NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (9-1) vs. BALTIMORE RAVENS (7-3)

Sunday, November 28, 2004 ★ Gillette Stadium (68,756) ★ 4:15 p.m. EST

The Patriots return to Gillette Stadium this week to take on the red-hot Ravens in a Thanksgiving Weekend clash. New England has won its last three games and has come out on top in 24 of its last 25 contests dating back to September of last year, but will face a tough test in the Ravens, who boast one of the NFL's most fearsome defenses.

Baltimore has won five of its last six games, with its only loss over that span coming by five points to the 9-1 Eagles in Philadelphia. The Ravens defense has allowed an average of just 14.0 points per game this season, making it the stingiest defense in the NFL. In its most recent six-game run, the Baltimore defense has allowed just 11.8 points per game, and it has allowed more than 20 points just once in 10 games this season.

The Patriots offense, on the other hand, is tied for fifth in the NFL by averaging 26.4 points per game. New England has scored more than 20 points in eight of its 10 games and has averaged 32.0 points per game over its last three contests. Defensively, the Patriots are allowing an average of 17.1 points per game, tying them with Minnesota for fifth in the league.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be televised nationwide by CBS. The game can be seen in Boston on WBZ-TV Channel 4. **Jim Nantz** will handle the play-by-play duties, while **Phil Simms** will provide analysis. **Bonnie Bernstein** will contribute reports from the sidelines.

RADIO: WBCN 104.1 FM is the flagship station for the Patriots Rock Radio Network. Play-by-play broadcaster **Gil Santos** is in his 28th season as the voice of the Patriots and will call the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer **Gino Cappelletti**. Santos and Cappelletti are celebrating their 21st season as a broadcast tandem.

NATIONAL RADIO: This week's game will be broadcast nationwide by CBS Radio Sports/Westwood One. **Ted Robinson** will call the play-by-play from Gillette Stadium and will be joined in the booth by analyst **Jack Ham**.

SAVING THE BEST FOR LAST

The Patriots have six games left in the 2004 season, and since Bill Belichick took over as head coach in 2000, the Patriots have saved their best football for the end of the season. Since 2000, New England is a combined 19-5 (.792) in its last six games of the campaign. Last year, the Patriots were 6-0 in their last six games, following a 2002 season where they closed out with a 4-2 record and a 2001 campaign in which New England swept its final six contests.

GAME TIME CHANGED TO 4:15

The Patriots would like to ask all media outlets to assist us in informing fans that the NFL has changed the kickoff time of this week's game against the Ravens to **4:15 p.m.** The game was originally scheduled for a 1:00 p.m. kickoff, but the change was made by the league to allow the game to be the featured matchup for CBS' doubleheader weekend. This season, the Patriots will appear in just six 1:00 p.m. games, the fewest since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970. The Patriots' 10 other games have all had or are scheduled for late-afternoon or prime-time kickoffs.



THIS WEEK: PATRIOTS VS. RAVENS

SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots will face the Ravens this week for just the third time since the Baltimore franchise was founded following the Cleveland Browns' move to Baltimore in 1996. The only team the Patriots have played fewer times than the Ravens are the Houston Texans, against whom New England has squared off just once. New England holds a 2-0 record over Baltimore, with the last meeting coming on Jan. 2, 2000, a 20-3 Patriots victory on the final day of the 1999 season. The first meeting between the teams came during the Ravens' first season in Baltimore, when the Patriots prevailed 46-38 on Oct. 6, 1996. The 46 points that New England scored in that game are the most by the Patriots in 20 years, dating back to the 1984 season. The 84 total points scored by both teams in that game rank as the second-highest total number of points in a game in Patriots history.

QUICK HITS

- The Patriots own a perfect 2-0 record against the Ravens, the highest rate of success the Patriots hold against any team they have played multiple times.
- Five Patriots players – Troy Brown, Tedy Bruschi, Ted Johnson, Willie McGinest and Adam Vinatieri – have played in each of New England's victories over the Ravens.

PATRIOTS VS. RAVENS' PREDECESSORS

From 1970-83, the Patriots faced the Baltimore Colts 27 times, recording a 12-15 record in those games. The Colts moved to Indianapolis prior to the 1984 season and Baltimore was without an NFL team until the Cleveland Browns moved to Baltimore and became the Ravens in 1996. Prior to the move, the Patriots were 4-11 against the Browns, including a 2-4 record against Cleveland while Bill Belichick was the Browns' head coach from 1991-95.

