NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (6-1) at SAINT LOUIS RAMS (4-3)

Sunday, November 7, 2004 ★ Edward Jones Dome (66,000) ★ 4:15 p.m. EST

Sporting their best start to a season since 1980, the 6-1 New England Patriots will travel to St. Louis to take on the 4-3 Rams in a midseason inter-conference showdown. Despite seeing an NFL-record 21-game winning streak snapped a week ago in Pittsburgh, the Patriots have matched the best seven-game season-opening mark in team history, sharing the mark with the 1980 and 1974 squads.

After experiencing significant success in the early part of their schedule, the Patriots approach the season's midpoint facing a tough opponent in one of the toughest places to win in the NFL. The Rams' historically strong offense is ranked sixth in the league, and St. Louis is 16-1 in its last 17 regular-season home games. The Patriots also have trends working in their favor, compiling a 28-4 record in games played after November 1 since 2001.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be televised on CBS. The game can be seen in Boston on WBZ-TV Channel 4. **Jim Nantz** will handle the play-by-play duties and **Phil Simms** will provide analysis. **Bonnie Bernstein** will contribute reports from the sidelines.

RADIO: WBCN 104.1 FM is the flagship station for the Patriots Rock Radio Network. Play-by-play broadcaster **Gil Santos** is in his 28th season as the voice of the Patriots and will call the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer **Gino Cappelletti**. Santos and Cappelletti are celebrating their 21st season as a broadcast tandem.

NATIONAL RADIO: This week's game will be broadcast nationwide by Westwood One Sports. **Harry Kalas** and **Jack Ham** will call all of the action from the Edward Jones Dome in St. Louis.

FANTASTIC FINISHES

One of the oldest mantras in sports is that it doesn't matter where you start a season, but it does matter where you finish it. The Patriots have done a remarkable job of finishing strong over the past two-plus seasons, as they have compiled a 28-4 (.875) record after November 1 since the 2001 season. In 2003, the Patriots hit their groove, winning all 11 games after Nov. 1, en route to the Super Bowl XXXVIII title.



THIS WEEK: PATRIOTS VS. RAMS

SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots and Rams will clash for the 10th time this week and for the first time since Super Bowl XXXVI. New England scored one of the greatest victories in franchise history when it defeated the favored Rams for the NFL championship on Feb. 3, 2002. That victory followed a tight game in the 2001 regular season that ended in a 24-17 St. Louis victory at Foxboro Stadium. The series dates back to 1974, when the Patriots defeated the Los Angeles Rams by a 20-14 score at what was then Schaefer Stadium. Including that game, the Patriots won the three of the first four games between the clubs before the Rams rolled off wins in four straight games between 1989 and 2001. New England is making its second visit to St. Louis to play the Rams, with its only other trip coming in 1998, when St. Louis came away with a 32-18 win. The Patriots are making the fifth trip to St. Louis in franchise history, having played three games against the St. Louis (now Arizona) Cardinals. New England is 1-3 all-time in games played in St. Louis.

The Patriots claimed the first championship in their 42-year history when they defeated the favored St. Louis Rams 20-17 in Super Bowl XXXVI at the Louisiana Superdome in New Orleans. St. Louis erased a 17-3 fourth-quarter Patriots lead to tie the score at 17 with 1:37 left in the game. Second-year quarterback Tom Brady responded by driving the Patriots 53 yards in 1:30, moving into Adam Vinatieri's field goal range. The kicker drilled a 48-yard kick as time expired to bring New England its first professional sports championship since 1986.

Tom Brady completed 16-of-27 passes for 145 yards and a touchdown, while running back Antowain Smith rattled off 92 yards on 18 carries. Troy Brown led the receiving corps with six catches for 89 yards. Cornerback Ty Law returned an interception for a touchdown and led the team with eight tackles.

