#### President - Ralph C. Wilson, Jr.



The American Football League is "off the ground" — a fate its National League detractors predicted it never would enjoy.

And, from a more provincial view, the Buffalo

Bills are again flesh, pad and pigskin.

About a year ago, Bills' owner, Ralph C. Wilson was scanning a sports page while spending some

time at Saratoga, N. Y.
"I saw a wire story announcing

"I saw a wire story announcing that Lamar Hunt of Dallas was forming a new pro football league. I became interested immediately without even knowing any of the details," he recalled.

"I wrote to Lamar relating how I had heard of his plans and informed him of my interest. He phoned me and advised that he already had six franchises but that the league might start with eight. He said I should get busy right away if I was really interested. I took the next plane out of New York for Dallas."

Buffalo was not the city uppermost in Wilson's mind for a franchise at the time.

"My family had a home in Miami and I thought it might be a good city for a pro team. Lamar also advised me of the other cities which had shown interest. They included Cincinnati, Louisville, Kansas City, St. Louis and Buffalo."

Last October 16 Wilson made a visit to Buffalo

"to explore the situation here."

"George Schaaf, who was my commanding officer aboard a minesweeper in World War Two, is a Buffalonian and I asked him about interest for the sport here. He said it was great.

I was told I'd have all out support if I put the franchise in Buffalo. I didn't expect to make a decision so quick but by the time I left town that night I had agreed to come to Buffalo if a satisfactory stadium lease could be arranged. The rest is history."

#### General Manager — Richard F. (Dick) Gallagher



Long before Ralph Wilson placed his American Football League franchise in the City of Buffalo, New York . . . or even before he had a franchise to place anywhere . . . he knew who he wanted to be his general manager, if and when. That man was Dick Gallagher.

Wilson, as everybody else, was aware of the Cleveland Browns' success story. But, in contrast to most people, Wilson

realized that a single man "does not an organization make," and that Paul Brown had expert help at Cleveland. Much of that help was supplied by Gallagher, whose titles were director of player personnel and assistant coach, but whose duties encompassed much additional front office and public relations responsibility. Gallagher was often . . . and aptly described as Paul Brown's first lieutenant.

Gallagher, a native of Ironton, Ohio, served two tenures with the Browns. Dick originally joined Paul Brown as end coach in 1947, the second year of the defunct All-American Conference. The next three years the Browns produced one of the best teams in the history of pro football. Gallagher, himself, insists the 1948 Cleveland Browns team was the "greatest I have ever seen."

When the A.A.C. died after the 1949 season, Gallagher returned to college coaching. Dick, who earlier had been an assistant coach of football and head basketball coach at William and Mary, took over the football reigns at Santa Clara. He coached the nationally ranked Broncos through 1953 when the school dropped football.

In 1954, Dick again joined the pros, becoming a member of the Chicago Cardinals coaching staff. A year later, Paul Brown called him "back home" as assistant coach and director of player personnel.

For four years thereafter, Gallagher signed the most promising collegiate talent available to the Browns. Jimmy Brown, Bobby Mitchell, Preston Carpenter, Milt Plum are a few of Gallagher's signees.

In addition to his other duties, the personable Irishman flashed his friendly smile, ready wit, and his countless football stories along the Ohio banquet trail during the off-season. He was Browns' No. 1 ambassador of good-will, just as he has been the Bills' since the day he signed on as general manager. From February 1, 1960 until June 15, Gallagher was the guest speaker at no fewer than 102 sports gatherings, numbering in size from 10 to 750 people.

#### Coach - Garrard "Buster" Ramsey



The village of Townsend is located in the heart of the Smoky Mountains in Eastern Tennessee. For the benefit of the uninformed, the great Smoky range forms a natural border between Tennessee and North Carolina. Garrard Ramsey places Townsend exactly 15 miles west of Gatlinburg. He then expresses considerable amazement at the inquisitor's obvious lack of a fundamental geographic education. "Gatlinburg", lectures Garrard Ramsey, "is one of the best-known vacation resorts in the whole country. Everybody knows where it is."