Despite being outgained in total offensive yardage 313-151, the Patriots defeated the Ravens 20-3 in the 1999 regular-season finale at Foxboro Stadium. The Patriots notched their eighth win of the season and their fifth at home while halting a three-game losing streak.

The first quarter ended scoreless, but the Ravens got on the board less than two minutes into the second quarter on a 19-yard field goal. However, those were the only points the Ravens would score on the day, as the Patriots defense held Baltimore scoreless for the remainder of the game.

The Patriots went on a scoring barrage in the second quarter, with Adam Vinatieri connecting on a 25-yard field goal and a season-long 51-yard attempt. Drew Bledsoe then added a 1-yard touchdown pass to Mike Bartrum, making the score 13-3. Midway through the third quarter, Chad Eaton returned a fumble 23 yards for a score, registering the final points on the day and bringing the final score to 20-3.

THIS WEEK IN PATRIOTS HISTORY

November 22 – November 28

Nov. 22, 1959 — In the inaugural AFL Draft, the Patriots selected Northwestern running back Ron Burton with the first draft choice in team history. Burton went on to play in 68 games in six seasons with the Patriots. He dedicated himself to charitable endeavors following his football career and the Patriots' annual community service award now bears his name.

Nov. 23, 1988 — Robert Kraft purchased Sullivan Stadium out of bankruptcy court to begin the pursuit towards his goal of owning the Patriots. Kraft's purchase of the stadium was an invaluable asset to keep the team in New England, as the Patriots had a binding lease through 2001. In 1994, instead of accepting a buyout, Kraft bought the Patriots and ensured that the team would remain in New England.

Nov. 27, 1994 — The Patriots defeated the Colts 12-10 in Indianapolis to even their record at 6-6 in Robert Kraft's first season of ownership. The victory was the third in a series of seven consecutive wins that propelled the team to a 10-6 record and its first playoff berth in eight seasons.

Nov. 23, 1997 — The Patriots jumped out to a 27-3 lead over the Miami Dolphins and held off a furious rally to hold on for a 27-24 win at Foxboro Stadium. Jimmy Hitchcock set a club record with a 100-yard interception return for a touchdown, and Larry Whigham added a 60-yard interception return for a score. The Patriots had just seven offensive possessions in the game.

Nov. 23, 1998 — Drew Bledsoe led the Patriots to a dramatic 26-23 win over Miami at Foxboro Stadium despite fracturing the index finger on his throwing hand with two minutes left in the game. With the broken finger, Bledsoe led his team on an 80-yard game-winning drive that culminated in a 25-yard touchdown pass to Shawn Jefferson with 34 seconds left. Bledsoe completed 28 of 54 passes for 423 yards.

Nov. 25, 2001 — Tom Brady threw four touchdown passes as the Patriots defeated the New Orleans Saints 34-17 at Foxboro Stadium to improve to 6-5 in the 2001 season. The victory kick-started a 9-game winning streak that included three postseason victories and New England's first NFL championship in Super Bowl XXXVI.

Nov. 28, 2002 — In their second Thanksgiving Day appearance in three years, the Patriots defeated the Detroit Lions 20-12 at Ford Field in Detroit. It was the first Thanksgiving Day victory for the Patriots in three tries.



THIS WEEK: PATRIOTS VS. RAVENS

PASSING PERFORMANCES

Tom Brady will start against the Ravens for the first time in his career. Brady has compiled a record of 21-6 (.778) when facing a team for the first time. This season, he is 2-0 when facing new teams (Arizona and Seattle). After this week's game, the only teams Brady will have not yet faced will be Cincinnati, San Francisco and Tampa Bay.

FANTASTIC FINISHES

One of the oldest mantras in sports is that it doesn't matter where you start a season, but it does matter where you finish it. The Patriots have done a remarkable job of finishing strong over the past two-plus seasons, as they have compiled a 31-4 (.886) record after November 1 since the 2001 season.

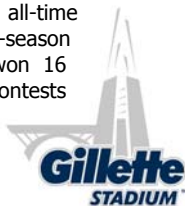

HOME SWEET HOME

The Patriots have now recorded a 20-3 (.870) all-time record at Gillette Stadium, including regular-season and postseason games. New England has won 16 consecutive regular-season and postseason contests at home, compiling the longest current home winning streak in the NFL. New England has not lost at home since a 30-17 defeat to the New York Jets on Dec. 22, 2002. The Patriots' .870 winning percentage at Gillette Stadium is the highest of any NFL team at its current home.



