NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (12-2) at NEW YORK JETS (10-4)

Sunday, December 26, 2004 ★ Giants Stadium (79,466) ★ 4:05 p.m. EST

The 2004 AFC East Champions will visit the New York Jets this week for a post-holiday matchup with important playoff implications. The playoff-bound Patriots need to win to regain late-season momentum and to secure an important first-round bye, while the Jets can clinch a playoff berth with a victory.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be televised to a regional audience by CBS. The game can be seen in Boston on WBZ-TV Channel 4. **Jim Nantz** will handle the play-by-play duties, while **Phil Simms** will provide analysis. **Bonnie Bernstein** will contribute reports from the sidelines.

RADIO: WBCN 104.1 FM is the flagship station for the Patriots Rock Radio Network. Play-by-play broadcaster **Gil Santos** is in his 28th season as the voice of the Patriots and will call the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer **Gino Cappelletti**. Santos and Cappelletti are celebrating their 21st season as a broadcast tandem.

PLAYOFF POSSIBILITIES

★ New England Patriots ★ 2004 AFC East Champions ★

The Patriots have clinched the AFC East title, assuring that they will host at least one home playoff game this season. If the Patriots defeat the Jets on Sunday, they will earn a bye through the first round of the playoffs and host a divisional playoff game the weekend of Jan. 15-16. Since the first-round bye was instituted in 1990, the Patriots have earned a bye three times (1996, 2001 and 2003), and have advanced to play in the Super Bowl in each of those years.

New England can clinch a first-round bye with...

- 1) NE win **OR**
- 2) NE tie + SD/IND game ends in a tie

TWELVE WINS

The Patriots have recorded 12 regular-season victories for the second time in the 45-year history of the franchise. The only other season in which New England recorded 12 or more victories was 2003, when the Patriots finished with a 14-2 record. New England has recorded 11 wins in six seasons in team history, most recently in 2001.

DOMINANT IN DECEMBER

When the calendar turns to the 12th month, the weather may turn cold, but in recent years the Patriots have remained red hot. Since Bill Belichick took over as head coach in 2000, the Patriots have recorded a 14-5 (.737) record in games played in the month of December. The Patriots' December dominance has fit into the team's recent history of saving its best football for the end of the season. Since 2001, the Patriots have recorded a 34-5 (.872) record in games played after Nov. 1, including a 6-0 mark in the playoffs.

DILLON CLOSING IN ON RECORDS

Running back Corey Dillon is enjoying the best season of his career, entering this week's action with 1,430 yards to his credit so far this season. He needs to gain just 58 more yards to set the Patriots franchise record for rushing yards in a season, a mark currently owned by Curtis Martin (1,487 yards in 1995). He also needs just six more yards to set a career high (currently 1,435 in 2000). Dillon has played in 13 of the Patriots' 14 games this season, and his average of 110 yards per game played leads all regular running backs currently active in the NFL. In addition to his yardage exploits, he has set a career high with 11 rushing touchdowns.

THIS WEEK: PATRIOTS VS. JETS

SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots and Jets will meet for the 90th time since the series between the AFC East rivals began in 1960. The Patriots have won five of the last six games between the teams, including a sweep of the two games last season. The Jets hold an overall edge in the series, but the Patriots lead the series 12-9 since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. The teams split the season series in 2001 and 2002, with all games being won by the visiting team in those years. New England will bid for its second consecutive season sweep of New York. If the Patriots defeat the Jets, it would mark just the second time in team history that they would own back-to-back sweeps over their rivals (also 1995-96). With their 90th meeting this week, the Jets tie the Buffalo Bills as the most frequent opponent in Patriots history. New England's 41 victories over the Jets (including one playoff win) are the third most over any single opponent, trailing only Buffalo (49 all-time wins) and Indianapolis (42).

