CONFERENCE OF CHAMPIONS®

Built on a firm foundation of academic excellence and superior athletic performance, the Conference ushered in a new era on July 1, 2011, officially becoming the Pac-12 Conference with the additions of the University of Colorado and University of Utah.

Just 27 days after the Conference officially changed its name, Commissioner Larry Scott announced the creation of the Pac-12 Networks on July 27, 2011, solidifying a landmark television deal and putting the Conference on the forefront of collegiate athletics. The Networks, including one national network, six regional networks, and a robust digital network marked the first-ever integrated media company owned by a college conference. In addition, the "TV Everywhere" rights allow fans to access Pac-12 Networks outside the home on any digital device, including smartphones and tablet computers.

The Pac-12 launched its China Initiative in 2011 as a way to proactively promote the Conference and member institutions through student-athlete exchanges and sport. In its first two years, Pac-12 student-athletes have enjoyed unique cultural and athletic experiences in China, and the Conference has gained significant brand exposure for the future and set a foundation for growth.

On the field, the Pac-12 rises above the rest, upholding its tradition as the "Conference of Champions ®," claiming an incredible 127 NCAA team titles since 1999-2000, including eight in 2012-13. That is an average of over nine championships per academic year. Even more impressive has been the breadth of the Pac-12's success, with championships coming in 28 different men's and women's sports. The Pac-12 has led or tied the nation in NCAA Championships in 47 of the last 53 years. The only exceptions being in 1980-81, 1988-89, 1990-91 and 1995-96 when the Conference finished second, and only twice finished third (1998-99 and 2004-05).

For the eighth-consecutive year, the Pac-12 had the most NCAA titles or tied for the most of any conference in the country, winning at least six every year since 2000-01. No other conference has won double-digit NCAA crowns in a single year, the Pac-12 doing so six times, including a record 14 in 1996-97.

Spanning nearly a century of outstanding athletics achievements, the Pac-12 was the first conference to reach 400 championships in 2010-11. With the inclusion of Colorado and Utah, the Conference surpassed another major milestone, with league teams capturing 450 titles, outdistancing the next conference by nearly 200. In all, Conference teams have won 459 NCAA Championships (309 men's, 150 women's).

The Conference's reputation is further proven in the annual Learfield Sports Directors' Cup competition, the prestigious award that honors the best overall collegiate athletics programs in the country. STANFORD continued its remarkable run and won its unprecedented 19th-consecutive Directors' Cup in 2012-13. Seven Pac-12 member institutions ranked among the top-25 Division I programs: No. 1 STANFORD, No. 3 UCLA, No. 14 USC, No. 15 OREGON, No. 17 CALIFORNIA, No. 18 ARIZONA STATE and No. 23 ARIZONA. It marks the third-straight year at least six member schools are in the top 25.

The Conference's eight national titles came in the form of five women's and three men's crowns. Five different league schools claimed NCAA titles and, of the six NCAA institutions to have won multiples titles, two were from the Pac-12. No other conference in the country had more than one team win multiple NCAA titles.

USC was the only institution in the country to win three NCAA titles in 2012-13, claiming both the men's and women's water polo titles, as well as women's golf. It was the fifth-straight men's water polo win, while the women's golf team dominated the field, winning with a NCAA-record 19-under. OREGON won a pair of NCAA titles, capturing its first women's cross country crown since 1987 then stood atop the podium at the women's indoor track & field championships for the fourth-consecutive year. STANFORD reclaimed the women's tennis national championship, its first since 2010, while COLORADO won the skiing championship for the second time in three years. UCLA claimed its first-ever baseball title, which was the program's first in the sport and the institution's nation-leading 109th NCAA title all-time.

In addition to the eight national championships, the Pac-12 also had runners-up in eight NCAA Championship events: women's volleyball (Oregon), men's water polo (UCLA), skiing (UTAH), men's swimming (CALIFORNIA), women's swimming (CALIFORNIA), women's rowing (CALIFORNIA), men's tennis (UCLA) and women's water polo (STANFORD). Overall, the Conference had 33 teams finish in the top four at 25 NCAA Championship events.

Participation in the postseason was a common occurrence for the Pac-12 in 2012-13. Of the 22 sports sponsored by the Conference, 15 witnessed at least half its teams participating in NCAA or other postseason action. The men

sent 59 of a possible 101 teams into the postseason (58.4 percent), while the women sent 70 of a possible 114 teams (61.4 percent).

The culmination of the 2012 Pac-12 football season included a pair of BCS bowl wins as Pac-12 champion STANFORD knocked off Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl and OREGON topped Kansas State in the Fiesta Bowl in a postseason that saw the Pac-12 send a record eight teams into bowl games. It was the third consecutive year that the Pac-12 had two teams participate in BCS bowls. Stanford, which claimed its first Pac-12 crown since 1999, posted its first Rose Bowl Game victory since 1972. Joining the Cardinal and Ducks on the bowl circuit were OREGON STATE (Valero Alamo Bowl), UCLA (Bridgepoint Education Holiday Bowl), USC (Hyundai Sun Bowl), WASHINGTON (MAACO Las Vegas Bowl), ARIZONA STATE (Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl) and ARIZONA (Gildan New Mexico Bowl). Oregon and Stanford finished among the top-10 in the final Associated Press poll, finishing second and seventh, respectively, while Oregon State ranked 20th.

In one of the closest league races in years, UCLA captured its 31st regular-season men's basketball title, and first since the 2008 season. The one-game separation between the top four teams was the closest since 1985. After 11 years in Los Angeles, the Pac-12 moved its postseason basketball tournament to Las Vegas and the MGM Grand Garden Arena where the OREGON Ducks won their third Pac-12 Tournament title, and first since 2007. The Ducks were the fifth different team over the last six years to capture the league's postseason crown. Joining Oregon in the NCAA Tournament were ARIZONA, CALIFORNIA, COLORADO, and UCLA. Arizona and Oregon advanced to the Sweet 16, marking the first time the league placed two teams in regional semifinals since 2008. Also representing the Pac-12 in the postseason were NIT participants ARIZONA STATE, STANFORD and WASHINGTON.

On the women's side, Pac-12 teams saw tremendous success with four teams earning NCAA Tournament bids and two more playing in the WNIT. CALIFORNIA, who earned a share of the Pac-12 regular-season title, the program's first, advanced to its first-ever NCAA Women's Final Four. It was the sixth-straight year a Pac-12 team had advanced to the national semifinals. STANFORD shared the regular-season crown and went on to claim the Pac-12 Tournament title at KeyArena in Seattle. Joining Cal and Stanford in the NCAA Tournament were COLORADO, its first appearance in the Big Dance since 2004, and UCLA. In the WNIT, UTAH lost by just three points in the title game.

The Conference has dominated the volleyball field, winning a record 14 NCAA titles in the sport since 1982. This past year was no different with seven teams earning NCAA Tournament bids, the 13th-consecutive year the Conference has sent at least six teams to the postseason event. OREGON represented the Pac-12 in the national championship match, making it the third-straight year a Conference team has played for the NCAA title. STANFORD won its sixth Conference title in seven years.

UCLA won the Conference's 28th all-time NCAA baseball championship. The Pac-12's 28 titles in the sport are, by far, the most for any conference, with the SEC coming in second with 10. Four Pac-12 teams in total received NCAA Tournament bids, with OREGON and ARIZONA STATE joining the Bruins in the postseason, as did OREGON STATE, who advanced to Omaha, Neb., to play in the College World Series.

Without question, the Conference has dominated the softball field, winning 23 national championships in the sport since 1982, most recently capturing six in a row from 2006-11. Eight Pac-12 teams earned NCAA Tournament bids in 2013. It was the second year in a row for the Conference to have eight teams participate in the postseason. ARIZONA STATE and WASHINGTON both punched their tickets to the NCAA Women's College World Series, the 27th consecutive year the Conference has sent two teams to the WCWS.

