NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (6-0) at PITTSBURGH STEELERS (5-1)

Sunday, October 31, 2004 ★ Heinz Field (64,350) ★ 4:15 p.m. EST

The Patriots will take to the road for the first time in nearly a month when they head to the Steel City to take on the Pittsburgh Steelers in a battle of division leaders from the AFC East and the AFC North. The two teams will renew a rivalry that was last visited two seasons ago when the Steelers traveled to New England for the 2002 season opener and the grand opening of Gillette Stadium. That game was a rematch of the 2001 AFC Championship Game, when New England qualified for Super Bowl XXXVI with a 24-17 victory at Heinz Field. Now, more than two years later, the Patriots and Steelers are once again on top of their divisions and will face off in an important midseason game this week.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast on CBS. The game can be seen in Boston on WBZ-TV Channel 4. Jim Nantz will handle the play-by-play duties and Phil Simms will provide analysis. Bonnie Bernstein will contribute reports from the sidelines.

RADIO: WBCN 104.1 FM is the flagship station for the Patriots Rock Radio Network. Play-by-play broadcaster **Gil Santos** is in his 28th season as the voice of the Patriots and will call the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer Gino Cappelletti. Santos and Cappelletti are celebrating their 21st season as a broadcast tandem.

NATIONAL RADIO: This week's game will be broadcast to a national audience by Westwood One. Harry Kalas and Jack Ham will call all of the action from Heinz Field in Pittsburgh.

STARTING STRONG

The Patriots have started the season with a 6-0 record, establishing the best start to a season in franchise history. The previous franchise record for best start to a season was established in 1974, when New England jumped out to a 5-0 record.

TOPPLING TOUGH TEAMS

The Patriots travel to Pittsburgh this week to square off with the 5-1 Steelers, marking the third consecutive week that New England will face a team that enters the game with a winning percentage above .700. The Patriots have recently shown an ability to step up when facing tough competition, having won their last nine games against such teams. New England will face a .700 team on the road for just the second time since the start of last season, with both of their previous such road games producing memorable last-second victories at Indianapolis and Miami (see below).

THIS WEEK: PATRIOTS VS. STEELERS

SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots and Steelers will renew acquaintances this week in the 20th overall meeting between the clubs. The two teams have met frequently in the playoffs in recent years, clashing three times in the postseason since 1997. New England won two of those three playoff contests, including a 24-17 upset win at Heinz Field in the 2001 AFC Championship Game as part of New England's first



Super Bowl run. The teams followed up on that memorable matchup in the grand opening of Gillette Stadium to open the 2002 season, with the Patriots breaking in their new home with 30-14 win on Monday Night Football. This week's matchup will be

the eighth meeting between the two teams in the



last 10 years, and the Patriots have won four of the last six meetings, including the last three in a row. Of the previous 19 games in the series, 13 have been played in Pittsburgh, where the Steelers own an 8-5 advantage. New England, however, won the only meeting at Heinz Field in the 2001 AFC Championship Game.

PASSING PERFORMANCES

Tom Brady is 2-0 as a starter against Pittsburgh, helping lead New England to victories in the 2001 playoffs and in the 2002 season opener. In the 2001 AFC Championship Game, Brady was the team's leading passer, completing 12 of 18 tosses for 115 yards before leaving the game late in the second quarter with an injury.

First Meeting with New England

REGULAR-SEASON RECORD

New England has set the NFL's all-time regular-season record with 18 consecutive victories, marking the longest regular-season winning streak in the 85-year history of the NFL. Including the postseason, the Patriots have won 21 consecutive games, setting the all-time pro football record for consecutive total victories. The last time the Patriots lost a game was on Sept. 28, 2003, when they dropped a 20-17 decision to the Washington Redskins at FedEx Field.

THIS WEEK IN PATRIOTS HISTORY

OCTOBER 25 - OCTOBER 31

Oct. 26, 1986— The Patriots beat the Bills on the road, 23-3. The game followed a 34-0 win at Pittsburgh, finishing a two-game road swing where the Patriots outscored their opponents 57-3.

Oct. 29, 1978 — The Patriots beat the New York Jets 55-21, recording the second-highest points output in team history. The following season, New England set the team record for points in a game in a 56-3 win over the Jets.

Oct. 30, 1966 — Jim Nance ran for 208 yards on 38 attempts in a 24-21 win over Oakland at B.U. Field. It was the first of two 200-yard rushing performances in franchise history.

