NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (7-1) vs. BUFFALO BILLS (3-5)

Sunday, November 14, 2004 ★ Gillette Stadium (68,756) ★ 8:30 p.m. EST

The Patriots will return to action in Foxborough for the first time in three weeks when they face their AFC East rivals from Buffalo in a prime-time matchup at Gillette Stadium on Sunday night. The Patriots are one of three NFL teams to reach the midpoint of the 2004 season with a 7-1 record, but will face a solid challenge from the Bills who, like the Patriots, have won three of their last four games. The game is a rematch of the Week Four battle in Western New York, when the Patriots faced a 17-10 second-quarter deficit and used three unanswered touchdowns to take the win. New England has defeated the Bills in six of the last seven meetings, but the resurgent Buffalo team will provide a tough test this week under a national spotlight.

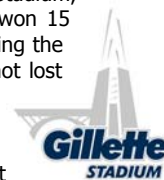
BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be televised nationwide by ESPN. The game can be also seen in Boston on WCVB-TV Channel 5. **Mike Patrick** will handle the play-by-play duties, while **Joe Theismann** and **Paul Maguire** will provide analysis. **Suzy Kolber** will contribute reports from the sidelines.

RADIO: WBCN 104.1 FM is the flagship station for the Patriots Rock Radio Network. Play-by-play broadcaster **Gil Santos** is in his 28th season as the voice of the Patriots and will call the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer **Gino Cappelletti**. Santos and Cappelletti are celebrating their 21st season as a broadcast tandem.

HOME SWEET HOME

The Patriots have recorded a 19-3 (.864) all-time record at Gillette Stadium, including regular-season and postseason games. New England has won 15 consecutive regular-season and postseason contests at home, compiling the longest current home winning streak in the NFL. New England has not lost at home since a 30-17 defeat to the New York Jets on Dec. 22, 2002. Last season, the Patriots were undefeated at home for the first time in team history, winning all eight regular-season games and two postseason games. The Patriots' .864 winning percentage at Gillette Stadium is the highest of any NFL team at its current home.



BEAST OF THE EAST

The Patriots have won eight consecutive games against AFC East opposition and are 17-3 in their last 20 divisional games. The defending AFC East champions have not lost within the division since the 2003 season opener and have defeated each of their divisional foes once so far this season. Since the beginning of the 2001 season, the Patriots own the best cumulative record within the division, notching an 18-5 mark.

PRO BOWL BALLOTING

Online balloting is underway on NFL.com for fans to vote for the players they would like to see represent the league at the 2005 Pro Bowl on Sun., Feb. 13 in Honolulu. The AFC and NFC squads are made up of the consensus votes of fans, players and coaches. Each group's votes counts one-third towards determining the 43-man rosters for each conference. Fans may log on to <http://nfl.com/probowl/ballot> and cast their votes and can also enter the Amerquest Pro Bowl Paradise Sweepstakes to get a chance to win a trip to the game. Voting will conclude on Sun., Dec. 19, and the teams will be announced on Wed., Dec. 22 at 7:00 in the Pro Bowl Selection Show on ESPN.

SERIES HISTORY

This week, the Patriots and Bills will meet for the 90th time since the series between the AFC East rivals began in 1960. The Patriots lead the series 48-40, with one tie. The Patriots' 48 wins over Buffalo are their most over any opponent, five more than they own over



Indianapolis (42). New England has won six of its last seven games against Buffalo, dating back to the 2000 season. The teams have had many memorable matchups over the years, including a five-game span from 1999 to 2001 where four of the five contests were decided in overtime.

PATRIOTS – BILLS QUICK HITS

- The Patriots have recorded 48 wins against the Bills, their most against any opponent.
- Bill Belichick holds a 7-3 career record against Buffalo, including a 7-2 record as head coach of the Patriots.
- Six of the last 13 games in the series have been decided by four points or fewer (NE 3-3).
- The Patriots and Bills have played in 19 games decided by three points or fewer since 1972.
- The Patriots are 14-6 against the Bills in their last 20 meetings.
- Since 1993, the two teams have played five overtime games, good for a total of 51:49 of extra time, almost equaling an entire game.

FAMILIAR FOE

Bills quarterback Drew Bledsoe played in 124 games while he was a member of the New England Patriots from 1993-2001. He holds the Patriots franchise records for passing yards (29,657), attempts (4,518) and completions (2,544). Bledsoe ranks second on the franchise list in touchdowns (166).

