

Personable Dean Griffing, probably the most experienced general manager in the American Football League, brings a lifetime of football background and knowhow — both administrative and coaching — to Denver and America's newest major sports circuit.

In fact, the 45-year old Griffing became a general manager in the professional football ranks just two years after he had graduated from Kansas State as an

All-Big Six center in 1934.

The native of Wichita, Kan., moved right into the dual role of coach and general manager of the Saskatchewan Roughriders in the Canadian League. Success

was quick in coming. In his first splash into the rough and rugged waters of pro football, his Roughriders were Western Conference champions.

Later he served with Toronto and Calgary, then returned to Saskatchewan in 1952 to team with Frank Filchock, now head coach of the Broncos, and the two collaborated to build one of the finest clubs

and organizations in the Canadian League. For almost a quarter of a century, Griffing coached and directed the fortunes

of Canadian League teams.

A desire to retire after those many successful years in the tough Canadian grid circuit, led Griffing to Tucson, Ariz., and acceptance of the post of executive director of the Optimist Bowl — a game that annually pits the stars of major and minor colleges against each other in that city.

But, after two years in that capacity, Griffing heeded the call to return to professional football and accepted his present post with the Denver Broncos where he has been an invaluable leader in the building of the Mile High City's initial venture into the pro sport.

His wealth of contacts and experience throughout Canada have helped the Bronco general manager construct one of the league's most experienced clubs. Likewise, it will be a valuable aid in future talent

scouting and recruiting.

Dean and his wife, Bea, have two children — Barbara Dean, 14, and Douglas Frederick, 10.







RAMPAGING BUFFALO BILLS HERE NEXT

The Buffalo Bills, roaring back after a slow start, will be out to avenge an early season defeat at the hands of the Denver Broncos when they run on to the Bears Stadium turf Sunday, Nov. 27.

The Broncos took the Bills into camp in the second game of the season in the western New York city last Sept. 18, 27-21, in a thriller in which Johnny Pyeatt's key interception in the fourth quarter enabled the Broncos to come

from behind for the victory.

Since then the Bills made several key changes in personnel and only this past week succeeded in knocking off the eastern division leading Houston Oilers, 25-24.

Primary revision in the Bills' attack was the signing recently of quarterback Johnny Green

whose collegiate reputation was established at the University of Chattanooga. Noted as an exceptionally fine passer and field general, Green lived up to his reputation as he completed two touchdown passes against the Oilers. One was a magnificent 70-yard play, overall, to Wray Carlton for the first Bill score. Later in the game another Greenoriginated aerial culminated in a Buffalo TD.

Defensive halfback Bill Atkins uncanny field goal kicking ability also will make a difference in the Buffalo attack. The former Auburn star, for instance, hit three-pointers from 45, 22 and 15 yards out to topple the Houstonians.

And linebacker Archie Matsos bulwarks a stout defense which is the best in the league, giving up less yardage than any other American Football League entry.

Coached by Garrard (Buster) Ramsey the Bills boast a club which should come fast in the last half of the race and their exciting one-point victory over the hitherto all-powerful Oilers could presage a close battle down the line in the east.



A founder of the Continental League, recently absorbed by the present major leagues, Howsam is looking forward to the day when major league baseball will join professional football in the Mile High City.

A leading citizen of Denver, Howsam belongs to some 40 organizations and has been honored by being named to many esteemed positions in the community.

Bob and his wife, Janet, are the parents of two boys, Bobby, 18, and Edwin, 16.





PETE MANGUM . . . Linebacker . . . 6-1 220 . . . 27 . . . Mississippi . . . A five-year veteran of the National Football and Canadian Leagues. After graduation in 1954 signed with the New York Giants and turned out to be one of their top linebackers before going into service in 1956. Returning from service he played with the Giants for two years and one year in Canada. Lettered three years at Ole Miss, being named to the All Southeastern Conference defensive platoon in 1953, the last year the free substitution rule was in effect in the college ranks. Good reactions and can play either the corner or middle linebacking spots.

