


Pittsburgh Steelers Draft Information

Kevin Colbert and Coach Tomlin Pre-Draft Press Conference

April 22, 2013



General Manager Kevin Colbert: Welcome everybody. I just wanted to open up and try to put a little wrap up on where we have gone from the end of last season to where we are today. As we've stated before, we finished 8-8. We weren't good enough. Quite honestly, as I've stated before, the talent that we had assembled was an 8-8 team. Any other explanation than that I think is incorrect. Obviously the plan is to be able to upgrade the team that we are going to put on the field in 2013. Just to review the departures from last year's team, Mike Wallace, Rashard Mendenhall, Keenan Lewis, Ryan Mundy and Will Allen left, and we also terminated James Harrison. The retentions, we kept Isaac Redman, David Johnson, Plaxico Burress, Ramon Foster, Larry Foote and Greg Warren. Most recently, we were able to hold onto Emmanuel Sanders and Steve McLendon. Steve is for a longer-term deal. We are excited that we are able to keep both those young guys on the squad. Outside, we went and signed Bruce Gradkowski, and then we brought back Matt Spaeth and William Gay. And in both Matt's Case and William's case, it was intriguing for us to add those guys back, because obviously we had a familiarity with them, and they were part of our success in the past. We anticipated some things at the cornerback position. Quite honestly, with Keenan [leaving] we felt that getting a guy like Gay back was very important, because he had been a part of our packages before and he was a nice fit for where we want to be in 2013. Again, with Heath Miller's health, to get a guy like Spaeth back in, who has been a starter for us in the past and a reliable backup, he, in addition to D.J. [David Johnson], it was important to get that depth back at the tight end position, because we won't know where Heath is health-wise until later on in the year. Realistically, that puts us at 65 guys right now. We have eight draft picks, one compensatory pick that we picked up, ironically for William Gay in the sixth round. We are at 65 right now. We will get to 90, so we will be adding 25 guys over the weekend. We are excited about that. The draft, it always is shaped up. We think we are in real good shape. We are picking 17th. We will be picking from a pool of about 150 guys that we have identified. Realistically I think there is probably 6-8 guys in this group that we think are special players. Beyond that, there is a nice group of potential starters that I think you will be looking at in rounds two and three. Beyond that, with rounds 4-7, we will be looking at depth. Realistically, I am always going to be optimistic about the group, but I can say that the numbers are a little lower or slighter at tight end, interior offensive linemen and the traditional 3-4 defensive ends. It's not a deep pool at those positions.

Head Coach Mike Tomlin: It's been a good process for me and the rest of the coaching staff. It's business as usual for us. Kevin and the scouting department work at this year round. We kind of get on the moving train if you will, starting down in Mobile. Kevin and I spent a great deal of time together scouring the country, from Mobile to Indianapolis, and to pro days. In the last month or so, we've been in the draft room developing the board. It's been a whirlwind. I feel very comfortable and familiar with this draft class. There are a number of capable guys that can fill out the ranks and play good quality football for us here in 2013 and beyond. I am just really excited. We have some finishing touches to do in regards to our readiness. We will continue to do that up until Thursday afternoon or evening. The process has been a good one for us. It's been very fluid and comfortable. We come together in a very fluid manner, scouts and coaches do a really nice job of pulling ideas and thoughts regarding this class. It's been a good process.

Is it any more important for a guy that you draft, especially number one, to come in and play or certainly contribute right away?

KC: I think we've always stated that you have to have production from one, two and three. When you don't, you have a hole. That will be the expectations for whoever we end up with at one. When they play and how much they play, of course, Coach Tomlin and his staff decides that. Quite honestly, I don't envision anyone coming in and being an impact in year one. I never do because I think there is always a growing process that has to occur.

MT: When we put that declaration on them we're talking about their pedigree. When they get on the field, of course, is due to a myriad of circumstances, some of which involve them, some of which don't.

Is there any update on LB Sean Spence's injury situation?

MT: Really none at this point. He's continuing to work and doing a nice job of it, aggressively attacking the rehab, but we know that this is going to be a process in terms of him marching his way back. But we like his demeanor and his availability throughout this process.

When you have a guy like David DeCastro who was injured most of last season, do you feel like you already have a top draft choice in place who is going to play most of this season?

KC: Obviously with David, and even Mike Adams and Sean [Spence] who was just asked about, all three of those kids suffered pretty serious injuries, of course Sean's being the worst. Mike and David's weren't season-ending injuries. So, we're excited to have David back in the mix with a year under his belt. He is healthy but hopefully he grew and learned from even the time he wasn't practicing or playing and he'll be caught up. He still should be fresh and we're excited he's part of it.