HALFWAY HOME

The Patriots have reached the halfway mark of the 2004 season with a 7-1 record, notching the best mark in franchise history through eight games. New England has started the season with a 6-2 mark on six different occasions, most recently in 2003, but this season is the first in which they have begun the campaign at 7-1. FANTASTIC FINISHES

One of the oldest mantras in sports is that it doesn't matter where you start a season, but it does matter where you finish it. The Patriots have done a remarkable job of finishing strong over the past two-plus seasons, as they have compiled a 29-4 (.879) record after November 1 since the 2001 season. In 2003, the Patriots hit their groove, winning all 11 games after Nov. 1, en route to the Super Bowl XXXVIII title.

CONNECTIONS

- Patriots head coach **Bill Belichick's** defensive game plan from the Giants' Super Bowl XXV win over the Buffalo Bills is permanently on display at the Pro Football Hall of Fame.
- While Belichick was the head coach at Cleveland, he hired **Don Blackmon** as the linebackers coach. Blackmon is currently the linebackers coach for Buffalo. Blackmon also played for the Patriots for eight seasons (1981-87).
- Bills linebacker **London Fletcher** was a college teammate of Patriots quarterbacks coach **Josh McDaniels** and Patriots director of pro personnel **Nick Caserio** at John Carroll University in 1996 and 1997.
- Patriots wide receivers coach **Brian Daboll** attended St. Francis High in Buffalo where he lettered in football. He also was a two-year starter at free safety at the University of Rochester.
- Bills defensive backs coach **Steve Szabo** was a volunteer coach for the Patriots in 2003.
- Patriots running back **Kevin Faulk** had a career-long, 45-yard touchdown run against the Bills on New England's first possession of the third quarter in a 38-7 win (11/03/02).
- Patriots safety **Rodney Harrison**, while playing for the Chargers, had a career-high three sacks in a 16-14 win over Buffalo in the 1998 season opener (09/06/98).
- Patriots linebacker **Ted Johnson** recorded a career-high 17 tackles against Buffalo on Nov. 15, 1998.
- Bills defensive tackle **Sam Adams' father, Sam Adams, Sr.**, played for the Patriots for nine seasons (1972-80).
- Bills quarterback **Drew Bledsoe** was drafted by the Patriots with the first overall selection in the 1993 NFL draft. He spent nine seasons with New England and earned three Pro Bowl selections.
- Bills safety **Lawyer Milloy** was drafted by the Patriots in the second round (36th overall) in the 1996 NFL draft. He played in 112 games in eight seasons in New England and earned four Pro Bowl nods.
- Bills wide receiver **Josh Reed** was a teammate of Patriots defensive end **Jarvis Green** and quarterback **Rohan Davey** at LSU.

STANDING TALL

The Patriots are tied for the best record in the NFL with a 7-1 mark to begin the 2004 season. The AFC East leaders are tied with the Philadelphia Eagles and Pittsburgh Steelers for tops in the league. Last season, New England finished with a franchise-best and NFL-best 14-2 record.

The Patriots won their record-tying 18th consecutive game and improved to 3-0 on the season with a 31-17 victory over the Buffalo Bills in Orchard Park, N.Y. New England was able to avenge last year's 31-0 loss in the season opener and improve to 14-6 against the Bills in the last 20 meetings between the teams.

Patriots quarterback Tom Brady nearly reached the 300-yard benchmark, finishing the day with 298 yards on 17-of-30 passing, while throwing for two touchdowns and compiling a passer rating of 112.9. Brady's favorite target on the afternoon was David Patten, who led all Patriots receivers with five catches for 113 yards, marking the second consecutive game in which the Patriots have had a 100-yard receiver. Wideout David Givens continued his strong start to the season, grabbing four balls for 86 yards, while running back Corey Dillon also turned in a strong performance, gaining 79 yards on 19 carries and scoring his first touchdown in a Patriots uniform.

Defensively, the Patriots played another solid game, sacking Bills quarterback Drew Bledsoe seven times and forcing two turnovers. The New England defense kept Buffalo off of the board in the second half and also produced the Patriots' first defensive score of the season on a 68-yard fumble return by Richard Seymour that iced the game. Tedy Bruschi tied for the team lead with seven tackles (4 solo), and also recorded two sacks and forced the fumble that Seymour scooped up and returned for a touchdown.