JOHN HATLEY . . . Defensive tackle . . . 6-4 . . . 260 . . . 30 . . Sul Ross (Tex.) . . . Another small college graduate who developed after he turned pro. A four-year veteran of the NFL with the Chicago Bears, who he broke in with, the Chicago Cards and Philadelphia Eagles. Particularly tough to the inside and is very rarely trapped. Was with the Dallas Texans during most of exhibition season then came to the Broncos in a trade that sent defensive halfback Bob Rosbaugh of Miami U. to Dallas. A quiet, serious leader who does most of his talking on the field, Hatley is from Uvalde, Tex

GORDY HOLZ . . . Offensive tackle . . . 6-4 270 26 Minnesota . . . A teammate of Bronco halfback Bob McNamara both in college and pro ball. Played with "Mac" at Minnesota and later at Winnipeg in the Canadian League. Obtained by the Broncos during the exhibition season from the Boston Patriots in exchange for center Larry Cundiff. Big and strong with plenty of speed, Holz can really go get 'em. Playing both ways in Canada he developed good lateral movements which makes him a tough man to get by. While at Minnesota became known around the Big 10 as one of hardest hitters in the league.







It is only proper and fitting that Denver, one of the nation's busiest sports centers, is privileged to present this most spectacular of all games.

A new era dawns in the vastly expanded sports activities of the bustling Mile High City with the introduction of Coach Frank Filchock's rip-snorting Broncos.

What we used to get such a wallop out of on the television screen now comes to us in the flesh with the inaugural season of the ambitious American Football League.

Bob Howsam and his associates in Empire Sports Inc. are to be complimented for bringing this AFL franchise into our midst. This chance taking project further proves the faith investors in Empire Sports Inc. have in the sports future of our Rocky Mountain West.





Shows five years of experience in the National Football League with the Cleveland Browns, Philadelphia Eagles and Green Bay Packers. A firey leader in the defensive forward wall, King has good lateral movement as well as a strong, straight ahead charge making him a threat to break up the wide sweep or the off-tackle slant. Learned his football young in Turtle Creek, Pa., where he played high school ball. One of the most well-proportioned men on the Bronco squad.



KEN ADAMSON . . . Offensive guard . . 6-2 One of the hardest workers on the squad and a tremendous competitor. Has developed into stand-out blocker, both in the line and downfield. 









GEORGE HERRING . . . Quarterback . . . 6-3 200 . . . 26 . . . Miss. Southern . . A two-year veteran of the Canadian League who could be one of the American Football League's outstanding punters. Quarterbacked one of the nation's top small college teams in 1956 when Miss. Southern won 9 and lost 1. Was fifth in the nation that year in punting and went on to play in the Senior Bowl. Herring performed for Vancouver and Regina in the Canadian League, playing offensive quarterback and handling all the punting. Both years he was among the league's leading punters with better than a 40-yard average. 
ELDON DANENHAUER . . . Offensive tackle 6-4 . . . 235 . . . 25 . . . Pittsburg St. (Kan.) . . . An excellent blocker with tremendous strength and desire. One of two brothers on the Bronco squad, Eldon is playing his first year in pro ball. He started at College of Emporia in Kansas, the same school his brother Bill attended, but switched to Pittsburg St. to make quite a name for himself his senior year. He and Bill, who's one year older than Eldon, teamed up at Clay Center, Kan., high school for three unbeaten seasons covering 27 games to rank as one of the top high school teams in the state during 1951.



BOB McNAMARA . . . Offensive halfback . . . 6-0 . . . 185 . . . 26 . . . Minnesota . . . One of the outstanding backs ever to perform in the Big 10, "Mac" was a concensus All American in 1954. After graduation he signed with Winnipeg in the Canada League and played four years. In 1956, his second year in the league, he was the top rusher with 1,157 yards and was named to the Canadian League All Star squad. Besides being a good runner McNamara has an uncanny knack of getting open to receive passes. For that reason he'll be a flanker back in Coach Filchock's offensive setup. During the off season "Mac" operates a restaurant and lounge in Minneapolis, Minn.



