## NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (1-0) vs SAN DIEGO CHARGERS (1-0)

Sunday, September 16, 2007 ★ Gillette Stadium (68,756) ★ 8:15 p.m. EDT

The Patriots will square off against the San Diego Chargers in New England's 2007 home opener at Gillette Stadium on Sunday night. The Patriots have won five straight home openers dating back to 2002 and are 24-23 all-time, including nine wins in the last 11 seasons.

## BROADCAST INFORMATION

**TELEVISION:** This week's game will be broadcast by NBC. The game can be seen in Boston on WHDH-TV Channel 7. **Al Michaels** will handle play-by-play duties and **John Madden** will provide analysis. **Andrea Kremer** will report from the sidelines.

**RADIO:** WBCN 104.1 FM is the flagship station for the **Patriots Rock Radio Network**. A complete listing of the network's 33 stations can be found in this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster **Gil Santos** is in his 31st season as the voice of the Patriots and will call the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer **Gino Cappelletti**. Santos and Cappelletti are celebrating their 24th season as a tandem.

**NATIONAL RADIO:** The game will be broadcast nationally by **Westwood One**. **Dave Sims** and **Bob Trumpy** will call the game.

## TWO IS TOUGH

The Patriots will aim to start the season with back-to-back victories, a feat that has historically proven quite difficult to achieve. New England has opened the season with a 2-0 record just eight times in the franchise's 47 previous seasons. This decade, New England has begun the season with back-to-back wins on three occasions (2002, 2004 and 2006). Last season, 11 NFL clubs began the year with a 2-0 record. In both 2004 and 2005, only seven of the NFL's 32 clubs opened the season with back-to-back wins.

## HOMELAND DEFENSE

Since Gillette Stadium opened in 2002, the Patriots have had the NFL's best defense at home. New England has allowed an average of just 15.76 points per game, a figure that leads the league since 2002. Additionally, the Patriots' 36-9 home record since 2002 (including regular-season and playoff games) is the second best in the NFL over that span.

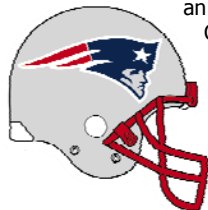
# PATRIOTS VS. CHARGERS

## SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots and Chargers will play for the 35th time overall and for the second time this calendar year. In the divisional playoffs on January 14, 2007, the Patriots claimed a 24-21 victory in San Diego to advance to the AFC Championship Game. The series dates back to 1960, the inaugural season for each team, with the Patriots holding

an 18-14-2 lead. The Chargers won the

last two regular-season meetings, including a 41-17 win in the 2005 regular season. Prior to a loss to the Chargers in the 2002 regular season, the Patriots captured 10 straight victories dating back to 1970, the final season of the AFL.

The Patriots advanced to the AFC Championship Game on a game-winning 31-yard field goal by rookie kicker Stephen Gostkowski with 1:10 remaining in the game. Tom Brady orchestrated his 24th career game-winning performance to lead the Patriots to victory following a fourth-quarter deficit or tie. San Diego took a 21-13 lead midway through the fourth quarter, but on the ensuing drive, the Patriots tied the game on a Reche Caldwell touchdown followed by a 2-point conversion run by Kevin Faulk. During New England's touchdown drive, Tom Brady was intercepted by San Diego's Marlon McCree, but Troy Brown stripped the ball and forced a fumble that the Patriots recovered to extend their game-tying drive. Following a three-and-out by the Patriots defense, New England drove for the game-winning field goal. San Diego missed a 54-yard field goal in the final seconds to send the Patriots to the AFC title game.

The Patriots suffered their first loss at home in two-and-a-half years, dropping to 2-2 on the 2005 season and seeing their 21-game home winning streak ended. The teams traded scores throughout the first half, with the Patriots taking a 7-3 first quarter lead on a 1-yard Corey Dillon run. The Chargers regained the lead on an 11-yard touchdown pass from Drew Brees to Keenan McCardell, but the Patriots answered with a 30-yard hookup from Tom Brady to Tim Dwight. After a LaDainian Tomlinson touchdown run gave the Chargers a 17-14 lead, Adam Vinatieri tied the score on a 34-yard field goal with seconds remaining in the half. The Chargers opened the scoring in the second half on Tomlinson's second rushing touchdown, and the Patriots were not able to respond, as the Chargers scored an additional 17 unanswered points to put the game out of reach.

