NOTABLE STORYLINES

- The Browns take on the New Orleans Saints in Week 2, as the team travels to the Mercedes-Benz Superdome for the first time since 2010 when the Browns won, 30-17. The Browns hold a 13-4 advantage all time, including an 8-2 mark on the road. The game kicks off at 1 p.m. EST on FOX.
- Last week, the Browns opened the 2018 regular season at home with a 21-21 overtime tie against the division-rival Pittsburgh Steelers. The game marked the first Kickoff Weekend game to end in a tie since Sept. 19, 1971, when the Miami Dolphins and Denver Broncos played to a 10-10 tie. It was also the Browns' second tie in the overtime era (started in 1974), with the team's only other overtime tie occurring on Nov. 19, 1989 against the Kansas City Chiefs, 10-10.
- The Browns defense forced six turnovers, including three interceptions and three fumble recoveries, in the season opener. It was the unit's most since recording six at Jacksonville on Nov. 21, 2010, while the last time the Browns recorded three interceptions in a game was against Denver on Oct. 18, 2015.
- DL **Myles Garrett** set career highs in forced fumbles (two) and tackles (six), while tying his career best with two sacks. The former No. 1 overall pick now has nine sacks in 12 career games.
- Making his NFL debut, rookie DB **Denzel Ward** recorded two interceptions. Ward is the fourth-youngest player (21 years, 134 days) in NFL history with a pair of interceptions in a game. He joined Clarence Scott (Sept. 19, 1971) as the only Browns rookies to record two interceptions in their NFL debut. He's the first Browns rookie to record two interceptions in a game since T.J. Ward on Nov. 21, 2010 and the first Brown to record two interceptions in a game since Joe Haden on Sept. 18, 2016.
- WR Jarvis Landry recorded seven receptions for 106 yards and has now caught at least two receptions in each of his past 64 games, the second-longest active streak in the NFL and the longest since 2014. He also extended his streak of least five receptions to 18 games, tied for the third longest in NFL history. His 407 receptions are the 10th most all time by an NFL player through their first five seasons (2014-18).
- QB **Tyrod Taylor** threw for 197 yards with a touchdown and added 77 rushing yards with a score. His 77 rushing yards are the fourth most by a Browns QB in a game and his 20-yard touchdown run was the second longest by a QB in Browns history.
- The Browns bolstered their roster in 2018 by adding 31 new players, including eight draft picks, eight unrestricted free agents, five waiver claims and four trades.





Hue Jackson: 9-39-1, fourth season as a head coach, third with the Browns. Hue Jackson was named the 16th full-time head coach in Cleveland Browns history on Jan. 13, 2016. He's in the midst of his 32nd year as a coach, with the last 18 being in the NFL. He's spent 11 seasons coaching in the AFC North, helping his team advance to the postseason seven times in that span. Jackson was also head coach of the Oakland Raiders in 2011 and guided the team to an 8-8 record. He's also served as offensive coordinator with the Washington Redskins (2003), Atlanta Falcons (2007), Raiders (2010) and Cincinnati Bengals (2014-15). He spent 14 years coaching on the collegiate level and was a QB at Pacific from 1985-86.

Sean Payton: 105-72, 13th season at head coach of the Saints. Since hired as head coach of the New Orleans Saints in 2006, Sean Payton has led the Saints to six playoff berths, four NFC South division titles and captured the franchise's first Super Bowl (XLIV) victory in 2009 with a 31-17 win over the Indianapolis Colts. Payton has a 112-77 overall record (.593), including a 7-5 postseason mark (.583), with the franchise. He holds the club's top win total and winning percentage for a head coach and is one of just eight active coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory.

NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

- Browns defensive coordinator **Gregg Williams** held the same position for the Saints from 2009-11 and helped New Orleans capture their first Super Bowl (XLIV).
- Browns LBs coach **Blake Williams** was an offensive assistant for the Saints in 2009, before becoming the team's assistant LBs coach from 2010-11. Williams also served as the defensive coordinator at Southeastern Louisiana University in 2015.
- Assistant DBs/S coach **Jerrod Kruse** was associate head coach/ special teams at Southeastern Louisiana University in 2015.
- Saints LB **Demario Davis** was a member of the Browns in 2016. Davis played and started all 16 games in 2016 and was a team captain.
- Saints TE **Benjamin Watson** spent three of his 15 career seasons with the Browns, totaling 154 receptions for 1,674 yards and eight touchdowns from 2010-12 in Cleveland. Watson started 41 of his 45 games played in a Browns uniform.
- Browns strength and conditioning assistant **Evan Marcus** held the same title for the Saints from 2000-02.
- Browns assistant OL coach **Mark Hutson** was the OL coach at Tulane University (New Orleans, La.) from 2007-10, before being promoted to interim head coach in 2011.
- Saints offensive coordinator **Pete Carmichael Jr.** served as the Browns TEs coach/offensive assistant in 2000. His father, **Pete Carmichael**, was the Browns offensive coordinator at the time.
- Saints head coach **Sean Payton** (Miami, Ohio), OL coach **Dan Roushar** (Cincinnati), strength and conditioning coach **Dan Dalrymple** (Miami, Ohio) and strength and conditioning assistant **Rob Wenning** (Findlay) spent time coaching collegiately in Ohio.
- Saints QB J.T. Barrett IV, DB Von Bell, DB Kurt Coleman, WR Ted Ginn Jr., DB Marshon Lattimore and WR Michael Thomas all played collegiately at Ohio State University.
- Saints WR **Ted Ginn** and CB **Marshon Lattimore** are natives of Cleveland, Ohio and played at Glenville High School.
- Browns WRs coach **Adam Henry** held the same role at Louisiana State University from 2012-14, where he coach Browns WR **Jarvis Landry**.
- Henry played collegiately at McNeese State University (Lake Charles, La.) and is in the football program's Hall of Fame.
- · Landry is a native of Metairie, La.
- Saints LB **Craig Robertson** is a former Brown.
- Browns DL **Devaroe Lawrence** was originally an undrafted free agent signing by the Saints in 2017 and was traded to the Browns earlier this month.

Sept. 14, 2014 FirstEnergy Stadium, Cleveland, Ohio

A 29-yard field goal by Browns K Billy Cundiff in the closing seconds of regulation sealed the Browns' first win of the 2014 season in a 26-24 victory over the New Orleans Saints at FirstEnergy Stadium. The game-winning field goal capped a 14-play, 85-yard drive that started at the Cleveland 4-yard line, and included two third-down conversions and a 6-yard pass from Browns QB Brian Hoyer to TE Gary Barnidge to convert on fourth-and-6 with 38 seconds to play. Hover also complete a 28-yard pass to WR Andrew Hawkins with 13 second remaining to ultimately set up Cundiff's game-winner. The Browns started the game with a 10-0 lead in the first guarter when Hoyer found WR Miles Austin for a 3-yard touchdown strike and Cundiff split the uprights from 32 yards away. New Orleans first points came on a 27-yard K Shayne Graham field goal and had its next offensive drive halted when Browns DB Tashaun Gipson picked off Saints QB Drew Brees and returned it for a 62-yard touchdown. A botched snap on the extra point attempt left the score at 16-3 in favor of Cleveland. The Saints found the end zone for the first time of the day when Brees completed a 9-yard touchdown pass to TE Jimmy Graham in the final seconds of the first half, and then picked up where they left off as Brees connecting with Graham again for a 1-yard score in the third quarter to take the lead, 17-16. Cleveland responded when RB Terrance West crossed the goal line from nine yards out to retake the lead. However, the Saints went back up by one on the ensuing drive as RB Mark Ingram scored on a 1-yard rush. After forcing the Browns to punt, New Orleans drove from its own 10-yard line to the Cleveland 31 with under four minutes to play. On third-and-5, Browns LB Karlos Dansby sacked Brees for a 7-yard loss. The loss on the play forced the Saints to punt and give the Cleveland offense the ball back with 2:37 left to play, leading to the late field goal and Browns victory.