DAVE ROLLE . . . Offensive fullback . . . 6-0 . . . 205 . . . 23 . . . Oklahoma . . . A power runner who's tough to bring down. Can go to the outside with good speed on either the quick pitchout or flare pass. A member of outstanding Oklahoma teams of 1956, '57 and '58 which lost only two games, one to Notre Dame, 7-0, and the other to Texas, 15-14. A starting fullback his last two years, Rolle's main job was to serve as a blocker for Oklahoma's speedy halfbacks. His development as a runner stems from his blocking experience, as he has learned to use his shoulders to bowl over would-be tacklers. This is his second year in pro ball having played last season with Edmonton in the Canadian League.



RED BRODNAX . . . Offensive fullback . . . 6-0 . . . 195 . . L.S.U. . . . Played first string fullback on L.S.U.'s national championship club of 1958. Clearing the way for the much publicized Billy Cannon, Brodnax was voted the most valuable player in the Southeastern Conference that year and was also awarded the Jacobs trophy, given annually to the outstanding blocker in the league. Steady performer who's always ready when the going gets tough. Has developed into good power runner and still retains his blocking ability. A native of Bastrop, La., where he played high school ball, Brodnax is playing his first year of pro ball.

FRANK FILCHOCK

HEAD COACH DENVER BRONCOS

Returning to the American coaching ranks after a successful career in the Canadian League, the 43-year-old Filchock brings with him an outstanding offensive background. Using a variation of the winged T, commonly referred to as the double fullback system, Filchock finished in the Canadian League playoffs eight out of nine years. Being a former quarterback in both the National Football and Canadian Leagues, Filchock builds his offense around the forward pass. A native of Grindstone Gulch, Pa., Filchock was a brilliant passer for the late Bo McMillian at Indiana University from 1935 through 1937 before joining the Washington Redskins in 1938. He teamed with Sammy Baugh, currently the coach of the New York Titans in the AFL, through the early '40's to make Washington one of the top clubs in pro football history.

Filchock still holds the NFL record for the longest pass play. He and teammate Andy Farkas hooked up for a 99-yard touchdown aerial against Pittsburgh in 1939. He quarterbacked the New York Giants to the Eastern Division Conference championship in 1946 before going to Canada. In 1949, his third year in the Canadian style of play, Filchock was named Canadian Athlete of the Year after leading Montreal to the Gray Cup Championship. Teamed with Bronco general manager Dean Griffing at Regina to build one of the league's top clubs, beginning in 1953. Came to Denver after being backfield coach at Calgary in 1959. Frank, his wife Dorothy and their two children, Gladys, 18, and John, 17, have made Wheat Ridge, Colo., their permanent home.

Groomed for professional coaching through association as a player with America's most successful powers, former all-pro tackle Lou Rymkus holds the fate of the Oilers in his huge hands.

Seven years a pro player and seven times a participant in title games, the offensive captain of the 1950 world champion Cleveland Browns has been coaching pro football since 1953. Last season he was an assistant to Sid Gillman with the Los Angeles Rams.





And memories will be reflected when Bob Stransky, former Colorado University All-American, carries the ball. And they'll like the eager efforts of Rookies Henry Bell and Gene Mingo.



Filchock came up with a gem in his secondary in Rookie Austin Gonsoulin, a ball hawking "phenom" from the cloistered halls of Baylor Univer-





AL CARMICHAEL . . . Offensive halfback . . . 6-0 . . . 190 30 . . . U.S.C. . . . Six-year veteran of the pro wars, all with the Green Bay Packers. Great kickoff and punt return specialist besides being a good runner and pass receiver. Holds the NFL record for the longest kickoff return — 106 yards against the Chicago Bears in 1956. Carmichael also holds the NFL mark for most kickoff returns — 153 covering six seasons for 3,907 yards. He's second in most kickoffs and yards returned for one season — 33 for 927 yards and a 28.1 average, all in 1956. An All Pacific Coast Conference choice in 1950 and '52 with Southern California, Carmichael is a Hollywood stunt man in both the movies and television during the off season.