## CONNECTIONS

- Patriots linebacker **Junior Seau** played for the Chargers for 13 seasons from 1990-2002 and earned 12 consecutive Pro Bowl berths. He was San Diego's team MVP for five straight seasons from 1997-2001. Seau also attended high school in Oceanside, Calif.
- Patriots guard **Stephen Neal** was born in San Diego and attended San Diego High School, where he was a five-sport athlete, lettering in football, wrestling, swimming, tennis and track & field.
- Patriots tight end **Kyle Brady** and Chargers safety **Marlon McCree** were teammates while both were with the Jacksonville Jaguars from 2001-03.
- Patriots head coach **Bill Belichick** was the New York Jets' assistant head coach/secondary in 1997, when Chargers fullback **Lorenzo Neal** played for the Jets.
- Chargers head coach **Norv Turner** was the head coach of the Oakland Raiders in 2005, when Patriots wide receiver **Randy Moss** played for the Raiders.
- Patriots wide receiver **Randy Moss** and Chargers offensive lineman **Cory Withrow** were teammates with the Minnesota Vikings for six seasons from 1999-2004.
- Patriots cornerback **Ellis Hobbs** and Chargers linebacker **Tim Dobbins** played together at Iowa State in 2004.
- Patriots offensive lineman **Russ Hochstein** and Chargers linebacker **Carlos Polk** were four-year teammates at the University of Nebraska from 1997-2000.
- Chargers defensive tackle **Ryon Bingham** played with Patriots offensive lineman **Russ Hochstein** (1999-2000) and defensive lineman **Le Kevin Smith** (2002-03) at the University of Nebraska.
- Patriots offensive tackle **Matt Light** played with Chargers linebacker **Shaun Phillips** at Purdue from 1999-2000.
- Patriots safety **Rashad Baker** and Chargers wide receiver **Eric Parker** were teammates at the University of Tennessee from 2000-01.
- Chargers head coach **Norv Turner** was the Dallas Cowboys' offensive coordinator from 1991-93, during which time Patriots strength and conditioning coach **Mike Woicik** held the same position with Dallas.
- Chargers special teams coach **Steve Crosby** was the special teams/tight ends coach for the Patriots in 1990. Crosby also served on **Bill Belichick's** coaching staff with the Cleveland Browns from 1991-94, coaching running backs (1991-93) and serving as the offensive coordinator (1994).
- Chargers inside linebackers coach **Ron Rivera** was a linebacker for the Chicago Bears in their Super Bowl XX victory over the Patriots.
- Chargers wide receiver **Kassim Osgood** was born in Boston.
- Chargers defensive end **Jacques Cesaire** is a native of Gardner, Mass. and attended Gardner High School before playing his college ball at Southern Connecticut State.
- Chargers linebacker **Stephen Cooper** is a native of Wareham, Mass. and attended Wareham High School before playing his college ball at the University of Maine.
- Chargers fullback **Andrew Pinnock** was born in Hartford, Connecticut. He was named "Mr. Football" in Connecticut in 1998.
- Chargers quarterbacks coach **John Ramsdell** attended Springfield College in Springfield, Mass.
- Patriots assistant strength and conditioning coach **Don Davis** and Chargers running back **Darren Sproles** are both natives of Olathe, Kan.
- Patriots linebacker **Mike Vrabel** caught his first career touchdown pass against San Diego on Sept. 29, 2002. Vrabel has totaled eight career touchdowns as a tight end.

## PASSING PERFORMANCES

Tom Brady has started four times against San Diego, completing 115 passes for 1,221 yards. Brady's 364 yards against the Chargers in 2001 mark the fourth highest single-game total of his career. His 353 yards at San Diego on Sept. 29, 2002 constitute Brady's seventh highest career total. Brady has thrown for 280 or more yards in three of his four career games against the Chargers, has thrown for multiple touchdowns three times in his four games and has attempted 50 or more passes in three of the four contests.

