### Steelers General Manager and Vice President Kevin Colbert and Head Coach Mike Tomlin 4.25.22

#### **Opening Statements:**

**Colbert:** Coach and I are just at the tail end of our preparation. We have three more days to tie up whatever loose ends are left, including our meetings (Tuesday) morning, and then get into what we determine to be our mock draft situations. It's been a good Spring. We visited prior to the owners meetings, and we've continued to work through the Pro Day circuit. It was a very productive Pro Day circuit. Coach Tomlin got there when he could outside of the owners meetings time frame when he had obligations to be there. It was a productive Spring. I think we can honestly say we feel good about the prep going into this draft, probably a little more so than some others. I really feel we hit the right spots at the right times. We got good information, we had good visits. I'm not going to get into all of the numbers of the visits, but we've had a good Spring. Really, we feel pretty much the same about the draft depth at this point as we did at the Owners Meeting timetable. We lost a few guys medically, we picked up a few guys medically. Further character checks will always be ongoing, and that type of information comes to us continuously. We'll examine everything — trade up, trade down — we're always open to both. Our pro guys will be finishing those calls by Tuesday, just so we know who may be partners in that type of endeavor.

**Tomlin:** I second Kevin's sentiment regarding the feel. It was a good process for us, myself and the coaches getting an opportunity to get on a moving train and come alongside Kevin and the scouts in the Spring. It's probably worth mentioning it's a good field because we had the totality of the process, and it's been a number of years since we've had that. We had Combine and Pro Days, and we took advantage of all opportunities to gather information and get an eye on these guys. It just helps establishing the (draft) board and having an understand of who these guys are and how it all fits. It's been a good process for us. We still have a bit of work to do, but there's a great feeling of comfort in that we've acquired the necessary information, and we have what we need to put the finishing touches on it.

### Have you ever spent more time on one position in your predraft evaluation, Pro Days, etc., than you have on the quarterback position this year?

Kevin Colbert: As I said at those pre-owners meetings, the Senior Bowl, the exposure that myself and the scouts had in the fall, we scouted with that intent to see games live, Senior Bowl, the pro days, the visits, try to wrap it up. But we would usually do that at all other positions, more specific to the ones that you might be zeroing in on.

## When you're looking at quarterback position now, obviously with the tragedy that happened with [Dwayne] Haskins, does that affect your decision, you and Kevin, going in, whether you're going to draft a QB maybe a little bit higher in the draft?

Mike Tomlin: In regard to Dwayne, our energy has been on paying proper respect and supporting his family. We have not approached it from a business decision or a business decision-making standpoint. We feel like that's the appropriate mindset for us to have as we sit here today.

### Can you talk about the moves you've done since free agency and how will that play into what you do or don't do in the draft?

Mike Tomlin: How so? What do you mean?

### Followup: Just the positions.

Mike Tomlin: Our goal always is to address all needs so we can kind of let the field come to us in the draft and we feel comfortable that we have quality, capable guys at each and every position. And that's what we desire, and that way we can go into the Draft and not feel undue pressure in terms of reaching positionally, etc. We had a very productive free agency period. We are excited about the guys that we are able to acquire. Obviously just beginning to get to know them as professionals and football players, but in terms of how we acquire talent, free agency and then the Draft, we think that free agency has really set us up nicely to have a good draft.

### Have you guys changed your best available philosophy over the years to more best available for need, or is it still the best guy out there on your board?

Kevin Colbert: We always have approached it the same way. When free agency began, obviously that creates some situations where you try to fill in certain holes through that period, as Coach mentioned. We thought we did some of that. And anytime we have draft preparations, and two players are close, if you have strength at one position and not another, and the players are close, you obviously will take that player where your strength isn't as good. Again, you'll make a huge mistake if you reach down low in your developments and on your boards for players that are not quite as good, because what looks like a position need at a certain time can change instantly. And we have to recognize that and just try to take the best players available if it's not close.

## Kevin, I want to thank you for your professionalism and cooperation over the years, first of all. Question is for Coach. Mike, you obviously have a lot of centers in your fold now. Is there any mindset right now as to is there a default guy, or are you just going to let that all play out over the summer?

Mike Tomlin: We are going to let it play out. It's good to have position flexibility. So, we have got some guys that are capable. It's important to have not only a starter-capable guy but some depth, and we just feel good about the list of candidates that we have.

## The topic of wide receiver is the boom that we've seen in contracts this off-season. Does that speak to the importance of the onus of getting good quality wide receivers on their first contract and maybe loading up on guys on their first contract to fill some of those positions?

Kevin Colbert: I think that's irrelevant to the position. We have always talked about -- our top three picks, they have to become starters in the business model that we follow because you have to have so many players fit into so many categories. When you miss on a player in those rounds, which we have, you end up spending more money trying to replace them in free agency. And we are always cognizant of what goes on at a different position and its impact on a salary cap, and hopefully you have some players that are worthy of that type of consideration. But that comes back to, you know, what we're about to do on Thursday in trying to make the best picks possible.

If I can piggyback off of that a little bit, as we see wide receiver classes get deeper, and we see the wide receivers more developed as they come out of the college game, what distinguishes a wide receiver who is still worth paying, let's say, 22, 23, \$24 million? What separates that guy when there is so much depth at that position now?

Kevin Colbert: Again, I think the depth is undefined until they get to this level. And any player at any position that we desire to pay, we feel he better be special at his position and maybe exceed where he was drafted and just recognize what they have accomplished at this level.

Again, I think we can do that at any given position for that special player within that group.

part of the decision-making. Understand that we are doing the same thing on our side.

When we talked to you before owners meetings, you said you believe you have a starting-caliber player at every position except strong safety. How did you come together with Terrell [Edmunds] to decide to bring him back into the fold, and do you still view that as a position of need going into the Draft? Kevin Colbert: We were open and honest with Terrell throughout the whole process, as he was with us. We were able to stay connected and see where it all went. We didn't know where the market would be; he didn't. We always encourage our free agents to look, it's going to better serve you to go out and find out what else is there. And that's

Fortunately, he's coming back to us, and he gives us that 22<sup>nd</sup> starter, so to speak. And when we say that, you know, I want to emphasize, we are not saying we're good enough, we're saying we have NFL veteran starters at each position. And the Draft process will provide great competition for that, but it isn't like any of these young men that we drafted will come in and be ordained a starter.

I know Coach doesn't do that ordinarily, but when you don't have great depth or what you believe to be a starter, sometimes those guys have to play a little quicker than possible -- or than desirable, and we like to avoid that. Again, to Coach's other point on the free agency, anything we did in free agency is not going to preclude us from drafting a player at that position.

## You said you felt good about the process leading up. Did you also feel good about the in-person quarterback meetings in finding what you were looking for, and do you need to pick a quarterback in this year's draft?

Kevin Colbert: I know I feel good about the process. Again, Coach and I met more with that position than we have, as I referenced earlier, and we spent time with them. Our offensive coaches, Coach [Mike] Sullivan, Coach [Matt] Canada, they spent more time with individual meetings. And look, quarterback is the most critical position in our sport, and we have to get that right. Could we add somebody? Yes. Could we start the season without adding anybody? Yes. And we'll see where it all goes.

#### Followup: Coach?

Mike Tomlin: Yeah, really nothing to add. I enjoy the process of having heightened urgency for a position. Seemed like a year ago we chopped up the running backs in a similar way. I know that the process we've gone through in terms of getting to know the quarterback pool is getting some attention, but it's not an irregular process for us in terms of locking in and getting a feel for a certain pool within the pool, if you will.

## Mike, as this week winds down for you, I'm sure there's excitement building for the Draft itself. Is there a little bittersweetness there, though, knowing it's the last time you'll go through it with the guy sitting next to you?

Mike Tomlin: I've tried not to think about it to be quite honest with you. It went through my mind a little bit some when we were traveling because we've just had such great times over the years traveling and gathering information, necessary information, to get to know the young men. But we've been up against it pretty good and hustling, so there hasn't been a lot of those moments, but obviously it has been a pleasure to work alongside him and we'll see where the roads lead us.

### When it comes to the running back depth, what's the expectations for Benny [Snell] and Anthony McFarland this season, and what's the level of desire to add to the group behind Najee [Harris]?

Mike Tomlin: Both capable young guys. Their resumes speak for themselves. Benny has been capable as a backup runner, has been capable as a [special] teamer. McFarland less so, less availability there. But they will define their roles with how they perform and obviously how they perform against competition, competition that's here and maybe competition that's not here.

## You talked about how -- at Georgia's pro day about how guys didn't expect Jordan Davis to be around long enough for you guys to get him at 20. What is the expectation, looking at this class, if you're able to get a dynamic defensive playmaker if you stayed home at 20 versus if you would need to trade up to get a player like that this year?

Mike Tomlin: We always talk about not speculating what others are going to do because it's fruitless, if you will. We'll put together our board here in the next 24 to 48 hours in totality. And as they come off, they come off, and we'll see what's available to us. And we'll ponder some of those possibilities, staying put, moving up, moving down, etc. But we just like our process, and we focus our energies on what it is that we do and less so about the potential of what others might do.

#### Any further clarity on Stephon Tuitt?

Mike Tomlin: No. No updates, but he's doing well.

### Voluntary workouts, anything like that?

Mike Tomlin: No updates.

#### And, Kevin, have you allowed yourself to smell the roses?

Kevin Colbert: No, not at all, honestly. Just to echo Coach's comments, listen, it's been a great process to work with Coach. You don't take those things for granted. He loves this part of the process, and that always makes it an easier endeavor. It's fun to be out and watch him interact with these young men and their families, and the respect that he commands on the road, it's very impressive. And the information that he comes away with that I might have missed is very helpful. It's been a nice working relationship, but it's been more than that.

Mike Tomlin: No doubt.

Kevin Colbert: You share the highs, you share the lows, and it's been great. But quite honestly, we haven't had the time to think about that. Now, I think that time will come whenever it comes, but right now we've got to get this thing right, and that's what we are focused on.

### After doing virtual visits the last couple years and coming back, have you guys changed anything about the process or the way that you do in-person visits, added anything or tweaked that at all?

Mike Tomlin: I think that we are not resistant to change, but we don't change for the sake of changing. Like in a lot of circumstances, I think the pandemic has taught us some valuable lessons. I think that there's a lot of information to be gleaned from Zoom meetings, so that's become a component of some of the things that we do. Just because you have 30 visits, in-person visits, you don't necessarily have to utilize them. So that's kind of the evolution from a mentality standpoint that we've gone through based on what's transpired.

## Coach Tomlin, you're obviously unbelievably thorough in general in your process, but having had the seven quarterbacks here, did any of them change your mind in any way? Was there anything learned in having them in your building beyond your exposure to them out at their buildings?

Mike Tomlin: I don't know that we established a strong enough opinion regarding anything to say that something changed our mind. I think at the outset, we formulated a plan to have as many interactions with these guys as we could in an effort to gain a complete understanding of who they are as people and as players. So, at the very beginning, there was an anticipation that we would, have some interactions in Mobile [Alabama], we would have some indicator actions in Indy, we would travel to the university cities and have that interaction centered around their pro day, and then we also had planned to bring them in. And so, I don't know that I was formulating enough of an opinion at any point in the process because I had an understanding of what we intended to do from a totality standpoint.

You mentioned earlier that you're willing to trade up, trade down. Past drafts, how many of those moments have come that have never come to fruition in terms of maybe you guys have tried to move up and it didn't facilitate that way or teams wanting to move up to your spot and you neglected that? Does that happen often?

Kevin Colbert: That's a lot to try to recall.

Mike Tomlin: Every year.

Kevin Colbert: When we go into it, we will have touched base with every team above us, below us; hey, they are interested in moving up, they are interested in coming down. We'll guesstimate what it will cost to move from 20 to 7 and then from 20 back down to 32, and you're always making those assessments. But we can always say what we gave up for Troy [Polamalu], a 3 and a 6, to move up more spots. Then we gave up to move for Santonio [Holmes], we gave up a 3 and a 4, and I forget how many spots we moved, maybe four, but in those of those endeavors, both those moves helped us win a Super Bowl. That's why we never will lock ourselves into -- they have got draft charts with the numbers, and this is a good deal and not a good deal. I think you can determine all that only after the fact. So, we will be knowledgeable of what it will cost, and we will decide as it unfolds. I never want to trade for a specific spot without knowing a specific player, or if you go back to Casey Hampton, when we traded back, we traded back three spots, we had three people, Casey included, who was the top of those three that we would have felt good about. So, we are always making those decisions, but it's never black and white.

### Going to test your memory, 22 of these, is there any you look at now and say, yeah, we got that one right or that was my favorite of any of the Drafts?

Kevin Colbert: Not really. I mean, again, obviously the ones that helped you win Super Bowls, those, but I can't say which part of which one because different guys came out of different drafts. I mean, Brett Keisel was a seventh rounder, Heath Miller was a first. I can't really say there's one specific one. There's too many to look back on. And maybe there's not enough to look back on, too, because Coach and I are never going to be satisfied with what our results were or are to this point. I hope this one's the best one.

Every first-round pick carries pressure that comes with it, quarterback to a far greater degree. And you have a guy in your building now who was a number two overall pick, and it didn't work out in his first spot for whatever reason. When you're evaluating quarterbacks, how much of a sense do you really get whether they can handle that added layer of pressure, and do you have to maybe just trust your gut when you're looking at guys in that position?

Kevin Colbert: Man, it's comprehensive. I mean, myself and the scouts, we got to see all these quarterbacks live at least two, sometimes three, sometimes seven times. We've seen them live so you try to judge that based on how they appear in a game, in a stadium, on the sidelines talking to their teammates, talking to their coaches. We follow that up with those individual interviews, and Coach and his staff will ask them certain questions. And I'll let Coach address that as to how are you going to handle this. You're coming from a small media market, Pittsburgh is a small town, but this is a big football environment, how do you anticipate this. Some of these guys have never been this far east. That was kind of enlightening. But I'll let Coach kind of follow up on that.

Mike Tomlin: I think that's why we laid out such a comprehensive process in an effort to gather as much information and get to know these guys as well as we could because some of the things you suggested are not football related, but personality related. Some people are introverted, extroverted, and settings such as this are draining for them, etc. So for us, it was, yes, getting to know them as players, but just as significant a component of it, particularly as it pertains to some of the things that you suggest, was getting to know them as young people as well.

## A lot of change this off-season, a new general manager, replacing a franchise quarterback and a new coordinator. How can that amount of change be positive for you and what's your mindset approaching that?