STANDING TALL

The Patriots are tied for the best record in the NFL with a 9-1 mark to begin the 2004 season. The AFC East leaders are tied with the Philadelphia Eagles and Pittsburgh Steelers for tops in the league. Last season, New England finished with a franchise-best and NFL-best 14-2 record.

CONNECTIONS

- Patriots head coach **Bill Belichick** was raised in Annapolis, Md., approximately 30 miles from Baltimore. Belichick was also the head coach of the Cleveland Browns for the five seasons that immediately preceded the franchise's move to Baltimore (1991-95).
- Patriots Vice President of Player Personnel **Scott Pioli** was the Ravens' director of pro personnel in the team's inaugural season of 1996. Prior to that, he was with the franchise in Cleveland as the Browns' pro personnel assistant from 1992-95, where he worked with Head Coach Bill Belichick.
- Patriots defensive backs coach **Eric Mangini** was an offensive assistant/quality control coach for the Ravens in 1996. He was a coaching assistant with the Browns in 1995 under Belichick and accompanied the franchise in its move to Baltimore.
- Baltimore's General Manager/Executive Vice President **Ozzie Newsome** was hired by **Bill Belichick** as the Cleveland Browns' special assignment scout in 1991 following Newsome's playing career. Newsome's duties grew to include working with Belichick and the coaching staff as an assistant to the head coach/offense/pro personnel. Newsome was promoted to director of pro personnel in 1994.
- Ravens Director of Player Personnel **Phil Savage** entered the NFL when he was hired by **Bill Belichick** as a defensive quality control coach for the Cleveland Browns in 1991.
- Ravens Director of Pro Personnel **George Kokinis** began his NFL career in 1991 as an intern in the Browns' operations department under head coach **Bill Belichick**.
- Ravens offensive coordinator **Matt Cavanaugh** was drafted by the Patriots in the second round (50th overall) of the 1978 NFL Draft. The former quarterback played in 52 games for New England from 1978-82 and earned 15 starts.
- Baltimore senior consultant **Jim Fassel** was a member of the New York Giants' coaching staff in 1991 and 1992, working as an assistant coach on the same staff as Patriots coordinators **Romeo Crennel** and **Charlie Weis**.
- Ravens Director of Player Development **O.J. Brigrance** was on the Patriots roster during the 2002 season and played in one game for New England that year. The former linebacker's 7-year playing career ended following that season.
- Patriots running back **Kevin Faulk** and Ravens kicker **Wade Richey** attended the same high school (Carenbro High in Louisiana) and also the same college (LSU). The players were 3-year teammates at each school.
- Patriots linebacker **Tully Banta-Cain** was a teammate of Ravens quarterback **Kyle Boller** at the University of California from 1999-2002.
- Patriots linebacker **Ted Johnson** and Ravens quarterback **Kordell Stewart** were teammates at the University of Colorado for four years from 1991-94.
- Patriots wide receiver **David Givens** and Ravens defensive end **Anthony Weaver** were teammates at Notre Dame for four years from 1998-2001.
- Patriots rookie defensive lineman **Vince Wilfork** and Ravens safety **Ed Reed** played on the same defense at the University of Miami in 2001.
- Ravens center **Mike Flynn** attended Cathedral High School in Springfield, Mass., and played college football at the University of Maine.
- Ravens tackle **Ethan Brooks** is a native of Hartford, Conn., and attended Williams College in Williamstown, Mass.

The Patriots improved to 9-1 with a 27-19 win over the Kansas City Chiefs on Monday Night Football. New England won for the 24th time in its last 25 games, jumping out to a 17-10 halftime lead and preserving the margin in the second half. The Patriots were victorious in Kansas City for the first time since 1964 and notched the first victory in team history at Arrowhead Stadium.

The Patriots offense was led by quarterback Tom Brady's 315 passing yards, as he broke the 300-yard mark for the second time this season. Wide receiver Deion Branch returned from a 7-game injury layoff to lead the receiving corps with six catches for 105 yards and a touchdown. Running back Corey Dillon just missed recording his fifth consecutive 100-yard game, gaining 98 yards on 26 carries.

