Groomed for professional coaching through association as a player with America's most successful powers, former all-pro tackle Lou Rymkus holds the fate of the Oilers in his huge hands.

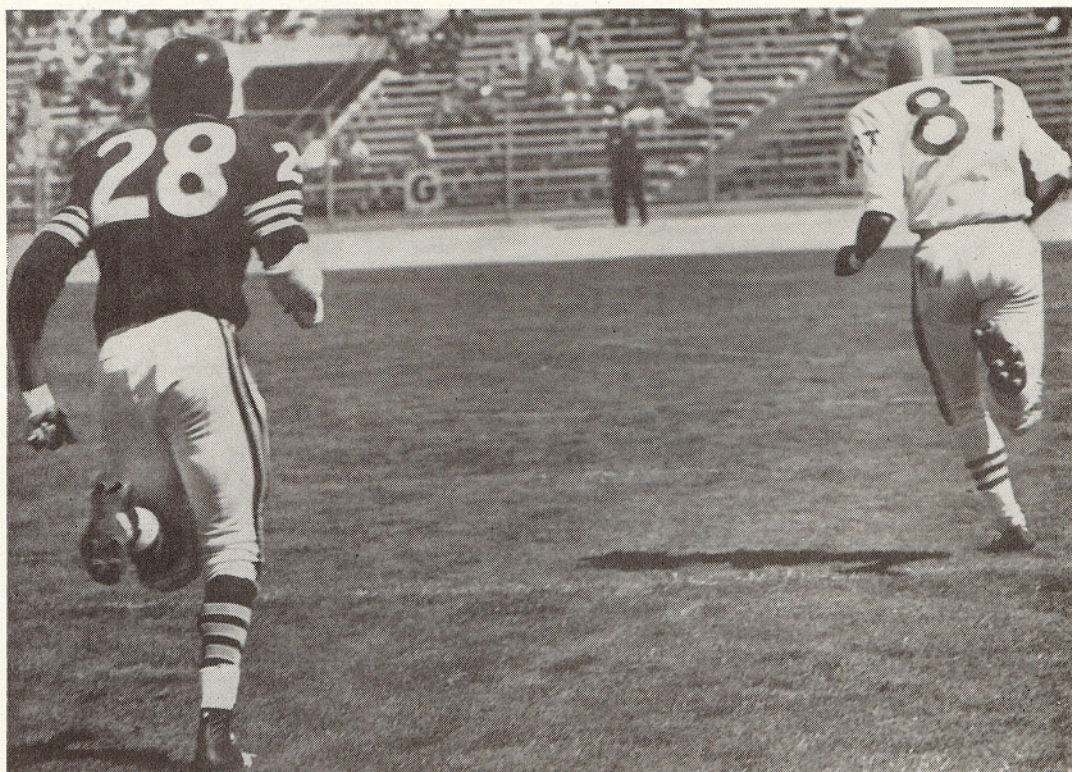

THE AMERICAN FOOTBALL LEAGUE

Yesterday A Dream, Today A Reality

The brightest, freshest force in sports is the American Football League, a pioneer assembly of eight professional football teams which this season becomes an exciting piece of Americana.

The evolution of the American Football League from idea to entity has been so incredibly swift that its entire history can be traced to one slow-coming idea, a dozen names, fewer dates.

It is a brief history, dating back only to January, 1959.

As additional background, however, there are countless uneven lengths of time and many frustrations that stretch back over several years for several people—men who had sought professional football for their home cities and had been rejected.

Bob Howsam . . . Bud Adams . . . Lamar Hunt. All had sought pro football ownership in the established league; all were rejected; none was encouraged.

The 27-year-old Hunt, a whisper-voiced oilman from Dallas, several times approached NFL officials in hopes of obtaining pro football for Dallas, either through expansion of the League or through purchase of an existing franchise.

In November, 1959, Hunt again sought out NFL officials. Three, including Commissioner Bert Bell and Expansion Committee Chairman George Halas, assured him there would be no expansion.

"Then," Hunt remembers, "sometime in January, 1959—the idea just came."

The idea was for a new league; after the idea, the AFL came more swiftly.

Guarding his plan, Hunt first approached another young oilman, K. S. (Bud) Adams of Houston, who also had made attempts to secure a pro franchise.

In the next few weeks and months, a solid nucleus was established.

Harry Wismer was a ready, capable ally eager to bring New York City a new team; Bob Howsam brought in the rich, untapped Denver area; the combine of H. P. Skoglund, Max Winter and Bill Boyer made it a five-team core by bringing in Minneapolis-St. Paul.

