



Robert C. McNair

Founder, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer

obert C. McNair is perhaps best known in the business community as the founder of Cogen Technologies, which was sold in 1999. Cogen was the largest privately owned cogeneration company in the world with aggregate capacity of 1,400 megawatts. Today, he retains ownership in a 345-megawatt plant in New York

and a 50-megawatt plant in West Virginia.

McNair also serves as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of The McNair Group, headquartered in Houston, Texas, where he oversees an investment portfolio including cogeneration assets in the eastern United States. Mr. McNair owns Palmetto Partners, Ltd., a private investment company that manages the McNairs' public and pri-

vate equity investments, and is Chairman of the McNair Foundation. In June 2000, Mr. McNair formed a biotechnology investment firm, Cogene Biotech Ventures, where he serves as Chairman.

Committed to bringing a National Football League team to Houston, Mr. McNair formed Houston NFL Holdings in 1998. On October 6, 1999, the NFL announced that the 32nd NFL franchise had been awarded to Mr. McNair, returning football to the City of Houston in the year 2002 and Super Bowl XXXVIII in 2004. On September 8, 2002, the Houston Texans

kicked off their Inaugural Season with a victory over the Dallas Cowboys – 19 to 10.

Mr. McNair's first two football-related hires have been lauded throughout the league. He hired former Washington Redskins general manager Charley Casserly within three months of securing the franchise. Casserly helped build three

Super Bowl winners over a 23-year career in Washington. Mr. McNair then hired Dom Capers as the first head coach of the Texans. Capers previously served as head coach of the expansion Carolina Panthers, leading them to the NFC Championship Game in just their second season of existence.

Those two leaders paid immediate dividends in 2002 as the Texans won four games in their inau-

gural season. Houston defeated Dallas in its nationally-televised season opener, becoming the first expansion club to win its opening game since the 1961 Minnesota Vikings. The Texans also won at Jacksonville and upset the Giants and Steelers, both playoff teams.

Despite facing a rash of injuries and the NFL's toughest schedule in 2003, the Texans posted a 5-11 campaign in their second NFL season. And in 2004, the Texans continued their steady climb by winning seven games. Houston won consecutive games for the first time and earned its first

sweeps of divisional opponents by defeating Jacksonville and Tennessee twice. The Texans' second win over the Jaguars, a 21-0 road triumph, marked Houston's first shutout win in franchise history.

Stonerside Stable, a major thoroughbred horse farm in Kentucky, is also among McNair's successes. A 1,500-acre thoroughbred horse farm and racing stable, Stonerside is home to nearly 200 racehorses, broodmares, yearlings and weanlings. Since its inception in 1994, Stonerside has won 59 Graded Stakes races including Grade I wins in the Belmont, Breeders Cup Mile, the Travers, the Haskell, the Hollywood Gold Cup, the Cigar Mile, the Carter, the Swaps, the Wood Memorial, the Matriarch and the Oak Leaf Stakes. Stonerside also has finished second and third in the Kentucky Derby and was the co-breeder of Fusaichi Pegasus, winner of the Derby.

Mr. McNair is a current or past member of the Boards of Trustees of a number of institutions including Rice University, Baylor College of Medicine, the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston Grand Opera, the Greater Houston Partnership, the Greater Houston Convention and Visitors Bureau, the Free Enterprise Institute and the Federal Reserve Banks of Dallas and Houston.

Mr. McNair is a member of the Texas Business Hall of Fame and a recipient of the Anti-Defamation League's Torch of Liberty Award, the Northwood University Outstanding Business Leader Award and the Association for Private Enterprise Education's Herman W. Lay Memorial Award. He recently received the Distinguished American Award from the Houston Chapter of the National Football Foundation and the Distinguished Citizen Award from the Rotary Club of Houston. In April 2002 The South Main Center Association presented McNair with the prestigious City Builder Award. The Houston Advertising Federation honored

McNair in November 2002 with the Annual Trailblazer Award recognizing him for significantly enhancing the overall image of Houston, both locally and globally. In April 2003 McNair received the Distinguished Citizen Award from the Sam Houston Area Council of the Boy Scouts of America, and in May 2003 McNair received The Denton A. Cooley Leadership Award from the Texas Heart Institute. In November 2003 the McNairs received the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge National Award for Outstanding Patriotism, Responsible Citizenship and Community Involvement. The McNair Foundation was honored as the 2003 Outstanding Philanthropic Foundation at the National Philanthropy Day luncheon sponsored by the Association of Fundraising Professionals, and in November 2004 the Foundation was honored at the Houston Independent School District Partnership Appreciation Breakfast with a Hall of Fame Award. In April 2004 McNair was honored with the Heart of Houston award from the Fifth Ward Enrichment Program. In March 2005 the Fellowship of Christian Athletes presented McNair with the President & Mrs. George H. W. Bush Community Impact Award. In June 2005 Rice University announced that the newest building on the campus, the 167,000 square foot home of the Jesse H. Jones Graduate School of Management, had been officially named Janice and Robert McNair Hall by the Rice Board of Trustees. McNair also is a founder of the Cotswold project, a revitalization project focused on downtown Houston.

Born in Tampa, Fla., Mr. McNair has been a resident of Houston since 1960. He graduated from the University of South Carolina in Columbia in 1958 with a Bachelor of Science degree. In 1999, Mr. McNair received an honorary doctor of humane letters degree from the University of South Carolina.

Philip Burguières

Vice Chairman

hilip Burguières, one of Houston's most innovative leaders, serves as Vice Chairman of the Houston Texans.

Burguières also serves as Chairman and CEO of EMC Holdings, LLC, an investment management company specializing in oil services and exploration and production industries. Additionally, he serves as Chairman Emeritus of Weatherford International, an international energy company. Until 1996, Burguières Weatherford was International's Chairman and Chief Executive Officer.

Prior to joining Weatherford in 1990,

Burguières was Chairman, President and Chief Executive Officer of Panhandle Eastern Corporation. He worked for 20 years at Cameron Iron Works, Inc., an international oil service company, where he served as Chairman and CEO for 10 years. Burguières is on the board of directors at Newfield Exploration Company and J.P. Morgan Chase. He also serves as Chairman of the Board of Directors of The J.M. Burguières Co., Ltd. (a family-owned limited partnership). He is a member of the National Petroleum Council, the World's President's Organization, is past president of the Petroleum Club of Houston, the Petroleum Equipment Suppliers

Association and past chairman of the National Ocean Industries Association. In 2005, Burguières received the 2005 Woodrow Wilson Award for Corporate

> Citizenship from the Smithsonian Institute. He was also the 2003 recipient of the National Mental Health William Association Styron Award. In May of 2000, Burguières was awarded the prestigious Hogg Award Ima from the Mental Health Association of Greater Houston. He is a Director of Catholic Charities, The Mental Health Association, and M.D. Anderson, where he serves on the executive committee, and The Texas

Heart Institute. He recently became chairman of the Menninger Clinic.

A native of Franklin, La., Burguières graduated with a bachelor's of science degree in mechanical engineering from the University of Louisiana, where a Chair in the engineering department has been named in his honor. He was a recipient of his alma mater's Outstanding Alumni Award in 1992. He served in the U.S. Navy for four years, reaching the rank of Lieutenant. Burguières received his master's in business administration from the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Business. He has two children, Emily and Martial.

Charley Casserly

Senior Vice President and General Manager, Football Operations

o succeed in the NFL's salary-cap era, you have to make every personnel decision count. And when you're charged with ushering an expansion team into the mix, each of those decisions is magnified.

Charley Casserly knew that when he took the job as Houston's general manager, nearly 30 months before the Texans would even play a down. Now as the Texans enter their fourth season, it appears that Casserly has this team headed in the right direction. Armed with five first-round selections, Casserly has nailed the first four. After selecting franchise quarterback David Carr with the top overall pick in 2002, Casserly selected wide receiver Andre Johnson with the third overall selection in 2003. All Johnson has done since then is catch 145 passes for 2,118 yards and become the second-youngest player on the AFC's most recent Pro Bowl roster. In 2004, Casserly selected cornerback Dunta Robinson, who started all 16 games, tied for the NFL lead among rookies with six interceptions and was selected NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year. Later in that first round, the Texans snagged defensive end Jason Babin, who converted to outside linebacker and started every game as a rookie.

His fifth first-rounder, selected this past April, was Florida State's Travis Johnson, the top-rated defensive tackle in the draft. The Texans were able to snag Johnson with the 16th overall pick — relatively low for such a high-profile position — even after trading back from the 13th selection and picking up a future third-rounder.

Casserly has also found value elsewhere,

plucking running back Domanick Davis in the fourth round of the draft in 2003 before Davis won NFL Rookie of the Year honors and posted consecutive 1,000-yard rushing campaigns. Starters such as linebacker Kailee Wong, linebacker Morlon Greenwood and defensive end Robaire Smith have been signed in free agency. A pre-draft trade with Oakland secured cornerback Phillip Buchanon, who has scored seven touchdowns on returns in just three seasons. And restricted free agent kicker Kris Brown has connected on 52 of 70 field goal attempts since coming to Houston.

Casserly's moves have helped the Texans' meticulous rise in the standings, from 4-12 in the expansion season to 5-11 in 2003 and 7-9 in 2004. In 2002, the Texans stunned the football world by defeating Dallas in their first game, becoming the first expansion team in 41 years to win its opening contest. The Texans later defeated two playoff teams (Giants, Steelers). In 2003, despite landing a league-high 17 players on injured reserve, Houston lost five games it led in the fourth quarter playing the league's toughest schedule based on their opponent's winning percentage. Last season, the Texans swept two division opponents (Jacksonville, Tennessee) for the first time and faced a schedule that featured seven games against playoff teams

"We will win here in Houston," Casserly said. "The tools are in place. We have a great owner, great coach, great facilities and one of the best places to live in this country. It's just a matter of everybody working together to see this through."

Texans owner Bob McNair hired Casserly on January 19, 2000, as Senior Vice President/General Manager of Houston's NFL expansion franchise. He heads all football operations for the club.

"We were so fortunate to be able to

attract a worldclass football man like C h a r l e y C a s s e r l y," McNair said.

Casserly his enters fourth season but sixth year with the Texans after a highlysuccessful 23vear stint with the Redskins. In Washington, Casserly was known for his work tireless ethic and a keen eye for football talent, traits that continue to serve him well

in Houston. Washington went to four Super Bowls during Casserly's tenure, winning three. NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue recently appointed him to the NFL's prestigious Competition Committee for the second time.

Casserly famously started with the Redskins in 1977 as an unpaid intern under Hall of Fame coach George Allen. Washington hired Casserly as a scout the next season and during his early years as a scout, he unearthed free agents Joe Jacoby and Jeff Bostic, who were original members of the famed "Hogs" offensive line and key components of Washington's first two Super Bowl teams, as well as Nate Newton. Jacoby was selected to four Pro Bowls and

Bostic made one trip to Honolulu. The Redskins elevated Casserly to assistant general manager in 1982 and the club went on to capture its first Super Bowl. That year, Casserly also re-instituted the club's intern program, which has produced more

than 20 league executives over his years in Washington and Houston.

In 1987. Casserly faced perhaps the biggest challenge of his Redskins career when NFL players went on strike. League owners decided replacement players, sending personnel men scrambling to fill roster spots. With about a week to assem-



ble a full complement of replacement players, Casserly put together a team that won all three of its games before the strike ended, including a Monday Night win against a Dallas team that featured a number of its star players. That experience was the subject of the Warner Bros. feature film, "The Replacements," starring Keanu Reeves and Gene Hackman.

When he was elevated to GM in 1989, Casserly sustained the Redskins' history of uncovering high-quality players in the later rounds of the draft. He used a fifth-round pick in 1990 to select Southwest Louisiana quarterback Brian Mitchell. Washington then converted Mitchell to a running back/kick returner, where he later joined

Jim Brown as the only players in NFL history to lead the league in combined net yards four times. In 1996, Casserly plucked Auburn running back Stephen Davis in the fourth round. Davis paced the NFC in rushing in 1999 with 1,450 yards. Casserly also drafted future Pro Bowlers in wide receiver Keenan McCardell (12th round, 1991) and

end Frank tight Wycheck (sixth round, 1993).

And during the 1999 off-season, Casserly made moves that immediately benefited the Redskins. First, he traded three draft choices to Minnesota for signal-caller Brad Johnson. The eightyear veteran responded with a Pro Bowl season in 1999, throwing for 4,005 vards and 24 TDs. (Johnson led the

Bucs to a championship last season, mean-XXXVII quarterbacks - he traded for Raiders quarterback Rich Gannon in 1992.)


Casserly then fired the shot heard 'round the league on draft day, acquiring all of the New Orleans Saints' 1999 selections, plus their first and third-round picks in 2000. To do so, Casserly simply swapped the Redskins' fifth selection in the first round for New Orleans' 12th choice. He still managed to obtain the player that Washington wanted, ultimately selecting future Pro Bowl cornerback Champ Bailey with the seventh pick in the first round. In part for those efforts, Sports Illustrated, Pro Football Weekly and USA Today named Casserly their Executive of the Year.

Casserly is determined to build a similar track record in Houston. He has already crafted one of the league's best scouting staffs and his football staff can boast 28 Super Bowl rings.

"The scouting staff is crucial for any expansion franchise," Casserly says, "Mr. McNair has provided us the means to assemble one of the most experienced staffs in the NFL."

Casserly's first order of business was the 2002 expansion draft, which produced

> eight eventual starters. He then pulled the trigger on Carr, ensuring the club a franchise quarterback for seasons to come. The 2003 draft focused on offense and Casserly honed in on defense in 2004 as the team's first seven picks were on that side of the ball. This past draft split it right down the middle - three selections on offense and three on defense.

shopper" services.

Rootes also oversees Lone Star Sports & Entertainment (LSSE), an event management and business development company affiliated with the Texans that manages non-Texans events in Reliant Stadium. In this capacity, he has helped secure such marquee events as the U.S. vs. Mexico soccer match on May 8, 2003, which drew the largest soccer crowd in Texas history and was named the best soccer crowd of 2003 by U.S. Soccer. LSSE also hosted the largest crowds of the 2004 and 2005 InterLiga Copa Libertadores qualification tournament and in July 2005 hosted part of the prestigious Gold Cup international championship.

Dom Capers

Head Coach
20th NFL Season 5th with Texans

s he glances up at the depth chart in his office, Dom Capers remembers why he decided to come to Houston four years ago.

Has it really been just four years? Football seasons tend to measure themselves in dog years anyway, but when it's an expansion team you're coaching, the gray hairs and sleepless nights seem to multiply even more rapidly. Capers knew that when

he took the job. He knew there were plenty of hurdles. He was also confident he could clear them.

The Texans didn't roll over and play dead when they arrived in the National Football League. On the contrary, they might have been the hardest-working team in the league, a mirror image of their head coach. But as with any expansion entry, youth and attrition inevitably took their toll. Yet

Capers was slowly but surely building the team in his mold – tough, disciplined and motivated.

After winning four games in 2002, the Texans managed five victories during an injury-ravaged 2003 season. And in 2004, Houston made its biggest leap to date, posting a 7-9 record against a schedule that featured six eventual playoff teams. The Texans swept two division rivals and won half of their road games.

Now, as the Texans enter their fourth

season, the expansion moniker has virtually vanished. Houston has talent and depth on both sides of the ball. It took plenty of patience and fortitude to reach this point. But this is exactly what Capers envisioned back in 2001.

"I had hoped this would be the case," he said. "Sometimes you have to bite the bullet and we certainly did. I look back through our depth charts from the first year

compared to our depth chart now. It's a big difference."

Houston's improvement in 2004 was evident on both offense and defense. The Texans established team records in nine categories, including total yards (5,128), touchdowns (37) and points (309). Quarterback David Carr had his best season under center and running back Domanick Davis posted his second con-

secutive 1,000-yard season. Meanwhile, wide receiver Andre Johnson became the first Texans offensive player to earn a Pro Bowl berth, setting club records with 79 receptions for 1,142 yards and six touchdowns.

The Texans started three rookies on defense and faced all five of the league's top-rated offenses. But Houston held its own, picking off a team-record 22 passes and posting the first shutout in franchise history, a 21-0 win at Jacksonville the day

after Christmas. In fact, the Texans kept the opposition out of the end zone for 13 consecutive quarters in December, an NFL season high. Cornerback Dunta Robinson led all NFL rookies with six interceptions and fellow first-round pick Jason Babin posted four sacks in Capers' aggressive 3-4 scheme.

