#### NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (6-3) at GREEN BAY PACKERS (4-5) Sunday, November 19, 2006 **★** Lambeau Field (72,922) **★** 1:00 p.m. EST

The Patriots begin a stretch of three straight games against teams from the NFC North division when they travel to Green Bay to play the Packers on Sunday afternoon. New England will look to snap its first losing streak since 2002 against a Green Bay team that has won three of its last four games. The Patriots have enjoyed solid success against NFC teams in recent years, compiling a 20-4 record against the conference since 2001, including three Super Bowl victories over NFC opposition. The Patriots have won six straight road games – a streak that is tied for the second longest in team history – and have won those six games by an average margin of 19.3 points. New England's defense ranks fourth in the NFL in allowing just 14.6 points per game, but will face a significant challenge in the Packers' seventh-ranked offense, which has put up an average of 361.8 yards per game so far this season.

#### **ROAD GAME WINNING STREAK**

The Patriots have won six straight regular-season road games and have triumphed away from Gillette Stadium seven times in their last eight road contests. Since their last road loss (11/27/05 at Kansas City), the Patriots have outscored their opponents 187-71 in their six straight road wins. New England's six-game road winning streak is the second longest in team history, just one shy of the team-record seven straight road wins that spanned the 2003-04 seasons. That streak was part of New England's 21-game winning streak, which set the all-time pro football record.


## **PATRIOTS VS. PACKERS**

#### SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots will face the Packers for just the eighth time in a regular-season series that dates back to 1973. The Packers have built a 4-3 advantage in the seven previous regular-season contests and have won each of the last two meetings by the score of 28-10. The Patriots will travel to Lambeau Field for a regular-season game for just the second time in team history, with the only other meeting coming 27 years ago,



during the 1979 season. Despite making just one regular-season trip to Lambeau Field, the Patriots have played there seven times in the preseason, most recently claiming a 27-3 win on Aug. 26, 2005. The Patriots also traveled to Green Bay for preseason games three times in a four-year span from 1994-97. The Patriots



have not defeated the Packers in the regular season since Oct. 2, 1994, when they claimed a 17-16 victory at Foxboro Stadium in the first regular-season home victory of Robert Kraft's ownership. In addition to the seven regular-season games in the series, the teams also squared off in Super Bowl XXXI in January, 1997 at the Louisiana Superdome in New Orleans.

#### **IT'S BEEN A WHILE**

The Patriots have not defeated the Packers in regular-season play since 1994, Robert Kraft's first season as owner. Since New England claimed a 17-16 win over Green Bay on Oct. 2, 1994, the Patriots have defeated 29 of the other 30 NFL teams in either regular season or postseason play. The only team against which the Patriots hold a longer victory drought than the Packers is Washington (last win in 1972). After the Packers, the next team on the Patriots' list of victory droughts is the San Diego Chargers, whom New England defeated as recently as 2001.

#### QUICK HITS

- The Packers were the first team to defeat the Patriots at Gillette Stadium, claiming a 28-10 victory on Oct. 13, 2002, in New England's first season in its new home.
- With the exception of recent expansion teams (those entering the league in 1995 or later), the Patriots' one regular-season appearance at Lambeau Field marks the fewest of any NFL team.

#### **TOUGH ROAD**

The Green Bay Packers are one of four NFL teams that the Patriots have never defeated on the road. New England has traveled to play Green Bay on the road two times – at Lambeau Field on Oct. 1, 1979 and at Milwaukee's County Stadium on Oct. 9, 1988 – and lost both games. New England has also never defeated Dallas, Washington or San Francisco on the road.

#### PATRIOTS VS. NFC NORTH

This season, the Patriots will play each of the four teams from the NFC North (Green Bay, Minnesota, Detroit and Chicago) as part of the NFL's scheduling rotation. The Patriots claimed a 31-7 road victory at Minnesota on Oct. 30 to kick off their NFC North slate and this week's game marks the first of three straight contests against NFC North foes. New England last faced off against the NFC North in the 2002 season and compiled a 3-1 record in those games that year. The Patriots hold an all-time regular-season record of 19-15 (.559) against the four NFC North teams. Both of the teams to which New England has lost the Super Bowl reside in the NFC North – Green Bay (XXXI) and Chicago (XX).

#### PATRIOTS VS. NFC

The Patriots have been dominant against NFC teams in recent seasons, compiling a 20-4 (.833) record against the conference since 2001. New England's record over that span includes three Super Bowl victories over NFC teams. Since losing to Green Bay on Oct. 13, 2002, the Patriots are 16-2 (.889) against NFC competition, This season, New England is 1-0 against the NFC, having defeated Minnesota on the road, 31-7, on Oct. 30, 2006.

The Packers became the first team to defeat the Patriots at Gillette Stadium, coming up with a 28-10 win in the last meeting between the clubs on Oct. 13, 2002. On a cloudy, drizzly day, Brett Favre completed 17 of 27 passes for 147 yards and three touchdowns, while Ahman Green caught a touchdown pass and ran for another score while chewing up 136 yards on 31 carries for the Packers. The Patriots chewed up 123 yards on the ground and David Givens scored his first NFL touchdown, but Green Bay became the first of three visiting teams to leave Gillette Stadium victorious and sent the Patriots to their third of four consecutive defeats.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Patriots struck first on a 32-yard field goal by Adam Vinatieri. But the Packers rolled off four touchdowns before the Patriots would put any more points on the scoreboard. Green Bay began its assault on the first drive after the Patriots field goal, taking a 7-3 lead on a 3-yard pass from Favre to William Henderson. Just three plays from scrimmage later, the Packers were in the end zone again after recovering a New England fumble on the 8-yard line and capitalizing on a 8-yard hookup from Favre to Green that gave Green Bay a fast 14-3 advantage that carried into halftime.

In the third quarter, the Patriots' two drives ended with a three-and-out and an interception. The Packers, however, drove 94 yards on seven plays, aided by a 34-yard pass interference call against New England cornerback Ben Kelly, to extend their lead to 21-3 on a 2-yard connection between Favre and tight end Bubba Franks. The Patriots' next drive ended in an interception, and the Packers once again capitalized in the form of a 7-play, 65-yard drive that ended in a 1-yard touchdown plunge from Green and a 28-3 Packers lead. New England put together a scoring drive in the final quarter, as a 16-yard punt return from Kevin Faulk set up a Patriots drive at the Packers' 44-yard line. New England proceeded to drive 44 yards on six plays to cut the lead to 28-10 on a 4-yard touchdown from Tom Brady to Givens. But New England could not muster any more offense as they fell to 3-3 in the 2002 season.

#### PASSING PERFORMANCES

Tom Brady is slated to start against Green Bay for the second time in his career. The Packers are one of two NFL teams that Brady has never defeated as a starting quarterback in the regular season or playoffs. Brady is 0-1 against the Packers and is also 0-1 against the Washington Redskins. Brady's only career start against the Packers came during the 2002 season, when he threw one touchdown and three interceptions in a 28-10 loss. Brett Favre has enjoyed success against the Patriots, posting a passer rating of 100.0 or higher in each of his last three games against New England, including Super Bowl XXXI. In his last three meetings with the Pariots, Favre has thrown a total of eight touchdowns and no interceptions. The Patriots will face Brett Favre at Lambeau Field for the first time.

#### THIS WEEK IN PATRIOTS HISTORY

#### November 13-19

**Three years ago – Nov. 16, 2003:** The Patriots shut out the Dallas Cowboys, 12-0, at Gillette Stadium in a battle of 7-2 teams. New England, wearing its silver uniforms for the first time, defeated a Dallas team coached by former Patriots head coach Bill Parcells. The shutout was the first for the Patriots in seven years.

**Six years ago – Nov. 19, 2000:** The Patriots defeated the Cincinnati Bengals at Foxboro Stadium, 16-13, on a game-winning 22-yard field goal by Adam Vinatieri with three seconds left in regulation.

**Twelve years ago – Nov. 13, 1994**: Patriots quarterback Drew Bledsoe set NFL records with 70 attempts and 45 completions in a 26-20 overtime victory over the Minnesota Vikings at Foxboro Stadium. Bledsoe found fullback Kevin Turner for a 14-yard touchdown in overtime to complete a comeback from a 20-0 deficit.

**Twenty-One years ago – Nov. 17, 1985:** The Patriots defeated the Seattle Seahawks 20-13 at the Kingdome to complete a six-game winning streak that raised their record to 8-3 en route to an 11-5 season and the first AFC Championship in franchise history.

**Twenty-Two years ago – Nov. 18, 1984:** New England beat Indianapolis 50-17 at the Hoosier Dome, marking the largest road point output in team history. Tony Eason completed 29 or 42 passes for 291 yards and four touchdowns. Mosi Tatupu ran for a pair of scores in the second half to complete the big win.







# **ROBERT KRAFT: BUILDING SUCCESS**

IN 1994

SINCE ROBERT KRAFT PURCHASED THE TEAM

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In 12-plus seasons of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his



seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.311 pct.) and recording the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won six division titles, four conference crowns and three Super Bowl championships.

