PAC-12 CONFERENCE



Built on a firm foundation of academic excellence and superior athletic performance, the Conference ushers in a new era with the additions of the University of Colorado and University of Utah, officially becoming the Pac-12 Conference on July 1, 2011.

The Pac-12 rises above the rest, upholding its tradition as the "Conference of Champions", claiming an incredible 180 NCAA team titles over the past two decades, including nine in 2010-11, averaging nearly nine championships per academic year. Even more impressive has been the breadth of the Pac-12's success, with championships coming in 27 different men's and women's sports. The Pac-12 has led the nation in NCAA Championships in 45 of the last 51 years and finished second five times.

Spanning nearly a century of outstanding athletics achievements, the Pac-12 was the first conference to reach 400 championships in 2010-11. With the inclusion of CU and UU, league teams have captured 442 NCAA titles (302 men's, 140 women's), outdistancing the next closest conference by nearly 200.

The Conference's reputation is further proven in the annual Learfield Sports Directors' Cup competition, the prestigious award that honors the best overall collegiate athletics programs in the country. STANFORD continued its remarkable run and won its unprecedented 17th-consecutive Directors' Cup in 2010-11. Six of the top 25 Division I programs were Pac-12 member institutions: No. 1 STANFORD, No. 3 CALIFORNIA, No. 11 UCLA, No. 14 USC, No. 16 ARIZONA and No. 21 WASHINGTON. With two teams in the top five, it was the most of any conference.

The 2010-11 campaign was marked by the 25-year anniversary of women's sports in the Pac-10, with year-long focus on the milestone. And after commissioner Larry Scott made history at the end of his first year with the announcement of the expansion of the Conference to include the University of Colorado and the University of Utah, he put the Conference on the forefront, announcing a landmark television deal, which is set to go into effect in 2012-13, and established a Pac-12 Football Championship game in 2011.

In 2010-11, the then-Pac-10 led the country with nine NCAA titles, with men's and women's programs sharing the wealth as the Conference claimed five NCAA women's titles and four men's crowns.

CALIFORNIA, STANFORD and USC each won two NCAA Championships, while six different league institutions claimed titles. The Golden Bears swept the men's and women's swimming and diving crowns; the Cardinal hoisted the national championship trophy in men's gymnastics and women's water polo; and the Trojans were tops in men's water polo and men's tennis.

Claiming titles in softball (ARIZONA STATE), women's indoor track & field (OREGON), and women's golf (UCLA), the Pac-10 also had runners-up in 10 NCAA Championship events: women's volleyball (CALIFORNIA), women's soccer (STANFORD),

women's gymnastics (UCLA), women's rowing (STANFORD), women's tennis (STANFORD), and women's track & field (OREGON). It was an all-Pac-10 final in men's and women's water polo, as well. Overall, the Conference had 32 teams finish in the top four at 18 NCAA Championship events.

Participation in the postseason was a common occurrence for the Pac-10 in 2010-11. Of the 22 sports sponsored by the Conference, 16 witnessed at least half its teams participating in NCAA or other postseason action. The men sent 66 of a possible 91 teams into the postseason (65.9 percent), while the women sent 69 of a possible 99 teams (69.7 percent).

The Conference experienced continued success in football as the league sent two teams to BCS Bowl games, with the Ducks earning a spot in the national championship bout. Overall, four went to bowls games. Oregon claimed its ninth Pac-10 crown in the sport, making its first-ever appearance in the BCS title game. Meanwhile, STANFORD (Discover Orange Bowl), ARIZONA (Valero Alamo Bowl), WASHINGTON (Holiday Bowl) also earned bowl bids. Oregon and Stanford were ranked in the

Without question, the Conference has dominated the softball field, winning 23 national championships in the sport since 1982 and six in a row after ARIZONA STATE hoisted the 2011 NCAA trophy, its second in three years. Seven Pac-10 teams earned NCAA Tournament bids, with two advancing to the NCAA Women's College World Series, including Pac-10 Champion ASU and CALIFORNIA.

Six Pac-10 baseball teams received NCAA Tournament bids in 2011. ARIZONA STATE, CALIFORNIA, OREGON STATE and STANFORD reached the Super Regionals, with Cal ultimately punching its ticket for the NCAA Men's College World Series, its first appearance in the CWS since 1992. ARIZONA, and UCLA also represented the Conference in the postseason event.

The Conference swept two men's and women's sports, capturing national championships in swimming & diving and water polo. CALIFORNIA took home both swimming & diving crowns. In water polo, USC was the top men's teams and the STANFORD women were national champs.

