## NEW ORLEANS SAINTS HOLD NINE SELECTIONS ENTERING NFL DRAFT FROM APRIL 24-26

The newest members of the New Orleans Saints will join the team this week, as the 90th annual NFL Draft will take place on Thursday, Friday and Saturday from April 24-26 in Green Bay, Wis. The draft will kick off in its primetime format for the 15th consecutive year at 7:00 p.m. (CT) on Thursday evening, with the first round to be completed. The draft will resume on Friday evening at 6:00 p.m. for rounds two and three with the remaining four rounds to be completed on Saturday starting at 11 a.m.

The Saints own nine picks in 2025, with their highest being a first round draft choice (9th overall). New Orleans will be looking to further supplement the roster following drafts the past seven seasons which have netted ten cumulative Pro Bowl selections, nine starters and several significant contributors with their picks, headlined by RB Alvin Kamara, CB Alontae Taylor, WR Chris Olave and C Erik McCoy.

ABC/ESPN and the NFL Network will provide full live coverage and analysis of the 2025 NFL Draft on Thursday, Friday and Saturday in its entirety. The first round will conclude by approximately 10:30 p.m., the second and third rounds will end by 9:45 p.m. and Saturday's selections will conclude around 6:15 p.m.

Each team is permitted a maximum of ten minutes per selection in the first round of the draft, seven minutes in the second round, five minutes for choices made in rounds three through six and four minutes for choices in round seven. Trading is allowed throughout the course of the draft.

There will be a total of seven rounds and 257 selections (222 regular picks and 35 compensatory choices) in the 2025 NFL Draft. The NFL awarded 35 compensatory draft picks to 15 teams. The Saints were awarded one compensatory pick in 2025.

Entering the draft, New Orleans holds one pick in the first round (9th overall), one pick in the second round (40th overall), two picks in the third round (71st and 93rd overall), two picks in the fourth round (112th and 131st overall), one pick in the sixth round (184th overall) and two picks in the seventh round (248th and 254th overall).

In exchange for CB Marshon Lattimore and their original fifth round pick (147th overall) in this year's draft, the Saints traded for the Washington Commanders third round pick (93rd overall) and fourth round pick (131st overall) in this year's draft. New Orleans is also left without their original seventh round pick (223rd overall) after trading it to the Philadelphia Eagles in 2022 as part of a trade that saw the clubs exchange multiple draft choices.

## SAINTS DRAFT RECAP

TALIESE FUAGA  
1ST ROUND: 2024



The New Orleans Saints have made the most of their choices, selecting quality players that now form the foundation of the roster. Below is a synopsis of the club's draft picks:

### 2024

**Round 1:** Tackle **Taliese Fuaga** – The Oregon State product started all 17 games at left tackle for New Orleans in his rookie season, becoming the first Saints rookie to start every game at LT since J.T. Taylor in 1978.

**Round 2:** Cornerback **Kool-Aid McKinstry** – After a standout career at Alabama, the Birmingham native played in 15 games with nine starts at cornerback, finishing with 41 tackles (31 solo), seven pass breakups and one coverage stop.

**Round 5a:** Quarterback **Spencer Rattler** – After injuries to starting QB Derek Carr, Rattler appeared in seven games with six starts and recorded 1,317 passing yards on 130-of-228 passes with four touchdowns. The rookie

showed his dual threat ability as well, adding 18 carries for 146 yards (8.1 avg).

**Round 5b:** Wide Receiver **Bub Means** – The rookie wideout appeared in seven games with one start, finishing with nine catches for 118 yards (13.1 avg.) and one touchdown before missing the final nine games due to an ankle injury.

**Round 5c:** Linebacker **Jaylan Ford** – Ford established a role on the team's special teams units. In eight games, he made five coverage stops before suffering a season-ending fibula injury in Week 17.

**Round 6:** Defensive Tackle **Khrystian Boyd** – Boyd played in six games and recorded three tackles. He will compete for more extensive snaps following a full offseason of participation in the team's strength and conditioning program.

**Round 7:** Tackle **Josiah Ezirim** – Ezirim spent the entire 2024 season on the Saints' practice squad.

### 2023

**Round 1:** Defensive Tackle **Bryan Bresee** – Appearing in all 17 games with ten starts, the former Clemson standout recorded 25 tackles, a career-high and team-leading 7.5 sacks, three pass breakups, one forced fumble and one blocked field goal. Bresee's 7.5 sacks was tied for fourth among NFL defensive tackles and is tied for the ninth-highest total in franchise history at the position.

**Round 2:** Defensive End **Isaiah Foskey** – Played in all 17 contests, adding seven tackles on defense and ten stops on a special teams unit that ranked as one of the best in the league. The second-year edge rusher was one of four Saints to record double-digit special teams stops.

**Round 3:** Running Back **Kendre Miller** – Despite missing 11 games due to injury, Miller totaled 148 rushing yards and a touchdown while adding five receptions for 33 yards in the passing game. On the special teams, Miller added six kickoff returns for 176 yards (29.3 avg).

**Round 4a:** Offensive Lineman **Nick Saldiveri** – The Old Dominion product was a key contributor for a Saints offensive line in year two, appearing in 11 games with six starts at left guard last season.

**Round 4b:** Quarterback **Jake Haener** – After a full offseason with the club in 2024, Haener saw the first game action of his NFL career, appearing in eight games with one start and completing 18-of-39 passes for 226 yards, one touchdown, one interception, and had 25 rushing yards on eight attempts.

**Round 5:** Safety **Jordan Howden** – Howden appeared in all 17 games with four starts, finishing with 47 tackles (26 solo), two pass breakups, three coverage stops and the first two interceptions of his career.

## 2022

**Round 1a:** Wide Receiver **Chris Olave** – Started all eight games he appeared in, catching 32 passes for 400 yards (12.5 avg.) with one touchdown. Olave suffered two concussions in 2024, missing nine contests and the final eight games of the campaign.

**Round 1b:** Tackle **Trevor Penning** – After being set back by injuries early in his career, Penning made a seamless transition to the right tackle position, opening all 17 contests. Penning and Taliese Fuaga were the only two offensive linemen to start all 17 games in 2024.

**Round 2:** Cornerback **Alontae Taylor** – In 2024, Taylor appeared in all 17 contests with 15 starts at both nickel corner and on the outside, recording career-highs in tackles (89), solo stops (61), sacks (four), stops for loss (seven), pass breakups (16) and forced fumbles (two).

**Round 5:** Linebacker **D'Marco Jackson** – Saw action in ten games, recording six tackles and eight special teams stops before suffering season-ending ankle injury in Week 14.



## 2021

**Round 2:** Linebacker **Pete Werner** – Werner turned in another productive campaign in year four, posting 92 tackles (54 solo) and one pass breakup, while starting all 13 games he appeared in.

**Round 6:** Tackle **Landon Young** – Appeared in all 17 games with five starts, four at right guard and one at left guard, while also making contributions as a sixth lineman and on special teams in 2024.

## 2020

**Round 1:** Center/Guard **Cesar Ruiz** – In 2024, Ruiz started all 13 games he appeared in at right guard. After signing an extension at the start of the 2023 season, Ruiz will look to continue his consistent play and help lead the Saints offense in 2025.

## 2019

**Round 2:** Center/Guard **Erik McCoy** – The PFWA NFL All-Rookie selection has started



all 81 games and three postseason contests he's played at center. Started seven contests at center, anchoring the New Orleans offensive line and helping the team to a 4-3 record when on the field. Despite playing just seven games, McCoy was selected to his second consecutive Pro Bowl.

## 2017

**Round 1b:** Tackle **Ryan Ramczyk** – Has opened all 101 regular season games he has appeared in, 98 on the right side, in his first seven campaigns and was named to the *Associated Press* All-Pro team in three consecutive years (2018-20). He joined Willie Roaf as only the second Saints tackle to be named *AP* All-Pro three times. Since Ramczyk joined the team in 2017, the Saints have the second-fewest sacks allowed (169), the fewest in the NFC.

**Round 3a:** Running Back **Alvin Kamara** – In 2024, the 2017 *Associated Press* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year led the team in both rushing and total yards from scrimmage (1,493), as he carried 228 times for a career-high 950 yards with six touchdowns and caught a team-high 68 passes for 543 yards with two touchdowns. Kamara is the Saints all-time leader in rushing yards (6,779), rushing touchdowns (60), total touchdowns (86), total yards from scrimmage (11,541), all-purpose yardage (12,199) and first downs (573). Kamara is also the franchise's all-time postseason rushing leader with 93 carries for 357 yards and three touchdowns, adding 33 receptions for 274 yards and a scoring grab.

## 2011

**Round 1a:** Defensive End **Cameron Jordan** – Jordan, now entering his 15th season with the Saints, started all 17 games in 2024, registering 34 tackles (18 solo), four sacks, seven stops for loss, four pass breakups and one interception. Jordan's eight Pro Bowl nods are the most for a defensive player in club history and second overall. His six consecutive selections (2017-22) trail only QB Drew Brees (seven from 2008-2014) and T Willie Roaf (seven from 1994-2000) for first in team record books. He finished the season with 121.5 career sacks and holds the franchise record for takedowns.

This marks New Orleans' first selection in the ninth slot of the first round in team history...Over the last ten drafts, cornerbacks, defensive tackles, offensive

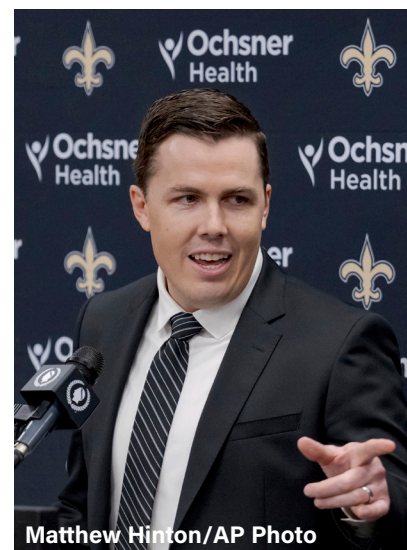


tackles, and wide receivers have each been selected twice with the ninth overall pick...In his rookie season with Chicago, Rome Odunze appeared in 17 games with 12 starts, catching 54 passes for 734 yards (13.6 avg.) and three touchdowns...In his first two seasons with the Eagles, Jalen Carter has been a force on the defensive

line, appearing in 32 games with 16 starts, posting 75 tackles (45 solo), 10.5 sacks, 20 stops for a loss, six pass breakups, four forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Carter has also appeared in five postseason contests with four

starts, recording 11 tackles (four solo), two sacks, three

pass breakups, and one forced fumble. He was named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team (2023), 2024 Pro Bowl Games, and helped lead Philadelphia to capture the Super Bowl LIX title this past season...Charles Cross has started all 48 games he has appeared in at left tackle for Seattle...In four seasons with Denver, Patrick Surtain II has appeared in 66 games with 65 starts, recording 232 tackles (184 solo), 11 interceptions, including two returned for touchdowns, 47 pass breakups, four stops for a loss, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. The Alabama product was named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team in 2021, has been selected to the Pro Bowl each of the last three seasons (2022-24), earned first team *Associated Press* All-Pro honors twice (2022, 24) and was named the 2024 *AP* Defensive Player of the Year...C.J. Henderson has appeared in 49 games with 32 starts for Jacksonville and Carolina (2020-23), recording 172 tackles (139 solo), one sack, six stops for a loss, three interceptions, 16 pass breakups, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery...In six seasons with Buffalo, Ed Oliver has appeared in 92 games with 83 starts, posting 231 tackles (144 solo), 27 sacks, 49 stops for a loss, one interception, seven forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. In 13 postseason games, Oliver has started 11 and recorded 30 tackles (14 solo), two sacks, six stops for a loss, and recovered one fumble. In 2019, he was named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team...Mike McGlinchey has started all 98 games he has played in at right tackle with San Francisco (2018-22) and Denver (2023-), including seven postseason starts



in as many appearances. The Notre Dame product was named to the 2018 PFWA All-Rookie Team...In six seasons with the Bengals (2017-20), Giants (2021) and Eagles (2024), John Ross III appeared in 38 games with 21 starts, catching 63 passes for 963 yards (15.3 avg.) with 11 touchdowns. Ross was a member of the Philadelphia's Super Bowl LIX Championship team... In nine seasons with Chicago (2016-19), Los Angeles Rams (2020-22), Buffalo (2023) and San Francisco (2024), Leonard Floyd has appeared in 138 games with 137 starts, posting 412 tackles (253 solo), 66.5 sacks, 71 stops for a loss, two interceptions, including one returned for a touchdown, 15 pass breakups, five forced fumbles and seven fumble recoveries. Floyd has also started all nine postseason games he has played in, recording 24 tackles (14 solo), five sacks, and one pass breakup. The Georgia product was named to the 2016 PFWA All-Rookie Team and was a member of the Super Bowl LVI Championship team in 2021 with the Rams...In seven seasons with the New York Giants (2015-18), Jacksonville (2018), Washington (2019) and Miami (2020), Ereck Flowers appeared in 105 games with 101 starts, playing left tackle, left guard, and right tackle. Flowers also started one postseason contest with the Giants at left tackle.