Pac-12 members have won 309 NCAA team championships on the men's side, 88 more than the next closest conference. Men's NCAA crowns have come at a phenomenal rate for the Pac-12 - 16 basketball titles by six schools (more than any other conference), 53 tennis titles, 45 outdoor track & field crowns, and 28 baseball titles. Pac-12 members have won 25 of 44 NCAA titles in volleyball, 39 of 43 in water polo, 28 in skiing, and 23 in swimming & diving national championships.

Individually, the Conference has produced an impressive number of NCAA individual champions. Over 2,000 (2,123) individual crowns have been won by Pac-12 student-athletes over the years with 1,459 by male student-athletes.

On the women's side, the story is much the same. Since the NCAA began conducting women's championships 32 years ago, Pac-12 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season on 23 occasions, including 13-consecutive years from 2000-2013. Overall, the Pac-12 has captured

150 NCAA women's titles, easily outdistancing the SEC, which is second, with 90. Pac-12 members have dominated a number of sports, winning 23 softball titles, 20 tennis crowns, 14 volleyball titles, 15 of the last 24 trophies in golf, and 13 in swimming & diving.

Pac-12 women student-athletes shine nationally on an individual basis, as well, having captured an unmatched 664 NCAA individual crowns, an average of nearly 21 championships per season.

PAC-12 CONFERENCE HISTORY

The roots of the Pac-12 Conference date back 98 years to December 2, 1915, when the Pacific Coast Conference (PCC) was founded at a meeting at the Oregon Hotel in Portland, Ore. The original membership consisted of four schools - the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Washington, the University of Oregon, and Oregon State College (now Oregon State University). All still are charter members of the Conference.

Pacific Coast Conference play began in 1916 and, one year later, Washington State College (now Washington State University) was accepted into the league, with Stanford University following in 1918.

In 1922, the PCC expanded to eight teams with the admission of the University of Southern California (USC) and the University of Idaho. In 1924, the University of Montana joined the league roster, and in 1928, the PCC grew to 10 members with the addition of UCLA.

The Pacific Coast Conference competed as a 10-member league until 1950, with the exception of 1943-45 when World War II curtailed intercollegiate athletic competition to a minimum. During that time, the league's first commissioner was named. Edwin N. Atherton was Commissioner in 1940 and was succeeded by Victor O. Schmidt in 1944. In 1950, Montana resigned from the Conference and the PCC continued as a nine-team Conference through 1958.

In 1959, the PCC was dissolved and the Athletic Association of Western Universities (AAWU) was formed and Thomas J. Hamilton was appointed Commissioner of the new league. The original AAWU membership included California, Stanford, Southern California, UCLA and Washington. Washington State joined the membership in 1962, while Oregon and Oregon State joined in 1964. Under Hamilton's watch, the name Pacific-8 Conference was adopted in 1968. In 1971, Wiles Hallock took over as Commissioner of the Pac-8.

Ten years later, on July 1, 1978, the University of Arizona and Arizona State University were admitted to the league and the Pacific-10 Conference became a reality. In 1986-87, the league took on a new look, expanding to include 10 women's sports. Since then, the Conference has been considered the premiere league in women's athletics, securing the most NCAA titles in women's sports of any conference nearly every year.

Thomas C. Hansen was named the Commissioner of the Pac-10 in 1983, a role he would hold for 26 years until 2009. Hansen was succeeded by current Commissioner Larry Scott, who took on the new role in July 2009.

During the 2010-11 academic year, the University of Colorado accepted its invitation to join the Pac-12 on June 11, 2010, and on June 17, 2010, the University of Utah agreed to join the Conference. The Buffaloes and Utes officially became the 11th and 12th members of the Conference on July 1, 2011, the first additions to the league since 1978. Since 1978, member schools have won 274 NCAA titles, including 139 women's and 135 men's.

It was during that 2010-11 academic year that Scott helped deliver monumental changes that transformed the Conference into a modern 12-team league. The Conference expanded to add two more teams, agreed to equal revenue sharing for the first time in Conference history, created two divisions - the North and the South, for football only, established a Football Championship Game for the first time ever, secured a landmark media rights deal that dramatically increased national exposure and revenue for each school, establishing the Pac-12 Networks and Pac-12 Digital Network that guaranteed enhanced exposure across all sports.

Currently, the Pac-12 sponsors 11 men's sports and 11 women's sports. Additionally, the Conference is a member of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) in four other men's sports and three women's sports.

The Pac-12 Conference offices are located 25 miles east of San Francisco in Walnut Creek, Calif.

PAC-12 TOPS FINAL LEARFIELD DIRECTORS' CUP

WALNUT CREEK, Calif. - Seven Pac-12 Conference institutions finished the 2012-13 academic year ranked in the final Learfield Sports Directors' Cup top 25, the most of any conference, the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) announced.

STANFORD won its 19th-consecutive cup after claiming a national championship in women's tennis, and top four finishes in women's cross country, women's soccer, men's gymnastics and women's water polo, accumulating an impressive 1,261.25 points.

With its baseball national title earned earlier this week, UCLA moved up to finish third (1,227.25 points) for the second straight years. In addition to the baseball crown, the Bruins posted top-four finishes in six other sports - men's and women's water polo, men's and women's tennis, women's gymnastics and women's golf. USC placed 14th overall with 945.00 points after sweeping the men's and women's water polo titles. OREGON placed 15th with 929.75 points after picking up a pair of NCAA titles in women's cross country and women's indoor track and field. Five top four finishes helped CALIFORNIA to finish 17th (858.83), while ARIZONA STATE and ARIZONA rounded out the top 25, finishing 18th (852.08) and 23rd (786.58), respectively.

WASHINGTON finished 28th with 716.08 points, COLORADO was 56th overall (418.00, followed by OREGON STATE (69th, 319.50), UTAH (77th, 261.25), and WASHINGTON STATE (tied 192nd, 73.00).

The success of the Pac-12 in the Director's Cup was bolstered by the capturing of eight NCAA titles, most among all conferences. In addition, 10 Pac-12 league members finished among the top four in 22 NCAA championships, while the Big Ten was next with its league members placing among the top four in 18 NCAA championships.

The Directors' Cup was developed as a joint effort between the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and USA Today. Points are awarded based on each institution's finish in up to 20 sports - 10 women's and 10 men's.

UCLA was perfect in postseason play, going 10-0 in the NCAA Tournament en route to winning its first national championship in baseball. The Bruins' pitching staff dazzled down the stretch, allowing seven runs over UCLA's final eight games (0.82 ERA) with three shutouts during that span. Bruin starters combined to allow just three runs over 34.0 innings (0.88 ERA) during the College World Series, and closer **David Berg** picked up his NCAA-record 24th save in the championship set. UCLA, which outscored its opponents 19-4 in Omaha, held its CWS opponents to a .037 average (1-for-27) with runners in scoring position.

OREGON STATE, which made its fifth College World Series appearance, reached the semifinals where it fell to Mississippi State. Four teams earned bids to the 2013 NCAA Division I Baseball Championship. The Beavers received the No. 3 overall seed in the tournament, while OREGON earned the No. 8 overall seed. Oregon, Oregon State and UCLA all hosted regionals, and ARIZONA STATE earned the second seed in the Fullerton Regional. The Beavers, which won a school record 52 games in 2013, claimed their third Conference title since 1999 and their highest-ever national seed in the tournament.