In 2003, the Texans led the league in two unenviable categories - opponent winning percentage (.570) and players on injured reserve (17). But Houston fought through that adversity to post five wins, owning fourth-quarter leads in five of its seven defeats. In 2002, the Texans shocked the football world by becoming the first expansion team since the 1961 Vikings to win its first game, defeating the Cowboys 19-10 on national television. The Texans later beat the Jaguars and two eventual playoff teams, the Giants and the Steelers. Cornerback Aaron Glenn and defensive end Gary Walker became the first Pro Bowlers from an expansion team since the 1970 merger.

In tackling his second expansion project,

Capers' legendary work ethic and attention to detail continue to flourish. Those qualities have rubbed off on the Texans, from the players to the coaches to the staff. Ask most and they will say that success will follow Dom Capers in Houston. In many ways, it already has.

The Texans introduced Capers as their first head coach on Jan. 21, 2001. Capers served as the defensive coordinator for the Jaguars during the 1999 and 2000 seasons. Prior to his stint in Jacksonville, he spent four seasons as head coach of the Panthers, guiding that expansion franchise from its infancy to a playoff berth.

Expansion success was nothing new to Capers, who compiled a 30-34 record in four seasons with the Panthers. The Panthers' 7-9 record in 1995 set an NFL mark for most victories by an expansion team. Carolina also posted the first fourgame winning streak in expansion history, the first winning home record by an expansion club and the first win over a defending Super Bowl champion (San Francisco) in

expansion annals.

In 1996, the Panthers shook up the league by winning their final seven regular-season games, resulting in a 12-4 record and the NFC West title. Carolina then defeated defending Super Bowl champion Dallas in the divisional playoffs before bowing to Green Bay in the NFC Championship Game at Lambeau Field. The Panthers, riding a defensive unit that ranked second in the league in points allowed, posted a 9-0 home record (including playoffs). Eight Panthers played in the Pro Bowl. Capers was named Coach of the Year by the Associated Press, among numerous other honors.

The Panthers posted records of 7-9 and 4-12 the next two seasons, resulting in Capers' dismissal. The Jaguars signed him six weeks later and the hiring paid immediate dividends.

Under Capers, the Jaguars improved from 25th in the NFL in total defense in 1998 to fourth in 1999. Jacksonville also yielded the fewest points (217) in the NFL, an average of 13.6 points per game. Since the advent of the 16-game schedule in 1978, only 11 teams had allowed fewer points in a season. Capers' unit set club records for sacks (57) and interceptions (19), while tying the team mark record for takeaways (30). Three Jaguars defenders made the AFC Pro Bowl squad (defensive end Tony Brackens, linebacker Kevin Hardy and safety Carnell Lake), marking the first time any Jacksonville defensive player had earned a trip to Honolulu. Capers was named NFL Assistant Coach of the Year by Pro Football Writers of America/Pro Football Weekly and USA Today. In 2000, the Jaguars ranked 12th in the league in total defense and again tied the club single-season record for takeaways with 30.

Capers arrived in Houston one year before the Texans began building their roster, a luxury he did not have in Charlotte. The early start enabled him to formulate a long-term plan for consistent success. Capers' attention to detail is legendary in league circles. He has recorded the date, time and details about every event in his day since his late father, Eugene, gave him his first leather-bound notebook for Christmas in 1981.

"He was my toughest critic, but also my biggest supporter," Capers said. "And he always believed that you got back out of things what you put into them. If you come in every day, expend all the energy you have and do things right, opportunities will present themselves.

"Since the first day I started coaching, that's the approach I've tried to take."

Capers cut his NFL teeth with veteran NFL head coach Jim Mora. After winning two USFL titles with the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars, Mora accepted the Saints' head coaching position in 1986 and brought Capers along with him as defensive backs coach. Capers served in that capacity through the 1991 season, helping the Saints to the first three playoff berths in franchise history.

Capers then accepted the defensive coordinator's post with the Steelers, helping the team win two AFC Central titles. In his three seasons with the Steelers, no team in the NFL yielded fewer touchdowns. Linebacker Greg Lloyd and Cornerback Rod Woodson made three consecutive trips to the Pro Bowl under Capers' watch.

Capers began his coaching career in 1972 at Kent State, where he was a graduate assistant for three seasons while earning a master's degree in administration. In 1975 he served as a graduate assistant at the University of Washington. Capers became a full-time coach the following year, and then matriculated to Hawaii, San Jose State, California, Tennessee and Ohio State.

Capers was born Aug. 7, 1950, in Cambridge, Ohio, and he was raised in nearby Buffalo, Ohio. He was a star athlete

Vic Fangio

Defensive Coordinator

20th NFL Season 4th with Texans

Vic Fangio enters his fourth season as defensive coordinator for the Houston Texans and his 11th consecutive season as an NFL defensive coordinator. Fangio also coaches the team's outside linebackers.

Fangio presided over a defense that started three rookies in 2004 and faced the NFL's top five rated offenses. Nevertheless, Houston's defense set a team record with 22 interceptions (tying for fifth in the league), scored five touchdowns and finished 15th in the NFL in points allowed. The Texans also ended the season on a remarkable run, holding the opposition out of the end zone for 13 consecutive quarters from Week 13 to Week 16. That scoreless run was the NFL's best in 2004.

The future looks bright for Fangio's defense. Cornerback Dunta Robinson led all NFL rookies with six picks and rookie outside linebacker Jason Babin collected 76 tackles and four sacks. Glenn Earl moved into the starting strong safety slot as a rookie and second-year pro Antwan Peek became a sparkplug at outside linebacker.

After orchestrating one of the league's best defensive performances in 2002, Fangio maneuvered through a startling amount of attrition in 2003 as five opening day defensive starters landed on injured reserve, including two Pro Bowlers — cornerback Aaron Glenn and defensive end Gary Walker — and standout nose tackle Seth Payne.

In 2002, the Texans ranked eighth in the AFC in total defense and fourth in the conference in pass defense despite lining up for the second-most defensive series in the NFL. The Texans also ranked seventh in the league in third-down defense, eighth in red zone

defense, fourth in penalties and ninth in yards per play.

Fangio's troops helped the Texans stay competitive throughout their inaugural campaign, turning in huge performances in the team's season-opening win over Dallas and subsequent late-season upset victories over the Giants and Steelers. In the remarkable 24-6 win at Pittsburgh, Houston's defense scored all three of the team's touchdowns.

Fangio came to Houston after serving in the same capacity for the Indianapolis Colts the previous three seasons. Fangio led the defense to major improvements in all statistical categories, which helped the Colts post a 23-9 record over the 1999-2000 seasons after posting a 6-26 record the two previous campaigns. Indianapolis also won its first division championship (1999) in 15 seasons. In Fangio's first season in Indianapolis, the Colts jumped from 29th in the league to 15th in total defense. His 2000 defense racked up 42 sacks, the most for the Colts in 11 years, and ranked 15th in points allowed.

Before his stint with the Colts, Fangio orchestrated one of the league's more fear-some units for four seasons at Carolina, helping the Panthers win the NFC West title in just their second season. In 1995, the expansion Panthers tied for seventh in the NFL in total defense and ranked sixth in scoring defense, 10th in rushing defense, fifth in takeaways and second in defensive passer rating. Fangio's defense allowed just 218 points in 1996, ranking second in the NFL as Carolina posted a 12-4 mark. That unit also ranked 10th in total defense, first in third down defense, first in sacks, second in first downs allowed and fifth in takeaways. The

Panthers yielded just five touchdowns and 56 points in the second half, breaking Chicago's 1985 record of 71 points – a record that still stands. Fangio coached three All-Pro line-backers in Kevin Greene, Lamar Lathon and Sam Mills.

Fangio cut his professional coaching teeth under veteran NFL head coach Jim Mora, his head coach in Indianapolis. Mora hired Fangio as a defensive assistant for the USFL's Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars in 1984. After winning two USFL titles, Fangio followed Mora to the New Orleans Saints as outside linebackers coach for eight seasons. He spent 1994 as the Saints' linebackers coach. During his tenure in the Crescent City, Fangio helped five different linebackers - Rickey Jackson, Vaughn Johnson, Sam Mills, Pat Swilling and Renaldo Turnball - reach a combined 16 Pro Bowls. The Saints' defense cracked the league's top 10 in total defense four times and the NFL's top 10 in rushing defense six times, including a first-place finish in 1989. New Orleans advanced to the playoffs for the first time in 1987, making return trips in 1990, 1991 and 1992.

Fangio launched his coaching career in 1979 at his alma mater, Dunmore (PA) High School, coaching linebackers for one season before becoming defensive coordinator. He was defensive coordinator at Milford Academy in 1982 before moving on to the University of North Carolina, where he coached for one season. Fangio was inducted into the Northeast Chapter of the Pennsylvania Hall of Fame in 1993.

A native of Dunmore, Pa., Fangio and his wife, Patty, have a son, Christian and a daughter, Cassie. The family lives in Sugar Land.

Chris Palmer

Offensive Coordinator

16th NFL Season 5th with Texans

Chris Palmer enters his fifth season as Houston's offensive coordinator. The Texans hired the former Cleveland Browns head coach on Feb. 2, 2001.

Palmer, a 16-year NFL coaching veteran, is best known for developing quarterbacks and appears to have another rising NFL star in fourth-year quarterback David Carr, the Texans' first-ever draft selection. Palmer also boasts one of the league's best young receivers in Andre Johnson, who last season became the first Texans offensive player to earn a Pro Bowl berth.

In 2004, the Texans set club records in first

downs (300), total yards (5,128), rushing yards (1,882), passing yards (3,246), completion percentage (60.7), touchdowns (37) and points (309). Johnson set team records with 79 receptions for 1,129 yards. Carr had his best season as a pro, completing 285 of 466 passes for 3,531 yards with 16 touchdowns and 14 interceptions. Running back Domanick Davis turned in his second consecutive 1,000-yard season, amassing a team-record 1,188 yards and 13 touchdowns. The offense's steady development over three seasons is a tribute to Palmer's patience and teaching ability. In Houston's 2002 expansion season, Palmer's young offense started six rookies, making it by far the youngest unit in the league. In 2003, the Texans upped their point total by 72 and cut their sack total by 40 despite starting three different quarterbacks. Now after a breakthrough 2004 season, the triumvirate of Carr, Davis and Johnson appears poised to help the Texans become one of the NFL's most consistent and prolific offenses.

Before returning to Houston, Palmer spent two seasons as head coach of the expansion Browns, leading Cleveland to a 2-14 mark in its inaugural season and an injury-ravaged club to a 3-13 record in 2000.

Palmer spent the 1997 and 1998 seasons as the offensive coordinator on Tom Coughlin's staff in Jacksonville. He helped the Jaguars claim the AFC Central Division title in 1998 as the club approached the 400-point mark in both seasons (394 in 1997, 392 in 1998).

Palmer served as an instrumental tutor to quarterback Mark Brunell. In 1997, Brunell led the AFC with a 91.2 passer rating and made the Pro Bowl. But Palmer's influence on Jacksonville's other young signal-callers was also evident. Five Jaguars signal-callers (Brunell, Rob Johnson, Steve Matthews, Jamie Martin and Jonathan Quinn) won at least one game for Jacksonville under Palmer's guidance.

Prior to joining the Jaguars in 1997, Palmer spent four seasons on Bill Parcells' staff in New England. As the Patriots' quarterbacks coach in 1996, Palmer retooled the mechanics of Drew Bledsoe, who ended the season leading the NFL in passing attempts and completions and finishing third in passing yards and touchdowns. The Patriots

defeated Jacksonville in the AFC Championship Game to advance to the Super Bowl for the first time in 11 years and Bledsoe made his second Pro Bowl. When Palmer was the Patriots' wide receivers coach in 1994, the team set an NFL first when five different players caught more than 50 passes. Palmer's first NFL coaching experience

came with the Houston Oilers, where he was wide receivers coach from 1990-92 under Jack Pardee. During Palmer's three-year stay in Houston, the Run 'N Shoot Oilers boasted the top-ranked passing offense in the NFL. Four Oilers wide receivers - Curtis Duncan, Ernest Givins (twice), Drew Hill and Haywood Jeffires (twice) - made the Pro Bowl during Palmer's three seasons in Houston.

Palmer was the head coach at Boston University from 1988-89, installing the Run 'N Shoot offense and producing one of the country's most prolific units. He was the head coach at the University of New Haven in 1986 and 1987, where the Chargers posted consecutive 8-2 records and set more than 50 school records.

Palmer's first professional coaching experience came in 1983 when he was the offensive line coach for the Montreal Concordes in the Canadian Football League. In 1984, he coached receivers for the USFL's New Jersey Generals, and the following season he was promoted to quarterbacks coach and offensive coordinator. That year, Palmer's offense featured QBs Doug Flutie and Brian Sipe

and RB Herschel Walker, who set a professional football single-season rushing record with 2,411 yards.

Palmer launched his coaching career as an assistant at the University of Connecticut in 1972, coaching the defensive line and wide receivers. In 1975, he moved to Lehigh as the wide receivers coach. The following season he was named the offensive coordinator at Colgate, where he coached for seven years (1976-82). In 1977, the Red Raiders led the nation in offense, averaging 486 yards per game.

Palmer played quarterback for Southern Connecticut State from 1968-71 and was selected to the New Haven Gridiron Club following his senior season. He earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees at SCSU, where he was recently inducted into the school's athletic hall of fame. He is also a member of the hall of fame at the University of New Haven and Immaculate High School. A native of Brewster, N.Y., Palmer and his wife, Donna, have two children, Mark and Kristin, and one granddaughter, Annette Grace. The couple lives in Houston.



Joe Marciano

Special Teams Coordinator
20th NFL Season 4th with Texans

oe Marciano enters his fourth season as special teams coordinator for the Houston Texans. Regarded as one of the league's top coaches in his field, Marciano has directed special teams for 19 NFL seasons.

In Houston, Marciano has been reunited with Dom Capers, with whom he spent his first nine professional coaching seasons, and his brother, Tony, who serves as the team's tight ends coach.

The Texans' special teams units have been

one of the more consistent elements over their brief history. Kicker Kris Brown has connected on 52 of his 70 field goals attempts over three seasons and all 81 of his PAT attempts. Punter Chad Stanley has averaged 41.2 yards over his three seasons and has downed 91 punts inside the 20.

Last season Brown set a club record with 85 points and nailed a career-high nine touchbacks. Second-year linebacker Antwan Peek had a breakout year with 18 special

teams tackles and a blocked punt. Meanwhile, the Texans ranked seventh in the AFC in opponent average starting field position.

In 2003, Stanley led the NFL with 36 punts inside the 20 and his 36.7-yard net average ranked sixth in the league. Brown nailed 18 off 22 field goals, missing just one inside 50 yards. J.J. Moses ranked fifth in the AFC with a 23.4-yard kickoff return average. In 2002, Brown connected on 13 field goals from 40-plus yards and Stanley ranked second in the AFC in net average (36.8), leading the conference with 36 punts inside the 20. The Texans also scored two touchdowns on special teams (punt return, punt block), recovered three fumbles and yielded just 5.7 yards per punt return, leading the AFC.

Marciano arrived in Houston after spending the previous six seasons in the same capacity for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Under Marciano, the Bucs boasted one of the NFC's most consistent special teams units. Tampa Bay blocked 20 kicks, registered nine of the 10 longest punt and kickoff returns in club annals and recorded 10 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week awards during his six seasons.

Kicker Martin Gramatica posted remarkable numbers during his first three NFL seasons. Gramatica nailed 84 of 101 field goal attempts (counting playoffs) and earned a Pro Bowl berth in 2000, breaking his own club single-season records in points scored (126), field goals (28), consecutive field goals (16), 50-plus-yard field goals (5) and extra points (42). Also in 2000, Tampa Bay set a team mark and tied a league mark by blocking seven kicks (four field goals, three punts), returning two for touchdowns.

In 1999, linebacker Shelton Quarles broke a 10-year Bucs single-season record with 31 special teams tackles. Tampa Bay opponents averaged just 17.6 yards per kickoff return, which set a club record. In 1998, Marciano's charges set single-season club marks in both kickoff return average (23.7) and punt return

average (13.7). In 1997, the Bucs finished first in the NFL in opponent net punting and opponent field goal percentage.

Marciano joined the Bucs after spending the previous 10 years as the special teams coach for the New Orleans Saints. For the first nine of those campaigns, he also coached the team's tight ends. During Marciano's New Orleans tenure, he coached three special teams players who were selected for the Pro Bowl (Morten Andersen, Tyrone Hughes, Bennie Thompson).

