The game will also be broadcast nationally on CBS/Westwood One Radio. **Brad Sham** and **Bob Trumpy** will broadcast the game along with **John Dockery**, who will report from the sidelines.

The AFC East Division Champion New England Patriots (11-5) will host the AFC West Division Champion Oakland Raiders (11-6) in a divisional playoff game this Saturday, Jan. 19 at Foxboro Stadium. The game will be broadcast nationally beginning at 8:00 p.m. EST. It will be the Patriots' fifth home playoff game in franchise history and the fourth in their last five years. The Patriots are 3-0 in their last three home playoff games. Their only home playoff loss was in 1978.

The Patriots enter the playoffs as one of the hottest teams in the NFL, winning eight of their last nine games, including six in a row. Their current six-game win streak is the longest in the AFC, tying the streak of the NFC's St. Louis Rams. The Rams, coincidentally, were the last team to defeat the Patriots over two months ago (Nov. 18).

The Patriots will be well rested after earning a first-round playoff bye just one week after enjoying their regular season bye. When the Patriots host the Raiders this weekend, it will be just their second game in 27 days. The Raiders, on the other hand, snapped a three-game losing streak by defeating the New York Jets, 38-24, to advance to this week's divisional playoff game.

It will be the third time the Patriots and the Raiders have met during the playoffs. Coincidentally, both of their previous games were also played in the divisional playoff round. If history is any indicator, fans can expect another close game. In 1976, the Patriots led 21-17 in Oakland with just 40 seconds remaining, but lost 24-17 when quarterback Ken Stabler scored from a yard out with just 10 seconds to play. Patriots fans will always remember referee Ben Dreith as the Stabler enabler who called an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty on Ray Hamilton to give the Raiders a first-and-goal opportunity at the 1-yard line. That year, the Raiders advanced to Super Bowl XI and defeated the Minnesota Vikings.

In 1985, it was the Patriots who defeated the Jets to advance to play the Raiders in the divisional playoff game. After trailing 20-17 at the half, the Patriots scored 10 points in four seconds (elapsed time). After the Patriots converted a 32-yard field goal, the ensuing kickoff was fumbled and Jim Bowman recovered it in the end zone for a touchdown to give the Patriots a 27-20 victory. The Patriots then defeated the Dolphins to claim their first conference title in franchise history and advanced to Super Bowl XX in New Orleans.

This week's game will be the first playoff game for 21 Patriots players, including 14 veterans and five drafted rookies and two first-year free agents. The most notable among the veteran first-timers is 11-year veteran Roman Phifer, who is about to be replaced as the NFL's senior-most member without playoff experience (168 games). Also making his playoff debut will be second-year quarterback Tom Brady, who enters the postseason with an 11-3 record as a starter.

HOME SWEET HOME

New England enters this week's game with a consecutive sellout streak at Foxboro Stadium of 81 games. The streak began the year Robert Kraft purchased the team (1994) and includes preseason, regular season and postseason games. The Patriots are 53-28 in those games, including six wins in their last seven at Foxboro. The Patriots currently have a three-game winning streak at Foxboro in the postseason and have not lost a home playoff game since 1978.

SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots and Raiders were two of the eight charter teams of the AFL in 1960 and have met 28 times over the past 42 years. While the two teams clashed 22 times in the 1960s and '70s, they have only met six times since 1981 and once since 1994. The Raiders hold a slim 14-13-1 advantage over the Patriots.

This will be the third time they have met in the playoffs, each occurring in the divisional playoff round. In the past two meetings, the team that has won, has advanced to the Super Bowl. The Raiders won the first meeting, 24-21 in 1976 on a last second touchdown run by quarterback Ken Stabler and advanced to Super Bowl XI against Minnesota. The Patriots evened the score in 1985, forcing six turnovers and defeating the Raiders 27-20. The Patriots advanced to Super Bowl XX against Chicago.

Last Game Review – Patriots 38, Panthers 6

GAME REVIEW

The New England Patriots defeated the Carolina Panthers 38-6 last week to finish the 2001 season 11-5 and clinch their sixth AFC East title in franchise history.

The Patriots forced six Panthers turnovers, three of which resulted in touchdowns. Two of those touchdowns were interception returns for scores (46 yards by Ty Law and 76 yards by Otis Smith). The last time they recorded six takeaways in one game was 12/1/96 at San Diego.

The Patriots opened the scoring on the first drive of the game with a 19-yard field goal by Adam Vinatieri. They drove 52 yards on 11 plays, using seven passes and three rushes to jump out to a 3-0 lead. It was the 13th time this season they have scored first and they improved to 9-4 in those games.