In June, 1959, the AFL group sent a representative to check again with Bert Bell on NFL expansion plans. Bell assured him there would be none, and the AFL spokesmen then revealed to Bell the plans for a new league.

On July 28, 1959, Bell appeared before a congressional committee and publicly announced that there were plans for a second league that would be in natural competition with the NFL.

The AFL then followed with a formal announcement of its existence at a Chicago meeting on August 15, 1959. Barron Hilton by then had brought in Los Angeles to bring the charter group to six—New York, Houston, Minneapolis-St. Paul, Los Angeles, Denver and Dallas.

Ralph Wilson, a major stockholder in the Detroit Lions, sought to bring in Miami as a seventh team, but stadium problems defeated these plans. Wismer and Hunt suggested he check Buffalo as a possibility; two days later there was a phone call from Wilson.

"Count me in," he said. "With Buffalo."

This was in mid-October, 1959, and the AFL had now grown to seven teams.

On November 19, 1959, the full complement of eight teams was reached as William H. Sullivan, Jr., led Boston into the league.

The full house then lost a charter member. The day before the AFL draft meeting (November 21, 1959) NFL officials sent a wire to a Minneapolis newspaper promising that city an NFL franchise for 1961.

The telegram created a local climate which prevented Minneapolis' AFL officials from securing adequate stadium rights. This forced the withdrawal of Minneapolis from the AFL in January, 1960.

Before this withdrawal, the league named Joe Foss, South Dakota's widely-respected war hero and former governor, as commissioner for a three-year term.

Foss gavelled a meeting at Dallas in January when entry bids from Oakland and Atlanta were heard. Oakland, led by Y. C. (Chet) Soda and seven others, was approved as the eighth member. To maintain player personnel balance, the league gave Oakland full rights to Minneapolis' draft list and in turn allowed the Bay entry to pick up to 56 players from the seven other teams.

The entry of Oakland brought the AFL up to full strength. In the busy months that followed, organizational problems were tackled and beaten, coaching and player personnel hired, and major league sports suddenly opened the door to a new lodger.

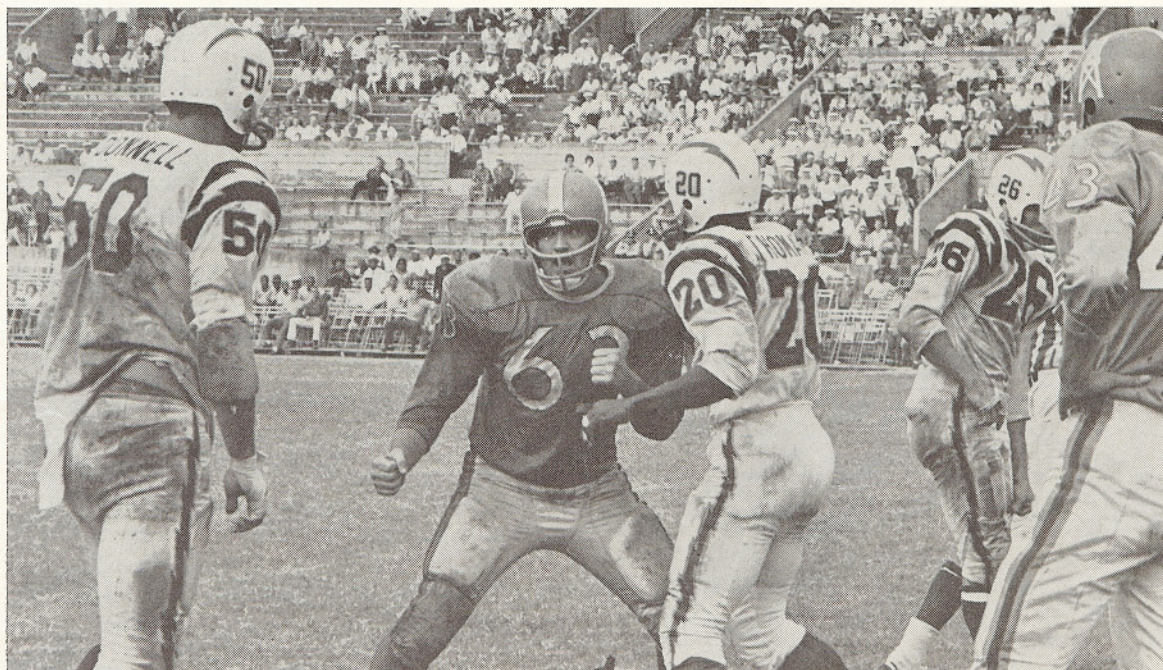

Today's Game

Stand by for an aerial assault from the Denver Broncos and take heed—Houston Oiler backers—for today your heroes must stand against one of the most clever and imaginative field generals in professional grid wars.

