The game will also be broadcast nationally on CB5/Westwood One Radio. **XXXXXX** and **XXXXXXX** will broadcast the game along with **XXXXXXX**, who will report from the sidelines.

The AFC's second-seeded New England Patriots (12-5) will travel to Pittsburgh to battle the conference's top-seeded Steelers (14-3) in the AFC Championship Game this Sunday at 12:30 p.m. It is the first time the AFC's top two seeded teams have met in the conference finals in three years, when the New York Jets traveled to Denver to play the Broncos. In the past seven years, only one top seeded team has won the AFC Championship (Denver in 1998). The last time the Steelers entered the playoffs as the top seeded team was in 1994. That year, Pittsburgh was defeated in the AFC Championship game by the San Diego Chargers. The last time the Patriots entered the playoffs as a number two seed, they hosted the AFC Championship game against Jacksonville and won to advance to the Super Bowl.

This will be the Patriots' third appearance in an AFC Championship game. In 1985, the Patriots traveled to Miami and claimed a 31-14 victory. In 1996, the Patriots hosted the Jacksonville Jaguars and won 20-6. After both games, the Patriots advanced to play in the Super Bowl in New Orleans (Super Bowl XX and Super Bowl XXXI).

This week's game will be the playoff rubber match between the Patriots and the Steelers. It is the second time the Patriots have played a playoff game in Pittsburgh in the past four years and the third time these two teams have met in the playoffs in the past five years. The two previous meetings were both divisional playoff games, with the home team claiming the victory. The last time the Patriots advanced to the AFC Championship Game was in 1996, after defeating the Steelers, 28-3, in the divisional playoff game. The following year, the Patriots traveled to Pittsburgh for a divisional playoff game and suffered a heartbreaking 7-6 loss.

Last week, the Patriots defeated the Oakland Raiders in overtime, 16-13, avenging a 25-year old loss suffered in Oakland in 1976. This week, the Patriots have the opportunity to avenge another painful playoff loss, the 7-6 loss at Pittsburgh on Jan. 3, 1998. In that game, Patriots linebacker Mike Vrabel played a critical role as a member of the Steelers when he forced a fumble after hitting Drew Bledsoe from behind with just 1:50 remaining in the game. The turnover came at the Patriots own 42-yard line, ending a drive that started at the 1.

On Jan. 5, 1997, the Patriots defeated the Steelers in a divisional playoff game, 28-3, in one of the most memorable games played at Foxboro Stadium. Thick fog blanketed the field throughout the game, but the Patriots emerged with a convincing 28-3 victory.

## **MUST SEE TV**

Last Saturday night, millions of television viewers saw snow on their screens, but it was not because of poor reception. The Patriots thrilling 16-13 overtime win over the Raiders last Saturday in prime time earned a 40.6 rating in the Boston television market and took a 61 percent share of the total television audience. Nationally, the match-up had a rating of 19.0 and was seen by a 31 percent audience share, making it the highest-rated Saturday AFC playoff game since 1997 and the highest-rated Patriots game in over three seasons.

Over the final seven weeks of the regular season Patriots telecasts were the highest rated program in the Boston market.



#### SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots and Rams will square off for the second time in just over two months. The Patriots will look to even the score with the Rams who defeated them 24-17 on Nov. 18, 2001. New England fell to St. Louis 24-17 on Nov. 18, 2001. Despite being outgained in total offensive yards, 482 to 230, the Patriots held the Rams to their fourth lowest scoring total of the season, 24 points. The Rams finished the 2001 season as the top scoring team in the NFL, averaging 31.4 points per game

This will only be the ninth time since the AFL/NFL merger in 1970 that they have met, including their meeting earlier this year. This will be their first meeting in the Super Bowl. The Rams hold an advantage in the series, winning five of eight games, including the last four in a row. The results of the series are listed below:

#### LAST TIME

The New England Patriots fell to the St. Louis Rams 24-17 at a sold-out Foxboro Stadium on Nov. 18, 2001. Despite being outgained in total offensive yards, 482 to 230, the Patriots held the Rams to their fourth lowest scoring total of the season, 24 points. The Rams finished the 2001 season as the top scoring team in the NFL, averaging 31.4 points per game.

The turning point of the game came late in the second quarter, when New England drove to the Rams 4-yard line and running back Antowain Smith was ruled to have fumbled the football. The play was upheld following an instant relay review. The officials ruled there was no conclusive evidence that Smith was down.

