BOSTON PATRIOTS (3-2) vs. OILERS (0-5)

Sunday, Oct. 18, 2009 ★ Gillette Stadium (68,756) ★ 4:15 p.m. EDT

The Boston Patriots return to Foxborough to face the Oilers in the third of four AFL Legacy games. Both teams will wear their throwback uniforms.

The Patriots and Oilers will play for the 39th time since the two charter members of the American Football League began play in 1960. The Patriots and Oilers played twice each year from 1960-1969 in the AFL, and have played 18 times since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970. In those 18 post-merger games, the Patriots have an 11-7 record, including a 1-1 mark in playoff games.

The Patriots will attempt to rebound with a win on Sunday after losing 20-17 last Sunday in overtime at Denver. The Oilers, who won their division with a 13-3 record last season, are looking to get in the win column after falling to an 0-5 record following a 31-9 loss to Indianapolis on Sunday Night Football last week.

AFL LEGACY GAMES

season marks the anniversary for the American Football League (AFL), of which the Patriots were an original member. The Boston Patriots, who hosted the AFL's first regular season game on Sept. 9, 1960 at Boston University Field, were featured in the NFL's first "AFL Legacy Game" on the opening weekend of the 2009 season on Sept. 14, 2009, when the Patriots hosted the



Buffalo Bills at Gillette Stadium on Monday Night Football. It was the first of four "AFL Legacy Games" in which the Patriots will appear this season (at Den, vs. Ten and at Mia). The Patriots will wear red and white "throwback" uniforms in those games, replicating the uniforms worn by the 1963 team

that claimed the franchise's first division title and competed in the franchise's first league championship game. Patriots coaches will also wear apparel featuring the Pat Patriot logo.

GAMEDAY PROGRAM DESIGN

The original "Pat Patriot" was born in 1960 when newspaper cartoonist Phil Bissell was assigned to sketch a reaction upon the announcement that Boston's American Football League team would be called the Patriots. From his original "Pat" cartoon,

Bissell became forever linked with the franchise that wore a copy based off of his original figure on its helmets from 1961 to 1992. Bissell, a resident of Rockport, Mass., also contributed stylized "Pat Patriot" cartoons to the covers of over 50 Patriots game programs



throughout the team's AFL seasons from 1960-69. In recognition of the Patriots 50th anniversary, Bissell has been commissioned to create the covers of this season's Patriots GameDay magazines in the same style of those early covers.

50TH ANNIVERSARY AFL EXHIBIT

The Hall at Patriot Place presented by Raytheon is a monument to 50 years of Patriots history. In recognition of both the Patriots' 50th anniversary and the 50th anniversary of the AFL, The Hall will feature a special exhibit throughout the 2009 season of game-worn jerseys, helmets and other memorabilia from the AFL era. SERIES HISTORY

The New England Patriots and Tennessee Titans (formerly the Houston Oilers) will play for the 39th time since the two charter members of the American Football League began play in 1960. The Patriots and Oilers played twice each year from 1960-1969 in the AFL, and have played 18 times since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970. In those 18 post-



merger games, the Patriots have a 11-7 record, including a 1-1 mark in playoff games. New England leads the overall series, 21-16-1 and owns an 9-3 record against the Titans franchise since 1981. The last game between the clubs came during the 2006



season when New England beat Tennessee, 40-23, in Nashville.

The Patriots and the Tennessee franchise met two times in the postseason. In 1978, The Houston Oilers beat New England 31-14 in an AFC Divisional matchup at Foxborough. The

Patriots beat the Titans, 17-14, in a 2003 post-season game to advance to the AFC Championship game.

QUICK HITS

GINO CAPPELLETTI PLEASED WITH AFL LEGACY

Patriots Hall of Famer Gino Cappelletti, who scored the first points in AFL history against the Denver Broncos on Sept. 9, 1960, reflected on the Patriots first games against the Houston Oilers in 1960.

"The rivalry with Houston matched that with Buffalo," said Cappelletti. "They were in the eastern division with us. The AFL had to do that because of where the teams were located. Dallas was more west. It did not benefit the Patriots because Houston was the best team. They won the championship in 1960 and played for it again in 1961. They came out of the shoot strong. George Blanda, after 10 years in the NFL, joined Houston because he knew their coach. Blanda was able to help them recruit some of the best players such as Billy Cannon and Charlie Hennigan, a lot of NFL auvs.

