

fter leading James Madison to its most successful four-season stretch in over 30 years, highlighted by a victory in the NCAA Tournament last weekend, Mark Byington was named men's basketball head coach at Vanderbilt Monday by Vice Chancellor for Athletics and University Affairs and Athletic Director Candice Storey Lee.

Byington will be officially introduced at a news conference on Thursday at 4 p.m. at Memorial Gymnasium. The event will be available on SECNetwork+ and the department's YouTube channel and will be open to the general public.

"Vanderbilt is getting an extraordinary coach and person in Mark Byington. From our first conversations, Coach Byington impressed me with his competitiveness, his intensity, his passion for developing young men on and off the court, his love for the game, and his plan to elevate Vanderbilt men's basketball to new levels of success," Lee said. "I was struck by the shared passion that we have for what this basketball program can be and for all that is possible at this great institution. I was also impressed with Mark's approach to building an elite culture and his desire to fully immerse himself in all corners of Commodore Nation. He has proven his ability to turn programs around at Georgia Southern and James Madison by working tirelessly and communicating a shared vision.

"I could not be more excited about the future of our men's basketball program."

"At Vanderbilt, we challenge ourselves to seek excellence in everything we do through hard work and collaboration," Vanderbilt Chancellor Daniel Diermeier said. "Hiring Mark Byington demonstrates our commitment to helping student-athletes reach the full heights of their athletic

potential while also fostering their lifelong learning and growth. I congratulate Coach Byington and commend Vice Chancellor Lee for bringing to Vanderbilt someone whose record of mentoring champions embodies our university values."

Byington opened 2023-24 by leading the Dukes to a victory at No. 4 Michigan State, as they would spend eight weeks in the Associated Press top 25 poll throughout the course of the season. He would go on to lead the school to the Sun Belt Conference Tournament championship, a win over fifth-seeded Wisconsin in the opening round of the NCAA Tournament and a 32-4 overall record. After taking over a program that had recorded four straight losing seasons, Byington guided James Madison to an 82-36 mark over the next four seasons.

He was voted the Colonial Athletic Association Coach of the Year after helping the Dukes to the 2020-21 regular season championship, and then — after the school switched affiliations to the Sun Belt Conference — guided the school to a 9-2 nonconference victory during the 2021-22 campaign highlighted by victories over Virginia and Florida Atlantic. The following season, his efforts helped James Madison record the highest NET ranking in program history as he was voted the Virginia State Coach of the Year after leading the Dukes to a 22-11 finish.

Over the last two seasons, Byington had James Madison ranked among the national leaders in scoring offense after averaging better than 80 points per game.

"I'm thrilled and honored to be the head men's basketball coach at Vanderbilt University. I know Commodore fans are eager for success and we will get there together," said Byington. "I was blown away by the passion and enthusiasm of Vice Chancellor and

Athletic Director Candice Storey Lee and Chancellor Daniel Diermeier. We share the same vision that Vanderbilt basketball belongs as one of the nation's elite programs. I look forward to meeting the fans, alumni, students and all of Commodore Nation. Our time is coming. Get ready!!!"

Prior to his stint at James Madison, Byington was head coach at Georgia Southern for seven seasons where he guided the Eagles to four 20-win campaigns - including each of the last three, the first time for the program in 30 years — before moving to James Madison. He inherited a team that had suffered seven consecutive losing seasons and led it to the semifinals of the Southern Conference Tournament his first season in charge, then helped the Eagles to a 22-9 mark, a runner-up finish in the Sun Belt Conference standings and a berth in the Sun Belt Tournament championship game the following year after a transition in leagues. After helping Georgia Southern move up 184 spots in the RPI that season, the biggest improvement in the nation, Byington was named the NABC District 24 Coach of the Year.

He would lead the Eagles to a 21-12 finish in 2017-18, including a win over Wake Forest, then guide the program to its highest RPI ever, second place in the Sun Belt standings and a 21-12 mark the following season. In 2019-20, Byington helped Georgia Southern to a 20-13 record and the semifinals of the Sun Belt Tournament before the remainder of the season was cancelled due to the coronavirus pandemic. In addition to posting a 131-97 mark overall in charge at Georgia Southern, he helped Tookie Brown become the first member of the program to be named the Sun Belt Player of the Year and first individual in league history to be selected first-team all-conference four times.

Before taking over at Georgia Southern, Byington was an assistant coach at Virginia Tech during the 2012-13 season. He served two different stints on the staff at Charleston, first as assistant coach from 2002-04 and then as assistant and associate head coach from 2005-12. During his time with the program, the Cougars went 194-100 overall including 108-51 in Southern Conference action. Byington also has experience as a graduate assistant (1999-01) and director of operations (2004-05) at Virginia, and was an assistant coach at Hargrave (Va.) Military Academy during the 2001-02 campaign.


A three-year starter at UNC Wilmington, Byington scored 1,088 points at the collegiate level and was named both second-team All-CAA and to the league's All-Defensive Team as a senior. He received his bachelor's degree in physical education from the school in 1998, and would go on the earn a master's degree in sport psychology from Virginia in 2003.



RICK RAY

ASSISTANT COACH

A veteran of the SEC, Ray brings nearly 30 years of coaching experience to the



During his time in Boulder, the Buffaloes won 20 or more games in three seasons. He also helped Colorado land the 13th-ranked recruiting class in the nation in 2021.

Prior to his time at Colorado, Ray spent seven seasons as a head coach. He led Southeast Missouri for five seasons (2015-20) after spending three seasons at the helm of Mississippi State (2012-15). During his tenure in Starkville, Ray developed a pair of SEC All-Freshmen selections in Craig Sword and Gavin Ware.


Ray spent 15 seasons as an assistant before earning his first head coaching job. He served as the associate head coach at Clemson for two seasons (2010-12) following a four-year stint at Purdue (2006-10) and two-year tenure at Northern Illinois (2004-06). He began his coaching career at Indiana State where he spent seven seasons (1997-2004) on staff. During those 15 years as an associate or assistant, Ray helped his teams to seven NCAA Tournament appearances and a pair of Sweet 16 berths.

With Ray serving as associate head coach, Clemson won 38 games in two seasons including a 22-12 mark in 2010-11 with a trip to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. During his tenure at Purdue, the Boilermakers made the NCAA Tournament every season and advanced to the Sweet 16 in each of his last two years. He also played a part in landing Purdue's vaunted 2007 signing class which feature All-Americans Robbie Hummel, JaJuan Johnson and E'Twaun Moore.