## PATRIOTS-CHARGERS QUICK HITS

- The Patriots' Oct. 14, 2001 victory over the Chargers was the first of Tom Brady's 24 career fourth quarter comeback performances. New England's divisional playoff victory over San Diego last season is Brady's most recent comeback.
- The Chargers are one of only three non-division opponents to which Tom Brady has multiple losses in his career (2). The others are Denver (5) and Indianapolis (3).
- Since Bill Belichick became head coach in 2000, the Patriots are 6-3 in games against teams they played in the previous season's playoffs, with two wins over Indianapolis in 2004, victories over Pittsburgh (2002 and 2005), Jacksonville (2006) and the New York Jets (2007) and losses to Oakland (2002), Indianapolis (2005) and Denver (2006).
- This week's game marks the second of two straight playoff rematches to begin the 2007 season. New England defeated the New York Jets last week in a rematch of their wild card playoff game from last season.
- This week's game will mark just the second time in team history that the Patriots will play their home opener on a Sunday night, with the other occasion coming on Sept. 13, 1998 – a 29-6 win over the Indianapolis Colts.

## TOM ON TURF

Tom Brady has enjoyed significant success on artificial surfaces throughout his career, and the Patriots have won 24 of their 26 games on artificial turf since 2001.

- Brady has compiled a career record of 24-2 as a starter in games played on artificial surfaces, including regular season and playoff games. His only losses came at Buffalo (09/07/03) and at Indianapolis (01/21/07).
- In his 26 previous starts on artificial surfaces, Brady has thrown 48 touchdowns and just 20 interceptions.
- Brady's touchdown-to-interception ratio on artificial surfaces is 2.4-to-1, as opposed to 1.8-to-1 on grass.
- On artificial surfaces, Brady has compiled a career passer rating of 97.7, compared to an 85.8 career rating on grass.

The Patriots opened the 2007 season with a convincing road victory over a division rival, defeating the New York Jets, 38-14. New England used 24 second-half points to put the game out of reach, as a solid effort in all three phases of the game resulted in an encouraging beginning to the campaign.

On offense, Randy Moss compiled 183 receiving yards on nine catches, turning in the third-most prolific day for a receiver in Patriots history (in terms of receiving yardage) and totaling the third-highest receiving yardage total of his career. Tom Brady also turned in a superlative performance, as his 146.6 passer rating was the third best of his career. New England ground out three drives of 10 plays or longer and in its four red zone trips came away with three touchdowns and a field goal.

On defense, the Patriots sacked New York quarterbacks five times, as Mike Vrabel totaled 2.5 sacks and Jarvis Green added a pair of sacks. New England allowed just 60 rushing yards as the Jets made six first downs on their non-scoring drives.

New England's special teams produced a 108-yard kickoff return for a touchdown by Ellis Hobbs, the longest kickoff return in the NFL's 88-year history.

The Patriots started strong, compiling a 12-play, 91-yard scoring drive on their first offense possession, ending in an 11-yard touchdown strike from Brady to Wes Welker. New York tied the score at seven midway through the second quarter, but on the ensuing drive, the Patriots marched down the field to reclaim the lead, 14-7, on a 5-yard touchdown pass from Brady to tight end Benjamin Watson.

In the second half, New England came out of the gates quickly, as Hobbs returned the opening kickoff 108 yards for a touchdown and a 21-7 Patriots advantage. On New England's next possession, Brady found Moss for a 51-yard touchdown and a 28-7 Patriots lead. A Jets score on their ensuing possession cut the lead to 28-14 entering the fourth quarter, but 10 unanswered points for the Patriots in the final period – a 22-yard Stephen Gostkowski field goal and a 1-yard scoring run by Heath Evans – put it away as the Patriots headed home with a 38-14 win.

### LONGEST KICKOFF RETURN IN NFL HISTORY

Ellis Hobbs returned the opening kickoff of the second half 108 yards for a touchdown, recording the longest kickoff return in NFL history and tying for the longest play in NFL history. The kickoff return for a touchdown was the second of Hobbs' career, with his other coming on Dec. 17, 2006 on a 93-yard return against the Houston Texans. Hobbs' 108-yard kickoff return surpasses the previous NFL record of 106 yards, achieved three times, last by Roy Green of the St. Louis Cardinals in 1979. Hobbs' play ties two 108-yard missed field goal returns for touchdowns as the longest play in NFL history. Nathan Vasher and Devin Hester of the Chicago Bears returned field goals 108 yards for touchdowns in 2005 and 2006, respectively.

