

Bob McNair FOUNDER, CHAIRMAN AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Robert C. McNair, a leading businessman, sportsman and philanthropist in the city of Houston for more than 50 years, is the founder, chairman and chief executive officer of the Houston Texans. McNair is perhaps best known in the business community as the founder of Cogen Technologies, which was sold in 1999. Cogen was the largest privately-owned cogeneration company in the world, with aggregate capacity of 1,400 megawatts.

McNair serves as chairman of The McNair Group, headquartered in Houston, Texas, where he oversees an investment portfolio that includes interests in three cogeneration plants in the eastern United States. McNair owns Palmetto Partners, Ltd., and RCM Financial Services, L.P., private investment entities that manage the Mc-Nairs' private and public equity investments, and is a member of the Texas Business Hall of Fame.

Committed to bringing a National Football League team to Houston, McNair formed Houston NFL Holdings in 1998. On October 6, 1999, the NFL announced that the 32nd NFL franchise had been awarded to McNair, returning football to the city of Houston in 2002. McNair's efforts brought Super Bowl XXXVIII to Reliant Stadium in 2004.

The Texans had the best season in franchise history in 2009 winning their last four games to finish with a 9-7 record. They set a franchise single-season record for victories and were a tiebreaker away from making the postseason for the first time. The Texans boasted the league's top passing offense and the highest-ranked defense in team history, and a team-record five players were selected to the Pro Bowl. With 8-8 seasons in 2007 and 2008, the Texans are one of only six AFC teams to finish .500 or better in each of the past three seasons.

McNair is actively involved in NFL affairs serving as chairman of the Investment Committee, and is a member of the Audit, Finance, Stadium and Expansion committees.

McNair is chairman emeritus of the board of directors of The Texas Bowl, Inc. which brought the inaugural Texas Bowl game to Reliant Stadium on December 28, 2006. The 2008 Texas Bowl featured the home-town favorite Rice Owls versus the Western Michigan Broncos. The Owls came away with their first bowl victory in 50 years in front of 58,880 fans. The Navy Midshipmen defeated the Missouri Tigers in 2009 and ticket sales for this game surpassed 69,000, once again breaking records in Houston's bowl historv. McNair selected DePelchin Children's Center as the charity beneficiary of the Texas Bowl in 2006. Since then, DePelchin has been awarded over \$300.000 and received over \$6.000.000 in promotional value. Annual Texas Bowl games will feature teams from the Big Twelve and the Big Ten starting in 2010.

Stonerside Stable, a major thoroughbred horse farm in Kentucky, is also among McNair's successes. A 1,947-acre thoroughbred horse farm and racing stable, Stonerside was home to more than 275 racehorses, broodmares, yearlings and weanlings. Since its inception in 1994, Stonerside has won 72 Graded Stakes races including Grade I wins in the Belmont, Breeders Cup Mile,

the Travers, the Haskell, the Hollywood Gold Cup, the Cigar Mile, the Carter, the Swaps, the Wood Memorial, the Matriarch and the Oak Leaf Stakes. Stonerside also has finished second and third in the Kentucky Derby and was the co-breeder of Fusaichi Pegasus, winner of the Derby in 2000. Stonerside also bred the 2008 winner of the Breeder's Cup Classic, Ravens Pass; and Midshipman, the winner of the 2008 Breeder's Cup Juvenile. In October 2008 McNair sold Stonerside Farm and Racing Stable.

McNair is Chairman of The Robert and Janice McNair Foundation, The Robert and Janice Mc-Nair Educational Foundation in Forest City, NC and the Houston Texans Foundation. The McNair Foundation was honored as the 2003 Outstanding Philanthropic Foundation by the Association of Fundraising Professionals, and in November 2004, the Foundation was honored by the Houston Independent School District with a Hall of Fame Award. Young Audiences of Houston awarded the Foundation its Houston Community Arts Partner Leadership Award in 2008.

The McNairs have given generously to a wide array of charitable, scientific, literary, educational and religious organizations through the Robert and Janice McNair Foundation. Major support has been given to scholarship programs at Baylor College of Medicine's MD/PhD Program, the University of South Carolina, Columbia College, Austin College, Virginia Tech and Houston Community College. Educational initiatives supported include the HISD Fine Arts Program, Project GRAD, Teach for America, Neuhaus Education Center and local charter schools. Contributions to the community include the McNair Asian Elephant Habitat at the Houston Zoo, the jogging trail at Discovery Green, Equestrian Center for the San Jacinto Girl Scouts, McNair Cub Scout Adventure World, the Computer Training Center Room for the United Way and sponsorship of community outreach programs for the Houston Symphony and Houston Grand Opera. The McNairs turned their philanthropic focus to medical research in 2007 and gave a transformational gift to Baylor College of Medicine to fund the McNair Scholars Program which will recruit top physicians/scientists in the fields of juvenile diabetes, breast and pancreatic cancer and the neurosciences. Additional McNair Scholars Programs were established at M.D. Anderson, Menninger Clinic, Texas Children's Hospital and Texas Heart Institute.



McNair is the recipient of many awards, including the Anti-Defamation League's Torch of Liberty Award, the Northwood University Outstanding Business Leader Award, the Association for Private Enterprise Education's Herman W. Lay Memorial Award, the Distinguished American Award from the Houston Chapter of the National Football Foundation, the Distinguished Citizen Award from the Rotary Club of Houston, The South Main Center Association City Builder Award, the Houston Advertising Federation Annual Trailblazer Award recognizing him for significantly enhancing the overall image of Houston both locally and glob-

ally, the Distinguished Citizen Award from the Sam Houston Area Council of the Boy Scouts of America, The Denton A. Cooley Leadership Award from the Texas Heart Institute, the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge National Award for Outstanding Patriotism, Responsible Citizenship and Community Involvement and the Fellowship of Christian Athletes President & Mrs. George H. W. Bush Community Impact Award. In June 2005. Rice University announced that the newest building on the campus, the 167,000-square-foot home of the Jesse H. Jones Graduate School of Management, had been officially named Janice and Robert McNair Hall by the Rice Board of Trustees. In January 2006, the McNairs were the recipients of the Texas Association of Partners in Education Award for the Texas Outstanding Sports Partnership. In October 2007, the Baylor College of Medicine bestowed their first Pink Ribbon Hero Award for Ambassadorship on the McNairs for their support of past Pink Ribbon Houses and for their commitment to the fight against cancer. In April 2009 the McNairs were honored at the annual KIPP Academy dinner as devoted supporters of education for inner city and underprivileged vouth. In May 2009 McNair was named Entrepreneur of the Decade by the Houston Technology Center. In November 2009 McNair was awarded the James A. Baker III Prize for Excellence in Leadership which recognizes nationally and internationally renowned leaders for their excellence in public service and civic life. In December 2009 McNair received the inaugural Rotary Lombardi Humanitarian Award. In February 2010 Janice and Bob McNair received the Encore for Excellence Award from the High School for the Visual and Performing Arts for their support of the fine arts in the Houston Independent School District. In April 2010, the McNairs received the Kezia De-Pelchin Award for their support of the DePelchin Children's Center and long history of philanthropic efforts in the Houston area. In May 2010, McNair was inducted into the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame. McNair also is a founder of the Cotswold project, a revitalization project focused on downtown Houston.

McNair is a current or past member of the Boards of Trustees of a number of institutions, including Rice University; Baylor College of Medicine; the Texas Heart Institute; Houston Grand Opera; the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston; the Greater Houston Partnership; the Greater Houston Convention and Visitors Bureau; the Free Enterprise Institute; the Sigma Chi Foundation and the Federal Reserve Banks of Dallas and Houston.

Born in Tampa, Florida, McNair has been a resident of Houston since 1960. He graduated from the University of South Carolina in Columbia in 1958 with a bachelor of science degree. In 1999, McNair received an honorary doctor of humane letters degree from the University of South Carolina. In May 2010, McNair was presented with an honorary doctor of humanities in Medicine from Baylor College of Medicine.





Cal McNair VICE CHAIRMAN

D. Cal McNair was named vice chairman of the Houston Texans in January 2008. He has been a Limited Partner of the Texans since 2001. McNair also serves as the vice chairman of Palmetto Partners, Ltd., the private equity investing arm of The McNair Group.

McNair has been actively involved with the football operations of the Texans franchise since its inception and attends NFL meetings as part of team management. He served on the search committee in the process of hiring head coach Gary Kubiak and general manager Rick Smith during the 2006 offseason.

Prior to 2001, McNair worked at Cogen Technologies for 11 years. In 1987, he was hired as one of the company's first employees. After beginning his tenure with Cogen, McNair helped to oversee the construction of several major power plants in the eastern United States, managing those assets in the areas of financial analysis and project management. McNair is a member of the board of trustees of The Robert and Janice McNair Foundation, as well as the Robert and Janice McNair Educational Foundation. He is a director and vice president of the Houston Texans Foundation, a member of the United Way's prestigious Alexis de Tocqueville Society and a current or past member of the Houston Zoo Board, the Fort Worth Zoo Board and the All Saints Episcopal School Board in Fort Worth.

McNair attended the University of Texas at Austin, where he was a four-year member of the Longhorn football team. He earned a master of business administration degree from the Rice University Jesse H. Jones Graduate School of Management.

Born in Houston, McNair attended Cypress- Fairbanks High School. He resides in Houston with his wife Hannah.





Philip Burguières VICE CHAIRMAN


Philip Burguières, one of Houston's most innovative leaders, serves as vice chairman of the Houston Texans.

Burguières also serves as chairman and CEO of EMC Holdings, an investment management company specializing in the oil service industry. Additionally, he serves as chairman emeritus of Weatherford International, an international energy company. Until 1996, Burguières was Weatherford International's chairman and chief executive officer. Prior to joining Weatherford, Burguières was Chairman, President and Chief Executive Officer of Panhandle Eastern Corporation and Cameron Iron Works, Inc. During his career in the energy industry he was named CEO of the year three times by Financial World Magazine.

Burguières is the current vice chairman of both the Menninger Clinic and the Baylor College of Medicine and serves on the Executive Committee of M. D. Anderson Cancer Center. In 2005, he received the Woodrow Wilson Corporate Citizenship Award from the Smithsonian Institute, was the 2003 recipient of the Mental Health America's William Styron Award, and in May of 2000 was awarded the Ima Hogg Award from the Mental Health America of Greater Houston. He is a Director of Bridges to Life, Catholic Charities, Mental Health America and the Texas Heart Institute.

He is on the boards of directors at FMC Technologies, Inc., and Newfield Exploration Company. He also serves as chairman of the board of directors of The J.M. Burguières Co., Ltd. (a familyowned company). He is a member of the National Petroleum Council, the World's President's Organization, is past president of the Petroleum Club of Houston, the Petroleum Equipment Suppliers Association; past chairman of the National Ocean Industries Association.

A native of Franklin, La., he graduated with a bachelor's of science degree in mechanical engineering from the University of Louisiana, where a Chair in the engineering department has been named in his honor. He was a recipient of his alma mater's Outstanding Alumni Award in 1992. He served in the U.S. Navy for four years during the Vietnam era , reaching the rank of Lieutenant. Burguières received his master's in business administration from the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Business.



Rick Smith GENERAL MANAGER

Rick Smith enters his fifth season as Texans general manager after being named to the post on June 5, 2006. After inheriting a two-win team, the Texans have accumulated 31 wins since 2006, giving him the most wins for a general manager in Texans history. The Texans have gotten better every season with Smith at the helm. Houston posted its first winning season going 9-7. Smith has built a team that has battled throughout the year as evidenced by a combined 14-6 record in the final month of the season over the last four years. That record ranks fourth in the NFL and tops among teams in the AFC South. Houston had an NFL-worst .211 winning percentage in the last month of the season before his arrival.

As general manager, Smith oversees all aspects of football operations. He works closely with the coaching and scouting staffs to build the club roster via free agency as well as overseeing the annual college draft.

Smith has assembled a front office staff that has the Texans pointed towards sustained success in the NFL. Smith has established himself as a prominent voice around the league in his four years at the helm with the Texans. He was appointed to the NFL's prestigious eight-man Competition Committee by NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell on December 5, 2008. Smith was honored with the Tank Younger Award in 2008 presented annually by the Fritz Pollard Alliance for outstanding work in an NFL front office. Smith was an original member of the General Managers Advisory Committee that provides advice and other feedback to the NFL Football Operations department on the integrity of the game, expansion of technology and other ways to improve the game.

The Texans offense ranked fourth in the NFL with a franchise-best 383.1 yards per game. Houston's offense is triggered by QB Matt Schaub, whom Smith acquired in a trade from the Atlanta Falcons before the 2007 season. Schaub finished the year leading the league with 4,770 yards which ranks sixth all time in NFL history. Schaub topped 300 passing yards nine times, which was tied for the second-most 300yard games in a season in NFL history. Schaub was selected as a Pro Bowler for the first time in his career and took home the MVP trophy throwing for 189 yards and a pair of touchdowns in an AFC win.

The Texans had a team-record five Pro Bowlers in 2009. Houston's defense sent three players DeMeco Ryans, Mario Williams and rookie Brian Cushing. Smith drafted Cushing in the first round, and the former Trojan proceeded to lead all rookies in tackles with 134. Cushing also tied for the team lead with four interceptions on his way to being named the Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year. Cushing tied SS Bernard Pollard for the team lead in interceptions. Pollard was an early-season addition the Texans defense needed. The Texans defense made strides in 2009, giving up 324.9 yards per game to rank a franchise-best 13th in the NFL.

Smith's main philosophy has been to build through the draft and supplement via free agency. Last season 13 players that the Texans signed or acquired during Smith's tenure started 10 or more games. In the final win of the season

against the Patriots, 15 of Houston's 22 starters had been with the Texans since his arrival in June 2006.

During the 2009 draft, Houston selected eight players, with four starting at least one game. In addition to Cushing's rookie success, second-round pick DE Connor Barwin led all NFL rookie defensive ends with 4.5 sacks. G Antoine Caldwell, slated to start at right guard in 2010, started in three of his 11 appearances at right guard while fourth- round CB Glover Quin started 12 games for the Texans secondary that allowed 217.9 passing yards per game.

In the 2010 draft, the Texans selected CB Kareem Jackson in the first round from Alabama. Jackson played in all 41 career games at Alabama and started 40 contests, registering 159 career tackles and helped the Crimson Tide win the national title for the first time in 17 years. In the second round Houston selected RB Ben Tate from Auburn. Tate rushed for 1,362 vards as a senior which ranked second in the SEC. In the third round, Houston selected native Houstonian DT Earl Mitchell from Arizona. A guick-footed defensive tackle, Mitchell finished with as the Wildcats defensive co-captain and an All-Pac 10 Conference secondteam selection as a senior. Throughout the rest of the draft, Smith selected four offensive players and two defensive players that will provide quality depth to the roster. Since his first draft in 2007, Smith has taken 14 players between the fourth and seventh round. Between those players, they have started 81 games for the Texans with 2007's seventh round pick Zac Diles starting the most at 20 games.

In his former role with the Broncos, Smith was responsible for evaluating players from around the NFL as well as those in NFL Europe, the Canadian Football League, the Arena Football League and other professional leagues. He also played a central role in the club's preparation for the college draft and was one of the Broncos' primary negotiators for player contracts.

With Smith heading the pro personnel department, the Broncos posted the league's fifth-best regular-season record from 2000-05, going 61-35 (.635). The 61 wins were the most of any AFC West team over that span, 10 more than the next closest team, Kansas City. Not surprisingly, Denver was one of only four teams in the NFL to reach the playoffs each season from 2003-05.

Before moving into the front office, Smith spent four years as the Broncos' assistant defensive backs coach and earned two Super Bowl rings while helping guide a unit that consistently ranked as one of the league's best. The team won more games from 1996-98 (46) than any club during that three-year period.

Smith joined the Broncos on April 3, 1996, following a two-year stint as defensive backs coach at his alma mater, Purdue University. He left Purdue in February to accept a coaching position at TCU, but spent just one month at the school before being hired by the Broncos.

A 1992 graduate of Purdue, Smith began his coaching career as a graduate assistant with the Boilermakers shortly after his graduation, serving as the school's assistant strength and conditioning coordinator as a grad assistant. After serving as the team's tight ends coach for one season, Smith was hired as the secondary coach, becoming the youngest position coach in the Big Ten Conference at the time at the age of 24.

Smith was a starter at strong safety and defensive captain for Purdue as a senior in 1991. A native of Petersburg, Va., he attended Meadowdale High School in Dayton, Ohio. Smith also is a member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Smith and his wife, Tiffany, live in Houston with sons Robert LaMar, Christian LaMar and daughter Avery Jordan.



Jamey Rootes PRESIDENT

Jamey Rootes serves as president of the Houston Texans and is responsible for all business functions of the club.

Since joining the Texans, Rootes has overseen the team's efforts to secure stadium naming rights and sponsorship, coordinated radio and TV broadcasting relationships, engineered the club's successful ticket and suite sales campaigns, led the creation and launch of the team's identity, and developed the team's highly-acclaimed customer service strategy.

Under Rootes' leadership the Texans have earned many distinctions, including the American Marketing Association's "Crystal Award" for the best overall marketing campaign. J.D. Power & Associates recognized the team for providing the best fan experience in the NFL and even featured the Texans as a service success story in their book entitled Satisfaction. Also, the Texans were recognized with Sports Business Journal's PRISM Award, which is given annually to the top major league professional sports team based on business excellence criteria. In 2003, the Texans were also named by Sports Business Journal as the best sports start-up over a five-year period. In 2009, the Texans extended their sell-out streak to 80 consecutive home games, a Houston NFL record and a testament to the quality of service and entertainment provided by the organization on gameday. As a result, the Texans have consistently been recognized as one of the most valuable professional sports franchises both in the NFL and globally, as measured by a variety of business publications.

Rootes was selected twice by Sports Business Journal as a member of their distinguished "Forty Under 40" list of leading sports executives. Rootes maintains an active role in the community and serves on a number of boards, including the Greater Houston Partnership, the United Way of Greater Houston, the Houston Food Bank, the Greater Houston Convention and Visitors Bureau and the Boys and Girls Clubs of Greater Houston.

Prior to joining the Houston Texans, Rootes helped to launch Major League Soccer as president and general manager of the Columbus Crew. During his tenure, the Crew was consistently among the league's strongest teams both on and off the field, and Rootes was recognized as Executive of the Year in 1996 and Marketing Executive of the Year in 1999. Rootes helped lead the construction of Crew Stadium in 1999, which was the first stadium of its type in America. This facility earned distinction as America's Foremost Sports Facility of the Year and led to the development of numerous soccer-specific stadiums across the United States over the past decade.

A native of Stone Mountain, Ga., Rootes attended Clemson University and was a member of the Tigers' soccer team that captured two NCAA titles and served as Student Body President. While earning an MBA at Indiana University, he served as an assistant soccer coach for the Hoosiers. Rootes previously held positions at IBM and Procter & Gamble before entering sports. Rootes lives in West University with his wife, Melissa, and their children, Christopher and Caroline.



Scott Schwinger SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, TREASURER AND CHIEF FI-NANCIAL OFFICER

Scott Schwinger serves as President of the Mc-Nair Group and as Chief Financial Officer for the Texans. He was promoted to his current position in May 2001.

For the past 15 years, Schwinger has held positions with various companies owned, directly or indirectly, by Robert C. McNair including president of Palmetto Partners Ltd. and RCM Financial Services, L.P. In April 2010, he was named the CEO of Palmeto Partners Ltd. In his role as president of RCM Management Services L.P., he oversees the investment and management activities for the McNair Group of companies which include portfolios of public and private equities and certain operating companies. He is vice president for Cogen Technologies, an independent power company. Schwinger also serves as managing director of EMC Holdings, L.L.C., a private energy investment fund.

