TITAN Pace-Setters

The TITANS have no easy match in tonight's game.

Denver's Broncos are riding a two-game winning streak and are leading the Western Division of the American Football League.

To face the challenge, the TI-TANS will have to depend upon 100% effort all the time as the Denver team is not one to be down just because the other team is ahead.


In the league opener at Boston, the Broncos trailed 7-0 in early play yet came back in the third period for a 13-10 win.

At Buffalo last week, the Broncos trailed as late as 11:50 of the final period, yet timely defensive work brought about the final TD in a 27-21 win.

For the TITANS, the attack has been fairly even in rushing and passing. Coach Sammy Baugh's attacking platoon has had 134 offensive plays, not including punts, and has run with the ball on 75 occasions and passed 59 times. Twenty-seven of the passes were complete—with two picked off by the opposition.

Al Dorow, ex-Michigan State, who is a seasoned professional quarterback, has completed 18 of the 37 passes he has thrown, with both interceptions charged against him, and has picked up 301 yards in the air for three touchdowns. Dorow can run with the ball as well, and has scored two touchdowns afoot, thus being responsible for five of the six touchdowns scored to date by the TITANS.

In the pass-receiving department, the TITANS have a tight duel shaping up between left end Art Powell and the flanker back, Don Maynard. Maynard leads to date in passes caught, with nine, and in total yardage, with 192. Powell, with eight caught for 129 yards, has one point over Maynard—one of his grabs went for a touchdown.

The TITANS ground attack has averaged only 92 yards per game but Pete Hart and Ted Wegert have done more than their share. Hart, starting fullback, has a 4.7-yards per try average, with 71 yards on 15 carries. Wegert, who hails from Riverhead, L. L.

has a 4.4 mark, with 61 yards on 14 carries.

Roger Donnahoo is making a name for himself in the TITANS defensive backfield.

This ex-Michigan State half-back has intercepted two passes to date—and returned them for a total of 69 yards each putting the TITANS in position for an eventual score. He also recovered two fumbles by the opposition—one setting up a score vs. Boston last Saturday night.


Another TITAN who is building a reputation is halfback Bill Shockley, from West Chester, Pa. State College. Shockley, only six feet and 185 pounds, is doing a job usually reserved for towering ends and tackles in professional football — kicking off, booting extra points and dropping the field goals over the crossbar.

In the two regular season games, Shockley has a perfect six for six in PATs, and has made three of five field goals attempted. During the five preseason games, Shockley kicked 14 for 14 on extra points and made four for five on field goals.

The Tale of the TITANS of New York

The well known cigarette commercial on television used to lead off with ... "they said it couldn't be done! . . .

Yet here in 1960, metropolitan professional football fans are getting their first look at the TITANS of New York and the New York opener of the American Football League. The League has gone from drawing board to the playing field in the short span of thirteen months.

Professional football has, in the past several years, become one of the favorite recreational pastimes in this nation. A good share of the credit for this advance must go to the advent of television, and increased radio and newspaper coverage of the

sport. The people love the game. Harry Wismer, owner and president of the TITANS of New York, has devoted almost half of his life to sports promotion, as a radio and television sportscaster, and has also been connected with professional football as a stockholder of both the Detroit Lions and the Washington Redskins. He has broadcast the games of the Detroit Lions. the Washington Redskins and the New York Giants and he has broadcast fourteen world's championship play-offs.

When Lamar Hunt, of Dallas, first came to Wismer and discussed the possibility of a new league, Wismer jumped at the chance for the New York franchise. In the thirteen intervening months, Wismer has traveled far and wide, promoting not only the TITANS and the American Football League but all of pro-

fessional football.

His important work with two vital AFL committees which he heads—the Radio-Television committee and the Expansion Committee - have helped sell the league on many fronts. He played a major role also, in the sale of the league TV rights which means so much from a financial standpoint to every team in the American Football League.

In accepting the New York franchise, Wismer showed firm belief in the desire of metropolitan fans to see more professional football. His chores in getting the team ready were many but each move has been a move forward.

