Steelers Have 17th Overall Selection in 2023 NFL Draft

PITTSBURGH — The Steelers have the 17th overall pick in the 2023 NFL Draft that will be held April 27-29 in Kansas City, Missouri.

The Steelers have a total of seven selections in the 88th Annual Draft. This is the 14th time in League history the NFL will conduct a three-day draft and the 30th consecutive year for the seven-round format.

The Draft begins on Thur., April 27, at 8 p.m. ET, and only the first round will be completed on the initial day. The second and third rounds will take place on Fri., April 28, beginning at 7 p.m. ET. The final four rounds will take place on Sat., April 29, starting at Noon. Teams are allotted 10 minutes for each selection in the first round and seven minutes in the second round. Five minutes are permitted for the third through sixth rounds. Four minutes will be allowed between selections in the seventh round and for all compensatory selections.

For the 18th consecutive year, multiple networks will be televising the Draft in its entirety. NFL Network, which is airing the Draft for the 17th time, will televise all three days of the Draft while ESPN (as well as ABC and ESPN Deportes) will continue its annual coverage of the entire draft through its conclusion. Additionally, the Steelers' official website (www.steelers.com) and NFL.com will have exclusive coverage and behind-the-scenes features. Steelers Nation Radio, as well as Westwood One Sports, SiriusXM and ESPN Radio will also broadcast the entire draft.

DRAFT NOTES: Thirty-eight prospects, including 17 on-site, are confirmed to participate in television coverage of the 2023 NFL Draft. The Steelers have selected in the first round in all but eight of the previous 87 NFL Drafts ... six of the seven Steelers' 2022 NFL Draft selections – and 17 of the 22 players drafted since 2020 – are currently on the roster.

Opening Statements:

Omar Khan: Appreciate everybody being here today. I'll talk a little bit about the rest of the offseason since we last got together in Arizona. As you know, we were able to acquire Allen Robinson [II] last week. Excited to have him. Early on when Coach [Mike Tomlin] and I got together after the season, we mapped out a plan on what we wanted 2023 to look like. One of the things we were keying on was acquiring a veteran receiver. Excited that we were able to get it all done with Allen. Once the medical was confirmed to be okay, it was easy for us. With respect to the medical, I'll just say that the doctors felt really good about him. We're going to be really smart, kind of like we were with Larry Ogunjobi. We're going to be conservative with the approach. We understand the importance of spring ball, but there's really no games being played until August. We did the same thing with Cole Holcomb, too. We're going to try to be really smart about that.

With respect to the Draft, what can I say? It's exciting that it's almost here. The process has been great. We spent a lot of time getting to know a lot of players, not only on the field but off the field. Once the season ended, it started for me at the Hula Bowl. Had an opportunity to interview several players there. Coach and I got to Mobile and we probably interviewed 40 to 50 players formally, another 20 to 30 players, probably more than that, informally. Went to Indy and had our 45 visits, formal visits. Handful of other informal visits there when you run into guys there. Hit the Pro Day circuit for a couple of weeks, great. Really productive. Got to know a lot of players along the way there. Then we got to obviously our 30 visits here, 30 formal visits. Had several other players that were local that didn't count towards the 30. Last few days we've been doing a lot of Zoom calls, trying to be diligent, get to know as many of these guys as possible. Once I leave here, we've got a couple more Zoom calls this afternoon. With that, Coach, I don't know if you wanted to add anything. The process has been great from my end.

Mike Tomlin: I think that's probably the most significant reflection I have on the process. It's not about Omar being new. We've done what we do in terms of our preparation. But I think the significant difference that makes me feel good as we sit here today is we adjusted during COVID in terms of the gathering of information, the tools we were willing to use to gather information. Now that we're on the other side of COVID, it's almost like being able to couple those techniques with some traditional ones. It's good to get back on the Pro Day circuit, see these guys in their college environments, the information you get from that. The interactions you get firsthand with them in a combine-like setting or Mobile. Good to get back to post-COVID normalcy in terms of some of those things. You couple that with the techniques we were able to develop during COVID in an effort to get information, whether it's doing research regarding medical information on those that you don't get an opportunity to get firsthand interaction with or utilization of Zooms to further get to know someone. It just feels really good in this post-COVID world to use some of those tools along with traditional ones in an effort to have a high floor of readiness. I just think that's why we feel really comfortable. We didn't get lazy because of COVID. We're back out there. We hit a bunch of Pro Days. We took every

opportunity that was at our disposal to beat the bushes and engage with these guys. I think that's why we feel comfortable about where we are. Still some more work ahead of us, continual discussions that need to be had. That will be ongoing. But just the work that we've done, the position that we're in right now in terms of the information that we have. Obviously, we've been able to do some things in free agency that I feel like provides a clean slate for us from a draft perspective. We don't have any glaring needs. We're able to look at the board in totality and not be swayed inappropriately in any specific way. That's just kind of the framework of some of the things that we've done and why we feel prepared and good.

We'll stop talking and open it up to you guys.

Mike, you've never had the first pick to start a day. How advantageous is that?

Mike Tomlin: Man, we're excited about it. We've been talking about it. I think the thing that we're least familiar about is the amount of calls that we will be or could be getting. That's what we've spent our time talking about; how do we organize and how do we get prepared for the receiving of the amount of interest that that pick could have? That's a good and exciting possibility for us.

On the other hand, Omar, what about the calls for No. 17? Are you getting a lot of pre-draft action on that?

Omar Khan: That's natural that that happens. That is happening. People are calling. Are we interested in moving up, down, sometimes it's just fishing for information, but it's happening.

How important is it to determine whether a guy is a football lover? How much do you determine that on a Zoom, or a call, or a face-to-face meeting? Could that be a deal breaker if you determine he's not?

Omar Khan: It's extremely important. It could be a deal breaker. I'm not going to go into how we come up with our final evaluation on that, but that is really important. We ask certain questions. It's all part of getting to know the player, understanding if he loves it. A lot goes into it, but it can be a deal breaker, love of football.

Throughout the history of this organization, a new general manager or coach, when the pairing is new, foundational pieces, haven't gone by need at all. Then they drift into need. How is the approach? You're saying best athlete, but there are some needs like a third tackle—

Mike Tomlin: We're not going to back ourselves into any corner as we sit here today. That's what I mean when I said we felt really good about what we were able to do in free agency. It provides a platform for what you suggest that we can just look at prospects available to us.

You started this talking about acquiring Robinson, the importance of him. You added Patrick Peterson. When you're looking to add a veteran guy like Robinson, how important is the mentorship piece holistically?

Omar Khan: It's extremely important. Especially when you're getting to the Draft, you're looking at guys saying, "Hey, we don't necessarily need this guy to come in and plug-and-play right away." He can learn from a guy like Pat P[eterson] or Allen Robinson. We have quality veterans, Cam Heyward. Lot of those guys. A great situation to be in.

DeMarvin Leal, what do you envision for him heading into 2023, his role? How might that impact the Draft?

Mike Tomlin: There's a lot of variables that determine that. His level of readiness, his growth and development physically, mentally, how he processes the experiences of Year 1. I'm open and expect him to be on another level, like I do all guys. But I don't know that I see it with great clarity as I sit here today. Still too many moving pieces. One of the major components of talent acquisition that remains to be done throughout this offseason, be it the Draft or free agency, things of that nature. But make no mistake, he showed some things, particularly over the latter part of last year. It's reasonable to expect him to build upon that. So, I'm open to it. But no definitive structure to it as we sit here today.

Have you gathered enough depth at any position to where you no longer look at the Draft, like maybe the inside of the offensive line?

Omar Khan: I think any opportunity we have to add competition, regardless of position, we're going to look at it. If it helps us, it helps us. I've said it from the very beginning, my job is to bring competition to every position possible. If drafting a certain player allows that and he's somebody we've targeted, we'll go after it.

In terms of what you've been able to glean so far in the pre-draft process about corners and tackles, have you been able to see a significant difference in top-end talent or depth?

Omar Khan: Two good positions that are available in the Draft. Overall, this is really a good draft. I think when you look at the talent, just position by position, Coach and I talked a lot about this, it's a good draft and it feels really good. We feel like we're going to be in a position to draft some good players. The phrase I always use, it's always at a priority-need position. I think we're going to have the ability to address those needs.

From a coaching perspective, what do you prefer? Do you prefer the notion of using some of the collateral you have to move up to get a home run in the top 10? If it is a deep draft, to have that many different components you can build into your roster, what is your preference?

Mike Tomlin: You give me a specific player, opportunity, I'll probably have a more definitive answer. We're not opposed to moving up in an effort to pinpoint someone that might be special, but we do truly believe there's great depth in this draft. We're ready and comfortable for whatever.

I'll be really specific why we feel this is a deep draft. I think it's another by-product of COVID. There are some veteran guys in this draft. There are guys with six years of college football playing experience and five years of college football playing experience. I think that's one of the reasons why it is so deep. It's just another by-product of COVID.

A lot has been made about the 30 visits. How do you weigh who you bring in here to the facility versus going on the road and meeting them, Zoom calls?

Mike Tomlin: There's a variety of things that determine that. Sometimes we're trying to gather medical information. Sometimes we're trying to find another intellectual football day with them. Maybe we didn't get any exposure to them because they were non-Combine or Senior Bowl, or we didn't go to their universities. There're several reasons why a guy could fall into the 30-visit list. Those are some examples of why. Medical, football get to know, a lack of exposure because they weren't invited to something, things of that nature.

Omar, do you expect an early run-on cornerback? Is that reflective of the quality there?

Omar Khan: That's a good question. You just never know. You just never know. I would assume so. It is a deep position. I think we're prepared if that happens.

Mike, how much closer are we getting to positionless football, especially on defense?

Mike Tomlin: I go the other way. As opposed to calling it positionless, I think there's more specialization. Positions that we didn't necessarily identify as positions years ago have very specific roles. I think the nickel, the interior corner is a position in today's game. The dime linebacker or the passing-situations linebacker, for example, is a really specific position in today's game. There are interior rushers. Those guys oftentimes play on the edge on run downs. It's a highly specialized game today. In one vein I think you can call it positionless. I think you can go the other direction and say it's very specialized. I know what you mean. It's a discussion, certainly.

At wide receiver, a lot of the guys that you have in the slot were smaller guys. Was part of getting Robinson, a bigger guy, about two-thirds of his snaps were outside, do you see him more of an inside guy?

Mike Tomlin: He's had experience as an inside guy. He has physicality in his game. He can drop his weight for a big. He is an example of our general free agent interest. It goes all the way back to when he was at Penn State. Kevin Colbert and I spent a great deal of time with him and his family through his draft process. He was a Diaper Dandy. A 20-year-old when he came into the Draft. We held him in high regard. We liked his football character, we liked his talents, we liked his upside. We followed him throughout his NFL journey. The interest still remains. Those are generally the stories, that's the framing of the people that we generally do free agent business with.

The same thing could be said for E[landon] Roberts. I remember being down at Houston when we were at his Pro Day. Kevin and I stood in the parking lot and talked to him and his parents for maybe 45 minutes after his Pro Day was over. That's how we play free agency. We build our team primarily through the Draft because we do a great deal of research and work regarding these guys in draft prep. So, our professional interest is usually a continuation of that.

Is it a media myth in terms of having a rookie salary quarterback, teams being able to go after other positions, stockpile a team according to the salary cap, or is there real substance to that?

Omar Khan: You don't have to be a mathematician to figure it out. When you have a rookie quarterback that's starting for you, it gives you options. That's what I always say, you have options to do different things, maybe get creative on some other things.

You talked about the pandemic, some of these college players have been playing for five or six years. Throughout your interviewing process, whether it be the top 30s or Zooms, have you noticed more preparedness because they're older and experienced?

Mike Tomlin: I think you notice it. I think also you look at the general age of the guys. Whenever we put a guy's profile up, you have basic, measurable information, height, weight, speed, 40 times. The date of birth is a component of it. I would imagine the average date of birth for this draft class is significantly higher than maybe the previous years. There's a specific reason why: the global pandemic.