Mike Tomlin: I acknowledge that change is a component of our business each and every year. So, from that perspective, I don't view what's transpired this year as any different. I acknowledge that there is some angst, if you will, regarding some of the changes and uncertainty. But that's always positive fuel for me. I'm a glass-half-full guy, and I'm always excited about the platform that transition could provide us in terms of getting better.

## As you evaluate defensive backs, are you seeing some of the hybriding that we've seen, like safety to inside linebacker when it comes to safety and corner, are you kind of seeing that proliferation of passing game in college influencing that position as you've talked about many times with inside linebacker and safety?

Mike Tomlin: What you see is specialization. You're seeing guys that are nickels and guys that are dime linebackers, if you will. And its specialization as it pertains to the passing game or winning possession down or situational football. So that's exciting to get a feel for some of that. I know years ago when I was a secondary coach, you were forecasting whether or not someone was nickel capable, if you will. I think you fast forward 20 years now, and there are guys that define themselves as nickels. And so that's what I mean when I'm talking about the elevated specialization. From my perspective, that's a fun element of their evaluation, to look at some of the things, the specialized skill sets and things that are now embraced and are continually embraced in our game.

## Do you have to make a decision from time to time between a player who you think you have a real good beat on, and his ceiling is here and another guy whose ceiling is through the roof but you're not sure if he'll ever get there, and what governs that?

Mike Tomlin: Certainly. I think in a lot of ways that discussion is weighed, we call it the ceiling and the floor, how high is the floor and how low is the ceiling, if you will. The potential component, particularly if you're talking about young people, third-year juniors and so forth, depending on the person and the circumstance, is a portion of the discussion and sometimes a significant portion of the discussion.

Other than a victory on Super Bowl Sunday, where does Draft Day round one rank for you from an excitement standpoint? And a month or so ago, you were talking about fresh ideas in your role. How have you seen the evaluation process change in the 20-something years you've been doing it?

Kevin Colbert: The first round is obviously always exciting. It's become a day of itself, which, you know, I'm not crazy about. We would like to do all seven rounds in one day, but we understand it's not. And those guys should be celebrated because they are 1 of 32 of a thousand guys you may have started the process with. So, the first round will always be exciting.

### How has it changed for you?

Kevin Colbert: The change we talked about, fresh ideas. Look, there's -- obviously the analytical world is big, and it's getting bigger, and we respect that and we understand it and we work within it. But it's never going to exchange -- it's never going to take over for the evaluation. It never did in my world. Coach understands it and respects it. You know, we acknowledge the analytic side more so in the pro side of things when you're comparing apples to apples. Our friends in the baseball world pointed that out to us. The amateur scouting for them, they can't really use the analytics because they are comparing high school, junior college, college, Minor League players, whatever. And we're the same way. Yeah, we'll acknowledge that, yeah, this guy has a certain percentage of a run after the catch and so on and so forth. But who did he do it against on what Saturday? So that world is evolving. I think it's valuable, but I think it also has to have some guidelines to go along with it. The fresh ideas will be there, but hopefully the people with the fresh ideas have an understanding of what really is important, and it's what happens on that field on a given Saturday.

## You talked about specialization. How is that pertaining now to slot receivers, and is it almost like you've got two different groups of receivers with guys that are specializing in one versus the other, and how is it weighed in this year's class?

Mike Tomlin: There are certainly some guys that identify themselves as slots just like I was discussing there are some guys that identify themselves as nickel corners and maybe didn't have that ten years ago. But you also still see the versatility opponent where guys are slot capable but also outside capable. You know that we value versatility and flexibility. But there's a lot to choose from at the receiver and those that cover receiver positions in the draft. It's just, you know, we've been having this discussion continually over the last several years.

You know, it can be traced to a lot of things, the 12-month cycle that will is football now, the 7-on-7, the skill development associated with those things. You're just seeing a lot of options in those spaces.

## You talked about thinking about this being Kevin's last draft, specifically when you guys were traveling, doing things like that, is there a routine or anything you guys would do before you go out to a visit or anything that made you think about those things?

Mike Tomin: We eat a lot. (Laughter.) We sample regional dining, depending on where we are (laughing). But there's a method to that, as well. We enjoy the informal settings of breaking bread with the young people in their towns and getting to know them, and hopefully that's a setting where we can legitimately get to know them in a non-football way.

#### Got a favorite regional dining spot that you guys had to hit this year?

Mike Tomlin: I'm a sweet tea guy. So, there are certain regions of the country that have high-grade sweet tea. That's where I like to go.

You talked to us during the bye week about specifically studying mobility and quarterbacks. You talked about that a bit. Now that you've gone through this process and met with all these quarterbacks, for the first time in your tenure, you're not inheriting a franchise quarterback. Have you figured out what the most important trait to you in a quarterback is?

Mike Tomlin: I haven't. I don't know that anyone has.

### Are there a few [characteristics]? Can you give me two or three?

Mike Tomlin: I think that is the ultimate competitor's position. Those that run to and not from competition, those that embrace competition and the intensity of it, and the anxiety maybe associated with it, I think they have a leg up. Obviously, there are some pedigree-related things per the position, arm strength and accuracy. That's evident. Either it's present or it's not. The intangible quality associated with competition I think is something that's valuable.

I know you guys are only concerned about what you're going to do, but can you take us behind the scenes a little bit this week when you put your draft board together, your mock drafts, do you guys have a good grasp of what the teams might do in front of you or educate a guess where you know a handful of players that might fall to you guys?

Kevin Colbert: Honestly, no. And again, we did away with mocking other teams probably...

Mike Tomlin: 10?

Kevin Colbert: 12 years ago? We just said, I don't know why we do this. We are just guessing. And it doesn't matter. We mock ourselves. We're picking first who we take and we're picking -- that player is gone, we're picking second, who are we taking. We go all the way down to 20 and we have guys lined up in the fashion that we will pick them, and then we will decide if we want to trade up or trade down. And that's based on that earlier why question; there's values to doing that. Again, when we trade away a third and a sixth, are we trading away Emmanuel Sanders and Antonio Brown? We don't know. But we always try to put a player to that scenario.

So, no, we don't concern ourselves with anybody but else but ourselves. I know there's 20 players. By Wednesday, we'll know the order and we'll pick them, and we'll know who may or may not be interested in moving up or coming down, and we'll try to make the decisions as best we can.

Heisman Trophy finalist—Pitt's first since receiver Larry Fitzgerald in 2003—and finished third in the balloting ... boasted national top-10 statistical rankings in eight categories: TD passes (ACC-record 42, fourth), points responsible for (282, fourth), points responsible for per game (21.7 avg., fifth), total offense (350.8 avg., fifth), passing yards (4,319, sixth), passing yards per game (332.2 avg., sixth), completions per game (25.69 avg., seventh) and pass efficiency (ACC-high 165.3 rating, ninth).

#### **2020 SEASON**

Started nine games, missing two consecutive contests due to injury (Oct. 17 at Miami and Oct. 24 vs. Notre Dame) ... completed 61% of his passes (203 of 332) for 2,408 yards with 13 TDs and nine interceptions ... ranked second in the ACC and 15th nationally in completions per game (22.56) ... ranked third in the ACC and 21st nationally in passing yards per game (267.6) ... led team with eight rushing TDs, the most by a Pitt quarterback since 1973 (Billy Daniels, 10) ... was the Panthers' third-leading rusher with 145 yards on 81 carries (1.8 avg.) ... named to the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award Top 15 and Davey O'Brien "QB Class of 2020" Top 35 ... became the first Pitt quarterback to twice throw for 400 yards in a game ... threw for a season-high 411 yards against NC State, completing 56% of his passes (22 of 39) ... accounted for three TDs against the Wolfpack (two rushing and one passing) ... threw for 404 yards and two TDs on 35-of-52 passing (67%) in a 47-14 win over Virginia Tech ... also rushed for a score against the Hokies and was named the ACC Quarterback of the Week ... after missing two games at the end of October, returned for Pitt's contest at Florida State (Nov. 7) and directed a 41-17 victory ... completed 21-of-27 passes (78%) for 210 yards and also rushed for a 10-yard score against the Seminoles.

#### **2019 SEASON**

Started 12 games (missing the Sept. 28 game against Delaware due to injury) and had the highest passing production of his collegiate career ... completed 62% of his passes (289 of 469) for 3,098 yards with 13 TDs and nine interceptions ... set then-Pitt season records for completions (eclipsing Tino Sunseri's mark of 256 set in 2012) and attempts (Rod Rutherford, 413 in 2003) ... Pitt's third-leading rusher with 220 yards and three TDs on 117 carries (1.9 avg.) ... was exceptional in Pitt's 34-13 win at Wake Forest, a victory that clinched the Coastal Division championship for the Panthers ... completed 23-of-30 passes (77%) for 316 yards and three TDs against the Demon Deacons ... each of Pickett's three TD passes (4, 63 and 23 yards) came in the second half to help Pitt erase a 10-6 halftime deficit ... named the ACC Quarterback of the Week and a Manning Award "Star of the Week" for his Wake Forest performance ... completed 7-of-11 passes (64%) for 162 yards, including a 78-yard TD (to Maurice Ffrench) in a 52-22 win over Virginia Tech ... rushed for a career-high 76 yards on seven carries (10.9 avg.) against Duke and had a season-long 30-yard TD run ... also threw for 150 yards and two TDs against the Blue Devils, including a 25-yard scoring strike to Ffrench with five seconds remaining to break a 45-45 tie.

### **Kenny Pickett Conference Call Transcript**

### Q. Kenny, what was that moment like when you saw the number pop up on your phone? Did you know automatically that it was the Steelers giving you a call to pick you there?

KENNY PICKETT: I did, yeah. I'm pretty familiar with the area code, so I had a pretty good idea of who it was. To be honest I was speechless. It's a lifelong -- 23 years of hard work to get to this point, and that all came in a phone call. It was probably one of the best moments of my life, and I'm so excited to get started and get to work with the guys who are next door to me my whole career with the Pittsburgh Panthers.

### Q. You're going to be asked to replace a guy that's probably going to the Hall of Fame. What do you view the challenge that it's going to take to live up to that standard?

KENNY PICKETT: Yeah, I'm honestly not thinking of that. I'm excited to get there tomorrow. There's a lot that goes into this, but I'm just excited to get to work. I've been working so hard for this moment; I can't wait for it to continue and be part of the team and get right back to work honestly. I'm just going to enjoy this night with my family and friends, and it's honestly right back to it.

### Q. What was the day like just as sort of the picks went by and there was a bunch of trades? It was a crazy draft for everyone else. What was it like for you?

KENNY PICKETT: Yeah, just about the same for everyone else, to be honest with you. It was kind of wide open in terms of the draft. I was really excited to obviously get the call. I wasn't too sure when it was going to be. We kind of had an idea, but I saw the 412 number pop up, obviously I got insanely excited for it. It's an unbelievable organization to be a part of and I can't wait to get there tomorrow.

## Q. The Steelers still have Rudolph, they signed Trubisky. Did you think if you were going to get drafted in the first round, you'd be joining a team with a more clear path to starting? How do you feel about competing for the job?

KENNY PICKETT: Yeah, I'm pretty familiar with competing. I've been doing it my whole life. So, I know how to be a good teammate and compete at the same time. I'm excited to join the quarterback room, get to know those guys and honestly just get better every day. We're all chasing a championship, so at the end of the day that's all that matters. That's what I'm excited to go do.

### Q. You've been here in Pittsburgh obviously for a handful of years. What have you learned about this city that makes you feel like you're a good fit for this Steelers team?

KENNY PICKETT: I'd kind of say my personality and how I attack my business and go about playing the game. I play with an edge. The Pitt fans understand that. I'm extremely excited to show that to the whole entire organization.

Yeah, I can't wait to get to work. I'm really excited. Like I said before, I'm kind of speechless. I've never had this kind of feeling before in my life. It's all the hard work coming to fruition in front of me. I can't wait to get in that building and go chase championships with those guys.

### Q. Was your process strong enough about the Steelers when you saw them come up at 20 that you felt pretty good, they were going to give you a call?

KENNY PICKETT: Yeah, I had a pretty good feeling when I got to 20 that would be the call. As soon as the Saints pick went in, I got the call. My dad saw, my fiancée saw, so we were all incredibly excited for it. I honestly just broke down. Like I said before, I'm just repeating myself, but it's my life's work in one phone call. It's really special.

### Q. This is obviously a great story in Pittsburgh, but do you feel there's more pressure on you now going from playing at Pitt to playing here in Pittsburgh with the Steelers?

KENNY PICKETT: Yeah, I think it's the National Football League, man, so there's pressure always. I love playing football. I love playing the game. This has been my whole entire life. I'm so excited to get with new teams, new coaches. Matt Canada, who I was recruited by, I can finally play with him and get coached by him. We're going to be spending a hell of a lot of time together to say the least. So, I'm incredibly excited to get there. But the pressure is always there. It's the business.

## Q. So follow up on that, Kevin Colbert just told us that that is something that they had to take into account, how a quarterback would kind of deal with all of this. What did you tell them in your pre-draft meetings to kind of give them that confidence that you could be a first-round picked quarterback and you could handle everything that comes with it here?

KENNY PICKETT: Yeah, I've always had that confidence in myself when I arrived at the University of Pittsburgh, so I know what I can do and I'm confident because of how hard I work. I know sooner or later I'm going to get to where I want to get to. It happened in college. I'm excited to go out there and work and do it in the NFL. There's a lot of great guys to learn from in that organization, especially that quarterback room, honestly.

I think one of my first calls at North Carolina was Mitch Trubisky. So, I'm excited to see him and learn from him. He's been in the league for some years now and he's a hell of a player, so I'm excited to get there.

#### Q. Did you say Mitch called you today?

KENNY PICKETT: No, he called me when I was getting recruited by North Carolina.

### Q. What do you like about Matt Canada's system?

KENNY PICKETT: Going back to when I was getting recruited, it's just the diversity of it. He has the quarterback in the pocket, he gets the guys on the move. So, I feel that's kind of underrated in my game. I feel I do a really good job of getting outside the pocket and making plays, and he does that with his play design naturally.

So, I feel like I do all the great things that he wants, and that's why he recruited me for his offense, that's why I feel like I'm in Pittsburgh now again. I can't wait to get back into it. Really just kind of obsess over the playbook and just kind of everything I do will be learning that playbook and being a Pittsburgh Steeler, so I can't wait to get there tomorrow.