THE LAST TIME

Patriots 30, Steelers 14 September 9, 2002 – Gillette Stadium

The Patriots started off the 2002 season right where they left off the 2001 campaign by defeating the Pittsburgh Steelers 30-14 on Monday Night Football in the grand opening of Gillette Stadium in a rematch of the 2001 AFC Championship Game.

New England scored 20 second-half points to put the game away in the final half. The offensive and defensive units each contributed to the victory as the offense gained 294 yards in the air, and the defense caused five turnovers, including three interceptions. They also limited the Steelers to just 74 yards rushing.

The Patriots opened the scoring on their second possession of the game following a Mike Vrabel interception. New England took possession at the Pittsburgh 26-yard line and needed only four plays to score the game's first touchdown. Quarterback Tom Brady connected with tight end Christian Fauria from four yards out for the first touchdown in Gillette Stadium history. Pittsburgh evened the score on a Hines Ward touchdown reception from Kordell Stewart with 4:50 left in the first quarter. The Patriots then responded with a 9-play, 44-yard drive that resulted in a 45-yard Adam Vinatieri field goal to put the Patriots up by three

New England was able to extend its lead just 1:33 into the second half. Brady connected on three passes for 74 yards, including a 40-yard touchdown pass to Donald Hayes to put the Patriots ahead 17-7. Rookie wide receiver Deion Branch blocked Steelers safety Lee Flowers on the scoring play, allowing Hayes easy access to the end zone.

On the Steelers' next possession, Patriots safety Victor Green forced Pittsburgh running back Jerome Bettis to fumble the ball and Green recovered the football. On the ensuing Patriots drive, Brady put the Patriots firmly in command by completing a 22-yard pass to Branch and giving New England a 24-7 advantage. Branch, who ended the day with six receptions for 83 yards, recorded his first NFL touchdown. Brady ended the night with a 110.0 passer rating by completing 29 of his 43 passes for 294 yards.

After adding two more Adam Vinatieri field goals (28 yards and 27 yards) the Patriots led 30-7. The Steelers added a late score in the fourth quarter but it was not enough to stop the Patriots from posting a 30-14 win. Vinatieri's 12 points in the game gave him an even 700 for his career.

The Patriots defense was impressive, limiting the Steelers offense to only 74 yards on the ground and intercepting Kordell Stewart twice on his first three passing attempts. New England cornerback Terrell Buckley and former Steeler Mike Vrabel recorded the first two interceptions. Buckley's interception was his first of two in the game. Overall, the Patriots caused five turnovers, and the Patriots converted three of those turnovers into 17 points.

PATRIOTS ON HALLOWEEN

The Patriots will play a game on Halloween for the first time since 1999 and for the seventh time in franchise history. All of the games (including this week) have been on the road. New England won its most recent Halloween game, a 27-3 victory over the Cardinals in Arizona. The day has also produced some scary results for the Patriots, as they hold an overall record of 2-4 on All Hallow's Eve.

- Former Patriots practice squad member Russell Stuvaints is now on the Steelers active roster at strong safety.
- Patriots receiver **Deion Branch** hauled in his first career touchdown pass, a 22-yard strike from Tom Brady, against the Steelers in his NFL debut on Sept. 9, 2002.
- Patriots tight end **Christian Fauria** recorded his first touchdown as a Patriot against the Steelers on Sept. 9, 2002.
- Steelers linebacker Larry Foote and Patriots quarterback Tom Brady played together at the University of Michigan.
- Patriots rookie receiver P.K. Sam, Steelers safety Chris Hope and Steelers linebacker Alonzo Jackson played together at Florida State.
- Steelers running back Jerome Bettis and Patriots linebacker Roman Phifer were teammates on the St. Louis Rams in 1993 and 1994
- Steelers quarterbacks coach Mark Whipple was the head coach at UMass from 1998-2003 where he won a Division I-AA national title in 1998.
- Steelers defensive backs coach Darren Perry was the secondary coach of the Cincinnati Bengals in 2002 when Patriots running back Corey Dillon was on the team.

The New England Patriots started the season 6-0 for the first time in franchise history with a 13-7 win over the New York Jets at Gillette Stadium on Oct. 24. With the win, the Patriots notched their 21st consecutive victory, extending the professional football record they set against the Miami Dolphins on Oct. 10 and broke the NFL record for consecutive regular-season victories (18).