New England's defense was solid against Kansas City's vaunted rushing attack, allowing the Chiefs just 64 total yards on the ground, 100 yards fewer than their NFL-leading average heading into the game. Safety Rodney Harrison came up with the biggest defensive play of the game, recording his first interception of the season as Kansas City was driving for a potential game-tying touchdown in the final minute of the first half.

Just as they have in each of the last 18 games, the Patriots scored first, jumping out to a 7-0 lead on a 5-yard run by Dillon to cap off a 10-play, 71-yard drive to open the game. Brady found Daniel Graham for a 27-yard gain on third-and-nine to extend the drive and put the Patriots in the early driver's seat. Kansas City responded with a 44-yard field goal by Lawrence Tynes to cut the Patriots' lead to 7-3, then the Chiefs defense stepped up by forcing New England into a three-and-out on its second possession. The home team took advantage of its next opportunity, taking a 10-7 lead on a 65-yard scoring strike from Green to Eddie Kennison, capping off a 5-play, 84-yard drive.

The teams exchanged punts before the Patriots took the lead for good on their first possession of the second quarter. Brady engineered a 75-yard drive on 10 plays, capped off by Dillon's second score of the night, a 1-yard plunge that gave New England a 14-10 advantage. Troy Brown's 22-yard reception on that drive vaulted him past Ben Coates and into third place on the Patriots' all-time receiving yardage list. The Patriots defense forced another Chiefs punt and the New England offense responded by increasing the advantage to 17-10 with a 37-yard Adam Vinatieri field goal that was set up by Daniel Graham's career-long 48-yard grab. Kansas City made its best effort to chip back before halftime, gaining a first-and-goal from the Patriots' 9-yard line with 1:04 left in the half. But Harrison came up with one of the game's biggest plays when he intercepted a Green pass intended for Tony Gonzalez in the end zone on third-and-goal. The play kept the Chiefs off the board and preserved the Patriots' 17-10 lead at the interval.

The second half began with a strong showing by the Chiefs offense, chewing up 8:15 of clock time on a 68-yard drive that netted a field goal and cut the Patriots' lead to 17-13. But New England responded quickly on its next possession, traveling 75 yards on just four plays to increase its margin to 24-13 on a 26-yard touchdown grab by Branch. The Patriots defense continued to hold strong, forcing the Chiefs to punt on their final third-quarter possession.

As the final period began, the Patriots were in position to put the game away. New England drove deep into Chiefs territory, but Dillon fumbled at the Kansas City 3-yard line and gave the home team some hope. The Chiefs capitalized on their chance, driving 97 yards on 11 plays and closing the gap to 24-19 on a 26-yard strike from Green to Kennison. Kansas City's 2-point conversion try failed, keeping the Patriots' lead at five points.

New England answered the Chiefs' score with a 28-yard field goal by Vinatieri that extended the Patriots' lead to 27-19. Kansas City had one last chance at a potential game-tying touchdown and 2-point conversion, but the Patriots defense held strong and did not allow a first down, sealing the win on a 10-yard sack by Willie McGinest on fourth down with a minute left in the game. The Patriots then ran out the clock and preserved their third consecutive victory, maintaining a 2-game lead atop the AFC East standings.

BROWN MOVES UP LISTS

With his 22-yard reception in the second quarter, Troy Brown passed Ben Coates to move into third place on the Patriots' all-time receiving yardage list. The 12-year veteran finished the game with 5,477 career yards, passing Coates' mark of 5,471 yards. The only two players in Patriots history who have gained more yards than Brown are Stanley Morgan (10,352 yards from 1977-89) and Irving Fryar (5,726; 1984-92).

SCORING IN 16 STRAIGHT QUARTERS

The Patriots put points on the board in all four quarters, marking the fourth consecutive game in which they have scored in every quarter. New England has tallied points in 16 consecutive quarters. The last time the Patriots did not score in a quarter was in the fourth quarter against the N.Y. Jets on Oct. 14. The Patriots have scored in 34 of 40 quarters this season. In contrast, the New England defense has allowed its opponents to score in just 22 of 40 quarters this year.

GOING LONG

Five different Patriots caught their longest pass of the season against the Chiefs. Daniel Graham (48 yards), David Patten (46), Deion Branch (26), Troy Brown (22) and Corey Dillon (20) all set season longs as Tom Brady completed seven passes of more than 20 yards.