The Rams capitalized on the turnover, driving 97 yards on eight plays and took the lead before the half, 14-10, on a Warner to Marshall Faulk touchdown pass. Warner completed eight of nine passes on the drive, including the 9-yard scoring pass.

All 24 points scored in the first half were the result of turnovers.

New England responded to a Rams fourth quarter touchdown with a 10-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to David Patten and cut the Rams lead to 24-17 with 7:46 remaining in the game. Brady completed all of his five pass attempts on the drive for 65 yards, including the score.

St. Louis was able to hold onto the ball for the final 7:46 of the game and clung on to their 24-17 victory.

#### PATRIOTS VERSUS NFC WEST

New England faced off against the NFC West this season and won three of four, with their only loss coming at the hands of the Rams. They defeated the Atlanta Falcons 24-10 (11/4), New Orleans Saints 34-17 (11/25) and Carolina 38-6 (1/6). They lost to St. Louis Rams 24-17 (11/18).

#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

- The last time the Patriots lost (11/18) was to the Rams. They have won eight straight games since they lost 24-17 against the Rams.
- This will be the third time the Patriots will face off against the top seed from the NFC in the Super Bowl (Chicago, Super Bowl XX and Green Bay, Super Bowl XXXI).



#### SERIES HISTORY

This will be the ninth meeting all-time between the Patriots and Eagles (first ever in postseason), with Philadelphia holding a 6-2 advantage in the series. The first meeting took place in 1973 and the last in 1999. The home team has won seven of the eight previous meetings, with the only road win being earned by the Eagles in the series only overtime contest in 1987. The last two meetings were the only two decided by more than ten points. New England's record at home against Philadelphia is 2-1 and they have a 0-5 record in Philadelphia. The two teams have never met at a neutral site.

#### CONNECTIONS

- Patriots cornerback Otis Smith originally signed with the Eagles as a rookie free agent in 1990. He spent five seasons in Philadelphia and played in 62 games.
- Patriots wide receiver **Charles Johnson** spent the 1999 and 2000 seasons with Philadelphia. He played in 27 games and caught 90 passes for 1,056 yards and eight touchdowns.
- Patriots safety **Tebucky Jones** was a teammate **Donovan McNabb** at Syracuse (1995-96).
- Patriots center **Damien Woody** attended Boston College with Eagles offensive lineman **Doug Brzezinski**.
- Patriots defensive coordinator **Romeo Crennel** was the NY Giants special teams coach from 1985-89 while the Eagles punter **Sean Landeta** kicked for the Giants.
- Eagles wide receiver **Sean Morey** was originally a seventh round (241<sup>st</sup> overall) pick of the New England Patriots in 1999. He played in two game during the 1999 season and spent the 2000 season on the Patriots practice squad. Morey grew up in Marshfield, Mass. and then matriculated to Brown University.
- Eagles center **Jim Pyne** attended Milford (Mass.) High School and is part of the only three-generation AFL/NFL family in history. His father, George III played for the AFL's Boston Patriots in 1965 and his grandfather George II played for the Providence Steam Rollers in 1931-32.
- Eagles Tight End/ Long Snapper **Mike Bartrum** earned a trip to the Super Bow as a member of the 1996 Patriots. He played for Patriots from 1996-1999, catching one pass for a one-yard score.
- Eagles defensive line coach **Tommy Brasher** held the same position with the Patriots from 1982-84.
- Patriots linebacker **Bryan Cox** and Eagles CB **Troy Vincent** were teammates in Miami from 1992-95.





#### **RECORD BREAKERS**

Patriots tight end **Jermaine Wiggins** established a Patriots postseason record with 10 catches against the Raiders. The previous mark of nine catches was held by Shawn Jefferson (1/3/98, at Pittsburgh). Wiggins' previous career-high was five catches vs. Kansas City (12/4/00).

Kicker **Adam Vinatieri** increased his career postseason point total to 40 on his game-winning overtime kick and surpassed Tony Franklin (39) for first on the Patriots list. Vinatieri nailed all three of his field goal attempts, including a 45-yard kick that tied the game at the end of regulation and a 23-yard, game-winning kick in overtime.

Quarterback **Tom Brady** set single-game Patriots postseason passing records with 52 attempts, 32 completions and 312 yards. In the second half alone, Brady completed 26 of 39 passes for 238 yards. He also became the first Patriots quarterback to rush for touchdown in the postseason.