With the additions of Colorado and Utah, Pac-12 members have won 302 NCAA team championships on the men's side, 89 more than the next closest conference. Men's NCAA crowns have come at a phenomenal rate for the Pac-12 - 16 basketball titles by six schools (more than any other conference), 52 tennis titles, 44 outdoor track & field crowns, and 26 baseball titles. Pac-12 members have won 25 of 42 NCAA titles in volleyball, 37 of 42 in water polo, and 22 in swimming & diving national championships.

Individually, the Conference has produced an impressive number of NCAA men's individual champions, as well, boasting 2,019 individual crowns.

On the women's side, the story is much the same. Since the NCAA began conducting women's championships 30 years ago, Pac-12 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season on 22 occasions, including 2010-11. Overall, the Pac-12 has captured 140 NCAA women's titles, easily outdistancing the SEC, which is second, with 77. Pac-10 members have dominated a number of sports, winning 23 softball titles, 19 tennis crowns, 13 of the last 21 volleyball titles, 14 of the last 22 trophies in golf, and 12 in swimming & diving.

Pac-12 women student-athletes shine nationally on an individual basis, as well, having captured an unmatched 616 NCAA individual crowns, an average of nearly 21 championships per season.



top-5 of the Associated Press' poll at season's end, finishing third and fourth, respectively.

Pac-10 regular-season champion ARIZONA, tournament champion WASHINGTON, UCLA and USC represented the Conference in the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, and three others competed in other postseason events. The Wildcats' run to the Elite Eight gave the league its 22nd appearance in the last 24 years. The CBI title returned to the Pac-10 after OREGON bested Creighton in a best-of-three series for the crown.

On the women's side, three teams competed in the NCAA Tournament and three others competed in postseason play. STANFORD made its fourth-consecutive NCAA Women's Final Four appearance after winning its fifth-straight Pac-10 Tournament crown. UCLA made its first back-to-back postseason outing for the first time since 1998-99. USC advanced to the WNIT championship game, while ARIZONA and CALIFORNIA were also invited to the event.

PAC-12 CONFERENCE HISTORY

The roots of the Pac-12 Conference date back over 95 years to December 2, 1915, when the Pacific Coast Conference (PCC) was founded at a meeting at the Oregon Hotel in Portland, Ore. The original membership consisted of four schools - the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Washington, the University of Oregon, and Oregon State College (now Oregon State University). All still are charter members of the Conference.

Pacific Coast Conference play began in 1916 and, one year later, Washington State College (now Washington State University) was accepted into the league, with Stanford University following in 1918.

In 1922, the PCC expanded to eight teams with the admission of the University of Southern California (USC) and the University of Idaho. In 1924, the University of Montana joined the league roster, and in 1928, the PCC grew to 10 members with the addition of UCLA.

The Pacific Coast Conference competed as a 10-member league until 1950, with the exception of 1943-45 when World War II curtailed intercollegiate athletic competition to a minimum. During that time, the league's first commissioner was named. Edwin N. Atherton was Commissioner in 1940 and was succeeded by Victor O. Schmidt in 1944. In 1950, Montana resigned from the Conference and joined the Mountain States Conference. The PCC continued as a nine-team Conference through 1958.

In 1959, the PCC was dissolved and the Athletic Association of Western Universities was formed and Thomas J. Hamilton was appointed Commissioner of the new league. The original AAWU membership included California, Stanford, Southern California, UCLA and Washington. Washington State joined the membership in 1962, while Oregon and Oregon State joined in 1964. Under Hamilton's watch, the name Pacific-8 Conference was adopted in 1968. In 1971, Wiles Hallock took over as Commissioner of the Pac-8.

Ten years later, on July 1, 1978, the University of Arizona and Arizona State University were admitted to the league and the Pacific-10 Conference became a reality. In 1986-87, the league took on a new look, expanding to include 10 women's sports. Thomas C. Hansen was named the Commissioner of the Pac-10 in 1983, a role he would hold for 26 years until 2009. Hansen was succeeded by current Commissioner Larry Scott, who took on the new role in July 2009.

During the 2010-11 academic year, Scott helped deliver monumental changes that transformed the Conference into a modern 12-team league. The Conference expanded by adding the University of Colorado and the University of Utah, agreed to equal revenue sharing for the first time in Conference history, created two divisions, the North and the South, for football only, established a Football Championship Game for the first time ever, secured a landmark media rights deal that dramatically increased national exposure and revenue for each school and established the Pac-12 Network and Pac-12 Digital Network that guaranteed enhanced exposure across all sports.

