NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (1-1) vs. BUFFALO BILLS (0-2)

Sun., Sept. 26, 2010 ★ Gillette Stadium (68,756) ★ 1:00 p.m. EDT

The New England Patriots return home this week to face the Buffalo Bills in the second of three-straight games against AFC East opponents. Last week the Patriots lost, 28-14, at the New York Jets. After hosting the Bills at Gillette Stadium this Sunday, the Patriots will travel to Miami for their first prime time game of the season on Monday Night Football against the Dolphins.

The Patriots will attempt to get back on the winning track this week and extend their streak to 14 straight wins over the Buffalo Bills.

Bill Belichick is 45-20 against AFC East opponents as head coach of the Patriots and QB Tom Brady owns a 39-11 record against AFC East opponents as a starter, including a 15-1 record against Buffalo.

BROADCAST INFORMATION

TELEVISION: This week's game will be broadcast to a regional audience by CBS and can be seen in Boston on **WBZ-TV Channel 4**. **Kevin Harlan** will handle play-by-play duties with **Solomon Wilcotts** providing color.

RADIO: 98.5 FM, The Sports Hub, is the flagship station for the **Patriots Radio Network**. A complete listing of the network's 36 stations can be found in this press release. Play-by-play broadcaster **Gil Santos** is in his 34th season as the voice of the Patriots and will call the action along with Patriots Hall of Famer **Gino Cappelletti**. Santos and Cappelletti are celebrating their 27th season as a tandem.

SERIES SUCCESS

PATRIOTS VS. BILLS

SERIES HISTORY

The Patriots and Bills will meet for the 101st time, with New England holding a 59-40-1 edge following a series sweep in 2009 for the sixth straight season. The Patriots, who have won 13 straight games against Buffalo, have not lost a game to the Bills since a 31-0 loss on opening day of the 2003 season (9/7/03). The 13-game win streak is the fourth longest winning streak over a single opponent in NFL history.



The series between the AFC East rivals began in 1960. The Patriots' 59 wins over the Bills are their highest victory total over any opponent, nine more than they own over the New York Jets (50). New England has won 13 straight games in the series and has won 18 of its last 20 games against Buffalo dating back to the 2000 season.



The Patriots have won by an average margin of 18 points per game during their current 13-game win streak. The Patriots are 28-21 all-time in Buffalo, including 21-15 at Ralph

Wilson Stadium. The Patriots beat the Bills last season with a come-from-behind 25-24 win on opening day at Gillette Stadium (9/14/09), and then won the re-match at Ralph Wilson Stadium (12/20/09), 17-10.

The teams have had many memorable matchups over the years, including a five-game span from 1999 to 2001 where four of the five contests were decided in overtime.

- The Patriots have won nine straight games against Buffalo at home, including a perfect 8-0 record at Gillette Stadium.
- The Patriots have recorded 59 wins over the Bills, the most by the Patriots against any one opponent.
- New England has won 13 straight games against Buffalo, the longest series winning streak against an opponent.
- The Patriots have defeated the Bills 18 times in the last 20 games between the teams.

DIVISIONAL DOMINANCE

The New England Patriots own a 43-14 (.754) record in regular season AFC East games since the beginning of the 2001 season, compiling the best intra-division record of any team in the NFL over the last nine seasons. The Patriots finished 4-2 in the division in 2009.

PASSING PERFORMANCES

Tom Brady is slated to start against Buffalo for the 17th time in his career. The Patriots signal caller has led the Patriots to 15 regular season victories over the Bills, recording his highest regular season victory total over any opponent. Brady has compiled 11 consecutive victories over the Bills, marking his longest regular-season winning streak over any opponent. Additionally, Brady has thrown for more touchdowns (33) against Buffalo than any other opponent.

Quarterback Tom Brady threw two touchdown passes to TE Benjamin Watson in the final two minutes of the game to rally the Patriots from a 24-13 deficit and give the team a 25-24 victory on Monday Night Football. On the final two scoring drives, he completed 11-of-13 passes for 112 yards and two touchdowns. After an 18-yard touchdown pass to Watson with 2:10 remaining that cut the deficit to 24-19, the comeback was aided by a huge special teams play on the ensuing kickoff. LB Pierre Woods forced a fumble on the return that was recovered by K Stephen Gostkowski at the Buffalo 31-yard line. Three plays later, Brady hit Watson for a 16-yard score and a 25-24 lead. Buffalo got the ball back with 45 seconds to play, but the Patriots defense held strong to secure the win. Brady finished with 39 completions on 53 pass attempts for 378 yards.