Wide receiver **David Patten** totaled 107 receiving yards against the Raiders, which was the third-highest single-game total in Patriots postseason history. He trails only Larry Garron (120, at Buffalo, Dec. 28, 1963) and Gino Cappelletti (109, at Buffalo Dec. 28, 1963).

#### WINNING WAYS

The Patriots extended their winning streak to seven games, equaling their longest win streak (including postseason games) since they closed the 1994 season with seven consecutive wins. They have also won nine of their last 10 and 11 of their last 13.

#### **BYE THE BYE**

Since 1990, when the NFL went to three wild-card teams with just two teams in each conference getting byes, those bye teams have won 81.3 percent of their games in the divisional playoffs (39-9), including a 3-1 record last weekend. Prior to this year, 18 of the 22 teams who have appeared in the Super Bowl have been bye-week teams.

#### HOME SWEET HOME

New England closed out Foxboro Stadium in dramatic fashion with a 16-13 come-from-behind victory in overtime against the Oakland Raiders. The Patriots will bring a consecutive sellout streak of 82 games at Foxboro Stadium with them over to CMGI Field next season. The streak began the year Robert Kraft purchased the team (1994) and includes preseason, regular season and postseason games. The Patriots are 54-28 in those games, including seven wins in their last eight at Foxboro. The Patriots also have a four-game winning streak at Foxboro in the postseason and have not lost a home playoff game since 1978.

#### **GREAT POINT**

During the Patriots current seven-game winning streak, they have only allowed an average of 12.9 points per game. In fact, in those seven wins their defense yielded only five touchdowns.

The Patriots finished the regular season allowing only 272 points (17.0 per game). It's the fifth lowest total in franchise history and the lowest total since the NFL went to a 16-game schedule in 1978. Their 17.0 average per game is the third lowest in team history (see below).

#### **OVERTIME IN THE PLAYOFFS**

There have been only 16 overtime postseason games dating back to 1958, including last week's 16-13 Patriots victory. The Patriots are only one of two teams (Los Angeles Rams) to win the game on the opening drive in overtime. The Rams defeated the N.Y. Giants, 19-13 on Jan. 7, 1990, when Jim Everett connected with Flipper Anderson on a 30-yard touchdown pass 1:06 into overtime. They are also only the seventh home team to win in the 16 overtime wins. They are listed below:

The Patriots are now 4-0 in games decided by three points or less this season, including a 3-0 record in overtime ... #### TURN, TURN, TURN

The Patriots recorded a +3 turnover ratio in their regular season finale against the Panthers and improved to 7-1 when they record a positive ratio this season (34-10 since 1996). During their six-game winning streak to end the regular season, the Patriots had a +11 turnover ratio and improved their season ratio to +7. The Patriots have finished 17 seasons with a positive turnover ratio and in 16 of those seasons they had a winning record.

New England finished the 2001 season tied for sixth in the NFL and second in the AFC with 22 interceptions. They also finished fourth in the AFC with 35 takeaways (see below). It's their highest totals since they recorded 24 interceptions in 1998 and 40 takeaways in 1994.

#### DEAD ZONE

The Patriots defense is in a zone. In their last five regular season games, they allowed their opponents just 10 drives in the red zone and their opponents converted just one of those into a touchdown. Opponents have scored seven field goals, one touchdown and have turned the ball over twice (fumble, intercepton).

In 2001, they allowed their opponents to score 19 touchdowns on 49 trips inside the red zone. They rank first in the AFC and third in the NFL with a touchdown percentage of 38.8.

#### WORST TO FIRST

This season, the New England Patriots finished as the AFC Eastern Division champions, rebounding from a 5-11 last-place finish in 2000. It was the 15<sup>th</sup> worst-to-first season in the NFL since the 1970 NFL merger. Three of those teams reached the Super Bowl (St. Louis Rams, 1998; Cincinnati Bengals, 1987; Cincinnati Bengals, 1980).

### VERSUS THE AFC EAST

The Patriots finished with a 6-2 record against the AFC East during the 2001 season. The last time they finished a season with a winning record against the AFC East was in 1997 (7-1).

#### HOME SWEET HOME

The Patriots closed out Foxboro Stadium with a 16-13 overtime victory over the Oakland Raiders in the Divisional round of the 2001 NFL playoffs. It was their  $82^{nd}$  consecutive sellout at Foxboro Stadium and they were 54-28 in those games. The streak began the year Robert Kraft purchased the team (1994) and includes preseason, regular season and postseason games.