Ray played collegiately for Grand View (Iowa) College where he was an All-American Scholar Athlete in 1993. He earned a degree in applied mathematics and secondary education from Grand View in 1994 and a master's in athletic administration from Nebraska-Omaha in 1997.

ASSISTANT COACH

Jon Cremins joined the Vanderbilt coaching staff in April 2024. Cremins has



While at JMU, Cremins helped lead the Dukes to their record-setting 32-4 mark this season, a Sun Belt Conference championship and NCAA Tournament win. JMU posted an 82-36 record during the four-year tenure.

During Cremins' two seasons as an assistant at Georgia Southern, he helped guide the Eagles to 20-or-more wins in both campaigns. With Cremins in Statesboro, Georgia Southern ranked fourth in the nation in field goal percentage and 15th in scoring during the 2018-19 season.

Cremins spent the 2017-18 season as an assistant at USC Upstate and prior to that stop served as the head coach for two seasons at Spartanburg Methodist. In his two seasons with the Pioneers, Cremins led the squad to a 55-11 record and back-to-back appearances in the NJCAA Division I Championship. He was named the Region X Coach of the Year in both of his seasons with Spartanburg Methodist and guided the Pioneers to nation-leading marks in field goal percentage, three-point percentage and three-pointers made.


He also spent time at Kennesaw State, Southeast Missouri and two seasons under his uncle, legendary coach Bobby Cremins, at Charleston. Cremins began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Valdosta State.

Cremins earned a bachelor's degree in history from Valdosta State in 2007 and a master's in public administration in 2009.

ASSISTANT COACH

Xavier Joyner joined the Commodores staff in April 2024 after spending the

previous four seasons on coach Mark Byington's James Madison staff.



Prior to joining Byington's staff at JMU, Joyner accumulated a wealth of coaching experience at the collegiate, high school and AAU levels. He spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Mount St. Mary's following a three-year stint as an assistant and scouting director at Paul VI Catholic High School in Fairfax, Va.

He also spent four seasons as an assistant with Nike Team Takeover in Washington, D.C. One of the elite AAU programs in the country, Joyner helped Nike Team Takeover to the Las Vegas FAB 48 title in 2017. He was also part of the coaching staff which led the 16U EYBL club to a No. 1 national ranking to close the season.


Joyner spent a decade as a head coach in the junior college ranks in Maryland, guiding Prince George's Community College from 2010-15 and Montgomery College Germantown from 2004-10. During his tenures, Joyner racked up 200 victories between the two programs and is the only coach to win regional titles at two different schools in Maryland.

A 1995 graduate of Husson University in Bangor, Maine, Joyner led the Eagles to back-to-back Maine Athletic Conference championships and earned allconference honors. He also garnered recognition in the form of the Allen Kenyon Leadership and Nelson Degrasse Scholar-Athlete Awards.



ASSISTANT COACH

Matt Bucklin has joined coach Mark Byington's Vanderbilt staff after



Bucklin comes to the Commodores after serving two seasons as an assistant coach on Byington's staff at JMU. In 2023-24, the Dukes claimed the Sun Belt Conference championship and earned their first NCAA Round of 64 win since 1983.

With Bucklin on staff, the 2022-23 squad also set four program records and earned 22 wins, the most since 1981-82. During his two seasons, JMU posted a 54-15 overall record and a 27-9 mark in Sun Belt action.

Prior to his time at JMU, Bucklin spent four years as the director of operations at Clemson under coach Brad Brownell. With the Tigers, Bucklin led defensive scouting along with coordinating travel, budget and academic components of the program.

Bucklin also brings SEC experience to Nashville, having served on Mark Fox's staff at Georgia. He spent two seasons as a graduate assistant while earning a master's degree before being promoted to operations coordinator in 2014 and helping the Bulldogs to postseason appearances in 2015, 2016

The Marietta, Georgia, native played for Georgia from 2009-12 and was part of the Dawgs' 2011 NCAA Tournament team. He earned his bachelor's degree in marketing from Georgia in 2012 and a master's degree in sport management in 2014. Bucklin is also a nephew of Michigan State head coach Tom Izzo.



ASSISTANT COACH

Kenneth Mangrum joined Vanderbilt Men's Basketball coaching staff in

August 2024 as an assistant coach.

Mangrum previously served as the associate head coach at New Mexico State for the 2023-24 season.

A 17-year veteran of collegiate coaching, Mangrum spent the five seasons prior to his New Mexico State stop as a member of the Troy coaching staff. Mangrum served three seasons as an assistant for the Trojans before being promoted to associate head coach. In his final two seasons at Troy, he helped lead the Trojans to back-to-back 20-win seasons for the first time in nearly 20 years.

Prior to joining Troy, Mangrum spent one season at Texas Southern where he helped the Tigers to a 24-14 mark and a 14-4 record in conference play. He also was at UT Arlington for four seasons, where he was part of the coaching staff which led the Mavericks to a program-record 27-9 mark in 2016-17. UT Arlington posted an 88-58 mark during Mangrum's time on staff and advanced to postseason play twice.

Before UT Arlington, Mangrum spent one season as an assistant at Sam Houston where he helped lead the Bearkats to a 24-11 record and an appearance in the Southland Conference championship game. Sam Houston also earned its first postseason win at the Division I level that season.

Mangrum got his start at the collegiate level at Angelo State where he served as an assistant from 2007-13. He holds a bachelor's and master's degree from North Texas where he played four seasons for the Mean Green.





DIRECTOR OF MEN'S BASKETBALL PERFORMANCE

Jon Sanderson joined the Commodores as the director of men's basketball performance in spring 2024.

Sanderson brings over 20 years of strength and conditioning experience to Vandy and spent the past 15 seasons leading the development of Michigan men's basketball and men's and women's golf student-athletes. While with the Wolverines, Sanderson was part of over 300 wins on the hardwood and 10 NCAA Tournament appearances. Michigan advanced to five-straight Sweet 16s and made four Elite Eight appearances during his time in Ann Arbor.

Sanderson is the only strength and conditioning coach in NCAA history to both play (Ohio State, 1999) and coach (Michigan, 2013 and 2018) in a Final Four. He also helped the Wolverines to three Big Ten regular season titles and a pair of Big Ten tournament championships.

On the hardwood, he has developed over 30 student-athletes who went on to play in the NBA following their collegiate careers.