The Rams got on the board first, scoring the only points of the first quarter on a 50-yard field goal by Jeff Wilkins. The Patriots broke onto the scoreboard in the second quarter, when Law picked off a Kurt Warner pass and returned it 47 yards for a touchdown and a 7-3 Patriots lead. New England used another Rams turnover to extend its lead just before halftime. New England's Antwan Harris forced the Rams' Ricky Proehl to fumble, and Terrell Buckley returned the loose ball to the Rams' 40-yard line with 1:20 left before halftime. Brady later found David Patten for an 8-yard scoring pass with 36 seconds left before the interval to give the Patriots a 14-3 halftime lead.

The teams traded punts to open the second half before New England forced another turnover and converted it into a score. Patriots cornerback Otis Smith picked off Warner and returned the ball 30 yards to the St. Louis 33-yard line. Four plays later, Vinatieri drilled a 37-yard field goal to put the Patriots ahead 17-3 heading into the final quarter.

The Rams found the end zone for the first time on a 2-yard run by Warner with 9:33 left in the game, cutting New England's lead to 17-10. After trading punts, the Rams took possession and used a three-play, 55-yard drive to tie the score at 17 on a 26-yard touchdown from Warner to Proehl with 1:37 left in the game. The Patriots got the ball back on their own 17-yard line with 1:21 left, and Brady completed five-of-seven passes to bring the Patriots to the St. Louis 30-yard line with seven seconds left. Vinatieri's 48-yard boot sailed through the uprights as time expired to bring the Patriots their first world championship.



ROAD RULES

The Patriots travel to St. Louis this week having won seven of their last eight road games. They had notched a franchise-record seven consecutive successful road trips until last week's 34-20 setback in Pittsburgh. New England dropped its first two road games in 2003, then came away victorious from its six remaining road trips of that season. This year, the Patriots won at Arizona and Buffalo before coming up short in the Steel City. Since Bill Belichick became head coach in 2000, the Patriots are 19-16 (.543) on the road. Since 2001, New England has notched a 17-10 (.630) record.

THIS WEEK IN PATRIOTS HISTORY

NOVEMBER 1 – NOVEMBER 7

Nov. 3, 1991 — Shawn McCarthy boomed a 93-yard punt in a 22-17 loss in Buffalo. The 93-yarder is a franchise record and the longest punt in the league since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970.

Nov. 3, 1996 — The Patriots beat the Miami Dolphins 42-23 to raise their record to 6-3 in the 1996 Super Bowl season. The 42-point output is the most by the Patriots against Miami. Curtis Martin tied a team record with three rushing touchdowns.

Nov. 3, 2002 — The Patriots defeated the Buffalo Bills 38-7 in their first game against former signal caller Drew Bledsoe. Tom Brady set the Patriots' completion percentage record by connecting on 84.6 percent of his passes (22-26), including three touchdowns.

Nov. 3, 2003 — The Patriots rallied for a memorable come-from-behind, 30-26 win over the Denver Broncos at Invesco Field in the Mile High City. Trailing by one point with less than three minutes left, Bill Belichick opted for an intentional safety to gain crucial field position. The move paid off as the Patriots got the ball back and scored a game-winning touchdown with 30 seconds left.

Nov. 7, 1976 — Mike Haynes returned a punt 89 yards for a touchdown in a 20-10 win over Buffalo, notching the longest punt return in franchise history. Haynes returned four punts for a team-record 156 yards in the game, kick-starting a six-game winning streak to end the 1976 season.