WARREN TAKES TWO

Defensive end Ty Warren recorded a career-high 2.0 sacks and also forced a Chiefs fumble. It was the first multiple-sack game of Warren's career. The second-year standout dropped Trent Green for a 9-yard loss in the first quarter and followed that up with a 6-yard sack in the fourth quarter. On his second sack, Warren forced Green to fumble, but Kansas City was able to recover the loose ball.

OUT IN FRONT

The Patriots have scored first in 15 straight regular-season games and in 18 consecutive games including the playoffs. **New England has tied the 1978 Miami Dolphins for the all-time NFL record for consecutive regular-season games scoring first.** The last time New England did not get on the board first was on Nov. 23, 2003 at Houston, when the Texans jumped out to a 3-0 lead at Reliant Stadium in a game the Patriots eventually won 23-20 in overtime. The 1942-43 Chicago Bears rank second in NFL history, scoring first in 14 consecutive regular-season games.

DILLON IN THE ZONE

Corey Dillon scored two rushing touchdowns, bringing his scoring total to six touchdowns this season. It was his second multiple-touchdown game this season (vs. Seattle, 10/17). Dillon opened the scoring with a 5-yard touchdown run that capped off the Patriots' opening drive. That score was the 50th rushing touchdown of his career.

- Roosevelt Colvin sacked Trent Green for a 3-yard loss in the second quarter, giving him 3.0 sacks on the season.
- Willie McGinest dropped Green for a 10-yard sack on the Chiefs' final offensive play of the game. The sack gave him a team-high 6.5 for the season.

GOING DEEP

Kansas City scored its first touchdown of the night on a 65-yard touchdown pass from Trent Green to Eddie Kennison in the first quarter. It was the longest play from scrimmage the Patriots have given up this season. The last time New England gave up a longer play in the regular season was on Dec. 13, 2003, when Jacksonville's Byron Leftwich connected with wideout Jimmy Smith for a 67-yard pass play at Gillette Stadium.

FIRST-HALF SCORING

The Patriots scored in both the first and second quarters, continuing their streak of having scored in each of the first two quarters in every game this season. In fact, in the second quarter, the Patriots have not only scored points, but have scored a touchdown in every game. In contrast, the Patriots allowed the Chiefs to score in the first quarter, marking just the third time in 10 games this season the New England defense has allowed its opponents to score in the first quarter.

GOLDEN GRAHAM

Daniel Graham grabbed a 48-yard pass in the second quarter, bringing the Patriots to the Chiefs' 9-yard line and setting up Adam Vinatieri's 37-yard field goal, giving the Patriots a 17-10 lead. It was the longest catch of Graham's career, besting his 38-yard grab against Cleveland last year (10/26/03). It also tied the second longest play from scrimmage for the Patriots this season (Bethel Johnson's 48-yard catch vs. Seattle on 10/17).

NEON DEION

Deion Branch returned to the Patriots lineup for the first time since Week Two and made an immediate impact. He scored his second touchdown of the season on an impressive 26-yard catch-and-run play where he found a seam in the Kansas City defense and ran for the touchdown after catching a short pass from Tom Brady, extending the Patriots' lead to 24-13 in the third quarter.

DEEP ATTACK

Tom Brady aired the ball out, completing seven passes of more than 20 yards. His seven deep balls went to five different receivers and included completions of 48 yards to Daniel Graham and 46 yards to David Patten.

HOT ROD

Rodney Harrison picked off a Trent Green pass intended for Tony Gonzalez in the end zone in the final minute of the first half, thwarting a Kansas City scoring chance and preserving New England's 17-10 halftime lead. It was Harrison's first interception of the season and the 30th pick of his career. Last season, the 11-year veteran recorded three picks for the Patriots.

TOMMY TOUCHDOWNS

Tom Brady found Deion Branch for a 26-yard touchdown in the third quarter, marking the 16th consecutive game (including playoffs) in which Brady has thrown a touchdown pass. The last time Brady did not throw a touchdown pass in a game was on Dec. 7, 2003 in a 12-0 win over Miami at Gillette Stadium. Brady's 13 consecutive regular-season games with a touchdown pass establishes a career-best touchdown streak, passing his 11 consecutive regular-season games from Dec. 22, 2001 to Nov. 10, 2002.

100 YARDS FOR BRANCH

Deion Branch exceeded the 100-yard receiving mark, gaining 105 yards on six catches while playing in his first game in eight weeks. Branch recorded his third career 100-yard game and his first 100-yard performance of the season. In addition to his three regular-season 100-yard games, Branch caught 10 passes for 143 yards in Super Bowl XXXVIII.