First problem was in obtaining a playing site for home games. Wismer solved that with a flourish when he signed a contract for use of the famed Polo Grounds, scene through the years of some of the greatest professional and college grid games a site considered by many to be one of the very best football stadiums in the country.

Developments then were rapid - completion of the first player draft in late November, 1959, the naming of Steve Sebo as TITANS' general manager in early December, and the selec-tion of Slingin' Sammy Baugh as head coach in mid-December.

Baugh has had many great

moments on the Polo Grounds turf as he pitched pass after pass for sixteen seasons with the Washington Redskins. Three of Sammy's Washington teammates John Steber, Dick Todd and Hugh (Bones) Taylor, joined his TITANS' staff, and the fourth coach selected was John Dell Isola. The former Fordham great knows the Polo Grounds well as a Ram lineman for three years, later as a player and assistant coach with the Giants.

Football history has been made at the Polo Grounds in the past and during many of those history-producing days, Harry Wismer was recording the history from a broadcast booth.

Now in 1960, Harry Wismer will be seeing more football history being enacted at the Polo Grounds, this time as owner and president of the TITANS of New York, American Football League.

TITAN Topics

The TITANS take their first regular season road trip immediately after tonight's game against Denver—with stops at Dallas on Sunday, Oct., 2; at Houston, Sunday, Oct., 9; and at Buffalo, Sunday, Oct. 16.

All three games will be brought back to the metropolitan area on Channel 7, TV, with the popular sportscaster Les Keiter doing the play-by-play and "Bullet" Bill Dudley, star ex-professional halfback, doing the color.

Keiter, Sports Director of WINS, New York, started in radio as a summer relief announcer on a Spokane, Wash., station after graduation from the University of Washington in 1941. After four years with Armed Forces Radio during World War II, Keiter started re-creating baseball games on various radio stations on the West Coast and in Hawaii. While working at KPOA in Honolulu, he had to re-create from telegraphic play-by-play, two games daily—a major league contest and a Pacific Coast League game, for a studio audience.

The Denver Broncos, tonight's opponent of the TITANS are the surprise of the yet-new American Football League Season.

They lost all five pre-season games—but came close, 36-30, against the Los Angeles Chargers in the pre-season finale. Then they upset Boston, 13-10, in the regular season opener, and shocked Buffalo, 27-21, on Sunday.

The TITANS certainly have had the freak plays go against them.

In the pre-season opening game, Paul Lowe, LA Chargers halfback, ran back the opening kickoff 105 yards for a TD with the game only seven seconds old. In last Saturday night's loss to the Boston Patriots, the winning points for Boston were scored after the game had ended. On an attempted punt, the pass from center was low and then bobbled by the punter — and Boston's Chuck Shonta was credited with

a 52-yard scoring fumble return—almost ten seconds after the game time had elapsed.

The TITANS take advantage of opportunities in a hurry, Against the Patriots, the TITANS recovered a Boston fum-

ble on the visitors' 32. Not able to make much of a gain, the TI-TANS quickly kicked a field goal from the 23.

Later, defensive back Roger Donnahoo intercepted a Boston pass on New York's 23 and returned it to the Boston 47. In four plays, NY took the lead in the game, 10-7, as Dorow passed to Bohling for 8 yards and the TD.

Four minutes later, New York scored again, this time on a Dorow to Ted Wegert pass that covered 16 yards. New York had taken the ball on its own 14, after a Boston punt, and covered the distance to the goal in eight plays.

New York's last score came in six plays from its own nine yard line. A great defensive effort had stopped Boston on the TITANS nine. The scoring play was a sparkling 38-yard maneuver from Dorow to right end, Thurlow Cooper.

Vice-President of the TITANS

DR. FRED J. CRESCENTE. M. D., has dual capacity with the TITANS, serving both as Exec. Vice President and as team physcian. From Ridgewood, N. J., he has been affiliated for many years with metropolitan area sports events. A graduate of Georgetown Univ., Washington, D. C., Dr. Crescente was connected with the New Jersey State Athletic Commission as its official physician for some 12 years, and also is Chairman of the Board of the Circus Saints and Sinners, State of New Jersey.