CONNECTIONS

- Patriots head coach **Bill Belichick** was the Jets' assistant head coach/secondary for three seasons (1997-99).
- As head coach of the Cleveland Browns, Belichick hired **Mike Tannenbaum** as a personnel intern. He is now the Jets' assistant G.M./director of player personnel.
- Defensive coordinator **Romeo Crennel** was the defensive line coach for the Jets from 1997-99.
- Defensive line coach **Pepper Johnson** played for two seasons with the Jets, before retiring in 1999. In his first season with the Jets, he was voted captain before the start of the regular season.
- Defensive backs coach **Eric Mangini** served as the Jets defensive assistant/quality control coach from 1997-99.
- Special teams coach **Brad Seely** held the same position with the Jets in 1994.
- Offensive coordinator **Charlie Weis** coached for three seasons with the Jets (1997 - WRs, 1998 - Offensive Coordinator/WRs, 1999 - Offensive Coordinator/FBs).
- Patriots Vice President of Player Personnel **Scott Pioli** was the director of pro personnel for the Jets from 1997-1999.
- Patriots guard **Joe Andruzzi** is from Staten Island, N.Y., where he was an offensive and defensive tackle at Tottenville High School.
- Patriots linebacker **Don Davis** originally signed with the Jets as a rookie free agent in the spring of 1995.
- Patriots running back **Kevin Faulk** set a career-high with a 95-yard kickoff return vs. the Jets (11/15/99). It was the eighth longest return – and the longest non-scoring return – in franchise history.
- Patriots cornerback **Ty Law** scored his first touchdown, a 38-yard interception return against the Jets (12/08/96). He also recorded his first career fumble recovery (09/14/97) against the Jets.
- Patriots linebacker **Roman Phifer** signed with the Jets as an unrestricted free agent on March 5, 1999, and stayed with the organization for two seasons.
- While playing for the Carolina Panthers, Patriots cornerback **Tyrone Poole** snagged his first career interception in the franchise's first win, 26-15 over the Jets (10/15/95).
- Jets running back **Curtis Martin** was originally drafted by the Patriots in the third round (74th overall) of the 1995 NFL Draft. In his three seasons with New England, Martin appeared in 45 games with 43 starts.
- Jets defensive back **Jamie Henderson** was drafted in the fourth round (101st overall) of the 2001 draft in a selection from the Patriots as part of the compensation package for head coach **Bill Belichick**.
- Jets quarterback **Quincy Carter** and Patriots defensive lineman **Richard Seymour** and Patriots rookie tight end **Benjamin Watson** played their collegiate football together at the University of Georgia.
- Jets assistant special teams and assistant defensive backs coach **Corwin Brown** played safety for the Patriots from 1993-96 and was a member of the Patriots Super Bowl XXXI team.
- Patriots rookie defensive end **Vince Wilfork** and Jets rookie linebackers **Darrell McClover** and **Jonathan Vilma** played their collegiate football together on the University of Miami defensive unit.
- Injured Patriots defensive lineman **Dan Klecko** and Jets guard **Dave Yovanavits** both played at Temple before entering the NFL in 2003.
- Patriots second-year cornerback **Asante Samuel** recorded his first career interception when he picked off Vinny Testaverde and returned it 55 yards for the game-winning touchdown on Sept. 21, 2003.

BEAST OF THE EAST

New England has the best record among AFC East teams in division games since the beginning of the 2001 season (19-6). The New York Jets rank second with a 13-12 record and Miami is third with a 12-14 mark. Buffalo has an 8-18 record. In their last 22 divisional games, the Patriots are 18-4.

The New England Patriots notched their 21st consecutive victory, extending the professional football record they set against the Miami Dolphins on Oct. 10 and breaking the NFL record for consecutive regular-season victories (18).

The Patriots defense stepped up once again, holding the Jets to just seven points. The defense also held Jets running back Curtis Martin to 70 yards on the ground and receiver Santana Moss to just two catches for 12 yards on the day.

On the offensive side for the Patriots, Corey Dillon ran for 115 yards on 22 carries. David Givens led the way in receiving yardage with 107 yards on five receptions while Tom Brady connected on 20 of 29 passes for 230 yards.

The Patriots got on the board early when the offense marched 53 yards down the field on the opening possession of the game to set up Adam Vinatieri's 41-yard field goal to put the Patriots up 3-0. On the ensuing possession, the Jets made their way down to the Patriots 19-yard line, but a fumble by Jerald Sowell was recovered by Randall Gay to thwart the Jets' scoring threat. The Patriots took advantage of the turnover by orchestrating an 84-yard drive capped by Vinatieri's 27-yard field goal to give the Patriots a 6-0 lead.

On the next possession, Jets quarterback Chad Pennington completed seven passes for 54 yards, leading his team on a 78-yard drive ending with his 1-yard touchdown run to give the Jets a 7-6 lead. However, Brady and the Patriots quickly answered back, going into their two-minute offense with time ticking down in the second quarter. Brady took the Patriots 62 yards in 1:50 of clock time, striking Patten for a 7-yard touchdown to put the Patriots up 13-7.

The second half saw a defensive struggle as neither team could get on the board.

The Patriots fell to 12-2 on the season after allowing the Miami Dolphins to score two touchdowns in the game's final 2:07 in a 29-28 upset loss at Pro Player Stadium in South Florida. New England took a 28-17 lead on a Daniel Graham touchdown catch with 3:59 left in the game, but Miami responded with two quick touchdown drives to steal the victory on Monday Night Football.

Corey Dillon paced the Patriots with 121 rushing yards on 26 carries, while Tom Brady completed 18-of-29 passes for 171 yards and three touchdowns. But it was Brady's four interceptions that helped spell doom for the Patriots, as three of the picks came in the second half, including two in the game's final two minutes.

The game started out well for the Patriots, as they got the ball to start the game and promptly drove 77 yards on nine plays to take a 7-0 lead on a 31-yard touchdown reception by Kevin Faulk. The teams then traded three-and-outs, but as the Patriots punted back to the Dolphins, kick returner Wes Welker grabbed the ball and raced 72 yards to the New England 2-yard line to put Miami in prime scoring position. The Dolphins capitalized on the next play, a 2-yard plunge from Sammy Morris that tied the score at seven with 8:30 gone in the game.

