This guide will be essential as you activate the NCAA Women's Final Four visual identity. The NCAA Women's Final Four name and logo are trademarks of the NCAA. NCAA corporate champions/partners, licensees and the NCAA's television partners have exclusive rights to the use of NCAA logos and marks for promotional purposes. The use of NCAA logos or marks by entities other than the aforementioned, including host institutions or conferences, must be approved by the NCAA branding and fan experience staff.

Every effort has been made to provide a comprehensive and accurate summary of the 2020 NCAA Women's Final Four style. As such, the information in this guide is not intended to supersede, override or affect the interpretation of any of the rights and obligations of the NCAA.

While this style guide provides guidelines for the correct usage of marks and graphics, final designs of all applications must be reviewed and approved by the NCAA branding and fan experience staff before production. In the event this guide requires clarification, the NCAA will provide such interpretations at its sole discretion.

The 2020 NCAA Women's Final Four Style Guide is a key component of the NCAA brand management strategy. Building the equity of the NCAA Women's Final Four mark can only be accomplished by adhering to these guidelines. Through the consistent application and usage of NCAA logos in all graphic applications, the NCAA will continue to build a strong and identifiable brand. The NCAA may revise these terms and conditions at any time. Users are bound by these revisions and should periodically visit the NCAA website (ncaa.org) to review the current terms and conditions. Information on the NCAA website is subject to change without notice.

CORE PURPOSE

The core purpose of the NCAA is to govern competition in a fair, safe, equitable and sportsmanlike manner, and to integrate intercollegiate athletics into higher education so the educational experience of the student-athlete is paramount.

The National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) is a voluntary, membership-led organization of almost 1,300 colleges and universities, conferences and other groups. Together, our members make rules and regulations to serve the student-athlete and preserve the integrity of intercollegiate athletics. There are approximately 125 committees of presidents, athletics directors, conference commissioners, coaches, faculty members and student-athletes from NCAA schools and conferences working to create these guidelines.

Each year, nearly a half a million student-athletes compete in three divisions (Division I, Division II and Division III) in 24 sports. Annually, approximately 54,000 student-athletes compete in 90 NCAA Championships®. Three of these championships – rifle, fencing and skiing – are co-ed championships.

NCAA championship events are held at more than 700 sites each year.







ADVERTISING

All decorations shall comply with the facility signage policy and be approved by the NCAA®.

LICENSEES

All items that include NCAA marks must be purchased from NCAA licensees. A current list of NCAA licensees can be found at ncaa.org under the resources tab, then under corporate relationships.

COMPONENTS OF THE NCAA® WOMEN'S FINAL FOUR® DÉCOR PLAN

- Women's Final Four citywide plan [to include, but not be limited to: competition venue, airport, NCAA headquarters hotel, participating team hotels, downtown proper, etc.].*
- · NCAA fan and community events.
- · NCAA sponsors/vendors.
- · NCAA projects.*

*Décor elements must be designed by the NCAA's preferred graphics provider. Printing and installation of décor projects can be produced locally by a provider identified by the NCAA and Local Organizing Committee (LOC).

Please contact your primary LOC décor liaison to obtain a décor project request form.

CITYWIDE

The citywide décor plan shall include, but not be limited to, banners in high traffic areas, the NCAA headquarters hotel, participating team hotels, interior and exterior of the competition venue, NCAA special event locations and the airport, pending ability of the budget to cover such costs. All décor elements must be free of commercial marks unless approved by NCAA branding and fan experience staff.

The NCAA shall not enter into any joint-indemnification agreements with the LOC in connection with the display of citywide decorations. Co-branding is prohibited unless pre-approved by the NCAA.

CLEAN ZONE

The LOC and the NCAA shall establish areas (within at least a multi-block radius around the primary NCAA and WBCA hotels, team hotels, Tourney Town™ venue and competition facility) that – on public property, on the exterior of private property, and on private properties without permanent structures – shall be free of temporary promotional and commercial activities that are not authorized by the NCAA. Every effort should be made to assure that the host city's airport shall be included as part of the clean zone or the restrictions and quidelines thereof.