The University of Colorado accepted its invitation to join the Pac-12 on June 11, 2010, and on June 17, 2010, the University of Utah agreed to join the Conference. The Buffaloes and Utes officially became the 11th and 12th members of the Conference July 1, 2011, the first additions to the league since 1978. During the 33 years between expansions, Conference teams claimed 258 NCAA titles, including 130 women's and 128 men's.

Currently, the Pac-12 sponsors 11 men's sports and 11 women's sports. Additionally, the Conference is a member of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) in four other men's sports and three women's sports.

The Pac-12 Conference offices are located 25 miles east of San Francisco in Walnut Creek, Calif.

The 11th-annual Pacific Life Pac-12 Women's Basketball Tournament heads back to Los Angeles for the fourth-straight year. The men's and women's tournaments have been combined, once again, with the first two rounds of the women's event taking place at Galen Center on March 7 and 8. The women head over to STAPLES Center, which has been the home of the men's tournament for 10 years, to see the new Pac-12 Champion crowned. The combination of the tournament will creates a fan-friendly, festival-like atmosphere for all to enjoy.

The Pac-12 Women's Basketball Tournament made its debut in 2002 and was held on the University of Oregon campus in Eugene, Ore. The Conference's premier women's sporting event then moved to HP Pavilion at San Jose for a six-year run (2003-08). The winner of the 12-team tournament receives the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Championship. The tournament seeding and Conference Champion are determined by the 18-game regular-season Pac-12 schedule.

En even in its infancy, the Pac-12 Conference played a significant role in the development of women's basketball. On April 4, 1896, California and Stanford squared off at the Page Street Armory in San Francisco in the first women's intercollegiate game in the nation. And two weeks later, the University of Washington hosted Ellensburg State in Seattle.

While progress slowed through much of the first half of the century, women's basketball pioneer Carol Eckman changed the game's history by engineering the first official women's tournament in 1969. In 1972, the tournament expanded into the Association for Inter-collegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW). At that point, women's basketball was off and running.

In 1978, just six seasons after the advent of the AIAW, UCLA was the first league squad to represent the Conference with a national title. The Bruins accomplished the feat at Pauley Pavilion on the UCLA campus in front of an AIAW record crowd of 9,351. However, UCLA was not the last Conference team to win a national crown.

The 1981-82 season marked the first year that women's basketball began competing in the NCAA with the advent of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Championship, implementing a 32-game field which, with the increasing popularity of the sport, first expanded to 48 teams and has grown to 64 teams after a second expansion in 1994.

League play began in 1986-87, the first year the Pac-10 Conference began sponsoring women's sports, combining the NorPac Conference (California, Oregon, Oregon State, Washington and Washington State) with the Western Collegiate Athletic Association (Arizona, Arizona State, Stanford, UCLA and USC).

The Conference quickly established a reputation as one of the strongest women's basketball leagues in the nation, with solid teams across the board. The Pac-10 sent at least four teams to the NCAA Tournament nine times in the decade of the '90s, and every Conference member made a trip to the Big Dance during that decade. In the new millennium, the story has proved much the same. Seven different Conference teams have advanced to the NCAA Tournament in the last six seasons.

Stanford head coach Tara VanDerveer took the Pac-10 Conference to new heights by winning a pair of NCAA titles in the 1990s. National Player of the Year Jennifer Azzi led the Cardinal to its first title in 1990, while Val Whiting guided the Cardinal to its second national championship in 1992. All told, Stanford made six trips to the NCAA Final Four in a seven-year span of the '90s.

Since the beginnings of the AIAW, the Conference's most significant contribution to the success and development of women's basketball has been its legendary players.

Names like Ann Meyers, Cheryl Miller, Cherie Nelson, Denise Curry, the McGee Sisters, Azzi, Sonja Henning, Whiting, Natalie Williams, Lisa Leslie, Kate Starbird, Tina Thompson, Nicole Powell and Candice Wiggins are just a few of the Pac-10 stars who have written a chapter in women's basketball at both the national and Conference level.

The first of this elite group to bring the women's game into the national spotlight was Meyers, the first four-time All-American. Meyers led the UCLA Bruins to the 1978 AIAW Championship under the direction of then-first year head coach Billie Moore. Curry, also a member of the 1978 title team, earned All-American honors three times and still stands as UCLA's all-time leading scorer, male or female. After 16 seasons, Moore ended her stint as the Bruins' mentor with a 423-182 career coaching record, with 296 of her victories coming at UCLA.