#### SELLOUT STREAK

In the early 1990s, the Patriots franchise appeared destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the team's season ticket base consisted of just 17,635 fans, barely enough to support the club. Fifteen years later, the season-ticket base stands at a capped total of 61,759 and more than 50,000 fans are on a waiting list. The Patriots have sold out 133 consecutive home games (dating back to the 1994 regular-season opener) including regular-season, preseason and playoff games. Patriots fans in New England have never been faced with a TV blackout under Kraft's ownership.

#### SUCCESS STORY

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have been one of the NFL's elite teams. Over the first 12-plus years of Kraft's ownership, the Patriots are tied for the highest win total among all NFL teams – a remarkable record considering the fact that the Patriots were a combined 19-61 (.311) in the four years immediately preceding the purchase. Since 2001, the Patriots have been the top team in the NFL, compiling a 74-26 record.

Bill Belichick is in his 32nd

season as an NFL coach and is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl titles in a four-year span. He has led the Patriots to three consecutive AFC East titles and has directed four division championships in the last five seasons. Belichick's Patriots teams own the all-time NFL records for consecutive total victories (21 from 2003-04), consecutive regular-season victories (18 from 2003-04) and consecutive playoff victories (10 from 2001-05). Belichick owns the second best postseason record in NFL history (11-2) and is the winningest NFL head coach since 2001 (74-26). From 2003-04, he directed the Patriots to back-to-back Super Bowl titles while posting consecutive 17-win campaigns. Belichick has spent more seasons in the league than any other current NFL head coach, and in that time has been a part of five Super Bowl championship teams. His overall record of 79-37 with the Patriots gives him the most victories and the best winning percentage of any head coach in franchise history.

#### BELICHICK'S PATRIOTS RENAISSANCE

Any successful project requires a sound plan, and once head coach Bill Belichick implemented his design on the Patriots, his approach has given him the best record of any NFL head coach who has coached at least one game since 2001. The remarkable run includes postseason play, where Belichick and the Patriots own a 10-1 record.

#### RANKED AMONG COACHING GREATS

In a recent Sportsnation Poll on ESPN.com, Bill Belichick was placed among the top five greatest coaches of all time (in any sport) by 9.4 percent of the poll's 117,000 voters. Voters were asked to select five coaches from a list of 20, and Coach Belichick finished 14th. UCLA's John Wooden (10 NCAA basketball titles) topped the poll with 44.4 percent of voters placing him in the top five. The other football coaches in the poll were Vince Lombardi (11.8 percent), Knute Rockne (11.4), Bear Bryant (10.5), Don Shula (10.3), Bill Walsh (10.0) and Joe Paterno (9.9). The only other Boston-area coach in the poll was the late Red Auerbach, who won nine NBA championships with the Celtics and finished with a 9.6 percent total in the poll.

#### WHAT A RUSH

New England totaled 238 yards rushing on 41 carries against Cincinnati on Oct. 1, marking their highest team rushing total in 13 seasons. The last time the Patriots had as many as 238 yards on the ground was on Dec. 26, 1993, when they gained 257 yards on 58 carries against the Indianapolis Colts in a 38-0 victory at Foxboro Stadium. The 200-plus yards on the ground against Cincinnati marked the Patriots' first 200-yard rushing game since Dec. 5, 2004, when New England ran for 225 yards on 50 carries against the Cleveland Browns. The Bengals game marked the third time in the Bill Belichick coaching era (2000-present) that the Patriots have totaled more than 200 yards rushing in a game. The other two occurrences came in 2004.

#### PATRIOTS TO PLAY IN INAUGURAL CHINA BOWL IN AUGUST, 2007

On Sept. 24, 2006, the NFL announced that the Patriots will take part in a preseason game in Beijing, China on Aug. 8, 2007. New England will play the Seattle Seahawks at Workers Stadium to kick off the one-year countdown to the 2008 Summer Olympics in Beijing. The game will be televised live in China at 8:30 p.m. on Aug. 8, 2007, and will also



be seen live in the United States on NBC at 8:30 a.m. that same day. The venue will serve as the site of the soccer competition in the 2008 Summer Olympics.





#### **BEAST OF THE EAST**

The New England Patriots own a 29-8 record in AFC East games since the beginning of the 2001 season, compiling the best intradivision record of any team in the NFL over the last five-plus seasons. The Patriots have claimed four of the last five AFC East championships, and along with the Philadelphia Eagles are the only teams in the NFL to have won four division titles in the last five years.

Since the beginning of the 2001 season, the Patriots have allowed an average of 17.70 points per game, a mark that ranks third in the NFL over that span. In 2006, the Patriots rank fourth in the league, allowing an average of 14.6 points per game (131 points in nine games). The Patriots have allowed 17.0 points per game or fewer in three seasons since 2001, including a 2003 season in which they paced the league by allowing just 14.9 points per game and a 2004 season in which they tied for second in the league by allowing 16.3 points per game.

#### THE DILLON FACTOR

Since COREY DILLON joined the Patriots prior to the 2004 season, the Patriots have recorded a 29-7 record in the 36 regular season games in which Dillon has appeared, and a 1-4 record in the five games he has missed over that span. Dillon has exceeded the 100-yard mark 11 times in a Patriots uniform while recording 663 rushes for 2,847 yards (4.3 avg). Additionally, Dillon has scored 32 touchdowns (30 rushing, 2 receiving) in 36 regular-season games with the Patriots. He has also secured the ball effectively, losing just six fumbles in his 663 carries with New England.

#### HARRISON IS ALL-TIME NFL LEADER

RODNEY HARRISON is the NFL's all-time leader in sacks by a defensive back, dating back to when sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982. Additionally, Harrison is the only player in NFL history to have recorded at least 25 career sacks and at least 30 career interceptions. Harrison currently owns 28.5 career sacks and 32 interceptions in his regular-season career.

Brown passed Stanley Morgan's old record of 534 career receptions on a 5yard reception in the third quarter against Indianapolis on Nov. 5. Morgan had held the Patriots' receptions record since Nov. 11, 1984, when he recorded



his 293rd career reception to pass Gino Cappelletti's then-record of 292 catches. Brown reached the 6,000-yard mark on Sept. 10 against Buffalo, becoming just the second player in team history to record the feat.

#### MARONEY EARNS HONORS

Laurence Maroney ran for 125 yards and two touchdowns on 15 carries (8.3 avg) against the Bengals on Oct. 1, a performance that earned honors as the FedEx Ground NFL Player of the Week and the Diet Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Week. In that game, Maroney – the 21st overall selection in the 2006 NFL Draft out of Minnesota – became the first Patriots rookie to rush for multiple touchdowns in a game since Curtis Martin did it in 1995. Additionally, his total of 125 yards was the highest by a Patriots rookie in nearly eight years, since Robert Edwards ran for 196 yards on 24 carries at St. Louis on Dec. 13, 1998.

#### **RETURN MEN**

Troy Brown and Kevin Faulk are the top two return specialists in Patriots history. Brown leads the franchise with 4,420 overall return yards, while Faulk is close behind with 4,341 overall return yards. Brown is the team's all-time leading punt returner with 2,570 career yards, and Faulk is the club's all-time leading kickoff returner with 3,686 career yards. In addition, Brown is tied with Irving Fryar for the club record with three punts returned for touchdowns.

#### RETURN SUCCESS FOR FAULK

Kevin Faulk is averaging 13.1 yards per punt return, a mark that ranks third in the NFL. Faulk's average is just 1.7 yards behind Cleveland's Dennis Northcutt, who leads the league with a 14.8-yard average. On Oct. 1 at Cincinnati, Faulk returned a punt 43 yards, recording the longest punt return for the Patriots since the 2001 regular-season finale when Troy Brown returned a punt 68 yards for a touchdown. The 43-yard return was the longest punt return of Faulk's career and set up a touchdown drive.

#### ABLE VRABEL

In proving to be one of the NFL's most versatile players, linebacker MIKE VRABEL has made important contributions for the Patriots on offense and defense. Vrabel has recorded eight career receptions, all resulting in touchdowns. He scored four touchdowns for the Patriots last season – three on offense and one on defense. Vrabel recorded a career-high two

#### **ROOKIE RETURN SUCCESS**

Laurence Maroney ranks second in the NFL with a 29.7-yard kickoff return average. He returned kicks for more than 70 yards in back-to-back weeks, recording a 77-yard return at Minnesota on Oct. 30, just one week after notching a 74-yard return against Buffalo on Oct. 22. Maroney's 77-yard return against the Vikings is the longest kickoff return for the Patriots since Dec. 4, 2004, when Bethel Johnson returned the opening kickoff 93 yards for a touchdown in a 42-15 road victory over the Cleveland Browns.

#### **BIG BENJAMIN**

Tight end Benjamin Watson leads all Patriots receivers with 34 catches for 436 yards (12.8 avg.) and a touchdown this season. His 34 catches represent a career-high mark, topping his 29 receptions in 2005. Additionally, his 436 receiving yards are just five yards behind his career-best 441 receiving yards in 2005. Watson set single-game career-highs with seven receptions and 95 receiving yards against the Vikings on Oct. 30. He also hauled in a career-long 40-yard reception in the same game.

