Commanders Public Relations 2024 Media Access Policy



CREDENTIAL POLICY

The Washington Commanders grant credentials and media access based on merit as guided by the priorities listed below. Because of the limited space available at the Commanders Facility in Ashburn and Commanders Field, these priority guidelines are intended to facilitate the most efficient use of space for working media covering the Washington Commanders and the NFL.

Full credential request policies are detailed below. For more information about obtaining media credentials, please contact Sean DeBarbieri and Samantha Fristachi.

The Commanders prioritize outlets in the following order:

1. Broadcast partners, including television and radio personnel responsible for live broadcasts of Washington Commanders games.
2. Local beat reporters who cover the team on a daily basis for large-scale local outlets, including newspapers, wire services, radio stations and television affiliates that cover the Washington Commanders and the NFL on a regular basis.
3. Large-scale national outlets, including national newspapers, magazines, television stations, websites and more.
4. Washington, D.C. metro area community publications and stations.
5. Out-of-town community outlets on specific assignment to cover Commanders personnel of unique interest to the outlet's market (e.g.: a player's hometown newspaper).
6. Blogs, Internet radio and other independent outlets, whose merit and credential consideration is subject to the discretion of Commanders Public Relations.

Policies for visiting scouts are handled separately in accordance with the 2024 Scouting Policy as distributed to all NFL teams prior to the season.

The following guidelines will be observed in granting access:

1. Season credentials will be reserved for organizations that provide consistent and substantial coverage of the Washington Commanders. Please be advised that a season media credential does not guarantee working space in media work areas.
2. With the exception of seasonally credentialed Commanders beat reporters who produce daily on-site reports, all credentials at both locations are approved and issued on a daily and/or game-by-game basis.
3. Passes and credentials are transferable within the same media outlet for use by those serving an editorial function with proper notice and approval by Commanders Public Relations. Passes used by any member of a credentialed outlet without specific editorial assignment or by non-working members of the organization are subject to revocation and will affect all future credentialing decisions by Commanders Public Relations for that outlet.
4. As the result of limited work space, credentials will not be issued to freelance writers or photographers without a specific assignment received in writing by the assigning organization.
5. Credentials may be issued: a) to online entities that are affiliated with a national or regional media organization; or, b) to online entities that host a website that regularly and substantially reports on the National Football League or the Washington Commanders, and employs for that website at least one full-

time permanent employee who writes a substantial majority of all material posted on the site. Priority for these sites will be based on potential audience at the discretion of Commanders Public Relations.

6. Commanders personnel may deny or revoke credentials without notice and an individual shall surrender his/her credential upon request for: noncompliance with the priorities or guidelines set out in this policy; noncompliance with health, safety, or security directives issued regarding Commanders events; and for conduct for which there are reasonable grounds to believe violate state or federal law, or constitute a breach of professional ethics. Any organization that wishes to contest a denial or revocation may: a) request Commanders Public Relations provide a written rationale for the denial or revocation; b) submit a written response to that rationale to the Director of Football Communications.

7. Commanders Public Relations reserves the right to change this policy at any time.

The Commanders Public Relations department has a media website (washington.1rmg.com) designed to serve the needs of all media members who cover the organization. The site contains the annual media guide and weekly game guides including stats, rosters, personnel bios and much more.

PRESS INFORMATION

All Commanders press releases and weekly media packets are distributed via e-mail. Please contact the Commanders Public Relations department to be added to the team's email distribution list for all press releases and media advisories.

Media Access Policy Continued

MEDIA WORKROOM

The media workroom at The Park is located inside the annex building adjacent to the main entrance. The room is available to working media throughout the week. Press conferences, rosters, transcripts and other information will be available in this area.

VIDEO STREAMING

Media availabilities, open practice sessions and other team activities on club premises may not be broadcast live by an individual or media outlet without prior approval from the Washington Commanders. This includes the use of social media applications such as Facebook Live and Periscope among others.

PRACTICE ACCESS

During the regular season, Wednesday-Friday practices will be open to local media who regularly cover the team for designated periods. Upon arrival at the practice facility, please go to the media workroom where a member of the public relations staff will escort you to practice. To request a Commanders Media Credential, email Samantha Fristachi (samantha.fristachi@commanders.com) at least one (1) day prior to your scheduled visit. Any media member without a Commanders Media Credential provided by the Washington Commanders Public Relations department will not be permitted access to the facilities. **NO INFORMATION FROM PRACTICE THAT MAY COMPROMISE THE TEAM'S COMPETITIVE ADVANTAGE IS ALLOWED TO BE DISTRIBUTED VIA ANY MEDIA PLATFORM.** This includes personnel groupings, formations, injury speculation, specific plays, game plan/strategy, player utilization, snap counts, player conduct (like fights or arguments with a coach) and practice drill descriptions and more as judged by Commanders Public Relations. Failure to comply could lead to revocation of credentials.

INJURIES AT PRACTICE

During the course of practice, media may report on practice participation. Media cannot film or report on specifics about players rehabbing away from practice. If an injury occurs during the open shooting portion of practice, media cannot post footage of the injury occurring. Reporting on anything injury adjacent, including a player wearing a brace or frequently speaking to a trainer is prohibited. Failure to comply with this policy could lead to a revocation of credentials.

REPORTING DURING PERIODS WHERE SHOOTING IS DOWN

Media cannot report on any team periods with details that would compromise the team's competitive advantage. Reporting on specific formations, specific plays or route concepts and personnel packages is prohibited. Media can report on practice snap counts and general takeaways from a play. In-season, media cannot report specific practice volume or snap counts. Failure to comply with this policy could lead to a revocation of credentials.

DAN QUINN INTERVIEWS

Head Coach Dan Quinn will conduct a weekly news conference in the Media Annex on Wednesday and Friday during the season. One-on-one requests should be sent to Sean DeBarbieri (sean.debarbieri@commanders.com).

COORDINATOR INTERVIEWS

During the regular season, both the offensive and defensive coordinators will be available after practice on Thursday. The special teams coordinator will be available after practice on Friday if requested. Charlie Mule (charles.mule@commanders.com) serves as the primary media contact for coordinators. All requests for coordinators beyond that time will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis in accordance with the coaches' scheduling availability.

ASSISTANT COACH INTERVIEWS

All requests for assistants must be arranged through the Commanders Public Relations Department with at least 24 hours notice. Position coaches will be available on a rotation after practice on Friday along with one-on-ones per request. Position coaches are available for questions on specific players and the position group only. No position coaches should be contacted directly by telephone (at an office line, at home or by cell phone) or by email. Charlie Mule (charles.mule@commanders.com) serves as the primary media contact for assistant coaches.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

The Commanders locker room is open to accredited media for specific interview periods after roster cutdown. The locker room is generally open to the media for 45 minutes following practices on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays of normal game weeks. All one-on-one requests should be arranged through the Commanders PR department at least 48 hours in advance. All interviews must be conducted inside the locker room unless additional permission is granted by a Commanders PR staff member. **NO B-ROLL, STILL PHOTOGRAPHY OR LIVE STREAMING IS ALLOWED INSIDE THE LOCKER ROOM.** Interviews to be conducted by phone must be arranged through Commanders PR prior to the day of the scheduled interview. All times are subject to change without prior notice.

GAME CREDENTIALS

Demand for credentials is high, and as such, the size and legitimacy of each media outlet requesting access will be considered on a case-by-case basis and subject to the discretion of Commanders Public Relations. Full details on credentialing decisions are available at the beginning of this policy.

For home games, all requests must be submitted through the team's online credentialing system no later than 5 p.m. ET on Monday of that particular game week.

For away games, all requests must be e-mailed to Samantha Fristachi (samantha.fristachi@commanders.com) and must include attending media members' name, job title and media affiliation no later than 10 days out from the scheduled game.

Josh was responsible for some of the firm’s most successful private equity investments, including the historic LyondellBasell transaction.

Across his platform – including through his foundation, Harris Philanthropies, Josh is committed to using a blend of philanthropic giving and impact investment to improve outcomes for underserved groups in communities where he has a deep connection. Specifically, Josh is focused on supporting vulnerable youth through sports and educational programming, championing equity and sustainable wealth creation in diverse communities and enhancing health, wellness and educational outcomes.

Josh serves on the Boards of Harvard Business School, the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania, the NBA, and the NHL. 

DAN QUINN

HEAD COACH

Dan Quinn is entering his first season as Washington's head coach after being named the 31st head coach in franchise history.

Quinn joins the Commanders with 21 years of coaching experience, most recently serving as the defensive coordinator for the Dallas Cowboys where he was named Assistant Coach of the Year voted on by the Associated Press in 2021. He inherited a defense in 2021 that ranked 28th in points-per-game. From 2021-23, Quinn's unit ranked No. 5 in the NFL in points-per-game (19.9), No. 7 in the NFL in net yards allowed-per-game (327.0), No. 6 in the NFL in sacks (141) and No. 1 in the NFL in interceptions (59). His unit also ranked No. 4 in the NFL in that span in third down conversion percentage (36.4%).

In 2023, Quinn led Dallas' defense to finish fifth in points allowed per game (18.5) and passing defense (187.4). CB DaRon Bland led the league with nine interceptions and returned five for a touchdown, a single-season NFL record. The defense finished eighth in the league with 17 interceptions and opponents had a 80.8 passer rating. LB Micah Parsons had a career-high 14.0 sacks while the defense finished for 13th with 46 sacks.

In his second season in Dallas, the Cowboys defense led the league in takeaways (33) for the second consecutive season - joining the 1972-74 Pittsburgh Steelers as the only teams since the NFL merger to lead the league in takeaways in consecutive years - and ranked fifth in points-per-game allowed (20.1). Dallas was also sixth in fewest touchdowns allowed (35), fourth in negative plays forced (115), second in opponent touchdown efficiency (16.2%), third in sacks (54) and first in quarterback pressures (271), per PFF.

Quinn has also excelled in developing defensive talent in Dallas. During his stint as defensive coordinator he assisted in the development of LB Micah Parsons, CB Trevon Diggs and Bland who were all named First Team All Pro as voted on by the Associated Press once over the past three seasons. Dallas also placed three defensive players into the 2024 Pro Bowl in each level of the defense with DE DeMarcus Lawrence, Parsons and Bland all representing the NFC this year in Orlando.

Prior to his stint in Dallas, Quinn spent five seasons as the head coach of the Atlanta Falcons from 2015-2020 where he led Atlanta to an appearance in Super Bowl LI and a playoff berth with a victory and appearance in the NFC Divisional Round in 2017. During his tenure as the Falcons head coach, Atlanta ranked No. 6 in the NFL in total takeaways with 105. Quinn finished his career in Atlanta with a 43-42 regular season record and 3-2 record in the postseason. He captured the second NFC Championship in Atlanta Falcons franchise history.

Quinn landed his first head coaching role after leading one of the greatest defenses in NFL history in Seattle. Quinn oversaw a Seattle defense in 2013-14 that helped guide the club to consecutive Super Bowl appearances. Over those two seasons, the Seahawks ranked No. 1 in the NFL in fewest yards allowed (270.4), points allowed (15.2) and passing yards allowed (178.8), all while holding opposing offenses to just 91.6 rushing yards-per-game. During his tenure in Seattle, Quinn worked with CB Richard Sherman who led the NFL with 12 interceptions in 2013-14. The Seattle defense also led the NFL during that span with 28 total interceptions. In the two seasons that Quinn oversaw the defense, the team totaled 63 total takeaways, which lead the league. Over the course of those two seasons, Quinn had four of his defensive players earn seven Pro Bowl selections - CB Richard Sherman (two), S Kam Chancellor (two), CB Earl Thomas (two) and LB Bobby Wagner (one).

He originally joined Seattle in 2009 as the assistant head coach/defensive line coach under Jim Mora after spending the previous six years coaching the defensive lines for the San Francisco 49ers (2003-04), Miami Dolphins (2005-06) and New York Jets (2007-08).

Between his stints with the Seahawks, Quinn served as the defensive coordinator at the University of Florida (2011-12), guiding the defense to a top-10 finish in 2011 - eighth in total defense (299.5) and seventh in passing defense (166.8).

While with the Jets (2007-08), Quinn coached the defensive line, helping the defense rank fifth in yards per-carry (3.7), seventh in sacks (41.0) and ninth in rushing yards-per-game (94.9) in 2008.

Quinn made his NFL coaching debut in San Francisco as a defensive assistant in 2001 before moving on to coach the 49ers defensive line (2003-04).

Quinn got his start coaching the defensive line at William & Mary (1994), then spent one season at Virginia Military Institute (1995), followed by four years as defensive line coach at Hofstra (1996-99) before being promoted to defensive coordinator in 2000.

HEAD COACH DAN QUINN

In college, Quinn was a four-year letter winner and two-time co-captain (1992-93) defensive lineman at Salisbury State (Division III in Salisbury, Md.). Quinn also lettered in track and field and held the school record in the hammer throw. He was inducted into the Salisbury State Athletic Hall of Fame in 2005.

Quinn, originally from Morristown, N.J., and his wife, Stacey, started Quinn's Corps in 2004, which helps serve members of the military both at home and abroad.

KLIFF KINGSBURY

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Kliff Kingsbury joins the Commanders after serving as a senior offensive analyst for USC in 2023.

Last season, USC's offense scored 41.85 points per game and Kingsbury worked closely with 2024 NFL Draft first overall selection Caleb Williams who threw for 3,633 yards and 30 touchdowns.

Prior to his time at USC, Kingsbury served as the head coach for the Arizona Cardinals for four seasons (2019-22). In 2021, Arizona posted an 11-6 record and secured a playoff berth. Kingsbury became the first head coach since 2015 to post 11-plus wins in a single season and lead the Cardinals to the playoffs. The Cardinals offense ranked top 10 in the league in total offense (8th), touchdowns scored (tied for 8th) and rushing offense (10th). Arizona was one of three teams to rank in the top 10 in total, rushing and passing offense that season.

Kingsbury worked closely with Cardinals QB Kyler Murray. In 2020, Murray threw for a career-high 3,971 passing yards and 26 touchdowns and earned Pro Bowl honors. In his first year under Kingsbury's guidance in 2019, Murray earned Associated Press Offensive Rookie of the Year honors.

In 2019, the Cardinals had historic offensive improvement under Kingsbury. While going 5-10-1 (a two-game improvement from 2018), they were No. 13 in offensive efficiency and had the second-best ground game in the NFL, setting a franchise-record by averaging 5.03 yards per carry. Kyler Murray was named the 2019 NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

In 2020, the Cardinals improved to 8-8 to place third in the NFC West with 3 Pro Bowlers, and continued to progress under Kingsbury in the 2021 campaign with a hot 7-0 start and finished 11-6 with 5 Pro Bowlers. They placed second in the NFC West, losing in the Wild Card playoffs to the eventual Super Bowl LVI champs, the Los Angeles Rams. In 2021, the Cardinals ranked in the top-10 in the NFL in both scoring and total offense.

From 2013-18, Kingsbury served as the head coach at his alma mater Texas Tech. Each season that Kingsbury called plays for the Red Raiders' offense, they ranked in the top 10 for passing yards and in the top 20 in total offense. His teams also averaged at least 30 points per game in every season.

In 2015, Texas Tech ranked second in the country in total offense (570.5), passing offense (388.2) and scoring offense (45.1). QB Patrick Mahomes threw for 4,633 yards and 36 touchdowns, becoming the youngest quarterback in NCAA history to amass 5,000 yards of total offense as he led the nation in that category (393.0).

In 2012, Kingsbury served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Texas A&M, helping QB Johnny Manziel become the first freshman to win the Heisman Trophy. The Aggies ranked third nationally in total offense (558.5), 13th nationally in rushing offense (242.1) and 14th in passing offense (316.5).

Kingsbury began his coaching career at Houston for four seasons, first as the offensive quality control coach, then quarterback coach and finally as co-offensive coordinator. The Cougars led the nation in total offense (599.1), passing offense (450.1) and scoring (49.3) in 2011, while QB Case Keenum completed his record-setting career and won the Sammy Baugh Trophy while being named a Heisman finalist.

Kingsbury was drafted by the New England Patriots in the sixth round in the 2003 NFL Draft. He spent 2003 on injured reserve with the Patriots, then was on the New Orleans Saints practice squad in 2004. He played for the New York Jets in 2005, appearing in one game, then attended the Buffalo Bills training camp in 2006. He played for the Cologne Centurions of NFL Europe in 2006, then signed with the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian Football League in 2007 before spending that season with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers.

As a player at Texas Tech, Kingsbury became one of three players in NCAA history to have more than 12,000 passing yards and total yards, with 1,000-plus completions. He set 39 school records, 16 Big 12 marks and 17 NCAA records. As a 2002 senior, he won the Sammy Baugh Trophy and was the Associated Press Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year.

JOE WHITT JR.

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Joe Whitt Jr. joins the Commanders after serving as the secondary/defensive passing game coordinator for the Dallas Cowboys for the past three seasons (2021-23).

Since taking over the secondary in 2021, Whitt's unit has led the league with 59 interceptions. Last season, Dallas' pass defense ranked fifth in passing yards allowed per game (187.4) and recorded 17 interceptions, tied for the eighth most in the NFL. CB DaRon Bland set an NFL single-season record for most interceptions returned for touchdowns in a single season (five), and earned Pro Bowl and All Pro honors. The Cowboys allowed 27 plays of 25-plus yards, the second fewest in the league.

In 2022, Whitt Jr. worked closely with CB Trevon Diggs as he recorded three interceptions, 14 passes defended and forced incompletions on 12.1 percent of passes. Dallas ranked eighth in the league in net pass yards per game (200.9) and tied for 10th in completion percentage (62.7). S Donovan Hooker registered 5.0 sacks which led all defensive backs and was tied for the most by a Cowboys defensive back since 1984.