Miller led USC to consecutive titles in 1983 and 1984 and rewrote the school's record books. A four-time All-American, Miller won the Naismith Award three times, an amazing feat considering the honor is the equivalent of college football's Heisman Trophy. Miller was also selected to the "1980s NCAA Team of the Decade" as voted by a panel of media and coaches.

In 1999, Kodak named its Silver Anniversary Team, honoring the top-10 Division I players of all-time, and Meyers and Miller were two of the 10 athletes honored.

Only 18 women have ever been inducted into the Naismith Memorial Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mo., and five of those outstanding individuals hail from the Pac-12: Meyers (1993), Miller (1995), Curry (1997), Moore (1999) and legendary head coach Tara VanDerveer (2011).

The Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in Nashville, Tenn., announced its inaugural class of 25 inductees in 1998, honoring legends from the 107-year history of the women's game. Moore, Meyers, Curry and Miller were inducted in the initial year. VanDerveer and former USC and California Coach Marianne Stanley joined the ranks in 2002, while former Oregon player and former Ducks head coach Bev Smith was inducted with the Class of 2004.

On the national level, women's basketball has made tremendous strides in both popularity and attendance. The 2008 Olympic Team won its fourth-straight gold medal as Leslie became just the second basketball player ever to win four gold medals (Teresa Edwards, U.S.). Leslie was joined by former Pac-10-great Thompson on the 2008 national team.

Many outstanding Pac-12 women's basketball players have gone on to success at the professional level, as 13 former Pac-12 stars are currently playing or coaching in the WNBA. Headlining that prestigious list of athletes who have played in the WNBA is Leslie, a five-time All-WNBA first team honoree and the 2002 WNBA Finals MVP. The first player to be placed on a team when the league began, Leslie became the first WNBA player to amass 5,000 career points and recorded the first dunk in league history during the 2002 campaign. She guided the Los Angeles Sparks to back-to-back league titles in 2001 and 2002. Fellow USC alumnae Thompson and retired WNBA star Cynthia Cooper helped guide the Houston Comets to four straight WNBA titles in 1997-2000. In August 2003, Thompson became just the second WNBA player to amass 4,000 points, following in Leslie's footsteps. Regarded throughout the league as the face of the WNBA and the most dominant player in the sport, Leslie announced her retirement in 2009, concluding a career that spanned 15 years.


The newest chapter in Conference women's basketball history has seen the league expand to include Colorado and Utah and the addition of a postseason tournament in 2002. An inaugural Pac-10 Women's Basketball Tournament was held Mar. 1-4, 2002, at storied McArthur Court on the University of Oregon campus. The Arizona State Sun Devils defeated the Stanford Cardinal in the championship game, capturing the Conference's first tournament trophy. Beginning in 2003, the tournament moved to the Northern California Bay Area and HP Pavilion at San Jose for a six-year run (2003-08), which saw UCLA and the Cardinal capture titles. In 2009, the tournament moved to the Galen Center in downtown Los Angeles and it proved to be another exciting chapter in the event. The tournament was combined with the men's tournament in 2010 and, for the first time ever, the semifinals and championship games were played at the STAPLES Center.

The eighth head coach in Arizona history, Butts enters her fourth season at Arizona ... one of the most sought-after young coaches in the country ... prior to landing in Tucson, spent five seasons at Kentucky, the last as an associate head coach ... also spent time at Michigan State and Tennessee Tech ... a four-year letterwinner at Tennessee, winning a national championship in 1997 and 1998.

TEAM OUTLOOK

- Head coach **Niya Butts** returns five letterwinners from last year's squad that won 21 games and participated in postseason play for the first time since 2005. The Wildcats posted their first winning record since the 2005 team went 20-12 and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.
- Butts and the Wildcats look to draw on the momentum from last season, when they won eight of their last 11 contests and got a win against rival Arizona State for the first time since Jan. 26, 2005. A fourth-place conference finish was Arizona's highest since capturing the league crown in 2004.
- Arizona has two returning starters in JR G **Davellyn Whyte** and SR G **Shanita Arnold**. Whyte earned All-Pac-10 honors for the second-straight season after averaging 15.8 points, 4.6 rebounds and 2.9 assists per game in 2010-11. She scored at least seven points in every game during the season and recorded double-digit figures in 29 contests.
- In her first season with the Wildcats after transferring from Arkansas, Arnold led the Pac-10 in assists for much of the year and finished ranked second with 4.88 assists per game.
- Arizona welcomes a newcomer class of three freshmen and three transfers to Tucson in 2011-12. JR F **Cheshi Poston** averaged 12.8 points and 11.5 rebounds per game for John A. Logan College in Carterville, Ill. Poston earned NJCAA All-America honors as the Lady Vols earned their first trip to the NJCAA Tournament in 10 years.

