California sophomore **Justin Murphy** earned Men's Rowing Athlete of the Year honors, after earning Newcomer of the Year honors in 2014. The Montclair, N.J. native has been an integral part of the No. 2 team in the nation and specifically the varsity eight this past year. After a solid freshman year, Murphy competed for the USA Under-23 team, stroking the four to a sixth-place finish. Murphy is currently in the six-seat of the Golden Bears' varsity eight and is positioned to make the step up to the USA Senior team this summer. **Jesse Maritz** of Oregon State was tabbed the Newcomer of the Year, making an immediate impact on the Beaver crew in his freshman year. Maritz posted one of the top scores on the erg in school history for a freshman, then slotted into the varsity eight and made the boat faster.

Washington's **Michael Callahan** earned top coaching honors for the sixth year in the row. Callahan, in his eighth year at Washington, led the team to a sweep at both Pac-12 Championships and IRA Championships, marking the Huskies' sixth-straight Conference title and fifth-straight national one. Under Callahan, the Huskies have experienced an unprecedented level of success, winning the Ten Eyck Award during each of his eight seasons at the helm.

CALIFORNIA earned a second-place finish at the NCAA Championships at Lake Natoma for the third-consecutive year. This marks the eighth year in a row that the Golden Bears have finished the NCAA Championships in the top three. No. 2 California came in second in the varsity eight with a time of 6:18.6, just behind eventual national champion Ohio State, which finished with a time of 6:18.1. The Bears finished the day with 114 team points, just shy of the Buckeyes who finished with 126. California's second-place finish means that a Pac-12 team has come in either first or second place in 15 of the last 19 years. Three other Pac-12 crews also finished near the top of the Division I team standings with WASHINGTON coming in fourth, STANFORD in sixth, and WASHINGTON STATE in eighth. Additionally, USC came in 15th overall at the national championship regatta.

Washington posted victories in three of four races at the Pac-12 Championships on Lake Natoma, but fell short of winning the Conference title. Instead, California won the varsity eight and captured the overall team championship for the seventh time in the last eight years. Washington finished second overall, after a second-place finish in the varsity eight and a first-place finish in the third varsity eight, the second varsity eight, and the varsity four. Washington State finished third at the Conference regatta after a second-place finish in the varsity four and third-place finishes in the second and third varsity eights. Stanford took fourth with a silver medal in the varsity eight. USC finished fifth overall, while UCLA came in sixth followed by OREGON STATE in seventh.

California's **Kendall Chase** was named the Pac-12 Women's Rowing Athlete of the Year. Chase has been a part of the Golden Bears' NCAA runner-up varsity eight all season and has been competing in the team's top boat since her freshman year. She captured two gold medals in the 2014 Women's World Rowing Under-23 Championships in Varese, Italy, serving in the seven-seat of the United States women's eight and in the bow-seat in the United States women's four. Women's Newcomer of the Year **Mia Croonquist**, also from Cal, has rowed at the five-seat of the Golden Bears' Pac-12 champion varsity eight throughout her first season on the team. She was also elected as one of the Bears' four team captains by the freshman class. Pac-12 Women's Rowing Scholar Athlete of the Year honors went to Stanford's **Naomi Cornman**, who has been the coxswain of the Cardinal varsity eight for the last two seasons. Cornman holds a 3.688 grade-point average and is double-majoring in French and international relations.

California coach **Al Acosta** earned Pac-12 Women's Coach of the Year honors in his first year as head coach of the Golden Bears. He guided California to a Pac-12 Championship and a second-place finish at NCAA Championships. Acosta is a Cal graduate himself and was named National Coach of the Year five times while leading the Stanford women's lightweight team.

A league-record five Pac-12 men's soccer teams earned berths to compete in the 2014 NCAA Tournament. Four Conference teams earned first round byes: No. 2-seed UCLA, No. 6-seed STANFORD, No. 14-seed WASHINGTON and No. 15-seed CALIFORNIA. OREGON STATE qualified for its first-ever Tournament and opened play in the first round.