The scoreboard remained stagnant through the first half of the second quarter before the Patriots broke through to take the lead. New England put together a 12-play drive that chewed up 50 yards and 6:48 on the clock, ending in a 3-yard touchdown run by Dillon that gave the Patriots a 14-7 lead. Miami responded by driving down to the Patriots' 12-yard line on the ensuing possession, but the New England defense held the Dolphins to a 30-yard field goal by Olindo Mare that closed the gap to 14-10. The next Patriots possession provided a harbinger of things to come, as a deep ball from Brady was intended for David Patten but was intercepted by Miami's Sammy Knight at the Dolphins' 21-yard line with 1:34 left in the half. New England's defense held tight, though, not allowing the Dolphins to capitalize on the turnover and sending the teams into halftime with the Patriots holding a 14-10 advantage.

The second half began fortuitously for the Patriots, as Miami's Chris Chambers fumbled on a botched reverse play and Vince Wilfork pounced on the loose ball to give the Patriots the ball near midfield. New England appeared to be in position to capitalize on the turnover, driving to earn a first down on the Dolphins' 20-yard line. But Brady was again intercepted by Knight, this time at the 10-yard line with 11:52 left in the third quarter. While New England could not produce points off of the Miami turnover, the Dolphins did not fall to the same fate. The home team took advantage of the interception to march down the field and take a 17-14 lead on a 1-yard touchdown run from Travis Minor. But the Patriots were not rattled by the deficit, using the ensuing possession to put together a 10-play, 71-yard drive that ended in a 2-yard pass from Brady to Dillon and a 21-17 Patriots lead with 2:15 left in the quarter. New England's defense then forced the half's first three-and-out series to return the ball to the Patriots offense, holding a 4-point lead heading into the final quarter.

After spending the first half of the fourth quarter swapping punts, the Patriots put together an 8-play, 65-yard touchdown drive that gave them a 28-17 advantage on a scoring catch by Daniel Graham with 4:06 left in the game. Miami responded by putting together a drive of its own, aided by an 18-yard pass interference penalty called on Rodney Harrison in the end zone. The penalty gave the Dolphins first-and-goal on the 1-yard line and they promptly punched the ball into the end zone on a run by Morris. A 2-point conversion bid failed, allowing the Patriots to maintain a 4-point lead, 28-23, with 2:13 left. Needing two

first downs to run out the clock and seal the game, the Patriots got the ball back but were forced into a third-down passing situation at their own 21-yard line with 1:52 remaining. On the third-and-nine play, Miami's Jason Taylor pressured Brady heavily, forcing a heave that was intercepted by Brendan Ayanbadejo and returned two yards to the New England 21. The Patriots defense proceeded to hold strong, forcing the Dolphins into a do-or-die fourth-down situation with Miami needing a touchdown to take the lead. The home team responded with a 21-yard touchdown pass from A.J. Feeley to Derrius Thompson, giving the Dolphins a 29-28 advantage with 1:29 to play. After Miami failed in another 2-point try, the Patriots were given a chance to potentially salvage the game with a field goal, but Brady's fourth interception of the night thwarted the bid for a last-minute comeback and gave the Dolphins the 1-point win.

IN THE (END) ZONE

New England has tied a team record with 15 touchdowns in their most recent three-game span. The only other time the Patriots scored that many touchdowns in a three-game period was in the franchise's inaugural season of 1960, when they saw the end zone 15 times from Nov. 4 to Nov. 18 of that season. The Patriots scored four touchdowns against Miami, marking their third consecutive game scoring four or more touchdowns. New England scored six touchdowns against Cleveland on Dec. 5 and followed that up with a five-touchdown performance against Cincinnati on Dec. 12, before seeing the end zone four times against Miami. Below is a comparison of the most productive three-game touchdown stretches in team annals.

The number of consecutive victories when leading after three quarters. Miami rebounded from a 21-17 deficit entering the fourth quarter. The last time New England had lost a game in which it had led entering the fourth quarter was on Dec. 24, 2000, when Miami rebounded from a 24-17 deficit to win 27-24.

The number of consecutive victories when the Patriots had scored 21 points or more. Prior to the Miami game, the last time New England lost when scoring 21 or more points was on Dec. 24, 2000, when Miami took a 27-24 victory at Foxboro Stadium.

LAST GAME: DOLPHINS 29, PATRIOTS 28

KEVIN FAULK

Kevin Faulk scored a touchdown for the third consecutive week on a 31-yard reception to end the Patriots' opening possession. The score was the eighth receiving touchdown of Faulk's career. He also has notched 10 rushing touchdowns and two kickoff returns for touchdowns in his career. Prior to his current run of three consecutive games with a touchdown, Faulk had not seen the end zone since returning a kickoff for a touchdown on Dec. 22, 2002.