300 YARDS FOR BRADY

Tom Brady exceeded the 300-yard passing milestone against the Chiefs, gaining 315 yards on 17-of-26 passing. Brady recorded his second 300-yard game of the season and his first since Week One against Indianapolis. Brady has now thrown for more than 300 yards eight times in his regular-season career. He has also broken the 300-yard barrier twice in six career postseason games. New England is now 7-1 when Brady throws for more than 300 yards in the regular season and 2-0 when he achieves the feat in the postseason.

CONSISTENT KICKING

Adam Vinatieri nailed two field goals, raising his accuracy rate to 96.2 percent (25/26) on the season. Vinatieri's career high for accuracy was set in the 2002 season, when he hit 27 of his 30 attempts, good for a 90.0 percent clip. The only field goal Vinatieri has missed this season came on his longest attempt of the year, a 47-yarder against Miami on Oct. 10.

THEY SAID IT

Below is a sampling of Patriots postgame quotes from Monday night's game.

HEAD COACH BILL BELICHICK

(On the road victory)

It's a tough place to come in here and play. I thought our players really did a good job of standing up to the adversity here, the hostile crowd and all that. They're very good; these people really support their team. Offensively I was really happy to see us move the ball and control it a little bit with some third down conversions. We got a big lift from (WR Deion) Branch and obviously Corey (Dillon) ran the ball pretty well. Defensively we were kind of scrambling around in the secondary, really from the second quarter on. That's the way it goes sometimes. Fortunately we were able to hang in there. I thought the two-point play was a big play, made it an eight-point game after Adam (Vinatieri's) field goal.

SAFETY RODNEY HARRISON

(On the play of the defense)

We were going against the number one offense in the league. They've got the best tight end in the league; they've got one of the best quarterbacks in the league, and some underrated receivers. We knew they were going to make some big plays, but it was really on us not to panic and not to let them in the end zone.

(On his interception)

I was just reading the quarterback and was able to get a break on the ball. We knew that Tony Gonzalez was their number one guy in the Red Zone. I knew they were going for them. I made a break on the ball and was able to go for it.

RUNNING BACK COREY DILLON

(On seeing more play action in the offense)

I think people are respecting the run to the point where we're sucking them up with the play action and that allows us to get down field with the deep ball and can make things happen. The passing game's helping the run game and the run game is helping the pass game. That's why we're a balanced offense.

Bill Belichick is celebrating his 30th season as an NFL coach and has spent more seasons in the league than any other current head coach. He has been a part of four Super Bowl championship teams, including two world titles in his four seasons as Patriots head coach. In addition to the team's current success, Belichick has built a firm foundation for the Patriots to remain competitive into the future. Since 2001, the Patriots have blossomed, rattling off 49 wins in their last 64 games and making Belichick the winningest NFL head coach since the 2001 season. His overall record of 54-26 (including a 6-0 playoff mark) gives him the best winning percentage of any head coach in Patriots history.

BELICHICK'S PATRIOTS RENAISSANCE

Any successful project requires a sound plan, and once head coach Bill Belichick had the time to implement his design on the Patriots, his approach has given him the best record of any NFL head coach since 2001. After the team endured a 5-11 rebuilding year in his first season, the fruits of Belichick's labor were put on display to the entire NFL, as his team posted an 11-5 record in 2001 and claimed the first Super Bowl title in franchise history. Since 2001, his plan has been in place in New England, and Belichick and the Patriots have compiled the best record in the NFL, winning two of the last three Super Bowls. The remarkable run includes postseason play, where Belichick and the Patriots own a perfect 6-0 record.

TOP BILLING

Bill Belichick is widely recognized as one of the NFL's premier head coaches, and recent polls have shown how his reputation has solidified. In an SI.com election day poll of more than 90,000 voters, Belichick was selected as the active coach (in any sport) that fans would most want to call their team's shots in a title game (Belichick received 35 percent of the vote, while Duke's Mike Krzyzewski ranked second with 27 percent). In addition, a Sports Illustrated poll of more than 300 NFL players revealed that Belichick was the coach that players would most like to play for, receiving 45 percent of the leaguewide vote.

