- 1967 OAKLAND CLIPPERS (NPSL)* The Baltimore Bays provided the opposition for the Clippers in a two game total goals Series. The home-town Bays thrilled a crowd of 16,619 with a 1-0 victory on a great defensive effort and a goal by Dennis Viollet. Dragan Djukic, one of many Yugoslavian first division players on the Clippers, scored a hat trick in the second game as the Californians prevailed 4-1 to win the series four goals to two.
- 1967 LOS ANGELES WOLVES (USA)* In a wild game that was tied at one apiece with 27 minutes to play, the Wolves beat the Washington Whips 6-5 in overtime. The two teams went on a scoring spree with four goals traded in a span of three and a half minutes that left the score at four-all. Eight minutes to play and the Wolves scored again, but that lead was short lived as Jens Peterson lofted a free kick some 50 yards to Francis Munro who was standing in front of the goal, and Munro headed it past a very suprised Phil Parkes of the Wolves to tie the game with 30 seconds to go. The teams traded goals in the overtime period to make it 5-5. In the sudden-death period that followed, Ally Shewan tried to clear a cross in front of the net, but nudged it into his own goal, ending the game on an incredible note.
- 1968 ATLANTA CHIEFS The Chiefs faced the San Diego Toros in a two game series. The first game was a scoreless tie in San Diego. The second was extremely well played as the Chiefs, attacking in a 4-2-4 formation, scored twice in the first half on goals by Peter McParland and Delroy Scott. A second period goal was recorded by Kaiser Motaung and the Chiefs finished 3-0 winners.
- 1969 KANSAS CITY SPURS No playoffs were held in 1969, but the Spurs captured the title by finishing first in the league with a 10-2-4 record and 110 points. The Atlanta Chiefs were second at 11-2-3, compiling 109 points. The top scorers for each team waged a season-long battle for the scoring title. Kaiser Motaung of Atlanta tallied 36 points on 16 goals and 4 assists, while George Benitez of Kansas City scored 15 goals and 5 assists for 35 points.
- 1970 ROCHESTER LANCERS Rochester was the first expansion team to win an NASL title. The Lancers dominated the first game behind the scoring punch of Raul Herrera, who accounted for two of Rochester's three goals. In the second game it was Washington storming back from a one goal deficit to win 3-1, but the Darts fell short on total goals, the Lancers winning the series four goals to three.
- 1971 DALLAS TORNADO The Tornado and the Atlanta Chiefs squared off in a best of three games series. In the first game Kaiser Motaung scored the game-winner for Atlanta three minutes into overtime. Three days later in Dallas, the rejuvenated Dallas team came back with a 4-0 victory. The finale was a fast-paced affair. The Tornado defense, with Gabbo Gavric, Dick Hall and John Best proved irresistable as the Tornado shed its losers image with a 2-0 win and the team's first-ever NASL title.
- 1972 NEW YORK COSMOS Cosmos forward Randy Horton, the NASL scoring leader that year, opened the scoring in the contest in the tenth minute of play against the St. Louis Stars, featuring an American-dominated lineup. In the second half a beautiful combination of passes between John Sewell and Pat McBride opened the Cosmos' defense for a Pat McBride pass to Casey Frankiewicz, who finished with the tying goal. The deciding goal was a penalty kick by Joe Jelinek at 86:00 that was partially stopped by Stars' 'keeper Mike Winter, but nonetheless rebounded in the net off the left post.

* Predecessors to the NASL were the National Professional Soccer League and the United Soccer Association, whose championships are reviewed here.

1973 PHILADELPHIA ATOMS North Americanization took a big step forward when Al Miller introduced his Atoms to a surprised NASL. Bobby Smith, Bob Rigby, Casey Bahr, Stan Startzell and Barry Barto proved equal to the foreign imports and contributed heavily to the expansion club's 2-0 win over the Dallas Tornado on a goal by Bill Straub and an own goal off John Best of Dallas. Although the Dallas lineup featured Kyle Rote, Ilija Mitic and Gabbo Gavric, the Atoms held their own against the Southern Division champions.