The Patriots extended their winning streak to 13 straight games over the Buffalo Bills with a 17-10 win at Ralph Wilson Stadium. With the win, the Patriots inched closer to the AFC East Division title with Miami and the Jets both falling to 7-7 with losses. The Patriots victory was aided by 11 Buffalo penalties for 124 yards, including 104 penalty yards in the first half. New England's first two scoring drives were set up by costly pass interference penalties. While QB Tom Brady was just 11-of-23 for 115 yards, WR Randy Moss had a good game with five receptions for 70 yards and a 13-yard touchdown catch in the second quarter.

CONNECTIONS

- Patriots **RB Sammy Morris** was drafted by the Bills with the 156th overall pick in the 2000 NFL Draft.
- Bills **Defensive Quality Control Coach Adrian White** spent his final year as a player in the NFL with the Patriots in 1993.
- Patriots **TE Aaron Hernandez**, **DE Jermaine Cunningham** and **LB Brandon Spikes** and Bills **WR David Nelson** were all teammates at the University of Florida from 2007-08.
- Additionally, Patriots **DL Gerard Warren** and Bills **LB Andra Davis** worked in the same defensive corps at Florida from 1999-2000.
- Patriots **LB Gary Guyton** and Bills **OL Cordaro Howard** were teammates at Georgia Tech from 2005-06.
- Bills **Head Coach Chan Gailey** was the Head Coach at Georgia Tech from 2002-07, and Guyton and Howard played for him during their time with the Yellow Jackets.
- Patriots **S Patrick Chung** and Bills **S Jairus Byrd** were four-year teammates and partners in the secondary at Oregon from 2005-08. The two were also drafted just eight picks apart in the 2009 NFL Draft, with Chung going to the Patriots with the 34th overall pick and Byrd to the Bills at No. 42.
- Patriots **RB Sammy Morris** and Bills **Defensive Coordinator George Edwards** were both members of the Miami Dolphins for the 2005-06 seasons.
- Patriots **RB Fred Taylor** and Bills **DE Marcus Stroud** spent seven seasons together with the Jacksonville Jaguars from 2001-07.
- Patriots **DT Vince Wilfork** and **S Brandon Meriweather** and Bills **WR Roscoe Parrish** were all teammates at the University of Miami in 2003.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2010

RANDY MOSS

- Moss is in sixth place on the NFL's all-time receiving yards list with 14,562 yards and needs 647 receiving yards in 2010 to move into second place all-time, behind Jerry Rice (22,895). He needs 438 receiving yards to become the fourth player in NFL history with 15,000 receiving yards. Jerry Rice (22,895), Isaac Bruce (15,208) and Terrell Owens (15,061) are the only other players to accomplish the feat.
- Moss is 10th place on the NFL's all-time list for receptions with 933. He needs 67 receptions to become just the seventh player in NFL history with 1,000 career receptions.
- Moss is in fourth place in NFL history with 150 overall touchdowns. He is just the fourth player in NFL history with at least 150 touchdowns. He needs one more receiving touchdown to join Jerry Rice (197) as the only players to top 150 touchdown catches.
- Moss has recorded 1,000 receiving yards in a season 10 times in his 12-year career. Moss can join Jerry Rice (14) as the only players in NFL history with 11 seasons with 1,000 receiving yards.

TOM BRADY

- Brady has 98 wins and needs two wins to become the 11th NFL QB to reach 100 wins.

WES WELKER

- Welker has a streak of 65 straight regular-season games with at least one reception. The last time Welker did not catch a pass in a game was 12/24/05 when he played for the Dolphins. He has caught at least one pass in each of his 51 games as a Patriot, including three postseason games.

TOUGH AT HOME

The Patriots own an overall record of 60-13 (.822) at Gillette Stadium. Since their state-of-the-art facility opened at the beginning of the 2002 season, the Patriots own the NFL's best record at home.

Quarterback Mark Sanchez threw three touchdowns to lead the New York Jets to a 28-14 victory over the New England Patriots at The New Meadowlands Stadium. New England jumped in front 14-10 in the first half, but the Jets scored 18 points in the second half, forced three turnovers and held the Patriots to just 80 total yards and no points.