COREY'S CAREER HIGH

Corey Dillon set a career high with his 11th touchdown run of the season, a 3-yard jaunt in the second quarter that gave the Patriots a 14-7 lead. Dillon's previous career high was 10 rushing scores, set in 1997 and also in 2001. His 11 rushing touchdowns are the most for a Patriot since Antowain Smith scored 12 times in 2001.

CENTURY MAN

Corey Dillon ran for 121 yards, giving him a career-high eight 100-yard games this season, tying him for the NFL lead. The Patriots record for 100-yard games in a season is nine, achieved by Curtis Martin in 1995. The three other NFL running backs with eight 100-yard games are LaDainian Tomlinson (San Diego), Tiki Barber (N.Y. Giants) and Curtis Martin (N.Y. Jets). In addition to his eight 100-yard games, Dillon had exceeded 85 yards in 12 of his 13 games on the season, and has run for at least 79 yards in each game in which he had appeared.

1,400-YARD MARK

On his 20-yard run in the third quarter, Corey Dillon exceeded 1,400 yards on the season, becoming just the third Patriot in history to run for more than 1,400 yards. Dillon joins Curtis Martin (1,487 yards in 1995) and Jim Nance (1,458 yards in 1966) as the only Patriots to break the 1,400 yard barrier.

COREY CATCHES TOUCHDOWNS

Corey Dillon grabbed a 2-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady in the third quarter, marking his first touchdown grab since the 2001 season. Dillon has already set a career high with 11 rushing touchdowns this season. He now has six career receiving touchdowns to go with 56 career rushing scores.

OUT IN FRONT

The Patriots added to their NFL record by scoring first in their 19th consecutive regular-season game. New England has bested the mark previously set by the 1978 Miami Dolphins, who scored first in 15 straight games. The last time New England did not get on the board first was on Nov. 23, 2003 at Houston, when the Texans jumped out to a 3-0 lead at Reliant Stadium in a game the Patriots eventually won 23-20 in overtime. New England also scored first in each of its three playoff games last season, raising their overall mark to 22 consecutive games scoring first, including playoffs. The Patriots' record includes 14 touchdowns and eight field goals.

FIRST QUARTER SCORING

The Patriots scored seven points in the first quarter, marking the 13th time in 14 games this season that New England has scored in the first quarter. New England holds an 87-48 scoring advantage in the first quarter this season. Miami scored a first-quarter touchdown, marking just the fourth time this season the Patriots have allowed their opponents to score in the first quarter.

SECOND QUARTER SCORING

The Patriots scored a touchdown in the second quarter, marking the 16th consecutive regular-season game in which they had put points on the board in the second quarter. Including the Miami game, the Patriots have not only scored, but scored a touchdown in the second quarter in 13 of 14 games this season and have notched a second-quarter touchdown in 15 of their last 16 regular-season games dating back to last season.

POINT MAN

Adam Vinatieri tied his career high with his 127th point of the season, scored on his final extra point of the game. Vinatieri also scored 127 points in 1998.

TOMMY TOUCHDOWNS

Tom Brady threw a 31-yard touchdown pass to Kevin Faulk in the first quarter, marking the 13th time in 14 games this season that he has thrown a touchdown. Dating back to last season and including the playoffs, Brady has thrown at least one touchdown in 19 of his last 20 games.

THREE TDs FOR BRADY

Tom Brady threw three touchdown passes against Miami, tying his season high set in the season opener against Indianapolis. Brady now has 24 touchdown passes on the season, four shy of his career high of 28, set in 2002. Brady has now thrown for three or more touchdowns 11 times in his regular-season career.

GREEN MACHINE

Jarvis Green sacked A.J. Feeley for a 9-yard loss in the first quarter, forcing him to fumble on the play (Miami recovered the loose ball). The sack gave Green a career-high 3.0 sacks for the season and 7.0 sacks in his regular-season career. The third-year defensive lineman has also recorded 2.5 postseason sacks.

SECOND-HALF DEFICIT

When Miami's Travis Minor scored on a 1-yard touchdown in the third quarter to give the Dolphins a 17-14 lead, it marked the first time the Patriots had trailed in the second half of a game since their loss at Pittsburgh on Oct. 31. The Miami game is just the third game in which the Patriots faced a second-half deficit all season, having trailed Indianapolis 17-13 in the second half of the season opener on Sept. 9 in addition to the Pittsburgh game.

GOLDEN GRAHAM

Daniel Graham grabbed a 2-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady in the fourth quarter, marking his sixth touchdown catch of the season and his first since Oct. 10 against Miami at Gillette Stadium. Graham scored at least one touchdown in each of the first four games of the season. He now has 11 career touchdowns.

GOOD POINTS

New England scored 28 points against Miami, marking the seventh time this season that the Patriots have scored 28 or more points in a game. The last time the Patriots broke the 28-point barrier that many times in a season was in 1996, when they also did it eight times en route to Super Bowl XXXI.