Prior to joining Michigan, Sanderson spent three seasons as the men's and women's basketball strength and conditioning coach at Clemson. While with the Tigers, Sanderson helped the program to threestraight 20-win seasons — a first for Clemson men's backetball

He began his career as an intern at North Carolina in 2002-03 before spending three seasons as the head strength and conditioning coach and sports nutrition coordinator for Olympic sports at Marshall (2003-06).

Sanderson earned his bachelor's degree in communication (2001) and master's in sport sciences (2002) from Ohio University. He holds certifications as a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (NSCA); Strength and Conditioning Coach Certified (CSCC); Registered Strength and Conditioning Coach (NSCA); United States Weightlifting Level 1 Club Coach (USAW); Functional Movement Systems Level 1 (FMS); Titleist Performance Institute Level 1 (TPI); Corrective Exercise Specialist (NASM-CES) and CPR/AED Certified (American Red Cross).

The Mansfield, Ohio, native played collegiately for Ohio State (1997-99) and Ohio (2000-02). He was the starting small forward on Ohio State's 1999 Final Four squad.





ANDY FARRELL

DIRECTOR OF BASKETBALL OPERATIONS

Andy Farrell joined the Vanderbilt men's basketball

program as the director of basketball operations in August 2024.

Farrell comes to Nashville after one season as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Siena. With the Saints, Farrell served as the NIL contact for the men's basketball program in addition to his daily coaching and recruiting duties.

Prior to Siena, Farrell spent six seasons on Anthony Grant's staff at Dayton. Farrell served as the Flyers' director of scouting and program development his first two seasons before transitioning into the role of special assistant to the head coach and recruiting coordinator in his final four years.

Farrell was part of the Flyers' 29-2 season in 2019-20 which saw Dayton climb as high as No. 3 in the AP poll. He helped recruit and coach four NBA Draft picks and two All-Americans at Dayton. He was also instrumental in the marketing and promotion of Obi Toppin's player of the year campaign along with organizing public appearances, Dayton Basketball Camps and coordinating social media and marketing campaigns for the program.

Prior to Dayton, Farrell spent three seasons (2014-17) as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Southwest Mississippi Community College. He also served one season as an assistant and recruiting coordinator at Longwood (2013-14) and two seasons as the director of operations and assistant recruiting coordinator at DePaul (2011-13).


Farrell got his start in college basketball at VCU as a graduate assistant in 2007-08 and then served as a video coordinator at Clemson and DePaul from 2008-11

A native of Dayton, Ohio, Farrell earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from Dayton in 2007. He then earned a master's in sport leadership/coaching from VCU in 2009.

Prior to SFA, Mast served as the head manager for Illinois men's basketball during his undergraduate studies. Mast led a team of 13 student managers for head coach Brad Underwood to organize team equipment and gear along with coding game film. hea Ralph was named the sixth head coach in Vanderbilt women's basketball history on April 13, 2021. The 2024-25 campaign marks her fourth season leading the Commodores.

Ralph orchestrated one of the biggest turnarounds in program history during the 2023-24 season, as the Commodores went from being projected last in the SEC preseason polls to earning the program's first bid into the NCAA Tournament in 10 seasons.

Vanderbilt went 23-10 in Year 3 under Ralph's direction, as the Commodores made their first appearance in the NCAA Tournament since the 2013-14 campaign. The 23 wins marked an 11-win improvement from a season ago, which is the second-largest win improvement from one season to the next in program history.

The Commodores went out and proved the preseason prognosticators wrong in 2023-24, as Vandy finished sixth in the SEC after being picked 13th in the Preseason SEC Coaches Poll and 14th in the Preseason SEC Media Poll. The Dores went 9-7 in SEC play and won a program-record six road SEC games. The nine SEC wins were the most for Vanderbilt since the 2012-13 campaign. The Commodores earned the No. 6 seed in the 2024 SEC Women's Basketball Tournament, which was the program's highest seed at the SEC Tournament since 2011.

Vanderbilt's at-large bid into the 2024 NCAA Tournament marked the second time in her three seasons that Ralph has led the Commodores to the postseason.

A total of three Commodores earned All-SEC honors in Year 3 under Ralph. Iyana Moore made her first appearance on the All-SEC second team, while Jordyn Cambridge was named to the All-SEC defensive team for a school-record third time. Khamil Pierre was named to the All-SEC freshman team, making her the third Commodore to earn a spot on the team under Ralph, joining Moore and Sacha

Washington. Pierre also was named SEC Freshman of the Week a program record five times during the season.

Vanderbilt's hard-nosed and gritty approach helped the Commodores become one of the elite defensive teams in the SEC, as Vandy ranked third in steals per game at 10.2 steals. The Dores' 315 steals during the 2023-24 campaign are the third-most in a season in program history.

Vanderbilt was hit hard with a plethora of preseason injuries to begin the 2022-23 campaign. Coach Ralph was able to rally the Commodores and record a second-straight double-digit win season, marking the first time in six years that Vandy has posted back-to-back double-digit win campaigns.

During the 2022-23 campaign, Ralph guided Vanderbilt to a winning record inside Memorial Gymnasium for the 38th time in the last 40 seasons. The Commodores won nine games at Memorial Gym, which included victories over Texas A&M, Arkansas, and Kentucky.

Ralph was key in the development of Ciaja Harbison, who transferred into the program for her graduate season and became one of the most prolific scorers in the SEC. Harbison earned second team All-SEC honors after averaging 19.6 points per game and shot 40.6% from the field. The only player in the SEC to score 40 points in a game this season, Harbison had three outings with 30-plus points among the 23 times she has scored in double figures while recording the highest scoring average of her collegiate career. Harbison has led the Commodores in scoring 16 times, assists on 20 occasions and steals in 15 games. Harbison tied a school record with 41 points and added five steals in a January win over Texas A&M

In her inaugural season, Ralph led Vanderbilt to its first postseason appearance since 2014. The Commodores reached the third round of the Women's National Invitation Tournament, their longest postseason run since 2013. Vanderbilt also recorded

its first SEC Tournament victory in six years when it defeated Texas A&M 85-69 on March 2, 2022.

In all, Ralph accrued the third-most wins of any women's basketball coach in a debut season. That included a 63-59 victory against No. 15 Florida in Memorial Gymnasium on Feb. 24, 2022, the program's first win against a ranked opponent since 2020.

Ralph wasted no time helping individual student-athletes realize their full potential. Jordyn Cambridge, Iyana Moore and Sacha Washington earned All-SEC accolades during the 2021-22 campaign. Cambridge recorded the program's first postseason triple-double during the SEC Tournament, while she and Moore contributed to a program-record 17 3-pointers against Alabama State on Dec. 28, 2021.

