NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (1-1) at PITTSBURGH STEELERS (2-0)

Sunday, September 25, 2005 ★ Heinz Field (64,350) ★ 4:15 p.m. EDT

The New England Patriots will travel to the Steel City for the third time in less than a year to face the Pittsburgh Steelers for the first time since last season's AFC Championship Game. The matchup features a plethora of storylines, as the rich recent history between the two clubs will ensure that this week's contest is one of the most anticipated games of the year in both Western Pennsylvania and New England. The last time the Patriots played in Pittsburgh during the regular season, New England entered the game with an NFL-record 21-game winning streak. This time, it is the Steelers that are on a winning run, having claimed victory in 16 consecutive regular-season contests. That mark is just two wins shy of the all-time regular-season record (18) held by the Patriots - the very same streak that the Steelers snapped less than 11 months ago.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be televised to a regional audience by CBS and can be seen in Boston on WBZ Channel 4. Jim Nantz will handle play-by-play duties and will be joined by analyst Phil Simms. Bonnie Bernstein will provide sideline reports throughout the game.

RADIO: WBCN 104.1 FM is the flagship station for the Patriots Rock Radio Network. A complete listing of the network's 34 stations can be found in this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster Gil Santos is in his his 28th season as the voice of the Patriots and will call the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer Gino Cappelletti. Santos and Cappelletti are celebrating their 21st season as a broadcast tandem.

NATIONAL RADIO: This week's game will be broadcast nationally by Westwood One/CBS Radio Sports. Dave Sims and Jack Ham will call the game.

ONE MORE TIME

Each time the Patriots have played in the AFC Championship Game, they have had at least one rematch with their title tilt foes the following regular season. New England has won all five such previous rematches and have also won all five of their AFC Championship Game appearances.

PATRIOTS VS. STEELERS

SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots and Steelers will square off for the fifth time in five seasons, for the 10th time in 11 seasons and for the third time in less than a calendar year. The two teams played just eight months ago in the AFC Championship Game, a contest won by the Patriots after suffering a loss to Pittsburgh in the 2004 regular season that ended New England's NFL-record 21-game winning streak. The recent rivalry between the teams



began in 2001, when New England scored a 24-17 upset win at Heinz Field in the AFC Championship Game as part of New England's first Super Bowl run. The teams followed that memorable matchup in the grand opening of Gillette Stadium in 2002, with the Patriots breaking in their new home with 30-14 win

on Monday Night Football. The Patriots have

won four of the last five meetings dating back to the 1998 season. Of the previous 21 games in the series, 15 have been played in Pittsburgh, where the Steelers own a 9-5 advantage. New England, however, has won the two playoff meetings at Heinz Field in the 2001 and 2004 AFC Championship Games.

- > Patriots linebacker **Chad Brown** was drafted by the Steelers in 1993 and played in Pittsburgh for four seasons, going to the Pro Bowl as a Steeler in 1996.
- > Chad Brown and Steelers cornerback Willie Williams were teammates in Seattle from 1997-2003. Williams and Patriots tight end Chrsitian Fauria were also teammates in Seattle from 1997-2001.
- > Patriots linebacker Mike Vrabel played in 51 games for Pittsburgh from 1997-2000. He totaled 43 tackles, including seven sacks while with the Steelers.
- > Patriots running back **Kevin Faulk** played with Steelers guard Alan Faneca at Louisiana State from 1995 to 1997.
- > Patriots defensive lineman Richard Seymour and Steelers receiver Hines Ward were teammates at Georgia in 1997.
- > Patriots cornerback Chad Scott was drafted by the Steelers in 1997 and spent the first eight years of his career in Pittsburgh before he was signed by the Patriots in 2005.
- > Patriots running back Corey Dillon and Steelers defensive lineman Kimo von Oelhoffen were teammates in Cincinnati from 1997 to 1999.
- > Patriots offensive linemen Matt Light and Brandon Gorin played on the same offensive line at Purdue with Steelers center Chukky Okobi. Okobi was also a teammate of Patriots linebacker Rosevelt Colvin at Purdue.
- > Patriots quarterback **Tom Brady** threw passes to Steelers tight end Jerame Tuman when the two were teammates at Michigan in 1998.
- Patriots punter Josh Miller played for the Steelers for eight years, from 1996-2003.
- > Patriots linebacker Tully Banta-Cain and Steelers cornerback Chidi Iwuoma played on the same defense for California in 1999 and 2000.
- > Steelers linebacker James Farrior was coached by Bill Belichick when Farrior was with the New York Jets from 1997-1999

The Patriots improved to 5-0 in AFC Championship Games and advanced to Super Bowl XXXIX with a 41-27 victory over the Steelers in Pittsburgh. New England set a franchise playoff record with 41 points against a Steelers team that featured the NFL's top-ranked defense.