### SEASON STARTS WITH A TOUCHDOWN DRIVE

The Patriots scored a touchdown on their first offensive possession of the season for the first time since 1997. The last time New England reached the end zone on its season-opening possession was on Aug. 31, 1997 against San Diego at Foxboro Stadium. In that game, the Patriots received the opening kickoff and marched 73 yards, ending in a 4-yard touchdown pass from Drew Bledsoe to Ben Coates. The last time the Patriots opened the season with a touchdown drive on the road was in 1989, when New England opened with a 93-yard touchdown drive against the Jets at Giants Stadium, ending in a 20-yard touchdown pass from Tony Eason to Irving Fryar.

## MOSS DEBUTS

Randy Moss scored his first touchdown in a Patriots uniform on a 51-yard reception from Tom Brady in the third quarter, giving the Patriots a 28-7 lead. The touchdown catch was the 102nd of Moss' career and was his 20th career touchdown reception of 50 yards or longer. Moss' 183 receiving yards in the game marked the third highest total of his career and the third highest single-game total in Patriots history.

## 150 FOR BRADY

Tom Brady's 51-yard touchdown pass to Randy Moss in the third quarter was the 150th touchdown toss of his regular season career. He joins Steve Grogan (182) and Drew Bledsoe (166) as the only quarterbacks in Patriots history to total 150 touchdowns.

## STARTING STRONG

The Patriots' first offensive possession of the season was a 91-yard, 12-play touchdown drive that ended in an 11-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Wes Welker, giving the Patriots a 7-0 lead. New England gained seven first downs on the drive and did not face a third down until the final play of the drive, on which Brady found Welker for the score.

## BRADY-TO-WELKER

Wes Welker scored his first touchdown in a Patriots uniform on an 11-yard scoring grab from Tom Brady in the first quarter. The scoring catch was Welker's 100th career reception and the second touchdown catch of his career. He also reached the end zone on a kick return in 2004 with the Miami Dolphins. Welker was acquired by the Patriots from the Dolphins on March 5, 2007 in exchange for a second-round pick and a seventh-round selection in the 2007 draft.

## PATRIOTS DEBUTS

Eleven players made their Patriots debuts against the Jets: TE Kyle Brady, P Chris Hanson, DB Brandon Meriweather, S Mel Mitchell, RB Sammy Morris, WR Randy Moss, WR Donte Stallworth, LB Adalius Thomas, DL Antonio Thomas, WR Kelley Washington and WR Wes Welker.

## VRABEL WITH MULTIPLE SACKS

Linebacker Mike Vrabel totaled 2.5 sacks, marking the second highest single-game sack total of his career and his highest since totaling a career-high 3.0 sacks against Cleveland on Oct. 26, 2003.

## BIG BENJAMIN

Benjamin Watson gave the Patriots a 14-7 lead with a 5-yard touchdown reception from Tom Brady with 1:07 remaining in the first half. The scoring grab was the eighth of Watson's career. Last season, Watson finished second on the team with 49 receptions, the highest reception total by a Patriots tight end since Ben Coates caught 67 passes in 1998.

## RECORD UPDATE

- Tom Brady improved to 7-0 as a starter on the road against the Jets.
- Brady improved to 22-1 as a starter on artificial turf in the regular season.
- Brady improved to 18-2 in the regular season when throwing for three or more touchdowns.

## MILESTONE FOR BELICHICK

With the Patriots' win, Bill Belichick recorded his 125th career regular season victory as a head coach, becoming one of just four active NFL head coaches with 125 or more career wins. He joins Joe Gibbs (163), Mike Holmgren (160) and Mike Shanahan (140).

**September 16, 1960:** Defensive back Chuck Shonta returns a fumble for a touchdown on the final play of the game to give the Patriots the first victory in franchise history with a 28-24 win over the New York Titans at the Polo Grounds in New York.