1974 LOS ANGELES AZTECS The Aztecs and Miami Toros were the participants in the 1974 title game, and for the first time in NASL history the championship game was decided by penalty kicks. Miami broke out on top as Ralph Wright scored, but a penalty kick by Ricardo DeRienzo tied the match. Miami went ahead on an own goal, but two LA goals sandwiched a score by Esteban Aranzuiz of Miami and the game ended 3-3. In the penalty kicks decider, the Aztecs scored five goals to the Toros' three to clinch the title.

Tampa Bay 2 Portland 0

Two expansion clubs- the Tampa Bay Rowdies and the Portland Timbers played in the first Soccer Bowl, held in San Jose. Both defenses were superb as it was not until the 66th minute when Tampa Bay defender Arsene Auguste broke the scoreless duel, hitting the back of the net with a 30-yard drive. It was still anyone's game until Clyde Best scored again for the Rowdies in the last minute to secure the 2-0 victory. The Rowdies became the third consecutive expansion team to win the NASL Championship, and the fourth over the last six years.

Played in the posh Seattle Kingdome, the Western Division champion Minnesota Kicks faced the Toronto Metros, second place finishers in the Northern Division. For the first 35 minutes the Kicks attacked well, but, after Eusebio scored on a hard-hit free kick, the strong Metros defense gave Minnesota forwards Ron Futch and Alan Willey little room to maneuver. In the second half, Toronto solidified their lead with a marvelous goal from Ivan Lukacevic and Ivair Ferreira made it a clear-cut victory with another score with 17 minutes remaining.

The star-studded Cosmos found the young and less famous Seattle Sounders a more than equal match in this memorable championship game. It was the Cosmos who opened the scoring when Seattle goalkeeper Tony Chursky intercepted a pass for Steve Hunt. Chursky started to dribble left when Hunt came around the right side and picked Chursky's pocket, sending the ball and Hunt himself into the net. The tying goal was the result of a fine dribbling and passing combination between Micky Cave and Tommy Ord, the play finished by Ord. It was not until late in the game that Hunt lofted a beautiful cross to Giorgio Chinaglia who scored on a header that gave the Cosmos their second NASL title, and marked the last NASL game that Pele would play in.

SOCCER BOWL-78

New York 3 Tampa Bay 1

A Soccer Bowl record crowd of 74,901 watched the New York Cosmos and the Tampa Bay Rowdies square off in a fine contest between these two offensive-minded teams. The Rowdies were marking very closely at the outset, and many of the Cosmos' shots early in the game never came near the goalkeeper. Thirty minutes into the game however, Steve Hunt of the Cosmos sent a high cross from inside the 35-yard line to right winger Dennis Tueart, who blasted the ball into the net, giving New York a 1-0 lead. A minute before the end of the first half a sharp combination of passes by the Cosmos up the middle ended with a hard shot by Hunt that rebounded off Tampa Bay goalkeeper Winston DuBose. Giorgio Chinaglia was in position for the rebound, which he headed in for the second Cosmos' score. The Rowdies, playing without their top scorer Rodney March, came back patiently as David Robb shuffled a pass sideways to Brazilian right back Mirandinha, who scored from the right with a viciously curving shot. Three minutes later Dennis Tueart put a damper on Tampa Bay's comeback, taking a pass from Werner Roth through Joe Fink's legs and angling a shot from the far right into the left side of the goal.

SOCCER BOWL-79

Vancouver 2 Tampa Bay 1

The matchup was a classic: Tampa Bay featured the League's leading scorer, Oscar Fabbiani, and Vancouver had the NASL's best 'keeper in Phil Parkes; Vancouver had the League's premiere defensive corps and the Rowdies were the fifth-best goal-producing unit in 1979. Trevor Whymark scored the first goal for the 'Caps, making a virtually untouched run up the right sideline and cutting diagonally to the top of the Rowdies penalty area where he unleashed a very hard left-footed shot. Jan van der Veen of the Rowdies performed a similar maneuver about ten minutes later, scoring his third playoff goal. The game-winner started with playoff MVP Alan Ball bringing the ball up the right side and shuffling it off to the left for an unmarked Whymark, 18 yards from the goal, who booted it in, this time right footed. The Rowdies mounted a patient comeback effort late in the game, but found the Whitecaps defense impenetrable and the city of Vancouver had its first championship in 15 years.