The Cleveland Browns forced four interceptions, running two back for touchdowns, to secure a 30-17 road victory over the New Orleans Saints. The Browns were able to get on the board first when kicker Phil Dawson connected on a 23-yard field goal early in the first guarter. The drive began deep in the Saints' territory after wide receiver Joshua Cribbs lateraled the ball on a punt return to cornerback Eric Wright, who took it 62 yards to the New Orleans 19 vard line. Cleveland extended their lead to 10-0 when running back Peyton Hillis ran for a score from four yards out, his fifth rushing touchdown of the season. After both teams traded field goals in the second quarter, Browns linebacker David Bowens was able to deflect a pass to himself and take the ball 30 yards for the score right before the half to make it 20-3. Following a scoreless third quarter, the Saints were able to narrow the gap to 20-10 when quarterback Drew Brees hit tight end David Thomas for an 11-yard touchdown. Cleveland then extended their lead to 23-10 when Dawson converted on his third attempt of the day, this time from 48 yards out. Later in the fourth, the Browns were able to seal up the victory when Bowens took his second interception back 64 yards for the touchdown. New Orleans added another touchdown late in the game to make the final score 30-17. Browns punter Reggie Hodges ran a fake punt for 68 yards in the second quarter, the longest rush by a punter since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR THIS WEEK

OFFENSE

QB Tyrod Taylor

- With a rushing touchdown vs. New Orleans, would become the first QB in franchise history to have a rushing score in each of his first two games of a season
- With a passing and a rushing score, will have done so in 12 games (Cam Newton, 13).
- By completing the game without multiple interceptions, will continue his current active streak of 43 games. The mark is an all-time NFL best.

RB Duke Johnson Jr.

- With 50-plus receiving yards, will mark the 14th times he's done so in a single game and tie him for fifth (Theo Riddick) among all active RBs.
- The contest will mark his 50th consecutive game played, the third most among active RBs.
- With 149 scrimmage yards, will have 3,000 for his career.

WR Jarvis Landry

- With at least five receptions, will mark the 19th consecutive game he's done so and will tie him for the second-longest streak all-time in the NFL.
- Five-plus receptions will also be the 51st occurrence of his career.
- With at least five receptions and 50 receiving yards, will be the 39th time he's done so in a single game.
- With at least 10 receptions, will have done so in eight games since 2015 and can pass Julio Jones to place third in the category.
- With at least 11 catches, will have done so in five games since 2015 and can tie Jones and Keenan Allen in the category.
- With at least a pair of catches, will have done so in 65 consecutive games, the longest streak in the league since 2014.
- Landry could become the first Browns player with back-to-back 100-yard receiving games since Josh Gordon in 2013 (Dec. 1 and Dec. 8).

RB Carlos Hyde

- A start will be the 18th consecutive time he's done so in the regular season, the fifth most among all active RBs.
- With 210 rushing yards, would surpass the 3,000 career rushing vards milestone.

TE David Njoku

• A receiving touchdown will be the fifth of his career and the third most by a Browns TE in his first two seasons.

• The last time the Browns had three or more interceptions in back-to-back games was 2008 (at Cin. 9/28 and vs. NYG 10/13).

DB Damarious Randall

- With a start and an interception, will break the record for most interceptions by an active player who has started 32 games or fewer.
- Another interception can tie Darius Slay for third-most interceptions by a single player since 2015.

DB Terrance Mitchell

• With an interception, will tie for second among active DBs who have appeared in 32 games or less.

DL Myles Garrett

• With two sacks, Garrett will be the first Browns player to record two or more sacks in back-to-back games since Jamir Miller in 2001.

• A TFL will be the 11th of his career and will give him sole passion of first place in the category among active DBs who have played in 31 or fewer games.

HALEY'S COMET

Todd Haley was named offensive coordinator on Jan. 24, 2018. Haley spent the past 21 years coaching in the NFL, including the past six as the offensive coordinator of the Pittsburgh Steelers. Haley oversaw one of the top offensive units in the league during his time in Pittsburgh, which led the NFL with six offensive players being selected to the Pro Bowl in 2017.

Last year, Pittsburgh posted a 31:56 average time of possession for the league's fourth-best average and a 377.9 yards-per-game average, the NFL's third-best output.

Prior to leading one of the NFL's best offenses over the past six years, Haley had three seasons as the head coach of the Kansas City Chiefs. There, he helped the Chiefs win the AFC West Division title in 2010, when Kansas City led the NFL in rushing yards per game (164.3).

EXPERIENCE IS THE BEST TEACHER

Along with Haley, the Browns offense has added assistant coaches with decades of NFL experience. Quarterbacks coach **Ken Zampese** has joined Cleveland's staff for his 20th NFL season and like Haley, Zampese is familiar with the AFC North. Zampese has been either offensive coordinator or quarterbacks coach of the Cincinnati Bengals since 2003 and helped shape QBs Carson Palmer and Andy Dalton into two of the highest-rated statistical passers in Bengals history.