In 2021, the Cowboys finished in the top 10 for opponent completion percentage (59.5 - third) and interceptions (26 - first). Diggs led the NFL with 11 interceptions and tied a franchise record while also earning his first Pro Bowl honors. Diggs was also named First Team All Pro as voted on by the Associated Press.

Whitt Jr. served as the secondary/defensive passing game coordinator for the Atlanta Falcons in 2020.

Prior to working in Atlanta, he worked as the pass game coordinator/secondary coach for the Cleveland Browns in 2019. His unit ranked seventh against the pass, allowing 216.9 yards per game. The Browns had 14 interceptions, tied for eighth in the NFL.

In 2018, Whitt Jr. was the defensive pass game coordinator after serving as the secondary/cornerbacks coach for the Green Bay Packers for nine seasons (2009-17). During his time in Green Bay, he helped the team win Super Bowl XLV, and he coached the Packers to a league-high 176 interceptions while ranking ninth in opponent passer rating (83.2). His unit ranked seventh in opponent completion percentage (59.8) and touchdown-to-interception ratio (1.34).

Cornerbacks Tramon Williams and Sam Shields combine for 33 interceptions from 2010-14 which was the most by a set of teammates in that time span. From 2009-11, the Packers led the NFL twice (2009 and 2010) and had 85 total interceptions. It was the most by the team over a three-year span since 1943-45 (95) and the most by any NFL team since the Minnesota Vikings and San Francisco 49ers each posted 86 from 1986-88.

In 2009, Whitt Jr. helped Hall of Fame CB Charles Woodson to a career-best nine interceptions, four forced fumbles, 18 pass defended and three defensive touchdowns. Woodson earned defensive player of the year honors that year and became 1-of-11 defensive backs in NFL history to achieve the honor.

Whitt Jr. entered the NFL coaching ranks with the Atlanta Falcons in 2007 as an assistant defensive backs coach.

He coached cornerbacks at Louisville from 2003-06 and wide receivers at the Citadel in 2002.

Whitt Jr. played collegiately at Auburn as a walk-on wide receiver, eventually earning a scholarship. He transitioned to a student assistant after suffering injuries and graduated in 2001 with a degree in communications.

LARRY IZZO

SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

Larry Izzo joins the Commanders after recently serving as the special teams coordinator for the Seattle Seahawks (2021-23). Izzo is entering his 14th year of NFL coaching and fourth as a special teams coordinator. Before his six-year stint with Seattle, Izzo spent seven seasons coaching with the N.Y. Giants (2011-15) and Houston (2016-17) following a 14-year playing career.

The Seahawks proved to be one of the best special team units in the NFL since 2021 with Kicker Jason Meyers leading the NFL in scoring in the 2022 season awarding him a Pro Bowl appearance (143). Meyers performance in 2023 remained consistent scoring only five less points than the previous year with a career high in made field goals (35). Punter Michael Dickson finished second in the league in net average (44.4 yards per punt) in 2022 while having a career high average in punt yards with 50 this past season.

In 2020, Izzo's special teams unit continued to dominate with kicker Jason Myers connecting on all 24 field goals, finishing 2020 having made 35-consecutive field goals dating back to 2019, a franchise-record. Punter Michael Dickson ranked second in the NFL with a 49.6 punting average and ranked in the top-five in average, net average, and punts landing inside the 20. Long snapper Tyler Ott and special teamer Nick Bellore were voted to their first Pro Bowls.

In 2019, punter Michael Dickson tied the franchise-record for most punts landing inside the 20 in a single season (34). The Seahawks special teams units forced three takeaways and blocked three kicks.

Izzo's first year with Seattle in 2018, Dickson set the franchise single-season punt average (48.2) and net average (42.5) records while becoming the first rookie punter to be named first-team AP All-Pro since Oakland's Shane Lechler in 2000 and the first Seattle punter to make the Pro Bowl since Rick Tuten in 1994, and the first rookie punter since the Los Angeles Rams' Dale Hatcher in 1985 to be selected to a Pro Bowl.

Prior to joining the Seahawks staff as an assistant special teams coach under Brian Schneider, Izzo spent 2016-17 with the Houston Texans as the special teams coordinator. In 2016, kicker Nick Novak tied for second in the NFL with 35 field goals made, which marked his career high and the most in a single season in Texans history.

Izzo spent his first five seasons (2011-15) with the Giants as an assistant special teams coach highlighted with a victory in Super Bowl XLVI. In 2015, the special teams unit ranked fifth in opponent kickoff return average (20.3) and tied for first in field goal percentage (93.8). New York was also seventh in the NFL in punt return average (10.2) and 10th in kickoff returning average (24.9). The Giants' kickoff team allowed an average return of just 18.3 yards in 2014, which ranked second in the NFL.

In his 14-year NFL career, Izzo played for three teams, including the Miami Dolphins (1996-2000), New England Patriots (2001-08) and New York Jets (2009). He was a three-time Super Bowl champion with New England (2001, 2003 and 2004) and a three-time Pro Bowler (2000, 2002 and 2004). He is one of 22 people in NFL history to win a Super Bowl as both a player and coach. He recorded 275 special teams tackles in 200 regular season games and 23 more in 21 postseason games. Izzo never played on a team with a losing record and his teams participated in the playoffs nine times, reaching five AFC Championship Games and four Super Bowls. He was selected as a special teams captain nine times, including eight with the Patriots.

A native of Woodlands, TX., Izzo was a four-year letterman and three-year starter at Rice University, where he played linebacker and finished fourth in school history with 301 tackles, including a record 46 for losses. He was named a consensus first-team All-Southwest Conference selection his senior year. He graduated in 2002 with a degree in business.

OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT

Andre Coleman joins the Commanders after most recently serving as the wide receivers coach at the University of Texas (2020-21). Prior to his time with Texas, Coleman was the wide receivers coach at his alma mater Kansas State from 2013-17 transitioning from his first coaching position as a wide receivers coach at Youngstown state (2010-12).

Before joining the Texas staff as an analyst in 2019, Coleman spent the previous six years at Kansas State coaching wide receivers, including two as pass game coordinator (2016-17) and one as offensive coordinator (2018). In 2018, Kansas State totaled 16 touchdowns on the ground led by running back Alex Barnes who led the Big 12 in rushing yards (1,355) rushing yards per game (113) and earned second-team all-conference honors. Offensive lineman Dalton Risner was named Big 12 co-Offensive Lineman of the Year.

In 2014, All-American Tyler Lockett and All-Big 12 performer Curry Sexton became the first duo in school history to go over 1,000 yards in the same season and were considered a top receiving duo in the nation during that season. Lockett was a semifinalist for the Biletnikoff Award and is currently a wide receiver for the Seattle Seahawks.

Prior to returning to Kansas State, Coleman spent the previous three seasons at Youngstown. He helped the program post a 7-4 record, including a 31-17 victory at Pittsburgh, which served as the school's first-ever victory over a BCS opponent.

As a player, Coleman was drafted in the third round of the 1994 NFL Draft by the San Diego Chargers. He would play for the Chargers, Seattle Seahawks and Pittsburgh Steelers (1994-98). A two-time Pro Bowler and 1994 NFL All-Rookie team honoree, Coleman helped the Chargers win the 1994 AFC Championship and earn a trip to Super Bowl XXIX.

A native of Hermitage, Pennsylvania., Coleman completed his degree in social sciences from Kansas State in 2011. He has three daughters – Shyla, Kyla and Brielle.

TOM DONATELL

DEFENSIVE BACKS

Tom Donatell joins the Commanders after most recently serving as the defensive pass game coordinator/secondary coach for the Los Angeles Chargers in 2023.

From 2021-22, Donatell was an assistant secondary coach with the Chargers. In 2022, Donatell worked closely with safety Derwin James Jr. who earned Pro Bowl and second-team All-Pro Associated Press honors and was the only defensive back to record at least 110 tackles, four sacks, an interception and a forced fumble.

In addition to James Jr., Donatell worked with cornerbacks Asante Samuel Jr. and Michael Davis. Davis set a career hit in passes defended (15) including a league-best 14 over the final 10 games of the season. Samuel Jr. recorded three passes in the teams postseason game which is tied for the second-most in a single postseason game in NFL history.

In 2021, James Jr. became the first defensive back in the last 20 years to have 100 tackles after missing the previous year due to an injury. Samuel was named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month for September after registering two interceptions within his first three career games, while Davis led the unit with 12 passes defended on the year.

Prior to working in Los Angeles, Donatell was a defensive quality control coach for the Seattle Seahawks for four seasons (2017-20).

Before coaching in the NFL, Donatell served as a graduate assistant at UCLA (2015-16) and the University of South Florida (2013-14).

The son of 32-year NFL coaching veteran Ed Donatell, Tom Donatell rotated at linebacker and safety as a collegiate player for the University of Iowa from 2008-12. He started eight games at strong safety for the Hawkeyes as a senior in 2012, picking off two passes and recording one forced fumble over the course of his career.

Donatell and his wife, Rebecca, have three sons Drake, Jack and Bennett.

BOBBY ENGRAM

WIDE RECEIVERS COACH

Bobby Engram is entering his second season with the Washington Commanders as the team’s wide receivers coach after being hired on March 9, 2023.

In 2023, Engram worked closely with WR Terry McLaurin as McLaurin recorded 1,000 yards for the fourth consecutive season, becoming the first player in Washington history to do so.

Engram enters his 13th NFL season after serving as the Baltimore Ravens tight ends coach (2019-21) and wide receivers coach (2014-18). Engram also coached one season with the San Francisco 49ers in the role of offensive assistant in 2011. He also played 14 seasons as a wide receiver for the Chicago Bears, Seattle Seahawks and the Kansas City Chiefs. He was most recently the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach for the Wisconsin Badgers.

In 2020, Engram contributed to an offensive unit in Baltimore that scored the NFL’s seventh-most points (29.3 ppg) in the NFL and led the league in rushing (3,071) for consecutive seasons. During the 2020 campaign, Andrews was tied for the team lead with 58 receptions for 701 yards and seven TDs becoming the first tight end in Ravens history with multiple seasons of at least 700 receiving yards and seven receiving TDs.

In 2019, under Engram’s watch, the Ravens tight ends played a major part of the team’s record-setting offense and 14-2 franchise-best season. Mark Andrews earned his first Pro Bowl, led the team with 64 receptions, 852 receiving yards and 10 receiving TDs. TE Nick Boyle and TE Hayden Hurst rounded out a trio that accounted for three of the Ravens Top 5 receptions leaders. In 2019, the Ravens ranked No. 1 in points (33.2) and rushing yards (206.0) per game, and finished No. 2 in total yards (407.6). The club also set a new NFL single-season rushing record (3,296). Baltimore also became the first team ever to average 200 passing and 200 rushing yards per game in a season.

In Engram’s third year (2016) guiding Baltimore’s receivers, Engram’s group helped record the second-most net passing yards in Ravens history (4,100), including a franchise-best 4,317 passing yards by QB Joe Flacco. Engram helped WR Mike Wallace achieve his third-career 1,000-yard campaign (1,017 yards on 72 receptions) in the receiver’s first season with the team. He also coached All-Pro WR Steve Smith Sr., including during his 2014 season where he registered 79 receptions for 1,065 yards and six touchdowns.

Prior to entering the coaching ranks, Engram played for 14 seasons (1996-2009) and three teams (Chicago, Seattle and Kansas City). Originally a second-round draft pick by the Bears, Engram played in 176 career games, totaling 650 receptions for 7,751 yards and 35 TDs. He also recorded two career punt returns for touchdowns.

Sharrif Floyd joins the Commanders as assistant defensive line coach after serving as a quality control/assistant defensive line coach for the Dallas Cowboys in 2023. Floyd served as an intern with Dallas during training camp in 2022 as a part of the Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship before returning to Florida where he served as a student assistant coach while finishing his undergraduate degree.

Prior to his coaching at the University of Florida, Floyd was the defensive coordinator at Ben Franklin High School in his hometown of Philadelphia in 2019.

As a player, Floyd was a defensive tackle drafted in the first round (23rd overall) by the Minnesota Vikings in the 2013 NFL Draft. He played three seasons for Minnesota before a knee injury ended his pro career, totaling 65 tackles, 9.5 sacks, 70 hurries and 26 tackles for loss, starting 24-of-43 games played. Floyd attended the University of Florida where he played in 37 games with 26 starts and earned first team All-American honors during his final season.

JOHN GLENN

ASSISTANT SPECIAL TEAMS

John Glenn joins the Commanders after most recently serving as the linebackers coach for the Seattle Seahawks (2018-23). Glenn is entering his 13th year as an NFL coach after twelve consecutive seasons with the Seahawks organization.

Before his 12-year stint with Seattle, Glenn spent two seasons on the University of Washington’s coaching staff as a quality control coach (2010-11) and three seasons as a linebackers coach for North Carolina Wesleyan College (2006-08).

In 2023, the Seattle linebacker core proved to be the foundation of the defensive unit with linebacker Bobby Wagner leading the NFL in tackles (183) along with recording 100 tackles for his 12th consecutive season. Wagner became the third player in NFL history to accomplish that milestone. Last season, Glenn helped linebacker Jordyn Brooks transition from a Will linebacker to middle linebacker. Brooks led the NFC and was fifth in the NFL with 161 tackles. It is also the fourth-most for a single-season in Seattle history.

In 2021, Glenn led a linebacker room that saw Brooks have a breakout season in his second year, ranking second in the NFL with a franchise-record 183 tackles. Wagner finished with 170 tackles, second most in franchise history, while being selected to his eighth consecutive Pro Bowl. Wagner was named second-team All-Pro by the Associated Press, the only player in franchise history with eight All-Pro nominations.

In 2020, Wagner was voted to the Pro Bowl for the seventh time and selected to the Associated Press All-Pro first team. It was Wagner’s fifth consecutive first team all-pro consecutive season and sixth time in his career earning the honor. The previous year, Wagner recorded the second-most tackles in franchise history with 159 and K.J. Wright posted a career-high 132 tackles.

Glenn would serve a variety of roles upon joining the Seattle staff in 2012. Beginning as a coaching and special teams assistant, he would achieve a victory in Super Bowl XLVIII. He was then promoted to the role of defensive quality control coach the following season and became a defensive assistant before assuming the role of a linebacker’s assistant in 2017.

Glenn entered the league after spending two seasons (2010-11) as the University of Washington’s quality control coach and three seasons as a linebackers coach for North Carolina Wesleyan College (2006-08).

A native of Scranton, Pennsylvania., Glenn was a three-year letter-winner at linebacker and a starter on East Stroudsburg University’s 2004 and 2005 NCAA playoff teams. He was also a two-year letter-winner in basketball in 2001-02 and 2002-03. Glenn and his wife, Leigh, have three sons, Nate, Luke, and Will.

BOBBY JOHNSON

OFFENSIVE LINE COACH

Bobby Johnson joins the Commanders after serving as the offensive line coach for the New York Giants for two seasons (2022-23).

From 2022-23, the Giants offense ranked ninth in the league in rushing yards per game (129.2) and tied for eighth in yards per attempt (4.5). In 2022, Johnson's unit was instrumental in running back Saquon Barkley rushing for a career-high 1,312 yards. Tackle Andrew Thomas earned Associated Press second-team All-Pro honors.

Prior to joining the Giants, Johnson spent three seasons (2019-21) with the Buffalo Bills as offensive line coach. During his time with the Bills, the offense finished second (31.3 – 2020) and third (28.4 – 2021) in points per game. In 2021, tackle Dion Dawkins earned Pro Bowl honors for the first time in his career.

In 2018, Johnson served as the assistant offensive line coach for the Indianapolis Colts. From 2015-17, he was the tight ends coach for the Oakland Raiders.

Johnson spent two seasons with the Detroit Lions, first as the tight ends coach (2013) and then as assistant offensive line coach (2014). During his first year with Detroit, tight ends Brandon Pettigrew and undrafted rookie Joseph Fauria combined for nine touchdowns.

He served one year as the tight ends coach with the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2012 and two years (2010-11) as the assistant offensive line coach with the Buffalo Bills.

From 2005-09, Johnson served as the offensive line coach at Indiana University and developed two NFL linemen, Rodger Saffold and James Brewer.

Before his time in Indiana, Johnson was at Miami (Ohio) as tight ends coach from 1999-2003 and offensive line coach in 2004 and helped the team to a 13-1 season and a MAC championship in 2003. Johnson began his coaching career at the University of Akron as a graduate assistant in 1995 and was promoted to defensive line coach in 1997.

An Akron, Ohio native, Johnson was a starting tackle at Miami (Ohio) from 1992-94 and helped the Red Hawks average 156.7 rushing yards per game in 1992 and 174.4 yards in 1994.

He graduated with a degree in health and appraisal and sports organization. Johnson and his wife, Kristen, have two daughters.

BRIAN JOHNSON

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH/OFFENSIVE PASS GAME COORDINATOR

Brian Johnson joins the Commanders as assistant head coach/offensive pass game coordinator after serving as the offensive coordinator for the Philadelphia Eagles last season.

In 2023, the Eagles offense ranked eighth in the league in total offense (354.4 total yards per game), third in third down offense (48 percent) and first in fourth down offense (73.08 percent).

Prior to his promotion, Johnson served as the quarterbacks coach for the Eagles for two seasons (2021-22). He worked closely with quarterback Jalen Hurts. In 2022, Hurts finished second in Associated Press NFL MVP voting and earned his first All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors. He threw for 3,701 passing yards and 22 touchdowns. Hurts also ran for 760 yards and 13 rushing touchdowns, the most by a quarterback that season. Under Johnson’s guidance, Hurts became the youngest quarterback in Eagles history to lead his team to the playoffs during the 2021 season.