BILL YELVERTON . . . Defensive end . . . 6-4 . . . 222 . . . 26 . . . University of Mississippi . . . Signed just prior to the Oakland game on Oct. 2, "Foots" was a stickout for the Broncos in their 31-14 victory. A star for the amazing Johnny Vaught at Ole Miss, Yelverton also can handle the offensive guard post. He played professional ball after his graduation from the Oxford school with the Calgary Stampeders of the Canadian League. In his first game for the Broncos he was named defensive player of the week by sports writers covering the game.

SKIP DOYLE . . . Defensive halfback . . . 6-0 . . . 190 29 . . . Ohio State . . . Another late addition to the Bronco squad. A two-year veteran with the Pittsburgh Steelers; a three-year letterman and an All-Big 10 selection at Ohio State. Handled both offensive and defensive halfback chores with the Buckeyes. Hobbies are golf and sports of all kinds. Married (Mary) and has a son, George (2/27/54). Lives in Columbus, Ohio, during the off-season where he and John Hlay, a former Buckeye teammate and Green Bay pro vet, are partners in a night club.

FRANK TRIPUCKA . . . Quarterback . . . 6-2 . . . 205 . . . 32 . . . Notre Dame . . . Brilliant passer and field general on Notre Dame's unbeaten team of 1948, the "Tripper" started his pro career with the Chicago Cardinals before moving to Canada. In Canadian ball, Tripucka posted an amazing 56.4 complete passing percentage. In 1956 with Regina he set three all-time Canadian League records that still stand — most passes thrown (383), most completed (216) and most yardage (3,274). In his seven seasons of Canadian competition he tossed 84 touchdown passes for an average of 12 per year. Played high school ball in Bloomfield, N. J., and then went to Notre Dame to perform under Frank Leahy on the Fighting Irish's great teams of 1946, '47, '48. Teamed with Johnny Lujack in 1947 as the Irish tied a great Army team, 0-0, in one of collegiate football's outstanding games. In business with another former Notre Dame quarterback, Angelo Bertelli, in Bloomfield.

CARL LARPENTER . . . Offensive tackle or guard . . . 6-3 . . . 230 . . . 23 . . . Texas . . . Making his debut in pro ball after completing service. "Larp" has good potential for either offensive tackle or guard due to his speed and size. Wicked blocker in the line as well as being a man who can pull out and lead the play. Was an end in high school at Port Arthur, Tex., and played both offense and defense. When he enrolled at Texas they decided to make a tackle out of him and he's been at the position ever since. He and Bronco defensive halfback Austin Gonsoulin played high school ball together.

AS BOWIE SEES THE PLAYERS - Denver Post Sports Writer

Expansion of major league baseball has been a serious topic in the past few years, but it took the American Football League to do something about it.

A group of men from eight coast-tocoast cities reacted vigorously slightly more than a year ago on the expansion subject and today the AFL is a reality.

The teams in Denver, Los Angeles, Oakland, Dallas, New York, Buffalo, Boston and Houston are tributes too, to their swiftness in bringing into reality the country's newest major league.

Now the championship race is underway and it will help keep professional football before the nationwide public until the AFL playoff game in December.

The new league is not claiming that it is an even competitor with the 41-year-old National Football League at this stage of the game.

Its players and teams are good and capable of dazzling audiences with thrilling football. Possibly in a few years the dream of Commissioner Joe Foss and the owners, coaches and players in the far-flung circuit, the new AFL champion will meet the NFL titlist on an annual basis for the pro football championship of the world.