The Patriots dominated the start of the game with a 7:34 drive and an 8:10 drive but came away with just one touchdown on those two drives. New England opened the game with a 13-play drive that ended at the Jets 19-yard line with a missed field goal. After stopping the Jets on three straight plays on the next series, the Patriots went on a 15-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a 6-yard touchdown pass from QB Tom Brady to WR Wes Welker for a 7-0 lead early in the second quarter.

The Jets converted two third-down plays on the ensuing drive to get into position for Sanchez's first touchdown pass of the day, a 10-yard pass to WR Braylon Edwards, to tie the game at 7-7. New England took a 14-7 lead later in the second quarter following a 46-yard pass from Brady to rookie TE Aaron Hernandez on a third-and-ten play for a first down at the Jets 34-yard line. Hernandez finished the game with six receptions for 101 yards. On the next play, Brady went deep for WR Randy Moss for a 34-yard touchdown pass. The touchdown marked the 150th touchdown of Moss' career, as he became just the fourth NFL player to reach at least 150 touchdowns. Jets CB Darrelle Revis aggravated his hamstring on the play to Moss and did not return to the game.

The Jets got the ball back with 53 seconds left in the first half and Sanchez completed 3-of-4 passes for 41 yards to move to the 31-yard line where K Nick Folk connected on a 49-yard field goal to cut the New England lead to 14-10 at the break.

Brady threw two interceptions and lost a fumble on a sack in the second half. The first turnover came when Jets CB Antonio Cromartie intercepted a Brady pass at the New York three-yard line on a pass intended for Moss in the end zone. The Jets took over and engineered 10-play, 80-yard drive that ended in a field goal to cut the lead to, 14-13. A 31-yard run by RB LaDainian Tomlinson on the Jets next series helped set up a 2-yard touchdown pass from Sanchez to WR Jerricho Cotchery and a Sanchez 2-point play to Edwards put the Jets in front, 21-14.

Early in the fourth quarter Brady was intercepted by Jets S Rodney Pool on a deep pass to Moss. After two pass interference penalties against the Patriots aided a drive that ended in a 1-yard touchdown pass from Sanchez to TE Dustin Keller for a 28-14 lead, Brady moved the Patriots to the New York 16-yard line. A strip sack by LB Jason Taylor ended the scoring threat. New York ran out the final four minutes to win the game.

MOSS AMONG THE BEST

Randy Moss registered his 150th overall touchdown to become just the fourth player in NFL history to reach 150 touchdowns on a 34-yard touchdown reception from Tom Brady in the second quarter. His 150 overall touchdowns are fourth in NFL history, behind Jerry Rice (208), Emmitt Smith (175) and LaDainian Tomlinson (153). He needs one more touchdown reception to join Rice (197) as the only other player to reach 150 touchdown receptions.

ROOKIES GOOD IN NEW YORK

Rookie TE Aaron Hernandez registered six receptions for 101 yards. It is the first 100-yard receiving game by a New England tight end since Ben Watson had 107 yards receiving on Oct. 7, 2007 vs. Cleveland. Last season, WR Julian Edelman made his NFL debut at the Jets (9/20/09) and caught eight passes for 98 yards. Last season the Patriots had a player finish with 100 or yards receiving 12 times.

HERNANDEZ HAS SECOND 40-PLUS RECEPTION

TE Aaron Hernandez caught a 46-yard reception from Tom Brady in the second quarter to help position the Patriots for a touchdown. It is his second 40-plus reception of the 2010 season after a 45-yard reception from Brady in the season-opener on his first ever NFL reception.

DL GERARD WARREN REGISTERS TWO SACKS

DL Gerard Warren registered his second career two-sack game after a 10-yard sack of Jets QB Mark Sanchez in the second quarter and a six-yard sack in the third quarter. Warren's other two-sack game was December 14, 2003 at Denver while playing for Cleveland.

WELKER IS GOOD FOR AT LEAST SIX

Welker now has six or more catches in 28 of his last 32 games after finishing with six against the Jets. Welker had a team-leading eight receptions in the season-opener vs. Cincinnati.

WELKER EXTENDS STREAK

Welker extended his streak to 65 straight regular-season games with at least one reception. He has caught at least one pass in each of his 51 games with the Patriots, including three postseason games. The last time that Welker did not catch a pass in a game was December 24, 2005 when he was with the Dolphins.

