

Robert C. McNair

Founder, Chairman and **Chief Executive Officer**



obert C. McNair is perhaps best known in the business community as the founder of Cogen Technologies, which was sold in 1999. Cogen was the largest privately owned cogeneration company in the world with aggregate capacity of 1,400 megawatts. Today, he retains ownership in a 345-megawatt plant in New York and a 50-megawatt plant in West Virginia.

McNair now serves as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of The McNair Group, headquartered in Houston, Texas, where he oversees an investment portfolio including cogeneration assets in the eastern United States. Mr. McNair also owns Palmetto Partners, Ltd., a private investment company that manages the McNairs' public and private equity investments, and is Chairman of the McNair Foundation. In June 2000, Mr. McNair formed a biotechnology capital fund, Cogene Biotech Ventures, where he serves as Chairman.

Committed to bringing a National Football League team to Houston, Mr. McNair formed Houston NFL Holdings in 1998. On October 6, 1999, the NFL announced that the 32nd NFL franchise had been awarded to Mr. McNair, returning football to the City of Houston in the year 2002 and Super Bowl XXXVIII in 2004. On September 8, 2002, the Houston Texans kicked off their Inaugural Season with a victory over the Dallas Cowboys -19 to 10.

Mr. McNair's two football-related hires have been lauded throughout the league. He hired former Washington Redskins general manager Charley Casserly within three months of securing the franchise. Casserly helped build three Super Bowl winners over a 23-year career in Washington. Mr. McNair then hired Dom Capers as the first head coach of the Texans. Capers previously served as head coach of the expansion Carolina Panthers, leading them to the NFC Championship Game in just their second season of existence.

Those two hires paid immediate dividends in 2002 as the Texans won four games in their inaugural season. Houston defeated Dallas in its nationally-televised season opener, becoming the first expansion club to win its opening game

since the 1961 Minnesota Vikings. The Texans also won at Jacksonville and upset the Giants and Steelers, both of whom eventually made the playoffs.

Stonerside Stable, a major thoroughbred horse farm in Kentucky, is also among McNair's successes.



Mr. McNair is a current or past member of the Boards of Trustees of a number of institutions including Rice University, Baylor College of Medicine, the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston Grand Opera, the Greater Houston Partnership, the Greater Houston Convention and Visitors Bureau, the Free Enterprise Institute and the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas.

Mr. McNair is a member of the Texas Business Hall of Fame and a recipient of the Anti-Defamation League's Torch of Liberty Award, the Northwood University Outstanding Business Leader Award and the Association for Private Enterprise Education's Herman W. Lay Memorial Award. He recently received the Distinguished American Award from the Houston Chapter of the National Foundation and Football Distinguished Citizen Award from the Rotary Club of Houston. In April 2002 The South Main Center Association presented McNair with the prestigious City Builder Award. In April 2003 McNair received the Distinguished Citizen Award from the Sam Houston Area Council of



the Boy Scouts of America, and in May 2003 McNair received The Denton A. Cooley Leadership Award from the Texas Heart Institute. He also is a founder of the Cotswold project, a revitalization project focused on downtown Houston.

Born in Tampa, Fla., Mr. McNair has been a resident of Houston since 1960. He graduated from the University of South Carolina in Columbia in 1958 with a Bachelor of Science degree. In 1999, Mr. McNair received an honorary doctor of humane letters degree from the University of South Carolina. Mr. McNair serves as an elder at Memorial Drive Presbyterian Church.

Burguières also serves as Chairman and CEO of EMC Holdings, LLC, an investment management company specializing in oil services and exploration and production industries. Additionally, he serves as Chairman Emeritus of Weatherford International, an international energy company. Until 1996, Burguières was Weatherford International's Chairman and Chief Executive Officer.

Prior to joining Weatherford in 1990, Burguières was Chairman, President and Chief Executive Officer of Panhandle Eastern Corporation. He worked for 20 years at Cameron Iron Works, Inc., an international oil service company. Where he served as Chairman and CEO for ten vears.


Burguières is on the board of directors at McDermott International, Exploration Company, Newfield Weatherford International and J.P. Morgan Chase. He also serves as Chairman of the Board of Directors of The J.M. Burguières Co., Ltd. (a family-owned limited partnership). 

Charley Casserly

Senior Vice President and General Manager, Football Operations

n 1989, Charley Casserly took over as general manager for the Washington Redskins. By his third season, the Redskins were hoisting their third Lombardi Trophy.

Now Casserly enters his second season in that same general manager position with the Texans. And while winning the Super Bowl is probably not a viable option for the second-year expansion club in the next few seasons, the challenge for Houston in 2003 is no less daunting.

Staring a diluted free agent pool and 31 established teams square in the eye, Casserly and his staff had to get creative in building their inaugural roster. Houston's 2002 starting lineup featured eight expansion draft picks, six rookies, three unrestricted free agents, three free agents, one trade acquisition and one waiver wire pickup. The kicker was a restricted free agent and the punter was a free agent.

But what appeared on paper to be a scattered collection of gridiron cast-offs was in fact a team built for future success. Just two starters - cornerback Aaron Glenn and defensive end Gary Walker -

were over 30 years old. The team was constructed with a slant towards defense and special teams to keep the Texans in games where they were on the shorter end of the talent gap.

The plan? Solid. But Casserly still wasn't sure what to expect on the eve of the Texans' first regular season game, a nationally-televised prime time affair against the Dallas Cowboys.

"Let's be honest," he said a few hours before kickoff. "There's a little bit of the fear of the unknown at play here. What's this thing going to look like?"

A few hours, everyone saw what "it" looked like. The Texans stunned the Cowboys 19-10, becoming the first expansion club to win its regular season debut since the 1961 Minnesota Vikings. Houston eventually posted a 4-12 record with two wins over playoff teams (Giants, Steelers). The Texans were a tough out all season and promise to be for seasons to come.

Casserly continues to play a crucial role in that vision. He is crafting a young team with speed and skill. And he has the right coach in Dom Capers to instill toughness and discipline in the group.

Ouarterback David Carr, who took every snap of his rookie campaign, is one of the NFL's rising stars. Carr, the first overall pick of the 2002 draft, was one of six draft picks to start on offense as rookies. Casserly tabbed Miami wide receiver Andre Johnson with the team's 2003 first-round pick, giving Carr a weapon that can stretch the field along with fellow receivers Corey Bradford and

Jabar Gaffney. The line should be much improved with the addition of free agent tackle Zach Wiegert and the return of tackle Tony Boselli from a shoulder iniury. And Casserly signed free agent running back Stacey Mack to bolster the running game.

On defense, Houston features a quartet of fast linebackers suited perfectly to Capers' 3-4 defense. And those two 30somethings? Well, they made the Pro Bowl, a first for an expansion club since the 1970 merger. Casserly re-signed strong safety Eric Brown and linebacker Jay Foreman this past March, ensuring that 10 of 11 starters from the defense will return for the team's second campaign.

knows for sure. The Texans still have the depth issues that plague all second-year franchises. The 2003 schedule features five playoff teams and three division winners, including defending Super Bowl champion Tampa Bay, But Casserly and his staff feel they have this team headed for sustained success.

"We will win here in Houston," Casserly said. "The tools are in place. We have a great owner, great coach, great facilities and one of the best places to live in this country. It's just a matter of everybody working together to see this through."

Texans owner Bob McNair hired Casserly on January 19, 2000, as Senior Vice President/General Manager of Houston's NFL expansion franchise. He heads all football operations for the club.

"We were so fortunate to be able to attract a world-class football man like Charley Casserly," McNair says.

Casserly enters his second season – but fourth year - with the Texans after a highly-successful 23-year stint with the Redskins. In Washington, Casserly was known for his tireless work ethic and a What's next for the Texans? Nobody | keen eye for football talent, traits that

continue to serve him well in Houston. Washington went to four Super Bowls during Casserly's tenure, winning three. NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue recently appointed him to the NFL's prestigious Competition Committee for the second time.

Casserly famously started with the Redskins in 1977 as an unpaid intern under Hall of Fame coach George Allen. Washington hired Casserly as a scout the next season and during his early years was a scout, he unearthed free agents Joe Jacoby and Jeff Bostic, who were original members of the famed "Hogs" offensive line and components Washington's first two Super Bowl teams. Jacoby was select-

ed to four Pro Bowls and Bostic made one trip to Honolulu. The Redskins elevated Casserly to assistant general manager in 1982 and the club went on to capture its first Super Bowl. That year, Casserly also re-instituted the club's intern program, which has produced more than 20 league executives over his years in Washington and Houston.

In 1987, Casserly faced perhaps the biggest challenge of his Redskins career when NFL players went on strike. League owners decided on replacement players, sending personnel men scrambling to fill roster spots. With about a week to assemble a full complement of replacement players, Casserly put together a team that won all three of its games before the strike ended, including a Monday Night win against a Dallas team that featured a number of its star players. That experience was the subject of the Warner Bros. feature film, Replacements," starring Keanu Reeves and Gene Hackman.



When he was elevated to GM in 1989, Casserly sustained the Redskins' history of uncovering high-quality players in the later rounds of the draft. He used a fifth-round pick in 1990 to select Southwest Louisiana quarterback Brian Mitchell. Washington then converted Mitchell to a running back/kick returner, where he later joined Jim Brown as the only players in NFL history to lead the league in combined net yards four times. In 1996, Casserly plucked Auburn running back Stephen Davis in the fourth round. Davis paced the NFC in rushing in 1999 with 1,450 yards.

And during the 1999 off-season, Casserly made moves that immediately benefited the Redskins. First, he traded three draft choices to Minnesota for signal-caller Brad Johnson. The eightyear veteran responded with a Pro Bowl season in 1999, throwing for 4,005 yards and 24 TDs. (Johnson led the Bucs to a championship last season, meaning Casserly traded for both Super Bowl

XXXVII quarterbacks - he traded for current Raiders quarterback Rich Gannon in 1992.)

Casserly then fired the shot heard 'round the league on draft day, acquiring all of the New Orleans Saints' 1999 selections, plus their first and third-round picks in 2000. To do so, Casserly simply swapped the Redskins' fifth selection in the first round for New Orleans' 12th choice. He still managed to obtain the player that Washington wanted, ultimately selecting Georgia cornerback Champ Bailey with the seventh pick in the first round. In part for those efforts, Sports Illustrated, Pro Football Weekly and USA Today named Casserly their Executive of the Year.

Casserly is determined to build a

already crafted one of the league's best scouting staffs and his football staff can boast 28 Super Bowl rings.

"The scouting staff is crucial for any expansion franchise," Casserly says. "Mr. McNair has provided us the means assemble one of

the most experienced staffs in the NFL."

Casserly's first order of business was last year's expansion draft, which produced eight eventual starters. He then pulled the trigger on Carr, ensuring the club a franchise quarterback for seasons to come. This year's draft focused on offense and Casserly was also able to pick up two additional selections for next year's draft, essential for a team still in its infancy stage.

Casserly began his career as an assistant coach at Cathedral High School in Springfield, Massachusetts, from 1969-72 before moving to a similar post at his alma mater, Springfield (MA) College from 1973-74. He returned to Cathedral High School to serve as the school's athletic director for two years before becoming head football coach at Minnechaugh High School from 1975-76. He holds a bachelor's degree in education and a master's degree in guidance from Springfield College, where he also played football. He is a member of the Springfield College Sports Hall of Fame.

Dom Capers Head Coach

It is easier to go down a hill than up it, but the view is much better at the top...

Few thought this expansion road would be easy, least of all Dom Capers.

This road is, in fact, fraught with pigskin peril and the Texans head coach knew that the second he took the job two-and-a-half years ago. Where experience is sought, you're saddled with youth; where cohesion is desired, there is disorder; and in a league that demands respect, you have not one ounce of history to lean on.