A seven-time national champion as a student-athlete or coach, Ralph arrived at Vanderbilt after spending the previous 13 seasons as an assistant coach alongside Geno Auriemma at the University of Connecticut. While serving as a coach at her alma mater, Ralph helped guide the Huskies to 12 Final Four appearances and six national championships, including a record four consecutive titles from 2013-16.

Ralph was an instrumental figure in recruiting and player development with the Huskies. She mentored standouts like Paige Bueckers, who in 2020-21 became the first freshman to sweep the major national player-of-the-year awards: the Naismith Trophy, Associated Press Player of the Year, USBWA National Player of the Year, Lieberman Award and Wooden Award.

In all, Ralph worked with 21 WNBA draft picks at UConn, including nine top-five picks and three No. 1 overall selections: Tina Charles, Maya Moore and Breanna Stewart.

Prior to returning to UConn as an assistant, Ralph spent five seasons at the University of Pittsburgh from 2003-08. She was instrumental in a period of unprecedented success, helping the Panthers improve from single-digit victories to at least 22 victories in each of her final three seasons. Pitt also reached the Sweet 16 for the first time in program history in 2008.

As one of the most celebrated student-athletes in women's basketball history, Ralph ranks eighth in UConn's storied record book with 1,678 points. She also ranks among the program's all-time top 10 in career assists (456), steals (252) and field goal percentage (57.9). Ralph graduated from Connecticut in 2001 with a degree in exercise physiology.

In leading UConn to a national championship in 2000, Ralph was named an All-American and Big East Player of the Year. She was selected as the most valuable player in the 2000 NCAA Women's Final Four. She also won the Honda Award, presented to the premier female student-athlete in 12 collegiate sports, and the "Sports Illustrated for Women" Player of the Year.

Ralph was selected by the Utah Starzz in the 2001 WNBA Draft, but was unable to pursue a professional career due to a knee injury.

Ralph and her husband, Tom Garrick, have one daughter, Maysen. Currently a member of the Vanderbilt coaching staff, Garrick served as head coach of the UMass-Lowell women's basketball program from 2018-21 and previously served as a Vanderbilt assistant from 2009-15.



TOM GARRICK

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH

For Tom Garrick, who has served as head coach at two schools and previously spent



six seasons on the coaching staff at Vanderbilt, the 2024-25 season will be the fourth season of his second stint at Vanderbilt as associate head coach. He rejoined the program in April 2021 with head coach Shea Ralph's staff.

On the Commodore bench from 2009-15, Garrick helped guide Vanderbilt to five NCAA Tournaments with four 20-plus win seasons and 120 victories along the way. In Music City, he tutored Jence Rhoads to honorable mention All-America honors in 2010-11 while Commodore guards garnered seven All-SEC accolades with three named to the SEC All-Freshman team.

Garrick also played an instrumental role in the success of Vanderbilt standouts Jasmine Lister and Christina Foggie. Lister shattered the program's record for minutes played and ranked No. 3 on Vandy's all-time list for career assists, while Foggie led the SEC in scoring as a senior, became the school's all-time leader in three-pointers and was a second-round pick in the 2014 WNBA Draft to Minnesota.

Before his return to Nashville in 2021, Garrick spent three seasons as an assistant coach at Boston College from 2015-18 before taking over as head coach at UMass Lowell. With the River Hawks, he guided a program that won just four games the season before his arrival to 16 victories in his second season in 2019-20.

A seasoned coach with a pair of head coaching stints, Garrick also led the Rhode Island women's program for six seasons from 2003-09 and finished his tenure with the second-most Atlantic 10 wins in program history. He took over following two years as an assistant coach from 2001-03, after which he started his coaching career with the Rhode Island men's program in 1998-99.

A four-year NBA veteran, Garrick was drafted by the Los Angeles Clippers in 1988 out of Rhode Island and played for the Clippers, San Antonio, Minnesota and Dallas. During his professional run, he also played overseas in Germany, Turkey and Spain across a five-year career in Europe.

As an athlete at Rhode Island, Garrick was nicknamed "The Chief" and finished his time in Kingston ranked among the school's top 10 in scoring (1,573 points), steals (189) and assists (407), and was inducted into the Rhode Island Athletic Hall of Fame in 1998.

ASHIFY FARIFY

ASSISTANT COACH/ RECRUITING COORDINATOR



Ashley Earley returned to Vanderbilt for her second stint as an assistant coach with the Commodores in April 2021. The 2024-25 season will be the fourth season of her second stint at Vanderbilt.

A member of Vanderbilt's 1,000-point club as a student-athlete from 2001-05, Earley returns to the program after being on the Vandy bench from 2013-16. With a track record of success in Memorial Gymnasium as a student-athlete and a coach, Earley coached Vanderbilt to the NCAA Tournament in 2014 while working hard on the recruiting front to bring in a pair of top-20 classes, including the nation's sixth-best unit and the top class in the SEC in 2016.

During her time with the program as a coach, Earley also tutored Vanderbilt's 2014-15 frontcourt to rank as one of the most efficient in the nation. At season's end, four players connected on better than 50 percent from the field while the team ranked 10th nationally at 45.4 percent.

An assistant at Penn State for the past two seasons, Earley also has coaching stops at Northern Kentucky (2017-19), Virginia (2012-13), Marquette (2010-12), Rhode Island (2009-10), Tennessee Tech (2007-09) and Alabama (2006-07).

An All-America, all-region and first team All-SEC honoree while a candidate for both the Naismith Trophy and the Wooden Award after the 2004-05 season, she closed her career leading Vandy in points, rebounds and steals for the season while shooting 64 percent from the floor. To this day, Earley is fifth in career field goal percentage (57.8) and eighth in single-season rebounds (300 in 2004-05) while ranking third for total games played (135). Along the way, she helped the Commodores to a pair of Sweet 16 appearances and the Elite Eight in 2002.

After her career at Vanderbilt, Earley was drafted by the Indiana Fever in the 2005 WNBA Draft and played professionally overseas for Maccabi Tel Kabir in the Safsal Israeli League.

COACH/ RECRUITING COORDINATOR



A member of Shea Ralph's inaugural coaching staff at Vanderbilt, the 2024-25 season is Kevin DeMille's fourth season as an assistant coach in 2024-25 after coming to Vanderbilt in April 2021.

With seven years of experience in various roles with the UConn women's basketball program with Ralph and head coach Geno Auriemma, DeMille joins Vanderbilt after five seasons at George Washington and comes to the program with eight trips to the NCAA Tournament and five victories in the title game under his belt.