WELKER STARTS SEASON WITH THREE TOUCHDOWNS ON HIS FIRST 11 RECEPTIONS

Welker scored on a 6-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady in the second quarter for his third touchdown in his first 11 receptions of the 2010 season. He finished the 2009 season with four total touchdowns.

TOM BRADY QUICK HITS

- Tom Brady (31,102) entered the Jets game 30th all-time in passing yards, 203 yards behind 29th place Steve McNair (31,304). He moved past McNair into 29th place on a 19-yard pass reception to RB Sammy Morris in the fourth quarter. Brady now has 31,350 career passing yards. John Brodie is in 28th place with 31,548 passing yards.

WR Julian Edelman made his 2010 debut after missing the opener due to injury and played as a third wide receiver and returned punts. Last season at the Jets (9/20/09), Edelman made his NFL debut, making his first start and finishing with eight receptions for 98 yards.

ROBERT KRAFT NEWS & NOTES

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have experienced one of the most dramatic turnarounds in the history of sports. In 16 seasons of ownership, Kraft has transformed one of the league's least successful clubs into what many observers view as a model NFL franchise. In the five seasons immediately preceding his purchase (1989-93), the Patriots were a moribund team, winning just 19 of 80 games (.311 pct.) and recording the worst record in the NFL over that span. When he bought the franchise on Jan. 21, 1994, Kraft announced his intention to bring a championship to New England, a tall order considering the team's previous success rate. But under Kraft's leadership, the Patriots have won nine division titles, five conference crowns and three Super Bowl championships. The Patriots have made five Super Bowl appearances since Kraft purchased the team, a period during which no other NFL franchise has earned more than three berths.

SELLOUT STREAK

In the early 1990s, the Patriots seemed destined for relocation until Robert Kraft's purchase of the team rejuvenated local interest. In 1991, the season ticket base was just 17,635, barely enough to support the club. Now, the season-ticket base stands at a capped total of 61,759 and more than 50,000 fans are on a waiting list. The Patriots have sold out 173 consecutive home games (dating back to the 1994 regular-season opener).

SUCCESS STORY

Since Robert Kraft purchased the team in 1994, the Patriots have been one of the NFL's elite franchises. Over the first 16 seasons of Kraft's ownership, the Patriots own the NFL's highest winning percentage and have won more Super Bowl titles, more conference championships and more playoff games than any other NFL team. The Patriots have now won 9 or more games in 13 of the 16 seasons that Robert Kraft has owned the team.

Bill Belichick is the only head coach in NFL history to win three Super Bowl titles in a four-year span. He spent 20 years as an assistant coach in the NFL and this is his 16th season as a head coach. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, he is the only man in NFL history to serve 20 or more seasons as an assistant coach and at least 15 seasons as a head coach. Over a 100-game span from 2003-08, Belichick directed the team to an 82-18 record, marking the best 100-game span for any team in NFL history. In the 2007 season, Belichick led the Patriots to the fourth undefeated and untied regular season in the NFL's 90-year history and the first since the NFL established a 16-game schedule in 1978. He has led the Patriots to the Super Bowl four times and has produced seven division championships, including five straight from 2003-07. Belichick's Patriots teams own the all-time NFL records for consecutive total victories (21 from 2003-04), and established the record for consecutive regular-season victories (21 from 2006-08) and consecutive playoff victories (10 from 2001-05). Belichick owns the second-best postseason record in NFL history (15-5) and is the winningest NFL head coach since 2001 (122-42). From 2003-04, he directed the Patriots to back-to-back Super Bowl titles while posting consecutive 17-win campaigns. Belichick has spent more seasons in the league than any other current NFL head coach, and in that time has been a part of five Super Bowl championship teams. His overall record of 127-53 with the Patriots gives him the most victories and the best winning percentage of any head coach in franchise history.

ELITE COMPANY

Bill Belichick is one of nine NFL head coaches to win three or more championships since the league began postseason play in 1933. With the Patriots' victory in Super Bowl XXXIX, Belichick joined an exclusive club in which each of the eight other members has been enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

MOSS IS NFL'S PREMIER TD RECEIVER

Since entering the NFL in 1998, Randy Moss has caught 149 touchdown passes, more than any other player over that span. Since joining the Patriots via trade prior to the 2007 season, Moss has caught 48 touchdowns – also the best in the league over that span. In terms of overall touchdowns (rushing, receiving and returning), Moss has totaled 150 scores since entering the league in 1998 (149 via reception and one via punt return), a tally that ranks second only to LaDainian Tomlinson (153 touchdowns) over that span. Moss's 13 receiving touchdowns in 2009 tied for the NFL lead with Larry Fitzgerald and Vernon Davis.