Schwinger oversees a staff of more than 30 and is responsible for the financial reporting, budgeting, cash management, risk management, management information systems and all debt and equity financings of the Texans and the other McNair Group companies. He provided the financial analysis support beginning in 1998 to bring professional football back to Houston. Schwinger also served on the Houston Super Bowl XXXVIII Host Committee, Inc. In addition, he provides strategic and investment management oversight, venture capital due diligence, and negotiates deal structuring for all McNair Group companies.

Since the award of the team in 1999, Schwinger

has successfully coordinated and structured debt financings totaling \$675 million, one of the largest and most successful series of financings to date for a professional sports team.

Schwinger received a Bachelor of Arts in mathematics from Vanderbilt University and a Master's of Business Administration from the University of Texas at Austin. In the community, he serves on the boards of the YES Prep Public Schools, The Make-A-Wish Foundation and The Endowment Fund. He and his wife, Becca, both native Houstonians, are the parents of sons, Corbin and Charley and daughter, Cara.





Suzie Thomas SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, GENERAL COUNSEL AND CHIEF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER

Suzie Thomas joined the Houston Texans and the McNair Group in March 2000. She oversees the legal, human resources and business administration functions for both groups and holds positions with various other entities in The McNair Group.

Thomas previously served as general counsel and vice president of Human Resources of Corporate Brand Foods America, Inc., a meat processing business that was subsequently purchased by Tyson Foods. Prior to CBFA, Thomas spent 16 years at Weatherford International, Inc., an international energy service and manufacturing company, the last 12 years as senior vice president and general counsel. She started her legal career as an associate attorney at Baker Botts L.L.P. in Houston.

Thomas earned her law degree from the University of Houston's Bates College of Law and her undergraduate degree in Spanish from the University of Texas. Thomas is a member of the State Bar of Texas, where she served as Chair of the Corporate Counsel Section from 1994-95. Thomas also serves as a director and executive committee member of and general counsel to Child Advocates, Inc. Thomas received the 2004 University of Houston Law Center's Corporate Sector Award and the 2005 Houston Business Journal Award for Best General Counsel with a staff of two to ten.

Ms. Thomas resides in Houston.





Marilan Logan VICE PRESIDENT AND CONTROLLER

Marilan Logan joined the Texans as the team's controller in February 2000 and was promoted to vice president in April 2007. She is responsible for maintaining the team's financial records.

Logan came to the Texans after serving as controller/treasurer for the Houston Aeros Hockey Club, Aerodromes Ice Rinks, and Houston Aeros Foundation for two seasons.

Prior to joining the Houston Aeros, Logan was the controller for the Houston Oilers (now Tennessee Titans) from 1978-97. Her responsibilities included accounting for player contracts, maintaining the club's financial records, and aiding club management with special projects. Prior to the Oilers, she was a cost accounting specialist for Reed Tool Company.

Marilan and her husband, Rick, have a daughter, Sandy, two sons Jeff and Roy, and two grandsons Kyle and Todd. The couple resides in Humble.





Chris Olsen VICE PRESIDENT, FOOTBALL ADMINISTRATION

Chris Olsen enters his fourth season with the Texans and first as the team's vice president of football administration. He spent 13 years working at the NFL league office in New York. Olsen's primary responsibility with the Texans is to work closely with general manager Rick Smith on negotiating player contracts and managing the salary cap.

Olsen served as the manager of labor operations with the NFL Management Council from 1999-2006. He was responsible for reviewing and analyzing player contracts to ensure teams were in compliance with the Collective Bargaining Agreement (CBA) and salary cap. He provided assistance to club executives pertaining to player-related areas of the CBA. He also served as a League liaison to the NFL Players Association regarding player contract matters. In addition, he served as a national game representative and as an instant replay communicator.

He began his tenure with the NFL in 1994 as an analyst in the player personnel department. He was promoted to coordinator in 1998 and became responsible for all facets of the player petition process on special eligibility for the NFL Draft (underclassman prospects) including coordinating player evaluations for the College Advisory Committee. He produced annual reports for the Competition Committee and reviewed player contracts to ensure their compliance with the NFL's Constitution and By-Laws.

Olsen began working in professional sports during his senior year in college with the Springfield Indians Hockey Club of the AHL in 1989-90 where he served as a public relations/marketing intern. After spending a brief time working for Ark-Asset Management Company, a financial services firm in New York City, he continued his sports career in 1992 while in graduate school by serving as a public relations/marketing intern for the Hartford Whalers of the NHL. Prior to joining the NFL, he worked for the New Jersey State Golf Association.

Olsen is a native of Little Silver, N.J. He received his degree in Business Administration from Western New England College in 1990. He earned a Master's Degree in Sports Management from Springfield College in 1997. Olsen and his wife, Kim, reside in Houston.





Lloyd Richards VICE PRESIDENT, FOOTBALL OPERATIONS

Lloyd Richards, Jr. enters his eighth season in the NFL and his fourth with the Texans. Richards was named vice president of football operations in June 2010. He oversees team travel, training camp and game day operations which include all aspects dealing directly on the field with the game or the Texans and the visiting team.

On game day, he is responsible for overseeing the sideline communication equipment as well as instant replay equipment. He serves as the team liaison with the NFL, the officials and the visiting team; he also handles catering in all Texan areas.

Richards oversees the team practice facility and Texans areas in Reliant Stadium, including scheduling, cleaning and maintenance. He is responsible for maintaining the day-to-day football operations budget as well as planning for future large expenditures and projects.

Richards began his NFL career with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1998 as a pro scouting assistant. He was named the Bucs' West Coast college scout in 2000. He worked with the Washington Redskins in 2001 as the assistant director of pro personnel.

Richards, a 1995 graduate from the University of Illinois, moved back to Champaign in 2002 as the director of football operations. He completed his masters in organizational communications from Illinois in the summer of 2003. He was promoted to assistant athletic director for football operations 2005. Richards resides in Pearland with his daughter, Jasmin, and son, Lloyd III.





Ryan Reichert VICE PRESIDENT, SECURITY

Ryan Reichert joined the Texans as director of security on October 7, 1999, one day after the NFL awarded its 32nd franchise to Houston. He was promoted to vice president of security in January 2008.

Reichert serves as a liaison between the Texans and federal, state and local law enforcement agencies. He is responsible for draft day preparations by conducting personal interviews and background checks of all draft eligible collegiate athletes entering the NFL draft. He is also responsible for overseeing the personal security of Texans players and their families and security aspects related to team events, player appearances, and team travel.

Reichert a former Houston police officer, served nearly 10 years with the department before assuming his current post with the Texans. During his tenure with the Houston Police Department, he was assigned to the Westside Command Substation as a patrolman and finished his career with the department's community service division, where he was responsible for the development and implementation of various community involvement initiatives, as well as serving the police department as a public speaker.

Reichert is an alumnus of several Texas universities. He graduated from Angelo State University, located in San Angelo, Texas with a bachelor's degree in sociology and a minor in criminal justice. He received his master's degree in Criminology from the University of Houston-Clear Lake, and earned his MBA from Rice University.

Reichert hails from Jourdanton, Texas, just south of San Antonio.





John Schriever VICE PRESIDENT, TICKETING AND EVENT MANAGEMENT

John Schriever is entering his eleventh year with the Texans and his 26th in the professional sports industry. During his career, Schriever has been part of the sales and service of more than 35 million tickets to sporting events. He started with the Texans in July 2000 as Director of Ticket Operations and was promoted to Vice President in July 2003. Schriever oversees all aspects of ticketing and event services for the Texans and Lone Star Sports and Entertainment.

Schriever began his sports business career with the Texas Rangers Baseball Club in 1984 as a season ticket sales intern. He became a fulltime staff member in the spring of 1985 and eventually was promoted to director of ticket operations before the 1989 season. During his 12 seasons with the Rangers, the team was purchased by an ownership group headed by George W. Bush, acquired pitcher Nolan Ryan, closed Arlington Stadium, opened The Ballpark in Arlington and hosted the 1995 Major League Baseball All-Star Game.

During the summer of 1996, Schriever worked with the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games at the Summer Olympics. He worked in ticketing as a customer service manager at Fulton County Stadium and Olympic Stadium.

Following the Olympic Games, Schriever took the position of director of tickets for Texas Motor Speedway in Ft. Worth. He was part of the management staff that opened the Speedway in the spring of 1997. The speedway debuted that year with a crowd of over 200,000 for its inaugural Winston Cup race.

Schriever is a graduate of Stephen F. Austin State University where he earned a degree in business management. John and his wife, Dana, who holds a degree in teaching from the University of Texas, have two children, Nicholas and Sarah.





Greg Watson VICE PRESIDENT, FINANCE

Greg Watson joined The McNair Group and the Houston Texans in November 1999 after working as an international finance associate in the energy industry. In his current position as vice president of finance, Watson is involved in all aspects of the team's debt and equity financing activities, long range financial forecasting and special project analyses.

His other responsibilities include financial analysis, due diligence and deal structuring for The McNair Group private equity investments. Watson received his Bachelor of Arts in political science from Vanderbilt University and his MBA with a focus on finance and entrepreneurship from The University of Texas. He and his wife, Cathy, both native Houstonians, live in Houston with their children, Claire, William and Gardner.



Gary KUBIAK HEAD COACH 5TH YEAR WITH TEXANS - 17TH YEAR IN NFL

TEXANS COACHES

Gary Kubiak returned to his hometown of Houston on January 26, 2006, becoming the second head coach in the history of the Houston Texans.

Kubiak is the winningest head coach in Texans history with 31 career victories in four years, including the three best seasons in team history over the last three years. One of Kubiak's primary goals upon arriving in Houston was to create a home field advantage at Reliant Stadium, and he has made great strides in that direction. The Texans have posted a 20-12 home record since 2006.

Kubiak guided the Texans to a 9-7 record in 2009, highlighted by a season-ending four-game win streak to capture the franchise's first winning season. Houston narrowly missed its first-ever playoff berth, losing a tie-breaker for the final spot on the last day of the season. The 2009 Texans set franchise records for total offense, scoring offense, total defense and scoring defense. A franchise-record five players earned trips to the Pro Bowl, led by Pro Bowl MVP Matt Schaub.

The 2008 Texans matched their record from the year before, going 8-8 for a second straight year despite an 0-4 start in the aftermath of Hurricane Ike, which devastated much of Houston and southeast Texas. Houston became just the tenth team in NFL history to start a year 0-4 and finish with at or above .500. Houston was one of 11 teams to go 8-4 or better over the last 12 games; and nine of those teams were in the playoffs. The offense enjoyed its most productive season, ranking third in the NFL and setting a franchise record with 6,113 total yards.

Year two for Kubiak saw the team achieve the best record in franchise history, finishing 8-8. The Texans won three of their last four and

five of their last seven to finish the season at .500. Closing the season strong has become a hallmark of Kubiak's teams. In two seasons in Houston, the Texans are a combined 6-4 in the month of December. Another point of emphasis under Kubiak has been developing a true home field advantage, and the team is well on its way to accomplishing that mission. After going 4-4 at Reliant Stadium in 2006, which was the best home mark at the time, Kubiak's troops posted a 6-2 mark at home last year.

In his rookie season, he tripled the team's win total of the previous year, guiding the club to a 6-10 record. The six victories included wins in three of the last five games of the season and the franchise's first ever win over Indianapolis. Six wins were the second-most in franchise history. All six wins came versus AFC opponents, giving the Texans their most wins over conference foes in team annals.

Kubiak came to Houston with the reputation of being an offensive mastermind and he has lived up to that billing in his first two years with the team. In 64 games under Kubiak, Houston has averaged 344.4 yards per game compared to an average of 266.5 yards per game from 2002-05. The scoring average under Kubiak has also risen nearly six points versus prior to his arrival.

The most dramatic improvement has been made by the offensive line. After giving up a leagueworst 68 sacks in 2005, the line has allowed an average of 30.5 per season under Kubiak. This has allowed the passing game to flourish, averaging nearly 80 yards per game better than in the franchise's first four years. The line also allowed the Texans rushing attack to average 103.0 yards per game over the last four years.

KUBIAK, GARY

Kubiak has made a habit of surrounding himself with great coaches throughout his tenure in Houston. One of his first hires in 2006 was former Green Bay head coach Mike Sherman, who served as the assistant head coach/offense and then offensive coordinator in Kubiak's first two seasons. In 2008, Kubiak bolstered his staff with two of the brightest minds in football, hiring venerable offensive line guru Alex Gibbs as the assistant head coach/offense and 1995 NFL Coach of the Year Ray Rhodes as the assistant defensive backs coach.

As head coach, Kubiak has also been responsible for the performance of the defense. Stocked with young talent such as the All-Pro combo of linebacker DeMeco Ryans and defensive end Mario Williams plus 2009 AP Defensive Rookie of the Year Brian Cushing, the defense is poised to become one of the league's best under second-year defensive coordinator Frank Bush. Bush guided the defense to a dramatic turnaround over the course of last season, and by the end of the year he had the unit playing like one of the five best defenses in the NFL.

Williams and Ryans were the first two draft picks of the Kubiak era, and they set the tone for what is quickly becoming an excellent track record on draft day. Following the lead of Ryans and Williams, tight end Owen Daniels gave the Texans a league-best three Pro Bowlers from the 2006 draft class. Right tackle Eric Winston has also emerged as a starter from that class. The 2006 class has started a total of 192 combined games for the Texans in their first three seasons.

The Texans' 2007 draft class was led by defensive tackle Amobi Okoye, the youngest first-round draft pick in NFL history, and cornerback Fred Bennett, who led the team in interceptions as a rookie. In 2008, first-round pick Duane Brown started all 16 games at left tackle, while running back Steve Slaton won the rookie rushing title with a franchise-record 1,282 yards. The 2009 class was highlighted by Cushing and CB Glover Quin, a fourth-round pick who went on to start 12 games as a rookie.

Kubiak spent 20 of the previous 23 years in the Denver area, where he earned a reputation as a brilliant offensive mastermind. He played for the Broncos from 1983-91 as the backup for Hall of Fame quarterback John Elway. Kubiak played in 119 games during his career and tossed 14 touchdowns in that span. During his time as a player in the Mile High City, he was a part of three teams that reached the Super Bowl.

Kubiak began his coaching career in 1992-93 as the running backs coach at his alma mater Texas A&M. Under Kubiak's watchful eye, running back Greg Hill was named second team All-America his junior year. Hill was selected by the Kansas City Chiefs in the first round of the 1994 draft.

Kubiak started his NFL coaching career with the San Francisco 49ers in 1994. As quarterbacks coach, he guided Hall of Famer Steve Young to his best season as a pro. Young was named the NFL MVP for the second time in his career.

Under Kubiak's tutelage, Young had a career high 70.3 completion percentage. He threw 35 touchdowns, passed for 3,969 yards and set an NFL record with a 112.8 passer rating, a mark that would stand for 10 seasons. Young captured Super Bowl XXIX MVP honors by tossing a record six touchdowns in San Francisco's 49-26 win over the San Diego Chargers.

In the spring of 1995, Kubiak returned to the Broncos as offensive coordinator, where he would steer Denver to the organization's best numbers in team history and help lead the team to seven postseason trips and two Super Bowl titles in 11 seasons.

Kubiak began his tenure in Denver as the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach to his former teammate, Elway. Kubiak made an imme-

diate impact as Elway threw for 3,970 yards, the second-best mark of his Hall of Fame career. Elway increased his touchdown passes from 16 in 1994 to 26 in 1995. During the final four years of his career (1995-98), Elway tossed 101 touchdown passes, second only to Brett Favre in that span.

Kubiak's offense featured one of the best tight ends in NFL history. Shannon Sharpe, the NFL's leader among tights ends in receptions, receiving yards, and touchdowns, spent seven years under Kubiak. Sharpe averaged 61 receptions and had the most yards receiving with 1,107 yards in 1997.

Kubiak's offenses always have been based on balance. The Broncos' running game has focused around a strong system instead of an individual. Broncos runners have gone over the 1,000-yard rushing mark 10 seasons out of the past 11. Denver has seen five different runners rush for more than 1,000 yards, more than any team in the NFL over the past 11 years.

Kubiak turned to Terrell Davis to tote the ball as the Broncos won back-to-back Super Bowls in the late '90s. In 1997, Davis became only the fourth running back in NFL history to rush for more than 2,000 yards. During the 1997-98 seasons, he rushed for 3,758 yards, most of any running back in back-to-back campaigns between 1995-2005. Davis' 2,008 rushing yards are the fourth most in NFL history. He won AP Offensive Player of the Year honors in 1996 and 1998.

Following Elway's retirement, Kubiak turned his offense over to second-year quarterback Brian Griese, who threw for 3,032 yards in his first season as the Broncos' starter. In the 2000 season, Griese guided the Broncos' offense to rank second in the NFL in points scored and total offense. He was named to the Pro Bowl that season.

That same season Mike Anderson rushed for 1,487 yards, a Bronco record for a rookie. Anderson set the NFL single-game rookie rushing record with 251 yards against the New Orleans Saints. That year, Kubiak's receivers, Ed McCaffrey (101) and Rod Smith (100), became just the second pair of teammates in NFL history to grab at least 100 receptions.

In 2002, the Broncos drafted running back Clinton Portis in the second round. In his rookie season, Portis rushed for 1,508 yards, breaking Anderson's rookie mark, and was named the AP Offensive Rookie of the Year. The Broncos' rushing attack averaged 141.6 yards per game, which ranked second in the AFC. The offense totaled 380.6 yards per game, which was third in the NFL.

Kubiak relinquished his quarterbacks coach title in 2003, turning the duties over to Pat McPherson. That offseason, Denver signed quarterback Jake Plummer from the Arizona Cardinals and Plummer was immediately transformed. Despite missing five games his first season in Denver, Plummer threw for more touchdowns (15) than interceptions (seven) for the second time in his career. The 2004 season saw Plummer throw for 4,089 yards, most in Broncos history. He also tossed 27 touchdown passes, tying Elway's 1997 club record.

Plummer stayed on his feet in Kubiak's offense. After being sacked an average of 36 times per season in Arizona, Plummer was sacked an average of 17 times per year in Denver. Every season in Kubiak's system, Plummer threw more touchdowns than interceptions and led the Broncos to the playoffs from 2003-05.

In 2005, Kubiak's offense ranked fifth in the NFL with 5,766 total yards. His rushing attack was second in the league, averaging 158.7 yards per game. The Broncos were led by Anderson's 1,014 yards on the ground and Tatum Bell's 921 yards. Denver finished 2005 with a 13-3 record, winning their division for the first time since 1998, the last time they appeared in the Super Bowl.

In his 11 years as offensive coordinator, Kubiak's


Broncos amassed 66,501 total yards and 465 touchdowns, most in the NFL in that span. He has coached 14 different Broncos that made the Pro Bowl. Denver's rushing attack has totaled 25,022 yards, most in the NFL over the last 11 seasons.

Kubiak's return to Houston is a return to his roots. He starred at St. Pius High School, where he was an all-state selection, passing for 6,190 yards during his high school career. He was inducted into the Texas High School Hall of Fame in 1999.

Kubiak attended Texas A&M, where he was selected All-Southwest Conference in 1982. He led the conference in attempts (324), completions (181), percentage (55.9) yardage (1,948), touchdowns (19), and total offense (1,885) as a senior. He set the SWC touchdown record with six against Rice during his junior season. He received his degree in Physical Education before being drafted by the Broncos in the eighth round (197th overall) in the 1983 draft.

Kubiak, born in Houston, is married to Rhonda. The couple has three sons Klint, Klay, and Klein. Klint is in his first season as a graduate assistant at Texas A&M, while Klay is a sophomore quarterback at Colorado State and Klein is a freshman wide receiver at Rice.

Frank BUSH DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR 4TH YEAR WITH TEXANS - 20TH YEAR IN NFL

Frank Bush enters his fourth season with the Texans and second as the defensive coordinator. He was the senior defensive assistant for the previous two years.

In Bush's first season calling the plays on defense, he oversaw a unit that improved dramatically over the course of the season. Over the last 14 weeks of the season, Houston ranked fourth in the NFL in total defense, allowing just 299.1 yards per game, and second in rushing defense, holding opponents to a scant 84.3 yards per game.