"When I made the transition into becoming a receiver it took place between the time we first played the Oilers and the final game of the year when we played the Oilers again down in Houston. I started the game at receiver in the final game and I always like to brag that I came out of the game with the highest average per catch of the year with a 28-yard average. I had one catch for 28 yards. It was meaningful for me and established my potential for the next coming year. [Patriots head coach] Lou Saban told me that when I come back you will have to make it as a receiver. He was very authoritative about it."

The Houston Oilers dealt the Patriots their only home playoff loss in team history, coming away with a 31-14 win in an AFC Divisional game at Schaefer Stadium (12/31/78).

THIS WEEK IN PATRIOTS HISTORY

OCTOBER 13 - OCTOBER 20

Oct. 13, 1985— Patriots cornerback Raymond Clayborn established a new team record for consecutive starts when he started his 111th straight game. Clayborn celebrated the recordsetting day by scoring his first professional touchdown on a 27-yard interception return in a 14-3 victory over Buffalo.

Oct. 20, 1996— The Patriots beat Indianapolis, 27-9, at the RCA Dome. It started a string of eight wins in their final 10 games as the Patriots advanced to Super Bowl XXXI.

Oct. 14, 2001— The Patriots rallied from a 26-16 deficit with less than five minutes to go in the game to post a 29-26 overtime win against San Diego at Foxboro Stadium. The win was the first in a series of 10 wins in 12 games en route to an 11-5 record in the Patriots' first championship season.

Oct. 19, 2003— The Patriots defeated the Miami Dolphins in overtime on the road by a 19-13 score. An 82-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Troy Brown provided the dramatic finish. Oct. 14, 2007— The 5-0 Patriots defeated the 5-0 Dallas Cowboys 48-27 at Texas Stadium. The game was just the fifth in NFL history between two unbeaten teams with five or more wins. The Patriots had their highest point total in 23 years.

CONNECTIONS

- Patriots senior football advisor Floyd Reese served 13 seasons as the executive vice president/general manager of the Houston Oilers/Tennessee Titans franchise from 1994-2006. He also served as the assistant general manager of the Oilers for four seasons from 1990-93 and assistant coach from 1986-89.
- Tennessee Titans head coach Jeff Fisher was a defensive back for the Chicago Bears from 1981-85. Fisher spent the 1985 season on injured reserve, helping coach the defense in an unofficial role while the Bears ultimately defeated the New England Patriots in Super Bowl XX.
- Titans G/C Eugene Amano and Patriots OL Dan Connolly were teammates at Southeast Missouri State from 2002-03.
- Patriots K Stephen Gostkowski walked onto the Memphis football team in 2002 while current Titans DT Tony Brown was a senior. Brown and new Patriots pickup, DL Terdell Sands are from Chattanooga, Tenn.
- Patriots WR Sam Aiken and Titans TE Alge Crumpler and LB David Thornton were teammates at the University of North Carolina from 1999-2000. All three are also native North Carolinians.
- Patriots TE Benjamin Watson and Titans S Chris Hope both grew up in Rock Hill, S.C.
- Patriots veteran RB Fred Taylor and Titans DE Jevon Kearse were teammates at the University of Florida from 1997-98. Kearse was also teammates with Patriots LB Derrick Burgess in Philadelphia for the 2004 season.
- Patriots LB Rob Ninkovich and Titans LB Stanford Keglar and T Mike Otto were teammates at Purdue from 2004-05.
- Patriots TE Chris Baker and Titans DT Kevin Vickerson played together at Michigan State in 2001.
- Patriots CB Jonathan Wilhite and Titans rookie DT Sen'Derrick Marks were teammates at Auburn from 2006-07

- Patriots rookie LS Jake Ingram and Titans rookie CB Ryan Mouton were teammates at Hawaii from 2007-08.
- Patriots backup QB Brian Hoyer and Titans rookie RB Javon Ringer played at Michigan State together from 2005-08.
- Titans DE Dave Ball and Patriots TE Chris Baker were teammates on the New York Jets in 2006. Baker was also teammates with Titans P Reggie Hodges on the Jets in 2008.
- Titans QB Kerry Collins, Patriots WR Randy Moss, DL Terdell Sands and LB Derrick Burgess all played for the Oakland Raiders from 2004-05
- Patriots S Brandon McGowan and Titans WR Justin Gage were teammates on the Chicago Bears from 2005-06.
- Titans DT Jovan Haye, WR Mark Jones and Patriots WR Joey Galloway played for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 2006-07. Galloway was also teammates with Titans C Kevin Mawae in Seattle from 1995-97.
- Titans WR Nate Washington, S Chris Hope and Patriots G Kendall Simmons won the Super Bowl while teammates on the Pittsburgh Steelers in 2005
- Titans S Kevin Kaesviharn and Patriots LB Rob Ninkovich were teammates on the New Orleans Saints for part of 2008.