The first quarter was an offensive shootout, with each team scoring 10 points. New England started the barrage with a 9-play, 77-yard opening drive that ended in a 2-yard touchdown run from Dillon and a 7-0 Patriots lead. The teams then traded field goals before Buffalo's Terrence McGee returned a kickoff 98 yards for a touchdown to tie the game at 10 as the quarter wound down.

Defense ruled the day for the first part of the second quarter, as the teams exchanged turnovers. New England's Tyrone Poole recorded his first interception of the season when he picked off a Bledsoe pass at midfield after Buffalo was poised with good field position. The Patriots proceeded to drive down to the Buffalo 2-yard line and were on the verge of taking the lead when Dillon coughed up the ball for his first fumble since the 2002 season, giving the Bills the ball deep in Patriots territory. Bledsoe and his charges wasted little time in capitalizing, driving 96 yards on just six plays to take a 17-10 lead on a 41-yard touchdown bomb from Bledsoe to Eric Moulds. New England stepped up to the challenge, though, as it used the ensuing drive to go 61 yards on six plays and tie the score on a 30-yard scoring pass from Brady to Patten and tie the score at 17 heading into halftime.

Neither team could find an offensive rhythm for much of the third quarter, as the Bills punted twice and the Patriots kicked once. New England gained possession at its own 20-yard line with 2:14 left in the quarter and proceeded to embark on what would prove to be the game-winning drive. It took 12 plays and five minutes, 57 seconds of clock time, but the Patriots methodically marched down the field on an 80-yard drive, ending in a 2-yard touchdown catch by Daniel Graham to gain a 24-17 advantage with 11:17 left in the game. The teams then traded punts before the Bills mounted a comeback bid in the game's final five minutes. Buffalo penetrated the Patriots red zone, but faced a fourth-and-three from the New England 17-yard line with three minutes left in the game. With the game hanging the balance, Bruschi penetrated through the Buffalo line and sacked Bledsoe, forcing a fumble that Seymour brought 68 yards to the end zone to give the Patriots a decisive 31-17 advantage. The Patriots defense snuffed out Buffalo's last bid for a score and improved to 3-0 on the young season.

The New England Patriots notched their seventh victory of the 2004 season with a 40-22 road win over the St. Louis Rams at Edward Jones Dome on Nov. 7. The win upped the Patriots' record to 7-1 on the season.

New England's defense, though altered as a result of injuries, had a solid game. Tedy Bruschi, Willie McGinest, Ty Warren, Richard Seymour and Jarvis Green combined to sack Rams quarterback Marc Bulger five times, while Roman Phifer added an interception. With three members of the starting secondary unavailable due to injury, rookie Randall Gay, former practice squadder Earthwind Moreland and veteran wide receiver Troy Brown filled in nicely.

On the offensive side, Corey Dillon had a strong afternoon, running for 112 yards on 25 carries. It was the 32nd 100-yard game of his career and his fourth this season. David Givens continued to factor in the aerial game, grabbing five passes for 100 yards and recording his third consecutive 100-yard game. Troy Brown contributed on offense as well, notching three receptions for 30 yards and a touchdown. Adam Vinatieri was a perfect 4-for-4 on field goal attempts and threw his first career pass, which Brown caught for a 4-yard touchdown on a fake field goal.

New England got off to a quick start, scoring on a 43-yard field goal from Vinatieri on the first drive of the game. The Patriots forced a three-and-out for the Rams, then seemingly went three-and-out themselves before Josh Miller's punt on fourth down was muffed by St. Louis returner Shaun McDonald and recovered by Patriots long snapper Lonie Paxton. New England converted the turnover into another Vinatieri field goal, giving the Patriots a 6-0 edge.

The second quarter began in St. Louis' favor as the Rams defense sacked Tom Brady in the end zone, forcing a fumble that resulted in a touchdown and a 7-6 St. Louis lead. New England answered with a 62-yard march downfield that culminated in a 2-yard touchdown pass from Brady to linebacker Mike Vrabel, putting the Patriots back on top, 13-7. St. Louis, not to be outdone, then drove for a touchdown of its own, an 11-yard score from Bulger to Isaac Bruce, giving the Rams a 14-13 lead. Another Vinatieri field goal, this one a 45-yarder, then gave way to a St. Louis drive late in the first half, where McGinest's sack led to a Bulger fumble and Green recovered, giving the Patriots possession at the St. Louis 28-yard line. This gave the Patriots just one minute to convert, and another Vinatieri kick gave New England a 19-14 edge going into halftime.