OSU sophomore outfielder **Michael Conforto** was named the Pac-12 Player of the Year, while Berg earned Pitcher of the Year honors. UCLA junior shortstop **Pat Valaika** was tabbed the Defensive Player of the Year, Oregon State freshman right-hander **Andrew Moore** was named Freshman of the Year and Oregon State's **Pat Casey** garnered Coach of the Year laurels. UCLA skipper **John Savage** was named the National Coach of the Year by Collegiate Baseball Newspaper.

MEN'S BASKETBALL

After 11 years in Los Angeles at the STAPLES Center, the Pac-12 moved its championship to Las Vegas where the MGM Grand Garden Arena played host to the league's postseason tournament. OREGON won its third Pac-12 Tournament title, and first since 2007. The Ducks were the fifth different league school to capture the postseason crown over the last six years. Similar to the regular season where 57 of 108 league games were decided by single digits, the 11-game Pac-12 Tournament provided eight games decided by single digits, including a tournament record three overtime games. UCLA earned the top seed at the Pac-12 Tournament after claiming its 31st regular-season league title.

The Pac-12 placed five teams in the NCAA Tournament, with another three teams playing in the NIT. The five teams in the NCAA Tournament represented the most by the Pac-12 since six participated in the 2009 NCAA Tournament. With ARIZONA and Oregon advancing to the Sweet 16, it marked the first time the league placed two teams in the regional semifinals since 2008.

CALIFORNIA's **Allen Crabbe** was named the Pac-12 Player of the Year as he led Cal to its fourth 20-win season in five years. Crabbe averaged 18.4 points per game/3rd in the Pac-12 and 6.1 rebounds per game. He becomes the seventh Golden Bear to earn Pac-12 Player of the Year honors. ARIZONA STATE's **Jahii Carson** and UCLA's **Shabazz Muhammad** were named Co-Freshman of the Year. Carson becomes the fourth Sun Devil to earn Pac-12 Freshman of the Year and the first since 2003. Carson logged more minutes than any other player this season averaging 37.2 minutes per game. He's among the league's top five in scoring and assists averaging 18.5 points per game and 5.1 assists per game. Muhammad is the eighth Bruin to earn Pac-12 Freshman of the Year honors. He led the Bruins in scoring (17.9 ppg/4th in Pac-12) and three-point field goal percentage (.377/11th in Pac-12). COLORADO's **André Roberson** was named the Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year as he helped the Buffs limit their opponents to a Pac-12 best 62.6 points per game in league play. He led the league with 11.2 rebounds per game and was second in the Pac-12 with 2.2 steals per game. **Dwight Powell** of STANFORD was named the Pac-12 Most Improved Player of the Year as he increased his points per game from 5.8 in his sophomore year to 14.9 for his junior season. He also increased his rebounding average after earning 4.6 rebounds in his sophomore year and 8.4 rpg for the 2013 season. Oregon's **Dana Altman** was voted the John R. Wooden Pac-12 Coach of the Year as he guided the Ducks to a second-place tie in the Pac-12 standings and the Pac-12 Tournament Championship. Under Altman, the Ducks have posted their second consecutive second-place finish and third consecutive 20-win season.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

CALIFORNIA capped the season with an impressive run to the NCAA Women's Final Four. It was the Golden Bears' first-ever trip to the event and the sixth-straight year a Pac-12 team has played in the national semifinal after STANFORD made five-consecutive trips from 2008-12. The Bears and the Cardinal shared the Pac-12 regular-season crown, the first-ever for Cal, while Stanford took home its seventh-straight Pac-12 Tournament crown. Pac-12 teams saw tremendous success this year with four teams earning NCAA Tournament bids and two more receiving WNIT invitations. For the first time since the 1980-81 season, four Pac-12 teams were ranked in the final *Associated Press* poll.

A consensus All-American, STANFORD's **Chiney Ogwumike** was voted the Pac-12 Player of the Year, as well as the Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year for the second-straight year. COLORADO's **Arielle Roberson** was named the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year. Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Famer and STANFORD head coach **Tara VanDerveer** was named the John R. Wooden Coach of the Year for the 13th time in 26 years at the helm. Nationally, five others were recognized as Honorable Mention AP All-Americans. Three different Pac-12 players were tabbed USBWA National Players of the Week. Ogwumike earned the nod twice, while the Buff's **Chucky Jeffery** and Cal's **Gennifer Brandon** earned it once each. The Pac-12 also boasted five of the nation's top rebounders, including three of the top 10.

Also of note in 2011-12, nine teams in all appeared in the top 25 of the NCAA's final statistical rankings. CALIFORNIA's **Layshia Clarendon** was named the Pac-12 Women's Basketball Scholar-Athlete of the Year. She was the Conference's top pick in the WNBA Draft, going in the first round to the Indiana Fever with the ninth pick overall. ARIZONA's **Davellyn Whyte** and CU's Jeffery went in the second round. Whyte graduated as one of only 15 players in Conference history to have scored at least 2,000-career points.

COLORADO successfully defended its Pac-12 Cross Country title, scoring just 49 points as each of its scoring runners finished among the top 15, including three in the top 10. ARIZONA sophomore **Lawi Lalang** outran his teammate, **Stephen Sambu**, to capture his second-straight individual title. It was a three-man race at the NCAA Championships, with Sambu and Lalang unable to catch the winner but eventually finishing second and third, respectively. The Buffs posted a second-straight top-three finish at the national meet, as four Pac-12 teams earned bids and all finished in the top 20. Lalang went on to be named Pac-12 Athlete of the Year for the second-consecutive year, as well as the USTF-CCCA West Region Male Athlete of the year for the second time in a row. OREGON's **Trevor Dunbar** was tabbed the Pac-12 Newcomer of the Year, while COLORADO's **Mark Wetmore** took home Pac-12 Men's Coach of the Year honors for the second time.

WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY

It was a banner year for the OREGON women who captured their first Pac-12 title since 1995, then went on to win the NCAA crown, the team's first since 1987. The Ducks had three runners finish in the top five at the Pac-12 meet, and each of its scoring runners crossed the finish line in the top 20. UO's 114 points were well ahead of second-place Providence, which scored 183 points. Three-time Pac-12 Athlete of the Year honoree **Jordan Hasay** was the top finisher for the Ducks at both races, coming in third place at the NCAA Championships, just .7 seconds behind the national champion. Hasay finished in the top three at the NCAA meet in each of the last three seasons. Four Pac-12 teams participated at the NCAA Championships, with STANFORD (3rd), ARIZONA (6th) and WASHINGTON (9th) all coming in the top 10, while COLORADO placed 24th. It was the first time since 2007 the Conference had four teams in the top 10. The Cardinal's third-place showing was its best since winning the NCAA title in 2007 and it was the Wildcats' best finish since 2001. In addition to the league honors, Hasay was also named the USTFCCCA West Region Athlete of the Year. First-year head coach **Robert Johnson** was voted the Pac-12 Women's Coach of the Year, as well as the USTFCCCA West Region Coach of the Year. STANFORD's **Kayla Hatton** was tabbed the Pac-12 Newcomer of the Year.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Jordan Hasay, Oregon

The culmination of the 2012 Pac-12 football season included a pair of BCS bowl wins as the Pac-12 champion STANFORD Cardinal knocked off Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl and the OREGON Ducks topped Kansas State in the Fiesta Bowl in a postseason that saw the Pac-12 send a record eight teams into bowl games. A record-tying eight teams produced winning records during the 2012 season--only the teams of the Pac-10 during the 2002 season equalled that feat.

Stanford earned its 13th trip to the Rose Bowl by virtue of its 27-24 victory over the South Division's UCLA Bruins in the Pac-12 Football Championship Game. The Cardinal edged UCLA, 27-24, to claim its first Conference title since 1999. Stanford quarterback Kevin Hogan completed 16-of-22 passes for 155 yards and a touchdown and added 47 yards and a touchdown on the ground en route to earning the game's most valuable player award. **Stepfan Taylor**, who established new school and career rushing records late in the second quarter, paced the Cardinal with 133 all-purpose yards (78 rushing, 55 receiving).