Prior to joining the Eagles, Johnson was at the University of Florida serving as quarterbacks coach from 2018-19 and was promoted to offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach in 2020. During his time with the Gators, he mentored three All-American selections – quarterback Kyle Trask, tight end Kyle Pitts and wide receiver Kadarius Toney. The Gators offense also ranked first in the FBS in passing yards per game (378.6) in 2020.

In 2017, Johnson was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for the University of Houston.

From 2014-16, Johnson worked as the quarterbacks coach at Mississippi State. He mentored quarterback Dak Prescott as Prescott became one of the best quarterbacks in SEC history. Prescott became one of two quarterbacks in SEC history to throw for 8,500 yards and rush for 2,000 yards. In 2015, Prescott was named a finalist for the Manning and Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Awards after setting school records in completions (316), completion percentage (66.2), passing yards (3,793) and efficiency rating (151.7).

Johnson began his coaching career at his alma mater, Utah, as the quarterbacks coach and was promoted to offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach after two seasons. In 2012, he became the youngest FBS offensive coordinator in the nation at 24 years old.

As a player at Utah, Johnson was a three-year starter and two-time bowl MVP and finished with the most wins (26) in school history, including an undefeated 13-0 season in 2008. He threw for 7,853 yards and 57 touchdowns and ran for 848 yards and 12 rushing touchdowns. Johnson was featured on the cover of EA Sports’ 2010 NCAA Football video game.

A native of Baytown TX., Johnson and his wife Ashley have three children, Rossi, Harlow and Pierce.

RYAN KERRIGAN

ASSISTANT LINEBACKERS/PASS RUSH SPECIALIST

Ryan Kerrigan enters his first season as assistant linebackers coach/pass rush specialist after spending the last two seasons as the assistant defensive line coach.

During his two seasons as assistant defensive line coach, Kerrigan worked along side Pro Bowlers Jonathan Allen and Daron Payne. In 2022, Payne recorded a career-high 11.5 sacks.

Kerrigan signed a one-day contract on July 29th, retiring as a member of the Burgundy and Gold. He is the Commanders all-time official sack leader and appeared in 156 games for the franchise from 2011-20.

Kerrigan finished his career in Washington with 457 tackles (333 solo), including 120 for loss, 95.5 sacks, three interceptions which were all returned for touchdowns, 25 passes defended and 26 forced fumbles.

Along with being the franchise's all-time leader in official sacks, Kerrigan is also one-of-three players in NFL history to record 60-plus sacks and 3-plus interceptions returned for touchdowns joining Jason Taylor and Julius Peppers. He is also second in franchise history in multi-sack games (18), trailing only Dexter Manley.

Kerrigan was selected in the first round (No. 16 overall) of the 2011 NFL Draft by Washington. He was a four-time Pro Bowl selection during his tenure with the organization. Kerrigan was recently selected as one of the 10 new additions to the 90 Greatest List. He also had a streak of 139-consecutive games played from 2011-19.

He attended Purdue University where he played football for four seasons (2007-10). He recorded 192 total tackles with 56 tackles for loss, 32.5 sacks and 14 forced fumbles. His 14 forced fumbles are tied for the all-time FBS record and is a Big Ten record. He finished second all-time at Purdue in sacks and fifth in Purdue history for tackles for loss.

A native of Muncie, Indiana, Kerrigan is married to his wife Jessica and the couple have four children.

ANTHONY LYNN

RUN GAME COORDINATOR/RUNNING BACKS

Anthony Lynn joins the Commanders as run game coordinator/running backs coach after serving as the assistant head coach/running backs coach for the San Francisco 49ers.

In 2023, Lynn continued to work with running back Christian McCaffrey who won Associated Press Offensive Player of the Year and led the league in rushing yards (1,459) and finished fourth for rushing touchdowns (14). McCaffrey earned Pro Bowl honors for the fourth consecutive season and was selected to the Associated Press All-Pro first-team. Lynn also worked with full back Kyle Juszczyk who earned Pro Bowl honors for the eighth consecutive season. The 49ers earned their second consecutive NFC West title and their first NFC championship since 2019.

After acquiring McCaffrey via trade in 2022, Lynn worked closely with the running back who was named NFC Offensive Player of the Week twice (Weeks 8 & 14) and NFC Offensive Player of the Month (December/January).

Prior to joining the 49ers, Lynn served as the offense coordinator for the Detroit Lions for one season (2021). Running back D'Andre Swift rushed for a then career-high 617 yards and finished second on the team with 62 receptions. Wide receiver Amon-Ra St. Brown led the Lions with 90 catches for 912 yards and five touchdowns.

From 2017-20, Lynn was the head coach for the Los Angeles Chargers. In 2020, Lynn worked with rookie quarterback Justin Herbert who set NFL rookie records for most passing touchdowns (31) and offensive touchdowns (36). Herbert was named the 2020 Associated Press Offensive Rookie of the Year and the PFWA Rookie of the Year. The 2018 Chargers finished with a 12-4 record and the team reached the playoffs for the first time since 2013.

From 2015-16, Lynn was the assistant head coach/running backs coach for the Buffalo Bills. In 2016, he also served as the offensive coordinator for the final 14 games of the season. The Bills led the NFL in rushing yards (2,432 in 2015 and 2,630 in 2016), rushing touchdowns (19 in 2015 and 29 in 2016) and yards per carry (4.8 in 2015 and 5.3 in 2016) during his time in Buffalo.

Lynn was with the New York Jets for six seasons (2009-14) and served as running backs coach (2009-13) and assistant head coach/running backs coach (2014). In 2014, the Jets ranked third in the NFL in rushing yards per game (142.5). From 2007-08, Lynn worked as the running backs coach with the Cleveland Browns.

Prior to his time in Cleveland, Lynn was the running backs coach for the Dallas Cowboys for two seasons (2005-06) and the running backs coach for the Jacksonville Jaguars for two seasons (2003-04).

Lynn began his coaching career with the Denver Broncos as an offensive assistant/assistant special teams coach from 2000-02.

Lynn entered the NFL as an undrafted free agent in 1992 with the New York Giants. He spent time with the Denver Broncos (1993-94, 1997-99) and the San Francisco 49ers (1995-96). Lynn played in 83 career games and won two Super Bowls (XXXII and XXXIII).

A native of Celina, TX., Lynn played collegiately at Texas Tech University where he earned All-Southwest Conference honors. Lynn is married to his wife, Stacey, and has two children, D'Anton and Danielle.

KEN NORTON JR.

LINEBACKERS COACH

Ken Norton Jr. joins the Commanders as linebackers coach after recently serving as the linebackers coach for UCLA for the 2022-23 seasons.

Norton Jr. brings 12 years of NFL coaching experience to Washington including nine seasons with the Seattle Seahawks (2010-14, 2018-21), and three with the Las Vegas Raiders (2015-17). Before becoming an NFL coach, Norton Jr. spent six years coaching at USC (2004-09) as a linebackers coach and an assistant head coach in his final season.

In 2023, UCLA led the Pac-12 and ranked 10th in the nation in total defense (301.5 yards per game). In addition, the Bruins ranked second in the nation in rushing defense (80.8) and limited opponents to 18.4 points per game which was the 14th-best mark in the country.

Prior to UCLA, Norton Jr. was a defensive coordinator for the Seahawks from 2018-2021. During his tenure in Seattle, the Seahawks advanced to the playoffs three times, and he coached multiple Pro Bowl players including cornerback Shaquill Griffin, linebacker Bobby Wagner and safeties Jamal Adams and Quandre Diggs. Adams was named an AP All-Pro in 2020 and Wagner was named an All-Pro each season.

With the Raiders, Norton Jr. served as the defensive coordinator that helped the Raiders to a 12-win season and a return to the postseason for the first time since 2002. The defensive unit produced the AP Defensive Player of the Year in defensive end Khalil Mack and two Pro Bowlers including Mack and safety Reggie Nelson in the 2016 season.

In his first stint in Seattle, Norton Jr. claimed his first Super Bowl victory as a coach in Super Bowl XLVIII with Seattle defeating the Denver Broncos 43-8.

Norton, Jr. spent six seasons coaching linebackers for USC from 2004-09, and defeated Oklahoma to win the 2004 national championship. Notable linebackers that Norton Jr. coached included: Brian Cushing, Jarvis Jones, Clay Matthews and Keith Rivers, Rey Mauluga and Lofa Tatupu, Kaluka Maiava, and Super Bowl MVP Malcolm Smith.

Norton played six seasons (1988-93) with the Dallas Cowboys and seven seasons with the San Francisco 49ers (1994-2000) after being selected in the second round of the 1988 NFL Draft. He was on back-to-back Super Bowl championship teams in 1992 and 1993 making the Pro Bowl in his last season with Dallas. Norton signed with the 49ers the following season and became the first – and still only – player in NFL history to be a member of three straight Super Bowl winning teams when San Francisco won the 1994 title. He was named first team All-Pro in 1995 along with his second Pro Bowl honors and a second-team All-Pro in 1993. He earned his third Pro Bowl invite following the 1997 season.

PETE OHNEGIAN

PLAYER DEVELOPMENT COACH

Pete Ohnegian joins the Commanders as player development coach after serving as an assistant defensive quality control coach for the Dallas Cowboys in 2023.

Last season, Ohnegian’s main responsibilities included assisting the linebackers along with film breakdowns and oversight of the elite performance program tracking the development for defensive players.

Prior to his time in Dallas, Ohnegian served as the strength and conditioning coordinator at William Paterson (N.J.) in 2018, following an internship with Army football strength and conditioning staff in 2016. In 2003, Ohnegian founded a professional performance center, Good Energy Training, in his home state of New Jersey, which he owned and operated until 2020.

Ohnegian’s coaching career began at his alma mater, Lafayette College, where he was the defensive line coach and Director of Strength and Conditioning for the 1994 season. He was part of the 1994 Lafayette team that won the Patriot League title.

Ohnegian played five seasons (1994-00) in the Arena Football League (2001) and spent a portion of the 1997 training camp with the Cowboys as a center/guard and long snapper.

As a player at Lafayette, Ohnegian was a four-year letter winner and captain (1993 season) as a defensive end, where he helped the Leopards win the Patriot League title in 1992. Ohnegian capped his career for the Leopards with 149 total tackles (87 solo), plus 11 tackles for loss and 18.0 sacks. Ohnegian and his wife, Katie, have a daughter, Allison, and three sons, John, Andrew and Michael.

JOHN PAGANO

SENIOR DEFENSIVE ASSISTANT

Pagano joins the Commanders with 32 years of coaching experience, most recently as the special assistant to the head coach at the University of Connecticut.

From 2020-21, Pagano served as the outside linebackers coach for the Denver Broncos. In 2020, linebacker Bradley Chubb earned his first career Pro Bowl honors after recording 7.5 sacks and 19 quarterback hits in 14 games played.

Pagano spent two seasons (2018-19) with the Houston Texans as senior defensive assistant/outside linebackers coach. During his time with the Texans, he worked closely with linebackers Jadeveon Clowney and Whitney Mercilus. In 2018, Clowney earned his third consecutive Pro Bowl nod and in 2019, Mercilus was one of two players to record at least seven sacks, two interceptions and four forced fumbles.

In 2017, Pagano was the defensive assistant head coach for the Oakland Raiders. In Week 12, he took over play calling duties and helped the Raiders pass rush record the seventh-most sacks (17) in the final six games of the season after ranking last in the league in sacks through the first 10 games of the season.

Before his time in Oakland, Pagano spent 15 seasons with the San Diego Chargers in various defensive coaching roles – defensive coordinator (2012-16), linebackers (2009-11), outside linebackers (2007-08), assistant linebackers/quality control (2005-06) and defensive assistant/quality control (2002-04). While with the Chargers, the team scored the fifth most defensive touchdowns (17) during the span and had six playoff appearances.

Pagano spent four seasons (1998-2001) as a defensive assistant with the Indianapolis Colts. He started his NFL coaching career with the New Orleans Saints in 1996 as a defensive assistant after six seasons as a college assistant - University of Mississippi (1995), Louisiana Tech (1994), UNLV (1990-91) and Mesa State (1989) and one as a high school coach - Overland High School, Aurora, Colo. (1992-93).

A Boulder, Colo. Native, Pagano played linebacker at Colorado Mesa University for four seasons (1985-88).

TAVITA PRITCHARD

QUARTERBACKS COACH

Tavita (Tah-VEE-tuh) Pritchard is entering his second season as quarterbacks coach for the Commanders after serving as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach from 2018-22 for Stanford.

In his first season as quarterbacks coach, Pritchard worked with QB Sam Howell as Howell threw for 3,946 yards and 21 touchdowns while completing 388 passes. Howell became the first quarterback since Kirk Cousins in 2017 to start every single game in a single season and completed the second-most passes in a single season in franchise history.

Pritchard played quarterback at Stanford from 2006-09 and joined the staff as a graduate assistant in 2010. He was then promoted to the role of defensive assistant from 2011-12 and moved on to coach the running backs in 2013. He was then promoted to the role of quarterbacks/wide receivers coach from 2014-17 before assuming the role of offensive coordinator from 2018-22.

In Pritchard's time as Stanford's offensive coordinator, eight offensive players were drafted: WR J.J. Arcega-Whiteside (2019 second round, Philadelphia), RB Bryce Love (2019 fourth round, Washington), TE Kaden Smith (2019 sixth round, San Francisco), TE Colby Parkinson (2020 fourth round, Seattle), OT Walter Little (2021 second round, Jacksonville), QB Davis Mills (2021 third round, Houston), C Drew Dalman (2021 fourth round, Atlanta) and WR Simi Fehoko (2021 fifth round, Dallas).

In 2020, Pritchard coached quarterback QB Davis Mills, a third-round draft pick of the Houston Texans, who guided the team to a 4-2 record, including four straight wins to end the season during a COVID-19 shortened season. Mills earned honorable mention AllPac-12, finishing 129-of-195 (66.2%) for 1,508 yards and 10 total touchdowns (seven passing, three rushing). His 301.6 passing yards per game was second best in the Pac-12.

Stanford averaged 420.2 yards per game offensively, including 287.3 yards per game through the air and 132.8 on the ground. Stanford improved on third down (48% in 2020 vs. 39% in 2019) and red-zone offense (78% TDs in 2020 vs. 47% TDs in 2019), while totaling 15 TDs on the ground in just six games vs. just eight rushing touchdowns in 2019 over 12 total games.

Pritchard coached QB Kevin Hogan, a fifth-round draft pick of the Kansas City Chiefs, during his final season at Stanford. Hogan led the team to the 2015 Pac-12 title and a Rose Bowl win. He threw 27 touchdowns to eight interceptions and completed 67.8 percent of his throws. Hogan finished his career at Stanford with a school-best 36-10 record as a starter and ranked first in career total offense (10,634), second in completion percentage (.659) and passing efficiency (154.6), and third in passing yards (9,385) and passing touchdowns (75). He also set school records for career rushing yards (1,249) and touchdowns (15) by a quarterback.

David Raih joins the Commanders as tight ends coach after serving as a senior offensive analyst for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2023.

Raih brings 15 years of professional and collegiate experience to Washington. Before landing in Tampa, Raih served as the offensive coordinator at Vanderbilt in 2021. Prior to Vanderbilt, Raih spent seven years in the NFL; two seasons (2019-20) as the wide receivers coach with the Arizona Cardinals and five seasons (2014-18) as an assistant coach with the Green Bay Packers.

In 2019, Raih coached wide receivers Larry Fitzgerald and DeAndre Hopkins. In 2020, Hopkins earned first team All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors. He ranked second in the NFL in receptions (115), and third in receiving yards (1,407).

Prior to joining Arizona, Raih served in a variety of coaching roles with the Green Bay Packers. He joined the staff as a coaching administrator in 2014. He was then promoted to the role of assistant offensive line coach the following season and became an offensive perimeter coach in 2017 before assuming the role of wide receivers coach in 2018. Raih began his coaching career as a coaching intern with the quarterbacks at UCLA (2008-09) before accepting roles at his alma mater, Iowa (2010-12), and Texas Tech (2013).

A native of Edina, Minnesota., Raih played quarterback at Iowa (1999-2003) and went to St. Thomas Academy, in St. Paul, MN. He and his wife, Lauren, have two children: Goldie and Rockford.

JASON SIMMONS

DEFENSIVE PASS GAME COORDINATOR

Jason Simmons joins the Commanders as defensive pass game coordinator after serving as the defensive backs/pass game coordinator for the Las Vegas Raiders for the past two seasons (2022-23).

In 2023, cornerback Tre'von Moehrig finished tied for first on the team with a career-high three interceptions. Simmons' unit accounted for three of the defense's five touchdowns last season which tied the most by the Raiders franchise since 2000.

In his first season with the Raiders, 13 defensive backs recorded playing time, tied for the second most in a single season by the team since 2000. Under Simmons, cornerback Amik Robertson had a career year and finished first on the team with nine passes defensed and two interceptions.

From 2020-21, Simmons served as the pass game coordinator/secondary coach for the Carolina Panthers. In 2020, safety Jeremy Chinn was named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team after leading all rookies with 116 tackles and becoming the first player in Panthers' history to win two Defensive Rookie of the Month Awards.

Prior to his time in Carolina, Simmons spent nine seasons with the Green Bay Packers serving in a variety of roles such as defensive backs (2019), secondary (2018), assistant special teams (2015-17), and coaching administrator (2011-14). Green Bay's defense recorded 146 total interceptions, tied for the fourth most by any team during Simmons time in Green Bay.

While Simmons served as assistant special teams coach, the Packers ranked second in the league in opponent punt return average (5.7) and yards per punt return (10.7).

Simmons was drafted in the fifth round by the Pittsburgh Steelers in the 1998 NFL Draft and went on to play in 121 games over a 10-year career from 1998-2007. He spent the first four years of his career with the Steelers as a special teams player and then went on to sign with the Houston Texans in 2002. Over his career, he recorded 186 tackles, 10 passes defensed, three forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries, two sacks and two interceptions.