The second half belonged to the Patriots, as they outscored St. Louis 21-8 to ice the game. New England's first possession of the second half resulted in what initially seemed to be Vinatieri's fifth field goal attempt of the day, but the Patriots instead snapped the ball directly to Vinatieri, who tossed a 4-yard pass to Brown for a surprise New England touchdown, extending the Patriots' lead to 26-14. On the following Rams drive, Phifer intercepted Bulger and the Patriots turned the takeaway into a 5-yard Dillon touchdown and a 33-14 lead.

St. Louis started off the fourth quarter with a 16-yard touchdown connection from Bulger to Torry Holt and the Rams' two-point conversion attempt was good, cutting the Patriots' lead to 11 points. The score could not spark a comeback, though, as New England sealed the deal with a 4-yard score from Brady to Bethel Johnson on the next drive, giving the Patriots a 40-22 lead with 5:23 left in the game. St. Louis made one more bid for a score, gaining a first-and-goal from the New England 3-yard line with 3:43 remaining. The Patriots' defense held strong as the game wound down, as Ted Johnson stopped Marshall Faulk for a 4-yard loss and a St. Louis holding penalty thwarted the Rams' final scoring bid, preserving the 40-22 win.

TOUCHDOWN VINATIERI

Kicker Adam Vinatieri threw a 4-yard touchdown pass to Troy Brown on a fake field goal play in the third quarter, giving the Patriots a 26-14 lead. It was the first pass attempt of Vinatieri's career and the first Patriots pass completion by someone other than Tom Brady since Rohan Davey completed three passes in the fourth quarter of the 2003 season opener at Buffalo (09/07/03). The last time a Patriot other than Brady threw a touchdown pass in regular-season play was on Oct. 21, 2001, when wide receiver David Patten completed a 60-yard scoring pass to Troy Brown at Indianapolis. Before the Rams game, the last time the Patriots attempted a fake field goal was on Oct. 8, 2000, when Lee Johnson completed a 16-yard pass to Eric Bjornson.

CONSISTENT KICKING

Adam Vinatieri nailed four field goals, raising his accuracy rate to 94.7 percent (18/19) on the season. He has scored 76 points so far this season, leading all NFL kickers and ranking second overall in the league behind Kansas City running back Priest Holmes (90 points). Vinatieri's career high for accuracy was set in the 2002 season, when he hit 27 of his 30 attempts, good for a 90.0 percent clip. The only field goal Vinatieri has missed this season came on his longest attempt of the year, a 47-yarder against Miami on Oct. 10.

FORTY LOOKS FINE

The Patriots scored 40 points for the first time in more than two years, dating back to when they put up 41 points on the Kansas City Chiefs in a 41-39 overtime victory at Gillette Stadium on Sept. 22, 2002. The last time New England scored 40 or more points in a non-overtime contest was on Sept. 15, 2002, when they defeated the New York Jets 44-7 at Giants Stadium.

GIVENS' HUNDRED-YARD FEAT

David Givens exceeded the 100-yard receiving mark for the third consecutive game and for the fourth time this season. Givens totaled exactly 100 yards on five catches. New England's leading receiver has grabbed 37 passes this season, gaining a total of 644 yards. He is on pace to gain 1,288 yards this season, a total that would rank second in franchise history to Stanley Morgan's 1,491 yards in 1986.

DILLON DOES IT

Corey Dillon exceeded the 100-yard rushing mark for the fourth time this season and in the third consecutive game in which he has appeared, gaining 112 yards on 25 carries (4.5 avg). Last season, Dillon broke the 100-yard barrier just once. Including the St. Louis game, Dillon has recorded 32 career 100-yard games and is the first Patriot to record four 100-yard games in a season since Antowain Smith did it in 2001. Dillon is on pace to record 1,498 yards this season, a total that would set a franchise record and mark a career high for the eight-year veteran.