UCLA went on a run and advanced all the way to the College Cup finals, facing off with Virginia. Despite dominating possession for most of the game, the Bruins could not manage a goal in regulation, nor either of the two overtime periods. In penalty kicks, UCLA fell after sending two kicks off the crossbar. It was UCLA's 13th College Cup appearance and its ninth-ever appearance in the finals. The Pac-12 holds an all-time record of 118-95-10 in the NCAA Tournament, with four national championships and eight second-place finishes.

Oregon State's **Khiry Shelton** was voted Pac-12 Player of the Year, while Stanford's **Brandon Vincent** was tabbed Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year. Oregon State's **Timmy Mueller** was named Pac-12 Freshman of the Year, and Stanford head coach **Jeremy Gunn** was named Pac-12 Coach of the Year. California senior MF **Omid Jalali** was honored as the Pac-12 men's soccer Scholar Athlete of the Year.

The Pac-12 had seven NSCAA/Continental Tire Division I All-America honorees. Stanford D Brandon Vincent, F Jordan Morris and UCLA MF Leo Stolz were named to the first team, while California MF Connor Hallisey and Oregon State F Khiry Shelton earned second team accolades. Washington D Andy Thoma and MF Cristian Roldan were honored on the third team.

UCLA MF **Leo Stolz** won the MAC Hermann Trophy, the highest individual intercollegiate award administered by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA), and presented annually at the Missouri Athletic Club in St. Louis. California MF **Connor Hallisey**, Oregon State's Shelton, Stanford MF **Jordan Morris** and UCLA's Stolz earned honors as semifinalists for the trophy.

The final NSCAA rankings had four teams ranked in the top 25 with five teams receiving votes overall. UCLA led the charge at No. 2.

PAC-12 MEN'S SOCCER SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

A league-record nine Pac-12 women's soccer teams earned berths to the 2014 NCAA Women's College Cup. Two Conference teams earned top seeds, with UCLA and Stanford taking home two of the four No. 1 spots. Other teams that received berths were No. 4-seeded WASHINGTON, ARIZONA, ARIZONA STATE, CALIFORNIA, COLORADO, USC and WASHINGTON STATE.

STANFORD represented Pac-12 women's soccer in the 2014 Women's College Cup. The Cardinal faced off against eventual national champion Florida State, falling in the national semifinal. Stanford's appearance in the Women's College Cup marked the 20th by a Pac-12 team and the seventh by the Cardinal, tied for sixth of most national semifinal appearances by a school.

UCLA midfielder **Sam Mewis** was named the Pac-12 Player of the Year, while teammate **Abby Dahlkemper** took home Defensive Player of the Year nods and fellow Bruin **Katelyn Rowland** was tabbed Goalkeeper of the Year. Stanford's **Andi Sullivan** was named Freshman/Newcomer of the Year. UCLA head coach **Amanda Cromwell** was voted the Coach of the Year.

The Pac-12 had five NSCAA/Continental Tire Division I All-America honorees. UCLA's Sam Mewis and Abby Dahlkemper were named to the first team, while Bruin Katelyn Rowland and Stanford's **Lo'eau LaBonta** earned second team accolades. UCLA's **Sarah Killion** was honored on the third team.

The final NSCAA rankings had four teams ranked in the top 25 with eight teams receiving votes overall.

Seven league teams earned berths to the NCAA Tournament, marking the 19th-straight season that the Pac-12 has had five or more teams advance to the postseason. The seven selections were tied for the second-most of any conference in the nation.

The Ducks claimed the 2015 regular season title on the final day of the season. It was Oregon's third-consecutive title, as UO racked up 21 league wins, the most in program history.

UCLA's **Ally Carda** repeated as Pac-12 Player of the Year, while UO's **Cheridan Hawkins** also had a repeat performance as Pac-12 Pitcher of the Year. **Hallie Wilson** of ARIZONA was named Defensive Player of the Year, and **Jenna Lilley** of Oregon was named Freshman/Newcomer of the Year. UTAH head coach **Amy Hogue** earned Coach of the Year. Thirteen Pac-12 softball players earned NFCA Division I All-American recognition.

Pac-12 men's swimming & diving teams had another dominant year in the pool, setting multiple new records while adding to the trophy case with national individual and relay titles.