He played safety at Arizona State University and earned second-team All-Pacific-10 honors his senior season. A native of Inglewood, Calif., Simmons attended Leuzinger High School in Lawndale Calif., where he lettered all four years in both football and track.

DARNELL STAPLETON

ASSISTANT OFFENSIVE LINE COACH

Darnell Stapleton joins the Commanders as assistant offensive line coach after serving as an assistant coach/offensive line coach for the University of Florida 2022-23.

Stapleton brings 11 years of collegiate coaching experience to Washington. Before landing in Florida, Stapleton served as an offensive line coach for Louisiana Lafayette (2021), Sam Houston State (2018-20), and Bucknell (2014-17). Beginning his college coaching career as a graduate assistant Rutgers in 2013, Stapleton additionally coached for Montclair Academy in 2013 along with coaching the New York Sharks in the Women's professional football league the previous year.

In 2022, Stapleton worked alongside offensive coordinator and offensive line coach Rob Sale on the offensive line. The Gators finished the regular season as the best in the conference in yards per carry (5.84). Florida ran the ball for an average of 213.7 yards per game in 2022, which ranked 16th in the FBS and third in the SEC.

Stapleton's offensive line unit produced two NFL products via the 2023 NFL Draft including O'Cyrus Torrence who was drafted by Buffalo in the second round, and tackle Richard Gouraige who was signed by the Bills as an undrafted free agent. Torrence became first Gators offensive guard to be named a Consensus All-American, and the fifth lineman in Florida history.

Prior to his tenure in Florida, Stapleton helped lead the Ragin' Cajuns to a Sun Belt Conference championship in 2021. The unit was responsible for 31 rushing touchdowns and 2,496 rushing yards, ranking 14th and 24th in the nation.

From 2018-20, Stapleton served as the offensive line coach and the run game coordinator for Sam Houston State. In 2019, running back Donovan Williams finished second in the Southland conference in rushing with 925 yards and 14 touchdowns.

Prior to his tenure with Sam Houston State, Stapleton served as the offensive line coach at Bucknell University (2014-17). He coached Julián Davenport, who earned First Team All-America honors and became Bucknell's first NFL Draft pick since 1969 when he was taken in the fourth round by the Houston Texans.

In 2013, Stapleton joined the Rutgers football staff as a graduate assistant working with the offensive line. The Scarlet Knights earned a bowl game appearance along with a Big East title.

As a player, Stapleton was a member of the Pittsburgh Steelers (2007-09) and won Super Bowl XLIII at the conclusion of the 2008 season. He started 12 games on the offensive line during his time in Pittsburgh, including the Super Bowl. He played in 16 career games with the Steelers. In 2010, Stapleton spent a season with the Virginia Destroyers in the UFL.

A native of Union Township, New Jersey., Stapleton graduated from Rutgers in 2007 with a degree in business and labor relations.

SHANE TOUB

OFFENSIVE QUALITY CONTROL COACH

Shane Toub enters his sixth NFL season in the coaching ranks and second in Washington as the offensive quality control coach.

Toub previously worked for the Chicago Bears as an offensive assistant (2018-19) and as a defensive quality control coach (2020-21). He spent the 2022 season as a defensive quality control coach for the University of Kansas.

In 2022, Toub was a part of a staff that engineered one of Kansas' best seasons in the past two decades. The team started 5-0 and became an AP Top 25 ranked school for the first time since 2009. The season culminated with a trip to the Liberty Bowl to face Arkansas. It was the school's first trip to a bowl game since 2009.

Prior to his stint at Kansas, Toub was a member of Matt Nagy's Chicago Bears staff from 2018-21. Toub was part of the Bears 2018 team that finished with a 12-4 record, winning the NFC North for the first time since 2010. The team's 12-4 record in 2018 was the organization's best regular season finish since 2006.

Prior to his coaching career, Toub played five seasons at the University of Dayton. Toub started 34 total games in his career at center. He started all 11 games as a senior and was named the Stan Kurdziel Memorial Trophy winner for being the team's top lineman along with being named a team captain that season. He was also a four-year member of the PFL Academic Honor Roll during his career.

He is also the son of David Toub, who is currently the special teams coordinator for the Kansas City Chiefs.

ADAM PETERS

GENERAL MANAGER

Adam Peters enters his first season as general manager of the Washington Commanders. In his current role, Peters oversees all aspects of the organizations football operations.

Peters joins the Commanders after serving a variety of senior leadership roles with the San Francisco 49ers, most recently as the team’s assistant general manager from 2021-23. Prior to being named assistant general manager, Peters spent four seasons with the 49ers as the vice president of player personnel.

During his time with San Francisco, Peters helped the 49ers construct a top roster in the NFL through the draft, free agency and via trades. Through the NFL Draft, Peters was part of a 49ers leadership team that selected the likes of TE George Kittle, LB Fred Warner, WR Deebo Samuel, T Mike McGlinchey, DT Javon Kinlaw, WR Brandon Aiyuk, and 2019 Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year DL Nick Bosa, among others. Through free agency, the team was equally effective, adding key contributors such as CB Richard Sherman, FB Kyle Juszczyk and K Robbie Gould. They also acquired All-Pro RB Christian McCaffrey and T Trent Williams via trade.

In 2023, the 49ers placed a league-high nine total players in the Pro Bowl. Following the conclusion of the 2023 regular season, San Francisco had five players named First Team All Pro by the Associated Press, which was the most by a single team in the NFL.

Peters joined the 49ers after spending eight seasons (2009-16) with the Denver Broncos. In 2016, Peters was named the Broncos director of college scouting after spending two seasons as the team’s assistant director of college scouting from 2014-15. Peters spent three years as a national scout (2011-13) after originally joining the Broncos as a regional scout in 2009. In Denver, Peters helped the team acquire 27 players through the draft and college free agency that were vital members of the Super Bowl 50 roster.

Prior to his time in Denver, Peters spent six seasons (2003-08) with the New England Patriots. In his first two seasons as a scouting assistant in New England, Peters was a part of two Super Bowl championship teams in 2003 and 2004. In 2005, Peters handled pro scouting responsibilities for the team before serving as an area scout in his final three seasons with New England.

Prior to his career in the NFL, Peters spent the 2002 season with UCLA where he served as a football operations graduate assistant after playing defensive end for the Bruins from 1999-2001. He transferred to UCLA from West Valley Junior College where he played tight end for two seasons (1997-98) and earned all-conference honors.

A Cupertino, Calif. native, Peters attended Monta Vista High School where he was a two-sport standout in football and baseball during his prep career.

BRANDON SOSNA

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT OF FOOTBALL OPERATIONS

Brandon Sosna enters his first season as senior vice president of football operations. In his role as senior vice president of football operations, Sosna will be the club's lead contract negotiator, oversee a number of football operations departments, including analytics, health and performance and football administration and will be one of the club's liaisons to the business operation. He will also play a major role in strategy around roster construction, the salary cap and the CBA. Sosna reports directly to Washington Commanders General Manager Adam Peters.

Sosna joins the Commanders after working for the Detroit Lions for the past two years. In Detroit he held the role of senior director of football administration. In that role, Sosna oversaw Detroit's strategic planning and management of the salary cap. He was also the club's chief contract negotiator.

Sosna joined the Lions after serving as the executive senior associate athletic director/chief of staff at the University of Southern California from 2019-21. During Sosna's time at USC, he managed the day-to-day operations across the entire athletics program, oversaw the department's external communications and revenue generating teams, provided administrative oversight of the football program, and served as the lead contract negotiator for the athletics department. Sosna helped modernize the USC athletics department and was credited as the "architect" of the hiring process for USC Head Coach Lincoln Riley in the 2022 offseason. He also played a key role in the university's move to the Big Ten Conference.

Prior to his three years with USC, Sosna had two stints at the University of Cincinnati (2013-17, 2019). He worked for the school in various capacities and in 2016 was named the athletic department's chief of staff. As the program's chief of staff he played a key role in the hiring of Head Coach Luke Fickell, who led Cincinnati to national prominence. Sosna returned to Cincinnati in 2019 as senior associate athletic director/chief revenue officer. Under his leadership, the athletics department set new records for attendance and ticket sales.

Sosna started his career in the NFL as a football administration intern with the Cleveland Browns from 2017-18 and was elevated to the role of salary cap and contract analyst in 2018.

A Cincinnati, Ohio native, Sosna graduated from the University of Pennsylvania with a bachelor's degree in political science.

Sosna was named to Forbes' "30 Under 30" list in 2020 and Sports Business Journal's "New Voices Under 30" list in 2019. He also received the Front Office Sports Rising 25 Award in 2017.

MARTIN MAYHEW

SENIOR PERSONNEL EXECUTIVE/ADVISOR TO THE GM

Martin Mayhew is entering his 26th season in the NFL and first in his new role of senior personnel executive/advisor to the general manager. In his new role with the club, Mayhew will support the front office and Commanders General Manager Adam Peters. Mayhew most recently served as the Washington Commanders GM from 2021-23.

Mayhew joined Washington with 22 seasons of NFL experience as an executive, including eight seasons as the general manager of the Detroit Lions. He returns to the franchise that he played for from 1989-92 and was a member of the Super Bowl XXVI team.

Mayhew spent the previous four season with the San Francisco 49ers, most recently as the club's vice president of player personnel. He held the position of senior personnel executive for the franchise from 2017-18. Mayhew assisted first-time general manager John Lynch and was a major contributor to a personnel department that was vital in the team's Super Bowl appearance in 2019.

Prior to his time in New York, Mayhew spent 15 years (2001-15) in the Detroit Lions organization, including the final seven as the team's general manager. He took over as the general manager following Detroit's winless season and oversaw the building of a roster that resulted in a 10-win season in 2011 and an 11-win season in 2014.

During Mayhew's tenure as Lions general manager, he was responsible for the draft selections of Pro Bowlers QB Matthew Stafford, DE Ezekiel Ansah and DT Ndamukong Suh. Suh was a four-time Pro Bowler and three-time First Team All-Pro selection with Detroit and was the 2010 NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year. Mayhew was also responsible for signing WR Golden Tate and S Glover Quin in free agency, both of whom went on to earn Pro Bowl honors in Detroit.

Mayhew first joined the Lions organization in 2001 as the senior director of football administration/staff counsel and was promoted to senior vice president of football administration/staff counsel in 2003. Mayhew was appointed senior vice president and assistant general manager in 2004. In 2008, Mayhew was promoted to general manager.

Mayhew played nine seasons in the NFL and was originally selected by the Buffalo Bills in the 10th round (262nd overall) in the 1988 NFL Draft. During Mayhew's nine-year career, he appeared in 118 games (107 starts) for Buffalo (1988), Washington (1989-92) and Tampa Bay (1993-96) and notched 473 tackles, 21 interceptions, 1.0 sack and four forced fumbles. He started at cornerback for the Super Bowl XXVI champion Washington Redskins.

Mayhew is a native of Tallahassee, Fla. and graduated from Florida State University with a degree in business management and also holds a law degree from Georgetown University. At Florida State, he lettered in both football and track. Mayhew interned for Washington's personnel department in 1999 while in law school at Georgetown. He also held labor and legal department internships with the NFL League Office before joining the Detroit Lions.

DOUG WILLIAMS

SENIOR ADVISOR TO THE GENERAL MANAGER

Doug Williams is entering his first season as senior advisor to the general manager.

Williams previously served as senior advisor to Washington Commanders President Jason Wright. In his role, Doug leveraged his vast experience with the team as a player, ambassador, and executive to provide counsel on all matters pertaining to the establishment of a new, modern identity for the team.

Previously, Doug served as Washington's senior vice president of player development. In that role, one of the most celebrated athletes in franchise history helped lead and guide the efforts of the team's player development department.

Doug, a member of the 80 Greatest Washington players and franchise's Ring of Fame, played with the team from 1986-89 and led Washington to a Super Bowl XXII title, which was a 42-10 rout of the Denver Broncos. The first African-American quarterback to play in a Super Bowl, he completed 18-of-29 passes for 340 yards with four touchdown passes to earn Super Bowl XXII MVP honors.

Doug is a veteran of 21 NFL seasons, including nine as a player and 12 in scouting/personnel roles. He spent five seasons as Personnel Executive with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 2004-08 before being named the team's Director of Pro Personnel for the 2009 season.

Doug joined the Buccaneers' front office in 2004 following a successful tenure as head coach at his alma mater, Grambling State, and one of the most storied playing careers in league and team history. His responsibilities in Tampa included coordinating the scouting and recruiting of all NFL players, while also monitoring NFL transactions and overseeing player tryouts. In addition, he was in charge of Tampa Bay's evaluating efforts of all other professional football leagues, including the Canadian Football League.

A first-round pick by Tampa Bay in the 1978 NFL Draft (17th overall), he led the Buccaneers to the first three playoff appearances in team history. He propelled the team to three winning seasons (10-6 in 1979, 9-7 in 1981 and 5-4 in 1982). They were the only campaigns in franchise history with a winning record until more than 15 years later, in the 1997 season. He started 67 career games for the Buccaneers and was a two-time team MVP in 1980 and 1981. He ended his Tampa Bay career in 1982 as the all-time franchise leader in touchdown passes, passing yards, attempts and completions.

In 1986, Washington traded for Williams' rights following two seasons with the USFL's Oklahoma Outlaws. In his Super Bowl XXII MVP performance following the 1987 season, he set or tied several Super Bowl passing records, including most TD passes (four), most yards passing (340), longest pass completion (80 yards) and longest TD pass (80 yards).

In six seasons during his first tenure (1998-2003) at Grambling State, Doug brought one of the most storied programs in college football history back to prominence, compiling a 52-18 record as head coach after succeeding the legendary Eddie Robinson, who was at the helm for 57 years from 1941-97 and re-wrote the record books as the winningest coach in the history of college football with 408 career wins.

Williams led the Tigers to three consecutive Southwestern Athletic Conference titles from 2000-02, as they were named National Black College Champions during the same three-year span. He was also named SWAC Coach of the Year in each of those three seasons. Williams was a two-time finalist for The Sports Network Eddie Robinson (Division I-AA) National Coach of the Year. He rejoined the program for three seasons from 2011-13, including earning the SWAC title in his first season back in 2011.

Doug started his college head coaching career at Morehouse College in 1997. He also has previous NFL experience as a scout for the Jacksonville Jaguars in 1995 and as offensive coordinator for the Scottish Claymores of the World League in 1995 and tutoring running backs for Navy in 1994. He also excelled on the high school level as head coach and athletic director at Point Coupee H.S. in New Roads, La., in 1991. In 1993, he was head coach at Northeast H.S. in his hometown of Zachary, La., where he guided the team to a 13-1 record and the state semifinals, including a win over Peyton Manning's Isidore Newman squad in the 1993 state quarterfinals.

As Grambling's quarterback from 1974-77, he had a spectacular college career as he passed for more than 8,000 yards and 93 touchdowns, leading the Tigers to three Black College National Championships and two SWAC titles. He posted a 35-5 record as a starter and finished fourth in voting for the 1977 Heisman Trophy.

In 2005, Doug and Shack Harris established The Shack Harris & Doug Williams Foundation with the function of providing grants for after-school initiatives, leadership development, mentoring programs and minority higher education assistance for

economically disadvantaged youth. In March of 2009, the foundation put on its first annual Washington Football Legends for Charity in Washington, D.C. In 2010, the foundation established the Black College Football Hall of Fame, which will move to its new home in Canton, Ohio in 2018.

After Super Bowl XLII, the NFL honored the 20th anniversary of his Super Bowl XXII victory as Williams was chosen to present the Lombardi Trophy to the New York Giants following their victory over the New England Patriots.

Doug and his wife, Raunda, have eight children: Ashley, Adrian, Carmeleta, Doug, Jr., Jasmine, Laura, Lee and Temessia.

VICE PRESIDENT OF FOOTBALL ADMINISTRATION



IMPORTANT DATES

The Start - July 9, 1932

George P. Marshall headed a group (Vincent Bendix, Jay O'Brien, Dorland Doyle) that bought a National Football League franchise in Boston. They contracted to play in Braves Field, home of the National League Baseball team, and were called "The Braves."

The Name

The Boston Gridders moved to Fenway Park, home of the American League Red Sox, and "The Braves" became "The Redskins."

The Franchise - Feb. 13, 1937

The Washington Redskins were officially born as the National Football League approved the transfer of the Boston Redskins franchise to Washington, D.C., and a new history began.

The Band - Aug. 9, 1937

The famed Redskins Band was founded and it was the first of its kind.

First Victory - Sept. 16, 1937

The First Game! The Franchise's Thursday night opener drew 19,941 fans to flood-lighted Griffith Stadium. Riley Smith scored on a 60-yard interception return, while the team added two field goals and an extra point to make the final score - Washington 13, Giants 3.

First Title - Dec. 5, 1937

Ten thousand fans stomped up Broadway behind the brass band following the franchise's first title. In the game, Sammy Baugh completed 11-of-15 passes, while Cliff Battles had touchdown runs of 75 and 76 yards as the team routed the Giants, 49-14, for the Eastern Championship.

World Champs! - Dec. 12, 1937

Freezing weather, frozen field and the icy-nerved Bears couldn't stop Sammy Baugh (center below). He completed 17-of-33 passes for 335 yards and three touchdowns. Wayne Millner (right), the all-time Notre Dame great, finished with nine catches for 160 yards, including 77- and 55-yard touchdowns.

Westward Ho! - Aug. 2, 1939

Washington set forth on their first coast-to-coast football training trip. Training site: Eastern State Normal School in Cheney, Wash.

Zero Hour - Oct. 1, 1939

Washington and the NY Giants battled in the mud and rain as the outcome wound up being a scoreless tie, the only scoreless tie in Washington history.