More than 100 players reported to training camp in Houston last summer to learn a new system taught by new coaches and executed with new teammates. The Texans were off and running, but running to stand still, trying to forge a team while the league's 31 other teams were simply trying to polish up.

But a funny thing happened on that bumpy expansion road – the Texans won four games. They were competitive. They were resilient. In short, the NFL's newest entry was a very tough out for all but a few teams on its docket.

And looking back, we shouldn't be all that surprised.

After all, Capers had been down that road before in 1995 with the expansion Carolina Panthers, who set a professional sports record with a 7-9 record in their initial season. Seven years is an eternity in this league. The free agent landscape had changed drastically and two additional teams had diluted the talent pool.

But something hadn't changed in those seven years. Capers' legendary work ethic and attention to detail continued to flourish. Those qualities

rubbed off on the Texans, from the players to the coaches to the staff, just like they had in Charlotte. And they will continue to light a fire in 2003 and beyond. Ask most and they will say that success will follow Dom Capers in Houston. In many ways, it already has.

Capers built his coaching track record on defense, so he set about building a veteran defensive unit to play his preferred 3-4 alignment in 2002. The Texans leaned on that defense to keep them in games and the unit responded with a stellar effort, ranking eighth in the AFC in total defense and fourth in the conference in pass defense despite lining up for the second-most defensive series in the NFL. The defense also produced two Pro Bowl starters in cornerback Aaron Glenn and defensive end Gary Walker. Houston was the first expansion club since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to produce a Pro Bowler.

Meanwhile, Houston's offense started an astounding six rookies, including quarterback David Carr, the first pick in the 2002 NFL Draft. Carr took every offensive snap and earned allrookie honors from *Pro Football Weekly*.

Each of Houston's four wins in 2002 was memorable and meaningful. The Texans stunned the football world by defeating Dallas in their first game, becoming the first expansion team to win its first regular season game since the 1961 Vikings. In October, the Texans earned their first-ever road win with a late comeback at Jacksonville, where Capers had spent his previous two seasons as defensive coordinator. In November, the Texans shocked the Giants, who would go on to win four of their last five games and make the playoffs. And on December 8,

the Texans secured perhaps the most bizarre victory of the NFL season, winning at eventual AFC North champion Pittsburgh 24-6. Houston won despite gaining just 47 yards of total offense, relying on its defense for all three of its touchdowns.

But the Texans have officially shed the expansion moniker. Now the challenge for Capers and his staff is to build on 2002.

"The first season is always a big test for everybody involved," Capers says. "But I think what we went through in 2002 will pay tremendous dividends as long as we learn from it. We found a way to be very competitive in a lot of football games and the next step for us is to find a way to win more of those games."

The Texans introduced Capers as their first head coach on Jan. 21, 2001. Capers served as the defensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars during the 1999 and 2000 seasons. Prior

to his stint in Jacksonville, he spent four seasons as head coach of the Panthers, guiding that expansion franchise from its infancy to a playoff berth.

Capers compiled a 30-34 record in four seasons with the Panthers. The Panthers' 7-9 record set an NFL mark for most victories by an expansion team. Carolina also posted the first four-game winning streak in expansion history, the first winning home record by an expansion club and the first win over a defending Super Bowl champion (San Francisco) in expansion annals.

In 1996, the Panthers shook up the league by winning their final seven regular-season games, resulting in a 12-4 record and the NFC West title. Carolina then defeated defending Super Bowl champion Dallas in the divisional playoffs before bowing to Green Bay in the NFC Championship Game at Lambeau Field. The Panthers, riding a defensive unit that ranked second in the league in points allowed, posted a 9-0 home record (including playoffs). Eight Panthers played in the Pro Bowl. Capers was named Coach of the Year by the Associated Press, among numerous other honors.

The Panthers posted records of 7-9 and 4-12 the next two seasons, resulting in Capers' dismissal. The Jaguars signed him six weeks later and the hiring paid immediate dividends.

Under Capers, the Jaguars improved from 25th in the NFL in total defense in 1998 to fourth in 1999. Jacksonville also yielded the fewest points (217) in the NFL, an average of 13.6 points per game. Since the advent of the 16-game schedule in 1978, only 11 teams had allowed fewer points in a season. Capers' unit set club records for sacks (57) and interceptions (19), while tying the team mark record for takeaways (30). Three Jaguars defenders made the AFC Pro Bowl squad (defensive end Tony Brackens, linebacker Kevin Hardy and safety Carnell Lake), marking

the first time any Jacksonville defensive player had earned a trip to Honolulu. Capers was named NFL Assistant Coach of the Year by Pro Football Writers of America/Pro Football Weekly and USA Today. In 2000, the Jaguars ranked 12th in the league in total defense and again tied the club single-season record for takeaways with 30.

Capers arrived in Houston one year before the Texans began building their roster, a luxury he did not have in Charlotte. The early start enabled him to formulate a long-term plan for consistent

success. Capers' attention to detail is legendary in league circles. He has recorded the date, time and details about every event in his day since his late father, Eugene, gave him his first leather-bound notebook for Christmas in 1981.

"He was my toughest critic, but also my biggest supporter," Capers said. "And he always believed that you got back out of things what you put into them. If you come in every day, expend all the energy you have and do things right, opportunities will present themselves.

"Since the first day I started coaching, that's the approach I've tried to take."

Capers cut his NFL teeth with veteran NFL head coach Jim Mora. After winning two USFL titles with the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars, Mora accepted the Saints' head coaching position in 1986 and brought Capers along with him as defensive backs coach. Capers served in that capacity through the 1991 season, helping the Saints to the first three playoff berths in franchise history.

Capers then accepted the defensive coordinator's post with the Pittsburgh Steelers, helping the team win two AFC Central titles. In his three seasons with the Steelers, no team in the NFL yielded fewer touchdowns. Linebacker Greg Lloyd and cornerback Rod Woodson made three consecutive trips to the Pro Bowl under Capers' watch.

Capers began his coaching career in



1972 at Kent State, where he was a graduate assistant for three seasons while earning a master's degree in administration. In 1975 he served as a graduate assistant at the University of Washington. Capers became a full-time coach the following year, and then matriculated to Hawaii, San Jose State, California, Tennessee and Ohio State.

Capers was born August 7, 1950, in Cambridge, Ohio, and he was raised in nearby Buffalo, Ohio. He was a star athlete at Meadowbrook High School. He graduated with a degree in physical education and a minor in psychology from Mount Union College in 1972, where he played a combination of safety-linebacker.

Capers hosts an annual charity golf tournament in the Buffalo, Ohio, area which has raised thousands of dollars for the American Heart Association. He and his wife, Karen, live in Houston.

Vic Fangio

Defensive Coordinator

ic Fangio enters his second season as defensive coordinator for the Houston Texans after orchestrating one of the league's best defensive performances in 2002.

The expansion Texans' defense sent two defensive players to the Pro Bowl (CB Aaron Glenn, DE Gary Walker) and ranked eighth in the AFC in total defense and fourth in the conference in pass defense despite lining up for the second-most defensive series in the NFL. The Texans also ranked seventh in the league in third-down defense, eight in red zone defense, fourth in penalties and ninth in yards per play.

Fangio's troops helped the Texans stay competitive throughout their inaugural campaign, turning in huge performances in the team's season-opening win over Dallas and subsequent late-season upset victories over two highly-ranked and playoff-bound offenses in the Giants and Steelers. In the remarkable 24-6 win at Pittsburgh, Houston's defense scored all three of the team's touchdowns. Overall, seven of the Texans' defensive starters posted career highs in tackles, even though none of the starters had played in the club's 3-4 defensive scheme.

Fangio came to Houston after serving in the same capacity for the Indianapolis Colts the previous three seasons. Fangio led the defense to major improvements in all statistical categories, which helped the Colts post a 23-9 record over the 1999-2000 seasons after posting a 6-26 record the two previous campaigns. Indianapolis also won its first division championship (1999) in 15 seasons and posted its best two-year record since moving from Baltimore in

1984. In Fangio's first season in Indianapolis, the Colts jumped from 29th in the league to 15th in total defense. His 2000 defense racked up 42 sacks, the most for the Colts in 11 years, and ranked 15th in points allowed.

Before his stint with the Colts, Fangio orchestrated one of the league's more fearsome units under Dom Capers for four seasons at Carolina, helping the Panthers win the NFC West title in just their second season. In 1995, the expansion Panthers tied for seventh in the NFL in total defense and ranked six th in scoring defense, 10th in rushing defense, fifth in takeaways and second in defensive passer rating. Fangio's defense allowed just 218 points in 1996, ranking second in the NFL as Carolina posted a 12-4 mark. That unit also ranked 10th in total defense, first in third down defense, first in sacks, second in first downs allowed and fifth in takeaways. The Panthers yielded just five touchdowns and 56 points in the second half, breaking Chicago's 1985 record of 71 points - a record that still stands. Fangio's 1997 unit ranked seventh in points allowed, sixth in first downs allowed and ninth in pass defense. His 1998 group ranked seventh in the NFL in takeaways. Fangio coached three All-Pro linebackers in Kevin Greene, Lamar Lathon and Sam Mills.

Like Capers, Fangio cut his professional coaching teeth under veteran NFL head coach Jim Mora, his head coach in Indianapolis. Mora hired Fangio as a defensive assistant for the USFL's Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars in 1984. After winning two USFL titles, Fangio followed Mora to the New Orleans Saints as outside linebackers coach for eight seasons. He spent 1994 as the Saints'

linebackers coach. During his tenure in the Crescent City, Fangio helped five different linebackers – Rickey Jackson, Vaughn Johnson, Sam Mills, Pat Swilling and Renaldo Turnball – reach a combined 16 Pro Bowls. The Saints' defense cracked the league's top 10 in total defense four times and the NFL's top 10 in rushing defense six times, including a first-place finish in 1989. New Orleans advanced to the playoffs for the first time in 1987, making return trips in 1990, 1991 and 1992.

Fangio launched his coaching career in 1979 at his alma mater, Dunmore (PA) High School, coaching linebackers for one season before becoming defensive coordinator. He was defensive coordinator at Milford Academy in 1982 before moving on to the University of North Carolina, where he coached for one season. Fangio was inducted into the Northeast Chapter of the Pennsylvania Hall of Fame in 1993.

A native of Dunmore, Pa., Fangio and his wife, Patty, have a son, Christian and a daughter, Cassandra. The family lives in Sugar Land.

Joe Marciano

Special Teams Coordinator



oe Marciano enters his second season as special teams coordinator for the Houston Texans. Regarded as one of the league's top coaches in his field, Marciano has directed special teams for 17 NFL seasons.

In Houston, Marciano has been reunited with Dom Capers, with whom he spent his first nine professional coaching seasons, and his brother, Tony, who serves as the team's offensive line coach.

Marciano's charges enjoyed a solid first season in both the kicking and return game. Kicker Kris Brown connected on 17 of 24 field goals (13 from 40-plus yards) and hit two game-winners (at Jacksonville, New York Giants). Punter Chad Stanley ranked second in the AFC in net average (36.8) and led the conference with 36 punts inside the 20. The Texans also scored two touchdowns on special teams (punt return, punt block), recovered three fumbles and yielded just 5.7 yards per punt return, leading the AFC.

Marciano arrived in Houston after spending the previous six seasons in the same capacity for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Under Marciano, the Bucs boasted one of the NFC's most consistent special teams units. Tampa Bay blocked 20 kicks, registered nine of the 10 longest

punt and kickoff returns in club annals and recorded 10 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week awards during his six seasons.

Kicker Martin Gramatica posted remarkable numbers during his first three NFL seasons. Gramatica nailed 84 of 101 field goal attempts (counting playoffs) and earned a Pro Bowl berth in 2000, breaking his own club single-season records in points scored (126), field goals (28), consecutive field goals (16), 50-plus-yard field goals (5) and extra points (42). Also in 2000, Tampa Bay set a team mark and tied a league mark by blocking seven kicks (four field goals, three punts), returning two for touchdowns.