The Patriots defense stepped up once again, holding the Jets to just seven points, the lowest number of points New England has allowed this season. The defense also held Jets running back Curtis Martin to just 70 yards on the ground and receiver Santana Moss to just two catches for 12 yards on the day.

On the offensive side for the Patriots, Corey Dillon ran for 115 yards on 22 carries, surpassing the century mark for the third time this season and the 31st time in his career. David Givens led the way in receiving yardage with 107 yards on five receptions while Tom Brady connected on 20 of 29 passes for 230 yards. Adam Vinatieri was perfect on each of his two field goal attempts.

The Patriots got on the board early when the offense marched 53 yards down the field on the opening possession of the game to set up Vinatieri's 41-yard field goal to put the Patriots up 3-0. On the ensuing possession, the Jets made their way down to the Patriots 19-yard line, but a fumble by Jerald Sowell was recovered by Randall Gay to thwart the Jets' scoring threat. The Patriots took advantage of the turnover by orchestrating an 84-yard drive capped by Vinatieri's 27-yard field goal to give the Patriots a 6-0 lead.

On the next possession, Jets quarterback Chad Pennington completed seven passes for 54 yards, leading his team on a 78-yard drive ending with his 1-yard touchdown run to give the Jets a 7-6 lead. However, Brady and the Patriots quickly answered back, going into their two-minute offense with time ticking down in the second quarter. Brady took the Patriots 62 yards in 1:50 of clock time, striking Patten for a 7-yard touchdown to put the Patriots up 13-7.

The second half saw a defensive struggle as neither team could get on the board. The Jets punted three times in the third quarter and the Patriots punted twice. New England appeared to have cracked through the Jets defense as the fourth quarter began, but a lost fumble by fullback Dan Klecko halted the Patriots at New York's 36-yard line. The Jets got the ball back again at their own 14-yard line with 8:02 left in the game and set out on one final attempt to win. New York drove 59 yards to the Patriots' 27-yard line, setting up a third-and-three with 2:48 left in the game. Willie McGinest and Richard Seymour combined to stop Curtis Martin for a 3-yard loss on third down, setting up one more chance for the Jets on fourth-and-eight. Pennington looked for Wayne Chrebet near the goal line, but Rodney Harrison reached in and batted the pass away, stopping New York's last scoring threat. Dillon ran the ball three times for one last first down, allowing New England to run the clock out and preserve the victory.

DILLON DOMINATES

Corey Dillon rattled off his longest run as a Patriot when he scampered for a 44-yard gain with one minute left in the third quarter. It was the longest run by a Patriot since Kevin Faulk scampered 45 yards for a touchdown at Buffalo on Nov. 3, 2002. Dillon now has three runs of more than 35 yards this season. A year ago, New England had just one rush of more than 35 yards: a 42-yard jaunt by Michael Cloud on Oct. 5, 2003.

TOMMY TOUCHDOWNS

Tom Brady found David Patten for a 7-yard touchdown just before halftime, marking the 12th consecutive game (including playoffs) in which Brady has thrown a touchdown pass. The last time Brady did not throw a touchdown pass in a game was on Dec. 7, 2003 in a 12-0 win over Miami at Gillette Stadium.

OUT IN FRONT

With Adam Vinatieri's 14-yard field goal to open the scoring, the Patriots have scored first in 11 straight regular-season games and in 14 straight games including the playoffs. The last time New England did not get on the board first was on Nov. 23, 2003 at Houston, when the Texans jumped out to a 3-0 lead at Reliant Stadium in a game the Patriots eventually won 23-20 in overtime.

FLY PATTEN

David Patten grabbed a 7-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady in the waning minutes of the first half, marking his fourth touchdown of the season and the 17th touchdown of his career. Patten ranks second on the team in touchdowns to Daniel Graham (5), and is only one catch shy of tying his career high of five scores, set in 2002.

CONSISTENT KICKING

Adam Vinatieri nailed two field goals, raising his accuracy rate to 92.3 percent (12/13) on the season. Vinatieri's career high for accuracy was set in the 2002 season, when he hit 27 of his 30 attempts, good for a 90.0 percent clip. In 2004, the only field goal Vinatieri has missed came on his longest attempt of the year, a 47-yarder against Miami on Oct. 10.