You obviously have known Omar for a while. What did you learn about him spending so much time during the pre-draft process on visits? What do you think you've learned that it will take to be successful collaborating in the Draft room?

Mike Tomlin: I don't know that I've learned anything new. It's an opportunity for us to live out the things we already know we value about one another, about the team-building process, about what this organization needs from us. We enjoyed our time traveling. There's business to get done. But aside from that business, man, there's many nights sitting in a lobby having a cup of coffee, just continuing to hash over the vision, the mode of operation. You can't have enough of those discussions to further solidify why it is we do what it is that we do, how we go about it, and our roles in it, how we work together, the fluidity of it. That's been fun. It's been fun. You can't shortcut it. I think that's why it's been fun. We respect it. We haven't tried to cut corners. The secret is there's no secret, man. We had to pack a bag and spend some time together and beat the bushes. It was a good process.

Process-wise, have you done anything different in terms of preparing for draft scenarios, how you evaluate prospects, than when Kevin was in your seat? How much has Andy [Weidl] played a role, too, in all that?

Omar Khan: I would say overall, I've said this before, it's been a similar process. I would say it's 85 percent similar to how we've done it in the past. I learned it from Kevin. Have a lot of respect for how we've always done it.

Having said that, we brought in Dan Colbert, Andy, Mark Sadowski, and Sheldon White. They've had some cool ideas, things they've done elsewhere that they've given suggestions to us. We've implemented some. Some I've said yes, some I've said no. But overall, it's similar.

You don't do the mocks anymore, correct?

Omar Khan: We do strategy meetings where we discuss what we're going to do if X, Y and Z happen, yeah.

Follow-up: Do you rank the top players? I only say that because I believe that's how Kevin said they did it in the last couple of years.

Omar Khan: I think that's just part of the strategy.

Mike Tomlin: That was pretty slick. That was awesome (laughter).

Omar Khan: We have strategy meetings where we go through different scenarios, how we would take players if they're there and all that, yeah. Along with what you just said, yeah.

Mike Tomlin: I think a cool thing is we haven't been running away from the differences of transition. We've been open to it. Just like I was talking a year ago, we were transitioning at quarterback, the uneasiness, the feeling that could be positive fuel for us. We're going through a transition here in a significant role. We'd be remiss if we didn't have urgency about it and also just be open to the differences that could help us improve. I've been excited about working with some of the new guys, some of the guys that aren't new but are in a new role. Just been open to doing things differently. I think particularly guys like us that have been in roles or been in this organization for an extended period of time, it's a natural inclination to get resistant to new thoughts, ideas, approaches. That's something that you can fall into. That's been something that we've been consciously resisting because we might miss an opportunity for improvement or get better. That's something that comes with transition, too.

How much fun is it for you the last couple years with all the transition? Does it give you more juice to have this new challenge?

Mike Tomlin: I'm always having fun. I love what we do. But the variables have been some of the reasons why. I can't tell you that there's a time that I can point to where I'm not having fun, whether it's in the 12-month calendar or over the totality of my time spent here. I just love the challenges that this business presents.

You said corner was an area where there was depth. What other positions do you feel have depth in this draft?

Omar Khan: I mentioned overall it's really good. You get excited about the D-line group, the O-line group is good. The corner group is good. Outside backer group is good. There are some good quarterbacks. We're not taking a quarterback.

Mike Tomlin: The tight ends.

Omar Khan: Tight end group is good. The receiver group is good. We just feel really good about the talent really at every position.

Omar, can you confirm it was coffee that you shared?

Omar Khan: It was coffee.

What was it like for you this first time going through this? Did you learn anything traveling and everything that maybe you didn't know?

Omar Khan: Yeah, you try to learn something every day. New experiences, talking to new people. It's a lot easier to get ahold of Nick Saban to meet one on one when you're in this role as opposed to my other role. You learn something every day. Coach used the word 'fun' earlier. That's the right word. It's been a lot of work. We think we've been very diligent. The process has been tremendous. At the end of the day, it's just been fun.

You mentioned at the outset you did whatever you could in the free agency process to gird yourselves. With Kenny going into Year 2, do you feel similarly about the offense overall? If the best players tend to come on the defensive side of the ball, you're comfortable addressing that side of the ball? Do you have enough there on offense to have the playbook flourish?

Mike Tomlin: Certainly, certainly.

If there's a player with a character concern, red flag, how do you go about evaluating that? Do you take a player off your board entirely, move them down...

Mike Tomlin: When there's character questions, we simply do the work. Doing the work is boots on the ground, relationships in their town, getting information about their day-to-day from people in those environments. It's about interviewing them, talking to them about their past, what they learned, the steps they've taken in an effort to improve. It's professional research, private investigation. We utilize all the tools at our disposal to gain enough information to make an appropriate decision on subjects such as that. At the end of the day, we make a Steeler decision, and we go with it. What the tipping point is in terms of taking someone off the board or leaving someone on the board, those are not black-and-white discussions. Those are handled on an individual basis, based on the information that we have gathered and the amount of that information.

One guy in this draft you don't have to do much research on is Joey Porter Jr. Is it fun to evaluate someone like that that you know so well?

Mike Tomlin: There's guys in every draft, particularly for me in recent years, that I have similar background with. Maybe the Pittsburgh guys. Maybe they're in a similar age group as my sons. The Skyy Moore discussion a year ago. D Ham [Damar Hamlin]. The guys that played next door. All the 412s. Because I've been a part of this community so long, I've essentially watched those generations of guys grow up. Seeing them play little league football, high school football. I've probably met them at some point during their development because guys like me meet talented young athletes.

It's not as unique as you would like to make it. I'm sure you are going to make it, but man, there's a handful of those guys for a variety of reasons, particularly in recent years as I mentioned, that kind of make that a less relevant and less significant story from my perspective.

Has your son been a resource this year?

Mike Tomlin: I don't get any information from my son, particularly professional information.

Have you been in contact with all 31 teams about trade-ups or downs?

Omar Khan: I'll say this. Before Thursday, we will have been in contact with all 31 teams. I wouldn't say we're there just yet.

Mike Tomlin: You mentioned 32. Being in that position, we're acknowledging we're not quarterback shopping. That position might be one that attracts quarterback shoppers. So, it's exciting to see what might transpire with some of those phone calls, the value that we might be able to get. It is a unique position for us to be in. We are very excited about it.

How spontaneous is Draft night? Say the 17th pick comes up, you talked to every team prior to that, is there a last-minute team called?

Mike Tomlin: I think preparedness makes that less spontaneous. That 32nd position is new to us. That's something that is probably going to have more of our attention in terms of the spontaneity of it or the uniqueness of it. It's just due diligence in terms of preparing for the myriad of things that could happen at 17, whether we stay there, move up, move back. That's everyday business for us or every year business for us.

Hypothetically, if you had something worked out, you're probably going to have it worked out a few picks before that?

Mike Tomlin: Could be or could happen in the moment. That's just experience that tells us to be ready for all of those scenarios that you outlined.

Even informally or if at all, do you communicate with Kevin? Has he been involved?

Omar Khan: I talk to Kevin. Kevin is always available to me whenever I need to call him.

Mike Tomlin: Kevin is a granddad, man. He's talking about granddad things, man. We're seeking wise counsel. He's laughing and wishing us good luck.

You said you looked at some things, specific things from Andy. Overall, how much of a resource has he been during this process?

Omar Khan: He's been great. I've known Andy for over 20 years. We know a lot about each other. We know how we think. But he's been great. It's been smooth.

Mike Tomlin: The interesting thing about him from my perspective is, my relationship with him is a new one, but he's not new to this organization or new to the values of this organization. So that's been cool to get to know and see the foundational component of that in him.

Omar, how do you describe what this like is for you personally and the feelings that come along with it?

Omar Khan: Personally, I'd say it's obviously exciting. It's a dream come true for me to be in this position. Been dreaming about it for a long time. But I feel ready. I wish the Draft—I wish I was leaving here to go make our picks. But exciting. I think we're ready.

Mike Tomlin: Andy and I have been laughing at him. He's been talking extremely fast.

[Anthony] Miller and [Calvin] Austin [II], how are they coming along health-wise?

Mike Tomlin: No updates regarding the health of guys. I don't have a detailed one, so I'm not going to mislead you with false information. We've been focused on talent acquisition. The guys have been going through the conditioning component of it. Haven't had a significant update in that regard.

We get on the other side of the Draft, start teeing this group up for on-field work, it probably gets to be more of a relevant discussion at that time.

With the Zooms you've added to this, do you have a ballpark of how many prospects you've physically had a conversation with?

Mike Tomlin: We have turned some stones over; I tell you that. We probably need to do that.

I'm telling you; we've touched more guys in this process than we have than any process I've been a part of. It's not anything unusual that we're doing. It's just, again, utilizing the COVID-related tools coupled with the normal back-to-business approaches that we've had. It's just providing a broader net for us.

Broderick Jones Conference Call Transcript

Did you get any indication of how much the Steelers were interested in you? Were you surprised that they took you?

There wasn't any indication, but I know a lot of teams liked me. They were on my list. I like the Steelers a lot. I rock with Coach Mike Tomlin a whole bunch. I feel like he understands me. I'm just ready to get to it.

There was a lot of belief that the Jets were going to take you with the 15th pick if the Patriots didn't make the trade with the Steelers. Were you expecting to become a Jet?

You know, this is the NFL Draft. I really wasn't expecting anything. I was just waiting on my name to be called. At the end of the day, the Steelers did what they could to get me. So, I'm happy with what happened. I'm just ready to get down to Pittsburgh and continue to grow and be the best person I am.

You were here about 10 days ago for the Top 30 visit. When you met with the Steelers, did they talk with you about whether they could see you on the left side or the right side? What did they tell you about your fit that could happen here?

They told me I'm a football player. At the end of the day, it doesn't matter where they stick me on the line. I'm going to give my best effort. My best shot. I'm going to fight to the end. Wherever they want to put me at, they can use me wherever. I'm willing to work, continue to push and just help this team wherever I can.

What was it like when you came here for the Pre-Draft visit? Who did you talk to? What was it like for you?

Man, I talked to everybody. I felt like I was at home. I'm not going to lie, I felt like I was at Georgia. I felt like the energy was there. At the end of the day, I was in love with the Pittsburgh Steelers when I left, and I became one. So, that's the end of that story.

Broderick, along those same lines, what does it mean to you to be a Pittsburgh Steeler, a member of such a storied franchise?

Yeah, that means a lot to me. I just can't wait to get to Pittsburgh and start that journey, you know? It's a whole new journey. I can't wait to start that process over. I can't wait to keep growing and hit the peak of my growth because I'm not done yet. I'm not near as close to being to the end goal so I'm ready to get back to work and perfect my craft.

The Steelers' last two first-round picks are the quarterback you'll be blocking for and the running back that you'll be blocking for. What do you know about [Kenny] Pickett as the quarterback and Najee Harris as the running back?

I don't know too much about them. I know both are great dudes through just watching the interviews and seeing them on social media and stuff. Najee, we played against him my freshman year. I wasn't able to go but just watching him, he's a dog. Kenny Pickett's a dog. That's all Pittsburgh is. Pittsburgh breeds dogs and I believe that's why they picked me.

What's your relationship like with George Pickens?

George Pickens is my guy, man. We have a great relationship.

How would you describe your playing style and your playing personality?

Physical, fast and dominant.

Broderick Jones Introductory Press Conference Transcript

Opening Statements:

Art Rooney II: Good afternoon. Thanks for joining us here this afternoon. We're excited to have Broderick [Jones] here to introduce him as our first-round draft pick. As you all know, Broderick comes off two national championships and no sacks allowed this year, so really a great resume and we're excited to have him join the group.

Broderick is somebody who thinks big. When he first came here to visit us on his 30 visit, when he was in my office, he told me I didn't have a big enough television. When we were meeting today, he reminded me again that I need to get a bigger television. So, he's a bigger guy who thinks big, and that's the way we like it.

Broderick, welcome to Pittsburgh and come on up.