The Patriots defense recorded four takeaways, with three interceptions and a fumble recovery leading to 24 points off turnovers. Rodney Harrison returned a second-quarter interception 87 yards for a touchdown, while Eugene Wilson's two picks each set up Patriots scoring drives. On offense, quarterback Tom Brady was an efficient 14-for-21 for 207 yards and two touchdowns, while New England's rushing attack also netted two touchdowns and totaled 126 yards.

The Patriots took control of the game early by forcing Pittsburgh turnovers on each of its first two drives and turning the miscues into a 10-0 lead. The Steelers got the ball first, but Wilson intercepted Ben Roethlisberger's second pass of the night to give the Patriots possession at Pittsburgh's 48-yard line. New England took advantage of the opportunity with an Adam Vinatieri field goal. On the Steelers' next possession, they moved the ball into New England territory but Rosevelt Colvin stripped Jerome Bettis on fourth-and-one and Mike Vrabel recovered the loose ball. Brady wasted no time capitalizing, hitting Deion Branch in stride for a 60-yard touchdown pass on the next play, giving New England a 10-0 lead just 8:11 into the game. Pittsburgh broke onto the scoreboard late in the first quarter on a 43-yard field goal by Jeff Reed, cutting the Patriots lead to 10-3.

In the second quarter, New England used another long hookup between Brady and Branch to extend its lead. This time, the pair's 45-vard completion helped set up a 9-yard touchdown grab by David Givens that made the score 17-3. On the Steelers' ensuing possession, Roethlisberger drove the team deep into Patriots territory, cracking into the New England red zone for the first time. But with Pittsburgh facing a second-and-six at the Patriots' 19-yard line, Rodney Harrison stepped in front of Roethlisberger's pass, picked it off, and returned it 87 yards for a touchdown and a 24-3 Patriots lead. New England stopped Pittsburgh once more before halftime to take a three-touchdown lead into the break.

The Steelers chipped into the Patriots' lead on their first possession of the third quarter with an efficient 5-play drive that covered 56 yards and ended in a 5-yard touchdown run by Jerome Bettis that made the score 24-10. On the next possession, the Patriots responded with a rushing score of their own, as a 25-yard Corey Dillon touchdown run extended the Patriots' advantage to 31-10. However, the Steelers kept up their offensive momentum, firing back with a 10-play, 60-yard drive that ended in a 30-yard scoring pass from Roethlisberger to Hines Ward, making the score 31-17.

The final guarter began with another solid Steelers drive, as Pittsburgh gained a first-and-goal from the Patriots' 4-yard line. But the New England defense held tough, stopping Bettis twice for 1-yard gains and batting down a pass in the end zone to force a 20-yard field goal that made the score 31-20. Vinatieri booted another field goal, this time from 31 yards out, to end the Patriots' next drive and raise the advantage to 34-20. On Pittsburgh's ensuing possession, Wilson came up with his second interception, giving New England the ball near midfield. Once again, New England converted the turnover into points, upping its lead to 41-20 on a 23-yard scoring run by Branch on a reverse with 2:32 remaining in the game. Pittsburgh found the end zone on a 7-yard touchdown from Roethlisberger to Plaxico Burress in the final minute, but the Patriots were able to run out the clock and punch their ticket to Jacksonville for Super Bowl XXXIX.

PASSING PERFORMANCES

Tom Brady is 3-1 as a starter against Pittsburgh, helping lead New England to victories in the 2001 and 2004 playoffs and also in the 2002 season opener. The Patriots will face Ben Roethlisberger for the third time. New England's victory over the Steelers in the 2004 AFC title game was Roethlisberger's only loss as a starting quarterback in the NFL.

