BOSTON PATRIOTS (3-1) at DENVER BRONCOS (4-0)

Sunday, Oct. 11, 2009 ★ Invesco Field at Mile High (76,125) ★ 4:15 p.m. EDT

The Boston Patriots travel to Denver to face the Broncos at Invesco Field at Mile High this week. Excluding the first week of the season, Sunday's game will be the fourth straight game that the Patriots have faced an undefeated team after playing the 1-0 New York Jets, 2-0 Falcons and 3-0 Ravens in each of the last three weeks. The Patriots are the second team since the NFL merger to play four straight games against an undefeated team (excluding the first game of the season). The only other team to face four consecutive undefeated teams was the 1986 Philadelphia Eagles.

This week's matchup will be the 43rd time the two teams have squared off. The Patriots have played more games against the Broncos than any other team that has never been in Boston's division.

The history between the teams dates back to the first days of the American Football League in 1960. The Patriots played the Broncos in the inaugural game of each franchise, a 13-10 Denver win on Sept. 9, 1960 at B.U. Field. The teams squared off twice a year in the decade prior to the AFL-NFL merger, with the Patriots taking a 10-7 advantage out of those games.

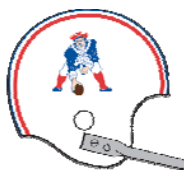
BROADCAST INFORMATION

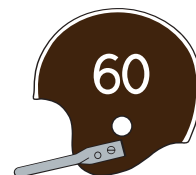

This season marks the 50th anniversary of the American Football League (AFL), of which the Patriots and Broncos were original members. The Boston Patriots hosted the AFL's first regular season game on September 9, 1960 at Boston University Field against the Denver



Broncos. Both teams will wear their throwback uniforms this Sunday. AFL LEGACY GAMES

This season marks the 50th anniversary for the American Football League (AFL), of which the Patriots were an original member. The Boston Patriots, who hosted the AFL's first regular season game on Sept. 9, 1960 at Boston University Field, were featured in the NFL's first "AFL Legacy Game" on the opening weekend of the 2009 season on Sept. 14, 2009, when the Patriots hosted the Buffalo Bills at Gillette Stadium on Monday Night Football. It was the first of four "AFL Legacy Games" in which the Patriots will appear this season (at Den, vs. Ten and at Mia). The Patriots will wear red and white "throwback" uniforms in those games, replicating the uniforms worn by the 1963 team



that claimed the franchise's first division title and competed in the franchise's first league championship game. Patriots coaches will also wear apparel featuring the Pat Patriot logo.

GAMEDAY PROGRAM DESIGN

The original "Pat Patriot" was born in 1960 when newspaper cartoonist Phil Bissell was assigned to sketch a reaction upon the announcement that Boston's American Football League team would be called the Patriots. From his original "Pat" cartoon, Bissell became forever linked with the franchise that wore a copy based off of his original figure on its helmets from 1961 to 1992. Bissell, a resident of Rockport, Mass., also contributed stylized "Pat Patriot" cartoons to the covers of over 50 Patriots game programs throughout the team's AFL seasons from 1960-69. In recognition of the Patriots 50th anniversary, Bissell has been commissioned to create the covers of this season's *Patriots GameDay* magazines in the same style of those early covers.

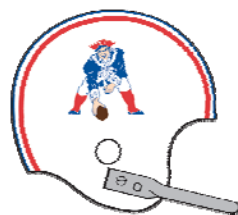
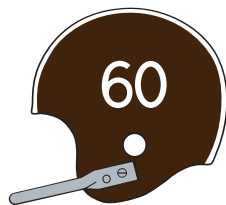

SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots and Broncos will meet for the 43rd time in series history and for the 16th time in the last 18 years. The Broncos have won five of the last seven regular-season and playoff contests, but had a three-game winning streak snapped last season on Monday Night Football when the Patriots beat Denver 41-7 on October 20.



The Broncos own a 26-16 advantage in the series, including a 2-0 mark in the playoffs. New England lost a Divisional playoff game at Denver during the 1986 and 2005 playoffs. Of the 42 previous games in the series, 25 have been played in Denver. The Patriots have played more games against the Broncos than any other team that has never been in New England's division. The Patriots are 1-3 all time at Invesco Field.