The 2009 Texans defense finished as the best in franchise history, setting club records for fewest yards (324.9) and points (20.8) allowed per game. The defense also excelled at getting off the field quickly. Houston's 50 three-and-out drives forced were the third-most in the NFL.

Bush's defense was captained by a pair of Pro Bowlers, LB DeMeco Ryans and DE Mario Williams. Ryans led the team with 93 solo tackles and his 123 total stops were second on the club. Williams led the team in sacks for the third consecutive year, posting 9.0. The defense was also aided by the emergence of LB Brian Cushing, who led the team with 133 tackles and registered four sacks, four interceptions, two forced fumbles and 10 passes defensed en route to winning the 2009 AP Defensive Rookie of the Year award.

In his first two years with Houston, Bush worked closely with the defensive line. With Bush's help, Williams posted 26 sacks over that two-year period. Williams shattered the team single-season sack record with 14 sacks and earned secondteam All-Pro recognition in 2007. In 2008, he notched 12 sacks and earned his first trip to the Pro Bowl, starting for the AFC squad. Defensive tackle Amobi Okoye set the franchise rookie sack record with 5.5 sacks in 2007 under Bush's tutelage.

Before coming to Houston, Bush spent the previous three seasons in Arizona. He was the linebackers coach from 2004-05 before being promoted to assistant head coach/linebackers in 2006. Bush coached new Texans defensive end Antonio Smith, a free agent addition in 2008, while in Arizona.

Before joining Dennis Green in Arizona, Bush worked as an assistant with the Denver Broncos (1995–03) and Houston Oilers (1992–94). Bush's linebackers helped the Cardinals defense to finish the season as the 8th ranked defense in the NFL in 2005, an improvement from the 12th ranked defense in 2004 and the 26th ranked defense in 2003.

Bush served nine seasons with the Broncos three as special teams coach (2001–03), one overseeing the defensive secondary/nickel packages (2000), and five as linebackers coach (1995–99). In 2003 Denver ranked fifth in the AFC in both punt and kickoff return average. Kicker Jason Elam accounted for 120 points for the second consecutive season, placing him fourth (2003), and second (2002), respectively. In 2001, Elam's 86 percent field goal accuracy mark (31of-36) was the best in Bronco history and Reuben Droughns ranked third in the AFC with a 25.8yard kickoff return average.

In 1995, his first season as linebackers coach with Denver, the Broncos defense improved from 28th to 15th, then skyrocketed to the fourth overall defense in the league in 1996, including first against the run. The 1997 season saw two

of his pupils—John Mobley (162) and Bill Romanowski (117) rank 1-2 on the club in tackles as Denver forged consecutive World Championships with victories in Super Bowl XXXII over Green Bay following the 1997 season and Super Bowl XXXIII over Atlanta after the '98 campaign. In the latter campaign, the linebacker trio of Mobley (132) Glenn Cadrez (105), and Romanowski (95) led the team in tackles, Romanowski earned his second Pro Bowl berth, and the Broncos run defense finished third in the NFL.

After an outstanding college career as a three year starter at North Carolina State, Bush was a fifth-round draft choice by Houston in the 1985 NFL Draft and earned all-rookie acclaim starting 11 of 16 games for the Oilers before a spinal injury prematurely ended his pro career a year later. After serving as a college scout for the Oilers for five years (1987-92), he was the team's linebackers coach for three seasons, bringing his tenure with Houston as a player, scout, and assistant coach to 10 years. Bush's linebackers continued to play an integral role the following two seasons with the Broncos. In 2002, his special teams ranked among the best in the league as Denver ranked third in the AFC in kickoff coverage and fourth in kickoff return average.

Born in Athens, Ga., Bush lives in Houston with his wife, Stephanie.

Rick DENNISON OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR 1ST YEAR WITH TEXANS - 16TH YEAR IN NFL

Rick Dennison, the Texans' offensive coordinator, is entering his 16th season in the NFL as a coach and his 25th year in the league overall. Dennison had spent his entire NFL tenure to date with the Denver Broncos, first as a player from 1982-90 and then as a coach from 1995-09.

This is Dennison's second stint as an offensive coordinator in the NFL. He took over the role in Denver from 2006-08 after his predecessor, Gary Kubiak, left Denver to become the head coach of the Houston Texans. Prior to taking over as offensive coordinator, Dennison coached the Broncos offensive line from 2001-05. He resumed that role last season under first-year head coach Josh McDaniels. Dennison coached Denver's special teams from 1997-00 and was an offensive assistant from 1995-96.

With Dennison at the helm, Denver's offense averaged 350.5 yards per game from 2006-08 and rushed for 124.4 yards per game, averaging 4.6 yards per carry. Despite starting a rookie at left tackle and a second-year player at right tackle in 2008, the Broncos offense gained 6,333 yards to rank second in the NFL and the offensive line allowed a franchise-record-low 12 sacks on the season.

In 2007, Denver was fourth in the NFL in yards per play (5.7) and was fifth in the league in yards per rush (4.6). In 2006, Dennison's first season at the helm of the offense, Denver ranked fifth in the NFL with an average of 360.4 yards per game.

With Dennison in charge of either the offensive line or the entire offense from 2001-09, the Broncos ranked second in the NFL with an average of 135.1 rushing yards per game, and Denver's 4.5yard rushing average in that time period was the third-highest in the league. The Broncos line also excelled in pass blocking, surrendering just 226 sacks in nine years, which was the fourth-fewest in the league over that time span.



DENNISON, RICK

Dennison coached Denver's special teams from 1997-00 and helped the Broncos win back-to-back World Championships in 1997 and 1998. Under his tutelage, PR Darrien Gordon and K Jason Elam each earned trips to the Pro Bowl and P Tom Rouen was one of the most consistent punters in the league. Dennison began his coaching career as an offensive assistant in Denver from 1995-96 after coaching for three years at the high school level for Suffield Academy in Suffield, Conn.

Dennison played linebacker for the Broncos from 1982-90, appearing in 128 games with 52 starts and three Super Bowls (XXI in 1986, XXII in '87 and XXIV in '89). In 1989, he received the Ed Block Memorial Courage Award. A year earlier, Dennison ranked second on the Broncos in tackles with 133 during the 1988 campaign while posting a teamhigh three fumble recoveries. Dennison joined the Broncos as a college free agent in 1982 after a fine collegiate career at Colorado State, where he was a second-team Academic All-American as a senior and earned three varsity letters. In 1979, Dennison received a bachelor's degree in civil engineering from CSU followed by a master's degree in the same field from CSU in 1982.

Born in Kalispell, Mont., Dennison attended Rocky Mountain High School in Fort Collins, Colo., where he lettered in football, basketball and baseball. His father, George, is the president of the University of Montana. Rick and his wife, Shannon, have five children – sons Joseph, Steven and Trey and twin daughters Abrynn and Allie.

Joe Marciano Special Teams Coordinator 9th Year with Texans - 25th Year in NFL


Joe Marciano enters his ninth season as special teams coordinator for the Houston Texans. Regarded as one of the league's top coaches in his field, Marciano has directed special teams for 24 NFL seasons. Marciano joins running backs coach Chick Harris as the only two coaches to have been with the Texans since the team's inception in 2002.

Marciano's coverage units excelled in 2009, holding opponents to a miniscule 4.3-yard punt return average and just 22.5 yards per kickoff return. Wide receiver Jacoby Jones continued to be one of the most dangers return men in the NFL, averaging 10.9 yards per punt return and 26.6 yards per kick return, including a 95yard kick return for touchdown against Oakland. Kicker Kris Brown surpassed the 1,000-point plateau for his career in Week 2 at Tennessee. He finished the year with 106 points, marking his third straight 100-point season, and booted a pair of game-winning field goals. Punter Matt Turk broke the team single-season punting record for the third straight year, averaging 42.8 yards per punt.

The 2008 special teams unit was one of the most consistent and explosive in the NFL in 2008. Brown turned in the best season of his career, setting franchise records for most points, with 124, made field goals, with 29 and field goal percentage, at .879. His field goal percentage was a career-high, while his 124 points tied a career high and 29 field goals were his second-highest. Jones returned two punts for touchdowns, a franchise record, and finished third in the AFC with a 12.1-yard punt return average. Turk broke his own franchise mark with a 42.3-yard average on a record-low 53 attempts.

Marciano's special teams unit provided many

of the biggest highlights of the 2007 season, tving three NFL records. The Texans tied the NFL single-season record with four kickoff returns for touchdown on the season, becoming just the fourth team in league history to do so. WR Andr¥ Davis tied another league record when he became the seventh player in history to return two kickoffs for touchdown in one game, doing so vs. Jacksonville in the season finale. Brown, who scored a team-record 115 points, became just the third kicker in league history to make three field goals of 50 yards or longer in one game when he did so vs. Miami on October 7. Turk also set team records for gross and net punting average in his first season as a Texan, and the coverage unit held opponents to a record-low total of 151 punt return yards on the season.

Under Marciano's guidance in 2006, punter Chad Stanley posted the best gross punting average of his career, averaging 41.6 yards per punt, and Brown led the team in scoring for the fifth consecutive season. The Texans still ranked sixth in the league in punt return average, at 10.5 yards per return; and the kick coverage team held opponents to the sixth-worst starting field position in the league.

Marciano's tenure as special teams coordinator was highlighted during the 2005 season. Pro Bowl selection and AP first team All-Pro kick returner Jerome Mathis was also honored by the NFL Alumni as the Special Teams Player of the Year and the Texans Rookie of the Year. He finished the season ranked second in the league for return men, returning 54 kickoffs for 1,542 yards and two touchdowns. He was the only player in the NFL to return two kicks for scores that season.

Marciano helped Brown finish the 2005 season with 102 points, including 26 field goals, the second-most of his career. Stanley also had a stellar 2005 season, finishing with 29 punts inside the 20yard line, the fourth most in the NFL. His 6.6 yardper-return average also ranked sixth in the NFL.

In 2004, Brown set a club record with 85 points and nailed a career-high nine touchbacks. Second-year LB Antwan Peek had a breakout year with 18 special teams tackles and a blocked punt. Meanwhile, the Texans ranked seventh in the AFC in opponent average starting field position.

In 2003, Stanley led the NFL with 36 punts inside the 20 and his 36.7-yard net average ranked sixth in the league. Brown nailed 18 of 22 field goals, missing just one inside 50 yards. J.J. Moses ranked fifth in the AFC with a 23.4- yard kickoff return average.

In 2002, Brown connected on 13 field goals from 40-plus yards and Stanley ranked second in the AFC in net average (36.8), leading the conference with 36 punts inside the 20. The Texans also scored two touchdowns on special teams (punt return, punt block), recovered three fumbles, and yielded just 5.7 yards per punt return, leading the AFC.

Marciano arrived in Houston after spending the previous six seasons in the same capacity with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Under Marciano, the Bucs boasted one of the NFC's most consistent special teams units. Tampa Bay blocked 20 kicks, registered nine of the 10 longest punt and kickoff returns in club annals, and recorded 10 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week awards during his six seasons.

Kicker Martin Gramatica posted remarkable numbers during his first three NFL seasons. Gramatica nailed 84 of 101 field-goal attempts (counting playoffs) and earned a Pro Bowl berth in 2000, breaking his own club single-season records in points scored (126), field goals (28), consecutive field goals (16), 50-plus-yard field goals (five), and extra points (42). Also in 2000, Tampa Bay set a team mark and tied a league mark by blocking seven kicks (four field goals, three punts), returning two for touchdowns.

In 1999, linebacker Shelton Quarles broke a 10year Bucs single-season record with 31 special teams tackles. Tampa Bay opponents averaged just 17.6 yards per kickoff return, which set a club record. In 1998, Marciano's charges set singleseason club marks in both kickoff return average (23.7) and punt-return average (13.7). In 1997, the Bucs finished first in the NFL in opponent net punting and opponent field-goal percentage.

Marciano joined the Bucs after spending the previous 10 years as the special teams coach for the New Orleans Saints. For the first nine of those campaigns, he also coached the team's tight ends. During Marciano's New Orleans tenure, he coached three special teams players who were selected for the Pro Bowl (Morten Andersen, Ty-

rone Hughes, Bennie Thompson).

Marciano's first professional football job came as the special teams/tight ends coach for the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars of the USFL, helping the club win two league championships. Marciano joined the Stars after spending 1982 as the tight ends/special teams coach at Temple.

In 1981, Marciano tutored the tight ends for Joe Paterno at Penn State. Marciano also coached wide receivers at Villanova (1980) and Rhode Island (1978-79). He began his college coaching career overseeing the tight ends at East Stroudsburg University in 1977. Marciano coached at Wyoming Area High School in West Pittston, Pa., in 1976. A native of Dunmore, Pa., Marciano was a quarterback at Temple, where he earned his bachelor's degree in health and physical education. He serves as a spokesperson for Autism Speaks and is very active in the organization's annual fundraising walk held each fall in Houston. Marciano is an avid fisherman who has conducted various fishing tournaments and has appeared on numerous ESPN fishing shows. In 1993, Marciano was inducted into the Northeast Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame. He is single and resides in Missouri City with his son, Joseph.

Bill Kollar ASST. Head Coach/Defensive Line 2ND Year with Texans - 22ND Year in NFL

TEXANS COACHES

Bill Kollar enters his second year as the Texans assistant head coach/defensive line. Kollar, who played eight seasons in the NFL as a defensive lineman, has 22 years of experience coaching in the NFL, including the last 21 as a defensive line coach. Prior to Houston, he spent the previous three years coaching the defensive line in Buffalo.

In his first season with the Texans, Kollar helped the defensive line improve throughout the season. DE Mario Williams led the way once again with 9.0 sacks on the season, earning his second consecutive Pro Bowl trip. Rookie DE Connor Barwin and free agent DE Antonio Smith tied for second on the team with 4.5 sacks apiece. The unit was a key on the defense's overall improvement, helping hold opponents to a mere 84.3 yards per game on the ground over the last 13 contests. Prior to his stint with Buffalo, Kollar coached the defensive line in St. Louis from 2001-05. In his five years coaching the defensive line in St. Louis, he helped DE Leonard Little emerge as a premier sack artist, with 57 sacks in five seasons. He helped the Rams earn a trip to the Super Bowl in 2001 during his first season with the team.

From 1990-2000, Kollar worked as the Atlanta Falcons defensive line coach. In 1998, the Falcons' defensive line tied for the NFL lead by giving up only six rushing touchdowns and set a team record by allowing an average of 75.2 rushing yards as Atlanta won the NFC Championship and earned a trip to Super Bowl XXXIII.

Kollar, 57, began his coaching career as a defensive assistant/special teams for Tampa Bay in 1984. He spent a year as a graduate assistant at Illinois in 1985 following his year in Tampa Bay. He was promoted to defensive line/special

teams coach for the Illini in 1986 and spent two years in that position. Kollar assumed the same role at Purdue from 1988-89 before returning to the NFL.

Kollar was an All-America defensive lineman at Montana State and earned the Most Valuable Player award at the 1974 Senior Bowl. He was selected in the first round (23rd overall) of the 1974 NFL Draft by the Cincinnati Bengals and played eight seasons for Cincinnati and Tampa Bay.

Kollar and his wife, Jan, have two sons, Chad and Clint.

Ray RHODES SENIOR DEFENSIVE ASSISTANT 3RD YEAR WITH TEXANS - 30TH YEAR IN NFL

Ray Rhodes enters his third season with the Houston Texans and second as the senior defensive assistant. He spent the 2008 season as the assistant defensive backs coach.

Rhodes works closely with second-year defensive coordinator Frank Bush on all aspects of the defensive game plan and assists defensive backs coach David Gibbs in coaching the secondary with an emphasis on coaching the safety position.

In his first season in his new role, Rhodes helped Bush lead a unit that improved dramatically over the course of the season. Over the last 14 weeks of the season, Houston ranked fourth in the NFL in total defense, allowing just 299.1 yards per game, and second in rushing defense, holding opponents to a scant 84.3 yards per game. SS Bernard Pollard joined the team in Week 3, yet still tied for the team lead with four interceptions and registered a career-high 102 tackles.

In his first year in Houston, Rhodes worked primarily with the safeties, a group that was plagued by injuries and featured six different starting combinations. Free safety Eugene Wilson, who signed late in training camp, emerged as a starter over the second half of the season, finishing in a tie for second on the team with two interceptions and third on the team in tackles with 63 on the year. Veteran Nick Ferguson took over the starting role at strong safety and was fifth on the team with 52 tackles.

Rhodes spent the previous five seasons with the Seattle Seahawks, first as the defensive coordinator and then as special projects/defense. In 2005, Rhodes' role as defensive coordinator was limited due to illness before the season began. He maintained his involvement with the defense, helping the Seahawks defense lead the league in sacks with 50 and finish second in the NFL in red zone defense (40.4%). Rookie LB Lofa Tatupu earned a trip to the Pro Bowl after that season.

Prior to joining the Seahawks, Rhodes spent two seasons in Denver as defensive coordinator with Texans head coach Gary Kubiak. He helped the defense, ranked 24th in 2000, improved to a number eight ranking in 2001 and number six ranking in 2002. After his first season three players received Pro Bowl nominations (CB Deltha O'Neal, DT Trevor Pryce and LB Al Wilson). In his only season with the Washington Redskins, Rhodes led the defense to end of the season ranking of fourth. Two players from that season, CB Champ Bailey and DE Marco Coleman, earned Pro Bowl bids.

In 1999, Rhodes held the position of head coach, leading the Green Bay Packers to an 8-8 finish. Prior to his time coaching at Lambeau, Rhodes was at the helm in Philadelphia for four seasons. He earned NFL Coach of the Year honors in 1995 when he guided the Eagles to a 10-6 record and an appearance in the NFC Divisional Playoff round.

Rhodes was defensive coordinator for San Francisco's 1994 World Championship team. He led the 49ers defense to an eighth place finish that season, as well as a victory over the San Diego Chargers in Super Bowl XXIX. S Merton Hanks, S Tim McDonlad, CB Deion Sanders and DT Dana Stubblefield all earned Pro Bowl nominations following the 1994 season.

He spent two seasons as defensive coordinator in Green Bay (1992-3) and nine seasons with the 49ers (1983-91) as the defensive backs coach. He began his career as the assistant secondary coach in San Francisco (1981-82). Rhodes spent two seasons as a running back at TCU (1969-70) before transferring to the University of Tulsa (1972-73). He was selected by the New York Giants in the 10th round of the 1974 NFL Draft. He played wide receiver in his first three NFL seasons, including 1975 when he led all NFC receivers with a 20.7 yards-per-catch average. He was switched to defensive back after two seasons

Rhodes, a Mexia, Texas native, and his wife, Carmen, have four daughters: Detra, Candra, Tynesha and Raven.

John Benton Offensive Line Coach 5th Year with texans - 7th Year in NFL

TEXANS COACHES

John Benton enters his fifth season coaching the offensive line for the Houston Texans.

Last season, the line provided protection for the NFL's leading passer, Matt Schaub, who threw for 4,770 yards and 29 touchdowns. Overall, the offense ranked fourth in the league, averaging 383.1 yards per game. The passing attack led the league with an average of 290.9 net yards per game, and the 25 sacks allowed were the fifth-fewest in the league.

Stellar pass protection has been a hallmark of the Texans line under Benton. Despite using eight different starting lineups in 2006, the first season under Benton's tutelage, the Texans offensive line surrendered 25 fewer sacks than in 2005. On the ground, the line improved throughout the year and helped the team average 123.4 rushing yards per game over the second half of the season.

The line was even better in 2007, cutting the sack

total in half from 2006, allowing just 22 on the year, which set a team record. The record-low sack total came while the team attempted a record-high 529 passes, meaning the line allowed a sack on just four percent of pass attempts. The line also paved the way for the team to rush for 1,586 yards and 12 touchdowns.

In 2008, Benton's line featured the same starting lineup for all 16 games, marking the first such occurrence in team history. The line paved the way for rookie running back Steve Slaton to set a franchise record with 1,282 rushing yards, while the 32 sacks allowed were the second-fewest in team history. The 2008 offense was the most productive in Texans history, gaining 6,113 total yards, which ranked third in the NFL.