Record Pass - Oct. 15, 1939

From the kick formation and standing deep in the end zone, Frank Filchock flipped a pass to Andy Farkas who went all the way for the touchdown. It was the longest pass play in National Football League history, 99 yards.

East Champs - Dec. 1, 1940

Miniature-sized Davey O'Brien of the Eagles completed 33 passes in 60 attempts, but Washington won 13-6 to clinch the Eastern Championship.

73-to-Ohhh! - Dec. 8, 1940

Despite Washington gaining the same number of first downs as the Bears in the World Championship Game at Griffith Stadium, the team lost 73-0.

California - Aug. 18, 1941

Washington brought pro football on a large scale to California for the first time. They established training quarters in San Diego at Brown Military Academy.

Title Escapes - Nov. 23, 1941

There were 50 seconds to go in the Eastern Championship Game and Washington held a 13-10 lead, but the Giants managed to score a field goal and a touchdown to win, 20-13.

Only Loss - Sept. 27, 1942

The Giants are unable to convert a first down, gained only ONE yard rushing and completed just ONE pass — but it was good for a touchdown. They then captured another touchdown on an interception and Washington suffered their only 1942 defeat, 14-7.

World Champs! - Dec. 13, 1942

The Bears took an early lead on an errant pass from center, but Sammy Baugh's 85-yard quick kick set them back on their heels. Wilbur Moore then made a vital interception and followed with a sensational catch for a 38-yard touchdown. Andy Farkas capped the victory by carrying the ball 10 of 12 times on an 80-yard touchdown drive. Score: 14-6.

Runner Up - Dec. 26, 1943

Sam Baugh suffered a concussion early, tackling Sid Luckman on a punt return and the Bears went on to win the NFL title, 41-21.

To a T - July 30, 1945

Washington abandoned their double-wing formation and adopted the T-formation.

East Champs - Dec. 9, 1945

Washington had two straight shutouts, the first coming against the Steelers, 24-0, on Dec. 2 and the team defeated the Giants, 17-0, en route to an Eastern title.

One Point Shy - Dec. 16, 1945

In subzero weather, Washington lost the world title to the Rams, 15-14, on freakish plays. Baugh's pass from the end zone hit the goal-post for a safety (no longer allowed); and Bob Waterfield's try-for-point hit the crossbar and bounced over.

Charity Game - Sept. 6, 1946

The inaugural Washington-Rams game benefiting the Los Angeles Times Charities, Inc. drew 68,188 to Memorial Coliseum and netted the Times Boys Club \$96,711.23.

High Note - June 13, 1947

The Redskins Band performed at the Philadelphia Inquirer's Famed Festival of Music alongside Whiteman, Waring and the Philharmonic.

Champs Trumped - Nov. 23, 1947

Fans cheered on Sam Baugh who thanked them with six touchdown tosses, routing the previous-champion Cards, 45-21.

First on TV - June 14, 1950

American Oil announced plans to televise all Washington games - no other pro teams were on TV.

Baugh-to-Bach - Oct. 10, 1954

Dr. Howard Mitchell led his National Symphony Orchestra at mid-field in a halftime show.

TD Torrent - Oct. 1, 1955

Twenty-one points in 137 seconds! The Eagles led 16-0 in the 3rd quarter when Brito recovered a fumble on the Eagles' 32 and LeBaron then passed to Janowicz for the touchdown. Torgeson recovered a fumble on Eagles 13 and Janowicz went on to score. Washington won, 31-30.

The Alumni - Oct. 15, 1958

The Redskins Alumni Association was established. Twenty-three former players residing here adopted a formal constitution and bylaws. They invited all non-resident ex-Redskins to join.

New Home - Dec. 12, 1958

Washington signed a 30-year lease to play in a proposed D.C. Stadium that Congress gave the go-ahead to build.

Home Debut - Oct. 1, 1961



IMPORTANT DATES

The first game in the new D.C. Stadium drew 37,767. Washington failed to hold a 21-7 lead and the Giants won, 24-21.

Redskins Trade for Mitchell - Dec. 14, 1961

Washington finalize an agreement to send their 1962 first overall draft pick, Heisman trophy winning back Ernie Davis, to the Cleveland Browns in exchange for future Pro Football Hall of Famer Bobby Mitchell.

Four of a Kind - Dec. 17, 1961

Dick James scored four touchdowns to set the Washington single game scoring record in a 34-24 win over Dallas.

Sonny and Sam - 1964

Washington stunned the public by trading QB Norm Snead to the Eagles for veteran QB Sonny Jurgensen. The team then repeated the performance by shipping favorite Dick James to New York for Sam Huff.

A Sunny Day - Oct. 11, 1964

Sonny Jurgensen out-dueled Norm Snead by throwing four touchdowns against the Eagles in the first meeting of the traded quarterbacks.

Record Rally - Nov. 28, 1965

Sonny Jurgensen sparked the then-largest comeback win in team history. Down 21-0, Washington recorded a 34-31 victory over the Cowboys as Sonny passed for over 400 yards and three touchdowns.

Graham Era - Jan. 25, 1966

Washington hired former Cleveland star, Otto Graham, as their Head Coach and General Manager.

TD Jamboree - Nov. 27, 1966

Washington and the NY Giants scored the most points in NFL history as they tied or set many team and league records in Washington's rout of New York, 72-41.

Record Breakers - 1967

Sonny Jurgensen set new Washington and NFL passing records for most attempts, completions, and yards in a season. Receivers Charley Taylor, Jerry Smith and Bobby Mitchell finished first, second and fourth in the League; it was the highest ever by receivers on the same team.

Lombardi Hired - Feb. 7, 1969

The unbelievable happened - Vince Lombardi left Green Bay to become the head coach of Washington.

George Preston - Aug. 9, 1969

George Preston Marshall, founder of the Washington Redskins, died at his home at the age of 72.

A Winning Season - Dec. 14, 1969

Washington defeated New Orleans by a score of 17-14 to ensure their first winning season since 1955. The victory also continued Coach Lombardi's record of never having coached a losing NFL team.

Lombardi Dies - Sept. 3, 1970

The sports world grieves the death of Vincent T. Lombardi, Head Coach and Executive Vice President of the Redskins.

1,000-Yard Club - Dec. 13, 1970

Larry Brown, on the second offensive play of the game against the Eagles and needing four yards to break the 1,000-yard barrier, gained 12 yards to become the first Washington player in history to become a member of the 1,000-yard club.

NFL Rushing Champ - Dec. 20, 1970

Larry Brown ended the season as the top rusher in the NFL with a total of 1,125 yards on 237 attempts for a 4.7 avg. He was the first Washington player since Cliff Battles in 1937 to win the rushing

title.

Allen Hired - Jan. 6, 1971

George Allen, winningest coach in the NFC, was named the Redskins' Head Coach and General Manager.

A New Home - June 2, 1971

Groundbreaking ceremonies were held for the Redskins new home, Redskins Park, near Dulles Airport.

Future is Now - 1971

Allen guided Washington to the most wins, nine, in 29 years with a 9-4-1 record. It was the first time in 29 years that the Redskins earned a championship playoff game.

Coach of the Year - 1971

George Allen was voted NFL and NFC "Coach of the Year."

NFC Champions - 1972

Washington won their first title in 30 years with a convincing 26-3 win over the defending World Champion Dallas Cowboys in RFK Stadium, following a 16-3 playoff victory over Green Bay. Washington lost 14-7 to Miami in Super Bowl VII in the L.A. Coliseum.

Player of Year - 1972

Larry Brown, honored by all selections as NFL "Player of Year," won NFC rushing title by setting a new Washington rushing record with his 1,216 yards.

NFC Coach of the Year - 1972

For a second year in a row, George Allen awarded "Coach of Year" honors.

4th Straight Playoffs - 1974

For the fourth consecutive year, George Allen's "Over the Hill Gang" reached the playoffs.

Jurgensen Retires - May 1, 1975

Quarterback Sonny Jurgensen retired after playing for 18 seasons in the NFL, 11 in a Washington uniform.

All-Time Receiver - Dec. 21, 1975

Washington wide receiver Charley Taylor became the all-time receptions leader in NFL history with his 634th career catch coming against the Eagles in the season's finale.

Milton King Dies - Jan. 23, 1976

Milton King, vice president and treasurer of the Redskins, died at the age of 85.

Return to Playoffs - 1976

By winning the final four games, including wins at Dallas and at St. Louis, Washington made the playoffs for the fifth time in six years under Allen.

Pardee Hired - Jan. 24, 1978

Jack Pardee, former Washington player and coach, was named the 19th head coach in Washington history.

Presidential Visit - Oct. 2, 1978

President Jimmy Carter became the second President ever to attend a regular season NFL game when he and Mrs. Carter, along with son Chip and wife Caron, saw the Monday night Cowboys-Washington clash.

Off to the Races - 1978

By winning the first six games, including wins over rivals Dallas and St. Louis and playoff bound New England, Washington enjoyed their best start in over 35 years.

Good News, Bad News - 1979

The 10-6 record was the ninth consecutive year that Washington finished .500 or better. Both the division title and wild card playoff game were lost in the final seconds of the game in Dallas,

35-34.

100 Straight - 1980

Washington extended the NFL's longest consecutive streak of sellouts to 100, dating back to 1966.

Gibbs Hired - Jan. 13, 1981

Joe Gibbs, offensive coordinator of the San Diego Chargers, became the 20th head coach in Washington history.

Finishing Kick - 1981

Victorious in 8 of their final 11 games, Coach Gibbs and his Washington club set or tied 13 club records.

Huff Inducted - Aug. 7, 1982

Former Washington and NY Giant Sam Huff was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

A New Beginning - Sept. 12, 1982

With the 0-5 start of a year ago, the 0-4 preseason fresh on everyone's mind, Mark Moseley lifted the burden with a 26-yard overtime field goal to give Washington a victory over Philadelphia. Moseley had only minutes earlier sent the game into overtime with a 48-yard field goal.

Hogs Take Their Bows - Jan. 15, 1982

The celebrated Hogs created enough holes in the Viking defense for John Riggins to plow for a Washington playoff record 185 yards, leading Washington to a 21-7 win and a spot in the NFC Championship. Before leaving the game, Riggins gallantly bowed to the 54,000-plus Washington faithful who roared in approval.

Strike! - Sept. 21, 1982

The NFL players walked out in a strike that would last until Nov. 17. In all, eight games were missed, seven canceled.

Holy Moseley! - Dec. 19, 1982

With time running out, the game on the line, with an NFL record at stake, Mark Moseley beat the Giants by booting his 21st straight field goal in a snowy RFK Stadium. The kick broke Garo Yepremian's record of 20 consecutive field goals made and gave Washington a 15-14 win. Also, in the game, John Riggins became only the fifth back in NFL history to exceed 2,000 carries (Payton, Simpson, Brown, and Harris are the others).

A Whitewash - Jan. 2, 1983

For the first time since 1980, Washington posted a shutout by beating the Cardinals 28-0. Their 8-1 record was the best in the NFC, giving them home-field advantage throughout the playoffs. The 128 points given up by the Washington defense is the fewest in the NFL.

Sweet Revenge - Jan. 22, 1983

Washington avenged their only loss of the season, setting back the Cowboys, 31-17, to reach their second Super Bowl, and first in 10 years.

Super Bowl Win! - Jan. 30, 1983

Washington won Super Bowl XVII downing the Dolphins 27-17. Their win streak reached eight, and 15 of 16 and 20 of 24 over two seasons. Jack Kent Cooke accepted the Super Bowl Trophy from Pete Rozelle in the locker room as MVP Riggins boasts, "Ron may be President, but for tonight, I'm King." The team's 12-1 record was the fifth best NFL mark in the last 50 years, and their best ever.

Hails from the Chief - Jan. 31, 1983

President Reagan and Mrs. Reagan were at Dulles Airport to greet the World Champions as they arrived back from California.

Parade of Stars - Feb. 3, 1983

The entire city of Washington celebrated as the team paraded before some 500,000 fans in a downtown ceremony amidst pouring rain. Coach Gibbs holds up the Super Bowl Trophy and pro-

claimed, "This is for you."

High Honors - 1983

Joe Gibbs was named Coach of the Year. Mark Moseley was the first special teams player in history named NFL MVP by Associated Press, Joe Theismann was Miller Man of the Year, and five Washington players (the most since 1972) were named to the Pro Bowl: Moseley, Theismann, Tony Peters, Charlie Brown and Mike Nelms. Later, Bobby Beathard was named Executive of the Year. And Riggins, who had four straight 100-yard rushing playoff games, the first ever to do so, won a car as Super Bowl MVP.

Jurgy to Mitch - July 30, 1983

Former Washington greats — quarterback Sonny Jurgensen and receiver Bobby Mitchell — were inducted into Pro Football's Hall of Fame.

Monday Night Fever - Oct. 1, 1983

Washington lost 48-47, in the highest scoring game in night football history. Washington and the Packers combined for over 1,000 yards of total offense.

The Diesel Keeps On Trucking - Nov. 20, 1983

John Riggins set an NFL record as his consecutive games with rushing touchdowns reached 12 while notching his 19th touchdown of the year to tie that NFL mark. John's streak ended at 13 consecutive games while he went on to establish an NFL record 24 touchdowns.

Doomsday Showdown - Dec. 11, 1983

Dressed in army fatigues, Washington marched into Dallas to do battle. The result was a convincing 31-10 victory in Dallas to gain sole possession of first place in the NFC East. It was a game that saw Tony Dorsett held to 34 yards on 14 carries (one yard on five carries in the second half) and scores from four different Washington players.

Alone on a Hill - Dec. 17, 1983

For the second year in a row, Washington finished with the best record in the NFL. Their 31-22 victory over the Giants capped a remarkable 14-2 regular season. It was the first time in the history of the League that an NFC team compiled so many victories.

One-Two Punch - 1983

Mark Moseley's NFL kick scoring record of 161 points, and Riggins' total of 144 points, topped the entire NFL. It was the first time since 1951 that the number one and two scorers played on the same team. Their total of 305 points surpassed the totals of eight other clubs.

Ring Out the Rams - Jan. 1, 1984

Washington rang in the New Year by drubbing the L.A. Rams 51-7 in the most lopsided playoff game in 26 years. The team set or tied 13 club playoff marks with the 44-point margin of victory, the greatest in the 47-year history of the club.

Three of a Kind - 1985

The 10 victories marked a third consecutive season that Washington won 10 or more games, equaling a club-best streak set from 1972-74. The 35 wins in those three seasons were a club record for wins over a three-year period. Threes were also meaningful for offensive linemen Joe Jacoby and Russ Grimm, who each earned a third consecutive trip to the Pro Bowl. Receiver Art Monk (91 catches) went for a second straight time.

Happy Birthday - Feb. 13, 1986

The Washington entered their 50th season in the Nation's Capital, celebrating the franchise's move from Boston to Washington.

Rally Ho - 1986

Headed by Coach Ray Flaherty of the 1937 World Champions, former players and coaches gathered to kickoff the 1986 season.

Little Mr. Big - Oct. 27, 1986



IMPORTANT DATES

WR Gary Clark accounted for 241 receiving yards (on 11 catches) to break teammate Art Monk's club record on Monday Night TV.

Showdown - Nov. 23, 1986

Eager to avenge their first loss of 1986, Washington came out smokin' against Dallas. The 34-0 first half lead marked the most points the Cowboys had ever allowed in a single half of play. The Washington 41-14 win was their most points ever against the Cowboys.

Gibbs Gets #70 - Jan. 3, 1987

Head Coach Joe Gibbs became the winningest coach in Washington history, gaining his 70th win as the team defeated the Bears 27-13 in a divisional playoff.

A Giant Step - Jan. 11, 1987

With 15 new faces on the roster, Washington played in their third NFC Championship game in five years.

Pro Bowlers, Again - Feb. 1, 1987

Hogs Russ Grimm and Joe Jacoby returned to the Islands of Hawaii for the fourth consecutive season. Joined by Art Monk, Darrell Green, Gary Clark, Dexter Manley, and Jay Schroeder, Washington equaled a club record seven participants in the annual classic.

NFLPA Strike - 1987

NFL players walked out following the second week of the regular season.

Perfect - Oct. 19, 1987

Washington "replacement" players closed out their season with a perfect 3-0 mark. The team held on to defeat Dallas, 13-7, in Texas Stadium.

Relief Pitcher - Dec. 26, 1987

Quarterback Doug Williams connected on 11-of-22 for 217 yards and two touchdowns in Minnesota. The 27-24 overtime victory is highlighted by a Ricky Sanders 51-yard catch-and-run to force sudden death. Haji-Sheikh kicks the game winner.

The Bear Facts - Jan. 10, 1988

For the second consecutive season, Washington traveled to Chicago for a divisional playoff game. After trailing 14-0 in the second quarter, the team rallied to win 21-17. Darrell Green provided the game-winning points on an electrifying 52-yard punt return, as Washington advanced to the NFC Championship Game for the fourth time in six seasons.

NFC Champs! - Jan. 17, 1988

Washington defeated Minnesota, 17-10, as Doug Williams connected with Gary Clark to break a 10-10 fourth quarter deadlock. Washington became the first team to advance to the Super Bowl three times in the 1980s.

World Champs! - Jan. 31, 1988

Twenty Super Bowl records were broken en route to a 42-10 decision over the Denver Broncos. Quarterback Doug Williams is named the game's MVP as he connected on 18-of-29 for a record 340 yards. His four touchdown passes tie another record as the team scores five times in five possessions in the second quarter alone.

100 Wins - Dec. 10, 1989

Joe Gibbs registered his 100th career win as head coach of Washington as the team defeated San Diego, 26-21. Only six other coaches reached 100 wins faster than Gibbs.

Monk Moves Up - Dec. 10, 1989

Art Monk moved into third place on the all-time NFL receiving list, ahead of friend and receivers coach Charley Taylor, in Washington's 26-21 win vs. San Diego.