BIG PLAY BETHEL

Bethel Johnson scored his first touchdown of the season on a 4-yard grab from Tom Brady in the fourth quarter, putting the Patriots firmly in command, 40-22. The score was the third touchdown reception of Johnson's career and his first since the 2003 season finale against Buffalo (12/27/03).

PHIFER PICK

Linebacker Roman Phifer recorded his first interception in more than three years when he grabbed a batted ball by Willie McGinest and returned it 25 yards in the third quarter. The score set up Corey Dillon's touchdown run that gave New England a 33-14 lead. The pick was the 11th of Phifer's 14-year career and his first since he picked off Indianapolis' Peyton Manning at Foxboro Stadium on Sept. 30, 2001.

MR. VERSATILITY

On the same day he caught his first touchdown pass of the season, wide receiver Troy Brown was pressed into action as a defensive back following starting cornerback Asante Samuel's first-quarter injury. Brown saw significant action throughout the day as the Patriots' nickel back and recorded a pass defense when he batted down a Marc Bulger pass late in the third quarter, just missing an interception. In addition to his defensive work, Brown also caught his first touchdown of 2004, a 4-yard pass from Adam Vinatieri on a fake field goal in the third quarter.

ABLE VRABEL

Linebacker Mike Vrabel scored his second career regular-season touchdown in the second quarter when he lined up as a tight end and acrobatically snared a 2-yard pass from Tom Brady to give the Patriots a 13-7 lead. Vrabel's other regular-season score came on Sept. 29, 2002, when he grabbed a 1-yard pass from Brady at San Diego. In addition, he grabbed a 1-yard score from Brady in Super Bowl XXXVIII, getting New England's final touchdown of the game and becoming the first defensive player to score a touchdown on offense in the Super Bowl since William Perry scored on a 1-yard run in Super Bowl XX.

MR. PERFECT

Domes and turf provide the ideal conditions for a kicker, and Adam Vinatieri has never missed under those ideal circumstances. Including his 4-for-4 performance against the Rams, Vinatieri is a perfect 34-for-34 in his career in domed stadiums that have artificial turf. The only indoor stadium in which New England's kicker has missed is Reliant Stadium in Houston, which has a natural grass playing surface. Vinatieri is 4-for-8 in his career at Reliant Stadium.

FOUR FIELD GOALS

Adam Vinatieri nailed four field goals against the Rams, marking the first time in nearly three years a Patriots kicker has enjoyed a four-score game in the regular season. Vinatieri last recorded a perfect 4-for-4 regular-season performance on Dec. 16, 2001 at Buffalo. He tied an NFL postseason record in the 2003 AFC Championship Game with five field goals.

GIVENS: MR. BIG PLAY

David Givens hauled in a 50-yard pass from Tom Brady in the second quarter, recording the Patriots' longest play from scrimmage this season. The catch was Givens' third grab this season of more than 40 yards and the second longest catch of his career (57 yarder vs. Dallas, 11/16/03). New England used the catch to get in position for a 45-yard field goal by Adam Vinatieri to regain the lead, 16-14.

PAXTON POUNCES

Long snapper Lonie Paxton recovered his first career fumble in the first quarter when he raced down the field on a punt play and pounced on a muffed catch by St. Louis punt returner Shaun McDonald. The Patriots regained possession of the ball at the Rams' 28-yard line and converted the opportunity into a 31-yard field goal and a 6-0 lead.

TOMMY TOUCHDOWNS

Tom Brady found Mike Vrabel for a 2-yard touchdown in the second quarter, marking the 14th consecutive game (including playoffs) in which Brady has thrown a touchdown pass. The last time Brady did not throw a touchdown pass in a game was on Dec. 7, 2003 in a 12-0 win over Miami at Gillette Stadium. Brady's 11 consecutive regular-season games with a touchdown pass ties his career-best touchdown streak, accomplished from Dec. 22, 2001 to Nov. 10, 2002.

SACK ATTACK

The Patriots sacked St. Louis signal caller Marc Bulger five times, with five different players recording sacks. Ty Warren got the sack attack started, dragging Bulger down in the first quarter for a 5-yard loss. Jarvis Green joined the attack, recording his second sack of the season in the second quarter. Willie McGinest got in on the action, stopping Bulger at the line of scrimmage in the second quarter, giving him a team-leading 4.5 sacks on the season. In the second half, Tedy Bruschi (1.5 sacks on the season) and Richard Seymour (3.0) each got in on Bulger for 9-yard losses.