Benton broke into the NFL as the assistant offensive line coach in 2004. During his first season, the Rams' offensive line was led by Pro Bowl LT Orlando Pace. St. Louis finished the season with an 8-8 regular-season record, but gualified

for the playoffs. The Rams rushed for 102 yards on their way to a 27-20 win at division rival Seattle in a Wild Card match-up. The offensive line gave Rams quarterbacks enough time to finish fourth in the NFL with 252.3 passing yards per game. The St. Louis ground attack gained 1,496 yards.

Benton was named the Rams' offensive line coach in 2005. His line opened holes for RB Stephen Jackson to rush for more than 1,000 yards for the first time in his career. Rams running backs averaged 1,579 rushing yards during Benton's two years as the line coach. Benton lettered at Colorado State from 1983-86 and earned honorable mention All-WAC accolades during his junior and senior seasons. He was a graduate assistant at Colorado State from 1987-90. His first offensive line job was at California University (Pa.), where he also served as the recruiting coordinator. Benton returned to his alma mater in 1996. He was the offensive line coach until 2000 and also took over as the co-offensive coordinator in 2000 until 2003. Upon his promotion, Benton looked for tutelage from Denver Broncos offensive coordinator Gary Kubiak. Colorado State emulated the Broncos' power rushing attack.

A Durango, Colo. native, he and his wife Nicole, have two daughters – Gabrielle and Paige. The family resides in Sugar Land.

David GIBBS DEFENSIVE BACKS COACH 2ND YEAR WITH TEXANS - 9TH YEAR IN NFL

David Gibbs enters into his second season with the Houston Texans as defensive backs coach and his ninth season overall coaching in the NFL.

In his first season, Gibbs inherited an injuryplagued Texans secondary that featured eight different starting lineups but managed to turn the unit into one of the best in Texans history. Rookie CB Glover Quin, a fourth-round pick, emerged as a starter early in the year and went on to start 12 games and finish fourth on the team with 64 tackles. SS Bernard Pollard joined the team in Week 3, yet still tied for the team lead with four interceptions and registered a career-high 102 tackles.

Prior to joining the Texans, Gibbs spent the three previous seasons as the defensive backs coach for the Kansas City Chiefs. While in Kansas City, Gibbs' secondary only allowed 208.4 passing yards per game in 2006 and only one 300-yard passer. Under Gibbs' leadership in 2007, the Chiefs defense allowed 188.9 passing yards per game, which ranked them fifth in the league for pass defense.

Gibbs made his first move to the NFL with the Denver Broncos in 2001, where he coached the safeties. The following season, Gibbs assumed responsibility for the entire defensive backfield, which he coached from 2002-04. While coaching at Denver in 2003, the Broncos ranked fourth in the league in total defense and allowed 176.8 passing yards per game, ranking them sixth in the league. Gibbs left Denver to return briefly to the college ranks in 2005, where he served as the defensive coordinator for Auburn.

Before entering the NFL coaching ranks, Gibbs spent 10 years at the collegiate level. His first coaching stints came in 1991-94, where he spent time at both Oklahoma ('91-92) and Colorado ('93-

94) as a graduate assistant. He coached the secondary at Kansas from '95 to '96 and followed then Kansas head coach Glen Mason to Minnesota in 1997 to be the defensive coordinator for the Gophers, making him the youngest defensive coordinator in NCAA Division I-A. He spent the next four seasons with Minnesota before making the jump to the NFL ranks. Gibbs was a four-year letterman at Colorado as a defensive back, where he earned a share of the National Championship in his senior year when the team defeated Notre Dame in the Orange Bowl.

The Mount Airy, North Carolina native is married to Debbie and has two children, Hudson and Charlie Grace.

Chick Harris Running Backs Coach 9th Year with Texans - 30th Year in NFL

Chick Harris enters his ninth season as running backs coach for the Houston Texans. Harris, who along with special teams coordinator Joe Marciano is one of two coaches to have been with the team since its inception, boasts 29 years of NFL coaching experience.

Harris has turned in impressive coaching performances seemingly every year despite a revolving door in the backfield. Last season, the Texans had four backs each rush for at least 250 yards, led by Steve Slaton, who finished with 437 yards in an injury-shortened season. Veteran Ryan Moats rushed for a career-high 390 yards, while rookie Arian Foster flourished late in the year, rushing for 216 of his 257 yards in the last two games.

In 2008, Slaton, then a rookie third-round draft pick, started the final 15 games and won the rookie rushing title with a franchise-record 1,282 yards. Slaton led all AFC players with 1,659 total yards from scrimmage, and his five 100-yard rushing days were also a team single-season record.

In 2007, Harris leaned on 2006 leading rusher Ron Dayne, who produced a team- and careerhigh 773 yards and six touchdowns. Rookie undrafted free agent Darius Walker came on late in the year and ran for 264 yards over the last four games.

In 2006, Dayne, the 1999 Heisman Trophy winner, led a committee of running backs with 612 yards and five touchdowns, including a career-high 153 yards and two touchdowns to lead Houston to its first-ever win over Indianapolis. Houston was one of three teams to have three different players rush for at least 90 yards in a game, and the Texans were the only team that had a pair of rookies each top the 90-yard mark in a game.

Harris helped RB Domanick Williams earn the 2003 Diet Pepsi Rookie of the Year award and develop into a two-time 1,000-yard rusher. Williams, drafted in the fourth round in 2003, is the franchise's all-time leading rusher with 3,195 career yards, and his 28 career touchdowns are the most in team history. He holds 27 team records, including the single-season records for rushing yards, with 1,188 in 2004, and rushing yards by a rookie, with 1,031 in 2003.

HARRIS, CHICK

During Harris' seven-year tenure with the Panthers, injuries forced the club to suit up a bevy of running backs, from Tshimanga Biakabutuka to Richard Huntley to Brad Hoover to Fred Lane to Anthony Johnson to Derrick Moore. Harris helped Carolina set an expansion record with seven wins in 1995 and also helped the Panthers reach the NFC Championship Game the following season.

Harris launched his NFL coaching career with the Buffalo Bills in 1981, coaching two seasons. He entered the coaching profession at Colorado State in 1970, coaching three seasons before heading to Long Beach State. After one season at Long Beach, Harris joined the Detroit Wheels of the World Football League in 1974. He then moved on to the University of Washington, where he spent six seasons, helping the Huskies to two bowl wins, including a Rose Bowl triumph over Michigan. Harris lettered in football and track at Northern Arizona, where he is a member of the Lumberjacks' athletic hall of fame.

Born in Durham, N.C., Harris attended Long Beach (Calif.) Poly High School. He has a son, Tyler, and a daughter, Tarana. Harris and his wife, Karen, have a daughter, Kara. The family lives in Sugar Land.

Johnny HOLLAND Linebackers Coach 5th Year with Texans - 16th Year in NFL

Johnny Holland enters his fifth year with the Houston Texans as the linebackers coach after spending the previous three seasons with the Detroit Lions. Holland, who starred on the field for the Green Bay Packers for seven years, enters his 16th season as a coach in the NFL.

Holland's linebacking corps continues to be led by two-time Pro Bowl MLB DeMeco Ryans. Ryans became the franchise's all-time leading tackler in 2009 and has amassed 518 tackles in his first four seasons. Holland coached his second Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year in 2009, helping SLB Brian Cushing garner the award as well as a Pro Bowl selection. Cushing led the team with 133 tackles, tied for the team lead with four interceptions and had 4.0 sacks. Cushing joined Ryans, the 2006 winner, making the duo the first teammates to have both won the award since Peter Boulware (1997) and Terrell Suggs (2003) of the Baltimore Ravens. In 2008, Ryans led the team for the third consecutive season with 112 tackles and he moved into first on the franchise career solo tackle list with 310, topping Jamie Sharper's total of 300 solos from 2002-04. Second-year linebacker Zac Diles had a stellar start to the year and finished second on the team with 66 tackles despite missing the final eight games with a broken leg. Rookie Xavier Adibi earned All-Rookie honors after tallying 34 tackles, all of which came in the last half of the season.

In 2007, Ryans was elected to start the 2008 Pro Bowl and earned second-team Associated Press All-Pro recognition after leading the team with 127 tackles, including 98 solo stops, two sacks an interception, a forced fumble and three fumble recoveries. WLB Morlon Greenwood registered his fourth consecutive 100-tackle season, finishing second on the team with 118 stops, including 90 solos, to go along with a sack, a forced fumble and an interception.



HOLLAND, JOHNNY

In his first year with the team, Holland helped Ryans earn AP Defensive Rookie of the Year honors after one of the greatest seasons by a rookie defender in league history. Under Holland's guidance, Ryans led the NFL in solo tackles with 126, and his 156 total tackles were more than any rookie in the previous 20 years. Ryans also recorded 3.5 sacks, an interception, a forced fumble, a fumble recovery, and eight pass deflections. With the addition of Ryans, Greenwood slid outside and finished second on the team with 110 tackles.

In 2005, Holland's first year as linebackers coach with the Lions, the unit was ravaged by injuries with four linebackers ending the season on injured reserve, including Boss Bailey and Earl Holmes, who entered the season as starters. Holland molded his group into a solid unit and helped the defense hold opposing offenses under 300 total yards in five of the team's last seven games.

In 2003-04, Holland was a defensive assistant for the Lions, helping Texans defensive coordinator Richard Smith coach the linebackers. Holland began his coaching career as a defensive quality control coach for the Green Bay Packers from 1995-97 before coaching special teams in 1998 and linebackers in 1999. While on Mike Holmgren's staff in Green Bay, he helped lead the Packers to back-to-back NFC Championships following the 1995 and 1996 seasons and a World Championship in Super Bowl XXXI. In 2000, Holland re-joined Holmgren in Seattle, where he served as the assistant special teams/ assistant strength and conditioning coach. From 2001-02, he returned to his more familiar role as linebackers coach for the Seahawks.

A native of Hempstead, Texas, Holland was a four-year letterman and three-year starter at Texas A&M. He led the Aggies' vaunted "Wrecking Crew" defense in tackles in each of his final three seasons in College Station before moving on to the NFL as a second round draft choice by the Packers in 1987. Holland posted six consecutive seasons with at least 100 tackles for Green Bay before retiring in 1994. In 1993, after suffering a neck injury in 1992, he led the team in tackles with 145 and helped guide the Packers to their first playoff birth in 11 years.

Holland was enshrined in the Texas A&M Hall of Fame in 1993 and was inducted into the Cotton Bowl Hall of Fame in 2000. In July, 2001, he was inducted into the Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame.

Holland and his wife, Faith, have a son, Jordan, and a daughter, Joli.

Larry KIRKSEY WIDE RECEIVERS COACH 4TH YEAR WITH TEXANS - 14TH YEAR IN NFL

TEXANS COACHES

Larry Kirksey enters his fourth year as the wide receivers coach for the Texans. He brings over a decade of experience to coaching wide receivers. He has coached three receivers, Jerry Rice (1,549), Jimmy Smith (862) and Terrell Owens (1,006), that have over 850 receptions in their career.

Kirksey's star pupil in Houston is four-time Pro Bowl WR Andre Johnson. In three seasons under Kirksey's tutelage, Johnson has averaged an NFL-best 97.4 yards per game and has led the league in receiving yards each of the last two years while leading in receptions in 2008. Johnson joined Rice as the only receivers in NFL history to lead the league in receiving yards in consecutive seasons and joined Marvin Harrison as the only receivers to surpass 1,500 yards in back-to-back years.

The receiving corps was a team strength in 2009 as the Texans led the NFL in passing offense at 290.9 yards per game. In addition to Johnson, Kevin Walter caught 53 passes for 611 yards while Jacoby Jones emerged as a big-play threat, averaging a touchdown every 4.5 receptions. Fourth-year pro David Anderson turned in a career year with 38 receptions for 370 yards.

In 2008, Johnson led the NFL in receptions, with 115, and receiving yards, with 1,575. Both were career highs for the franchise's all-time leading receiver, who earned Associated Press firstteam All-Pro honors and started for the AFC in the Pro Bowl. Johnson teamed with Walter for the most prolific receiving tandem in the league. The pair combined for 2,474 receiving yards. Walter's 899 yards were a career high for him. Both also matched the franchise record for receiving touchdowns with eight apiece. In his first year with the Texans, Kirksey oversaw a group that had three players top 700 receiving yards, making Houston one of just four teams to achieve that feat. The unit's depth was tested when Johnson missed seven games due to injury, but fellow receivers Walter and Andr¥ Davis stepped up to fill the void. Walter set career highs in receptions, with 65, yards, with 800, and touchdowns, with four. His 65 catches led the team and he was second in receiving yards. Davis emerged as one of the best deep threats in the NFL, averaging nearly 18 yards per catch. Despite playing in just nine games, Johnson once again led the team in receiving yards, with 851, and touchdowns, with eight.

Kirksey spent the 2006 season as an asst. head coach/running backs at Middle Tennessee State. The Blue Raiders won the Sun Belt title on their way to the Motor City Bowl.

Kirksey spent the 2004 season in Denver as a volunteer coach for the Broncos. He spent 2003 as the wide receivers coach with the Jacksonville Jaguars. During his time in Jacksonville, Jimmy Smith led the team with 54 receptions while missing four games.

He spent the 2001-02 season in Detroit. During the 2001 season, Johnnie Morton finished the year 12th in the NFL with 1,154 receiving yards. The Lions finished sixth in the league with 224.8 yards per game.

Kirksey, a Kentucky native, was an assistant head coach in charge of the wide receivers at Texas A&M in 2000. That year, he helped lead the Aggies to a berth in the Independence Bowl while injecting hints of the West Coast offense.

In 1994, Kirksey began his NFL coaching career

with the responsibility of coaching the NFL's alltime reception and receiving yards leader Jerry Rice. Under Kirksey, Rice set an NFL record with 1,848 receiving yards, while setting a career high of 122 receptions in 1995. From 1994-99 Rice caught 606 passes for 6,666 yards. Kirksey's receivers helped set a Super Bowl record in Super Bowl XXIX with six touchdown catches, including three by Rice.

From 1990 to 93, Kirksey coached running backs for Alabama, where he helped lead the Crimson Tide to a national championship in 1992. Kirksey's running back corps led the SEC in rushing that season with an average of 252 yards per game. He coached running backs at the University of Florida under Charlie Pell and Galen Hall from 1984 to 88. During his tenure at Florida, he coached star running backs Lorenzo Hampton, Neal Anderson, John L. Williams, and Emmitt Smith. After leaving Florida, Kirksey spent one year as running backs coach at Pittsburgh.

Prior to joining the Gators, Kirksey gained valuable experience by taking over head coaching duties at Kentucky State in 1983.

Kirksey got his start in coaching when he became the wide receiver/tight end coach at Miami of Ohio in 1974 and remained with the Redskins for three seasons before joining the staff at Kentucky. He also coached wide receivers and tight ends for the Wildcats from 1977 to 1981, then spent the 1982 campaign coaching the same positions at Kansas.

Kirksey earned a bachelor's degree from Eastern Kentucky in 1974, where he was a four-year letterman and three-year starter at wide receiver. As a senior, he earned all-conference honors. Kirksey was out of coaching in 2005 while serving as deputy executive director of the Kentucky Sports Authority.

He and wife Anita have two children, Jessica and Jared.

Greg KNAPP QUARTERBACKS COACH 1ST YEAR WITH TEXANS - 16TH YEAR IN NFL

TEXANS COACHES

The Houston Texans named Greg Knapp the team's quarterbacks coach on Jan. 27, 2010.

The 47-year-old Knapp is entering his 16th season in the NFL as a coach, including the last nine seasons as an offensive coordinator. Overall, Knapp is entering his 25th year in coaching.

Knapp is already very familiar with Texans quarterback Matt Schaub, whom he coached from 2004-06 as the offensive coordinator in Atlanta after the Falcons drafted Schaub in the third round of the 2004 NFL Draft. Under Knapp's tutelage, Schaub developed into one of the most sought-after players in the NFL. Knapp's Falcons offense featured the best rushing attack in the league, averaging 169.9 yards per game on the ground from 2004-06.

During his 15 years on the offensive side of the ball in the NFL, his quarterbacks have participated in the Pro Bowl nine times. San Francisco's Steve Young and Jeff Garcia played in the game from 1995-98 and 2000-02, respectively; and Michael Vick represented the Atlanta Falcons from 2004-05.

Knapp spent last season as the offensive coordinator for the Seattle Seahawks and guided an attack that averaged 316.8 yards per game, including 218.9 per game through the air. Quarterback Matt Hasselbeck passed for 216.4 yards per game and finished with 3,029 yards on the year with 17 touchdowns as he bounced back from an injury-shortened 2008 campaign.

Knapp joined the Seahawks after two seasons as the offensive coordinator for the Oakland Raiders (2007-08). In his first year, the Raiders averaged 294.8 yards per game despite starting four different quarterbacks over the course of the season. In 2008, the Oakland offense averaged 272.3 yards per game, including a rushing attack that ranked 10th in the NFL with an average of 124.2 yards per game.

Knapp began his NFL coaching career with San Francisco in 1998 as the 49ers quarterbacks coach. Under his guidance from 1998-99, quarterback Steve Young concluded his Hall of Fame career with a passer rating of 95.5 over his last two years. In 2000, quarterback Jeff Garcia took over the reins of the Niners' offense and threw for a career-high and team-record 4,278 yards and 31 touchdowns.



KNAPP, GREG

Knapp was promoted to San Francisco's offensive coordinator in 2001 and held that position through 2003. In his three years as the play-caller, the 49ers averaged 355.8 yards per game, which ranked fifth in the league. Garcia threw for an average of 213.0 yards per game and posted a passer rating of 87.4 in Knapp's offense.

A native of Seal Beach, Calif., Knapp played quarterback at Sacramento State from 1982-85.

He started his coaching career in 1986 at his alma mater and remained there through 1994. He coached the Hornets running backs from 1986-89 and wide receivers from 1989-90 before being promoted to assistant head coach and offensive coordinator from 1991-94.

Knapp and his wife Starla have one daughter, Jordan.

Brian PARIANI TIGHT ENDS COACH 5TH YEAR WITH TEXANS - 20TH YEAR IN NFL

Brian Pariani enters his fifth season with the Houston Texans as the tight ends coach. Pariani is responsible for one of the more utilized units in the Texans' new offensive scheme. Under Pariani's guidance, Owen Daniels has established himself as one of the best young tight ends in the NFL.

Daniels earned his first Pro Bowl trip in 2008 while under Pariani's watch and was on pace for a second all-star nod in 2009 before his season was cut short by injury. The fourth-year pro caught 40 passes for 519 yards and five touchdowns before suffering a season-ending knee injury in the eighth game of the year.

Despite the loss of Daniels, the tight end position remained a vital cog in the league's top-ranked passing attack. Joel Dreessen put together a career year, catching 26 passes for 320 yards and a touchdown. Rookies James Casey and Anthony Hill combined to catch seven passes for 73 yards as well.

In 2008, Daniels caught 70 passes for 862 yards, both career highs, and two touchdowns. He ranked among the top five AFC tight ends in receptions, receiving yards, first downs (46), yards per catch (12.3) and yards per game (53.9). In addition to Daniels' stellar year, Dreessen caught 11 passes for 77 yards on the year.

In 2007, Pariani's tight ends had the most productive year in team history, combining to catch 73 pass for 859 yards and six touchdowns. They were led by Daniels, who was sixth among NFL tight ends with 63 receptions for 768 yards and three touchdowns. Nearly 70 percent of Daniels' receptions (44 of 63) went for first downs, which ranked fourth in the league among tight ends. Dreessen caught four passes for 55 yards and the first two touchdowns of his career.