A Lion of a Comeback - Nov. 4, 1990

Washington equaled the greatest comeback in club history with a 41-38 overtime win at Detroit. Down by 21 points in the third quarter and 17 points entering the fourth, Jeff Rutledge rallied the team by passing for 363 second-half yards (30-42). The game winning points came on a Chip Lohmiller 34-yard field goal in overtime.

700 Catches - Nov. 18, 1990

Art Monk became only the third player in NFL history to catch 700 passes when he hauled in four receptions against the Saints in RFK.

Ring in the New Year - Jan. 5, 1991

Washington pushed their playoff record to 12-3 under Joe Gibbs with a solid team effort 20-6 win over the Eagles at Veterans Stadium.

Perfect Start - 1991

For the first time in franchise history, Washington opened the year with 11 straight victories.

One of the Best - 1991

Washington became only the sixth team in NFL history to record 17-or-more wins in a single season by posting a 17-2 overall mark (best in team history).

Hog Protection - 1991

In 16 games, the "Hogs" allowed a league-low and club-record nine sacks. It was the third lowest total in NFL history.

A Class Act - Dec. 22, 1991

Art Monk becomes only the second player in NFL history to catch 800 passes when he caught five passes in the season finale at Philadelphia.

NFC Champs - Jan. 12, 1992

For the fourth time under Joe Gibbs, and the fifth time in franchise history, Washington returned to the Super Bowl with a 41-10 win over Detroit in the NFC title game.

World Champs! - Jan. 26, 1992

Washington claimed their third Super Bowl win under Gibbs. The team knocked out Buffalo 37-24 and Mark Rypien was named Super Bowl MVP after completing 18 passes and throwing two touchdowns. Gary Clark and Art Monk both caught seven passes, with Clark gaining 114 yards and one TD, and Monk adding 113 yards. Brad Edwards had two interceptions and the defense sacked Bills QB Jim Kelly five times.

Pro Bowl Record - Feb. 2, 1992

Washington set a club record with eight players earning a selection to the Pro Bowl. Jim Lachey and Darrell Green were named starters, while Gary Clark, Chip Lohmiller, Charles Mann, Earnest Byner and Mark Schlereth also were named to the NFC squad.

New Redskin Park Opens - Aug. 24, 1992

Washington moved into their new training complex set on a picturesque 160 acres in Loudoun County, Va. The building is more than 70,000 square feet to complement four practice fields.

Monk is #1 - Oct. 12, 1992

Art Monk became the NFL's all-time leading pass receiver against Denver on Monday Night in Week 5. His 820th career catch was a 10-yarder with 3:12 remaining in the 4th quarter.

Joe Gibbs Resigns - March 5, 1993

After 12 seasons guiding Washington to four Super Bowls, three titles, a 16-5 playoff mark and a 140-65 career record, Joe Gibbs stepped down as head coach. Richie Petitbon is hired as the 21st coach in club history.

IMPORTANT DATES

Turner Hired - Feb. 2, 1994

Norv Turner, offensive coordinator of the Dallas Cowboys, became the 22nd coach in team history.

Coleman Becomes All-Time Leader - Oct. 9, 1994

Linebacker Monte Coleman played in his 206th career game breaking Art Monk's team record for games played. Monte, tied with Sammy Baugh for most seasons as a member of the organization with 16, ended his career with 216 games played. Darrell Green would take over the record in 1998.

Pro Bowl - 1994

Linebacker Ken Harvey and punter Reggie Roby earned selection to the NFC squad. Harvey led the NFC in sacks with 13.5 and Roby became the first Washington punter selected to the Pro Bowl since Sam Baker in 1958.

BIG Upset Wins - Oct. 1, 1995

Washington's 27-23 win over 13-point favorite Dallas was the team's biggest upset win since defeating the Cowboys, 34-31, on December 11, 1966. The team was 17-point underdogs in the rematch at Texas Stadium, but came up with a 24-17 win. It was the biggest upset win in the NFL since 1980.

Pro Bowlers - 1995

Linebacker Ken Harvey earned his second straight starting assignment in the Pro Bowl, while kick/punt returner Brian Mitchell was honored with his first Pro Bowl selection. Mitchell led the NFC in kickoff returns with a 25.6-yard average and was second in the NFL in punt returns (12.6-yard average).

New Stadium - March 13, 1996

Washington owner Jack Kent Cooke, Maryland Gov. Parris N. Glendening and Prince George's County Executive Wayne Curry signed a contract paving the way for the immediate start of construction for the new home of the team in Prince George's County.

Gibbs To Hall - July 27, 1996

Joe Gibbs is inducted into the NFL Hall of Fame.

Allen Passes Riggo - 1996

Terry Allen rushed past John Riggins' single-season rushing record, gaining 1,353 yards. Allen also led the NFL in touchdowns with 21 TDs.

Pro Bowlers - 1996

Washington sent their largest amount of representatives to the Pro Bowl since the 1991 season, when running back Terry Allen, quarterback Gus Frerotte, cornerback Darrell Green, linebacker Ken Harvey and punter Matt Turk made the trip to Hawaii.

So Long RFK - Dec. 16, 1996

Washington played their final home game at Robert F. Kennedy Memorial Stadium against the Dallas Cowboys. With greats from the past on hand, the team defeated the Cowboys 37-10. Washington finished 17-3 at RFK, including 11-1 in the playoffs.

Jack Kent Cooke Passes Away - April 6, 1997

Jack Kent Cooke, only the second owner in team history, died of congestive heart failure at the age of 84. At his memorial service, John Kent Cooke, Sr. announced the new stadium would be called Jack Kent Cooke Stadium.

Big Jack Opens - Sept. 14, 1997

The team christens Jack Kent Cooke Stadium in style with a 19-13 overtime win over the Arizona Cardinals. In overtime, rookie Kenard Lang forced a fumble that was recovered at the Cardinals 35-yard line. Two plays later Gus Frerotte threw a 40-yard scoring strike to a leaping Michael Westbrook in the end zone.

Green is Tops - Dec. 13, 1997

Cornerback Darrell Green played in his 217th career game as a Washington player breaking Monte Coleman's team record for

games played.

Pro Bowlers - 1997

Darrell Green earns his seventh Pro Bowl selection in his 15th season. He is also joined by fellow cornerback Cris Dishman, while linebacker Ken Harvey is selected for the fourth straight year and punter Matt Turk makes his second straight appearance.

Mitchell Joins Brown - 1998

Brian Mitchell led the NFL in total combined net yards for the fourth time joining Hall of Famer Jim Brown as the only players in NFL history to lead the league in total combined net yards four times.

Skip-In to the End Zone- Dec. 13, 1998

Rookie running back Skip Hicks sets a club rookie record with eight rushing touchdowns, breaking Don Bosseler's record of seven set in 1957.

Organization is Sold - May 25, 1999

Daniel M. Snyder gained unanimous approval (31-0) from league owners to become the fourth owner in franchise history. Snyder buys the team for a record \$800 million - the most ever for an American sports franchise.

Welcome to FedExField - Nov. 21, 1999

The organization partners with Federal Express Corporation, re-naming Jack Kent Cooke Stadium, FedExField.

Winning the East - Dec. 26, 1999

Washington overcame a 10-point fourth quarter deficit to defeat the 49ers 26-20 in overtime. The win gave the team their first NFC East crown since 1991.

Records Fall - 1999

Brad Johnson (Below) completed the season with 316 completions - most ever by a Washington player. His 4,005 yards and 519 attempts are second in club history. Stephen Davis' 1,405 yards are the most ever by a Washington player. He led all NFC rushers, and earned his first birth to the Pro Bowl. Darrell Green increases his team records with his 50th interception and played in his 250th game.

Leadership Council - Jan. 2000

Owner Daniel M. Snyder introduced the Washington Redskins Leadership Council, the Redskins' foundation.

Homeward Bound - July 20, 2000

The team opens training camp at home for the first time, welcoming fans to the team facility in Ashburn, Va.

Alumni Recognized - Aug. 24, 2000

Alums Joe Gibbs, Dexter Manley and Art Monk are inducted into the Ring of Fame.

Turner Out, Robiskie In - 2000

Norv Turner was dismissed as Head Coach after 13 games. Terry Robiskie was named interim head coach to finish out the season on Dec. 4, 2000.

Centers Sets Mark - Dec. 24, 2000

Larry Centers became the NFL's all-time leader in catches by a running back with 685 receptions.

Smith "Sacks" the Record Books - Dec. 24, 2000

Bruce Smith sets NFL record with his 13th 10-sack season.

NFL Attendance Record - 2000

Washington set an NFL record for attendance with a season total of 647,424. Average home attendance at FedExField was 80,928.

Schottenheimer Takes Command - Jan. 3, 2001

Marty Schottenheimer signed on as the franchise's 24th head coach.

IMPORTANT DATES

Return to Carlisle - July 29, 2001

Washington returned to Dickinson College in Carlisle, Pa., for training camp after a six-year hiatus, re-establishing a 32-year summer tradition (1963-94).

Washington Relief Fund - Sept. 13, 2001

The organization announced the establishment of the Relief Fund for the benefit of families of the victims of the September 11th tragedy at the Pentagon. Over the course of the season, the team raised over \$700,000.

Washington Makes NFL History - Nov. 25, 2001

Washington set an NFL record, becoming the first team in history to win five consecutive games after losing their first five. The team would go on to win eight of the last 11 games, following the 0-5 start.

More Records for Davis - Jan. 6, 2002

Stephen Davis became the first player in team history to rush for more than 1,000 yards for three consecutive seasons. He finished the 2001 campaign rushing for 1,432 yards on 356 carries, both career and team single-season records for the Pro Bowl running back.

Arrival of Head Ball Coach - Jan. 14, 2002

Owner Daniel M. Snyder announced former Heisman Trophy winner and offensive genius Steve Spurrier as the club's 25th head coach. Marvin Lewis, with his proven track record of defensive success, is brought on board shortly thereafter as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator, making the team a dangerous foe on both sides of the ball.

Allen Voted to the Hall - Feb. 2, 2002

George Allen, who coached Washington from 1971 to 1977 and posted a record of 67-30-1 and led them to two NFC Championships, was voted into the NFL Hall of Fame. Allen, after being named one of the 70 Greatest Washington players of all time, was enshrined in the Hall on Aug. 4, 2002.

Kickoff Overseas - Aug. 3, 2002

Head Coach Steve Spurrier made his Washington debut in a 38-7 victory over the San Francisco 49ers in the 2002 American Bowl in Osaka, Japan. Washington finished the game with 479 yards of offense, including 434 passing yards.

Off to a Good Start - 2002

Washington finished out the preseason with a 4-1 mark, setting a team record with 164 preseason points. The previous team record was 156 points, set in 1975 in six games.

Naming 70 Greats - June 13, 2002

The 70 Greatest Players in team history were announced in June by a blue-ribbon panel, which selected the team's leading on-field contributors in celebration of the franchise's 70th Anniversary. Spanning the entire history of the team, since its founding in Boston in 1932, the 70 Greatest Players encompassed three head coaches and 67 players.

70th Anniversary Weekend - Oct. 2002

The 70 Greatest Players were honored in a weekend of festivities, culminating in a special halftime ceremony during a 31-26 Washington victory over the Indianapolis Colts. The celebration reunited the 70 Greats with a black-tie gala event, an alumni and media brunch, dinner party and pregame barbecue at FedExField. The anniversary season was also commemorated through "retro" uniforms worn at home games all year, featuring a one-season return to the team's spear-and-feather helmet logo, as well as jersey and pants colors and design that reflected back to the 1960s midpoint of the team's storied history.

Green's Last Game - Dec. 29, 2002

Darrell Green concluded his 20th and final season with the club

and the NFL, defeating the longtime rival Dallas Cowboys, 20-14. During his 20 years, Green set an NFL record for consecutive seasons with at least one interception (19) and a team record for regular season games played (295) and started (258). In a special pre-game ceremony at the Dallas game, Green was honored by his teammates and by fans. His name was also added to the Ring of Fame.

Downright Defensive - 2002

Under the guidance of assistant head coach and defensive coordinator Marvin Lewis, Washington finished the season ranked 5th in the NFL in total defense, an improvement from 10th during the 2001 season. The club's defense ranked in the league's top-10 for the last three seasons.

Consistently Coles - Oct. 12, 2003

With his six receptions against Tampa Bay, Laveranues Coles set a modern day NFL record for at least five receptions in 19 consecutive games.

Bruce Sacks Record - Dec. 7, 2003

Bruce Smith broke the NFL all-time sack record against the Giants. Smith finished his career with an impressive 200 sacks.

Spurrier Resigns - Dec. 30, 2003

Steve Spurrier resigned as the 25th Head Coach in franchise history.

Gibbs Returns - Jan. 7, 2004

Owner Daniel M. Snyder announced that Joe Gibbs would return as Head Coach.

500th Win - Sept. 12, 2004

Washington earned the 500th franchise victory, defeating Tampa Bay 16-10.

Gibbs - Oct. 23, 2005

Head Coach Joe Gibbs earned his 150th overall victory against the San Francisco 49ers, with a decisive 52-17 win.

Franchise Records - 2005

Wide receiver Santana Moss and running back Clinton Portis both set team records at their respective positions. Moss broke Bobby Mitchell's record for most receiving yards in a season with 1,483. The previous mark was 1,436 set in 1963. Portis set a new record for rushing yards in a season with 1,516, previously held by Stephen Davis with 1,432 yards in 2001. Portis also recorded a franchise-high nine 100-yard rushing games in 2005.

Playoff Win - Jan. 7, 2005

Washington earned their first playoff victory since 1999, defeating the Tampa Bay Buccaneers by a score of 17-10 in the NFC Wild Card Playoff game in Tampa Bay.

Taylor Tragedy - Nov. 27, 2007

Washington Pro Bowl safety Sean Taylor died one day after he is shot by an intruder in his Miami home. Taylor's death devastated coaches and teammates. Meanwhile, fans created a memorial outside the facility honoring Taylor's memory.

In Taylor's Memory - Dec. 2, 2007

Sadness swept over FedExField as the organization and its fans mourned the tragic death of safety Sean Taylor just five days earlier. Fans left flowers, cards and mementos at a makeshift memorial outside the stadium. The team hosted a pregame tribute to Taylor, including a moving four-minute video on the Jumbotron. Washington lost to the Buffalo Bills, 17-16, but this was a day devoted to the memory of Taylor. A day after the game, the entire organization traveled to Miami for Taylor's funeral.

Gibbs Retirement - Jan. 8, 2008

Citing a need to spend more time with family, 67-year-old Hall of

Monk and Green Inducted - Aug. 2, 2008

Wide Receiver Art Monk and cornerback Darrell Green are inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Zorn's First Win - Sept. 14, 2008

Head Coach Jim Zorn registered his first NFL victory as the team defeated the New Orleans Saints 29-24 in the regular season opener at FedExField.

Taylor Honored - Nov. 30, 2008

Sean Taylor was honored and placed in the Ring of Fame in an emotional pregame ceremony prior to the Washington vs. NY Giants game. Taylor became the 43rd member to be inducted. Taylor's father Pedro, fiancé Jackie, daughter Jackie and mother Donna were present to celebrate the life and accomplishments of Taylor in front of a capacity crowd at FedExField.

Bruce Smith Inducted - Aug. 8, 2009

Defensive End Bruce Smith is inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Allen Hired - Dec. 17, 2009

Bruce Allen, son of Pro Football Hall of Famer and Washington legend George Allen, is hired as Executive Vice President/General Manager.

Shanahan Takes Over - Jan. 6, 2010

Mike Shanahan, who won consecutive Super Bowls following the 1997 and 1998 seasons with the Denver Broncos, is hired as the club's Executive Vice President/Head Coach.

Russ Grimm Inducted - Aug. 7, 2010

Russ Grimm becomes the first member of the beloved Hogs inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Shanahan's First Win - Sept 12, 2010

Head Coach Mike Shanahan registered his first victory with Washington on Sunday Night Football at home against the division rival Dallas Cowboys, 13-7. Linebacker Brian Orakpo's pass rush drew a holding penalty that negated a Cowboys' touchdown on the final play of the game, giving Washington the win.

DeAngelo Hall Ties Interception Record - Oct. 24, 2010

Cornerback DeAngelo Hall tied an NFL record and Washington record by totaling four interceptions against the Chicago Bears at Soldier Field in Week 7. He became the 19th NFL player and third Washington player to accomplish this feat in a game.

DeAngelo Hall Named Pro Bowl MVP - Jan. 30, 2011

Cornerback DeAngelo Hall, appearing in his third Pro Bowl, was named the game's MVP after he recorded an interception and returned a fumble 34 yards for a touchdown.

Hall of Fame Hanburger - Aug. 6, 2011

Legendary linebacker Chris Hanburger is inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

10th Year Anniversary of 9/11 - Sept. 11, 2011

Washington honors the victims of the Sept. 11, 2001 tragedy on the 10th anniversary of the terrorist attacks as the team hosts the New York Giants at FedExField in the 2011 season opener. Gen.

Colin Powell tosses the ceremonial coin as the team opens the 2011 season with a 28-14 win against the eventual Super Bowl Champion Giants.

Chris Cooley Becomes Top Tight End - Sept. 11, 2011

Tight end Chris Cooley recorded two receptions against the New York Giants in the 2011 season opener to pass Jerry Smith for the franchise lead in receptions by a tight end.

Burgundy and Gold Goes Green - Sept. 18, 2011

Washington launches 8,000 solar panels at FedExField prior to the team's 22-21 win against the Arizona Cardinals. The panels were installed to be capable of meeting the stadium's power needs on non-game days and providing up to 20 percent of the needed electricity on game days – the equivalent of providing 300 homes with energy for a full year.

Richie Petitbon Recognized - Dec. 24, 2011

Former Washington player and coach Richie Petitbon is inducted as the 45th member of the team's Ring of Fame.