USC sophomore WR **Marqise Lee**, the Pac-12's Offensive Player of the Year, earned the Biletnikoff Award as the nation's top receiver during a record-breaking season. ARIZONA STATE junior DT **Will Sutton** was named the Pac-12's Pat Tillman Defensive Player of the Year and was honored by the league's offensive linemen with the Morris Trophy as the league's top defensive lineman. STANFORD junior tackle **David Yankey** was honored with the Morris Trophy as the league's top offensive lineman. Cardinal **David Shaw** was named the Pac-12 Coach of the Year for the second straight season after guiding the Cardinal to their third consecutive 11-win season. Oregon quarterback **Marcus Mariota** was named the league's Offensive Freshman of the Year after setting a Pac-12 freshman record with 32 TD passes, and USC defensive lineman **Leonard Williams** picked up Defensive Freshman of the Year accolades. Lee and Stanford tight end **Zach Ertz** were unanimous All-Americans, while four additional Conference players garnered consensus All-America status.

MEN'S GOLF

The Pac-12 enjoyed another remarkable season in men's golf, highlighted by CALIFORNIA's record-setting run to the NCAA Championships and a bevy of national individual honors for Conference golfers. Cal, which became the first team in modern era to win 11 of its first 13 events, established a new NCAA record for tournament wins in a season. The Conference was well represented on the national awards circuit, as a pair of Pac-12 players garnered national player of the year accolades and four were named PING first team All-Americans. Four teams were ranked among the top nine in the final GolfWeek rankings, and a fifth cracked the top 20. Additionally, nine individuals found themselves ranked among the top 25 in GolfWeek's final individual rankings. Ten Conference teams received NCAA Regional bids--more than any other Conference--and five qualified for the NCAA Championships, where California senior Max Homa collected individual medalist honors. Cal, which posted the low team score in stroke play, was eliminated in the match-play semifinals by eventual runner up Illinois.

Cal (1,406, +6) posted a nine-stroke victory at The Los Angeles Country Club to capture its second consecutive Pac-12 title. The Bears, who held a two-stroke lead over runner-up UCLA through 54 holes, picked up seven strokes on Wednesday to secure their unofficial NCAA-record-tying 10th tournament victory of the season. UCLA, which carded a 15-over 1,415 for the tournament, took second, while Washington finished third at 32-over (1,432). **Max Homa**, who set a course record with a 9-under 61 in round one, collected medalist honors with a 9-under 271 for the tournament.

California's **Michael Kim** was named the Pac-12 Men's Golfer of the Year, Jon Rahm of ARIZONA STATE was tabbed Pac-12 Freshman of the Year and California coach **Steve Desimone** picked up Pac-12 Coach of the Year honors for the second straight year. Kim also became Cal's first-ever recipient of the Jack Nicklaus Award, which recognizes the top players at the Division I, II, III, NAIA and NJCAA levels. WASHINGTON's **Chris Williams** won the prestigious Ben Hogan Award, which is presented annually to the nation's top collegiate men's golfer, taking into account all collegiate and amateur competitions during the past 12-month period. Cal's Kim, Homa and **Michael Weaver** and STANFORD's **Patrick Rodgers** were named Division I PING first team All-Americans. Kim, Weaver and Rodgers represented the United States in the Palmer Cup, while Cal's **Joël Stalter** competed for the European squad. The Bears' dominant run through the regular season yielded five Pac-12 Golfers of the Month, marking the first time that a team has swept the award.

WOMEN'S GOLF

USC claimed the program's fourth Conference title, posting a 54-hole total of 853 (-11) to win the 2013 Pac-12 Championship. The Trojans' first championship came in 1989, and won crowns in 2008 and 2011. USC freshman **Annie Park** became the third-consecutive Trojan, and sixth overall, to earn top medalist honors.

Eight Pac-12 teams were selected to participate at the NCAA Regionals and six advanced to the NCAA Championships. USC sailed to the national championship by 21 strokes ahead of the rest of the field. The team's 72-hole total of 1,133 strokes for 19-under-par obliterated the previous championship record set by UCLA in 2004 by an impressive 15 strokes. Park captured the individual title with a 10-under 278.

USC swept the Pac-12 Women's Golf Honors. Park was named Pac-12 Golfer of the Year and Freshman of the Year, and USC head coach **Andrea Gaston** was named Pac-12 Coach of the Year.

The Beavers in front of a home crowd claimed the title with a Championship team total of 197.850. It was a team effort for OREGON STATE as different individuals stepped up on every event for the Beavers. Vault was led by senior **Makayla Stambaugh** and **Kelsi Blalock** as they tied for second with a pair of 9.950's. The Beavers took the top spots on bars as Stambaugh won the event with a 9.975, and senior **Stephanie McGregor** and junior **Brittany Harris** tied with UCLA senior **Vanessa Zamarripa** for second all with 9.950's. Senior **Melanie Jones** took the floor title again with a 9.950. CALIFORNIA head coach **Justin Howell** was named the 2013 Pac-12 Coach of the Year in his first year as head coach. California also took the Freshman of the Year with **Serena Leong** earning that honor. STANFORD junior **Amanda Spinner** was named the Specialist of the Year, while UCLA's Zamarripa was crowned the Gymnast of the Year.

All eight Conference teams were selected to participate in the NCAA Women's Gymnastics Regional Championships. STANFORD, UCLA and UTAH all advanced to the NCAA Championships in addition to five Pac-12 individuals. ARIZONA senior **Aubree Cristello**, Oregon State sophomore **Chelsea Tang** and Harris and WASHINGTON senior **Lauren Rogers** all advanced in the all-around, while OSU's Stambaugh advanced on the floor exercise. UCLA advanced to the Super Six team competition and placed fourth overall with a 197.100. Nine Pac-12 gymnasts qualified for individual event finals. On vault UCLA's junior **Olivia Courtney** and senior **Kaelie Baer** placed third and fourth, respectively with Zamarripa placing fifth. Utah's sophomore **Georgia Dabritz** took the highest finish for the Pac-12 as she tied with former Olympian Bridget Sloan from Florida for second place on bars.

The Pac-12 produced 20 All-Americans for the second year in a row, including 12 first-team All-Americans. UCLA led the Conference with 10, UTAH had eight and STANFORD had two.

PAC-12 WOMEN'S GYMNASTICS SCHOLAR ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Stephanie McGregor, Oregon State

WASHINGTON completed its second-straight undefeated season, winning all five grand finals at the IRA National Championships for the second year in a row. Prior to last season, no crew had swept all five events at the regatta. The national title was the 16th for the Huskies, who have captured three-consecutive IRA Championships for the first time in program history. UW also claimed the Ten Eyck Trophy for the seventh-straight season, extending its IRA record. CALIFORNIA, which posted top-three finishes in the second varsity eight, the varsity four, the freshman eight and the open four grand finals, placed third in the Ten Eyck standings, while STANFORD finished in 13th-place and OREGON STATE came in 17th.

Washington successfully defended its Conference title at the Pac-12 Rowing Championships on Lake Natoma, hoisting the team trophy for the fourth year in a row. The Huskies won three of the four men's races, including the varsity eight. Cal turned in a time of 6:35.6 in the varsity four to upend top-seeded Washington and added a pair of second-place performances in the varsity eight and the freshman/novice eight to finish second in the team standings. STANFORD, which raced to a second place finish in the varsity eight, placed third in the team standings.