CONNECTIONS

- Patriots linebacker **Roman Phifer** was drafted in the second round of the 1991 NFL draft by the Rams and played in both Los Angeles (1991-95) and St. Louis (1996-98).
- Patriots linebacker and special teams ace **Don Davis** spent two seasons with the Rams from 2001-02, playing in 28 games with 15 starts over that span. He started for St. Louis against the Patriots in Super Bowl XXXVI.
- Patriots linebacker **Matt Chatham** was originally signed by the Rams as a rookie free agent prior to the 1999 season. He was waived prior to that season, then spent training camp with the Rams in 2000. He was waived following camp and claimed by the Patriots, for whom he has since played in 48 games.
- Rams general manager **Charlie Armey** spent 1991-97 with the Patriots as the Director of College Scouting.
- Rams wide receivers coach **Henry Ellard** played in five games with the Patriots during the 1998 season and caught five passes for 86 yards.
- Rams tight ends coach **Frank Falks** was the tight ends and halfbacks coach at the San Diego Chargers from 1994-96 when Patriots safety **Rodney Harrison** was on the team.
- Rams linebacker **Trev Faulk** was a member of the same Louisiana State squad as Patriots quarterback **Rohan Davey**, cornerback **Randall Gay**, defensive end **Marquise Hill** and defensive lineman **Jarvis Green**. Faulk is also a cousin of Patriots running back **Kevin Faulk**, who is also an alumnus of LSU.
- Patriots cornerback **Asante Samuel** and St. Louis cornerback **Travis Fisher** played in the same Central Florida secondary.
- Patriots wide receiver **David Givens** and Rams running back **Joey Goodspeed** were on the same offensive unit at Notre Dame from 1998-2001.
- New England running back **Corey Dillon** played collegiate football at the University of Washington where Rams tight end **Cameron Cleeland** was on the same offensive unit. Cleeland also played for New England in 2002.
- Rams offensive tackle **Orlando Pace** and Patriots linebacker **Mike Vrabel** were teammates at Ohio State.
- St. Louis guard **Scott Tercero** and New England linebacker **Tully Banta-Cain** were teammates at the University of California.
- Patriots kicker **Adam Vinatieri** and Rams guard **Adam Timmerman** were both 4-year lettermen at South Dakota State University from 1991-94.
- Rams guard **Darnell Alford** attended Boston College, where he played on the same offensive line as Patriots center **Dan Koppen** in 1999.
- Rams tackle **Grant Williams** played for the Patriots from 2000-01, starting 12 of 29 games over that span.
- Rams wide receiver **Dane Looker** was acquired by the Patriots via trade in 2000, and was inactive for 10 games with the team that season.

The New England Patriots stumbled for the first time in more than a year, losing to the Pittsburgh Steelers 34-20 on October 31. The loss ended the Patriots' winning streak, but not before they set the professional football consecutive win record (21), and broke the NFL record for consecutive regular-season victories (18).

The Patriots defense could not contain the offense of the Steelers, allowing 221 rushing yards and 196 yards passing. Eugene Wilson forced the lone fumble for the Patriots on defense, but Pittsburgh was able to recover.

On the offensive side, New England was able to muster only five rushing yards. David Givens led the way in receiving yardage with 101 yards on eight receptions while Tom Brady connected on 25-of-43 passes for 271 yards. Adam Vinatieri was again consistent, making both of his field goal attempts.

The Patriots defense got off to a good start, forcing a Pittsburgh three-and-out in the game's opening possession. New England's offense then marched 40 yards down the field to set up Vinatieri's 43-yard field goal to put the Patriots up 3-0. The trouble for the Patriots began two Steeler possessions later, when Roethlisberger connected with Plaxico Burress for a 47-yard touchdown. The following New England possession ended in a Brady fumble, recovered by Pittsburgh, which resulted in a four-yard touchdown for Burress. The next New England possession was more of the same, as Brady's pass to Bethel Johnson was intercepted and returned for a 39-yard Pittsburgh touchdown and a 21-3 Steelers lead.

The opening play of the second quarter saw Brady sacked for a 10-yard loss, after which the two teams traded punts. When New England's offense next saw the ball, Brady made two completions before his attempt to connect with Johnson was again intercepted. The Patriots defense then held the Steelers to a 19-yard field goal. Brady then found his rhythm, connecting with Kevin Faulk and Givens for a total of 54 yards before finding Givens in the end zone for a 2-yard touchdown, sending the Patriots into halftime facing a 24-10 deficit.