FOUR PICKS

Tom Brady threw four interceptions against Miami, tying his career high. Including the two picks Brady threw in the Patriots' loss at Pittsburgh, he has thrown a total of six interceptions in the Patriots' two losses. In contrast, he has thrown just seven total picks in the Patriots' 12 victories. Last season, Brady threw seven interceptions in the Patriots' two losses and just five picks in their 14 victories.

COACH'S CORNER

Below are Coach Belichick's postgame comments following the Miami game.

"Give Miami credit. They made the plays at the end of the game that they needed to make and we didn't make them. That is why they came out on top. We didn't do a good job in any of the three phases. We just need to play better. That is all there is to it. We just need to play better. We didn't make the plays that we needed to make at the end of the game. It wasn't lack of intensity, it was lack of execution. It wasn't any one play. It was a combination of things for the most part that went in Miami's favor and especially at the end of the game."

Bill Belichick is celebrating his 30th season as an NFL coach and is the winningest head coach in Patriots history in terms of overall victories (57) and winning percentage (.679). Belichick has spent more seasons in the league than any other current NFL head coach. He has been a part of four Super Bowl championship teams, including two world titles in his four previous seasons as Patriots head coach. Since 2001, the Patriots have blossomed, rattling off 52 wins in their last 68 games and making Belichick the winningest NFL head coach since the 2001 season. His overall record of 57-27 (including a 6-0 playoff mark) gives him the best winning percentage of any head coach in Patriots history.

BELICHICK'S PATRIOTS RENAISSANCE

Any successful project requires a sound plan, and once head coach Bill Belichick had the time to implement his design on the Patriots, his approach has given him the best record of any NFL head coach who has coached a full season since 2001. After the team endured a 5-11 rebuilding year in his first season, the fruits of Belichick's labor were put on display to the entire NFL, as his team posted an 11-5 record in 2001 and claimed the first Super Bowl title in franchise history. Since 2001, his plan has been in place in New England, and Belichick and the Patriots have compiled the best record in the NFL, winning two of the last three Super Bowls. The remarkable run includes postseason play, where Belichick and the Patriots own a perfect 6-0 record.

TOP BILLING

Bill Belichick is widely recognized as one of the NFL's premier head coaches, and recent polls have shown how his reputation has solidified. In an SI.com election day poll of more than 90,000 voters, Belichick was selected as the active coach (in any sport) that fans would most want to call their team's shots in a title game (Belichick received 35 percent of the vote, while Duke's Mike Krzyzewski ranked second with 27 percent). In addition, a Sports Illustrated poll of more than 300 NFL players revealed that Belichick was the coach that players would most like to play for, receiving 45 percent of the leaguewide vote.

THE KRAFT ERA

Since ROBERT KRAFT purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced a remarkable reversal of fortunes. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund franchise that had won just 19 of 80 games (.311 pct.). In the early 1990s, the franchise appeared destined for relocation until Kraft bought the team and rejuvenated local interest. By the start of the 1994 season, every game was a complete sellout. Ten seasons later, the consecutive sellout streak is now at 113 and counting. **Since Kraft took ownership, the Patriots have won more conference championships than any other team in the NFL, claiming three AFC titles in the past eight seasons.**

The Patriots clinched their eighth division title with their 35-28 win over the Bengals on Dec. 12, coupled with the New York Jets' loss to Pittsburgh on the same day. It is New England's fifth division title in the 11 seasons since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994. The Patriots have clinched the division title with games remaining on the schedule for the third time in team history and for the second consecutive season. New England wrapped up the AFC East on Dec. 10, 1978, with one game left in the season and clinched last year's crown on Dec. 7 against Miami with three games left on the slate. Four of the Patriots' division titles were clinched on the final day of the season, with a fifth being clinched in a tie-breaking playoff game in 1963.

SNAPSHOTS OF SUCCESS

New England's NFL-record 21-game winning streak is over, but the Patriots are still in the midst of one of the most prosperous periods for any team in NFL history. The recent run of success began with a 29-26 overtime victory against the San Diego Chargers on Oct. 14, 2001, sparking a streak of 51 wins in the Patriots' last 64 games. The Patriots entered that contest with a 1-3 record, and Tom Brady was making just the third start of his career against a 3-1 San Diego team. New England rallied back from a 26-16 deficit with less than four minutes left in the game, beginning a stretch of 13 wins in the final 15 games of the 2001 season as the Patriots won their first title in Super Bowl XXXVI. OUT IN FRONT

The Patriots have scored first in an NFL-record 19 consecutive regular-season games. New England has bested the mark previously set by the 1978 Miami Dolphins, who scored first in 15 straight games. The last time New England did not get on the board first was on Nov. 23, 2003 at Houston, when the Texans jumped out to a 3-0 lead at Reliant Stadium in a game the Patriots eventually won 23-20 in overtime. New England also scored first in each of its three playoff games last season, raising their overall mark to 22 consecutive games scoring first, including playoffs. The Patriots' record includes 14 touchdowns and eight field goals.