**September 16, 1990:** The Patriots beat Indianapolis 16-14 for their only victory of the 1990 season.

**September 15, 1996:** The Patriots travel to Arizona and defeat the Cardinals 31-0. Running back Curtis Martin scores three touchdowns and Drew Bledsoe throws for three scores as the Patriots earn their first win in a season that would see them march to Super Bowl XXXI.

# A CHAMPIONSHIP ERA

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In 13 seasons of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.311 pct.) and recording the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won seven division titles, four conference crowns and three Super Bowl championships.

## SELLOUT STREAK

In the early 1990s, the Patriots franchise appeared destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the team's season ticket base consisted of just 17,635 fans, barely enough to support the club. Fifteen years later, the season-ticket base stands at a capped total of 61,759 and more than 50,000 fans are on a waiting list. The Patriots have sold out 139 consecutive home games (dating back to the 1994 regular-season opener) including regular-season, preseason and playoff games. Patriots fans in New England have never been faced with a TV blackout under Kraft's ownership.

## SUCCESS STORY

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have been one of the NFL's elite franchises. Over the first 13-plus years of Kraft's ownership, the Patriots own the highest win total among all NFL teams in addition to the highest winning percentage – a remarkable record considering the fact that the Patriots were a combined 19-61 (.311) in the five years immediately preceding the purchase.

Bill Belichick is in his 33rd season as an NFL coach and is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl titles in a four-year span. In the 2006 season, Belichick led the Patriots to the AFC Championship Game for the fourth time in six seasons. He has directed four consecutive AFC East titles and has produced five division championships in the last six seasons. Belichick's Patriots teams own the all-time NFL records for consecutive total victories (21 from 2003-04), consecutive regular-season victories (18 from 2003-04) and consecutive playoff victories (10 from 2001-05). Belichick owns the second best postseason record in NFL history (13-3) and is the winningest NFL head coach since 2001 (82-28). From 2003-04, he directed the Patriots to back-to-back Super Bowl titles while posting consecutive 17-win campaigns. Belichick has spent more seasons in the league than any other current NFL head coach, and in that time has been a part of five Super Bowl championship teams. His overall record of 88-39 with the Patriots gives him the most victories and the best winning percentage of any head coach in franchise history.

## SUPER SUCCESS

Bill Belichick is one of just four head coaches to win three championships since the Super Bowl Era began following the 1966 season. Coach Belichick joins three members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame in the exclusive club. Belichick is the only coach to win three Super Bowls in the post-1993 salary cap era.

## NFL'S BEST DEFENSIVE MIND

In a recent *Sports Illustrated* poll of 361 NFL players, Bill Belichick was selected as the best defensive mind in the NFL, earning 35 percent of the players' vote. Indianapolis' Tony Dungy ranked second with 15 percent of the vote, while Chicago's Lovie Smith (9 percent) and Cincinnati's Marvin Lewis (8 percent) also garnered votes in the poll.

## RANKED AMONG COACHING GREATS

In a recent Sportsnation Poll on ESPN.com, Bill Belichick was placed among the top five greatest coaches of all time (in any sport) by 9.4 percent of the poll's 117,000 voters. Voters were asked to select five coaches from a list of 20, and Coach Belichick finished 14th. UCLA's John Wooden (10 NCAA basketball titles) topped the poll with 44.4 percent of voters placing him in the top five. The other football coaches in the poll were Vince Lombardi (11.8 percent), Knute Rockne (11.4), Bear Bryant (10.5), Don Shula (10.3), Bill Walsh (10.0) and Joe Paterno (9.9). The only other Boston-area coach in the poll was the late Red Auerbach, who won nine NBA championships with the Celtics and finished with a 9.6 percent total in the poll.

## ELITE COMPANY

Bill Belichick is one of nine NFL head coaches to win three or more championships since the league began postseason play in 1933. With the Patriots' victory in Super Bowl XXXIX, Belichick joined an exclusive club in which each of the eight other members has been enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

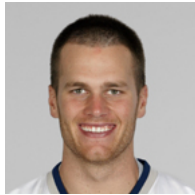