In his first season with Houston, Pariani developed Daniels, a fourth-round draft choice, into the most productive rookie tight end in the NFL and a first-team PFWA/Pro Football Weekly allrookie selection. Daniels set the Texans rookie record with five receiving touchdowns, which matched wide receiver Andre Johnson for the team lead. Daniels finished his first year with 34 catches for 352 yards and five touchdowns, all of which were first among rookie tight ends.



PARIANI, BRIAN

The move to Houston returned Pariani to the pro coaching ranks after spending the 2005 season as the offensive coordinator at Syracuse University. He spent 1995-04 coaching the tight ends with the Denver Broncos alongside Texans head coach Gary Kubiak. Before his time with the Broncos he coached with the San Francisco 49ers from 1991-94. Pariani teamed with Kubiak to bring the 49ers a Super Bowl championship in 1994.

Having coached with the Broncos in Super Bowl XXXII and XXXIII and with the San Francisco 49ers in Super Bowl XXIX, Pariani is one of only seven coaches in the NFL to have won World Championships with teams from both conferences.

While with the Broncos, Pariani coached Shannon Sharpe, the leading receiving tight end in NFL history. Sharpe led the NFL in receptions by a tight end from 1996-98 averaging 73 catches over the three year span. Sharpe totaled 425 receptions for 5,373 yards and 38 touchdowns with Pariani. Sharpe retired in 2004 finishing his career with eight Pro Bowl selections. He retired as the NFL career record holder at the tight end position for receptions, with 815, and yards, with 10,060, and 62 touchdowns. On October 20, 2002, Sharpe set an NFL record with 214 receiving yards by a tight end in a 37-34 OT win at Kansas City. During his time in Denver, Pariani's tight ends combined for 859 receptions and 9,948 receiving yards, most in the NFL over that 10-year period. In 2001, Pariani's unit combined to catch 100 passes, sending Dwayne Carswell to his first Pro Bowl.

On the ground, Pariani's group helped lead the way for Denver runners to rush for 22,483, most in the NFL from 1995-04. Bronco running backs topped the 1,000-yard mark nine times during Pariani's tenure in the Mile High City.

In 1990 Pariani served as a scouting assistant with the San Francisco 49ers before being promoted to offensive coaches assistant in 1991. The 49ers offense led the league in total yards in 1992 and 93, and scored a team-record 505 points and 62 touchdowns in 1994 en route to a Super Bowl title. After earning his bachelor's degree in political science from UCLA in 1989, Pariani began his career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater.

Pariani was born in San Francisco and was a three sport athlete at Marin Catholic High School in Kentfield, Calif. Pariani and his wife, Stephanie, have two daughters, Jessica and Gianna. The family resides in Houston.

Frank POLLACK ASST. OFFENSIVE LINE 4TH YEAR WITH TEXANS - 4TH YEAR IN NFL

Frank Pollack is in his fourth year as the Texans assistant offensive line coach. Pollack will continue to work closely with offensive line coach John Benton to mold the Texans front five.

Last season, the line provided protection for the NFL's leading passer, Matt Schaub, who threw for 4,770 yards and 29 touchdowns. Overall, the offense ranked fourth in the league, averaging 383.1 yards per game. The passing attack led the league with an average of 290.9 net yards per game, and the 25 sacks allowed were the fifth-fewest in the league.

In 2008, the Texans line featured the same starting lineup for all 16 games, marking the first such occurrence in team history. The line paved the way for rookie running back Steve Slaton to set a franchise record with 1,282 rushing yards, while the 32 sacks allowed were the second-fewest in team history. The 2008 offense was the most productive in Texans history, gaining 6,113 total yards, which ranked third in the NFL.

In his first year with the Texans, Pollack helped mold an offensive line that became the best in team history in terms of pass protection. The line cut its 2006 sack total nearly in half, from 43 to just 22 in 2007, allowing a sack on just four percent of the team's pass attempts. On the ground, the line helped RB Ron Dayne to a team- and career-high 773 yards and six touchdowns. Pollack's first collegiate coaching position was at his alma mater, Northern Arizona, in 2005 as the co-offensive line coach working specifically with the tackles and tight ends. He was promoted to the offensive line coach in 2006 where the Lumberjacks produced the Big Sky Player of the Year and Newcomer of the Year. The Northern Arizona offense led the conference in scoring (34.4) and passing (267.2) and finished second in rushing (137.9). Their points per game were fourth in the Division 1-AA.

Pollack was a sixth-round selection by the San Francisco 49ers in 1990. He played by the Bay from 1990-91 before moving to Denver where he played from 1992-93 before ending his career with the 49ers from 1994-98. He finished his career with 90 career games and one Super Bowl Championship with San Francisco in 1994.

Pollack attended Greenway High School in Phoenix and graduated from Northern Arizona with a degree in advertising in 1990. He and his wife, Wendy, have two sons, Frankie and Carter.

Robert SALEH ASST. LINEBACKERS COACH 5TH YEAR WITH TEXANS - 5TH YEAR IN NFL

EXANS COACHES

Robert Saleh enters his fifth season with the Houston Texans and his second as assistant linebackers coach.

Saleh served as a defensive assistant for the previous three years, handling the quality control aspects of the defense. He has worked closely with linebackers coach Johnny Holland during on-field drills for the past four seasons, but has taken on increased responsibility in his current role.

The linebackers were regarded as the strongest group on a rapidly improving defense in 2009, led by the Pro Bowl duo of MLB DeMeco Ryans and SLB Brian Cushing. The 2006 and 2009 Associated Press Defensive Rookies of the Year, respectively, led the team in tackles and were the only teammates to both rank among the league's top 10 tacklers.

Saleh joined the Texans as a coaching intern during the 2005 season after spending the previous three seasons coaching at the collegiate level. He spent time at the University of Georgia in 2005, where head coach Mark Richt tabbed him as a defensive assistant. Saleh spent the 2004 season as a defensive assistant for Central Michigan University, where he worked primarily with the defensive line and defensive backs.

Prior to his season at Central Michigan, Saleh spent two seasons at Michigan State (2002-03) as an offensive assistant for former head coach Bobby Williams and a defensive assistant for head coach John L. Smith. Saleh is a native of Dearborn, Mich. and attended Northern Michigan University, where he started at tight end for four seasons.

Saleh resides in Pearland with his wife, Sanaa.

Carter will work under Texans defensive coordinator Frank Bush, and works primarily with defensive backs coach David Gibbs. He also worked with the defensive backs in his previous role as defensive assistant, which he held for the previous four seasons.

Carter was drafted by the Arizona Cardinals in the fourth round (107th pick overall) of the 1994 NFL Draft, and went on to play for the Kansas City Chiefs in 1995 and the Oakland Raiders from 1996-98. Carter also played five seasons in the Canadian Football League with the Edmonton Eskimos (2000-01), Montreal Alouettes (2002) and British Columbia Lions (2003-04).

Carter and his wife, Nicole, live in Houston with their daughter Br¥a and son Perry, Jr.

Marc LUBICK Offensive Assistant 1st year with texans - 3rd year in NFL

Marc Lubick was hired as a Texans offensive assistant on Feb. 11, 2010. He was the tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator at Colorado State University before joining the Texans.

Lubick, 32, previously spent 10 seasons in coaching and eight seasons at CSU. He was named to Rams head coach Steve Fairchild's staff on Dec. 12, 2007. Lubick spent three seasons as CSU's wide receivers coach from 2005-07. During that time, he coached Texans wide receiver David Anderson, a seventh-round draft pick in 2006, along with 2007 NFL free agent signee Dustin Osborn.

A former prep quarterback and college safety, Lubick launched his coaching career in 2000 as a defensive student assistant at CSU. Working with the Rams' secondary, he had the opportunity to assist in the development of stalwart performers Jason and Justin Gallimore, standout Aaron Sprague and honors-winner Dexter Wynn.

During the 2002 season, Lubick was an academic graduate assistant coach at CSU, working with the team's wide receivers.

Mike Martz's St. Louis Rams staff as a scouting assistant for two seasons (2003-04) before returning to CSU in the spring of 2005.

XANS COACHES

A defensive back at Montana State from 1996-99, Lubick earned academic all-conference honors three times. He played quarterback and defensive back at Fort Collins High School from 1993-95.

Lubick's father, Sonny, is considered the most successful head football coach in CSU history, and in addition to working at Miami (Fla.), also served as an assistant at Stanford, Colorado State and Montana State. He also was the head coach at Montana State from 1978-81. Marc's brother, Matt, is the wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator/pass game coordinator at Duke.

In 2006, Marc began a successful but difficult year-long battle with a rare form of cancer, fighting through months of chemotherapy and inspiring his family, players and fellow coaches.

A 2001 graduate of Colorado State, he has a bachelor's degree in health and exercise science.


Bruce Matthews enters his second season on the Texans' coaching staff and will assist the offensive staff in player evaluation and game preparation.

Matthews, 48, is in his second year as a coach after a Hall of Fame career as a player. He played 19 seasons in the NFL, all with the Houston Oilers/Tennessee Oilers/Tennessee Titans franchise. Matthews was the most decorated lineman in league history and was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2007, his first year of eligibility. He tied a league record with 14 consecutive Pro Bowl selections and was a ninetime first-team All-Pro. Matthews was selected as a guard to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 1990s and was one of two players to start every game during the decade.

At the time of his retirement in 2001, Matthews had played in more games (296) than any nonkicker in NFL history and more seasons (19) than any offensive lineman. He never missed a game due to injury. During the course of his career, Matthews started at all five positions along the line, making him arguably the most versatile lineman of all time. His number 74 was retired by the Titans, and he was inducted into the franchise's hall of fame in 2002.

Following his retirement as a player, Matthews served as a volunteer coach at Elkins High School in Missouri City, Texas, and coached youth football. Matthews was drafted by the Oilers with the ninth overall pick of the 1983 NFL Draft out of Southern California, where he was an All-American guard. He attended Arcadia (Calif.) High School.

Matthews was born in Raleigh, N.C., before moving to Chicago and eventually Los Angeles. He and his wife, Carrie, live in Sugar Land. The couple has seven children: Steven, Kevin, Marilyn, Jake, Michael, Luke and Gweneth.

Cedric SMITH Strength & Conditioning Coach 1st year with texans - 11th year in NFL

Cedric Smith enters his first season with the Texans after being hired on Feb. 8, 2010. Smith just completed his third season as Kansas City's strength and conditioning coach after spending six years as an assistant strength coach with the Denver Broncos (2001-06).

As Kansas City's strength and conditioning coach, Smith was responsible for overseeing the Chiefs year-round conditioning efforts. The former NFL fullback implemented a vigorous offseason program that not only puts an emphasis on strength training and cardiovascular endurance, but also focuses on enhancing speed and flexibility. Smith supervised the club's personalized in-season training regimen.

Prior to joining the Broncos, Smith was a fitness manager and consultant with Gold's Gym in Phoenix for two years ('99-00) after concluding a successful seven-year NFL playing career. During his professional playing tenure, Smith enjoyed stints with Arizona ('96-98), Washington ('94-95), New Orleans ('91) and Minnesota ('90). He finished his NFL career with 40 carries for 100 yards (2.5 avg.) with two touchdowns and 20 receptions for 141 vards (7.1 avg.) with two scores. He also had five kickoff returns for 83 yards (16.6 avg.). He originally entered the NFL as the second of Minnesota's two fifth-round selections (131st overall) in the '90 NFL Draft. Smith appeared in 15 games for the Vikings as a rookie, opening holes for RB Herschel Walker.

Smith enjoyed his finest NFL campaign in 1994 with Washington. He played in 14 games (eight starts), rushing 10 times for 48 yards (4.8 avg.) and catching 15 passes for 118 yards (7.9 avg.).

Prior to entering the NFL, Smith was a three-year starter at fullback at the University of Florida where he paved the way for running back Emmitt Smith, the NFL's all-time leading rusher. Serving as a fullback for the Gators, he finished his collegiate career with 20 starts, carrying the ball 102 times for 300 yards (2.9 avg.) with four TDs and catching 11 passes for 77 yards (7.0 avg.). He was a three-time Academic All-Southeastern Conference selection.

Before enrolling at Florida, Smith was named All-Alabama as a fullback at Enterprise High School in Enterprise, Ala. Smith graduated from the University of Florida with a degree in Health Sciences in 1990. He has five children: Chandler, Canyon, Cole, Cameron and Cerraya.

Carr has one son Corbyn, and he and his wife Shenikwa are parents of two girls Kennedy and Kayla.






Ryan Cavanaugh College Scout 10th NFL Season; 2ND with the texans


Diane Crossey DIRECTOR OF EVENT SERVICES 9TH NFL SEASON; 9TH WITH THE TEXANS

Grier's first NFL position came in New England in 1981 when he was the running backs coach under Ron Erhardt.

Grier spent 1978-80 as running backs coach at Boston College under Ed Chlebek, helping the team improve from 0-11 to 7-4. Grier's initial college coaching post came at Eastern Michigan where he coached the running backs for George Mans and then Chlebek from 1974-77. TEXANS WRAP UP FIRST SEASON WITH 4-12 RECORD

Texans end Inaugural Season tied for second-most wins by an NFL expansion team.

The Houston Texans ended their first season with a 4-12 record, tying the mark for second-most wins by an expansion team (Jacksonville 1995). Two of those wins were on the road (Jacksonville, Pittsburgh) and two were against eventual playoff teams (Steelers, Giants). Overall, the Texans played 11 games against teams with a record of .500 or better and played eight games against playoff teams.

The Texans proved to be a tough opponent, thanks in large part to a veteran-laden defense that ranked 16th in the NFL in total defense and produced two Pro Bowl starters in cornerback Aaron Glenn and defensive end Gary Walker. In addition, five defensive players set new career-highs in tackles.


"We've got more veterans on defense, more guys that have played and understand the fine line between a winning performance and a losing performance," said head coach Dom Capers. "You'd like to win more games, but having been through this process before, I understand it's a step-by-step process. I'm proud of the way this team has hung together. I think we have a good core to build from and move forward.

One of those players was first round draft choice David Carr, who was one of three quarterbacks in the NFL this season to take every snap. "I have learned a lot," said Carr. "I had a lot of fun – I always have fun playing ball. I wouldn't change anything that happened this year. It is all going to be positive when I look back at it later in my career because I am going to learn from every experience that I had, especially when I have a chance to go back and watch all these games again."



SUMMARY

The Houston Texans won the first game in franchise history with a 19-10 victory over the Dallas Cowboys in Reliant Stadium. It marked the first time that an expansion club won their opening game since Minnesota defeated Chica-go 37-13 in 1961. The Texans also became the first expansion team since New Orleans in 1967 to score on their first possession when QB David Carr hit TE Billy Miller on a 19yard passing strike. Early in the second quarter, Texans LB Kailee Wong sacked Dallas QB Quincy Carter for an eightyard loss, recording the first sack in Texans history. On the next play, CB Aaron Glenn intercepted Carter's pass at the Dallas 18 yard-line for the first interception in the Texans annals and 25th of Glenn's nine-year career. The turnover set up a K Kris Brown 42-yard field goal to put Houston ahead 10-0. A 33-yard field goal put Dallas on the board and made it 10-3 at halftime. Dallas evened the score at 10 in the third quarter. The Texans answered in the fourth when Carr lofted a pass to WR Corey Bradford who hauled it in for a 65-yard touchdown to put Houston ahead 17-10. DT Seth Payne sacked Carter in the end zone for a safety, sealing the Texans' historic win.

SUMMARY

The Texans (1-1) suffered the first loss in franchise history, falling to the San Diego Chargers 24-3 in Qualcomm Stadium. The Chargers took an early lead when QB Drew Brees hit WR Curtis Conway for a 35-yard TD pass on their first possession. After Chargers LB Junior Seau returned an interception to the Texans 6, Brees and Conway connected again three plays later on a three-yard reverse to give San Diego a 14-0 lead. Houston got on the board prior to halftime with a 45-yard K Kris Brown field goal. With three seconds remaining in the half, San Diego padded their lead as K Steve Christie nailed a 36-yard field goal to put the score at 17-3. Both the Chargers and Texans defensive units held strong to keep the third quarter scoreless. Early in the fourth quarter, San Diego put the game away when LB Ben Leber got past Texans TE Billy Miller to sack Carrin the end zone, causing the ball to come loose. Chargers DE Raylee Johnson recovered the fumble and San Diego took a three-touchdown lead that they would hold onto for the remainder of the game. Carr showed great toughness as he was sacked nine times by a relentless Charger defense but finished the game.

SUMMARY

The Texans (1-2) fell to the Indianapolis Colts 23-3 at Reliant Stadium. The game marked the first time in over thirty years that a Houston team took the field in an outdoor venue, with the retractable roof kept open. The last occasion was on December 16, 1967, when the Houston Oilers defeated the San Diego Chargers 24-17 in Rice Stadium. Indianapolis scored on its second drive when QB Peyton Manning tossed a 42-yard touchdown strike to WR Qadry Ismail. On the following Colts possession, LB Jay Foreman forced a fumble, which was recovered by CB Marcus Coleman. A Colts interception, though, set up a 26-yard K Mike Vanderjagt field goal to extend the lead to 10-0. Vanderjagt hit a 39-yarder to make it 13-0 at halftime. The Texans were able to put some points on the board in the third quarter thanks to a 24-yard K Kris Brown field goal to put the score at 13-3. Indianapolis added 10 fourth-quarter points to come away with the 20-point win. DT Gary Walker recovered a fumble in the third guarter, while rookie RB Jonathan Wells rushed for 93 yards and added 14 receivina.

With less than four minutes remaining, K Kris Brown split the uprights from 43-yards out to extend Houston's lead to 17-6. Glenn sealed the Texans victory when he intercepted Maddox's pass on the Steelers next possession and returned it 65 yards for his second touchdown of the day to finish off an improbable 24-6 Houston win.

SUMMARY

The Texans (4-12) concluded their inaugural season with a 13-3 loss to the AFC South champion Tennessee Titans. On Tennessee's first drive, Titans QB Steve McNair hit WR Justin McCareins on a 36-yard pass that set up a 28-yard K Joe Nedney field goal. The Titans blocked a 19-yard field goal attempt by K Kris Brown, and then blocked a punt by Chad Stanley to set up another Nedney field goal from 26 yards out to give Tennessee a 6-0 lead. On Houston's second possession of the second half, the offense still couldn't punch the ball in the end zone, settling for a 31-yard Brown field goal. But Titans DT Albert Haynesworth was flagged for unsportsmanlike conduct for trying to vault off a teammate to block the kick and the Texans were awarded the ball 1st and goal at the Titans 7. The Texans again went backwards and Brown came in again to nail a 42-yarder, putting the score at 6-3 in favor of the Titans. With just over eight minutes remaining in the game, McNair hit Tennessee WR Drew Bennett for a 53-yard pass and first down to set up a four-yard Eddie George touchdown run that sealed the 13-3 Titans victory.

Youth carried Texans in second season

The Texans capped off an improved season from their inaugural debut with a 5-11 record, overcoming the NFL's most difficult schedule (.570 opponent winning percentage).

The Texans started the season with a 21-20 upset after breaking Miami's 11-game winning streak in season openers. They played three of the four division winners in the AFC and beat NFC South winner Carolina Panthers (14-10). In the Texans' last seven games at Reliant Stadium, the outcome was dependent on the final drive of the game with the Texans winning three and their opponents winning four.

Rookie RB Domanick Davis and rookie WR Andre Johnson opened eyes around the league in 2003, combining for seven Rookie of the Week honors. Davis became the first Texans player to eclipse the 1,000-yard mark (1,031 yards). Johnson fell 24 yards short of 1,000 (976 yards) on 66 receptions. With David Carr completing this potent offensive trio, Texans fans are very optimistic about the near future.

Even though the defense was riddled by injuries all year, with nine of the Texans' 17 players on the reserved/injured list coming on the defensive side of the ball, every member did their part to keep games close. In fact, the games were so close that the last seven games played in Reliant Stadium came down to the last possession. LB Jamie Sharper led the defense with a league-leading 195 tackles on the season, starting every game of the year. Despite the Texans' injury-plagued season marked by close losses, the Texans move into the off-season with a solid and young foundation to build on for next year.