#### CALLING ON CALDWELL

Reche Caldwell ranks third on the team with a career-high 32 receptions for 335 yards (10.5 avg) and two touchdowns. Caldwell's 32 catches have topped his previous career high, set in 2005 with the San Diego Chargers when he hauled in 28 balls. Caldwell also caught a career-high nine passes against the New York Jets on Nov. 12.

#### DEPENDABLE DOUG

Doug Gabriel has proven to be a solid presence in the Patriots offense, catching 24 passes for 332 yards. His average of 13.8 yards per catch leads all Patriots players with at least five receptions. Gabriel has already tied his career high with three touchdown catches this season

The Patriots dropped to 6-3 on the season with a 17-14 loss to the New York Jets at Gillette Stadium. The loss was the Patriots' second consecutive defeat and snapped a string of 57 straight games without back-to-back losses. The Jets built a 17-6 fourth-quarter lead, but the Patriots mounted a comeback bid, closing the gap to three points on a 15-yard touchdown from Tom Brady to Reche Caldwell with 4:14 left in the game. The Patriots defense halted the Jets' ensuing drive, giving the New England offense just over a minute to attempt a game-tying or game-winning drive. With no timeouts, Brady drove the Patriots to the Jets' 46-yard line with 10 seconds left, but on the final play of the game he was sacked by New York's Shaun Ellis to seal the victory for New York.

For the Patriots, Corey Dillon ran for a season-high 98 yards on 11 carries and Tom Brady completed 25-of-37 passes for 255 yards, one touchdown and one interception. Reche Caldwell paced the Patriots' receiving corps with a career-high nine receptions for 90 yards and a touchdown. On defense, Tedy Bruschi led the team with a career-high 17 tackles (7 solo) while Junior Seau added 15 tackles (10 solo). Safety Artrell Hawkins recorded his first interception in a Patriots uniform.

#### STREAK STOPPED

The Patriots have lost consecutive games for the first time since December 2002, and their streak of 57 consecutive regular season games without back-to-back losses – the second longest streak since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger – has come to an end. The last time the Patriots had a losing streak was when they dropped a game at Tennessee (24-7, 12/16/02), and followed that with a home loss to the N.Y. Jets (30-17, 12/22/02). The loss to the Jets loss ended a streak of 11 straight wins in games following a loss.

#### SINGLE-GAME CAREER HIGH FOR CALDWELL

Reche Caldwell grabbed a career-high nine passes for 90 yards and a touchdown and led the team in receptions for the third time in the last four games. In addition to his nine catches, Caldwell also caught a 2-point conversion pass from Tom Brady in the fourth quarter to close the deficit to 17-14. Caldwell's nine receptions were the most by a Patriot this season and marked the first time a Patriots player had caught as many as nine passes since David Givens grabbed nine balls at Pittsburgh on Sept. 25, 2005.

#### SINGLE-SEASON CAREER HIGH FOR CALDWELL

With a 7-yard reception in the third quarter, Reche Caldwell set a new career-high with his 29th reception of the season. Caldwell finished the game with 32 receptions on the season, a number that tops all Patriots wide receivers and ranks second on the team to Benjamin Watson (34). The fifth-year veteran's previous career high was 28 receptions, achieved with the San Diego Chargers in 2005.

#### **STEPHEN GOSTKOWSKI**

Rookie kicker Stephen Gostkowski made both of his field goals against the Jets. The two successful boots give him eight field goals in his last nine chances (88.9 percent). Gostkowski is 10-of-14 on the season (71.4 percent). Additionally, Gostkowski is perfect on extra points, hitting all 23 of his PAT chances.

#### LONG RUN FOR DILLON

Corey Dillon scampered for a 50-yard run late in the first quarter, marking the longest rush by a Patriot in nearly eight years. Dillon's rush was the longest for New England since Sedrick Shaw tore off a 71-yard run against the New York Jets on Dec. 27, 1998 at Giants Stadium. For Dillon, the 50-yard run was his longest rush since Oct. 6, 2002, when he ran for a 67-yard touchdown for the Cincinnati Bengals against the Indianapolis Colts. Prior to Dillon's 50-yard run, the longest rush for the Patriots since Bill Belichick became head coach in 2000 was a 45-yard touchdown run by Kevin Faulk against the Buffalo Bills on Nov. 3, 2002.

#### FOURTH-DOWN EFFICIENCY

The Patriots converted all three of their fourth-down chances in the game and have converted 11-of-14 fourth-down tries this season (78.6 percent). Two of the conversions came on New England's field-goal drive at the end of the first half. On that drive, Heath Evans ran for one yard on fourth-and-one at the Patriots' 44-yard line and Jabar Gaffney hailed in a 13-yard reception on fourth-and-two at the Jets' 24-yard line. In the fourth quarter, the Patriots converted a fourth-and-three at the Jets' 38-yard line on a 6-yard pass from Tom Brady to Benjamin Watson.

#### SEASON-HIGH FOR DILLON

Corey Dillon's 98 rushing yards marked his highest output of the season and his highest rushing total since gaining 102 yards at Buffalo on Dec. 11, 2005. Dillon's 98 yards were the highest total by a Patriots player at Gillette Stadium since the 2004 divisional playoffs, when Dillon ran for 144 yards on 23 carries against the Indianapolis Colts on Jan. 16, 2005.

#### HAWK EYES

Artrell Hawkins intercepted a Chad Pennington pass early in the second quarter, marking Hawkins' first interception as a Patriot. The ninth-year veteran signed with the Patriots almost exactly a year ago (11/16/05) and the Jets game marks his 12th regular-season game for the Patriots and his ninth start. The interception was Hawkins' 11th career interception and his first since Dec. 5, 2004, when he recorded a pick for the Cincinnati Bengals in a game at New Orleans.

#### QUICK HITS

- Artrell Hawkins' interception was New England's 10th interception of the year, equaling last year's 16-game total in this season's ninth game.
- Rosevelt Colvin sacked Chad Pennington for a 10-yard loss in the third quarter, raising his season total to 3.5 sacks. That figure ranks second on the team behind only Jarvis Green's 5.5 sacks.
- ➤ The Patriots had a total of 100 rushing yards in the first quarter (on 12 carries).
- Ty Warren was listed as a gameday inactive for today's game. It is the first game Warren has missed in his career, having played in 56 straight regular-season games and eight playoff games since entering the league as the Patriots' first-round draft choice in 2003.

#### PATRIOTS IN THE COMMUNITY

Patriots defensive lineman Richard Seymour invited 10 children from the Yawkey Boys and Girls Club of Roxbury to attend the Jets game. Seymour purchased game tickets and Patriots jerseys for each child and met with the group to sign autographs following the game. The group also got to watch pregame warm-ups from the sidelines.

The Patriots dropped to 6-2 on the season, falling to the undefeated Indianapolis Colts in a game that came down to the wire. Facing a seven-point deficit with 1:55 remaining in the game, the Patriots took possession at their own 36-yard line, needing to go 64 yards for a game-tying score. After a 25-yard completion to Benjamin Watson brought the Patriots to the Colts' 39-yard line, a tipped ball resulted in Tom Brady's fourth interception of the game – and the fifth turnover for the Patriots – as the Colts took the ball back and ran out the clock. That play was the final act of a competitive, high-energy contest that saw the Patriots spar with the NFL's top teams but ultimately fall short in the end.

#### TROY BROWN: ALL-TIME LEADING RECEIVER

With his 5-yard reception in the second quarter – the 535th reception of his career – Troy Brown became the Patriots' alltime leading receiver, passing Stanley Morgan's mark of 534 receptions. Morgan had held the record since November 11, 1984, when he passed then-leader Gino Cappelletti with his 293rd career reception. Brown had tied Morgan's record on an acrobatic 6-yard reception in the first quarter.

#### **GREAT SCOTT**

Chad Scott recorded his second interception in as many games, picking off Peyton Manning at the Patriots' 14-yard line on a pass intended for Dallas Clark. Scott, who also had an interception last week against Minnesota, has now recorded 21 interceptions in his 10-year NFL career. His two interceptions rank second on the Patriots this season, behind only team-leader Asante Samuel's three interceptions.

#### **DILLON SCORES**

Corey Dillon scored two touchdowns in the first half, raising his team-leading touchdown total to six. Dillon got the Patriots on the board with a 1-yard scoring run to tie the game at seven early in the second quarter. He scored again in the second quarter on a 4-yard run that tied the game at 14. The touchdowns give Dillon 32 regular-season scores in a New England uniform, with his 32 total touchdowns coming in just 35 total games.

#### FOURTH DOWN CONVERSION

In a key fourth-and-three situation on the final play of the first quarter with the Patriots at the Colts' 18-yard line and trailing 7-0, they elected to go for the first down and Tom Brady connected with Kevin Faulk to give the Patriots a first-and-goal at the Colts' 5-yard line. Two plays later, the Patriots tied the game at seven on a 1-yard touchdown run by Corey Dillon. Following the game, the Patriots had converted eight-of-11 fourth-down tries this season (72.7 percent).

#### RARE FUMBLE FOR DILLON

Corey Dillon's third-quarter fumble was his first lost fumble of the season and just his sixth lost fumble of his Patriots career. Immediately following the fumble, Dillon had lost six fumbles on 689 touches (649 carries and 40 receptions) for the Patriots (0.9 percent of the time). Dillon lost just one fumble last season on 231 touches (0.4 percent), and lost four fumbles on 360 touches in 2004 (1.1 percent).