CALIFORNIA's **Ryan Murphy** took home Pac-12 Men's Swimmer of the Year accolades, while USC's **Ralf Tribuntsov** was voted Men's Swimming Freshman/Newcomer of the Year and USC's **Dave Salo** was selected as Men's Swimming Coach of the Year. STANFORD's **Kristian Ipsen** took home Men's Diver of the Year for the second-straight season, while ARIZONA STATE's **David Hoffer** was voted Men's Diving Freshman/Newcomer of the Year and Stanford's **Patrick Jeffrey** was selected as Men's Diving Coach of the Year.

At the NCAA Championships, five Pac-12 teams finished in the top-22 while Pac-12 swimmers took home five individual titles and three relay titles. CALIFORNIA finished second overall, while USC and STANFORD finished in the top 10, with the Trojans placing fourth and the Cardinal coming in sixth. ARIZONA finished 11th overall, while UTAH placed 22nd. Cardinal senior **David Nolan** made history in the pool with his second-career title in the 200 IM, setting an NCAA record in the event. Cal took home a championship in the 200 medley relay, while sophomore Golden Bear Ryan Murphy successfully defended his two titles from last year, winning the 100 and 200 back at the national meet and setting an American record in the 200 back in the process. USC senior standout **Cristian Quintero** won the 200 free and was a member of the national champion 800 free and 400 free relays. Arizona's **Kevin Cordes** won his fourth-consecutive title in the 100 breast, becoming only the third swimmer in NCAA history to win the event four straight years.

The 2015 Pac-12 Championship saw another record-breaking year, with USC winning its first league crown since 1979 in a dramatic, come-from-behind finish in the final day. The Trojans scored 287 points in day four to score 818.5 total points and mark the first championship in 36 years to be won by a school other than Stanford or California. Cristian Quintero took home Swimmer of the Meet accolades after winning three individual titles, setting a meet record in the 800 free and 200 free, and helping USC to three relay titles. David Nolan defended his Pac-12 title in the 200 IM, setting a new Pac-12 record in the process. California's **Josh Prenot** set a new Pac-12 meet record in the 400 IM, while fellow Golden Bear Ryan Murphy set a meet record in the 200 back and Stanford's Kristian Ipsen had a meet record in the 3-meter diving competition.

PAC-12 MEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Kevin Cordes, Arizona

It was another banner year for Pac-12 women's swimming and diving, capped with an NCAA title as CALIFORNIA won the national crown for the fourth time in the past seven years. The Golden Bears were also Pac-12 Champions for a second-straight year. Cal's **Missy Franklin** was named NCAA Women's Swimmer of the Year and **Teri McKeever** was named NCAA Women's Swimming Coach of the Year.

Cal dominated the field at the NCAA Championships with a school-record 513 points in the event en route to the meet victory. Four other Pac-12 teams finished in the top 25, with Stanford coming in third, USC at eighth, Arizona at 15th and UCLA at 23rd. Pac-12 swimmers won 13 of a possible 21 events, including eight individual titles and all five relay titles. Four NCAA and American records, one championship record, and five pool records were broken by Pac-12 swimmers at the national meet.

The Golden Bears also won their second-consecutive and fourth-overall Pac-12 Championship, with nine different Golden Bear swimmers capturing at least one race at the meet, either individually or on a relay. Cal won 12 of the possible 21 events en route to the Pac-12 crown, thanks largely in part to Missy Franklin who won three individual titles. Three NCAA records, three Pac-12 records and five meet records were broken at this year's Championships.

Cal's Franklin was voted Pac-12 Women's Swimmer of the Year, while STANFORD's **Simone Manuel** was named Women's Swimming Freshman/Newcomer of the Year and Cal's Teri McKeever received Women's Swimming Coach of the Year accolades. On the diving side, ARIZONA's **Samantha Pickens** was voted Pac-12 Women's Diver of the Year, and UCLA's **Maria Polyakova** was voted Women's Diving Freshman/Newcomer of the Year and UA's **Omar Ojeda** was voted Women's Diving Coach of the Year.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

The regular season title came down to the wire for Pac-12 men's tennis. Stanford and USC tied for the men's championship after California came back to hand Stanford its first loss of the season and USC had a come-from-behind victory to hold off UCLA. The Cardinal defeated the Trojans in their lone matchup of the regular season to earn the automatic qualifier for the NCAA Tournament.