PASSING PERFORMANCES

Tom Brady will face off against the Titans for the fifth time in his career. He has recorded a 3-1 record as a starter against Tennessee and has won each of his last three starts against the Titans, leading the Patriots to a victory from a fourth-quarter tie in the 2003 divisional playoffs and leading his team to a win from a fourth-quarter deficit in the 2003 regular seaon.

The Patriots ended the 2006 regular season on a solid note with a 40-23 victory over the Tennessee Titans. Wide receiver Reche Caldwell had a career-high 134 yards and a touchdown on four catches, while Corey Dillon ran for two touchdowns and Laurence Maroney added another. The Patriots defense sacked Tennessee's Vince Young five times and Asante Samuel picked off a pair of passes to lead the defensive effort. Tennessee came back from a 19-3 deficit to close the margin to 26-23 entering the fourth quarter. But New England came up with a pair of touchdowns in the final stanza to seal the game and finish the season 12-4.

The New England Patriots failed to hold onto a 17-7 halftime lead in a 20-17 overtime loss to the Denver Broncos at Invesco Field at Mile High.

The Denver defense held New England to zero points and only 110 yards in the second half. After going 14-of-19 for 152 yards passing in the first half, QB Tom Brady was limited to five completions for 63 yards in the second half.

Denver QB Kyle Orton threw for 330 yards, including two touchdown passes to WR Brandon Marshall, as the Broncos chalked up 27 first downs and 424 yards of total offense.

New England entered the final quarter with a 17-10 lead, but Denver marched 98 yards in 12 plays before Orton completed an 11-yard touchdown pass to Marshall to tie the game at 17-17 with 5:21 remaining in regulation. Orton was six-of-10 for 76 yards on that drive. With under two minutes remaining in regulation, New England moved to the Denver 49-yard line before DE Vonnie Holliday forced a fumble on a sack of Brady to end a New England scoring threat.

Denver took the overtime kickoff and moved 58 yards in 11 plays to set up a 41-yard game-winning field goal by Matt Prater for a 20-17 victory.

New England built a 10-0 first quarter lead after scoring on their first two possessions. The Patriots became the first team to throw a touchdown pass against Denver's second ranked defense when Brady connected with WR Wes Welker on an eight-yard scoring pass to cap a drive early in the first quarter. Denver's ensuing drive ended when LB Jerod Mayo forced a fumble on a run by RB Knowshon Moreno that was recovered by S Brandon McGowan at the Denver 43-yard line. That play led to a 53-yard field goal by K Stephen Gostowski for a 10-0 lead.

After Denver closed the gap to 10-7 midway through the second quarter with the first of two Orton to Marshall touchdown passes, Brady and the Patriots got the ball back with 4:31 left in the half and engineered a 10-play, 74-yard drive that culminated with a seven-yard touchdown from Brady to TE Benjamin Watson for a 17-7 lead. The halftime advantage was preserved after WR Randy Moss lined up on defense as the deep safety and intercepted a pass from Orton as time expired.

Denver added a field goal in the third quarter to close to 17-10 and that was the score as the team's headed into the final quarter following a 40-yard field goal attempt by Gostkowski that sailed wide to the left.

MOSS RECORDS FIRST CAREER INTERCEPTION

Randy Moss lined up as a deep safety on defense during Denver's final play of the first half and intercepted a QB Kyle Orton pass to secure New England's 17-7 first half lead. It is his first career interception and second pass defensed of his career. He recorded his first pass defensed in 2007 at Buffalo (11/18/07). It is the first interception that Denver has thrown in 2009.