#### Q. Did you keep your apartment or are you thinking about maybe upgrading it?

KENNY PICKETT: Oh, man, if you guys saw my apartment, you guys wouldn't be asking that question. I definitely won't be staying in Oakland. I can't wait to find a new place. My fiancée will harp on that and agree, but my roommates might be a little upset, but I think they'll understand.

Q. When we were talking about Kevin Colbert, he said how surprised and unexpected that you were available at 20. Going into the draft did you think you would still be on the board or were you thinking the Steelers were going to have to trade up to get you? What were you thinking as the draft unfolded?

KENNY PICKETT: Yeah, I thought the board was pretty open to be honest. I had a range of about 6 to 20 that I felt like was the range I could go in. I was just waiting for the call. I wish there was a game that you could go play or something you can figure out where you're going. It's something that's out of your control. I felt like I put my best foot forward in every aspect in this whole process.

When I saw that 412 number though, I was kind of overwhelmed with emotions and just unbelievable. I can't wait to go next door.

Q. When you decided to stay home and not go to Vegas with the draft, what was it like having that moment there with your family and how excited are your folks to have the familiar drive down the turnpike away?

KENNY PICKETT: Yeah, I've envisioned this moment since I swear, I've been like five or seven years old. Ever since I've started playing football. I've envisioned having the track. I'd watch with my family, and me and my dad would talk all the time if that was going to be me some day. So that hug to him when I got that call was -- I just don't have words for it. We just both said that we would do it, and I'm incredibly happy that it's right next door to where I played college ball.

## Q. When you were going through the process, like when free agency rolled around, did you think to yourself, yeah, the Steelers, I'm on their radar, then they got Trubisky? Did you kind of cross them off and then get back into your mind? What were you thinking through that process?

KENNY PICKETT: I'm going to be honest, every interview, every encounter that I had, there was not one encounter that I turned down. I took care of every opportunity that was there because I want to be the best, and I felt like any team interacts with me would have that feeling that I was the guy to go with. So, I wanted to make sure that I took every interview, every visit, anything I could possibly do to help myself in this process I would do.

I didn't care about what any team was doing in the free agency, what rumors I was hearing. I just wanted to put my best foot forward with that team.

### Q. Going back to that call that you had with Mitch, do you remember, or can you recall the advice or anything that he said to you then?

KENNY PICKETT: Yeah, I mean, he was great honestly because he was a guy, I really felt like I emulated my game around with what he did and how he played. So having him call me in high school, it was awesome. He was kind of in the position that I am now.

So, it's something that I'm doing to recruits now in Pitt, so it's come full circle, and I take a lot of pride in the fact that I can do that now. So, I'm so appreciative of it and I know he's a great pro, so I'm excited to get there. It's not his job to teach me anything. I'm excited to go there and watch how he goes about his business and kind of take great things away from him.

## Q. I know Mike Tomlin and Kevin really appreciated that you stayed an extra year, and honestly paved the way for these other athletes that are coming up. What advantage do you think you have by having the extra year and staying in school?

KENNY PICKETT: I just think the experience of playing games and having starts under my belt, I think that really helps, seeing a lot of different defenses, playing a lot of different levels of competition. So, I think it's just only going to help me at the next level. I'm just excited to finally fulfill my dream and go relentlessly at this goal of winning a championship.

I'm really happy that I'm in Pittsburgh.

### Q. You've mentioned a couple times about going next door, but how weird is it going to be the next time you're here at the facility I think tomorrow coming in the Steelers side instead of the Pitt side?

KENNY PICKETT: Yeah, I don't know how weird it's going to be because every time I walked off Heinz Field, the two practice fields, the farthest end, I've envisioned myself being at the two practice fields as soon as you walk out of that facility. I right where I said I would be, and I knew I would be. It was five years of college, but honestly since I was five years old, I've been working towards this. So, I'm exactly where I thought I would be, and I can't wait to get to work.

Q. Every year at this time of year when the draft rolls around it seems like certain narratives get attached to every player. Yours might be that you're a high floor guy but maybe not the same ceiling as other quarterbacks in this class. What would be your response to that criticism in general?

KENNY PICKETT: Yeah, there's always criticism. It's something I'm kind of at peace within this game and this position especially. When I said I was going back last year, I'm sure everyone said, why is he going back? He can't get any better, what does he think five years is going to do? And now sitting here I just got drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers 20th overall pick.

So, I'm always improving. There's not an off-season I've had where I felt like I haven't gone up because I go to work every single day. So, I know I'm always improving, and there's always something that I can improve on, and I know what it is physically, and I know what it is mentally, and I obsess over it. That's what I continued to do. Nothing really changes in terms of my mindset and how I go about my business.

It increases with the level of the NFL, but I just can't wait to keep chasing that dream of winning a Super Bowl.



### **Kenny Pickett Introductory Press Conference**

#### Art Rooney II:

Good afternoon, we are excited obviously be able to introduce Kenny to you all today. And usually, I get to say to the individual, 'welcome to Pittsburgh' and today I get to say, 'welcome to this side of the building.' It's a great feeling to be able to do that. And it's also something for me to be able to say that we drafted somebody who broke all of Dan Marino's records in college, which is pretty special. You all know, the number of awards that Kenny has won, Heisman Trophy finalist. But of course, you know team goals are the ones that count, and Kenny led his team to a championship this past season. And that's what we're looking for here to win a championship. So, I'm pleased to introduce Kenny Pickett.

### **Kenny Pickett:**

I just want to thank Mr. Rooney first, obviously, Coach [Mike] Tomlin, Kevin [Colbert], the whole coaching staff. Coach [Matt] Canada, Coach [Mike] Sullivan, and the scouting department. Everyone that had a hand in getting me here, just incredibly grateful for the opportunity. Like Mr. Rooney said coming from right next door—I walk into the building, I always peek to the left side and now I'll be calling this place home. My family at home as well, my fiancé, so there's plenty of thank you's to go out but just incredibly grateful to be here.

## Last night you said it was a moment that five-year-old you, seven-year-old you dreamed of, something that was really special to you and your Dad. If you could go back and talk to five-year-old Kenny Pickett, seven-year-old Kenny Pickett what would you say?

Just keep going. I always knew--this was always the dream so like you said I've envisioned it since I was five--seven years old. So, it was incredibly special. Obviously, I was overcome with emotion last night having my family there, my dad and that's really why I wanted to be back in New Jersey. My grandparents were there. Everyone that played a part in helping me get here was there, it was an awesome moment.

### At what point in this process did you think that the Steelers were real players, that you potentially could stay here in Pittsburgh?

Going through the process you really don't know to be honest. You hear a lot of different things. I just want to put my best foot forward in any situation that I was in. I felt like I did that. And you know, incredibly happy to be here.

### At what point did you get over the elation of being drafted and think about this year and the offense and your team and new teammates?

I mean, I still, it's still going through. It hasn't been 24 hours yet. So, I got a few texts from some of my new teammates now and that was really special. Appreciate those guys reaching out and kind of welcoming me in, so I'm excited to get to work here.

We saw the video of you coming off the plane, getting applause at the airport, that kind of thing.

What's it been like just coming back into Pittsburgh now as a Steelers quarterback and not just the Pitt quarterback? Have you gotten a different reception in the short time that you've been back here?

Yeah. I mean, it's special. It's really special. And I have a lot of friendships. I know a lot of people here obviously, like you said from, playing at Pitt and being here for five years. So, the fact that I'm starting my pro career here is, you know, really special and I'm looking forward to building new relationships with everybody in the city.

### We talked this pre-draft process about knowing Mike Tomlin and Kevin Colbert a little bit. Do you know any of the Steelers players? Do you run into them at all? Any relationships there?

Yeah, a little bit, you know, throughout the years, bumping into those guys and, now they'll be my teammates, and obviously we'll be spending a heck of a lot more time together.

### Have you heard from Mitch [Trubisky] or Mason [Rudolph]?

I have. They both they both reached out. And I actually told Mitch-- I don't know if he remembered it, but senior year he called me, he was trying to recruit me to North Carolina. It goes kind of full circle. Two great guys, I'm really looking forward to working with them.

### Did you form a relationship with the other guys, the other QBs in that were in the draft? Is it a little strange to maybe be the only guy that's picked in the first round?

No, I mean, to be honest, like I definitely--all those guys are friends of mine, and I've spent a lot of time with them. No matter where they end up, it's just all about what you do when you get here. So that's what I'm excited about now. I finally have a new home. I'm excited to get to work and I know everyone will be successful if they work hard.

### I know there's pressure, no matter who drafts you wherever you go, but is there a level of comfort being able to stay here and play at Heinz Field?

Yeah, like you said there's comfort but there's a job at hand and I know what I have to do. I know how to go about my business so I'm really excited to be here. That first game back in Heinz Field instead of being in blue and gold, it'll be black and gold, I am really excited for that.

## A compliment that has been paid to you coming out of Pitt is that it's believed that your floor is very high, that your baseline, your standard is very high. Some question how much further you can push your ability after your senior year? How much--what is your ceiling if you floor is that high?

Yeah, I mean, I don't know. I feel like when I went back to Pitt, a lot of people were saying 'why is he going back? How much better is he going to get He's been there for four years.' I feel like I continue to improve every offseason just because of how hard I work and obsess over the little things of getting better. There's plenty of areas I can improve. So, I don't know what my ceiling will be. We'll have to find out in a few years.

Going back to the question on pressure. I mean, when Mr. Rooney is introducing you, he already talks about Dan Marino. How many times have you heard the maybe Dan Marino similar path and the fact that the Steelers did pass on him in 1983? Does that add any level of pressure I know that was obviously a long time ago, but this year like this time they got their quarterback back? What do you think when you hear those things?

Yeah, it's special. I'm glad it didn't pass on me this year. It feels it feels great to be here. I've talked to Dan a bunch. I'm going to continue to talk to him and use him as a resource. So just coming from a special place next door and continuing the tradition here at the Steelers.

#### What are you most looking forward to now being a Steeler?

Probably just getting to work. I've known Coach Canada for a long time, and I finally get to play for him. That was the first thing we talked about on the phone. It's fulfilling my dream and once this wears off here in a couple of hours, and I can kind of just soak it in, enjoy it and then get to the get to the playbook part and learn that and kind of just obsess over being the best I can be.

**Usually, the Steelers kind of give the rookies, a tour of the town. Are you going to lead the tour?** That's what I said. I was like, 'Yeah, I don't need the tour.' When the new guys get here, I can show them around. We'll see what happens.

Was watching NFL on Sunday's part of your ritual? I know you guys have meetings on Sunday next door or whatever, but I mean, did you just immerse yourself in the TV even just by being next to it?

Yeah, I mean, you just kind of feel like there's a connection you know, whenever the Steelers are or on you always watch if you're a Pitt player. We always have it up in the locker room if they're playing. If there was a night game, we always watch. It's really special to put that helmet on. And you know, I'm looking forward to doing that.

Maybe you were watching more just casually but I mean, did you get to see anything from that Canada's offensive remind you to all this stuff that he's kind of doing when he was recruiting you at Pitt? And have you been able to as a competitor, have you have you been able to put off like diving into that and letting yourself enjoy this for now?

Yeah, I try my best. But definitely just watching the games I could tell it was a lot of the stuff that he's always done. Getting the quarterback on the move, changing the launch points up, using athleticism, which I feel like I have so I feel like I fit the mold that coach is looking for. And you know, I'm excited to get in that playbook and see what else he's adding because I know every year it's changing, so I'm excited to learn new things.

You've been compared to some other quarterbacks in the NFL right now. And when you hear some of the names you've been compared to, do you take that as a compliment or are you thinking I can be even better than some of those guys.

I mean, they're all great. You're talking about pros. That's why I said, 'there's no slight I take for any comparison.' You know, I just always try to improve. If there's something I can take from somebody's game, I'm always going to do that. That's why I'm excited to get to learn from, you know, Mason and Mitch and see what they do well, and see if I can incorporate that with what I do. You're always learning you're always evolving. So, looking forward to doing that.

Something that Mike and Kevin talked about last night was your maturity both on and off the field. Specifically, off the field how did you feel like you matured in your last, especially last year at Pitt and how much does that help? And how does that help staying here with all the pressure that you could get in all circumstances?

Yeah, I mean, I got engaged. That was a big moment. I'm really excited for Amy to come out here now and live out here with me, and really enjoy the city together. So, I think there's a lot of things that changed throughout the five years at Pitt. And you know, like you're evolving as a player, you're evolving as a person as well. So, I'm excited to kind of start this next chapter here with her.

## When you made that decision in December of '20 to come back for another year. Now 15-16 months later, you're here. Have you even exceeded what you thought was possible when you made the decision to come back?

This is where I wanted to be when I made that decision to come back, I set out to do it. I had great support from my coaches and my teammates. I knew we had a really special group, there at Pitt. If I came back, I felt like we had a great shot to win a championship and that's exactly what we did. And when you win championships, things kind of fall in line for you know, the individuals on the team. So, this is exactly where you know, I thought I would be

**Did you have any relationship with Ben Roethlisberger? And have you heard from him at all?** Not much, not much. I mean, I have about 100 messages I haven't opened yet. So maybe.

### I know you got some comments about your hand size, but you're the first quarterback off the board. What do you have to say about that?

Not much, really. I mean, it's not that big of a deal, obviously. I'm just happy to be a Steeler.

## You mentioned having 100 messages. I mean, what have these last...since 10 o'clock last night been like? I don't know if you saw the video of a Southside bar with Steelers and Pitt fans seeing you get picked. How crazy has it been?

I haven't seen it. I want to take the time and kind of soak it in and look at all that stuff. I really just kind of been enjoying the people that have been with. I got about two or three hours of sleep and hopped on a plane and I'm here now. I've just really been enjoying it and kind of taking it all in, but when I go home and get a second to hang with my family again will be really awesome.

## Pat [Narduzzi] talked about how competitive you are and how you want to play all the time. Mike said yesterday you're going to compete for the starting job. Is that a realistic goal? Is that what you want to hear? As soon as possible to be able to start?

Any competitor would want to, absolutely. I mean, but I know how to be a great teammate and how to go about my business. I'm really excited to learn from those guys. Like I said, all great people in the building. That's something I've known since I've been at Pitt. I'm excited to be a part of this organization and compete and work towards winning a championship.

### It's a younger offense with guys like Najee [Harris] and Diontae [Johnson] and those guys. Is it kind of exciting to have such a young group and kind of build something together?