Moreover, running backs/associate head coach **Freddie Kitchens** spent the last 11 seasons with the Arizona Cardinals, having held coaching roles with the RBs, QBs and TEs.

GET REDY

The Browns offense is tied with the Pittsburgh and Philadelphia for 10th in the NFL in the red zone with a 66.7 touchdown percentage, 12.0 percent ahead of the league average. Last year, the Browns finished tied for 25th in the NFL in red zone scoring efficiency with 48.7, 4.7 percent below the league average.

BIG-TIME SECURITY

The Browns return with a group of three players that each started all 16 games last season. OL **Joel Bitonio**, **JC Tretter** and **Kevin Zeitler** headline a front that helped the Browns offense rank sixth in rushing average (4.46). Since 2016, the Browns are second in the entire league in rushing average in such span (4.67). **Bitonio** enters his fifth NFL season, having spent his entire tenure in Cleveland.

RUNNING THE FIELD

The Browns offense posted 177 rushing yards on 38 attempts for two touchdowns through the first week of the 2018 NFL season. The Browns' 177 total rushing yards are the second-best mark in the league and their 4.66 rushing average ranks seventh.

The Browns have the second-best rushing average (4.67) in the NFL since 2016. Cleveland finished sixth in the league last season with a 4.46 rushing average.

GIVE AND TAKE

The Browns defense forced a league-leading six turnovers, including three interceptions and three fumble recoveries, in the season opener. It was the unit's most since recording six at Jacksonville on Nov. 21, 2010, while the last time the Browns recorded three interceptions in a game was against Denver on Oct. 18, 2015.

The unit currently ties for the second-most interceptions in the NFL (three) and has the most fumble recoveries (three). The teams trio of fumble recoveries against Pittsburgh tied for the second most in club history and was the most in a single game since Nov, 1, 2015 against the Arizona Cardinals (three).

With the offense giving away just one interception, the Browns' net difference (+5) is the NFL's top tally.

WILLIAMS REIGNS SUPREME

Defensive coordinator **Gregg Williams** spearheaded the turnaround of the Cleveland Browns defensive unit last year, aiding the development of 2017 first-round picks DL **Myles Garrett** and DB **Jabrill Peppers**. Garrett finished the year tied for second among rookie sack leaders (seven).

Second-year LB **Joe Schobert** finished second in the NFL with 144 tackles and earned his first career Pro Bowl selection in 2017. He and fellow LB **Christian Kirksey** were two of only three NFL players to play all defensive snaps for their respective teams.

The Browns' defense also finished second in the NFL in rushing yards per attempt, holding opponents to an average of 3.4 yards per touch. Cleveland's defense also finished top-10 in the league in opposing team's average yards per drive (27.8).

DEFENDING THE LAND

With 70 tackles on the year, the Browns rank second in the league behind the Kansas City Chiefs (73). Since last season, the Browns have the NFL's fifth-highest mark (967).

A FORCE UP FRONT

Browns defensive linemen collected 259 total stops last season, the fourth most in the NFL and the most by a Browns unit since 2012.

With 20 this season, the Browns DL tie for third in the NFL.

SPECIAL FORCES UNIT

The Browns have also added experience to the special teams coaching staff, welcoming special teams coordinator Amos Jones. Jones, who most recently was special teams coordinator for the Arizona Cardinals for the past five seasons, is no stranger to the AFC North, having been on the Pittsburgh Steelers' staff from 2007-12. Under Jones' tutelage, two Cardinals special teamers were selected to Pro Bowls and K Chandler Catanzaro tied the NFL record for most consecutive made field goals to begin a career (17) in 2014. In his first season in the desert in 2013, Jones guided P Dave Zastudil to tie the NFL lead with 35 punts inside the 20-yard line. With the Steelers, Jones was a member of a staff that won Super Bowl XLIII, developed WR Antonio Brown into a Pro Bowl kick returner in 2011 and helped Pittsburgh lead the NFL with a franchise record of 1,581 return yards in 2009. Jones has a total of 37 years of coaching experience at the high school, college and professional levels.