MAYO RETURNS

Jerod Mayo, the 2008 AP Defensive Rookie of the Year, returned to action after missing three games with an injury. Midway through the first quarter, Mayo forced a fumble on a tackle of Denver RB Knowshon Moreno that was recovered by S Brandon McGowan at the Denver 45-yard line to help set up a field goal.

GOSTOWKI SETS CAREER-HIGH WITH 53-YD FG

K Stepen Gostkowski's 53-yard field goal in the first quarter is a career-high, besting a 52-yard field goal vs. Chicago on November 26, 2006.

GOSTKOWSKI TAKES OVER FOURTH ON PAT LIST

Gostkowski's extra point in the first quarter moved him out of a tie with Tony Franklin (163) and into sole possession of fourth place on New England's All-Time PAT list. He entered the Denver game tied for fourth place with Tony Franklin on the Patriots All-Time PAT list with 163.

WELKER KEEPS IT UP

Wes Welker finished with eight receptions for 86 yards. He has averaged 7.1 receptions per game as a member of the Patriots. Welker has had six or more receptions in 17 of his last 19 regular-season games.

PATRIOTS OFFENSE SCORES 1ST TD PASS AGAINST DENVER IN 2009

The Patriots eight-yard scoring pass from QB Tom Brady to WR Wes Welker was the first touchdown pass against Denver in 2009. The Broncos entered the game ranked second in the NFL in total defense and allowed just two rushing touchdowns and no passing touchdowns in the first four games. Brady added a seven-yard touchdown to TE Benjamin Watson in the second quarter.

NINKOVICH RECORDS FIRST CAREER SACK

Rob Ninkovich registered his first NFL sack on a three-yard sack of QB Kyle Orton in the second quarter. Ninkovich was a college teammate of Orton at Purdue and caught a two-yard touchdown pass from Orton as a tight end in a 41-16 win over Notre Dame.

PATRIOTS SCORE 17 AGAINST DENVER

New England scored 17 points against a Denver defense that was ranked second and was allowing just 6.5 points per game through the first four games of the 2009 season. New England's 17 first half points were more than Denver allowed in a single game in 2009.

PATS GET A TAKEAWAY IN 13-STRAIGHT

The New England Patriots have had at least one forced turnover in 13 straight games, the third longest current streak entering the Denver game, behind Oakland (15) and the NY Jets (12).

WATSON SCORES HIS THIRD TOUCHDOWN

TE Benjamin Watson connected with QB Tom Brady for his third touchdown of the 2009 season with a seven-yarder in the second quarter. He had two in the season-opener against Buffalo. He had two touchdowns last season.

QUICK HITS

- ➤ QB Tom Brady dropped to 1-5 against Denver in the regular season. The Broncos are the only team against which Brady has a losing record.
- ➤ New England won the turnover battle 2-1 against Denver. It was the first loss when winning the turnover battle in 53 games. Since the beginning of 2003, the Patriots are now 53-1 when winning the turnover battle.
- > The game time temperature was 30 degrees. It was the first loss under Bill Belichick (9-1) when the temperature is 34 degrees or colder.
- > The 20 points by Denver are the most scored against New England all season.

ROBERT KRAFT NEWS & NOTES

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In 15 seasons of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five



seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.311 pct.) and recording the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won eight division titles, five conference crowns and three Super Bowl championships. The Patriots have made five Super Bowl appearances since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other NFL franchise has earned more than three berths.

In the early 1990s, the Patriots seemed destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the season ticket base was just 17,635, barely enough to support the club. Now, the season-ticket base stands at a capped total of 61,759 and more than 50,000 fans are on a waiting list. The Patriots have sold out 164 consecutive home games (dating back to the 1994 regular-season opener).

SUCCESS STORY

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have been one of the NFL's elite franchises. Over the first 15plus years of Kraft's ownership, the Patriots own the NFL's highest winning percentage and have won more Super Bowl titles, more conference championships and more playoff games than any other NFL team.



Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl titles in a four-year span. Belichick spent 20 years as an assistant coach in the NFL and this is his 15th season as a head coach. According to the Elias Sports Bureau he is the only man in NFL history to serve 20 or more seasons as an assistant coach and at least 15 seasons as a head coach. Over a 100game span from 2003-08, Belichick directed the team to an 82-18 record, marking the best 100-game span for any team in NFL history. In the 2007 season, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in the NFL's 88year history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. He has led the Patriots to the Super Bowl four times in the last eight seasons and has produced six division championships in the last eight seasons, including five straight from 2003-07. Belichick's Patriots teams own the all-time NFL records for consecutive total victories (21 from 2003-04), consecutive regular-season victories (21 from 2006-08) and consecutive playoff victories (10 from 2001-05). Belichick owns the second best postseason record in NFL history (15-4) and is the winningest NFL head coach since 2001 (114-36). From 2003-04, he directed the Patriots to back-to-back Super Bowl titles while posting consecutive 17-win campaigns. Belichick has spent more seasons in the league than any other current NFL head coach, and in that time has been a part of five Super Bowl championship teams. His overall record of 119-47 with the Patriots gives him the most victories and the best winning percentage of any head coach in franchise history.

ELITE COMPANY

Bill Belichick is one of nine NFL head coaches to win three or more championships since the league began postseason play in 1933. With the Patriots' victory in Super Bowl XXXIX, Belichick joined an exclusive club in which each of the eight other members has been enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

BELICHICK WINS 100th REGULAR-SEASON GAME WITH PATRIOTS

The Patriots' victory over Oakland on Dec. 14, 2008 was Bill Belichick's 100th regular-season victory as Patriots head coach. His 100th victory came in his 142nd regular-season game as head coach, and only three NFL coaches have won their 100th game with a team in fewer tries – Oakland's John Madden (136 games), Miami's Don Shula (137) and Cleveland's Paul Brown (138)

AMONG THE GREATS

Coach Belichick has recorded 156 career wins and is one of 17 coaches in NFL history to win 150 or more games. MOSS IS NFL'S PREMIER TO RECEIVER

Since entering the NFL in 1998, Randy Moss has caught 136 touchdown passes, more than any other player over that span. Since joining the Patriots via trade prior to the 2007 season, Moss has caught 35 touchdowns – also the best in the league over that span. In terms of overall touchdowns (rushing, receiving and returning), Moss has totaled 137 scores since entering the league in 1998 (136 via reception and one via punt return), a tally that ranks second only to LaDainian Tomlinson (142 touchdowns) over that span. Wes Welker leads the NFL with 249 receptions since the start of 2007. In 2007, he set a Patriots franchise record with 112 receptions, tying him for the NFL lead and setting a league record for most receptions in a player's first season with a new team. In 2008, he nearly replicated that feat, with his 111 receptions placing second in the NFL.



Welker joined the Patriots in a trade with the Miami Dolphins prior to the 2007 season, and since then is the NFL's leading receiver.

WELKER NAMED TO PRO BOWL SQUAD

Wes Welker was named to his first career Pro Bowl after the 2008 season and is the fifth Patriots wide receiver to earn Pro Bowl honors since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, joining Randy Moss (2007), Troy Brown (2001), Terry Glenn (1999) and Stanley Morgan (1979-80 and 1986-87). Welker finished second in



the NFL with 111 receptions in 2008 – the second highest singleseason total in team history behind his franchise-record 112 receptions in 2007. Welker became the eighth player in NFL history to record back-to-back 100-catch seasons and is the first player to achieve the feat with the Patriots.

WELKER RECORDS 12 CATCHES

Wes Welker tied his second-highest single-game reception total with 12 catches in the season-opener vs. Buffalo (9/14). His dozen receptions trail only his career-high 13 catches vs. Philadelphia on Nov. 25, 2007. The 12 catches against Buffalo marked Welker's fifth career regular-season game with 10 or more catches. Welker's other 12-catch game was last season at Seattle on Dec. 7, 2008. His 12 receptions tie the fifth-highest single-game total in team history, behind Troy Brown's team-record 16 catches on Sept. 22, 2002 and three 13-catch performances (Welker, 11/25/07; Deion Branch, 9/29/02; Terry Glenn, 10/3/99).

WELKER PILES UP YARDS

Wes Welker led the Patriots with 1,165 receiving yards in 2008 and joined Randy Moss in recording the first back-to-back 1,000-yard receiving seasons in Patriots history. Moss also had 1,000 receiving yards in 2007 and 2008. Welker's 1,165 yards in 2008 rank sixth on the Patriots' all-time single-season list. WELKER'S ROUTE TO THE NFL

Despite being named the Oklahoma football player of the year by both the *USA Today* and the *Daily Oklahoman*, Wes Welker's only scholarship offer came from Texas Tech, and only after a player that committed to Texas Tech backed out.