In 1981, Marciano tutored the tight ends for Joe Paterno at Penn State. Marciano also coached tight ends at Villanova (1980) and Rhode Island (1978-79). He began his college coaching career overseeing the tight ends at East Stroudsburg University in 1977. Marciano coached at Wyoming Area High School in West Pittston, Pa., in 1976.

A native of Dunmore, Pa., Marciano was a quarterback at Temple, where he earned his bachelor's degree in health and physical education. He is an avid fisherman who has conducted various fishing tournaments and has appeared on numerous ESPN fishing shows.

In 1993, Marciano was inducted into the Northeast Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame. He is single and resides in Missouri City with his son, Joseph.



Kippy Brown

Wide Receivers Coach 13th NFL Season 4th with Texans

Kippy Brown, a 13-year NFL coaching veteran, enters his fourth season as wide receivers coach for the Houston Texans.

Brown is coaching one of the league's rising young stars in wide receiver Andre Johnson, who last season became the first Texans offensive player to earn a trip to the Pro Bowl. Johnson set club records with 79 receptions for 1,129 yards. He also tied Houston's single-season mark with six touchdown receptions. At age 24, Johnson can already boast 145 catches for 2,118 yards and 10 touchdowns.

Brown's young and talented wideout stable also includes Jabar Gaffney, who at age 23 has 116 catches for 1,517 yards and five scores. Derick Armstrong set career marks last season with 29 receptions for 415 yards. And veteran Corey Bradford has averaged 16.2 yards per catch since signing with Houston in 2002.

Before arriving in Houston, Brown served as head coach of the XFL's Memphis Maniax. Prior to his stint in Memphis, Brown spent one season with the Green Bay Packers as their running backs coach, helping perennial Pro Bowl back Ahman Green break through with his first 1,000-yard rushing campaign. Before arriving in Green Bay, Brown spent four seasons with the Miami Dolphins under Jimmy Johnson, the final two seasons as offensive coordinator. Brown arrived in Miami as the running backs coach, helping

Karim Abdul-Jabbar become the first Dolphins back to crack the 1,000-yard barrier in 18 years. The following season, Abdul-Jabbar tied for the NFL lead in rushing touchdowns with 15.

Johnson elevated Brown to offensive coordinator in 1998, where he worked with future Hall of Fame quarterback Dan Marino. The Dolphins earned a wild card berth in both of Brown's seasons calling the plays.

Brown served one season as the running backs coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1995. Prior to that, he returned to the University of Tennessee, serving two seasons as the assistant head coach and wide receivers coach. The Volunteers outscored their opponents 847-383 over those two seasons en route to an 18-6 mark. Brown helped tutor future No. 1 draft pick Peyton Manning as a freshman.

Brown's first NFL coaching stop came in New York, where he spent three seasons (1990-92) as the running backs coach for the Jets. In 1991, the Jets ranked fifth in the league in rushing and advanced to the playoffs for the first time in five seasons.

Brown's initial stint at Tennessee was as wide receivers coach from 1983-89. He helped develop such prolific Vols receivers as Anthony Miller, Tim McGee, Alvin Harper and Carl Pickens. Prior to arriving in Knoxville, Brown coached wide receivers at Louisville, including future Dolphins standout Mark Clayton.

Brown launched his coaching career at his alma mater, Memphis State, coaching running backs in 1978 and wide receivers in 1979-80. Brown was a starter for the Tigers at quarterback. He graduated from MSU in 1977 with a degree in communications. Brown prepped at Sweetwater (TN) High School, leading his charges to consecutive state titles in 1972-73.

A native of Sweetwater, Tenn., Brown and his wife, Deon, have two children, Jerome and Jennifer. The couple lives in Houston.



Chick Harris

Running Backs Coach 25th NFL Season 4th with Texans

Chick Harris enters his fourth season as running backs coach for the Houston Texans after spending the previous seven seasons in the same capacity for the Carolina Panthers. Harris can boast 25 years of NFL coaching experience.

Harris' primary current protégé, thirdyear running back Domanick Davis, has quietly established himself as one of the top young backs in the league. Davis posted his second consecutive 1,000-yard season in 2004, rushing for a career-high 1,188 yards and 13 touchdowns. Davis can already boast eight career 100-yard games. He's also a consistent threat coming out of the backfield, hauling in 115 career passes for 942 yards. In all, Davis holds 27 team records in two seasons under Harris. Backup running back Jonathan Wells posted another strong season in 2004, rushing for 299 yards and three scores. Tony Hollings, at just 23 years of age, rounds out Harris' talented trio of returning running backs. Fullback Moran Norris, who resigned with the Texans in March, has started the past two seasons.

Harris was originally hired in Charlotte by Dom Capers, who did so before the Panthers' inaugural season in 1995.

During Harris' seven-year tenure with the Panthers, injuries forced the club to suit up a bevy of running backs, from Tshimanga Biakabutuka to Richard Huntley to Brad Hoover to Fred Lane to Anthony Johnson to Derrick Moore. Harris helped Carolina set an expansion record

with seven wins in 1995, then helped the Panthers reach the NFC Championship Game the following season.

Harris joined the Panthers after spending three seasons with the Rams in Los Angeles, the last season as offensive coordinator. In 1993, Harris helped rookie running back Jerome Bettis earn NFL Co-Rookie of the Year honors after rushing for 1,429 yards and seven touchdowns.

Prior to his stint with the Rams, Harris served nine seasons as the offensive backfield coach for the Seattle Seahawks. Seattle advanced to the AFC Championship Game in Harris' initial season and made three other playoff appearances during his tenure. In 1986, Harris helped Curt Warner establish a single-season franchise record with 1,481 rushing yards.

Harris launched his NFL coaching career with the Buffalo Bills in 1981, coaching two seasons. He entered the coaching profession at Colorado State in 1970, coaching three seasons before heading to Long Beach State. After one season with the 49ers, Harris joined the Detroit Wheels of the World Football League in 1974. He then moved on to the University of Washington, where he spent six seasons, helping the Huskies to two bowl wins, including a Rose Bowl triumph over Michigan.

Harris lettered in football and track at Northern Arizona, where he is a member of the Lumberjacks' athletic hall of fame.

Born in Durham, N.C., Harris attended Long Beach (CA) Polytechnic High School. He has a son, Tyler, and a daughter, Tarana. Harris and his wife, Karen, have a daughter, Kara. The family lives in Sugar Land.

Defensive Backs Coach *4th NFL Season 4th with Texans*

Jon Hoke enters his fourth season as the Texans defensive backs coach, directing one of the league's most talented secondary units.

Hoke's troops boast a formidable mix of young talent and veteran leadership. His

defensive backs accounted for 18 of the Texans' team-record 22 interceptions in 2004. Nine of those picks resulted in returns of 20 yards or more, tying the Texans for third in the league in that category. Cornerback Dunta Robinson tied for

the lead among NFL rookies with six picks.

Veteran Marcus Coleman also made a successful transition from cornerback to free safety last season, picking off two passes and returning one a team-record 102 yards for a touchdown. Third-year cornerback Demarcus Faggins had by far his best season as the team's nickel corner, picking off three passes and returning one for a score. And Hoke also helped fourth-round pick Glenn Earl crack the starting lineup as a rookie.

Houston's pass defense has been strong in all three of its seasons. In 2003, Coleman turned in a career season, picking off a club-record seven passes, which tied him for first in the AFC. In 2002, Hoke helped Aaron Glenn make his third Pro Bowl as the Texans ranked 10th in the NFL in pass defense, yielding just 196.3 yards per game through the air. Houston's defensive backs picked off nine passes, recovered four fumbles and scored three touchdowns.

Hoke came to Houston after spending the previous three seasons as defensive coordinator at the University of Florida. Hoke replaced current University of Oklahoma head coach Bob Stoops at Florida in 1999, initially serving as defensive coordinator and secondary coach. In 2000, he added the title of assistant head coach.

Under Hoke, the Gators went to three consecutive New Year's Day bowl games (Citrus, Sugar, Orange), won the 2000 Southeastern Conference championship and finished as high as No. 3 in both national polls (2001). Hoke's ball-hawking defensive units forced 88 turnovers over three seasons.

In 2001, Florida led the SEC in total defense, scoring defense, first downs allowed, passing efficiency defense and third-down conversion defense. UF ranked ninth nationally in total defense, fifth in scoring defense, 12th in rushing defense and 13th in passing defense – the only SEC

school to rank in the top 15 in all four categories. The Gators yielded just 19 touchdowns, the fourth-fewest in the country, and only five aerial scores, tying national champion Miami for fewest nationally.

In 2000, Hoke's defense led the country with 40 turnovers. His 1999 unit ranked ninth in the nation in rushing defense and paced the conference with 43 sacks.

Hoke arrived in Gainesville after five seasons tutoring the defensive backs at Missouri. The Tigers earned bowl bids in Hoke's last two seasons, thanks in large part to a defense that forced 48 turnovers, leading to 208 points. Hoke helped Mizzou rank 22nd in the nation in scoring defense in 1998, yielding UM's fewest points in 15 years. Hoke also coached the Tigers' kick block team, which blocked 11 extra points, seven punts and five field goals in his five seasons in Columbia.

Prior to coaching at Missouri, Hoke spent four years at Kent State, coaching defensive backs all four seasons and adding the title of defensive coordinator in his final season. He coached defensive backs and special teams at San Diego State from 1987-88 and launched his coaching career in the same capacity at Bowling Green in 1983, helping the Falcons win the Mid-American Conference title with an 11-0

mark in 1985.

Hoke was a four-year letterman at Ball State (1976-79), earning All-MAC honors as a defensive back. He earned a bachelor's degree in physical education before playing in 11 games for the Chicago Bears in 1980. A native of Kettering, Ohio, Hoke and his wife, Jody, have four children — Mallory, Kyle and twins Kendall and Carly. The family lives in Sugar Land.



Mike London

Defensive Line Coach1st NFL Season 1st with Texans

Mike London enters his first season as Houston's defensive line coach after a distinguished college coaching career that spanned 17 seasons.

London inherits a veteran line that includes two-time Pro Bowler Gary Walker, standout nose tackle Seth Payne and right end Robaire Smith, who paced Houston's line with a career-high 100 tackles last season.

London spent the past four seasons as the defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator under Al Groh at Virginia, which also runs the 3-4 defense. London helped the Cavaliers win 30 games and reach three consecutive bowl games. Along the way, he tutored defensive end Chris Canty, who twice earned All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors. In three of London's four seasons, a UVa. player finished first in tackling among ACC defensive linemen.

London's impact was just as dramatic off the field as he helped the Wahoos land three consecutive top 20 recruiting classes, a first for the school.

London arrived in Charlottesville after a four-year stint as the defensive line coach at Boston College. London helped the Eagles to two bowl games and coached future NFL standout Chris Hovan. London also served as the pro scout liaison and Big East assistant coach representative, helping him land training camp internships with the Cowboys (1997), Patriots (1998) and Jets (1999-2000).

From 1994-96, London worked as outside linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator at his alma mater, the University of Richmond. He coached future pro Shawn Barber, a fourth-round draft pick of the Redskins. London coached the defensive line at William & Mary from 1990-93 after

Tony Marciano

Tight Ends Coach 7th NFL Season 4th with Texans

Tony Marciano enters his fourth season with the Houston Texans and second as tight ends coach. He spent the previous two seasons as the team's offensive line coach.

Last season, Marciano's tight ends, paced by veteran Mark Bruener, helped the Texans set club records in rushing yards (1,882), time of possession (29:59) and scoring (309 points). Running back Domanick Davis posted his second consecutive 1,000-yard season. Bruener and tight end Billy Miller also combined for 21 receptions for 230 yards.

In 2003, Marciano's line cut its sack total by more than half and helped Houston's offense establish team records in every offensive statistical category. The offensive line showed tremendous collective improvement over 2002, when the expansion Texans were forced to start two rookies and had six different starting lineups over the course of 16 games.

Marciano, whose brother, Joe, is the team's special teams coordinator, came to Houston after spending the previous four seasons as tight ends coach for the Indianapolis Colts. In his four seasons with the Colts, Marciano tutored one of the most productive tight end duos in the league in

Marcus Pollard and Ken Dilger. Pollard posted a career-high 47 receptions for 739 yards and eight touchdowns in 2001. Dilger hauled in 150 passes and scored 18 times over his four seasons under Marciano. Both players earned their first trip to the Pro Bowl in 2001.

Prior to his stint with the Colts, Marciano spent three seasons as the offensive line coach for the Canadian Football League's Calgary Stampeders, adding offensive coordinator duties for his final season. He spent the 1994 campaign as the offensive line coach for the Toronto Argonauts.

Before joining the professional coaching ranks, Marciano spent two years at Kent State as its assistant head coach/offensive line coach. He launched his college coaching career at TCU, serving as the assistant offensive line coach for two seasons, as well as the strength and conditioning coach. Marciano then coached tackle, tight ends and kickers at Southern Methodist for six seasons before serving as the offensive coordinator at Brown (1987-88) and the offensive coordinator/offensive line coach at Richmond (1989-90).

Marciano graduated from Indiana (PA) University, where he was a three-year starter on the offensive line and team captain as a senior.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Marciano and his wife, Kelly, have a son, Anthony, and a daughter, Anna. The family lives in Missouri City.



Steve Marshall

Offensive Line Coach (Tackles) 4th NFL Season 4th with Texans

Steve Marshall enters his fourth season coaching the offensive line for the Houston Texans. He held the title of assistant offensive line coach for two seasons before earning his current title last season.

In 2004, Marshall oversaw the development of second-year left tackle Seth Wand, while helping veteran Todd Wade become a stalwart presence at right tackle. The Texans' offensive line helped the team set single-season records in rushing yards (1,882), time of possession (29:59) and scoring (309 points). Running back Domanick Davis also posted his second consecutive 1,000-yard rushing season.

In 2003, Marshall's line cut its sack total by 40 and helped Houston's offense establish team records in every offensive statistical category. The offensive line showed tremendous collective improvement over 2002, when the expansion Texans were forced to start two rookies and had six different starting lineups over the course of 16 games.

Marshall came to Houston after spending the previous two years as the University of Colorado's offensive line coach. Marshall also led the Buffaloes' offensive field goal/PAT and kickoff return units on special teams.

Marshall's 2001 offensive line was a major reason the Buffaloes captured their first Big 12 Conference championship and a Fiesta Bowl berth. The Buffs ranked eighth nationally in total rushing, 20th in total offense and were second in total offense in the Big 12.

Prior to his two years in Colorado, Marshall spent two seasons as North Carolina's offensive coordinator and served as the instructor of the Tar Heels' offensive line. Although UNC's offense was beset by

injuries, he played a significant role as the team increased its scoring against six common opponents from the previous year. Before his stint in Chapel Hill, Marshall served in the same capacity for Texas A&M during the 1997 season, coaching current Texans center Steve McKinney. He came to College Station from UCLA where he tutored the Bruins offensive line for one year.

From 1993-95, Marshall led the Tennessee offensive line and spent his last year as the team's running game coordinator. He was also the running game coordinator from 1994-95. The Volunteers earned two bowl bids (Gator, Citrus), while Marshall's offensive line protected quarterback Peyton Manning and paved the way for running back James Stewart. It marked the second occasion in Marshall's 22-year collegiate coaching career that he spent time in Tennessee, the first being from 1980-81 when he served as a part-time assistant offensive line coach.

Before coaching at Tennessee, Marshall spent six seasons as the Virginia Tech offensive coordinator/offensive line coach under Frank Beamer, whom he served under in the same capacity at Murray State for two seasons prior to his stint with the Hokies. In 1984, Marshall led the offensive line and tights ends at his alma mater, the University of Louisville. Before his return to UL, Marshall coached the offensive line and kicking team at Marshall for two seasons. He launched his coaching career as the offensive line coach at Plymouth State in 1979.

Marshall has coached 194 Division I-A games as well as seven bowl games, four on New Year's Day (two Citrus, one Cotton, one Fiesta). He has also been a mentor to All-America and Outland Trophy winner

Tony Oden

Defensive Assistant/Assistant Defensive Backs
2nd NFL Season 2nd with Texans

Tony Oden enters his second season in Houston, where he serves as defensive assistant and helps Jon Hoke with the Texans' defensive backs.

Oden helped Houston's secondary pick off 18 of a team-record 22 passes in 2004. Cornerback Dunta Robinson led all NFL rookies with six picks and three-time Pro Bowler Aaron Glenn picked off five passes, giving him 11 interceptions over his three seasons in Houston. Veteran Marcus Coleman also made a successful transition from cornerback to free safety last season and third-year cornerback Demarcus Faggins had by far his best season as the team's nickel corner.