#### **TOUCHDOWN-FREE STREAK BROKEN**

Indianapolis' first-quarter touchdown ended a streak of 10 straight quarters in which the Patriots defense had not allowed a touchdown. Prior to that touchdown, the last tine New England's defense had allowed its opponent to reach the end zone was in the second quarter of their game against Miami on Oct. 8.

#### MAYS' DAY

Rookie linebacker Corey Mays made his NFL debut, participating on the Patriots' kickoff team. Mays was a member of the Patriots' practice squad for the first seven games of the season before being signed to the active roster in time for the Colts game. Mays recorded his first career special teams tackle with a big hit on Indianapolis kick returner Terrence Wilkins in the second quarter.

#### SPECIAL PLAY

Artrell Hawkins game up with a big special teams play in the third quarter, forcing Indianapolis kickoff returner Terrence Wilkins to fumble and then recovering the ball. The play came on the kickoff following Stephen Gostkowski's 49-yard field goal that cut the Colts' lead to 24-17.

#### SACK FOR SEAU

Junior Seau dropped Peyton Manning for a 9-yard sack on second-and-goal in the second quarter. The sack was the first for Seau in a Patriots uniform and raised his career sack total to 53.0 career sacks.

#### HOT WHEN IT'S COLD

The temperature at kickoff was 31 degrees. The Patriots have enjoyed tremendous recent success in cold weather and even with the loss to the Colts are now 21-3 since 1993 when the kickoff temperature is 34 degrees or less.

- New England has now won 16 of its last 18 games when the kickoff temperature has been 34 degrees or colder.
- Since 1993, the Patriots are now 21-3 when the temperature is 34 degrees or colder, and 15-1 when it's 30 degrees or colder.
- Tom Brady is now 21-2 as a starter when the temperature is less than 40 degrees. His only loss prior to the Colts game came in the 2005 regular-season finale against Miami, when Brady started and played in only the first quarter, leaving the game in a 7-7 tie.

The Patriots tied the best start to a season in franchise history, improving to 6-1 with a 31-7 road victory over the Minnesota Vikings on Monday Night Football. New England's defense did not allow the Vikings to see the end zone – Minnesota's only seven points came on special teams – and recorded four interceptions to halt the Vikings attack. Tom Brady tied his career high with four touchdown passes while passing for 372 yards – tying his second highest career yardage total.

The Patriots began the game on the right note, silencing the raucous Minnesota crowd on their first possession by driving 86 yards on seven plays to take a quick 7-0 lead on a 6-yard scoring strike from Tom Brady to Reche Caldwell. Later in the quarter, following a punt by Minnesota and an interception thrown by New England, the Vikings mounted a formidable drive that saw them earn a first-and-goal from the Patriots' 10-yard line. After forcing a third-and-goal from the 5-yard line, the New England defense came up big with the first of four interceptions on the night as Rodney Harrison picked off a Brad Johnson pass at the goal line to end the Minnesota scoring threat as the first quarter came to a close. Following the interception, the Patriots marched 93 yards on eight plays to take a 10-0 lead on a 23yard field goal by Stephen Gostkowski. On the ensuing Vikings possession, the Patriots defense once again was able to intercept Johnson, as Chad Scott ended the drive by picking off a deep ball at the 29-yard line. After the teams traded punts, the Patriots mounted a drive late in the half that covered 74 yards in 11 plays and ended with a 9-yard touchdown from Brady to Benjamin Watson that gave New England a 17-0 lead with 25 seconds left in the first half.

Minnesota struck first in the second half, cutting its deficit to 17-7 on a 71-yard punt return for a touchdown by Mewelde Moore. But Laurence Maroney returned the ensuing kickoff 77 yards to set up a short Patriots touchdown drive that answered the Vikings score, as New England took just three plays to raise its advantage to 24-7 on a 7-yard scoring pass from Brady to Troy Brown. The Patriots mounted one more drive in the third quarter, as a 29-yard punt return by Kevin Faulk set up a 4-play, 39-yard drive that ended in a 10-yard scoring strike from Brady to Chad Jackson that put the Patriots in command, 31-7. Two more interceptions by the Patriots in the final quarter stopped Minnesota from chipping into the lead, and the Patriots headed back to New England with a Monday night win.

#### PICK PARTY

The New England defense intercepted Minnesota quarterbacks four times, marking the Patriots' first four-interception game since Nov. 14, 2004, when they intercepted Buffalo's Drew Bledsoe three times and J.P. Losman one time. Coming into the Vikings game, the Patriots had recorded four interceptions in their first six games of the season.

#### HARRISON HALTS 'EM

Rodney Harrison intercepted Minnesota's Brad Johnson on the goal line in the first quarter to halt a Minnesota drive. The interception was Harrison's first of the season and the 32nd of his regular-season career. Since joining the Patriots prior to the 2003 season, Harrison now has recorded six interceptions in the regular-season and six in the playoffs for a grand total of 12 picks. Dating back to the beginning of the 2004 regular season (and including playoff games), six of Harrison's last seven interceptions have come inside the opponents' 20-yard line, with five of the seven coming inside the 4-yard line (including two in the end zone and one on the goal line).

#### **TENTH MONTH TAKEAWAYS**

With four interceptions against the Vikings, the Patriots finished the month of October with 13 takeaways for the month. The Patriots forced four turnovers against Buffalo on Oct. 22, three against Miami on Oct. 8, and two against Cincinnati on Oct. 1. In contrast, the Patriots have recorded just four giveaways in their four October games, and notched a solid plus-nine turnover differential for the month.

#### TOMMY GUN

Tom Brady threw for 257 yards in the first half, completing 17of-25 passes. His 257 yards were his highest yardage total for any half in his career. His previous career high for a half was 226 yards, achieved in the second half of a 2005 divisional playoff game at Denver on Jan. 14, 2006. Brady's 257 yards were the second highest first-half total in franchise history, trailing only Drew Bledsoe's total of 271 yards in the first half of the 1997 regular-season opener against San Diego at Foxboro Stadium on Aug. 31, 1997.

#### TOP RETURN MAN

Laurence Maroney returned a kickoff 77 yards in the third quarter, setting up Troy Brown's 7-yard touchdown catch from Tom Brady that gave the Patriots a 24-7 lead. Just last week against Buffalo, Maroney returned a kickoff 74 yards to set up a Patriots touchdown, a feat that earned him AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors. Following his 77-yard return against the Vikings, Maroney was tied for the NFL lead in kickoff return average with the New York Jets' Justin Miller, averaging 29.7 yards per return (14 returns for 416 yards). Maroney's play against the Vikings came at a key moment in the game, immediately following a 71-yard punt return for a touchdown by Minnesota's Mewelde Moore that had cut New England's lead to 17-7.

#### CALDWELL SCORES

Reche Caldwell scored his first touchdown as a member of the Patriots, hauling in a 6-yard scoring catch from Tom Brady to cap off the Patriots' opening drive and give New England a 7-0 lead. The scoring grab was the seventh touchdown of Caldwell's five-year career, and his first touchdown since hauling in a 28-yard touchdown while playing for the San Diego Chargers against the Patriots at Gillette Stadium on Oct. 2, 2005.

#### **GREAT SCOTT**

Cornerback Chad Scott recorded his first interception in a Patriots uniform when he picked off a deep pass by Brad Johnson at the Patriots' 29-yard line in the second quarter. The interception was the 20th of Scott's 10-year career and his first since Oct. 3, 2004.

#### LONG RUN FOR EVANS

Heath Evans ran for a 35-yard gain in the fourth quarter, recording the longest rush of his career. Prior to that run, the longest rush of Evans' career was a 21-yard jaunt against Miami on Nov. 13, 2005.

#### QUICK HITS

- Billy Yates made his first career start, beginning the game at left guard.
- Corey Dillon's 27-yard reception in the third quarter was his longest reception since Sept. 10, 2000, when he hauled in a 31-yard pass while playing for the Cincinnati Bengals against Cleveland.
- Tully Banta-Cain dropped Brad Johnson for a 2-yard sack in the second quarter. The sack gave Banta-Cain 1.5 sacks for the year and 4.5 sacks for his career.
- Benjamin Watson's 40-yard catch in the second quarter was the longest grab of his regular-season career.

The Patriots improved to 5-1 with a convincing 28-6 road divisional victory in Buffalo. New England got an efficient performance from Tom Brady, who delivered a season-best 112.4 passer rating on a two-touchdown day, and a pair of touchdowns from running back Corey Dillon to provide the offensive firepower. On defense, New England recorded three takeaways, recovering a pair of Buffalo fumbles and notching an interception to stall the Bills' attempts to get into the end zone.

The Patriots began the day with their longest drive of the afternoon, a 14-play, 71-yard excursion that ended in an 8-yard touchdown run by Dillon to claim a 7-0 lead. Buffalo answered back with a 40-yard field goal to cut the advantage to 7-3, but kick returner Laurence Maroney swung the momentum back towards the Patriots with a 74-yard return of the ensuing kickoff. The big return by the rookie set up a 4-play, 21-yard drive that ended in a 12-yard scoring run by Dillon to give the Patriots a 14-3 advantage as the first quarter wound down.