Blockbuster Trade - March 10, 2012

Washington and the St. Louis Rams officially announce that they have agreed to a trade that gives Washington the rights to the No. 2 overall pick in the 2012 NFL Draft. The league formally approved the deal on March 14. On April 26, the team goes on to select eventual AP Offensive Rookie of the Year Robert Griffin III with that pick.

Celebrating 80 Years - May 10, 2012

From the inside of the newly built Indoor Training Facility, the team launches their 80th Anniversary celebration. The organization would spend the offseason touring the D.C., Maryland and Virginia areas as part of its "Thank You Tour" to commemorate the anniversary with the fans. The event also featured the debut of the team's 1937-inspired alternate uniforms as well as the start of voting for the 10 newest additions to the 80 Greatest Players.

Clinton Portis Officially Retires - Aug. 23, 2012

Running back Clinton Portis officially announces his retirement from the NFL in a press conference at the team facility. He exited the NFL ranking second in franchise history in rushing yardage (6,824), carries (1,667) and rushing touchdowns (46).

Welcome to the NFL, Rookie - Sept. 9, 2012

In Week 1 at New Orleans, Robert Griffin III becomes the first rookie to start at quarterback for Washington in Week 1 since Norm Snead on Sept. 17, 1961. Griffin III becomes the first player in NFL history to compile 300-plus passing yards, two or more passing touchdowns and no interceptions in an NFL debut, leading Washington to a 40-32 win against the Saints.

"10 for 80" Honored - Nov. 4, 2012

At halftime of the team's Homecoming Game against Carolina, Washington honors the 10 members of the organization selected to complete the 80 Greatest Players. The honorees include LaVar Arrington, Bobby Beathard, Joe Bugel, Terry Hermeling, Jon Jansen, Roy Jefferson, Richie Petitbon, Clinton Portis, Chris Samuels and Sean Taylor.

Turkey Day Triumph - Nov. 22, 2012

Washington gets their first Thanksgiving Day win in Dallas in team history, defeating the Cowboys, 38-31. Washington explodes for 28 second-quarter points, and quarterback Robert Griffin III - who had a four-touchdown game vs. Philadelphia a week earlier - throws four touchdown passes to become the first player in franchise history to pass for four touchdowns in consecutive games.

Hawaii Bound - Dec. 26, 2012

The NFL announces that linebacker/special teamer Lorenzo Alexander, quarterback Robert Griffin III and tackle Trent Williams have been selected to the 2013 Pro Bowl. Linebackers Ryan Kerri-

gan and London Fletcher are later added to the roster, giving the club five Pro Bowlers for the first time since 1996.

How The East Was Won; Morris Surpasses Portis - Dec. 30, 2012

Washington secures its first NFC East title in 13 years with a 28-18 win against the Dallas Cowboys in a win-or-go-home tilt at FedExField. Washington rolls up 274 rushing yards in a game “flexed” into primetime by the NFL. In the process, rookie running back Alfred Morris rushes for 200 yards and pushes his season total to 1,613, breaking Clinton Portis’ team record for rushing yards in a single season.

End of an Era - Jan. 11, 2013

After 30 seasons, the beloved “Hogettes” decide to hang up their snouts, floppy hats and dresses in announcing their intent to retire. The group says it will continue to help raise money for local children’s charities, just in more “incognito” fashion.

Rookie of the Year - Feb. 2, 2013

Robert Griffin III is named AP Offensive Rookie of the Year, making him the third Rookie of the Year in team history and the first since Mike Thomas in 1975.

Road Trip to Richmond - July 25, 2013

Washington holds their first Training Camp session at the brand new Bon Secours Washington Training Center in Richmond, Va. During the three-week span, more than 150,000 fans attend the team’s inaugural camp in the capital.

Artful Performance By Garçon - Dec. 22, 2013

Wide receiver Pierre Garçon posts a career-high 11 receptions in Week 16 vs. Dallas, pushing his season total past Pro Football Hall of Famer Art Monk’s team record for receptions in a single season (106 in 1984). Garçon would finish the season with a league-leading 113 receptions.

Here’s Jay - Jan. 9, 2014

Jay Gruden is named the 29th head coach in franchise history. At 46 years of age, the former offensive coordinator for the Cincinnati Bengals becomes the team’s youngest head coaching hire since hiring eventual Pro Football Hall of Famer Joe Gibbs at 40 years of age in 1981.

Jay’s First Win - Sept. 14, 2014

Jay Gruden earns his first win as head coach as the defense runs wild in a 41-10 home win against the Jacksonville Jaguars. The unit tied a team record with 10 sacks, including a team-record-tying four-sack effort from linebacker Ryan Kerrigan.

Rypien in the Ring - Oct. 19, 2014

Super Bowl XXVI MVP Mark Rypien is inducted as the 46th member of the Ring of Fame at halftime of an overtime win against the Tennessee Titans on Alumni Homecoming Weekend.

You Like That! Historic Comeback - Oct. 25, 2015

Washington overcomes a 24-0 second quarter deficit to post the largest comeback in team history in a 31-30 win against Tampa Bay. Following the game, quarterback Kirk Cousins exclaims “You like that!” while walking back to the locker room. The moment is captured on camera and goes viral, becoming a rallying cry for the team’s NFC East championship run.

Bostic and Coleman Enter the Ring - Oct. 25, 2015 and Dec. 20, 2015

Center Jeff Bostic and linebacker Monte Coleman become the 47th and 48th members of the Ring of Fame. Bostic is enshrined during a Week 7 win vs. Tampa Bay and Coleman is honored during a Week 15 win vs. Buffalo.

Win No. 600... In Style - Dec. 26, 2015

Washington becomes the fifth NFL franchise to record 600 com-

bined regular season and postseason wins all-time with a 38-24 win in Philadelphia. The victory also secures the team’s 15th division title in team history.

Records Fall in Dallas - Jan. 3, 2016

Having already clinched the NFC East a week earlier, Washington faces the Cowboys in Week 17 with individual records on the line. Quarterback Kirk Cousins breaks the team’s single-season passing yardage record during the game on a 28-yard pass to receiver Jamison Crowder. Later in the game, Crowder catches his 59th reception of the season, a team rookie record.

The Park Welcomes Inova - July 25, 2016

As the team departs for Training Camp, the team announces a new health and wellness partnership with Inova, including renaming the team’s Ashburn headquarters to the Inova Sports Performance Center.

Washington Goes International - Oct. 30, 2016

Washington makes their European debut when they face the Cincinnati Bengals at Wembley Stadium in London. The back-and-forth game becomes one of the season’s most entertaining, as the team storms back to force overtime, but a missed field goal in the extra frame results in a 27-27 draw.

Beathard Honored - Nov. 13, 2016

Former General Manager Bobby Beathard is inducted as the 49th member of the Ring of Fame at halftime of the team’s victory against the Minnesota Vikings.

Pro Bowl Bound - Dec. 20, 2016

Four Washington players — linebacker Ryan Kerrigan, tight end Jordan Reed, guard Brandon Scherff and tackle Trent Williams — are selected to the 2017 Pro Bowl. Reed and Scherff’s selections are their first of their careers, while Williams becomes only the third member of the franchise since 1970 to earn five consecutive Pro Bowl selections.

From MVP to Senior VP - June 13, 2017

Washington announces that Doug Williams, Super Bowl XXII MVP, has been promoted Senior Vice President of Player Personnel after three-plus years as a personnel executive with the team. Said Williams, “I’ve been around the circuit, but there’s nothing like coming back here to a place that gave you an opportunity to be on top of the stage in football. Washington did that for me.”

A Thanksgiving to Remember - Nov. 23, 2017

Washington hosts their first Thanksgiving home game in franchise history, earning a 20-10 win against the New York Giants. After the game, wide receiver Jamison Crowder, quarterback Kirk Cousins, linebacker Ryan Kerrigan and most of the offensive line chomp on turkey legs during postgame interviews with NBC’s Michele Tafoya.

Pro Bowl Trio - Dec. 19, 2017

Linebacker Ryan Kerrigan, guard Brandon Scherff and tackle Trent Williams all earn Pro Bowl honors. Together, Scherff and Williams became the first Washington offensive line duo collectively named to the Pro Bowl in consecutive seasons since the duo of Russ Grimm and Joe Jacoby earned selections four straight times following the 1983-86 seasons.

Rings for Replacements - June 12, 2018

After 31 years, Washington honors replacement players from the team’s 1987 squad with Super Bowl rings in a ceremony at Inova Sports Performance Center. Charley Casserly, who served as the team’s Assistant General Manager in 1987 and helped build the replacement squad, hosted the event and welcomed more than 25 players in attendance. The ceremony culminated with the surprise appearance of 1987 Super Bowl champions Doug Williams, Gary Clark and Dexter Manley, who joined the replacement players for a group photo.

IMPORTANT DATES

Beathard Inducted into Hall of Fame - Aug. 4, 2018

Former Washington General Manager Bobby Beathard was enshrined in Canton, Ohio at the Pro Football Hall of Fame as a member of the Class of 2018. Beathard helped guide the franchise to three Super Bowl appearances, including victories in Super Bowl XVII and XXII during his 11 year tenure. In his 11 seasons as general manager the team posted a .625 winning percentage which was the best mark in the NFC and second best mark in the NFL in that span.

600th Regular Season Victory - Dec. 16, 2018

With a 16-13 victory over the Jacksonville Jaguars at TIAA Bank Stadium in Jacksonville, Fla., Washington became just the fifth team in NFL history to record 600 regular season victories. Washington joined the Chicago Bears, Green Bay Packers, New York Giants and Pittsburgh Steelers as the only franchises in NFL history to accomplish the feat. Head Coach Jay Gruden presented Owner Daniel Snyder with a game ball following the victory.

London Fletcher Enters Ring of Fame - Sept. 23, 2019

London Fletcher is inducted as the 50th member of the Ring of Fame at halftime of the team's Monday Night Football matchup against the Chicago Bears.

Samuels Enters the Ring - Oct. 20, 2019

Chris Samuels is inducted as the 51st member of the Ring of Fame at halftime of the team's matchup against the San Francisco 49ers in Week 7 at FedExField.

Way and Scherff Selected to Pro Bowl - Dec. 17, 2019

Tress Way and Brandon Scherff are both named to the 2019 Pro Bowl in Orlando, Fla. Way earns his first Pro Bowl selection and is named the starting punter for the NFC, becoming the first Washington punter since Matt Turk in 1998 to be named a Pro Bowler. Scherff earns his third Pro Bowl selection, becoming the ninth offensive lineman in franchise history to earn three-plus Pro Bowl selections.

Entering the Rivera Era - Jan. 1, 2020

Owner Dan Snyder announces that Ron Rivera will become the 30th head coach in franchise history. The two-time Associated Press NFL Coach of the Year brings more than 20 years of coaching experience to Washington along with nine at the helm of the Carolina Panthers.

AP Given Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award - Feb. 1, 2020

Adrian Peterson becomes the sixth player in NFL history and first member of the franchise to earn the Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award at NFL Honors in Miami, Fla. The award is given to an NFL player who best demonstrates the qualities of on-field sportsmanship, including fair play, respect for the game and opponents, and integrity in competition.

Washington and Jennifer King Make History - Feb. 10, 2020

Washington becomes the first team in NFL history to hire a female African American full-year coaching intern with the hiring of Jennifer King. King will primarily work with the running backs and will spend an entire calendar year with the team helping in the offseason and draft preparation all the way through the end of the 2020 regular season.

Dan Snyder Pulls Scouts Off the Road - March 12, 2020

In response to the rapid spread of COVID-19, Owner Dan Snyder becomes the first NFL owner to pull all scouts off the road and cancel all Top 40 visits in preparation for the NFL Draft. The NFL and all 31 other teams eventually followed suit.

Washington Opens FedExField to National Guard - March 21, 2020

The organization opens the FedExField parking lots to the Mary-

land National Guard to operate a COVID-19 testing site for residents of Prince George's County. Owner Dan Snyder also makes a \$100,000 to the Capital Area Food Bank to help feed families devastated by the global pandemic.

Washington Drafts DE Chase Young - April 23, 2020

Picking the highest in the NFL Draft since 2012, Washington selects defensive end Chase Young out of Ohio State. Young is widely regarded as one of the best edge rushing prospects to come out of college in the past decade. Young holds the single-season sack record at Ohio State with 16.5 sacks as a junior in 2019.

Mitchell's Number is Retired - June 20, 2020

Owner Dan Snyder announces that the team is retiring the No. 49 in honor of the late Bobby Mitchell. Mitchell's number becomes only the second ever retired in franchise history. The team also announces the renaming of the lower level of FedExField in honor of Mitchell.

Washington Football Team - June 20, 2020

After undergoing a thorough review of the organization's nickname, the team announces that they will call themselves the Washington Football Team. The former nickname and logo are both officially retired. The team also announces that the process for finding a new team name will continue and the franchise will undertake an in-depth branding process to properly include player, alumni, fan, community and sponsor input.

Washington Starts New Era with Win - Sept. 13, 2020

Washington defeated Philadelphia 27-17 to secure their first win under head coach Ron Rivera. In the victory, first-round draft selection Chase Young made his NFL debut and recorded 1.5 sacks in the victory.

QB Alex Smith Returns to Live Action - Oct. 11, 2020

QB Alex Smith made his first appearance in an NFL game since suffering a severe leg injury in November of 2018. Smith came off the bench to backup Kyle Allen who exited with an injury.

Thanksgiving Day Victory at Dallas - Nov 26, 2020

Washington defeated Dallas 41-16 on Thanksgiving Day. RB Antonio Gibson rushed for three touchdowns becoming the first Washington player to rush for three touchdowns since Robert Kelley did so on November 11, 2016.

Washington Defeats Undefeated Pittsburgh - Dec. 7, 2020

Washington went in to Heinz Field in Pittsburgh and knocked off the 10-0 Steelers, defeating the club 23-17. TE Logan Thomas had nine receptions for 98 yards and a touchdown.

DE Chase Young and T Brandon Scherff Named to 2020 Pro Bowl Roster - Dec. 21, 2020

Scherff was selected as the starting guard for the NFC. His selection is the fourth of his career (2016-17; 2019-20). Scherff joined Trent Williams, Chris Samuels, Len Hauss, Joe Jacoby and Russ Grimm as the only Washington offensive linemen to be selected to the Pro Bowl four-plus times. Young became the eighth rookie in Washington history to be named to a Pro Bowl and the first since quarterback Robert Griffin III in 2012. He became the first defensive rookie since linebacker Brian Orakpo in 2009. Young was the third defensive rookie in franchise history to be named to a Pro Bowl joining Orakpo and Pro Football Hall of Famer Paul Krause. He became the youngest player in Washington history to be selected to the Pro Bowl at 21-years old.

Washington Defeats Philadelphia to win NFC East - Jan. 3, 2021

In a must-win, Week 17 game, Washington finished off Philadelphia, 20-14, to clinch their first NFC East title since 2015. In the victory, DE Chase Young recorded a sack, three QBHs and one fumble recovery. WR Terry McLaurin caught a five-yard touch

down to amass 1,000 yards in a season for the first time in his career.

Washington Hires Martin Mayhew as General Manager - Jan. 21, 2021

Mayhew came to Washington with 20 seasons of NFL experience as an executive, including eight seasons as the general manager of the Detroit Lions. He played for Washington from 1989-92 and was a member of the Super Bowl XXVI team. Mayhew spent the 2017-20 seasons with the San Francisco 49ers, he held the position of senior personnel executive for the franchise from 2017-18. Mayhew assisted first-time general manager John Lynch and was a major contributor for a personnel department that was vital in the team's Super Bowl appearance in 2019.

Washington Hires Marty Hurney as EVP Football/Player Personnel - Jan. 21, 2021

Hurney is named Washington's EVP Football/Player Personnel. He joined the club with 28 seasons of NFL experience as an executive and rejoined the franchise where he started his NFL career as a member of the team's public relations department. Hurney was named the Carolina Panthers General Manager in 2002 and held the position until 2012. He was then brought back as the club's interim general manager in 2017 and maintained the official role from 2018-2020. During Hurney's tenure as general manager, the Panthers appeared in the postseason four times, with two NFC South titles, two trips to the NFC Championship game and an appearance in Super Bowl XXXVIII.

Washington Names Jennifer King Assistant Running Backs Coach - Jan. 26, 2021

Jennifer King is promoted to assistant running backs coach. The historic hire makes her the first African American female full-time assistant coach in NFL history. King also becomes the second female assistant position coach in the NFL behind Tampa Bay Buccaneers assistant defensive line coach Lori Locust.

Ron Rivera Named NFC Coach of the Year by the Committee of the 101 - Jan. 28, 2021

Head Coach Ron Rivera is named the NFC Coach of the Year by the Committee of the 101. It is Rivera's third time receiving the honor (2013 & 2015) and he joins George Allen (1971 & 1976) and Joe Gibbs (1983) as the only coaches in Washington franchise history to earn the honor. Rivera joins Dick Vermeil as the only coaches to earn the honor three times in their careers.

DE Chase Young named AP Defensive Rookie of the Year - Feb. 6, 2021

Chase Young put up impressive numbers in the 2020 NFL season and was rewarded for it by being named the AP Defensive Rookie of the Year. The second overall selection in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, Young played in 15 games (all starts) and led all NFL rookies with 7.5 sacks. He posted 44 total tackles (32 solo) and he added four passes defensed, 12 quarterback hits, four forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries and a fumble return for a touchdown. Young was selected as both NFC Defensive Player and NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month for December, and he was a PFWA All-NFC honoree – the only 2020 rookie to be selected to an all-conference squad. Young became the eighth rookie in Washington history to be named to a Pro Bowl and the first since quarterback Robert Griffin III in 2012. He was the first defensive rookie since linebacker Brian Orakpo in 2009. Young is the third defensive rookie in franchise history to be named to a Pro Bowl joining Orakpo and Pro Football Hall of Famer Paul Krause.