The TITANS official takes time to give his own aid and enlist the help of others for "Boy's Town of Italy", and is General Chairman for the State of New Jersey with this worthwhile project. He also is active in the New Jersey "Oldtimer's Athletic Association."

Through the years he has been a financial backer for many semi-








JACK KLOTZ

At Pennsylvania Military College, big Jack Klotz won Little All-America rating in 1955, when the cadets from Chester, Pa., went through their season undefeated. He received further seasoning as a member of the Marine Corps team at San Diego in 1956-57-58 and played in Canada last year. Fast afoot for his size — 6-foot-4 and 260 pounds — he impressed the Titans from the start of pre-season training. He fits into the picture as a swing replacement at either tackle on the offensive unit. In a pinch, he also can play at offensive guard or in the defensive line.

One of the first players to clinch a place on the TITAN squad, **Bobby Marques** (pronounced Marks) has been a fixture at middle linebacker ever since Coach Sammy Baugh organized his defensive unit. A graduate of Boston University, from which he received a physical education degree last June, Marques was named on the 1959 All-New England team as a center by the wire services. A stocky 220-pounder, he has excellent lateral range and tackles with tigerish ferocity. At high school in Everett, Mass., Marques played at fullback as well as in the line. A member of the Marine Corps reserves, he works off season with an Everett construction company.

TED WEGERT

Ted Wegert is one of those rare fellows who crashed pro football without the benefit of college experience. All-everything on the high school level at Riverhead, the hub of Suffolk County's booming potato and cauliflower industry, Ted set a Long Island single-season scoring record of 163 points that still stands. But instead of accepting any of numerous college offers, he cast his lot with the Navy. In addition to his other duties, he played football as a gob and was the outstanding player on the Bainbridge Naval Training Station team that won the 1954 Service Bowl game. On being mustered out, Wegert hopped right into a regular job with the Philadelphia Eagles, for whom he played three seasons. A solidly-constructed 200-pounder, he runs low, hard and fast and can dish it out as well as take it.



BILL MATHIS

As a member of Clemson's Atlantic Coast Conference champions in 1959, Bill Mathis led that fast league in scoring with 70 points. Rated Clemson's most valuable player, he averaged close to five yards per rush on 98 carries; caught 18 passes for 317 yards and three touchdowns; had a punting average of 35 yards; returned ten punts for 101 yards and carried nine kick-offs back 294 yards. Originally signed by the Houston Oilers, he was acquired by the Titans in exchange for negotiation rights to tackle Don Floyd. A fleet 215-pounder who stands six feet, Mathis will see action at both fullback and halfback. He hails from Manchester, Ga., and was a horticulture major at Clemson.

A few days before the season opened, the Titans reached into the free-agent grab-bag and pulled out a real prize in Art Powell. This fleet, rangy end from San Jose State College has been a sensational pass-receiver for the New Yorkers. A top halfback and end in college, Art dropped out of San Jose after his junior season, played two years in Canada and spent 1959 with the Philadelphia Eagles. Among his accomplishments with Philadelphia was a 98-yard kick return against the Giants. A trimly-built 220-pounder who stands 6 feet 2 inches, Powell can run like the wind and really go up into the air and get the ball. He's a brother of Charlie Powell, the former professional boxer and San Francisco 49ers tackle who now is with the Oakland Raiders.

Few college linemen have caught the eye to the degree that Bob Reifsnyder did at the Naval Academy in 1956 and 1957. Reef was an unanimous All-America selection and won the Maxwell Trophy as the season's outstanding player in the latter year, in which he helped Navy score a smashing victory over Mississippi in the Cotton Bowl. A severe knee injury blighted big Bob's senior season at Annapolis and also kept him from making the grade last year with the Los Angeles Rams, of whom he was a high draft choice, and the New York Giants, who picked him up later as a free agent and carried him on their taxi squad. This year he was signed by the Los Angeles Chargers but pushed for and got his release to get a job closer to his Baldwin, L. I., home, which was blessed early in September with a baby boy named Bob Jr. Sound of knee again, the 250-pound Reifsnyder is his old devastating self as a one-man troubleshooting gang at any Titan rushline spot that needs bolstering.