This marks New Orleans' seventh selection in the 40th slot of the draft in team history, the last occurring in 2023 when the Saints selected defensive end Isaiah Foskey out of Notre Dame...Over the last ten drafts, wide receivers have been selected four times and defensive backs have been selected three times with the 40th overall pick...At this slot, four straight receivers were selected (2015-18). Since that time, defenders have been selected the last six drafts...In his rookie season with the Eagles, Cooper DeJean played in 16 games with nine starts, posting 50 tackles (37 solo), a half sack, three tackles for loss, six pass breakups, one forced fumble, three fumble recoveries, and one coverage tackle. As the Eagles primary punt returner, DeJean brought back 21 punts for 211 yards (10.0 avg.). In the postseason, the Iowa product started all four games and recorded 18 tackles (12 solo), one interception returned for a touchdown in Super Bowl LIX, four pass breakups, recovered one fumble, and returned nine punts for 53 yards (5.9 avg.) en route to Philadelphia's Super Bowl LIX victory.

DeJean was also named to the 2024 PFWA All-Rookie Team...In two seasons with New Orleans, Isaiah Foskey has appeared in 27 games, posting 17 tackles (seven solo), a half-sack, one pass breakup, and nine special teams stops...In three seasons with the Seahawks, Boye Mafe has played in 48 games with 30 starts, recording 130 tackles (87 solo), 18 sacks, 20 stops for a loss, nine pass breakups, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, and three special teams stops. Mafe has also appeared in one postseason contest with Seattle, posting two solo stops...In four seasons with Atlanta, Richie Grant has played in 67 games with 33 starts, recording 264 tackles (167 solo), three sacks, ten stops for a loss, three interceptions, 17 pass breakups, four forced fumbles, and two fumble recoveries...Across four seasons with the Texans (2020-21), Vikings (2022), Jaguars (2023), and Titans (2023), Ross Blacklock has appeared in 44 games with three starts, recording 40 tackles (27 solo), three sacks, five stops for a loss, two pass breakups, and one forced fumble...In four seasons with the Raiders (2019-21), Cardinals (2022) and Cowboys (2022), Trayvon Mullen has played in 46 games with 31 starts, recording 143 tackles (122 solo), two stops for a loss, four interceptions, 29 pass breakups, one forced fumble, and seven special teams stops...In seven seasons with Denver, Courtland Sutton has played in 98 games with 82 starts, catching 379 passes for

### **1. Tennessee Titans**

#### **Cam Ward, QB, Miami**

Speaking about the No. 1 pick at league meetings two weeks ago, Titans coach Brian Callahan said, "We're open to everything at this point." Tennessee certainly has options, especially if another team calls GM Mike Borgonzi with a massive trade offer. But the Titans don't have a franchise quarterback, and they have a chance to get one in Ward. To win in the NFL, you have to take those opportunities when they present themselves.

I was a fan of Will Levis during the ahead of the 2023 draft. But he has made too many mistakes with the football over the past two seasons (16 INTs and 17 fumbles) to prove he's the guy. It's time to upgrade, and Ward would bring a big arm, an ability to create outside of structure and good accuracy to Nashville.



### **2. Cleveland Browns**

#### **Travis Hunter, WR/CB, Colorado**

I debated Hunter vs. Penn State's Abdul Carter for Cleveland. There's no doubt that slotting Carter opposite Myles Garrett would destroy opponent game plans. But Hunter is a special prospect in so many ways, and he'd check a big box for the Browns -- mainly as a receiver. They have wideout Jerry Jeudy and tight end David Njoku but need more pass-catching talent. Hunter -- my No. 1 overall prospect -- has a "wow" factor to his game, and he could use his speed, ball skills, instincts and elusiveness to become an impact player right out of the gate. He had 96 catches for 1,258 yards and 15 TDs last season.

But there's also the defensive impact of taking Hunter. Cleveland already has playmakers at cornerback in Denzel Ward and Greg Newsome II, but it could still use Hunter in big spots. Have to make a stop at the end of the half? I'd have him on the field.

Drafting Hunter and getting him in the mix on both sides of the ball could really energize this fan base.



### 3. New York Giants

#### **Abdul Carter, OLB, Penn State**

Even after signing Russell Wilson and Jameis Winston, the Giants have been linked to Colorado quarterback Shedeur Sanders. I'm not ruling it out. Neither Wilson nor Winston is a long-term answer. However, the additions mean the Giants can at least toy with passing on the quarterbacks in Round 1 in favor of one of the class's top two prospects. Travis Hunter is off the board, but Carter would take this New York defense to new heights.

In his first season as a full-time edge rusher (after playing primarily off-ball linebacker in past years), Carter had 12 sacks and 23.5 total tackles for loss. I see elite traits on the tape. And considering the Giants have holes all over their roster, they might opt for the best player on the board. They'd have something with Carter, Brian Burns, Kayvon Thibodeaux and Dexter Lawrence II up front.



### 4. New England Patriots

#### **Will Campbell, OT, LSU**

With Travis Hunter and Abdul Carter unavailable, the Patriots could listen to trade offers in case a quarterback-needy team wanted to jump on Shedeur Sanders. I'm not projecting trades here, but even if I were, there's a good chance New England might just stand pat and take Campbell. The Patriots allowed pressure on a league-worst 39.4% of their dropbacks last season, and Drake Maye is entering his first full season as the starting quarterback. They have to be better in pass protection.

Campbell would slide in at left tackle. I'm not overly worried about his 32<sup>5</sup>/<sub>8</sub>-inch arms; he plays longer than that. Campbell can land a quick first punch and use his great overall technique and agility to keep pass rushers at bay. He has 38 games of experience, and pairing him with new right tackle Morgan Moses would buy Maye more time in the pocket.

### **5. Jacksonville Jaguars,**

#### **Mason Graham, DT, Michigan**

I'm out of things to say about Graham to Jacksonville -- I've projected this match in all four of my mock drafts. New coach Liam Coen might want offensive playmakers for Trevor Lawrence, but the Jaguars have a chance to finally get a pocket-pushing disruptor for the middle of the defensive line.

With great power and quickness, Graham can get into the backfield to create interior pressure on quarterbacks and drop running backs behind the line of scrimmage. He had 3.5 sacks and 14 run stops last season. With Josh Hines-Allen and Travon Walker collapsing the pocket on either side, Graham could have an immediate impact. And the Jaguars -- who ranked 31st in yards allowed per play in 2024 (5.9) -- could use all the help they can get.



### **6. Las Vegas Raiders**

#### **Ashton Jeanty, RB, Boise State**

Last in rushing yards per game at 79.8. Last in yards per rush at 3.6. Tied for the second-fewest runs of 10 or more yards with 34. That's what Las Vegas produced on the ground last season. New coach Pete Carroll is going to want much more out of his run game, and Jeanty could immediately flip the script. He displayed excellent speed, contact balance and vision en route to 2,601 rushing yards last season. He could be an elite three-down back in the NFL.

Maybe add another receiver on Day 2 of the draft, and this would suddenly be a very interesting offense with Jeanty, Geno Smith, Brock Bowers and Jakobi Meyers.

### 7. New York Jets

#### **Armand Membou, OT, Missouri**

Membou is powerful and quick, and he started 30 games at right tackle in college. It would make a lot of sense for the Jets to pop him into the lineup there, with 2024 first-rounder Olu Fashanu manning the left side. They signed quarterback Justin Fields, who has the league's second-highest sack rate since being drafted in 2021 (10.5%). For this to work, the offensive line has to be good.

I considered Penn State tight end Tyler Warren here. He can line up all over the offense and give Fields a reliable outlet when the pressure does come. Once the ball is in his hands, he'd pick up chunks of yardage. But I don't think New York is going to ignore the O-line.



### 8. Carolina Panthers

#### **Jalon Walker, LB, Georgia**

No change on my Panthers pick projection, as this makes it four mock drafts in a row for Walker to Carolina. He's an explosive defender with bend and versatility. I like him at off-ball linebacker -- he'd make plays all over the field for the Panthers with sideline-to-sideline speed. But he could absolutely rush off the edge, too; he had 6.5 sacks last season.

This Carolina defense was the worst in the NFL in yards allowed per play (6.0), yards allowed per rush (5.2), opponent QBR (64.8), points allowed per game (31.4) and opponent third-down rate (50.2%) last season. Walker would help no matter where he lines up.

### 9. New Orleans Saints

#### **Shedeur Sanders, QB, Colorado**

If Sanders doesn't go to the Giants, there aren't many clear landing spots for him in the top 10 ... and he could slide. I could see a team trading up for him -- maybe even the Saints, who have nine picks -- but most of these rosters are already set at quarterback. This is a great outcome for New Orleans, though. I like this match a lot.

Sanders is my top-ranked quarterback, and his accuracy jumps off the tape. He completed 74% of his throws last season despite being under constant pressure. Playing in the NFC South with good weather and a few indoor stadiums would ease any arm strength concerns. And he wouldn't be forced to play right away. Derek Carr, 34, will be with the Saints for at least another season; Sanders could learn behind him before taking over.



### 10. Chicago Bears

#### **Tyler Warren, TE, Penn State**

Offseason moves to add interior offensive linemen Joe Thuney, Jonah Jackson and Drew Dalman should buy Caleb Williams more time to throw. Landing Warren would give the second-year quarterback another reliable target. New Bears coach Ben Johnson could line up Warren anywhere, get him the ball and let him roll to first downs after the catch. The versatile tight end had 1,233 receiving yards last season, and 700 of them came once the ball was in his hands.

Chicago got only 512 total yards out of its tight end room in 2024, but the combination of Warren and Cole Kmet could do some damage.

### 11. San Francisco 49ers

#### **Will Johnson, CB, Michigan**

There's well-documented roster turnover in San Francisco right now, and Charvarius Ward is among the departures. Renardo Green has one of the outside starting spots, but what will the 49ers do at the other? Could slot guy Deommodore Lenoir move outside? Will new signee Tre Brown earn the role (and stay healthy)? Or could this be a golden chance to land a potential shutdown CB1 in Johnson?

Johnson missed time last season with a toe injury, and he slid from the top five to No. 12 overall on my Big Board. But the talent is undeniable. He's big -- 6-foot-2 -- and his instincts and ball skills show up in the box scores. He had nine interceptions over his Michigan career, including two pick-sixes last season. The 49ers had 11 total INTs a year ago (tied for 19th).



### 12. Dallas Cowboys

#### **Omarion Hampton, RB, North Carolina**

I was torn here, as I think Dallas will look at all offensive playmakers. It needs a difference-making WR2 to take some of the load off CeeDee Lamb. But I'm not sure Texas' Matthew Golden or Arizona's Tetairoa McMillan will go quite this early.

Instead, I see the Cowboys trying to improve the run game, which managed 4.0 yards per carry and a league-low six TDs last season. They have thus far replaced Rico Dowdle with Javonte Williams and Miles Sanders. Neither new back has the home run ability of Hampton, who can scoot through holes and take off despite his 221-pound build. I've never been an advocate of the first-round running back, but team owner Jerry Jones isn't afraid to address the position on Day 1.

### 13. Miami Dolphins

#### **Jahdae Barron, CB, Texas**

Terron Armstead's retirement makes this interesting. The Dolphins ranked 28th in pass block win rate last season (55.7%), and protecting quarterback Tua Tagovailoa is paramount. Texas' Kelvin Banks Jr. could fit. But Miami also drafted Patrick Paul late in the second round last April, and he has spent a year learning behind Armstead. The Dolphins could start Paul and use this pick to clean up the CB2 spot opposite Jalen Ramsey, where either Storm Duck, Cam Smith or Ethan Bonner is currently slated to start.

Barron would jump to the front of the line. His ball skills (five INTs in 2024), speed and versatility would boost the unit.



### 14. Indianapolis Colts

#### **Colston Loveland, TE, Michigan**

The Colts had arguably the NFL's worst tight end production last season, with their group combining for 39 catches, 467 yards and two TDs. They also lost Kylen Granson (Eagles) and Mo Alie-Cox (unsigned) and haven't addressed the position. In an enormous make-or-break year for Anthony Richardson (and/or possibly Daniel Jones), Indy has to get more playmakers in its offense. Loveland has the seam-stretching ability to make plays down the field, and he has the 6-foot-6 size to post up in the red zone.

Receiver is the other position that stands out, but I went with Loveland as the better value (No. 11 on my board). Here's an interesting note from ESPN Research off that decision: This would be the first time since 2006 that multiple running backs and multiple tight ends were selected before a second wide receiver went off the board.

### 15. Atlanta Falcons

**Mike Green, OLB, Marshall**

It almost seems too simple. Atlanta had the second-fewest sacks in the NFL last season (31). Green had the most sacks in the FBS (17). Suddenly, there'd be some optimism around the pass rush, with Green and free agent signing Leonard Floyd flying in off the edge. Green mixes in speed and power to keep offensive tackles on their heels, and his ability to stop the run means coach Raheem Morris could keep him on the field no matter the situation. If things play out this way, he'd be the second-highest drafted Marshall player in the common draft era (Byron Leftwich went seventh in 2003).