The Patriots defense followed with a score of their own, when Law snared a Chris Weinke pass and returned it 46 yards for a score, improving their lead to 10-0. It was Law's second interception return for a touchdown this season and the fifth of his career, a franchise record.

In the second quarter the Panthers threatened to score, moving inside the red zone. On third and goal from the three, Weinke was sacked by Willie McGinest and the Panthers settled for a field goal, cutting the Patriots lead to 10-3.

The Patriots were forced to punt on their first drive of the second half and punter Ken Walter pinned the Panthers on the 1-yard line. The Patriots defense did not allow the Panthers to gain a first down and forced them to punt from their 7-yard line. Patriots punt returner Troy Brown returned the punt 68 yards for a score, increasing their lead to 17-3. It was his second punt return for a touchdown of the season and the third of his career, tying a franchise record.

Following a Panther field goal, Patriots running back Antowain Smith rushed for a 32-yard touchdown and the Patriots increased their lead to 24-6. Smith's score marked the first time since Nov. 9, 1997 that the Patriots scored a touchdown on offense, defense and special teams in one game.

The Patriots put the pedal to the metal in the fourth quarter, getting two more scores. Quarterback Tom Brady completed a five-yard touchdown pass to Jermaine Wiggins and then cornerback Otis Smith picked off a Weinke pass, his second of the game, and he returned it 76 yards for a touchdown, his second of the season and the seventh of his career.

The last time the Patriots recorded two interception returns for touchdowns was when both Law and Smith returned interceptions for scores vs. Indianapolis (9/30).

PATRIOTS MILLER LITE PLAYER OF THE GAME

Patriots wide receiver Troy Brown was named Miller Lite Player of the Game against the Panthers. He broke the game open in the third quarter with a 68-yard punt return for a touchdown. He also led all receivers with six catches for 45 yards. It was his fifth Miller Lite Player of the Game award this season.

FIRST THINGS FIRST

The Patriots scored first against the Panthers on a 19-yard field goal by Adam Vinatieri, marking the 13th time this season they have done so. They also extended their streak of not allowing a point in the first quarter to three games.

They outscored the Panthers 10-3 in the first half and this season they have outscored their opponents 207-105 in the first half and 133-51 in the second quarter.

GREAT POINT

The Patriots defense yielded just six points to the Panthers in their season finale, their lowest total of the season and the lowest since they allowed the Baltimore Ravens to score only three points (1/2/00). The Patriots finished the season allowing only 272 points (17.0 per game). It's the fifth lowest total in franchise history and the lowest total since the NFL went to a 16-game schedule in 1978. Their 17.0 average per game is the third lowest in team history (see below).

FOR THE RECORD

The Patriots finished the season 3-1 against the NFC West, their best record versus the NFC since they went 3-1 in 1999 ... The Patriots were 9-4 this season when they scored first, 10-1 when they led at the half and 10-0 when they led after three quarters.

THREE TIMES A CHARM

The Patriots scored touchdowns on offense (A. Smith run, J. Wiggins pass), defense (O. Smith and T. Law interception returns) and special teams (T. Brown punt return) against the Panthers. It was the first time since Nov. 9, 1997 at Buffalo they had scored in all three phases of the game (B. Coates pass, C. Martin run, offense; C. Slade, interception return, defense; and D. Cullors, kickoff return, special teams).

WINNING WAYS

The Patriots extended their winning streak to six games, their longest since they closed the 1994 season with seven consecutive wins. They have also won eight of their last nine and 10 of their last 12.

HOT AND COLD

When the game time temperatures have cooled down in recent years, the Patriots have heated up. Since 1993, the Patriots are 12-4 when it's 36 degrees or colder, including a 2-1 record in the playoffs. In the Patriots final two games of the 2001 season, both victories, the game-time temperature was 36 degrees.

TEAM TURNAROUND

The Patriots won six straight games and eight of their last nine, improving their record to 11-5 on the season. They recorded the second-best turnaround in the NFL in 2001, second only to the Chicago Bears, who increased their win total by eight games (see below).

TURN, TURN, TURN

The Patriots recorded a +3 turnover ratio in their season finale against the Panthers and improved to 7-1 when they record a positive ratio this season (34-10 since 1996). During their six-game winning streak to end the regular season, the Patriots had a +11 turnover ratio and improved their season ratio to +7. The Patriots have finished 17 seasons with a positive turnover ratio and in 16 of those seasons they had a winning record.

New England finished the 2001 season tied for sixth in the NFL and second in the AFC with 22 interceptions. They also finished fourth in the AFC with 35 takeaways (see below). It's their highest totals since they recorded 24 interceptions in 1998 and 40 takeaways in 1994.

DEAD ZONE

The Patriots defense is in a zone. In their last five games, they have allowed their opponents just 10 drives in the red zone and their opponents have converted just one of those into a touchdown. Opponents have scored seven field goals, one touchdown and have turned the ball over twice (fumble, interception).