Stanford's **Austin Hack** was named the Pac-12 Athlete of the Year. He rowed in the Cardinal's varsity eight crew that placed third at the Pac-12 Championships and second in the petite final at the IRA Championship. The junior, who is in his second year in the varsity eight shell, also helped Stanford's top boat to its first victory over California at the Big Row since 2008. **Alex Perkins** of Washington was tabbed the Newcomer of the Year after helping the Huskies capture their third-consecutive national title as a member of their unbeaten varsity eight crew. Washington's **Michael Callahan** earned top coaching honors for the fourth year in the row. In his sixth year at UW, the Huskies have won the Ten Eyck Award during each of his six seasons at the helm.

WOMEN'S ROWING

CALIFORNIA captured the varsity eight title en route to earning a second-place finish at the NCAA Championships. The Golden Bears, who finished just two points behind national champion Ohio State, has placed among the top three at the NCAA Championships in nine of the last 10 years. USC, which entered the weekend with a perfect record in the women's varsity eight, finished fourth, followed by WASHINGTON in sixth, UCLA in ninth and STANFORD in 10th. WASHINGTON STATE, which placed sixth in the varsity four grand final, came in 14th.

Cal posted victories in the varsity four and the second varsity eight at the Pac-12 Championships to claim its sixth-consecutive league title. USC finished second but posted the highest point total in varsity races to earn the league's automatic NCAA berth. The Trojans cruised to a five-second victory in the varsity eight, regatta's marquee event. WASHINGTON, which opened the Championships with an open-water victory in the women's freshman/novice eight, placed third.

USC's **Melanie Grindle** was named the Pac-12 Athlete of the Year after helping the Trojans to a victory in the varsity eight at the Pac-12 Championships. Newcomer of the Year **Ieva Adomaviciute** is in her first full year of competition at WSU, helping the Cougars earn a NCAA Championships berth. USC's **Zenon Babraj** earned his second Pac-12 Coach of the Year honor after guiding the Trojans to a second-place finish at the Pac-12 Championships. He was named the Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association (CRCA) West Region Coach of the Year.

MEN'S SOCCER

WASHINGTON and UCLA earned bids to the NCAA Tournament with the Bruins earning the No. 6 seed and the Huskies grabbing an at-large bid. This was the Huskies' first appearance in the tournament since 2007. The Bruins experienced their 30th straight NCAA bid and their 40th appearance overall. The Huskies topped Air Force in the first round by a score of 1-0, but fell to Creighton in the second round, 4-2. UCLA received a first round bye and was upset by San Diego in the second round 5-2.

Ryan Hollingshead, UCLA senior midfielder, had a stand-out senior season and was named both the Pac-12 Player of the Year and the Pac-12 men's soccer Scholar-Athlete of the Year. He is the first men's soccer player to earn both awards in the same season. UCLA head coach **Jorge Salcedo** was named Coach of Year for the second year in a row after leading UCLA to an 8-1-1 Conference record and the second Conference championship in as many years. STANFORD midfielder **Aaron Kovar** was named the Freshman of the Year after tallying eight points in 15 games for the Cardinal this season. Kovar was just the second Stanford player to win the Conference Freshman of the Year.

CALIFORNIA senior defender **Steven Birnbaum** and Hollingshead were named finalists for the Senior CLASS Award. Hollingshead earned first team honors, while Birnbaum was named to the second team. Hollingshead was named a second team College Soccer News All-American. UCLA freshman defender **Grady Howe** was named to the College Soccer News All-Freshman team. Washington junior goalkeeper **Spencer Richey** and Hollingshead were named to the second team TopDrawerSoccer.com team of the season. Stanford senior forward **Adam Jahn** was named to the third team.

OREGON STATE's **Emery Welshman** led the way in the MLS SuperDraft this year with the 16th overall pick by the Toronto FC. Welshman was joined in the first round by UCLA's **Fernando Monge** who was picked up by the Montreal Impact with the 18th selection. Hollingshead was drafted in the second round at No. 20 by FC Dallas. Washington's **Dylan Tucker-Gangnes** was selected in the second round with the 34th overall pick by the Portland Timbers. Jahn, Washington's **Ben Fisk**, UCLA's **Evan Raynr** and Oregon State's **Colin Mitchell** were all drafted in the MLS Supplemental Draft.

WOMEN'S SOCCER

Six Pac-12 teams earned NCAA Tournament bids in 2012, and four teams hosted first round matches. Conference champion STANFORD, which made its fifth consecutive trip to the College Cup, fell to eventual national champion North Carolina in the semifinal. UCLA reached the quarter-finals and CALIFORNIA advanced to the second round, while ARIZONA STATE, WASHINGTON and WASHINGTON STATE fell in the first round. Pac-12 teams posted a 75-28-12 (.704) record against non-conference competition this season, and three teams claimed spots in the final NSCAA rankings. Stanford finished the season at No. 3, while UCLA came in a No. 5, and Cal landed at No. 21 in the poll.

Five players represented the Pac-12 on NSCAA All-America teams — **Zakiya Bywaters** (first team) and **Abby Dahlkemper** (second team) of UCLA and **Alina Garciamendez** (first team), **Rachel Quon** (first team) and **Mariah Noguiera** (second team) of Stanford. Additionally, 23 of the 33 players named to the NSCAA All-Pacific Region team are from Pac-12 schools. Cardinal head coach **Paul Ratcliffe** claimed his fifth straight Pac-12 Coach of the Year award, and UCLA's Bywaters was the Pac-12 Player of the Year.

SOFTBALL

ARIZONA STATE and WASHINGTON represented the Pac-12 at the Women's College World Series. The Sun Devils tied for seventh, while the Huskies tied for third. It was the 27th consecutive year the Conference has sent two teams or more to the WCWS.

Eight of the Pac-12's nine teams made the NCAA postseason for the second consecutive year. ARIZONA STATE, OREGON, and WASHINGTON all hosted regionals while ARIZONA, CALIFORNIA, OREGON STATE, STANFORD and UCLA went on the road. The Sun Devils, Ducks and Huskies all advanced to the Super Regional competition.

Oregon claimed its first ever Pac-12 Championship with a 19-5 league record, going 12-0 at home in Conference play. ASU sophomore catcher **Amber Freeman** was named the Pac-12 Player of the Year while UO's **Janie Takeda** was named the Pac-12 Batting Champion after leading the Conference with a .442 batting average. **Jessica Moore** from Oregon was crowned the Pac-12 Pitcher of the Year for her performance atop the mound. Stanford's **Kayla Bonstrom** took home the Freshman of the Year honors and UW senior catcher **Shawna Wright** was named the Defensive Player of the Year. The Ducks' skipper **Mike White** was voted the Pac-12 Coach of the Year.

MEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING

Three Pac-12 squads finished among the top four at the NCAA Championships and four teams placed in the top seven. CALIFORNIA paced the Conference with a second-place finish (406.5), followed by ARIZONA in third (313.5) and USC in fourth (289). STANFORD came in seventh with 282 points, ARIZONA STATE finished 18th (53) and UTAH rounded out the Conference contingent in 33rd place (11). The Pac-12's seven representatives in the top 10 led all conferences.

Cal claimed its first Pac-12 Conference Championship since 1981, ending Stanford's 30-year lock on the league crown. The Golden Bears accumulated 825 points to edge second-place Cardinal (800), and USC took third with 638.5 points. Arizona's **Kevin Cordes** swept the breast stroke events, while Cal standout **Tom Shields** won both butterfly events and USC's **Vladimir Morozov** took the 50 and 100 freestyle in spectacular fashion, setting an NCAA record in the latter.