Broderick Jones: First of all, I would like to thank Mr. [Art] Rooney [II], Omar [Khan], Coach [Mike] T[omlin] just for the great opportunity to be here. It's just a blessing to be here in Pittsburgh with the Steelers. It's something I've always dreamed about since the process started. They've been on my tail. This feels like home, and I'm glad to be home.

You alluded to this being a really good fit yesterday when we talked to you, and you've spent a ton of time with these guys. Why do you think it's such a perfect match?

Just because of the energy. The vibe that I get from everybody within the organization. Like I said, it just feels like I'm at home. It feels like I'm back at Georgia. Feels like I'm back at Lithonia High School. So, I feel like I can thrive in a system like that, where I feel comfortable.

You were a five-star recruit in high school, offered early by Georgia and committed early to Georgia, came in, started and now you're a first-round pick after three years. When did you know that you wanted to walk this path and have this be your journey?

Really, like eighth grade. I knew I wanted to take football to the next level. So, eighth grade, that's when I started to see growth within my game and really started to take it serious.

It was reported during the pre-draft process that Georgia practiced the 1s against the 1s. Is that accurate?

Yes sir.

Can you talk about the last couple of years? There's a lot of guys on defense that went through there that are in the NFL now. Do you have any memorable moments, and can you talk about going against some of those guys?

It's tough. But one thing I remember is as a freshman when I first went in – there's this thing you call a dog drill, basically one-on-ones – I had to go against six people that all went first round as a freshman coming in and lost every single rep. It humbled me, but I just continued to work, continued to better myself. But like you said, going versus as many people as I can remember, Travon [Walker], Azeez [Ojulari], Jermaine Johnson, Adam Anderson, Nolan Smith, you have no choice but to get better going against that many first rounders because that's what it is. It's iron sharpening iron every day.

Follow-up: Did that take a little getting over, that 0-for-6?

Man, I'm still feeling that to this day.

Follow-up: Are you looking to have some payback against some of them?

Oh yeah. Oh yeah, I've got to get my payback.

It would have been easier to take the easy route and go somewhere else, maybe step in and start right away. What kept you there and what is it about your personality that wanted to keep fighting?

That wasn't the reason I went to Georgia, you know? I knew it was going to be tough going in as a freshman, but I wanted to be a part of the building process. Georgia was on the uprise, so I just wanted to be able to be a part of something bigger than me. I feel like Georgia was the best fit for me. They had coaches that were able to help me improve my game, on and off the field. So, I just felt like that was the best fit. I didn't feel like that anywhere else I visited. I just decided to stick it out and it worked out for the best.

You're still a young guy. College guys have opportunities now that they didn't five years ago if they want to stay. What was your thought process in turning pro? You guys have it going down there.

I just felt like my job was finished at the University of Georgia. Two national championships, SEC championship, All-SEC ... I felt like I did all I could there. I felt like there was nothing left for me to do there. So, it was time for me to move on to bigger and better things.

When you started last season, did you think the opportunity next spring would be there? Mike T[omlin] was talking about how the guys last year were talking you up, saying you were the guy to watch in next year's draft. Was the plan for last year to be your last ride, or did something happen during the course of the season that made you think you could excel to the next level?

It was more so throughout the course of this season. Last year, I really wasn't thinking about that. I had just started playing for real. So, that wasn't really going through my head at the time. I was just trying to better myself as a person and continue to level up my game. It really was throughout the course of this season when I really started to think about the decision to declare, and we made it to this point.

How did you decide on 77? Does that have any meaning to you?

Yeah, my roommate from the University of Georgia, he wore 77. Devin Willock, the one that passed away in the crash. They told me the number was available, and I just wanted to show my respect by taking that number and letting him live through me.

I was reading that you're really close with your family and you guys are really tight knit. What was that moment like when you got the phone call that the Steelers traded up to draft you? Can you walk us through those emotions?

It was a big moment. Very emotional. Before my mom even heard my name called on the TV, she was crying because she knew I was on the phone with Coach. It was just an amazing feeling. Just having everybody there, my whole support system. I can't even put it into words, the emotions that I was feeling going through my head at the time. Just sitting there with them, talking to Coach, was too much at once for me. So, I just had to sit back, take a breath, just enjoy the moment.

Did you know it was the Steelers calling you? There have been stories of people having their phone on do not disturb, or a spam call, or whatever. Did you know?

I'm not going to lie to you. I'm sitting there, I heard my phone ring, I didn't even look at it. I just answered it. I didn't even see who was calling. I just picked it up.

Follow-up: When did you realize it was the Steelers?

When Coach said his name, I said, 'Oh, yes.'

Who have been some of the most impactful people in your life that helped you reach this point?

My mom. She does a lot for my family. So, just being able to watch her and see what she did for us growing up. She sacrificed a lot, so I just want to be able to give back and show my gratitude and my thanks to her.

When you look back at everything you've done in your football career to get you to this point, what are you the most proud of?

Most proud of? Probably the way I play. Coming in as a freshman at the University of Georgia, I didn't play like I play now with the physicality, with the toughness. So, that's probably my biggest accomplishment, just being able to play with that edge, that physicality, that dominance.

Follow-up: How did you develop that?

Just the University of Georgia. The way we practice, the way we get after every day. You have no choice but to practice like that, because if not, you're going to be on the sidelines somewhere watching practice and not in practice. I'd rather tough it out, the little bumps and bruises, and continue to fight through and push through because that's the only way the team is going to get better. That's the only way I'm going to get better at the end of the day.

Does it matter where you play? Do you feel more comfortable on one side or the other?

I play wherever the team needs me to play.

I understand you have some interesting hobbies. Dirt bike riding, you like snakes... How did you get involved with those kinds of things?

My friend had a snake. It was back in high school, which freaked me out at first just like everybody else in the room. But once I got used to being around him and his pet snake, I just decided to get one on my own.

Follow-up: Do you just have one?

No, I've got two now.

Follow-up: What are their names?

Pablo and Piper.

Follow-up: Did they come with you on this visit?

No, Coach told me to leave the snakes at home.

What do you feel like you learned over those last two runs to the national championship about what it takes for an organization to be great at that level and not just about football, but all the other things?

Just playing with an edge, really. At the end of the day that's what it is. To be the best, you've got to beat the best. Nobody plays as physical as us. Nobody was running the ball like us. Nobody was taking shots down the field like us. You've just got to be able to play dominant. You've got to play physical. You've got to play tough. You've got to thug it out at the end of the day. That's the only way you go in. So that's really what I learned from the University of Georgia.

You spent a year behind Jamaree [Salyer] at Georgia and he was drafted last year. How much of an influence was he while you two were at Georgia together? Was he much of a help at all throughout this draft process, knowing that he went through this last year?

Man, he was a big help. When I first got there, he took me in all the way till the time he left. I still talk to him to this day. He congratulated me last night, and I talked to him. So, just being able to sit back behind him and just soak up all the knowledge was a big blessing for me, because he taught me a lot. I can say he helped me in many different ways.

Follow-up: What's he told you so far about being a pro or these first few steps into being a rookie?

We really haven't talked about it much. That conversation hasn't come up, but one day it will soon.

You said you started taking it really seriously in eighth grade. What makes you love football? What made you want to keep yourself dedicated to it, committed in the weight room and everything?

Just the bonds that I was able to build really. The brotherhoods I was able to be a part of. It was something different. That's a lifelong journey right there. Just being able to have those people around you who can help better you within your life on and off the field, like the Nolan Smiths. Nolan's the type of person I want to have in my wedding as the best man. He's that type of person. So, just building those bonds and those relationships really.

I know you just got here, but have any players reached out from the Steelers yet?

Yeah, a couple reached out. Kenny [Pickett], Najee [Harris], Cam [Heyward], a lot of different players. Too many to name. Just thanking me, congratulating me, telling me it's time to work now. I'm ready to get here and get started on my new journey and see what the future holds.

You were a pretty good basketball player as well. How do you feel that sport helped your skillset and when did you realize that football would be the path to professional sports?

I feel like basketball helped a lot, just with footwork, with foot speed, hand-eye coordination, a whole bunch of different things. But I always knew it was going to be football when I stopped growing. I just played basketball to stay in shape, but I always knew it was going to be football. I always loved football, but basketball, I can say it helped my game a lot.

Follow-up: Have you stopped growing?

I wouldn't say I stopped, but it slowed down. It slowed down on me. I knew I wasn't going to be 6-foot-9, so basketball had to come to a halt.

I know part of the welcome to Pittsburgh was seeing the Franco Harris statue and everything. Did you know a lot about Franco before you saw the statue? Did you know that was going to be part of the introduction to the city at the airport?

I actually saw it when I came on my 30 visit. I really didn't know much but just being able to take pictures with my fans, my family, was a big deal because it means a lot to this city. I'm a part of this city now, so you know it means something to me, too.

Is your family here with you now?

Yes.

General Manager Omar Khan and Head Coach Mike Tomlin – 4.27.23

Opening Statement:

Omar Khan: As you guys are aware, we traded up and acquired Broderick Jones. As late as this afternoon, we've been going through detailed strategy meetings, and Broderick was a player we identified would be a great addition to our team. When we saw how the Draft was going and he was still sitting there, we started making some phone calls to see if there was an opportunity to trade up and get him and fortunately, we were able to make that trade with New England.

Really excited. I think he's going to be a really great Steeler for a long time. I love his athleticism. Love the upside with him. We got off the phone with him, talked to him and he was really excited.

With that, I'll open it to any questions. We've got more business to do in the draft room here, so fire away.

How did you know to wait for pick 14 to come along?

Omar Khan: It's just part of the process. You just make phone calls, and you get a feel for what people are willing to do. Some people, some clubs are a no; other clubs are a maybe. You just stay close to the phone and stay in contact with the clubs that might be interested. And it just so happened that with New England, it worked out.

Talk about left versus right, and what he can do and what impact it might have on your existing offensive line?

Omar Khan: I'll let Coach speak to that, but I'll just say, hey, our job is to bring in competition. And I would say that by the time we get to the opening game, the best five offensive lineman will play, and we'll see. That's Coach [Mike Tomlin]'s area. See how it shakes out.

Mike Tomlin: He's a really talented guy. We were excited about him, really, at every step of the process. We had dinner with him the night before the Pro Day. Had a chance to spend time with him in his environment.

It was interesting, I was in Athens a year ago and took a group of his former teammates out 12 months ago, and I said, give me a name that we're going to be back for in 12 months. And universally, Broderick's name was the guy's name that we got 12 months ago. That was the first time I really heard his name.

In investigating, I see why they held him in such high regard. He's a really good player right now. But the upside is tremendous. He's a Diaper Dandy. We're excited about getting him in the fold and teaching him and letting him sort himself out.

In terms of the division of labor and who is going to do what, those things will be decided in the team developmental process but make no mistake, we are excited about having a young man of his talent.

Is it a case of playing the board; if you knew you wanted him, and if he wasn't going to be there at 17?

Mike Tomlin: The scenarios are countless. We had a high level of preparedness. Obviously, we were not willing to mortgage anything above a third-day pick. He got within range. There had been a run at his position. There were some teams potentially in front of us that may have had an interest in the position. It was a player that we coveted, and so we did what we needed to do to secure the player that we identified.

Omar Khan: The value was right for us for the trade.

You have a reputation of being aggressive over these last 12 months. Do you like that?

Omar Khan: I don't know if I'd call myself aggressive. I'm just trying to win a Super Bowl. That's what I'm trying to do.

Mike Tomlin: He's aggressive.

If you look at who got picked the next couple selections thereafter, a lot of the teams that went next were kind of looking at the same positions and maybe the same players. Did that make the negotiations a little muddy? How did you navigate that?

Omar Khan: We were prepared with clubs in front of us and behind us, and what their needs are, and it just sort of worked out. It was more about us, really, wanting the player; and we found somebody that was willing to trade for and at the value that we were comfortable with.

Trading for a tackle, what does that say about the investment you guys are making in your two first-round picks in Kenny [Pickett] last year and Najee [Harris] the year before?

Mike Tomlin: We are just trying to build a quality football team. We are not trying to make statements.

Do you feel his limits are just starting to scratch the surface?

Mike Tomlin: He's got big-time upside, but I also say that he's a really good player right now.