THE KRAFT ERA

Since ROBERT KRAFT purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced a remarkable reversal of fortunes. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund franchise that had won just 19 of 80 games (.311 pct.). In the early 1990s, the franchise appeared destined for relocation until Kraft bought the team and rejuvenated local interest. By the start of the 1994 season, every game was a complete sellout. Ten seasons later, the consecutive sellout streak is now at 111 and counting. **Since Kraft took ownership, the Patriots have won more conference championships than any other team in the NFL, claiming three AFC titles in the past eight seasons.**

OFFENSE FROM DEFENSE

RICHARD SEYMOUR's 68-yard fumble return for a touchdown against Buffalo on Oct. 3 was the Patriots' first defensive touchdown of the season and also the longest fumble return in franchise history. It was New England's first touchdown on a fumble recovery since Matt Chatham recorded a 38-yard scoop-and-score in a 17-6 win over the New York Giants at Gillette Stadium on Oct. 12, 2003. Last season, the Patriots led the NFL with six defensive touchdowns and were 6-0 in games in which they scored on defense. The Patriots are 13-2 in their last 15 games in which they scored a defensive touchdown, dating back to 1999.

TAKING AIM

ADAM VINATIERI is the most accurate kicker in franchise history and ranks sixth among the most accurate kickers in NFL history. He has recorded an 82.0 percent conversion rate (237/289) over his nine-year career. He is 25-for-26 in 2004. He has connected on 84 of his last 97 kicks, good for an 86.6 percent clip.

SCORING MACHINE

ADAM VINATIERI is the second leading scorer in Patriots history, totaling 1,019 points in his 8-plus seasons with the club. Vinatieri made the team as a rookie free agent in 1996 and has scored 100 points or more in each of his nine seasons, joining Jason Elam of the Denver Broncos as the only two kickers in NFL history to accomplish the feat. LAST-MINUTE MAN

ADAM VINATIERI nailed his second Super Bowl-winning field goal, booting a 41-yarder through the uprights with four seconds left to give the Patriots a 32-29 victory over Carolina in Super Bowl XXXVIII. He is the only kicker in NFL history to kick a game-winning field goal in the final minute of the Super Bowl and has accomplished the feat twice, including his 48-yarder to win Super Bowl XXXVI. Out of the Patriots' six playoff wins since 2001, four were decided on game-winning boots by Vinatieri. In all, Vinatieri has kicked 17 game-winning field goals in his career, including nine in the past three seasons. His game-winners are listed below:

ON POINT

SUCCESS STREAK

ADAM VINATIERI enters this week's action having connected on each of his last 18 field goals, recording the second-longest success streak in team history. Vinatieri has been perfect in each of his last six games and has not missed a kick since a 47-yard attempt went wide right against Miami on Oct. 10. Vinatieri established a franchise record by connecting on 25 consecutive boots from Nov. 24, 1996 to Nov. 9, 1997. DILLON DOMINATES

COREY DILLON has recorded five 100-yard games so far this season and owns 33 career 100-yard games. Dillon's five games surpassing the century mark are the most by a Patriot since Curtis Martin recorded a franchise-record nine 100-yard performances in 1995. Dillon's five 100-yard games ties his career high, set in 1999, 2000 and 2002. BALANCED ATTACK

Corey Dillon and David Givens have each gained 100 yards in the same game three times this season, marking the only times since 1997 that the Patriots have had a 100-yard rusher and a 100-yard receiver in the same game. Dillon and Givens both broke the 100-yard mark in their respective categories at Arizona (9/19), against the N.Y. Jets (10/24) and at St. Louis (11/7). Prior to this season, the last time the Patriots achieved the feat was on Nov. 2, 1997, when Curtis Martin ran for 104 yards and Shawn Jefferson gained 108 receiving yards at Minnesota.

GIVENS LEADS THE WAY

Through 10 games this season, DAVID GIVENS is New England's leading receiver, pacing the team with a career-high 43 receptions and 713 yards. Last season, Givens tied for the team's postseason lead with 17 catches on the heels of a 34-catch regular season. Givens has exceeded the 100-yard receiving mark four times this season, becoming the first Patriot to record four 100-yard games in a season since Terry Glenn did it in 1999. He got his first career 100-yard game at Arizona on Sept. 19, 2004 (120 yards), then followed that with three consecutive century-mark games against the N.Y. Jets (10/24) at Pittsburgh (10/31) and at St. Louis (11/7).