Cordes was named the Pac-12 Swimmer of the Year after a season in which he excelled on both the collegiate and international circuits. He set a pair of American records in the 100 and 200 breaststroke early in the season and followed it up with a pair of medals at the 2012 FINA World Swimming Championships in December. Then he added Conference titles in the 100 and 200 breaststroke. At the NCAA Championships, Cordes established new NCAA, American and U.S. Open records in the 100 and 200 breaststroke en route to picking up Swimmer of the Meet honors. Pac-12 Freshman of the Year **Josh Prenot** broke the California school record in the 400 IM in a fall meet and bettered the mark at the NCAA Championships. Cal's **David Durden** was named the Pac-12 Men's Swimming Coach of the Year for the fourth-consecutive year.

Stanford's **Kristian Ipsen**, the Pac-12 Men's Diver of the Year, enjoyed a successful campaign in all three diving disciplines. The 2012 Olympic bronze medalist set a Conference record on the 3-meter springboard at the Pac-12 Championships and took home the league title on the one-meter springboard en route to picking up Men's Diver of the Meet honors. He followed up with a record-setting performance on the one-meter springboard at the NCAA Championships, during which he also won his second national title on the three-meter and took second on the platform. Arizona's **Rafael Quintero**, the Pac-12 Freshman Diver of the Year became the first Arizona freshman in more than a decade to win the platform title at the Pac-12 Championships. Stanford's **Rick Schavone** was named the Pac-12 Diving Coach of the Year after leading four Cardinal divers to the NCAA Championships, where Ipsen claimed titles on the one-meter and three-meter springboard events.

WOMEN'S SWIMMING & DIVING

CALIFORNIA scored 293 points to place second at the NCAA Championships. In all, four Pac-12 schools finished among the top 10, tying the SEC for the highest total of any conference. ARIZONA, which claimed three individual national titles, finished fifth (311), while USC placed seventh (291) and STANFORD took eighth (246). Cal freshman **Elizabeth Pelton** garnered CSCAA Swimmer of the Meet laurels after setting an NCAA and American record in the 200 backstroke and posting second-place finishes in the 200 IM and the 200 freestyle. She also helped the Bears to a trio of third-place finishes in relays.

Bolstered by a series of strong finishes on the final day of competition, STANFORD captured its third Pac-12 Championship in four years. Cal won four individual events in the final evening of competition, and USC notched key victories in the 1,650 freestyle and on women's platform, but the Cardinal picked up valuable points in the 200 backstroke, 100 freestyle and 400 freestyle relay to secure the victory. Stanford finished with 1,439.5 points, while USC (1,418.5) came in second and Cal (1,333.5) took third. Pelton and fellow Cal freshman **Rachel Bootsma** set meet records in the 200 and 100 backstroke, respectively, and the Golden Bears won a league-high seven individual Conference titles.

Pelton, who collected Pac-12 Swimmer and Freshman of the Year accolades, was named Swimmer of the Meet at the Pac-12 Championships after winning individual titles in the 200 backstroke and the 200 IM. She established a Pac-12 record in the 200 backstroke and swam the opening leg of the Bears' winning 400 freestyle relay. Cal head coach **Teri McKeever** earned Pac-12 Women's Swimming Coach of the Year for the sixth time in her career.

Arizona's **Samantha Pickens** was named Pac-12 Women's Diver of the Year. She capped the season with a victory on the one-meter at the NCAA Championships. ARIZONA STATE freshman **Morgan Weller** was named Pac-12 Women's Diving Freshman/Newcomer of the Year after winning the one-meter and placing sixth on the three-meter at the Pac-12 Championships. Weller's victory on the one-meter at the Pac-12 Championships was ASU's first in the event since 2005. USC's **Hongping Li** was tabbed the Pac-12 Women's Diving Coach of the Year for the fifth-consecutive year and a record tenth time overall. Under his tutelage, redshirt sophomore **Haley Ishimatsu** established a NCAA record on the platform en route to winning her first national title. Ishimatsu was named the Diver of the Meet at the Pac-12 Championships after winning the platform, placing second on the one-meter and finishing fourth on the three-meter.

UCLA claimed the Pac-12 Championship title in Ojai, Calif. and finished as runner-up in the NCAA Championship on a season capped by a 29-1 overall record and a perfect 7-0 Conference record. The Bruins topped USC in the championship match at the Pac-12 tournament by a score of 4-3.

The Pac-12 had 11 individuals selected for the NCAA singles championship competition. Four Pac-12 athletes advanced to the Round of 16 including USC's **Yannick Hanfmann** and **Ray Sarmiento**, UCLA's **Marcos Giron** and WASHINGTON's **Kyle McMorrow**. **Roberto Quiroz** of USC and **Dennis Novikov** of UCLA both advanced to the second round before being eliminated. CALIFORNIA's **Campbell Johnson** and **Ben McLachlan**, STANFORD's **John Morrissey**, USC's **Emilio Gomez** and UCLA's **Adrien Puget** all fell in the first round of competition.

The Pac-12 men were represented in the doubles tournament solely by the pair from Cal of Johnson and **Christoffer Konigsfeldt**. The duo fell in the first round to a pair of athletes from Auburn.

UCLA's Novikov was named the Pac-12 Singles Player of the Year, while California's pair of Johnson and Konigsfeldt were selected the Pac-12 Doubles Team of the Year. Johnson was also voted the Pac-12 Freshman/Newcomer of the Year. UCLA head coach **Billy Martin** was awarded the Pac-12 Coach of the Year.

The Pac-12 finished the season with three teams ranked in the ITA Top 25: No. 2 UCLA, No. 5 USC and No. 17 California.

WOMEN'S TENNIS

The Pac-12 Conference tennis season concluded with the crowning of STANFORD women's tennis team at the NCAA Championships. **Nicole Gibbs** of Stanford won her second individual national title in a row for the Cardinal as the pair of **Kaitlyn Christian** and **Sabrina Santamaria** of USC finished their undefeated season as the NCAA doubles champions. Gibbs was just the fifth individual to win back-to-back NCAA singles titles, while Christian and Santamaria put USC back on the map nationally with the first doubles title ever for the Trojans.

UCLA and USC split individual championships at the Pac-12 Championships in Ojai, Calif. UCLA freshman **Kyle McPhillips** was crowned the singles champion as the USC duo of Christian and Santamaria claimed the doubles title.

The NCAA women's team tournament featured five of the 11 Pac-12 schools that sponsor tennis. Stanford, the 2013 National Champion, upset three higher ranked schools en route to the championship. UCLA fell in the semifinals to eventual runner-up Texas A&M. California advanced to the semifinals, while USC fell in the round of 16 to the Cardinal and Arizona State fell in the second round.

USC's Santamaria was named the Pac-12 Singles Player of the Year, and the USC duo of Christian and Santamaria were named the Pac-12 Doubles Team of the Year. UCLA's McPhillips earned the Pac-12 Freshman/Newcomer of the Year and USC's **Richard Gallien** was awarded the Pac-12 Coach of the Year.

The Pac-12 finished with four teams ranked in the ITA Top 25: No. 1 Stanford, No. 6 USC, No. 7 UCLA and No. 9 CALIFORNIA.

MEN'S OUTDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

For the seventh-consecutive year, OREGON claimed the Pac-12 Track & Field Championship title at Cromwell Field at Loker Stadium on the campus of USC. Oregon won by over a 40-point margin. It was the 14th league title for the Ducks. UO went on to record the Pac-12's highest finish at the NCAA Championships, as three league teams finished in the top 10. The Ducks placed fourth with 44 points, two points ahead of fifth-place USC. At the Pac-12 Championships, two meet records were broken, including the 1500-meter record that had stood since 1979. ARIZONA's **Lawi Lalang** recorded a 3:38.53 in the event to break the record held by Rudy Chapa (Oregon, 3:38.7).