The second quarter saw neither team get onto the scoreboard, but New England forced two Buffalo turnovers to preserve its lead. With Buffalo driving at New England's 41-yard line, Mike Vrabel strip-sacked J.P. Losman and Vince Wilfork recovered the ball to halt the Bills' scoring bid. On Buffalo's next possession, the Bills again marched into Patriots territory, but on a third-down play at New England's 23-yard line, Asante Samuel intercepted Losman at the Patriots' 13, keeping Buffalo corralled once again. New England preserved its 14-3 lead heading into halftime.

The second half began with the teams trading punts before New England found the end zone once again to take full command of the game. After gaining possession on their own 40-yard line following a punt, the Patriots quickly moved down the field on a 4-play, 60-yard drive that ended in a 35-yard scoring pass from Brady to Chad Jackson that gave the Patriots a 21-3 advantage heading into the final quarter. Buffalo cut the lead to 21-6 on an early fourth quarter field goal, but on the ensuing drive, the Patriots found the end zone one final time, taking a 28-6 lead courtesy of a 5-yard scoring strike from Brady to Doug Gabriel that capped off an 8-play, 67-yard drive. The Patriots preserved that lead to improve to 4-0 in divisional games this season.

#### HEATING UP

Tom Brady posted a season-best 112.4 passer rating, completing 18-of-27 passes for 195 yards and two touchdowns with no interceptions. Brady posted an increase in his passer rating for fifth straight game. After posting a rating of 82.3 in the season opener against the Bills on Sept. 10, Brady's passer rating has climbed steadily each week – 73.9 on Sept. 17 against the Jets; 79.4 on Sept. 24 against the Broncos; 89.9 on Oct. 1 against the Bengals; 91.2 on Oct. 8 against Miami; and 112.4 against the Bills on Oct. 22. Brady's rating against Buffalo was his highest since posting a 122.8 rating against Tampa on Dec. 17, 2005.

#### DILLON IN THE ZONE

Corey Dillon scored two touchdowns in the first quarter to spark the Patriots to a 14-3 lead. The touchdowns give Dillon 73 career rushing touchdowns and 28 rushing touchdowns since joining the Patriots prior to the 2004 season. His 28 rushing scores rank sixth on the Patriots all-time list and his 73 career rushing scores tie him with Terry Allen for 22nd on the NFL's alltime list. Including two receiving touchdowns, Dillon has scored 30 total touchdowns in 33 regular-season games with the Patriots.

#### SAMUEL INTERCEPTION

Asante Samuel recorded his third interception of the season and his third in the last two games when he picked off a J.P. Losman pass in the second quarter. Samuel's three picks this season lead the team and tie his career high (also achieved in 2005). His pick against the Bills gives him nine career regular-season interceptions. Including his two playoff interceptions, Samuel has 11 career picks, including three returned for touchdowns.

#### **RETURN MAN**

Laurence Maroney returned a kickoff 74 yards following Buffalo's first-quarter field goal. The return was the longest kickoff return for the Patriots since Dec. 4, 2004, when Bethel Johnson returned the opening kickoff 93 yards for a touchdown in a 42-15 road victory over the Cleveland Browns. Maroney's return set up a four-play touchdown drive that ended in a 12-yard scoring run by Corey Dillon and a 14-3 Patriots lead.

#### **TENTH MONTH TURNOVERS**

The Patriots picked up three Buffalo turnovers, giving them eight in three October games, having forced two turnovers against Cincinnati on Oct. 1 and forcing three turnovers against Miami on Oct. 8. Although New England did not score following any of its turnovers against the Bills, it has totaled 31 points off of its eight October turnovers. New England has turned the ball over just twice in October, giving it a solid plus-6 turnover differential for the month.

#### CAREER HIGH FOR CALDWELL

Reche Caldwell tied his career high with five receptions against the Bills. Caldwell also recorded five catches while playing for the San Diego Chargers against the New York Jets on Nov. 6, 2005.

#### **JACKSON SCORES**

Rookie wide receiver Chad Jackson hauled in a 35-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to give the Patriots a 21-3 lead in the third quarter. The catch was Jackson's second career touchdown, with his other score coming on a 13-yard scoring grab against the New York Jets on Sept. 17. The scoring catch against Buffalo came on Jackson's fifth reception of the season.

#### GABRIEL SCORES

Wide receiver Doug Gabriel grabbed his team-high third touchdown pass of the season, a 5-yard grab in the fourth quarter that gave the Patriots a 28-6 lead. Gabriel's three total touchdowns are tied with Laurence Maroney (whose three scores have come via the rush) for second on the team behind Corey Dillon's four rushing touchdowns. Gabriel's three touchdowns tie his career high, also achieved in 2005 while with Oakland.

#### STARTING STRONG

The Patriots scored a touchdown on their opening drive for the first time this season and for the first time since Dec. 26, 2005, when they achieved the feat to begin a 31-21 road victory over the New York Jets.

#### STRIP SACK

Mike Vrabel sacked J.P. Losman and forced him to fumble with 10:07 left in the first half, and Vince Wilfork pulled in the loose ball to give the Patriots possession on their own 48-yard line. For Vrabel, the play marked his ninth career forced fumble and gave him 1.5 sacks for the season and 35.5 sacks for his career. For Wilfork, the fumble recovery was the fourth of his career.

#### QUICK HITS

- New England scored 14 points in the first quarter against Buffalo. In their first five games combined, they had totaled 17 first-quarter points.
- Josh Miller recorded his longest punt of the season when he booted a 62-yard bomb late in the second quarter.

The Patriots headed into their bye week perched atop the AFC East with a 4-1 record after defeating the Miami Dolphins, 20-10 at Gillette Stadium. New England took advantage of its opportunities at critical points in the game, converting three forced turnovers into a total of 17 points. The Patriots' other three points came following a blocked Miami field goal.

Asante Samuel led the defensive effort with a career-high two interceptions, both of which set up Patriots touchdown drives. Rodney Harrison and Tedy Bruschi helped to set the defensive tone early, as Harrison forced Ronnie Brown to fumble on the Dolphins' first series and Bruschi recovered the loose ball, allowing New England to capitalize with a successful field goal.

Wide receiver Troy Brown paced the Patriots offensive charge with five receptions for 58 yards and a touchdown, while Benjamin Watson added four catches for 33 yards. Fullback Heath Evans scored his first career touchdown, hauling in a 1yard pass from Tom Brady in the fourth quarter to round out the scoring. Brady was 16-for-29 on the afternoon, totaling 140 yards and two touchdowns for a 91.2 passer rating.

New England got on the board first as Stephen Gostkowski nailed a 35-yard field goal following Bruschi's fumble recovery to give the Patriots a 3-0 first-guarter lead. On Miami's next possession, Patriots defensive lineman Mike Wright blocked a 40-yard field goal try by the Dolphins' Olindo Mare to preserve the lead. On the ensuing drive, New England marched 56 yards on 15 plays, ending in another field goal from Gostkowski, this time from 31 yards, to give the Patriots a 6-0 lead. Three plays later, Samuel recorded his first interception of the game and returned the ball to Miami's 10-yard line to keep momentum on New England's side. Two plays later, the Patriots got on the scoreboard again on a 10-yard scoring grab by Troy Brown to put the Patriots ahead 13-0. The Dolphins scored twice in the final three minutes of the half - on a 2-yard run by Ronnie Brown and a 40-yard field goal - to cut New England's halftime lead to 13-10. In the second half, Evans' 1-yard touchdown provided the only scoring as the Patriots claimed a 20-10 win.

#### TURNOVER TIME

The Patriots scored 17 of their 20 points off of three forced turnovers, including two interceptions and a fumble. New England scored 14 points off turnovers in their victory over Cincinnati on Oct. 1, and has totaled 31 points off of turnovers in its last two games. On Miami's third offensive play of the game, Rodney Harrison forced Miami's Ronnie Brown to fumble and Tedy Bruschi pounced on the loose ball to give the Patriots possession at the Dolphins' 37-yard line. New England capitalized on the turnover by taking a 3-0 lead on a 35-yard field goal by Stephen Gostkowski seven plays later. In the second quarter, Asante Samuel's interception and 26-yard return gave New England possession on the Miami 10-yard line and set up a 10-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Troy Brown two plays later. Finally, in the fourth quarter, Samuel notched his second interception of the game, giving the Patriots possession at the Dolphins' 24-yard line and setting up Heath Evans' 1-yard touchdown run four plays later.

#### **EVANS IN THE ZONE**

Heath Evans scored his first career touchdown on a 1-yard reception from Tom Brady in the fourth quarter to give the Patriots a 20-10 lead. Evans' first career score came against his former team, having played in six games for the Miami Dolphins in 2005. Evans' first career touchdown came in his 78th career game on his 28th career reception.