Last week's game was also the Patriots 171<sup>st</sup> consecutive game that was televised locally. The streak, which began with the 1993 season-finale, includes preseason, postseason and regular season games.

#### **FAREWELL TO FOXBORO**

Last weekend's game was the 242<sup>nd</sup> game played at Foxboro since it opened in 1971, including the fifth postseason game. The Patriots finished with a 137-105 record at Foxboro Stadium, including a 4-1 record in the playoffs. They closed out their Foxboro Stadium stay by winning their last four games.

## **NO SOUP FOR YOU**

Over each team's last seven games of the season (including postseason) New England ranks second only to Philadelphia in points surrendered. The Patriots have given up 90 points in their last seven games, averaging 12.9 a contest. During their seven-game winning streak, the Patriots only allowed opposing offenses to score five touchdowns. The Eagles gave up 89 points for an average of 12.7 per game. Chicago finished third with an average of 13.0 (91 points) and last week's opponent, the Steelers ranked fourth with an average of 14.4 (101 points).



#### TAKE THE LONG WAY HOME

Smith's 32-yard touchdown run at Carolina was his second touchdown run of 32 yards or more this season and was his fifth run of at least 32 yards this season. It's the most since Robert Edwards had five in 1998.

#### FIRST THINGS FIRST

Smith kept the chains moving for the Patriots this season, gaining 64 first downs. He ranked seventh among AFC running backs with 58 rushing and six receiving for first downs.





#### **FLY PATTEN**

Patriots wide receiver David Patten set career-highs in 2001 with 51 catches, 749 yards and four touchdowns, but it was his performance against the Colts (10/21) that thrust him into NFL lore.

Patten led an offensive assault, which included two touchdown receptions, a run for a touchdown and a touchdown pass in the Patriots 38-17 victory over the Colts. He became the first player in franchise history to accomplish the touchdown trifecta in a game and the first player to do so in the NFL in 22 years (to the date). Hall of Fame RB Walter Payton was the last player to accomplish the feat on Oct. 21, 1979 vs. Minnesota. Four players scored the TD trifecta in the 1960s, but Patten is the first since Keith Lincoln in 1965 to record four total touchdowns while achieving the feat.

#### JUST FOR KICKS

Patriots punter Ken Walter, who was signed by the Patriots on Oct. 16, led the AFC and ranked second in the NFL with a net punting average of 38.1 during the 2001 season. Walter was equally deft in placing punts inside the 20-yard line in 2001. He boomed almost half of his punts, 24 of 49 (49.0%), inside the 20. It's the highest ratio in the NFL. He did not punt into the end zone in final eight weeksof the regular season (40 consecutive punts). Walter earned AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors after averaging 42.2 yards on five punts, including two inside the 20, against the Dolphins in Week 15.

#### THE SPECIALIST

Patriots linebacker Larry Izzo has been a special teams standout during his six-year career and continued his exceptional play this season with the Patriots. Izzo, who has earned one trip to the Pro Bowl (2000), finished the 2001 season tied with Tampa Bay's Dwight Smith for the NFL lead with 22 special teams tackles. Izzo set a career-high with 33 special teams tackles in 1999.





#### **GOING BOWLING**



Patriots safety Lawyer Milloy was named to the Pro Bowl for the third time in his career this season. He trails only Hall of Fame cornerback Mike Haynes (six) for most Pro Bowl appearances by a defensive back.

Milloy led the defense with 113 tackles this season, marking the fifth consecutive season he has surpassed 100 tackles. It was also the fourth consecutive season he led the defense in tackles. His year-by-year career totals are listed below. Milloy has been a constant on the Patriots defense since he was drafted in 1996, playing in all 96 games, including 80 consecutive starts.

"He's there dependably week in and week out, year in and year out," said Head Coach Bill Belichick. "I think he has as much respect probably for the way he plays his position as anybody in the league. I mean he's just tough, consistent, dependable and he's a warrior."

He returned two of the three interceptions for touchdowns, 46 yards at Carolina (1/6/02) and 23 yards vs. Indianapolis (9/30), and increased his franchise-record to five. #### OTIS, MY MAN

Patriots cornerback Otis Smith led the Patriots and finished tied for fourth in the AFC with five interceptions during the 2001 season. "Otis is a savvy ball hawk and if the ball is thrown inaccurately around him most of the time he is going to come up with it," said Head Coach Bill Belichick.