MR. FIRST DOWN

DAVID GIVENS' first 30 catches this season all resulted in first downs for the Patriots, and 39 of his 42 catches to date have recorded first downs. New England's leading receiver is averaging 16.6 yards per catch, and has shown a knack for the big play, grabbing three passes of more than 40 yards and 11 passes of 20 yards or more.

COMEBACK KID

TOM BRADY has engineered 16 game-winning drives to break a tie or take the lead in the fourth quarter or overtime in his career. He has accomplished the feat twice in the Super Bowl, most recently engineering a 47-yard drive with just over a minute remaining to lead the Patriots to victory in Super Bowl XXXVIII. He led seven comebacks in 2003, including a fourth-quarter comeback to break a 14-14 tie against Tennessee in the AFC Divisional Playoffs in addition to comebacks against Houston, Indianapolis, Miami, Tennessee and Denver in the regular season. Brady's record also includes his dramatic performance to lead the Patriots to victory in Super Bowl XXXVI and his heroics in the snow against the Oakland Raiders in the 2001 Divisional Playoffs, giving him four comebacks in six postseason starts.

WILLIE MAC ATTACK

WILLIE MCGINEST ranks fourth on the Patriots' all-time sacks list with 69.0 career sacks. He leads the team with 6.5 sacks through 10 games in the 2004 season, continuing a run of strong play dating back to late last year. Including his NFL-leading 5.0 sacks in the 2003 postseason, McGinest has recorded 13.0 sacks in his last 13 games, 13.5 sacks in his last 15 games and 14.5 sacks in his last 17 games. He is the Patriots' career postseason sack leader and ranks third all-time in NFL postseason history with 11.5 career postseason sacks, trailing only Bruce Smith (14.5) and Reggie White (12.0). The Patriots' all-time regular-season sack leaders are listed below.

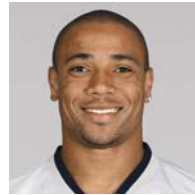

HOT ROD

RODNEY HARRISON leads the Patriots with 94 tackles (65 solo) and continues to be a leader in the New England secondary. Harrison is also tied for second on the team with 3.0 sacks, putting him halfway to his career high of 6.0 sacks, set with the San Diego Chargers in 2000. He recorded a career-high 20 tackles (12 solo) at Pittsburgh on Oct. 31, 2004. In 2003, his first season in New England, Harrison led the team with a career-high 140 tackles (105 solo) and is on pace to beat that mark with 150 tackles this season.



SACK ATTACK

The Patriots have recorded 30.0 sacks through nine games this season. New England's 30.0 sacks have been recorded by 11 different defenders, with Willie McGinest leading the way with 6.5 sacks and Ty Warren ranking second with 3.5 sacks. Last season, the Patriots totaled 41.0 sacks, registered by 14 different players, and are on pace to notch 48.0 sacks this season.

"BIG SEY" SEES THE ZONE

Two-time Pro Bowl defensive lineman RICHARD SEYMOUR scored his first career touchdown on Oct. 3 at Buffalo, scooping up a Drew Bledsoe fumble caused by Tedy Bruschi and rumbling 68 yards for the score and a decisive 31-17 advantage for the Patriots. Seymour became the first Patriots defensive lineman to score a touchdown since Willie McGinest recovered a fumble in the end zone in a 30-28 win over the New York Jets in the 1999 season opener.

MEAN GENE

EUGENE WILSON leads the Patriots with three interceptions this season. Two of his picks came against Arizona on Sept. 19, marking the first multiple-pick game of his career. All of Wilson's interceptions this season have kick-started Patriots scoring drives, with the team notching 17 points off of his three picks. Last year, Wilson tied for the NFL rookie lead with four picks and the Patriots led the NFL with 29 interceptions.

A SPECIAL PLAYER

LARRY IZZO leads the team with 16 special teams tackles and has led his team in special teams stops in each of his last five NFL seasons. Since pacing the Miami Dolphins with 33 special teams tackles in 1999, the two-time Pro Bowler has set the mark on his team in every season since then, including every year since he joined the Patriots in 2001. He has recorded 88 special teams tackles in a Patriots uniform over the last three-plus seasons and is in his fourth consecutive year as New England's special teams captain.

PICK A STREAK

The Patriots have notched at least one interception in 21 of their last 24 regular-season games and have done so in 12 of their last 13 regular-season home games. Including last season's two postseason games in Foxborough, the Patriots have at least one pick in 14 of their last 15 home games.