There is no rebuttal. Garrard Ramsey is a physical giant. He carries 245 pounds on a 6′ 3″ frame. He speaks directly and forthrightly. Words, like time, he does not waste. Townsend remains 15 miles from Gatlinburg, which has suddenly become a much desired vacation retreat to be visited. A map proves Gatlinburg to be 45 miles east of Knoxville, a circumstance which, when coupled with a few elementary mathematics, puts the exact location of Townsend 30 miles east of Knoxville and more clearly into focus.

Townsend is noted for several things. Principal among them, the village houses one of America's largest aluminum manufacturing plants, and, Garrard Ramsey was born there. The latter is of more immediate importance in the area served by the Buffalo Bills of the American Football League. For Garrard Ramsey is the Head Coach of the Bills.

Garrard Ramsey, better known as "Buster" was hired to coach the Buffalo Bills of the American Football League — almost as owner Ralph C. Wilson's first order of official team business. Ramsey was the only candidate seriously considered.

Actually, "Buster" wasn't a candidate in the strict sense of the word. Wilson had to sell him on the Bills and the AFL. "I doubt very much I would have taken the job for any other owner," admits Buster. "I was very happy at Detroit but Mr. Wilson is a wonderful man and awfully persuasive."

Ramsey was happy at Detroit and very well paid, too. Reliable sources, insist Buster was the highest salaried assistant coach in pro football.

For eight seasons, Buster Ramsey was the defensive coach of the Detroit Lions under the fabled Buddy Parker and more recently, George Wilson. Defense is the most important facet of professional football. Coaches and players are unanimous that "all pro teams can score, but not all of them can play defense . . . and that's where championships are won."

The Detroit Lions played defense . . . to the hilt. There was little argument that during Ramsey's tenure, the Lions were the best defensive team in the NFL. There was no argument that Buster was the best defensive coach.

Ramsey's list of credits include development of such renowned Detroit stalwarts as Jack Christiansen, Yale Lary, Jim David in the backfield; Joe Schmidt, Bob Long and Darvis McCord along the line. Christiansen. Lary and David were perhaps the foremost football larcenists in NFL history.

It is safe to say their names were as well known to fans around the country as any three members of the Lions offensive unit.

The Lions defensive unit had tremendous pride and esprit de corps. An occasional bad game in which Detroit suffered free scoring defeat would plunge "Ramsey's Wreckers" into an extremely black mood. Defensive errors or judgment lapses that did no actual harm were sinful enough. To have his "wreckers" guilty of sufficient mistakes as to cost the Lions a ball game would send Ramsey into an apoplectic rage. At such time, it was not good policy to enter into polite conversation with the tall Tennessean.

Where football is concerned, Buster Ramsey is completely intense. He also suffers from a singleness of purpose that oftimes puzzles those who do not know him well.

During a game, Ramsey is an inveterate sideline pacer. He often covers more territory in 60 minutes than the combined total yardage of both teams. Ask him why he doesn't remain seated on the bench or at least stand in one place and there is no satisfactory answer.

"I know sideline pacing has never won a ball game," admits Ramsey, "but I just can't sit down. I'm probably the only coach in the game who has never picked a wood splinter from his pants. At least it saves wear and tear on my clothes."

Because of his eternal pacing and arm-weaving, Buster has always been as well known — and cordially despised — by opposition fans as the Lions' head coach. In San Francisco, he is "Bluster Buster"; in Baltimore, the fans call him "Rampaging Ramsey." Fans in other league cities call him other names . . . loudly, with feeling and punctuated freely with "Bronx Huzzahs."

Ramsey has never been concerned with fan reaction in opposition cities. He has one thought in mind — the winning of football games. He is absolutely dedicated to victory. There is a feeling prevalent in Western New York that the Bills will reap the full reward of Buster's dedication.

Who will be the hero among heroes of the Buffalo Bills this season? Or will there be a player whose mere presence on the field stirs excitement in the fans?

It took the old Bills of the All-American Conference a

year to uncover such a player.

He was a silky blond-haired, quick-to-smile, 20-yearold named George Ratterman. For George, that was five law schools, seven children and 13 football seasons ago.

Ratterman left the University of Notre Dame campus tired of playing second-string to Frank (Boley) Dance-

wicz and Johnny Lujack.