Yeah, it's really exciting. Like you said, I mean, there's a long list of great players here. So, I'm excited to get involved and you know, meet those guys, learn what they do really well. And like I said, help us win a championship here.



### Head Coach Mike Tomlin and General Manager Kevin Colbert

KEVIN COLBERT: It's good to see you guys back in the familiar setting of this pressroom. We're super, super excited to be able to draft Kenny Pickett with our first-round pick. Honestly, never thought he would make it to us at 20. Exciting times for us, for Kenny, for the University of Pittsburgh, and for Pittsburgh in general. It's great. We couldn't be more excited.

#### Coach?

MIKE TOMLIN: You know, it's interesting, well, we circled the globe or at least the United States here the last several months, man, just exploring and researching, and it's funny, we ended up with a guy from next door.

We're excited about it. Just to be able to not only know what he's capable of, but to see his process, his maturation process, his developmental process is just a great deal of comfort, and we're excited.

### Q. How much did it help that he's right next door and you had a chance to see him evolve like Mike (Tomlin) just said?

KEVIN COLBERT: Yeah, honestly, you watch him grow over the years, and sometimes we're more critical of the Pitt guys because we've watched them grow from freshmen on up. We get a little too critical times, and we talk about that. Some of the other kids, the other players, we catch them in their sophomore, junior year and you don't get to see them quite as much.

But honestly, Kenny developed, obviously had a great senior year, and it was a good move for him to stay in school. It just talks and preaches about what you can do when you stay and continue to develop and turn into a first-round pick. Kenny is special, and he grew from -- like I said, we watched him come in as a freshman. You knew who he was, and when he became their starter, you just continued to watch him grow into the great season that he had.

We really don't get to see the Pitt kids as much as you think we do. They're on an opposite practice schedule. We get to see them play some more games. But like Coach said -- just let me talk, this quarterback class was a special group of young men with Kenny. Obviously, we had Kenny valued the most because we took him first. It's nothing to take away from those other young men. They're great people. They're going to be great players, as well.

Again, just super excited for Kenny.

### Q. What were the things you liked about Kenny?

MIKE TOMLIN: We talked about his high floor, and the high floor was because of the intangibles but also the anticipation and the pro accuracy were very obvious and consistent when studying his tape.

#### Q. He's also run the Canada offense a lot?

MIKE TOMLIN: (Smiling).

### Q. Did it take it more challenging for you guys knowing that you had all the quarterbacks available at your pick?

MIKE TOMLIN: No, it did not. You want options. Like Kevin mentioned, it was a pleasure to get to know all the young men through the process. We took every opportunity to develop a relationship and to get to know them, and I'm appreciative of that. Just really impressed by those young men, all of them.

## Q. Kevin, you said that you didn't expect Kenny to be there at 20. What's going through your mind early on at like pick 11 when teams started moving up? Did you think he would still be there at that point?

KEVIN COLBERT: We didn't know. We map it out and we get 20 guys lined up. The quarterbacks were in that group. We just wait and hope and keep it going. You have options. You're not going to lose, we're going to get a player at 20, but to get that player at 20 was certainly a pleasant surprise.

### Q. A few days ago you said that you watched some of these quarterbacks as many as seven times. Was this a guy that fit those seven times?

KEVIN COLBERT: Yeah, when Kenny was a young player, we weren't studying him, but you knew who he was. I remember sitting behind him at the Dapper Dan coming out of his sophomore year, and you're around him. But yeah, we did get to see Kenny over the last two seasons, and this year in particular, it was great.

## Q. You mentioned the high floor of Kenny Pickett; how does that speak to potential NFL readiness when he gets here at 24, and how does that work with the dynamic of the other two experienced quarterbacks that you have?

MIKE TOMLIN: You know, I think that's what Kevin was alluding to when he mentioned it was a good thing for him to come back and go back to school and gain another year of college experience. He is 24 years old. He is a mature young man. You do see maturity in his game, and I think all those things are going to put him into position to compete.

#### Q. Is he going to get a chance to start this year, and how will that play out?

MIKE TOMLIN: He'll be given an opportunity to compete certainly.

### Q. You talk a lot about mobility and how final it is in today's day and age. Kenny has shown he can move. What does he provide that, Willis was another guy that could move, what was the separator?

MIKE TOMLIN: I like his mobility. I'm going to ask that he slide when he gets in certain circumstances. (Laughter).

### Q. Kevin, was it imperative of you guys to address the quarterback position in this draft in your mind?

KEVIN COLBERT: It wasn't. You know, there was plenty of good players that we could have taken here. There's plenty left for us to take. But this quarterback group, if we could address it with people, we felt worthy of this pick, we certainly were going to, because quarterback is the most critical spot in the National Football League. That's not to take anything away from Mitch Trubisky and Mason Rudolph. We've got three young quarterbacks. I think it's going to be great competition, and as Coach mentioned, they'll all be in it to see who becomes the starter, but now I think we've got three real good options.

### Q. You mentioned his maturity. What else about his off-the-field presence excites you?

KEVIN COLBERT: Kenny is just a mature, even-keeled guy. A lot of times like when we're studying the quarterbacks, we not only watch them on the field, but we watch them off the field, when they come off, how are they with their teammates, how do they interact with their coaches, how do they conduct media interviews. We talk to Kenny about how he's going to handle this in this market because he's going from a University of Pittsburgh great to a potential Steeler great.

But it'll be different for him. He won't be a college player any longer, he'll be a professional, and there will be different expectations. But we feel that the maturity that he displayed on and off the field will help him in that endeavor.

### Q. Kevin touched on it a little bit just now, but how do you handle this with Mitch and Mason in terms of letting them know what you guys are doing?

MIKE TOMLIN: It's really nothing to handle. Those guys are competitors. We're in a competitors' business. They understand that. They understand that we're building the construction of the team to win. So, I'm sure they're excited about having an opportunity to put their skills on display.

#### Q. Kevin, I'm guessing you thought he was the most NFL-ready guarterback?

KEVIN COLBERT: Again, there was a great group, and as Coach mentioned, we really enjoyed getting to know them, getting to know their families. But obviously when you take this guy first, he was our top choice, and again, can't take anything away from the rest of that group, but Kenny was clearly our top pick at that position, and it was, again, unexpected.

### Q. Where did you see him make the biggest leap from last year to this year?

KEVIN COLBERT: I think he continued to grow. Coach talked about his mobility. Sure, he can create plays, but he finds receivers when he's creating. He's not necessarily going to scramble for 40 yards, 50 yards, but he may buy a little time to his left and still be able to throw it back to his right, and there's no panic in the young man, and that's really exciting.

Again, I think he grew into -- he was like a first-year NFL player for Coach Narduzzi and Coach Whipple, just a mature player at that position that obviously helped Pitt and we're hopeful it helps us.

### Q. Quarterbacks usually go early. Why do you think the first one was at 20?

KEVIN COLBERT: No idea. Honestly, I didn't know if any of them would make it to us at 20. But they were there, and again, Kenny was the pick.

## Q. You talked about Coach Whipple, and obviously he played for Coach Canada, as well. How does a quarterback playing in a pro-style offense make your evaluation easier or different than someone who is not?

KEVIN COLBERT: Yeah, we talk about it all the time. He's coming from a pro system and sometimes it's an easier transition. It doesn't mean the player is coming out of it, can't make that transition. It may take a little bit longer. And you've got to be careful as to not over-evaluate a player because he's coming from a familiar system.

But I think Kenny, again, coming out, that'll help him. Going to the Senior Bowl helped him. Again, that was another great week where we got to see the top guys all in the same venue.

It'll be familiar for him, but again, he's going to go from being a great college player to hopefully a great NFL player.

## Q. To follow that up, when you talked about before you sometimes can be a little bit more critical of kids because you've seen them for so long, was there any part of you because you had those two veteran quarterbacks in place, maybe we could take a younger guy and have him develop behind those guys?

KEVIN COLBERT: Yeah, we go through it all, and in the end, we're going to pick what we felt was the best player. Yeah, he's a little bit older than the rest of the group, but he was still the best. The age factor never came into play.

#### Q. Was much made of the hand size thing?

KEVIN COLBERT: It wasn't for us. Honestly, I never paid attention to it. I believe it was the Clemson game, and there were other scouts here, and they said, you know he's got a small hand? And I said, no, thanks for sharing. But it really didn't matter because it was never a factor. His fumble rate was not anywhere near a problem. He could certainly throw the football.

Sometimes we get hung up on all that analytical measurements and short arms and long arms and so on and so forth. I just want to see the results. I know Coach does, too. It certainly didn't affect him.

### Q. Kevin, was there any anxious moments there about potentially moving up, because I think the Saints slotted right before you?

KEVIN COLBERT: Yeah, we made some calls. We did. But that's not unusual. We'll make some calls. We had people calling us from the bottom. We had people that we knew were interested in maybe trading down to our spot and us trading up. So, we go through that process almost every round.

Q. Mike, I know you talk to the Pitt players sometimes and they like to talk to you. Kenny said I think it was combine that he remembers sitting on the bench with you, long conversations. Do you remember the first interactions you had with him or the first time you noticed him?

MIKE TOMLIN: You know, I make it my business to kind of get to know those guys just to be neighborly, just to encourage them. I've known him for several years now, whether it's in the parking lot or what have you, wishing him good luck on a big game of the week, neighborly type things, in a very natural way, like I've done with those who have come before him.

### George Pickens Conference Call Transcript

### What was that moment like when you saw the phone call and found out that you've been drafted by the Steelers? Did you have any idea that it was coming?

I actually didn't. I actually didn't have any clue which team. With the draft, you never know. People trade up, people get traded. I'm just glad to be a Steeler.

### The Steelers sent a lot of folks to the Georgia pro day. Did you feel like they were interested in you then? Did you think it was a possibility?

I knew it was of course a possibility because there were a few other teams there as well, so with all those people being there at that time of course you're going to know there is a possibility that one of those teams is going to pick you up, but you never know which one it will be.

## When you were at Georgia where did you feel that you excelled the most: outside, slot? In your conversations with the Steelers have they told you where they're leaning towards using you the most?

At Georgia, I really felt clearly the outside because primarily it was the position I played and most of the time I was there, but I also did a lot of slot work and slot routes as I was there through practice.

**Did you get to spend any time with Mike Tomlin or Matt Canada at the Pro Day or any of the reps?**Actually, yes. I didn't really spend as much time with them at the pro day with the drills and all, but I most definitely saw them there.

### What was the decision to come back and try to play last year as opposed to taking a full year off and getting a full year of tape under your belt before going into the '23 draft?

It really felt amazing because like I was saying, coming back off the ACL injury was just putting in the trust. When I got my trust back, it was really a great feeling to be back on the field with the guys.

### Right, but why come back so quickly instead of maybe waiting and playing for Georgia next year and having twelve games under your belt?

Really just the guys that I came out with was the group that I came in with and I wanted to uphold that as far as staying together as a bond, but another thing is they do say you have a risk or a chance of doing it again so that wouldn't technically be the smartest choice. I just wanted to come out with the guys I started with.

### What do you know about the Steelers either coaching staff, organization in general or some of their players on offense?

I actually know [Chase] Claypool, Diontae [Johnson], just a few guys I can name right there that I've been watching over the course of the years being Steelers.

### Is it exciting to you that they just drafted a quarterback last night in the first round in Kenny Pickett and you guys can do this thing together?

Like I was saying everything happens for a reason, so that is also a blessing for Kenny to go last night and for me to go today.

### Does Hines Ward have any stature at Georgia being a wide receiver at Georgia and then what he did with the Steelers? Do you know that path at all?

No, not really. No, not at all.

## You decided to come back. Did you want to prove something? Did you just want to be able to play in a championship game? You could have easily just sat out the rest of the year and maybe risked further injury. What was your thought process then?

Like I was saying, I wanted to finish the season with the guys I started with, so coming back was already on my agenda immediately. As soon as I knew I was injured, that was already on my agenda. Another part of it is to have trust in coming back on the field and that's one the things I have that a lot of guys don't have.

#### Was it neat that your new position mate, teammate announced your pick?

It's an honor. Everything right now is just an honor, to be a Steeler and being with the teammates I'm going to have in the future.

### I guess you were in a car wreck a week or so ago. Was that scary and at the time did you think you had any injuries that could hurt your draft status?

No, actually that wasn't scary at all. It was only 20 miles an hour. We weren't going fast at all, so it wasn't scary at all.

## What do you think your opportunity here is with the Steelers? Do you know anything other than Diontae [Johnson] and Chase [Claypool]? Do you know about their situation losing a few receivers in the free agency?

Yea, just daily on SportsCenter, but as far as teammates and becoming a bond I just want to go on another championship run like I did with Georgia.



### **Matt Canada Press Conference Transcript**

Obviously super excited about George [Pickens], the draft pick we got. Coming out of last year, getting early draft prep, we thought he was the best wideout coming out, he had a tough injury through the spring, but battled to come back and played late in the year for them [Georgia]. We were able to go to his pro day, coach [Mike] Tomlin, coach [Frisman] Jackson and Mr. [Kevin] Colbert were there, and he was impressive beyond belief at his pro day. He showed no signs of any injury or anything that way, so we're really excited to be able to get him at any point in the draft. We were fired up about that, we need him on our team.

### Do you see him [George Pickens] as an inside guy or an outside guy?

We see him as kind of both. He's so explosive, I mean you look at what he did in his career down there, he did a lot. They used him in multiple places with the talent they had, and we certainly have a couple of guys who we feel really good about at wideout. So, we'll see where he fits and where the best place to put him is, but I think he can do both.

#### Do you think that injury pushed him down the board a little bit?

I wouldn't want to speculate on anybody else. There's a reality in that, we know how that works. He didn't play a lot last year, but we're coming out really high and fired up to have him.

#### Did it look like Christmas in April for an offensive coordinator to get these two bullets in your arsenal?

It's been a great two days so far. We're certainly excited about it. I've known Kenny [Pickett] a long time, and I'm excited to have him as part of our offense and team, and George being around and being able to get him. It's been a great draft.

### What separated him from some of the other wide receivers who were still on the board by the time you guys picked? At least one or two went after him.

His body of work prior to his injury is one thing we were impressed with. We did a lot of study on his 2020 season and even prior to that. I do think his pro day showed how explosive he was, and we were there to watch it. Coach Jackson and Coach Tomlin were there, and I think that put him in a place where we felt really good about having a chance to get him at this point in the draft.