The third quarter began ominously for the Patriots as their first play, a 2-yard completion from Brady to Faulk, ended with a Faulk fumble. Pittsburgh recovered and Bettis capped off the ensuing drive with a 2-yard touchdown, giving the Steelers a 31-10 lead. The score forced New England to come out strong on the next drive. Brady completed six passes as the Patriots marched down the field and into field goal range, where Vinatieri's 25-yard attempt was good. The Steelers then notched a field goal of their own, moving the score to 34-13.

To begin the fourth quarter, Brady spread the ball around before going to Givens again in the end zone, this time for 23 yards. The Steelers then ran out the clock, preserving a 34-20 win and handing New England its first loss in 21 games.

FINISHING STRONG

The Patriots scored a touchdown on their final possession of the first half, marking the sixth time in their last eight games that they have scored on their last possession before halftime. New England scored last-possession touchdowns against the N.Y. Jets (10/24), Miami (10/10), Buffalo (10/3), and Carolina (2/1), and notched a last-possession field goal against Indianapolis (9/9). The Patriots did not score on their final first-half possessions against Seattle (10/17) and Arizona (9/19).

HUNDRED YARD DAY

David Givens led all Patriots receivers with 101 yards on eight catches, marking his second consecutive game with more than 100 receiving yards. Givens' eight catches were a career high. He is the first Patriot to record back-to-back 100-yard games since Troy Brown on Oct. 14 & 21, 2001.

STARTING STRONG

The Patriots are tied for the franchise's best seven-game start to a season. The Patriots are 6-1, a mark also attained by the 1980 and 1974 teams. The Patriots began the 1964 season with a 5-1-1 record through seven games, and notched a 5-2 mark on nine occasions, most recently in 2003.

OUT IN FRONT

With Adam Vinatieri's 43-yard field goal to open the scoring, the Patriots have now scored first in 12 straight regular-season games and in 15 straight games including the playoffs. The last time New England did not get on the board first was on Nov. 23, 2003 at Houston, when the Texans jumped out to a 3-0 lead at Reliant Stadium in a game the Patriots eventually won 23-20 in overtime.

CONSISTENT KICKING

Adam Vinatieri nailed two field goals, raising his accuracy rate to 93.3 percent (14/15) on the season. Vinatieri's career high for accuracy was set in the 2002 season, when he hit 27 of his 30 attempts, good for a 90.0 percent clip. The only field goal Vinatieri has missed this season came on his longest attempt of the year, a 47-yarder against Miami on Oct. 10.

BOMBS AWAY

Pittsburgh got on the board with a 47-yard touchdown pass from Ben Roethlisberger to Plaxico Burress in the first quarter. It was the longest touchdown pass the Patriots have allowed in regular-season play in more than two years. The last time a Patriots opponent hit the end zone from further out was on Sept. 29, 2002, when San Diego's Drew Brees found Curtis Conway from 52 yards out for a touchdown. The Patriots lost that game, 21-14, snapping a 12-game winning streak (including playoffs).

DEFENSIVE SCORING

The Steelers took a 21-3 lead on a 39-yard interception return for a touchdown by Deshea Townsend in the final minute of the first quarter. It was the first time the Patriots have allowed a defensive touchdown since the 2003 season opener, when Buffalo's Sam Adams returned a pick 37 yards for a score in a 31-0 Buffalo win. Since that time, the Patriots had scored seven defensive touchdowns – five on interception returns and two on fumble returns.

NO PASSING ZONE

When Pittsburgh's aerial attack found the end zone on a 47-yard first-quarter touchdown, it broke a string of 120 consecutive pass attempts by Patriots opponents without throwing a touchdown pass. The last time New England had allowed a passing touchdown was on Oct. 10, when Miami's Jay Fiedler found Chris Chambers for a 10-yard scoring pass in the second quarter of New England's 24-10 win.