You always talk about meeting with guys at those pro day dinners, like Cam Sutton. What did you learn about Broderick in that environment and what makes him tick?

Mike Tomlin: He's got a competitor's mentality. He's wired right for this line of work. He's got a desire to be great. He's highly competitive. There's a reason why he put himself in that environment. He's been part of a winner. He understands that we are in the winning business. He values that. He's experienced that.

Sometimes you can't really value that unless you've been a part of it, and obviously the run that university has been on with their football program, they have won about as much as you can win over the time he spent playing a significant role for them.

Your offensive line is one of the most improved units, and yet you've paid attention to bringing in some new faces. What's the thought process?

Mike Tomlin: We are just trying to improve our football team.

You had spoken about his upside. What intangibles or leadership qualities did you find in Broderick?

Mike Tomlin: We are not necessarily looking for leadership qualities in a third-year junior. We believe that's potentially in his future. But those guys, man, we like them for their physical pedigree, the things that they can do and the overall trajectory of their game and their lives. So, he's an exciting guy. The leadership component of it will develop, I'm sure, with time.

On the phone, he said he left here and felt like Pittsburgh was home. Could you guys feel that from him as well?

Omar Khan: Yeah, we've spent a lot of time with him. We met with him at Indy. We flew down to Georgia. Had dinner with him along with several of his teammates. So, we got the opportunity to watch him interact and how he was with them and then spent a great deal of time with him the day of the Pro Day, and then we brought him in for a visit.

I think you guys can ask him here, I don't know if you guys had a chance to talk to him yet, but he's extremely excited. He felt at home here I think when he left.

Who did he say to keep an eye on for next year?

Mike Tomlin: I'll keep that under my cap, but nice try. You're always working.

Are you guys done for today?

Omar Khan: We'll see.

Mike Tomlin: We're still open for business. I think it's just prudent to be. Man, this is a quality draft. We have to get back in the back.

We talked to him, and he used the phrase physical, fast and dominant; those are adjectives he used to describe himself. Was there a particular moment in games where those adjectives stood out to you, a game or a play that encapsulated those descriptions?

Omar Khan: I think he was consistent in all those areas. He's a national champion, two-time national champion, and he just kept growing from the first game he started. We pretty much watched every game he's played, and I think it's all that, and more.

Do you think with the history with George Pickens, it might develop an automatic synergy that will embed itself with the offense?

Omar Khan: Obviously they know each other, and George is a great player, and we feel great about Broderick and we'll see where that relationship goes. But I know they know each other and held each other in a high regard.

Was this a surprising first round, a bunch of different moves? How difficult was it to do business? What was it like for you, a hectic couple hours?

Omar Khan: Yeah, it was exciting, let me put it that way.

You know, there were a lot of, I think everyone that was watching the Draft would probably say there were several moves that were probably unexpected and surprises, and we see these moves pretty much at the same time everybody else does. It was an interesting time. We are just really excited we were able to move up and make that trade.

What's it like working with the Patriots?

Omar Khan: It was great today. It was good. We got a deal done. Win-win. You know, just excited. We got Broderick Jones, it's exciting.

Joey Porter Jr. Press Conference Transcript

Opening Statement:

I just want to thank the Rooney family, Coach [Mike] Tomlin and the whole organization for picking me and trusting me to put on for Steeler Nation. I'm here and I'm ready.

It has to be really exciting for you to play here, your hometown team where your dad played.

I mean, yeah, this is something that was always in the back of my mind, and even my family's mind, what if I end up in Pittsburgh? So now that I'm here, we're just trying to figure out where I'm going to live now. So, it's a good feeling to have.

You were connected to the Steelers throughout the entire process. What was it like tonight when you got the call?

It was great. Last night, I was mad. I had the edge on me. This is a perfect way to end my day right here. I just forgot all about last night and shoot, I'm ready. I got a chip on my shoulder. I'm trying to prove myself.

Going in the second round, does that add a little bit of juice coming in here to prove yourself?

Definitely, definitely. It adds a little more fuel to the fire, and that just gives me even greater reason to go out and put on for Steeler Nation and my pops and everything.

Follow-up: Is that why you didn't stay in Kansas City?

Yeah, I was a little upset. But also, I'm not going to put on the same suit twice. I'm not going to do that. So, I'm going to go home and relax with the family.

There's so much talk about you following in your dad's footsteps, but what excites you the most about being able to write your legacy?

It's going to be my flavor to it. It's me. It's not him. He understands that it's my time to shine. He did what he had to do. It's my time right now and I'm going to get the fans' attention with that, and I'm going to play hard ball.

You know this defense. How do you feel you fit within the scheme?

This is Steelers defense. This is what we're about. Hard football, we're going to smack you in the mouth. We're going to play aggressive, and I feel like that fits my game style. I'm going to get in your face, I'm going to talk a little trash, but we're going to play.

Is this almost a decent way for this to have happened? Now you've come here as their second pick. The stuff about only being here because you're Joey [Porter Sr.]'s son, that's dented now, isn't it? They went up and got another guy and they still wanted you anyways. Does that help?

Yeah, yeah, definitely helped the narrative. Definitely. I'm just blessed to be here. That chip on my shoulder is going to last and I'm going to prove myself that I feel like I'm that guy. I feel like I was CB1 that year, and we're going to see this year when the season starts.

Did it feel different walking through here? You've been here obviously numerous times. Coming through here as the Steelers draft pick, does it feel different at all yet?

No, it's like a stroll in the park. I kind of already knew everything about this facility. I'm just giddy going in there because I know it's time to work. It's time. It's business.

You mentioned you talk a lot of trash. Can you compete with your father in that regard?

Of course. I feel like I can talk a little bit better than him. But yeah, that's just my competitive edge.

Out at training camp covering guys like Antonio Brown, you're a 14, 15-year-old kid at the time, what was that like and how did that help you?

I mean, it gave me the utmost confidence. I was going against the best at that time, considerably. So, just to be able to work with him and work with the Steelers at that young age, everybody can't do that. So, I was just really happy to be in that moment, soaked it all in and took it with me.

What was today like after the disappointment of last night? Were you expecting this could happen?

No, I was not expecting it. After last night, I was like, anything could happen with this draft. I kind of had that going into it, but there's always that little voice in the back of your head saying maybe the Steelers could draft you. So, when they were on the clock, and then the time was winding down, I was like, dang, they might not get me. But then I saw that 412 number pop up, and I'm like, okay, yeah, I'm coming home. So, it was great.

Do you remember your dad playing for the Steelers?

Yeah, definitely.

What did your dad say to you about yesterday and not getting picked, and then what did he say to you today?

He just said use that as fuel. He knows me, he knows how it gets, so he understands how I'm coming for the season. I've got something to prove. This just gives me an even greater reason.

You said at the Combine you're more like your mom, you're easy going. Now you're more like your dad.

Yeah, I'm kind of turnt right now. I'm a little bit mad. But I'm just happy at the same time. So, I don't know how to feel, but I'm just happy to be back.

What made you want to drive down here? A lot of guys that get picked do a conference call. They're usually not in the same city as the team that drafts them, but why come down here tonight?

It was right across the street. It wasn't too far of a drive. We were like, 'Might as well go see everybody, chill with everybody.' It was a great little reunion.

Were you at your parents' house watching?

Yeah, I was. Yeah.

You mentioned bringing your own flavor. How are you going to do that?

I just feel like I bring a different approach to the game. He was really turned on and off the field a little bit. He didn't have the off mode a little bit, but I feel like, like I said before that you brought up, I'm like my mom and my dad. It just gives a little spice to the gang.

What's your relationship like with Mike Tomlin, and did he share anything memorable after you were selected?

I mean, yeah, me and Coach T[omlin] have a great relationship. I'm close with the family. Me and Dino Tomlin are great friends. We talk every day, basically. It was business at the end of the day, and that's what he told me. He's like, 'It's funny, because it's kind of like a family thing, but at the end of the day it's business.' So every time I walk in here, we've got to treat it like business, and I'm all about that, and I'm ready.

Along those lines, being drafted by the Steelers brings a lot of excitement, but it brings a lot of expectations for you, too. How do you anticipate dealing with it? When things don't go smoothly or just knowing that you are following in some big footsteps.

I mean, it comes with the game. I didn't do this for no reason. I understand what my dad did and understand his legacy. I'm trying to add on to the family legacy. So, there's going to be some ups and downs with that, but I'm ready.

When they traded up to 14, did you know that it wasn't for you? Did you think it could have been for you? There was only one corner who was gone at the time.

I thought I was coming home at 14. I was like, okay, this is the jump. I heard talks about the Patriots. It was all kind of stuff on the news and in social media about where I was going, where everybody was going. So, when they made that trade, I was like, I could possibly be going home right here. Then they did their pick, and it is what it is.

You're probably the biggest corner they've had here since Mel Blount. Have you ever talked to Mel, met him or anything like that?

No, but I wish I would.

Has it hit you yet? Has it sunken in?

Yeah, definitely. I'm all in the Steelers gear. It's crazy.

You were talking on a podcast with Patrick Peterson about the possibility of this. What do you imagine you'll be able to gather and benefit from his leadership and his experience?

I mean, he's a Hall of Fame cornerback, so I'm just glad to be paired with him and get to soak as much up as I can. He did a lot with this sport, and I'm just happy to be paired with him.

You talked about your dad's legacy and obviously he's given a lot back to this community. What does all that mean to you to be able to continue that here in the same city?

I mean, it means everything to me. It makes it easier for me and my mom and really the whole family to do what we always do and just keep pushing with that foundation.

What was your dad's reaction? Did he give you any advice?

I mean, he was excited. He was probably louder than me a little bit. But he was ready. He said you just go in with that chip on your shoulder. You know you're pissed off a little bit, but they'll know, too.

Talk a little bit about your journey coming up through Pittsburgh and the people who helped you get to this point. Of course, your dad, people like your conditioning coach Sean McCaskill and some others who helped you and your growth and maturation to get to this point.

I mean, they're all excited for me. They're happy for me. They're all outside. Even Sean McCaskill, my DB trainer. This is a great moment. Everybody's happy I'm staying at home and I'm just excited to be with Steeler Nation and just kick this thing off.

Teryl Austin Press Conference Transcript

Opening Statement:

Excited to get Joey [Porter Jr.]. We knew we wanted a young cornerback. He's got a lot of great attributes. Size, length, competitive, tough. Really good. Really glad we were able to get him to come in and contribute to our team. We're looking forward to him coming in, competing and having an opportunity to help us win games this year. There's no red shirts, none of that stuff. Hopefully, when he gets here, we'll get right to work.

Did you ever think he would be there at 32? Why do you think he fell a little?

You never know, the Draft is a crazy thing. So, you don't know how it falls. I think when you saw the quarterbacks go, a lot of people were saying, 'Hey, these are the top two corners.' And the other one didn't go until 17th or 18th. You thought, 'Hey, there's going to be some really good players here at 32.' We were fortunate it was him.

How important was it to get an outside corner?

I think it was very important. I really loved the way our guys competed last year. We led the league in interceptions. But we were probably in the bottom five in terms of big plays. So, we wanted to make sure we got some competition, some help out there, so that we can eliminate those things.

Is it your plan, right now, for him to come in and start day one?

Well, no. Everybody is going to have to earn it. But he is going to have every opportunity to get in there and show us what he can do.

What do you see from Joey's skillset? He only had one interception in his career in college. But what do you see from him that leads you to believe that he can produce more at the next level?

Well, when you look at him, he's tall. He's strong. He's long. He gets his hands on receivers. He's a big target to throw over. I remember, a long time ago when I was in Seattle, we had signed Bobby Taylor and Matt Hasselbeck would throw some balls toward him in practice. And he goes, 'I know I think I can get it there but he's just so long that it makes you pause.' I think that is something with quarterbacks. That length is an issue, because he does have a big radius to be able to get back to a ball that he may look like he's out of position on. I think he's got a lot of really good NFL traits. We know the issue in terms of lack of ball production, but that's something that you can work on. As long as he's doing all the other things he does well, we'll be glad with him.