In 1999, starting linebacker Shelton Quarles broke a 10-year Bucs single-season record with 31 special teams tackles. Tampa Bay opponents averaged just 17.6 yards per kickoff return, which set a club record for lowest opponent kickoff return average. In 1998, Marciano's charges set single-season club marks in both kickoff return average (23.7) and punt return average (13.7). In 1997, wide receiver Karl Williams finished as the NFC's second-leading punt returner and the Bucs finished first in the NFL in opponent net punting and opponent field goal percentage.

Marciano joined the Bucs after spending the previous 10 years as the special teams coach for the New Orleans Saints. For the first nine of those campaigns, he also coached the team's tight ends. In 1995, the Saints ranked third in the league in lowest punt return average allowed (6.5) and sixth in lowest kickoff return average permitted (19.8). During Marciano's New Orleans tenure, he coached three special teams players who were selected for the Pro Bowl (Morten Andersen, Tyrone Hughes, Bennie Thompson).

Marciano's first professional football job came as the special teams/tight ends coach for the

Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars of the USFL, helping the club win two league championships. Marciano joined the Stars after spending 1982 as the tight ends/special teams coach at Temple.

In 1981, Marciano tutored the tight ends for Joe Paterno at Penn State. There, he coached future NFL offensive lineman Ron Heller who played TE for the Nittany Lions. Marciano also coached tight ends at Villanova (1980) and Rhode Island (1978-79). He began his college coaching career overseeing the tight ends at East Stroudsburg University in 1977. Marciano coached at Wyoming Area High School in West Pittston, Pa., in 1976.

A native of Dunmore, Pa., Marciano was a quarterback at Temple, where he earned his bachelor's degree in health and physical education. He is an avid fisherman who has conducted various fishing tournaments and has appeared on numerous ESPN fishing shows. In 1993, Marciano was inducted into the Northeast Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame. He is single and now resides in Missouri City with his son, Joseph.

he Texans named former Cleveland Browns head coach Chris Palmer as the team's first offensive coordinator on February 2, 2001.

Palmer, a 14-year coaching veteran, is best known for developing quarterbacks and he appears to have another star pupil in Texans quarterback David Carr.

Carr, the top overall pick of the 2002 NFL Draft, earned the starting job in training camp and took every offensive snap. Displaying a strong arm, command in the huddle and unparalleled resiliency, Carr threw for 2,592 yards, the second-most by a rookie signal-caller on an expansion team in NFL history, and earned all-rookie honors from *Pro Football Weekly*.

Overall, Palmer's young offense started six rookies in 2002, making it by far the youngest unit in the league. Nevertheless, Houston's offense produced 17 touchdowns, two 500-yard rushers (James Allen, Jonathan Wells) and four players with 40 or more receptions (Allen, Corey Bradford, Jabar Gaffney, Billy Miller). Miller paced the Texans with 51 catches and Bradford ranked fifth in the AFC with a 15.5-yard-per-catch average.

Before returning to Houston, Palmer spent two seasons as head coach of the expansion Browns, leading Cleveland to a 2-14 mark in its inaugural season and an injury-ravaged club to a 3-13 record in 2000. Palmer drafted current Browns QB Tim Couch with the top pick in the 1999 NFL Draft.

Palmer spent the 1997 and 1998 seasons as the offensive coordinator on Tom Coughlin's staff in Jacksonville. He helped the Jaguars claim the AFC Central Division title in 1998 as the club approached the 400-point mark in both seasons (394 in 1997, 392 in 1998).

Palmer served as an instrumental tutor to Pro Bowl QB Mark Brunell, who has developed into one of the most explosive quarterbacks in the NFL. In 1997, Brunell led the AFC with a 91.2 passer rating and made the Pro Bowl. But Palmer's influence on Jacksonville's other young signal-callers was also evident. Five Jaguars QBs (Brunell, Rob Johnson, Steve Matthews, Jamie Martin and Jonathan Quinn) won at least one game for Jacksonville under Palmer's guidance.

Prior to joining the Jaguars in 1997, Palmer spent four seasons on Bill Parcells' staff in New England. As the Patriots' quarterbacks coach in 1996, Palmer retooled the mechanics of Drew Bledsoe, who ended the season leading the NFL in passing attempts and completions and finishing third in passing yards and touchdowns. The Patriots defeated Jacksonville in the AFC Championship Game to advance to the Super Bowl for the first time in 11 years and Bledsoe made his second Pro Bowl. When Palmer was the Patriots' wide receivers coach in 1994, the team set an NFL first when five different players caught more than 50 passes.

Palmer's first NFL coaching experience came with the Houston Oilers, where he was wide receivers coach for the Oilers from 1990-92 under Jack Pardee. During Palmer's three-year stay in Houston, the Run 'N Shoot Oilers boasted the top-ranked passing offense in the NFL. Four Oilers wide receivers - Curtis Duncan, Ernest Givins (twice),

Palmer was the head coach at Boston University from 1988-89, installing the Run 'N Shoot offense and producing one of the country's most prolific units. He was the head coach at the University of New Haven in 1986 and 1987, where the Chargers posted consecutive 8-2 records and set more than 50 school records.

Palmer's first professional coaching experience came in 1983 when he was the offensive line coach for the Montreal Concordes in the Canadian Football League. In 1984, he coached receivers for the USFL's New Jersey Generals, and the following season he was promoted to quarterbacks coach and offensive coordinator. That year, Palmer's offense featured QBs Doug Flutie and Brian Sipe and RB Herschel Walker, who set a professional football single-season rushing record with 2,411 yards.

Palmer launched his coaching career as an assistant at the University of Connecticut in 1972, coaching the defensive line and wide receivers. In 1975, he moved to Lehigh as the wide receivers coach. The following season he was named the offensive coordinator at

Colgate, where he coached for seven years (1976-82). In 1977, the Red Raiders led the nation in offense, averaging 486 yards per game.

Palmer played quarterback for Southern Connecticut State from 1968-71 and was selected to the New Haven Gridiron Club following his senior season. He earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees at SCSU, where he was recently inducted into the school's athletic hall of fame. He is also a member of the hall of fame at the University of New Haven and Immaculate High School.

A native of Brewster, N.Y., Palmer and his wife, Donna, have two children, Mark and Kristin, and one granddaughter, Annette Grace. The couple lives in Houston.

ippy Brown, an 11-year NFL coaching veteran, enters his second season as wide receivers coach for the Houston Texans.

Brown's young corps of Texans receivers produced 116 catches last season. led by fifth-year pro Corey Bradford, who posted career-high numbers with 45 receptions for 697 yards and six touchdowns. Bradford's 15.5-yard average ranked fifth in the AFC. Brown also oversaw the development of rookie Jabar Gaffney, who hauled in 41 passes for 483 yards and one score.

Before arriving in Houston, Brown served as head coach of the XFL's Memphis Maniax. Prior to his stint in Memphis, Brown spent one season with the Green Bay Packers as their running backs coach, helping Ahman Green break through with his first 1,000-yard rushing campaign.

Before arriving in Green Bay, Brown spent four seasons with the Miami Dolphins under Jimmy Johnson, the final two seasons as offensive coordinator. Brown arrived in Miami as the running backs coach, helping Karim Abdul-Jabbar become the first Dolphins back to crack the 1,000-yard barrier in 18 years. The following season, Abdul-Jabbar tied for the NFL lead in rushing touchdowns with 15.

Johnson elevated Brown to offensive coordinator in 1998, where he worked with future Hall of Fame quarterback Dan Marino. The Dolphins earned a wild card berth in both of Brown's seasons calling the plays.

Brown served one season as the running backs coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1995. Prior to that, he returned to the University of Tennessee, serving two seasons as the assistant head coach and wide receivers coach. The Volunteers outscored their opponents 847-383 over those two seasons en route to an 18-6 mark. Brown helped tutor future No. 1 draft pick Peyton Manning as a freshman.

Brown's first NFL coaching stop came in New York, where he spent three seasons (1990-92) as the running backs coach for the Jets. In 1991, the Jets ranked fifth in the league in rushing and advanced to the playoffs for the first time in five seasons.

Brown's stint at Tennessee was as wide receivers coach from 1983-89. He helped develop such prolific Vols receivers as Anthony Miller, Tim McGee, Alvin Harper and Carl Pickens. Prior to arriving in Knoxville, Brown coached wide receivers at Louisville, including future Dolphins standout Mark Clayton.

Brown launched his coaching career at his alma mater, Memphis State, coaching running backs in 1978 and wide receivers in 1979-80. Brown was a starter for the Tigers at quarterback. He graduated from MSU in 1977 with a degree in communications. Brown prepped at Sweetwater (TN) High School, leading his charges to consecutive state titles in 1972-73.

A native of Memphis, Tenn., Brown and his wife, Deon, have two children, Jerome and Jennifer. The couple lives in Houston.

Todd Grantham enters his second

season as defensive line coach for the Houston Texans. In 2002, Grantham's three starters (Gary Walker, Seth Payne, Jerry Deloach) all produced career-high numbers in tackles and Walker earned his second Pro Bowl invitation after racking up 115 tackles and 6 ½ sacks.

Grantham arrived in Houston after spending the previous three seasons in the same capacity for the Indianapolis Colts. Grantham's charges registered 96 sacks over three seasons, helping the Colts post a 29-19 record and advance to the playoffs twice. Indianapolis' 10-win improvement from 1998 to 1999 marked the greatest

one-season turnaround in league history. In 1999 and 2000, the Colts posted 56 sacks, the highest two-year total for the club since it moved to Indianapolis.

Prior to his stint in Indianapolis, Grantham served three seasons as the defensive line coach at Michigan State. He added the title of assistant head coach in final season in East Lansing. MSU ranked 19th in total defense in 1996 and 13th in 1997, making consecutive bowl trips.

Grantham spent six seasons (1990-95) at his alma mater, Virginia Tech, the final two as defensive line coach. In 1995, the resurgent Hokies ranked first nationally in rushing defense,

fifth in scoring defense and 10th in total defense. Tech racked up 50 sacks en route to the Big East title and a Sugar Bowl triumph over Texas. Grantham coached defensive ends and inside linebackers from 1990-91 and defensive tackles from 1992-93.

Grantham played guard and tackle for the Hokies from 1984-88. He earned second-team All-South and honorable mention All-America honors as a senior. Grantham earned a bachelor's degree in sports management.

A native of Pulaski, Va., Grantham and his wife, Paige, have a son, Corbin. The family lives in Sugar Land.

hick Harris enters his second season as running backs coach for the Houston Texans after spending the previous seven seasons in the same capacity for the Carolina Panthers.

Harris can boast more than two decades of NFL experience. He helped tutor a Houston backfield that produced two 500-yard rushers last season in rookie running back Jonathan Wells and veteran James Allen. Wells ranked third among rookie rushers in yards and Allen set a career high with 47 receptions for 302 yards. Harris also helped rookie fullback Jarrod Baxter earn a starting role.

Harris was originally hired in Charlotte by Dom Capers, who did so before the Panthers' inaugural season in 1995.

During Harris' seven-year tenure with the Panthers, injuries forced the club to suit up a bevy of running backs, from Tshimanga Biakabutuka to Richard Huntley to Brad Hoover to Fred Lane to Anthony Johnson to Derrick Moore. Harris' attention to detail and encouragement helped each of those

young backs succeed at the highest level.

Harris helped Carolina set an expansion record with seven wins in 1995, then helped the Panthers reach the NFC Championship Game the following season.

Harris joined the Panthers after spending three seasons with the Rams in Los Angeles, the last season as offensive coordinator. In 1993, Harris helped rookie running back Jerome Bettis earn NFL Co-Rookie of the Year honors after rushing for 1,429 yards and seven touchdowns.