The seventh head coach in Colorado women's basketball history, Lappe was hired by her alma mater on April 12, 2010, and is the youngest head coach at a BCS Conference school ... Last season, was the only rookie Division I head coach with wins over ranked teams (No. 16/15 Oklahoma, No. 17/16 Iowa State) ... One of three rookie head coaches to lead a team into the postseason as the Buffaloes advanced to the quarterfinals of the WNIT in 2010-11.

TEAM OUTLOOK

- In her first season as head coach, **Linda Lappe** and the Buffaloes advanced to the WNIT quarterfinals. Colorado looks to build on its success from 2010-11 after moving from the Big 12 to the Pac-12.
- Colorado must replace its all-time leading scorer in Brittany Spears, who started all 127 games of her career and recorded 2,185 points. Spears, who is prominent in nearly every career statistical category for the Buffaloes, was the 19th overall pick in the 2011 WNBA Draft by the Phoenix Mercury.
- Despite the loss of Spears, Colorado has several returning playmakers, including JR G **Chucky Jeffery**, who led the team with 4.3 assists and 2.5 steals per game while ranking second in points (13.5 ppg) and rebounds (7.9 rpg). She also logged just the second triple-double in team history.
- Jeffery split time with SO G **Brittany Wilson** last year, but with the graduation of Britney Blythe, the duo will likely see extended time on the floor together since both are able to play either guard position.
- JR G/F **Meagan Malcolm-Peck** is the Buffaloes' most consistent returning long-range threat after knocking down 38 three-pointers in 2010-11.
- The lone senior on the team is F **Julie Seabrook**, who started all 34 games last season. Seabrook provides veteran presence in the post, but her ability to shoot from outside helps stretch an opponent's defense.

Known for his up-tempo style of play, enters his third season at his first position with a collegiate women's team after spending 18 years in the men's game coaching at LaSalle, George Mason and Loyola Marymount, before coaching in the NBA with the Chicago Bulls and the Los Angeles Lakers ... had a very successful coaching career with the WNBA's Phoenix Mercury, where he led the team to a 41-27 (.603) record over two years and a WNBA Championship in 2007.

TEAM OUTLOOK

- Oregon welcomes back four players that finished last season in the starting lineup - SR F **Amanda Johnson**, SO F **Danielle Love**, SO G **Ariel Thomas** and SO G/F **Deanna Weaver** - while fifth-year SR G **Nia Jackson** is expected to be healthy in her return to the floor following a season-ending knee injury.
- Before being sidelined by injury, Jackson was leading the Pac-10 with 17.0 points and 5.7 assists per game. Her junior season was her best yet, as she shot a team-best .460 from the field and .435 from three-point range. Jackson finished the year with 20 double-figure scoring games in 21 games played.
- During Westhead's two years at Oregon, the Ducks have been one of the highest scoring teams in the NCAA, ranking second in 2010 (81.4 ppg) and 15th in 2011 (73.3 ppg). The Ducks also averaged 8.5 three-pointers per game last year, good for third in the country.
- Oregon returns 67-percent of its scoring from last season, including four of its five top scorers, so the Ducks look to continue lighting up the scoreboard in 2011-12.
- In addition, three of Oregon's top five rebounders are back. Johnson led the Ducks and ranked third in the Pac-10 with 8.3 rebounds per game. She also finished the season third in the conference in scoring at 15.9 points per game.

TEAM OUTLOOK

- As head coach **Scott Rueck** enters his second year at the helm, he welcomes back four starters including his top two leading scorers from last season in SO G **Alyssa Martin** and RS JR G **Sage Indendi**. Martin was named to the Pac-10 All-Freshman Team after starting all 30 games for the Beavers and averaging 12.4 points. Martin finished the season with 20 double-digit points games. Close, who has coached in 15 consecutive NCAA Tournaments as an associate or assistant coach, returns to Westwood after serving on the Bruins coaching staff in 1994 and 1995 ... Considered one of the top offensive minds in the game, spent the last seven seasons as an associate head coach at Florida State, guiding the Seminoles into a nationally-recognized program ... Florida State won at least 20 games in all but one of her seasons in Tallahassee.