The Texans (5-11) dropped their final outing of the season in a gripping 20-17 loss to the Indianapolis Colts at Reliant Stadium. After a scoreless first quarter, K Mike Vanderjagt's 39-yard field goal in the second put Indianapolis ahead 3-0. The Texans answered when RB Domanick Davis scampered 11 yards into the end zone soon after to give the Texans a 7-3 lead. An interception by CB Marcus Coleman on Indy's next possession set up K Kris Brown's 36-yard field goal to give Houston a 10-3 halftime lead. On Houston's opening drive of the second half, Davis topped the 1,000-yard mark for the season on a 14-yard carry, then picked up his second touchdown of the day on a 13vard run to give Houston a 17-3 lead. Indianapolis rallied to score 17 unanswered points in the fourth quarter and pull out the three-point win. RB Edgerrin James ignited the rally with a six-yard scoring run to put the score at 17-10. An interception by Indianapolis' defense set the Colts up at the Houston five, where QB Peyton Manning found WR Brandon Stokley for a touchdown to tie it up, and then Vanderjagt booted a 43-yard field goal as time expired for the win.

Texans improve for third consecutive season

The Houston Texans finished the 2004 season with a 7-9 record –two games better than 2003 and with significant accomplishments to build upon next season.

The Texans lost 22-14 to the Cleveland Browns to end the season but strung together a two-game road winning streak at Chicago and Jacksonville early in December. Houston had three two-game win streaks after going the first two years without back-to-back wins. The Texans also swept two AFC South opponents – Jacksonville and Tennessee – to finish 4-2 in what many consider the toughest division in professional football.

WR Andre Johnson became the first Texan selected to the Pro Bowl since 2002 and finished the year with 1,142 receiving yards and six touchdowns. QB David Carr set career highs in yards (3,531), touchdowns (16) and completions (285). RB Domanick Davis overcame a slow start to the season to rush for a career-high 1,188 yards and a team record 13 rushing touchdowns. The Texans improved from 2002 and 2003 in 10 offensive categories.

Defensively, the Texans ended on a high note keeping opponents out of the end zone for 13 consecutive quarters in the months of December and January – an NFL season high. The unit started three rookies, CB Dunta Robinson, LB Jason Babin and SS Glenn Earl. Babin finished second to Kailee Wong (5.5) with four sacks. Robinson led the team with six interceptions, three forced fumbles, three sacks and finished second in Defensive Rookie of the Year voting.

K Kris Brown has yet to miss an extra point since joining the Texans in 2002 and made 34 point after attempts and 17 field goals in 2004. P Chad Stanley punted 73 times for a 41.2 yard average.

After a scoreless first quarter, Texans QB David Carr sailed a pass over WR Corey Bradford's shoulder for a 37-yard touchdown strike to give Houston a 7-0 lead. The Bears got on the board in the third quarter when their defense pressured Carr and he was forced to throw out of the end zone. His incomplete pass was tagged as an intentional grounding penalty giving the Bears a safety. A fourth-quarter field goal made it 7-5. Houston answered swiftly with a 20-yard field goal from K Kris Brown to extend the lead to 10-5. Davis scored from 11 yards out to give the Texans a 17-5 lead. With under five minutes remaining, Texans LB Charlie Anderson scooped up a Bears fumble and sprinted 60 yards to paydirt, sealing the 24-5 win.

The Texans (7-8) defeated the Jaguars for the second time this season and finished division play with a 4-2 mark and sweep over both the Jaguars and Titans. Houston's 21-0 win marked the first shutout in team history. The offense piled up 333 yards and held the ball for nearly 40 minutes, while the defense held Jacksonville to a mere 126 total yards and forced three turnovers. Houston got the ball first and wasted no time marching down the field before RB Domanick Davis plunged into the end zone from one yard out to give Houston a 7-0 lead. In the second quarter, QB David Carr found WR Andre Johnson in the left corner of the end zone from 10 yards out and the Texans took a 14-0 lead. LB Kailee Wong intercepted Jacksonville QB David Garrard in the third quarter, but the offense couldn't convert the turnover into points. In the fourth quarter, Texans CB Dunta Robinson stripped the ball out of WR Troy Edwards hands. The ball sailed right into the hands of Texans LB Antwan Peek, who rumbled 66 yards for his first career touchdown extending the Texans lead 21-0. On the Jaguars next possession, Texans LB Jamie Sharper nailed Toefield and LB Jason Babin recovered the fumbled ball to give the Texans offense the opportunity to run out the clock for a shutout.

SUMMARY

The Texans (7-9) wrapped up their 2004 season on a sour note, falling to the Browns 22-14 at Reliant Stadium. Browns K Phil Dawson provided 15 of his team's points with five FGs. RB Domanick Davis rushed for 103 yards and one score, but the Texans had just 102 net passing yards as the Browns sacked QB David Carr six times. After Dawson's 45-yard field goal gave Cleveland a 3-0 lead early, the Texans answered on the ensuing drive when QB David Carr hit RB Jonathan Wells on a six-yard touchdown strike to put Houston up 7-3. Cleveland then proceeded to reel off 19 consecutive points over the next three quarters to go up 22-7. The Texans weren'r ready to throw in the towel as Davis punched in a one-yard touchdown run to bring the score to 22-14. Texans K Kris Brown attempted an onside kick to give Houston one last scoring shot but Cleveland recovered the ball to secure a 22-14 win in the last week

Texans finish the season 2-14

The Houston Texans completed their fourth season with a 2-14 record, worst in franchise history. Houston faced five teams that had at least ten wins on the season, four of which made the playoffs and three that won their division.

Houston was plagued by injuries and changes during their 2005 campaign. The Texans had 10 combinations starters on the offensive line. Five Texans linemen started at least two games at different positions. Houston improved on their rushing average in 2005, averaging 4.2 yards per carry versus 3.9 the season before. RB Domanick Davis battled through inflammation in his knee the entire season to rush for 976 yards, falling 24 yards shy of his third consecutive 1,000 yard season to begin his career. Others like Carr and RB Jonathan Wells picked up the slack. Both rushed for over 300 yards and passed the career 1,000 yard rushing mark. They join Davis as the only three players to rush for 1,000 yards as a Texan.

The Texans defense was hampered by injury. They said goodbye to their signal caller and leader LB Kailee Wong in Week 5 when he tore ligaments in his knee forcing him to miss the season. The middle was anchored by LB Morlon Greenwood, who led the team with 143 tackles, and LB DaShon Polk, who made a career high 134 tackles.

Houston also got contributions from a pair of rookies picked on the second day of the draft who came up big. KR Jerome Mathis, a fourth-round pick, was named to the Pro Bowl and was named AP First Team All Pro as he averaged 28.6 yards per return. He returned a pair of kickoffs for touchdowns, including the first in Texans history. S C.C. Brown, a sixth-round pick, set a Texans rookie record by recording 93 tackles and made one interception.

SUMMARY

The Texans (0-2) lost their second consecutive game to open the season for only the second time in team history, falling 27-7 to the Pittsburgh Steelers on a steamy 90 degree day at Reliant Stadium. The Steelers started off fast, scoring on their first four possessions to race out to a 20-0 halftime lead. WR Hines Ward caught a pair of touchdowns for Pittsburgh, scoring from 16 yards out in the first quarter and from 14 on the first play of the second quarter. Houston's sole touchdown came in the third quarter on a three-yard pass from QB David Carr to RB Domanick Davis. Davis led the team in rushing and receiving on the day, running for 59 yards on 15 carries and catching four balls for 33 yards and the touchdown. Carr completed 16-of-26 passes for 167 yards and a score but was sacked eight times by the relentless Steelers defense. After a Toefield touchdown, WR Andre Johnson scored on a 53-yard hookup with Carr to put the Texans up 20-17. SUMMARY

The Texans (2-14) finished with the worst record in the league thanks to a 20-17 overtime loss to the San Francisco 49ers at Monster Park. In wet and windy conditions, the Texans were unable to hold onto their 10-point firstquarter lead and were outscored 20-7 the rest of the way. Houston got on the board with 9:18 left in the first thanks to K Kris Brown's 21-yardfield goal. Morency rushed for a three-yard touchdown on the next drive to put Houston up 10-0. A touchdown late in the second quarter and a field goal to start the third rallied San Francisco to a 10-10 tie. Backup QB Tony Banks threw a 25-yard touchdown pass to WR Corey Bradford to put Houston up 17-10 in the third, but the 49ers tied it again thanks to a 40-yard interception return for touchdown. K Joe Nedney eventually won it for the Niners with 3:55 remaining in overtime on a 33-yard field goal.

TEXANS WIN SIX IN KUBIAK'S FIRST SEASON

The Houston Texans finished the first season of the Gary Kubiak era with a 6-10 record, the second best mark in team history. After dropping the first three games of the season, the Texans finished the season with a 6-7 record including a pair of wins over their division rival Jacksonville Jaguars and the team's first win over AFC Champion Indianapolis, preventing the Colts from obtaining a first-round bye in the playoffs. The Texans finished the season strong as they won three games in the month of December, tying a team high in wins in a month.

Houston was led by the Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year LB DeMeco Ryans. He led the NFL with 126 solo tackles and finished with 156 total tackles, second in the NFL. The Texans defense improved as the season progressed. After struggling during the first three games of the season, the Texans defense finished the season yielding 337.5 yards per game, the fewest amount of yards since giving up 326.9 in 2002. Houston's secondary was led by CB Dunta Robinson. The thirdyear corner from South Carolina finished the season tied for the team lead in interceptions (2) and recorded his first career touchdown with a nine-yard return against the Buffalo Bills in Week 12.

On offense, WR Andre Johnson again led the Texans for the third consecutive season in receptions with a teamrecord and NFL season-high 103 receptions. He also set a team record with 1,147 receiving yards. QB David Carr led the NFL with a 68.3 completion percentage, while completing 302 passes, a new career and team high.

Houston won four more games this season than in 2006, establishing a team record for the biggest turnaround in team history. The Texans enter the 2007 draft with the eighth overall pick in the first round.

K Kris Brown got the Texans on the board in the second quarter thanks a 41-yard field goal making the score 7-3. Houston took the lead in the third quarter when QB David Carr took to the air, launching himself from the Giants' two-yard line into the end zone to put his team in front 10-7 with 1:14 remaining in the third quarter.

The Texans (3-7) stormed back from a 14-point deficit to lead 21-17 late in the fourth quarter against the Buffalo Bills at Reliant Stadium, but a 15-yard touchdown pass from QB J.P. Losman to WR Peerless Price with just nine seconds remaining earned Buffalo the win. The loss snapped a twogame winning streak for the Texans and ruined a recordsetting performance by QB David Carr, who completed 22 consecutive passes at one point to tie the NFL single-game record. SUMMARY

The Texans (6-10) defeated the Cleveland Browns 14-6 for their first-ever season-ending victory. With Houston's win against the Indianapolis Colts, the Texans finished the 2006 season with back-to-back wins and finished with their best home record in franchise history with a 4-4 mark at Reliant Stadium. Rookie RB Chris Taylor had a career-high 99 yards on 20 carries. He added his first NFL touchdown to the stats sheet as well, the only offensive score in the game. Houston managed just 177 total yards in the game and had the ball for less than 22 minutes. Trailing 3-0 at halftime, Taylor scored to cap Houston's first drive of the second half to make the score 7-3. The game's decisive play happened on Cleveland's ensuing drive as DT Anthony Maddox forced a fumble while sacking Browns QB Charlie Frye. Maddox picked the ball off the ground and rumbled 47 yards for his first career touchdown to make the score 14-3. Houston held Cleveland to just three more points the rest of the way. Houston's 6-10 record marked a four-game improvement over the 2005 season and also the second-best record in franchise history.

TEXANS WIN FRANCHISE RECORD EIGHT GAMES

The Houston Texans finished the 2007 campaign with their best mark in team history with an 8-8 record. Houston played well at Reliant Stadium finishing 6-2 at home, besting their 4-4 record from a year ago. Houston finished the season on a four-game home winning streak to set a team record.

The Texans offense was led by QB Matt Schaub, but when he was slowed by an injury, the Texans did not skip a beat with QB Sage Rosenfels under center. The Texans finished the season setting franchise records with 43 touchdowns, 5,337 total net yards and 3,751 passing yards.

Houston's defense was led by the starting 2008 Pro Bowl MLB DeMeco Rvans, who led the team with 127 tackles. He teamed with DE Mario Williams: both were named second team AP All-Pro. Williams set a franchise record by recording 14 sacks in his sophomore campaign.

The Texans tied an NFL record by returning four kickoffs for scores. WR André Davis set a team record with three kickoff returns on the season. K Kris Brown set a team record with 115 points and set an NFL record by recording three field goals of 54-yards or longer in one game.

SUMMARY

The Texans (8-8) earned their best record in franchise history with a 42-28 victory over the Jacksonville Jaguars in Reliant Stadium. WR André Davis became just the seventh player in NFL history to return two kickoffs for touchdowns in a game. The Texans' 42 points were a team record. RB Ron Dayne and TE Owen Daniels both found the end zone in the first half, but Davis stole the show before halftime. After a Jaguars touchdown, Davis returned his first kickoff for a touchdown, racing 97 yards down the sideline just 15 seconds before halftime. On the first play of the second half, Davis dashed 104 yards on the opening kickoff to make it 28-14. Dayne and RB Darius Walker both scored second-half touchdowns to complete the Texans scoring spree. The win gave Houston its first .500 record in franchise history.

TEXANS WIN EIGHT GAMES BACK-TO-BACK

The Houston Texans finished the 2008 campaign with their second consecutive 8-8 season. The 16 wins over two seasons are the most in team history. Head coach Gary Kubiak became the Texans all-time leader in wins, amassing 22 over his first three seasons in Houston.

The Texans finished the season with four wins in the month of December to set a team record for wins in a month. Houston won five of its last six games which included the team's first four-game winning streak. The Texans finished the season with a win over the Chicago Bears 31-24 for their third consecutive win in the season finale.

Houston began the season with three consecutive road games, becoming the first team since 2001 to start the home portion of their season in October. The Texans endured Hurricane Ike, which hit in the Houston area on September 13 and damaged the roof of Reliant Stadium forcing the team to reschedule their Week 2 matchup against Baltimore. The Texans started the year 0-4, but managed to finish 8-4 over the last 12 weeks becoming the 10th team in NFL history to start 0-4 or worse and finish .500 or better.

A late touchdown run by Orton capped the scoring. Slaton ran for 92 yards in the game to capture the rookie rushing title with a franchise-record 1,282 yards. Johnson caught 10 passes for 148 yards to finish the year with 115 catches for 1,575

HOUSTON TEXANS 2010 SEASON-IN-REVIEW

TEXANS COMPLETE SEASON WITH THEIR BEST RECORD IN TEAM HISTORY

The Houston Texans wrapped up their best season in franchise history, winning their last four games to finish the season 9-7, tied for the fourth best record in the AFC and a tie breaker away from making the NFL's post season. The Texans finished second in their division, which was the highest in team history.

Houston finished with the fourth-best offense in the NFL after gaining a team-record 6,129 yards and scored 388 points, also a team record. Houston's offense gained over 400 yards of offense in eight games, including the last four games of the season. OB Matt Schaub became the first Texan to lead the NFL in passing with 4,770 yards. WR Andre Johnson led the league with 1,569 receiving yards and lead the NFL in back-to-back seasons for the first time since Jerry Rice did from 1993-95. The combination of Schaub and Johnson was the first combination to lead the league in passing and receiving since Brett Favre and Antonio Freeman of the Green Bay Packers in 1998.

Defensively, Houston finished with the best performance in team history, winding up 13th and yielding a mere 324.9 yards per game. The Texans were led by their linebackers that finished one and two in team tackles. Brian Cushing, who was voted the AP Defensive Rookie of the Year, finished with 133 tackles, a team-leading four interceptions, four sacks and 12 tackles for loss. DeMeco Ryans finished with 123 tackles and earned his second trip to the Pro Bowl.

Joining Ryans in the Pro Bowl were DE Mario Williams, who had 9.0 sacks to lead the team, Cushing, Schaub and Johnson. Schaub finished the Pro Bowl with 189 passing yards and two touchdowns to earn the game's MVP honor.

Next season Houston will face opponents with a combined .547 winning percentage, tying them for the toughest schedule in the NFL. Houston owns the 20th pick in the first round, the lowest the Texans have selected in the first round.

TEXANS 7, JETS 24 RELIANT STADIUM - 9/13 - 70,118

In one of the most anticipated Week 1 matchups in the NFL, the Texans learned that they have a lot to work on in a lopsided 24-7 loss to the New York Jets.

The Jets cruised by the Texans behind 462 total yards of offense, including 190 rushing yards. On the other side of the ball, Rex Ryan made his head coaching debut and witnessed his defense hold the Texans' offense scoreless and limit them to 183 yards of offense.

Texans quarterback Matt Schaub was pressured most of the afternoon and appeared to be slowed by his left ankle injury. He finished with 166 yards on 18-of-33 passing with an interception.

On the ground, running back Steve Slaton had only 17 yards on nine attempts. In one of the few times that the Texans' offense drove inside New York territory, Slaton was tackled and fumbled at the 15-yard line at the end of a slashing 18-yard reception. The Jets recovered the ball to quiet the 70,118 fans in attendance.

The Jets scored first at the end of the first quarter when Jay Feely capped a 16-play, 68-yard drive with a 24-yard field goal.

Jets running back Leon Washington gained 12 yards on first-and-15 on New York's next drive, but the play was followed by two Mark Sanchez incompletions and a punt. On third-and-three from the 27, Sanchez was leveled before throwing by linebacker Xavier Adibi, who came up the middle untouched on a blitz.

Slaton's fumble occurred on the next series, when he was hit by cornerback Donald Strickland. Defensive end Mike Devito recovered the ball and ran seven yards to the New York 22.

The Jets then extended their lead to 10-0 with a 30-yard touchdown pass from Sanchez to wide receiver Chandi Stuckey, who was wide open in the middle of the end zone on a busted coverage by the Texans' secondary. The score capped a 10-play, 78-yard drive that ended with about three minutes left to play in the first half.

With 5:18 left in the third quarter, the Texans appeared to generate some momentum. Tight end Owen Daniels caught a 27-yard pass to the Houston 41. On third-and-nine, Schaub found Andre Johnson open for seven yards. Coach Gary Kubiak left the offense on the field for fourth-and-two, and Schaub's pass intended for Daniels was broken up by safety Eric Smith to give the Jets' offense possession at the Houston 49.

The Texans scored their only points on a fumble return for a touchdown with 12:18 remaining in the contest. Safety John Busing picked off Sanchez's pass and returned it 15 yards before he was tackled and fumbled. Safety Dominique Barber recovered the loose ball and scored on a 48-yard return. Kris Brown's extra point made it 17-7.

Houston held the momentum only briefly. Sanchez converted another third down on a 40-yard pass to tight end Dustin Keller to the Houston 33. After a five-yard illegal substitution penalty, Jones scored on a 38-yard run off **the right guard**.

TEXANS 34, TITANS 31 LP FIELD - 9/20 - 69,143

In a game of big plays, the one that sealed victory for the Texans was both bizarre and anti-climactic. It was a fitting end to one of the most chaotic games in Texans history.

Quarterback Matt Schaub threw for 357 yards and a career-high four touchdowns to lead the Texans back from a 21-7 second-quarter deficit. Two of those touchdowns went to All-Pro receiver Andre Johnson, who caught 10 passes for 149 yards. The deciding score was Kris Brown's 23-yard field goal with 2:55 left in the game.

The Texans overcame a monstrous day from Titans running back Chris Johnson, who had 197 rushing yards on only 16 carries along with 87 receiving yards. He scored three touchdowns, on runs of 91 and 57 yards and a 69-yard catch.

Before Brown's 23-yard field goal that provided the winning margin, the Texans tied the game at 31 late in the third quarter on a one-yard touchdown catch by tight end Owen Daniels. Tennessee had taken a 31-24 lead when Chris Johnson broke loose for a 91-yard touchdown run earlier in the quarter.