In Washington, D.C., DeMille worked his way up from an assistant director of operations role to assistant coach with a strong track record of developing talent. During his time in the nation's capital, DeMille guided GW's post players to first and second team all-Atlantic 10 honors, the A-10 Sixth Woman of the Year, two all-rookie selections and All-Atlantic 10 Tournament honors while guiding the team's primary scoring options in four of his five seasons. In 2020-21, DeMille helped A-10 all-rookie selection Ali Brigham lead all Atlantic 10 rookies and the team - in scoring and field goal percentage while finishing second among rookies in rebounding.

Working for former UConn great Jennifer Rizzotti at George Washington, he also spent time as video coordinator for the women's national team at the 2014 FIBA World Championship in Istanbul, Turkey. DeMille was also on staff for the goldmedal winning women's national team in the 2016 Olympics in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

Off the court, DeMille is the team's liaison with the marketing and communication departments. Prior to Vanderbilt, he championed Diversity and Inclusion efforts at GW and orchestrated the program's Bigger Than Basketball Season of Action that generated support, funding and in-kind contributions for national and DC-based organizations supporting The Trevor Project, Martha's Table, Set the Expectation, The Hidden Opponent, So Others Might Eat and other social causes.

At UConn, DeMille spent his four undergraduate years as a practice player and student manager before serving one semester as a graduate assistant. He was then hired as the assistant director of operations before moving on to George Washington with Rizzotti.

He earned his degree in social science of sport from UConn in 2013 and a master's degree in media and strategic communication at George Washington in

ASSISTANT COACH/ ASSISTANT DIRECTOR/ **OPERATIONS**



Eric Mundinger is entering his third season on Vanderbilt women's basketball staff. The 2024-25 season marks his first season as an assistant coach, adding the title after spending two years as the program's assistant director of operations.

Head coach Shea Ralph elevated Mundinger to assistant coach in May 2024, while maintaining his role of assistant director of operations. In addition to his responsibilities as assistant director of operations, Mundinger performs coaching duties on the court with student-athletes.

He is entering his fourth season with the program after obtaining his master's degree in leadership and organizational performance from Vanderbilt in May 2022. He will oversee student managers and practice players, address equipment needs, assist with team travel and logistics, game scheduling, recruiting operations, and additional day-to-day operations.

Mundinger came to Vanderbilt from Memphis, where he served as the head manager for the women's basketball team. He began his career as a student manager, aiding coaches and players in tasks and drills for the NCAA Division I American Athletic Conference member. Additionally, he managed the set-up and break down of the gym for practice and team meals.

Due to his performance, Mundinger was quickly promoted to head student manager after his first year and he assisted the department by overseeing other student managers, tracking equipment and inventory, in accordance with the annual budget, and designing team gear such as shirts, travel suits and coaching gear.

Prior to his role at Memphis, Mundinger served as a coach at the Penny Hardaway Basketball Camp where he instructed a group of 150 campers by demonstrating and explaining basketball drills. Apart from leading the campers, Mundinger also played a role in the lunch set-up for the campers and the coaches.

Mundinger has also worked as a camp coach at Melissa McFerrin Hoops School, where he demonstrated drills to campers, refereed 5-on-5 games, and supported with team check-ins and camp t-shirt distribution.

He graduated magna cum laude from the University of Memphis in May 2020 with a bachelor's degree in sport and leisure management. He is proficient in SportsCode, FastDraw and FastScout.

DIRECTOR / OPERATIONS/ CHIEF OF STAFF



Chris Brann enters his fourth season with the Vanderbilt women's basketball team, while it is his first season as the program's executive director of operations and chief of staff.

Brann was promoted to executive director of operations and chief of staff in May of 2024 after spending his first three seasons as the director of operations. Head coach Shea Ralph announced Brann's addition to her staff on May 10, 2021. He joined Vanderbilt after spending six seasons as the director of operations with Boston College women's basketball. The run marked his second stint with the program after serving in the same capacity from 2006-09 under BC's all-time winningest coach Cathy Inglese.

A native of Jacksonville, Florida, Brann brings 15 years of experience to the role. He's previously served as the director of operations for Boston College (2006-09, 2012-18), Miami (Fla.) (2011-12), Denver (2009-11) and Wright State (2003-06).

A 2003 graduate of Florida State, Brann started his career in women's basketball as the head manager for the Seminoles. He also later completed his master's in sports administration from Florida State.

Nelson will be responsible for aiding the coaching staff in all areas of recruiting including travel, correspondence, campus visits, and sharing what makes Vanderbilt women's basketball an elite program among the SEC and national competition.

She served in a similar capacity with first-year head coach Clark Lea and the Vanderbilt football program as the recruiting operations coordinator. She joined the Commodores in 2021, guiding the program to one of its best recruiting classes in program history.

Nelson spent the 2019 and 2020 two seasons with the Minnesota football program as a recruiting and graphics design assistant. During her time with the Golden Gophers the team went 14-6 and won the 2019 Outback Bowl with a 31-34 victory against Auburn.

A Notre Dame graduate, Nelson was a 2018 NCAA national champion with the women's basketball program. She was a student-athlete from 2013-18 and a two-time ACC All-Academic honoree.

While at Notre Dame, Nelson also worked as a graphic design intern, creating graphics for all sports to use on UND.com, emails and social media. She also worked as an intern with Winning Edge Leadership and made custom social media graphics for leadership retreat participants.

ABOUT MEMORIAL GYMNASIUM

The Southeastern Conference's most historic venue for college basketball, Memorial Gymnasium serves as the home court for the Vanderbilt Commodores.


Dedicated in 1952 as a memorial to all Vanderbilt men and women who served in World War II, the arena was built as a combination gymnasium and concert hall by the late master architect Edwin Keeble.

Nearly 70 years later, the unique style of Memorial Gymnasium (capacity 14,316) — with its benches situated on the baseline, a playing court that sits above portions of the crowd and deafening acoustics — continues to make the Commodores' home a dreaded stop for opponents.

Vanderbilt's men's and women's teams have combined to win more than 75 percent of their home games.

In 2021 Memorial Gymnasium went through its most recent upgrades, which included new LED videoboards, an advanced playing surface, brand new locker rooms for the men's and women's basketball teams and an updated staff and student-athlete entrance. In recent years, the facility also underwent several other renovations highlighted by a refurbished three-court practice gym, coaching offices and donor room.