#### **BLOCK PARTY**

Mike Wright blocked a 40-yard field goal attempt by Miami's Olindo Mare in the first quarter to preserve a 3-0 Patriots lead. The blocked field goal was the first by the Patriots in the regular season in nearly three years, dating back to when Richard Seymour blocked a field goal attempt by Mare at Miami on Oct. 19, 2003. That block in 2003 also marked the last time that Mare had a field goal blocked. Including playoff games, Wright's block was the first for New England since Seymour swatted down a 31-yard attempt by Tennessee's Gary Anderson in a 2003 divisional playoff game on Jan. 10, 2004.

#### **GREEN GIANT**

Jarvis Green sacked Joey Harrington for an 11-yard loss in the fourth quarter. Green leads the team with 4.5 sacks this season, and his 4.5 sacks set a new single-season career high, besting his mark of 4.0 sacks in 2004. Against Cincinnati on Oct. 1, Green recorded a career-high 3.0 sacks, including a strip-sack of Carson Palmer, and was named AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts.

#### LONG DRIVE

New England used a 15-play drive that took 8:12 of clock time to take a 6-0 lead on a 31-yard field goal by Stephen Gostkowski. The drive was the Patriots' second longest drive of the season in terms of number of plays and time elapsed. The only drive that was longer was a 16-play drive that took 8:15 of clock time in the fourth quarter of a 24-17 win over the Jets on Sept. 17.

#### TWO PICKS FOR SAMUEL

Asante Samuel had a career-high two interceptions, becoming the first Patriots player to record two interceptions in a single game since Eugene Wilson picked off a pair of passes at Arizona on Sept. 19, 2004. Both of Samuel's interceptions gave New England great field position and set up Patriots touchdowns as New England totaled 14 points off of Samuel's forced turnovers. Samuel's first interception came when he picked off a Joey Harrington pass at the Miami 36-yard line in the second quarter and returned it 26 yards to the Dolphins' 10-yard line. New England took advantage of the turnover with a 10-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Troy Brown two plays later to give the Patriots a 13-0 lead. Samuel's second pick came in the fourth quarter, when he grabbed a tipped ball at the Miami 26-yard line and returned it to the Dolphins' 24-yard line, setting up a 1-yard touchdown pass from Brady to Heath Evans four plays later. The two picks give Samuel eight career regularseason interceptions. He also has two interceptions in his playoff career. In 2005, Samuel tied for the team lead with a careerhigh three interceptions.

#### TOUCHDOWN TROY

Troy Brown caught a 10-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady in the second quarter to give the Patriots a 13-0 lead. The touchdown was Brown's second touchdown reception this season, his 29th career scoring reception and his 32nd overall touchdown (including three career punts returned for touchdowns). His 29 career touchdown receptions rank sixth on the Patriots all-time list of scoring catches. With his 29th career scoring grab, Brown passed Russ Francis (28) to claim sole possession of sixth place on the list.

#### QUICK HITS

- > Tom Brady improved to 28-6 (.824) against AFC East teams.
- The game was the 131st consecutive home sellout for the Patriots. The record includes every regular-season, preseason and playoff game since the 1994 regular-season opener.
- Rookie wide receiver Chad Jackson started his first career game.

The Patriots improved to 3-1 on the year with a convincing 38-13 road victory over the previously-undefeated Cincinnati Bengals. New England piled up 424 total net yards, including 236 rushing yards, and scored 17 points in the fourth quarter to seal the victory. The Bengals took a 6-0 lead on a pair of first-quarter field goals, while New England answered with two second-quarter touchdowns to take a 14-6 lead into halftime. Cincinnati closed the gap to 14-13 with a touchdown midway through the third quarter, but the Patriots rolled off 24 unanswered points to claim the win.

On offense, rookie running back Laurence Maroney totaled 125 rushing yards and two touchdowns, while Corey Dillon added 67 rushing yards and a score. Tom Brady connected with wide receiver Doug Gabriel for a 25-yard touchdown and found tight end Daniel Graham for a 3-yard score.

New England's defense held Cincinnati's explosive offense in check for most of the game and forced key fourth-quarter turnovers that put the contest out of reach. Jarvis Green led the charge with three sacks, including a fourth-quarter strip-sack that set up a Patriots touchdown. Ty Warren added a strip-sack of his own that also led to a touchdown. The Patriots defense held the Bengals to an 18 percent third-down conversion rate (2-for-11) that stopped Cincinnati from mounting many lengthy drives.

#### ROOKIE RUNNER

Laurence Maroney ran for 125 yards on 15 carries (8.3 avg), marking the highest rushing total by a Patriots rookie in nearly eight years, since Robert Edwards ran for 196 yards on 24 carries at St. Louis on Dec. 13, 1998. Maroney also recorded the first 100-yard rushing game by a Patriots rookie since Edwards in 1998. Additionally, Maroney's 41-yard run in the third quarter was the Patriots' longest rush in nearly two years, since Corey Dillon ran for a 44-yard gain against the Jets on Oct. 24, 2004.

#### MARONEY IN THE ZONE

First-round draft choice Laurence Maroney scored a pair of touchdowns on runs of 11 and 25 yards. Maroney is the first Patriots rookie to rush for multiple touchdowns in a game since Curtis Martin did it five times in 1995. Maroney also became the first Patriots rookie to score multiple rushing touchdowns in a season since Robert Edwards ran for nine touchdowns in 1998. Maroney's second touchdown, a 25-yarder, was the Patriots' longest touchdown run since Kevin Faulk scored on a 45-yard touchdown run at Buffalo on Nov. 3, 2002. The touchdowns give Maroney a total of three touchdowns in his four-game NFL career, including a 1-yard scoring run in the Patriots' 24-17 victory over the New York Jets on Sept. 17.

#### MOVING ON UP

With his 12-yard run in the third quarter, Corey Dillon moved into 15th place on the NFL's all-time rushing list, passing Ricky Watters' mark of 10,643 yards. Following that run, Dillon had 2,471 rushes for 10,649 yards in his 10-year career. O.J. Simpson currently ranks 14th on the all-time list, totaling 11,236 yards over 11 seasons from 1969-79. Dillon has more career rushing yards than any other active running back and is the only active player to own more than 10,000 career rushing yards.

#### LONG RUN FOR BRADY

Tom Brady scrambled for a 22-yard run on third-and-13 in the third quarter, recording the longest run of his career. His previous career-long run was 15 yards, which he accomplished on two occasions – at Kansas City on Nov. 27, 2005 and against the New York Jets at Gillette Stadium on Dec. 22, 2002.

#### TURNING OVER

Jarvis Green had a career-high three sacks for 30 yards, becoming the first Patriots player to record three or more sacks in a regular-season game since Mike Vrabel had three sacks against Cleveland in a 9-6 win at Gillette Stadium on Oct. 26, 2003. Green's previous career high was 2.5 sacks, achieved against Indianapolis in the 2003 AFC Championship Game. On Green's first sack of the day, he dropped Cincinnati's Carson Palmer for a 10-yard loss, forced him to fumble on the play and recovered the ball himself at the Bengals' 13-yard line in the fourth quarter. The strip-sack set up Corey Dillon's 1-yard touchdown plunge that gave the Patriots a 31-13 lead. The takeaway marked the fourth forced fumble of Green's career and also the fourth fumble recovery of his career. Green also had sacks of nine yards and 11 yards in a three-play span in the fourth quarter.

#### FAULK'S PUNT RETURN

Kevin Faulk's 43-yard punt return in the second quarter was New England's longest punt return since Troy Brown returned a punt 68 yards for a touchdown in the 2001 regular-season finale at Carolina on Jan. 6, 2002. The punt return was the longest of Faulk's career, besting his 35-yard return against Kansas City on Dec. 4, 2000 at Foxboro Stadium. Faulk's 43-yard return came on his 65th career punt return. Faulk has never returned a punt for a touchdown, but owns two career kickoff returns for touchdowns to go along with 10 career rushing touchdowns and nine career receiving touchdowns.

#### GABRIEL GETS THE TOUCHDOWN

Wide receiver Doug Gabriel scored a touchdown for the second consecutive week, hauling in a 25-yard score from Tom Brady in the second quarter to give the Patriots a 14-6 lead. Gabriel had scored a total of five touchdowns in his first 43 career games (all with Oakland) and his last two scores mark the first time in his career he has scored touchdowns in back-to-back games.

#### FIELD POSITION

New England began a second-quarter touchdown drive at the Cincinnati 42-yard line following Kevin Faulk's 43-yard punt return. It marked just the second time this season that New England began a drive in its opponents' territory. The Patriots took advantage of the field position to drive 42 yards on six plays to take a 14-6 lead on a 25-yard touchdown catch by Doug Gabriel. The other drive this season that New England began in opponents' territory was against the New York Jets on Sept. 17 and also resulted in a touchdown, when the Patriots took over at New York's 45-yard line and went 45 yards on seven plays, ending in a 1-yard scoring run by Laurence Maroney.

#### QUICK HITS

- With the victory, the Patriots have won five of their last six road games in the regular season.
- > Wide receiver Troy Brown participated on defense as an extra defensive back on occasion.
- Linebacker Tully Banta-Cain's 16-yard kickoff return in the first quarter was his third career kickoff return, having recorded one return in both 2004 and 2005.
- Rookie wide receiver Chad Jackson recorded the first rushing attempt of his career, gaining a first down on a 10-yard run as part of New England's second-quarter touchdown drive. On the play, running back Kevin Faulk took a direct snap and handed off to Jackson, who used a block from Tom Brady to break free.