Prior to his stint with the Rams, Harris served nine seasons as the offensive backfield coach for the Seattle Seahawks. Seattle advanced to the AFC Championship Game in Harris' initial season and made three other playoff appearances during his tenure. In 1988, Harris helped Curt Warner establish a single-season franchise record with 1,481 rushing yards.

Harris launched his NFL coaching career with the Buffalo Bills in 1981,





coaching two seasons. He entered the coaching profession at Colorado State in 1970, coaching three seasons before heading to Long Beach State. After one season with the 49ers, Harris joined the Detroit Wheels of the World Football League in 1974. He then moved on to the University of Washington, where he spent six seasons, helping the Huskies to two bowl wins, including a Rose Bowl triumph over Michigan.

Harris lettered in football and track at Northern Arizona, where he is a member of the Lumberjacks' athletic hall of fame.

Born in Durham, N.C., Harris (9/21/45) attended Long Beach (CA) Polytechnic High School. He has a son, Tyler, and a daughter, Tarana. Harris and his wife, Karen, have a daughter, Kara. The family lives in Sugar Land.

Reggie Herring enters his second season as the linebackers coach for the Houston Texans. Herring's linebackers enjoyed a stellar 2002 season in Houston's

3-4 defense.

Herring's two starters at inside linebacker each posted career-high numbers in 2002. Jay Foreman led the team with a career-high 193 tackles, while Jamie Sharper racked up a career-best 178 stops. Herring's unit helped the Texans' defense rank eighth in the AFC in total defense despite lining up for the secondmost defensive series in the NFL.

Herring came to Houston after serving as the defensive coordinator for Clemson the previous five seasons. He signed on as the defensive coordinator at Ole Miss after the 2001 season before assuming his current post with the Texans. Before he was named defensive coordinator at Clemson, Herring tutored the

on Hoke enters his second season as the Texans defensive backs coach. Hoke directed a secondary that featured one Pro Bowl selection (CB Aaron Glenn) and ranked 10th in the NFL in pass defense, yielding just 196.3 yards per game through the air. Houston's defensive backs picked off nine passes, recovered four fumbles and scored three

Hoke came to Houston after spending the previous three seasons as defensive coordinator at the University of Florida. Hoke replaced current University of Oklahoma head coach Bob Stoops at Florida in 1999, initially serving as defensive coordinator and secondary coach. In 2000, he added the title of assistant head coach.

touchdowns.

Under Hoke, the Gators went to three consecutive New Year's Day bowl games (Citrus, Sugar, Orange), won the 2000 Southeastern Conference championship and finished as high as No. 3 in both national polls (2001). Hoke's ball-hawking defensive units forced 88 turnovers over three seasons.

In 2001, Florida led the SEC in total defense, scoring defense, first downs allowed. passing efficiency defense and

third-down conversion defense. UF ranked ninth nationally in total defense, fifth in scoring defense, 12th in rushing defense and 13th in passing defense - the only SEC school to rank in the top 15 in all four categories. The Gators vielded just 19 touchdowns, the fourth-fewest in the country, and only five aerial scores, tving national champion Miami for fewest nationally.

In 2000, Hoke's defense led the country with 40 turnovers. His 1999 unit ranked ninth in the nation in rushing defense and paced the conference with 43 sacks.

Hoke arrived in Gainesville after five seasons tutoring the defensive backs at Missouri. The Tigers earned bowl bids (Holiday, Insight.com) in Hoke's last two seasons, thanks in large part to a defense that forced 48 turnovers, leading to 208 points. Hoke helped Mizzou rank 22nd in the nation in scoring defense in 1998, yielding UM's fewest points in 15 years. Hoke also coached the Tigers' kick block team, which blocked 11 extra points, seven punts and five field goals in his five







seasons in Columbia.

Prior to coaching at Missouri, Hoke spent four years at Kent State, coaching defensive backs all four seasons and adding the title of defensive coordinator in his final season. He coached defensive backs and special teams at San Diego State from 1987-88 and launched his coaching career in the same capacity at Bowling Green in 1983, helping the Falcons win the Mid-American Conference title with an 11-0 mark in 1985.

Hoke was a four-year letterman at Ball State (1976-79), earning All-MAC honors as a defensive back. He earned a bachelor's degree in physical education before playing in 11 games for the Chicago Bears in 1980.

Tony Marciano enters his second season as offensive

line coach for the Houston Texans. Marciano coached a unit besieged by injuries throughout last season. The Texans used six different starting lineups and featured two rookie starters in left tackle Chester Pitts and right guard Fred Weary, but showed steady improvement as the season progressed.

Marciano, whose brother, Joe, is the team's special teams coordinator, came to Houston after spending the previous four seasons as tight ends coach for the Indianapolis Colts. In his four seasons with the Colts, Marciano tutored one of the most productive tight end duos in the league in Marcus Pollard and Ken Dilger. Pollard posted a career-high 47 receptions for 739 yards and eight touchdowns in 2001. Dilger hauled in 150 passes and

scored 18 times over his four seasons under Marciano. Both players earned their first trip to the Pro Bowl in 2001.

Prior to his stint with the Colts, Marciano spent three seasons as the offensive line coach for the Canadian Football League's Calgary Stampeders, adding offensive coordinator duties for his final season. He spent the 1994 campaign as the offensive line coach for the Toronto Argonauts.

Before joining the professional coaching ranks, Marciano spent two years at Kent State as its assistant head coach/offensive line coach. He launched his college coaching career at Texas Christian, serving as the assistant offensive line coach for two seasons, as well as the strength and conditioning coach. Marciano then coached tackle, tight ends and kickers at Southern Methodist for six seasons before serving as the offensive

Marshall came to Houston after spending the previous two years as the University of Colorado's offensive line coach. Marshall also led the Buffaloes' offensive field goal/PAT and kickoff return units on special teams.

Marshall's 2001 offensive line was a major reason the Buffaloes captured their first Big 12 Conference championship and a Fiesta Bowl berth. The Buffs ranked eighth nationally in total rushing, 20th in total offense and were second in total offense in the Big 12.

Prior to his dual years in Colorado,

Marshall spent two seasons as North

Carolina's offensive coordinator and served as the instructor of the Tar Heels' offensive line. Although the North Carolina offensive unit was beset by injuries, he played a significant role as the team increased its scoring against six common opponents from the previous year. Before his stint in Chapel Hill, Marshall served in the same capacity for Texas A&M during the 1997 season. He came to College Station from UCLA where he tutored the Bruins offensive line for one year.

From 1993-95, Marshall led the Tennessee offensive line and spent his last year as the team's offensive coordinator. He was also the running game coordinator from 1994-95. The Volunteers earned two bowl bids (Gator, Citrus), while Marshall's offensive line protected

the way for running back James Stewart.

Chuck Banker was hired in February 2000 as Houston's first director of pro scouting. Banker has

22 years of NFL experience, both in player personnel/scouting and as an assistant coach.

In his current post, Banker oversees Houston's pro scouting department, which will include scouting players on the other 31 NFL teams, as well as monitoring the talent in the Canadian Football League (CFL), and the Arena Football League (AFL).

Banker came to Houston after spending the previous three years (1997-99) as the scouting coordinator for the Washington Redskins. It was Casserly, then the Redskins' GM, who hired him for what was his second stint with Washington. Prior to that, Banker worked for the Philadelphia Eagles for three years, first as the team's director of player personnel (1994-95) before being promoted to director of scouting in 1996. With the Eagles, Banker was responsible for evaluating pro and college players, and for making recommendations on potential player acquisitions through free agency, trades and waivers. Philadelphia posted two 10-win seasons during Banker's tenure.

Banker's first association with the Redskins lasted from 1987-94. He

coached Washington's special teams for Joe Gibbs for two seasons (1987-88), helping the club capture Super Bowl XXII. 
BLESTO Scout

The Houston Texans won the first game in franchise history with a 19-10 victory over the Dallas Cowboys in Reliant Stadium. It marked the first time that an expansion club won their opening game since Minnesota defeated Chicago 37-13 in 1961. The Texans also became the first expansion team since New Orleans in 1967 to score on their first possession when QB David Carr hit TE Billy Miller on a 19-yard passing strike. The play was engineered after Dallas CB Bryant Westbrook was called for a 43-yard pass interference penalty. Three plays and 62 yards later, Houston had a 7-0 lead over Dallas. Early in the second quarter, Texans LB Kailee Wong sacked Dallas QB Quincy Carter for an eight-yard loss, recording the first sack in Texans history. The Houston defense was just getting warmed up and on the next play, CB Aaron Glenn intercepted Carter's pass at the Dallas 18 for the first interception in the Texans annals and 25th of Glenn's nine-year career. The turnover set up a Kris Brown 42-yard field goal to put Houston ahead 10-0. Just before the end of the first half, the Cowboys drove 34 yards towards their own end zone. On third and six at the Houston 14, the Texans defense held strong and the Cowboys settled for a 33-yard Billy Cundiff field goal to put the score at 10-3 in favor of the Texans at halftime. Dallas received to start the second half of play and mickly entered into Houston territory to the 24. The Houston defense held the Cowboys on third and five and Cundiff came in to attempt a 42-yard field goal but the kick sailed wide left and the score remained 10-3. On their next possession, Dallas evened the score at 10 when they produced an 84-yard drive that was scaled off by a 46-yard touchdown run by Michael Wiley. To begin the fourth quarter, the Texans answered when Carr lofted a pass to WR Corey Bradford who hauled it in for an impressive 65-yard touchdown run to Put Houston ahead 17-10. With just 2:42 remaining in the game, Dallas began one last drive deep in their own territory at the four. The possession was quickly terminated when Texans DT Seth Payne sacked Carter in the and zone for a safety, sealing the Texans' 19-10 win, the first in franchise history.

The Houston Texans regular season record fell to 1-1 after losing to the San Diego Chargers 24-3 in Qualcomm Stadium. The Chargers took an early lead when QB Drew Brees hit WR Curtis Conway for a 35-yard TD pass in their first possession of the game. After the teams exchanged punts, Texans QB David Carr threw high to WR Corey Bradford, who tipped it into the waiting arms of Chargers LB Junior Seau. Seau returned his 15° career interception to the Texans 6. Brees and Conway connected again three plays later on a three-yard reverse to give San Diego a 14-0 lead at the end of the first quarter. The Texans defense came on strong in the second quarter, with LB Jeff Posey pushing Brees back to the Chargers goal line. Houston LB Jamie Sharper scooped up what appeared to be a Brees fumble and ran it into the end zone but the play was ruled as forward progress and the Chargers punted. The Texans regained control of the ball and began in good field position at the Chargers 35 but were stopped by the San Diego defense on 3rd and 2 and settled for a 45-yard Kris Brown field goal. Will three second remaining in the half, San Diego padded their lead as K Steve Christic nailed a 36-yard field goal to put the score at 17-3. Both the Chargers and Texans defensive units held strong to keep the third quarter scoreless. Early in the fourth quarter, San Diego put the game away when LB Ben Leber got pag Texans TE Billy Miller to sack Carr in the end zone, causing the ball to come loose. Chargers DE Rayler Johnson recovered the fumble and San Diego took a three-touchdown lead that it would hold onto for the remainder of the game.