Capacity has fluctuated throughout the history of the building. It reached its highest number of 15,646 in 1969 when 4,000 seats were added in the east and west ends. When chairback seats in the end zones and suites on the north side were installed in the late 1990s capacity lowered to 14,316.



ornelius Vanderbilt, known as "the Commodore," was in his 79th year when he decided to make the gift that founded Vanderbilt University in the spring of 1873.

In athletics, Vanderbilt is a charter member of the Southeastern Conference and is the conference's only private school. The Commodores have claimed five national championships, in bowling (2007, 2018), women's tennis (2015) and baseball (2014, 2019). Vandy also owns three individual national championships with Ryan Tolbert's 400-meter hurdles crown in 1997, Gordon Sargent's men's golf title in 2022 and Veronica Fraley's win in discus in 2023.

The \$1 million that he gave to endow and build the university was Vanderbilt's only major philanthropy. Methodist Bishop Holland N. McTyeire of Nashville, husband of Amelia Townsend who was a cousin of Vanderbilt's young second wife Frank Crawford, went to New York for medical treatment early in 1873 and spent time recovering in the Vanderbilt mansion. He won the Vanderbilts' admiration and support for the project of building a university in the South that would "contribute to strengthening the ties which should exist between all sections of our common country."

McTyeire chose the site for the campus, supervised the construction of buildings and personally planted many of the trees that today make Vanderbilt a national arboretum. At the outset, the university consisted of one Main Building (now Kirkland Hall), an astronomical observatory and houses for professors. Landon C. Garland was Vanderbilt's first chancellor, serving from 1875 to 1893. He advised McTyeire in selecting the faculty, arranged the curriculum and set the policies of the university.

For the first 40 years of its existence, Vanderbilt was under the auspices of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. The Vanderbilt Board of Trust severed its ties with the church in June 1914 as a result of a dispute with the bishops over who would appoint university trustees.

From the outset, Vanderbilt met two definitions of a university: It offered work in the liberal arts and sciences beyond the baccalaureate degree and it embraced several professional schools in addition to its college. James H. Kirkland, the longest serving chancellor in university history (1893-1937), followed Chancellor Garland. He guided Vanderbilt to rebuild after a fire in 1905 that consumed the main building, which was renamed in Kirkland's honor, and all its contents. He also navigated the university through the separation from the Methodist Church. Notable advances in graduate studies were made under the third chancellor, Oliver Cromwell Carmichael (1937-46). He also created the Joint University Library, brought about by a coalition of Vanderbilt, Peabody College and Scarritt College.

Remarkable continuity has characterized the government of Vanderbilt. The original charter, issued in 1872, was amended in 1873 to make the legal name of the corporation "The Vanderbilt University." The charter has not been altered since.

The university is self-governing under a Board of Trust that, since the beginning, has elected its own members and officers university's general governance is vested in the Board of Trust. The immediate government of the university is committed to the chancellor, who is elected by the Board of Trust.

The original Vanderbilt campus consisted of 75 acres. By 1960, the campus had spread to about 260 acres of land. When George Peabody College for Teachers merged with Vanderbilt in 1979, about 53 acres were added.

Vanderbilt's student enrollment tended to double itself each 25 years during the first century of the university's history: 307 in the fall of 1875; 754 in 1900; 1,377 in 1925; 3,529 in 1950; 7,034 in 1975. In the fall of 1999 the enrollment was 10,127.

In the planning of Vanderbilt, the assumption seemed to be that it would be an all-male institution. Yet the board never enacted rules prohibiting women. At least one woman attended Vanderbilt classes every year from 1875 on. Most



came to classes by courtesy of professors or as special or irregular (non-degree) students. From 1892 to 1901 women at Vanderbilt gained full legal equality except in one respect — access to dorms. In 1894 the faculty and board allowed women to compete for academic prizes. By 1897, four or five women entered with each freshman class. By 1913 the student body contained 78 women, or just more than 20 percent of the academic enrollment.

National recognition of the university's status came in 1949 with election of Vanderbilt to membership in the select Association of American Universities. In the 1950s Vanderbilt began to outgrow its provincial roots and to measure its achievements by national standards under the leadership of Chancellor Harvie Branscomb. By its 90th anniversary in 1963, Vanderbilt for the first time ranked in the top 20 private universities in the United States.

Vanderbilt continued to excel in research, and the number of university buildings more than doubled under the leadership of Chancellors Alexander Heard (1963-1982) and Joe B. Wyatt (1982-2000), only the fifth and sixth chancellors in Vanderbilt's long and distinguished history.

From 1954-64, Vanderbilt enrolled its first black

students, all of whom showed both courage and determination. These changes would not have happened when they did without the support of others, such as Chancellors Branscomb and Heard, who understood the tenor of the times, and as leaders they helped guide Vanderbilt through these years of challenge.

In 1954, when Bishop Joseph Johnson graduated from Vanderbilt after a year of baccalaureate work as a special student (with the approval of the Board of Trust), his year of hard work and triumph was against a backdrop of a nation amidst social upheaval.

On Dec. 2, 1967, Perry Wallace made history in a basketball game against Southern Methodist University by becoming the SEC's first black basketball player to compete in a varsity game. He played in his first SEC varsity basketball game two days later against Auburn. Wallace was a member of the All-SEC second team and an SEC Sportsmanship Award recipient. He graduated with a bachelor of engineering in 1970.

In addition to his integration efforts, Heard added three schools (Blair, the Owen Graduate School of Management and Peabody College) to the seven already existing and constructed three dozen buildings. During Wyatt's tenure, Vanderbilt acquired or built one-third of the campus buildings and made great strides in diversity, volunteerism and technology.

The university grew and changed significantly under its seventh chancellor, Gordon Gee, who served from 2000 to 2007. Vanderbilt led the country in the rate of growth for academic research funding, which increased to more than \$450 million and became one of the most selective undergraduate institutions in the country.

In March 2008, Nicholas S. Zeppos was named Vanderbilt's eighth chancellor. The appointment came following Zeppos' many years of service to the university, where he started as an assistant law professor in 1987, and went on to serve as dean of the law school and Vanderbilt's provost.

Shortly after his appointment, Zeppos led the university through the most challenging economic times since the Great Depression, a period from which Vanderbilt emerged relatively unscathed. A mark of the university's



commitment to positive change, even amid economic calamity, Zeppos implemented Opportunity Vanderbilt in 2008 — a pioneering initiative that would fund loan-free tuition for the nation's most deserving students, regardless of their background or financial means.