The purposes of the clean zone are to: (1) minimize commercialization; (2) create a clean, safe and vibrant environment; and (3) allow the NCAA to offer activities and official events that provide limited and tasteful recognition to selected commercial entities associated with those activities and events. Except where specifically noted, restrictions apply to public- and privately owned exterior spaces, and temporarily enclosed spaces.

To access NCAA championship logos, log on to the NCAA's Digital Library located at ncaa.widencollective.com. New users will be required to create a login. Once the digital librarian has granted access, championship logos may be downloaded and used.

FULL-COLOR LOGO

GRAYSCALE LOGO

The grayscale logo is for use on light or white backgrounds and dark backgrounds. Grayscale versions have been created for use when a one-color logo is required and gradients are achievable (e.g., newspaper advertisements).

ONE-COLOR LOGO

One-color logos are available for when a one-color logo is required and the grayscale version is not achievable.

COMMON MISUSE



Do not alter the proportions of the mark.



Do not rotate the logo.



Do not skew or distort the mark.



Do not place the logo over distracting backgrounds.



Do not alter the logo's colors.



Do not add strokes or other graphical elements.



Do not crop the logo in any way.



Do not place the logo in proximity to any other corporate mark.





CLEAR SPACE

When the logo appears on its own and in design application, it requires a fixed amount of minimum clear space around it. Text, photos or other graphic elements should never encroach on this space. Designers should use discretion and follow clear space guidelines.

The logo's clear space is determined by the height of the letter F in "Final."













COLOR INFORMATION

The foundational colors for the visual identity are all derived from the logo's color palette to support the visual identity in signage, décor, and communication applications.

FONTS

The fonts used within the context of the 2020 NCAA® Women's Final Four® visual identity are shown here and should be used as follows:

Regina Black – The primary font used for headlines, large applications, and signage. Regina Black should be used in all-caps for headlines. Regina Black should not be used in body copy in any circumstance.

Haboro Slab Norm Bold – The secondary font to be used alongside Regina Black in headlines, as well as in smaller, more copy-heavy communications and paragraphs. Haboro should be used in all-caps for headlines, but should be used in sentence case when utilized for body copy.




DESIGN ELEMENTS

Below are the basic elements of the visual identity. These elements may be used in any application and can be cropped to give the visual identity flexibility and variety. The musical instruments and basketball line illustrations can vary in size and number in a composition. The illustrations can be rotated, overlapped, and cropped in any way to create interesting compositions. When illustration elements are resized, the line weight and size relationship should remain the same. Line weight should also remain consistent on illustrations used in different compositions that occupy the same space.

The illustrations can be recolored to any color in the visual identity palette. The negative space inside and outside the illustrations can be recolored to add variety and interest. In cases where team-specific color palettes are needed, these elements can be made team-specific if the design is unique to one team.

BACKGROUNDS AND PATTERNS

The visual identity is built from solid color backgrounds and illustrated patterns. Using these backgrounds and patterns in a consistent way is essential to the foundational visual identity. These elements are designed to work together in composition, color, and balance to create a visual experience that represents the brand of the 2020 Women's Final Four® and grabs the attention of the audience.

PRIMARY SOLID BACKGROUNDS

The primary color for solid backgrounds is black, as it provides the most contrast for overlaying text, logos, and illustrations. Green, yellow, and orange should also be used as solid backgrounds for variety, but should be treated as secondary to black, as they provide less color contrast to overlaying elements.








PRIMARY PATTERN

The primary illustration pattern should be used to fill space where there is no type content or logos. The pattern can be resized, cropped, and recolored. Elements can be added and removed as needed. When the pattern is used in compositions, equal balance should be given to both the jazz elements and basketball elements.







TYPOGRAPHY LOCK-UPS

These type treatments have been designed to integrate with the visual identity and boldly communicate information about the event throughout the décor. The type treatments consist of a combination of two fonts: Regina Black and Haboro Slab.