It was a repeat of what Johnson did in the first quarter, when the Titans needed only nine plays to score their first 14 points thanks to their speedy running back. On Tennessee's first possession, Johnson ran 57 yards on thirdand-19 for his first touchdown run.

Andre Johnson's one-handed 19-yard touchdown catch tied the game at seven in the first quarter. Schaub was a perfect four-of-four on third down on the 14-play, 77-yard scoring drive, completing passes to Johnson, Daniels and Anderson.

On the ensuing drive, Chris Johnson scored again, this time on a 69-yard reception. The Texans didn't put a man on him at the line of scrimmage, and nobody covered him as he ran up the left sideline and caught Collins' pass en route to an easy score. Later Collins connected with receiver Nate Washington to make the score 21-7 in the second quarter.

The Texans wasted no time in beginning their comeback, making it 21-14 on the very next play from scrimmage with Schaub's 72-yard touchdown pass to Johnson. A few plays later, free safety Eugene Wilson intercepted Collins at the 42-yard line and returned the ball to the Tennessee 29. Schaub then found Jones for a game-tying 29-yard touchdown pass.

With 10:29 left to play, the Texans turned back the Titans on fourth-and-six from the Houston 33-yard line. The defense also forced a three-and-out on the Titans' next possession, giving Houston the ball at its own 32 with 7:10 left in the game. Schaub then marched the Texans 63 yards in nine plays, the biggest a 44-yard pass to Jones on the first play of the drive, to lead to Brown's deciding field goal. Schaub converted a two-yard quarterback sneak on fourth-and-inches from the Titans' 15-yard line that kept alive the game-winning drive.

The Texans were in familiar territory Sunday battling an AFC South rival in a back-and-forth contest. Coach Gary Kubiak even told the players at halftime, when the Texans led 21-17, that they were in the same game as a week ago at Tennessee.

The difference though, was that the Texans committed the critical fourth quarter mistake instead of their opponent.

With 2:10 left in the Texans' 31-24 loss to the Jacksonville Jaguars, running back Chris Brown rushed off the right tackle on the one-yard line before fumbling into the end zone. The Jaguars recovered the ball and maintained possession once officials upheld the fumble ruling on the field.

Prior to Brown's fumble, which officials upheld after review, wide receiver Kevin Walter was penalized on a controversial pass interference call that negated tight end Joel Dreessen's touchdown catch.

Coming off his four touchdown passes at Tennessee, quarterback Matt Schaub had a productive day against the Jaguars aside from an interception on the opening drive. He completed 26-of-35 attempts for 300 yards with three touchdowns.

In his regular season debut, Walter had a game-high seven catches for 96 yards and a touchdown.

Trailing 3-0 in the first quarter after Josh Scobee's 52-yard field goal, Schaub connected with wide receiver Jacoby Jones on an 18-yard touchdown that helped make the score 7-3.

Jacksonville regained the lead on David Garrard's two-yard touchdown run. Prior to the play, Kubiak challenged a 15-yard touchdown catch by Ernest Wilford, who stepped out of bounds prior to crossing the goal line.

With 5:33 left before halftime, Schaub found Walter open for a nine-yard touchdown, which was followed less than a minute later by Maurice Jones-Drew's 61-yard score.

The rapid fire offense continued on the ensuing possession, when Schaub connected with Steve Slaton, Andre Johnson and Owen Daniels for 41 yards. On third-and-goal, Schaub found Daniels open in the end zone to help make the score 21-17, Texans, at halftime.

To begin the second half, the Jaguars marched 83 yards on 10 plays. The Jaguars took a 24-21 lead on Jones-Drew's one-yard touchdown run.

The Texans evened the score thanks to Brown's 27-yard field goal, but the Jaguars answered with a touchdown drive courtesy of Jones-Drew's eight-yard run, which gave the visitors a 31-24 lead early in the fourth quarter.

While the Jaguars carried all the momentum in the fourth quarter, cornerback Dunta Robinson revitalized the crowd by forcing a fumble on wide receiver Mike Sims-Walker. Linebacker Zac Diles recovered the fumble at the Houston 49.

Schaub marched the offense down to the one-yard line before Brown's fumble squashed the Texans' comeback hopes.

TEXANS 29, RAIDERS 6 RELIANT STADIUM - 10/4 - 70,291

The Texans won their first home game of the season by a 29-6 margin over the Oakland Raiders.

It was the most complete performance of the season by the Texans' defense, which limited the visitors to 165 net yards of offense, including only 45 on the ground, and two third down conversions on 15 attempts.

It was a gutsy performance by the defense, which had three new starters in safeties Dominique Barber and Bernard Pollard and cornerback Glover Quin. Barber replaced free safety Eugene Wilson, who was sidelined with flu-like symptoms.

In the first quarter, WR Andre Johnson had a big 62-yard gain set up K Kris Brown for a 26-yard field goal to give Houston an early 3-0 lead.

On the Raiders' second possession, defensive tackle Amobi Okoye sacked quarterback JaMarcus Russell for a five-yard loss on second down. Linebacker DeMeco Ryans then stopped running back Michael Bush for a one-yard loss on third-and-long to force Oakland's second punt.

Oakland's offense returned to the field less than a minute later after Texans RB Steve Slaton fumble was recovered by Matt Shaugnessy. Sebastian Janikowski's 46-yard field goal capped a five-play, 15-yard scoring drive.

Texans QB Matt Schaub completed another long pass on the next series, connecting with Kevin Walter for 41 yards to the Oakland 24. Four plays later, Brown's 34-yard field goal gave the Texans a 6-3 lead early in the second quarter.

The Texans extended their lead when Slaton rushed in for a 32-yard touchdown on a delayed handoff. On the drive, Slaton and running back Ryan Moats totaled 67 yards on five carries on the drive.

A career-long 44-yard catch by tight end Owen Daniels to the Oakland 17 set up Slaton's second touchdown of the game on an 18-yard screen pass. Slaton lined up wide left and followed blocks by Johnson, Duane Brown and Kasey Studdard into the end zone.

Raiders first-round pick Darrius Heyward-Bey responded with an 18-yard catch and 20-yard end around to move Oakland into Houston territory. On fourth-and-nine at the 35-yard line, Russell completed a 19-yard pass to rookie wide receiver Louis Murphy. Four plays later, Janikowski booted a 33-yard field goal that made the score 20-6 with 2:05 left before halftime.

With 10:29 remaining in the third quarter, the Texans collected their first takeaway on a fumble recovery by defensive end Antonio Smith. Ryans tackled Bush and forced the fumble at the Oakland 41. Four plays later, Matt Turk 's punt was downed at the one-yard line by André Davis.

On the first play, LB Brian Cushing shot through a gap to wrestle down RB Justin Fargas in the end zone to make the score 22-6 with 8:53 left in the third quarter. On the ensuing kick return, Jacoby Jones sprinted through the middle of Oakland's coverage team to score on a 95-yard touchdown.

Defensive end Mario Williams forced the Raiders' second turnover with 10:15 left in the game when he sacked Russell at the Oakland 20 and ripped the ball away. Rookie defensive end Connor Barwin recovered for no gain to maintain the Texans 23-point lead.

The Texans were on the verge of their biggest comeback victory in team history until the final minute of their 28-21 loss Sunday to the Arizona Cardinals.

After entering halftime with a 21-0 deficit, the Texans evened the score at 21-21 with 4:15 left in the game behind a physical 17-yard touchdown grab by Andre Johnson, who had a game-high eight catches for 101 yards and two scores.

Arizona regained the lead on the Texans' ensuing possession, when cornerback Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie intercepted Matt Schaub's pass to wide receiver Kevin Walter and returned it 49 yards for a touchdown.

A 63-yard kickoff return by André Davis put Houston back in scoring range, but the Texans' potential game-tying drive stalled at the one-yard line after running back Steve Slaton gained five yards on a shovel pass.

With three tries from within a yard of the goal line, running back Chris Brown was stopped twice on second and fourth down, while a third down pass to tight end Joel Dreessen was ruled incomplete at the back of the end zone. Arizona took over on downs and ran out the rest of the game clock.

With a Texans' ground game that averaged only 2.1 yards per carry, Schaub attempted a career-high 50 passes with a career-high 35 completions for 371 yards. He completed throws to nine different players.

Defensively, the Texans forced only two punts in the first half, but Arizona punted on all five of their second half possessions except for their final series.

Trailing 7-0 with 2:35 left in the first quarter, the Texans recorded their only takeaway when safety Eugene Wilson tackled wide receiver Anquan Boldin and forced a fumble at the Houston two-yard line. Linebacker DeMeco Ryans recovered the fumble and returned it 29 yards. After review, officials confirmed the ruling on the field.Johnson then caught a pass for 21 yards and running back Slaton gained 24 yards on three carries before Kris Brown 's 35-yard field goal attempt was blocked by defensive end Calais Campbell.

Arizona extended their lead in the second quarter thanks to quarterback Kurt Warner's deft touch. He completed five passes for 66 yards on the scoring drive. An eight-yard pass interference penalty on cornerback Jacques Reeves set up Warner's nine-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Larry Fitzgerald, which made the score 14-0 with 1:44 left before halftime. Less than a minute later, after a quick three-and-out by Houston, Arizona began from the Houston 48 following Matt Turk's 29-yard punt. Warner found Fitzgerald open on a 26-yard touchdown pass to extend the Cardinals' lead to 21-0.

Midway through the third quarter, Schaub led the Texans on a 10-play, 64-yard scoring drive. He completed four passes for 42 yards, and Brown scored on a one-yard dive to help cut the Cardinals' lead to 21-7.

A 27-yard pass to tight end Owen Daniels, followed by Slaton's 23-yard catch-and-run, gave Houston a first down at the Arizona 27. A 15-yard catch by wide receiver David Anderson on third-and-eight moved Houston to the 10-yard line. Johnson's weaving 11-yard touchdown catch on a screen made the score 21-14 after Brown's extra point.

The Texans put together a 60-minute effort, and the result was a convincing road victory that moved their record to 3-3. Behind a huge game from quarterback Matt Schaub and a stout performance from an improving defense, the Texans led for almost the entirety of their 28-17 victory over the Cincinnati Bengals.

Schaub threw for 392 yards and four touchdowns, including two to tight end Owen Daniels. The others went to running back Steve Slaton and wide receiver Jacoby Jones.

Rookie linebacker Brian Cushing had the best game of his promising young career, tallying nine tackles, two forced fumbles and a game-clinching interception. In the second half, Frank Bush's defense held the Bengals scoreless and allowed just 78 total yards. They gave up only six yards in the third quarter.

The Texans forced the Bengals into five three-and-outs on 13 possessions, and they shut down Cedric Benson, the NFL's leading rusher. Benson scored in the second quarter but gained just 44 yards on 16 carries (2.8 avg.).

The Texans gained 472 yards of offense. Slaton had 102 yards receiving and 43 rushing, and Andre Johnson had a game-high 135 receiving yards.

The Texans' offensive explosion started on their first play from scrimmage, when Andre Johnson picked up 59 yards on a screen pass. Kris Brown's 28-yard field goal attempt was blocked, but the Texans scored on their next possession with a 12-yard touchdown pass from Schaub to Daniels.

The Bengals scored all 17 of their points in the second quarter. Their first points came on a 10-yard touchdown run by Benson early in the period, which tied the game at seven.

On the ensuing drive, Slaton put the Texans back on top with a 38-yard touchdown off of a screen pass. After Slaton caught the pass in the left flat, left tackle Duane Brown threw a block near the line of scrimmage that sprang him to daylight.

With less than a minute before halftime, the Bengals tied it again with an eight-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Carson Palmer to wide receiver Laveranues Coles. Schaub was then picked off by cornerback Chris Crocker at the Cincinnati 41-yard line with 18 seconds left in the half. Crocker's 18-yard return set up a 50-yard field goal by Shayne Graham on the last play of the first half, which put the Bengals up 17-14.

That was the Bengals' only lead of the game, and it didn't last long. Four minutes into the third quarter, the Texans went ahead on Schaub's third touchdown pass of the game. It was a 23-yard strike to Jones, who was wide open in the end zone after a play-action fake.

After that three-and-out, the Texans drove 66 yards to extend their lead to 28-17 with a spectacular one-handed touchdown catch by Daniels from seven yards out.

With 3:37 left in the game, the Bengals got the ball at their own 20-yard line. They reached the Texans' 26-yard line at the two-minute warning, but Cushing ended Cincinnati's comeback hopes with an interception at the 11-yard line. The Texans kneeled out the remaining time on the clock to walk away with the victory.

The Texans showed the resolve of a veteran team Sunday by shutting down the San Francisco 49ers' comeback attempt in a 24-21 win at Reliant Stadium.

After a nearly flawless first half, the Texans saw their 21-0 halftime lead whittled to three points in the fourth quarter. But on the 49ers' potential game-winning drive, safety Eugene Wilson picked off quarterback Alex Smith with 36 seconds on the game clock to preserve Houston's fourth win of the season.

The Texans' defense limited the 49ers to only 50 total net yards of offense in the first half, but San Francisco responded behind Smith, who replaced starter Shaun Hill in the third quarter. Smith finished with 206 passing yards and three touchdowns to tight end Vernon Davis.

Quarterback Matt Schaub continued his excellent play by completing 20-of-30 passes for 264 yards with two touchdowns. Pro Bowler Andre Johnson saw blanket coverage all game, which opened up opportunities for Pro Bowl tight end Owen Daniels, who caught seven passes for a game-high 123 yards and one touchdown. Running back Steve Slaton chipped in with four catches for 22 yards and a touchdown, while gaining 67 yards on 18 carries with a score.

With 6:38 left in the first quarter, the Texans began their third drive from their 39-yard line. Daniels snagged a 31-yard pass in the middle of the field before wide receiver Kevin Walter's nine-yard catch to the San Francisco 21. On third-and-five from the 25-yard line, Daniels' 12-yard catch moved the chains and set up Slaton's one-yard touchdown run.

Johnson caught his first pass of the game on an 18-yard strike from Schaub on third-and-12 from the Houston 26. Four plays later, the Texans punted, but wide receiver Arnaz Battle muffed the catch at the 10-yard line, where André Davis recovered the fumble. Two plays later, Slaton caught a screen pass and avoided two defenders to score a nine-yard touchdown.

The offense returned to the field with 6:46 left before halftime. Schaub's 42-yard pass to Daniels on a perfectly executed play action fake extended the Texans' lead to 21-0.

On the opening drive of the third quarter, Smith completed his first pass to rookie Michael Crabtree for 17 yards to the Houston 48. Later, Smith put San Francisco on the scoreboard with a 29-yard touchdown pass to Davis.

The 49ers moved 66 yards on 10 plays, after they recovered a Slaton fumble, to cut their deficit to seven points. On third-and-seven from the Houston 31, wide receiver Josh Morgan caught a 17-yard pass across the middle. On the next play, Davis made a 14-yard touchdown reception to make the score 21-14.

On the next Houston possession, Kris Brown nailed the 50-yard field goal, though, making the score 24-14 with 7:16 left in the game.

In response, Smith led the 49ers 73 yards on seven plays over 3:33 and completed a 23-yard touchdown pass to Davis with 3:43 left in the game.

TEXANS 31, BILLS 10 RALPH WILSON STADIUM - 11/1 - 69,790

The Texans overcame a mistake-filled first quarter to beat the Buffalo Bills with stout defense and a breakout performance by running back Ryan Moats.

The Texans never led in the first three quarters, but they pulled away late with three fourth-quarter rushing touchdowns from Moats. Houston dominated the time of possession, holding the ball for more than 39 minutes, and is now 5-3 for the first time in team history after a 31-10 victory at Ralph Wilson Stadium.

Moats got the bulk of the Texans' carries after Steve Slaton lost a fumble in the first quarter. He wound up with 23 attempts for 126 yards and three touchdowns, all career-highs, and became the first player in club history with three touchdowns in a game.

Just about everything that could go wrong in the first quarter did for the Texans. They had two penalties and three turnovers, one on Slaton's fumble and two on interceptions by quarterback Matt Schaub. Owen Daniels, who came into the game leading all NFL tight ends in receiving yards, was injured on the Texans' second drive and did not return.

Bills rookie safety Jairus Byrd was on the receiving end of both of Schaub's first quarter interceptions. Buffalo needed only one play to turn the second one into seven points, scoring a touchdown on a 29-yard end around by wide receiver Terrell Owens late in the first quarter.

The Texans trimmed the Bills' lead to 7-3 on a 42-yard field goal by Kris Brown early in the second quarter. Brown added another field goal from 22 yards out with 2:21 left in the first half to bring the Texans to within a point. That field goal came after the Texans drove 86 yards, their longest scoring drive of the season.

The offense followed suit in the second half, outgained the Bills 123-19 in the third quarter. On their first possession, they seamlessly drove 72 yards, keyed by a 36-yard catch by Jacoby Jones, to set up Brown's third field goal of the game. The 26-yard kick made the score 10-9.

The Texans continued their offensive surge by taking the lead for the first time on Moats' first touchdown run, an 11-yarder early in the fourth quarter. Johnson caught a pass in the back of the end zone for a two-point conversion, which put the Texans up 17-10.

On the second play of the Bills' following possession, QB Ryan Fitzpatrick was under pressure from defensive end Antonio Smith, who had a sack earlier in the game. Fitzpatrick heaved a desperation pass down the field, and CB Jacques Reeves picked it off at the Texans' 30-yard line. Ten plays and 66 yards later, the Texans went ahead 31-10 on Moats' third touchdown, a three-yard run with 3:34 left to play.

The Bills gained 54 of their 77 second-half yards on their next possession, but LB Brian Cushing ended their scoring chance with his interception at the Texans' 25-yard line. Schaub took a knee three times to run the final two minutes off the clock and end the game.

TEXANS 17, COLTS 20 LUCAS OIL STADIUM - 11/8 - 66,033

Kicker Kris Brown missed wide left on a 42-yard field goal attempt as time expired, and the Texans remain winless in Indianapolis after a 20-17 loss to the undefeated Colts.

Beginning with Brown's long field goal at the end of the first half, the Texans scored 17 unanswered points to overcome a 13-point deficit. They took the lead for the first time on on a one-yard touchdown run by Steve Slaton early in the fourth quarter. Five minutes later, Colts running back Joseph Addai put Indianapolis back on top for good with a two-yard touchdown run.

Wide receiver Andre Johnson had 10 catches for 103 yards in the losing effort. Quarterback Matt Schaub threw for 311 yards and a touchdown but was picked off twice. The Texans had the ball for 34:33 but lost the turnover battle 3-2 and were penalized 13 times for 103 yards.

Indianapolis stormed out to a 13-0 lead using a no-huddle offense. Peyton Manning threw 25 passes in the first quarter and finished the game 34-of-50 for 318 yards. He had one touchdown, a seven-yarder to Addai that put the Texans down 7-0 in the first quarter. The Colts added field goals by kicker Matt Stover on their next two possessions.

The Texans didn't pick up a first down until midway through the second quarter on a six-yard carry by Ryan Moats. Ten plays later, Moats fumbled at the Colts' one-yard line as he was falling out of bounds after a nine-yard catch. Moats initially was ruled down, but Colts head coach Jim Caldwell threw his red challenge flag as the Texans lined up for their next play coming out of the two-minute warning.

Houston safet<mark>y Bernard Pollard</mark> prevented Indianapolis from capitalizing on the turnover by picking off Manning at the Texans' 14-yard line. His 36-yard return to midfield set up for Brown's 56-yard field goal at the end of the first half.

Thanks to Brown and their defense, the Texans only trailed by 10 at halftime despite being outgained 264-99 and being flagged for nine penalties.

Schaub and the offense started the second half with a 12-play, 86-yard scoring drive that ended with a one-yard touchdown catch by Moats. It cut the Colts' lead to 13-10.

After the touchdown, the Texans' defense forced a three-and-out. Schaub then found Jacoby Jones for a 45-yard pass that led to Slaton's touchdown run, which gave the Texans a 17-13 lead.