### 16. Arizona Cardinals

**Matthew Golden, WR, Texas**

Despite using the No. 4 pick on receiver Marvin Harrison Jr. last year, the Cardinals' 2024 offense leaned on its explosive run game. If Arizona can find another top-tier pass catcher to help the aerial game catch up, this offense would be hard to stop. Golden is a great route runner, and he has 4.29 speed to run underneath some Kyler Murray deep balls. He had 58 catches for 987 yards and nine TDs last season, and he'd give the Cards a solid 1-2-3 punch in Harrison, Golden and tight end Trey McBride.



### 17. Cincinnati Bengals

**Jihaad Campbell, LB, Alabama**

The Bengals spent big money this offseason to keep their offensive core around for the long term, and now it's time to turn the focus to the other side of the ball. What happens with Trey Hendrickson looms large. If he does end up getting traded after requesting a move, Cincinnati certainly has to look at the pass rushers on the board. I could see Texas A&M's Shemar Stewart fitting, but his lack of production might scare off teams this early.

I'm going to wait until we know more about Hendrickson's future and instead go with Campbell, who is a complete football player. Look at this stat line from 2024: 112 tackles, 5 sacks, 11.5 tackles for loss, 16 pressures, 12 run stops, 1 interception, 4 pass breakups and 2 forced fumbles. And remember that Germaine Pratt, the Bengals' starting middle linebacker, *a*lso requested a trade this offseason.



### **18. Seattle Seahawks**

#### **Kelvin Banks Jr., OT, Texas**

Banks gave up three sacks over 42 career starts at left tackle for the Longhorns. He's agile for 6-foot-5 and 315 pounds, and he has some pop. The Seahawks have Charles Cross at left tackle, so Banks would help elsewhere on this lackluster offensive line. Right tackle Abraham Lucas has played in just 13 games over the past two seasons. The guard spots are both issues. Banks could fit in at any of those spots.

New quarterback Sam Darnold ranked seventh in the NFL in QBR when he had a clean pocket in Minnesota last season (74.5). Facing pressure, he was 22nd (23.4). So it's pretty clear Seattle has to address the pass protection to maximize the Darnold signing.



### **19. Tampa Bay Buccaneers**

#### **Nick Emmanwori, S, South Carolina**

Good luck throwing downfield on Tampa Bay with Emmanwori and Antoine Winfield Jr. locking down the third level. Emmanwori is a baller. He has the traits to make plays, picking off four passes last season. He has the speed and explosiveness to drive on the ball, running a 4.38-second 40-yard dash and jumping a ridiculous 43 inches in the vertical at the combine. And he has the 6-foot-3, 220-pound size to outmuscle receivers and hang with tight ends.

The Bucs gave up 54 passing plays of 20 or more yards last season, eighth most in the NFL. Adding Emmanwori would help contain some of those big plays.

### 20. Denver Broncos

#### **Tetairoa McMillan, WR, Arizona**

This is one of the teams to watch for running backs, but Ashton Jeanty and Omarion Hampton are both gone. I think the Broncos could -- spoiler -- wait until Day 2 and still get a legit starter. The other major way to help quarterback Bo Nix take the next step in Year 2 would be getting him another playmaking receiver. McMillan dominated in college, with 3,423 yards and 26 touchdown receptions over three seasons. He isn't a blazer, but he can make tough catches with his body control and sure hands.

Consider this, too: Nix threw 22 red zone touchdown passes last season, tied for sixth in the NFL. Now there's a chance he'd be throwing jump balls in the end zone to Courtland Sutton (6-foot-4), Evan Engram (6-foot-3) and McMillan (6-foot-4)? Look out, AFC West pass defenses.



### 21. Pittsburgh Steelers

#### **Derrick Harmon, DT, Oregon**

Harmon is a constant headache for opponents. He had five sacks and 35 pressures as an interior pass rusher last season, and he took care of business in the run game with 11 stops and 10 tackles for loss. Keeanu Benton and Harmon would be a good pairing inside.

I originally had Ole Miss quarterback Jaxson Dart to Pittsburgh. He throws with accuracy and velocity, and he'd be a potential short- and long-term answer. We're all still waiting to see what happens with Aaron Rodgers, so I'll hold off on any quarterback moves for the Steelers until we know a little more.

### 22. Los Angeles Chargers

#### **Grey Zabel, G/C, North Dakota State**

Los Angeles would love for one of the top three receivers or top two tight ends to be sitting there when it is on the clock. And there's a chance the Chargers reach slightly for someone like Emeka Egbuka (Ohio State) or Luther Burden III (Missouri). I lean toward a better value move: Pick an impact lineman for the run game now, and wait until Day 2 for a deep pool of playmakers. Zabel played all over in college, with starts at both tackle positions and both guard spots. He's a tone-setter who drives defenders off the ball, and he could help open rush lanes at left guard.

Per ESPN Research, Zabel would join Trevor Penning (2022) and Lester Holmes (1993) as the only non-FBS offensive linemen selected in the top 22 picks since the 1978 FBS/FCS split.



### 23. Green Bay Packers

#### **Mykel Williams, OLB, Georgia**

The Packers had 45 sacks last season (tied for eighth), but that's a little misleading. They were really good at converting pressure into sacks, but they got pressure only 29.8% of the time (22nd). Williams was hindered by an ankle injury in 2024, which kept him to five sacks over 12 games. But he has the explosive traits to be an extremely effective edge rusher. Other spots of interest would be receiver and cornerback, so expect Green Bay to take a look at guys like Emeka Egbuka or Kentucky corner Maxwell Hairston, too.



### 24. Minnesota Vikings

#### **Donovan Jackson, G, Ohio State**

Minnesota signed guard Will Fries and center Ryan Kelly away from the Colts. It's a big improvement on the interior offensive line. Let's take it a step further. Jackson would replace Blake Brandel at the other guard spot, and he has the versatility to kick outside

if needed. He did so this past season when Josh Simmons got hurt for Ohio State. That seems relevant given left tackle Christian Darrisaw is recovering from a left knee injury. Jackson is a plug-and-play interior blocker with great agility and technique; he allowed four sacks over 40 career starts.

The Vikings do not have a second-round pick, but they could find a solid cornerback at the end of Round 3.



### **25. Houston Texans**

#### **Josh Conerly Jr., OT, Oregon**

The pass protection really hurt C.J. Stroud and the Houston offense last season. He was sacked 52 times. The Texans began an overhaul of the offensive line this offseason -- including trading away left tackle Laremy Tunsil, the unit's one sure thing. They can't risk wasting another year of Stroud's rookie contract by forcing him to constantly fend for himself against opponent pass rushes. Houston signed Cam Robinson and Trent Brown, but it shouldn't be satisfied. Conerly is consistent, allowing just two sacks over his college career. He'd help keep Stroud clean in the pocket.



### **26. Los Angeles Rams**

#### **Jaxson Dart, QB, Ole Miss**

I love this pick because of the potential. Rams coach Sean McVay could develop Dart into a legit future starter. Of course, I say "future" because Matthew Stafford's contract restructure keeps him in Los Angeles for at least another season. But he's 37 years old, and the Rams have to make plans for 2026 and beyond. Dart can hit receivers' strike zones on a rope, and his ability to throw on the run is fun to watch. He had 4,279 passing yards, 29 TD throws and six interceptions last season. And this pick would bring him back to the West Coast -- Dart spent 2021 at USC before transferring to Ole Miss.

Given a season to learn under Stafford and transition to the NFL game after playing in Lane Kiffin's RPO-happy offense, Dart has a high ceiling in the pros.

### 27. Baltimore Ravens

#### **Malaki Starks, S, Georgia**

Starks does a little bit of everything on the back end. He can step up into the box and stop the run. He can drop over the slot in coverage. And he can patrol center field with his closing speed. Baltimore was burned by big plays last season (58 opponent plays went for 20 or more yards, third most in the NFL). The Ravens tried a few different players at the safety spot next to Kyle Hamilton, and the midseason switch to Ar'Darius Washington helped. But Starks would be a real difference-maker.

This is a good roster with legit Super Bowl aspirations, and GM Eric DeCosta can't let chunk plays undo them.



### 28. Detroit Lions

#### **Donovan Ezeiruaku, OLB, Boston College**

The Lions' defense was hammered by injuries last season. Even before the injured reserve started filling up, though, the edge rush depth chart was concerning. Aidan Hutchinson -- who is coming off a leg injury -- needs a running mate. The only other Detroit edge rusher with more than three sacks last season was Za'Darius Smith (four), who was acquired at midseason and released this spring.

Ezeiruaku jumped to No. 21 in my recent Big Board update, meaning he'd not only take care of that pass rush need but also do so at value. His 65 pressures led the FBS last season, and he turned them into 16.5 sacks.



### 29. Washington Commanders

#### **Shemar Stewart, DE, Texas A&M**

Stewart's draft stock is hard to predict. As I mentioned earlier, I considered him for Cincinnati at No. 17. He comes off the board here, 12 spots later. It's the same dilemma that GMs will be struggling with on draft night. Stewart has all the talent in the world --

speed, explosiveness and power. But he also had 4.5 sacks over three seasons. If an NFL coaching staff can help him put it all together, the upside is immense. I'm betting on Commanders coach Dan Quinn unlocking that potential. Dante Fowler Jr.'s departure in free agency means there's a hole opposite Dorance Armstrong on the D-line.



### **30. Buffalo Bills**

#### **Maxwell Hairston, CB, Kentucky**

Teams were able to throw against Buffalo last season, completing 68.5% of their passes into coverage. That was fifth worst in the league, and worst among playoff teams. Rasul Douglas is unsigned, and his outside corner spot opposite Christian Benford is currently held by new addition Dane Jackson. More depth is needed.

Hairston can fly. He ran a 4.28-second 40-yard dash at the combine, the fastest time at the event this year. And he has the hands to make plays, with six picks over the past two seasons.



### **31. Kansas City Chiefs**

#### **Josh Simmons, OT, Ohio State**

If Simmons didn't injure his knee last October, we might not be having this conversation -- because his projection might be closer to the top 10. He has really good footwork and power, and he gave up just one sack over 19 career starts at left tackle. Heck, he hadn't given up a single *pressure* in six games before the injury last season. That's the kind of pass protection the Chiefs need.

Kansas City tried Wanya Morris and Kingsley Suamataia at left tackle, but neither held up well. It kicked guard Joe Thuney outside, but he's in Chicago now. The Chiefs have to find a legitimate answer, and while they signed Jaylon Moore to be that, it's no sure thing. He was a backup in San Francisco.

### 32. Philadelphia Eagles

#### **James Pearce Jr., OLB, Tennessee**

The defending Super Bowl champs lost some key parts of their defense in free agency, including edge rusher Josh Sweat. Being able to get after the quarterback is important for Vic Fangio's defense, and there's a glaring void now on the edge. There are mixed opinions around the league on whether Pearce is a first-rounder, but he has the traits to develop into a speedy disruptor in the right system. He had 17.5 sacks over the past two seasons and ranked second in the nation in pressure rate last season (19.0%).

### 1. Tennessee Titans

#### **Cam Ward, QB, Miami**

Absent a "Godfather"-style trade offer -- one the Titans cannot refuse -- I fully expect Tennessee to take Ward and build this franchise around him. He had an incredible 2024 season in which he led the FBS in passing touchdowns with 39, and he's the best innovator in the quarterback class when the play breaks down. While this group of quarterbacks does not stack up to last year's elite class, the majority of evaluators I've spoken with view Ward as the clear-cut top signal-caller and worthy of the first pick.

The Titans still have Will Levis, but after the team finished 31st in QBR (37.3) and threw the second-most interceptions (21) in 2024, it will be looking for an upgrade.



### 2. Cleveland Browns

#### **Abdul Carter, Edge, Penn State**

The Browns haven't frequently been linked to the top quarterbacks, which indicates they are likely more focused on choosing between Carter and Colorado receiver/cornerback Travis Hunter. They did trade for Kenny Pickett and -- spoiler! -- can find another quarterback option later in the draft with Deshaun Watson out (re-torn Achilles).

While Hunter is my top prospect, Carter isn't far behind. And putting him opposite Myles Garrett would form perhaps the scariest pass-rush duo in the NFL. Carter had 12 sacks last season and looked unstoppable despite playing through a shoulder injury down the stretch.

### 3. New York Giants

#### **Shedeur Sanders, QB, Colorado**

Despite the Giants' signings of Russell Wilson and Jameis Winston, I just don't buy them passing on Sanders. If the team is bullish on Sanders being its franchise quarterback, the veteran signings are irrelevant. This would be a move about the future and stability. Sanders throws with pristine accuracy and touch -- he passed for 4,134 yards and completed 74% of his throws last season -- but he must improve his urgency under duress.

With Wilson and Winston sharing the QB room with him, Sanders could learn and keep developing without the pressure of being immediately thrown into the QB1 role.



### 4. New England Patriots

#### **Travis Hunter, WR/CB, Colorado**

The Patriots are likely rooting for two quarterbacks to go ahead of their pick. That would mean either Carter or Hunter would be available to them at No. 4, and either player could be a building block for New England. Hunter would change the dimensions of this offense if slotted alongside newly acquired Stefon Diggs. He is a natural playmaker with elite ball skills, catching 96 passes for 1,258 yards and 15 scores last season. And he could even be used as a part-time cornerback on the other side of the ball, with Christian Gonzalez and Carlton Davis III as the two full-time starters.