Oden came to Houston from Central Michigan University after spending the previous season as defensive backs coach at Eastern Michigan. From 2000-02, Oden coached in various capacities at East Carolina. He was originally hired as the

Pirates' wide receivers coach but switched to outside linebackers prior to the 2000 spring campaign to work with defensive coordinator Tim Rose. Oden moved over to defensive backs in 2001 and coached the safeties and served as assistant special teams coach in his last season in Greenville. The Pirates reached two bowl games during his tenure.

Prior to his stint with ECU, Oden spent two seasons in West Point, serving as Army's assistant secondary coach. He also led the junior varsity program in 1999 after serving as its defensive coordinator in 1998. In 1997, Oden coached wide receivers as a graduate assistant at Boston College. Oden's first college coaching job came at Millersville (PA), where he was an assistant secondary and special teams coach.

Although this is Oden's first full-time NFL coaching stop, he is no stranger to the

Tom Olivadotti

Linebackers Coach
21st NFL Season 2nd with Texans

Tom Olivadotti enters his second season as linebackers coach for the Texans and his 21st overall season in the NFL.

Olivadotti will tutor a revamped line-backers corps in 2005. The Texans signed unrestricted free agent Morlon Greenwood from Miami and plan to shift outside linebacker Kailee Wong inside. Last season, Olivadotti's linebackers accounted for 324 tackles and helped the Texans rank 10th in the NFL in opponent rushing average per carry (4.42).

In all, Olivadotti's teams have made the playoffs in 12 of his previous 20 seasons, highlighted by six division titles and one conference crown. Only four of those clubs have posted losing records.

Olivadotti came to Houston from New York, where he served as the Giants' line-backers coach for four seasons. Olivadotti was instrumental in the development of linebackers Mike Barrow and Dhani Jones. Barrow averaged 135 tackles per season under Olivadotti. Jones earned a starting job in 2002 and averaged 128 tackles in his two seasons as a starter.

Olivadotti's linebackers helped the Giants rank third in the NFL in scoring defense in 2002. In 2001, New York ranked eighth in the league against the run and linebacker Jessie Armstead earned his fourth consecutive Pro Bowl berth. In 2000, Olivadotti's first season with the

Giants, New York ranked fifth in total defense and second in rushing defense, propelling the Giants to the NFC title.

In the NFC Championship Game, those Giants defeated Minnesota, where Olivadotti had spent the previous four seasons coaching linebackers. One of his linebackers led the Vikings in tackles in each of those four seasons. Ed McDaniel and Dwayne Rudd combined for 318 tackles in 1999. The Vikings reached the NFC Championship Game in 1998, posting a 15-1 regular-season mark.

From 1987-95, Olivadotti served as defensive coordinator for the Miami Dolphins. In 1990, the Dolphins ranked seventh in the NFL in total defense, the first time since 1983 that Miami had cracked the top 18 in that category. In 1992, the Dolphins advanced to their first AFC Championship Game in seven years. Two years later, Olivadotti's troops led the NFL in interceptions with 23. In 1995, the Dolphins yielded just seven rushing touchdowns.

Olivadotti's first NFL coaching stop came in Cleveland, where he served as line-backers and secondary coach for two seasons. The Browns won the AFC Central in both seasons and advanced to the AFC Championship Game after a 12-4 regular season in 1986. Two Browns defensive backs — Hanford Dixon and Frank

Minnifield – earned Pro Bowl berths. Veteran linebacker Clay Matthews had made the Pro Bowl the previous season.

Olivadotti's professional coaching debut came in 1984 with the USFL's Miami Federals. He had spent the previous four seasons as defensive coordinator and line-backers coach at the University of Miami, culminating with the Hurricanes' first national championship in 1983. In those four seasons, Olivadotti coached 18 future NFL players.

Olivadotti was defensive coordinator at Boston College from 1978-79, tutoring future Pro Bowlers Fred Smerlas and Joe Nash. Olivadotti launched his collegiate coaching career at Princeton, coaching linebackers in 1976 and offensive line in 1977. He had previously headed the football program at Salesianum High School in Wilmington, Del., (winning a state title) after working as a high school assistant coach in New Jersey for five years.

Olivadotti was a four-year letterwinner at Upsala College in East Orange, New Jersey, starting at defensive back, line-backer and wide receiver. He also lettered in baseball and track. After earning a business degree from Upsala, Olivadotti played semi-pro football while coaching in the high school ranks.

Olivadotti and his wife, Karen, have two children, Kari and Kirk, son-in-law Ben,

daughter-in-law Keely and two grandchildren. Kirk played football at Purdue and coaches defense and special teams for the Washington Redskins. The couple lives in Houston.

Joe Pendry

Offensive Line Coach (Center/Guards) 19th NFL Season 2nd with Texans

Joe Pendry enters his 19th NFL season and his second in Houston, where he coaches the Texans' interior offensive linemen.

Pendry's arrival in Houston reunited him with head coach Dom Capers. Pendry served as Capers' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for three seasons in Carolina (1995-97). In all, Pendry has worked for seven NFL teams over 18 seasons, reaching the playoffs 11 times.

In 2004, Pendry's line helped the Texans set single-season records in rushing yards (1,882), time of possession (29:59) and

scoring (309 points). Running back Domanick Davis also posted his second consecutive 1,000-yard rushing season, setting team records with 1,188 yards and 13 rushing touchdowns.

Pendry arrived in Houston after assisting the Southwest Missouri State football program during the 2003 season. His last NFL stop came in Washington, where he spent the 2001 season as the Redskins' offensive line coach under Marty Schottenheimer. Pendry's troops helped the Redskins rush for 1,948 yards, including a club-record 1,432 yards by running back Stephen Davis. Left tackle Chris Samuels was selected to his first Pro Bowl in just his second NFL season.

Pendry's previous post was in Buffalo, where he served as the Bills' offensive coordinator for three seasons. In Pendry's first season, the Bills jumped from 25th to sixth in the NFL in total offense, reaching the playoffs and sending four offensive

players to the Pro Bowl. Buffalo again made the postseason in 1999, ranking 11th in the league in offense. Under Pendry, the Bills averaged 2,041 rushing yards per season, cracking the league's top 10 all three seasons.

In Charlotte, Pendry helped the Panthers set an NFL expansion record for wins in 1995 (seven) and then reach the NFC Championship Game in just their second season. Quarterback Kerry Collins played in the Pro Bowl and r first 1,000-yard rushing season in franchise history.

Pendry spent the 1993-94 seasons in Chicago after serving four seasons in Kansas City as Schottenheimer's offensive coordinator. The Chiefs made the playoffs in three of Pendry's four seasons. Pendry accompanied Schottenheimer to Kansas City from Cleveland, where he broke into the NFL as the Browns' running backs coach. Cleveland reached two AFC Championship Games and in 1985 became

the first team in NFL history to boast two 1,000-yard running backs (Earnest Byner, Kevin Mack).

Pendry, like Capers, launched his professional coaching career with the USFL's Philadelphia Stars. He served as Philadelphia's offensive coordinator in 1983 before becoming head coach of the Pittsburgh Maulers in 1984.

Pendry began his coaching career at his alma mater, West Virginia, in 1969. He later

matriculated to Kansas State (1975), back to Morgantown for the 1976-77 seasons, then coached at Pittsburgh (1978-79) and Michigan State (1980-81). Pendry was a tight end for the Mountaineers before an injury during his sophomore season ended his career.

A native of Matheny, W. Va., Pendry and his wife, Sandi, have a son, Joe, a daughter, Jill, and three grandchildren. The couple lives in Houston.



Dan Riley

Strength & Conditioning Coach 24th NFL Season 5th with Texans

Dan Riley joined the Texans as the club's first strength and conditioning coach on Feb. 1, 2001. Riley enters his 24th year as a strength coach in the National Football League.

Riley spent the previous 19 seasons in the same capacity with the Washington Redskins. He served as an integral part of three Super Bowl champions, four NFC champions and five NFC champions during his tenure.

Riley has authored four books on weight training. In addition, he wrote a physical fitness column for the *Washington Post* and also authored the "Power Line," a monthly fitness column for Coach and Athletic Director magazine. Riley now authors the "Fitness Corner" column on HoustonTexans.com.

Prior to his stint with the Redskins, Riley spent five years as the strength coach at Penn State after serving four years as the strength coach at the United States Military Academy at West Point.

Chuck Banker was hired in February 2000 as Houston's first director

of pro scouting. Banker has 24 years of NFL experience, both in player personnel/scouting and as an assistant coach.

In his current post, Banker oversees Houston's pro scouting department, which will include scouting players on the other 31 NFL teams, as well as monitoring the talent in the Canadian Football League (CFL), and the Arena Football League (AFL).

Banker came to Houston after spending the previous three years (1997-99) as the scouting coordinator for the Washington Redskins under current Texans general manager Charley Casserly. It was Casserly, then the Redskins' GM, who hired him for what was his second stint with Washington. SUMMARY

The Houston Texans fell to 0-1 after losing at home to San Diego (1-0), breaking an opening-game winning streak that dated back to 2002. RB Domanick Davis touched the ball on the Texans' first four snaps, accounting for 57 yards, including a career-long 38-yard reception. But the drive stalled and Kris Brown kicked a 37-yard FG. The Chargers answered as QB Drew Brees converted on 3rd and 7 with a pass to TE Antonio Gates. The drive ended in a 48-yard Nate Kaeding FG to tie the score 3-3. Carr found WR Andre Johnson for 12 yards and WR Jabar Gaffney for 14 yards before hitting Gaffney again to pick up a first down. The Texans were two yards out but couldn't put the ball in the end zone as Brown kicked a 20-yarder to put the score at 6-3 in Houston's favor. Houston stopped San Diego on its next possession and began to drive but Davis fumbled and Chargers SS Terence Kiel recovered at the Texans 45, San Diego RB LaDainian Tomlinson ran for eight and 32 yards and found the end zone shortly after to put the Chargers ahead 10-6. Carr went back to work and hit Johnson on a 17-yarder before RB Tony Hollings pulled in a 27-yard reception. Davis scored on the next play to give the Texans a 13-10 lead. The Texans stopped the Chargers again but Carr was picked off by FS Jerry Wilson as the first half came to a close. The Chargers got the ball to open the second half and were forced three-and-out for the first time all day. But Chargers LB Donnie Edwards tipped a pass from Carr high into the air and LB Steve Foley came down with it at the Chargers 49. Brees then found WR Reche Caldwell in the end zone for a 36-yard TD and a 17-13 lead. Carr hit Johnson for 12 yards on the ensuing possession and Wilson was called for a 15-yard personal foul, pushing the ball to the Chargers 20. Davis plunged in to the end zone from one yard out to give Houston a 20-17 lead with 4:36 at the end of the third quarter. San Diego answered with a 29-yard Kaeding FG to tie the score at 20. The Chargers got the ball back and Brees found Gates on consecutive plays for 42 yards, moving the ball to the Texans 15. A holding call pushed the ball back to the 24-yard line but Brees found WR Eric Parker in the back of the end zone for a 19-yard TD. Texans head coach Dom Capers threw the red flag but referee Bill Leavy upheld the call and the Chargers took a 27-20 lead. After a power-outage delay, the Texans got the ball back and were moving towards a game-tying TD but Davis fumbled the ball. Foley recovered to seal the Chargers' 27-20 victory as the San Diego offense ran down the clock.

Both the Texans and Lions were forced to punt the ball on their opening drives. Houston took control again but OB David Carr was sacked by Lions defensive linemen Shaun Rogers and James Hall, putting the Texans in a 3rd and 9 situation. A false start penalty pushed Houston back even further and P Chad Stanley came in to kick the ball back to Detroit, The Lions weren't able to produce any points on the ensuing drive and punted back to Houston. RB Domanick Davis fumbled the ball on the Texans' next series and Lions LB James Davis scooped it up to give Detroit possession. Houston's defense kept the Lions out of the end zone as K Jason Hanson came in to boot a 47-yard field goal. But his attempt sailed wide right and the game remained scoreless heading into the second quarter. Carr was intercepted on the next series by CB Keith Smith and Detroit's offense took over, QB Joey Harrington hit FB Cory Schlesinger for a 12-yard pickup and then connected with Schlesinger a few plays later in the corner of the end zone to give the Lions a 7-0 lead. Houston went to work to even the score as Carr hit WR Andre Johnson for 24 yards and a first down. Carr found another target in WR Jabar Gaffney for a 25-yard gain, but the offense was forced to lean on a 34yard Kris Brown field goal to put the score at 7-3. Neither team was able to put any more points on the scoreboard as the first half came to a close. Detroit received to kick off the second half and Texans CB Aaron Glenn stepped in front of a pass intended for Lions WR Tai Streets for a 23-yard return. But Houston's offense wasn't able to capitalize on the turnover as Davis turned the ball over again after a nine-yard catch. Lions RB Kevin Jones started things off with an 11-yard run before Harrington hit RB Artrose Pinner on 14- and seven-yard receptions. Harrington sealed the 71-yard drive with a 31-yard touchdown pass to WR RoyWilliams, extending Detroit's lead to 14-3 in the third quarter. Houston fired back and Carr engineered an 82-yard scoring drive on six plays. Carr hit Davis for nine yards and found TE Mark Bruener for another six. An encroachment call against Detroit gave the Texans a first down and two plays later, Carr found Johnson for a 54-yard touchdown strike to close the scoring gap |4-10. But Houston's celebration was short-lived as Lions return man Eddie Drummond rambled 99 yards into the end zone to extend the Lions' lead to 21-10. Houston fought back as Davis chipped away with six touches before Carr hit WR Corey Bradford on a 13-yarder. Carr found Bradford again on the money with a 27-yard touchdown strike. The two-point conversion to Gaffney failed and the score stood at 21-16 in favor of the Lions. The Lions answered when Harrington fired the ball to Williams in the corner of the end zone for a 14-yard score to give the Lions a 28-16 lead with under five minutes remaining in the game. The Texans' offensive efforts gave one last scoring shot but they turned the ball over on downs and the Lions offense ran the clock down to seal the 28-16 home victory.



The Texans marched into Chiefs territory on their opening possession but QB David Carr was picked off by Chiefs CB Eric Warfield in the end zone for a touchback. Chiefs WR Dante Hall gained 17 yards on a reverse and RB Priest Holmes rushed for 19 yards on his first two carries. QB Trent Green hit TE Tony Gonzalez shortly after on a 14-yard touchdown pass to give Kansas City an early 7-0 lead. Both teams went three-and-out on their next possessions. Neither team was able to score again on their next series but Kansas City was able to down a punt at the Texans 2. Carr completed his first pass to RB Domanick Davis and then connected with WR Andre Johnson on strikes of 12 and 46 yards to put Brown in field goal range. He hit his first of the day, a 28-yarder to put the score at 7-3. The Texans defense was able to stop the Chiefs offense on their next drive as NT Seth Payne made a key tackle on 4th and 2 to keep Holmes from moving the chains, Houston responded with under two minutes remaining in the half, RB Jonathan Wells rambled for 21 yards on two consecutive carries and Carr hit TE Billy Miller on 15- and 21-yard strikes. A roughing the passer penalty moved the Texans to the Chiefs 26-yard line. Houston took a delay of game penalty before Brown nailed a 49-yarder to trim the lead to a point at halftime. Hall opened the second half with a 45-vard kickoff return to the Texans 48. The Chiefs marched into the end zone in eight plays as Green hit WR Chris Horn on a six-yard scoring pass to extend the Chiefs' lead to 14-6. Houston was forced to punt on the ensuing drive and the Chiefs got back to work, marching down to the Houston 2. But CB Marcus Coleman came up with a big defensive play, picking off Green in the end zone and racing 102 yards for the longest touchdown in team history. Wells raced around the left side for a two-point conversion to tie the game at 14. Both teams exchanged punts and Kansas City began marching down field into Houston territory to start the fourth quarter. Green found Chiefs WR Johnnie Morton on 3rd and 4 for nine yards and, three plays later, dumped a pass to TE Jason Dunn to give Kansas City a 21-14 lead. Houston answered as S Jason Simmons took a direct snap in punt formation for one yard and a first down. Carr hit WR Derick Armstrong for 20 yards before lofting a long toss to Johnson, who made a spectacular juggling catch for 38 yards to the Chiefs 7, Carr found WR Jabar Gaffney two plays later on a nine-yard scoring pass to tie the score at 21. Texans LB Antwan Peek came up with a huge 10-yard sack on the Chiefs' first snap and teammate Kenny Wright sealed the drive with another 10-yard sack to force a punt with about two minutes remaining. Wells picked up a first down, and then Carr fired a bullet to Armstrong who raced 35 yards to the Chiefs 30. Brown came in to kick the 49-yard game winner, the eighth of his career, to seal the Texans' road win.