HUNDRED YARD RUSHER

Corey Dillon exceeded the 100-yard mark for the third time this season and for the 31st time in his career, gaining 115 yards on 22 carries. This season is the first year since 2001 in which the Patriots have produced as many as three 100-yard rushing games (four times in 2001). The Patriots have now won each of their last 11 games in which they produced a 100-yard rusher, dating back to the 1999 season.

HUNDRED YARD RECEIVER

David Givens exceeded the 100-yard mark for the second time this season and for the second time in his career, grabbing five passes for 107 yards. He established a career high earlier this season when he grabbed six passes for 118 yards at Arizona (9/19).

TWO TIMES 100

The Patriots had a rusher and a receiver break the 100-yard mark for the second time this season and just the second time since 1997. Corey Dillon broke the 100-yard rushing mark and David Givens broke the 100-yard receiving mark, just as the duo did on Sept. 19 at Arizona. Prior to this season, the last time the Patriots had a 100-yard rusher and a 100-yard receiver in the same game was on Nov. 2, 1997, when Curtis Martin ran for 104 yards and Shawn Jefferson caught 108 yards worth of passes at Minnesota.

TRAILING AT HOME

The Jets took a 7-6 lead over the Patriots on Chad Pennington's 1-yard touchdown run with 1:55 left in the first half. This marks just the second game in which the Patriots have trailed during their last 12 home games, including playoffs. Prior to the Jets game, the Patriots had not trailed at any point in 10 of their last 11 home games.

Bill Belichick is celebrating his 30th season as an NFL coach and has spent more seasons in the league than any other current head coach. He has been a part of four Super Bowl championship teams, including two world titles in his four seasons as Patriots head coach. In addition to the team's current success, Belichick has built a firm foundation for the Patriots to remain competitive into the future. Since 2001, the Patriots have blossomed, rattling off 46 wins in their last 60 games and making Belichick the winningest NFL head coach since the 2001 season. His overall record of 51-25 (including a 6-0 playoff mark) gives him the best winning percentage of any head coach in Patriots history.

BELICHICK'S PATRIOTS RENAISSANCE

Any successful project requires a sound plan, and once head coach Bill Belichick had the time to implement his design on the Patriots, his approach has given him the best record of any NFL head coach since 2001. Belichick hit the ground running as soon as he arrived in New England in 2000, shaping and molding the Patriots into a contender. After the team endured a 5-11 rebuilding year in his first season, the fruits of Belichick's labor were put on display to the entire NFL, as his team posted an 11-5 record in 2001 and claimed the first Super Bowl title in franchise history. Since 2001, his plan has been in place in New England, and Belichick and the Patriots have compiled the best record in the NFL, winning two of the last three Super Bowls. The remarkable run includes postseason play, where Belichick and the Patriots own a perfect 6-0 record.

THE KRAFT ERA

Since ROBERT KRAFT purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced a remarkable reversal of fortunes. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund franchise that had won just 19 of 80 games (.311 pct.). In the early 1990s, the franchise appeared destined for relocation until Kraft bought the team and



rejuvenated local interest. By the start of the 1994 season, every game was a complete sellout. Ten seasons later, the consecutive sellout streak is now at 110 and counting. Since Kraft took ownership, the Patriots have won more conference championships than any other team in the NFL, claiming three AFC titles in the past eight seasons.

RISING TO THE OCCASION

Since the beginning of the 2003 season, the Patriots are 12-0 against teams with records of .500 or above. In 2003, the Patriots were 10-0 against teams that finished the season with a winning mark, including an 8-0 mark against playoff teams. So far this year, the Patriots are 3-0 against teams with a record of .500 or better, having defeated Indianapolis, Seattle and the New York Jets. PICK A STREAK

The Patriots have notched at least one interception 18 of their last 20 regular-season games and have done so in 11 of their last 12 regular-season home games. Including last season's two postseason games in Foxborough, the Patriots have at least one pick in 13 of their last 14 home games. Last season, New England led the NFL with 29 interceptions, the most by a Patriots team since 1964.

OFFENSE FROM DEFENSE

RICHARD SEYMOUR'S 68-yard fumble return for a touchdown against Buffalo on Oct. 3 was the Patriots' first defensive touchdown of the season and also the longest fumble return in franchise history. It was New England's first touchdown on a fumble recovery since Matt Chatham recorded a 38-yard scoopand-score in a 17-6 win over the New York Giants at Gillette Stadium on Oct. 12, 2003. Last season, the Patriots led the NFL with six defensive touchdowns and were 6-0 in games in which they scored on defense. The Patriots are 13-2 in their last 15 games in which they scored a defensive touchdown, dating back to 1999.