"I was thinking I'd get a scholarship somewhere," Welker said. "When it didn't happen when it was supposed to I was pretty hurt by it."

Welker had an impressive collegiate career, accumulating 259 receptions and eight punts returned for touchdowns. He even won a national award as the best special teams player in the country. Despite those accolades, he was passed over in the 2004 NFL draft and signed with San Diego as a free agent. He made the team, then was cut after the first game.

He signed with Miami soon after and was used just on special teams. He caught New England's eye with a 71-yard punt return on Monday Night Football in a game against the Patriots. He was acquired by the Patriots in a trade with Miami in 2007.

WELKER AVERAGING 7 CACTHES A GAME

Wes Welker caught at least six passes in each of the first 11 games in 2008. Welker is the first player in NFL history to have six or more catches in the first 11 games of a season. He caught 12 in the 2009 season-opener vs. Buffalo (9/14) and six on his return to action last Sunday against Baltimore (10/4).He is averaging 7 catches a game as member of the Patriots.

Faulk has totaled 3,013 rushing yards and 3,304 receiving yards since 2000, joining an exclusive list of elite players who have achieved the



feat. Faulk is one of just seven players who reached the milestone with just one team. In the 1990s, there were 13 players who achieved the 2000/2000 milestone; 22 players did it in the 1980s; nine players achieved the feat in the 1970s.

PATRIOTS FLECT FIVE SEASON CAPTAINS

The New England Patriots announced their 2009 captains prior to the start of the regular-season. Quarterback Tom Brady and WR Randy Moss will serve as offensive captains. Nose tackle Vince Wilfork and LB Jerod Mayo will serve as defensive captains. Wide receiver Sam Aiken will serve as special teams captain. The Patriots' 2009 captains were elected by their teammates.

On offense, Brady will serve as an offensive captain for the eighth straight season, having first been elected in 2002. Moss, in his third season with the Patriots after joining the team via trade in April 2007, will serve as a Patriots captain for the second straight season.

On defense, Wilfork is a captain for the second straight season, while Mayo will serve as a captain for the first time. He joined the Patriots as a first-round pick in 2008 and earned the AP Defensive Rookie of the Year award.

Aiken will serve as the Patriots' special teams captain for the first time. A special teams standout, Aiken has accumulated 71 special teams tackles during his six NFL seasons, entering the 2009 season.



"He's smart, well prepared," Bill Belichick said. "He understands. He's got a real good understanding of football. Not just his role but where other people have to be. That's what you really want in a defensive signal-caller, someone that understands how it all works."

"It's been a long road," Guyton said. "I have come far. I've achieved some things here. I'm happy. I'm enjoying it. But I don't look back as much, just always forward."

MATT LIGHT AND HIS FOUNDATION

The Light Foundation, a nonprofit founded in 2001 by Matt Light, held its signature fundraising event on Tuesday, September 29 at Addieville East Farm in Mapleville, RI.

The Shoot-Out, now in its 5th year, offers participants the opportunity to match their shooting skills against Light, his teammates, and a host of local and national celebrities. Proceeds from the one-of-



a-kind event benefit the Light Foundation, a youth-based organization that strives to install honesty, accountability and responsibility in young people through unique outdoor learning experiences that include a character development football camp, a financial literacy program offered at area schools and academic scholarships. In the eight years since the organization was founded, it has raised over \$1.2 million to support these programs.

Light says he wanted to develop a unique high-profile charity event that would raise funds and exposure for his foundation, and his love of the outdoors naturally came into play.

DOMINATING DEFENSE

The Patriots held the Ravens to 21 points (and just 14 points on offense) after Baltimore came into the game ranked second in the NFL, averaging 34.3 points per game. The Patriots defense has not allowed more than 20 points in a game so far in 2009, limiting Buffalo to 17 offensive points, the New York Jets to 19 points, Atlanta to 10 points and Baltimore to 14 offensive points. Denver's 20 points are the most allowed so far in 2009.

PATRIOTS FORCE TURNOVERS

The Patriots have forced at least one turnover in 13 straight games, the second longest current streak in the NFL behind Oakland (16). The Patriots forced two turnovers against the Broncos with an interception and a forced fumble. The Patriots are 53-1 in the last 54 games in which they've won the turnover battle.