TEAM OUTLOOK

- The Bruins' recent success has seen them finish second in the Conference and advancing to the second round of the NCAA Tournament in back-to-back years. A new era begins, however, with head coach **Cori Close** taking over the helm. With nine letterwinners and a pair of starters, Close intends to build on the team's postseason accomplishments.
- Close and the Bruins are already facing challenges. The team will have to move forward without SR F **Jasmine Dixon**, who suffered a season-ending injury in the off-season. Dixon was a national player of the year candidate and a two-time all-conference performer.
- In addition to Dixon, the team loses its top two scorers from last season in Doreena Campbell and Darxia Morris who have exhausted their eligibility. But taking on the offensive load will be SR G **Rebekah Gardner** who was the team's biggest outside-shooting threat and claimed double-digit starts.
- UCLA was one of the top rebounding teams in the country last year, ranking 21st in rebounding margin. The Bruins welcome back RS JR **Atonye Nyingifa** and JR G/F **Markel Walker**. Both were among the top 20 rebounders in the Conference last season.
- Close will inherit a talented recruiting class, including top in-state prospects FR F **Kacy Swain**, FR G **Moriah Faulk** and FR G **Alexis Perry**.

TEAM OUTLOOK

- The Trojans are coming off one of their most successful seasons in recent memory, winning the most games since the 1993-94 campaign and advancing to the championship game of the WNIT. Four starters return from last year's squad, including all-conference performers SR G **Briana Gilbreath** and SR G **Ashley Corral**, both of who have been significant contributors since stepping foot on campus as freshmen.
- Added to the mix is RS SR G **Jacki Gemelos**, the No. 1-rated high school recruit in the nation in 2006. After making her collegiate debut halfway through the season two years ago, she appeared to be in top form last year as she competed in her first full collegiate campaign.
- With two years under his belt, head coach **Michael Cooper** is drawing in some of the best talent in the nation. The incoming freshman class was ranked eighth-best in the country. The incoming class hails from the state of California and a transfer from Australia.
- Considered a bubble team the last two years, USC could have all the pieces in place to be among the 64 teams invited to participate in the NCAA Tournament. It would be the first trip to the "Big Dance" for the Trojans since 2006. Ranked No. 23 entering the 2011-12 campaign, the Trojans are ranked in the preseason for the first time since 2006.

Serving as interim head coach last season, Levrets guided a young team to an 18-17 record that included four-straight wins in the Mountain West Conference Tournament and a No. 15 seed in the NCAA Tournament ... In his three years as an assistant, the Utes reached the NCAA Tournament in 2008 and 2009 ... The 2008 squad went undefeated in conference play (16-0) and earned a No. 7 seed in the tournament ... Has coached three All-Americans with the Utes in Leilani Mitchell, Morgan Warburton and Kilee Whipple.

TEAM OUTLOOK

- After winning a conference championship and making an NCAA Tournament appearance in his first season, head coach **Anthony Levrets** is ready to continue the tradition of success as the Utes enter the Pac-12. Utah became the first No. 5 seed to win the Mountain West Conference Tournament and earned the program's 17th bid to the NCAA Tournament in 2011.
- Levrets returns four starters from last year's squad, including MWC Tournament Most Valuable Player, SR G **Janita Badon** and MWC Freshman of the Year, SO F **Michelle Plouffe**. Badon, the lone senior on the team, is entering her third year as a starter at point guard. She averaged 12.6 points and 5.6 assists per game last season. Plouffe ranked second on the team in scoring with 13.7 points per game while leading the Utes in rebounding (7.3 rpg).
- RS JR G **Iwalani Rodrigues**, the team's leading scorer last season (14.9 ppg), was a second-team All-MWC honoree. She also ranked in the top 10 in the nation in three-point percentage (.449).
- The 2010 MWC Freshman of the Year and a All-MWC second team pick, RS SO F **Taryn Wicijowski** returns after redshirting in 2010-11. In her first season, she led the conference and ranked 10th in the NCAA with a 57.8 field goal percentage. Wicijowski also averaged 14.8 points and 6.3 rebounds.

Spent 12 seasons at Washington where she posted nearly 200 victories and led the Huskies to six NCAA Tournament appearances ... Has coached 16 All-Pac-10 performers in her career and one Pac-10 Player of the Year.