About the Broncos

As it was with the TITANS, the Denver Broncos did not distinguish themselves during the American Football League's preseason campaign. But just as was the case with Sammy Baugh, Frankie Filchock, the Bronco coach, was not particularly concerned with the showing of his squard in these unofficial contests. It was his aim to have his men ready when the bell rung. That they were.

In the American League's first championship game, the Broncos galloped to a 13-10 victory over the Boston Patriots, rated in advance as one of the new cir-

cuit's top powers.

Inspection of the Denver roster in its more or less final form reveals that early concern about the ability of the Broncos was overdone. Filchock, a former National League star with the Washington Redskins and the New York Giants and a highly successful coach in the Canadian League for several years, has some pretty fair football players at his disposal.

What's more his squad is one of the most experienced in the American League. With admirable foresight, Frankie repatriated a whole flock of the better players who had drifted into Canada for previous lack of opportunity on native soil. No fewer than twenty of the Broncos have had two or more previous seasons in pro football.

The Broncos are particularly

well fortified at quarterback. They have two tried-and-true old pros at the signal calling post in Frank Tripucka, the former Notre Damer from Bloomfield, N. J., and Tom Dublinski. Tripucka played eleven seasons and Dublinski eight with various National and Canadian League clubs. In addition, Denver has a capable reserve quarterback in George Herring, a third-year pro.

They pack a heavy wallop at the running halfback spot, with Bob Stransky of Colorado fame and Henry Bell and Gene Mingo, a couple of husky speedsters who learned the ropes in service football. They also are exceptionally well-manned at the flanking halfback, where they use Al Carmichael, a brilliant performer with Green Bay and in Canada, and Bob McNamara, the former Minnesota All-American who also starred in Canada.

To round out a rosy backfield picture, fullback is manned by Dave Rolle, a big blaster from Oklahoma, and J. W. Brodnax, whose line-smacking and solid blocking helped Louisiana State win No. 1 collegiate ranking in 1958.

As additional passing targets, Tripucka, Dublinski and Herring have Bill Jessup, a nine-year profrom Southern California, and towering Don Carothers, whose brilliant receiving helped Dick Jamieson of the TITANS win Little All-American acclaim at Bradley a few years back.

A king-sized offensive line includes such "name" players as Ken Adamson, Notre Dame's 1959 captain; Carl Larpenter of Texas' Cotton Bowl team and Fred Broussard, an All-Southwest Conference center at Texas A. & M.

There also is a lot of proven talent on the defensive platoon. Among its leaders are linebacker Hardy Brown, the scourge of the National League for several years; fleet Frank Bernardi, who played in the defensive backfield of the Cardinals for a spell before going to Canada, and 280-pound Bud McFadin, a well-seasoned tackle from Texas.

Dale Dodrill, a perennial allpro middle guard with the Pittsburgh Steelers, and Jim Cason, an outstanding defensive back and kick returner with the San Francisco Forty-Niners, are Filchock's aides. Backing them up in the front office is Dean Griffing, another old pro who put in nearly twenty-five years as coach and general manager of various Canadian teams.

Denver further benefits by owning its own ballpark. The Broncos are the only team in either American pro football league that can make such a claim. They play in beautiful Bears Stadium, the property of their owner-president, Bob Howsam, who also controls the Denver baseball franchise, for years the most successful minor league operation in the country.

Introducing the TITANS

If it hadn't been for a couple of the erratic bounces that footballs have a way of taking, Blanche Martin would have been a sure-fire All-America last season. Bad break No. 1 was a knee operation that scared off selectors who had him tabbed for greatness off his brilliant play of 1957 and 1958, when he was rated Michigan State's most valuable all-around back. Bad Break No. 2 was the Spartans' 1959 switch to a double-wing attack in which Martin at fullback was cast in a less conspicious, though equally important, role. Completely sound of limb again, this trim 195-pounder is a tremendous football player. He has a quick start, straight-ahead power and the speed to go outside; he's an outstanding pass-catcher and a daring kick-returner; he punts well, blocks like fury and could qualify for the defensive platoon of the rare team than has no place for him on its offensive unit. A married man, he has two young children.