Obviously, he's someone who has a lot of familiarity with people in the building and vice versa. How much does that help him in his transition? Just being around here and growing up here?

It's more, not the people in the building or his dad, he's basically coming home. A lot of young guys are going to a new city. They have to learn a new way to live. This stuff, he all knows. That's less stress to a young guy coming in, so he can really concentrate more on the football part of it.

Sometimes you worry about their agility or quickness. He didn't time in the three-cone. Were you worried about him?

No. The one thing I've learned in my time in this League, those big guys are going to look different than the little guys. They may not look as fast or maybe sometimes not even move as fast, but they cover more ground. When I've had the taller corners, sometimes it doesn't look the same, but boy the job gets done the same. He may not move as fast as a smaller guy in terms of lateral movement but the ground he covers is going to be bigger and better. So that's what I looked at and I have no reservations about that part of his game.

I know sometimes it can be made into a big deal when you have a rookie come in and there's a guy like Patrick Peterson there to have that mentor role. What excites you about the two of them working together this coming season?

Just what you said. I think that's really good. I remember, when I first got to Detroit, Darius Slay was going into his second year and Rashean Mathis was a veteran corner. That dynamic was outstanding for both of them. The young guy keeps the older guy loose, and the older guy gives his knowledge to the young guy. If the young guy is willing to take it, there's a great dynamic there and I think we can get that same type of dynamic because everybody knows the type of guy Pat P[eterson] is and Joey is a great young man. I think those two guys working together along with the other guys in our room and Grady [Brown] and everybody is going to be good. He's going to be in an environment that gives him an opportunity to succeed.

That natural extra attention with him being Joey [Porter Sr.]'s son, the Penn State guy, the local guy. In a way, is that mitigated some by him being a second rounder as opposed to trading up at 14 or getting him at 17 when you've got another good player already and you gave other teams a chance to get him?

I don't think so. I don't worry about that. Most of the guys don't worry about that. They just worry about coming in and competing. I don't think that pressure would be any different no matter where he went. Whether we traded up, took him at 17 or got him when we got him. I think that pressure is the same for players to come in and perform. I don't think it would be anything added.

What about his demeanor not only before, but going through the draft process and evaluating him tells you in his demeanor that he can handle that pressure?

I think the big thing with him was it was always that he knew what he had to do, and it wasn't because of who his dad was and why people were coming in. They were coming in to see him because he was a good player. And I think he understood that right from the beginning and he handled it like a true professional, like what you want to see these guys do when they go through this process and that's part of the process. Seeing how the guys handle things. How do they react when the coaches are in? One of the things we do when we go in the buildings, and we go to workouts, we always talk to other people in the building. How is he around other people? There wasn't a bad word to be said about the young man. And so, we feel really, really comfortable in terms of that.

You mentioned Patrick Peterson, getting him and Joey, how has that changed the dynamic of that position and your defense?

I don't know what it's going to do until we get him in the building. All I know is we've added another piece we think is a talented piece and we will kind of figure that out as we go. Maybe in Latrobe, I'll have a little better answer for you, how's that?

You mentioned his competitiveness, how has that manifested so far for you?

Well, I think when you watch a guy that competes there's going to be times that things happen out there that aren't the best, but you always watch him and he's continuing to scrap. The energy level doesn't change, the way he plays the game doesn't change and you like the guys that have that type of mentality when they play because there is going to be a lot of things. There's going to be ebbs and flows in the games, but he doesn't allow that to affect him. He plays the game from start to finish the way you're supposed to.

Do you think there was a lot of interest in moving up to that 32nd pick? What were some of the discussions like in the room about a possible trade and what made you ultimately decide to stick to the pick?

That is above my pay grade, and we picked that guy, so I have no answer for you there.

Joey was obviously very gregarious and a trash talker. What would you say about his personality? Is he like his dad, is he not like his dad? And what drew him to you as a person?

That would be hard, to live up to your dad's trash talking. Joey's as good as there ever was. But he's his own person, really attentive. My interactions with him, I know I was up there with the Pro Day and had a good chance, I was kind of running it a little bit and sticking my nose in there because I wanted to be involved and see how he was. A really good listener, going to ask the right questions and do what you ask him to do because he wants to be good, he wants to excel. And so, I don't know if he'll be a big trash talker, I don't really care about that, all I care about is how does he play on Sundays, and I think he's setting himself up to give himself an opportunity to be a good player.

Does his skill set match with the way you guys like to play press with the ability he has shown?

I think it does. One of the things we always do is we look at guys and we want to know, 'Hey, how do they play in the press?' Because we are going to play man and you guys know that, but we are also going to play some zone and we are also going to ask these guys to tackle some big backs in our division. He's got that ability to do all of those things. When you start looking at skill sets, I felt really comfortable with what he brought to the table for us, and we were good there.

Was he seriously considered at 17 if you weren't able to trade up?

Like I said, that is above my pay grade. You'll have to go down and talk to Omar [Khan] and Mike [Tomlin] about all that stuff. Those are behind closed doors meetings, and they call me when it happens.

Who's the last press-man corner you have had to this degree?

Again, Slay with press man, he was really good. It's been a while since we've run into a big, long guy. I had Bobby Taylor at the end of his career. Bobby was a guy who could get his hands on you and disrupt you, but it's been a while. You don't see guys his size. Jimmy Smith in Baltimore, we drafted Jimmy. Jimmy was 6-foot-2, just a shade smaller, but he was a press guy as well.

This has really been Pittsburgh's tradition, hasn't it?

I think so, when you watch Ike Taylor who's been around, you saw him press on the back side quite a bit. Ike Taylor would be in the 3x1 sets, he would be alone on the back side, and he was able to handle that. I think when you have that dynamic, if you can get that type of guy, it really does help you. When you get a guy that can maybe make it so difficult for the other people, you can maybe kick some coverage do some other things coverage wise to help others.

With all the corners that were coming down overnight with Porter still on the board at 32, were you anxious, were you nervous, were you excited? What were your emotions waiting until this decision was made to go get him?

I don't, because I just think the way it's going to shake out is the way it's going to shake out, and whoever it was, it was going to be a Pittsburgh Steeler at 32. We were going to welcome him with open arms and do our best to coach him and help him become the best player he can be. Now, it happens that it is Joey and that's great, but I really don't get anxious at those things. I just kind of understand that whoever we bring in here at 32, we anticipate that guy is going to help us win games and going to be a good Pittsburgh Steeler.

He's a guy who has been around pros since he was a kid. Has that been reflected in his demeanor, just anything intangible wise that you noticed?

I think that may be why, again, when I was there, the feeling I got when interacting with him that he has been around and understood that this an important part of his day and important part of his interview process and how to handle it. It's the same thing, you talk to guys about how to handle themselves, I know he didn't do anything at the Combine, but there's other things that go on and how he handled himself. I think that is something he probably knew and understood because it's a different thing not everyone has a chance to experience, but he did.

Keanu Benton Conference Call Transcript

What did you like about your visit here? Did you have an idea that the Steelers might take you?

I did have a little bit of an idea. I felt like it was a place for me and a place where I felt comfortable at. You know, they have T.J. Watt there, Isaiahh Loudermilk and Nate Herbig. So, I feel pretty comfortable going in as a rookie with these guys.

From a playing standpoint, why is this the place for you?

It's just a place where I can develop my game. I'm not sure where they want me to play at just yet, but I'm just ready to take off with my NFL career.

Before your visit here, how much interaction did you have with the Steelers? Did you meet with them at other stops?

I've talked to their scouts a couple of times. Just kind of talking to me when I thought about coming out after my third year. After I did come out and declare, I pretty much talked to them the most.

It certainly sounds like you know about the Steelers personnel with their Wisconsin connections. What do you know, schematically, about their approach up front on the defensive line? Where do you think you'll fit in best there?

I think I'll fit in best between the 0 and the 3. I'm just grateful to have the opportunity. I think that they have a kind of similar set to us at Wisconsin, and I'm just happy to get it started.

What does it mean to be a Pittsburgh Steeler and how exciting was this moment for you and your family?

It's awesome. I feel like it's just something that I've been waiting on my whole life, to be an NFL player. The Steelers, there's never been a bad taste in my mouth with anything. The Steelers have been a good team since I've known about football so I'm just happy and blessed to be here.

what do you know about Cam Heyward and what do you think about the idea of working with and playing behind a guy like that?

I think it's great. It's going to be awesome working behind a vet who's been there before and who's been doing it for as long as him, just kind of picking his brain and putting my own little schedule together. Just getting help from the veterans who've been there and had success at this level.

It sounds like you've got a lot of people there. Who were you watching the Draft with and what were their reactions when your phone rang?

Yeah, it was a little nuts in here. My family, my family friends and a couple of teammates from Wisconsin, but we are just here at an Airbnb enjoying ourselves.

How would you describe your playing style and from the feedback you've gotten from NFL teams, what do you feel like you'll need to improve to reach that next level?

I feel like I've got a lot of strengths. I feel like my run game is mainly the big thing that a lot of people see. But I feel like in Pittsburgh, I can develop into a great pass rusher. Like I said, kind of get notes from Coach [Karl] Dunbar, who's a great coach, and Cam Heyward.

At what point did you feel this was all starting to come together for you and that you could legitimately play in the NFL?

I would say after my freshman year. It was always something I knew I could achieve just by the way I worked and the progress that I've made in the past years. It was just an awesome opportunity to play at Wisconsin and let them get to know me, and also make connections there so I can be at this point today.

Speaking of connections, you'll be on the line with T.J. Watt, another Wisconsin product. What do you say about that?

I think it's awesome. I never got a chance to play with him, but I'm pumped to.

They signed a couple of defensive linemen in free agency, they kept a guy in Larry Ogunjobi, they brought in a bunch of offensive linemen. Being bigger, tougher, stronger, upfront in the trenches, was that something they expressed to you that's an agenda around here, and they want you to be a part of it? Was that message sold to you?

Yeah, definitely. Just talking to Coach Tomlin, the main thing I had taken away from that was that he wants goons out there and he wants somebody to come out there who's not afraid to get their nose dirty and I feel like I am that best option for that guy.

This is a division with the Ravens, Bengals and Browns running games. How much do you look forward to those matchups and have you seen that level of physicality if you have ever just tuned in as a casual fan?

I have seen that physicality and I think it's just something that I have to get used to. I feel like I've been doing it for a long enough time that when I come in it's not going to be that big of an adjustment. Just got to continue to keep my body healthy and take those steps I need to to become great.

What intrigues you most about Keanu Benton?

He's a big, strong guy. Really active. Good hands. For a big guy, you'll see him venture outside the box chasing things down. He's got a good motor. You can see he's in really good shape. He plays a lot of snaps. Sometimes you'll watch guys and they're splitting snaps with other guys. He's an 80 to 85 percent guy. So, he keeps himself in really good shape, really good competitive sphere, big strong guy. I like him.

How much did you get to see of him leading up to this during the process and what stood out?

I had a good chance to see him evaluating film. He came in here for a visit and I had the chance to sit down and talk to him. Wonderful guy, it seems like he's got his stuff together. I know that Denzel [Martin] and Grady [Brown] had an opportunity to work with him at the Senior Bowl and they spoke highly of him. So, all the background stuff that we seem to be looking at and look for, he passed all those tests.

You said he can play nose and 3, where do you see him starting out here?

I think we'll start him probably inside as a nose and see what he can do as a 3 or a 4 for us. He's a big body but he's not a two-down guy. So, he'll have some chance to be a guy that can play on third-down and do some things in terms of penetrating and rushing and all those things. We'll probably start him inside as a nose and let him grow into it and see what he does. But he's not strictly that.

This is just one of the several additions that you've made to the defensive line. How much of a concerted effort was there to bolster the trenches?

You always make sure that you bolster the trenches, as you say, because the games are won up front. The receivers and DBs only play as well as the guys in front of them. As far as we look at it, the games are won by the bigs. You have to have depth. It can't just be your front guys. Your front guys get hurt. You've got to have some people be able to step up. I think we've added really good depth, really good competition in both rooms. The offensive line as well, and our defensive line for sure. That's good for us as a team because that makes everybody practice a little harder, play a little harder, get a little better as football players. It's our job to make sure the best players are out there for us.