### Was there a game you saw in 2020 that may have stood out to you guys?

There probably was from Coach Jackson. I watched a bunch of highlights of different games throughout the process and I was impressed with his ability to go get the football and his ability to go down the field. We had him as a really high guy coming out prior to his injury and we kept him there. He showed us on his pro day that he was still that guy. We're really happy for him.

## How do you think he fits in with what Chase [Claypool] and Diontae [Johnson] can do? How do you envision their skillsets complimenting each other?

I think Diontae and Chase have spoken for themselves. Chase had a great year, maybe not what he wanted last year but was really close. 'Tae came back and had a really good year. I think when you have two guys like that, one more explosive receiver doesn't allow anybody to double team. They have to pick who they want to double. Obviously, we feel good about Pat [Freiermuth] so I think it allows us to have great versatility in our offense and allow people to decide who they want to double, because you can't double them all. I don't know exactly how that's going to work, I'm not going to get into that yet, but I do think it's a really good asset for us.

### What intangibles stand out about him, especially playing well for a successful team?

I think that the one intangible that you can give him a lot of credit for is coming back and playing. I don't have the exact date, I had it back there a little bit ago looking at it, but I mean eight and a half plus or something from injury, to coming back and playing. He didn't have a huge role, but he came back and played late, had some significant plays, and fought to get back out there and play. To me, that's a great show of his character right there. He could have easily said, "Hey, I'm going to get healthy and wait." We've all seen those things happen. They had a great team, they had an exceptional season, but I think that shows a lot about him right there. On the field, you've seen it, or you will see it if you go study him on tape. He can go down the field. He makes plays. He goes up for the football. We're impressed with his hands. All those things you like about a wideout. I think for me sitting here, that's said a lot about his character. He wanted to be a part of that team, he wanted to be a part of that championship, and he fought to come back. You guys have been following the draft here for two days, they had a lot of guys come off the board and a lot of great players. I think that's an impressive character for him.

## What do you make of the way the wide receiver position has been emphasized in this offseason? Obviously, they're important to you guys, but what do you think is the cause of that?

They make a lot of plays. Right now, people want to score points, and everybody is looking to have those big splash plays. I think that's what happening. You're seeing that in free agency, you're seeing that in the draft, its going quick. There's a lot of talent out there, you look at college football, its spread out there's more wideouts playing and that's what's happening, so we see all of that. We see that trickling up to us.

### Does Chase have versatility to come work inside?

I believe he does. I think we can do a lot of different things with Chase, and I'm excited about exploring that, when we get into that here through the summer and the next fall.

### How important is it to have three guys stretch the field, not only in your offense, but any offense?

I think it's important. To the question about how important wideouts are, I think it's showing across the league. You just have one, things roll that way. Coverage tilts that way. Having three guys that go down the field and we feel positive about what we got at tight end too with Pat and Gentry both. They can add to our versatility and ability to make them go the entire field both horizontally and vertical.

## Does losing JuJu [Smith-Schuster] and Ray-Ray [McCloud] open the chance to double up at the receiver position this weekend?

I work really hard to call the plays the best I can. There's a big room down there where they're going to decide that.

## To Guy's question earlier, you have the two picks so far and added some lineman in free agency. What kind of impacts have been made on the offense during this offseason?

We're really excited about the free agency pickups we made up front in Mason [Cole] and James [Daniels]. I think those guys are going to come in and be really helpful for us. They add experience and talent, not minimizing that, but to come into that room, I think that room's going to continue to grow with two more pieces to the puzzle here with more offensive guys. The more weapons you have the better, the more competition you have at every room the better. We're excited.

## You got a lot of youth on that offensive now. Is that a little concerning that the experience does not match up?

I don't think there's anything we're going to be able to change about that. I'm going to be excited about the youth. They're willing to work, and they've been here already going. I think we got a real talented group, and we're going to have a lot of fun getting them ready to go.

## You mentioned this about getting Kenny in the first round, how you know Kenny and you've worked with him. How exciting is it to have a guy you know and to work with him?

I never coached Kenny. I was a part of recruiting him. I think there's a kind of special situation in regards of my wife and I sitting there having dinner with his parents however many years ago that was. To kind of be at the end of his college run, even though I never coached him, but I do feel good about knowing who he is as a person, and I'm excited about coaching him.

### **DeMarvin Leal Conference Call Transcript**

## What were your interactions with the Steelers before tonight? Did you have any idea that they were interested in bringing you in?

Me and Dan Moore Jr. go back to [Texas] A&M going against each other. He taught me lots of things, not only this process but things outside of football, so that's my guy.

### What about Buddy Johnson? Are you close to him as well?

Yes, sir I am. That's my linebacker. We both know how to talk football, and we both know how to communicate well. Our games together were unbelievable, so I can't wait to get back my linebacker.

## Is there a player you model your game after or think you play like for Steelers fans who maybe haven't seen you?

I model my game after guys like J.J. Watt, Aaron Donald, and guys like that. Stay tuned.

### I don't know if you know, J.J. has a brother that plays here.

I do know.

### What are your thoughts on playing with T.J. and Cam Heyward?

I'm a little brother myself, and we always want to be the best at what we do. I know that T.J. Watt... he's crazy at pass rush, so I can't wait to get to work with him. I can't wait to combine our talents and see what we can be.

## Do you think your offseason testing hurt your draft stock? Do you think that pushed you down the list a little bit?

Everything plays its part. Everything at the end of the day came down to. Everything worked out the way I wanted to at the end of the day. I'm just glad to be in this position and be a part of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

One thing that Teryl Austin mentioned was your versatility and that was something that they really liked in your game. Where did they say they see you fitting on the line? Did they mention you having to play multiple spots?

Yeah, that's one thing he saw the most of is the fact that I can play all over the defensive line. That's something they see me doing, and I'm glad that they believe in me. I'm glad to be a part of it.

### **Teryl Austin**

#### **Opening Statement**

Just here to talk about the guy we just drafted, DeMarvin Leal from Texas A&M. Really liked him as a football player. Really versatile, loose body, upper body, plays multiple positions across the line. We think he has an opportunity to be a good player for us when he gets in here, but he does offer some versatility, he's got the frame to get a little bigger and he does some pass-rushwise and run-game-wise that we really like and value here.

### Where do you see his best fit on the defensive line?

I think initially we'll probably look at him at an end spot. It all depends. He has some flexibility, but if you're playing base defense, you can look at him as an end. When you're playing in your nickel defense, you may look at him at a different position. That's all to be determined as we get going.

### You mentioned his frame. Will he need to put a little weight on if he's going to play inside?

I think if he's going to play in the base, yes. That position takes a bigger man and he's got the frame to do it. I think he probably was playing it the way he was because that's where they needed him at his school. I have no reservations about him being able to fit anywhere in our scheme. Once he gets here, we'll figure that out.

### Were you surprised to get him this late? Some people said he was probably in the middle of the second round.

Absolutely. We had a very nice grade on him and the fact that he was sitting there really surprised all of us, so I think it was a no brainer for us to choose him.

### How much of a priority was it for you guys to add to the defensive line in this draft?

I think you're always looking to add. First, you're always looking at good players regardless of the position because good players help us become a better team. But I think if you can add a quality defensive lineman, a young defensive lineman, that always is helpful. You can never have enough of those guys and corners.

### Did he do a lot of similar things at A&M that you're going to ask him to do here and how does he do against the run?

He does. He will do a lot of things that are similar. The difference is a lot of times the offenses they play against are a little bit different than what they'll play up here, but he has the ability to do all the things that we'll ask him to do. You'll see him doing plays [inaudible] at the line of scrimmage. He gets off, you see him pass rush. He's actually so versatile. He'll play on the nose. He's played out in space. He's played out on the edge, so he'll be able to do what we want. I don't think that's ever going to be an issue with this young man.

### Was it important to add some youth on the defensive line? Some of those guys aren't getting any younger.

I think it's again, like I said, it's important to continue to add because you add young depth, young legs and you have an opportunity to develop those guys and I think that's really important to add those young guys in there. I'm going to bring up a guy from last year [Isaiahh] Loudermilk. We got him and he really developed towards the end of the year and was playing and

he's going to develop into being a nice player and I think that's why you always grab a young talented defensive lineman if you have an opportunity.

## Is part of that being able to lean on Cam [Heyward] or even Tyson [Alualu] or [Stephon] Tuitt in terms of being in the league for as long as they all have and to be able to be that guide?

Absolutely. I think we have we have great veteran leadership and those guys mentor guys because they understand the standard that's here with our defense and they want those guys, even though they're coming in behind them, to live up to that standard and to be able to understand what it takes to execute that standard.

### Does he remind you of anyone you've coached over the years?

No, it's hard to say. He looks like a lot of good college players and when he gets here, we'll figure out what he looks like.

## Other than Tyson [Alualu], I don't know that you guys have prototypical bigger nose behind him. Is that a concern at all for you as you're thinking about the base?

No. Right now, it's not a concern. I'm just worried about the draft and these young guys that are coming in and all that other stuff will sort itself out as we get through OTAs and work through the different phases here. Right now, I'm just kind of concerned with the draft and where those guys are and once the guys we get, where they kind of slide in there.

## When you look those struggles against the run last year, how much did you attribute that to not having to [Stephon] Tuitt and [Tyson] Alualu and the depth of a defensive line and how much was it other things?

Well, here's what I'll say. Again, we're kind of getting out into different areas and how about if I just talk about the draft tonight and then I'll answer all these questions because I'm sure they're going to come up at a different time about where we are depthwise and maybe how the concerns we had based on last year. But really just sticking to that guy. It's his night. Really excited to have that young man and how I think he fits in with us.

### Did you have any interactions with him or any intangibles?

I did not have any interactions. Coach Dunbar was at his pro day, and he came back with some good news about him and he liked the kid. He liked his demeanor. He liked the way he worked and so that always goes into the evaluation of the player and we felt really comfortable with him.

### **Calvin Austin III Conference Call Transcript**

## Did you have any idea that they were interested in you and just your reaction to being picked by the Steelers?

Just from the Senior Bowl and conversations throughout. I could tell there was a little interest and I'm just extremely blessed right now to be at a great organization like the Steelers with Coach Tomlin and Mr. Rooney. It's just a blessing.

### Did you meet with a lot of their people, their position coach at all during this process?

I did some. I would say not as much as some others, but the talk that we had, I could kind of tell that it was very personal, and you could tell that there was a connection.

## Do you know anything about what Matt Canada likes to do from an offensive scheme standpoint and how you think they might use you?

I know a little bit just from watching their games and stuff. I know they like to run the ball but also spread it out some. I'm just ready to come in and for him to use me however is needed because I'm that guy that can play inside, outside. I can do it all, so whatever role he needs me, I'll be very excited just to go out there and do that job.

## You're 170-pound guy in the slot over the middle, you have to be fearless. Do you have any kind of examples or stories about that?

Just from really growing up is where I became fearless. I have a whole bunch of older cousins and we would go to the park and play tackle football all the time and from that point on, I've just always been tough because they wouldn't take it easy on me and I'm the type where I like to show off myself. If I do get hit or anything like that, I'm the type that wants to get right back up fast and go through it again because I'm never scared when I'm on the field and when I'm off the field, I'm the biggest receiver out there.

### Who are some of the guys that you model your game after?

There's a lot of guys I watch. I would say one in particular is Tyler Lockett. He's a guy that I watched a lot just because he can do things from the slot. He tracks the ball well. Tyreek Hill of course. Cole Beasley just because of how he works in the slot. Davante Adams, his release game. I watch a lot of guys and just take things from their game to add to mine and continue getting better.

### Were you primarily in the slot? How much did you go outside at Memphis?

I was primarily outside at Memphis, so about I would say 80% of my snaps came from outside. That's what I think makes me very versatile because with my size, you would think I'm just a slot receiver but that's something I can go in and do both. I can do outside and inside because I have the experience.

## Going back to recruiting, did you consider going to a smaller school to play football or did you go to Memphis to run track? Did you plan on doing both?

Whatever school I was going to go to, I was going to do both. I wanted to go to Memphis, so the track coach started recruiting me. I was like, "The only way I can go is if I can play football too." I had been to all the Memphis camps in the past. I was like, "I'll run track there, but I want to play football too." He talked to the football coach the next day and they offered me a preferred walk-on, so I walked on for both football and track. Then, in 2019, after we played Houston, I earned my scholarship for football.

### Would the track coach have given you a scholarship if you just went track?

Yes, sir. He would have given me a full ride scholarship offer, but I wanted to play football. Football has always been where my heart is, so there was no way I was going to just take that just to run track. I was going to have to play football.

## At 5'8" have you heard a lot that you're too small to do that and is that something that's driven you?

Oh yes. Just watching the draft too, this whole process, it's music to my ears. I come out and laugh anytime I see someone say it or mention it. That's always the thing. That's all I've been hearing, so it just gives me the extra drive to continue to work hard. I've been built off work. All I do is work, so it's not going to be anything drastic. I was going to work anyway, but it does add a little more juice.

### Do you love returning punts?

Yeah, I do because when you're returning punts, that's open field. That's where you make something happen.

### Did you continue to run track after football, or do you give that up?

I continued to run track, so I stopped when COVID came in 2020 because they canceled the rest of the season. That was my last year running track.

# These are exciting times for the Steelers offense with Kenny Pickett on Thursday, George Pickens Friday and now you. What do you know about those guys and how much do you look forward to the three of you coming in here to try to do some new things with Matt Canada?

Yes, sir. Kenny Pickett with the fake slide. He was actually the other quarterback at the Senior Bowl, so I've spoken to him before and just from watching his game, he's a guy that can throw the ball. He can get the ball left, right, deep down the field, short up the middle, he can do it all. George Pickens is a really good receiver from Georgia. I've known a lot and watched a lot of him as well and just the whole receiving staff already at the Steelers. It's a ton of talent, so I'm just glad to be a part and just get to work really.

# How do you feel like the coming out of high school without scholarship offers and that sort of mindset of being a walk-on and having to work for everything you earn, how do you feel like that sort of defined who you are right now?

Just because I'm blessed to be in this position and I do understand that because if you had talked about them when I first got on campus, this would have probably been a crazy thing to even think about. Being a walk-on just defines who I am. I've always been overlooked. I've always been doubted, but I don't play football or work as hard as I do to prove those people wrong. I work and play as hard as I do to prove the people who believe in me right like my family here. That's my why and I've always been doing that since I was a walk-on. I know I have to go above and beyond, and it just becomes a part of me. I'm just built off work and I will continue to do it.

### Can you recommend a rib joint in Memphis?

Go to One & Only. It will not let you down. One & Only.