LONG PASS

Patrick Pass grabbed a 22-yard pass from Tom Brady in the first quarter as part of the Patriots' game-opening field goal drive. The catch was the second longest of Pass' career, just shy of his 23-yard touchdown reception against Miami on Dec. 22, 2001.

END ZONE RECOVERY

St. Louis' Leonard Little recovered a fumble in the end zone, scoring the Rams' first touchdown of the day. It was the first time in 10 years that a Patriots opponent recovered a fumble in the end zone. Before last week's game, the last time it happened was on Sept. 11, 1994, when Buffalo's Mike Lodish accomplished the feat. The last time New England gave up a touchdown on a fumble return was on Oct. 14, 2001, when San Diego's Derrick Harris picked up a Lee Johnson fumble and ran six yards for the score.

FINISHING STRONG

The Patriots scored on their final possession of the first half, marking the third consecutive game in which they have accomplished the feat and seventh time in their last nine games that they have scored on their last possession before halftime. New England scored last-possession touchdowns against Pittsburgh (10/31), the N.Y. Jets (10/24), Miami (10/10), Buffalo (10/3), and Carolina (2/1), and notched last-possession field goals against the Rams and against Indianapolis (9/9). The Patriots did not score on their final first-half possessions against Seattle (10/17) and Arizona (9/19).

PATRIOTS IN DOMES

The Patriots played in a dome for the first time this season and won their eighth consecutive dome game. New England has not lost a dome game since Thanksgiving Day, 2000 when the Detroit Lions rolled to a 34-9 win at the Pontiac Silverdome. The dome domination includes both of New England's recent Super Bowl victories, at the Louisiana Superdome (SB XXXVI) and at Reliant Stadium in Houston (SB XXXVIII).

Bill Belichick is celebrating his 30th season as an NFL coach and has spent more seasons in the league than any other current head coach. He has been a part of four Super Bowl championship teams, including two world titles in his four seasons as Patriots head coach. In addition to the team's current success, Belichick has built a firm foundation for the Patriots to remain competitive into the future. Since 2001, the Patriots have blossomed, rattling off 47 wins in their last 62 games and making Belichick the winningest NFL head coach since the 2001 season. His overall record of 52-26 (including a 6-0 playoff mark) gives him the best winning percentage of any head coach in Patriots history.

BELICHICK'S PATRIOTS RENAISSANCE

Any successful project requires a sound plan, and once head coach Bill Belichick had the time to implement his design on the Patriots, his approach has given him the best record of any NFL head coach since 2001. After the team endured a 5-11 rebuilding year in his first season, the fruits of Belichick's labor were put on display to the entire NFL, as his team posted an 11-5 record in 2001 and claimed the first Super Bowl title in franchise history. Since 2001, his plan has been in place in New England, and Belichick and the Patriots have compiled the best record in the NFL, winning two of the last three Super Bowls. The remarkable run includes postseason play, where Belichick and the Patriots own a perfect 6-0 record.

TOP BILLING

Bill Belichick is widely recognized as one of the NFL's premier head coaches, and recent polls have shown how his reputation has solidified. In an SI.com election day poll of more than 90,000 voters, Belichick was selected as the active coach (in any sport) that fans would most want to call their team's shots in a title game (Belichick received 35 percent of the vote, while Duke's Mike Krzyzewski ranked second with 27 percent). In addition, a Sports Illustrated poll of more than 300 NFL players revealed that Belichick was the coach that players would most like to play for, receiving 45 percent of the leaguewide vote.

THE KRAFT ERA

Since ROBERT KRAFT purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced a remarkable reversal of fortunes. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund franchise that had won just 19 of 80 games (.311 pct.). In the early 1990s, the franchise appeared destined for relocation until Kraft bought the team and rejuvenated local interest. By the start of the 1994 season, every game was a complete sellout. Ten seasons later, the consecutive sellout streak is now at 110 and counting. **Since Kraft took ownership, the Patriots have won more conference championships than any other team in the NFL, claiming three AFC titles in the past eight seasons.**

OFFENSE FROM DEFENSE

RICHARD SEYMOUR's 68-yard fumble return for a touchdown against Buffalo on Oct. 3 was the Patriots' first defensive touchdown of the season and also the longest fumble return in franchise history. It was New England's first touchdown on a fumble recovery since Matt Chatham recorded a 38-yard scoop-and-score in a 17-6 win over the New York Giants at Gillette Stadium on Oct. 12, 2003. Last season, the Patriots led the NFL with six defensive touchdowns and were 6-0 in games in which they scored on defense. The Patriots are 13-2 in their last 15 games in which they scored a defensive touchdown, dating back to 1999.