Hundreds of good football players are graduated from the nation's colleges each year. Before the AFL came into being on Sept. 9 when the Denver Broncos and the Boston Patriots played the first league game of the season, hardly 100 players a year made the jump from college campus to the professional ranks.

Now there is room for nearly 300 more players of professional caliber.

The AFL scored a sensational "first" by outbidding the established National League for most of last year's college stars, landing nearly 75 percent of the headliners.

American League rosters carry such names as Billy Cannon, Charlie Flowers, Richie Lucas, Ron Burton, Jack Spikes, Austin Gonsoulin, Abner Haynes, Blanche Martin and Johnny Robinson.

The rosters also include solid old pros who have earned their combat badges in pro football wars.

They include Frank Tripucka and Bud McFadin of the Denver Broncos, Tommy O'Connell, George Blanda, Babe Parilli, Sid Youngman, Al Dorow—and a host of others, who, mingled with the rookies, give solidarity to the new league.

Pro football traditionally develops its own stars and heroes. Go back several years. Do you remember Cliff Battles? Ken Strong? Harry Newman? Sammy Baugh? And more recently—Johnny Unitas and Big Daddy Lipscomb of the Baltimore Colts?

In most cases they were unknowns until they established themselves in the play-for-pay ranks.

The new American League starts from scratch this season. But competition is even, the main ingredient of any athletic contest.

Balance and good, thrilling competition is the purpose to which the American Football League is dedicated.

And that's what the fans want. The American Football League is on its way to that goal.

DALE DODRILL . . . Line Coach . . . A former Colorado State University and Pittsburgh Steeler great, Dodrill, 33, will be serving his first year in the coaching profession as he guides the Bronco line prospects. Dodrill has been one of the top middle guards and linebackers in the NFL for the past nine years. He was an All Pro defensive choice in 1953, '54 and '55. He spent his entire career with Pittsburg and he holds the Steeler record for the longest blocked kick return — an 83-yard run against the Los Angeles Rams in 1952. An employee of a Denver insurance firm during the off-season, Dodrill lettered four years at Colorado State U. playing with such pro greats as Thurman McGraw, Jim David and Jack Christiansen. Dodrill was twice All Skyline. The Stockton, Kan., native closed out his collegiate career with outstanding performances in the 1950 East-West Shrine game and the College All-Star game of 1951. He was All State in football in 1942 and '43 at Loveland, Colo., high school. Living in Lakewood, Colo., Dale and his wife Janet are the parents of two sons, Garrett, 4, and Michael, 2.

JIM CASON . . . Backfield Coach . . . a great defensive back for eight years in the National Football League, playing with the San Francisco 49ers and Los Angeles Rams. Cason, 33, is beginning his first year in coaching after two years of operating an insurance business in Harlingen, Tex. An outstanding running back with L.S.U. in 1945, '46 and '47, Cason broke in with the 49ers in 1948. He played with San Francisco through '52 and then went to Canada one year to play under Filchock at Regina. In 1954 he was back with San Francisco, switching to the Rams in 1955 and '56. In '55 the Rams won the Western Conference crown with Cason performing brilliantly at defensive halfback. Jim played his high school ball in Victoria, Tex., where he lettered three years in both football and track. Jim and his wife, Helen, live in Harlingen during the off season with their two children, Becky Jean, 8, and Pete, 4.

Other management player personnel are: Fred Posey, Trainer; Harvey Stephen, Equipment Manager.



Below are biographies of DENVER BRONCO players pictured on page 14 of this program.

DAVE STRICKLAND . . . Linebacker . . . 5-11 . . . 215 . . . 28 . . . Memphis St. . . . The fastest defensive lineman on the squad. Nicknamed the "Frog" because of his husky build from the waist up and his slim halfback type legs. An end in college at Memphis St., Strickland started as a flanker in proball in Canada but was changed to an offensive guard by Bronco Coach Frank Filchock because of his speed. Playing his first year at linebacker, the four-year Canadian veteran has adapted very well. Good rusher who can crash to the inside and get his man as well as being able to adjust to the outside to stop the end sweeps.