That same year, another transformation took hold for undergraduates: in 2008, Vanderbilt opened the Martha Ingram Commons, a living-learning residential hall that enables a fully holistic approach to education. The Commons marked the first of Vanderbilt's Residential College system, followed by Warren and Moore colleges, which opened in 2014 and E. Bronson Ingram College in 2018. This priority of educating the whole student — intellectually, socially and emotionally — is also reflected in the university's long-term campus development plan, FutureVU, which aims to align Vanderbilt's physical spaces with its academic mission.

Zeppos also oversaw the separation of Vanderbilt University and Vanderbilt Medical Center in 2016, a prescient decision that positioned both institutions for long-term success and independence.

In August 2019, Zeppos became chancellor emeritus after serving as Vanderbilt's top leader for more than 11

years. Provost and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs Susan R. Wente served as interim chancellor until July 1, 2020, becoming the first woman to lead the university.

Daniel Diermeier, an internationally renowned scholar of political science and managerial leadership, began his tenure as the ninth chancellor of Vanderbilt University on July 1, 2020. Formerly provost and dean of the Harris School of Public Policy at the University of Chicago, and a longtime professor at Stanford University and Northwestern University's Kellogg School of Management, Diermeier was selected by the Vanderbilt Board of Trust after an extensive worldwide search.

Today, Vanderbilt University is a private research university with approximately 7,000 undergraduates and more than 6,400 graduate and professional students. Comprised of 10 distinct schools and colleges on one centralized campus in downtown Nashville, Vanderbilt spurs — and is optimized for — cross-disciplinary research, fostering discoveries that impact society for the better.

Vanderbilt is consistently ranked as one of the nation's top 15 universities by publications such as U.S. News & World Report, with several programs that consistently rank in the top 10.

Testament to the current leadership, faculty, staff and students, Vanderbilt was ranked #1 for both financial aid and students loving their college by the Princeton Review in 2021, and was recently ranked No. 19 in Reuter's assessment of the World's Most Innovative Universities. Cutting-edge, cross-disciplinary research and liberal arts, combined with strong ties to a distinguished medical center, create an invigorating atmosphere where students tailor their education to meet their goals and researchers collaborate to solve complex questions affecting our health, culture and society.

Vanderbilt, an independent, privately supported university, and the separate, non-profit Vanderbilt University Medical Center share a respected name and enjoy close collaboration through education and research. Together, the number of people employed by these two organizations exceeds that of the largest private employer in the Middle Tennessee region.

n internationally renowned political scientist and management scholar, Daniel Diermeier is the ninth chancellor of Vanderbilt University.

Daniel Diermeier was named Vanderbilt University's ninth chancellor in late 2019 after an extensive search by the Board of Trust.

A visionary leader and internationally renowned political scientist and management scholar, Diermeier stepped into the role in July 2020 and immediately committed to safely and successfully bringing students back to campus during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Vanderbilt was one of a very small number of the nation's best universities to do so. In the years since, Chancellor Diermeier has led an ambitious program of expansion and improvement in the spirit of Vanderbilt's motto, Crescere aude, or "dare to grow." Under his leadership, the university has risen in stature, topped the \$1 billion mark in research expenditures, successfully launched a \$300 million fundraising campaign for Vanderbilt athletics and reaffirmed its long-standing commitment to free expression and civil discourse. Diermeier has driven efforts to become the destination for leading faculty and the most promising students, to create a culture of radical collaboration and personal growth for Vanderbilt's faculty, students and staff and to expand Vanderbilt's global presence. In 2022, Vanderbilt launched the Discovery Vanderbilt initiative, a multimillion-dollar investment to catalyze and expand the university's capacity for innovation and discovery across disciplines.

Diermeier has worked to increase Vanderbilt's innovation partnerships with corporations and the U.S. military, as well as collaboration with Nashville and other communities in Middle Tennessee. He drove development of the Vanderbilt Project on Unity and American Democracy and the annual Vanderbilt Summit on Modern Conflict and Emerging Threats. Under his leadership, Vanderbilt was selected as the host of the Clinton Global Initiative University in early 2023 and launched a yearlong celebration of the university's Sesquicentennial.

In addition to his role as chancellor, Diermeier is University Distinguished Professor in the Owen Graduate School of Management and Distinguished University Professor of Political Science in the College of Arts & Science. He is a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and the Guggenheim Foundation. He has published five books and more than 100 research articles in academic journals—mostly in the fields of political science, economics and management, but also in linguistics, sociology, psychology, computer science, operations research and applied mathematics.

Throughout his career, Diermeier has proven to be a bold innovator, combining excellence as a leader, researcher and teacher with an entrepreneurial mindset.

His first faculty position was as an assistant professor at the Stanford Graduate School of Business in 1994. In 1997, Northwestern University recruited him to its Kellogg School of Management to build its political economy program. He rose quickly through the ranks at Kellogg, receiving promotion to professor just four years after earning his Ph.D.

In 2000, he was appointed Kellogg's IBM Professor of Regulation and Competitive Practice. Later, he was appointed director of the Ford Motor Company Center for Global Citizenship. He also held appointments at Northwestern in economics, political science, linguistics and law. He won multiple teaching awards, including the L.G. Lavengood Outstanding Professor of the Year Award and the Alumni Professor of the Year Award. He was a 2007 recipient of the Aspen Institute's Faculty Pioneer Award, called "the Oscars of the business school world" by the Financial Times.

Diermeier co-founded the Northwestern Institute on Complex Systems and served as the founding academic director of the CEO Perspectives program, one of the leading development programs for C-level executives. He also served as chairman and co-founder of the Northwestern Global Health Foundation, a nonprofit dedicated to developing low-cost medical devices.

In 2014, Diermeier was appointed dean of the Harris School of Public Policy at the University of Chicago, where he was also named the David Lee Shillinglaw Distinguished Service Professor. As dean, he led the transformation of the Harris School into the third-ranked public policy school in the nation. His achievements included launching a strategy that doubled enrollment while increasing selectivity; a 50 percent growth in faculty; a major fundraising effort that included funding for the Keller Center, the school's \$80 million, LEED Platinum-certified home; and the recruitment of diverse students, faculty and staff, including bridge programs that led to a notable increase in minority students.

After his successes at the Harris School, the University of Chicago named Diermeier provost in 2016. In that role, Diermeier was responsible for all academic and research programs, as well as oversight of the university's budget. His first priority was to improve the university's financial performance without impeding its progress toward greater eminence. Another major theme of his tenure was the expansion of diversity and inclusion. He appointed more women to leadership positions, engaged in a faculty-led initiative to increase the numbers of underrepresented minorities and women in the STEM faculty pipeline, and significantly increased the number of African American and Hispanic undergraduates who were the first in their families to attend college.