You have a number of defensive players on the team from the Big Ten, including your last two picks. What is it about that conference and the defensive guys that they're producing?

When you look at it, I don't know if we look at the conference. But if you're looking at it, they're going to run the ball. You're going to see teams that line up and run the ball. It's not going to be a finesse football game. You're going to see guys that have

to play in different weather, different conditions that are similar to here in Pittsburgh. Sometimes you'll be picking the unknown, not ever having seen a guy play in those type of weather conditions. But you know all those things about guys from the Big Ten. So, there's a comfort level. I don't know how much that really goes into it but there is obviously something there.

Along those lines, Wisconsin specifically, with the odd-man front, how much easier is it to project what a guy can do when he's already in that scheme at that level?

Yeah, I think it's always easier when you see a guy do the things you want. There's always less of a projection and more of a certainty, so to say, about what he can do, and you just hope that he continues to do that and continues to get better at his craft.

Are there more similarities than just the odd-man front with Wisconsin? It seems like every year you guys go back to Wisconsin for new people.

Yeah, I think there are probably some similarities and there's some good football players. When you look at a lot of those guys, they kind of fit a Steeler mold. They're tough, they're hard-nosed, blue-collar guys, and you know what you're getting when you get a guy from that school. He's going to be tough, he's going to be physical, he's going to give you everything he has. So, I think there is a comfort level, obviously, in that.

How much of a goal or an agenda has it been to build up the depth along the defensive line? Not only with him, but the two guys you got in free agency in the past off-season too to get more quality reps when [Larry] Ogunjobi and [Cam] Heyward aren't playing for instance?

Absolutely, I think again, as I mentioned, you want to make sure you have that quality depth because the games are won up front, and I remember a couple years ago when we weren't very good up front. We got guys hurt and beat up and we weren't very good up front. We struggled to stay in games. So, I think it's a real thing to make sure that we have quality depth, good guys, we know who our front-line guys are, who are the guys that are going to be playing a lot of snaps when those guys aren't available. And I think that makes us a better team, makes us a stronger team and I like that. I think everybody likes that.

Mike [Tomlin] was talking about nose tackles earlier this offseason, and how maybe just because teams are running the ball more doesn't necessarily mean it's more reps for noses because it's run out of pass formations. But, when you look in the division, it seemed like Baltimore was running multiple tight ends out there most of the time. That game here was sort of lost because the defense couldn't stop the run at the end of it. Do you feel like that was specifically something, maybe just because of the division you guys play in, is more important for you than it is for a generic NFL team right now?

I think that's part of our identity. It's important for us. If you're going to beat Cleveland, you'd better be able to stop [Nick] Chubb, if you're going to beat Baltimore, you'd better be able to stop the run. If you're going to beat Cincinnati, we know what the quarterback and those guys are going to do, but you'd better be able to stop Joe Mixon and those guys from running. So, I think it's important that the first thing you've got to do is win in your division, and if you can't beat the guys in your division, you're going to have a hard time winning it. I'm sure we have those things in mind. We're getting those big guys up front to make sure we can stop the run even if they are running out of pass formations. It doesn't matter, you still have to lay your hands on people and get off blocks and stop those running backs.

Keanu is a four-year senior at Wisconsin, When you watch the tape of him, does he stand out as a veteran for the college level? Do you see anything advanced coming from him?

I think so. I think when you watch a guy that makes it all the way in four years, you can see his game is a little more polished than maybe a young guy. So, you're going to see his techniques are a little bit more refined. What he sees, how he sees, blocking schemes are going to be a little bit better than maybe a younger guy. I think those things show up on tape with him.

There's not a ton of sack production that Keanu put up in college, but he did say he got a ton of opportunities to pin his ears back and go at the quarterback. What about his move sets specifically gives you that belief that he has that pass rusher upside?

When you watch a guy that is explosive, he is heavy handed, he gets extension on guys, I think when you see those things and you see that he can roll his hips, I think [Karl] Dunbar and those guys do a great job of teaching guys rush plans and how to use their strengths to become a better rusher. I think he has some of the baseline abilities and that's what we see, and we are counting on him to be a run stopper and get some bonus out of him with being a pass rusher.

From what you have seen over the last four years, will Cam Heyward be a loving, nourishing mentor, or will he be tough love, on top of Keanu mentor in that room?

He'll probably be a little bit of both. Cam's really good. He'll show him some tough love, but he knows when to put an arm around a guy and bring him along with him and I think that's the neat thing about Cam. He has been in this business a long time. He was that guy, 100 years ago, but he was that guy, so he knows what it's like to be a young guy coming in a room with some really veteran players, so he will know when to push him but also know when to put his arm around a guy and say 'Hey, come on man, let's go.'

You've got guys like that at all three levels with T.J. [Watt], Cam, and [Patrick] Peterson. How much of a luxury is that?

It's a great thing, and the thing that is really unique is that our guys really like to give back to others in the room. You can't say that everywhere, but I can say that here. I can say that confidently here that those guys want the other guys in that room to play well because they know it helps our team. I can't say enough good things about how our veterans interact with our younger guys and what they try to do with them. Again, I have not seen Patrick P[eterson] in that role, but I know how our older guys—I know how Joe Haden was with the younger guys in the room and I just see that here. That dynamic in our room and that defensive room.

What's the emotion like right now with everything going on there? How does this feel for you?

Man, the emotion is crazy. This is a dream come true. Not only that, but it also comes with a perk playing alongside my old teammate, George [Pickens], GP. Broderick Jones, we go back to the Under Armour games in high school and now we've played at Georgia together. It's hard for me to speak right now just because of how happy I am. Just to be a Steeler, a great franchise. Just to become a part of that is amazing.

When you got that call and you saw the 412-area code pop up, what was your reaction? How much of an indication did you have that it might have been the Steelers that were going to take you?

For me, when I saw it, I did take a top 30 there. I just had a special connection when I was there and things like that. As I was sitting there, other teams picked these other tight ends and I just started narrowing down my options in my head. I'm not going to say I knew it was going to be the Steelers, but I had a good feeling. One of the best feelings in the world was just seeing my phone ring.

During any of those conversations that you had with the Steelers, did they talk to you at all about how you might be used given that they do have a good tight end here already in Pat Freiermuth? Are you guys going to play together a lot? What sort of vibe are you getting in that context?

It was a quick call, not into details yet but I already know the Steelers have a great tight end room, crazy tight end room at that and now they just added another great one in there. I'm not sure how I'm going to be used but any way possible I'm all for it. If it starts off with special teams, whatever it may be, whatever it is man, I'm all for it. I just recently came from a great tight end room at the University of Georgia. I'm just going to continue to do that and just continue to play my role.

What was it you liked about the visit here? What really stuck out to you?

Man, it was really just the people in the building. Easiest way to put it, quickest way, and the realest way; the people in the building I just had a connection with almost everybody in the building. With that being said, yeah.

There are some reports out there that there are some medical red flags for teams, how much did teams look into that in the pre-draft process and what were they concerned with? How are you feeling, health wise, at this point?

I feel great man, something they probably had concern with is probably the knees because I am tall and a bigger guy but, they're talking about some knee swelling. For me, I've never had injuries with my knees, knock on wood. I never tore anything in the knee. I had surgery on the right one, but it was just to clean some cartilage up. There was no tear, no break, no fracture, no nothing. For people to say that, I mean, all the concerns, at the end of the day, it's just teams taking risks on us players and no other teams wanted to take a risk. For me, a great player, and that's what Pittsburgh got.

It seems like the Steelers made an effort to add tough physical football players who can help them win in the trenches, how do you feel like your playing style fits into that?

Man, that's crazy that you described my whole playing style with that question, that's all I do. You surround the offense with players like George and Kenny [Pickett] and other players on the team, that's a Super Bowl, that's all I got to say.

Matt Canada Press Conference Transcript

Opening Statement:

Obviously, an exciting night. We got two really good players on offense and obviously a bunch of good players for the Steelers on both sides. Really excited about the pick we just had [Darnell Washington] and what he can bring to the table, a versatile guy that can block. You guys have seen the tape, but how physically he plays and he also does some things after the catch. So, really excited about it. I'll answer any questions you guys have.

His blocking seems to get a lot of attention. What stood out about him in that area?

It's all over the tape. He's a giant human being that takes pride in blocking. He enjoys being a blocker. I think he's been quoted saying he's a sixth offensive lineman. He understands what his body can do, and I do think he can catch balls. They had so many weapons at Georgia and I'm not sure his totals are maybe what you might think they could be. He's definitely a blocker, and as a guy, we obviously formal-ed him and met him there in Indy and we had him back. Just a really, really good person. Likes football, likes being physical. Really excited about him.

He said at the Combine that some NFL coaches have been talking to him about playing tackle.

I mean, we weren't in that group, but I mean, he's a huge human being. If you guys have met him in person, he's one of those guys that when you see a person it's going to be like, 'He's bigger than I thought.' He's really been blessed in a lot of different ways physically. He can block, he can run, and again, he's a really good guy.

Larry Brown here was a tight end way back in the 70s and became a great tackle after he slowed down and had some knee issues and they moved him inside. Is that even feasible in today's game?

I wouldn't want to get into if it is or not, but for us, we know where he's going to be and we're excited about his role where he is.

Could he be a redzone target for you? How does he work in that regard?

I mean, he could be anything. Obviously, his size comes into play. We've got a lot of good weapons right now. I do believe because of the weapons they had on their team his pass catching total might not be as impressive to some when you look at just stats but that's what a lot of people do. He does make plays on the ball. He has some run-after-the-catch. He has a couple real impressive highlights running through guys, running over guys. So, yeah, he can be a weapon in different parts of the field. For sure.

This year, is his biggest asset injury insurance for Pat [Freiermuth], or is this an opportunity to expand what you can do with multiple tight ends?

I wouldn't want to limit him on that. Him and Pat are certainly very, very different players. Obviously, depth at that position and what you do with those guys depends on who's on the field. He's a different type of a tight end, but we're certainly looking forward to playing him this year and the opportunities he creates and matchups he creates.

Assuming he and Zach [Gentry] are the more in-line guys, does that give you some more flexibility to move Pat around a little bit?

Yeah, exactly. I mean, I think Pat's a different type of tight end and those two guys, Zach and Darnell, are bigger, more blocking guys. Zach's made some plays down the field and can catch the ball, but certainly Pat is more known for that, right? I mean, that's why the tight end position, I think there's probably two types, two or three in the game right now. I would say those are different types of players, but we think we can match them up pretty well.

Does Connor Heyward have more fullback in his future?

Yeah, I mean, that's probably his body type, right? What he can do, and we've got him as a tight end, but the things he can do, the way we can move him around, maybe not calling him a fullback, but I think his skill set fits that role.

You guys might have the biggest and shortest tight ends in the NFL now. Does Darnell remind you of any tight end you've had or seen? He's been labeled as pretty unique.

No. I think he's such a big guy, and I've said it a lot, but I just think he moves so well for such a big man. Obviously, the reference of being a tackle, when he walked in the room, I believe you would think if you didn't know who he was, you would think he was a tackle, which is nothing bad about that. In fact, he can run, catch and do some things.

You've got a tackle and a tight end known for blocking. Is it safe to say improved blocking and play in the trenches was a focus for you guys this offseason?

Yeah, I mean, obviously Omar [Khan] and those guys did a great job down there, and Coach [Mike] Tomlin, Mr. [Art] Rooney [II], picking who they pick. We're going to do the best we can with the players we get. Obviously, you're talking about on offense two guys that block and are physical and so that's certainly part of it. That's what we're trying to do. I think Coach Tomlin said it really clear, there's no secret of what we're trying to do and how we're trying to play football.

With some of the upgrades you've made on the offensive line, how might the offense evolve based on the different personnel?

I think it gives us more personnel. You talk about the tight end that comes in, and more opportunities, different guys playing, and obviously we want to continue to get better and we have to get better. Where that's going to take us, I don't want to say right now or get into that. But we're really excited about the two guys we just got. We got two really, really good players in two days.