Moss had 10 catches in the win vs. Atlanta on Sept. 27, 2009 making it his 10th game with 10 or more catches. The 10-catch performance was Moss's second of 2009 – he tied a career high with 12 catches in the 2009 season-opener vs. Buffalo (09/14/09). Moss now has three 10-catch games with New England.

MOSS REACHES 1,000 YARDS FOR 10TH TIME

Randy Moss reached 1,000 receiving yards for the third straight season and the 10th time in his career after finishing the 2009 with 1,264 receiving yards. He joined Jerry Rice (14 seasons) as the only players in NFL history with 10 1,000-yard receiving seasons.

WELKER GOES OVER 100 RECEPTIONS IN 2009

Wes Welker's 10-catch game vs. Carolina on Dec. 13, 2009 pushed him over 100 receptions for the third straight season. WELKER'S ROUTE TO THE NFL

Despite being named the Oklahoma football player of the year by both *USA Today* and the *Daily Oklahoman*, Wes Welker's only scholarship offer came from Texas Tech, and only after a player that committed to Texas Tech backed out.

"I was thinking I'd get a scholarship somewhere," Welker said. "When it didn't happen when it was supposed to I was pretty hurt by it."

Welker had an impressive collegiate career, accumulating 259 receptions and eight punts returned for touchdowns. He even won a national award as the best special teams player in the country. Despite those accolades, he was passed over in the 2004 NFL draft and signed with San Diego as a free agent. He made the team, then was cut after the first game. He signed with Miami soon after and was used just on special teams. He caught New England's eye with a 71-yard punt return on Monday Night Football in a game against the Patriots. He was acquired by the Patriots in a trade with Miami in 2007.

WELKER TIES NFL RECORD FOR FEWEST INDIVIDUAL GAMES PLAYED TO REACH 100 RECEPTIONS

Welker reached 100 receptions in his 11th game of the 2009 season to tie Marvin Harrison for the fewest individual games played to reach 100 receptions in a season in NFL history. Harrison caught 100 passes in his first 11 games of the 2002 season en route to an NFL-record 143 catches. (Welker missed two games in 2009 due to injury).

WELKER GOES OVER 100 YARDS

Welker had a career-high six 100-yard games in 2009 and has 14 for his career. His previous high for most 100-yard games in a season was four in 2007 and 2008.

MOSS AND WELKER: FIRST TIME IN PATS HISTORY TWO PLAYERS HAVE 12 CATCHES

BANTA-CAIN SETS CAREER-HIGHS IN SACKS

LB Tully Banta-Cain set a single-game career-high with three sacks in the win at Buffalo on Dec. 20, 2009 and closed out the 2009 season with a career-high of 10.0 sacks for the season. His previous best for a season was 5.5 in 2006 with the Patriots. He had three games in 2009 with at least two sacks and now has five games in his career with at least two sacks. The Patriots have now had a player finish the season with double digit sack totals 12 times. Banta-Cain's 10 sacks are the most for the Patriots since Mike Vrabel's 12.5 sacks in 2007.

DOMINANT DEFENSE

The Patriots defense finished 11th in the NFL in 2009, eight yards behind the 10th place Washington Redskins. The Patriots defense has finished in the top ten 13 times, including five times under Head Coach Bill Belichick.

PATRIOTS FORCE TURNOVERS

The Patriots did not force a turnover against Miami (11/8/09), breaking a streak of 15 straight games with a turnover. That streak had been the longest streak in the NFL. PATRIOTS NEWS & NOTES

WILFORK WEARS HIS HEART ON HIS NECK

Vince Wilfork wears No. 75 over his bulky shoulder pads. Underneath hangs a gold chain locket for those who were number one in his heart: his parents. In 2002, parents David and Barbara Wilfork both passed away within five months of each other, leaving the then University of Miami star without his greatest support system. Wilfork, who lost his father to diabetes, has raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for diabetes-related causes. His annual draft day fundraiser, a bowling event he has held for seven years, is one of the signature fundraising events held by a pro athlete in New England. For his charity work, Wilfork was awarded the 2010 New England Patriots Ron Burton Community Service Award. While he has many accomplishment on the football field and will always cherish his National Championship and Super Bowl rings, his constant reminder lies closest to his heart, a picture of his late parents at their high school prom. "I carry them with me wherever I go", Wilfork said of his parents' keepsake. "My parents pushed me to be the best I could be. The things I do and my wife does, we do out of the kindness of our heart, and we do it for the community. I never look for anything in return. My teammates are my second family. My kids, my wife, the New England Patriots – that's all I have."