### Frisman Jackson Press Conference Transcript

### **Opening Statement:**

Obviously, we drafted Calvin. Great pick up for us. Really liked what we saw on tape when we watched him. He made some plays in the slot and outside as a perimeter wide out. He did some really good things with the ball in his hands, so we're really excited to have him on board. Think he adds a different dimension to our offense with his perimeter ability and his ability in the slot to be able to make some plays for us, so we can't wait to get him here, get to coaching him, and see what he can do.

### He said that he played primarily on the outside at Memphis, but do you figure he's primarily inside here?

He can play both. Right now, we don't know exactly where we will put him, but with his ability to play both inside and outside, he gives us some flexibility in that regard.

### Is he a 4.32 on tape?

Oh yeah, you see the speed on tape, with the ball in his hands and without the ball in his hands as he comes off the line of scrimmage, he's fast.

## A big part of Matt Canada's offense is the jet sweeps and everything too. Is that a reason why you liked him with his ability with the ball in his hands?

Not just for the jet sweeps. Some of the stuff he did down the field as far as running by people and catching balls down the field. That's what excited me, because you saw a small guy who's 5'8" but he didn't play 5'8". He played bigger than his size listed, so not necessarily just the jet sweep part of it, but his whole game just excited us as a coaching staff.

### What does he bring to the wide receiver room that you didn't have before?

He's probably one of the fastest guys in the room, but he's a smaller guy. All the rest of the guys are pretty big except for Diontae [Johnson] but he brings the speed element, and he brings toughness. Not saying that the guys weren't tough last year, but he brings some toughness along with his competitiveness, and I believe he's going to make the room fun. He's going to bring some juice and stuff to the room.

### When you say plays bigger, how does he do that?

When you're a 5'8" guy, can you go up and attack the football when the ball is in the air? Or do you sit down and wait for it? He [Calvin Austin III] goes up and attacks the ball in the air. Most 50-50 balls, or competitive combat catches as Coach [Mike] Tomlin likes to say. He goes and makes those plays. When I say he plays bigger in size, that's what I'm referring to. He plays like a guy who's 6'1" or 6'2" as far as when he jumps up and attacks the football.

### You add two different size guys to that room. Was it important to get a different type of player?

I don't think we came into today with that mentality. We were just going to take the best guy that was on the board, and he was the best guy on the board. He's a guy that we like, as we went through the whole pre-draft process, and so when he was sitting there, Coach Tomlin came down and said, "Hey man, do you like this kid? Do you still like him?" and I'm like "absolutely," so he was available, and we took him because he was the best guy on the board. We weren't necessarily looking for size or anything like that.

## What about you? You get here and kind of get a clean slate. You show up and get two top four draft picks that are in your room. Is that advantageous to you?

No, I wouldn't say that. Jerry [Olsavsky] was making fun of me saying I get all of these new guys, but I lost some guys in free agency in our room. We just added two pieces to the puzzle and hopefully they're big pieces that can come out and help us win some games.

### Did you interact with Calvin [Austin III] during the pre-draft process at all? What do you think of him as an individual?

I spoke with him a little bit at the combine. We get a little bit of time to interview these guys, and you felt the competitiveness in his voice when he spoke. You felt the toughness that he had when he talked about how he grew up and how he loved the game of football, and it was his passion. Those are one of the things I like in wideouts. I want a guy that's competitive and I want a guy that's tough. He kind of displayed both those things even without watching the tape.

### He has a reputation for fearlessness. Did you see examples, and can you give us any?

Yeah, I think they were playing Temple. I saw him run across the middle and catch a in route across the middle, and he was going to get the crap hit out of him, but he holds on and makes the catch. I worked at Temple, so I know the type of guys at Temple, there's some tough dudes at Temple. He was able to maintain the catch and make the play for his team. I can see the guy who can go across the middle and is not afraid of, "hey I might have to take this hit and alligator arm it." He goes out and he attacks the football no matter where the ball is at.

### He says he likes to get up after a tough hit and get right back at it. Is that to your point?

That shows some toughness. He's not lying down there on the ground. He gets up whether he's hurt or not. He gets up. He's going to celebrate a little bit and have a little fun with it. I enjoy seeing guys do that.

### Is he a legit punt returner?

That's more Danny Smith. I tend to concentrate on the receiver aspect of it. I know he's made some plays on the punt return game, and if he's able to do that, that's an extra perk for us.

### What's the biggest thing he needs to improve? Where do you need to work with him on the transition?

Just keep continuing to refine the route running part of it. I saw some things there that I can really correct. If those things can get corrected, I think he can do some really good things in this league for us.

## Your time in the game as a coach and even as a player, there's been track guys that become wide receivers. There's some that work out and some that don't. Is there a common trend that translates?

I saw a guy on tape that's a track player that plays football. He's not a guy that's a football player that runs track. He's a tough dude. You see the track speed, and you see the football player in him. That was important to me, because we know he ran track, he went to Memphis on a track scholarship. I wanted to see the toughness and the competitiveness. I saw those things on tape. When you're scouting a guy with that track background, you worry about that, whether or not he's a track player that happens to be playing football. I'm excited to get him in the room, because I think he shows that toughness that we want in the room.

## One thing Mike Tomlin mentioned when you were hired is your ability to teach in the way that you coach. How much do you enjoy the process of developing these new rookies like Calvin [Austin III] or George [Pickens] from last night?

I consider myself a teacher before anything. The development part of it is huge. Having the college background where you get a young guy, you have to develop him. The programs that I coached, Temple and Baylor, you had to develop guys. We weren't able to get the five-star guys. That's in my background. That's important to me. I get pleasure in seeing a guy as a young pup coming into this league or coming into college and you see the developmental phase. You see the development of the player you think he can be. That's important to me, the development part of it. I consider myself a developmental coach. I take pride in that.

## As a wide receivers coach that's been in the league now, what do you make with what's happened this offseason with the way the position is being suddenly valued extremely? Do you feel like that's been something that's coming, or a little bit crazy?

The game has transitioned so much to the pass with 7-on-7 circuits. 7-on-7 circles have become like AAU basketball. These kids travel all over the place to do 7-on-7. We saw the game trending in that direction so with the influx of so many wide receivers to the draft, and these guys doing so much seven on seven and so much passing in the college game, we kind of saw it coming, and it is a product of that.

### We know you just took Calvin, but can we get your breakdown on George [Pickens] and what you think of him?

George is a big frame guy. I was able to go work him out on his pro day, and he was a guy that was able to sink his hips getting in and out of his breaks, transitioning out of his breaks with speed, went up and attacked the football. Obviously, he didn't get to play as many games as he wanted to this past football season, but I loved the fact that he wanted to go and play. He came back from injury, and he could have sat out for the draft process to happen and get myself ready for the draft, but he went in there and wanted to compete with his team. That showed a lot to me. The skillset is there. I can't wait to get my hands on him and Calvin and work with those guys.

## Looking ahead to that process, how much has it helped that you worked with Matt Canada before? If you guys picked up where you left off with his schemes and everything?

He coached me in college, and then I worked with him at NC State. I'd like to think I'm a better coach now then I was when I first started working with him at NC State. I'm looking forward to it. There's some familiarity with the offense, familiarity with the way he coaches and wants things done. That makes this transition coming here to Pittsburgh a lot easier than most places.

### To your earlier point, how do you feel overall about the speed in your room?

Speed is great. They all can run. Every guy in our room can run. They can take the top off the coverage. Hopefully, they'll invite safeties over the top of us and hoping to open up some of the intermediate and short passing game. Hopefully, every guy in the room can take advantage of the speed, where teams have to focus on that part of it.

### **Connor Heyward Conference Call Transcript**

## You were the most heavily predicted guy on Pittsburgh's mock drafts all season. How do you feel about that?

I always felt like they were interested, but I didn't want to get my expectations too high. My brother was just as surprised as I was, and we were both just extremely happy. I'm not born in Pittsburgh, but Pittsburgh means a lot and he's [Cameron Heyward] involved a lot. So, this just means that much more to me.

### Where have you spent today? Were you with Cam [Heyward], or what are you doing?

I'm in Georgia right now with Cam, Cam's family and all my siblings and close friends. Then later, I'm going to have some more friends and family come later. I just didn't want to have everybody just watching TV behind my back while I'm stressing even more.

### What was Cam's reaction when you got the phone call?

He called me into my mom's room and was like, "Who was that?" and I just told him one second. It was coach [Mike] Tomlin and about halfway through, I told him who he was, and his facial reaction was just priceless.

## Did you dare to think that the Steelers might pick you to try to avoid thinking about the possibility and didn't want to tease yourself?

No, I never teased myself one bit. I wanted to see it happen, and if it didn't happen, I wasn't going to put that in my head. So now that it did happen, I'm glad it did.

### Have you guys ever been on any team together before?

No sir. We've never played together. It would be the first time.

## Did the Steelers mention how they view you? Maybe as a tight end, H-back or fullback? Where do you see your role developing here?

I see myself as all of those and so do they. They like my versatility and I think that they have a plan for me. No matter what that is, I'm going to embrace it and I'm just excited to be a Steeler.

### How much of that plan do you think involves special teams for you?

100%. I know my position. Tight end and fullback, and special teams is an important thing. At Michigan State, I played special teams, around three or four special team units a year. So, I know what it takes to be successful on special teams, and special teams can keep you in the NFL longer. You can't shy away from that. That's something you just want to do.

## Can you talk us through how those different position changes evolved at Michigan State? How have you transferred from one to another?

I came in as an athlete my freshman year, and coach Dantonio recruited me. He thought I was just an offensive guy, anywhere on offense, or outside linebacker on defense. They tried me out on offense and that worked out. Then when coach Tuck[er] came in, coach Peagler was my running back coach, he was a tight end coach at Florida. He suggested it to the staff, and two weeks before the season, I switched into their hybrid role, tight end and h-back role and I'm glad I did. I don't think I would be in this position if I didn't.

## I'm sure you're a Steelers fan, I'm just going to guess on that. Do you have a favorite Steelers moment or a favorite Cam moment?

My favorite Cam moment so far is when he got the interception against the Giants when it kind of just fell in his hands, or in his belly or whatever. Besides that, I would say Troy Polamalu. He's always been one of my favorite players and somebody that I've always looked up to, just growing up and loving the Steelers. Troy Polamalu is somebody that everybody looks to. I look up to him and Jerome Bettis a lot as players growing up.

# Cam has a reputation for getting in camp fights, especially with rookies. Even when he was a rookie, he was a bit of a bully. How has he been a bully to you, and what are you expecting in his camp?

He's been a big brother, but more of a father figure. I mean I can take the tough love. I'm kind of expecting it to come into camp, but it makes the experience that much more fun.

# I know you said you've never played on a team with Cam, and you haven't even lived in the same part of the country as Cam for a while. Are you going to move in with him? Or are you going to keep those separated once you get here?

I'll live with my grandma before I live with Cam. Or I'll just get my own place, more than likely I'll get my own place. For the first couple of weeks or so, I'm sure that I'll stay with Cam or my grandma just to get situated and acclimated with the football stuff. Obviously, that's the most important stuff, and then the other stuff comes second.

## At what point do you think it'll really hit you that you're going to play in the NFL with your brother?

Probably tomorrow when I wake up, or when I step on the field for practice for the first time.

## There are three other sets of brothers on the Steelers roster of 90 guys, that's pretty amazing. Is that something that they seem to like family members and sons and everything else?

Yeah, I honestly think when you have your siblings around, it makes you play that much better. They can push you to the limits that your teammates can push you to, and when your brother has been tough on you, the teammates can kind of look at that and be like, "okay, he's being tough on me."

Very excited we got Connor Heyward. Very talented guy. I know he's done some things, positional flexibility things, and when I saw him as a tight end, I had an opportunity to look at him as a tight end guy and he offered some value. I knew he could be an outstanding [special] teams player, but right now we get a chance to focus on him being a tight end and fitting in with the rest of the guys. If anybody has any questions, I can take those now.

## Why do you guys value the bloodlines of Connor and Cam [Heyward] and Derek and TJ [Watt]? Is there something to that?

I can't answer that question. That was kind of built before I got in, but all those guys are in the building, and all contribute at a high level. It was fortunate to have that kind of talent and bloodline that's coming through, but with Connor, I think he kind of holds his own weight and own name. Being drafted in the NFL is a big thing. I think it's bigger than bloodline. I think he's being valued and selected because he can play.

## It seemed like he did a little bit of everything. Was there any one thing that really stood out that kind of made you guys pick him?

For me, I saw him play in line, I saw him make plays down the field as a tight end, catching the ball and running after the catch, I saw him catch screens, and he showed value as a runner. He showed value as a ball-catcher. He checked the ball really well. People talk about his limp playing in line. He has that want to and the savviness to do some other things that are really attractive and getting him on our football team and the things that we're trying to do with moving, he gives you that added dimension.

### Is it the same things that Derek Watt gives you?

Similar but he played more of a true fullback where Connor gives, in my opinion, a different flex and tight end responsibility and he just gives you that value.

### Did you talk to Cam [Heyward] as a reference when you were looking into Connor?

I don't mess with Cam. Cam's too big. I want to do a good job, so I didn't have that talk. Cam is awesome. Cam shows his athleticism when he challenges tight end and he'll go and do some one-on-one pass stuff. I did not get a chance to visit with Cam about his brother's talent, but with the bloodline, I got a chance to see his father play and play against his father and got a chance to share one of my stories with Connor when I was at the combine, so it'd be interesting to see those guys go at it because he is going to have to see his brother at some point.

## How much can it help Connor's transition to the NFL to have Cam here and be around and just be in a family that knows the NFL?

I think being in a football family helps. This organization kind of embraces everybody that walks in the building. I think coming in culturally, this is a fun and safe environment to grow the player. Being familiar with a lot of the guys, a lot of relationships already that Cam had in place, I think it gives him a little comfort to come in and be comfortably uncomfortable as we like to say. That'll give him that for sure. He still has to compete with some guys that want to play and I'm sure he's going to want to do the same thing.

### Can you tell us the Iron Head story?

I want to say the year might have been '85 or '86. When I was playing for Miami, we came to play Pitt back when they were on the campus and his dad might have ran for 250 and we didn't have an answer for him. I remember Benny Blades, one of our strong safeties, and Jim [inaudible] and Benny was saying some colorful things to the line because they wouldn't get him to stop. It was just a chance to kind of share what I knew about his dad and seeing him a few times, we got the chance to rush him. It was a cool story I like telling and T.A. [Teryl Austin] kind of qualifies the story because he laughs about it. "We couldn't stop the guys." No, we won but he had the best of them that day.