The Patriots played the Broncos in the inaugural game of each franchise, a 13-10 Denver win on Sept. 9, 1960 at B.U. Field. QUICK HITS

- The Broncos are the only team the Patriots have lost to twice in the playoffs (1986 and 2005). New England's 11 other playoff losses have been to 11 different clubs.
- The Patriots rushed for 257 yards and a 6.8-yard average in last year's 41-7 win.
- RB Sammy Morris set a personal-best with 138 yards rushing on 16 carries for an average of 8.6 yards last year against Denver.
- RB Laurence Maroney had a career-high with five receptions vs. Denver (9/24/06).
- In Belichick's only two wins at Denver (10/1/00 and 11/3/03) he took intentional safeties in the second half to help secure the win.

The New England Patriots improved to 4-2 on the season with a 41-7 win over Denver at Gillette Stadium. The Patriots tied their largest Monday Night Football victory and improved to 15-1 since 2003 following a loss. New England's defense forced five turnovers and the Patriots offense converted those takeaways into a total of 20 points. The New England rushing attack totaled 257 yards – its highest total in 15 years – and Matt Cassel set a then career high with three touchdown passes, two to Randy Moss.

New England came out swinging in the first quarter, forcing a pair of Denver fumbles and converting each one into a field goal to take a 6-0 lead heading into the second quarter. The Patriots found their way into the end zone on their first full possession in the second stanza, marching 56 yards on six plays to take a 13-0 lead on a 4-yard scoring run by Sammy Morris. The New England defense halted Denver's next possession with a Brandon Meriweather interception and the Patriots offense responded with its longest drive of the night, traveling 84 yards on nine plays to give New England a 20-0 lead on a 13-yard scoring hookup from Matt Cassel to Randy Moss. The Patriots defense snuffed out a late Denver scoring bid with a Mike Wright strip-sack to preserve the 20-0 halftime margin.

New England set up its first scoring drive of the second half with a 44-yard punt return by Wes Welker following Denver's first possession of the third quarter. That play set up a 28-yard scoring drive that ended in a 27-yard catch-and-run scoring play from Cassel to Moss and a 27-0 Patriots lead. Denver's next possession was snuffed out by a James Sanders interception, setting up an eight-play, 80-yard scoring drive that ended with a Cassel's third scoring toss of the night, a 6-yard pass to Wes Welker that made the score 34-0 heading into the final quarter. Four plays into the final stanza, Denver scored its lone points on a 10-yard touchdown pass from Jay Cutler to Daniel Graham. But two possessions later, the Patriots extended the margin to 41-7 on a 1-yard touchdown run by rookie BenJarvus Green-Ellis that ended a 7-play, 52-yard drive and closed out the scoring with 3:09 left in the game.

Oct. 10, 1961 – Mike Holovak replaces Lou Saban as Patriots head coach.

The New England Patriots improved to 3-1 with a 27-21 victory over the Baltimore Ravens. The New England defense held the Ravens on two fourth-down attempts in the fourth quarter to secure the win. Trailing 27-21 with just over five minutes to play, Baltimore attempted a fourth-down play on a fourth-and-one situation from its own 45-yard line. LB Gary Guyton and S Brandon McGowan stopped RB Willie McGahee on a run up the middle for no gain. After forcing the Patriots to punt, Baltimore got the ball back with 3:32 to play and drove to the 14-yard line. QB Joe Flacco's fourth-down pass fell incomplete with 32 seconds to play, allowing the Patriots to run out the clock to remain unbeaten against the Ravens.

New England struck quickly when LB Eric Alexander forced a fumble on the game's opening kickoff which McGowan recovered at the Baltimore 12-yard line. But the Patriots could not get a first down and were forced to settle for a field goal and a 3-0 lead. The Ravens responded with a 15-play, 81-yard drive that ended in a 20-yard touchdown pass to WR Derrick Mason for a 7-3 lead. The Patriots scored 14 points in the second quarter to take a 17-7 halftime lead. QB Tom Brady capped a 76-yard drive with a one-yard touchdown run to make it 10-7, and RB Sammy Morris scored on a 12-yard run with under five minutes to play in the first half. Baltimore had an opportunity to cut the deficit to three on the ensuing drive when they marched to the New England 17-yard line with 1:15 to go, but CB Leigh Bodden picked off a Flacco pass to preserve the 17-7 lead.