### 5. Jacksonville Jaguars,

#### **Mason Graham, DT, Michigan**

Jacksonville has big needs up front on defense that are too hard to ignore with this pick, and Graham would immediately reshape the complexion of both the pass rush and the run defense. He racked up 26 pressures and 14 run stops last season. The Jaguars, meanwhile, allowed the second-most yards (389.9 per game) and fifth-most points (25.6

per game) in the NFL last season. Lined up between edge rushers Josh Hines-Allen and Travon Walker, Graham would help this defense get back on track.



### **6. Las Vegas Raiders**

#### **Ashton Jeanty, RB, Miami**

The Raiders have a thin running back room (Raheem Mostert is listed atop the depth chart) and will almost assuredly address the position in the draft. They averaged 3.6 yards per carry and 79.8 per game last season, both bottom of the league. New coach Pete Carroll has historically relied on the running game, so Jeanty is an easy match.

I believe Jeanty has the best chance of any player in the class to be a Pro Bowler in Year 1. His rare blend of power, contact balance, explosion and pass-catching ability can keep him on the field for any situation. He could post big numbers in Las Vegas after rushing for 2,601 yards in his final season at Boise State.



### **7. New York Jets**

#### **Armand Membou, OT, Missouri**

The free agent signing of Justin Fields means the Jets have a quarterback solution for at least 2025. But the loss of Morgan Moses in free agency means they have a hole at right tackle. New York already had pass-protection issues, finishing 23rd in pass block win rate last season (57.1%).

Membou had a meteoric rise in 2024, as the 20-year-old dominated in the SEC with tenacity, elite movement skills and pass protection proficiency. He can be a tone-setter up front, joining Olu Fashanu to give New York a pair of talented young OTs.



### **8. Carolina Panthers**

#### **Jalon Walker, EDGE/LB, Georgia**

The Panthers have made a series of edge rusher investments over the past two years, but none has massively moved the needle. The Panthers -- who allowed the most yards

per play (6.0) and tied for the third-fewest sacks (32) last season -- could truly address their need in the top 10, though.

Walker had 6.5 sacks in 2024 even though he spent a lot of his time patrolling the middle of the field at off-ball linebacker. Carolina could deploy Walker in a hybrid role since it needs a boost at both linebacker and edge rusher.



### **9. New Orleans Saints**

**Shemar Stewart, EDGE, Texas A&M**

I've said this about Stewart throughout the predraft process: The general manager who uses a high pick on him will need a lot of cachet. Stewart is a risky pick with exactly 1.5 sacks in each of his three collegiate seasons. Mickey Loomis fits that GM bill perfectly, though, and the Saints haven't been afraid of taking toolsy pass rushers in the first round in the past (including Payton Turner in 2021 and Marcus Davenport in 2018). This would be the ultimate big swing given Stewart's upside at the position. I see acceleration and power when I watch him play.



### **10. Chicago Bears**

**Will Campbell, OT, LSU**

I'm pretty bullish on Campbell as a prospect. Despite concerns about his 32 $\frac{5}{8}$ -inch arm length, he ranks fifth on my board. And in this scenario, I'm not super focused on whether he would ultimately play tackle or slide inside to guard. The Bears' starting five is already much better on paper after a busy free agency, and Campbell could play wherever he's needed.

New coach Ben Johnson would love a player like Campbell, whose elite foot quickness and pass-protection ability fit great in his system. The Bears will likely feature plenty of zone rushing schemes in 2025.

### 11. San Francisco 49ers

#### **Walter Nolen, DT, Ole Miss**

The 49ers have major work to do along the defensive line and perhaps a few other spots after losing multiple starters on both sides of the ball this offseason. Nolen would be a play-wrecker for them. He is overwhelmingly powerful and explosive, and he could help replace veterans Maliek Collins and Javon Hargrave. Nolen had 6.5 sacks in his lone season at Ole Miss after two years at Texas A&M. In a league that has put an increased premium on pass-rushing defensive tackles, he would provide San Francisco with a valuable building block.



### 12. Dallas Cowboys

#### **Tetairoa McMillan, WR, Arizona**

Some evaluators are dubious of using an early pick on a wide receiver with somewhat pedestrian speed -- scouts I spoke to timed McMillan in the high 4.5s in the 40-yard dash at his pro day -- but I'm a true believer in the T-Mac camp. At 6-foot-4 and 219 pounds, he is a nightmare assignment for a cornerback in man-to-man coverage. Plus, he has outstanding ball skills and a catch radius that makes quarterbacks want to target him in the red zone. Over the past two seasons, McMillan compiled 2,721 yards.

He'd give Dak Prescott the second top-end receiver that Dallas has long been seeking opposite CeeDee Lamb.



### 13. Miami Dolphins

#### **Will Johnson, CB, Michigan**

I know the Dolphins must address their interior offensive line, but cornerback should not be overlooked. There is a big hole at CB2 in Miami opposite Jalen Ramsey, with Storm Duck and Cam Smith currently listed as options to start. Johnson has strong ball skills (nine career interceptions, including two pick-sixes in just six games last season) to pair

with his great 6-foot-2 size. While there are some questions about his top-end speed, he's a good example of a prospect who has enough tools to overcome any potential limitations.



### **14. Indianapolis Colts**

**Tyler Warren, TE, Penn State**

The Colts have not had a tight end reach 500 receiving yards in a single season since 2018, and none of their tight ends reached even 200 last season. So it's safe to say Indy needs to beef up that position. Enter Warren, who crossed the 200-yard threshold *on the ground* and had 700 of his 1,233 receiving yards come after the catch last season. He chews up extra yardage with a combination of power, tenacity and quickness that is tough to imagine from a player of his 6-foot-6, 256-pound size.



### **15. Atlanta Falcons**

**Mike Green, EDGE, Marshall**

With the second-fewest sacks of any team in the NFL last season (31), Atlanta needs to make major strides in its pass rush if it wants any chance at a meaningful playoff run. While the Falcons will return 2024 third-round pick Bralen Trice (knee) and signed Leonard Floyd, Green -- who led the FBS with 17 sacks in 2024 -- would go a long way in boosting their defensive line. He has an advanced arsenal of rush moves and plays with power. He is a willing and stout run defender, as well.



### **16. Arizona Cardinals**

**Kelvin Banks Jr., OT, Texas**

Arizona has an interesting offensive line arrangement, as Paris Johnson Jr. started his career at right tackle before switching to left tackle this past season. In the long term, this pick would allow the Cardinals to move Johnson back to the right side and slot in Banks at left tackle. Banks started three full seasons on the left side at Texas, showing

a good combination of size (6-foot-5, 315 pounds), nimble feet and pass-protection acumen. He allowed pressure on just 0.8% of his pass-block snaps in 2024, which tied for third best in the FBS among offensive tackles.



### **17. Cincinnati Bengals**

#### **Grey Zabel, G/C, North Dakota State**

While it is no mystery that the Bengals must attack defense in this draft, there's one notable offensive position that is still a big problem: guard. Consider that 64 guards qualified in pass block win rate last season, and Cordell Volson and Alex Cappa -- the Bengals' two starters -- were 61st and 64th, respectively. (Cappa was released.)

Zabel has had an outstanding predraft process. He was the best player I saw at Senior Bowl practices, proving he can dominate against top competition after starting 41 games at the FCS level. Plus, teams believe he has the positional versatility to play guard or center in the NFL, and he is always in control as a pass protector.



### **18. Seattle Seahawks**

#### **Matthew Golden, WR, Texas**

Following their trade of DK Metcalf and release of Tyler Lockett, the Seahawks have made small strides to retool their receiving room beyond Jaxon Smith-Njigba. Cooper Kupp was the headline acquisition, and Marquez Valdes-Scantling will be an occasional deep threat for Sam Darnold. But the room is far from complete. Golden ran the fastest 40-yard dash of any offensive player at the combine (4.29 seconds), and that speed pops on his tape. He also explodes in and out of his breaks, which helped him tally 987 receiving yards and nine TD catches in 2024.

For those wondering how Seattle could possibly bypass the interior offensive line: With Zabel off the board one pick earlier, I'm just not sure the Seahawks would reach for Ohio State's Donovan Jackson or Alabama's Tyler Booker.

### 19. Tampa Bay Buccaneers

#### **Malaki Starks, S, Georgia**

Tampa Bay allowed the fourth-most passing yards per game last season (243.9) and desperately needs a partner for All-Pro safety Antoine Winfield Jr. at the third level of the defense. Starks was not as impactful this past season as he was in 2023 (one INT, down from three), but the high-end skill set is still there. Starks is a versatile, instinctive safety who is willing to help in any phase of the defense. He had plenty of snaps at Georgia covering the deep portion of the field, hovering over the slot and even walking down into the box.



### 20. Denver Broncos

#### **Omarion Hampton, RB, North Carolina**

The Broncos opted for a committee approach at running back last season, mixing in Javonte Williams, Jaleel McLaughlin and Audric Esteime. It resulted in a pedestrian run game behind an excellent offensive line. I see Hampton as a legitimate three-down back for coach Sean Payton. Hampton had back-to-back seasons with 1,500-plus rushing yards and can be a factor in the passing game (67 catches over the past two seasons). He ran a 4.46-second 40 at 221 pounds at the combine, too.



### 21. Pittsburgh Steelers

#### **Jaxson Dart, QB, Ole Miss**

While it seems the Steelers are the most likely landing spot for Aaron Rodgers, signing him would not preclude them from looking toward the future at quarterback. Rodgers is 41 years old, and each coming season is a true year-to-year proposition. But Pittsburgh hasn't even signed Rodgers yet, meaning Mason Rudolph is the current QB1. Let's lock up another signal-caller for the Steelers here.

Dart broke Eli Manning's school record at Ole Miss for passing yards (4,279) and led the FBS in yards per attempt (10.8) in 2024. He has good mobility and accuracy, throwing 52 touchdowns and 11 interceptions over the past two seasons.



### **22. Los Angeles Chargers**

#### **Colston Loveland, TE, Michigan**

This is a common projection in part because it would reunite Loveland with his former college coach Jim Harbaugh, but the fit really does make sense for the Chargers. Los Angeles lacked a movable matchup player at tight end in 2024, and Loveland is exactly that. At 6-foot-6 and 248 pounds, he is too big for defensive backs to cover, but he's also faster than most linebackers with his seam-stretching speed and nifty route running.



### **23. Green Bay Packers**

#### **Mykel Williams, EDGE, Georgia**

The Packers had the second-highest percentage of snaps in zone defense last season (70.7%), which has more to do with their personnel limitations than coordinator Jeff Hafley's scheme preference. Teams can play more man coverage when they have a dominant pass rusher or a shutdown corner. The latter could be the move here, with guys like Texas' Jahdae Barron and Kentucky's Maxwell Hairston on the board. But let's go with Williams, who posted 14 sacks over three years at Georgia.

He has the 6-foot-5, 260-pound frame and 34<sup>3</sup>/<sub>8</sub>-inch arm length to get into the chest of blockers and swat passes at the line of scrimmage. He's coming off an ankle injury that limited him in 2024, and I think major improvement is ahead for the 20-year-old.



### **24. Minnesota Vikings**

#### **Jahdae Barron, CB, Texas**

Minnesota spent big to upgrade its defensive interior, but it also has to ensure its secondary does not drop off too much in 2025. The cornerback room lost Stephon

Gilmore and Shaquill Griffin, and Byron Murphy Jr. -- who returned on a new deal -- is a better fit in the slot. Barron could claim one of the starting outside spots. He is one of the most instinctive players in the entire class, showing an ability to find the football from any alignment. His versatility would surely appeal to defensive coordinator Brian Flores, and he posted five interceptions and 10 pass breakups in 2024.



### **25. Houston Texans**

#### **Donovan Jackson, G, Ohio State**

Houston would continue its offensive upheaval with the addition of Jackson, who just cracks my top 20 prospects. He was a stalwart for multiple seasons at guard for Ohio State before kicking out to left tackle in October when Josh Simmons went down with a knee injury. Jackson immediately became comfortable in the position and was outstanding throughout the Buckeyes' national championship run. His best spot is still at guard, but he has invaluable positional flex to go along with power and toughness.



### **26. Los Angeles Rams**

#### **Maxwell Hairston, CB, Kentucky**

Hairston would bring natural man coverage skills and rare speed to the Rams. His 4.28-second 40-yard dash was the fastest at the combine among all players. And Hairston's speed makes it difficult for receivers to challenge him downfield because he can still catch up even if he loses them at the line of scrimmage. He also has a playmaker mentality that led to an SEC-best five interceptions in 2023, two of which were returned for touchdowns in the same game.



### **27. Baltimore Ravens**

#### **James Pearce Jr., EDGE, Tennessee**

With the Ravens looking for more pass-rush juice, Pearce's wait ends here. He entered this past season as a potential top-10 pick and has some of the most effortless

movement skills of any pass rusher in this class. He ran a 4.47-second 40 and can really bend the edge, too. But his lack of consistency last season resulted in a stock drop. The Ravens could capitalize by landing Pearce and his considerable upside late in the first round.