In 2001, they allowed their opponents to score 19 touchdowns on 49 trips inside the red zone. They rank first in the AFC and third in the NFL with a touchdown percentage of 38.8.

WORST TO FIRST

This season, the New England Patriots finished as the AFC Eastern Division champions, rebounding from a 5-11 last-place finish in 2000. It was the 15th worst-to-first season in the NFL since the 1970 NFL merger. Three of those teams reached the Super Bowl (St. Louis Rams, 1998; Cincinnati Bengals, 1987; Cincinnati Bengals, 1980).

VERSUS THE AFC EAST

The Patriots finished with a 6-2 record against the AFC East during the 2001 season. The last time they finished a season with a winning record against the AFC East was in 1997 (7-1).

HOME SWEET HOME

The Patriots enter the postseason with a consecutive sellout streak of 81 games at Foxboro Stadium. The streak began the year Robert Kraft purchased the team (1994) and includes preseason, regular season and postseason games. The Patriots are 53-29 in those games.

Their first playoff game will be the 171st consecutive game the Patriots have played that will be televised locally. The streak, which began with the 1993 season-finale, includes preseason, postseason and regular season games.

FAREWELL TO FOXBORO?

This weekend's game will be the 242nd game played at Foxboro, including the fifth postseason game played. The Patriots hold a 136-105 record at Foxboro Stadium since it opened in 1971, including a 3-1 record in the playoffs. The Patriots won their final regular season home game at Foxboro Stadium, 20-13, against the Miami Dolphins.

FLY PATTEN

Patriots wide receiver David Patten set career-highs in 2001 with 51 catches, 749 yards and four touchdowns, but it was his performance against the Colts (10/21) that thrust him into NFL lore.

Patten led an offensive assault, which included two touchdown receptions, a run for a touchdown and a touchdown pass in the Patriots 38-17 victory over the Colts. He became the first player in franchise history to accomplish the touchdown trifecta in a game and the first player to do so in the NFL in 22 years (to the date). Hall of Fame RB Walter Payton was the last player to accomplish the feat on Oct. 21, 1979 vs. Minnesota. Four players scored the TD trifecta in the 1960s, but Patten is the first since Keith Lincoln in 1965 to score four total touchdowns while achieving the feat.

JUST FOR KICKS

Patriots punter Ken Walter, who was signed by the Patriots on Oct. 16, led the AFC and ranked second in the NFL with a net punting average of 38.1 during the 2001 season. Walter was equally deft in placing punts inside the 20-yard line in 2001. He boomed almost half of his punts, 24 of 49 (49.0%), inside the 20. It's the highest ratio in the NFL. GOING BOWLING



Patriots safety Lawyer Milloy was named to the Pro Bowl for the third time in his career this season. He trails only Hall of Fame cornerback Mike Haynes (six) for most Pro Bowl appearances by a defensive back.

Milloy led the defense with 113 tackles this season, marking the fifth consecutive season he has surpassed 100 tackles. It was also the fourth consecutive season he led the defense in tackles. His year-by-year career totals are listed below. Milloy has been a constant on the Patriots defense since he was drafted in 1996, playing in all 96 games, including 80 consecutive starts.

"He's there dependably week in and week out, year in and year out," said Head Coach Bill Belichick. "I think he has as much respect probably for the way he plays his position as anybody in the league. I mean he's just tough, consistent, dependable and he's a warrior."

OTIS, MY MAN

Patriots cornerback Otis Smith led the Patriots and finished tied for fourth in the AFC with five interceptions during the 2001 season. "Otis is a savvy ball hawk and if the ball is thrown inaccurately around him most of the time he is going to come up with it," said Head Coach Bill Belichick.

Smith returned two of his interceptions for touchdowns, 78 and 76 yards, increasing his career total to seven. He became just the fifth player in franchise history to record two interception returns for scores in the same season. He also accumulated 181 return yards in 2001, the fourth highest single-season total in franchise history.

His 78-yard return versus the Colts (9/30) was the longest return of his career and the longest by a Patriot since Jimmy Hitchcock returned an interception 100-yards for a score vs. Miami (11/23/97). His previous long was 74 yards vs. Washington (12/22/91).

SACK ATTACK

Willie McGinest was credited with six sacks this season, increasing his career total to 51.5 (5th in franchise history). ROMAN CONQUER

Linebacker Roman Phifer finished the season as the second-leading tackler on the Patriots with 92 stops (71 solos). It was the seventh time in his 11-year career he has recorded 92 or more tackles and the first time since 1998 when he logged 99 with the St. Louis Rams. He also totaled two sacks, one interception, two forced fumbles and recovered two fumbles.