As a member of Arizona State's high-scoring Red Devils of 1956-57, Leon Burton compiled a fantastic ground-gaining record. He was an All-Border Conference selection twice, won honorable All-America mention and at the close of his senior season played in the East-West Shrine, Copper Bowl and All-American Bowl games. A native of Flint, Mich., Burton was a track, basketball and football star in high school there. He had a brief trial with the Cleveland Browns last year, then played in Canada. Lightning fast and a snake-hipped runner in the open field, his chief role with the Titans will be as a punt and kick-off return specialist. He also will be used as a relief halfback on offense.

General Manager Steve Sebo's all-embracing knowledge of the football players who performed in the Philadelphia area during Steve's six-year stay at Pennsylvania is responsible for the presence on the Titan roster of **Joe Ryan.** This rugged citizen was a crack center and linebacker for Villanova in 1954-55. He played service football in the Army in 1957-58, then dropped out of the game after a brief 1959 fling with the Philadelphia Eagles. Sebo induced Joe to give pro football another try with the Titans. He joined the club only a few weeks before the season opened, having had a previous engagement to get married in July. A marketing major at Villanova, Ryan has an off-season job with the New York City Youth Board. A 235-pounder who hits hard, he is being used as a defensive end, as well as a linebacker.

Introducing the TITANS

The Big Ten always has been noted for its rugged linemen. The Titans have come up with one of the more rugged ones in Nick Mumley. This 1959 Purdue graduate, obtained on waivers from the Dallas Texans shortly before the season opened, has stepped right into the defensive rushline. He's listed as starting right end but is serviceable anywhere along the four-man frontier. Six-foot-four and 255 pounds. Nick has the speed, power and desire to raise behind-the-line havoc with opposing runners, passers and kickers. He played in the College All-Star game in Chicago in 1959, then reported to the Philadelphia Eagles, who had drafted him. As often happens with all-stars, the practice time he missed cost Mumley a real shot at a job. Obviously, though, he's ready now.

An all-time University of Pennsylvania great, Ed Bell came to the Titans with three seasons of National League and two of Canadian League experience to his credit. A two-way end in college, Ed has found his niche in pro football as an outside linebacker. He also is serviceable as a corner man in the deep secondary. A well-knit 218-pounder, he is as quick on his feet as a cat and has a wonderful sense of anticipation that generally puts him in the right place at the right time. At Penn, Bell received All-America recognition in both 1951 and 1952, a rare honor for an Ivy Leaguer in this football era.

A native of Baltimore and a graduate of Baylor University, Chuck Dupre of the Titans' defensive backfield is the second member of his family to make the grade in pro football. He is a younger brother of L.G. (Long Gone) Dupre, a star offensive halfback with the Baltimore Colts who now is with the Dallas Cowboys of the National League. Chuck won All-Southwest Conference honors at Baylor, where he excelled on offense as well as on defense. One of the fastest Titan players, he is an ace pass defender at either safety post.

Did You Know That ?