Houston lifted their record to 2-2 after defeating Oakland (2-2) 30-17 for the team's first home victory of the 2004 season and first-ever back-to-back win streak. Oakland received the ball to start the game and was forced to punt by a hungry Texans defense. Houston's offense had to punt on the ensuing possession, QB Kerry Collins hit WR Jerry Porter on a 33-yard strike but the Raiders called in Sebastian Janikowski for a 35-yard field goal attempt. Janikowski's kick spun wide right and Houston took over at their own 25. RB Jonathan Wells ran for 14 yards and QB David Carr hit WR Andre Johnson on a 15-yard strike to set up K Kris Brown's 46-yard field goal that gave Houston a 3-0 lead. Collins connected with WR Courtney Anderson for 22 yards in the air to start Oakland's next series, Janikowski was soon called in for his second field goal attempt from 50 yards out. The kick was good to tie the score at three. The Texans took over again and RB Tony Hollings picked up seven yards before Wells ran for another 12. Carr hit TE Billy Miller for another 27-yard gain but Wells fumbled on his next carry and Raiders CB Phillip Buchanon jumped on the loose ball at Houston's three-yard line, Oakland RB Tyrone Wheatley got his troops out of the danger zone on a 47-yard run, but Texans LB Jamie Sharper quickly changed the Raiders' plans. Sharper pummeled Collins, sending the ball loose at Oakland's 16, and then scooped up the loose ball and raced 16 yards into the end zone for a 10-3 Houston lead. Oakland punted on their next possession and the Texans offense made another run for the end zone. Wells ran for five yards and Carr followed with four, but Wells was pushed back one yard on 4th and 1 and Houston turned the ball over to Oakland at their own 45, RB Amos Zeroeue shed the Texans blockers for a 55-yard touchdown run on the first play of the drive to tie the score at 10. Houston fired right back. Carr hit Johnson on a 33-yarder and found WR Jabar Gaffney for 29 more aerial yards to place Houston at the one-yard line. Wells punched the ball in for the score and Houston regained a 17-10 lead. Oakland next engineered a 61yard, nine-play scoring drive capped by a three-yard Zeroeue touchdown run to tie the score at 17 at halftime. Both Houston and Oakland punted on their first possessions of the third quarter. Stanley punted 45 yards in the Texans second series and along with a penalty, placed the Raiders on their own 10. Collins advanced his unit another 16 yards before he was picked off by Texans CB Dunta Robinson, who returned the interception 25 yards to place Houston's offense at the Oakland 19. But the Texans had to settle for a 21-yard Brown field goal to take a 20-17 lead. Raiders C Adam Treu and Collins fumbled the center-to-quarterback exchange on the next series and Texans LB Jay Foreman pounced on the loose ball. Carr took over at the Oakland 30 and found Johnson soon after for a 15-vard touchdown pass to extend the Texans' lead to 27-17. Houston CB Demarcus Faggins stepped in front of Collins' pass on Oakland's next drive and the Texans' took over at their own one-yard line. Brown booted a 44-yarder shortly after to further the lead 30-17. Oakland's offense had just three minutes left but their efforts were stopped short when Robinson picked off Collins' intended throw for Porter, returning it 61 yards to seal Houston's win.

The Houston Texans dropped to 2-3 while Minnesota improved to 3-1 after winning 34-28 in overtime after the Texans rallied from a 21-0 deficit, Minnesota entered into Houston territory on their opening drive but Texans LB Jason Babin sacked QB Daunte Culpepper on 3rd and 7 to force a punt. RB Domanick Davis caught two passes for 26 yards but the Texans stalled just across midfield and punted. Vikings RB Mewelde Moore rushed for 37 yards and Culpupper hit WR Marcus Robinson for a 21-yarder to set up WR Randy Moss' one-yard TD catch that gave the Vikings a 7-0 lead. Towards the end of the first half, the Vikings again marched into the red zone. On 3rd and 7, Culpepper's intended pass for Robinson was incomplete but a pass interference call on Houston CB Demarcus Faggins put the ball first and goal at the five-yard line. Three plays later, Culpepper faked a handoff from the shotgun and fired a scoring strike to WR Nate Burleson to extend the Vikings lead to 14-0 at halftime. Houston went three-and-out to start off the third quarter and Minnesota took over at the Houston 49, Culpepper hit Moss of a 29-vard strike and Houston LB Jamie Sharper was flagged for a 15-yard late hit, placing the Vikings at the Houston 10. Two plays later, Culpepper lofted a touchdown pass to Robinson and Minnesota had a commanding 21-0 lead, Trying to play catch-up, Carr found TE Mark Bruener for a 27-yard gain and then connected with WR Jabar Gaffney for another 22. Three plays later, WR Andre Johnson reeled in an acrobatic 36-yard catch to put Houston at first and goal at the Vikings 4. Three plays later, Johnson amazed again, leaping in the air to pull in a four-yard touchdown catch to put Houston on the board 21-7. Two series later, Carr threaded a needle to WR Derick Armstrong who made a diving 35-yard catch to the Vikings 19. The Vikings reached midfield on their ensuing possession, but Houston held and got the ball back at their 21. Carr went down on the first snap and backup QB Tony Banks replaced him for one snap. Carr threw incomplete upon his return and Houston punted. On 3rd and 1 from midfield, Culpepper faked the handoff and threw deep to Moss, who was able to extend the score 28-14 on the 50-yard score, Houston went to work and Carr converted a 4th and 4 pass to Armstrong for 18 yards to the Vikings 33, Carr found Johnson on 13- and eight-yard passes before he dove to the one-yard line on a scramble. A tripping call pushed Houston back to the 11 but Carr fired a laser to Armstrong on fourth down to cut the scoring gap to 28-21, Houston's defense held the Vikings and, three plays and 24 yards later, Houston tied up the game at 28 after Carr found Johnson for his second TD of the day to tie the score at 28 and send the game into overtime. Minnesota won the coin toss and punted on the first possession. Houston punted on their ensuing drive. Minnesota fired back as Culpepper fired off a pass to Robinson who turned it into a 50-yard TD to win the game 34-28.

Houston's 20-10 win was the first-ever against Tennessee as the Texans lifted their record to 3-3 overall and 1-0 in the division. The Titans fell to 2-4. Texans RB Domanick Davis ran for two and 10 yards on Houston's opening drive, QB David Carr then found WR Corey Bradford on a 47-yard pass to set up Kris Brown's 21-yard field goal to put Houston ahead 3-0. Tennessee began the ensuing drive at their own 31, but QB Steve McNair's initial pass intended for WR Drew Bennett was intercepted by Texans CB Aaron Glenn. Four plays into Houston's drive, Carr was picked off by Titans CB Andre Woolfolk and the Titans took over. McNair advanced his unit into Houston territory but at the 38-yard line, Texans DE Robaire Smith deflected McNair's pass for WR Ben Troupe and Texans CB Dunta Robinson came up with the ball for his third interception of the season. Houston couldn't materialize the turnover into points and P Chad Stanley sent off a 47-yard punt. Houston's defense held strong and the Titans punted back to Texans return man J.J. Moses. RB Jonathan Wells ran for eight yards to start off the Texans drive and Carr found Bradford on an 18-yard connection. Titans SS Tank Williams was able to pressure Carr on the next snap, sacking him for 10 yards and sending the ball loose for teammate DE Carlos Hall to recover. The Titans offense fired back and McNair hit WR Derrick Mason for 13 yards before RB Chris Brown rambled for another 10. Two plays later, McNair connected with Bennett on a 10-yard touchdown strike to give the Titans a 7-3 advantage. Houston's offense took over and WR Jabar Gaffney stretched out to haul in an impressive 30-yard catch down the sideline, putting Houston at the Titans 41. Carr hit WR Andre Johnson on an 11-yarder and then found another receiver in Derick Armstrong, who reeled in a seven-yard pass to the Tennessee 20. Carr found Gaffney again in the corner of the end zone for the touchdown and the Texans re-gained a 10-7 lead. The Titans were able to score on their next series, calling in K Gary Anderson to boot a 40-yard field goal to tie things up at 10. Houston scored once more before the end of the first half on Brown's 50-yard field goal to give the Texans a 13-10 lead heading into the locker room. Both the Titans and Texans punted back and fourth the entire third quarter and once again to start the fourth, The Titans offense lined up again to put together a scoring drive but, Texans LB Kailee Wong stepped in front of McNair's intended pass for Antowain Smith and Houston took over at the Titans 43. But the Texans offense went three-and-out and turned the ball back over. Tennessee punted away their next offensive series and Houston went to work. Carr found Gaffney open for 22 yards, Wells ran for 13 and Johnson fought for a first down on a 13-yard catch to put Houston at the Titans 20. Johnson repeated two plays later for another 13-yarder to place Houston four yards from the goal line. Wells punched in the scoring run to extend the Texans lead 20-10 with under five minutes remaining. The Titans began their rallying drive as McNair marched his troops down to the Houston 4. But Texans FS Marcus Coleman intercepted McNair's pass intended for Mason and returned the pick 14 yards to seal Houston's third win of the season.



Houston's defense forced a three-and-out and Carr found WR Jabar Gaffney on the first play of the ensuing drive for 21 yards. Carr connected with Bradford again for another 12. Three plays later, Gaffney got free for another 16-yard catch and two plays later, on another third down, Gaffney took a reverse from Carr and sprinted to the end zone for an apparent six-yard touchdown. Jacksonville challenged and the play was reversed due to Gaffney losing control of the ball right before crossing the goal line. The Texans punted on their next possession and Jacksonville had one comeback attempt with 56 seconds remaining, But on 2nd and 10, Leftwich looked for WR Ernest Wilford and was instead picked off by Texans CB **Demarcus Faggins**, who raced 43 yards into the end zone to seal a 20-6 Texans victory.

The unit put K Kris Brown in field goal position, but Brown's 37-yard attempt sailed wide right and the Broncos took over. Houston's defense forced the Broncos three-andout on their initial drive. Houston's offense re-gained possession but punted almost as quickly. Chad Stanley sailed a 55-yard punt deep into Broncos territory, allowing RB Tony Hollings to down the ball at the one-yard line. The Broncos got to work as RB Reuben Droughns picked up carries of nine and six yards, A pass interference call against Texans CB Aaron Glenn pushed the Broncos to the Houston 48. RB Garrison Hearst added seven yards on two runs. Two plays later, OB Jake Plummer found TE Jeb Putzier on a 34-yard scoring strike to give Denver a 7-0 lead at the end of the first quarter. The Texans reached midfield on the ensuing drive but couldn't convert on 4th and 1 and Denver's offense took over. Three minutes later, K Jason Elam booted a 52-yard field goal to extend the Broncos lead to 10-0. The Texans offense sputtered and punted the ball back to the Broncos. This time, Houston's defense, carried by a nine-yard Seth Payne sack, was able to hold Denver out of the end zone and the Broncos punted. Houston LB Antwan Peek surged forward and blocked Micah Knorr's kick and Texans RB Jonathan Wells scooped up the loose ball, taking it to the one-yard line, Houston RB Domanick Davis punched in the touchdown one play later to make the score 10-7 still in favor of Denver. But the Broncos answered with Droughns picking up 20 yards on four carries. Plummer then sailed a 40-yarder to WR Ashley Lelie who ran into the end zone to give Denver a 17-7 lead with under two minutes remaining in the first half. Houston was forced to punt again and the Broncos offense engineered a 53-yard scoring drive in 53 seconds. Plummer hit Putzier for 14 yards and continued the air strike with a 15-yard completion to TE Dwayne Carswell and an 11-yarder to Lelie. Three plays later, Plummer found WR Rod Smith for a 13-yard touchdown giving Denver a commanding 24-7 lead at halftime. The Broncos' scoring unit fired again on the first drive of the second half. Plummer connected with FB Kyle Johnson for a 23-yard touchdown to put the score at 31-7. Houston punted on its next two possessions and Denver took over at the beginning of the fourth quarter. The Broncos entered into field goal range, but Elam's 46-yard field goal was nullified by a holding call on the Broncos and Houston took over. Carr aired out a 44-yarder to WR Derick Armstrong on the first play of the drive. Davis chipped in runs of two and nine yards and Carr surged forward on 4th and 1 for a first down. Two plays later, Davis punched in his second touchdown of the day. Carr's two-point conversion pass failed and the score stood at 31-13 in Denver's favor. The Texans got the ball back with under two minutes remaining in the game but couldn't convert on a final effort.

The Texans clawed back from an 18-point deficit to defeat the Titans for the second time this season, sweeping an AFC South opponent for the first time in club history. The win moved Houston to 5-6 overall and 3-1 in divisional play. The Texans' 31 points set a team record as the Titans fell to 4-7. Titans QB Steve McNair completed his first three passes and RB Antowain Smith gained 29 yards on three carries. Two plays later, McNair lofted a 12-yard scoring toss to TE Erron Kinney and the Titans had a 7-0 lead. Two plays into the Texans' first drive, QB David Carr was picked off by Titans S Scott McGarrahan. McNair found Kinney again for an 11-yard touchdown and the Texans were down 14-0, Houston RB Domanick Davis rumbled for a 27-yarder on the next drive and Carr fired an 11-yard pass to WR Corey Bradford to set Kris Brown up for a 29-yard field goal, Brown split the uprights to cut the Titans' lead to 14-3. Houston's defense forced a punt on the next drive and the Texans offense got the ball back, Carr dropped back and was buried by Titans DT Randy Starks in the end zone but the ball was placed at the one-yard line. The Titans challenged the spot and possible safety but the play was upheld. Houston eventually punted back to the Titans and the Tennessee offense rolled again, McNair found WR Derrick Mason on a 16-yarder. Two plays later, Texans CB Dunta Robinson was called for pass interference and the Titans moved to the four-yard line. McNair connected with Mason again for the touchdown to put the score at 21-3. The Texans bounced back on the next series and Carr found TE Mark Bruener for 12 yards before hitting Davis on an 11-yarder. Davis ran for another 15 to put Houston at the Tennessee 16, Texans RB Jonathan Wells caught a nine-yard pass before racing four yards into the end zone to make it 21-10 as the first half came to a close. The Texans got the ball to start the second half. Carr hit Bradford down the middle for a 17-yard gain and receptions of six yards from WR Andre Johnson and 11 yards from Davis put Houston in the red zone. Carr connected with TE Billy Miller shortly after on a 14-yard touchdown strike to cut the lead to 21-17. Houston's defense came alive and forced a Titans punt. The Texans also punted on their next try. On the ensuing Tennessee offensive drive, Texans LB DaShon Polk pounced on a loose fumble and the Texans took over at the Titans 27. Carr hit Miller for 10 yards before finding Johnson in the back of the end zone for an 11-yard score. Houston took the lead 24-21. The Titans began a comeback early into the fourth quarter but Texans LB Antwan Peek invaded the pocket, sacking McNair for a six-yard loss and sending the ball loose. Texans LB Kailee Wong pounced on the fumble. On Tennessee's next possession, Texans FS Marlon McCree came through with flying colors, intercepting McNair and racing for another 24 yards to place the Texans offense at the Tennessee 44. With under two minutes remaining in the game, Davis ran for three yards and one play later, raced through a hole and 41 yards into the end zone to seal a 31-21 Texans victory,

The Texans dropped to 5-7 on the season after a 29-7 loss at The Meadowlands to the New York Jets (9-3), The Texans turned the ball over on downs on their initial possession and the Jets were able to answer with a 41-yard Doug Brien field goal to take an early 3-0 lead. On the first play of Houston's ensuing drive, RB Domanick Davis took the handoff, broke a few tackles and raced 60 yards into the end zone. But his celebration was cut short after a holding call brought the play back to the Houston 30. RB Jonathan Wells picked up nine yards and OB David Carr followed up with a 19-yard pass to WR Andre Johnson for a first down at the Jets 42. Carr was shaken up on the play and left for one snap. Soon after, Houston was forced to punt again. RB Curtis Martin picked up 31 yards on four carries to get the Jets to the Houston 7. But the Texans defense held and Brien came in and booted a 26-yarder to extend the Jets lead to 6-0. On Houston's ensuing drive, Carr sailed a bomb to Johnson who made an acrobatic 37-yard catch to reach the Jets 25. Now within striking distance, Carr looked for WR Derick Armstrong at the back of the end zone but in the process, the Jets were called for illegal contact. In exchange for the penalty, the Texans picked up a first down and took over at the two-yard line. Davis punched in a touchdown on the next play and the Texans took a 7-6 lead. Texans CB Dunta Robinson then picked off Pennington's intended pass for Jets WR Justin McCareins, returning the theft 20 yards to the Jets 36. The Texans offense took over but Carr's initial pass was picked off by Jets CB David Barrett and the Jets regained possession. Houston's defense forced the Jets to punt as the first half came to a close. Martin picked up runs of 11, five and three yards to kick off the third quarter but the Jets punt unit took over soon after. The Texans started the drive at their own three but weren't able to advance the ball past their own six-yard line and Chad Stanley came in for his first punt of the day. Santana Moss fielded the kick and returned the ball 46 yards, nearly crossing the goal line before stepping out of bounds at the four-yard line. Two plays later, Martin ran in a four-yard touchdown to give the Jets a 13-7 lead. Houston was forced to punt on their next offensive try. Pennington hit Martin on a five-yard scoring connection to scal an 80-play drive that chewed 6:10 off the clock, Pennington's twopoint attempt to WR Wayne Chrebet was no good but the Jets extended the lead to 19-7. Carr found Johnson for completions of 14 and 10 yards to catapult him over 100 yards receiving on the day. Davis rushed for another yard, but on the next play Carr's pass, intended for TE Billy Miller, was picked off by Jets FS Erik Coleman, who added another 37 return yards to the wound. The Jets capitalized on the turnover and in five plays, the New York offense was able to take a commanding 26-7 lead off of a Pennington to TE Anthony Becht two-yard touchdown toss. The Texans were forced to punt on their next possession. The Jets were able score again on a 25-yard Brien field goal to give New York a commanding 29-7 advantage. Houston wasn't able to produce any last minute points and the Jets picked up their ninth win of the season as time ran out.