HARD KNOCK LIFE

The Browns were selected to be featured on HBO's Hard Knocks documentary series in 2018. "Hard Knocks: Training Camp with the Cleveland Browns" is produced by HBO Sports and NFL Films and is a five-episode reality series that provides an allaccess look as the Browns went through training camp and the preseason. The Browns were the feature of the 13th edition of the award-winning series, which debuted in 2001 and has won 16 Sports Emmys. The series ran from Tuesday, Aug. 7 (10-11 p.m. EST/PT) through its Sept. 4 season finale.

AWAKENING THE SLEEPING GIANT

General Manager **John Dorsey** was named to his current position on Dec. 7, 2017, following Week 13 of the 2017 NFL season. Since then, Dorsey has enhanced the roster through free agency and trades, as well as taking advantage of the Browns' draft selections.

Dorsey also bolstered the roster off the field, headlined by the additions of Assistant General Manager Eliot Wolf and vice president of player personnel Alonzo Highsmith. Both Wolf and Highsmith's connection to Dorsey spans from the trio's time and experience with the Green Bay Packers. Dorsey was first hired by the Packers as a college scout, joining Hall of Famer Ron Wolf's staff, who is also the father of Eliot.

Dorsey served as general manager of the Kansas City Chiefs from 2013-16. During that time, Dorsey's teams earned three postseason berths and a 2016 AFC West title. The Chiefs also won at least nine games a year in that span and registered a 43-21 (.672) overall record, the NFL's fourth-highest winning percentage.

As the Chiefs' GM, Dorsey selected three players who went on to earn first team All-Pro honors and were also selected to multiple Pro Bowls, including TE Travis Kelce (third round, 2013), CB Marcus Peters (first round, 2015) and WR Tyreek Hill (fifth round, 2016). In 2017, he drafted RB Kareem Hunt (third round), who led the NFL in rushing during his rookie season and was selected to the Pro Bowl. The year prior in 2016, LB D.J. Alexander (sixth round, 2015) was also selected to the Pro Bowl.

APRIL SHOWERS BRING PRO BOWL FLOWERS

Dorsey's career success in the spring has been evident in the winter, as he's selected a rookie Pro Bowler in each NFL Draft since 2015.

Since entering the league in 2011, he's one of only three NFL QBs who have played five seasons or more and have reached a 90.0 passer rating or better (90.0), along with a rushing average of 5.0 or more (5.62). Only Aaron Rodgers and Russell Wilson accompany Taylor.







KICKING THE RECORD BOOK

K Zane Gonzalez made his way into the Browns rookie record books in 2017 with 15 field goals made, the most by a Browns rookie in history, and with 70 points for the No. 2 spot on the points list. Moreover, Gonzalez converted the longest field goal ever made by a Browns rookie (54 yards). It was also the longest made by a Browns K since Phil Dawson in 2011.

Gonzalez also made three field goals in Week 12 at Cincinnati, joining Jeff Jaeger (Nov. 8, 1987) as the only Browns rookie kickers to make three field goals in a game.

A BRIT-TON OF PUNTING

P Britton Colquitt posted the best yards per punt mark (47.6) of his career in 2017. Colquitt was fifth in the NFL last season with 47.6 yards per punt average on 80 boots and posted a Browns single-season record 40.6 net average. Since then, Colquitt remains top ten in the category.

THE WARDEN

Making his NFL debut in Week 1 of 2018, rookie DB **Denzel Ward** recorded two interceptions. Ward is the fourth-youngest player (21 years, 134 days) in NFL history with a pair of interceptions in a game. He joined Clarence Scott (Sept. 19, 1971) as the only Browns rookies to record two interceptions in their NFL debut. He's the first Browns rookie to record two interceptions in a game since T.J. Ward on Nov. 21, 2010 and the first Brown to record two interceptions in a game since Joe Haden on Sept. 18, 2016.

Additionally, Ward's pair of interceptions tie him for the league lead in the category, while his three pass breakups are tied for second.

HEAD COACH HUE JACKSON

Hue Jackson was named the 16th full-time head coach in Cleveland Browns history by Dee and Jimmy Haslam on January 13, 2016. He has 31 years of coaching experience, including the last 17 in the NFL. He has spent 11 seasons coaching in the AFC North, during which time he helped his team advance to the postseason seven times. Jackson was head coach of the Oakland Raiders in 2011 and guided the team to an 8-8 record. He has also served as offensive coordinator in Washington (2003), Atlanta (2007), Oakland (2010) and Cincinnati (2014-15).