### **28. Detroit Lions**

#### **Derrick Harmon, DT, Oregon**

Injuries befell the Detroit defense down the stretch last season, and some of them will linger into this upcoming season -- including stalwart defensive tackle Alim McNeill's torn ACL. Harmon could help fill that hole after his breakthrough 2024 season. His 34 pressures in his lone year with the Ducks were by far the most of any FBS defensive tackle. He has the length, power at the point of attack and pursuit speed as a rusher to make a difference.



### **29. Washington Commanders**

#### **Nick Emmanwori, S, South Carolina**

The Commanders added veteran defensive back Will Harris in free agency to replace Jeremy Chinn, but Emmanwori could have some appeal to their defensive staff, given Dan Quinn's history of using safeties in creative ways. Emmanwori's physical tools are off the charts; he ran a 4.38 in the 40 at the combine despite weighing 220 pounds. He also jumped 43 inches in the vertical. Emmanwori is a menace with the football in his hands and took two of his four interceptions to the house last season.



### **30. New England Patriots (via BUF)**

#### **Josh Conerly Jr., OT, Oregon**

Our first trade -- and it's an intriguing interdivisional move. The Patriots went with the best player available at No. 4, but that meant bypassing arguably their biggest roster hole. They can rectify that by getting back into the first round for another Day 1 pick. Meanwhile, Bills general manager Brandon Beane can slide down to acquire extra draft

capital, similar to what he did in 2024. I have the Patriots trading a second-rounder (No. 38) and a third-rounder (No. 77) to the Bills for No. 30 and a fourth-rounder (No. 109).

Despite a fruitful free agency, the Patriots could still use better protection and more playmakers around quarterback Drake Maye. They had the second-worst pass block win rate last season (50.9%). Those needs and a steady supply of draft capital might embolden them to move up for Conerly, an ever-steady left tackle who had an excellent 2024 season. He allowed one sack over 14 starts. The Patriots can make this trade to get ahead of Kansas City and Cleveland, who could both be interested in the tackle market.



### **31. Las Vegas Raiders (via KC)**

#### **Luther Burden III, WR, Missouri**

Wide receiver is high on the Raiders' needs list. The value wasn't there at No. 6, as we instead went with Jeanty. But considering Jakobi Meyers was the only Las Vegas receiver over 600 yards last season, it makes sense for the Raiders to surge back into the first round to take the extremely talented Burden. He was dominant in 2023, when he had 1,212 receiving yards, including 710 after the catch. He had a modest 2024 (676 yards), but his explosiveness and power with the ball in his hands give him game-changing ability.



### **32. Philadelphia Eagles**

#### **Jihaad Campbell, LB, Alabama**

It hurts me to see Campbell have to wait this long; he's the final prospect on the board who ranks in my top 25. But after recent left shoulder surgery, his health outlook for the start of his career is less clear. But this would be a classic example of the Eagles pouncing on a talented player who fell due to circumstance. Philly struck gold with a no-risk signing of Zack Baun last offseason, and the idea of a linebacker trio eventually composed of Baun, Nakobe Dean (knee) and Campbell is exciting. Campbell had 112 tackles, 11.5 tackles for loss, 5 sacks and an interception last season.

### **1. Tennessee Titans**

#### **Cam Ward, QB, Miami**

I've heard since bowl season from folks inside the Miami program that the New York Giants love Ward, but the Titans have a big need too and won't pass on the 2024 ACC player of the year. The Canes had fallen off the college football map for much of the past two decades before Ward arrived from Washington State and put a much-needed jolt into that program. He holds the NCAA Division I record with 158 career touchdown passes in his time at Miami, Washington State and Incarnate Word.

"I know guys (at Miami), they love that kid — like, really *love* him," one ACC defensive coordinator said. "He's an alpha. Great leader. Competitive. That usually works well in the NFL."

Ward would've carried the Canes into the College Football Playoff if their defense wasn't so leaky. The 6-foot-2, 219-pounder is the ultimate gunslinger. He does have some issues being reckless with the football that have burned his team. Miami coaches didn't try to change his play style; they just worked on cleaning things up a little.

"A lot of his throws are backyard football stuff," the ACC DC said. "We tried to force him to play more in the pocket. He was so frustrating to play against because he can really extend plays."

A defensive coordinator who faced Ward and four first-round QBs from last year in the Pac-12 — Caleb Williams, Jayden Daniels, Michael Penix Jr. and Bo Nix — thought Ward was as competitive as any of those players but didn't think he was as polished or would be ranked ahead of any of them.

"He really hated to lose — like, just can't stand to lose — and he's tough," the Pac-12 DC said. "I loved that about him."

In 2024, Ward threw 39 TDs and seven INTs — the same number of picks as he had in 2023. In the Canes' three losses, he threw eight touchdowns and zero picks.

“His good is really, really good,” one longtime ACC head coach said. “But he is really loose with the ball — as a runner, when he scrambles, that ball is out there, and he takes a lot of chances throwing it. A lot of balls he threw were interceptions that were dropped. But athletically, he’s everything you want. He’s got all the arm talent. He’s elusive, but he freelances so much. He is so high-risk, high-reward. I think it’d be scary passing on him because of what he could be.”



### **2. Cleveland Browns**

#### **Abdul Carter, EDGE, Penn State**

If Cam Ward is available, I believe Cleveland will pounce. Instead, the Browns gobble up the latest in a long line of defensive freaks from the Nittany Lions capable of making an immediate impact. The pairing of Carter and Myles Garrett will cause huge headaches for opponents. At 6-3 and 250 pounds, the 2024 Big Ten defensive player of the year has average size for an edge player but is blazing fast. After spending his first two years as a linebacker, he led the nation with 23.5 tackles for loss to go with 12 sacks in his first season playing on the edge. A foot injury has hindered him from some of the evaluation part of the draft run-up, but last offseason, at 254 pounds, he clocked a 4.48-second 40-yard dash along with a 4.35 shuttle to go with an equally impressive 10-7 broad jump.

That kind of juice feeds into the Micah Parsons comparisons. The Cowboys star clocked a 4.43 at 245 pounds going into his last season at Penn State. An assistant who faced Carter in 2024 and spent time in the NFL has a different pro comp for the Penn State star.

“He reminds me of Von Miller,” the coach said. “He’s really bendy around the edge and such a speed rusher. He’s slippery enough to make your tackle completely whiff, and it’s a TFL. You hoped he slipped on that bad grass at Penn State. He’s a little different from Micah, who I think has more tenacity and physicality in his game and plays stronger. Abdul is much more bendy. Micah destroys people on inside moves. He’ll shimmy, counter and get inside, and that’s how you get sacks really quick. Abdul is really trying to win with speed around the edge.”

“He has elite twitch,” a Big Ten O-line coach said. “He will put his face in there and try to stop the rush. He is so fast. He jumped offside against us, and our guy almost didn’t see

him; he went by so fast and so far. He's still figuring it out. Got a lot better as the year went on."

"His change of direction is pretty special, and he played with a high motor," another Big Ten O-line coach said. "I think his physicality is just OK. Not great."

Said a head coach whose team faced Penn State in the first half of the season: "His get-off is such a problem. Our deal was to run the ball right at him. He didn't use his hands that well in the run game, but he became more of a complete player as the year went on."



### **3. New York Giants**

#### **Shedeur Sanders, QB, Colorado**

The Giants have a big need at quarterback. Sanders, the son of football legend Deion Sanders, is a polarizing prospect. He and his dad arrived at Colorado two years ago and revived a program that had been left for dead. They, along with fellow Jackson State transfer Travis Hunter, made the Buffaloes nationally relevant immediately. The younger Sanders sparked the Buffs to a season-opening road win at TCU, a team that played in the national title game the previous season. In 2024, the Buffs improved from 4-8 to 9-4 and finished in the Top 25.

In two seasons, despite playing behind a woeful O-line, Sanders amassed a 64-to-13 touchdown-to-interception ratio.

"I think he has good arm talent and really good poise," a Big 12 defensive coordinator said. "I think he's almost too cocky, at least at the college level, where he would take some really bad sacks. Decision-making-wise, I think he thinks he's better than everybody else, and that does help him elevate his game, but it also gets him into some bad situations. And if he doesn't shake that, he's gonna take way too many sacks in the NFL."

At 6-1 1/2, 212 pounds, Sanders does not have his dad's remarkable athleticism. Rival coaches estimate Sanders is probably a high 4.7, low 4.8 (40) guy.

"Even though he's not fast, he was pretty elusive," the Big 12 defensive coordinator said. "What I thought he does very well is when plays broke down, that was a strength. Once

the first read wasn't there and he broke the pocket, he kept his eyes downfield and really had a nice touch and was accurate. Especially when he's on the run, that's when he's most dangerous. I don't know if he has any elite physical traits, but I do think he has elite processing and feel for the game."

One former NFL coach who watched a lot of Sanders was reminded of when Mac Jones came out of college, wondering whether he has any elite traits.

"Yeah, he's smooth, and he operates well," the coach said, "but if he operates so well, why does he take so many sacks? I know his O-line is awful, and I get that to an extent, but I'm watching him, and like 40 percent of the sacks are on him. Dude, just throw the ball!"

But that coach also believes Sanders is very accurate.

"He throws a very catchable ball," the coach said, "and knows what kind of ball to throw, and his pocket movement is good, and those things do translate, but his clock is way too slow. It might be because he always thinks he has to make a play, but that's not gonna go well in the NFL."

Said a Big 12 secondary coach, "I think he really understands football and is very smart, and their OC did a good job of playing to his strengths. I don't think he's gonna be a bust."



#### **4. New England Patriots**

##### **Travis Hunter, WR/CB, Colorado**

Hunter is the best pure athlete in this draft. He is a rare talent, an elite cornerback who doubles as a dynamic wideout with a gas tank like college football has never seen. Other special DBs like Charles Woodson and Champ Bailey have dabbled on offense. None have played as many snaps as Hunter or made as many big plays on that side of the ball and excelled deep into games after remarkably high snap counts.

The 6-0, 188-pound Hunter won the Heisman Trophy as the nation's top player, the Biletnikoff Award as the top receiver and the Bednarik Award as the top defensive player. He can help second-year QB Drake Maye immediately, even if cornerback is his primary position.

“I think he’s a better DB than he is a receiver,” a defensive coordinator said. “But he’s a really good receiver. He understands space. He’s such a smart player, period. People don’t give him enough credit for that. He’s very savvy, very instinctual. He knows where to sit down and how to create space. He has elite change of direction. *Elite*. His ball skills are also elite. He’s got long levers. But I think he’s a better DB because it is harder to find a shutdown corner like that. There’s only so many possessions in the NFL in a game, and he can turn the ball over, he can get it for you. He will.”

Hunter’s size isn’t eye-popping, especially for a receiver, and scouts don’t think he’d run in the low 4.3s. Still, people rave about his play speed. One Colorado coach guessed that Hunter probably would run a high 4.3 or around 4.4 but added that if you lined up all the fastest guys at the NFL Scouting combine this year and had a race, Hunter would end up winning it.

“Yeah,” a Big 12 defensive coordinator said after hearing that take on Hunter, “I think that nails it.”

He added his team didn’t have any answers for Hunter as a receiver. It tried to play him soft and keep him covered up over the top, but CU adjusted and threw screens to him. Hunter was so dynamic that he didn’t need much of an opening, and he was gone.

“I think he’s damn good,” the Big 12 DC said. “He’s got that ‘it’ factor. He’s going to find a way to make a big play, and he’s got that competitive speed, where he’s gonna run away from whoever is chasing him. And when the ball is up in the air, whether he’s playing offense or defense, he’s gonna out-jump whoever is up against him.”

“His upside is scary,” a Big 12 secondary coach said. “He made this one pick, and I was like, ‘Holy s—!’ It was crazy how he went up to go get it. This guy has crazy ball skills.”



#### **5. Jacksonville Jaguars,**

#### **Mason Graham, DT, Michigan**

This is a tricky spot. The coaches I spoke to who have faced Graham talked about him like he was a first-round talent, just not necessarily in the top five. Then again, you could say the same about Shedeur Sanders, and maybe this is more of an indictment of this year’s talent pool.

The Jags need help on the D-line and didn't remedy it through free agency. Graham, who measured 6-3 1/2 and 296 pounds at the combine, was listed at 320 last season. When I was working on last year's Freak List, Graham weighed in at 315 pounds and ran an impressive 4.69 shuttle (that would've been sixth-best among DTs if he did it in Indy in February). He finished with 45 tackles, 7.5 TFLs and 3.5 sacks, earning first-team All-America honors.

I expect two Wolverines D-linemen to go in the first round. Kenneth Grant is the other. The five coaches I spoke to who faced Michigan last season see Graham as the more polished product. A former high school wrestler, he knows how to play with great leverage.

"He knows who he is, and he plays to his strength," said a Big Ten O-line coach who faced Michigan late in the season. "I think he's super impressive with his alignment, how well he uses his hands, takes on double teams — you'll see him free up the defensive end on a twist. He's stout, and he's pretty twitchy. He's quicker than people think."