Midway through the third quarter, Baltimore made it 17-14 when LB Terrell Suggs forced a fumble on a sack of Brady that was recovered by DE Dwan Edwards in the end zone with 6:19 left in the third quarter. Brady was unshaken and on the next series directed a scoring drive that ended in a 14-yard touchdown pass to WR Randy Moss for a 24-14 New England lead. Baltimore answered with an 80-yard drive that ended in a 13-yard scoring pass from Flacco to McGahee early in the fourth quarter to cut the New England lead to 24-21. New England went on a 15-play, 59-yard drive that took 7:50 off the clock on the next series before adding a field goal for a 27-21 lead.

The Patriots held the Ravens to 21 total points (and just 14 points on offense) after the Ravens came into the game ranked second in the NFL averaging 34.3 points per game. In its first three games, Baltimore had totaled 38, 31 and 34 points. Brady's 1-yard touchdown run in the second quarter and Morris' 12-yard touchdown run in the second quarter are the first two rushing touchdowns given up by Baltimore in 2009.

MOSS MOVES PAST FAULK ON ALL-TIME TD LIST

WR Randy Moss caught a 14-yard touchdown pass from QB Tom Brady in the third quarter for his first touchdown reception of the 2009 season. Moss moved out of a tie with Marshall Faulk into sole possession of sixth place on the NFL's all-time touchdowns list with a total of 137 touchdowns (136 receiving touchdowns and one punt returned for a touchdown). Moss is third on the all-time list for receiving touchdowns with 136, behind Terrell Owens (140) and Jerry Rice (197).

TWO-RUSHING TDS AGAINST BALTIMORE

QB Tom Brady's 1-yard touchdown run in the second quarter and RB Sammy Morris' 12-yard touchdown run in the second quarter are the first two rushing touchdowns given up by Baltimore in 2009. Baltimore allowed just four rushing touchdowns in 2008.

BODDEN RECORDS FIRST PATRIOTS INT. OF 2009

Leigh Bodden intercepted a Joe Flacco pass at the New England 9-yard line with 1:11 left to play in the first half to preserve a 17-7 halftime lead. Bodden's interception was the 14th of his career, his first as a member of the Patriots, and the first interception for New England in 2009.

WRIGHT HAS FIRST 2-SACK GAME

Mike Wright registered his first career two-sack game, dropping Joe Flacco twice for total losses of 17 yards. His two sacks pushed his 2009 total to 3.0, a single-season career high. He had 2.5 sacks last season.

OPENING WITH A TURNOVER

Eric Alexander forced Baltimore kick returner Chris Carr to fumble on the game's opening kickoff and Brandon McGowan recovered the loose ball to give the Patriots possession at the Ravens' 12-yard line. New England converted the opportunity into a field goal and a 3-0 lead. The fumble was the fourth opponent fumble that the Patriots have recovered through four games this season, and the Patriots have scored following all four of their opponent fumble recoveries so far in 2009. The forced fumble and recovery was the second for the Patriots on kickoff coverage this season, having also forced and recovered a fumble by Buffalo's Leodis McKelvin in the fourth quarter of the season opener on Sept. 14.

BRADY TAKES IT IN

QB Tom Brady's one-yard touchdown run in the second quarter was the sixth rushing score of his career. It was his first rushing touchdown since he had two rushing touchdowns in a win over the Washington Redskins on October 28, 2007.

SERIES STREAKS

- The Patriots improved to 5-0 all-time against the Ravens since the Baltimore franchise was founded in 1996.
- The Patriots improved to 12-2 against the AFC North since the division was formed during the NFL's 2002 realignment.

FUN FACTS

- The Patriots improved to 23-4 in the month of October since the beginning of the 2003 season. The Patriots have won 14 of their last 15 October games.
- The Patriots won the turnover battle, recording two takeaways and one giveaway. Since the beginning of the 2003 season, the Patriots are 53-0 when winning the turnover battle.
- The Patriots won the opening coin toss today and have now won 18 straight games when winning the opening coin toss. The last time the Patriots won the opening coin toss and lost the game was on Dec. 10, 2006, at Miami.

GOSTKOWSKI STREAKING

Stephen Gostkowski hit both of his field goal attempts this afternoon against the Ravens and has been successful on 11 straight attempts dating back to the season opener on Sept. 14. The success streak ties the second longest streak of the 2008 Pro Bowler's career (he also had streaks of 11 straight field goals in 2006 and 2007). He hit a career-best 17 straight field goals spanning the 2007 and 2008 seasons. The Patriots record for consecutive field goals is 25, achieved by Adam Vinatieri from 1996-97.