Pac-12 student-athletes claimed seven NCAA titles. UA's Lalang won a pair of titles, the 5,000 meter and 10,000 meter, and was the only athlete at the meet to win more than one title. USC's **Bryshon Nellum** (400m) and **Reggie Wyatt** (400mh), OREGON's **Elijah Greer** (800m) and **Mac Fleet** (1500m), and UCLA's **Julian Wruck** (discus) all won individual titles, as well. Wruck also broke the Pac-12 record in the discus twice, setting the collegiate record with a throw of 68.16m/223-7, over seven feet further than the previous league mark.

Postseason honors went to USC's Bryshon Nellum, who was named Pac-12 Track Athlete of the Year, ARIZONA STATE's **Jordan Clarke** was voted Pac-12 Field Athlete of the Year for second time in his career and WASHINGTON's **Chris Williams** was tabbed the Pac-12 Newcomer of the Year, the first-ever Husky to earn the honor. Pac-12 Coach of the Year Honors went to first-year head coach OREGON's **Robert Johnson**. Nellum was also tabbed the USTFCCA National Men's Track Athlete of the Year, USC sprint coach, assistant coach **John Henry Johnson**, was named the National Men's Assistant Coach of the Year.

WOMEN'S OUTDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

OREGON claimed its fifth-straight Pac-12 title, accumulating 139 points at Loker Stadium on the campus of USC. The Ducks used four individual titles and a win in the 4x100 relay to claim the title. Included in one of those wins was a 1-2-3 finish in the 200-meter race. Four Pac-12 Championships meet records were broken on the women's side. Two of those downed records came at the hands of UO's **English Gardner** and ARIZONA STATE's **Christabel Nettey**. They broke Gail Devers' (UCLA) records in the 200 meter and long jump, respectively, records which had stood since 1987, the first year the Conference sponsored women's sports.

The Ducks went on to finish third at the NCAA Championships, the highest finish among Pac-12 teams, scoring 43 points, just one point behind the second-place team. Four league teams in all placed in the top 10 in the final standings. Taking home individual titles were UO's Gardner, who successfully defended her 100-meter title, winning the race in a Pac-12 record 10.96. STANFORD's **Kori Carter** set a NCAA-meet record in the 400-meter hurdles, posting a time of 53.21 to give the Cardinal its first-ever title in the event. COLORADO's **Emma Coburn** won her second 3,000-meter steeplechase national title in three years, while ARIZONA's **Brigetta Barrett** finished a decorated collegiate career with a third-straight NCAA title in the high jump. 2012 Olympic silver medalist Barrett also set the NCAA collegiate-meet record in the event at the Pac-12 Championships. ASU brought home two individual titles with **Anna Jelmini** (shot put) and **Chelsea Cassulo** (hammer throw) grabbing top honors.

Stanford's Carter became the first-ever Cardinal to be named Pac-12 Track Athlete of the Year, while UA's Barrett was tabbed the Pac-12 Field Athlete of the Year for the second time in three years and Oregon's **Jenna Prandini** was voted the Pac-12 Newcomer of the Year. Oregon's **Robert Johnson** was voted the Pac-12 Coach of the Year by his league peers. Barrett was also named the National Women's Field Athlete of the Year.

WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL

OREGON represented the Pac-12 in the national championship game, the third-straight year a league squad has played in the final match. The Ducks were the fifth-seeded team in the tournament, the program's highest-ever seeding, and made its first-ever NCAA semifinal appearance. UO's **Alaina Bergsma** was named the AVCA National Player of the Year, the third-straight year a Pac-12 player has earned the distinction.

The Pac-12 boasts the most storied history at the NCAA Championships, as seven different Pac-12 teams have advanced to the national semifinals since 2001. At least one league team has advanced to the semifinal round for the 29th time all-time and to the title match for the 24th time. The Pac-12 has won 14 NCAA titles in women's volleyball, the most of any conference in the country.

Seven Pac-12 teams earned NCAA Tournament bids, tied for the most of any conference in the country. STANFORD received the league's automatic berth after claiming the Pac-12 crown, the program's 15th all-time league title and the sixth in the last seven years. Five of the Conference's seven tournament teams were among the top-16 seeded teams. Stanford was the No. 2 seed, Oregon was the fifth seed, USC was the No. 6 seed, UCLA was the No. 7 seed and WASHINGTON was the No. 13 seed. Also earning bids were ARIZONA STATE and CALIFORNIA. It was the Sun Devils' first tournament appearance since 2006. The Conference has sent at least six teams to the NCAA Tournament for 13-consecutive years. It sent four teams to the regional semifinals for the ninth time in the history of the tournament, with three squads advancing to the regional finals.

Individually, eight league players earned AVCA All-American honors, including five first-team honorees. In addition to the AVCA National Player of the Year honor, she was also tabbed the Pac-12 Player of the Year. The Pac-12 Freshman of the Year was USC's **Samantha Bricio**, the third second time in the last three years a Trojan has earned the honor. UO's **Lauren Plum** was voted the Pac-12 Setter of the Year and USC's **Natalie Hagglund** was selected the Pac-12 Libero of the Year for the second-straight year. The Pac-12 Coach of the Year honors went to Stanford's **John Dunning**.

OREGON STATE claimed its third Conference championship in four years and sent a Conference-high seven wrestlers to the NCAA Championships in March. OSU finished eighth at the NCAA Championships in March, posting the program's second consecutive top-10 finish.

BOISE STATE redshirt senior **Jason Chamberlain** was named the Pac-12 Wrestler of the Year. He finished the season 26-1 and claimed his third Pac-12 title at 149 pounds. The two-time All-American finished the season in the top two in winning percentage for the Broncos and took second at the NCAA Championships after dropping a 3-2 decision in the 149-pound final.

(Capsule Reviews of 2012-13 Pac-12 Highlights in the MPSF)

MEN'S GYMNASTICS

STANFORD finished third with a 436.150 at the NCAA Championships after entering the meet ranked fourth. Stanford senior **Eddie Penev** finished second on floor tallying a 15.550. Penev also tied for seventh on vault with a 15.125. He took third in the all-around competition with an 87.350. Teammate redshirt sophomore **Sean Senters** took eighth place on floor with a 14.00 and tied for fifth on vault with a 15.125. Redshirt senior **John Martin** took a top three finish on pommel horse with a score of 14.775 to place third. California freshman Takahiro Kawada also placed on pommel scoring a 14.475 for eighth. **Jonathan Liu** of California led the way on parallel bars with a fourth place finish (14.900). Stanford sophomore **Brian Knott** (14.750) and Stanford freshman **Dennis Zaremski** (14.525) finished seventh and eighth, respectively on the event. Redshirt senior **Cameron Foreman** rounded out the top ten on parallel bars with a 13.600. The Cardinal was the runner-up at the MPSF Championship (425.950) behind Oklahoma with California placing third (419.550). Penev was crowned the floor champion with a 15.950 and earned the all-around title totaling an 88.200. Foreman tied for first on parallel bars scoring a 14.80. A total of ten All-American honors were earned by eight gymnasts during the NCAA Individual Event Finals. Penev completed his distinguished collegiate career by earning the Nissen-Emery Award given to the nation's top senior gymnast.

MEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

ARIZONA STATE won its second-straight MPSF title, only the second in the history of the program. The Sun Devils scored 125.5 points, winning the title by a large margin. OREGON's **Elijah Greer** his 800-meter title with a new MPSF standard (1:46.73). Additionally, STANFORD's **Michael Atchoo** took down the all-time MPSF Mile, running a 3:57.14, while COLORADO's **Joe Morris** was a double-event champion in the 60-meter (6.72) and 200-meter (21.06). Six Pac-12 teams went on to compete in the NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships where UO and ARIZONA tied for sixth in the final team competition. The Wildcats' **Lawi Lalang** took home a pair of individual national crowns, claiming the Mile and the 3,000 in meet-record times. He went on to be named the USTFCCA National Men's Indoor Track Athlete of the Year for the second-consecutive year. UO's Greer was the NCAA Champion in the 800 meter, while ASU's **Jordan Clarke** claimed his third-straight shot put title.

WOMEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

Powered by a win in the 4x400-relay, OREGON won its fourth-straight NCAA Indoor Track & Field title, also winning the MPSF crown for the third time in the last four years. The Ducks were the only team to score 100 points at the Conference meet, tallying 112 points. Oregon's **Phyllis Francis** took down the MPSF record in the 400-meter (52.03), one of the oldest running records in league history, dating back to the inaugural year for the conference in 1992-93. ARIZONA'S **Julie Labonte** wrapped up her indoor career with a fourth-straight shot put crown. Three Pac-12 teams placed in the top-10 at the NCAA Championships, with ARIZONA and ARIZONA STATE finishing in a tie for seventh. COLORADO's **Emma Coburn** was the national champion in the mile, while UA's **Brigetta Barrett** won her third NCAA title in the high jump.

WOMEN'S LACROSSE

STANFORD upset top-seeded Denver to win its eighth MPSF Tournament title in nine years and earn the MPSF's automatic NCAA Tournament berth. The Cardinal recorded its first-ever victory in the NCAA Women's Lacrosse Tournament, defeating Notre Dame, 8-7, as sophomore **Hannah Farr** scored the game-winning goal with just four seconds remaining in regulation to advance to the second round. The MPSF Player of the Year was CALIFORNIA's senior attack **Megan Takacs**, winning the honor for the second-straight year. She scored at least three goals against every Conference opponent this season. Midfielder **Amanda Johansen** of first-year program USC was tabbed the MPSF Rookie of the Year after setting the single-season Conference record for draws.

MEN'S VOLLEYBALL

UCLA fell to BYU in MPSF Championship semifinals, 23-25, 21-25, 25-18, 26-24, 15-10. UCLA junior **Gonzallo Quiroga** and Stanford junior **Brian Cook** were both named First Team All-MPSF. Stanford junior **Steve Irvin**, USC sophomore **Micah Christenson**, UCLA juniors **Spencer Rowe** and **Dane Worley** were all named second team recipients. Stanford freshman **James Shaw**, UCLA junior **Evan Mottram** and UCLA junior **Robart Paige** were all accorded honorable mention status. Shaw was also named to the All-Freshman team.

MEN'S WATER POLO

In a Championship match that pitted USC against cross-town rival UCLA, the Trojans held strong and claimed their fifth-consecutive national championship, making it 15-straight years since a non-Pac-12 school won the national title. No. 1 USC topped No. 2 UCLA, 11-10, in Los Angeles, Calif., to extend their record of five consecutive national championships in exciting fashion as the game winner was delivered with just 40 seconds left in the game. Senior **Michael Rosenthal** was named the NCAA Tournament Most Valuable Player. The father son duo of USC head coach **Jovan Vavic** and USC junior **Nikola Vavic** earned the National Coach of the Year and National Player of the Year honors, the first father-son duo to ever do so. In all, 14 players from Pac-12 institutions were named All-Americans, including six first-team honorees.

WOMEN'S WATER POLO

In the longest match in women's water polo championship game history, No. 1 USC rallied from a 3-0 deficit and defeated STANFORD 10-9 in a third sudden-death period to win the 2013 national title. USC's goalie **Flora Bolonyai** made 17 saves in the championship match earning her the NCAA Tournament Most Valuable Player. USC's **Anni Espar** and **Kaleigh Gilchrist** joined Bolonyai on the All-Tournament first team, while Melissa Siedmann, **Maggie Steffens** represented Stanford and **Rachel Fattal** represented UCLA. On the second team **Kate Baloni** and **AnnikaRIES** were from Stanford, while **Hannah Buckling** was the lone Trojan. Senior Cardinal two-meter **Melissa Siedemann** was named the 2013 Peter J. Cutino Award winner making her the third-straight Stanford player to receive the annual honor. Siedmann was also the ACWPC National Player of the Year, while 17 players from Pac-12 institutions were tabbed All-Americans. USC's **Joan Vavic** was also voted the National Coach of the Year.

FOLLOW THE PAC-12 TO LONDON

PAC-12 ROAD TO LONDON PAVED WITH GOLD

With Conference-affiliated athletes representing 46 countries at the XXX Olympiad in London last summer, the Pac-12's final medal count came to 45 at the conclusion of the Games. If the Pac-12 had been a nation, it would have ranked fifth, just ahead of Germany (44). The Pac-12's 19 gold medals would have ranked fifth among all countries.

The Conference sent an impressive contingent of 239 athletes, coaches and other officials with ties to Pac-12 institutions, far outpacing other major conferences.

Team USA included 138 individuals with Pac-12 ties, including 119 athletes who competed in 13 sports. In fact, Pac-12 Olympians make up almost 25 percent of the 529 Team USA athletes that competed in London. In addition, for the first time ever, the U.S. sent more women than men to the Olympic Games. Of those 269 women who donned the red, white and blue, 69 were from the Pac-12 (26 percent), a true testament to Title IX and the Conference's strength in women's athletics.

Pac-12 competitors won medals for nine different countries, as eight of member institutions schools were represented on the medal podium. USC led all universities across the nation with 25 total medals, California was third with 17 and Stanford had 16. The top-three gold-medal winning institutions across the country are from the Pac-12, with Stanford and USC each claiming 12. Cal had 11 to rank third, and UCLA's six medals tied for fifth.

Over the course of the London Olympic Games, Pac-12 affiliated athletes claimed medals in a variety of sports, both indoors (swimming, water polo, volleyball, cycling, and diving) and outdoors (swimming, track & field, soccer, tennis, rowing, and beach volleyball).

In addition, contributions to the official medal count came almost equally in men's and women's sports. Pac-12 women contributed to 23 medals, while the men helped to win 22.

Individually, 89 total medals are going home with Pac-12 athletes, including 51 golds. While in London, Pac-12 athletes also set five world records, two Olympic records, an American record and a collegiate track record. A couple of 'firsts' were accomplished by Pac-12 athletes, including Haley Anderson (USC) becoming the first American woman to medal in the open water swimming event, and Tunisia's Ous Mellouli (USC) becoming the first swimmer to medal in an indoor and the open water events in the same Games.

Additionally, the "World's Greatest Athlete" was bestowed upon former Oregon Duck and American Ashton Eaton, after winning the decathlon. An "All-American final" in women's beach volleyball featured three Pac-12 athletes (of the four competing), and, with seven of the eight women's water polo teams featuring at least one athlete with Pac-12 ties, the Conference was virtually guaranteed three medals, and, indeed, a Pac-12 athlete stood on every level of the medal podium at the end of the tournament.

The track & field had the most Pac-12 athletes, with 59 representing 20 countries. Swimming was second with 52 athletes from 28 countries. The water polo competition featured the third-most Pac-12 athletes with 31, including 12 women named to the 13-player USA roster. In rowing, 29 athletes competed for several countries that had Pac-12 allegiances.

Other notable areas of impressive Pac-12 participation included women's soccer, women's water polo and beach volleyball. Ten women on the 18-player USA women's soccer roster were from the Pac-12, 12 of the 13 USA women's water polo players were from the Pac-12, and five of the eight named to the USA beach volleyball roster were from the Pac-12.

In 16 days of competition, Pac-12 athletes claimed medals on all but one day of the London Games.