TOMMY TOUCHDOWNS

Tom Brady found David Givens for a 2-yard touchdown just before halftime, marking the 13th consecutive game (including playoffs) in which Brady has thrown a touchdown pass. The last time Brady did not throw a touchdown pass in a game was on Dec. 7, 2003 in a 12-0 win over Miami at Gillette Stadium.

21-POINT QUARTER

The Patriots allowed the Steelers to score 21 points in the first quarter after allowing a total of just 10 first-quarter points in their first six games combined. This game marked the first time the Patriots allowed 21 or more points in a quarter since Chicago notched 21 in the third quarter on Nov. 10, 2002. The Patriots came back to win that game, 33-30. New England also won a game on Sept. 22, 2002, when Kansas City scored 21 fourth-quarter points. The last time the Patriots had given up a 21-point quarter and lost the game was on Thanksgiving Day, 2000 when Detroit scored 21 fourth-quarter points in a 34-9 Lions victory.

Bill Belichick is celebrating his 30th season as an NFL coach and has spent more seasons in the league than any other current head coach. He has been a part of four Super Bowl championship teams, including two world titles in his four seasons as Patriots head coach. In addition to the team's current success, Belichick has built a firm foundation for the Patriots to remain competitive into the future. Since 2001, the Patriots have blossomed, rattling off 46 wins in their last 61 games and making Belichick the winningest NFL head coach since the 2001 season. His overall record of 51-25 (including a 6-0 playoff mark) gives him the best winning percentage of any head coach in Patriots history.

BELICHICK'S PATRIOTS RENAISSANCE

Any successful project requires a sound plan, and once head coach Bill Belichick had the time to implement his design on the Patriots, his approach has given him the best record of any NFL head coach since 2001. Belichick hit the ground running as soon as he arrived in New England in 2000, shaping and molding the Patriots into a contender. After the team endured a 5-11 rebuilding year in his first season, the fruits of Belichick's labor were put on display to the entire NFL, as his team posted an 11-5 record in 2001 and claimed the first Super Bowl title in franchise history. Since 2001, his plan has been in place in New England, and Belichick and the Patriots have compiled the best record in the NFL, winning two of the last three Super Bowls. The remarkable run includes postseason play, where Belichick and the Patriots own a perfect 6-0 record.

THE KRAFT ERA

Since ROBERT KRAFT purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced a remarkable reversal of fortunes. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund franchise that had won just 19 of 80 games (.311 pct.). In the early 1990s, the franchise appeared destined for relocation until Kraft bought the team and rejuvenated local interest. By the start of the 1994 season, every game was a complete sellout. Ten seasons later, the consecutive sellout streak is now at 110 and counting. **Since Kraft took ownership, the Patriots have won more conference championships than any other team in the NFL, claiming three AFC titles in the past eight seasons.**

PICK A STREAK

The Patriots have notched at least one interception in 18 of their last 21 regular-season games and have done so in 11 of their last 12 regular-season home games. Including last season's two postseason games in Foxborough, the Patriots have at least one pick in 13 of their last 14 home games. Last season, New England led the NFL with 29 interceptions, the most by a Patriots team since 1964.

OFFENSE FROM DEFENSE

RICHARD SEYMOUR's 68-yard fumble return for a touchdown against Buffalo on Oct. 3 was the Patriots' first defensive touchdown of the season and also the longest fumble return in franchise history. It was New England's first touchdown on a fumble recovery since Matt Chatham recorded a 38-yard scoop-and-score in a 17-6 win over the New York Giants at Gillette Stadium on Oct. 12, 2003. Last season, the Patriots led the NFL with six defensive touchdowns and were 6-0 in games in which they scored on defense. The Patriots are 13-2 in their last 15 games in which they scored a defensive touchdown, dating back to 1999.