"He's a really good first- and second-down player, but I didn't think he had a lot of juice on third downs," said an O-line coach who faced Michigan early in the season. "The NFL is probably suited more for him than the college game. The way a lot of people in college play isn't really suited to these big guys, and in the NFL, if you can't stop the run, you get fired. So you need guys like this. He's very strong at the point."

A Big Ten running backs coach said Graham's play style is a little like Aaron Donald.

"This guy is so good at using his hands and diagnosing how he's being blocked so fast," the running backs coach said. "Like Donald, I think he's got this ability where he processes so fast and counters so fast before the guy can even put his hands on him. They have like an extra step and can win so fast. His get-off is really good, and his hand-fighting and the counters in his game are elite."



### **6. Las Vegas Raiders**

#### **Jalon Walker, EDGE/LB, Georgia**

I know there's a lot of speculation that Vegas will take Boise State running back Ashton Jeanty, but Walker, the 2024 Butkus Award winner as the nation's top linebacker, is too tempting to miss out on. His production, explosiveness and character have UGA and

opposing coaches gushing. If the Raiders aspire to be like the Philadelphia Eagles, getting a game-wrecking defender from Georgia is a good place to start.

At 6-1, 243 with 32-inch arms, Walker doesn't have great length, but he was a dominant player who shined in big games for the Dawgs. In two meetings last fall against Texas, which had legit offensive line prospects, Walker had four sacks and six TFLs. In the SEC title game in 2023, he had two sacks against Alabama. He can be a playmaker as an off-the-ball linebacker or harass QBs on third downs as an edge rusher.

"He is a problem on first and second down and a major problem on third downs," said an SEC O-line coach who has faced a lot of first-round defensive players the past two years. "He was the best defensive player we saw all year. He's got stuff in him like Will Anderson. Very similar. He's so explosive. I think this guy is a complete stud."

"He has a lot of position flex — they dropped him (into coverage), rushed him, blitzed him," another SEC offensive coach said. "He's super twitchy and has an array of pass rush moves. He killed our (starting offensive tackle), and that kid is a really talented player who's also gonna play in the NFL."



### **7. New York Jets**

#### **Armand Membou, OT, Missouri**

The Jets could use a right tackle, and Membou is really intriguing. He had a fantastic combine in meetings and on the field. He clocked a 4.91 40-yard dash with a 1.74 10-yard split, and he vertical jumped 34 inches and broad jumped 9-7.

Membou came to football late but has displayed all sorts of promise. He's really twitchy and sudden with unreal quickness for his size. South Carolina edge rusher Dylan Stewart was a freshman All-American, but Membou dominated him in their matchup.

"I think he's pretty special," an SEC defensive coordinator said. "He's just so athletic, and you really saw it because they run so much of that stretch play there."

"I can see why some people might think he's a guard because he's so strong and explosive, but he can also really bend," an SEC D-line coach said. "His football IQ is high."

### 8. Carolina Panthers

#### **Mykel Williams, EDGE, Georgia**

The second Georgia player to go in the top 10, Williams was injured in the 2024 opener against Clemson and didn't get to play much in the first half of last season. But he was back for a big game at Texas in October and gave UT fits, notching two sacks. He had two more sacks against the Longhorns in the SEC title game. The 6-5, 260-pounder has 34 1/2-inch arms with potential that makes D-line coaches giddy.

"He was banged up a lot this year, but when he was close to 100 percent, he's super twitchy," an SEC tight ends coach said. "He's a freak."

He'll boost a Carolina team that had the worst pass rush in the league.

"He's more of the traditional defensive end guy than Walker," said an SEC O-line coach who was really impressed by both Georgia players. "He can either be that 3-4 outside linebacker or 4-3 end. He has real pass rush ability. I think he's an elite edge rusher. He's great chasing from behind, and he can play the run well enough."



### 9. New Orleans Saints

#### **Will Campbell, OT, LSU**

Drafting a cornerback would make sense for the Saints, but Hunter will be long gone, and this seems too early for Michigan's Will Johnson or Texas' Jahdae Barron. Helping new coach Kellen Moore by bolstering the O-line is a good alternative.

"He's pretty nasty," an SEC D-line coach said. "He's got heavy hands and will get after people in the run game. Sometimes he will get off-balance in pass pro, but he's impressive. I could see him starting for the NFL at tackle for a decade and making a team very happy."

Campbell, who's from Monroe, La., ran a 4.98 40 with a 1.76 10-yard split to go with a 32-inch vertical and 9-5 broad jump. Some may take issue with his arm length — measured at 32 5/8 inches at the combine and 33 inches at LSU's pro day — but he

won't look overmatched on the edge in the NFL, according to the coaches I've spoken to.

"He's a special talent," an SEC defensive coordinator said. "I wouldn't worry that his arms might be a half-inch or inch shorter than some people would like. He's athletic enough, quick enough and nasty enough to control the pass rush. I think he's a complete player."



### **10. Chicago Bears**

#### **Ashton Jeanty, RB, Boise State**

Chicago strengthened its interior O-line this offseason, and a juiced-up running game should be a big help for last year's top pick, Caleb Williams. With both Jeanty and UNC's Omarion Hampton available, the Bears have their pick of who they want to team with D'Andre Swift to give new coach Ben Johnson a 1-2 punch similar to what he had in Detroit.

Jeanty is coming off a dazzling 2024 in which he rushed for 2,601 yards and 29 TDs to lead the Broncos to the Playoff and finish No. 2 in the Heisman race. He had 10 rushes of 60-plus yards and five of 70-plus. You have to go back to 2018 to find anyone who even had six of 60-plus.

Scouts have compared the 5-8, 211-pounder to LaDainian Tomlinson (for his all-around skill set), to Maurice Jones-Drew (Boise State OC Dirk Koetter coached both and saw the parallels) and to Alvin Kamara (because of his freakish ability to stay balanced).

"You take him off that team, and they're not close to a Playoff team," said a secondary coach who faced Boise State last year. "He's got very good vision, good patience. He bounces off people, runs through contact. It was rare for one guy to bring him down. And I liked that he gets better as the game goes on.

"He reminded me of Ezekiel Elliott in how he ran. I do think guys didn't go in with confidence to take him down, like some guys were intimidated by him. That ain't gonna be the case in the NFL."

### **11. San Francisco 49ers**

#### **Jahdae Barron, CB, Texas**

Charvarius Ward was one of the many big losses the 49ers had this offseason. The feeling here is that general manager John Lynch will opt for Barron over Michigan's Will Johnson. The 5-11, 194-pound Barron is the smaller DB, but he's faster. He won the Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's top DB, making five interceptions and 67 tackles.

Lynch played with one of the NFL's great nickel backs, Ronde Barber, in Tampa. It's a stretch to say Barron is going to reach those heights, but he's instinctive, savvy and versatile. Texas coaches felt strongly that he could excel as a nickel, corner or safety because he's so smart and has such great agility and quickness. They think if he came out last year, he probably would've been a mid-round pick. Instead, he's going in the middle of the first round.

"He's got terrific ball skills and feel. I think his football IQ is really high," an SEC offensive coordinator said. "His ability to adjust and trigger is elite. His footwork is really clean. Excellent open-field tackler. I thought this guy was the best player on that team."



### **12. Dallas Cowboys**

#### **Omarion Hampton, RB, North Carolina**

There's a lot of speculation that Dallas will end up with Jeanty, but if he's gone, the Cowboys still have an excellent option in the versatile Tar Heels star. The 6-0, 221-pound Hampton is a bigger back than Jeanty and has a knack for big plays. He ran a 4.46 40 at the combine with a 1.54 10-yard split to go with some elite jumping numbers of 10-10 in the broad jump and 38 inches in the vertical.

"He's the complete package," said a defensive coordinator who faced him last season. "He's so strong and physical. He looks like a linebacker, but he can break away and take it the distance."

In 2024, Hampton ran for 1,660 yards and 15 TDs. He also has good hands. One longtime ACC coach said he joins Dalvin Cook and Travis Etienne as the top three backs he saw in the past decade.

“We put a tape together before we played them about the amount of tackles he broke,” the coach said. “Nobody could tackle him. Backs like that usually can’t outrun you to the perimeter, but he could, and his hands are really good. I think he can be a 25-carry-a-game back, and there’s a lot of different offenses I think he’ll fit into.”



#### **13. Miami Dolphins**

##### **Will Johnson, CB, Michigan**

The defensive MVP of the 2023 national title game, the 6-2, 194-pound Johnson missed the second half of last season with a turf toe injury. He still had three impressive years in Ann Arbor that included a program-record three pick sixes, a direct reflection of Johnson’s play style in how quickly he sees things and how willing he is to take chances.

There are some concerns about just how fast he is. His coaches at Michigan think he can run somewhere from 4.45 to 4.48 in the 40 and is explosive enough to broad jump 10-5 and vertical in the 36- or 37-inch range. They also say he’ll play at a solid 205 pounds. His best film was in his games against Ohio State and last year against Texas. In addition to his size, his best attributes are his intangibles. Coaches say he prepares like a quarterback and has the mind of one with excellent instincts, which enable him to play so fast.

That has them drawing comparisons to Patrick Surtain II, although the Broncos star is probably a more dynamic athlete.

“He is built like Surtain, like he is a beautiful athlete,” said one Big Ten assistant who has coached in the NFL. “I think he moves well, has really good ball skills, and you know he is very smart, but this year we thought he looked a little checked out on film. He wasn’t as physical. We knew we could get double moves on him, and it was open.”

### 14. Indianapolis Colts

#### **Tyler Warren, TE, Penn State**

Indy needs to help get its QB going, whether it's Anthony Richardson or Daniel Jones. The 6-5 1/2, 256-pound Warren figures to be a big help. He did everything for the Penn State offense last year. He won the Mackey Award as the country's top tight end, played wildcat QB and became the go-to target for a team that didn't have any difference-makers at wide receiver. He had 104 catches for 1,233 yards and eight TDs and rushed for 218 yards and four TDs.

"He went from being a pretty good player to being a great college player," a Big Ten defensive coordinator said. "I just think he's a great athlete. I'm not saying he's as smooth as Travis Kelce, but he has some of that just natural playmaking ability that not a lot of legit tight ends have."

"His ability after the catch is special; he breaks a lot of tackles, and I think he has upper-level ball skills," said one head coach whose team faced Penn State early in the 2024 season. "I think this is a really good athlete who was just learning the position."

"They were force-feeding him the ball last year," another Big Ten coach said. "He is a very good player. He's closer to (Rob Gronkowski) than Brock Bowers. He is a true tight end. Good blocker, not like dynamite, but good."



### 15. Atlanta Falcons

#### **Jihaad Campbell, LB, Alabama**

I think there will be some back and forth about whether the Falcons should take Campbell or Marshall edge Mike Green. Here, the choice is Campbell, who arrived in Tuscaloosa as an edge rusher but played mostly as an off-ball linebacker. In 2024, he played both and was a terror, making 117 tackles with 11.5 TFLs, five sacks and two forced fumbles.

The 6-3, 235-pounder ran a 4.52 40 at the combine with a 1.53 10-yard split and had a 10-7 broad jump.

“That dude can fly,” one SEC O-line coach said. “(Alabama) did not have really any of those special guys they normally had on defense under (Nick) Saban. But he was that one dude who popped on the film. He’s so active and so fluid. He made a ton of big plays for them. Sometimes, it’ll look like he gets lost out there, but he has such burst that he’ll end up making plays you figure he’s out of. Also thought he got pretty good in coverage last year.”



### **16. Arizona Cardinals**

#### **Derrick Harmon, DT, Oregon**

Arizona figures to go in the trenches here with some good options on either side of the ball. The Cardinals added edge Josh Sweat in free agency, so I don’t believe they will take Mike Green here, and Harmon is too talented to let go by. The Ducks stepped up big on the name, image and likeness front to land the Michigan State transfer, and he made a big impact, notching 45 tackles, 10.5 TFLs, five sacks and two forced fumbles. He more than looked the part at the combine, measuring 6-4 1/2, 313 pounds and clocking a 4.95 40 with a 1.74 10-yard split.

“He was the best interior pass rusher we faced this year,” a Big Ten O-line coach said. “He has great length and athleticism. We schemed a lot of things to make sure he didn’t get one-on-ones against us. He wasn’t as stout in the run game as (Mason) Graham.”

“I thought he was unbelievable,” a Big Ten running backs coach said. “He’s just as disruptive as Mason Graham when we played them, and he’s even bigger. Very impressed by him.”

“Liked him a lot,” a Big Ten O-line coach said, “but I do think he picks and chooses when he wants to play hard or not. He is really good, though. He’s very explosive and quick and plays with power and strength and can shed and get skinny.”

### 17. Cincinnati Bengals

#### **Mike Green, EDGE, Marshall**

New defensive coordinator Al Golden could use a bookend partner for Trey Hendrickson. Green, the nation's sack leader in 2024, makes a lot of sense. He was a disruptive force for the Thundering Herd and then went to the Senior Bowl and turned a lot of heads with his performance.