PATRIOTS IN OCTOBER

The Patriots are 23-5 in October games, having swept the month in 2003, 2006 and 2007. The Patriots had an 11-game winning streak in the month of October that was snapped last season when New England dropped a 30-10 decision at San Diego (10/12/08).

PATRIOTS WIN GAME NUMBER 400

The Patriots recorded the franchise's 400th all-time victory, including postseason games, with the 26-10 win over Atlanta. The 400 victories rank third among the eight original AFL teams, behind Denver and Oakland. The eight original AFL teams, including the Patriots, began play in 1960. The Patriots recorded their milestone 400th victory in their 50th season and in their 777th overall game. Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have 176 victories, more than any other NFL team during that span.

The second-year promising young talent was born in 1985, when another Slater in The City of Angels was named to his second of seven Pro Bowls. Matthew's father, Jackie Slater, a Hall of Fame offensive tackle, spent his entire career with the Rams organization in LA. LIKE FATHER LIKE SON, PART 2

CB Shawn Springs has always been a speedster. No doubt, the gift of fast feet was a hereditary gift from his father, Ron Springs, an 8-year NFL running back for the Dallas Cowboys and Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Ron, who tallied over 2500 rushing and 2200 receiving yards in his career, became ill in 1990 with type 2 Diabetes. By 2004, Shawn was a respected NFL veteran, but he was willing to give up his career and offered to donate his kidney to his father, who needed a transplant. Ron declined, saying in a 2005 *Washington Post* article, "I think that was a tremendous gesture, and it just justifies the fact that he's a loving son. But I couldn't have let him do that, because I always prayed and wanted him to be a professional athlete, so I would not have shortened his career by no means necessary."

MOSS ON PACE FOR 1,000 YARDS

Randy Moss has recorded a 1,000-yard receiving season nine times in his 11-year career. Moss can join Jerry Rice (14) as the only players in NFL history with 10 seasons with 1,000 receiving yards with a 1,000 yard season in 2009. Moss currently has 367 receiving yards, which puts him on pace for 1,174 receiving yards

BRADY ON PACE FOR 4,516 PASSING YARDS

Tom Brady currently has 1,344 passing yards through five games, putting him on pace for 4,300 passing yards. That mark would tie Drew Beldsoe for seven seasons of 3,000 or more yards and give Brady his third season with over 4,000 passing yards. Bledsoe and Brady are tied with two 4,000 yard seasons.

BRADY WAS THERE FOR "THE CACTH"

In the 2003 AFC Divisional Playoff Game against Tennessee on January 10, 2004, QB Tom Brady threw for 201 yards and one touchdown, leading the Patriots to a narrow 17-14 victory en route to their second Super Bowl. That wasn't the first time Brady has seen a major playoff game come down to the wire on a game played on January 10. A native of the Bay area, Brady was at Candlestick Park for the 1982 NFC Championship game between the 49ers and Cowboys, as a four-year-old fan of course, witnessing Dwight Clark's "The Catch" from Joe Montana. According to Gary Myers' book *The Catch*, Brady wept after the play. Said Brady, "Not because I was happy or excited, but because everybody stood up and I couldn't see!" While Brady has been recognized for his stellar credentials, he said Montana, "was and will always be the greatest quarterback ever to play."

TOP TELEVISION RATINGS

Historically, the Patriots have been at or near the top of the weekly television ratings. Last week's game against Denver had a household rating of 29.73 with a 57 share. With over a million viewers, the game was the most watched TV event of the week.



PATRIOTS NEWS & NOTES

SANDERS EARNED HIS REPUTATION AS A HARD WORKER

James Sanders has earned the reputation as one of the Patriots' hardest workers. Said Bill Belichick on Sanders, "I think he's very professional. You would like to have 53 players like James on your team in terms of his work ethic, his toughness, and being a teammate. He's a high-character player."

BRANDON MCGOWAN IS A WELCOMED ADDITION

Brandon McGowan puts literally everything he has into making big tackles. Said McGowan, "I don't really care about my body and I'll expose my body to some messed-up positions to make a play." And expose he has; McGowan has fought his way back from three season-ending injuries in four years in Chicago. The University of Maine standout, who is one of three active players (Stephen Cooper, SD; Lofa Tatupu, SEA) to come out of the Football Championship Subdivision school, signed with the Patriots in May and forced a game-changing fumble off of Falcons' running back Michael Turner on September 27th. He also recovered a fumble at Denver that helped position the Patriots for a field goal.