Colts QB Peyton Manning found WR Marvin Harrison shortly after for a three-yard touchdown to give Indy a 7-0 lead. Houston punted on their second try and Manning went back to work. He hit TE Marcus Pollard for 18 yards and six plays later, fired a 12-yard scoring strike to WR Reggie Wayne. The Colts had a two-touchdown lead. The Texans offense couldn't convert on its next possession and the Colts took over, Texans CB Dunta Robinson sacked Manning for 10 yards, which eventually forced the Colts to munt. Carr hit RB Domanick Davis for 16 yards before three Davis runs moved the ball to the Colts 10. On 3rd and goal, Carr found RB Jonathan Wells for a touchdown to cut the Colts lead to 14-7. On the Colts' ensuing drive, Robinson nailed Manning again, sending the ball loose. The officials ruled that since the whistle blew, there was no actual fumble recovery and Indy kept possession. The Colts punt team came out shortly after and gave the ball back to Houston. The Texans began to march into Indy territory but Carr fumbled the shotgun snap from C Steve McKinney and Colts DE Raheem Brock recovered as the first half came to a close. Colts K Mike Vanderjagt made a 30-yard field goal on the Colts' opening drive of the second half to extend their lead to 17-7. But the Texans answered on Davis' 15-yard touchdown run to cut the lead to 17-14 still in Indy's favor. The Texans defense held the Colts on their next drive and the Texans took over. Carr found WR Andre Johnson on a crossing route for 12 yards and again hit Johnson on 3rd and 10 with a 13-yard pass. But Colts DE Dwight Freeney sacked Carr for a nine-yard loss and the Texans punted. Manning and the Colts offense began to peck away. He found WR Brandon Stokley for 15 yards and then lofted a 26-yarder to Wayne. But the Colts had to settle for a 43-yard Vanderjagt field goal to give them a 20-14 advantage midway through the fourth quarter. Houston had a shot at coming back but wasn't able to put any points on the board. Indy eventually marched into field goal range and Vanderiagt sealed the Colts' win with a 44-yard field goal with 1:56 remaining. Davis finished the day with 128 yards rushing yards and 201 total yards, a new personal best, It was Davis' second 100-yard rushing game in 2004 and sixth of his career.



The Texans rode their best defensive effort of their brief history en route to a 24-5 win over the Bears at Soldier Field. Houston improved its record to 6-8, while Chicago fell to 5-9. The Texans' defense forced four turnovers and scored a defensive touchdown. Texans RB Domanick Davis rushed for 95 yards and a touchdown as Houston weathered its coldest game in team annals (12 degrees). Bears RB Thomas Jones ran eight times for 32 yards on Chicago's opening drive, But Bears QB Chad Hutchinson's next handoff to Jones ended in a furnble and Texans LB Jason Babin scooped up the loose ball for a 15-yard return. The Texans offense put K Kris Brown in field goal range but Brown's 42-yard attempt sailed wide right and the score remained tied at zero. Both teams punted on their next possession and Chicago took over at their own 48. The Bears set K Paul Edinger up for a 53-yarder, but he faked the kick and looked for DE Israel Idonije to pick up a first down. Edinger's pass was tipped by Texans LB Kailee Wong and CB Aaron Glenn nabbed the ball for a pick. Houston's offense was forced to punt on the ensuing drive and Chicago took another crack at crossing the goal line. Hutchinson hit Bears WR Desmond Clark for 14 yards but on the next play Babin and Texans S Glenn Earl blew up Bears RB Bernard Berrian for a 10-yard loss on a reverse. Edinger came in four plays later to kick a 39-yard field goal but his attempt was no good and the game remained scoreless. Texans OB David Carr found WR Jabar Gaffney for an 11-yard gain and a first down on Houston's next try, but three plays later P Chad Stanley kicked his third punt of the afternoon. The Texans defense held the Bears from scoring on their next try and Houston began marching their two-minute offense as the first half clock wound down. Carr found Texans WR Andre Johnson on 3rd and 10 for a 26-yard connection to move the chains. On the next play, Carr sailed a bomb right over Corey Bradford's shoulder for a 37-yard touchdown strike to give Houston a 7-0 lead. With seconds remaining in the first half Texans CB Dunta Robinson picked off Hutchinson to prevent the Bears from scoring before halftime. The Texans and Bears exchanged punts for much of the third quarter. With just under five minutes remaining in the third, the Bears defense pressured Carr and he was forced to throw out of the end zone. His incomplete pass was tagged as an intentional grounding penalty giving the Bears a safety. Houston's 7-2 lead was cut even closer when Edinger booted a 43-yard field goal at the beginning of the fourth quarter to put the score at 7-5 still in favor of the Texans. Houston answered swiftly. Carr bit Gaffney for a 69-yard gain enabling Brown to kick a 20-yard field goal and extend Houston's lead to 10-5. The Texans defense held Chicago to another punt and Houston's offense was able to pounce again. Carr found Gaffney for a seven-yard gain. Davis chipped in runs of five and three yards before rambling 11 yards into the end zone to give the Texans a 17-5 lead. The Bears took over with under five minutes remaining and advanced the ball to the Texans 48 before Robinson caused his second disruption of the day. Robinson flew around the edge and took Hutchinson down for a seven-yard sack and forced a fumble. Texans LB Charlie Anderson scooped up the ball and sprinted 60 yards into the end zone, sealing Houston's 24-5 win.



The Texans wrapped up their 2004 season on a sour note, falling to the Browns 22-14 at Reliant Stadium, Cleveland (4-12) snapped a nine-game losing streak and earned its first road win of the season. Browns K Phil Dawson provided 15 of his team's points with five FGs. Houston ended its third season with a 7-9 record. RB Domanick Davis rushed for 103 yards and one score, but the Texans had just 102 net passing yards as the Browns sacked QB David Carr six times. Houston punted on the opening drive and Cleveland took it from there. Browns OB Kelly Holcomb aired out a 38-yarder to WR Dennis Northcutt to help set up Dawson's 45-yard field goal to give Cleveland a 3-0 lead. The Texans answered on the ensuing drive. Davis found multiple holes in the Browns defense before WR Corey Bradford added a 15-yard reception, Davis followed with a 15-yard run to set up a Carr to RB Jonathan Wells six-yard touchdown strike to give Houston a 7-3 lead. Early in the second quarter, Dawson booted a 22-yard field goal to close the scoring gap to 7-6 still in favor of the Texans, Houston wasn't able to initiate any points on the ensuing drive and the Browns added another three to the score after a 29-yard Dawson field goal gave Cleveland a 9-7 lead. The Texans stalled on the next offensive effort as Carr was sacked for a four-yard loss by Browns DE Tyrone Rogers. The Texans punted back to Cleveland soon after with just over one minute remaining in the first half. But Holcomb's second pass of the Browns' drive was intercepted by Texans CB Demarcus Faggins. The Texans offense had one final try for the end zone before heading into the locker room, but the unit wasn't able to capitalize on the turnover and trailed 7-9 at halftime. Texans FS Jason Simmons picked off Holcomb's first pass of the Browns' opening drive to start off the second half. Houston's offense again punted and Cleveland took over determined to add to their point total. The Browns' offense chewed 7:02 in the third quarter en route to Holcomb's nine-yard touchdown pass to TE Steve Heiden, extending Cleveland's lead to 16-7. The Texans were forced to punt on their next try. The Texans defense held the Browns again and the Cleveland punt team came out for duty. But Browns CB Dyshod Carter punched the ball out of Texans return man J.J. Moses' hands, and Cleveland teammate Barry Gardner recovered. The Browns were able to notch another field goal out of the turnover when Dawson hit his fourth of the day, a 45-yarder to give the Browns a commanding 19-7 lead. The Texans punted two more times before Dawson struck again, booting a 22-yard field goal to extend the Browns' lead 22-7 with just four minutes remaining. The Texans weren't ready to throw in the towel as Carr helped engineer a nine-play, 64-yard scoring drive, Carr hit TE Billy Miller for a six-yard completion before finding WR Derick Armstrong for another six. Carr left for one play after being sacked by Browns DT Alvin McKinley. Texans backup QB Tony Banks came in for one play and completed a pass to Davis for 16 yards. Carr rejoined the offense and picked up 20 yards on a rush and, three plays later, Davis punched in a one-vard touchdown to bring the score to 22-14 still in favor of Cleveland. Texans K Kris Brown attempted an onside kick to give Houston one last scoring shot, but Cleveland recovered the ball to secure a 22-14 win in the last week of the season.







1997

June 18: The NHL bypasses Chuck Watson and Bob McNair's efforts to bring an expansion hockey club to Houston. The pair moves on to their next project - returning the NFL to Houston.

July 3: Houston Oilers owner Bud Adams gets the green light to move his team to Nashville, Tennessee. U.S. District Judge Lynn Hughes signs the final consent judgment in the lawsuit against the team after all parties involved agree to a settlement.

October 15: NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue praises the early plans of Bob McNair and Houston for an expansion franchise at the NFL Owners' Meetings.

October 17: In reaction to Tagliabue's comments, officials from the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo (HLS&R) say they will push for the building of a domed stadium that the Rodeo will share with an NFL team, as opposed to renovating the Astrodome. It marks the Rodeo's first public statement in support of McNair's efforts.

1998

March 23: The NFL expansion committee awards an expansion team to Cleveland. McNair, Harris County Judge Robert Eckels and Mayor Lee Brown meet with Tagliabue for the first time as a group at the owners' meeting held in Houston.

May 7: Los Angeles-based entertainment broker Michael Ovitz announces he will spearhead a \$750-million proposal to build a stadium in Carson, California, in an effort to bring the NFL back to L.A.

June 30: Tagliabue and NFL Stadium Committee head Jerry Richardson visit Houston to see plans for the city's retractable-roof stadium, meeting for several hours with McNair, Houston Sports Authority Jack Rains, Brown, Eckels and HLS&R president Jim Bloodworth.

September 25: The HLS&R votes unanimously to approve paying a \$1.5 million annual lease to use the proposed retractable-roof NFL stadium.

October 27: Tagliabue announces that NFL owners will have a decision on the league's newest expansion team by April.

1999

February 16: The NFL Expansion Committee meets, but does not pick a winning bidder from the three finalists. Tagliabue says the decision will come within a month.

March 16: The NFL Expansion Committee votes 29-2 to give Los Angeles until September 15 to work out a feasible stadium and ownership plan. If L.A. cannot get a plan together, the committee will then recommend Houston for the 32nd franchise.

May 25: Ovitz unveils a new plan for a 60-acre spread of parks, parking garages and a new stadium where the Los Angeles Coliseum currently sits. The plan impresses the NFL, but the league remains concerned about a lack of financial planning for the proposed project. June 3: In a two-hour meeting with Tagliabue, McNair is encouraged to step up his efforts

for an expansion team.

July 28: Los Angeles presents an exclusive negotiating agreement to the NFL but the league does not sign it, stating that it does not address the financial situation behind the New Coliseum at Exposition Park.

September 9: NFL executives tell the Houston group to be prepared to come to the owners' meetings in Atlanta on October 6.



September 28: Marvin Davis, one of the bidders for the Los Angeles franchise, bows out of the expansion race.

October 6: The National Football League owners vote 29-0 to award the 32nd NFL franchise to Houston and Bob McNair for a record amount of \$700 million.

November: McNair and Houston NFL executives start the first of 40 separate focus group sessions, which eventually total 500 individual participants. The sessions are conducted not just in Houston, but in Galveston, Austin, Beaumont, San Antonio and Corpus Christi as well. Fans are asked for their opinions on the image of Houston and its surrounding areas, the image of the NFL and the expectations for the Houston franchise.

November 24: Houston NFL debuts "transition" logo, which serves as the organization's mark until a team name is selected, and the corresponding official logo, team colors and uniform are developed. The "transition" logo is created by NFL Properties, the New York-based licensing and marketing arm of the NFL.

2000

January 19: Houston NFL hires Charley Casserly as Executive Vice President/General Manager. Casserly comes to Houston after 23 years with the Washington Redskins, the last 10 as general manager. The Redskins captured Super Bowls XVII, XXII and XXVI during his tenure in Washington.

February: The National Football League begins researching and developing computerized designs for potential logos. Additional focus groups are conducted in Houston and San Antonio.

March 2: Houston NFL announces that its team name search has been narrowed to five choices: Apollos, Bobcats, Stallions, Texans and Wildcatters. The five names were deter-

mined after several months of research conducted jointly by Houston NFL 2002 and National Football League Properties. That research included multiple focus group studies performed in both English and Spanish in not only Houston, but also in numerous surrounding markets such as San Antonio, Austin, Galveston and Beaumont. March 9: Houston NFL 2002 celebrates the official groundbreaking of the new stadium that will house the team when it begins play in 2002. The 69,500-seat state-of-the-art facility will be the world's first retractable-roof football stadium. Houston NFL 2002 will be a co-tenant of the new stadium with the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Participants in the groundbreaking agreement include. But Markets



the groundbreaking ceremony include Bob McNair, NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue, Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo President Mike Wells, Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association Commissioner Steve Hatchell, Houston Mayor Lee Brown, Harris County Judge Robert Eckels, Harris County Commissioner (Precinct 1) El Franco Lee, Harris County Sports & Convention Corporation Chairman Mike Surface and Harris County-Houston Sports Authority Chairman Billy Burge.

April: The list of five team names is shaved to three - Apollos, Stallions and Texans. Color

logo designs are presented to focus groups for feedback.

August 10: McNair and other club officials view the final proofs of the selected team logo at Giants Stadium in East Rutherford, New Jersey. NFL Properties conducts television and photo testing of the logo as well.

September 6: The NFL's 32nd franchise is officially christened the Houston Texans before thousands at a downtown rally on Texas Avenue. NFL commissioner Tagliabue introduces McNair, who then unveils his team's name, colors and logo to the crowd. The ceremony, televised live on ESPN2, includes simultaneous unveilings in Austin and San Antonio. McNair then heads to Enron Field, where he throws out the first "pitch" (actually a Texans football) to Houston Astros Owner Drayton McLane before the Astros play the Florida Marlins.

September 7: The Texans are honored by the Texas Sports Hall of Fame in Waco. Club officials present the Hall of Fame with a Texans helmet, football and other merchandise, which is placed in a display case in the football wing of the Hall of Fame.

October 26: Reliant Energy acquires the naming rights for Houston's new state-of-the-art football stadium and the sports.



entertainment and convention complex currently known as the Astrodomain Complex. Reliant Energy's 32-year agreement to acquire the naming rights for five different buildings and the complex is the most comprehensive naming rights agreement in history. Reliant Park will be a partnership of mutual support between the Harris County Sports and Convention Corporation, the Houston Texans, RodeoHouston and Reliant Energy. The facilities at Reliant Park will include Reliant Stadium, Reliant Astrodome, Reliant Arena, Reliant Hall and Reliant Center.