HOT WHEN IT'S COLD

Since 1993, the Patriots are 18-2 when the kickoff temperature is 35 degrees or colder. Last season, the Patriots played seven games in temperatures 35 or lower, winning all seven contests.

SIX PACK

In its Week 13 win at Cleveland, New England scored six touchdowns, recording the most in a game since the Patriots also found the end zone six times on Dec. 1, 1996 in a 45-7 win at San Diego. The Cleveland game marked the fifth time in team history the Patriots had scored six touchdowns on the road, tying the team's all-time road mark for touchdowns in a game. The game marked the 17th time in the Patriots' 695-game history that they scored six or more touchdowns. New England has scored six or more touchdowns in just four games in the last 20 years. The club record for touchdowns in a game is eight, accomplished twice against the New York Jets at Schaefer Stadium: on Sept. 9, 1979 in a 56-3 win and on Oct. 29, 1978 in a 55-21 victory. The Cleveland game marked the 13th time in franchise annals that the Patriots have scored exactly six touchdowns.

HOME SWEET HOME

The Patriots have recorded a 22-3 (.880) all-time record at Gillette Stadium, including regular-season and postseason games. New England has won 18 consecutive regular-season and postseason contests at home, compiling the longest current home winning streak in the NFL. New England has not lost at home since a 30-17 defeat to the New York Jets on Dec. 22, 2002. The Patriots' .880 winning percentage at Gillette Stadium is the highest of any NFL team at its current home.

ON POINT

The Patriots are in the midst of one of the most productive offensive seasons in team history. Through 14 games, the Patriots have scored 393 points, ranking third in the NFL with an average of 28.1 points per game. The Patriots are on pace to score 449 points in 2004, a total that would set a franchise record for scoring in a season. New England has scored more than 30 points in five games this season and has exceeded the 40-point plateau in two contests. The Patriots have been especially productive during the team's last seven games, averaging 32.1 points per game over that period.

NET RUSHING SUCCESS

In their Week 13 win at Cleveland, the Patriots gained a total of 225 net rushing yards (50 attempts). It was the highest number of rushing yards for the Patriots in nearly 12 years, dating back to a 257-yard performance against Indianapolis on Dec. 26, 1993. In that game, a 38-0 Patriots victory in arctic conditions at Foxboro Stadium (19 degrees with a 33 mph wind), Leonard Russell paced the Patriots with 138 yards on 26 carries. The Cleveland game marks just the second time since 1985 that the Patriots have gained 225 yards or more on the ground. Prior to that 1993 game, the last time the Patriots gained 225 or more rushing yards in a regular-season game was on Dec. 22, 1985, when they ground out 281 yards against Cincinnati in a 34-23 win at Sullivan Stadium.

GETTING DEFENSIVE

In their game against Baltimore on Nov. 28, the Patriots held the Ravens to just 124 total net yards and zero touchdowns on the day, New England's most stifling defensive performance of the season. The 124 yards was the fewest allowed by the Patriots defense in 2004, one yard less than the 125 yards Buffalo was able to gain on the Patriots on Nov. 14 at Gillette Stadium. It was the second time this season that the Patriots did not allow an offensive touchdown, with the other zero-touchdown game also coming against the Bills at home. Taking into account the Bills and Ravens games, the Patriots allowed a total of just 249 net yards and no offensive touchdowns in back-to-back home games.

OFFENSE FROM DEFENSE

The Patriots have scored four defensive touchdowns this season and are 16-2 in their last 18 games when scoring on defense, dating back to 1999. Last season, the Patriots led the NFL with six defensive touchdowns, and New England has now recorded 10 defensive touchdowns in its last 27 games, dating back to Week Three of the 2003 season. NOT HALF BAD

One of the keys to New England's recent success has been the ability to close out victories by protecting second-half leads. The Patriots recently set the NFL's post-merger record with 31 consecutive victories in games in which they led at halftime, preserving every halftime lead they held from Oct. 28, 2001 until falling victim to a fourth-quarter rally by the Miami Dolphins on Dec. 20, 2004. New England also set the NFL mark with 38 straight wins in games in which they led after three quarters, protecting every lead over nearly a four-year span from Dec. 24, 2000 until the Miami loss on Dec. 20, 2004. During their streaks, the Patriots came back to win six times when facing a halftime deficit and four times when trailing entering the fourth quarter.