FANTASTIC FINISHES

One of the oldest mantras in sports is that it doesn't matter where you start a season, but it does matter where you finish it. The Patriots have done a remarkable job of finishing strong over the past two-plus seasons, as they have compiled a 28-4 (.875) record after November 1 since the 2001 season. In 2003, the Patriots hit their groove, winning all 11 games after Nov. 1, en route to the Super Bowl XXXVIII title.

He has recorded an 81.2 percent conversion rate (224/276) over his eight-year career. He is 12-for-13 in the 2004 season. He has connected on 71 of his last 84 kicks, good for an 84.5 percent clip.

SCORING MACHINE

ADAM VINATIERI is the second leading scorer in Patriots history, totaling 969 points in his eight-plus seasons with the club. Vinatieri made the team as a rookie free agent in 1996 and has scored 100 points or more in each of his eight seasons, joining Jason Elam of the Denver Broncos as the only two kickers in NFL history to accomplish the feat. LAST-MINUTE MAN

ADAM VINATIERI nailed his second Super Bowl-winning field goal, booting a 41-yarder through the uprights with four seconds left to give the Patriots a 32-29 victory over Carolina in Super Bowl XXXVIII. He is the only kicker in NFL history to kick a game-winning field goal in the final minute of the Super Bowl and has accomplished the feat twice, including his 48-yarder to win Super Bowl XXXVI. Out of the Patriots' six playoff wins since 2001, four were decided on game-winning boots by Vinatieri. WHAT A RUSH

Through five games, the Patriots are averaging 126.5 rushing yards per game, on track to produce their most prolific rushing season since 1988. That season, running back John Stephens powered an attack that averaged 132.5 yards per game. In 2004, Corey Dillon has led the way with 637 yards, averaging 106.2 yards per game.



OFFENSE NEWS & NOTES

DILLON DOMINATES

COREY DILLON has recorded three 100-yard games so far this season and owns 31 career 100-yard games. In his second game as a Patriot, Dillon ran for 158 yards at Arizona (09/19/04), gaining the most yards by a Patriots rusher in nearly six years, since Robert Edwards cut loose for 196 yards (on 24 carries) on Dec. 13, 1998 at St. Louis.



Dillon also broke the 100-yard barrier on Oct. 17 when he rumbled for 105 yards against Seattle and followed that up with a 115-yard performance against the New York Jets on Oct. 24.

STRONG START FOR DILLON

Through six games, Corey Dillon has run for 637 yards on 129 carries (4.9 avg). Last season, Antowain Smith led the team with 642 rushing yards. Dillon is on pace to run for a franchise-record 1,699 yards, which would beat Curtis Martin's team mark of 1,487 yards, set in 1995. If Dillon continues on this pace, he could also break his personal career high of 1,435 yards (on 315 carries), set in 2000 with the Cincinnati Bengals.

BALANCED ATTACK

Corey Dillon and David Givens have each gained 100 yards in the same game twice this season, marking the only two times since 1997 that the Patriots have had a 100-yard rusher and a 100-yard receiver in the same game. Dillon and Givens both broke the 100-yard in their respective categories at Arizona (9/19) and against the N.Y. Jets (10/24). Prior to this season, the last time the Patriots achieved the feat was on Nov. 2, 1997, when Curtis Martin ran for 104 yards and Shawn Jefferson gained 108 receiving yards at Minnesota.

GIVENS LEADS THE WAY

Through six games this season, DAVID GIVENS is New England's leading receiver, pacing the team in receptions (24) and yards (443). Last season, Givens tied for the team's postseason lead with 17 catches on the heels of a 34-catch regular season. Givens has exceeded the 100-yard receiving mark twice this season, marking the first two times in his three-year career he has achieved the feat. He got his first career 100-yard game at Arizona on Sept. 19, 2004 (120 yards), then followed that with a 107-yard game against the N.Y. Jets (10/24/04). Coming into this season, Givens' previous single-game career high was 87 yards, set on Nov. 3, 2003 at Denver.