Four teams advanced to the postseason, with USC seeded seventh and UCLA seeded 16th in the NCAA Tournament bracket, while California and Stanford also earned at-large berths in the tournament. All four teams won their opening-round matches, with three of the four matches being sweeping victories, and USC advanced to the quarterfinals for the 10th-straight season while UCLA made it to the third round of action. Individually, seven singles players qualified for the tournament, with USC's **Yannick Hanfmann** and **Jonny Wang** advancing to the Round of 16. Three doubles teams earned berths.

The 2015 Pac-12 Championships showcased some of the top collegiate tennis talent in Ojai, Calif., for the 70th year for the men. The second-seeded Trojan men fought back from losing the doubles point to exact revenge over top-seeded Stanford in the men's team championship match to win the tournament title, 4-3. It marked USC's second tournament championship since the team format was established in 2012.

The men's coaches voted UCLA sophomore **Mackenzie McDonald** as the Men's Singles Player of the Year, and the duo of Yannick Hanfmann and **Roberto Quiroz** of USC were selected as the Men's Doubles Team of the Year and **Tom Fawcett** of Stanford was the Men's Freshman/Newcomer of the Year. Stanford head coach **Paul Goldstein** was the Men's Coach of the Year.

Men's players earning All-America honors were: Stanford's **John Morrissey** and **Robert Stineman**; UCLA's Mackenzie McDonald; and USC's Yannick Hanfmann, Roberto Quiroz and Jonny Wang.

With three national runners-up in the NCAA Women's Team and Individual Championships and an undefeated Pac-12 season for USC, league squads continued the tradition of excellence in collegiate tennis for the Pac-12.

USC finished the season undefeated in Pac-12 play and clinched the title in the final week of the regular season after holding off UCLA in their final match to avoid tying with California, which had just one loss in Pac-12 play. It marked USC's second undefeated Pac-12 season in three years, as the Trojans also won the title outright in 2013.

The women saw considerable success in the postseason, as five teams picked up bids for the NCAA Tournament. Seventh-seeded UCLA finished second overall, while top-seeded USC swept three of their four victories to join the Bruins in the semifinals in Waco. Stanford played through the quarterfinals, California reached the third round, and Arizona State reached the second round. Individually, Stanford's **Carol Zhao** finished as runner-up in the singles draw while California's **Klara Fabikova** and **Zsofi Susanyi** were runners-up in doubles.

The Pac-12 Women's Championships saw UCLA's **Catherine Harrison** win the singles title while Stanford's Carol Zhao and **Taylor Davidson** won the doubles title. Harrison's title marked the third-straight singles championship and ninth overall for the UCLA women.

The women's coaches voted UCLA's **Robin Anderson** as the Women's Singles Player of the Year, and voted Carol Zhao and Taylor Davidson of Stanford as the Women's Doubles Team of the Year. USC's **Madison Westby** was selected Women's Freshman/Newcomer of the Year, and Trojan head coach **Richard Gallien** was the Women's Coach of the Year.

Women's players earning national recognition were: California's Klara Fabikova, **Maegan Manasse**, **Denise Starr** and Zsofi Susanyi; Stanford's Taylor Davidson, **Caroline Doyle**, **Ellen Tsay** and Carol Zhao; UCLA's Robin Anderson, **Jennifer Brady**, Catherine Harrison, **Kyle McPhillips** and **Chanelle Van Nguyen**; and USC's **Giuliana Olmos** and **Sabrina Santamaria**.

OREGON successfully defended its NCAA title posting a 29-point victory over the second-place team, the largest margin of victory in 21 years. It is the Pac-12's 47th all-time men's outdoor crown. Four Pac-12 athletes won six NCAA individual crowns, including UO's **Edward Cheserek** (5,000 meters and 10,000 meters) and USC's **Andre De Grasse** (100 meters and 200 meters), who were each double winners. The Ducks' **Sam Crouser** won the javelin and Trojan **Conor McCullough** was a winner in the hammer.