SOCCER BOWL-80

New York 3 Ft. Lauderdale 0

For the third time in four summers the Cosmos ended the 1980 season by parading the NASL championship trophy following a Soccer Bowl win. The New Yorkers parlayed a pair of Giorgio Chinaglia goals with a tight defense to subdue the Ft. Lauderdale Strikers 3-0. While the margin of victory matched the largest in Soccer Bowl history, the win was far from easy. En route to the title, the Cosmos had to weather a scoreless first half in which the Strikers failed to convert many good scoring chances. Part of the story of the game was some of the coaching decisions. Cosmos coach Hennes Weisweiler decided to protect his team from the Strikers lethal counterattacks. So he made a controversial decision to start Angelo DiBernardo in midfield, moved Beckenbauer to sweeper and relegated Carlos Alberto to the bench. His counterpart, Cor van der Hart, started a midfield of Ray Hudson, "Nene" Cubillas, Colin Fowles and Lex Schoenmaker. Conspicuous by his absence was Francisco Marinho. When informed he would not be starting, Marinho refused to dress for the game. His decision proved costly when Gerd Mueller left the game due to an injury at 37:27. Still, the game was to have many intriguing matchups, most significant being Chinaglia vs. Ken Fogarty. For most of the day "Foggy" battled his rival admirably. But Fogarty was to learn what all too many NASL stoppers already knew; a man can outplay Chinaglia for 89 minutes and still lose the decision.

Chicago 1 New York 0 (Shootout)

The Big Apple vs The Windy City

It was billed as the best matchup of offensive powers in Soccer Bowl history. Instead, Soccer-Bowl 81, at Toronto's Exhibition Stadium, turned out to be the best defensive battle of the year, as the Chicago Sting sought to dethrone the 1980 NASL Champion New York Cosmos.

The field glittered with stars from 13 nations, 12 NASL All-Stars, Giorgio Chinaglia, NASL MVP, and Willy Roy of Chicago, the 1982 NASL coach of the year.

Soccer Bowl MVP Frantz Mathieu spearheaded the Sting defense by shutting down NASL Leading scorer, Chinaglia and the Cosmos patent attack, while 1982 NASL top defender, Wim Rijsbergen and Cosmos goalkeeper Hubert Birkenmeier stymied the league's top offense in 1982 (84 goals) at the other end of the field.

After 105 hard-fought minutes for the first time in NASL history, the soccer championship of North America would be decided by a shootout. Four rounds, only New York's Vladislav Bogicevic and Chicago's Karl-Heinz Granitza were able to score. The championship now rested on the shoulders of two North Americans, Chicago's Rudy Glenn and New York's Robert Iarusci. Glenn, shooting first, scored as his shot was deflected by Birkenmeier, only to roll into the net. Chicago now had a 2-1 lead as the pressure shifted Toronto native, Robert Iarusci. Sting goalkeeper Dieter Ferner rose to the occasion, as he blocked the defender's attempt, to give his team the League title.

The 1-0 shootout victory was the "Windy City's" first professional sports championship in 18 years.