SUMMARY

The Houston Texans dropped their second consecutive game after losing to the Indianapolis Colts 23-3 in front of a home crowd at Reliant Stadium to bring their record to 1-2. The game marked the first time in over thirty years that a Houston team took the field in an outdoor venue, with the retractable roof kept open. The last occasion was on December 16, 1967, when the Houston Oilers defeated the San Diego Chargers 24-17 in Rice Stadium. The Texans were forced to punt on their first possession and handed the reigns over to the defense where LB Jeff Posey sacked QB Peyton Manning in an effort to stop the Colts ensuing drive, sending the ball back into the hands of the Texans offense. The Texans were forced again to punt and Indianapolis ate 3:42 off of the play clock while Manning engineered a seven-play, 80-yard drive, sealed by a 42-yard touchdown strike lo WR Qadry Ismail. K Mike Vanderjagt split the uprights to give the Colts a 7-0 first quarter lead. On the following Colts possession, LB Jay Foreman forced a fumble, which was recovered by CB Marcus Coleman. But two plays later, Texans QB David Carr's pass bounced off of intended receiver Rod Rutledge's hands where Colts CB Idrees Bashir would record his first and only pick of the night. The turnover set up a 26-yard Vanderjagt field goal to extend the Colts lead 10-0. The Texans responded when RB Jonathan Wells ran the ball 37 yards into Colts territory to set up a 54-yard Kris Brown field goal attempt. Brown's kick had plenty of but hit the right upright to keep the Texans at zero. Indianapolis finished the first 30 minutes of play with a 46-yard drive capped off by a 39-yard Vanderjagt field goal to increase the Colts lead 13-0 at halftime. On their first possession of the second half, the Texans were able to put some points on the board when they traveled 56 Jards on 12 plays, settling for a 24-yard Brown field goal to put the score at 13-3, still in favor of Indianapolis. The Texans' defense forced their second fumble of the night when DT Gary Walker recovered WR Marvin Harrison's fumble on the Houston 13, however the Texans could not convert the turnover into points. The Colts added a 43-yard touchdown when Manning hit WR Reggie Wayne to put the Colts ahead 20-3. In the final four minutes of the game, Carr was sacked four times and fumbled once, a turnover that the Colts converted into a 37-yard field goal to cap the scoring.

After taking an early 7-0 lead on the Eagles, the Houston Texans eventually succumbed to Philadelphia 35-17, bringing their season record to 1-3 heading into the bye week. Texans QB David Carr hit WR Corey Bradford on Houston's second possession. Bradford hauled in a one-handed catch for 26 yards to the Eagles 43. Afters pass interference call moved them further towards the end zone, Carr and Bradford connected again on a 23-yard touchdown pass to give Houston an early 7-0 lead. Eagles QB Donovan McNabb, who misfired on three consecutive passes on Philadelphia's initial drive, was picked off by Texans SS Eric Brown on his near attempt. But the Texans weren't able to capitalize on the turnover and Philadelphia regained the ball, marching 72 yards downfield to the Houston 7. The Texans won their first first-ever road trip and first AFC South division game in a hard-fought 21-19 contest at Jacksonville. The victory snapped a five-game losing skid for Houston and brought their season record to 2-5. After exchanging punts, Jacksonville K Tim Seder missed a 50-yard field goal attempt while Houston K Kris Brown's 45-yard attempt sailed wide left. The Jaguars were finally able to break through the Texans defensive efforts early in the second quarter when QB Mark Brunell hit WR Jimmy Smith on a 25-yard touchdown strike to take a 7-0 lead. The Texans answered when OB David Carr led his troops 46 yards downfield where he hit TE Jabari Holloway on an 11-yard pass. Just one play later, RB Jonathan Wells took the ball three yards into the end zone to even the score at seven. Both teams were forced to punt on their next possessions but Houston P Chad Stanley's boot was blocked and bounced into the end zone for a Jaguars safety to increase their lead 9-7. With three seconds left in the first half, Selder was again called in for duty but missed from 35 yards out, his second failed attempt of the day. Texans TE Billy Miller caught a 37-yard pass en route to a 43-yard Brown field goal to begin the second half and put the Texans ahead 10-9. Seder booted a 34-yard field goal after the Jaguars capitalized on a Carr fumble, putting them back in the lead 12-10. Carr came back to engineer an 80-yard scoring drive highlighted by Miller's 40-yard reception to put the unit in the red zone. Miller followed with a one-yard touchdown catch to take the lead. Carr then hit WR Jabar Gaffney in the back of the end zone on the two-point conversion to put Houston ahead 18-12. Brunell led the Jacksonville offense 70 yards into the end zone where RB Stacey Mack's two-yard rush into the end zone put the Jaguars back in the lead 19-18. Houston's special teams came up big when Gaffney fielded Chris Hanson's punt at the Houston 20 before tossing a lateral to Aaron Glenn who returned it 47 yards into Jacksonville territory. RB James Allen added three rushes to set up Brown's 45-yard game-winning field goal. With two minutes remaining in the game, the Jaguars gave one last effort but Texans LB Kailee Wong led Houston's defensive stand and sacked Brunell twice as time ran out and the Texans took home a 21-19 victory.



SUMMARY

The Texans captured their third win of the season and brought their record to 3-8 when they defeated the New York Giants 16-14 at Reliant Stadium. The Texans had the ball for six possessions while the Giants held onto it for five, all in the first quarter, while neither team amassed any points. Houston put up the first numbers of the game at the beginning of the second half when QB David Carr hit TE Billy Miller on a 42-yard reception to set up a 40-yard Kris Brown field goal, putting the Texans ahead 3-0. After each team exchanged two punts, the Giants took over and RB Tiki Barber raced 70 yards down the sideline to the Houston 16. Four plays later, he took the ball two yards into the end zone to give the Giants a 7-3 lead. With just under two minutes left in the first half, the Texans defense forced a Giants punt. New York snapper Bob Jones sent the ball sailing over PMatt Allen's head. Allen kicked the ball into the end zone and out of bounds to give the Texans a safety and put the score at 7-5 heading into the locker room. The Giants received to start off the third quarter and were forced to punt on a 3rd and 25 situation. Texans return man Jermaine Lewis returned Allen's punt 39 yards to the Giants 34. RB Jonathan Wells contributed with three runs on the scoring drive before punching the ball in from one yard out to put the Texans ahead 11-7. Carr found RB James Allen in the end zone for the two-point conversion, extending Houston's lead 13-7. On the Giants next position, a Kerry Collins to TE Jeremy Shockey connection set up K Matt Bryant's 33-yard field goal attempt. But the kick sailed just wide of the left upright to give the Texans the ball at their own 23. Houston was forced to punt, giving the ball back to the Giants, who tagineered a 61-yard touchdown drive. Collins hit WR Amani Toomer on a 31-yard pass to put the score at 1413 in favor of New York. On the next Houston drive, Brown split the uprights on a 50-yard field goal to put Houston back in the lead 16-14. The Texans defense held the Giants from posting any more points, largely in part by FS Matt Stevens and LB Jeff Posey's clutch fourth-quarter interceptions that helped seal the Texans' second home victory and third win of the season.

The Texans captured their fourth win of the season and second on the road with a dominant defensive performance that sealed a 24-6 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers. The Steelers defense got off to a stellar start when LB Jason Gildon sacked QB David Carr twice in the Texans first offensive series. The Texans defense quickly answered when CB Kenny Wright picked up QB Tommy Maddox's fumbled ball and scampered 40 yards into the end zone to give Houston a 7-0 lead. Fellow CB Aaron Glenn picked up where Wright left off on the Steelers next possession when he picked off a Maddox pass and returned it 70 yards for a touchdown to extend the Texans lead 14-0. Soon after, Pittsburgh WR Antwaan Randle El dropped a 13-yard pass on the Houston 24. CB Jason Simmons recovered but the Texans offense wasn't able to capitalize on the turnover. With just 20 seconds remaining in the half, the Steelers were able to put points on the board when K Jeff Reed hit a 40-yard field goal. On the Steelers first drive of the second half, Reed was called in again and hit a field goal from 31 yards out to cut the Texans lead 14-6. At the beginning of the fourth quarter, Reed came in to attempt a 43-yarder but the kick fell short of the uprights. On the next Pittsburgh punt, Texans return man Jabar Gaffney fumbled Josh Miller's kick and the Steelers took over on the Houston 25. 

The Texans immediately regrouped on offense with Carr completing five of six passes for 61 yards; including a 24-yard pass to TE Jabari Holloway to set up 1st and goal at the 1. RB Jonathan Wells punched into the end zone one play later to seal a 91-yard touchdown drive and give the Texans a 7-3 lead. The Ravens reached the Texans 5 on the next drive but stalled there as Stover booted a 22-yard field goal to cut the deficit to one. Two plays later, Titans QB Steve McNair his WR Justin McCareins on a 36-yard reception that set up a 28-yard Joe Nedney field goal. The Texans stalled at the Titans 10 on the next drive, bringing out Brown for a 19-yard field goal. But the kick was blocked by Titans SS Tank Williams. The Titans made another big play on special teams later in the second quarter when LB Rocky Boiman blocked a punt by Chad Stanley while the Titans recovered at the Houston 22. Houston's defense held firm, forcing another Nedney field goal from 26 yards out to give Tennessee a 6-0 lead. On Houston's second possession of the second half, the offense still couldn't punch the ball in the end zone, settling for a 31-yard Brown field goal. But Titans DT Albert Haynesworth was flagged for unsportsmanlike conduct for trying to vault off a teammate to block the kick and the Texans were awarded the ball 1" and goal at the Titans 7. The Texans again went backwards and Brown came in again to nail a 42-yarder, putting the score at 6-3 in favor of the Titans. With just over eight minutes remaining in the game, McNair hit Tennessee WR Dress Bennett for a 53-yard pass and first down to set up a four-yard Eddie George touchdown run that sealed Tennessee's 11th win.

TEXANS TEAM HISTORY

<u> 1997</u>

June 18: The NHL bypasses Chuck Watson and Bob McNair's efforts to bring an expansion hockey club to Houston. The pair moves on to their next project – returning the NFL to Houston.

July 3: Houston Oilers owner Bud Adams gets the green light to move his team to Nashville, Tennessee. U.S. District Judge Lynn Hughes signs the final consent judgment in the lawsuit against the team after all parties involved agree to a settlement.

October 15: NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue praises the early plans of Bob McNair and Houston for an expansion franchise at the NFL Owners' Meetings.

October 17: In reaction to Tagliabue's comments, officials from the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo (HLS&R) say they will push for the building of a domed stadium that the Rodeo will share with an NFL team, as opposed to renovating the Astrodome. It marks the Rodeo's first public statement in support of McNair's efforts.

1998

March 23: The NFL expansion committee awards an expansion team to Cleveland. McNair, Harris County Judge Robert Eckels and Mayor Lee Brown meet with Tagliabue for the first time as a group at the owners' meeting held in Houston.

May 7: Los Angeles-based entertainment broker Michael Ovitz announces he will

spearhead a \$750-million proposal to build a stadium in Carson, California, in an effort to bring the NFL back to L.A.

June 30: Tagliabue and NFL Stadium Committee head Jerry Richardson visit Houston to see plans for the city's retractable-roof stadium, meeting for several hours with McNair, Houston Sports Authority Jack Rains, Brown, Eckels and HLS&R president Jim Bloodworth.

September 25: The HLS&R votes unanimously to approve paying a \$1.5 million annual lease to use the proposed retractable-roof NFL stadium.

October 27: Tagliabue announces that NFL owners will have a decision on the league's newest expansion team by April.

1999

February 16: The NFL Expansion Committee meets, but does not pick a winning bidder from the three finalists. Tagliabue says the decision will come within a month.

March 16: The NFL Expansion Committee votes 29-2 to give Los Angeles until September 15 to work out a feasible stadium and ownership plan. If L.A. cannot get a plan together, the committee will then recommend Houston for the 32nd franchise.

June 3: In a two-hour meeting with Tagliabue, McNair is encouraged to step up his efforts for an expansion team.

July 28: Los Angeles presents an exclusive negotiating agreement to the NFL but the league does not sign it, stating that it does not address the financial situation behind the

September 9: NFL executives tell the Houston group to be prepared to come to the own-

September 28: Marvin Davis, one of the bidders for the Los Angeles franchise, bows out

October 6: The National Football League owners vote 29-0 to award the 32nd NFL franchise to Houston and Bob McNair for a record amount of \$700 million.