PATRIOTS-STEELERS QUICK HITS

- > The Patriots will travel to Pittsburgh to play the Steelers for the third time in less than a calendar year (10/31/04, 01/23/05, 09/25/05). It is just the second time in team history that the Patriots will play three road games against the same team in the same city in regular season or postseason play in less than a one-year span. The other occurrence was in 1985-86, when New England played the New York Jets three times in East Rutherford, N.J. (11/24/85, 12/28/85, 09/11/86).
- > The Steelers enter this week's game with 16 consecutive regular-season victories. The Patriots hold the all-time NFL record with 18 consecutive regular-season wins, a streak that was broken by the Steelers in a 34-20 decision at Heinz Field on Oct. 31, 2004.

THIS WEEK IN PATRIOTS HISTORY **September 19 – 25**

Sept. 22, 1968— Due to a scheduling conflict at Fenway Park, the nomadic Boston Patriots play the New York Jets in a "home" game at Legion Field in Birmingham, Ala. The Patriots drop a 47-31 decision before 29,192 fans.

Sept. 23, 1970— Ground-breaking ceremonies are held in Foxborough to inaugurate the construction of the Patriots' new stadium. Schaefer/Sullivan/Foxboro Stadium served as the team's home from 1971-2001.

Sept. 19, 1971— The Patriots defeat the Oakland Raiders, 20-6, in the first regular-season game played at the new Schaefer Stadium in Foxborough.

Sept. 24, 1972— New England mounts a dramatic comeback with two fourth-quarter touchdowns against the Atlanta Falcons at Schaefer Stadium, rallying from a 20-7 fourth-quarter deficit for a 21-20 win.

Sept. 25, 1983— The Patriots record a 28-23 win over the Steelers in Pittsburgh, predating this year's matchup between the same teams in the same city by exactly 22 years. The Patriots clinch a dramatic win when Stephen Starring hauls in a 76-yard touchdown pass from Steve Grogan with less than four minutes to play in the game.

Sept. 23, 1990— The Patriots drop a 41-7 decision to the Bengals in Cincinnati, beginning a 14-game losing streak to end the 1990 season with a 1-15 record.

Sept. 19, 1999— Adam Vinatieri nails a game-winning 26-yard field goal with 35 seconds left as the Patriots defeat the Indianapolis Colts, 31-28, at Foxboro Stadium.

Sept. 22, 2002— Wide receiver Troy Brown establishes a singlegame franchise record with 16 receptions in the Patriots' 41-38 overtime victory over the Kansas City Chiefs at Gillette Stadium.















Home of the Three-Time Super Bowl Champions

Home Winning Streak (Including Postseason): 21 Games Overall record at Gillette Stadium: 25-3



The Patriots and their fans at Gillette Stadium have established one of the biggest home-field advantages in the country. Since its Grand Opening on Sept. 9, 2002, the Patriots have compiled a 25-3 record at their privately financed, state-of-the art stadium. Patriots fans have embraced the team's new home with unprecedented fervor, using the most fan-friendly venue in the region to express their passion for the Patriots and spur the team on to unparalleled success. In the three-plus seasons that New England has called Gillette Stadium home, the Patriots have won two AFC East titles, hosted the second AFC Championship Game in franchise history and are 3-0 in home playoff games.

HOME SWEET HOME

The Patriots have recorded a 25-3 (.893) all-time record at Gillette Stadium, including regular-season and postseason games. New England has won 21 consecutive regular-season and postseason contests at home, compiling the longest current home winning streak in the NFL. New England has not lost at home since a 30-17 defeat to the New York Jets on Dec. 22, 2002. The Patriots' .893 winning percentage at Gillette Stadium is the highest of any NFL team at its current home.

HOME WINNING STREAK: 21 GAMES

The Patriots have not lost at home in more than two full calendar years. Since Dec. 29, 2002, the calendar has turned around twice, bringing all kinds of weather to Gillette Stadium, but one thing as remained constant - every game has resulted in a Patriots victory.

PATRIOTS NEWS & NOTES

THE KRAFT ERA

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In just 11 seasons of ownership, he has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately



preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.311 pct.) and recording the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won five division titles, four conference crowns and three Super Bowl championships. Since Kraft took ownership, the Patriots are 12-4 in the playoffs and have won more Super Bowl championships than any other team in the NFL.