HOME SWEET HOME

The Patriots sport a 19-3 (.864) all-time record at Gillette Stadium, including regular-season and postseason games. New England has won an NFL-best 15 consecutive regular-season and postseason contests at home, with its last defeat coming in a 30-17 regular-season loss to the New York Jets on Dec. 22, 2002. Last season, the Patriots were undefeated at home for the first time in team history, winning all eight regular-season games and two postseason games in Foxborough. The Patriots' .864 home winning percentage is the highest of any NFL team at its current home stadium.

SCORING MACHINE

ADAM VINATIERI is the second leading scorer in Patriots history, totaling 977 points in his eight-plus seasons with the club. Vinatieri made the team as a rookie free agent in 1996 and has scored 100 points or more in each of his eight seasons, joining Jason Elam of the Denver Broncos as the only two kickers in NFL history to accomplish the feat. LAST-MINUTE MAN

ADAM VINATIERI nailed his second Super Bowl-winning field goal, booting a 41-yarder through the uprights with four seconds left to give the Patriots a 32-29 victory over Carolina in Super Bowl XXXVIII. He is the only kicker in NFL history to kick a game-winning field goal in the final minute of the Super Bowl and has accomplished the feat twice, including his 48-yarder to win Super Bowl XXXVI. Out of the Patriots' six playoff wins since 2001, four were decided on game-winning boots by Vinatieri. In all, Vinatieri has kicked 17 game-winning field goals in his career, including nine in the past three seasons. His game-winners are listed below:

DILLON DOMINATES

COREY DILLON has recorded three 100-yard games so far this season and owns 31 career 100-yard games. In his second game as a Patriot, Dillon ran for 158 yards at Arizona (09/19/04), gaining the most yards by a Patriots rusher in nearly six years, since Robert Edwards cut loose for 196 yards (on 24 carries) on Dec. 13, 1998 at St. Louis. Dillon also broke the 100-yard barrier on Oct. 17 when he rumbled for 105 yards against Seattle and followed that up with a 115-yard performance against the New York Jets on Oct. 24.

- The most by a Patriot in more than seven years (since Curtis Martin set a franchise record with 40 carries in a game against the New York Jets at Foxboro Stadium on Sept. 14, 1997).

STRONG START FOR DILLON

Through seven games, Corey Dillon has run for 637 yards on 129 carries (4.9 avg). Last season, Antowain Smith led the team with 642 rushing yards. Dillon is on pace to run for 1,456 yards, which would come close to challenging Curtis Martin's team mark of 1,487 yards, set in 1995. If Dillon continues on this pace, he could also break his personal career high of 1,435 yards (on 315 carries), set in 2000 with the Cincinnati Bengals.

BALANCED ATTACK

Corey Dillon and David Givens have each gained 100 yards in the same game twice this season, marking the only two times since 1997 that the Patriots have had a 100-yard rusher and a 100-yard receiver in the same game. Dillon and Givens both broke the 100-yard mark in their respective categories at Arizona (9/19) and against the N.Y. Jets (10/24). Prior to this season, the last time the Patriots achieved the feat was on Nov. 2, 1997, when Curtis Martin ran for 104 yards and Shawn Jefferson gained 108 receiving yards at Minnesota.

GIVENS LEADS THE WAY

Through seven games this season, DAVID GIVENS is New England's leading receiver, pacing the team in receptions (32) and yards (544). Last season, Givens tied for the team's postseason lead with 17 catches on the heels of a 34-catch regular season. Givens has exceeded the 100-yard receiving mark three times this season, becoming the first Patriot to record three 100-yard games in a season since Troy Brown did it in 2001. He got his first career 100-yard game at Arizona on Sept. 19, 2004 (120 yards), then followed that with back-to-back century-mark games against the N.Y. Jets (10/24/04) and the Pittsburgh Steelers (10/31/04). Coming into this season, Givens' previous single-game career high was 87 yards, set on Nov. 3, 2003 at Denver.