Smith returned two of his interceptions for touchdowns, 78 and 76 yards, increasing his career total to seven. He became just the fifth player in franchise history to record two interception returns for scores in the same season. He also accumulated 181 return yards in 2001, the fourth highest single-season total in franchise history.

His 78-yard return versus the Colts (9/30) was the longest return of his career and the longest by a Patriot since Jimmy Hitchcock returned an interception 100-yards for a score vs. Miami (11/23/97). His previous long was 74 yards vs. Washington (12/22/91).

#### SACK ATTACK

Willie McGinest was credited with six sacks this season, increasing his career total to 51.5 (5<sup>th</sup> in franchise history). Earlier this season, he notched multiple sacks in back-to-back games and became the first Patriot player to do so since Patriot linebacker Chris Slade notched three sacks versus Detroit (9/12/93) and two versus Seattle (9/19/93).

Patriots linebacker Bryan Cox totaled 49 tackles while playing in 11 games this season. Cox has accumulated 1,076 total tackles during his 11-year career, the fifth highest total among active AFC linebackers (see below).

#### **ROMAN CONQUER**

Linebacker Roman Phifer finished the season as the secondleading tackler on the Patriots with 92 stops (71 solos). It was the seventh time in his 11-year career he has recorded 92 or more tackles and the first time since 1998 when he logged 99 with the St. Louis Rams. He also totaled two sacks, one interception, two forced fumbles and recovered two fumbles.

"I'll tell you Roman is having a terrific year, he really is," said head coach Bill Belichick during the season. "This is the best I have seen him play in the last three or four years. His pass rush has really improved and he has always been a good coverage linebacker."

Phifer played in the first postseason game of his 11-year career last week against the Raiders. He will no longer hold the distinction of being the player who has played in the most regular season games with no postseason action. The list prior to last week's game is listed below:

New England's defensive ends Bobby Hamilton and Anthony Pleasant combined for 13 sacks (seven and six, respectively). It's the highest sack total by a Patriots defensive line tandem since defensive ends Brent Williams (8.0) and Gary Jeter (7.0) totaled 15 in 1989. The Patriots defense recorded 41 sacks, compared to 29 last season.





#### **GOING BOWLING**



Tom Brady was voted to represent the New England Patriots at the Pro Bowl this year, becoming just the second Patriots quarterback to receive the honor (Drew Bledsoe). He became just the fifth

quarterback to get voted to the Pro Bowl in his first year as a starter since 1970, joining Dan Marino (1983), Brett Favre (1992), Kurt Warner (1999) and Dante Culpepper (2000). Both Vito 'Babe' Parilli and Mike Taliaferro earned AFL all-star recognition in the 1960's.

Brady completed 63.9% (413-264) of his passes this season and achieved the highest completion percentage in the 42-year history of the franchise. #### **RATINGS GAME**

Brady finished the 2001 season ranked third in the AFC and sixth in the NFL with a quarterback rating of 86.5 while starting in 14 games this season. His 86.5 rating was the fifth-highest in the 42-year history of the Patriots franchise. Tony Eason (93.4, 1985), Babe Parilli (91.8, 1962), Eason (89.2, 1986) and Drew Bledsoe (87.7, 1997) are the only Patriot quarterbacks to record higher passer ratings during a season.

## **RECORD BREAKER**

Patriots wide receiver Troy Brown caught back-to-back passes on the Patriots first drive of the game against the Panthers (his  $96^{th}$  and  $97^{th}$ ) to become the Patriots all-time leading receiver for a single season, surpassing Ben Coates (96, 1994). Brown also caught his 100<sup>th</sup> pass of the season in the third quarter and became the first Patriot to ever record 100 receptions in a season.

Brown also moved into second place with 1,199 yards receiving, moving

ahead of Coates (1,174, 1994). Brown is only the sixth Patriots receiver to eclipse the 1,000-yard receiving mark in a season. The last Patriots wide receiver to reach 1,000 yards was Terry Glenn who had 1,147 yards in 1999. Whether it's quarterback Tom Brady, tackle Greg Robinson-Randall, tight end Jermaine Wiggins, or wide receiver Fred Coleman, they've all been dependable players who have had a positive impact on the team this year.

"I think our team definitely improved from December to July both in terms of personnel and also in terms of the team's attitude and it's work ethic and it's commitment to the offseason program that started (last) March. That improvement has manifested itself to where we are today and that is mainly due to a lot of hard work by the players and the chemistry that they have developed themselves." – **Belichick.**