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have been one of the NFL's elite teams. Over the first 11 years of Kraft's ownership, the Patriots' aggregate record ranks third among all NFL teams - a remarkable record considering the fact that the Patriots were a combined 19-61 (.311) in the four years immediately preceding the purchase. Bill Belichick is now in his 31st season as an NFL coach and is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl titles in a four-year span. Belichick owns the best postseason record in NFL history and is the winningest NFL head coach since 2001. In 2004, he directed the Patriots to their second consecutive Super Bowl title on the heels of a 14-win campaign. In addition, his 2004 squad equaled the best record in NFL history for a defending Super Bowl champion, and from 2003-04 his teams set the all-time pro football record with 21 consecutive victories. Belichick has spent more seasons in the league than any other current NFL head coach, and in that time has been a part of five Super Bowl championship teams. His overall record of 63-28 with the Patriots (including a 9-0 playoff mark in New England) gives him the most victories and the best winning percentage of any head coach in franchise history.

SNAPSHOTS OF SUCCESS

The Patriots are in the midst of one of the most prosperous periods for any team in NFL history. The recent run of success began with a 29-26 overtime victory against the San Diego Chargers on Oct. 14, 2001, sparking a streak of 57 wins in the Patriots' last 71 games, including postseason. The Patriots entered that contest with a 1-3 record, and Tom Brady was making just the third start of his career against a 3-1 San Diego team. New England rallied back from a 26-16 deficit with less than four minutes left in the game, beginning a stretch of 13 wins in the final 15 games of the 2001 season as the Patriots won their first title in Super Bowl XXXVI. BOUNCING BACK

The Patriots have not lost back-to-back games since December, 2002. Their streak of 35 consecutive weeks without back-toback losses is the longest current streak in the NFL and the longest such mark in franchise history. SCORING MACHINE

ADAM VINATIERI is the second leading scorer in Patriots history, totaling 1,069 points in his nine-plus seasons with the club. WILLIE MAC ATTACK

WILLIE McGINEST ranks fourth on the Patriots' all-time sacks list with 72.0 career sacks. He led the team with 9.5 sacks in the 2004 season. He is the Patriots' career postseason sack leader and ranks third all-time in NFL postseason history with 11.5 career postseason sacks, trailing only Bruce Smith (14.5) and



Reggie White (12.0). The Patriots' all-time regular-season sack leaders are listed below.

BIG-TIME BACKERS

Patriots linebackers take up four of the top seven spots on the NFL's career sacks list among active linebackers. Chad Brown, a free agent signing by the Patriots prior to the 2005 season, leads all active linebackers with 78.0 career sacks. He is trailed closely by teammate Willie McGinest, whose 72.0 career sacks have all come as a Patriot. Additionally, Rosevelt Colvin (34.0 sacks) and Mike Vrabel (30.5 sacks) rank sixth and seventh, respectively, among all active linebackers.

ABLE VRABEL

In proving to be one of the NFL's most versatile players, linebacker MIKE VRABEL has made important contributions for the Patriots on offense and defense. He scored his sixth career touchdown – but his first on defense – on a 24-yard interception return against Carolina in Week Two. As a situational tight end in short-yardage situations, he caught two touchdown passes in the 2004 regular season and another in Super Bowl XXXIX. Including his 1-yard touchdown catch in Super Bowl XXXVIII, Vrabel has scored on all five of his NFL receptions, two of which came in Super Bowls. Vrabel's other touchdowns in 2004 came on a 2-yard catch at St. Louis on Nov. 7, 2004, a 1-yard score against San Francisco on Jan. 2, 2005. He also scored on a 1yard grab at San Diego on Sept. 29, 2002. At his regular position of linebacker, he ranked second on the team in 2004 with 5.5 sacks and finished fourth on the team with 76 tackles (59 solo). In addition to Vrabel's contributions on offense and defense, he also notched five special teams tackles in 2004.