November 1: At its owners' meetings in Atlanta, the NFL announces that Reliant Stadium will host Super Bowl XXXVIII on February 1, 2004. Houston becomes the seventh city to host multiple Super Bowls. Rice Stadium hosted Super Bowl VIII in 1974. Jacksonville is awarded Super Bowl XXXIX and Detroit earns Super Bowl XL.

2001

January 21: The Texans introduce Dom Capers as the club's first head coach. Capers comes to Houston from Jacksonville, where he served the previous two seasons as the Jaguars' defensive coordinator. From 1995-98, Capers was the head coach of the expansion Carolina Panthers, leading the team to the NFC West title and a berth in the NFC Championship Game in 1996.

February 2: Chris Palmer is hired as the Texans' first offensive coordinator. Palmer spent the previous two seasons as head coach of the expansion Cleveland Browns.

May 22: The NFL formally unveils its realignment plan for the 2002 season at league meetings in Chicago. The league will feature eight four-team divisions. The Texans are



placed in the AFC South with Indianapolis, Jacksonville and Tennessee.

June 12: Bob McNair and Titans owner Bud Adams each donate \$100,000 to the Red Cross in an effort to aid Houston flood victims. NFL Charities matches the donation. More than 20,000 Houston-area families were displaced from their homes by raging flood waters the previous weekend.

September 25: The Texans unveil their team uniforms before a crowd of 12,000 fans in downtown Houston. Local dignitaries and numerous Texan celebrities join Bob McNair on stage for the ceremony. The Houston Texans Cheerleaders also make their debut.

November 5: The Texans hold their first player workouts, evaluating a group of defensive backs.

December 29: The Texans sign 10 players to the first contracts in club history. The team's first players are running back Michael Basnight, safety Leomont Evans, tackle Robert Hicks, defensive tackle Jason Nikolao, quarterback Mike Quinn, fullback Matt Snider, cornerback Jason Suttle, linebacker Casey Tisdale, safety Kevin Williams and tackle Jerry Wisne.

2002

January 14: The Texans hire former Indianapolis Colts defensive coordinator Vic Fangio as their first defensive coordinator.

February 18: The Texans selected T Tony Boselli, T Ryan Young, CB Aaron Glenn, DT Gary Walker, LB Jamie Sharper, WR Jermaine Lewis, CB Marcus Coleman, DT Seth Payne, G Matt Campbell, S Matt Stevens, G Jeremy McKinney, T Ryan Schau, RB Charlie Rogers, TE/LS Sean McDermott, DE Jabari Issa, WR Avion Black, QB Danny Wuerffel, LB Brian Allen and TE Johnny Huggins in the expansion draft.

March 4: The Texans execute the first trade in club history, shipping QB Danny Wuerffel to Washington in exchange for DT Jerry DeLoach.

March 6: The Texans sign their first unrestricted free agent, inking former Colts offensive

lineman Steve McKinney.

March 25: The Texans launch their off-season program at Reliant Astrodome. All 65 players report.

April 20: The Texans select Fresno State quarterback David Carr with the first overall selection of the 2002 NFL Draft. Carr flies back to Houston from New York that afternoon to sign a seven-year contract. He is the first of 12 players Houston selects over seven rounds.



April 26: The Texans open their first mini-camp with 99 players, including 25 rookies.

April 28: The Texans launch their first Texans Outreach Tour, taking players to Austin, Beaumont, College Station, Corpus Christi and Lufkin over a five-day stretch.

July 20: Ninety-seven players report for the Texans' first-ever training camp. Camp is held

at the club's training facility in Houston. The players go through conditioning drills the following day before hitting the practice field on July 22.

August 2: The Texans scrimmage the Cowboys before a crowd of 27,536 at the University of Houston's Robertson Stadium.

August 5: In their first preseason game, the Texans fall to the New York Giants 34-17 in

the annual Pro Football Hall of Fame Game in Canton, Ohio. Kris Brown kicks a 22-yard field goal for Houston's first points. TE Billy Miller and WR Sherrod Gideon follow with touchdown receptions.

August 10: The Texans record their first preseason win, defeating the New Orleans Saints 13-10 at the Louisiana Superdome.

August 24: The Texans open Reliant Stadium with a 24-3 preseason loss to the Miami Dolphins.

September 8: The Texans become



the first NFL team in 41 years to win their expansion debut, stunning the Dallas Cowboys 19-10 before 69,604 at Reliant Stadium. QB David Carr throws two touchdown passes, including a 19-yarder to TE Billy Miller for the club's first-ever touchdown. DT Seth Payne sacks Cowboys QB Quincy Carter in the end zone for a safety to clinch the victory. October 27: The Texans win on the road for the first time, defeating Jacksonville 21-19 at ALLTEL Stadium. K Kris Brown nails a 45-yard field goal with 2:11 left to provide the winning points.

December 8: Despite just 47 yards of total offense, the Texans shock eventual AFC North champion Pittsburgh 24-6 at Heinz Field. All three of Houston's touchdowns are scored by the defense – two interception returns by CB Aaron Glenn and a fumble return by CB Kenny Wright. The 47 yards mark the lowest output by a winning team in NFL history.

December 19: CB Aaron Glenn and DE Gary Walker are selected to represent the AFC in the 2003 Pro Bowl. It is the third selection for Glenn (1997, 1998) and the second for Walker (2001). The Texans tie the 1961 Vikings for the most players selected on an expansion team and become the first expansion club to be represented since the Saints in 1967, when all teams were required to have at least one player selected.

2003

February 2: CB Aaron Glenn and DE Gary Walker start for the AFC in the Pro Bowl and help their conference to a 45-20 win before 50,125 at Aloha Stadium in Honolulu.

February 13: Texans general manager Charley Casserly is named to the NFL's Competition Committee for the second time in his 25-year NFL career.

April 26: The Texans use the third overall selection of the 2003 NFL Draft to pick Miami WR Andre Johnson, who caught 22 touchdowns passes in three seasons with the Hurricanes.

September 7: The Texans become the first NFL expansion team to win two consecutive



regular season openers, stunning the heavily-favored Dolphins 21-20 in Miami. K Kris Brown hits a game-winning 35-yard FG in the final minute, one of a team-record five field goals.

September 21: The Texans, in conjunction with Siemens and the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston, open a photography exhibit entitled First Down Houston: The Birth of an NFL Franchise. The exhibit features 86 black-and-white photos taken by Robert Clark, who followed the Texans throughout their inaugural season.

September 28: QB David Carr leaps over the goal line from one yard out on the game's final play, lifting Houston to s 24-20 win over Jacksonville at Reliant Stadium. Dom Capers is named Staples NFL Coach of the Week for his decision to go for the touchdown. **Nov. 13:** After rushing for 104 yards and one touchdown in Houston's loss to Cincinnati, rookie RB Domanick Davis wins his fourth consecutive NFL Rookie of the Week honor, the first in league history to do so.

2004

January 29: RB Domanick Davis is named NFL Rookie of the Year at a press conference at the George R. Brown Convention Center. NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue is on hand to present Davis the trophy. WR Andre Johnson is another one of the five finalists.

February 1: Reliant Stadium hosts one of the most exciting Super Bowls ever as New England defeats Carolina 32-29 in Super Bowl XXXVIII. Patriots K Adam Vinatieri nails a 41-yard FG with four seconds remaining to give his team the win.

March. 4: The Texans sign three unrestricted free agents, inking former Titans DT Robaire Smith, former Dolphins T Todd Wade and re-signing G Todd Washington.

March. 31: NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue selects Bob McNair to chair a new league committee that will study revenue and costs.

April. 24: The Texans select twice in the first round of the NFL Draft for the first time in club history, using the 10th pick to select South Carolina CB Dunta Robinson and trading up to get Tennessee's first-round pick (27th overall), where Houston selected Western Michigan LB Jason Babin.

2005

February 13: WR Andre Johnson becomes the first Texans offensive player to play in the Pro Bowl, making one catch for 24 yards in the AFC's 38-27 win over the NFC.

April 21: The Texans trade their second-round pick in the 2005 draft and one of their two third-round picks to Oakland in exchange for CB Phillip Buchanon.

April. 23: After trading down from the 13th overall selection to the 16th pick, the Texans draft Florida State DT Travis Johnson.



the city of Houston has always been on the cutting edge of stadium development. Houston first introduced the Astrodome, which opened in 1965 as the world's first dome stadium. The trend continued in 2002 with the debut of Reliant Stadium.

Reliant Stadium, the first NFL stadium with a retractable roof, opened for business on Aug. 24, 2002, as the Texans hosted the Miami Dolphins in their first home preseason game. Houston's regular season debut against Dallas on Sept. 8 was televised nationally on ESPN. The Texans stunned

world's biggest sports spectacle returned to Houston for the first time in 30 years in 2004 as Reliant Stadium hosted a memorable Super Bowl XXXVIII between the New England Patriots and Carolina Panthers. The Patriots won 32-29 on Adam Vinatieri's 41-yard field goal with four seconds remaining before a record crowd of 71.525. The event also featured elaborate pregame and halftime shows featuring the likes of Aerosmith, Beyoncé, Kid Rock, Janet Jackson, P. Diddy, Nelly, Toby Keith and Willie Nelson.

Reliant Stadium has also played host to



the Cowboys before a raucous crowd, unveiling a gameday atmosphere that would become a staple throughout the Texans' inaugural campaign.

Counting preseason contests, the Texans have played to 30 consecutive sellouts and set a team record in 2004 with 565,192 fans during the regular season, an average of 70,649 per game. The Texans' largest crowd to date was 70,769 in their prime time showdown with the Green Bay Packers last November, the largest non-Super Bowl crowd in the city's history.

And speaking of the Super Bowl, the

numerous college football games, including three Houston Bowls and the 2002 Big 12 Championship Game. The stadium has also become one of the nation's leading soccer venues. The U.S. National Soccer Team hosted Mexico in May 2002 in the two teams' first match since their 2002 World Cup meeting. Earlier this year, Reliant Stadium hosted the championship matches of the Mexican League's InterLiga qualification competition.

The Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo continued to play to a packed house in 2005, boasting such acts as Alicia Keys,

Hilary Duff, Maroon 5, Brooks & Dunn and Clint Black. Reliant Stadium has also played host to The Rolling Stones, Metallica, Disney on Ice and the Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey Circus.

Ground broke on Reliant Stadium on March 9, 2000. The stadium, covering 1.9 million square feet, features 44,000 seats on the sideline. There are 8,200 club seats and 187 suites. The suites are the closest to the field in the NFL.

With the innovation of the retractable roof, Houston returned to outdoor NFL action in 2002 for the first time since Super

grass is grown on eight-foot square trays then transported to the stadium.

Reliant Stadium features an open view of the playing field from the main concourse and on the club level. The main concourse is 40-feet wide, which makes it the largest in the NFL. Each concession stand has multiple televisions enabling Texans fans to stay on top of the action.

Reliant Stadium can also boast a larger than life scoreboard. Following the trend that was started with the Astrodome scoreboard, Reliant Stadium houses two of the largest in the league. Both include out of

Bowl VIII at Rice Stadium in 1974. The roof is made of translucent Teflon-coated fiberglass fabric, and takes 10 minutes to open and close. When opening, the roof splits at the 50-yard line and docks in the end zones. The roof can withstand winds as strong as 140 miles per hour when closed and secured. The Texans have played eight of their 24 home games with the roof closed, as was Super Bowl XXXVIII.

The climate-controlled stadium also features a natural grass playing surface. The

town scores, down and distance, the game clock and a host of other traits. The video boards are the largest in the NFL.

The Texans' front office is located on the south end of the stadium, enabling the club's day-to-day operations to be under one roof. Players report to the stadium to take part in film sessions, practice, treatment and training. The 10,000-square-foot weight room is the largest in the league. The players can also take advantage of a three-lane lap pool.

Houston's working media has its own offices and library on the ground level of Reliant Stadium. Texans head coach Dom Capers conducts his weekly press conference in the media workroom. His post-game press conferences are held in one of the team's two media auditoriums on the ground level. The stadium's press box is located on the eighth level of the stadium's west side, flanking Kirby Drive.

Across the street, the Texans' training facility features three grass practice fields. One field is lit for night sessions during training camp. The Texans also have an indoor practice field outfitted

with Field Turf. The air-supported structure offers the team a seamless transition from outdoor to indoor practice in case of inclement weather. The state-of-the-art facility also doubles as the team's training camp headquarters.

The game broadcasts are simulcast on both stations with SportsRadio 610 producing pre- and post-game programs in addition to weekly player, coach and GM shows, Infinity Radio Houston sister stations Smooth Jazz 95.7, The Wave, and CNN 650 Radio News are promotional partners with the Houston Texans as well.

SR610 afternoon host Marc Vandermeer enters his fourth season as the "Voice of the Houston Texans." Vandermeer brings a solid 16 years of radio broadcasting experience to the booth. Prior to his work in Houston, Vandermeer was the voice of the University of Miami Hurricanes football and basketball teams. Joining Vandermeer in the booth to provide analysis is former Heisman Trophy winner Andre Ware. Ware, a native Houstonian, played his college football at the University of Houston before becoming a first-round draft pick of the Detroit Lions. After his football career, Ware made the jump into the broadcast booth as color commentator for the Houston Cougars. He also currently serves as an analyst for college football games on ESPN. Ware was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2004.

SportsRadio 610 talk show host John Granato handles sideline reporting during all Texans games. Granato

has worked in television and radio with a wide range of experience. He currently serves as a co-host of SportsRadio 610's morning show.

The game broadcasts will include a three-hour pregame show and a two-hour post-game show hosted by Rich Lord, Lance Zierlein Marc Vandermeer and Matt Jackson on



SportsRadio 610 (SR610 afternoon, morning and evening hosts, respectively). Weekly Texans shows produced and broadcast by SportsRadio 610 include head coach Dom Capers, general manager Charley Casserly, quarterback David Carr, center Steve McKinney and Houston Chronicle NFL writer John McClain.

Infinity signed a 10-year agreement with the Houston Texans in September 2000. This agreement gave Infinity the exclusive right to broadcast Houston Texans Football games through the 2012 season and produce numerous ancillary programs featuring the

La Tremenda 1010 AM is owned and operated by Univision Communications Inc., the premier Spanish-language media company in the United States, which currently owns and/or operates 68 radio stations in 17 of the top 25 U.S. Hispanic markets and four stations in Puerto Rico. In Houston, they also broadcast KLTN-FM (Estereo Latino 102.9 FM), KOVE-FM (KLOVE 106.5FM), KQBU-FM (Que Buena 93.3 FM), KOBT-FM (Orbita 100.7FM), KRTX-AM (Tejano 980 AM) and KPTY-FM (Party 104.9 FM).

An avid sports fan, Rolando Becerra will continue to serve as the play-by-play voice for the Texans on La Tremenda. Becerra is the only Hispanic commentator to have done play-by-play broadcasts for five major sports teams: the Houston Astros (1986-1992), the Houston Rockets (1988-1993), the Houston Oilers (1995-1997), the Houston Aeros (1999-2000) and the Texans (2002-05).

Becerra, originally from Cuba, began his radio career in Miami in 1973. He's been a Houston resident and radio constant for more

than 20 years. You can also catch him on KLAT-AM as host of the "Rolando Becerra Show," which airs Monday through Friday from 6-9 a.m. Los Houston Texans is broadcast on La Tremenda Mondays from 6-7 p.m. and Deportes Espectacular will air Saturdays from 3-5 p.m. with Becerra and Felipe Valenzuela. Becerra has been married to his wife, Jenny, for 35 years and they are parents to four children: Barbra, Jason, Jaron and Megan.

Enrique Vasquez returns to handle color commentary duties for Texans broadcasts on La Tremenda. Vasquez came back to the Houston football scene after a two-year run doing color commentary for the Dallas Cowboys, where he also did play-by-play in the late 1990s. He has also done sports broadcasting for Fox Sports, covering everything from basketball to the Olympics to Super Bowls. Some Texans fans and La Tremenda listeners may remember Vasquez as one of the Spanish broadcast voices for the Houston Oilers from 1992 to 1995. Vasquez also writes a popular weekly column for the Spanish section of HoustonTexans.com.

Medical Glossary

A-C Joint - Acromicclavicular joint; joint of the shoulder where acromion process (of the scapula) and the distal end of the clavicle meet; most shoulder separations occur at this point.

Abduct - Movement of any extremity away from the body.

Abrasion - Any injury which rubs off the surface of the skin.

Abscess - An infection which produces pus; can be the result of a blister, callus, penetrating wound or laceration.

Achilles Tendon - The tendon at the back of the heel

Abductor - Any muscle which moves a part toward the median axis of the body.