FRANK BERNARDI . . . Defensive halfback . . . 5-9 . . . 185 . . . 26 . . . Colorado . . . Hard-nosed tackler and defender who comes to play. Four years of experience as a defensive back with the Chicago Cards has made him a smart defender. Comes up fast to meet running plays and is rarely caught out of position. One of Colorado University's all-time greats making second team All American in 1954 as well as the All Big 8 squad. His second year in the pro ranks, 1956, he set a record in the National Football League that still stands. Against Washington he legged a punt return 95 yards for a touchdown, the third longest punt return in NFL history.

HENRY BELL . . . Offensive halfback . . . 5-10 . . . 210 . . . Service Ball . . . Explosive runner with power and speed. Played four years of service ball in the Army after graduating from Valdosta, Ga., high school where he earned All City honors his senior year. In 1956, his first year of service competition, he was chosen on the All Army team while playing with Hawaii. Bell was the first string left half on Hawaii's 1957 team that went undefeated in 10 games. That year he received a bid to play in the Hula Bowl. In 1958 and '59 he played with Ft. Riley, Kan., ranking as one of the top rushers in service ball both years.

LIONEL TAYLOR . . . Offensive end . . . 6-2 . . . 214 . . . 23 . . . New Mexico Highlands . . . Could easily develop into one of the AFL's outstanding offensive ends, if not the best. Joined the Broncos just before the third game of the regular season — a two-year vet with the Chicago Bears. Big and fast, a three-year letterman at Highlands where he also saw some duty at tailback off the single-wing attack. Also lettered three times and captained his college basketball team. Pet superstition is making sure his shoe tongues are always turned down and his socks are up. Hobby is cards. Married (Lorencita) and has a daughter, Loretta (3/17/59). High school star at Buffalo High in Accoville, W. Va. Now lives in Las Vegas, N. M.

AL DAY . . . Linebacker . . . 6-2 . . . 216 . . . 22 . . . East Michigan University . . . Another pro rookie, has played end and offensive fullback, but excells on defense; good reactions and speed. "Big AI" was team's Most Valuable Player during his senior college year. Biggest thrill came during high school football when he scored winning point off a fake placement and pass to give Detroit Pershing a state championship title before a huge Briggs Stadium throng.

BOB STRANSKY . . . Offensive halfback . . . 6-1 . . . 180 . . . 24 . . . Colorado . . . One of the greatest backfield performers in Colorado history. A tough, tricky runner, single-wing tailback during his college days; made Look Magazine's All American team in 1957 when he led the Buffalos in scoring and total yardage. Played in East-West Shrine game. Second year in proball. Played with Winnipeg, Canadian Gray Cup champs, in 1958. Native of Yankton, S. D., and now makes Denver his home.





TELEVISION COVERAGE

Professional football is the fastest growing spectator sport in America today, and the ABC-TV Network holds a similar position in the broadcasting field, so it was only natural that the two join forces.

We at the network are particularly pleased that our association with pro football should be with the new American Football League. Not only will we be bringing the finest football played to millions of viewers every week, but we feel that through our contract with the AFL we will be playing an important role in the development of this newest addition to the American sport scene. At the same time the AFL is playing a major role in our own growth plan in the area of sports broadcasting which would not be complete without professional football on the schedule.

The telecasting of AFL games adds to the over-all sports picture at ABC-TV, which now includes NCAA football, major league baseball and professional boxing, golf and bowling.

Through our association with the AFL many Americans who never have had an opportunity to see the exciting and polished game of football, as the pros play it now, will be able to enjoy this sport. As a result of these telecasts we at ABC-TV believe we will be instrumental in making new fans for the American Football League.