RICHARD SEYMOUR: "BIG SEY"

Defensive lineman RICHARD SEYMOUR was named to his third consecutive Pro Bowl in 2004 and was voted a defensive captain by his teammates. His 67 tackles and 5.0 sacks were tops among Patriots defensive linemen. His 217 tackles since 2002 lead all Patriots defensive linemen. In addition, he scored his first career touchdown on Oct. 3, 2004 at Buffalo, scooping up a Drew Bledsoe fumble caused by Tedy Bruschi and rumbling 68 yards for the score and a decisive 31-17 advantage for the Patriots. Seymour became the first Patriots defensive lineman to score a touchdown since Willie McGinest recovered a fumble in the end zone in a 30-28 win over the New York Jets in the 1999 season opener.

HOT ROD

Last season, RODNEY HARRISON led the Patriots in tackles for the second consecutive year, recording 138 stops (96 solo), as he continued to be a leader in the New England secondary. His tackle total was just two stops short of his career high, set in 2003 in his first year in New England. In his two-plus seasons in Foxborough, Harrison has



notched 293 tackles, marking the most productive stretch of his 11-year NFL career. He recorded a career-high 20 tackles (12 solo) at Pittsburgh on Oct. 31, 2004. In 2003, Harrison led the team with a career-high 140 tackles (105 solo).

HARRISON LEADS ALL NFL DEFENSIVE BACKS

Rodney Harrison led all NFL defensive backs in tackles for two straight seasons and has recorded more tackles than any other NFL defensive back since 1994. According to the day-of-game statisticians, Harrison recorded 129 tackles (89 solo) in 2004, tops among all defensive backs in the NFL. His tackle total ranked ninth among all NFL players, trailing only eight middle linebackers. In 2003, Harrison was credited with 125 total tackles by day-of-game crews, a figure that also led all NFL defensive backs.

The Patriots dropped their first game of the 2005 campaign, falling to the Panthers in Charlotte, 27-17. New England lost for just the third time in 36 games and fell to an NFC team for the first time since losing to Washington on Sept. 28, 2003.

The New England defense played solidly against the Panthers' passing attack, holding Carolina signal caller Jake Delhomme to just a 42.3 percent completion rate (11-26) and 154 yards with an interception. But Panthers running back Stephen Davis scored three touchdowns and Carolina forced two costly Patriots turnovers to provide the difference in the game.

The Patriots got on the board first, taking a 7-0 lead on a 1-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Daniel Graham. The play was set up by a 71-yard catch-and-run play by Troy Brown, the longest Patriots reception in nearly two seasons. The New England lead was short-lived, however, as the Panthers offense came out firing on the ensuing drive. Delhomme completed back-to-back passes of 23 and 41 yards to set up the first of Davis' three 1-yard touchdown runs, tying the score at seven with 1:20 left in the first quarter.

In the second stanza, the Patriots appeared poised to counterpunch as Brady led a drive that reached the Panthers' 23-yard line. But following a 10-yard holding penalty, Brady was picked off by Panthers linebacker Will Witherspoon to end the scoring threat. Carolina took advantage, seizing the lead on the ensuing possession as a 51-yard field goal by John Kasay put the Panthers ahead, 10-7. With the momentum now on Carolina's side, the Panthers stopped the Patriots' next offensive possession, setting up a Patriots punt that was returned by Chris Gamble for a 76-yard gain that gave Carolina possession on the New England 13-yard line. Four plays later, Davis' second 1-yard scoring scamper gave the Panthers a 17-7 lead that they took into halftime.

Carolina got the ball to begin the second half and used another long Kasay field goal (52 yards) to take a 20-7 lead. The Patriots then set into motion a sequence of events that got them back into the game, as a 45-yard field goal by Adam Vinatieri made the score 20-10, and a 24-yard interception return for a touchdown by Mike Vrabel cut the gap to 20-17 with 6:08 left in the third guarter. New England stopped the Panthers' next offensive bid to get the ball back with a chance to tie or take the lead, but the Panthers' Mike Rucker sacked Brady and caused a fumble that was recovered by Julius Peppers at the Patriots' 12yard line. Five plays later, Davis plunged into the end zone for a third time to make the score 27-17 with 14 seconds elapsed in the final quarter.

Neither team could move the ball into its opponent's territory for much of the final quarter until the Patriots broke onto Carolina's side of the field with around three minutes to play, trailing by 10 points. New England made it as far as the Carolina 32-yard line, but a fumble by Benjamin Watson with 2:17 left in the game was recovered by the Panthers' Dan Morgan. Carolina was able to keep the ball and run out the clock to score the victory.