November: McNair and Houston NFL executives start the first of 40 separate focus group sessions, which eventually total 500 individual participants. The sessions are conducted not just in Houston, but in Galveston, Austin, Beaumont, San Antonio and Corpus Christi as well. Fans are asked for their opinions on the image of Houston and its surrounding areas, the image of the NFL and the expectations for the Houston franchise.

November 24: Houston NFL debuts "transition" logo, which serves as the organization's mark until a team name is selected, and the corresponding official logo, team colors and uniform are developed. The "transition" logo is created by NFL Properties, the New Yorkbased licensing and marketing arm of the NFL.

January 19: Houston NFL hires Charley Casserly as Executive Vice President/General Manager. Casserly comes to Houston after 23 years with the Washington Redskins, the last 10 as general manager. The Redskins captured Super Bowls XVII, XXII and XXVI

February: The National Football League begins researching and developing computerized designs for potential logos. Additional focus groups are conducted in Houston and

March 2: Houston NFL announces that its team name search has been narrowed to five San Antonio. choices: Apollos, Bobcats, Stallions, Texans and Wildcatters. The five names were determined after several months of research conducted jointly by Houston NFL 2002 and National Football League Properties. That research included multiple focus group studies performed in both English and Spanish in not only Houston, but also in numerous surrounding markets such as San Antonio, Austin, Galveston and Beaumont.

March 9: Houston NFL 2002 celebrates the official groundbreaking of the new stadium that will house the team when it begins play in 2002. The 69,500-seat state-of-the-art

facility will be the world's first retractable-roof football stadium. Houston NFL 2002 will be a co-tenant of the new stadium with the Houston Rodeo. and Show Livestock Participants in the groundbreaking ceremony include Bob McNair, NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue, Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo President Mike Wells, Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association Commissioner Steve Hatchell, Houston Mayor Lee Brown, Harris County Judge Robert Eckels, Harris County Commissioner

(Precinct 1) El Franco Lee, Harris County Sports & Convention Corporation Chairman Mike Surface and Harris County-Houston Sports Authority Chairman Billy Burge.


April: The list of five team names is shaved to three – Apollos, Stallions and Texans. Color logo designs are presented to focus groups for feedback.

August 10: McNair and other club officials view the final proofs of the selected team logo at Giants Stadium in East Rutherford, New Jersey. NFL Properties conducts television and photo testing of the logo as well.

September 6: The NFL's 32nd franchise is officially christened the Houston Texans before thousands at a downtown rally on Texas Avenue. NFL commissioner Tagliabue introduces McNair, who then unveils his team's name, colors and logo to the crowd. The ceremony, televised live on ESPN2, includes simultaneous unveilings in Austin and San Antonio. McNair then heads to Enron Field, where he throws out the first "pitch" (actually a Texans football) to Houston Astros Owner Drayton McLane before the Astros play the Florida Marlins.

September 7: The Texans are honored by the Texas Sports Hall of Fame in Waco. Club officials present the Hall of Fame with a Texans helmet, football and other merchandise, which is placed in a display case in the football wing of the Hall of Fame.

October 26: Reliant Energy acquires the naming rights for Houston's new state-of-the-



art football stadium and the sports, entertainment and convention complex currently known as the Astrodomain Complex. Reliant Energy's 32-year agreement to acquire the naming rights for five different buildings and the complex is the most comprehensive naming rights agreement in history. Reliant Park will be a partnership of mutual support between the Harris County Sports and Convention Corporation, the Houston Texans, RodeoHouston and Reliant Energy. The facilities at Reliant Park will include Reliant Stadium, Reliant Astrodome, Reliant Arena, Reliant Hall and Reliant Center. November 1: At its owners' meetings in Atlanta, the NFL announces that Reliant Stadium will host Super Bowl XXXVIII on February 1, 2004. Houston becomes the seventh city to host multi-

ple Super Bowls. Rice Stadium hosted Super Bowl VIII in 1974. Jacksonville is awarded Super Bowl XXXIX and Detroit earns Super Bowl XL.

2001

January 21: The Texans introduce Dom Capers as the club's first head coach. Capers comes to Houston from Jacksonville, where he served the previous two seasons as the Jaguars' defensive coordinator. From 1995-98, Capers was the head coach of the expansion Carolina Panthers, leading the team to the NFC West title and a berth in the NFC Championship Game in 1996.

February 2: Chris Palmer is hired as the Texans' first offensive coordinator. Palmer spent the previous two seasons as head coach of the expansion Cleveland Browns.

May 22: The NFL formally unveils its realignment plan for the 2002 season at league meetings in Chicago. The league will feature eight four-team divisions. The Texans are placed in the AFC South with Indianapolis, Jacksonville and Tennessee.

June 12: Bob McNair and Titans owner Bud Adams each donate \$100,000 to the Red Cross in an effort to aid Houston flood victims. NFL Charities matches the donation. More than 20,000 Houston-area families were displaced from their homes by raging

August 15: The NFL announces its new schedule rotation for 2002. In addition to their home-and-home series with AFC South rivals Indianapolis, Jacksonville and Tennessee, the Texans will host Baltimore, Cincinnati, Dallas, the New York Giants and the fourthplace team from the AFC East in 2002. Houston will then travel to Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, Washington and the fourth-place team in the AFC West.

September 25: The Texans unveil their team uniforms before a crowd of 12,000 fans in downtown Houston. Local dignitaries and numerous Texan celebrities join Bob McNair on stage for the ceremony. The Houston Texans Cheerleaders also make their debut.

November 5: The Texans hold their first player workouts, evaluating a group of defensive backs. December 29: The Texans sign 10 players to the first contracts in club history. The team's first players are running back Michael Basnight, safety Leomont Evans, tackle Robert Hicks, defensive tackle Jason Nikolao, quarterback Mike Quinn, fullback Matt Snider, cornerback Jason Suttle, linebacker Casey Tisdale, safety Kevin Williams and tackle Jerry Wisne.

2002 January 14: The Texans hire former Indianapolis Colts defensive coordinator Vic Fangio

February 18: The Texans selected T Tony Boselli, T Ryan Young, CB Aaron Glenn, DT Gary Walker, LB Jamie Sharper, WR Jermaine Lewis, CB Marcus Coleman, DT Seth Payne, G Matt Campbell, S Matt Stevens, G Jeremy McKinney, T Ryan Schau, RB Charlie Rogers, TE/LS Sean McDermott, DE Jabari Issa, WR Avion Black, QB Danny Wuerffel, LB Brian Allen and TE Johnny Huggins in the expansion draft.

March 4: The Texans execute the first trade in club history, shipping QB Danny Wuerffel to Washington in exchange for DT Jerry DeLoach.

March 6: The Texans sign their first unrestricted free agent, inking former Colts offensive

March 25: The Texans launch their off-season program at Reliant Astrodome. All 65


April 20: The Texans select Fresno State quarterback David Carr with the first overall selection of the 2002 NFL Draft. Carr flies back to Houston from New York that after-

noon to sign a seven-year contract. He is the first of 12 players Houston selects over seven rounds.

April 26: The Texans open their first mini-camp with 99 players, including 25 rookies.

April 28: The Texans launch their first Texans Outreach Tour, taking players to Austin, Beaumont, College Station, Corpus Christi and Lufkin over a five-day stretch.

July 20: Ninety-seven players report for the Texans' first-ever training camp. Camp is held at the club's training facility in Houston. The players go through conditioning drills the following day before hitting the practice field on July 22.

August 5: In their first preseason game, the Texans fall to the New York Giants 34-17 in the annual Pro Football Hall of Fame Game in Canton, Ohio. Kris Brown kicks a 22-yard field goal for Houston's first points. TE Billy Miller and WR Sherrod Gideon follow with



touchdown receptions.

August 10: The Texans record their first preseason win, defeating the New Orleans Saints 13-10 at the Louisiana Superdome.

August 24: The Texans open Reliant Stadium with a 24-3 preseason loss to the Miami Dolphins.

September 8: The Texans become the first NFL team in 41 years to win their expansion debut, stunning the

Dallas Cowboys 19-10 before 69,604 at Reliant Stadium. QB David Carr throws two touchdown passes, including a 19-yarder to TE Billy Miller for the club's first-ever touchdown. DT Seth Payne sacks Cowboys QB Quincy Carter in the end zone for a safety to clinch the victory.

October 27: The Texans win on the road for the first time, defeating Jacksonville 21-19 at ALLTEL Stadium. K Kris Brown nails a 45-yard field goal with 2:11 left to provide the winning points.

December 8: Despite just 47 yards of total offense, the Texans shock eventual AFC North champion Pittsburgh 24-6 at Heinz Field. All three of Houston's touchdowns are scored by the defense - two interception returns by CB Aaron Glenn and a fumble return by CB Kenny Wright. The 47 yards mark the lowest output by a winning team in NFL history.

December 19: CB Aaron Glenn and DE Gary Walker are selected to represent the AFC in the 2003 Pro Bowl. It is the third selection for Glenn (1997, 1998) and the second for Walker (2001). The Texans tie the 1961 Vikings for the most players selected on an expansion team and become the first expansion club to be represented since the Saints in 1967, when all teams were required to have at least one player selected.

February 2: CB Aaron Glenn and DE Gary Walker start for the AFC in the Pro Bowl and



help their conference to a 45-20 win before 50,125 at Aloha Stadium in Honolulu.

February 13: Texans general manager Charley Casserly is named to the NFL's Competition Committee for the second time in his 25-year NFL career. April 26: The Texans use the third overall selection of the 2003 NFL Draft to pick Miami WR Andre Johnson, who caught 22 touchdown passes in three seasons with the Hurricanes.





he city of Houston has always been on the cutting edge of stadium development. Houston first introduced the Astrodome, which opened in 1965 as the world's first dome stadium. The trend continued in 2002 with the debut of Reliant Stadium.

Reliant Stadium, the first NFL stadium with a retractable roof, opened for business on Aug. 24, 2002, as the Texans hosted the Miami Dolphins in their first home preseason game. Houston's regular season debut against Dallas on Sept. 8 was televised nationally on ESPN. The Texans stunned the Cowboys before a raucous crowd, unveiling a gameday atmosphere that would become a staple throughout the Texans' inaugural campaign.

The Texans averaged 69,915 fans over their eight regular season games at Reliant Stadium. A record crowd of 70,694 witnessed Houston's home finale against the Tennessee Titans on Dec. 29, marking the largest non-Super Bowl crowd in the city's history.

After the Texans conclude their second season at Reliant Stadium, the stadium will host the world's largest sports showcase. Super Bowl XXXVIII will be played at Reliant Stadium on Feb. 1, 2004, marking Houston's first Super Bowl in 30 years.

Reliant Stadium also hosted two major college football games in 2002. Oklahoma State defeated Southern Mississippi before a crowd of 44,687 in Reliant Stadium's first Houston Bowl on Dec. 27. Reliant Stadium also hosted the 2002 Big 12 Championship Game on Dec. 7. Oklahoma defeated Colorado 29-7 before a crowd of 63,332.

After the football season concluded, Reliant Stadium continued to host premier events. The Rolling Stones played before a packed house on Jan. 25. The Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo moved to Reliant Stadium in February, boasting acts such as Alabama, Ashanti, Bon Jovi, Julio Iglesias, Martina McBride, LL Cool J, George Strait and ZZ Top. The

U.S. National Soccer Team hosted Mexico at the facility on May 8 in the two teams' first match since their 2002 World Cup meeting.

On March 9, 2000, ground was broken on Reliant Stadium, which stands larger than life scoreboard. Following the

makes it the largest in the NFL. Each concession stand has multiple televisions enabling Texans fans to stay on top of the action.

Reliant Stadium can also boast a



adjacent to Reliant Astrodome. The stadium, covering 1.9 million square feet, features 44,000 seats on the sideline. There are 8,200 club seats and 166 suites. The suites are the closest to the field in the NFL.