Adhesion - Abnormal adherence of collagen fibers to surrounding structures during immobilization following trauma or as a complication of surgery which restricts normal elasticity of the structures involved.

Aerobic - Exercise in which energy needed is supplied by oxygen inspired; required for sustained periods of hard work and vigorous exercise

Anabolic Steroids - Testosterone, or a steroid hormone resembling testosterone, that stimulates growth in the body as a whole,

Anaerobic - Exercise without the use of oxygen as an energy source; short bursts of vigorous exercise.

Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL) - Ligament of knee attaching to anterior tibial plateau and posterior medial aspect of femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from coming forward.

Anterior Compartment Syndrome - Condition in which swelling within the anterior compartment of the lower leg (comprising of muscles, nerves and arteries to the foot) jeopardizes the viability of the muscles and nerves within the compartment.

Anti-Inflammatory - Any agent which prevents inflammation (such as aspirin or ibuprofen).

Arteriogram - Film demonstrating arteries after injection of opaque medium (dye).

Arthrogram - X-ray technique for joints using air and/or dye injected in affected area (to show torn cartilage or rotator cuff tears)

Arthroscope - An instrument used for visualization of the interior of a joint cavity; sometimes referred to as "scope,"

Arthroscopy - Examination of the internal structures of a joint by means of surgical viewing apparatus (arthroscope) inserted into the joint,

Aspiration - The withdrawal of fluids from a body cavity by means of a suction or siphonage apparatus (syringe)

Asymptomatic - Without symptoms,

Atrophy - To shrivel or shrink from disuse, as in muscular atrophy.

Avascular Necrosis - Death of a part due to lack of circulation (can occur in the elbow from throwing).

Avulsion - A tearing away forcibly of a part of structure.

Axilla - The armpit.

Baker's Cyst - Indicates that there is trauma inside the knee joint that leads to excessive joint-fluid production; inflammation of the gastroenemius bursa, Usually produces localized swelling behind the knee.

Bennett's Fracture - Fracture dislocation of the base of the first metacarpal (or the thumb).

Biceps - Muscle on the front of the upper arm responsible for blending the elbow.

Bone scan - "Radionuclide Imaging," which is useful to demonstrate stress fracture not evident on routine x-rays.

Brachial Plexus - Network of nerves originating from the cervical vertebrae running down the arm.

Bruise - A discoloration of the skin due to an extravasation of the blood into the underlying tissues.

Burner - Common term for brachial plexus trauma in the neck, Usually results in burning or tingling sensation into the shoulder or arm when the neck is forced beyond the normal range of motion.

C.P.R. - Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation; artificial establishment of circulation of the blood and movement of air into the lungs in a pulseless, non-breathing person.

Calcaneus - The heel bone

Calf - Also know as gastrocnemius; muscle responsible for plantarflexing, or pointing the toes down the foot,

Capsule - An enclosing structure which surrounds the joint and contains ligaments which stabilize that joint

Cartilage - Smooth, slippery substance preventing two ends of bones from rubbing together and grating.

Cellulitis - Inflammation of cellular or connective tissue.

Charley Horse - A bruise to the quadriceps resulting from a direct blow to the front of the thigh, characterized by intramuscular bleeding. No other injury should be called a charley horse,

Chondral Fracture - Fracture to the chondral (cartilaginous) surfaces of bone,

Chondromalacia - A roughening of the cartilage surface, Best known for the roughening of the underside of the kneecap.

Clavicle - The collar bone,

Collagen - A substance existing in commonly injured tissues of the body, including skin, cartilage, ligaments and bone.

Concussion - Jarring injury of the brain resulting in dysfunction. Can be graded mild, moderate or severe depending on loss of consciousness, amnesia and loss of equilibrium.

Congenital - Existing before birth; to be born with.

Contusion - An injury to the muscles and tissues caused by a blow from a blunt object,

Cortisone - An anti-inflammatory medication

Costochondral - The cartilage that separates the bones within the rib cage

Cyst - Abnormal sac containing liquid or semisolid matter.

Degenerative Joint Disease - Changes in the joint surfaces as a result of repetitive trauma-

Dehydration - Loss of body water.

Deltoids - Muscles at top of arm, just below shoulder.

Disc - A flat, round-like, plate structure usually referring to cartilage between vertebrae.

Dislocation - Complete displacement of joint surfaces

Ecchymosis - Bleeding into the surface tissue below the skin, resulting in a "black and blue" effect.

Ectomy - Suffix connoting the affected part (e.g. meniscectomy, appendectomy).

Edema - Accumulation of fluid in organs and tissues of the body (swelling)

Medical Glossary

Effusion - Accumulation of fluid, or the fluid itself, in various spaces in the body. Commonly found in the knee following injury.

Electrolyte - lonized salts in blood, tissue fluids and cells including salts of sodium, potassium and chlorine.

Electrolyte Drink - Fluid for replacing electrolytes, such as Gatorade Thirst Quencher.

EMG - Electromyogram test to check nerve function.

Epicondylitis - Inflammation in the elbow due to overuse of either the flexor or extensor muscles attaching to the medial or lateral epicondyle of the humerus.

Eversion - Turning outward.

Extension - Motion of straightening a joint.

Extensor - A muscle which upon contraction results in straightening a joint,

External Rotation - Lateral movement of a joint or extremity to the outside.

Fascia - A connective tissue sheath consisting of fibrous tissue and fat which unites the skin to the underlying tissues.

Femur - Thigh bone,

Fibula - The smaller of the two bones in the lower leg, located to the outside.

Flexibility - The ability of muscle to relax and yield to stretch force.

Flexibility Exercise - A general term used to describe exercise performed by a person to passively or actively elongate soft tissues without the assistance of a therapist.

Flexion - Bending a joint, as in flexing the arm or leg

Flexor - A muscle which upon contraction flexes or bends.

Fracture - Breach in continuity of a bone. Types of fractures include simple, compound, comminuted, greenstick, encomplete, impacted, longitudinal, oblique, stress or transverse.

Gamekeeper's Thumb - Tear of the ulnar collateral ligament of the metacarpo-phangeal joint of the thumb.

Glenohumeral - The shoulder socket, containing the glenoid, the humeral head and the labrum.

Glenoid - A cavity of the scapula into which the head of the humerus fits to the form of the shoulder joint (the shoulder socket).

Groin - Junction of the thigh and abdomen.

Hamstring - Muscle running from the buttocks to behind the knee. Often injured as a result of improper conditioning or lack of muscle flexibility. Muscle responsible for flexing the knee joint.

Heat Stroke - Condition of rapidly rising internal body temperature that overwhelms the body's mechanisms for release of heat.

Heat Exhaustion - Mild form of shock caused by loss of fluid and electrolyte from the circulation because of excessive sweating when exposed to heat.

Heat Cramps - Painful muscle spasms of arms or legs causes by excessive body heat and depletion of fluids and electrolyte.

Hematoma - A tumor-like mass produced by an accumulation of coagulated blood in a cavity.

Hip Pointer - Contusion to the iliac crest.

Humerus - Bone of the upper arm.

Hyperextension - Extreme extension, or straightening, of a limb or body part,

Iliotibial Band - A thick, wide facial layer from the iliac crest to the knee joint.

Impingement Syndrome - Pinching together of the supraspinatus muscle and other soft tissue in the shoulder, which is common in throwing.

Isokinetic Exercise - A form of active resistive exercise in which the speed of movement of the limb is controlled by a pre-set rate-limiting device, such as Cybex, Biodex, etc.

Isometric (static) Contraction - A muscle contraction in which tension is developed but no mechanical work is done. There is not appreciable joint movement and the overall length of the muscle remains the same.

Isokinetic - A constant speed and consistent resistance exercise.

Isotonic (dynamic) Contraction - A concentric or eccentric muscular contraction that results in movement of a joint or body part (lifting a free weight).

Itis - Suffix connoting inflammation (e.g. tendinitis, bursitis).

Joint Mobilization - Passive traction and/or gliding movements applied to joint surfaces that maintain or restore the joint play normally allowed by the capsule, so that the normal roll-slide joint mechanic can occur as a person moves.

Lateral Collateral Ligament (LCL) - Ligament of knee attaching lateral femoral condyle to the fibula head. It provides lateral stability to the knee.

Ligament - Band of fibrous tissue that connects bone to bone or bone to cartilage and supports and strengthens joints.

Lumbosacral - Region of low back comprised of lumbar and sacral spine.

Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) - Provides highly detailed pictures of the body's interior, using highly magnetic fields, MRI does not require radiation.

Malleolus - Rounded projections on either side of the ankle joint

Medial - Pertaining to or near the middle.

Medial Collateral Ligament (MCL) - Ligament of knee attaching to medial femoral condyle to medial tibia, It provides medial stability to the knee.

Meniscus - Crescent shaped cartilage usually pertaining to the knee joint.

Meniscectomy - An intra-articular procedure at the knee by which meniscus (fibrocartilage) is removed surgically.

Metacarpals - Five long bones of hand, just below fingers

Metatarsals - Five long bones of foot, just below toes

Mobilization - Passive stretching movements performed by a therapist at a slow speed slow enough that a patient can stop the movement.

Myositis - Inflammation of a muscle,

Myositis Ossificans - Inflammation in muscle resulting in the formation of bone-like substance

Necrotic - Relating to death of a portion of tissue.

Neuritis - Inflammation of a nerve.

Orthotic - Any device applied to or around the body in the care of physical impairment or disability, commonly used to control foot mechanics,

Osteochondritis Dissecans - A piece of bone and/or cartilage loosened from its attachment after trauma and a cause of a lesion,

Osteomyelitis - An inflammatory disease of bone caused usually by infection with streptococcus or staphylococcus,

Parasthesia - Sensation of numbness or tingling, indicating nerve irritation.

Patella - The kneecap.

Patella Tendinitis - Inflammation of the patella tendon,

Pathology - Study of the nature and cause of disease.

Pectorals - Chest muscles beneath the breast, leading up to shoulder.

Peroneal - Muscles of the lateral lower leg responsible for everting the foot,

Plantar Fascia - The tight band of muscle beneath the arch of the foot,

Plica - A fold of tissue in the joint capsule and a common result of knee injury.

PNF (Proprioceptive Neuromuscular Facilitation) - An approach to the apeutic exercise based on the principles of functional human anatomy and neurophysiology.

Posterior Cruciate Ligament (PCL) - Ligament of the knee attaching to posterior tibial plateau and anterior lateral aspect of femoral condyle, It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from going backward.

Quadriceps (Quads)- The four powerful muscles in the front of the thigh, responsible for extending the knee joint

Radiography - Taking of X-rays,

Radius - Forearm bone on thumb side,

Reconstruction - Surgical rebuilding of an injured joint

Referred Pain - Pain felt in undamaged area of body away from actual injury.

Rotator cuff - Comprised of four muscles in the shoulder area; supraspinatus, infraspinatus, teres minor, and subscapularis. Often irritated by overuse,

S-C joint - Sternoclavicular joint; articulation between the sternum and the clavicle.

Sacrolliac - Relating to the juncture of the hip bone and lower part of the spine.

Scan - Injection of radioactive fluid (equal in radioactivity to about one x-ray) which may then be displayed on a computer/monitor or film (e.g., bone scan),

Scapula - The shoulder blade.

Sciatic Nerve - Largest nerve in body located in back of leg which controls most of its function.

Sciatica - Irritation of the sciatic nerve, resulting in pain or tingling running down the inside of the cap.

Sesamoid Bones - Lies within and adds strength to tendons as they cover bony surface. The most commonly known is the kneecap,

Shin splint - A catch-all syndrome describing pain either in the front of the lower leg or on the inner aspect of the leg.

Spasm - Sudden, violent, involuntary contraction of a muscle,

Spleen - Large, solid organ responsible for the normal production and destruction of blood cells.

Spondylitis - Inflammation of one or more vertebrae.

Spondylolisthesis - Forward displacement of one lumbar vertebra,

Spondylosis - Abnormal vertebrael fixation or immobility.

Sprain - A joint injury. A violent twisting, stretching, pulling or tearing of a ligament.

Stinger - Common term for brachial plexus trauma in the neck.

Strain - A muscle injury. The stretching, pulling or twisting of a muscle of a tendon.

Stress X-Ray - A continual x-ray taken when a portion of the body is stressed to its maximum to see if the ligaments are intact,

Stress Fracture - A hair-line type of break in bone caused by overuse

Stretching - Any therapeutic maneuver designed to lengthen (clongate) pathologically shortened soft-tissue structures and thereby increase range of motion.

Subluxation - Partial dislocation of a joint, Term usually implies that joint can return to normal position without formal reduction. Synoyial Fluid - Lubricating fluid for joints and tendons, produced in synovium, or inner lining of the joint.

Synovitis - Inflammation of the synovium.

Talus - The ankle bone that articulates with the tibia and fibula.

Tarsus - Arch of foot

Tendinitis - Inflammation of the tendon and/or tendon sheath, often caused by chronic overuse and/or sudden injury.

Tendon - Fibrous tissue that connects muscles to other structures

Tennis Elbow - General term for lateral elbow pain.

Tibia - Larger of the two bones in lower leg; weight-bearing bone,

Tomograph - A special type of x-ray apparatus that demonstrates the organ or tissue is a particular depth.

Trachea - The windpipe.

Trapezius - A flat triangular muscle covering the posterior surface of the neck and shoulder.

Triceps - Muscle of the posterior upper arm, opposite the biceps, that extends the elbow.

Turf Toe - Sprain of the metatarsophalangeal (MTP) joint of the great toe

Turf Burn - Abrasion resulting from contact with artificial turf in which one or more layers of skin are removed.

Ulna - One of two bones in forearm; extends from point of elbow and found on outer (little finger) side.

Ulnar Nerve - Nerve in the elbow commonly irritated from excessive throwing or repeated trauma.

Wrist - The junction between the two forearm bones (radius and ulna) and the eight wrist bones (trapezium, trapezoid, capitate, hamate, pisiform, triquetral, lunate and scaphoid).

GAME DAY COVERAGE

Credential Requests (Home Games):

Only credential requests from working media on specific assignment for a recognized news organization or sports publication will be honored credential requests. Credentials will not be issued to free-lance writers or photographers unless requested by a recognized news organization or sports publication. Season-long credentials are issued in August; game-by-game credentials must be requested before 5 p.m. on the Tuesday prior to each home game. The Texans do not credential online media outlets. All credential requests must be submitted online at http://houstontexans.com/media.

Credential Requests (Road Games):

If you are a regular member of the Houston media who wishes to cover the Texans on the road, submit request for game credentials and parking passes through Rocky Harris at rharris@houstontexans.com. All requests must be submitted no later than one game previous to a road contest. Credentials will be distributed on either Wednesday or Thursday during open locker room.

Parking:

(Game day) Parking for Texans games must be applied for online at houstontexans.com/media/credentials. The appropriate parking pass will be required for access to media parking lots on game day.

Entry on Game Day:

The media entrance at Reliant Stadium is on the west side of the stadium on the corner of Kirby and Murworth. Enter the media entrance which is located just right of the Verizon VIP gate.

Will Call:

Media will call is located on the west side of the stadium at the corner of Kirby and Murworth. The media will call gate is located just right of the Verizon VIP gate. The appropriate game credential must be presented at the media entrance for admission into the stadium. Game credentials not picked up in advance will be available on game day at the credential will-call window. Please remember to bring a valid ID. The window will open three hours prior to kickoff and bags will be checked upon entrance to the stadium.

Postgame Interviews and Locker Room Access:

Members of the media needing to conduct post game interviews will be given access to the Texans' and visiting interview rooms after the game, as well as the home and visiting locker rooms. NO STILL PHOTOGRAPHERS OR AUTOGRAPHS ARE ALLOWED IN THE TEXANS LOCKER ROOM. With six minutes remaining in the game, take the media elevator to the field level. With two minutes remaining in the fourth quarter, media members will be allowed on the field. Radio, print and television interviews (including the microphones of television reporters) of Texans players are not allowed on the field following the game. Dom Capers' post game interview session with the media will begin approximately 10 minutes following the conclusion of the game and will be held in the Texans team meeting room (white arrow). Electronic media covering the press conference are asked to use the mult-box to ease congestion at the podium. Both team locker rooms will be open to press bearing the proper credentials following the NFL-mandated 10-minute cooling-off period. The visiting head coach will be available in the visitor's interview room adjacent to the visiting locker room.

To reach either locker room from the press box, simply take the elevator to the service level and follow proper direction arrows on the ground:

Blue- Texans locker room Red- Visitors locker room

White-Texans post game press conference

Photographers:

Photographers who are credentialed on a season-long basis for sideline access will be required to wear a photo vest. 