100 TOUCHDOWNS FOR BRADY

Tom Brady threw the 100th touchdown pass of his regularseason career in the first quarter when he hooked up with Daniel Graham on a 1-yard scoring toss. Brady is the fourth quarterback in Patriots history to achieve the feat, joining Steve Grogan (182), Drew Bledsoe (166) and Vito "Babe" Parilli (132). Brady achieved the milestone in his 64th career regular-season

ABLE VRABEL

Mike Vrabel returned an interception 24 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter, recording the first defensive touchdown of his career. On offense, Vrabel has scored five career receiving touchdowns (3 in the regular season, 2 in the playoffs) on five career receptions while lining up as a tight end in goal-line situations. The play marked the first time the Patriots have recorded an interception return for a touchdown since Asante Samuel recorded a 34-yard scoring return against Cincinnati on Dec. 12, 2004 at Gillette Stadium. In 2004, the Patriots scored four defensive touchdowns (3 fumble returns, 1 interception return), and in 2003, New England led the NFL with six defensive touchdowns. The Patriots have now scored 11 defensive touchdowns in their last 32 regular season games, dating back to week three of the 2003 season. The Patriots fell to 16-3 in their last 19 games when scoring on defense, dating back to 1999.

LONG BALL

Troy Brown hauled in a 71-yard pass from Tom Brady in the first quarter, setting up the Patriots' first touchdown on the next play. For Brown, the catch was the second longest reception of his 13year career, and it was the longest reception by a Patriot since Brown hauled in an 82-yard touchdown in overtime to best the Miami Dolphins on Oct. 19, 2003. It was the longest non-scoring catch of Brown's career and the third longest completion of Brady's career. Brown is the third leading receiver in Patriots history and needs seven catches to pass Ben Coates for second place on the all-time receptions list and 73 yards to pass Irving Fryar for second place on the all-time receiving yardage list.

TRAILING AT HALF

The Patriots trailed at halftime, marking the first time they faced a halftime deficit since Oct. 31, 2004, when they trailed the Pittsburgh Steelers 24-10. New England had either led or was tied at the half in 13 consecutive games (10 regular season and three playoff contests). In 2004, the Patriots trailed at the half just twice, in the Pittsburgh game and in the season opener against Indianapolis (trailed 17-14 in a game eventually won).

RARE PICK

Tom Brady threw a second quarter interception to Will Witherspoon that ended a streak of 157 consecutive passes without an interception, including last year's playoffs. Brady did not throw a pick in the 2004 playoffs (81 postseason attempts), and did not throw an interception in last week's season opener against Oakland. Prior to the Panthers game, the last time Brady was picked off was in the first quarter of the 2004 regularseason finale against the San Francisco 49ers on Jan. 2, 2005.

SECOND QUARTER STREAK OVER

The Patriots did not score in the second quarter, ending a streak of 25 consecutive games in which they had put points on the board in the second quarter (including six playoff games). The last time New England was blanked in the second guarter was on Dec. 7, 2003 at Gillette Stadium against the Miami Dolphins. The Patriots scored in the second quarter in every game of the 2004 regular season and also in every game in the 2003 and 2004 playoffs.

GOLDEN GRAHAM

Daniel Graham hauled in his first touchdown reception of the season on a 1-yard grab from Tom Brady in the first quarter. The touchdown was the 13th of Graham's career. The 2002 firstround draft choice ranks fourth on the team in terms of career touchdowns in a Patriots uniform, trailing only Troy Brown (28), Kevin Faulk (19) and Corey Dillon (15). In 2004, Graham tied for the team lead with seven receiving touchdowns.

The Patriots began the 2005 season with a steady 30-20 victory over the Oakland Raiders in a nationally-televised Thursday night matchup at Gillette Stadium. The win was the New England's 21st consecutive home triumph. The Patriots unveiled their Super Bowl XXXIX championship banner as part of a star-studded pregame show before getting to work.

A pair of former Super Bowl MVPs came up big for the Patriots on offense, as Tom Brady topped 300 yards for the ninth time in his regular-season career and Deion Branch led New England with seven catches for 99 yards. Branch and newcomer Tim Dwight each grabbed first-hale touchdown passes and running back Corey Dillon ran into the end zone twice in the second half for his 12th career multiple rushing touchdown game.