Dick Todd, the backfield coach of the TI-TANS, made his first appearance at the Polo Grounds in 1937 as a member of a Texas A.&M. team that won a 13-7 thriller with Manhattan College on a 65-yard run by . . . guess who? . . . Dick Todd . . . At 6 feet 9 inches, Joe Katcik, the TITANS tackle, is the tallest player in the American Football League . . . That three TITANS -Dewey Bohling, Pete Hart and Gene Cockrell also played under Coach Sammy Baugh at Hardin-Simmons . . . Eastern colleges have been the chief source of TITAN playing talent. Twelve TITANS are from Eastern schools, nine from the Midwest, six each from the South and Southwest and two from the Far West... The East also can lay claim to Ted Wegert, a Riverhead, L. I., product who bypassed college completely en route to pro football . . . Tom Saidock, the hard-nosed TITAN defensive tackle, sells soft drinks in the off-season, for the Canada Dry corporation . . . Roger Ellis, the TITAN linebacker, is a civil engineer . . . Dick Jamieson, the TITAN quarterback, aspires to a career in the public relations field . . . Don Rossi, the general manager of the Dallas Texans, who play here on Thanksgiving Day, was on the National Football League officiating staff last season . . . Roger Donnahoo, the TITAN defensive back, is an ardent philantelist (stamp collector, to you) . . . The upcoming TITAN road games at Dallas on Oct. 2, at Houston on Oct. 9 and at Buffalo on Oct. 16 will be televised back to New York via Channel 7. Les Keiter will do the play-by-play description ... In his sixteen years with the Washington Redskins, Slingin' Sammy Baugh, the coach of the TITANS, advanced the ball more than twelveand-a-half miles (22,085 yards) via his 1709 pass completions. They were good for 187 touchdowns. These all are National Football League records that still stand...Bob Marques, the TITAN linebacker, and Rick Sapienza, the TITAN punting specialist and sometimes pass receiver, live around the corner from each other in Everett. Mass. ... That handsome cover illustration of Sammy Baugh was executed by Tom Beecham . . . Commissioner Joe Foss of the American Football League was one of the most decorated airmen of World War II. As a Marine fighter pilot, he shot down twenty-six enemy planes. Among other awards, he received the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Congressional Medal of Honor.

A former football and baseball star at Michigan State, later backfield coach at his alma mater when the Spartans ran up a record 28-game football winning streak, Steve Sebo received his appointment as general manager of the TITANS of New York in early December, 1959.

Prior to his TITANS appointment, Sebo had spent six seasons as head football coach at the University of Pennsylvania. His 1959 Quaker Eleven won the Ivy League title with a 6-1 mark and had an overall season mark of 7-1-1 including a 22-22 tie with Navy.

Sebo's three varsity years at Michigan State—1934-35-36—were great years for the Spartans. A three year record of 20 wins, four losses and two ties included three straight wins over arch-rival Michigan. Sebo was the leading scorer for the Spartans in both 1934 and 1936 operating as a wingback. As a catcher with the MSU baseball team, he was one of the top hitters in the mid-west and took the team batting title in 1937.

After coaching at Petoskey (Mich.), High School for four years, Sebo entered the Air Force during World War II, and attained the rank of Major before his discharge in June, 1946. He then became director of athletics and head coach at Alma, Mich., College and in two years developed an unbeaten and untied team that was one of but thirteen

in the nation in 1948. During his Alma tenure he also served as president of the coaches group of the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

In 1949, Sebo was backfield coach at Harvard under Art Valpey. A year later he returned to Michigan State as freshman coach. In 1952, he moved up to the varsity backfield post, which position he held until he moved to Penn as head coach in 1954.

During his MSU coaching days,

Sebo saw the Spartans become national champions in 1952, co-champions of the Big Ten in their first season in the league (1953) and winner of the Rose Bowl game on January 1, 1954, when MSU defeated a tough UCIA team, 28-20.

The TITANS general manager is married to the former Margaret Morrison, whom he met while teaching at Petoskey. The couple have one child, a son, Jimmy, age nine.

Things You Should Know About the AFL Rules

With one major exception, the American Football League will play under the established pro football rules.

The exception involves the conversion rule. In line with the provocative and popular change adopted by the colleges two years ago, the A.F.L. will give its teams the option after a touchdown of trying for one point via a place kick or for two points via a running or passing play. The try will be from the 2-yard line.

A.F.L. football includes all the other rules features that have made pro football such a fast, wide-open and

exciting game.


The goal posts are on the goal line, encouraging field goal kicking. There are no restrictions on substitutions, permitting teams to present their most talented specialists in all situations. A ball-carrier may get up off the ground and keep going, provided he was not knocked from his feet as a result of contact with an opponent. Defensive players are permitted to advance a recovered fumble.

These progressive A.F.L. rules are just another reason why there is no football like pro football.