The telecast schedule calls for 32 games to be aired on 17 dates. Thirty of these games will be broadcast on 15 Sunday afternoon playing dates with one game offered to the eastern half of the country and another game presented in the West-

ern portion of the United States. On Thanksgiving Day one game will be aired nationally and at the close of regular season play, the championship game between the Eastern and Western divisional winners will be broadcast. Oakland, incidentally, has the honor of opening the telecast schedule in the West on Sept. 11, playing host to the Houston Oilers. That same date Buffalo at New York will be aired in the East. Oakland will appear on six regular season national telecasts.

The playing talent gathered by the eight AFL teams represents the cream of the 1959 college stars, including such standouts as Billy Cannon of LSU, Richie Lucas of Penn State, Charlie Flowers of Mississippi and many fine players with previous pro experience in the United States and Canada. The presence of these fine players on the AFL elevens insures top-flight competition in every game.

To mold these stars into precision gridiron units the AFL has eight of the country's top coaches in Oakland's Eddie Erdelatz, Sammy Baugh with New York, Frank Filchock of Denver, Sid Gillman of Los Angeles, Lou Rymkus of Houston, Buster Ramsey of Buffalo, Lou Saban of Boston and Hank Stram of Dallas.

The ingredients are all there — great players, fine management and coaching efficiency — and from ABC-TV a well trained team of producers, directors, cameramen, technicians and announcers who will bring the stirring pro gridiron action to people all over the country.



History of the AMERICAN FOOTBALL LEAGUE

Yesterday a Dream, Today a Reality

The American Football League—a dream come true for young, capable Lamar Hunt, a 27-year old Dallas oilman, received its initial breath of air in January, 1959, when the idea simply popped into his head after unsuccessfully trying to bring National League Football into Dallas.

Hunt's idea for a new league formulated swiftly. Two others besides the soft-spoken Texan—Denver's Bob Howsam and Houston's Bud Adams had likewise experienced rough sledding in trying to bring professional football to their respective cities.

In fact, along with being denied entrance into the NFL, they weren't given any encouragement that they would ever get in.

First, Hunt contacted Adams, another young Texas oilman, and at their first meeting the two simply talked about football and their mutual problems in unsuccessfully trying to acquire pro football for Dallas and Houston. Hunt didn't reveal his ambitions to Adams, but two months later he contacted both Howsam and Adams, shared his idea and acquired a pair of allies.

Howsam, New York City's Harry Wismer and a trio of Minneapolis-St. Paul businessmen soon brought in their cities and the young unannounced loop was up to five clubs.


For Howsam, it finally meant the beginning of realizing his ambition to bring professional football to Denver.

In the summer of 1959, Howsam, representing the American Football League official again contacted the late Bert Bell on any possibilities of NFL expansion, but the commissioner assured them there would be none. It was soon after this that the AFL revealed to Bell the plans for a new league.

Other events quickly fell into place and on August 15, 1959, in a Chicago meeting, the AFL made a formal announcement of its existence, consisting of a charter group of six — Dallas, Houston, Denver, New York City, Minneapolis-St. Paul and Los Angeles, the latter being just brought in by Barron Hilton.

Miami was slated to be the seventh city of the eight-team loop, but stadium problems switched that franchise to Buffalo and in November, 1959, Boston became the eighth member.

But, not all was peaches and cream. In January of this year, a charter member was lost when Minneapolis-St. Paul officials regretfully pulled out when they couldn't secure adequate stadium rights. This situation was brought on when NFL officials sent a wire to a Minneapolis newspaper promising that city an NFL franchise for 1961.

While all this trouble was brewing and before the actual withdrawal of Minneapolis-St. Paul, the league named Joe Foss, South Dakota's highly and widely-respected World War II fighter pilot ace and former governor, as commissioner for a threeyear term.

Soon afterward, in a Dallas get-together, Oakland was admitted as the eighth member to again bring the loop up to full strength.

In the hectic months that followed, organizational problems were attacked and whipped, League, front-office, coaching and player personnel were hired and the fledgling American Football League was well on its way to a successful entry into America's sporting world.