On defense, the Patriots' biggest play of the night came in the third quarter with New England clinging to a 17-14 lead. On the play, Jarvis Green sacked Oakland's Kerry Collins for a 13yard loss, causing Collins to fumble on the play. The ball shot into the air and nose tackle Vince Wilfork grabbed it to give the Patriots possession on the Oakland 20-yard line. Three plays later, Dillon charged for an 8-yard touchdown, giving the Patriots a solid 23-14 lead.

100th WIN FOR BELICHICK

The victory over the Raiders marked the 100th overall victory as a head coach for Bill Belichick. The Patriots head coach is now 90-71 in the regular season and 10-1 in the playoffs for an overall mark of 100-72 in his career. Belichick is 63-27 overall as head coach of the Patriots. Belichick joins eight other active coaches in the 100-win club (Marty Schottenheimer, Bill Parcells, Joe Gibbs, Bill Cowher, Mike Holmgren, Mike Shanahan, Dick Vermeil and Dennis Green) and is the 33rd head coach in NFL history to record 100 overall wins. Belichick and Parcells are the only coaches to have earned their 100th career win with the Patriots. Parcells earned his 100th overall win in the Patriots' 1994 season finale.

TOM TERRIFIC

With 306 passing yards, Tom Brady notched the ninth 300-yard passing game of his regular-season career. He also has had two 300-yard games in the playoffs. The last time he threw for over 300 yards was at Kansas City on Nov. 22, 2004, when he notched 315 yards. Against the Raiders, Brady had a 105.8 passer rating, marking the 27th time he has achieved a rating of 100.0 or better in his regular-season and playoff career. The Patriots are now 27-0 in games when Brady posts a rating of 100.0 or better.

DOUBLE-DIP FOR DILLON

Corey Dillon ran for two touchdowns, marking the 12th multiple rushing touchdown game of his career. Last season, Dillon ran into the end zone twice in three games, with his last twotouchdown performance coming on Dec. 5, 2004 at Cleveland.

MILLER TIME

Patriots punter Josh Miller dropped back-to-back punts inside the Raiders' 5-yard line in the third quarter. His first punt of the second half was a 48-yard bomb that bounced just in front of the goal line and spun back to the 4-yard line, where it was downed by Larry Izzo. Miller's next punt was a 49-yard boot that bounced around deep in Raiders territory and was downed by Randall Gay at the 4-yard line.

CAPTAINS TAKE THE FIELD

The Patriots' 2005 captains were on the field for the opening coin toss. The offensive captains are Tom Brady (fourth season as a captain) and Troy Brown (fourth season). The defensive captains are Rodney Harrison (third season), Richard Seymour (third season) and Mike Vrabel (first season). The special teams captain is Larry Izzo (fifth season).

THE DWIGHT STUFF ON PUNT RETURNS

Tim Dwight made a splash with his first punt return as a Patriot, gaining 27 yards on a first-quarter return. It was the longest punt return by a Patriot since the 2002 season, when Deion Branch rattled off a 40-yard return against the Denver Broncos on Oct. 27, 2002. In 2003, the longest punt return was a 23yard scamper by Troy Brown (09/21/03 vs. N.Y. Jets). In 2004, the longest punt return was also a 23-yarder by Brown (12/26/04).

TOUCHDOWN TIM

Tim Dwight caught his first touchdown pass as a Patriot, scurrying around the edge to snare a 5-yard pass from Brady to give the Patriots a 17-14 lead in the second quarter. Last season with the San Diego Chargers, Dwight had just two receptions while playing in 12 games. Tonight's score was the 14th career touchdown grab for the eighth-year veteran.

BIG BENJAMIN

Benjamin Watson caught two passes for 55 yards on the Patriots' first drive, leading to a 26-yard field goal by Adam Vinatieri. As a rookie last season, the former first-round draft choice played in one game, the season-opener against Indianapolis) and had two catches for 16 yards.

OUICK HITS

- ➤ Mike Vrabel dropped Kerry Collins for a 6-yard sack late in the third quarter. It was the Patriots' first sack of the season.
- > Adam Vinatieri had an extra point blocked in the third guarter. It was the first point after miss for Vinatieri since Nov. 16, 2003, when he had a PAT blocked against Dallas.