## As far as tight ends go, Connor is kind of unique with his body type and his career to this point. Does he remind you of anybody you've had in your rooms over the years?

A young man that strikes my memory played for the Dolphins. I'm going to have to circle back on that, but he played for the Dolphins, and he played for the Cardinals I believe. But it's similar in body type. He played for Buffalo as well. It's similar in that because you talk about stature. He played at Tulsa. I can't remember his name, but I know every place he played, that's funny. He has his own uniqueness. It's just a skill set that he's going to offer us to be able to do some other things and then with Danny Smith, he's got to often show up for us on teams and I think he has that ability. He runs well, he's got good body control, he does all those things, so he should be able to show up on Sunday with all kinds of talent and skill sets.

### Michigan State was a pretty run-focused offense. How was he run-wise?

On the film that I had an opportunity to see, I thought he held his own. Obviously, Zach Gentry has grown into that role, but I don't think you leave him to do all the heavy lifting. If he's asked to do it, he's going to have to do it like all the rest of the guys.

### How does he complement your room?

We're going to see. Right now, you get talented guys in, and you know he's going to find a way to play. But we're going to see. You get in our big packages and is he the F, is he the Z, is he the Y? We'll see. He just gives you one more opportunity to stress the defense because he does offer those things. He can play in the back, he can play in line, you can move him out of space. Let T.A. and them try to figure it out.

### You said you didn't go to Cam about Connor. Did Cam go to you?

No. I don't mess with Cam. I take that back, Cam is awesome. I actually hadn't seen him since the offseason start-ups. I know he went to the Pro Bowl and when I was at the Combine, I saw him do a piece on the network, but I did not get a chance to bump into him. I did tell Coach Tomlin when I was at the Combine, I saw Connor and I said, "Man, he can play." "Ah, don't worry about that Fredo, you're not getting a player this year." I said, "Okay, that's fine." I kind of kept needling, needling, needling, and then he said, "Hey, we got Connor," kind of like we did with Pat [Freiermuth] last year.

### So Cam wanted to see Mike Tomlin.

I didn't say that, but maybe. It's an open-door policy around here, so everyone has access.

### Do you see similar work ethics between Cam and Connor in the way they play the game?

Different because I have seen Cam work in practice, and I have not got a chance to see Connor work in practice. I know he's talented, he's a young man, he plays hard. I know he's trying to find his own niche. When you come here with your big brother, I'm sure he'll play with a chip and want to have his own say in it.

### On the tight-ends room.

Yeah. It's a fun room. They keep me on my toes. They make me say "I'm vintage." I won't ever be old when I have a young room like that, so to add one more element that's going to be positive like Connor, I'm excited for it. I'm excited for him and the Steelers. I think it's going to be awesome.

### **Mark Robinson Conference Call Transcript**

### What made you make the move from running back to linebacker?

I had a couple of coaches in my head, the right people, all put guys on the knee and as children of the game listening, learning, you just take the advice and wisdom. I prayed on it, and I tried it for a week.

### Do you remember a few years ago a guy at UCLA did the same thing?

No, sir.

### You don't remember Myles Jack doing that?

Oh, yeah, I do remember Myles Jack. Yes, I do.

### There's a guy you can ask questions about playing linebacker. How raw are you at that position?

How raw am I?

### At linebacker, yeah.

I'm not quite sure. I'm not sure how raw I am.

### How many years have you been playing linebacker?

One year. One season.

## You had quite a journey too. I guess you were at a couple of schools before Ole Miss. How did that transpire?

I had one offer coming out of high school, which was to Presbyterian and before our first season was done, my freshman season, they announced to us that we were going to a non-scholarship organization. Of course, we all scattered trying to find places, you know to go play at, and that's what I found. I went to Southeast Missouri, and I put it back for two seasons and that's when my [friend] convinced me to walk on at Ole Miss. I bet on myself, a lot of faith, I believe in God, and it paid off for me, so I'm here today.

### What do you know about the city of Pittsburgh?

I don't know nothing, but I plan on learning a lot.

### You came in here recently on a visit correct? What coaches did you get to meet with?

I had a chance to meet with everybody in the office. I went out to dinner with Mr. Rooney, I talked to the GM, the head coach, Coach Tomlin, we all sat down. I talked to the defensive coordinator, position coaches, I just had a day to myself to talk and meet with those guys one-on-one and just kind of talk to each other and get to know each other. That was a blessing for me.

## When you made the move to linebacker, what do you feel like came easily to you and what do you feel like you had to spend more time working on?

Play recognition was the hardest part. On offense it's one call, but on defense, the play changes every time one person moves. What came easily was my effort. My work to my will. That's what I bet on and that's just my game, so I'm going to continue to play that way and add more to the toolbox and we're just going to keep getting better.

## What were your conversations like with Brian Flores when you came in and where did he see you fitting in this defense?

Coach just asked me to come in and do what I do best: run, hit, [inaudible]. Upon meeting him, I didn't know a lot about him. I knew he came from Miami, so just sitting there getting to know him, he talked about his family, I talked about mine and we had a great time. We sat down. We had a great conversation, and it was a great experience for me.

You might not know this, but you are the second walk-on, or I guess I should say former walk-on, the Steelers have drafted today. How much is that something that motivation that just sticks with you and the hunger that sticks with you when you're trying to earn a scholarship like that?

It's just different. It's a really different avenue. You go through different things when you're a walk-on. I know especially for me, it just taught me how to stay focused, stay humble, and no matter what the odds are just bet on yourself and believe in God, and it will all work out through hard work.



### **Brian Flores Press Conference Transcript**

Excited to have Mark. We brought him in for a visit. I spent a lot of time with him. He's excited to bring them on, and I just got off the phone with him. He's excited about this opportunity, it's a great opportunity for him, and we look forward to working with him.

## I didn't have time to google him, but didn't he have some kind of position change that kind of makes him a mystery in this position?

Yeah, he was a running back for most of his career. One year at linebacker at Ole Miss. I think that's part of what we liked about him, there's some upside here. This is somebody who hasn't played the position for a long time, but he showed speed, he showed athleticism, he showed toughness, physicality, and a lot of things we liked. He's a fun guy to watch on film for sure.

### Did he take to it quickly, moving around? Do you think he has a high ceiling?

I think he's got some upside. When you learn a new position, there's going to be a little bit of a learning curve early in the season, but as you watched him progress, going into games five, six, seven, and eight, you saw him improve and get better. That's really what you're looking for. You like to see that as a coach. He's someone who is a hard-working kid. He kind of got that feeling, and I have that feeling too. It's important to him, which is a big part of making progress as a player. I know he'll work to get better.

### Where do you see him fitting on the field and then within your room?

That's up to him. I always tell players to take advantage of opportunities. I think if he comes in, improves and works to get better, he'll have a chance.

## You mentioned the upside traits such as speed and physicality. Where are the areas that he needs to improve on as he continues to make progress?

He's going to have a big learning curve I should say. Specifically for him, still being new to the position, but there's a big learning curve for all rookies in the league getting used to the speed of the game, being in a new city. I'm sure it's not as hilly where he is, not how much it is in Pittsburgh. We got to find a new place to live, got to get acclimated to a new environment, and have to get to know a bunch of new teammates, but I know football is important to him, and he'll do what he needs to do to get better on a daily basis.

### Do you know if he's played a lot of special teams?

He's played in the kicking game for sure. He'll need to help us in the kicking game for sure. I've got some background on special teams, so I'll try to steer him in the right direction, but Danny [Smith] will take care of that as well.

### When you're scouting guys that are taken late in the third day, what do you evaluate the most?

Intangibles are a big thing. In my experience, the guys who develop in this league are the guys have the work ethic, the intelligence, and are obsessed with getting better. Those guys improve in this league. There's a lot of good players in this league, as you all know. The guys who work and improve, often times they move passed other guys.

# I'm sure you've watched tape on this defense from last year with historically poor run defense numbers. Yet, they haven't really addressed it other than seventh round and defensive lineman. Is it not a talent thing? Do you see how it can be improved?

I think there's probably another time to talk about that. Today, it's about Mark and this opportunity for him. It's a day of congratulations for him. Obviously, we see a lot of good things in him, and he can help our team defensively and in the kicking game. He's played offense before, so maybe he finds a way to help us there too. Although we have a pretty good running back here or running backs I should say. But today is about Mark, and we'll address some of those things as we move forward.

### Did you give a little nugget for us and say he might play a little running back?

No. You can write that if you want, but I think the running back situation here is pretty solidified.

## When you look at the areas of that position, run game, pass coverage, and pass rush, what did he take to quickly? Did you see one that felt more natural to him?

I think having played running back, there were some things that he saw as a linebacker that kind of translated to him, seeing it from that vantage point, which I thought helped him. This is one season playing linebacker, so that's part of the intrigue and the upside. But that's up to him, as with any player, to put the work in, to learn the playbook, to practice, perform and improve every day. He's got all the traits that says he'll do all those things.

## From your understanding, was it his decision to move over to linebacker? Saying like, "hey I've done running back for a while, I want to try something new," or was it a coaching thing where they saw it and made him transition?

He's a ballplayer. He wants to be out on the field. I don't know the ins and outs of what happened there, and I'm not going to speculate on that. He did a nice job and definitely improved over the course of the season, so I'm excited to work with him.

## I know a lot of people talk about the downsides of a raw player as a coach. Is there some excitement to have a guy that is raw and what you described as a ballplayer?

For me, every player is raw, and I think every player can make improvements. As a coach, you get excited about that, finding the things they do well and trying to pinpoint those and put them in positions to do the things that they do well over and over again, and help them improve in the things where they're not as good. I think we all have weaknesses in whatever field we're in. It could be coaching, journalism, football or basketball. I mean, everyone has weaknesses, and try to improve those weaknesses. As a coach, we're trying to help improve those weaknesses, but we want to play to their strengths as well.

**Hey Chris, real quick. Can you pronounce your last name for us?** ola-doe-KUN

## It sounds like you are on cloud nine right now, Chris. I mean, obviously everyone is when they get drafted, but are you surprised that you sneaked in here just based on some of the analysis out there from mock draft world?

Sort of. It's pretty surreal to me. I'm just thankful for the opportunity to be a part of the Pittsburgh organization, and I knew down the wire here there are some teams in play that were looking at me. When coach Tomlin got on the call, it sort of all just came so fast and I'm just super grateful.

### After they took Kenny Pickett, did you think, "well they don't have a need for another quarterback," and didn't expect to come here?

I took a visit to Pittsburgh, and I really enjoyed my time in Pittsburgh on my visit, so when they took him I was like, "man, well I don't know if they're out of play or not." Me and my agent sort of trusted the process, and I'm just glad to be a Steeler now.

#### What was your visit like in Pittsburgh? What kind of things did you do, and who did you talk with?

It was great. A lot of medical stuff, and then got met everyone in the building, from Coach Tomlin to Coach Brian Flores, having lunch with Matt Canada, getting to meet everyone around the building and meeting some players. It was a great visit. I can tell, everyone was super cool, real laid back, and in an environment that I would want to be in.

### I saw that you're from Tampa, and you want to the same school as Ray-Ray McCloud, but do you know Diontae Johnson at all from being down that way?

I do actually. We work out at the same gym down here in Tampa, so I've known him forever. I'm glad I get to now be a teammate with him after playing against him for so long.

**RE: You played against him [Diontae]? Was it like in high school or in youth ball?** In high school.

#### Have you worked out with him as far as throwing passes down there recently?

#### **Kevin Colbert Opening Statement:**

Thanks again, everybody. Bring this draft process to an end. We talked about Kenny Pickett on Thursday evening. Just to follow up, when Kenny came in for his press conference and visitation yesterday, it just reaffirmed for myself the maturity and just the real good feeling you have about having Kenny Pickett be your quarterback with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Sometimes you take that for granted until you get the young men in the rooms, but it was great to see him and have him around.

George Pickens, the coaches talked about him. Pickens is a very, very talented young man. He suffered an ACL last spring. He fought his way back. It was very impressive. Sometimes players in those situations, they just shut it down, get healthy and prepare for the draft. He prepared to help Georgia down the stretch, and they used him in certain packages in their last few games and into the playoffs and championship game he made a big play.

But it was impressive to us how he responded, and instead of putting that injury, letting him put him on the shelf, he fought through it and became a national champion. We felt really comfortable with where he was with the rehab at his pro day, a couple months removed from the championship.

It was exceptional. He did a lot of things that we thought he would have been doing had he been healthy last season, so we're very encouraged about that.

DeMarvin Leal, this is a talented, inside-outside; he's moved all along the defensive line of scrimmage. We think he can play a number of positions, both in the base defense and in the sub-packages; quality interior rusher who also rushed from the outside last year; he's certainly a run defender, as well.

Calvin Austin, you're going to look at his size. He's smaller but he's extremely fast. I think he timed in the -- on our watches, in the 4.4s at the combine, but what Coach reminded me of was this is a 200-meter guy. He's probably hitting his peak speed at 40 yards. He is exceptionally fast. He can play inside and outside. He doesn't have the ideal size to play outside, but he made plays for Memphis, both in the slot and outside, and he can return punts. I believe he has 29 for an 11-yard average.

Connor Heyward, obviously people understand who he is. First and foremost, that's not why we drafted him. Connor Heyward was a running back at Michigan State, and really, I give Coach Tucker and his staff credit for taking Connor and using him in a different manner as an H-back tight end/fullback.

Connor has got exceptional ball skills, receiving abilities, for a big man. We're excited to see what he can do as a tight end, as an H-back, as a special teamer. I don't want to discount, this guy one time against the University of Maryland put up I believe it was 140-some yards in a game, so he's very, very talented. He's very versatile.

Mark Robinson is a real interesting story. Mark was a scholarship running back at Presbyterian University. Presbyterian dropped scholarships, so he looked for another opportunity and he went to southeast Missouri as a scholarship player.

Southeast Missouri during the COVID season didn't play, so he sought -- he did not want to sit out a whole year, so he had a friend, an ex-teammate from back home at the University of Mississippi that encouraged him to come down there.

He went there as a walk-on runner. They gave him some looks just on defense as a scout team player, and all of a sudden, they're seeing, wait a minute, this young man can play defense. About midway through the season, he actually started nine games as an inside linebacker and really caught our attention. He has a real explosive tackling demeanor about him. He's a very, very interesting young man and really a self-made guy.