LAST-MINUTE MAN

ADAM VINATIERI nailed his second Super Bowl-winning field goal, booting a 41-yarder through the uprights with four seconds left to give the Patriots a 32-29 victory over Carolina in Super Bowl XXXVIII. He is the only kicker in NFL history to kick a game-winning field goal in the final minute of the Super Bowl and has accomplished the feat twice, including his 48-yarder to win Super Bowl XXXVI. Out of the Patriots' six playoff wins since 2001, four were decided on game-winning boots by Vinatieri. SUCCESS STREAK

ADAM VINATIERI enters this week's action having connected on each of his last 21 field goals, recording the second-longest success streak in team history. GIVENS LEADS THE WAY

Through 13 games this season, DAVID GIVENS is New England's leading receiver, pacing the team with a career-high 52 receptions and 780 yards. Last season, Givens tied for the team's postseason lead with 17 catches on the heels of a 34-catch regular season. Givens has exceeded the 100-yard receiving mark four times this season, becoming the first Patriot to record four 100-yard games in a season since Terry Glenn did it in 1999. He got his first career 100-yard game at Arizona on Sept. 19, 2004 (120 yards), then followed that with three consecutive century-mark games against the N.Y. Jets (10/24) at Pittsburgh (10/31) and at St. Louis (11/7).

MR. FIRST DOWN

DAVID GIVENS' first 30 catches this season all resulted in first downs for the Patriots, and 43 of his 52 catches to date have recorded first downs. New England's leading receiver is averaging 15.0 yards per catch, and has shown a knack for the big play, grabbing three passes of more than 40 yards and 11 passes of 20 yards or more.

RECORD PACE

1,400-YARD MARK

Corey Dillon has recorded 1,430 rushing yards this season, giving him the third 1,400-yard season in the 45-year history of the Patriots franchise. Dillon's yardage total is the third highest total in franchise history. Dillon trails just Curtis Martin (1,487 yards in 1995) and Jim Nance (1,458 yards in 1966) in the Patriots record book, and is on pace to set the team's all-time mark with 1,650 yards this season.

BREAKING THE BARRIER

On his 5-yard run in the first quarter against Baltimore on Nov. 28, COREY DILLON passed the 1,000-yard mark in just his 10th game of the season, achieving the milestone in the fewest games of any rusher in Patriots history. The previous team record was set by Curtis Martin in 1997 and Jim Nance in 1966, both of whom passed the 1,000-yard mark in their 11th game. BALANCED ATTACK

Corey Dillon and David Givens have each gained 100 yards in the same game three times this season, marking the only times since 1997 that the Patriots have had a 100-yard rusher and a 100-yard receiver in the same game. Dillon and Givens both broke the 100-yard mark in their respective categories at Arizona (9/19), against the N.Y. Jets (10/24) and at St. Louis (11/7). Prior to this season, the last time the Patriots achieved the feat was on Nov. 2, 1997, when Curtis Martin ran for 104 yards and Shawn Jefferson gained 108 receiving yards at Minnesota.

HE RATE ME

TOM BRADY has earned six passer ratings over 100.0 this season and has done so 22 times in his career. All of Brady's 22 career 100.0-plus ratings have come in Patriots victories. COMEBACK KID

TOM BRADY has engineered 16 game-winning drives to break a tie or take the lead in the fourth quarter or overtime in his career. He has accomplished the feat twice in the Super Bowl, most recently engineering a 47-yard drive with just over a minute remaining to lead the Patriots to victory in Super Bowl XXXVIII. He led seven comebacks in 2003, including a fourth-quarter comeback to break a 14-14 tie against Tennessee in the AFC Divisional Playoffs in addition to comebacks against Houston, Indianapolis, Miami, Tennessee and Denver in the regular season. Brady's record also includes his dramatic performance to lead the Patriots to victory in Super Bowl XXXVI and his heroics in the snow against the Oakland Raiders in the 2001 Divisional Playoffs, giving him four comebacks in six postseason starts.

Tom Brady has compiled a sparkling 18-2 record as a starter in games where the final margin was less than a touchdown, including a 4-0 postseason record in such games. In games decided by three points or fewer, Brady is 12-2. In the 2003 season, Brady led the team to nine victories by six points or fewer, including two in the playoffs. TOM BRADY recorded the 1,000th completion of his career on a 13-yard toss to Corey Dillon in the first quarter against Buffalo on Oct. 3. Brady becomes the fourth Patriots passer to join the 1,000-completion club, joining Drew Bledsoe, Steve Grogan and Vito "Babe" Parilli.

CAREER NUMBERS

TOM BRADY ranks fourth among Patriots' all-time leading passers, and is the franchise's all-time leader in completion percentage. Law and Clayborn are the only two Patriots to record 30 or more picks in a Patriots uniform. WILLIE MAC ATTACK

WILLIE MCGINEST ranks fourth on the Patriots' all-time sacks list with 71.0 career sacks. He leads the team with 8.5 sacks through 14 games in the 2004 season, continuing a run of strong play dating back to late last year. Including his NFL-leading 5.0 sacks in the 2003 postseason, McGinest has recorded 15.0 sacks in his last 17 games, 15.5 sacks in his last 19 games and 16.5 sacks in his last 21 games. He is the Patriots' career postseason sack leader and ranks third all-time in NFL postseason history with 11.5 career postseason sacks, trailing only Bruce Smith (14.5) and Reggie White (12.0). The Patriots' all-time regular-season sack leaders are listed below.