Diermeier also led major expansions of the University of Chicago's faculty in engineering and applied science, while continuing improvements in economics, policy, business and urban studies. He oversaw sustained investment in the humanities and social sciences. During his tenure, the university's undergraduate college experienced significant growth, while increasing selectivity and yield. Diermeier also focused on improving doctoral and non-degree education.

With Diermeier as provost, the University of Chicago increased its level of global engagement, culminating in the opening of the Francis and Rose Yuen Campus in Hong Kong. The university also increased engagement locally with the City of Chicago and neighboring communities through initiatives including the Urban Labs, a faculty-led research center working with city governments to address urgent issues.

Over the course of his career, Chancellor Diermeier has served as a board member for the University of Chicago Medical Center, Argonne National Laboratory, the Civic Consulting Alliance, the Marine Biological Laboratory, the National Opinion Research Center, the Field Museum of Natural History and the Management Board of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. He has been an adviser to governments, nonprofits and leading companies, including Abbott, Accenture, Allianz, the City of Chicago, the Government of Canada, Ernst & Young, Exelon, the FBI, Hyatt, Johnson & Johnson, Medtronic, Metro Group, PricewaterhouseCoopers, State Farm, UnitedHealth Group and the United States Olympic and Paralympic Committee.

A first-generation college graduate, Diermeier earned a Ph.D. in political science from the University of Rochester. He also holds master's degrees in political science from the University of Rochester and the University of Munich, and he earned a master's degree in philosophy from the University of Southern California.



andice Storey Lee is Vanderbilt's vice chancellor for athletics and university affairs and athletic director and was reappointed to a new five-year term in summer 2023.

Named to the position on May 21, 2020, Lee is Vanderbilt's first female athletic director and the first Black woman to head an SEC athletics program.

A former member of the Vanderbilt women's basketball team, Lee has earned undergraduate, masters and doctorate degrees from Vanderbilt Peabody College of education and human development and has been an

inspirational leader in athletics and the wider Vanderbilt community ever since arriving on campus as a first-year student in 1996.

Lee began her athletics administration career at Vanderbilt in 2002, serving first as an academic adviser and then compliance director. Working under the late athletic director David Williams, Lee was named the department's senior woman administrator in 2004, a responsibility she held until 2020. She also assumed the title of deputy athletic director in 2016, overseeing the day-to-day operations of the athletic department and serving as the sport administrator for football and women's basketball.

A team captain, four-year letter winner, and five-time SEC Academic Honor Roll selection as a member of the Vanderbilt's women's basketball team, Lee battled through knee injuries and helped lead the Commodores to an SEC Tournament championship in her final season (2002). She graduated from Vanderbilt with a bachelor of science degree in human and organizational development in 2000, received her master's degree in counseling in 2002 and her doctorate in higher education administration in 2012.

A model student-athlete at Bob Jones High School in Madison, Alabama, she was named to the 2022 class of the Huntsville-Madison County (Ala.) Athletic Hall of Fame.

Beyond her duties at Vanderbilt, Lee is a leader in college athletics at a national level. She serves on the Southeastern Conference's Council on Racial Equity and Social Justice and on the executive committee of the Black Athletic Directors Alliance, an organization created in 2020 to promote the growth, development and elevation of Black athletics administrators. She formerly served as a member of the NCAA Women's Basketball Rules Committee and as chair of the NCAA Division I Women's Lacrosse Committee and of SEC Senior Woman Administrators.

Lee has been recognized by peers and media as one of the leading young administrators in college athletics. In 2022, she was named Athletic Director of the Year at the Black Student-Athlete Summit. The Sports Business Journal named her to its college sports "Power Players" list in 2019, and Adidas named her to its "NEXT UP" class in 2018. In addition, Lee was the recipient of the John McClendon Scholarship for Black administrators in 2017.

Lee has also built deep roots as a longtime fixture in the Nashville community. She currently serves or has served on the boards of directors for the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame, Nashville Sports Council, YWCA of Middle Tennessee and The Family Center. She was named a 2019–20 fellow of the Tennessee Independent Colleges and Universities Association's executive leadership institute and is a graduate of the 2012 class of Leadership Nashville and the 2012 Vanderbilt Leadership Academy. In 2021, Lee received Peabody College's Distinguished Alumna Award. Members of Vanderbilt's student-athlete advisory committee awarded Lee their inaugural staff appreciation award in 2002 in recognition of her leadership through the COVID-19 pandemic.

Lee is committed to a vision that one of the world's preeminent academic

institutions in one of the nation's best cities can thrive in the most competitive athletic conference in college sports. Working in partnership with Chancellor Daniel Diermeier, she led development of the Vandy United Fund in 2021. The \$300 million investment in athletics reflects the university's commitment to empowering student-athletes to realize their full potential on and off the field.


During Lee's time at Vanderbilt, student-athletes have won five national championships in baseball (two), bowling (two) and women's tennis. Vanderbilt teams have also won more than 20 conference championships and tournament titles, including baseball, men's and women's basketball, bowling, women's cross country, men's and women's golf, women's lacrosse, women's soccer and women's tennis. Additionally, the football team has played in six bowl games since breaking a 26-year bowl drought in 2008.

In 2020-21, Vanderbilt finished with an overall NCAA Graduation Success Rate of 97, the highest of any SEC program, for the sixth straight year. During the 2010–22 season, student-athletes also exceeded a 3.0 grade-point average for the 16th straight year.

Lee is married to Sean Lee, the executive director of a Middle Tennessee housing authority. They have an adult son, Andrew.





he Vanderbilt Hall of Fame was established in 2008 and as of March 2024 includes 110 members. Inductees are considered on three criteria:

COMMODORE GREATS

Letter winners and student-athletes who have brought recognition and prominence to the university and themselves by their athletic accomplishments as an undergraduate. Nominees are not eligible until two years after they last participated in intercollegiate athletics at the university.

DISTINGUISHED LETTER WINNERS

Letter winners and student-athletes who have made major contributions to the university athletic program through personal time, effort, interest and through many years of continued service, or have distinguished themselves as exceptional in their chosen field of endeavor. Nominees are not eligible until six years after they last participated in intercollegiate athletics at the university.

LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT

Individuals, coaches, athletic officials, staff members and other university officials, who were not letter winners or student-athletes at Vanderbilt University, yet have rendered outstanding service to the intercollegiate athletics program through personal time, effort, interest and through many years of continued service.