Just two weeks ago in Denver, resourceful Frankie Tripucka won the battle but lost the war by passing for 401 yards in losing by 20 points. It was 45-25 favoring Houston, and a lot of football-knowing people in the Mile High City are still shaking their heads and asking how a team can mount a 492 yard offense and get beat.

Some have found no better reasoning than the fact that it was Lou Rymkus' birthday and Big Lou was just supposed to win regardless how many yards, or TOUCHDOWNS, for that matter, the Broncos might have scored.

But regardless what underlying reasons might best satisfy the Denver rooter, it is obvious that the Oilers would never have won without the "big play," the long gainer, the back-breaking scoring drives on short series.

If today's game follows a similar pattern, Tripucka will mix his plays—particularly his sequence of pass patterns—with the same genuine mastery of a Waldorf chef. Plays that start out the same but wind up with cute new wrinkles on the tailend will be blended tenderly into ten and 12-play touchdown drives.

Houston's George Blanda only hopes for a return to a dry pasture where he can cut his horses loose on the ground while mixing in about an equal portion of pass plays. His two-pony backfield of Dave Smith and Billy

Cannon were too well behaved last Sunday in the mud and slush of Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum. And without the running game, even George's greatest day throwing as an Oiler was three points shy in a 24-21 loss to the Chargers.

But even on a dry track, chances are that the Oilers will again need the big plays that saved them from defeat at Denver. It will help if Blanda and Bill Groman can duplicate their 75 yard pass play; if Smith has another of those 45 yard touchdown gallops left over; or Bobby Gordon another 60-yard kick return. Blanda's 51 yard field goal of two weeks ago might also be very useful here today.

Those are the things that spelled the difference in a 70 point game at Denver, and the Oilers may very well need them today to offset the cagey Tripucka and his bag full of tricks.

Within that bag, "The Tripper" can nearly always find exactly the item to catch your defense off guard. Almost without looking he can reach in and pull out one of the AFL's finest pass receivers in Lionel Taylor who caught 10 for 140 yards and one score. With the same non-chalance he'll select Fullback Dave Rolle or Halfback Henry Bell, two of the league's better runners, to pick on some slight flaw in your defense.

So today it isn't Big Lou's birthday and the Denver Broncos are here to re-establish themselves as Western Division contenders at the expense of the club that knocked them from the lead.

Next Home Game

After today's encounter on the home field against Denver, the Oilers again hit the airways for Boston and then Dallas before returning to the familiar surroundings of Jeppesen Stadium to host the Buffalo Bills on December 11.

This is to be a pro rematch the likes of which Houston fans may have to wait a long time to see again. The reasons date back to October 30 when the Buffalo Bills, last place team in the Western Division at the time, came off the floor to score a solid 25-24 kayo of the apparently run-away Houston Oilers.

While in the one dressing room at War Memorial Stadium at Buffalo, this was being called the "Day of Arrival for the Bills," only the thickness of a wall separated promises of "Wait 'til we get with these guys again in Houston."

Just minutes before these dressing room chants, the Bills had completed the biggest reversal in the first year of the American Football League.

Behind their newly discovered quarterback, Johnny Green, the Buffalo entry had put victories back-to-back. First an amazing 38-9 routing of the Oakland Raiders, and now an electrifying win over the Houston Oilers.

Buffalo's largest crowd of the year had been left limp from frenzied excitement. Green had employed the screen

pass, executed beautifully to Wray Carlton and Elbert Dubenion, as the big weapon which set up or scored both Buffalo touchdowns and four field goals.

Though George Blanda had thrown three touchdown passes and kicked a spectacular 50-yard field goal, it hadn't been enough. Not even Dave Smith's 107 yards rushing or Billy Cannon's two touchdowns had shaken Green. Though thrown for 46 yards in losses by Houston's prized forward wall, Green had fearlessly grabbed every scoring opportunity and bled it dry for field goals or touchdowns.

After such a reversal in pro ranks, players from both teams eagerly await the second meeting. The element of personal pride, the very foundation of competitive athletics, is always more at stake in the second meeting. The victorious underdog wants to prove that his first victory was no fluke, and the dethroned favorite is just as determined to fashion a convincing and lasting whipping for the previous damage to his own pride.

Buffalo at Houston on December 11 is one you can't afford to miss. It will have all the ingredients of a great pro football show; the things that make the kingdom of pro football the most exciting in the world of sports.

Head Coach of the Denver Broncos

The most famous son of Grindstone Gulch, Pa., is Frank Filchock, head coach of the Denver Broncos and a quarterback with a lasting reputation in professional football.