BRADY RECORDS UPDATE

- Tom Brady has won 18 straight starts at home (including playoffs), a streak that began following a 17-14 loss to the New York Jets on Nov. 12, 2006.
- Since the beginning of the 2007 season, Tom Brady has a 12-0 regular-season record at home and has completed 289 of 434 passes (66.6 pct.) for 3,284 yards with 25 touchdowns and five interceptions for a passer rating of 103.5.

ROBERT KRAFT NEWS & NOTES

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In 15 seasons of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.311 pct.) and recording the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won eight division titles, five conference crowns and three Super Bowl championships. The Patriots have made five Super Bowl appearances since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other NFL franchise has earned more than three berths.

SELLOUT STREAK

In the early 1990s, the Patriots seemed destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the season ticket base was just 17,635, barely enough to support the club. Now, the season-ticket base stands at a capped total of 61,759 and more than 50,000 fans are on a waiting list. The Patriots have sold out 164 consecutive home games (dating back to the 1994 regular-season opener).

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have been one of the NFL's elite franchises. Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl titles in a four-year span. Belichick spent 20 years as an assistant coach in the NFL and this is his 15th season as a head coach. According to the Elias Sports Bureau he is the only man in NFL history to serve 20 or more seasons as an assistant coach and at least 15 seasons as a head coach. Over a 100-game span from 2003-08, Belichick directed the team to an 82-18 record, marking the best 100-game span for any team in NFL history. In the 2007 season, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in the NFL's 88-year history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. He has led the Patriots to the Super Bowl four times in the last eight seasons and has produced six division championships in the last eight seasons, including five straight from 2003-07. Belichick's Patriots teams own the all-time NFL records for consecutive total victories (21 from 2003-04), consecutive regular-season victories (21 from 2006-08) and consecutive playoff victories (10 from 2001-05). Belichick owns the second best postseason record in NFL history (15-4) and is the winningest NFL head coach since 2001 (114-35). From 2003-04, he directed the Patriots to back-to-back Super Bowl titles while posting consecutive 17-win campaigns. Belichick has spent more seasons in the league than any other current NFL head coach, and in that time has been a part of five Super Bowl championship teams. His overall record of 119-46 with the Patriots gives him the most victories and the best winning percentage of any head coach in franchise history.

ELITE COMPANY

Bill Belichick is one of nine NFL head coaches to win three or more championships since the league began postseason play in 1933. With the Patriots' victory in Super Bowl XXXIX, Belichick joined an exclusive club in which each of the eight other members has been enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

BELICHICK WINS 100th REGULAR-SEASON GAME WITH PATRIOTS

The Patriots' victory over Oakland on Dec. 14, 2008 was Bill Belichick's 100th regular-season victory as Patriots head coach. His 100th victory came in his 142nd regular-season game as head coach, and only three NFL coaches have won their 100th game with a team in fewer tries – Oakland's John Madden (136 games), Miami's Don Shula (137) and Cleveland's Paul Brown (138).

AMONG THE GREATS

Coach Belichick has recorded 155 career wins and is one of 17 coaches in NFL history to win 150 or more games. Belichick owns a career winning percentage of .631, placing third in NFL history among all NFL coaches with at least 150 career victories. Belichick trails only George Halas (.682) and Don Shula (.666) on that list.

MOSS IS NFL'S PREMIER TD RECEIVER

Since entering the NFL in 1998, Randy Moss has caught 136 touchdown passes, more than any other player over that span. Since joining the Patriots via trade prior to the 2007 season, Moss has caught 35 touchdowns – also the best in the league over that span. In terms of overall touchdowns (rushing, receiving and returning), Moss has totaled 137 scores since entering the league in 1998 (136 via reception and one via punt return), a tally that ranks second only to LaDainian Tomlinson (142 touchdowns) over that span. Last season, Moss's 11 touchdown receptions led the AFC and tied for third in the NFL.

WELKER LEADS NFL IN RECEPTIONS SINCE 2007

Wes Welker leads the NFL with 241 receptions from 2007. In 2007, he set a Patriots franchise record with 112 receptions, tying him for the NFL lead and setting a league record for most receptions in a player's first season with a new team. In 2008, he nearly replicated that feat, with his 111 receptions placing second in the NFL.

Welker joined the Patriots in a trade with the Miami Dolphins prior to the 2007 season, and since then is the NFL's leading receiver.