On the Colts' ensuing drive, Pollard thwarted another Indianapolis scoring threat with his second interception of the game. The Colts tried a wide receiver pass with Reggie Wayne on an end around, and Pollard snared it at the Texans' 24-yard line.

The Texans were unable to pick up a first down and punted back to the Colts. Eight plays and 61 yards later, Indianapolis took back the lead with Addai's two-yard touchdown run.

Schaub led the Texans on a furious last-minute drive, completing passes to five different receivers and moving the offense 61 yards in 11 plays.

With one second remaining, Schaub spiked the ball at the Indianapolis 24-yard line to stop the clock. Brown came on for the game-tying field goal attempt. It had plenty of distance but sailed wide left to end the game.

TEXANS 17 , TITANS 20 RELIANT STADIUM - 11/23 - 71,153

With a chance to tie the game on a 49-yard field goal attempt, Kris Brown's kick missed wide left with six seconds left on the game clock. The result was a 20-17 loss to the Tennessee Titans in front of a record 71,153 fans at Reliant Stadium.

It was a heartbreaking end to a thrilling game between fierce division rivals. Quarterback Matt Schaub finished with 305 yards on 25-of-39 passing with two touchdowns and no interceptions, while wide receiver Andre Johnson caught four passes for 78 yards and a touchdown.

Defensively, the Texans limited running back Chris Johnson from any huge gains, but the NFL's leading rusher still managed 151 yards on 29 carries (5.2 avg.). Houston did have trouble containing quarterback Vince Young's scrambling as he rushed for 73 yards on 11 carries to go with 116 passing yards and a score. Young's 12-yard scramble on third-and-three from the Tennessee 48 put kicker Rob Bironas in position for the 52-yard game-winning field goal.

Schaub took the Texans second possession down the field, completing his next three throws for 29 yards before his four-yard touchdown on a shovel pass to running back Steve Slaton.

Down 7-0, Young responded by leading the Titans on a nine-play, 75-yard scoring drive. His 13-yard touchdown pass to rookie Kenny Britt evened the score with 12:50 left in the first half.

Schaub found Andre Johnson open for a 12-yard touchdown to cap the six-play drive over 2:53 ton the next Texans possession.

Before halftime, Young drove the Titans 75 yards on eight plays and handed off to running back LenDale White for a one-yard touchdown. Bironas' extra point tied the score with 54 seconds left.

On the opening drive of the second half, the Titans drove deep into Houston territory when Young scrambled before fumbling off his knee at the 16-yard line. Safety Bernard Pollard recovered the loose ball for no gain. The Texans put together a six play drive that resulted in Brown missing from 49-yards out.

Tennessee moved into Houston territory after a six-yard scramble by Young, who just missed his second giveaway a play earlier when his pass was dropped by Texans CB Dunta Robinson. Later, Young scrambled 12 yards on third down to the 35-yard line. Bironas' 50-yard field goal gave the Titans a 17-14 lead with 2:49 left in the third quarter.

The Texans tied it up with Brown's 26-yard field goal late in the third quarter. Johnson caught a 49-yard play action pass to the Titans' eight-yard line to set up the score.

With a chance to take the lead with 5:14 left in the game, Schaub led the offense to midfield before Slaton dropped a short pass on third-and-10. Matt Turk's punt pinned Tennessee at its six-yard line.

A 15-yard yard horse collar penalty on safety John Busing gave the Titans a first down at the 24-yard line. On thirdand-three from the Houston 48, Young scrambled left 12 yards for a first down. Four plays later, Bironas' 53-yard field goal attempt split the uprights with 47 seconds left in the game.

With the ball at the 38-yard line, Schaub completed consecutive passes to Anderson for 25 yards to the Titans' 37-yard line before the Texans called a 30-second timeout with 21 seconds remaining in the game. Wide receiver Kevin Walter snagged a six-yard catch on the next play. After Schaub spiked the ball, he dove forward to center the ball at the 30-yard line, where Brown's 49-yard field goal attempt missed wide left.

TEXANS 27, COLTS 35 RELIANT STADIUM - 11/29 - 70,990

The Texans could not hold onto a double digit lead against the Indianapolis Colts at Reliant Stadium losing 35-27. The 70,990 fans in attendance witnessed the Texans' 17-point first half lead evaporate when the Colts went on a 35-3 run to finish the game.

Quarterback Matt Schaub completed his first nine passes, including a seven-yard touchdown pass to fullback Vonta Leach on a perfectly executed play action fake with 8:25 left in the first quarter. Schaub's first incompletion didn't come until early in the second quarter, when the Texans held a 14-0 lead.

Looking to capitalize off an interception by linebacker Brian Cushing, Schaub threw 29 yards to Andre Johnson on a double move. Johnson caught the pass in the end zone, but the ball was jarred loose when he hit the ground. The play was reviewed, and officials upheld the ruling on the field of an incomplete pass.

Six plays later, Kris Brown lined up for a 35-yard field goal that sailed over the left crossbar to give the Texans a 17-0 lead with 10:49 left in the first half.

Defensive end Antonio Smith was penalized 15 yards for roughing the passer, which was his second 15-yard penalty in the game, and quarterback Peyton Manning threw a nine-yard touchdown pass to Pierre Garcon to cut the lead to 17-7 in the second quarter.

Houston entered the locker room at halftime up 20-7 after Brown kicked a 33-yard field goal on the ensuing drive and rookie Brice McCain intercepted Manning with seven seconds on the first-half clock.

In perhaps the most controversial penalty of the game, officials flagged cornerback Jacques Reeves for holding on a pass that sailed well beyond Pierre Garcon. The play moved the Colts 43 yards to the Houston 19. Manning's four-yard touchdown pass to Reggie Wayne cut Houston's lead to 20-14 after the extra point.

In the third quarter, Manning found wide receiver Austin Collie open on consecutive passes for 39 total yards to move the Colts inside Houston territory. An 18-yard pass interference penalty on cornerback Dunta Robinson gave the Colts a first down at the 18-yard line. Manning's six-yard touchdown pass to tight end Dallas Clark gave the Colts a 21-20 lead after Stover's extra point.

Less than 30 seconds later, Schaub's pass intended for tight end James Casey was picked off by Clint Session, who silenced the crowd with his return for a touchdown.

Schaub lost a fumble on the next series when he was sacked by defensive end Robert Mathis. Defensive end Raheem Brock recovered the loose ball, and four plays later, running back Chad Simpson rushed for a 23-yard touchdown with 2:52 left in the game.

With 18 seconds left on the game clock, Schaub passed to wide receiver <mark>Jacoby Jones</mark> for a 10-yard touchdown. The Colts closed the door, though, when Brown's onside kick was batted out of bounds.

Maurice Jones-Drew spoiled their hopes of a comeback by literally running out the clock, picking up 38 yards on seven consecutive carries. Jones-Drew had only 38 yards on 17 carries (2.2 average) before that final drive.

Schaub left the game with a dislocated left shoulder after being sacked by Derrick Harvey on the Texans' first play. He returned midway through the second guarter and led a 10-play, 82-yard scoring drive that ended with an eightyard touchdown run by Brown. The Texans had gained 67 yards in four series with Rex Grossman at the helm.

Grossman threw an interception on his second pass of the game. He finished 3-of-9 for 33 yards with a passer rating of 5.6. Schaub's absence helped the Jaguars race out to a 17-0 lead, led by guarterback David Garrard's 199 passing vards and two touchdowns in the first half. Jaguars kicker Josh Scobee added field goals of 51 and 46 vards before halftime.

The Jaguars started their first series of the second half on their own three-yard line thanks to a 56-yard punt by Matt Turk. On second down, Garrard slipped and was tackled in the end zone for a safety by linebacker Zac Diles to make the score 20-9.

After starting their next possession with good field position at their own 39-yard line, the Texans drove to the Jacksonville 41. Schaub's pass for David Anderson was picked off by linebacker Justin Durant after safety Gerald Alexander knocked the ball out of Anderson's hands with a big hit. Durant's 27-yard return set up Scobee for a 24vard field goal with 4:37 left in the third guarter.

After a punt, Schaub hit Johnson with a 53-yard pass that moved the Texans to the Jacksonville 16 early in the fourth guarter. On first-and-goal from the five, Chris Brown attempted a pass on a toss sweep to the right. Brown was hit as he threw in the general direction of Joel Dreessen, and the pass floated to Alexander for an easy interception at the one vard-line.

The Texans forced a three-and-out after the turnover and got the ball back at the Jacksonville 46. Following first down catches by Anderson and Kevin Walter, Johnson took a pass over the middle, bounced off a tackler and got to the outside for an 11-yard gain to the one-yard line. His one-yard touchdown catch came one play later.

After the failed two-point conversion try on an incomplete pass from Schaub to Brown, the Jaquars got the ball back at their own 24-yard line. Jones-Drew picked up three rushing first downs, the last coming right before the two-minute warning. With the Texans out of timeouts, Garrard kneeled three times to end the game.

TEXANS 34, SEAHAWKS 7 RELIANT STADIUM - 12/13 - 70,380

Texans WR Andre Johnson was at his best with 10 catches for 184 yards (18.4 avg.) and two touchdowns all in the first half. His first touchdown came on the first play of scrimmage, when he blew past cornerback Marcus Trufant on a 64-yard pass play.

Johnson finished with 11 receptions for 193 yards (17.5 avg.), while quarterback Matt Schaub overcame his dislocated non-throwing shoulder from a week ago to complete 29-of-39 passes for 365 yards with two touchdowns and an interception.

By halftime, Houston had a 24-7 lead and 364 net yards of offense.

The Texans sealed the win when safety Bernard Pollard picked off quarterback Matt Hasselbeck's pass intended for fullback Justin Griffith. Pollard scored his second-career touchdown 70 yards later, which gave Houston a 34-7 lead with 2:57 left in the third quarter.

On defense, the Texans forced seven punts and only one third down conversion on 14 attempts. Defensive end Mario Williams contributed two sacks, and linebacker Brian Cushing added another sack, while the Texans finished with 15 tackles for loss.

It's the second-fewest points that the Texans have allowed an opponent this year after holding the Oakland Raiders to two field goals in a 29-6 win during Week 4.

The Texans began their third series from their 44-yard line and moved into scoring range when wide receiver David Anderson caught a 27-yard pass. Running back Ryan Moats' four-yard touchdown run helped put Houston ahead 17-0 with 2:50 left in the first quarter.

Linebacker Kevin Bentley, a former member of the Seahawks, deflected Jon Ryan's third punt, which traveled only 18 yards to the Houston 36. The Texans moved inside the 20-yard line on Johnson's 23-yard catch, which he followed with a 17-yard touchdown grab across the middle of the Seahawks' defense.

Seattle gained a first down for a first time with 11:42 left in the first half when linebacker DeMeco Ryans was penalized 15 yards for roughing the passer. Three plays later, Williams sacked quarterback Matt Hasselbeck to force a punt.

Late in the first half after Brown's kick was blocked, the Seahawks drove 84 yards in six plays on a scoring drive. Hasselbeck completed three passes for 56 yards before connecting with tight end John Carlson on a four-yard touchdown with 1:14 left in the first half.

K Kris Brown's field goal and Pollard's interception gave the Texans a commanding 27-point lead late in the third quarter.

It appeared that the Seahawks would cut their deficit early in the fourth quarter, when linebacker David Hawthorne picked up Moats' fumble and returned it 51 yards to the Houston 11. But on fourth-and-goal from the eight-yard line, rookie cornerback Brice McCain broke up Hasselbeck's pass intended for T.J. Houshmandzadeh in the corner of the end zone. The game ended with the Texans stopping Seattle on two more fourth down attempts.

TEXANS 16, RAMS 13 EDWARD JONES DOME - 12/20 - 46,256

Matt Schaub and Andre Johnson led the way yet again as the Texans kept their playoff hopes alive with a road victory over the St. Louis Rams.

The Texans are now 7-7 and very much alive in the AFC Wild Card race with two games remaining after their 16-13 victory dropped the Rams to 1-13 on the season.

Schaub threw for 367 yards, Johnson had nine catches for 196 yards and the Texans outgained the Rams 419 yards to 237. The Texans scored 16 points in four trips to the red zone.

Rams running back Steven Jackson, who entered the game as the league's second-leading rusher, accounted for nearly half of the Rams' offensive production with 82 rushing yards and 41 receiving yards. But the Texans limited rookie quarterback Keith Null to 173 passing yards and a touchdown, sacking him three times and picking off a pass in the red zone.

A 28-yard field goal by kicker Kris Brown with 4:36 left in the game provided the winning margin. Schaub and Johnson connected for consecutive passes of 30 and 44 yards to set up the game-deciding kick.

The Texans started the game with an eight-play, 60-yard drive, but a fumble by rookie running back Arian Foster at the St. Louis 19-yard line brought an abrupt end to the series. That would be Foster's last offensive play of the game.

The Rams and Texans exchanged short field goals to give the Texans a 6-3 lead late in the second quarter. Rams receiver Danny Amendola caught a two-yard touchdown pass with 1:47 left in the first half, capping a drive that included two offsides penalties on the Texans. Brown missed a 52-yard field goal that bounced off the right upright at the end of the second quarter to give the Rams a 10-6 lead at halftime.

On the Texans' first drive of the third quarter, Schaub lost a fumble on a quarterback sneak at the Houston 39yard line. Three plays later, Texans safety Dominique Barber intercepted Null at the 15-yard line. Null was being pressured by Smith on the play.

After the interception, the Texans drove 83 yards in 10 plays to take a 13-10 lead on a three-yard touchdown pass from Schaub to Kevin Walter. Schaub was 7-of-8 for 81 yards on the scoring drive, which included three catches for 40 yards by tight end Joel Dreessen.

The Rams tied the score at 13 on the next possession with a 52-yard field goal by Josh Brown with 1:50 left in the third quarter. St. Louis threatened to take the lead early in the fourth quarter with a drive that got into Texans' territory. But rookie defensive end Connor Barwin thwarted the scoring drive by sacking Null for an 11-yard loss on third-and-12 from the Houston 46.

After a punt, the Texans drove 81 yards in seven plays to score the go-ahead field goal. Houston's defense, keyed by a second-down sack by Smith, followed that up by forcing the Rams to punt the ball with 2:49 left in the game.

TEXANS 27, DOLPHINS 20 LAND SHARK STADIUM - 12/27 - 65,847

In what was billed by some players as the most important game in team history, the Texans kept their slim postseason hopes alive Sunday with a rollercoaster 27-20 win at Miami.

After scoring on each of their five first half possessions to take a 27-3 halftime lead, the Texans did not score a point in the second half as the Dolphins crept into the game.

Quarterback Matt Schaub, who completed 20-of-31 passes for 286 yards and two touchdowns, fired his first two attempts to Johnson for 38 yards. Later in the opening drive, Kris Brown's 49-yard field goal gave Houston the early lead.

Johnson caught a team-high five passes for 71 yards. His physical 10-yard touchdown grab on fourth-and-one extended the Texans' lead to 10-0 with 2:05 left in the first quarter.

Following a three-and-out by Miami, the Texans drove 94 yards to score. Tight end Joel Dreessen caught two passes for 33 yards into Miami territory. Jacoby Jones' 44-yard touchdown catch stretched the lead to 17-0 with 12:41 left in the first half.

Less than a minute later, Cushing intercepted a pass that bounced off running back Ricky Williams' shoulder pads. Cushing, who added nine tackles and a sack in the game, returned the pick six yards to the Miami 28. From there, running back Ryan Moats caught an 11-yard pass by avoiding linebacker Akin Ayodele on a nifty spin move. A play later, running back Arian Foster waltzed into the end zone for a 17-yard touchdown. Foster finished with 97 yards on 19 carries.

Following a Miami punt, Dreessen's 18-yard catch on the first play of the next series gave Houston a first down at the Dolphins' 46-yard line. Later, Brown capped the 12-play, 60-yard drive with a 22-yard field goal to make the score 27-0 with 4:25 remaining before halftime.

Just before the intermission, Dan Carpenter converted a 27-yard field goal with seven seconds on the game clock to put the Dolphins on the scoreboard.

Miami began the second half with a 12-play, 79-yard scoring drive. On third-and-goal from the two-yard line, quarterback Pat White handed off to running back Lex Hilliard for a two-yard touchdown that helped cut the score to 27-10 with 10:10 remaining in the third quarter.

The Texans burned almost three minutes off the game clock before Turk's 51-yard punt was returned eight yards to the Dolphins' 26-yard line. Henne put Miami in scoring range with a 35-yard pass to Ginn and a 15-yard completion to Davone Bess. Henne's 10-yard touchdown pass to Hilliard made the score 27-17 after Carpenter's extra point.

Later, Cushing's sack on first down for a four-yard loss led to a Miami punt with 5:22 left in the contest.

The Texans kept running to drain the clock, and the Dolphins burned two timeouts. Carpenter finished the series by booting a 38-yard field goal to make the score 27-20 with 2:30 on the game clock.

Walter recovered the ensuing onside kick at the Houston 41. With the Dolphins holding no timeouts, the Texans rushed on three consecutive plays. Foster's six-yard gain on third-and-three closed the game out.

TEXANS 34, PATRIOTS 27 RELIANT STADIUM - 1/3/10 - 71,029

The Texans became winners for the first time in one of the most improbable comebacks in team history.

Trailing 27-13 early in the fourth quarter, the Texans answered with three touchdowns, a sack and an interception to collect a 34-27 win and finish the regular season with a 9-7 record – their best finish ever.

Perhaps the most remarkable feat of the win Sunday was not the Texans' three touchdowns in the final 10 minutes.

Houston's perseverance and a combined effort by all phases of the team led the comeback. The offense scored on all three possessions of the fourth quarter. Defensively, safety Bernard Pollard's interception set up the game-winning points. On special teams, linebacker Kevin Bentley got the crowd on its feet by de-cleating wide receiver Matthew Slater on a kick return midway through the fourth quarter.

Quarterback Matt Schaub finishes the regular season as the NFL's leader in passing yards after completing 24-of-29 passes for 303 yards with two touchdowns and an interception. Also, wide receiver Andre Johnson finishes with the NFL lead in receiving yards after catching six passes for 65 yards.

Another big story is the play of rookie running back Arian Foster, who pounded his way for a career-high 119 yards on 20 carries (6.0 avg.). He scored twice and rushed for 29 yards on five carries in the final five minutes of the contest.

Houston took the early lead when Schaub found tight end Joel Dreessen for a 25-yard touchdown on the game's opening drive.

With 5:29 left in the first quarter, the Patriots' offense returned to the field starting from their 37-yard line. Quarterback Tom Brady drove the offense 63 yards on nine plays before running back Fred Taylor scored on a four-yard touchdown run.

After the Texans failed on a fourth and goal, linebacker Zac Diles forced a fumble on running back Fred Taylor that Pollard recovered in the end zone. Brown missed the extra point, making the score 13-10 with 4:41 left before halftime. Rookie quarterback Brian Hoyer replaced Brady on that series.

Tied 13-13 after Gostkowski's second field goal of the game, the Texans had one more chance to take the lead before halftime, but Brown's 56-yard attempt missed wide right.

In the third quarter Schaub pass deflected off Jones and was intercepted by rookie Darius Butler, who returned the ball 91 yards for a score.

Houston kept fighting and cut the score to 27-20 on Jones' tip-toeing eight-yard touchdown catch in the back of the end zone. Jones finished with a season-high five catches for 65 yards. The momentum picked up when defensive end Mario Williams sacked Brady for a four-yard loss on third down to force a punt, which Jones returned 31 yards to the New England 34.

On third-and-12, Schaub rifled a sideline pass to Johnson, who ran out of bounds at the Patriots' 11-yard line for a 15-yard gain. Foster ran for a short yardage touchdown to even the score 27-27 after Brown's extra point.

On the next series, Pollard intercepted Brady. Foster continued pounding the ball on New England, gaining 25 yards on three consecutive carries. He scored on the next carry to give Houston a 34-27 lead with 1:54 left in the game.