The 6-3, 251-pounder posted 17 sacks and 22.5 TFLs in 2024. His old coach at Marshall, Charles Huff, said Green reminds him a lot of former Alabama star Will Anderson, who Huff was around when he was a Tide assistant. He said Green's not as powerful but is more athletic with "unbelievable get-off" and explosiveness. He finished last season around 242 pounds but has worked hard to get his weight up. Some off-the-field questions about him surfaced during the combine from his time before Marshall, but unless more comes to light, we think he'll be the Bengals' guy.

"When you watched the tape, we'd bring him up a lot," a Power 5 O-line coach said. "What is this guy doing at Marshall? I thought he was a real guy. He had some shake to him and some edge. Really good with his hands, is twitchy, and he knows what he is. He used his speed, and then he'd go speed-counter, and then he could go speed to power. He is a natural edge guy and natural pass rusher."



### 18. Seattle Seahawks

#### **Tetairoa McMillan, WR, Arizona**

As much as Seattle needs O-line help, I don't see it drafting Bama's Tyler Booker or North Dakota State's Grey Zabel here. The 6-4, 219-pound McMillan, with his freakish ball skills, is too gifted not to take and package with Jaxon Smith-Njigba and Cooper Kupp.

"He's a dude," one Big 12 head coach said. "They weren't any good around him, but he's such a difference-maker. He has elite ball skills. He knows how to use his body. I was super impressed with him. His game translates because most NFL catches are contested catches."

In 2024, McMillan had 84 catches for 1,319 yards and eight touchdowns despite defenses knowing he was Arizona's first, second and third option on every pass play. Scouts and coaches aren't sure how fast he is — he's probably 4.6-ish in the 40, and his vertical is in the 34- or 35-inch range — but he has uncanny timing from his volleyball background. His old coach at Arizona, Jedd Fisch, spent a long time as an NFL assistant and told me McMillan is "the best athlete I've ever seen," in part because of his remarkable hand-eye coordination.

"Baller," a Big 12 secondary coach said. "On film, I saw some laziness when he wasn't getting the ball. But he has the best skills I've seen in years. He's unbelievable. I don't worry about his speed. He'll be able to make those catches on third-and-6 when you really need it with a corner right on him."

"I think he has competitive speed and competitive vertical ability," a Big 12 DC said. "Those '50-50 balls' aren't 50-50 balls with him. They're more 90-10 with him."

"The thing with him is he did not come off the field," a Big 12 defensive coordinator said. "You watch the film, and you think, 'This kid is lazy.' I think he was just trying to get a breather. He has as good of hands as you will ever see — he catches everything, away from the body, up in the air. He has such good body control. Not a blazer. But I think he does a good job of finding a way to separate. I can't compare him hands-wise to anyone."



#### **19. Tampa Bay Buccaneers**

##### **Donovan Ezeiruaku, EDGE, Boston College**

Tampa already added Haason Reddick to boost the pass rush, but Ezeiruaku is a high-floor, low-risk option to join him. The 6-2 1/2, 248-pounder is undersized but does have good length with 34-inch arms. He has good athleticism, with a 35-inch vertical jump. More impressively, his 4.19 shuttle time was by far the fastest of the edge players at the combine, as was his 6.94 3-cone time.

He won the Hendricks Award, honoring the nation's top defensive end, after leading the ACC with 16.5 sacks and 20.5 TFLs.

"I thought he was a monster," a Power 4 conference O-line coach said. "He's got a lot of moves and counters to beat you with. I don't think people talked enough about this kid considering how good he actually was."

### **20. Denver Broncos**

#### **Matthew Golden, WR, Texas**

One of the running backs would make a lot of sense, but with both Ashton Jeanty and Omarion Hampton gone, Sean Payton will get the fastest receiver in the draft. Golden's stock is soaring after his 4.29 40 with a 1.49 10-yard split gave scouts who already liked his film at Texas even more reason to tout him. He blossomed last year with the Longhorns after transferring from Houston, leading Texas with 987 receiving yards on 58 catches with nine TDs.

"He's got crazy burst and sudden movements to get past a DB," one SEC defensive coach said. "And he's smart."

Word is Golden went from being a decent practice player to a great practice player in around seven months, as he matured and got dialed in at Texas.

"I didn't think he was as fast as he was in Indy, but if that's what he ran, that's what he is," a Power 4 conference DB coach said. "He is a very good route runner. They did a good job with him to get one-on-ones."



### **21. Pittsburgh Steelers**

#### **Jaxson Dart, QB, Ole Miss**

There are legit first-round caliber D-linemen available here, but I believe the Steelers are intrigued enough by Dart's makeup and his physical talent to take him. The 6-2, 223-pounder has played a lot of football and faced some really good defenses in his college career.

The biggest compliment rival coaches will give him is that he's probably as tough as any QB they've faced in recent years and that they think he's a good leader because they could see teammates wanting to play for him. He put up big numbers in Lane Kiffin's offense, throwing for 4,279 yards and leading the nation with an average of 10.8 yards per attempt. He cleaned up some of his turnover issues, throwing just 11 interceptions

in the past two seasons combined — as many as he threw in 2022. He hasn't thrown a pick in the red zone in the past two seasons.

"I do think he's talented," said an SEC defensive coordinator who has faced him multiple times. "He's got a live arm and is athletic, but he's very streaky. My biggest question on him is he was just OK when they faced good opponents. They had a lot of talent on that team (in 2024), and they looked tight whenever the pressure got hot."



### **22. Los Angeles Chargers**

#### **Colston Loveland, TE, Michigan**

The Chargers recently added Tyler Conklin, who is a reliable tight end with almost 1,100 receiving yards during the past two seasons with only one drop. But Jim Harbaugh knows Loveland, his former tight end at Michigan, is a more dynamic weapon and will give Justin Herbert more firepower. The 20-year-old Loveland is 6-6, 248 pounds and led the anemic 2024 Wolverines offense with 56 catches for 582 yards and five touchdowns despite being the primary focus of every opposing secondary. Loveland didn't get high marks as a blocker from the opposing coaches I spoke to, but I've heard from UM sources that he had a shoulder injury he played through for much of the season.

"He is in that Evan Engram mold," one Big Ten secondary coach said. "He probably doesn't have that kind of top-end speed and is more of a 4.65 40 guy, but he can stretch the field, and he's probably a little more physical. He's a smooth route runner, smoother than (Tyler) Warren, and tough enough."

"It was also a little hard to tell how good he was because Michigan's QB play this year was so bad, and they didn't have good wide receivers," a rival Big Ten coach said. "He was the guy everyone paid attention to. He's rangy, and he moves really well. He's a good receiver, but he feasted on really bad college safeties, and I think that's one of the positions with the biggest difference between college and the NFL. Safety play in college is so bad. In the NFL, it's very good, and these tweener guys can get locked up a lot."

### **23. Green Bay Packers**

#### **Grey Zabel, OL, North Dakota State**

Zabel is the latest in a long line of gifted O-linemen who blossomed in the Missouri Valley Football Conference. Zabel shined in Senior Bowl practices and turned heads at the combine, where at 6-6 and 312 pounds, he vertical jumped an astounding 36 1/2 inches — the best of all the O-linemen. He has excellent position flexibility, having played left tackle, right tackle and guard. His arm length of just 32 inches is why some personnel people think he's best suited as an interior lineman.

"He's a talented, physical kid," one Missouri Valley head coach said. "I don't think he's quite as good as (Bucs guard) Cody Mauch or (Bills OT) Spencer Brown, but I think he's better than (Saints first-round OT) Trevor Penning. Gray is a really good athlete, but I think Mauch bent better and was more of a mauler."

If there was any knock on his game, it was that he wasn't great at handling stunts, but rival coaches couldn't stop raving about Zabel.

"He is so good," said an FCS defensive coordinator who has coached at the major college football level. "He's extremely athletic and really good in pass stuff. He changes direction so well, is strong, poised and doesn't get rattled. I think if you have him at center or guard, he'll be pretty damn salty."



### **24. Minnesota Vikings**

#### **Nick Emmanwori, S, South Carolina**

Minnesota has some terrific options here to bring in a young star safety to learn from Harrison Smith. I think the Vikings will go for the freak athlete Emmanwori from South Carolina over Georgia standout Malaki Starks. The 6-3, 220-pound Emmanwori put on an awesome display at the combine, vertical jumping 43 inches, broad jumping 11-6 and running a 4.38 40 with a 1.49 10-yard split to back up a staggering amount of production in the SEC. He made 88 tackles with four INTs and two pick sixes in 2024.

Emmanwori gets compared to former Seahawks enforcer Kam Chancellor because of his size, but former Cardinals star Adrian Wilson, a five-time Pro Bowler, is a better comp, according to South Carolina DC Clayton White. White played at NC State with Wilson, who had similar size and was a more dynamic athlete than Chancellor.

Inside the Gamecocks program, Emmanwori was known as “Nick the Eraser.” As freakish as Emmanwori is, his coaches say the things that impress them most are his football IQ and ability to retain information.

“He’s as big as some defensive ends in college and faster than anyone on the field,” an SEC offensive coordinator said. “He’s got so much range, it gives you a lot to worry about. There’s some inconsistency there with him on the film, but you just don’t see guys this size or are this athletic.”



### **25. Houston Texans**

#### **Kelvin Banks Jr., OT, Texas**

With Laremy Tunsil off to Washington, Houston needs help at tackle. There are a couple of intriguing options here. Ohio State’s Josh Simmons is exceptionally athletic but still a bit raw, whereas Banks is more seasoned. The 6-5, 315-pound Banks won the Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy in 2024 after starting 15 games at left tackle.

Despite winning some individual hardware, Banks had his share of struggles in 2024. Sources at Texas said he was dealing with an ankle injury that he was playing through. UT folks speak highly of Banks’ competitive maturity, which impressed them early in his career when he was matched against Alabama’s Will Anderson and Dallas Turner and more than held his own. They love his ability to recapture his balance when he gets knocked off his center and can stay connected to the defender, displaying uncanny body control and core strength.

“I think he’s more of a right tackle, but he has good feet and can anchor,” an SEC D-line coach said. “He’s a better run blocker than pass protector.”

“I’m not as high on him as I think everybody else is,” a Power 4 defensive line coach said. “He is skilled, but I didn’t think he was great in space.”

### **26. Cleveland Browns (via LAR)**

#### **Josh Simmons, OT, Ohio State**

In this scenario, the Browns trade up with the Rams, sending their Nos. 33 and 94 picks to Los Angeles.

Cleveland has Dawand Jones and Jack Conklin lined up to be its starting tackles. Jones is young and talented but has had season-ending injuries in each of his first two years, and Conklin will be a free agent in 2026. Simmons is a legit left tackle prospect with top-20 tools. He was having an outstanding season in 2024 before going down with a knee injury at midseason.

Buckeyes coaches say the 6-5, 317-pounder can run in the high 4.8s/low 4.9s and is a “freaky athlete” who vertical jumps in the high 30s. He’s still raw and spent just two years in Columbus after transferring from San Diego State. Coaches believe he’d be a top-10 pick if he had remained healthy.

“He’s an elite athlete with rare ability to recover from being out of position,” a Big Ten D-line coach said. “He’s also got some real grown-man strength to him.”



### **27. Baltimore Ravens**

#### **Malaki Starks, S, Georgia**

Texas A&M defensive ends Shemar Stewart and Nic Scourton are in play here, but Starks’ playmaking ability fits with the Ravens’ DNA. The 6-1, 197-pound Starks started all three years at Georgia — no small feat given the talent pool and intricacy of the defensive system. He led Georgia with 77 tackles and ran a stellar 4.5 40-yard dash. His 1.51 10-yard split is even better.

“He’s super smooth,” an SEC offensive coordinator said. “He covers a lot of ground. He is a very savvy player. Really good open-field tackler. Georgia wasn’t that good in the back end (in 2024). I think their issues would’ve been a lot more glaring if he wasn’t back there.”

### 28. Detroit Lions

**Nic Scourton, EDGE, Texas A&M**

Detroit goes to Dan Campbell's alma mater to build back its D-line after injuries ravaged the unit in 2024. Shemar Stewart is an even freakier Aggie than Scourton, but the 6-3, 257-pound Scourton is the more polished and productive player. In 2023, while at Purdue — as a 19-year-old team captain — he led the Big Ten in sacks. He transferred close to home and earned first-team All-SEC honors with 14 TFLs and five sacks. He played last season at 285 pounds but has shed almost 30 pounds to offer more position flexibility.

"He's very well-rounded and really disruptive," an SEC O-line coach said. "He's a really big defensive end. I think he might be more of a four-tech or maybe even a three-tech, instead of being an edge guy."

"He's a better player than Stewart," another SEC offensive line coach said. "He plays the run really well. Got really good pass rush skills with a lot of change-ups and good body control for a big guy. He'll get a lot of effort and motor sacks."



### 29. Washington Commanders

**James Pearce Jr., EDGE, Tennessee**

With sack leader Dante Fowler Jr. gone to Dallas, Washington needs a jolt on the D-line, and the choice here is Pearce over Shemar Stewart, another combine freak. Pearce, at 6-5, 245, is smaller but more productive. His athleticism is elite, as he ran a 4.47 40 with a 1.56 10-yard split. He also broad-jumped 10-3.