BLUE STREAK

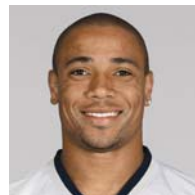
RANDALL "BLUE" GAY scored his first career touchdown on a 41-yard fumble return in the third quarter at Cleveland on Dec. 5. Gay scooped up a William Green fumble caused by Richard Seymour and used the whole field to elude Cleveland defenders and reach the end zone. It was the Patriots' third fumble recovery for a touchdown in 2004 and the second in two weeks.

HAPPY RETURNS

BETHEL JOHNSON recorded his second career kickoff return for a touchdown when he returned the opening kickoff 93 yards for a score at Cleveland on Dec. 5. It was the longest kickoff return of Johnson's two-year career and the longest kickoff return for a Patriot since Kevin Faulk returned one 95 yards against the New York Jets on Nov. 14, 1999. The last time the Patriots had a kickoff returned for a touchdown was when Johnson scampered 92 yards for a score at Indianapolis on Nov. 30, 2003.

HOT ROD

RODNEY HARRISON leads the Patriots with 125 tackles (89 solo) and continues to be a leader in the New England secondary. Harrison also has recorded 3.0 sacks, putting him halfway to his career high of 6.0 sacks, set with the San Diego Chargers in 2000. He recorded a career-high 20 tackles (12 solo) at Pittsburgh on Oct. 31, 2004. In 2003, his first season in New England, Harrison led the team with a career-high 140 tackles (105 solo) and is on pace to beat that mark with 143 tackles this season.



BIG PLAY BRUSCHI

TEDY BRUSCHI has forced two fumbles this season, and both have been recovered for touchdowns by the Patriots. Against the Ravens on Nov. 28, Bruschi sacked Kyle Boller for an 18-yard loss and forced him to fumble in the fourth quarter. The ball rolled into the end zone, where Jarvis Green pounced on it for a touchdown and a 24-3 Patriots lead. The sack gave Bruschi 2.5 sacks on the season, and the forced fumble was his second of the year. Bruschi's other forced fumble came against Buffalo on Oct. 3, when he stripped the ball from Drew Bledsoe on a rushing play and Richard Seymour recovered the ball and returned it 68 yards for a score. Bruschi has a solid history of creating turnovers that become touchdowns. From 2002-03, he became the first player in NFL history to return four consecutive interceptions for touchdowns.

"BIG SEY" SEES THE ZONE

Two-time Pro Bowl defensive lineman RICHARD SEYMOUR scored his first career touchdown on Oct. 3 at Buffalo, scooping up a Drew Bledsoe fumble caused by Tedy Bruschi and rumbling 68 yards for the score and a decisive 31-17 advantage for the Patriots. Seymour became the first Patriots defensive lineman to score a touchdown since Willie McGinest recovered a fumble in the end zone in a 30-28 win over the New York Jets in the 1999 season opener. Fellow lineman Jarvis Green followed Seymour's feat with a touchdown of his own on a fumble recovery in the end zone on Nov. 28 against Baltimore.

MEAN GENE

EUGENE WILSON is tied for the team lead with three interceptions this season. Two of his picks came against Arizona on Sept. 19, marking the first multiple-pick game of his career. All of Wilson's interceptions this season have kick-started Patriots scoring drives, with the team notching 17 points off of his three picks. Last year, Wilson tied for the NFL rookie lead with four picks and the Patriots led the NFL with 29 interceptions.

A SPECIAL PLAYER

LARRY IZZO leads the team with 25 special teams tackles and has led his team in special teams stops in each of his last five NFL seasons. Since pacing the Miami Dolphins with 33 special teams tackles in 1999, the two-time Pro Bowler has set the mark on his team in every season since then, including every year since he joined the Patriots in 2001. He has recorded 97 special teams tackles in a Patriots uniform over the last three-plus seasons and is in his fourth consecutive year as New England's special teams captain.

GREEN MACHINE

JARVIS GREEN scored his first career touchdown against the Ravens on Nov. 28 on a fumble recovery in the end zone that gave the Patriots a commanding 24-3 lead. Green scooped up the ball after Tedy Bruschi forced Baltimore signal caller Kyle Boller to fumble following an 18-yard sack. Before the Ravens game, the last time the Patriots recovered a fumble in the end zone for a touchdown was on Sept. 12, 1999, when Willie McGinest pounced on a loose ball in the Patriots' 30-28 win over the New York Jets at Giants Stadium.



BROKEN RECORD: 21 WINS IN A ROW

BROKEN RECORD

The Patriots recorded a one-game winning streak 21 consecutive times, setting an all-time record for the 85-year history of pro football. Using their game-by-game, week-by-week approach to remain focused, the Patriots did not lose a game for more than a year. Following a 20-17 loss at Washington on Sept. 28, 2003, the Patriots did not lose for 398 days, until the streak was snapped in a 34-20 loss at Pittsburgh on Oct. 31, 2004.