ZOLTAN MESKO: COMING TO AMERICA

Rookie P Zoltan Mesko was born in Timisoara, Romania, on the Romania-Hungary border. In 1989, during the communist revolutions, his family would survive by diving on the floor to avoid gun shots from the armies. Even after the fall of the Berlin Wall, his parents and he lived in poverty. His family was finally able to escape Romania when his father won a United States Permanent Resident Card (green card) in the Diversity Immigrant Visa Lottery in 1997 when Mesko was 11.

MESKO DISCOVERS FOOTBALL

An avid soccer player from his days in Romania, Mesko had a strong leg. It was only when he came to America that he discovered his leg could take him places. In eighth grade, Mesko was playing kickball in the gym when he kicked the ball so high that he broke a light fixture. He was given a choice: pay for the light fixture or play football. With his family still struggling with money and football being a more popular sport than soccer at his school, the choice was an obvious one—Mesko decided to play football. His leg would land him numerous Division I Scholarships and admission offers from Ivy League schools. From these, Mesko chose to play football at Michigan.

DOUBLE TROUBLE: CB DEVIN MCCOURTY

After being selected by the Patriots in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft, CB Devin McCourty became part of a select group in league history. McCourty's identical twin brother, Jason, is a cornerback with Tennessee, selected in the sixth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. The two are the 11th set of twins to play in the NFL. Devin and Jason were cornerbacks in the Rutgers secondary from 2005-08. Devin redshirted for the 2005 season and therefore was a year behind his brother in eligibility. McCourty is the second twin to suit up for the Patriots, after CB Kato Serwanga was a member of the team from 1998-2000. His twin brother Wasswa played for San Francisco and Minnesota from 1999-2001. According to McCourty's mother, the two can only be told apart by tiny scars on their faces left by chickenpox.

EDELMAN GOES FROM STANDOUT QB TO WR

Julian Edelman began his college football career with a year at the College of San Mateo (Ca.) before transferring to Kent State where as a senior he completed 56% of his passes (153 of 275 passes for 1,820 yards) with 13 touchdowns. He was also the leading rusher, gaining 1,551 yards on 215 attempts (an average of 7.5 yards per carry) and scoring 13 touchdowns. His offensive numbers broke Kent State's single-season record for total offense to break Joshua Cribb's single season school record that was set in 2003 when he was at Kent State.

ALL IN THE FAMILY: TE ROB GRONKOWSKI

Rookie TE Rob Gronkowski grew up playing football against his brothers in the backyard. Now, he has a chance to play against them in the NFL. Dan Gronkowski, the oldest of the bunch, is currently in his second season as a TE for the Denver Broncos, while 23-year old Chris is currently a rookie with the Dallas Cowboys as a fullback. The Gronkowski's are among 22 different sets of brothers currently in the NFL, yet they are the only family that can claim to have three siblings in the league. According to the pro Football Hall of Fame, the Gronkowski brothers join nine other families to have at least three brothers playing at the same time.

Patriots T Matt Light and the Light Foundation took aim at another successful year for the organization when they hosted the 2010 Matt Light Celebrity Shoot-Out on Tuesday, September 14 at Addieville East Farm in Mapleville, Rhode Island. The event allows for participants to test their clay shooting skills against a host of celebrities, including members of the New England Patriots as well as stars from TV and movies. Current Patriots QB Tom Brady, WR's Randy Moss and Wes Welker and Light's fellow linemen, C Dan Koppen and T Nick Kaczur have also tried their hand at the competition in years past. The Light Foundation was established in 2001 and strives to instill the values of responsibility and hard work to youths by providing unique outdoor learning experiences to assist them in reaching their highest potential.

LIKE FATHER LIKE SON

WR Matthew Slater spent his college days at UCLA. The third-year promising young talent was born in 1985, when another Slater in The City of Angels was named to his second of seven Pro Bowls.