With the innovation of the retractable roof, Houston had outdoor NFL action last season for the first time since Super Bowl VIII at Rice Stadium in 1974. The roof is made of translucent Teflon-coated fiberglass fabric, and takes 10 minutes to open and close. When opening, the roof splits at the 50-yard line and docks in the end zones. The roof can withstand winds as strong as 140 miles per hour when closed and secured. The climate-controlled stadium also features a natural grass-playing surface. The grass is grown on eight-foot square trays then transported to the stadium.


Reliant Stadium features an open view of the playing field from the main concourse and on the club level. The main concourse is 40 feet wide, which

trend that was started with the Astrodome scoreboard, Reliant Stadium houses two of the largest in the league. Both include out of town scores, down and distance, the game clock and a host of other traits. The video boards are the largest in the NFL.

The Texans' front office is located on the south end of the stadium, enabling the club's day-to-day operations to be under one roof. Players report to the stadium to take part in film sessions, practice, training. and treatment 10,000-square-foot weight room is the largest in the league. The players can also

take advantage of a three-lane lap pool.

Houston's working media has its own offices and library on the ground level of Reliant Stadium. Texans head coach Dom Capers conducts his weekly press conference in the media workroom. His post-game press conferences are held in one of the team's two media auditoriums on the ground level. The stadium's press box is located on the eighth level of the stadium's west side, flanking Kirby Drive.

Across the street, the Texans' training

facility features three grass practice fields. One field is lit for night sessions during training camp. The Texans also have an indoor practice field outfitted with Field Turf. The air-supported structure offers the team a seamless transition from outdoor to indoor practice in case of inclement weather. The state-of-the-art facility also doubles as the team's training camp headquarters. The players and coaches report for camp on July 25.

THEN AND NOW

"We are still, in many ways, building on the concepts utilized by the Romans in 82 A.D. In fact, the Roman Coliseum had a retractable fabric roof that could be drawn manually by ropes and pulleys to cover the colossal stadium's seating bowl. The canopy's opening allowed the bright Italian sun to illuminate the savage events on the floor.

"Two thousand years later, Reliant Stadium in Houston, Texas, also offers a retractable fabric roof. But where the Romans used a hand-sewn white canvas and ropes and pulleys, Reliant Stadium uses puncture-resistant Teflon-coated fiberglass and laser-guided transporters that operate with the push of a button. The Romans held their finger in the air to determine wind speed and appropriateness of drawing the fabric closed, while Reliant Stadium has computer-operated weather sensors that determine approaching rain and high wind gusts to cross-coordinate operational speed against potential uplift."



Gatorade Junior Training Camp





Infinity Broadcasting Corporation signed a 10-year agreement with the Houston Texans in September of 2000. This agreement gave Infinity the exclusive right to broadcast Houston Texans Football games and produce numerous ancillary programs featuring the team. Infinity will simulcast all Texan games on Country station 100.3 KILT FM and SportsRadio 610 AM. Infinity Radio Houston stations Smooth Jazz 95.7 and Business Radio 650 will be promotional partners with the Houston Texans as well. The game broadcasts will include a three-hour pre-game show and a two-hour post-game show hosted by Rich Lord, Charlie Pallilo and Lance Zierlein on SportsRadio 610. Texans weekly guests on SportsRadio 610 include head coach Dom Capers, general manager Charley Casserly, cornerback Aaron Glenn and center Steve McKinney.

Marc Vandermeer was drafted last year for the Texans' inaugural season to be the "Voice of the Houston Texans". Vandermeer brings a solid 14 years of radio broadcasting experience to the booth. Prior to his work in Houston, Marc was the voice of the University of Miami Hurricanes football and basketball teams. He currently serves as a talk show host on SportsRadio 610 and does morning drive sports reports on 100.3 KILT. Joining Vandermeer in the booth to provide analysis is former Heisman Trophy winner Andre Ware. Ware, a native Houstonian, played his college football at the University of Houston and was a first-round draft pick of the Detroit Lions. After his football career, Ware made the jump into the broadcast booth as color commentator for the Houston Cougars before moving on as analyst for SEC games broadcast on CBS.

SportsRadio 610 talk show host John Granato will handle sideline reporting during all Texans games. Granato has worked in television and radio with a wide range of experience. He currently serves as a co-host of SportsRadio 610's morning show.

KLAT La Tremenda is proud to be the flagship Spanish-language radio broadcaster of the Houston Texans for the second consecutive season. With 37.4 percent of Houston's 1.9 million people, Hispanics offer a huge fan base for the Texans. Since the team's inception, the Texans have realized the power of

Hispanic Houston and recognized how many long-time fans they stand to gain. It's no wonder they turned to Houston's Heritage Spanish Station, La Tremenda, to reach these fans with their broadcast. So get your team spirit pumping, strap on the pads and ask yourself: Are you ready for some fútbol Americano?

La Tremenda 1010 AM is owned and operated by Hispanic Broadcasting Corporation, which owns 47 radio stations in 13 of the top Hispanic markets in the U.S. In Houston, they also broadcast KLTN-FM (102.9 FM, Estereo Latino), KOVE-FM (106.5 FM, KLOVE), KOBT-FM (100.7 FM, Orbita) and KPTY-FM (Party 104.9 FM).

An avid sports fan, Rolando Becerra will continue to serve as the play-by-play voice for the Texans on La Tremenda. Becerra is the only Hispanic commentator to have done

play-by-play broadcasts for five major sports teams: the Houston Astros (1986-1992), the Houston Rockets (1988-1993), the Houston Oilers (1995-1997), the Houston Aeros (1999-2000) and the Texans (2002).

Becerra, originally from Cuba, began his radio career in Miami in 1973. He's been a Houston resident and radio constant for more than 20 years. You can also catch him on KLAT-AM as host of the The "Rolando Becerra Show", which airs Monday through Friday from 9-a.m. - 12:00 p.m. Becerra has been married to his wife, Jenny, for 33 years and they are parents of four

children: Barbra, Jason, Jaron and Megan.

Enrique Vasquez returns to handle color commentary duties for Texans broadcasts on La Tremenda. Vasquez came back to the Houston football scene after a two-year run doing

color commentary for the Dallas Cowboys, where he also did play-by-play in the late 1990s. He has also done sports broadcasting for Fox Sports, covering everything from basketball to Olympics to Super Bowls. Some Texans fans and La Tremenda listeners may remember Vasquez as one of the Spanish broadcast voices for the Houston Oilers from 1992 to 1995. Vasquez also writes a popular weekly column for the Spanish section of HoustonTexans.com.





A-C Joint - Acromicclavicular joint; joint of the shoulder where acromion process (of the scapula) and the distal end of the clavicle meet; most shoulder separations occur at this point.
 Abduct - Movement of any extremity away from the body.
 Abrasion - Any injury which rubs off the surface of the skin.
 Abscess - An infection which produces pus; can be the result of a blister, callus, penetrating wound or lac-

Achilles Tendon - The tendon at the back of the heel.

Achilles Tendon - The tendon at the back of the heel.

Abductor - Any muscle which moves a part toward the median axis of the body.

Adhesion - Abnormal adherence of collagen fibers to surrounding structures during immobilization follows: lowing trauma or as a complication of surgery which restricts normal elasticity of the structures involved.

Aerobic - Exercise in which energy needed is supplied by oxygen inspired; required for sustained periods of hard work and vigorous exercise.

Anabolic Steroids - Testosterone, or a steroid hormone resembling testosterone, that stimulates growth in the body as a whole.

Anaerobic - Exercise without the use of oxygen as an energy source; short bursts of vigorous exercise.

Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL) - Ligament of knee attaching to anterior tibial plateau and posterior medial aspect of femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from coming forward. Anterior Compartment Syndrome - Condition in which swelling within the anterior compartment of the lower leg (comprising of muscles, nerves and arteries to the foot) jeopardizes the viability of the muscles and nerves within the compartment.

Anti-Inflammatory - Any agent which prevents inflammation (such as aspirin or ibuprofen).

Arteriogram - Film demonstrating arteries after injection of opaque medium (dye).

Arthrogram - X-ray technique for joints using air and/or dye injected in affected area (to show torn carti-

Arthroscope - An instrument used for visualization of the interior of a joint cavity; sometimes referred to

Arthroscopy - Examination of the internal structures of a joint by means of surgical viewing apparatus (arthroscope) inserted into the joint.

Aspiration - The withdrawal of fluids from a body cavity by means of a suction or siphonage apparatus

Asymptomatic - Without symptoms.

Asymptomatic - Without symptoms.

Atrophy - To shrivel or shrink from disuse, as in muscular atrophy.

Avascular Necrosis - Death of a part due to lack of circulation (can occur in the elbow from throwing). Avulsion - A tearing away forcibly of a part of structure.

Axilla - The armpit.

AXIIIa - The armpit.

Baker's Cyst - Indicates that there is trauma inside the knee joint that leads to excessive joint-fluid production; inflammation of the gastroenemius bursa. Usually produces localized swelling behind the knee.

Bennett's Fracture - Fracture dislocation of the base of the first metacarpal (or the thumb).

Biceps - Muscle on the front of the upper arm responsible for blending the elbow.

Bone scan - "Radionuclide Imaging," which is useful to demonstrate stress fracture not evident on routine

Brachial Plexus - Network of nerves originating from the cervical vertebrae running down the arm.

Bruise - A discoloration of the skin due to an extravasation of the blood into the underlying tissues.

Burner - Common term for brachial plexus trauma in the neck. Usually results in burning or tingling sensation into the shoulder or arm when the neck is forced beyond the normal range of motion.

C.P.R. - Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation; artificial establishment of circulation of the blood and movement of air into the lungs in a pulseless, non-breathing person.

Calcaneus - The heel bone.

Calf - Also know as gastrocnemius; muscle responsible for plantarflexing, or pointing the toes down the

Capsule - An enclosing structure which surrounds the joint and contains ligaments which stabilize that

Cartilage - Smooth, slippery substance preventing two ends of bones from rubbing together and grating.

Cellulitis - Inflammation of cellular or connective tissue.

Charley Horse - A bruise to the quadriceps resulting from a direct blow to the front of the thigh, characterized by intramuscular bleeding. No other injury should be called a charley horse.

Chondral Fracture - Fracture to the chondral (cartilaginous) surfaces of bone.

Chondromalacia - A roughening of the cartilage surface. Best known for the roughening of the underside of the kneecap.

Clavicle - The collar bone.

Collagen - A substance existing in commonly injured tissues of the body, including skin, cartilage, liga-

Concussion - Jarring injury of the brain resulting in dysfunction. Can be graded mild, moderate or severe depending on loss of consciousness, amnesia and loss of equilibrium.

Congenital - Existing before birth; to be born with.

Contusion - An injury to the muscles and tissues caused by a blow from a blunt object.

ortisone - An anti-inflammatory medication.

Cortisone - An anti-inflammatory medication.

Costochondral - The cartilage that separates the bones within the rib cage.

Cyst - Abnormal sac containing liquid or semisolid matter.

Degenerative Joint Disease - Changes in the joint surfaces as a result of repetitive trauma.

Dehydration - Loss of body water.

Deltoids - Muscles at top of arm, just below shoulder.

Dise - A flat, round-like, plate structure usually referring to cartilage between vertebrae.

Dislocation - Complete displacement of joint surfaces.

Eschymacis - Bleeding into the surface issue below the skin resulting in a "black and blue

Ecchymosis - Bleeding into the surface tissue below the skin, resulting in a "black and blue" effect. Ectomy - Suffix connoting the affected part (e.g. meniscectomy, appendectomy).