On a Friday evening, September 9, 1960, at Braves Field, home of the old Boston Braves baseball team, the Denver Broncos and the Boston Patriots tangled in the first American Football League game of its infant history.

The eight-car train was off and running, roaring down the track of success with a full head of steam.






He was also associated in professional baseball with Miami and Colorado Springs. During the off season he salls

A PEEK-A-BOO at TODAY'S ENEMY

Today's football assignment — well, pardon the help of an old cliche, but it's like skyrocketing out of a sizzling frying pan and diving headlong into the fire itself.

Last week it was the Dallas Texans and now it's the other half of Texas' rugged AFL twosome, the equally-powerful Houston Oilers, who give the Broncos' divisional title hopes

another stiff acid test, and it's common knowledge that the Broncos need this one badly.

The Oilers — shepherded by Lou Rymkus — hit town with the league's top record, a 5-2 mark, and their only losses have been scant one-pointers to Oakland and Buffalo, two of the loop's most improved clubs.

A heralded youngster who is beginning to live up to the awesome tales of his gridiron prowess and a battle-wise veteran who just could wind up as the league's most valuable player are two of the biggest reasons why the Oilers are so successful.

Billy Cannon, the former LSU All-American and Heisman Trophy winner, is the "youngster" everybody wanted.

A 210-pounder with a tremendous combination of speed and power — he can reel off 100 yards in less than ten seconds and can push a shot well over 50 feet — is just beginning to dazzle everyone with his talent after a somewhat lackluster exhibition season.

But, many insisted that the wraps were on Cannon during the pre-season tilts and it's a good bet that such was the case. After all, the remarkable Cannon is reported to be either league's highest paid player, reportedly drawing a whopping \$110,000 over a three-year period.

Anyway, ever since the opening of the season, he has ranked as one of the loop's top three rushers and in the Oilers' 25-24 loss to Buffalo last week, Cannon speared touchdown passes of 22 and 53 yards.

The "veteran" is big versatile George Blanda who used to do some great quarterbacking for the Chicago Bears.

Blanda, one of pro football's all-time place-kicking greats, is the AFL's leading scorer with 74 points and still holds the NFL record for most consecutive points after touchdown. The 6-2, 210-lb., Blanda booted 156 in a row for the Bears in a period from 1951 to 1956.

George was on the pitching end of Cannon's two touchdown catches against the Bills and also flipped a third TD aerial in the contest. In that same game, Blanda kicked a 50-yard field goal, the AFL's longest yet.

Probably the most pleasant surprise on the Oilers has been the powerful running of fullback Dave Smith who hails from little Ripon (Wis.) College. Smith, a pile-driving 205-pounder in his first season of pro ball, has been the league's leading ground-gainer for most of the season.

Jacky Lee (Cincinnati) and Charlie Milstead (Texas A&M) are Blanda's helpers at quarterback while two graduates from little Northwest Louisiana, Charlie Hennigan and Charlie Tolar, are two other halfback standouts. Ken Hall (Texas A&M) is another halfback and is the lad who stepped off a 105-yard kickoff return against the New York Titans.

Bill Groman (Heidelberg) and John Carson (Georgia) are a fine pair of offensive ends and a new addition at offensive guard is Wahoo McDaniel, the former star end at the University of Oklahoma. McDaniel is now up to 240 pounds.

The defensive crew is headed by big Orville Trask, a 258-lb. tackle from Rice. In his first season of pro ball, Trask is also the Houston team captain.

A real meanie at a linebacker spot is Dennit Morris, another former Sooner great. Morris, an agile 225-pounder, operates at the middle linebacking post.

Don Floyd (TCU) and Dan Lanphear (Wisconsin) are All-American tackles now handling defensive end berths. Bobby Gordon (Tennessee) is a defensive standout in the secondary and a little lad (5-11 and 155 lbs.) in that same department is Julian Spence.