Those guys have won a lot in college. How much of a factor is that into decision making and evaluation, where they come from and what their level of internal expectation might be?

I think that plays into it, but I think, obviously, a lot of it's skillset. Those are probably questions for Mr. Rooney and Omar and Coach Tomlin and those guys. I think we evaluate all those things and the program you come from. There are guys who come from tough places that come in and be great players too. So, I don't think we ever say that, but a guy who knows how to win and guys who have won and expect to win, there's certainly benefits to that. So, in this case, it's a great, great situation and we're excited about it.

It sounds like people are pretty excited where you are. What was that moment like when you got the call from the Steelers? Did you have any idea?

I can't really explain it to you. I'm at a loss for words. This is all I've ever dreamed about, to get a chance to play for the Steelers. Such a legendary organization and I get to play with my brother, so that's all I could ever ask for.

Your brother wasn't a Steeler a few months ago. Now he is, and now you get to play with him. Go deeper into that, what is that like for you?

Me and him talked about this since we were little kids. We grew up and shared the same dream, we work out together, we do everything together. That's my best friend. I don't think blood could make us any closer, and in my brother's famous words, 'I'm just happy to be here.'

Have you ever played together on the same team?

When we were little, but not like this.

Is he there with you now?

Yeah, my brother is with me.

Did Nate [Herbig] lobby for you to get drafted here?

I don't know what he did, but man, this is just a dream come true to play with my brother. I can't really ask for much more.

Did you have meetings with the Steelers in advance?

Yes, I had a meeting with them at the Combine, I met with them a little at Pro Day and the linebacker coach worked me out there, so it just felt like the right place for me and it's exactly where I need to be.

Do you have a hunch as to how they want to use you; inside, outside, both? What are you thinking?

I'm just thinking they want me to come in and be a dog, and that's what I do. So, whatever they want me to do, I'm going to do it. 100 percent.

Take us through the moments when you realized it was the Steelers and what Nate was saying.

I mean, it was like a flood of emotions, because I know how hard my brother worked and I know how hard I worked. To see the fruits of our labor and everything come around full circle is kind of crazy.

Where do you think you really grew as a player this past year?

I think I grew in my leadership role. Taking more of a leadership role, connecting with guys off the field, gaining that trust with one another so when we get on that field it's crisp, it's smooth and we all trust each other.

When you guys were growing up how much did you and your brother talk about possibly playing in the NFL?

When did you both make that a goal for yourselves?

Every day. As long as I can remember, every day. That's all we ever wanted. This is all we worked for. We dedicated our whole life to this. This is it. It's here now. It's time.

With your brother and the moments leading up to realizing the Steelers had called, I don't want to know your feelings, what actually happened?

It didn't feel real. I saw my phone ring Pittsburgh, PA and I was like, 'There's no way, I'm about to be a Steeler with my brother.' I picked it up and it was Mr. [Omar] Khan, and I started crying. I couldn't hold it in.

What did your brother do and say?

My brother just gave me a hug and told me he loved me.

You mentioned that you played with your brother early on. What was the name of that team, and do you have any early memories of playing together on the same football field?

We played for the Kauai Bulldogs together. I was like second grade, he was like sixth grade. It was crazy, I was like a little kid running around with them. We played next to each other on the D-line too. It was pretty fun.

Do you feel like you have a frame if they wanted you to add 10 pounds, that you can beef up to about 250 pounds?

100 percent, I'm going to do whatever they need me to do.

There's more than one Wisconsin guy here now. Do you feel it'll be an easier transition to join this team?

For sure, I think they'll take me under their wing like they already have. T.J. [Watt] has already taken me under his wing, [Isaiah] Loder milk has already taken me under his wing, me and Keanu [Benton] are like best friends. Now that we're all going to be together, I think it'll make the process a lot easier.

What do you think of Keanu as a player and as a teammate at Wisconsin?

Keanu was a beast, man. He was unblockable. I thought he was the best player in the Draft, to be honest. You guys got a dog in Keanu, and I think he's going to be a Steeler for a long time.

Do you have a good anecdote or a good story about Keanu?

I remember one morning we had a Friday walkthrough later on and then he woke up early just to go fishing because that's how he gets his mind off of things. But it's just pretty funny because this guy always has fishing poles, tackle boxes, everything. His car is full of fish and stuff.

Do you think your parents will move here now that you and Nate are both living here? Is the Herbig family just going to move to Pittsburgh at this point?

We might have to. We might have to come take Pittsburgh over.

Nate said a month ago that the one person he can't block would be you. Do you believe that he believes that?

I guess we'll find out, won't we?

The Steelers have had a lot of these family relationships over the years. Are you familiar with that? They've had Watt brothers, now they have the Heyward brothers, they've had Edmunds brothers. Is that something that put it in your mind that it could be a possibility that they'd do this again with you guys?

Yeah, I mean, the Steelers are everything I'm about. Faith, family and football. That's it. Everything's so right. They're all about family, all about everything. Now that me and my brother are there, we're looking to keep that trend going.

Opening Statement:

We took Nick Herbig from Wisconsin, outside linebacker. Really like his pass-rush ability, really like his competitiveness. His toughness is on tape. I think you see it, it's very evident. I'm very excited to get to work with him. Looking forward to it.

Any questions?

You like his pass-rush ability. Is he primarily going to be an outside guy for you, or is going to play off-the-ball inside?

Right now, he's going to start at outside linebacker. That's what we have him at. Yes sir.

Will you try and put a few extra pounds on him?

We'll have to get with Gie [Garrett Giomont]. That's one of those things where if that's what they want to do, I think we'd like—240 is good. Obviously, could gain some weight, but we'll get with Gie on that. That's a little above me, but I like him right now at his 240 weight, to be honest with you.

Obviously, there's already another Herbig on the roster. How much was Nate [Herbig] lobbying you guys to take a serious look at his brother and draft him?

I don't know, I haven't I haven't talked to Nate besides seeing him in the building. I don't know. I'm sure he's very excited. Nick was crying on the phone, couldn't really understand him. So, I guarantee mom, dad, Nate, everybody's excited about this.

How much exposure did you have to him personally in this process?

So, I got to sit with him at the [NFL] Combine. We talked for a little bit at the Combine informally, but that's about it. Other than that, I know a few guys at Wisconsin, just from being around and talking to those people, just knowing how he is.

Did you go to his Pro Day?

No, I was not there.

You know a few guys from Wisconsin. I think there's four within the front seven on your defense. What is it about the Badgers? Is it their scheme, the players they recruit, what do you like about them?

I just think they do a good job. I think they do a lot of things we do on defense too. I just think they're smart. They know what they're looking for and on the recruiting trail, and I think it's just attractive to us.

Is he athletic enough where he has options where he can move around? Is he that type of player?

Oh, yeah, he's definitely athletic enough to do that. But like I said, we're going to start him at that outside backer and try to make a big-time player out of him there first.

You guys have a long history of taking guys in the middle rounds and then developing them into really good edge rushers. What's the key to something like that?

Just trying to figure out their weaknesses and hammering it home, and staying on our standard, what we feel as coaches, making sure they deliver to our standard and staying on them. Making sure we earn our paychecks as coaches; I think that really has a lot to do with it. Coach [Mike] T[omlin] is really on player development. That's what he's about. So, you've got to be able to take these draft picks in these middle rounds and really make them players.

What's the biggest area where Nick will need to improve? Is it just kind of transitioning to that size difference because he's not the typical 6-foot-4, 250 frame?

Yeah, I'd say just about anybody from the No. 1 pick down to the Mr. Irrelevant is going to have an adjustment in this League. The transition, I think that'd be first on Nick's, learning to transition to getting up here, the playbook and all that. He'll have a lot on his plate.

Your position room, other than the two starters, has seen a lot of turnover over the last couple of years. How much ideally do you want a third guy to play to relieve your two starters?

It's always nice because you can't have those guys playing all those plays. So, it's always nice to get a rotation. I've been around for a couple years now, and we've always been trying to find that rotational piece, and that third spot, third and fourth spot. So, it's huge. It's what we're looking for.

What's one thing he did this last year that opened your eyes up to view him as a prospect?

I don't think anything other than just being himself. His competitiveness, who he was. I don't think he's changed much. I think he is who he is. I think he's played and been that tough guy. Obviously, he's gotten better over his time there, but I just think he's a tough competitive guy. I think that's just always attractive in this building.

You've been here for a while, but was this your first time getting to talk to a guy right after he was drafted to say, "Hey, you're coming in and I'll be your coach?" What was that like?

Yeah, I mean, it's awesome. It's a dream come true. It's stuff that since I was a young kid, it's what I've always wanted to do. I wasn't always athletic. So, I always saw myself as the coaches on the sidelines, you know what I mean? That's what I was always looking at, and wanted to be like, so that's fun. It's a life changing moment for them, and it's always fun for me too.

Do you see yourself as just a corner in the NFL or have some teams talked to you about playing safety?

There are some reports that you got flagged for medicals. Where are you health-wise right now and how do you feel?

Man, I feel great. I feel ready to go. I feel ready to go, I feel good.

Some people might consider getting picked in the seventh round a slide. Do you consider it motivation?

I'm just happy just to be here. I'm just happy they took a chance on me, and I just promise you that the Steelers fans, Steelers Nation, they will not regret it.

When you went to Purdue, they were looking to add some weight, some mass to your frame. How much did your body transform?

Yeah, so I came in at 180, then I got up to 215, and leading up to the Combine, I wanted to slim up a little more, be a little more built, so then I got back to 206 and right around that range is what I feel my best at.

Grady Brown Press Conference Transcript

Opening Statement:

Good to be here. I guess we're here to talk about [Cory] Trice [Jr.] from Purdue. One thing I'll say is we'll look good getting off the bus this year in our first game with the two guys that we picked up.

He did a great job at Purdue, taking up a lot of space on the line of scrimmage, played a lot of press coverage, and that's huge. Really, just the way that he plays press, being able to go down and not play a motor technique, not back up, but really just used that 6-3, 6-2 frame to just take up a lot of space and make guys work on the line of scrimmage. So, really excited about getting him here. He has some toughness. He started his career off as a safety. He was a high school basketball player. So just a lot of good things just from a coaching standpoint to work with, and we're looking forward to getting them in here.

Do you envision him strictly as a cornerback? I know you mentioned he has some experience playing safety and they once projected him as a safety.

Right. That's an excellent question. I think a lot of those answers will be found out when he gets in here and we start moving him around. You look at a person's ability to learn different positions and everything like that, but one thing he's shown is that he can be a corner in this League.

He has all the physical attributes. Where are areas that you want to work with him more?

You want to take what he does well and make it better, and then just continue to develop him from that standpoint. Anytime you're dealing with a longer defensive back, there may be some issues in space and off coverage and everything like that. A lot of times in college, you really do what you're best at doing as often as you can. So, we'll find out exactly what it is that he needs to get better at. But right now, we want to focus on what we do have.

He's had a couple of injuries over the past couple of years. Do you think that's why he fell down the board a little bit?

I'm not sure. A lot of times beauty is in the eye of the beholder, and some people like certain things. I know what I like, I know what we like here. I know what we need. So, I'm really not sure about why the other teams did not pick him up before now, but I'm just glad he's available for us to pick him up.

Did you get a chance to work with him much in the process leading up to this?

I did have an on-field experience with him at the Combine and that probably helped me from a visual standpoint, just standing next to him and realizing how big of a player he is, how big of a person he is. Looking at his skill set of size and athletic ability, which helped me for sure.

What makes him such a good press corner?

Like I said earlier, he just doesn't back up. A lot of times in today's game, guys walk down on the line of scrimmage and as soon as the receiver moves or the receiver flinches, they back up and we're giving back the space that we walked down to take away. He doesn't do that. He's been coached well at Purdue by those guys on how to play aggressive—really, I shouldn't say aggressive, just stay on the line of scrimmage and make receivers work.

With [Joey] Porter [Jr.] and Trice, those are two guys with good size and good length. How important are those traits to you guys at the quarterback position?