"I'll tell you Roman is having a terrific year, he really is," said head coach Bill Belichick during the season. "This is the best I have seen him play in the last three or four years. His pass rush has really improved and he has always been a good coverage linebacker."

Phifer will play in the first postseason game of his 11-year career during the divisional round of the playoffs. He will be able to drop the distinction of being the player who has played in the most regular season games with no postseason action, see below:

GOING BOWLING



Tom Brady was voted to represent the New England Patriots at the Pro Bowl this year, becoming just the second Patriots quarterback to receive the honor (Drew Bledsoe). He became just the fifth quarterback to get voted to the Pro Bowl in his first year as a starter since 1970, joining Dan Marino (1983), Brett Favre (1992), Kurt Warner (1999) and Dante Culpepper (2000). Both Vito 'Babe' Parilli and Mike Taliaferro earned AFL all-star recognition in the 1960's.

Tom Brady became the only quarterback in franchise history to win 11 of his first 14 starts as a Patriot. Vito "Babe" Parilli ranks second in Patriots annals with 10 wins his first 14 starts.

COMPLETING THE PICTURE

Brady completed 63.9% (413-264) of his passes this season and achieved the highest completion percentage in the 42-year history of the franchise. The Patriots single-season record was held by Tony Eason in 1986 with a 61.6 mark (448-276). Brady finished the season ranked second in the AFC and fourth in the NFL. RATINGS GAME

Brady finished the 2001 season ranked third in the AFC and sixth in the NFL with a quarterback rating of 86.5 while starting in 14 games this season. His 86.5 rating was the fifth-highest in the 42-year history of the Patriots franchise. Tony Eason (93.4, 1985), Babe Parilli (91.8, 1962), Eason (89.2, 1986) and Drew Bledsoe (87.7, 1997) are the only Patriot quarterbacks to record higher passer ratings during a season.

Brady recorded six games with a rating of 91.6 or better (all wins) and three of 124.4 or more, including a season-high of 148.3 at Indianapolis (10/21). The top-rated passers in 2001 are listed below:

RECORD BREAKER

Patriots wide receiver Troy Brown caught back-to-back passes on the Patriots first drive of the game against the Panthers (his 96th and 97th) to become the Patriots all-time leading receiver, surpassing Ben Coates (96, 1994). Brown also caught his 100th pass of the season in the third quarter and became the first Patriot to ever record 100 receptions in a single-season.

Brown also moved into second place with 1,199 yards receiving, moving ahead of Coates (1,174, 1994). Brown is only the sixth Patriots receiver to eclipse the 1,000-yard receiving mark in a season. The last Patriots wide receiver to reach 1,000 yards was Terry Glenn who had 1,147 yards in 1999. The Patriots single-season receiving highs, along with Brown's totals from this season, are listed below.

THE RETURNS ARE IN

Brown finished the season as the top punt returner in the NFL, averaging a career-high 14.2 yards per return. He is just the second Patriot to accomplish the feat, joining Irving Fryar (14.1, 1985). Brown's 14.2 average is the second-highest in franchise history, behind Mack Herron's 14.8 average in 1974. Brown returned two punts for touchdowns this season, an 85-yard return vs. Cleveland (12/9) and a 68-yard return against Carolina (1/6/02). They were the second and third of his career, tying Irving Fryar (1984-91) for the most career punt returns touchdowns (three). He also tied Fryar (1985) and Hall of Famer Mike Haynes (1976) for the most punt returns for touchdowns in a season (two).

If the New England Patriots can be summed up in one word, it would have to be “team”. They have received career-best performances from numerous players this season, each contributing to the team’s success. Veteran starters like wide receiver Troy Brown, running back Antowain Smith and safety Lawyer Milloy have all established new career-highs in multiple statistical categories, while young players have exceeded expectations to contribute to the team’s success in 2001. Whether it’s quarterback Tom Brady, tackle Greg Robinson-Randall, tight end Jermaine Wiggins, or wide receiver Fred Coleman, they’ve all been dependable players who have had a positive impact on the team this year.

“There is an old saying about the strength of the wolf is the pack and I think there is a lot of truth to that. On a football team it’s not the strength of the individual players, but it is the strength of the unit and how they all function together.” – **Patriots Head Coach Bill Belichick.**

“I think our team definitely improved from December to July both in terms of personnel and also in terms of the team’s attitude and it’s work ethic and it’s commitment to the offseason program that started (last) March. That improvement has manifested itself to where we are today and that is mainly due to a lot of hard work by the players and the chemistry that they have developed themselves.” – **Belichick.**

“When you look at them individually, they may not be impressive, but this is a team game, not an individual game.” – **Buffalo Bills President/General Manager Tom Donahoe.**