During the past two seasons, Pearce has 27.5 TFLs and 17.5 sacks. Abdul Carter has similar size and burst, but line coaches who have studied both think the Penn State edge player is scarier.

"We felt like we could neutralize him with some chips and take him out," one Power 4 offensive line coach said. "He wants no part of setting the edge and stopping the run. He reminds me a lot of (former Falcons first-rounder) Vic Beasley."

"He's got great get-off, but I think he's very one-dimensional," an SEC O-line coach said.

### 30. Buffalo Bills

#### **Kenneth Grant, DT, Michigan**

The one-time three-star recruit from Indiana wasted little time making jaws drop when he arrived in Ann Arbor. He was 360 pounds, and he clocked a sub-5.0 40, according to Jim Harbaugh. Those incredible wheels showed up a lot on the field, particularly when he ran down Penn State star running back Kaytron Allen in a game.

The 6-4, 331-pound Grant has 33 1/2-inch arms and made 32 tackles with 6.5 TFLs and three sacks alongside Mason Graham in 2024.

“He was just as impactful in our game as Graham,” a Big Ten running backs coach said. “He’s a monster. He’s big and nasty and has some pass rush to him.”

“I thought he was just OK,” a Power 4 conference line coach said. “I didn’t love him. I thought he took plays off. He’d jump around blocks. He didn’t always play through the blocks. He is very athletic and you do see flashes of really good stuff.”

“He’s got great size, length, and is super explosive,” said a Big Ten offensive line coach. “He just needs to be more polished. You can see times where it looks like he wore down.”



### 31. Kansas City Chiefs

#### **Shemar Stewart, EDGE, Texas A&M**

The 6-5, 267-pound Miami native with 34 1/8-inch arms lit up the combine, running a 4.59 40 with a 1.58 10-yard split. His jump numbers were even more eye-popping, as he hit 40 inches in the vertical and 10-11 on the broad jump. His on-field production isn’t as jaw-dropping, with just 4.5 sacks and 11 TFLs in his three seasons at A&M.

Stewart has elite traits and has been quite disruptive at times, but whether that eventually translates into big plays is one of the biggest questions in this draft.

“I thought he was really good on film but wasn’t great against us,” an SEC offensive line coach who faced A&M late in the season said. “I think he’s similar to Mykel Williams. He’s a little bigger but not quite the pass rusher. He’s this great looking kid, and then you hear how he tests. I didn’t think he had that kind of twitch. I didn’t see a first-round guy.”

“He’s not as good as the Georgia guys, but he has so much upside,” an SEC tight ends coach said. “He’s so long, and he can run. He will definitely flash. I think he’s more talented than (Tyree Wilson), who went top 10 to the Raiders (in 2023).”

“He’s not elite or a game-wrecker where you have to slide to him and chip him,” another SEC line coach said. “I think he’s pretty explosive, but I don’t think he did a good job of setting his moves up.”



### **32. Las Vegas Raiders (via PHI)**

#### **Emeka Egbuka, WR, Ohio State**

The Eagles trade the No. 32 pick to the Raiders for the No. 37 pick and a fourth-rounder (No. 108), as Las Vegas scrambles to jump back into the first round to make sure it gets the best slot receiver in the draft.

The 6-1, 202-pound Egbuka had a breakthrough season in 2022, when he caught 74 passes for 1,151 yards and 10 TDs. After dealing with injuries in 2023, he put up similar numbers in 2024 in helping the Buckeyes win the national title. Ohio State coach Ryan Day told people during Egbuka’s freshman season that he was so football savvy that Day thought the young wideout was the player on the roster whom he could most see as a coach down the road. The former baseball player is excellent at tracking the ball and is extremely competitive.

He ran a little faster than people thought, going 4.45 in the 40 at OSU’s pro day, where he jumped 38 inches. New Raiders OC Chip Kelly spent the 2024 season running the Buckeyes offense and knows just how good this guy is. Egbuka had more catches (14) in third-and-medium situations than anyone in the country last season. Expect him to have multiple seasons in the NFL with 100-plus receptions. Buckeyes wideouts don’t bust, and I’d be shocked if this guy did.

“He’s as polished as they come,” a Big Ten DBs coach said. “Terrific route runner who sets guys up really well. I think he’s better in the slot than outside, but he can do both. He has a great feel for space. He’s also bigger and stronger than you think.”

“He’s good at everything,” a Big Ten secondary coach said. “Our players were really high on him. He’s big enough to play big. I could see why the Ohio State coaches would say

that Egbuka's so football smart. Jeremiah (Smith) was so special, the other guys got overshadowed, but he's good. Look how long he has done it there — that matters."

**Cam Ward, QB, Miami**

The Giants need to make a splash in a quarterback market that is more of a puddle than an ocean.

This is the only trade I am projecting in this mock, and it probably would be the least-surprising move if it comes to fruition. Packaging a pair of Day 2 picks to move up from No. 3 to No. 1 likely would be enough to put Ward in a Giants jersey.



### **2. Cleveland Browns**

**Abdul Carter, Edge, Penn State**

The Browns want to draft a quarterback, so I wouldn't be surprised if they made an offer to the Titans to move up one spot. But if they don't trade out and Ward is off the board, Carter wouldn't be a bad fallback option. Carter's medicals could be tricky, though, so they'll be something to watch over the next month.



### **3. Tennessee Titans (via NYG)**

**Travis Hunter, CB/WR, Colorado**

Should the Titans trade out of the top spot, it is a good bet they won't move down further than the third pick — they'll want to ensure they get one of the top players in this draft class. No matter if he plays offense, defense or both, Hunter immediately would bring a jolt of energy to the Tennessee roster.

### **4. New England Patriots**

#### **Armand Membou, OT, Missouri**

Teams are warming up to the idea that Membou could go this high — his tape is good enough; his testing was more than good enough.

That said, he is still just 20 and had to pull out of the Senior Bowl because of an illness, so teams still have homework to do on him. But he is in the mix to be the first offensive lineman drafted.



### **5. Jacksonville Jaguars,**

#### **Will Campbell, OT/G, LSU**

The tackle-guard debate with Campbell will be popular in the next two months, so let's pace ourselves. Regardless, Campbell is one of the more well-liked players in the draft class by teams, because of his tape and talent.

The Jaguars may need to replace impending free agent Brandon Scherff (ironically, the last guard to be drafted in the top five), and Campbell would be a nice drive onto the fairway for a first-year general manager and head coach.



### **6. Las Vegas Raiders**

#### **Ashton Jeanty, RB, Miami**

The Raiders are in the market for playmakers. Ideally, one of those playmakers would be a quarterback, but adding Jeanty to Chip Kelly's offense would vastly upgrade a unit lacking an identity.

### **7. New York Jets**

#### **Mason Graham, DT, Michigan**

Graham isn't going to blow anybody away with his length or testing (he sat out everything but the bench press at the combine), but teams are ready to trust his tape. His attitude and play style fit what Aaron Glenn wants to build in New York.



### **8. Carolina Panthers**

#### **Shemar Stewart, Edge, Texas A&M**

At 6-foot-5 and 267 pounds, Stewart ripped off a 1.58-second 10-yard split in the 40-yard dash. To put that into context, Von Miller posted a split of 1.59 — and he was 20 pounds lighter. Many people will get hung up on Stewart's lack of sack production, but the tape shows a player who affects the backfield much more than the stat sheet suggests.



### **9. New Orleans Saints**

#### **Tyler Warren, TE, Penn State**

Regardless of who's going to be the quarterback, the Saints are missing offensive playmakers — an issue that has allowed opposing defenses to dictate the action, rather than the other way around. But Warren and his diverse skill set would greatly open up Kellen Moore's offense.



### **10. Chicago Bears**

#### **Tyler Booker, G, Alabama**

The Bears will have their choice of several different prospects in the trenches here.

Despite his below-average athletic testing, Booker had one of the combine's cleanest positional workouts, and teams are trusting the tape that shows a Pro Bowl-level player. By the end of his rookie year in Chicago, Booker would be one of the leaders in the locker room.



### **11. San Francisco 49ers**

#### **Mykel Williams, Edge, Georgia**

Although his 2024 season didn't go as planned (mostly due to a nagging ankle injury), Williams has the length and physical traits that have teams excited about his NFL future. He is an outstanding run defender and holds a lot of promise as a pass rusher.



### **12. Dallas Cowboys**

#### **Tetairoa McMillan, WR, Arizona**

Outside of CeeDee Lamb, where is the juice coming from in the Cowboys' offense? McMillan could provide some. With his rangy catch radius and ball skills, he is a quarterback-friendly target who is open even when covered.



### **13. Miami Dolphins**

#### **Nick Emmanwori, S, South Carolina**

In regards both to the need and the best player available here, Emmanwori would fit well in Miami. At 6-3 1/8, 220, his 4.40 40-yard dash, 43-inch vertical and broad jump of 11 feet, 6 inches give him "certified freak" status.

### **15. Atlanta Falcons**

**Jalon Walker, Edge/LB, Georgia**

I know, I know — the Falcons don't draft Bulldogs in the first two rounds. But I'll bet Raheem Morris is very interested in the athletic versatility and intangibles that Walker would bring to Atlanta's front seven.



### **16. Arizona Cardinals**

**Donovan Ezeiruaku, Edge, Boston College**

With a 6.94-second three-cone, Ezeiruaku was the only pass rusher at this year's combine to clock in under seven seconds in the short-area agility drill. Between his 34-inch arms and the 16.5 sacks he produced last season, the Boston College product could sneak into the top 20.



### **17. Cincinnati Bengals**

**Will Johnson, CB, Michigan**

I don't know if we'll ever see Johnson run a 40-yard dash (Michigan's pro day is scheduled for March 21), which would be an issue for some teams. But with Johnson's fluidity and footwork, his tape shows a corner who should start immediately as an NFL rookie.

### **20. Denver Broncos**

#### **Omarion Hampton, RB, North Carolina**

Be it a "joker" pass catcher or a dynamic running back, there is a good chance Denver will be hunting for an offensive difference-maker here.

At 221 pounds, Hampton ripped off a 4.46 40 and 38-inch vertical, numbers that reflect the explosion he shows on the field.



### **21. Pittsburgh Steelers**

#### **Shedeur Sanders, QB, Colorado**

Sanders is going to be a wild card in this draft. He could go in the top six or fall out of the first round entirely — and neither outcome would be a shock.

**Derrick Harmon, DT, Oregon**

Harmon (6-4 1/2, 313) was one of only two defensive tackles weighing more than 305 pounds to run under 5.00 seconds in the 40-yard dash — he did it in 4.95. His athleticism off the ball was reflected in his FBS-best 55 pressures last season.



### **24. Minnesota Vikings**

**Kelvin Banks Jr., OT/G, Texas**

The projection of Banks moving to guard was never about size, it was more about his play style. He has the tools to stay outside, but several teams see his best long-term position inside, which fits what the Vikings could be looking for with this pick.



### **25. Houston Texans**

**Grey Zabel, G/C, North Dakota State**

Zabel put himself in the top-50 mix based on his 2024 tape. And after his Senior Bowl and combine performances, a spot in the top 25 is certainly possible. He played every

I don't know if the Ravens would go cornerback in the first round in back-to-back years, but with Brandon Stephens unlikely to return, the need is there. Barron helped himself with his on-field workout at the combine.



### **28. Detroit Lions**

**Kenneth Grant, DT, Michigan**

At 6-4, 331, Grant is a massive man with some unique traits. Do teams wish the tape was more consistent? No question. But the NFL is a big man's league, and there aren't many with Grant's combination of size and ability in this class.



### **29. Washington Commanders**

**Josh Simmons, OT, Ohio State**

The Commanders could go in a few directions in the first round, including adding an offensive tackle to help protect their franchise quarterback. If not for the knee injury he suffered early last season, Simmons would be long gone by this point.

I would love to go in a different direction with a roster that feels in need of a truly bold shakeup (drafting Shedeur Sanders?!), but the Colts could use a big target at tight end with the mindset to fit in as a run blocker. Warren is a safe pick, but he's not a lock here.



### **15. Atlanta Falcons**

**Will Johnson, CB, Michigan**

The Falcons play a heavy percentage of zone, which is perfect for Johnson, who thrives as a ballhawk in those coverages. If Atlanta doesn't go with the corner here, the pick should be an edge rusher.

### **19. Tampa Bay Buccaneers**

**Shemar Stewart, EDGE, Texas A&M**

Stewart is unpolished but has elite size and rare athletic ability, and he's able to play standing up or with a hand down. It could be tough for Tampa Bay general manager Jason Licht to pass on these types of traits at a major position of need.

**Shavon Revel Jr., CB, East Carolina**

Revel is big, long and fast, with the ability to shrink catch space down the field or step downhill and support against the run. Cornerbacks with size and speed typically get pushed up in the draft.

Like Kyle Hamilton, Emmanwori is a safety with rare size -- but Emmanwori has better back-end range and ball-hawking skills, so adding him would allow Hamilton to play down and be part of the action more often.