The Ducks' NCAA performance came after a dominating outing at the Pac-12 Championships hosted by UCLA. Oregon won its ninth-consecutive league crown, scoring 152 points to stay ahead of the Trojans. It was also the seventh-straight year UO had swept both the men's and women's titles. Though the Ducks took home the team crown, De Grasse's individual outing resulted in 22.5 points for the Trojans and earned him the Athlete of the Meet distinction.

Pac-12 honors went to De Grasse, who was voted the Pac-12 Men's Track Athlete of the Year, and ARIZONA's **Pau Tonnesen** was tabbed the Men's Field Athlete of the Year. The Trojans' **Marquis Morris** was named the Men's Freshman of the Year. USC's **Caryl Smith Gilbert**, who is only in her second year with the Trojans, was voted the Pac-12 Men's Coach of the Year.

Nationally, UO's **Robert Johnson** was voted the United States Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association National Men's Coach of the Year (also earning the women's honor). His assistant coach, **Andy Powell**, was named National Assistant Coach of the Year.

HONDA AWARD

Jenna Prandini, Oregon

The day after the OREGON men claimed its second-straight NCAA title, the Duck women followed suit winning its first NCAA Championship in 30 years by a slim nine-point margin. The close competition came about a month after the Ducks clinched their seventh-straight Pac-12 title by just three points over USC. It was not until the meet's final race of the day, the 4x400-meter relay that UO clinched the title, making it one of the most exciting Conference championships in recent memory.

Oregon's **Jenna Prandini** and **Raevyn Rogers** took home individual NCAA titles, with Prandini winning the 100-meter race and Rogers, only a freshman, picking up a crucial 10 points at the 800-meter distance. Prandini contributed 26 points on her own, also posting runner-up finishes in the 100 meter and long jump.

Second-year head coach USC's **Caryl Smith Gilbert** was voted the Pac-12 Women's Coach of the Year by her peers, the first time she has earned the honor. The Trojans were ranked as high as No. 5 in the nation this season and also had the lead at the Pac-12 Championships late in the competition. ARIZONA STATE's **Shelby Houlihan** was the Pac-12 Track Athlete of the Year, successfully defending her 1,500-meter and 5,000-meter league titles. Pac-12 Field Athlete of the Year nods went to Oregon's **Jasmine Todd** who was named the Pac-12 Athlete of the Meet at the league championships, tallying 35 important points after Prandini scratched on the first day of the meet due to injury. COLORADO's **Erin Clark** was tabbed the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year, the first Buffalo to win a major league award since joining the league. She won the steeplechase crown, an event the Colorado women have not lost since joining the league four years ago. UO's **Robert Johnson** won the USTF-CCCA National Women's Coach of the Year award.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S TRACK & FIELD SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Jessica Tonn, Stanford

Pac-12 volleyball made history in 2014 as 10 teams earned berths to the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship, setting a new league and NCAA record. Five league teams were seeded in the top 16: top-seeded STANFORD, No. 3 WASHINGTON, No. 10 OREGON, No. 11 ARIZONA, and No. 12 UCLA. Joining the five seeded teams were ARIZONA STATE, COLORADO, OREGON STATE, USC and UTAH. The Pac-12 also set a league record for most teams ranked in the AVCA Coaches Poll, with nine teams in the top 25 of the final polling.

STANFORD won its 16th Pac-12 title and advanced to the national semifinal, finishing the season with the best win-loss percentage in the nation. The Cardinal's appearance in the national semifinal marked the 31st time in the history of the NCAA Tournament that at least one league team has advanced that far. The Pac-12 has won 14 of 34 NCAA titles awarded, including 12 of the last 24. It was also the 15th consecutive year the Conference has had at least six teams compete in the NCAA Tournament.

Fourteen Pac-12 players were named to AVCA All-America teams, the most selections for the league since 2006. It was the 13th consecutive year that the Pac-12 has had at least eight student-athletes on AVCA All-America teams.