TAKING AIM

ADAM VINATIERI is the most accurate kicker in franchise history ranks seventh among the most accurate kickers in NFL history. SCORING MACHINE

ADAM VINATIERI is the second leading scorer in Patriots history, totaling 993 points in his eight-plus seasons with the club. Vinatieri made the team as a rookie free agent in 1996 and has scored 100 points or more in each of his eight seasons, joining Jason Elam of the Denver Broncos as the only two kickers in NFL history to accomplish the feat. LAST-MINUTE MAN

ADAM VINATIERI nailed his second Super Bowl-winning field goal, booting a 41-yarder through the uprights with four seconds left to give the Patriots a 32-29 victory over Carolina in Super Bowl XXXVIII. He is the only kicker in NFL history to kick a game-winning field goal in the final minute of the Super Bowl and has accomplished the feat twice, including his 48-yarder to win Super Bowl XXXVI. Out of the Patriots' six playoff wins since 2001, four were decided on game-winning boots by Vinatieri. In all, Vinatieri has kicked 17 game-winning field goals in his career, including nine in the past three seasons. His game-winners are listed below:

DILLON DOMINATES

COREY DILLON has recorded four 100-yard games so far this season and owns 32 career 100-yard games. In his second game as a Patriot, Dillon ran for 158 yards at Arizona (09/19/04), gaining the most yards by a Patriots rusher in nearly six years, since Robert Edwards cut loose for 196 yards (on 24 carries) on Dec. 13, 1998 at St. Louis. Dillon also broke the 100-yard barrier on Oct. 17 when he rumbled for 105 yards against Seattle and followed that up with a 115-yard performance against the New York Jets on Oct. 24 and a 112-yard game at St. Louis on Nov. 7.

BALANCED ATTACK

Corey Dillon and David Givens have each gained 100 yards in the same game three times this season, marking the only times since 1997 that the Patriots have had a 100-yard rusher and a 100-yard receiver in the same game. Dillon and Givens both broke the 100-yard mark in their respective categories at Arizona (9/19), against the N.Y. Jets (10/24) and at St. Louis (11/7). Prior to this season, the last time the Patriots achieved the feat was on Nov. 2, 1997, when Curtis Martin ran for 104 yards and Shawn Jefferson gained 108 receiving yards at Minnesota.

GIVENS LEADS THE WAY

Through eight games this season, DAVID GIVENS is New England's leading receiver, pacing the team with a career-high 37 receptions and 644 yards. Last season, Givens tied for the team's postseason lead with 17 catches on the heels of a 34-catch regular season. Givens has exceeded the 100-yard receiving mark four times this season, becoming the first Patriot to record four 100-yard games in a season since Terry Glenn did it in 1999. He got his first career 100-yard game at Arizona on Sept. 19, 2004 (120 yards), then followed that with three consecutive century-mark games against the N.Y. Jets (10/24/04) at Pittsburgh (10/31/04) and at St. Louis (11/7). Coming into this season, Givens' previous single-game career high was 87 yards, set on Nov. 3, 2003 at Denver.

MR. FIRST DOWN

DAVID GIVENS' first 30 catches this season all resulted in first downs for the Patriots, and 36 of his 37 catches to date have recorded first downs. New England's leading receiver is averaging 17.4 yards per catch, and has shown a knack for the big play, grabbing three passes of more than 40 yards and 10 passes of more than 20 yards.

HE RATE ME

TOM BRADY has earned four passer ratings over 100.0 this season and has done so 20 times in his career. All of Brady's 20 career 100.0-plus ratings have come in Patriots victories.