Yes, it's important. I mean, you look at the guys that we have to play in our division, you look at the receivers that we have to cover in our division, you look at the backs that we have to tackle in our division. Size, the size and length and toughness are definitely important. Like I said, we'll look good getting off the bus, so we've just got to coach them up and get them going in the right direction.

In terms of your cornerback additions, Pat Peterson came from an almost strictly zone background. Now you have two rookies that are more press-man types. It used to be that teams would have a type, a Cover 2 team, or a Cover 3 team, or a man team. Do you feel like it's more important for you guys to be able to do a number of things with different personnel?

Yeah, honestly, I'm not sure that Pat came from a zone scheme or not to be honest with you. But for us, I believe it's important for us to be able to do whatever is best versus that offense. It may be zone, or it may be man, the game is, especially from a defensive standpoint, it's just different now than it was in the past. You really can't just sit in one thing and do that. So, to your point, I think it is important to be able to do a number of things.

It used to be that your two outside corners played 100 percent of the snaps. Is there a point where there are packages where there are certain guys against certain offensive schemes?

Absolutely. Absolutely packages. Again, to the point of football just changing. It's not 21 personnel. It's not always 12 personnel. You have these tight ends that can play in the slot as receivers and then create a three-man surface in the run game. So, packages are definitely important. It was big for us last year and I believe it will continue to be big for us in the future.

How big was the fact that Trice has gone up against some really good tight ends and has really been used against them at Purdue almost as a tight-end eraser at times?

A lot of respect for the tight ends in the Big Ten. A lot of respect for the tight ends in the National Football League. But we need help stopping receivers, and my projection is for him to be able to line up in front of a receiver and make him work on the line of scrimmage.

I saw that you started games at just about every position on the offensive line at Maryland. How much do you think your positional flexibility could help with the Steelers?

Definitely, I feel like it helps a lot. In the NFL, snaps are limited, and seasons are limited when you're stuck at one position so I feel like me adding the versatility to the team is definitely a bonus when teams usually travel with seven to eight linemen, if that. It's always a good help when you can help at all five spots on the offensive line.

It looks like you played center in 2020. How much have you practiced at center recently, and how much center have you played in game?

I played four games. I started four games at center in 2021. I've practiced at center throughout practice this past year and at center the year before that. I've practiced at center pretty much every time. I played it in the Shrine Bowl recently in Las Vegas, back in February, and I've always got a ball in my hand. It was always something that I practiced because I value that flexibility. They say your best ability is availability, but behind that, I feel like it's versatility. So, being available and being versatile is definitely something that I try to be in my game.

It looks like you started everywhere but left guard. Is that true?

I started at left guard against Northwestern this past year.

Throughout the pre-draft process, did you have any indication or how much of an indication did you have that this could have been the landing place for you after the Draft was done?

My talks with Pittsburgh were very brief. I've talked to a lot of other teams. You never know with this draft process. You could be anywhere, and I'm happy that the Steelers took a chance on me and I'm coming to bring my all.

If you had to describe your game in a few words, what would those words be?

I would say smart and tough.

Opening Statements:

Omar Khan: Productive weekend. Really feel like we're a better football team today than we were at 7:59 on Thursday. Can't wait until we get to the rookie minicamp in a couple weeks and really see our new Steelers in action.

It's going to be fun. I think we're in a good place.

As we speak, the rookie free agency process is going -- in full effect. As soon as I leave, we're going to go finalize that, and I'm sure we'll get the names to you guys over the next couple days.

With respect to the remainder of the off-season, I've said it before, we're going to continue to evaluate what opportunities exist to improve our roster, if there are, and with that, I'll turn it over to Coach.

Mike Tomlin: Feel really good about the weekend, but probably equally as important, I felt good about the process, and I think that just tees up the weekend. We've talked quite a bit about that. We rolled our sleeves up and got on the road and did all the things we needed to do, utilized all the opportunities to engage with these young people, man, and get a sense of what they're capable of and how they might fit.

Mike, you took a big tackle, you took two big corners, you took a massive tight end. Was there any added emphasis on size and maybe physicality with your picks this year?

MIKE TOMLIN: You know, I don't know if size per se was a point of emphasis, but obviously we value physicality and those that are capable of playing a brand of football that we value.

Last week at the pre-draft press conference you had mentioned that you were open to doing business with the 32nd pick, maybe trading out of it. Did you guys become less eager to do so when Joey Porter, Jr., was still on the board?

OMAR KHAN: I think we listened. There were definitely opportunities there, and after we evaluated everything, we just felt really good about the opportunity to take Joey Porter, Jr., so it worked out that way.

Coming into the weekend, did you ever see a scenario where he would be there at 32 for you guys?

OMAR KHAN: You know, you go through different scenarios and mocks, and we had him graded obviously higher than that, and we expected him to go higher than that, but we're very fortunate. We consider ourselves very fortunate to have had the opportunity to pick him at 32.

Omar, you've been through the draft process before, but this is your first one as GM. How was it for you to go through this entire process?

OMAR KHAN: It was awesome. I think the journey of getting here has been great since I got the job to now. It's been pretty special.

I have a great group of people that I did this with, and they worked really hard for this organization. We have a really strong group of people. It's just exciting. I don't know if it's hit me completely yet, but yeah.

Mike, we've checked in with you along the way about how you've seen Omar handle this process. Now that there's a bow on it, how would you evaluate what it was like working with him this weekend and throughout this process?

MIKE TOMLIN: I don't know that I evaluate it from that perspective. We've just got work to do. It's normal for us. We've worked together for a long time. I don't know that we hide behind roles and titles. People have opinions. We've got work to do. We've got information to gain.

The process was very similar to how it's been in the past. I don't know that I've looked at him in a different light because of the position. I don't know that he looks at himself in a different light. I just think sometimes titles and things of that nature are overblown. We've worked together for a long time, and we had some fun this weekend.

You said he was aggressive going after the next two. Is he still aggressive?

MIKE TOMLIN: Yeah, what did they call him, the con (Khan) artist? I saw that. That's pretty good. That's a cool nickname.

Do you have a favorite nickname, Omar?

OMAR KHAN: I've been called worse. I don't have a favorite nickname, but yeah.

Your sixth rounders, did you expect to not walk away with a quarterback in the draft, and can you tell us anything about the kid from Minnesota that you signed in free agency?

OMAR KHAN: Sure, I'm not going to get into exactly who we signed. I don't know what's out there and what's not and I know that process continues. I have Cole Marcoux, Dan Colbert and Mark Sadowski and Sheldon White, they're leading that process right now. But obviously we didn't draft one, and we still have a couple open quarterback spots to fill.

Mike, what are your thoughts on getting the defensive lineman and also getting the big tight end?

MIKE TOMLIN: Both guys, we had a great deal of exposure to. I think we 30 visited both guys. We saw (Keanuu) Benton down in Mobile, saw (Darnell) Washington in Athens at his pro day. So just really comfortable with what they're capable of and how they might fit, so really excited about both guys.

Asking about size, where do you think overall you really improved your team or were able to improve your team this weekend?

MIKE TOMLIN: We feel good about the pedigree of the men that we've gotten. That'll be told as we get to work and really get an opportunity to put them in a professional football setting and see how it plays out.

I'm not going to have any bold predictions in that regard.

Omar, how important was it to go back to get that fourth-round pick, and how do you evaluate how many picks you need and where we want them to be?

OMAR KHAN: It was an opportunity, we were sitting there in the third round, we just -- when the call came about trading back, we just evaluated it, and we had a good feel for how many players were left that we'd be interested in, and got the top guy actually on that list. He was still sitting there, and the opportunity to pick up a fourth, which we had lost, was going to be a long wait from today if we didn't have an extra pick. Fortunately, we got it because we think we got a really good football player in Nick Herbig.

You didn't pick in the fifth or sixth rounds today. Was there a temptation to get back in for a player that you were eyeing up and looking at?

OMAR KHAN: You always listen, and we did. There were some phone conversations, but at the end of the day it just -- nothing that made sense for us.

How did you spend that long break that you guys had between those picks?

OMAR KHAN: On the phone, had some Chick-Fil-A downstairs. We just talked amongst ourselves, continued to strategize -- that was a good opportunity for us to discuss the process after the draft with signing some of the free agents. We went back and met and just evaluated our roster as to where we were. Next thing you know, we were back in the room and kind of seeing where things were shaking out.

In part because of that you didn't have fifth and sixth rounder, but it's kind of rare, isn't it, to go through a draft without a QB, a wide receiver, or a running back. How are you feeling there?

MIKE TOMLIN: We feel good about some of the work that we've been able to do. There are multiple ways to add to your talent pool. We've done some things in free agency, really excited about the acquisition of Allen Robinson, for example. I think last year we ran into Jaylen Warren at the rookie mini, for example, so we'll keep team building.

You said you had a lot of offensive pieces, free agency and the draft. How do you envision this offense moving forward? How would you like to see it work?

MIKE TOMLIN: Boy, that is a broad question. We'll hold our cards close to our vest, and you'll see in the fall. How about that?

When we talked to (Keanuu) Benton after his pick, he said it's apparent after talking to you that he said you want some goons out there. Is there an apt description?

MIKE TOMLIN: That's an accurate description, but I'll give him some media training so he can keep some of our private conversations private.

When you see a tight end that big and has that unique skill set, obviously guys who can block but also catch?

MIKE TOMLIN: I think the awesome thing about him besides his measurables is his mindset. Here's a guy that I think maybe has "sixth offensive lineman" on his license plate. He embraces the things that come with being who he is, and knowledge of self and embracing that I think is one of the things that made him attractive, besides the unique physical traits and the things that he's been able to accomplish. The mindset, the willingness, too, is equally exciting.

You talked about Broderick (Jones) and how last year when you were scouting at Georgia you were asking for a name, and Broderick's came up. Did a similar sentiment come up around Darnell (Washington), or what was it you were able to discover throughout the process?

MIKE TOMLIN: I didn't have to ask anybody about Darnell. All you've got to do is watch Georgia tape. He stands out. He's an enormous human. So, I had prior knowledge to him.

Guys like Broderick, third-year juniors, those are the guys that you ask about sometimes when you're in places because those are the guys that kind of sneak up on you in draft prep. Washington has a longer resume and had more exposure to him.

Georgia, Wisconsin, what is it about places that you've been back to before that makes you comfortable wanting to go to again?

MIKE TOMLIN: You know, Georgia obviously, they've won back-to-back National Championships, and you don't do that without quality players, so we're not the only one's fishing in that pond. Philadelphia, I think is doing a pretty good job of that.

Sometimes a place like Wisconsin is a stylistic match. Always had a lot of respect for Jim Leonhard, their former coordinator, and they do a lot of similar things that we do. So, it makes it an easy eval. There's less speculation in terms of what they might be able to do in our system of football.

Omar, after the trade to get the fourth-round pick back, you said your top guy was still on the board. Did you mean Washington at that point?

OMAR KHAN: Yeah.

How surprised were you that he fell to that point in the draft?

OMAR KHAN: I would say very surprised. We thought very highly of him. Honestly did not expect him to be sitting there. Just our gain.

Denzel (Martin) was saying there was a lot of emotion when you called Nick (Herbig), and that was understandable because of all that. What was that call like, and when did you like from Nick?

OMAR KHAN: Both Coach and I spoke to him, and he was excited. He was very emotional, and obviously I'm sure for his parents, that's an amazing moment.

We could hear the emotion in the phone, a lot of noise in the background, and from when I talked to him, Coach, I don't know how he was with you when you talked to him.

MIKE TOMLIN: Yeah, it was the normal excitement that you would expect in a draft-like setting. But talking about Wisconsin and Herbig, there's not a lot of speculation, man, that guy held down the same position that I watched T.J. (Watt) play in that place, and I think it was (Andrew) Van Ginkel after him. They asked him to do a lot of things. You see them do NFL things. They rush, they drop. It's fun to watch Wisconsin tape for those reasons.

- Pittsburgh drafted cornerback **JOEY PORTER JR.** (Penn State) with the first pick of the second round (No. 32 overall)
- **JOEY PORTER JR.** is the 28th Penn State player drafted by Pittsburgh in franchise history – third-most of any college program (Pittsburgh 46, Notre Dame 36)