In 2017, the Browns defense made significant improvements in many categories. The Browns, who finished 31st in the NFL in both total defense and rushing defense in 2016, ranked 14th in total defense and seventh in rushing defense in 2017. Cleveland recorded its best finish in rush defense since 1992 and held opponents to a 3.35 rushing average. Joe Schobert become the first Browns linebacker named to the Pro Bowl in 16 years, as he was second in the NFL with 142 tackles. Defensive lineman Myles Garrett, the first overall pick of the 2017 NFL Draft, led the Browns with seven sacks, tied for second among all NFL rookies.

Offensively, running back Duke Johnson Jr. led the team in receptions (74) and receiving yards (693), while totaling seven touchdowns. He averaged 6.7 scrimmage yards per touch, third most in the NFL among running backs in 2017. Rookie tight end David Njoku led the Browns with four receiving touchdowns, the most ever by a Browns rookie tight end. Rookie quarterback DeShone Kizer recorded the second-most passing yards by a Browns rookie and third-most touchdown passes.

In his first year with Cleveland, Jackson helped the Browns finish second in the NFL with a 4.89 rushing average, the team's best mark since 1966. Linebacker Christian Kirksey finished third in the NFL with 148 tackles, while left tackle Joe Thomas was selected to his 10th career Pro Bowl.

Jackson helped develop one of the youngest teams in NFL history. The Browns opened the 2016 season with 17 rookies on their 53-man roster, the most by an NFL team in a season opener since 2002. First-round pick wide receiver Corey Coleman was named NFL Rookie of the Week after a 104-yard, two touchdown performance in Week 2. Second-round pick defensive lineman Emmanuel Ogbah recorded a team-best 5.5 sacks, tied for the fourth-most by a Browns rookie.

Prior to joining the Browns, Jackson spent the previous four seasons (2012-15) with the Cincinnati Bengals. During that time, he helped the Bengals to two division titles and a trip to the postseason all four years. In 2012, he served as secondary/assistant special teams coach before coaching the running backs in 2013. Jackson spent 2014-15 as offensive coordinator.

With Jackson as coordinator in 2015, the Bengals offense finished third in the AFC in yards per play (5.7) and points per game (26.2). He was voted by the Professional Football Writers of America (PFWA) as the Co-Assistant Coach of the Year as quarterback Andy Dalton set a career high and franchise record with a 106.3 rating, which led the AFC and was second in the NFL. After losing Dalton to injury in Week 14, Jackson guided quarterback A.J. McCarron to a 2-1 record in the final three games of the season as the Bengals clinched the AFC North title. The Cincinnati running game produced two 700yard rushers in Jeremy Hill (794) and Giovani Bernard (730) for the first time since 1988. Tight end Tyler Eifert experienced a breakout season after hauling in 13 touchdown receptions, the most by a Bengals tight end in franchise history and the most by a Cincinnati player since 2001. Wide receiver A.J. Green added 10 receiving touchdowns on 86 receptions for 1,297 yards. Eifert, Green and left tackle Andrew Whitworth were selected to the Pro Bowl.

In Jackson's first year as offensive coordinator for Cincinnati in 2014, the run game posted its highest yards per game average (134.1) since 2000. Dalton passed for 3,398 yards and Green totaled 1,041 receiving yards. Hill led all NFL rookies with 1,124 rushing yards, the second-most by a Bengals rookie in team history.

After spending the 2010 season as the Raiders offensive coordinator, Jackson was promoted to head coach in 2011.





HEAD COACH HUE JACKSON CONTINUED

Oakland finished the year 8-8 and tied for first in the AFC West but missed the postseason via tiebreaker. The 8-8 mark was the best record by any Raiders team since 2002. The Raiders finished ninth in the NFL in total offense (379.5 yards per game) and seventh in rushing offense (131.9).

Before joining the Raiders, Jackson spent two seasons (2008-09) as quarterbacks coach for Baltimore, helping the Ravens advance to the playoffs both years. He was vital in the development of Joe Flacco, who was named NFL Rookie of the Year in 2008 and became the first rookie quarterback to win two playoff games as the Ravens advanced to the AFC Championship game.