WELKER NAMED TO PRO BOWL SQUAD

Wes Welker was named to his first career Pro Bowl after the 2008 season and is the fifth Patriots wide receiver to earn Pro Bowl honors since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, joining Randy Moss (2007), Troy Brown (2001), Terry Glenn (1999) and Stanley Morgan (1979-80 and 1986-87). Welker finished second in the NFL with 111 receptions in 2008 – the second highest single-season total in team history behind his franchise-record 112 receptions in 2007. Welker became the eighth player in NFL history to record back-to-back 100-catch seasons and is the first player to achieve the feat with the Patriots.



WELKER RECORDS 12 CATCHES

Wes Welker tied his second-highest single-game reception total with 12 catches in the season-opener vs. Buffalo (9/14). His dozen receptions trail only his career-high 13 catches vs. Philadelphia on Nov. 25, 2007. The 12 catches against Buffalo marked Welker's fifth career regular-season game with 10 or more catches. Welker's other 12-catch game was last season at Seattle on Dec. 7, 2008. His 12 receptions tie the fifth-highest single-game total in team history, behind Troy Brown's team-record 16 catches on Sept. 22, 2002 and three 13-catch performances (Welker, 11/25/07; Deion Branch, 9/29/02; Terry Glenn, 10/3/99).

WELKER PILES UP YARDS

Wes Welker led the Patriots with 1,165 receiving yards in 2008 and joined Randy Moss in recording the first back-to-back 1,000-yard receiving seasons in Patriots history. Moss also had 1,000 receiving yards in 2007 and 2008. Welker's 1,165 yards in 2008 rank sixth on the Patriots' all-time single-season list. In 2007, Welker totaled 1,175 receiving yards – a performance that ranked fourth in team history. WELKER'S ROUTE TO THE NFL

Despite being named the Oklahoma football player of the year by both the *USA Today* and the *Daily Oklahoman*, Wes Welker's only scholarship offer came from Texas Tech, and only after a player that committed to Texas Tech backed out.

"I was thinking I'd get a scholarship somewhere," Welker said. "When it didn't happen when it was supposed to I was pretty hurt by it."

Welker had an impressive collegiate career, accumulating 259 receptions and eight punts returned for a touchdown. He even won a national award as the best special teams player in the country. Despite those accolades, he was passed over in the NFL draft and signed with San Diego as a free agent. He made the team, then was cut after the first game.

He signed with Miami soon after and was used just on special teams. He caught New England's eye with a 71-yard punt return on Monday Night Football in a game against the Patriots. He was acquired by the Patriots in a trade with Miami in 2007.

WELKER CATCHES SIX OR MORE PASSES IN 11 STRAIGHT GAMES TO OPEN 2008

Wes Welker caught at least six passes in each of the first 11 games in 2008. Welker is the first player in NFL history to have six or more catches in the first 11 games of a season. He caught 12 in the 2009 season-opener vs. Buffalo (9/14) and six on his return to action last Sunday against Baltimore (10/4).

Kevin Faulk is one of just 13 NFL players this decade to total at least 2,000 rushing yards and at least 2,000 receiving yards, and is one of only six players to have at least 2,000 rushing yards and at least 3,000 receiving yards. Faulk has totaled 3,005 rushing yards and 3,278 receiving yards since 2000, joining an exclusive list of elite players who have achieved the feat. Faulk is one of just seven players who reached the milestone with just one team. In the 1990s, there were 13 players who achieved the 2000/2000 milestone; 22 players did it in the 1980s; nine players achieved the feat in the 1970s.

PATRIOTS ELECT FIVE SEASON CAPTAINS

The New England Patriots announced their 2009 captains prior to the start of the regular-season. Quarterback Tom Brady and WR Randy Moss will serve as offensive captains. Nose tackle Vince Wilfork and LB Jerod Mayo will serve as defensive captains. Wide receiver Sam Aiken will serve as special teams captain. The Patriots' 2009 captains were elected by their teammates.

On offense, Brady will serve as an offensive captain for the eighth straight season, having first been elected in 2002. Moss, in his third season with the Patriots after joining the team via trade in April 2007, will serve as a Patriots captain for the second straight season.

On defense, Wilfork is a captain for the second straight season, while Mayo will serve as a captain for the first time. He joined the Patriots as a first-round pick in 2008 and earned the AP Defensive Rookie of the Year award.