MR. FIRST DOWN

DAVID GIVENS' first 30 catches this season all resulted in first downs for the Patriots. New England's leading receiver is averaging 17.0 yards per catch, and has shown a knack for the big play, grabbing two passes of more than 40 yards and nine passes of more than 20 yards.

HE RATE ME

TOM BRADY has earned three passer ratings over 100.0 this season and has done so 19 times in his career. All of Brady's 19 career 100.0-plus ratings have come in Patriots victories. Brady also owns three of the top five ratings in Patriots history.

SOLID DOWN THE STRETCH

TOM BRADY has compiled a 28-4 (.875) career record as a starter in games played after November 1. The streak includes the Patriots' 2001 and 2003 Super Bowl runs. Last year, Brady led the team to wins in all 11 of his starts following the beginning of November en route to the team's victory in Super Bowl XXXVIII. In 2002, Brady and the Patriots were 6-3 in the final two months of the season, rebounding from a 3-4 start to finish 9-7. In 2001, Brady led the team to an 11-1 record after November 1 as the team marched to a victory in Super Bowl XXXVI.

COMEBACK KID

TOM BRADY has engineered 16 game-winning drives to break a tie or take the lead in the fourth quarter or overtime in his career. He has accomplished the feat twice in the Super Bowl, most recently engineering a 47-yard drive with just over a minute remaining to lead the Patriots to victory in Super Bowl XXXVIII. He led seven comebacks in 2003, including a fourth-quarter comeback to break a 14-14 tie against Tennessee in the AFC Divisional Playoffs in addition to comebacks against Houston, Indianapolis, Miami, Tennessee and Denver in the regular season. Brady's record also includes his dramatic performance to lead the Patriots to victory in Super Bowl XXXVI and his heroics in the snow against the Oakland Raiders in the 2001 Divisional Playoffs, giving him four comebacks in six postseason starts.



RODNEY HARRISON leads the Patriots with 73 tackles (49 solo) and continues to be a leader in the New England secondary. Harrison is also tied for second on the team with 3.0 sacks, putting him halfway to his career high of 6.0 sacks, set with the San Diego Chargers in 2000. He recorded a career-high 20 tackles (12 solo) at Pittsburgh on Oct. 31, 2004. In 2003, his first season in New England, Harrison led the team with a career-high 140 tackles (105 solo) and is on pace to beat that mark with 167 tackles this season.



SACK ATTACK

The Patriots have recorded 19.0 sacks through seven games this season. "BIG SEY" SEES THE ZONE

Two-time Pro Bowl defensive lineman RICHARD SEYMOUR scored his first career touchdown on Oct. 3 at Buffalo, scooping up a Drew Bledsoe fumble caused by Tedy Bruschi and rumbling 68 yards for the score and a decisive 31-17 advantage for the Patriots. Seymour became the first Patriots defensive lineman to score a touchdown since Willie McGinest recovered a fumble in the end zone in a 30-28 win over the New York Jets in the 1999 season opener.

MEAN GENE

EUGENE WILSON leads the Patriots with two interceptions this season. Both of his picks came against Arizona on Sept. 19, marking the first multiple-pick game of his career. Both of Wilson's interceptions kick-started Patriots scoring drives, with his first-quarter theft leading to the Patriots' second touchdown of the game and his fourth-quarter steal starting a New England field goal drive. Last year, Wilson tied for the NFL rookie lead with four picks and the Patriots led the NFL with 29 interceptions.

A SPECIAL PLAYER

LARRY IZZO leads the team with 11 special teams tackles and has led his team in special teams stops in each of his last five NFL seasons. Since pacing the Miami Dolphins with 33 special teams tackles in 1999, the two-time Pro Bowler has set the mark on his team in every season since then, including every year since he joined the Patriots in 2001. He has recorded 83 special teams tackles in a Patriots uniform over the last three-plus seasons and is in his fourth consecutive year as New England's special teams captain.