COMEBACK KID

TOM BRADY has engineered 16 game-winning drives to break a tie or take the lead in the fourth quarter or overtime in his career. He has accomplished the feat twice in the Super Bowl, most recently engineering a 47-yard drive with just over a minute remaining to lead the Patriots to victory in Super Bowl XXXVIII. He led seven comebacks in 2003, including a fourth-quarter comeback to break a 14-14 tie against Tennessee in the AFC Divisional Playoffs in addition to comebacks against Houston, Indianapolis, Miami, Tennessee and Denver in the regular season. Brady's record also includes his dramatic performance to lead the Patriots to victory in Super Bowl XXXVI and his heroics in the snow against the Oakland Raiders in the 2001 Divisional Playoffs, giving him four comebacks in six postseason starts.

TY LAW is tied for the Patriots franchise record with 36 career interceptions and needs just one more pick to pass Raymond Clayborn and claim sole possession of the club mark. Law tied the franchise record with a first-quarter interception against Seattle on Oct. 17 at Gillette Stadium. Law and Clayborn are the only two Patriots to record 30 or more picks in a Patriots uniform. Law is the team's all-time leader in interceptions returned for a touchdown and also in postseason picks (4).

WILLIE MAC ATTACK

WILLIE MCGINEST ranks fourth on the Patriots' all-time sacks list with 67.0 career sacks. He leads the team with 4.5 sacks through eight games in the 2004 season, continuing a run of strong play dating back to late last year. Including his NFL-leading 5.0 sacks in the 2003 postseason, McGinest has recorded 11.0 sacks in his last 11 games, 11.5 sacks in his last 13 games and 12.5 sacks in his last 15 games. He is the Patriots' career postseason sack leader and ranks third all-time in NFL postseason history with 11.5 career postseason sacks, trailing only Bruce Smith (14.5) and Reggie White (12.0). HOT ROD

RODNEY HARRISON leads the Patriots with 81 tackles (55 solo) and continues to be a leader in the New England secondary. Harrison is also tied for second on the team with 3.0 sacks, putting him halfway to his career high of 6.0 sacks, set with the San Diego Chargers in 2000. He recorded a career-high 20 tackles (12 solo) at Pittsburgh on Oct. 31, 2004. In 2003, his first season in New England, Harrison led the team with a career-high 140 tackles (105 solo) and is on pace to beat that mark with 162 tackles this season.



SACK ATTACK

The Patriots have recorded 23.0 sacks through eight games this season. New England's 23.0 sacks have been recorded by 10 different defenders, with Willie McGinest leading the way with 4.5 sacks and Rodney Harrison, Richard Seymour and Mike Vrabel close behind with 3.0 sacks. Last season, the Patriots totaled 41.0 sacks, registered by 14 different players, and are on pace to notch 46.0 sacks this season.

"BIG SEY" SEES THE ZONE

Two-time Pro Bowl defensive lineman RICHARD SEYMOUR scored his first career touchdown on Oct. 3 at Buffalo, scooping up a Drew Bledsoe fumble caused by Tedy Bruschi and rumbling 68 yards for the score and a decisive 31-17 advantage for the Patriots. Seymour became the first Patriots defensive lineman to score a touchdown since Willie McGinest recovered a fumble in the end zone in a 30-28 win over the New York Jets in the 1999 season opener.

MEAN GENE

EUGENE WILSON leads the Patriots with two interceptions this season. Both of his picks came against Arizona on Sept. 19, marking the first multiple-pick game of his career. Both of Wilson's interceptions kick-started Patriots scoring drives, with his first-quarter theft leading to the Patriots' second touchdown of the game and his fourth-quarter steal starting a New England field goal drive. Last year, Wilson tied for the NFL rookie lead with four picks and the Patriots led the NFL with 29 interceptions.

A SPECIAL PLAYER

LARRY IZZO leads the team with 15 special teams tackles and has led his team in special teams stops in each of his last five NFL seasons. Since pacing the Miami Dolphins with 33 special teams tackles in 1999, the two-time Pro Bowler has set the mark on his team in every season since then, including every year since he joined the Patriots in 2001. He has recorded 87 special teams tackles in a Patriots uniform over the last three-plus seasons and is in his fourth consecutive year as New England's special teams captain.

PICK A STREAK

The Patriots have notched at least one interception in 19 of their last 22 regular-season games and have done so in 11 of their last 12 regular-season home games. Including last season's two postseason games in Foxborough, the Patriots have at least one pick in 13 of their last 14 home games.