FREE AGENTS MAKE AN IMPACT

Fourteen players on the New England 53-man roster entered the NFL as rookie free agents. Two that came to the Patriots as rookie free agents are making an impact on the defense. Mike Wright came to New England as a rookie free agent in 2005. He registered his first career two-sack game, dropping Joe Flacco twice for total losses of 17 yards vs. Baltimore (10-4). His two sacks pushed his 2009 total to 3.0, a single-season career high. Gary Guyton came to New England as a rookie free agent in 2007. He is second on the team with the team with 34 total tackles and is on pace to finished the season with 109 tackles.

Said Bill Belichick about coming to the Patriots as a free agent, "I think Mike's similar to some of the other players that would fall into that category. Players like Gary Guyton and guys like that who weren't high picks that came in at a pretty early point — Pierre Woods, [Brian] Hoyer —came in and showed that they belonged, both physically and athletically from a football standpoint, recognizing things, reacting, kind of knowing what to do."

TOUGH AT HOME

The Patriots own an overall record of 54-12 (.818) at Gillette Stadium. Since their state-of-the-art facility opened at the beginning of the 2002 season, the Patriots own the NFL's best record at home. Now in their seventh season at Gillette Stadium, the Patriots have finished three seasons undefeated at home since the stadium opened (2003, 2004 and 2007) and own a perfect 7-0 playoff record at the venue.

A Q&A With Brandon Meriweather

ON THE FIELD:

Who has been the most influential person in your football career? Probably my uncle, James Pryer. I basically wanted to be like him growing up. He was the fastest guy in the neighborhood and the best receiver in the neighborhood. He played football in high school and quit football before entering college to focus on his academics.

What was some of the best advice your former teammate and former Patriots safety Rodney Harrison gave you? Hot-Rod [Harrison] gave me a lot of advice, but what probably stuck with me the most was when he told me to "Play every game like it was my last because you never know when your last is going to be." Seeing him get hurt and ending his career like that kind of makes it true.

What is your earliest memory of playing football? I first started playing football when I was 6 years old. My cousin had to make me a fake birth certificate because I wanted to play in an 8 and older league. It worked and I played.

Your first NFL start was in Super Bowl XLII. Would you say that was one of your most memorable moments as well or did you treat that just as any other game? I tried to treat it like any other game. But at the same time I couldn't because of all the things they had going on around you and all the people. It was hard.

What are some of the biggest adjustments you have had to make from playing at the University of Miami to playing in the NFL? The mental part of the game is a lot different. I think that's the biggest adjustment you have to make from college to the NFL. In college you can get away with just being a better athlete, but in this league you have to know more and you can't have any bad steps. If you are an inch late, you could get beaten by your opponent in a big game, whereas in college you could take two wrong steps and still make a play. I

Since Harrison's injury, Meriweather has started at strong safety in each of the Patriots' 14 contests, beginning against the St. Louis Rams on Oct. 26, 2008.

You have mentioned you would like to be a football coach if you weren't currently playing in the NFL. Is this something you would like to do after your football career? I could see myself being a high school football coach. I like working with kids. It's something I would definitely like to

What are some of your hobbies? I like to go to the movies and listen to music. I'm a homebody. I pretty much like to stay in the house and watch movies.

Do you have any superstitions? I would say the only thing I do on a consistent basis is pray. I have to pray at the same time everyday.

In 2008, Meriweather was one of just four NFL defensive backs with at least two interceptions, two sacks and two forced fumbles, joining Arizona's Adrian Wilson, Minnesota's Antoine Winfield and Philadelphia's Quintin Mikell. Wilson and Winfield were named to the Pro Bowl, following last season. Meriweather led the Patriots with four interceptions in 2008, tying the highest total for a Patriots safety in a decade, dating back to when Lawyer Milloy had six interceptions in 1998.

OFFENSES B-WARE

Following Rodney Harrison's season-ending injury versus Denver last season, Meriweather has started for the Patriots in each of their 15 games since, beginning with the Patriots' 23-16 victory over the St. Louis Rams in Week Eight of the 2008 campaign. During that 15-game span, Meriweather is ahead of reining AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year Jerod Mayo for the team lead in tackles with 101 stops, based on coaches' film review.