The 10-0 record in the opening weekend of the NCAA Tournament marked the most first-round wins in Conference history. Previously, Pac-12 teams went undefeated seven times in the opening round: 8-0 in 2000; 7-0 in 2008; 6-0 in 2007, 1998, 1996 and 1982; and 2-0 in 1990.

A whopping 22 players were named to the AVCA All-Region teams, with 14 on the All-Pacific North Region squad and eight on the All-Pacific South team. The 22 student-athletes on teams bests the league's previous record of 16 All-Region honorees, which was set last year when the All-Pacific team split into North and South divisions.

Washington's **Krista Vansant** earned Player of the Year for the second-straight season, while **Mary-Kate Marshall** of Oregon State was voted Freshman of the Year, **Madi Bugg** of Stanford was voted Setter of the Year, **Cassie Strickland** of Washington was tabbed Libero of the Year and **Taras Liskevych** was voted Coach of the Year.

OREGON STATE successfully defended its championship, winning its fourth-consecutive Pac-12 title in a year where 24 Pac-12 wrestlers earned berths to the NCAA Championships. The Beavers led the national field with seven student-athletes in the NCAA championship bracket, while ARIZONA STATE had six qualifiers, STANFORD had five, and BOISE STATE, CAL POLY and CSU BAKERSFIELD had two apiece.

Pac-12 Wrestler of the Year **Blake Stauffer** finished fourth overall in the 184 class at NAAs, becoming the first All-American for Arizona State since 2011. Stanford's **Jim Wilson** placed eighth in the 165 class, the first All-American for Stanford since 2012. Pac-12 Wrestling Freshman/Newcomer of the Year **Geordan Martinez** of Boise State was just one victory shy of All-America status at 141. Oregon State seniors **Alex Elder**, **Joe Latham** and **Taylor Meeks** were also one win short of placing at the national meet, with Elder at 157, Latham at 174 and Meeks at 184.

The Beavers were dominant at the Pac-12 Championships, winning five individual titles with eight wrestlers in championship bouts. Senior Beaver Latham earned Outstanding Wrestler of the Meet accolades. Head coach **Jim Zalesky** was named Pac-12 Wrestling Coach of the Year for the fifth time in the past six seasons, as the Beavers claimed their sixth Conference title in Zalesky's nine years at the helm. Martinez posted two upsets to claim the Pac-12 title at 141, while Arizona State had two individual titles with **Christian Pagdilao** winning at 149 and Stauffer winning at 184. Stanford also had a pair of individual titles as Wilson won the 165 class and **Nathan Butler** won the heavyweight class.

(Capsule Reviews of 2014-15 Pac-12 Highlights in the MPSF)

MEN'S GYMNASTICS

STANFORD finished second with a 440.450 at the NCAA Championships, marking its ninth top-three finish in the past 10 seasons. Stanford sophomore **Akash Modi** won individual titles in the parallel bars (15.450) and all-around (90.450). Modi was named MPSF Gymnast of the Year for the second-straight season, leading the nation with six National Gymnast of the Week awards and four MPSF Gymnast of the Week honors. The sophomore won 22 individual events against NCAA teams, including three conference titles in the all-around, the parallel bars and the floor. He also set an NCAA record on parallel bars with a 16.150. CALIFORNIA finished fifth overall at the NCAA Championships for its highest finish since 2012.

MEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

Behind a 1-2-3 finish in the 3,000 meters, OREGON won its second-straight NCAA indoor title on the heels of winning its second MPSF crown, the team's first league title since 2008. **Eric Jenkins**, **Edward Cheserek** and **Will Geoghegan** became the fourth set of male teammates in the history of the NCAA Indoor meet to sweep the top three spots in the 3,000, as 70 of the team's 74 points came from the middle distance events. Jenkins became an NCAA champion in the 3,000 meter and 5,000 meter, while Cheserek won the mile. The Ducks also claimed the distance medley relay title. At the MPSF Championships, UO's 95 points was enough to stay ahead of USC's 88.5 points. ARIZONA STATE's **Bryan McBride** took down one of the oldest MPSF records, leaping to a winning 7-5 and breaking standard set in 1996. The Trojan's **Conor McCullough** also set an MPSF record in the weight throw (77-5.25), taking down a mark set in 1999. Jenkins was named USTFCCA National Track Athlete of the Year.

WOMEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

USC repeated as MPSF Indoor Track & Field Champions in just the program's second year of MPSF competition. The Trojans compiled a two-day total of 111 points, ahead of second-place OREGON (89) and third-place ARIZONA STATE (69.33). Highlighting USC on day two was the 4x400-meter relay team that finished in an all-time meet record 3:33.58. UCLA's **Ida Storm** delivered a MPSF record weight throw of 73-6, nearly three feet further than the previous 2009 standard. Additionally, Oregon's **Jenna Prandini** sprinted to a time of 7.19 in the 60-meter. The five-time defending NCAA Champion Ducks finished second overall. STANFORD placed eighth and USC was tied for 12th. Prandini was the individual champion in the long jump.

WOMEN'S LACROSSE

STANFORD and USC earned berths to the NCAA Tournament, where the Trojans won their first-ever NCAA tournament game in the first round. The Trojans faced James Madison for the first time in program history and upset the 19th-ranked Dukes for USC's 14th win on the season, a program record. USC was ousted in the second round after a loss to Duke, while Stanford lost its opening-round game against No. 10 Florida. The Cardinal finished the season ranked 16th nationally, after winning the MPSF Tournament with a perfect 9-0 record in Conference play and a win over USC in the championship final. COLORADO and OREGON also earned bids to the MPSF Tournament, where the Buffs won their opening game against San Diego State but fell to Stanford in the second round and the Ducks fell in their first game against Denver. Trojan attacker **Michaela Michael** was named MPSF Player of the Year, and head coach **Lindsay Munday** earned Coach of the Year.

MEN'S VOLLEYBALL

For just the ninth time in 46 years of the NCAA men's volleyball championship, the Pac-12 did not have a team advance to the national semifinals... UCLA outside hitter **J.T. Hatch** was named MPSF Freshman of the Year. Earning first team All-MPSF honors was USC's **Micah Christenson**, while USC's **Robert Feathers**, Stanford's **Conrad Kaminski** and Hatch were named second team All-MPSF. Christenson was a first-team AVCA Division I-II All-America honoree, while Kaminski was a third-team honoree.

MEN'S WATER POLO

It was one-two-three finish at NCAA Championships as UCLA brought home its ninth national title, USC finished second, and STANFORD finished third. The Bruins won their first title since 2004 with a thrilling, 9-8 decision over six-time defending champion USC on the heels of four goals from **Danny McClintick**, who earned NCAA Tournament MVP honors. The Trojans reached their 10th-straight NCAA Championship game after finishing fourth in the MPSF Tournament and yielding the 2015 MPSF Player of the Year in senior driver **Kostas Genidounias**. Stanford, which bested UC San Diego in the third-place game, also won the MPSF Tournament, winning the program's fifth league championship and first since 2004. The Cardinal won 26 games this year, its highest since 1994 when it won 27. CALIFORNIA finished fifth in the MPSF Tournament and Golden Bear freshman **Luca Cupido** was named MPSF Newcomer of the Year.

WOMEN'S WATER POLO

STANFORD captured its fifth NCAA title and fourth in five years with a 7-6 victory over top-seeded UCLA. All top-four finishers hailed from Pac-12 institutions, as UCLA finished second, USC finished third and California finished fourth. The Cardinal became the first host school to win a national championship while defending its title at Avery Aquatic Center. The NCAA title was also the 106th won by a Stanford team and extended the school's national-best streak of years with at least one NCAA championship to 39, dating back to 1976-77. USC's **Monica Vavic** broke the 15-year-old MPSF record for career goals scored in USC's NCAA quarterfinal match, posting 291 in her tenure with the Trojans. Stanford junior **Maggie Steffens** was named MPSF Player of the Year, while Cardinal freshman **Jordan Raney** was voted Newcomer of the Year. UCLA head coach **Brandon Brooks** was voted Coach of the Year after guiding the Bruins to a conference-high 10th MPSF Championship with a 9-8 victory over California.