The Patriots suffered their first loss of the 2006 season, dropping a 17-7 decision to the Denver Broncos in their inaugural appearance on NBC's *Sunday Night Football*. Patriots quarterback Tom Brady tied his career high for pass attempts, throwing 55 times and compiling 320 yards through the air, but the Patriots couldn't come back against a talented Broncos team.

Strong defensive play from both teams led to a scoreless first quarter, as the two teams traded several punts. After New England failed to convert a fourth-and-one play midway through the second quarter, the Broncos drove from their 37-yard line to the Patriots' 4-yard line where Broncos kicker Jason Elam opened the scoring with a 23-yard field goal. New England responded with a 60-yard drive to the Denver 19-yard line that featured three consecutive first down plays, but the Broncos special teams unit blocked a field goal attempt by Patriots kicker Stephen Gostkowski. Capitalizing on the turnover, Broncos quarterback Jake Plummer hit receiver Javon Walker in stride down the right sideline for a 32-yard score, giving Denver a 10-0 lead at the half.

The defenses were on display again in the third quarter, as neither squad mounted a significant drive in a battle for field position, but the Broncos scored early in the fourth quarter, converting a third-and-6 play on a Walker catch and run for 83 yards and a touchdown to stretch the Broncos' lead to 17. The Patriots responded on their next drive, marching 80 yards downfield and scoring when newly acquired receiver Doug Gabriel snared a Brady bullet in the back of the end zone. The touchdown catch was Gabriel's first as a Patriot, and came just six plays after making his first catch in a New England uniform. Gabriel finished the game with six catches for 65 yards, all coming in the fourth quarter. The Patriots switched to a no-huddle offense with 3:36 remaining in the game and drove into the Denver red zone, but were unable to mount a comeback bid.

Prior to the game, NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell joined Patriots owner Robert Kraft and other dignitaries to announce that the Patriots would play in the inaugural China Bowl in Beijing, China during the 2007 preseason.

#### STATISTICAL CORRECTION

There was been a correction to the statistics from the Patriots-Broncos game. With 2:31 remaining in the third quarter, the Patriots completed a 12-yard pass to Daniel Graham. The reception was originally credited to Benjamin Watson and has been corrected. For the game, Watson had five receptions for 54 yards and Graham had two receptions for 19 yards.

#### CAREER HIGH FOR WATSON

Tight end Benjamin Watson set a career high with five receptions against the Broncos. His previous career high for receptions came against New Orleans on Nov. 20, 2005, when he caught four passes in a 24-17 Patriots victory.

#### **BRADY TIES CAREER HIGH**

Tom Brady tied a career high with 55 pass attempts. He also attempted 55 passes in a 33-30 victory at Chicago on Nov. 10, 2002. Brady completed 31 of his 55 throws against Denver, his highest completion total since also connecting on 31 passes at Pittsburgh on Sept. 25, 2005. Brady has now completed 30 or more passes seven times in his career and New England is now 5-2 in those games. Brady threw for 320 yards against Denver, marking the 13th time in his career he has exceeded the 300-yard mark. New England is now 11-2 in Brady's 300-yard games, with the only other loss coming on Sept. 29, 2002 at San Diego (a 21-14 loss)

#### DOUG GABRIEL

Wide receiver Doug Gabriel hauled in an 8-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady in the fourth quarter. He led the team with 65 receiving yards and tied for the club lead with six receptions (all in the fourth quarter). The scoring grab was Gabriel's first as a Patriot and his sixth career touchdown catch. Last season with the Oakland Raiders, Gabriel caught three touchdown passes (out of 37 receptions). Gabriel also hauled in two touchdowns in 2004 for the Raiders. For Brady, the touchdown was his fourth scoring pass of the season and the 127th of his career

#### **NBC/SUNDAY NIGHT NOTES**

The Broncos game marked the first time the Patriots had appeared on NBC since Jan. 3, 1998 - a 7-6 road loss to the Pittsburgh Steelers in a 1997 divisional playoff game. Following the game, New England has an all-time record of 13-12 in Sunday Night Football games, with the loss to Denver breaking a streak of four straight wins on Sunday nights. This game was the second time the Patriots and Broncos have met on Sunday Night Football. The teams also met on Oct. 8, 1995, and Denver claimed a 37-3 victory at Foxboro Stadium in a game televised by TNT.

#### LONG HALF TIME

Prior to this game, the Patriots had scored in 27 consecutive halves of football. Before being shut out by the Broncos in the first half, the last time New England did not score in a half was on Oct. 30, 2005, when they trailed the Buffalo Bills 3-0 at halftime in a game that the Patriots eventually won 21-16. Interestingly, that game also marked the last time the Patriots played on Sunday night.

#### **ROOKIE RECEPTIONS**

Rookie running back Laurence Maroney caught the first passes of his career, grabbing five passes for 61 yards, including a 31-yard catch-and-run play from Tom Brady. In his three seasons at the University of Minnesota, Maroney caught a total of 21 passes for 198 yards and one touchdown. His longest collegiate catch went for 37 yards in 2005.

#### QUICK HITS

- Wide receiver Doug Gabriel made his first reception in a Patriots uniform on a 12-yard catch in the fourth quarter.
- Junior Seau led the team with 11 tackles (2 solo), while Vince Wilfork and Ty Warren tied for second with 10 tackles (7 solo) apiece.
- Richard Seymour paced the team with three quarterback hits.
- Chad Scott made a key third-down play in the third quarter, putting a big hit on Rod Smith and forcing an incomplete pass on third-and-seven, forcing a Denver punt on the next play.
- Tedy Bruschi tipped a Jake Plummer pass intended for Brandon Marshall into the air on third-and-three in the first quarter, nearly intercepting the ball and forcing a Denver punt on the next play.
- Ellis Hobbs delivered a big hit on Denver's Javon Walker on third-and-six in the first quarter, forcing an incomplete pass and a Denver punt on the next play.

#### SCORELESS THROUGH THREE QUARTERS

The Patriots did not score through three quarters, marking the first time New England had not scored through three quarters of a game since September 7, 2003. In that game, the Patriots ended up being shut out 31-0 by the Buffalo Bills at Ralph Wilson Stadium.

The Patriots improved to 2-0 on the season with their second straight divisional win, a 24-17 road victory over the New York Jets. New England's rushing attack excelled for the second straight week, totaling 147 yards as Corey Dillon and Laurence Maroney both exceeded 4.0 yards per carry and both scored touchdowns. Rookie Chad Jackson caught a touchdown pass from Tom Brady, who finished the day 15-of-29 passing for 220 yards. Troy Brown led New England's receiving corps with four catches for 51 yards. Defensive lineman Ty Warren paced the defense with 11 tackles (8 solo), while four different players recorded a sack for New England. Tedy Bruschi made his return from injury a memorable one, finishing tied for third on the team with six tackles and grabbing an interception on a tipped ball to seal the win in the final minute of the game.

New England used its effective ground game and an opportunistic passing attack to build a 24-0 lead by the third quarter. The Patriots opened the scoring with an 11-play, 82-yard drive on their second possession of the game to take a 7-0 lead on a 1-yard touchdown run by Dillon. After a Jets punt, New England marched 87 yards on 11 plays to the New York 2-yard line, but settled for a 20-yard field goal and a 10-0 lead. New England took advantage of good field position to score again before halftime, driving 50 yards on five plays to take a 17-0 lead on a 13-yard strike from Brady to Jackson with 14 seconds left in the half. New England extended its lead on the first possession of the second half, claiming a 24-0 advantage on a 1-yard scoring run by Maroney with 8:57 left in the third quarter. New York clawed back with two long touchdown plays in the third guarter a 71-yard reception by Jerricho Cotchery and a 46-yard grab by Laveranues Coles - but the Patriots were able to withstand the charge and hang on for the victory.

#### SHUTTING THEM DOWN

The Patriots defense completed a streak of more than five full quarters without allowing any points, outscoring opponents 36-0 over that span. The streak was ended on Jerricho Cotchery's 71-yard touchdown catch with 6:15 remaining in the third quarter and began following an 18-yard touchdown run by Buffalo's Anthony Thomas with 11:40 left in the second quarter on Sept. 10. Following that score, New England did not allow any points in 80:25 of clock time. New England outscored Buffalo 12-0 in the second half of the Buffalo game and then built a 24-0 lead over the Jets prior to Cotchery's score.

#### FRANCHISE CLIMBS ABOVE .500

With their victory over the Jets, the Patriots' overall franchise record climbed above .500 for the first time since the end of the 1968 season, when the Boston Patriots' franchise record stood at 60-59-9. The Patriots dropped the 1969 season opener (35-7 at Denver on Sept. 14, 1969) and had not been above .500 again until today. Following the Jets game, the Patriots' overall team record stood at 357-356-9, including regular-season and playoff games. During Robert Kraft's first season of ownership in 1994, the Patriots' overall record bottomed out at 54 games below .500 (228-282-9). The low point was reached on Nov. 6, 1994 following a 13-6 loss to Cleveland (to a Browns team coached by Bill Belichick). Kraft has since transformed that team into a model NFL franchise that has won more Super Bowls (3), conference titles (4) and playoff games (13) than any other NFL team since 1994. The Patriots are 52 games above .500 in the Kraft era, compiling a 132-80-0 record.