Filchock, now 43, left his native Pennsylvania to attend the University of Indiana where he became a brilliant passer on Bo McMillan's teams of 1935-37. When he graduated and became a Washington Redskin with Sammy Baugh, he gave the 'Skins the

greatest one-two combo in pro quarterbacking history. He left Washington to join the New York Giants, and promptly guided them to the Eastern Division title.

Named "Athlete of the Year" in Canada for quarterbacking Montreal to the Grey Cup title in 1949, he later coached at Regina where he earned his present reputation as a truly great offensive strategist, with his own double-fullback system.

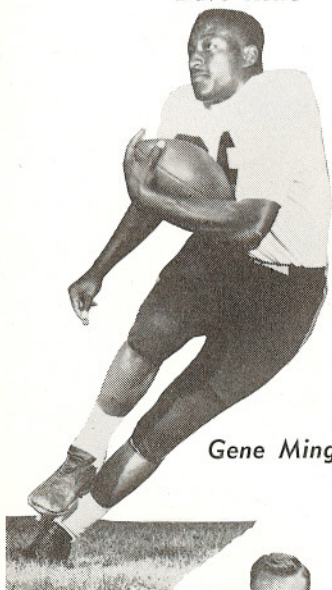

In writing "The Oilers," Mr. Ellis has blended a bit of the fabulous oil industry with the theme of winning football teams, creating a song that can be treated as both a marching band number and a tune that "swings" a little.

In his long and colorful career as a song writer and entertainer Mr. Ellis has produced more than 40 tunes that have been published and recorded, many of them presented by some of the greatest names in the world of entertainment.

While an entire list of his musical offerings would be too lengthy to mention here, two of his most popular hits were "You're All I Want For Christmas," and the novelty tune "Little Jack Frost, Get Lost." Ellis creations have gotten the treatment of such top artists as Bing Crosby, Peggy Lee, Roberta Sherwood, The Ink Spots, Four Freshmen and Mills Brothers.

As it should be, Houston's greatest show in sports entertainment gets its musical background—"The Oilers"—from Houston's greatest name in musical entertainment.

THE AMERICAN FOOTBALL LEAGUE TAKES A LOOK TO THE FUTURE

Busy as they were this year with the immensity of organization for the first season of play, American Football League officials couldn't help but look beyond the initial season to a future that has an obvious glow.

The biggest stumbling block in the location of any new sports franchise is stadium facilities. These, commonly, either are unavailable, or have to be expanded, or are locked up by another franchise.

American Football League teams spent close to a million and a half dollars preparing existing stadiums for the new league.

In a few years, stadium facilities doubtless will be a minor problem, if a problem at all. The creation of the American Football League has spurred communities, counties and private builders into a furious state of planning.

Before the Houston Oilers opened their season, plans were announced for the construction of a covered stadium capable of seating 50,000 fans and costing \$15 million. Plans are also tied to Houston's gaining of a major league baseball franchise. If it doesn't come, however, Oiler owner Bud Adams has admitted he is interested in building his own stadium—one that will seat 50,000.

At Oakland, the Raiders must vacate Kezar Stadium after the 1961 season. Raider management wanted from the start to locate in the East Bay area but were rejected in the bid for the only suitable stadium. Hope is that voters, in November, will approve the construction of a \$13 million all-purpose stadium that will seat about 50,000. The Raiders are already in line as the first tenant.

The most ambitious undertaking is in the lively hub of Boston, where the Patriots of Bill Sullivan have spent \$200,000 expanding Boston U. Field. Sullivan interested private individuals in the construction of a stadium that would be one of the showpieces of America.

Plans have already been announced for the construction in Boston of a \$25 million stadium seating at least 51,000 and also domed. It would be a stadium and convention center. Included in the plans are a 350-room motor motel, a restaurant-night club capable of seating 2500 and plush upper level "Apartment Boxes" (complete with Kitchenette) for the fan who prefers deluxe class football viewing and is willing to pay the price.

The Boston plan is no pipe dream. It has been announced and will be ready, says the syndicate, for the 1962 season. The first tenant: the Boston Patriots.

With stadium facilities mushrooming, there is much talk that the AFL will expand its membership to ten or more clubs. Since its formation, there have been close to a dozen applications from cities seeking franchises. Atlanta is a conditional member for 1961; Chicago is rumored ready to make the jump; Providence and Vancouver have announced applications. And there are half a dozen others not publicized.

The American Football League looked with enthusiasm to the 1960 season, but it also looked beyond the first run.

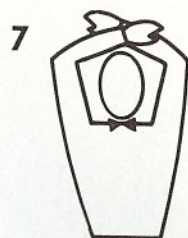