MR. FIRST DOWN

Every one of DAVID GIVENS' 24 catches this season has resulted in a first down for the Patriots. New England's leading receiver is averaging 18.5 yards per catch, and has shown a knack for the big play, grabbing two passes of more than 40 yards and eight passes of more than 20 yards.

HE RATE ME

TOM BRADY has earned three passer ratings over 100.0 this season and has done so 19 times in his career. Brady has topped the 100.0 mark in seven of his last 12 games, marking the most productive stretch in his five-year career. All of Brady's 19 career 100.0-plus ratings have come in Patriots victories (see below). Brady also owns three of the top five ratings in Patriots history.

SOLID DOWN THE STRETCH

TOM BRADY has compiled a 28-4 (.875) career record as a starter in games played after November 1. The streak includes the Patriots' 2001 and 2003 Super Bowl runs. Last year, Brady led the team to wins in all 11 of his starts following the beginning of November en route to the team's victory in Super Bowl XXXVIII. In 2002, Brady and the Patriots were 6-3 in the final two months of the season, rebounding from a 3-4 start to finish 9-7. In 2001, Brady led the team to an 11-1 record after November 1 as the team marched to a victory in Super Bowl XXXVI.

COMEBACK KID

TOM BRADY has engineered 16 game-winning drives to break a tie or take the lead in the fourth quarter or overtime in his career. He has accomplished the feat twice in the Super Bowl, most recently engineering a 47-yard drive with just over a minute remaining to lead the Patriots to victory in Super Bowl XXXVIII. He led seven comebacks in 2003, including a fourth-quarter comeback to break a 14-14 tie against Tennessee in the AFC Divisional Playoffs in addition to comebacks against Houston, Indianapolis, Miami, Tennessee and Denver in the regular season. Brady's record also includes his dramatic performance to lead the Patriots to victory in Super Bowl XXXVI and his heroics in the snow against the Oakland Raiders in the 2001 Divisional Playoffs, giving him four comebacks in six postseason starts.

HOT ROD

RODNEY HARRISON leads the Patriots with 53 tackles (37 solo) and continues to be a leader in the New England secondary. Harrison is also tied for second on the team with 3.0 sacks, putting him halfway to his career high of 6.0 sacks, set with the San Diego Chargers in 2000. In 2003, his first



season in New England, Harrison led the team with a career-high 140 tackles (105 solo) and is on pace to edge that mark with 141 tackles this season.

SACK ATTACK

The Patriots have recorded 19.0 sacks through six games this season, putting them on pace to approach the franchise record with a projected 51 sacks. New England set the team mark with 55.0 sacks in 1984, as Andre Tippett led the team with 18.5 sacks, setting an individual team record. New England's 19.0 sacks this season have been recorded by 10 different defenders, with Willie McGinest leading the way with 3.5 sacks and Rodney Harrison and Mike Vrabel close behind with 3.0 sacks. "BIG SEY" SEES THE ZONE

Two-time Pro Bowl defensive lineman RICHARD SEYMOUR scored his first career touchdown on Oct. 3 at Buffalo, scooping up a Drew Bledsoe fumble caused by Tedy Bruschi and rumbling 68 yards for the score and a decisive 31-17 advantage for the Patriots. Seymour became the first Patriots defensive lineman to score a touchdown since Willie McGinest recovered a fumble in the end zone in a 30-28 win over the New York Jets in the 1999 season opener.

MEAN GENE

EUGENE WILSON leads the Patriots with two interceptions this season. Both of his picks came against Arizona on Sept. 19, marking the first multiple-pick game of his career. Both of Wilson's interceptions kick-started Patriots scoring drives, with his first-quarter theft leading to the Patriots' second touchdown of the game and his fourth-quarter steal starting a New England field goal drive. Last year, Wilson tied for the NFL rookie lead with four picks and the Patriots led the NFL with 29 interceptions.

A SPECIAL PLAYER

LARRY IZZO leads the team with 10 special teams tackles and has led his team in special teams stops in each of his last five NFL seasons. Since pacing the Miami Dolphins with 33 special teams tackles in 1999, the two-time Pro Bowler has set the mark on his team in every season since then, including every year since he joined the Patriots in 2001. He has recorded 82 special teams tackles in a Patriots uniform over the last three-plus seasons and is in his fourth consecutive year as New England's special teams captain.

WCVB's Mike Lynch hosts the program and is joined by head coach Bill Belichick for a weekly chalk talk and also by a Patriots player of the week.