#### JACKSON'S NFL DEBUT

Rookie wide receiver Chad Jackson made his NFL debut against the Jets and made an impact with his first career touchdown, a 13-yard grab with 14 seconds left in the first half, giving the Patriots a 17-0 lead. Jackson also made a big play early in the game with a 29-yard reception from Tom Brady on the Patriots' second drive, making the grab along the sideline in spite of tight coverage from New York's Justin Miller. Jackson's catch moved New England into Jets territory and was a key play on New England's 82-yard drive that ended in a 7-0 Patriots lead.

#### **DILLON IN THE ZONE**

Corey Dillon gave the Patriots a 7-0 lead on a 1-yard plunge in the first quarter. The touchdown was Dillon's 27th score in 29 regular-season games as a Patriot (25 rushing touchdowns and 2 receiving touchdowns). The touchdown was the 70th rushing touchdown of his career and his 77th overall touchdown. Dillon is the NFL leader in rushing yards among players currently on 53man rosters, totaling 10,582 career yards.

#### MARONEY IN THE ZONE

Rookie Laurence Maroney scored his first career touchdown on a 1-yard run in the third quarter to give the Patriots a 24-0 lead. Maroney had a pair of 14-yard runs against the Jets, each a big part of touchdown drives. Maroney's first 14-yard scamper brought New England to the Jets' 4-yard line in the first quarter, helping to set up Corey Dillon's 1-yard touchdown run two plays later. His second 14-yarder came in the third quarter, bringing New England to the Jets' 3-yard line and setting up his own touchdown two plays later.

#### DRIVE ENDER

Richard Seymour played a key part in back-to-back third-down stops in the first half. First, he batted down a Chad Pennington pass at the line of scrimmage on third down in the first quarter, forcing a New York punt on the next play. On New York's next drive, Seymour pressured Pennington, running in on the quarterback and forcing him to throw early, resulting in an incomplete pass to Laveranues Coles on third down, forcing another punt. Seymour capped off his solid half with a 1-yard sack of Pennington late in the quarter.

#### **QUICK HITS**

- Tom Brady's first six completions of the day were to six different receivers – three tight ends and three wide receivers.
- Linebacker Tedy Bruschi saw his first action of the season, starting New England's first defensive series of the second quarter. Bruschi missed all four preseason games and the regular-season opener with a wrist injury.
- Kevin Faulk drew a 28-yard pass interference penalty on New York's Victor Hobson in the third quarter that gave the Patriots a first down at the Jets' 12-yard line. New England capitalized on the opportunity by ending the drive with a 1-yard touchdown by Laurence Maroney, taking a 24-0 lead.

#### A DAY OF FIRSTS

Against the Jets, running back Laurence Maroney scored his first career touchdown, wide receiver Chad Jackson made his first career reception and caught his first career touchdown pass, tight end David Thomas recorded his first career reception and defensive lineman Mike Wright made his first career start.

#### MAGIC NUMBER 29

The Patriots had three completions of exactly 29 yards in the first quarter, to Chad Jackson, David Thomas and Daniel Graham. The 29-yard grabs for Jackson and Thomas marked the first career reception for each player. Interestingly, the Patriots' two completions that did not go for 29 yards in the first quarter added up to 29 yards (a 15-yarder by Troy Brown and a 14-yarder by Benjamin Watson).

The Patriots began the season with a tight two-point victory over a division rival in front of their 129th consecutive sellout crowd in Foxborough. New England's rushing attack paced the offensive side of the ball, totaling 183 yards on 41 carries, while Tom Brady threw two touchdown passes and completed 11-of-23 passes for 163 yards. But New England's defense was the main catalyst for the victory, pitching a second-half shutout and allowing Buffalo a total of just five net yards after coming up with a critical stop on fourth down at the Patriots' 7-yard line early in the third quarter with the Bills bidding to extend their lead to 24-7. Trailing 17-14 entering the fourth quarter, the Patriots bore down and tied the game on a 32-yard field goal by Stephen Gostkowski with 9:33 left in the contest. On Buffalo's ensuing possession, Ty Warren sacked Buffalo's JP Losman in the end zone for a safety that gave the Patriots a 19-17 lead and provided the final margin of victory.

#### WHAT A RUSH

The Patriots gained 183 rushing yards on 41 carries (4.5 avg.), compiling their highest rushing yardage total since gaining 225 yards on 50 carries (4.5 avg.) at Cleveland on Dec, 5, 2004. New England totaled 136 net passing yards against Buffalo, making it the first since that 2004 game against the Browns that the Patriots have gained more rushing yards than passing yards.

#### IN A RUSH TO START THE SEASON

The Patriots' 183-yard rushing performance marked New England's highest rushing total in a season opener since 1985, when the Patriots gained 208 yards on 41 carries against Green Bay (Sept. 8, 1985). The team record in a season-opening game is 241 rushing yards, against Kansas City on Sept. 18, 1977.

#### SAFETY CHECK

Ty Warren sacked JP Losman in the end zone for a safety with 8:33 left in the game to give the Patriots a 19-17 lead. The safety was the first for the Patriots since Dec. 7, 2003, when Mike Vrabel and Jarvis Green combined to sack Jay Fiedler in the end zone in a 12-0 victory over Miami to clinch the AFC East title.

#### CLIMBING THE CHARTS

With his 11-yard run in the first quarter, Corey Dillon passed Eddie George to move into 16th place on the NFL's all-time rushing list. Following that carry, Dillon's career rushing total stood at 10,446 yards, eclipsing George's career total of 10,441 yards. Ricky Watters is currently in 15th place on the all-time list (10,643 yards). Dillon has compiled the highest career rushing total of any running back on a 2006 opening-day active roster. Dillon is the only NFL player on an opening day roster to have recorded more than 10,000 rushing yards.

#### SOLID START FOR MARONEY

Laurence Maroney gained a total of 49 yards on his first two NFL carries, starting his pro career on the right foot. The two runs provided the majority of the yardage on a 9-play, 80-yard drive that ended in a 9-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Troy Brown. Maroney's first NFL carry was a 27-yard scamper that brought the Patriots to the Bills' 30-yard line, with his shifty running eluding tacklers as he bounced outside the numbers and headed downfield. He followed that up with a similar run to the opposite side of the field that was good for 22 yards. Over the course of the 2005 regular season, the Patriots had just two rushes longer than either of Maroney's first two runs of the season (a 31-yard run by Patrick Pass on Nov. 20, 2005 and a 29-yard run by Corey Dillon on Oct. 2, 2005).

#### **BIG BENJAMIN**

Benjamin Watson grabbed a 34-yard pass from Tom Brady in the third quarter, recording the second longest reception of his regular-season career. The grab was just one yard shy of his career long, a 35-yard catch in the 2005 season opener against Oakland and was the key play on a Patriots touchdown drive that ended in a 17-yard touchdown pass from Brady to Kevin Faulk that cut the Bills lead to 17-14. Watson caught 10 passes of 20 yards or longer in 2005.

#### FAULK SCORES

Kevin Faulk lined up as a wide receiver and made a diving catch on a 17-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter to cut the Bills lead to 17-14. The touchdown reception was the ninth scoring grab of Faulk's career and his first since Dec. 20, 2004, when he snared a 31-yard scoring pass at Miami. Faulk now has 21 total touchdowns in his career, including 10 rushing scores and two on kickoff returns.

#### NFL DEBUTS

The following players made their NFL debuts against the Bills – K Stephen Gostkowski, DB Willie Andrews, RB Laurence Maroney, LB Pierre Woods, OT Wesley Britt, OT Ryan O'Callaghan and TE David Thomas. Additionally, DL Le Kevin Smith was active but did not play.

#### **TOUCHDOWN TROY**

Troy Brown scored the Patriots' first touchdown of the season when he hauled in a 9-yard pass from Tom Brady with 10:47 remaining in the first quarter. The scoring grab was the 28th receiving touchdown of Brown's career and his 31st overall touchdown (including three career punts returned for a score).

#### COMING UP ROSES

Rosevelt Colvin sacked JP Losman for a 9-yard loss on first down in the second quarter. The sack was New England's first of the season and the 41st of Colvin's career. Last season, Colvin led the team with 7.0 sacks. On the next play following his sack, Colvin batted down a Losman pass, bringing up a third-and-19 situation that the Bills could not convert.

#### HOME OPENERS

The Patriots improved to 10-2 in their last 12 home openers, including a 5-0 record in home openers at Gillette Stadium. The last time the Patriots fell in a home opener was on Sept. 23, 2001, when they dropped a 10-3 decision to the New York Jets at Foxboro Stadium.

#### **BELICHICK GETS 100th WIN**

Patriots Head Coach Bill Belichick recorded his 100th career regular season victory (100-77, .565). Belichick became the 31st head coach in the NFL's 87-year history to reach the 100-win mark. Belichick now holds a 64-33 (.660) record in the regular season since becoming Patriots head coach in 2000. He is already the franchise's winningest head coach in terms of victories and winning percentage.