<u>Edema</u> - Accumulation of fluid in organs and tissues of the body (swelling).
<u>Effusion</u> - Accumulation of fluid, or the fluid itself, in various spaces in the body. Commonly found in the knee following injury

Electrolyte - Ionized salts in blood, tissue fluids and cells including salts of sodium, potassium and chlo-

Electrolyte Drink - Fluid for replacing electrolytes, such as Gatorade Thirst Quencher.

EMG - Electromyogram test to check nerve function.

Epicondylitis - Inflammation in the elbow due to overuse of either the flexor or extensor muscles attaching to the medial or lateral epicondyle of the humerus.

Eversion - Turning outward.

xtension - Motion of straightening a joint. Extensor - A muscle which upon contraction results in straightening a joint.

External Rotation - Lateral movement of a joint or extremity to the outside.

Fascia - A connective tissue sheath consisting of fibrous tissue and fat which unites the skin to the underly-

Femur - Thigh bone.

Fibula - The smaller of the two bones in the lower leg, located to the outside.

Flexibility - The ability of muscle to relax and yield to stretch force.

Flexibility Exercise - A general term used to describe exercise performed by a person to passively or actively elongate soft tissues without the assistance of a therapist.

Flexion - Bending a joint, as in flexing the arm or leg.

Flexor - A muscle which upon contraction flexes or bends.

Fracture - Breach in continuity of a bone. Types of fractures include simple, compound, comminuted,

greenstick, encomplete, impacted, longitudinal, oblique, stress or transverse.

Gamekeeper's Thumb - Tear of the ulnar collateral ligament of the metacarpo-phangeal joint of the

Glenohumeral - The shoulder socket, containing the glenoid, the humeral head and the labrum.

Glenoid - A cavity of the scapula into which the head of the humerus fits to the form of the shoulder joint (the shoulder socket).

Groin - Junction of the thigh and abdomen.

Hamstring - Muscle running from the buttocks to behind the knee. Often injured as a result of improper conditioning or lack of muscle flexibility. Muscle responsible for flexing the knee joint.

Heat Stroke - Condition of rapidly rising internal body temperature that overwhelms the body's mecha-

nisms for release of heat.

Heat Exhaustion - Mild form of shock caused by loss of fluid and electrolyte from the circulation because

of excessive sweating when exposed to heat.

Heat Cramps - Painful muscle spasms of arms or legs causes by excessive body heat and depletion of flu-

ids and electrolyte. Hematoma - A tumor-like mass produced by an accumulation of coagulated blood in a cavity.

Hip Pointer - Contusion to the iliac crest. Humerus - Bone of the upper arm.

Hyperextension - Extreme extension, or straightening, of a limb or body part.

Iliotibial Band - A thick, wide facial layer from the liac crest to the knee joint.

Impingement Syndrome - Pinching together of the supraspinatus muscle and other soft tissue in the shoulder, which is common in throwing,

Isokinetic Exercise - A form of active resistive exercise in which the speed of movement of the limb is controlled by a pre-set rate-limiting device, such as Cybex, Biodex, etc.

Isometric (static) Contraction - A muscle contraction in which tension is developed but no mechanical work is done. There is not appreciable joint movement and the overall length of the muscle remains the

<u>Isokinetic</u> - A constant speed and consistent resistance exercise.
<u>Isotonic (dynamic) Contraction</u> - A concentric or eccentric muscular contraction that results in movement of a joint or body part (lifting a free weight).

Itis - Suffix connoting inflammation (e.g. tendinitis, bursitis).

Joint Mobilization - Passive traction and/or gliding movements applied to joint surfaces that maintain or restore the joint play normally allowed by the capsule, so that the normal roll-slide joint mechanic can occur as a person moves.

Lateral Collateral Ligament (LCL) - Ligament of knee attaching lateral femoral condyle to the fibula nead. It provides lateral stability to the knee.

Ligament - Band of fibrous tissue that connects bone to bone or bone to cartilage and supports and strengthens joints.

Lumbosacral - Region of low back comprised of lumbar and sacral spine.

Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) - Provides highly detailed pictures of the body's interior, using highly magnetic fields. MRI does not require radiation.

Malleolus - Rounded projections on either side of the ankle joint.

Medial - Pertaining to or near the middle.

Medial Collateral Ligament (MCL) - Ligament of knee attaching to medial femoral condyle to medial tibia. It provides medial stability to the knee.

Meniscus - Crescent shaped cartilage usually pertaining to the knee joint.

Meniscectomy - An intra-articular procedure at the knee by which meniscus (fibrocartilage) is removed surgically.

Metacarpals - Five long bones of hand, just below fingers.

Metatarsals - Five long bones of foot, just below toes.

Mobilization - Passive stretching movements performed by a therapist at a slow speed slow enough that a patient can stop the movement,

Myositis - Inflammation of a muscle.

Medical Glossary

Myositis Ossificans - Inflammation in muscle resulting in the formation of bone-like substance.

Necrotic - Relating to death of a portion of tissue.

Neuritis - Inflammation of a nerve.

Orthotic - Any device applied to or around the body in the care of physical impairment or disability, commonly used to control foot mechanics.

Osteochondritis Dissecans - A piece of bone and/or cartilage loosened from its attachment after trauma and a cause of a lesion.

Ostcomyclitis - An inflammatory disease of bone caused usually by infection with streptococcus or staphy-

Parasthesia - Sensation of numbness or tingling, indicating nerve irritation.

Patella - The kneecap.

Patella Tendinitis - Inflammation of the patella tendon.

Pathology - Study of the nature and cause of disease.

Pectorals - Chest muscles beneath the breast, leading up to shoulder.

Peroneal - Muscles of the lateral lower leg responsible for everting the foot.

Plantar Fascia - The tight band of muscle beneath the arch of the foot.

Plica - A fold of tissue in the joint capsule and a common result of knee injury.

PNF (Proprioceptive Neuronuscular Facilitation) - An approach to therapeutic exercise based on the principles of functional human anatomy and neurophysiology.

Posterior Cruciate Ligament (PCL) - Ligament of the knee attaching to posterior tibial plateau and anterior lateral aspect of femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from going backward.

Quadriceps (Quads)- The four powerful muscles in the front of the thigh, responsible for extending the knee joint.

Radiography - Taking of X-rays, Radius - Forearm bone on thumb side.

Reconstruction - Surgical rebuilding of an injured joint.

Referred Pain - Pain felt in undamaged area of body away from actual injury.

Rotator cuff - Comprised of four muscles in the shoulder area; supraspinatus, infraspinatus, teres minor, and subscapularis. Often irritated by overuse.

S-C joint - Sternoclavicular joint; articulation between the sternum and the clavicle.

Sacroillac - Relating to the juncture of the hip bone and lower part of the spine.

Scan - Injection of radioactive fluid (equal in radioactivity to about one x-ray) which may then be dis-

played on a computer/monitor or film (e.g. bone scan). Scapula - The shoulder blade.

Sciatic Nerve - Largest nerve in body located in back of leg which controls most of its function.

Sciatica - Irritation of the sciatic nerve, resulting in pain or tingling running down the inside of the cap.

Sesamoid Bones - Lies within and adds strength to tendons as they cover bony surface. The most commonly known is the kneecap.

Shin splint - A catch-all syndrome describing pain either in the front of the lower leg or on the inner aspect of the leg.

Spasm - Sudden, violent, involuntary contraction of a muscle.

Spleen - Large, solid organ responsible for the normal production and destruction of blood cells.
Spondylitis - Inflammation of one or more vertebrae.

Spondylitis - Inflammation of one or more vertebrae.

Spondylolisthesis - Forward displacement of one lumbar vertebra.

Spondylosis - Abnormal vertebrael fixation or immobility.

Sprain - A joint injury. A violent twisting, stretching, pulling or tearing of a ligament.

Stinger - Common term for brachial plexus trauma in the neck.

Strain - A muscle injury. The stretching, pulling or twisting of a muscle of a tendon.

Stress X-Ray - A continual x-ray taken when a portion of the body is stressed to its maximum to see if the ligaments are intact. igaments are intact.

Stress Fracture - A hair-line type of break in bone caused by overuse.

Stretching - Any therapeutic maneuver designed to lengthen (elongate) pathologically shortened soft-tissue structures and thereby increase range of motion.

Subluxation - Partial dislocation of a joint. Term usually implies that joint can return to normal position

without formal reduction.

Synovial Fluid - Lubricating fluid for joints and tendons, produced in synovium, or inner lining of the

Synovitis - Inflammation of the synovium.

Talus - The ankle bone that articulates with the tibia and fibula.

Tarsus - Arch of foot.

Tendinitis - Inflammation of the tendon and/or tendon sheath, often caused by chronic overuse and/or sudden injury.

Tendon - Fibrous tissue that connects muscles to other structures.
Tennis Elbow - General term for lateral elbow pain.

Tibia - Larger of the two bones in lower leg; weight-bearing bone.

Tomograph - A special type of x-ray apparatus that demonstrates the organ or tissue is a particular depth. rachea - The windpipe.

rapezius - A flat triangular muscle covering the posterior surface of the neck and shoulder.

Diceps - Muscle of the posterior upper arm, opposite the biceps, that extends the elbow.

Rurf Toe - Sprain of the metatarsophalangeal (MTP) joint of the great toe.

Turf Burn - Abrasion resulting from contact with artificial turf in which one or more layers of skin are removed Ulna - One of two bones in forearm; extends from point of elbow and found on outer (little finger) side.

Ulnar Nerve - Nerve in the elbow commonly irritated from excessive throwing or repeated trauma. Wrist - The junction between the two forearm bones (radius and ulna) and the eight wrist bones (trapezium, trapezoid, capitate, hamate, pisiform, triquetral, lunate and scaphoid).

Texans Media Policy

CREDENTIAL REQUESTS: Only credential requests from working media on specific assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication will be honored credential requests. Credentials will not be issued to free-lance writers or photographers unless requested by a recognized news organization or sports publication. All credential requests must be submitted online at www.houstontexans.com/media/credential.cfm, Call (832) 667-2282 for more information.

PARKING: Parking for Texans games must be applied for via written request, The appropriate parking pass will be required for access to media parking lots on gameday.

MEDIA ENTRANCE AND WILL CALL: The media entrance is located at the press gate on Murworth/Kirby intersection on the West side of the stadium. The will call window is located inside the press gate in the hallway next to the daily press workroom. The appropriate game credential must be presented at the media entrance for admission into the stadium. Game credentials not picked up in advance will be available on game day at the credential will-call window. The window will open three hours prior to kickoff.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photographers who are credentialed on a season-long basis for sideline access will be required to wear an armband. Photographers on a game-by-game basis will have a different credential. Sideline access for NFL games is limited to photographers on assignment for recognized or sports publication. No one except network television personnel and authorized game personnel will be admitted to the field without a camera. All field photographers must remain outside the bench areas and outside the yellow border surrounding the playing field.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS AND LOCKER ROOM ACCESS: Members of the media needing to conduct post game interviews will be given access to the Texans' and visiting interview rooms after the game, as well as the home and visiting locker rooms. NO STILL PHOTOGRAPHERS OR AUTOGRAPHS ARE ALLOWED IN THE TEXANS LOCKER ROOM. With six minutes remaining in the game take the media elevator the field level. With two minutes remaining in the fourth quarter, media members will be allowed on the field. NO INTERVIEWS ARE ALLOWED ON THE PLAYING FIELD. Dom Capers' post game interview session with the media will begin approximately 10 minutes following the conclusion of the game and will be held in the Texans team meeting room across from their locker room. Electronic media covering the press conference are asked to use the mult-box to ease congestion at the podium. Players also will be available approximately 10 minutes after the game when the locker room is open. The visiting head coach will be available in the visitor's interview room adjacent to the visiting locker room.

DURING THE WEEK

MEDIA WORKROOM: The media workroom is located on the concourse level at Reliant Stadium across from the Texans' locker room. The room is available to working media throughout the week. Phones, Texans information, NFL news releases and other information are available.