Aiken will serve as the Patriots' special teams captain for the first time. A special teams standout, Aiken has accumulated 71 special teams tackles during his six NFL seasons.

Gary Guyton was not drafted into the NFL, but through a solid work ethic was able to make the 53-man roster and earn a starting job in his second year. "He's smart, well prepared," Bill Belichick said. "He understands. He's got a real good understanding of football. Not just his role but where other people have to be. That's what you really want in a defensive signal-caller, someone that understands how it all works."

"It's been a long road," Guyton said. "I have come far. I've achieved some things here. I'm happy. I'm enjoying it. But I don't look back as much, just always forward."

MATT LIGHT AND HIS FOUNDATION

The Light Foundation, a nonprofit founded in 2001 by Matt Light, held its signature fundraising event on Tuesday, September 29 at Addieville East Farm in Mapleville, RI.

The Shoot-Out, now in its fifth year, offers participants the opportunity to match their shooting skills against Light, his teammates, and a host of local and national celebrities. Proceeds from the one-of-a-kind event benefit the Light Foundation, a youth-based organization that strives to install honesty, accountability and responsibility in young people through unique outdoor learning experiences that include a character development football camp, a financial literacy program offered at area schools and academic scholarships. In the eight years since the organization was founded, it has raised over \$1.2 million to support these programs.

Light says he wanted to develop a unique high-profile charity event that would raise funds and exposure for his foundation, and his love of the outdoors naturally came into play.



DOMINATING DEFENSE

The Patriots held the Ravens to 21 points (and just 14 points on offense) after Baltimore came into the game ranked second in the NFL averaging 34.3 points per game. The Patriots defense has not allowed more than 19 points in a game so far in 2009, limiting Buffalo to 17 offensive points, the New York Jets to 19 points, Atlanta to 10 points and Baltimore to 14 offensive points.

PATRIOTS FORCE TURNOVERS

The Patriots have forced at least one turnover in 12 straight games, the third longest current streak in the NFL behind Oakland (15) and the NY Jets (13). The Patriots forced two turnovers against Baltimore, with a forced fumble on the opening kickoff and an interception prior to the end of the first half. Since 2003, the patriots are 53-0 when they win the turnover battle.

PATRIOTS OFF TO HOT START

The Patriots have started the season with at least three wins in their first four games for the fourth straight season and are the only team to begin each of the last four seasons with a record of 3-1 or better through their first four games.

PATRIOTS IN OCTOBER

The Patriots are 23-4 in October games, having swept the month in 2003, 2006 and 2007. The Patriots had an 11-game winning streak in the month of October that was snapped last season when New England dropped a 30-10 decision at San Diego (10/12/08).

PATRIOTS WIN GAME NUMBER 400

The Patriots recorded the franchise's 400th all-time victory, including postseason games, with the 26-10 win over Atlanta. The 400 victories rank third among the eight original AFL teams, behind Denver and Oakland. The eight original AFL teams, including the Patriots, began play in 1960. The Patriots recorded their milestone 400th victory in their 50th season and in their 777th overall game. Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have 176 victories, more than any other NFL team during that span.

LIKE FATHER LIKE SON, PART 2

CB Shawn Springs has always been a speedster. No doubt, the gift of fast feet was a hereditary gift of his father, Ron Springs, an 8-year NFL running back for the Dallas Cowboys and Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Ron, who tallied over 2500 rushing and 2200 receiving yards in his career, became ill in 1990 with type 2 diabetes. By 2004, Shawn was a respected NFL veteran, but he was willing to give up his career and offered to donate his kidney to his father, who needed a transplant. Ron declined, saying in a 2005 *Washington Post* article, "I think that was a tremendous gesture, and it just justifies the fact that he's a loving son. But I couldn't have let him do that, because I always prayed and wanted him to be a professional athlete, so I would not have shortened his career by no means necessary."

OPENING WITH A TURNOVER

Eric Alexander forced Baltimore kick returner Chris Carr to fumble on the game's opening kickoff and Brandon McGowan recovered the loose ball to give the Patriots possession at the Ravens' 12-yard line. New England converted the opportunity into a field goal and a 3-0 lead. The fumble was the fourth opponent fumble that the Patriots have recovered through four games this season, and the Patriots have scored following all four of their opponent fumble recoveries so far in 2009. The forced fumble and recovery was the second for the Patriots on kickoff coverage this season, having also forced and recovered a fumble by Buffalo's Leodis McKelvin in the fourth quarter of the season opener on Sept. 14.