OPENING DRIVES

The Patriots allowed the Raiders to score a touchdown on their opening drive, marking the first time in 37 games that New England had allowed an opening-drive touchdown. The streak included six playoff games and dated back to the 2003 season opener (at Buffalo, 09/07/03). In the 2004 regular season and playoffs (a total of 19 games), the Patriots allowed opponents only six points on their first offensive possession, a mark that led the NFL.

BRANCHING OUT

Deion Branch picked up right where he left off last year, catching the Patriots' first touchdown of the season on an 18-yard grab from Tom Brady in the first quarter. For Branch, the Super Bowl XXXIX MVP, it was his 10th career touchdown catch, and for Brady, the MVP of Super Bowls XXXVI and XXXVIII, it was his 98th career scoring pass.

LONG BALL

The Raiders took a 14-10 lead in the second quarter on a 73yard bomb from Kerry Collins to Randy Moss. It was the longest play from scrimmage the Patriots have allowed since Dec. 4, 2000, when Kansas City's Elvis Grbac connected with Derrick Alexander on an 81-yard touchdown pass at Foxboro Stadium.

PATRIOTS DELIVER CLOTHING TO HURRICANE EVACUEES ON CAPE COD

everal New England Patriots spent their day off at Otis Air National Guard Base on Cape Cod on Monday, Sept. 12, delivering muchneeding clothing items to the families displaced to the base in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina. Patriots players Kevin Faulk, Bethel Johnson, Don Davis and Eric Alexander, along with assistant strength and conditioning coach, Harold Nash, drove to the base to deliver the goods and meet with the 200 people currently staying at the base.

Faulk, who hails from Carencro, Louisiana attended and LSU, encouraged his teammates to clean out their closets and bring gently used clothing items to the stadium yesterday. Nearly the entire team brought in bags and boxes of shoes, men's clothes, women's clothes and baby clothes to be

donated to the families. From there, Faulk packed up a truck with the thousands of items to transport them to the base. The Patriots contingent spent several hours with the evacuees, signing autographs and posing for pictures. In addition to Faulk, Alexander and Nash also have ties to the Gulf region; Alexander attended LSU and Nash is a native of New Orleans and attended Louisiana-Lafayette.

HURRICANE KATRINA RELIEF EFFORTS

In order to raise funds to assist in hurricane relief efforts, the New England Patriots Charitable Foundation established two programs to encourage financial contributions from Patriots players, coaches, staff and fans. Details of the two programs are listed below:

Hurricane Katrina Relief Fund: On Tuesday, September 6, the New England Patriots Charitable Foundation established a Hurricane Katrina Relief Fund to give Patriots fans the opportunity to make financial contributions to hurricane relief efforts. Fans were encouraged to pledge donations in any \$25 increment, but those who made a donation of \$1,000 or more received a special thank you from the Patriots organization. For each \$1,000 donation, the Kraft family and the Patriots Charitable Foundation rewarded the donor with one lower seating bowl ticket to the Patriots-Raiders game. In less than 12 hours, the Patriots Charitable Foundation raised \$165,000, 100 percent of which will go to a variety of non-profit agencies directly supporting relief efforts. Fans may continue to donate to the fund through a link from the Patriots Web site.

Patriots Employee Matching Program: To encourage contributions to the Gulf Coast recovery efforts in the wake of Hurricane Katrina, the New England Patriots Charitable Foundation has established a program for Patriots players, coaches and employees to make donations in support of the hurricane relief efforts. If players, coaches and staff choose to make a personal financial contribution to a sanctioned non-profit organization that is working directly with disaster relief, the Kraft family, through the New England Patriots Charitable Foundation, will match those contributions for the first \$100,000 raised.

Cradles to Crayons Hurricane Relief Collection

On Saturday, September 10, the New England Patriots Charitable Foundation and Bank of America teamed up with Cradles to Crayons, a non-profit organization dedicated to providing homeless children with essential supplies, to host a collection drive to benefit the children of displaced families of Hurricane Katrina. In just three hours, Cradles to Crayons accepted thousands of new and slightly used items outside of the ProShop at Gillette Stadium. Clothes, shoes, school supplies, toys, books, strollers and cribs were collected, and all of the items will be sent to agencies housing Hurricane Katrina evacuees.