He brought with him a slender frame which seemed better suited for tennis, a game he played well, a magician's ability with a football, and a flair for creating excitement—anywhere.

It took him exactly one game—the 1947 opener against the New York Yankees—to establish himself as the Bills'

first-string quarterback and the fans' favorite.

He didn't surrender either position until the air was let out of the AAFC football three years later.

Only Cleveland's Otto Graham, in whose shadow Ratterman later played with the Browns, was more attention compelling than George during his time with Buffalo.

There was an unpredictability about Ratterman that

the fans savored.

His attempts at running with the ball were regarded in the same light as Lefty Gomez's hitting when he was the pitching star of the New York Yankees.

His ability to throw a long pass matched Gomez's ability to pitch a fastball and his handoffs were as baffling

as Gomez's let-up pitches.

And "The Kid," as George was known, was as zany off the field as "El Goofo" ever thought of being.

He once gave a piano concert in Kleinhans Music Hall

decked out in white tails and opened the program by playing chop sticks.

'We did okay though," he still insists, "we outdrew President Truman that night. And his speech was open

to the public for free."

One of George's sidelines was doing commercials on television for a downtown department store. He also had a thrice-weekly radio sports program for another store. One night, he got his commercials mixed up and suggested his TV audience patronize his radio sponsor.

"That flub," he laughs, "got the programs more attention than anything I'd done before. The only trouble was that both sponsors got mad and cancelled out."

Ratterman admits pulling one rock in his search for laughs. Cleveland had won the AAFC championship and was to oppose a team of All-Stars from the other teams in Houston, Texas.

One rainy day, all the Cleveland players were surprised to learn via the Shamrock Hotel switchboard operator that Coach Paul Brown had called off practice. This is something that Brown had never done before.

One player, George Young, couldn't believe it. So he went to the bus that was to take the team to the practice

field and found Brown waiting alone.

Soon an irate Brown was berating the switchboard operator for taking instructions from an imposter and the Cleveland players were rushing to the bus.

"I made one mistake that time," says Ratterman, "I should have called off the All-Stars practice. That would

have got me a day off."

Head Coach Buster Ramsey may be fortunate enough to come up with a crowd favorite this season. But he'll have a hard time finding one to match George (The Kid) Ratterman.



## FOOTBALL SCENE Larry Felser

This was in the Polo Grounds last Sunday. The conversation piece was the Denver Broncos, or rather the Broncos' 13-10 upset of the heavily-favored Boston.

Steve Lenzi, the former William and Mary star who scouted the game for the Bills, entered the conversation. "That was not only a good win," said Lenzi, "but

Denver was a darn good team.

"I saw Boston beat the Broncos, 42-6, in the second pre-season game at Providence. This Denver team has really improved. Frank Filchock took a good look at

everyone on that club and it paid off.'

Gene Mingo, the swift little running back whose 76yard punt return decided the game, barely missed being an ex-Bronco the day before the game. Mingo had hit a dry spell after starring in Denver's early games. The coaching staff had just about decided to release him, but after the Patriot game, it seemed a sure thing that he would not appear on a waiver list for quite a while.

Bob Bowie, the former sports editor of Stars and Stripes who now covers the Brones for the Denver Post. described Mingo's deciding run as comparable to the great one Billy Cannon made last year to give LSU a 7-3 victory over Mississippi.

Bowie thinks the addition of two defensive tackles— Bud McFadin and John Hatley - has made a terrific

difference in the club.

McFadin was an All-Pro linebacker with the Los Angeles Rams before a gunshot wound, suffered in the off-season, forced his retirement from football. That was four years ago. Bud is whole again, 280 pounds worth in fact, and left a thriving business in Dallas to help bale out the Broncs.

Hatley, also a Texan, wrestles steers on the big-time rodeo circuit during the winter months. He was gored by a bull in Madison Square Garden last March, but mended in time to report to the Dallas Texans in July. The Broncos acquired him in a trade.

Hatley, McFadin, Mingo and veterans like quarterback Frank Tripucka and flanker back Al Carmichael could make Denver the surprise team of the AFL season.