Chris Oladokun is another guy that he was a triple transfer and started off at South Florida, went to Sanford University, and then graduated from Sanford and took a grad senior year at South Dakota State and really did a nice job.

He ended up I believe it was 25 touchdown passes. We had good grades on him coming out of there. He played in the NFLPA game, and we decided, look, we wanted to add another quarterback to our roster, and this young man, we brought him in for a pre-draft visit, very mature, very smart, impressed us, not only on the field but with his off-the-field talents and intelligence and just demeanor.

That wraps up the picks. We'll be trying to sign free agents, as always, and scouts. We'll be working on that this evening and try to wrap it up and get ready for what's next. Coach?

#### Mike Tomlin Opening Statement:

Yeah, I'd like to open by acknowledging this guy to my left here, his contributions to this organization for 22 plus years has been exceptional and needs no endorsement from me. I think it quite simply speaks for itself.

I've had an opportunity to come alongside this gentleman for 15 of those years, and I just want to say it has been an absolute pleasure, not only in terms of results but the process itself.

It's a pleasure to come alongside him and evaluate talent and make the critical decisions. There's a lot of challenges in our business, but the spirit in which you attack them is everything, and it's just been a pleasure to work with him.

His mark and impact on us will continue to be felt, played out in the lives of the men that we selected here today, and I just wanted to say that. Thank you for 15 quality years right here.

KEVIN COLBERT: And right back at the coach. I appreciate that, and believe me, it's been a special relationship.

You don't think about these things until you get away from the task at hand, but there will be time to reflect on it. But I share Coach's appreciation. Appreciate what he and his staff and his demeanor have done for this organization, and just can't say how happy I've been to be able to work beside Coach Tomlin for 15 of those 22 years, and of course Coach Cowher for those first seven.

We know what the task is, and we've tried to accomplish that as best we can, but we just told the personnel department and the coaches it's time to start another year.

Again, appreciate everything, but it's time for 2022.

### Q. Kevin, for even the tiniest moment when you made that last pick, ironically at quarterback, did you even think for a moment, this is the last pick I'm going to make?

KEVIN COLBERT: It hit me for a minute --

MIKE TOMLIN: It's not in his DNA. We tried to take him there, and he led us maybe to the doorstep.

KEVIN COLBERT: No, you do think about that. Like I said, it'll hit you a little bit later. But it's like a game; when the game comes to an end, you appreciate it and you think about it, but you really will reflect on it when it gets quiet and you're by yourself and it's like, oh, wait a minute, what do I got to do next. I don't know.

But of course, it means a lot. The last pick, again, we hope it's the best pick, and only time will tell.

#### Q. Mike, did you say anything to him after that last pick?

MIKE TOMLIN: To him? No, no. I know he's not going to break character. But he makes it easy to stay focused on the task at hand, which we all have done and will continue to do.

### Q. Kevin, what are you going to do immediately? I know you're going to stay tied to -- not like you're moving away, but the last couple weeks, how are they going to be different than the last 22?

KEVIN COLBERT: Honestly, I don't know, because for 38 years we've been doing this. I've enjoyed every moment of it, and I don't know what's next. None of us do.

We'll move into that process, whatever the next step is, when Art decides to continue that search, and we'll see where it goes and how I may or may not be able to fit into it. I just want to make sure that, again -- I've said it before, whatever the next step is, if I can help and not hinder, great.

#### Q. Do you like how you left the franchise?

KEVIN COLBERT: I don't want to say better than. I'm proud that we've added to that room. It was four trophies -- there was four when we got here, and you knew the task.

You think about DMR and being able to add to that room means a ton. But it doesn't mean it's over. The next step, I mean, we've got to get more than, and we'll never lose that. But it means a lot.

### Q. Until a replacement is named, will you continue in what you're doing the next week, months, however long it takes?

KEVIN COLBERT: Yeah, I would anticipate -- we'll see. Again, Art will address that and bring Coach and I up to speed. Coach will be more involved with the next wave. I made initial recommendations, and we interviewed some great people, including two great internal candidates. There's a lot of people that can do this. There's probably some that can do it better.

But there will be -- time will tell, and Art will dictate when that time is to move to the next step. He'll dictate how we want to go about it, how he wants to go about it, and ultimately, he'll make that decision with whatever input he asks of us.

### Q. Long-term, I'm not sure what's next, but immediately you have a dinner tonight or any kind of celebration that the draft is done, your last draft is done?

KEVIN COLBERT: Not really. I'll go back down to the room and make sure we get the free agents all wrapped up and button things up for tonight and go home and spend time with Janice, my wife, and see where life goes.

# Q. Today specifically when you had the lull between -- about the fifth, was there anything you were hunting for that you would have liked to have gotten that you didn't have, a defensive back or an offensive lineman? Oftentimes you walk away from the draft with one of those --

KEVIN COLBERT: Yeah, every time you go into a draft you wish you had more than, and you reflect on why you didn't have that fifth-round pick. That was a swap of 5 and 7s with the Jets that we did for Avery Williamson after we had lost Devin Bush.

We traded for a veteran linebacker, and Avery did a nice job filling in that year. He gave us what he could. When you trade away a fifth that we did next year, that was for Ahkello Witherspoon, and he came in and gave us a year of service and now he's under contract for two more.

So, you always reflect on what you got with that pick, and it makes up some of it when we didn't have the round pick that we had for Minkah. We're very comfortable in not having that pick and having Minkah.

So, you understand there might be that lull and you wish you could have, but reality is you didn't.

Again, coming away with seven picks, it was good. Again, that fifth or that seventh that we got back, that's for Oladokun.

### Q. Lots of numbers at those positions, defensive back, and offensive line, but the competition is capable there, a lot of value to it this weekend?

MIKE TOMLIN: Yeah, and we added to that mix in free agency. There's two ways we add to our talent pool, free agency, and draft, and we felt really comfortable with what we were able to do with free agency in both rooms.

#### Q. When you called Connor Heywood, did you deliberately not want to tip off Cam?

MIKE TOMLIN: It was none of Cam's business. Cam just happens to be his big brother. But I say that, and I mean it. Connor's resume speaks for itself. He's a Swiss Army knife. He's very talented. He has a nice skill set. He's a capable runner. He's a capable blitz pickup guy. He's very good in terms of the screen game, timing and feel. He made some plays down the field as a tight end in that offense. He's a physical guy.

We imagine that he could be an offensive contributor in teams, and so he was very worthy of that consideration, and I didn't want to water that down in any way by including big brother.

### Q. You guys are up now to four sets of brothers; is that the cap on brother sets on this roster or will you find a couple more?

MIKE TOMLIN: You know, we value the intangible quality, and when you're doing business with one, it probably gives you an indication about the intangible quality of the other. We're all continually trying to measure that which we cannot, and that probably is what drives us toward the brother game.

But the guys that we do business with, they're here on their own merits and their own capabilities. In some instances, they just happen to be brothers.

#### Q. How much do you enjoy that part of this process, getting to make those phone calls?

MIKE TOMLIN: There's nothing like it. There's nothing like being a part of someone's story. I think Kenny said it, that phone call was a culmination of a life's work, and I have respect and appreciation for that. I make that call in that spirit.

### Q. Mike, what are your thoughts on the two receivers you added, kind of their styles that they'll bring to your offense?

MIKE TOMLIN: Really excited about them. Very different guys, but you need differing skill sets in the receiving room. Kevin outlined Pickens and why we're excited about him.

Quite frankly we just think there's a heck of a lot more meat on that bone. His talent was very evident. His health was very evident at his pro day. We got a bird's eye view of an extended workout at that pro day, and we're really comfortable with what we saw, the things that he's been able to do, and the pedigree that he brings is exciting.

We were equally as pleased with Calvin. Calvin is a smaller guy, a start-stop guy, punt return capable. It seems like over the last several years the offensive skill position at Memphis, they've had a lot of dynamic playmakers, and he's just the latest. We're excited to add him. He brings a differing skill set, a guy that probably works inside as a potential jet sweeper and some of those things.

So, we're excited about getting to know the things that we can anticipate them being good at but also not having them in a box and being open to being pleasantly surprised by some things that they might bring.

Pickens is a big guy that has little guy stop-start. We're excited about that, so we're not pinning him in a box in that way. Calvin is a little guy who made some plays outside down the field.

So, we'll put those guys into the mix and coach them up, and we're excited about what they potentially bring us.

#### Q. Is it safe to say they bring some explosive components to the game?

MIKE TOMLIN: I think any time we're hunting at the receiver position that's what we're looking for. It comes just in varying shapes and sizes.

Q. Mike mentioned before about addressing the offensive line in free agency. Was that always the plan or is that where you felt more bang for your buck would be, the free agent offensive line and go somewhere else in the draft?

KEVIN COLBERT: I mean, when we went into the free agency, we had hoped for that. Again, coming away with two guys that are center guard capable and having Kendrick Green in that same talent pool is comforting because you have three guys that can play center and guard, and collectively it's nine years' worth of service we have from that group.

That lessened the desire to add to the interior to that, and there's only certain things you can do. Again, if we had more picks maybe you add more players, but we felt we wanted to add more players in different spots.

Q. Kevin, a more global question, but when you spoke after picket was selected, you spoke really highly of the quarterback class at large and Mike said it went around the globe and came back home to get picket. Were you a little surprised to see all those guys still on the board with as much homework as you had done on them?

KEVIN COLBERT: I was, and we were. We were just comforted to know that we had Kenny in the fold. Again, I'll repeat, that group is a quality group, and I suspect a lot of those players will come away as starters, and their team selected them when they selected them, and if it works out for them, great for them.

But I hope it works out for those young men because it was a quality group. The one thing we didn't really talk about with Kenny, we put Kenny through the exact same process that we put the rest of those guys through just to make sure we didn't take anything for granted.

But in doing it, you learn so much about them, again, their families, their teammates, how their teammates respected them. It was a good group.

I was surprised. And again, sometimes things break differently, but while they were breaking, we were just comfortable in knowing that we had Kenny Pickett.

Q. You talked a lot about being invigorated about having a new quarterback or the challenge of it. Your offense as a whole, not just the quarterback, has kind the turned over the past two years. Is that the same feeling you've had going forward?

MIKE TOMLIN: I've just generally had that type of feeling this time of year because we're in the team building mode. I take nothing for granted in terms of what's transpired.

In some instances, we might have familiar guys in familiar roles, but nothing stays the same. I work with an edge this time of year, with a level of excitement that anticipates some newness, whether it's new people or whether it's old people evolving in some way. Really excited about where we are and getting to work to kind of meet the challenges that await us.

### Q. The moves made last night, those guys, even going back to high school, the five-star guys, is that a coincidence --

MIKE TOMLIN: It is. We don't pay attention to the high school scouting services.

#### Q. Is that an indication of just kind of betting on the talent, like you said, I mean, high pedigree.

MIKE TOMLIN: They were a major SEC institution, so I would imagine that's just what comes with that.

KEVIN COLBERT: And both those players were graded very highly going into the whole draft process or coming out of the meeting process. We had them both valued very highly.

### Q. A couple guys who were walk-ons and had to earn that, is that something you guys tended to gravitate toward? You have some already on the roster.

MIKE TOMLIN: I just think the whole discussion is a reflection of football justice. It doesn't matter by what means where you position yourself for draft eligibility. It's about your resume. It's about your body of work. It's about how you conduct yourselves.

We pride ourselves in being open and being pleasantly surprised, and sometimes it comes in the form of five-star guys. Arthur Millett used to always make a joke last year during the season that he was a zero-star guy, and boy, you got respect for that, as well.

I embraced the football justice component of it. It does not matter by what means you get here.

#### Q. The same thing you said, talk about the guy from South Dakota State at the FCS level.

MIKE TOMLIN: No question.

#### Q. Mike, assuming everybody shows up at OTA, one, who makes and who takes the first snap?

MIKE TOMLIN: I haven't even begun to think about that. We got so much more work ahead of us from a classroom perspective and things of that nature as we push into phase 2 and so forth of our off-season. That'll clear itself up, I'm sure.

#### Q. Kevin, have you guys made any decision about Devin Bush?

KEVIN COLBERT: No. We wanted to get through this draft weekend, and we'll talk about that on Monday. That's the deadline. We understand it has to be made by then, but again, through this whole -- we were focused on this weekend and making sure we got this weekend right, and we'll make those decisions on Monday.

# Q. You guys multiple times mentioned, talked about that Pickens decided to come back and play and fought his way back and played and could have taken the year off after his injury. Is that an intangible and a positive? Is it positive or negative to see the love of football?

KEVIN COLBERT: We understand what's going on in the college football world, and we don't begrudge anybody that decides not to play in their bowl games. I've said it, and Coach agrees, that we won't hold it against somebody.

But when someone does play in that game we give them extra credit, because that is an intangible quality that they're giving up for their team, and I think that's a huge value that when push comes to shove. We can trust that player to make that decision for us at whatever point that is.

George was no different than that. I mean, he had a serious injury. He made it back in an unusual short amount of time, and I give Georgia and Coach Smart credit for how they did that. He was practicing during the year on a limited basis.

I remember watching him there and understanding, okay, he might make it, and they used him in certain spots as much as they were comfortable with without risking further injury with him.

Again, by the time he got to his pro day he was about a year removed from that ACL and he was -- it was an exceptional display of his health.

#### Q. Was picking DeMarvin impacted at all by Stephon's availability or lack thereof?

KEVIN COLBERT: No. I mean, DeMarvin, we always wanted to be adding young defensive linemen. Cam is not getting any younger, Tyson is not getting any younger, and Stephon is right at that -- coming out of that prime age.

You've got to keep bringing youth. We did it last year with Loudermilk. It's encouraging to keep that young along that line, so when a guy like Leal was there, that wasn't a hard choice.

MIKE TOMLIN: You can never have enough young, high pedigree bigs.

#### Q. What do you think about Leal's versatility?

MIKE TOMLIN: You know, his versatility is exciting, but I like his traits in general, his rush traits. He's dynamic. Man, I studied that Bama game significantly. That was a Sunday match-up. I thought he represented himself very well in that game.

Sometimes, oftentimes when you talk about versatility, you almost feel like you're slighting them from a pedigree standpoint, and this is a high pedigree guy with a bunch of talent.

### Q. The depth at outside linebacker, is that concerning at this point, or could it be something you can address here in the next couple weeks?

MIKE TOMLIN: You know, it's not overly concerning, but it's also something that we're capable of addressing.