TEAM OUTLOOK

- The Cougars had their best showing in the Conference since the 1997-98 campaign, finishing tied for seventh in the league. Head coach **June Daugherty**, in her fifth year in Pullman, welcomes back four starters and 11 letterwinners.
- Washington State appears to be an experienced squad. Veterans SR G **April Cook**, SR G **Jazmine Perkins**, JR C **Carly Noyes** and RS SO G/F **Ireto Amojo** have been asked to fill the role as starters since arriving on campus as freshmen.
- Amojo was one of the best three-point shooters in the Conference, knocking down 1.55 threes per game at a rate of 40.6 percent shooting. Noyes was one of the top three blockers in the league, averaging 1.39 blocks per game.
- WSU has scheduled one of the toughest slates, taking on Big Ten foes Penn State, Wisconsin, Ohio State and Michigan. Regional foes Gonzaga and San Diego State are on the slate, as well as the Big East's Louisville.

STANFORD rolled to the Conference title, going a perfect 18-0 and advancing through the postseason field of 64 to its fourth-straight NCAA Final Four. In total, the Conference had three teams make the NCAA Tournament with UCLA earning a No. 3 seed and ARIZONA STATE receiving a bid as a seven-seed. ARIZONA, CALIFORNIA and USC made postseason appearances, as well, playing in the WNT, with the Women of Troy eventually falling in the championship game.

Pac-10 athletes also pulled down a number of individual honors, as Conference player of the year Stanford guard Jeanette Pohlen was named a first team All-American by the Associated Press (AP), and received additional nods by United States Basketball Writer's Association (USBWA) and John R. Wooden All-America teams. Fellow Cardinal junior forward Nnemkadi Ogwumike was a second team AP All-American and was also named to the USBWA and John Wooden teams, while guard/forward Kayla Pedersen garnered honorable mention honors from the AP. Other AP honorable mentions went to UCLA's Jasmine Dixon, USC's Briana Gilbreath and Arizona's Ify Ibekwe. Ibekwe also became the first Wildcat to take home the Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Year award, and Stanford forward Chiney Ogwumike was the Conference's Freshman of the Year.

In a season that saw her win her 800th game as a head coach, Stanford's Tara VanDerveer was named the John R. Wooden Coach of the Year for the 11th time in 25 years at the helm. Perhaps most notably, though, it was also announced that she would be part of the 2011 class enshrined in the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame—only the eighth female coach to be inducted.

Additionally, Pedersen and Pohlen were both taken in the first round of the WNBA Draft with the seventh and ninth picks, respectively. Ibekwe was drafted in the second round.

Many outstanding Pac-12 women's basketball players have gone on to succeed at the professional level, as 13 former Pac-10 stars are currently playing or coaching in the WNBA. Headlining the list of former Pac-12 athletes who have played in the WNBA is Lisa Leslie, a five-time All-WNBA First Team honoree and the 2002 WNBA Finals MVP who retired in 2009. Leslie became the first WNBA player to amass 5,000 career points and recorded the first dunk in league history during the 2002 season. She guided the Los Angeles Sparks to back-to-back league titles in 2001 and 2002. Fellow USC alums Tina Thompson and retired WNBA star Cynthia Cooper helped guide the Houston Comets to four-straight WNBA titles from 1997-2000.

LARRY SCOTT COMMISSIONER

Larry Scott came to college athletics in 2009 with an energy and bold vision that he has used to deliver monumental changes to one of the most storied Conferences in the country, the Pacific-10, and transform it into a modern 12-team Conference built for long-term success. Welcome to the Pac-12.

Scott succeeded Tom Hansen as the sixth Commissioner of the Pac-10 Conference on July 1, 2009. Scott came to collegiate athletics after serving six years as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour (Women's Tennis Association), where he helped generate unprecedented growth and popularity for women's professional tennis on a global scale.

He has established a solid track record of innovation and growth -- across a range of different sports, at both the college and professional levels -- grounded in deep experience that goes back to his student-athlete days at Harvard.

At the WTA Tour Scott achieved the long-sought goal of equal prize money for women in tennis' grand slam events. He also became the architect of the largest-ever sponsorship in both women's sports and professional tennis, a six-year \$88-million landmark title sponsorship agreement with Sony Ericsson. Among his many other WTA achievements are the largest television deal in women's tennis history, and a reform package that led to a 40 percent increase in prize money - a record \$86 million - and \$750 million in facilities investment.

More recently, in his first two years as Commissioner of the Pac-10, Scott has led the Conference through expansion for the first time since 1978 by successfully adding Colorado and Utah, created a Football Championship Game for the first time in Conference history, secured agreement for equal revenue sharing for the first time ever, delivered a landmark media rights agreement with ESPN and Fox that dramatically increases revenue and national exposure for schools, and created the Pac-12 Network and Pac-12 Digital Network that promises to significantly enhance exposure for all sports throughout the Conference. He has also orchestrated a rebranding of the Conference, with messages of innovation, excellence, and the advantages of West Coast location at its core.