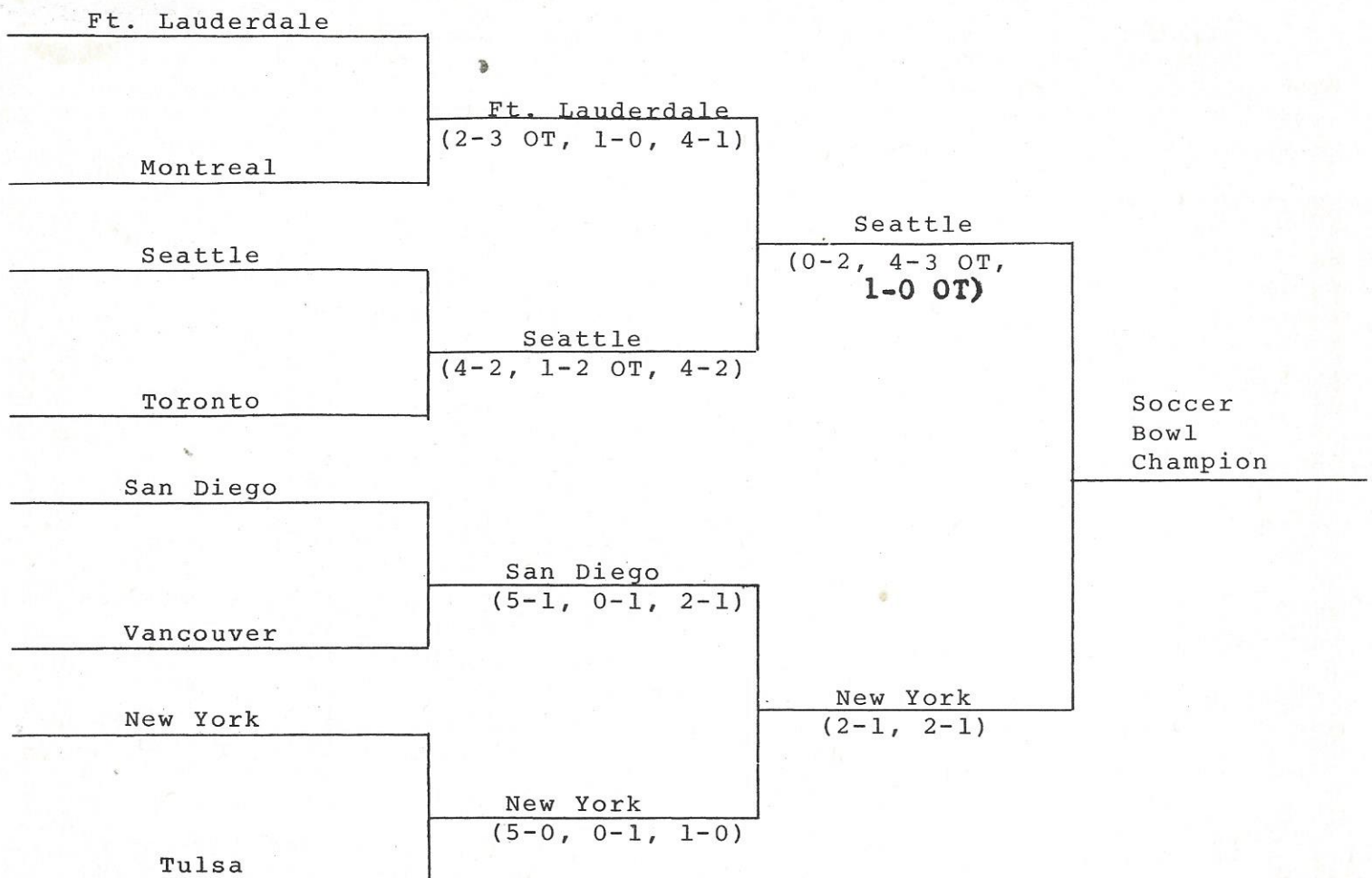

TIE IN VOTING

NOTES

NASL TIEBREAKER PROCEDURE—THE SHOOTOUT

NASL games which are tied at the end of regulation play will be extended by 15 minutes of sudden death overtime (two 7½ minute periods). A flip of a coin will decide which team will kick off. The first team to score a goal, either from the field or by a penalty kick wins the game.

If the game remains tied at the end of the second overtime period, the outcome will be decided by The Shootout which involves players on each team challenging the opposing goalkeeper in a one-on-one situation.

The visiting team will kick first and each team will take five chances in alternate order. Attacking players will start with the ball on the 35-yard line and must take their shot within five seconds. Goalkeepers have no movement restrictions within the five second period in accordance within normal rules of play.

The kicks shall be ended when one team has achieved an insurmountable advantage, such as scoring on its first three kicks while their opponents miss their first three.

If the teams remain tied after the prescribed five attempts, they shall continue to take alternate kicks until one has scored more than the other after an equal number of attempts. Only players in the game at the end of the overtime period shall be eligible to take such kicks. Goalkeepers shall not take kicks. No player may take a second kick until all other eligible members of his team have done so, at which time they shall continue in any order the team may wish, i.e., they do not have to kick in the same rotation.