From 2004-06, Jackson served as the Bengals wide receivers coach, helping develop one of the best wide receiver tandems in NFL history with Chad Johnson and T.J. Houshmandzadeh. During that span, the two combined to average 173.3 catches, 2,363.3 receiving yards and 15 touchdowns per season. In 2005, Johnson led the AFC with 1,432 receiving yards. In 2006, Johnson and Houshmandzadeh became the first Bengals duo to each top 1,000 receiving yards in the same season.

Jackson gained his first fulltime NFL experience with Washington, where he served as the running backs coach from 2001-02, before being promoted to offensive coordinator in 2003. Under Jackson's tutelage, running back Stephen Davis led the NFC with 1,432 rushing yards in 2001.

Jackson spent 14 years coaching on the college level, going from a graduate assistant at Pacific all the way to offensive coordinator at Southern California. He spent four seasons (1997-2000) as USC's offensive coordinator, where he also helped to recruit and develop players, including quarterback Carson Palmer, who went on to win the Heisman Trophy and be selected No. 1 overall in the NFL draft.

He was a minority coaching fellowship intern with the Los Angeles Rams in 1990, Arizona Cardinals in 1992 and Washington Redskins in 1995. He also served as the running backs/wide receivers/special teams coach for the London Monarchs of the World League in 1991.

Born Oct. 22, 1965, Jackson was a quarterback at Pacific from 1985-86 and threw for 2,544 yards and 19 touchdowns. The Los Angeles native also lettered in basketball and earned his degree in physical education.

Jackson and his wife, Michelle, have three daughters, Jordyn, Baylee and Haydyn.



THE HUE JACKSON FOUNDTION


Hue Jackson and his wife, Michelle, launched the Hue Jackson Foundation on July 20, 2017. The foundation is committed to empowering children, teen and adult survivors of human trafficking through the funding of organizations that champion for and serve as a voice for those who are exploited. The foundation also focuses its efforts to further awareness, prevention and healing for victims of human trafficking.

On July 17, 2018, the Hue Jackson Foundation opened the Hue Jackson Foundation Survivors of Human Trafficking Residence. This residence is approximately 4,500 sq. ft. and provides a safe environment for up to 12 recovered adult survivors of human trafficking. It offers collaborative and holistic services, and provides shared office space for law enforcement, healthcare, and social services providers, to help assist these survivors on their road to recovery.



Sept. 9, 2018 FirstEnergy Stadium, Cleveland, Ohio

The Cleveland Browns kicked off the 2018 season with a tie against the Pittsburgh Steelers, 21-21. In the first tie for the Browns since 1989, the team's defense forced six turnovers for the first time since 2010. Rookie DB Denzel Ward became the first Browns DB to secure two interceptions in his NFL debut since 1971 (Clarence Scott). Browns DL Myles Garrett forced a career-best two fumbles, while matching career-best marks in tackles (six) and sacks (two). Following a scoreless first quarter, Steelers RB James Conner culminated a 10-play, 88-yard scoring drive ending in a four-yard touchdown run. After the 7-O halftime break, Browns QB Tyrod Taylor led Cleveland on an opening-half possession that he ended with a 20-yard touchdown run by him, tying the game at 7-7. Pittsburgh answered as QB Ben Roethlisberger found WR Antonio Brown for a 22-yard touchdown pass on the ensuing possession. After forcing the Browns to punt, Conner found the end zone again for his second score of the game, giving the Steelers their largest lead of the game, 21-7. After recovering the team's second fumble of the game, Browns RB Carlos Hyde punched in a one-yard score. Before the final whistle of regulation, Taylor found WR Josh Gordon for a 17-yard strike with 1:58 remaining in regulation to tie the game, 21-21. In the OT period, each team exchanged possessions with punts, before the Steelers put together an eight-play, 31-yard drive to set up a K Chris Boswell game-winning field goal attempt, but Boswell's try missed to the left. Following a Cleveland punt, Roethlisberger was strip-sacked by LB Genard Avery on the following possession. The ensuing Browns K Zane Gonzalez game-winning field goal attempt was blocked by Steelers LB TJ Watt, forcing the teams to tie, 21-21.