QB Alex Smith named AP Comeback of the Year - Feb. 6, 2021

Washington QB Alex Smith is named the AP Comeback Player of the Year for 2020. Smith becomes the first player

in Washington franchise history to win the award and the first NFC East player to earn the honor since Philadelphia quarterback Michael Vick did so in 2010. Smith becomes the third-consecutive quarterback to win the award, joining Tennessee's Ryan Tannehill (2019) and Andrew Luck (2018). During the 2020 season, Smith made his first appearance since suffering a severe leg injury on November 18, 2018. It was a comeback that surmounted 693 days and several major obstacles. Smith made his first start of the season on November 15, 2020 and threw for a career-high 390 yards while completing a career-high 38 passes.

Washington Retires legendary Safety Sean Taylor's No. 21 - Oct. 17, 2021

Washington officially retires S Sean Taylor's number 21 against the Kansas City Chiefs. It is only the second number ever retired by the franchise.

Washington Football Team Officially Becomes Washington Commanders - Feb. 2, 2022

The Washington Commanders became the team's official identity on Feb. 2, 2022, with the unveiling of the team's new logo, helmets and jersey's.

Josh Harris is Approved as Owner of the Washington Commanders - July 20, 2023

Josh Harris and his group of limited partners are unanimously approved by league owners to complete their historic purchase of the Washington Commanders. The Harris Group purchased the franchise for \$6.05 billion – the most ever for a North American sports franchise.

Adam Peters is Named General Manager of the Washington Commanders - Jan. 15, 2024

Adam Peters came to Washington with 20 years of NFL experience in both scouting and as an executive. Most recently, Peters spent the 2021-2023 seasons with the San Francisco 49ers as their assistant general manager. He held the title as vice president of player personnel for the franchise for four seasons prior. During Peters tenure in San Francisco, the team took trips to four NFC Championship games and made an appearance in Super Bowl LIII. Holding many scouting titles from 2003-2016, including the director of college scouting with the Denver Broncos and New England Patriots, Peters was staffed on three Super Bowl winning teams.

Washington Hires Dan Quinn as Head Coach - Feb. 3, 2024

Dan Quinn becomes the 31st head coach in franchise history. Quinn joins the Commanders with 21 years of coaching experience, most recently serving as the defensive coordinator for the Dallas Cowboys (2021-2023) where he was named Assistant Coach of the Year voted on by the Associated Press in 2021. Prior to his stint in Dallas, Quinn spent five seasons as the head coach of the Atlanta Falcons from 2015-2020 where he led Atlanta to an appearance in Super Bowl LI and an AFC Divisional Round appearance in 2017. Quinn led the Seattle Seahawks defense in 2013 and 2014 where the club made appearances in consecutive Super Bowls. He has also been on the coaching staff of the New York Jets, Miami Dolphins, San Francisco 49ers, the University of Florida, Hofstra, VMI, and William & Mary.

The Cards scored with 20 seconds remaining on a catch by Mel Gray to force overtime. St. Louis won the coin toss and marched to set up a 37-yard Jim Bakken field goal to win after seven minutes of play.

Nov. 23, 1975 - RFK Stadium
Oakland 26, Washington 23

George Blanda's 27-yard field goal decided the contest after 7:13.

Sept. 27, 1976 - Veterans Stadium
Washington 20, Philadelphia 17

Mark Moseley's 29-yard field goal won the Monday night game with 12:49 elapsed in overtime.

Nov. 12, 1978 - RFK Stadium
Washington 16, New York Giants 13

Washington won on Moseley's 45-yard field goal after 3:32 elapsed.

Nov. 15, 1981 - Giants Stadium
Washington 30, New York Giants 27

Moseley kicked a 49-yard field goal on the game's final play to force overtime and a 48-yard field goal to win with 3:44 elapsed.

Ricky Sanders' 51-yard touchdown reception from Doug Williams with less than two minutes remaining tied the score at 24. Ali Haji-Sheikh kicked the 26-yard game-winning field goal after Sanders' 36-yard kickoff return in overtime.

Dec. 17, 1988 - Riverfront Stadium
Cincinnati 20, Washington 17

Jim Breech connected from 20 yards out seven minutes into sudden death.

Nov. 4, 1990 - Pontiac Silverdome
Washington 41, Detroit 38

Chip Lohmiller's 34-yard field goal 9:10 into overtime capped the Washington comeback that equalled the team's greatest in history. Down by 21 points in the third quarter and 17 points entering the fourth, Jeff Rutledge's 12-yard run tied the game with :18 seconds remaining.

Nov. 3, 1991 - RFK Stadium
Washington 16, Houston 13

Darrell Green intercepted a Warren Moon pass which set-up Lohmiller's 41-yard field goal 5:01 into overtime moving Washington to a 9-0 record. The Oilers tied the game with less than

two minutes in regulation and had a chance to win after Brian Mitchell fumbled the kickoff, but Ian Howfield's 33-yard attempt sailed wide left.

Oct. 16, 1994 - RFK Stadium
Arizona 19, Washington 16

Arizona scored the tying touchdown with :19 left in regulation. Arizona's game-winner was set up by Terry Hoage, who intercepted a Heath Shuler pass and returned it 12 yards to the 23. Peterson kicked the game-winning 29-yard field goal.

Oct. 8, 1995 - Veterans Stadium
Philadelphia 37, Washington 37

Arizona 37, Washington 34

In one of the most bizarre games in Washington history, the team led by 14 points in the fourth quarter only to squander the lead. The Cardinals won the coin toss and drove to the Washington 15, only to have Kevin Butler miss. Scott Blanton booted the apparent 38-yard game-winner, but a holding penalty forced a retry from 48 that went wide left. Arizona then missed a 29-yarder that was negated because the Redskins were offside. Butler's third attempt was good from 32 yards.

San Francisco 19, Washington 16

San Francisco's William Floyd's 1-yard touchdown run tied the game in regulation. After winning the coin toss in overtime, the 49ers' Jeff Wilkins hit a 38-yard field goal to win.

Sept. 14, 1997 - Jack Kent Cooke Stadium
Washington 19, Arizona 13

In the inaugural game at Jack Kent Cooke Stadium, Washington won with 13:24 left in overtime when Gus Frerotte, sidestepping a heavy rush, threw a 40-yard strike to a leaping Michael Westbrook in the end zone. The winning points were set up two plays earlier when rookie defensive end Kenard Lang forced and recovered a fumble on the Washington 35-yard line.

Nov. 23, 1997 - Jack Kent Cooke Stadium
Washington 7, NY Giants 7

In overtime, Washington turned the ball over three times, but the defense forced two punts and the Giants missed a 54-yard field goal. With under two minutes remaining, Washington drove to the Giants 36-yard line, but a 54-yard field goal attempt fell short with 11 seconds left in overtime.

Sept. 12, 1999 - FedExField
Dallas 41, Washington 35

Dallas stopped the club's first overtime drive and then scored on a 76-yard bomb from Troy Aikman to Rocket Ismail.

Nov. 28, 1999 - FedExField
Washington 20, Philadelphia 17

Brett Conway's game-winning 27-yard FG was set up by a 48-yard kickoff return by James Thrash, which opened the overtime period. The Eagles never had the ball.

OVERTIME GAMES

Dec. 26, 1999 - 3Com Park Washington 26, San Francisco 20

Washington overcame a 10-point fourth quarter deficit to win their ninth game of the year and clinch the NFC East. Brad Johnson's QB sneak from the 1-yard line with 3:28 left in regulation sent the game into the extra period. On the opening drive, Johnson connected with Larry Centers for a 33-yard TD.

Oct. 1, 2000 - FedExField Washington 20, Tampa Bay 17

Tampa Bay forced the overtime when Martin Gramatica connected on a 42-yard field goal as the regulation clock fell to 0:00. 10:51 into the extra period, Deion Sanders ignited the crowd with a 57-yard punt return, setting up the game winning 20-yard field goal by Michael Husted.

Oct. 21, 2001 - FedExField Washington 17, Carolina 14

Placekicker Brett Conway kicked a 23-yard field goal in overtime to seal Washington's first victory of the season and the first under Marty Schottenheimer, 17-14. Washington forced overtime by overcoming a 14-point deficit in the fourth quarter thanks to a 67-yard interception return for touchdown by LaVar Arrington and an 85-yard touchdown pass from Tony Banks to Rod Gardner.

Sept. 21, 2003 - FedExField New York Giants 24, Washington 21

With less than five minutes left in regulation, Washington overcame a 21-10 deficit to send the game into overtime. The Giants won the toss and drove downfield from their own 6-yard line. Kicker Matt Bryant connected on a 29-yard field goal to cap off New York's first scoring drive since the second quarter and seal the 24-21 victory.

Oct. 2, 2005 - FedExField Washington 20, Seattle 17

With a chance to win the game at the end of regulation with 0:01 left on the clock, Seattle kicker Josh Brown missed a 47-yard field goal, sending the game into overtime. After winning the coin toss, Washington went on a 5:31 drive that culminated with a Nick Novak 39-yard field goal to seal Washington's victory over the Seahawks.

Nov. 27, 2005 - FedExField San Diego 23, Washington 17

San Diego running back LaDainian Tomlinson scored a 32-yard touchdown run with 3:37 remaining to tie the game at 17. With 0:35 remaining, Washington had an opportunity to take the lead with a 53-yard field goal but the ball sailed wide right. In overtime, San Diego ran two plays that culminated in a 41-yard touchdown run, again by Tomlinson to seal the victory.

Oct. 1, 2006 - FedExField Washington 36, Jacksonville 30

Jacksonville sent the game into overtime with 0:06 on the clock when kicker Josh Scobee connected on a 41-yard field goal. Washington won the coin toss and proceeded to take the ball 80 yards on three plays for the game-winning score. Quarterback Mark Brunell connected with wide receiver Santana Moss for a 68-yard touchdown pass to seal the win.

Dec. 24, 2006 - Edward Jones Dome St. Louis 37, Washington 31

Washington kicker Shaun Suisham nailed a field goal with 1:15 remaining in regulation to tie the score at 31 and send it into overtime. St. Louis came back in overtime and, six minutes into the extra time, running back Steven Jackson took a handoff 21 yards for the game winning touchdown.

Sept. 9, 2007 - FedExField Washington 16, Miami 13

In overtime, Washington won the coin toss and elected to receive. Running backs Clinton Portis and Ladell Betts combined

for 46 rushing yards and quarterback Jason Campbell completed a key third-down pass to tight end Chris Cooley, keeping the drive alive. As soon as Washington got into field goal range, kicker Shaun Suisham nailed the 39-yard field goal to seal the victory.

Nov. 4, 2007 - Meadowlands Washington 23, New York Jets 20

Jets kicker Mike Nugent connected on a 30-yard field goal with 0:15 left in regulation to tie the game at 20-20 and send the game into overtime. Washington running back Clinton Portis bulldozed his way down the field in overtime, setting up the game-winning 46-yard field goal by kicker Shaun Suisham.

Dec. 6, 2009 - FedExField New Orleans 33, Washington 30

Saints quarterback Drew Brees drove 80 yards at the end of regulation to tie the game at 30-30. In overtime, the Saints marched down the field setting up an 18-yard field goal by kicker Garrett Hartley to seal the victory.

Sept. 19, 2010 - FedExField Houston 30, Washington 27

After holding the Texans on the first possession of overtime, Washington drove to the Houston 34-yard line, but kicker Graham Gano pushed a 52-yard attempt wide right. On the ensuing drive, Neil Rackers connected on a 35-yard field goal to give Houston the win.

Oct. 10, 2010 - FedExField Washington 16, Green Bay 13

LaRon Landry intercepted an Aaron Rodgers pass on Green Bay's second overtime possession and Washington drove 24 yards to set up a game-winning 33-yard field goal by kicker Graham Gano in the team's Week 5 win against the eventual Super Bowl champions.

Nov. 21, 2010 - LP Field Washington 19, Tennessee 16

After missing a potential game-winning field goal at the end of regulation, Graham Gano redeemed himself in overtime, capping off a 10-play, 57-yard drive with a 48-yarder on the club's first overtime possession to secure a 19-16 road win.

Dec. 26, 2010 - EverBank Field Washington 20, Jacksonville 17

A 20-yard touchdown run by Jacksonville quarterback David Garrard in the final three minutes of regulation helped the Jaguars force overtime. Jacksonville won the toss and elected to receive, but on their third offensive play of overtime, cornerback Kevin Barnes intercepted Garrard, setting up Graham Gano for a 31-yard game-winning field goal.

Nov. 20, 2011 - FedExField Dallas 27, Washington 24

Washington quarterback Rex Grossman lofted a perfect fade to receiver Donté Stallworth in the corner of the end zone with 14 seconds remaining in regulation to force overtime. Washington missed a 52-yard field goal attempt on the first possession of overtime, and Dallas responded as kicker Dan Bailey hit a 39-yard field goal above the right upright for a Dallas victory.

Dec. 9, 2012 - FedExField Washington 31, Baltimore 28

Baltimore took an eight-point lead with less than five minutes to play, but Washington quarterbacks Robert Griffin III and Kirk Cousins led a 13-play, 88-yard drive to tie the game at 28-28. Cousins, in place of an injured Griffin III, threw an 11-yard touchdown pass to Pierre Garçon and followed it with a two-point conversion on a quarterback draw. In overtime, Washington forced the eventual Super Bowl champion Ravens to go three-and-out, and after a 64-yard punt return by rookie Richard Crawford, kicker Kai Forbath hit a 34-yard game-winning field goal.

OVERTIME GAMES

Nov. 3, 2013 – FedExField Washington 30, San Diego 24

Leading 24-21 on Homecoming Weekend, the team's defense faced first-and-goal from its own 1-yard line with 21 seconds remaining. After stopping Danny Woodhead on first down, Washington forced two Philip Rivers incompletions and forced the Chargers to settle for a game-tying 19-yard field goal by Nick Novak. Washington took the ball on the first possession of overtime and promptly drove 78 yards in 10 plays, winning the game on fullback Darrel Young's team-record-tying third rushing touchdown of the day.

Oct. 27, 2014 – AT&T Stadium Washington 20, Dallas 17

Led by quarterback Colt McCoy in his first start with the team, Washington earned their first overtime win against the rival Cowboys since Nov. 2, 1975. On Monday Night Football, McCoy completed 25-of-30 passes for 299 yards, including engineering a nine-play, 58-yard drive culminating in a 40-yard Kai Forbath field goal on overtime's first possession. Rookie cornerback Bashaud Breeland batted away a fourth down pass on the ensuing Cowboys possession, giving the team a 20-17 win.

Oct. 11, 2015 – Georgia Dome Atlanta 25, Washington 19

Washington trailed by three with 24 seconds remaining in regulation. Quarterback Kirk Cousins led the Redskins 46 yards in four plays, and kicker Dustin Hopkins hit a then-career-long 52-yard field goal with no time remaining to force overtime with the teams tied at 19-19. Washington received the ball to start overtime, but on the seventh play of the drive, wide receiver Ryan Grant slipped in his route, allowing Falcons cornerback Robert Alford to intercept a Cousins pass and race 59 yards down the right sideline for the game-winning touchdown.

Oct. 30, 2016 – Wembley Stadium Washington 27, Cincinnati 27

In Washington's first game in London, Washington and Cincinnati treated an international audience to a back-and-forth game that featured five lead changes. Trailing 27-24 with 3:15 remaining, quarterback Kirk Cousins engineered a 10-play, 45-yard drive to set-up kicker Dustin Hopkins for a game-tying 40-yard field goal with 1:07 remaining in regulation. In overtime, Hopkins pulled a potential game-winning 34-yard field goal wide left. Washington forced a fumble on the Bengals' ensuing possession, and a potential Hail Mary pass for the Redskins on their next drive sailed out of bounds, resulting in the team's second tie of the overtime era.

Nov. 19, 2016 – Mercedes-Benz Superdome New Orleans 34, Washington 31

A battered Washington squad led the eventual NFC North champion Saints, 31-16, with under six minutes remaining in New Orleans, but the Saints engineered touchdown drives of 75 yards and 87 yards and converted a two-point conversion to send the game to overtime at 31-31. After a Washington three-and-out to open the extra period, the Saints drove 51 yards to set up Wil Lutz's game-winning 28-yard field goal.

Dec. 22, 2019 – FedExField NY Giants 41, Washington 35

In a game that looked like it was going to get out of hand early, Washington outscored the New York Giants 14-0 in the fourth quarter to force overtime. New York won the coin toss and elected to receive and QB Daniel Jones led an 11 play, 66 yard drive that was capped with a three yard touchdown pass to TE Kaden Smith to seal the victory. The loss sealed Washington's fate finishing last in the NFC East, but guaranteed the team the No. 2 overall selection in the 2020 NFL Draft.

Dec. 4, 2022 – MetLife Stadium Washington 20, NY Giants 20

Coming out of halftime tied at 13, the Commanders and the Giants battled in the second half. The Giants thought they were going to walk away with a win until Jahan Dotson caught a 28-yard touchdown pass from Taylor Heinicke with 1:45 left in the fourth quarter to tie the game at 20. Neither team could score in overtime and Giants kicker Graham Gano missed a 58-yard field goal to end the game in a tie.

Oct. 1, 2023 – Lincoln Financial Field Philadelphia 34, Washington 31

Washington trailed Philadelphia by seven with 1:46 left in regulation. Quarterback Sam Howell, in his fifth career game, drove 10 plays for 64 yards including a 10-yard touchdown pass to Jahan Dotson, forcing overtime for the first time against Philadelphia since 1999. Washington won the coin toss, elected to receive, but offensively came up short allowing Philadelphia to gain possession. Jake Elliott's 54-yard field goal was the difference.