MOSS ON PACE FOR 1,000 YARDS

Randy Moss has recorded a 1,000-yard receiving nine times in his 11-year career. Moss can join Jerry Rice (14) as the only players in NFL history with 10 seasons with 1,000 receiving yards with a 1,000 yard season in 2009. Moss currently has 331 receiving yards, which puts him on pace for 1,324 receiving yards.

BRADY ON PACE FOR 4,516 PASSING YARDS

Tom Brady currently has 1,129 passing yards through four games, putting him on pace for 4,516 passing yards. That mark would tie Drew Bledsoe for seven seasons of 3,000 or more yards and give Brady his third season with over 4,000 passing yards. Bledsoe and Brady are tied with two 4,000 yard seasons.

PATRIOTS HEAD COACH BILL BELICHICK ON...

WR Sam Aiken

On taking on leadership roles as special teams captain...

"He's really on top of things. We ask him to do a lot of things for us. He works hard at them and he does a good job. I think he's done an excellent job at providing leadership and direction — the right attitude for the players that are on the special teams unit. He represents them and I think he represents them very well."

DL Myron Pryor

On doing things right...

"He's got good strength. He's a pretty smart football player. He certainly understands leverage and in-line play. I think his fundamentals, his background and defensive football are very good."

WR Randy Moss

On his toughness, playing with back pains Week 3 vs. ATL...

"I think that's one of the stronger performances I've seen. He was hurting. He had a will and he played through it...he showed me a lot of toughness in that game. He's been tough, but I thought that was really ... It was a pretty special performance, going over the middle, blocking, catching short passes, taking a lot of hits, making first downs, and he was making a lot of them. I thought it was a real good performance."

On his communication skills with his teammates...

"He and Tom [Brady] are always talking and the other receivers. They talk a lot about different techniques and how a certain defender plays and how to play against him — those types of things—the way he interacts with his teammates and supports [them] — not just the receivers but also the defenders. They have a good working relationship with each other about, 'This is what I'm trying to do to you and this is how I'm trying to defeat it,' and help each other get better and ultimately that helps them get better. If our receiver tells our defensive back, 'Hey, this is what you're doing that's giving me trouble or what you're doing is making it easy for me,' and the player can improve on the other side of the ball, ultimately, it improves him. It's a healthy relationship and it's one that we try to encourage. I think we get a lot out of them. Players are good about that. They are good about helping the younger players, but they're also good about working with each other on different strengths and weaknesses and techniques that can be beneficial to our team."

RB Fred Taylor

On what Fred does well...

"Fred's run hard for us all year — in preseason, in all the camps, training camp, and all that. He runs hard and he runs smart. He knows where the holes are, he sets up blockers well and he can carry the load."

LB Adalius Thomas

On his pass rush...

"He provides a lot of versatility. I think that's one of his strengths as a linebacker and that's what we ask him to do. He rushes. He covers. He plays inside. He plays outside. He's versatile, flexible enough to move around and do those things well, so that helps the overall scheme of the defense. It also helps other players — put them at some positions or be flexible with them. It gives the offense a couple different things to worry about."

RB Sammy Morris

On his versatility...

"I think Sammy has proved to us over the past couple years that he's a dependable player in every phase of the game, whether it be offense, in the kicking game, running game, passing game. He's good with the ball in his hands as a runner, as a receiver and [in] blitz pickup, as a blocker, as a short-yardage runner, as a third-down back and on special teams, both as a coverage player and as a blocker in the return game."

CB Shawn Springs

On playing smart football...

"Mentally, he's into everything. He makes very, very few mistakes. He's really on top of his game and situations and all of those kinds of things..."

On what they wanted from him upon signing him...

"I think we knew that was the player that we were getting when we got him and he's been able to do that for us. And that isn't any big surprise, but he's done a good job of it. He works hard. He's smart. He has a good skill set. To be able to play all those positions, that's very unusual, and mentally and from a technique and understanding standpoint, he's done a good job there."

TE Benjamin Watson

On pinpointing his strengths...

"He's versatile athletically and he's versatile mentally, so he can do a lot of things. He can play on the line. He can play off the line. He can play detached. He can play in close. He has a good skill set."

LB Gary Guyton

On his humility...

"Yeah, I have a lot of respect for Gary. He's a very humble player, works hard and has earned everything he's got. You really have a lot of respect for a player like that."