Scott has earned major recognition for his visionary leadership: In 2008 the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour was nominated by Sports Business Journal as Sports League of the Year and was the recipient of the Women's Sports Foundation Billie Jean King Contribution Award. In 2008, Scott was named to Time Magazine's list of best global sports executives.

Scott's career in athletics extends back to his captaincy of Harvard's tennis team, where he was named an All-American, earned a B.A. in European History in 1986, and gained a lifelong appreciation for the importance of maintaining a careful balance between academics and sports. He went on to play tennis professionally on the ATP circuit, winning one title, and then going on to serve for more than a decade in key posts, including Chief Operating Officer, President of ATP Properties, and Executive Vice President of the International Group. In these roles, which included postings in Sydney, Monte Carlo and London, he was credited with significantly growing the global popularity of men's tennis, establishing the Tennis Masters Cup as one of the sport's most successful events, negotiating the renewal of the ATP's 13-year partnership with Mercedes-Benz -- which remains one of the preeminent sponsorship agreements in tennis history -- and launching tournaments in such developing regions as China and the Persian Gulf.

Larry and his wife, Cybille, live in Danville, Calif., and have three children, Alexander, Sebastien and Alannah.

LEARFIELD SPORTS DIRECTORS' CUP

Six Pac-10 Conference institutions finished the 2010-11 academic year ranked in the final Learfield Sports Directors' Cup top 25, the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) announced today. Two institutions, STANFORD and CALIFORNIA, were in the top five, the most of any conference.

The Conference of Champions was represented by five members in the Directors' Cup top 20, tied for the most with the ACC. The Cardinal won its 17th-consecutive cup after claiming national championships in men's gymnastics and women's water polo, and runner-up finishes in women's tennis and women's soccer, accumulating an impressive 1550.25 points, 273.2 points better than second-place Ohio State.

CALIFORNIA posted its highest-ever finish in the standings and sixth-straight top-10 showing, placing third overall with 1219.50 points after sweeping the men's and women's swimming and diving titles. Also placing in the top 25 were UCLA (11th, 1020.75), USC (14th, 9909.25), ARIZONA (16th, 906.00) and WASHINGTON (21st, 779.30).

ARIZONA STATE was just out of the top 25, placing 27th with 692.50 points, and OREGON was 30th with 640.75 points. OREGON STATE was 69th overall (272.00), followed by WASHINGTON STATE (135th, 118.50).

COLORADO and UTAH, who officially joined the Pac-12 Conference today, also placed in the top 75. The Buffaloes were 66th with 315.50 points, while the Utes collected 266.00 points for 71st place.

KEVIN WEIBERG • Deputy Commissioner and Chief Operating Officer

Deputy Commissioner Kevin Weiberg has responsibility for all aspects of the Pac-12 Conference's administrative operations. Woodie Dixon joined the Pac-12 in April 2010 and manages all business affairs, in-house legal matters, football administration and human resources.

Prior to joining the Pac-12, Dixon spent six years (2005-10) as General Counsel for the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs overseeing all legal matters for the franchise, including player, marketing, sponsorship, stadium operations, special event and sales contracts, litigation and licensing. An Arizona graduate, Leighton returns to the Pac-12 where she began her career as a public relations intern. Most recently, she acted as Vice President of Marketing and Brand Development for Maloof Sports & Entertainment. Chris Dawson was named Assistant Commissioner of Olympic Sports in August 2001 and was promoted to Associate Commissioner in February of 2006. She is the Conference liaison for women's basketball, men's soccer, swimming and diving, tennis and softball. Dawson is also responsible for administering the officiating policy. She currently serves on the NCAA Division I Awards, Benefits, Expenses and Financial Aid Cabinet.

Prior to joining the Pac-12, Dawson spent 23 years at the University of California as the Associate Athletic Director for Sport Programs and Senior Women's Administrator from 1992 to 2001. She was named Assistant Athletic Director for the Cal Women's Athletic Department in 1989 and was the Sports Information Director for the women's department from 1979-89. Dawson served as the chair of the NCAA Championships & Competition Cabinet, and as a member of the NCAA Strategic Planning Cabinet, the NCAA Soccer Rules Committee, the NCAA Woman of the Year Committee and the NCAA Volleyball Committee.

Dawson is a 1975 honors graduate of the University of Virginia where she was a student-athlete in basketball. She earned a master's degree in education, with emphasis in sport administration from Ohio University in 1979.

Dave Hirsch has been with the Pac-12 since 1995 and was promoted to Vice President, Communications in June 2010.