These type lock-ups should be used as designed – as two-color applications – but can be used in one-color applications when needed. The lock-ups should be recolored as needed to create visual contrast in the composition for legibility. Additional lock-ups may be designed as needed, but should follow the principles set here. Lock-ups should always contain the registered trademark symbol (\mathbb{B}) and trademark symbol (\mathbb{T}) where necessary.

TYPOGRAPHY LOCK-UPS

Team-specific type treatments have been designed to represent the teams participating in the event. The team-specific type treatments also consist of Regina Black and Haboro Slab, but have been recolored in the approved team color palettes.

These type lock-ups are for placement only and should be recreated once the four teams have been determined. The "X's within the O's" embellishment in the Regina Black font should be recreated with the official team names where possible.

BUILDING COMPOSITIONS

The following guidelines explain how the visual identity is applied while building compositions. Following these guidelines will ensure consistency throughout applications.



LAYER 1: LOGOS AND TEXT


The 2020 Women's Final Four logo, type lock-ups, and typographic content should be placed on the top layer at 100% opacity with no effects. Text and logos should be placed in negative spaces without overlapping or touching any illustrations.

LAYER 2: ILLUSTRATIONS

Illustrations should be placed over the background layer at 100% opacity with no effects and can be re-colored, rotated at 90° angles, overlapped, and cropped at the edges of the composition. Line weight should remain consistent when resizing illustrations.

LAYER 3: SOLID COLOR BACKGROUND

Backgrounds should be 100% opacity vectors in the color scheme of the visual identity: black, green, orange, yellow, or team-specific colors. Composition backgrounds should not be white or NCAA blue (PANTONE 300), or contain patterns or photography.









VERTICAL COMPOSITIONS

The elements in this décor package were designed to work cohesively. As elements are applied, the visual identity begins to take shape, creates visual excitement, and draws the viewer in. The combination of illustrations, colors, and type treatments gives this event a wide range of design application opportunities. Design opportunities can be filled with just illustration elements to break up messaging, but event branding and messaging should be prominent in the décor.















HORIZONTAL COMPOSITIONS

These horizontal compositions are an example of how the illustration elements can be used to create color breaks for placement of logos and messaging. The negative spaces around and within illustrations can be recolored to add excitement and variety. These compositions will work well applied to facia, fencing, horizontal video boards, email headers, and more.












TEAM-SPECIFIC COMPOSITIONS

NCAA TRADEMARK GUIDELINES

Using the trademark, its symbols and NCAA guidelines:

NOTE: These general guidelines do not include merchandise designs. All product designs must be submitted through the NCAA licensing program administered by the Collegiate Licensing Company. Inquiries should be directed to the NCAA licensing staff.

All uses of NCAA trademarks must be submitted to the NCAA branding and fan experience staff or its designees for approval.

Accurate reproductions of NCAA logos may be obtained through the NCAA Logo Library. For access to the logo library, please contact Durenka Robie at drobie@ncaa.org. Trademark insignias are fact-sensitive and depend upon the location of the trademark and how it is used. In any advertising, headline or graphic using NCAA marks, the insignia $^{\text{TM}}$ or $^{\text{th}}$ as noted in the NCAA trademark list should be used. Trademarks used in text, if not part of a headline or graphic, should include the insignia with the first use.

Location of the insignias is also fact-sensitive. In the case of NCAA Women's Final Four, an ® is required after NCAA and after Women's Final Four. The NCAA owns "NCAA" and "Women's Final Four," but "NCAA Women's Final Four" is not a registered mark in itself: NCAA® Women's Final Four.

NCAA TRADEMARKED PROTECTION LANGUAGE

NCAA trademarks should have notice of ownership language in a discreet location proximate to the trademark use. The legal notice often is located at the bottom of a page in smaller font or "mouse print."

The examples below are written only to represent the most typical examples. If you are unsure of exact wording for a specific example, please work with Durenka Robie for assistance and clarification.