MT: And I'll say this, the designation to return and the availability of that place to place him was very beneficial for him and for us. We know a lot more about what he's capable of and I'm sure he's a lot more ready to meet the challenges of 2013 because he had that opportunity to return.

When you say six or eight very special players in the draft, is that just in the first 17 picks or in the draft overall?

KC: I think you look at that group and it's not unusual. That's usually a group I think everybody can identify and say, "These kids should be special players, be it with us or be it with somebody else." The rest of them, there are going to be some really good players in that group, too. What comes to us at 17, who knows. I doubt that we move up. I think the more picks we have the better, in this draft particularly. But there will be a good player at 17, there's no question about that.

When you say the more picks the better, does that hint that you wouldn't mind moving down and getting more picks?

We're open to either, as always. But this draft in particular I think there is nice quality available, in two through four as well.

Guys who were injured or had procedures last season, like Marcus Gilbert or Mike Adams, do you expect those guys to be healthy and available?

KC: Yeah, they're all progressing at different stages. We have availability dates for what we're projecting so we'll see how those play out. Some will be available for the OTAs, some maybe for the June minicamp and some maybe not until training camp. But, optimistically, they'll all return at some point.

MT: They're all proceeding according to plan at this juncture. No surprises, positively or negatively.

Is there one position that is deeper than others in this year's draft?

KC: Not really. Like I said, the ones that the numbers are down are the tight ends, the interior line and the 3-4 ends. Which is a little concerning with the 3-4 ends because there are about 14 teams that are playing our scheme right now. That's a position where there just are not a lot of guys. But across the board, the other positions, it's probably up to the team's preferences, what they like and how much they like him. But I think you'll have at least a selection to pick from. There is a lot of talk about the quarterback position not being particularly special this year, and I disagree with that. I think that group of quarterbacks, you'll have starters emerge from that group. I don't think anybody sat here last year and was ready to deem Russell Wilson a starter, Pro Bowl, playoff-caliber quarterback. He came out and surpassed expectations, quite honestly. I think this group, you'll see players pop out of the quarterback position that will be starters, and some may be stars.

MT: I think the draft is deep in the secondary, as it has been the last number of years, maybe just due to the amount of spread football played in college football, the number of sub packages that are employed by defenses. I think that corners and sub package corners and hybrid safeties are aplenty. But, really, that's been the case for the last number of years.

With losing LB James Harrison, there are some guys that are projected to be mid-first round picks that could be pass rushers but have "red flags." How much attention have you been paying to some of those guys and their medical issues?

MT: Really, no more attention than to the other guys that are considered one's at other positions. Obviously, some things that we look at hardcore are medical and character issues and we deal with those on a case-by-case basis. But, really, no more than we have at other positions. We give it all its due diligence.

Teams change players in and out because of business reasons, age and things like that. Fans look at the changes that have been made and get upset. What can you say to fans to assure them that you are doing everything in your power to put the best team possible on the field?

KC: All we try to do is add as many good players as we can. It's not real scientific. There are going to be subtractions every year, it's usually 14-20 guys per team turnover around the league. So, it's not uncommon that there is change. Sometimes the change is due to finances from a cap standpoint. Sometimes it's due to needing a change. I think, quite honestly, when you go 8-8, it's probably a combination of both for us. As I've stated before, if we have the same team that we had last year, it would be silly to expect different results. So, it's our job to try to improve that and all we can tell the fans is that we're working towards that end. You'll be able to judge us in February, whether we got the job done or not.

MT: To add to that, our goals and mentality have not and will not change. We desire to be a legitimate competitor for the Lombardi Trophy each and every year and 2013 is no different than '12 or '11, or '15 or '16 for that matter. That goal and that mentality and that approach will never change.

With the Emmanuel Sanders situation, did you have any contact with the New England front office and try to work out a deal, as opposed to just matching the offer?

KC: No, rules prohibit those types of conversations. In any restricted free agent situation where somebody is flirting with one of your players or talking to them or wanting to sign them, ultimately we get to make the decision and that's how we felt throughout the whole process. There is nothing you can do. It's well within the rules to have a player visit and to negotiate a contract and to sign him, as Emmanuel did. All along we knew that the decision was ours and ours alone. It wasn't the player's decision, it wasn't another team's decision, it was our decision and we were very happy that we're able to keep him. Maybe at some point we can extend Emmanuel to have him here on a longer term basis. I know he is already here working. I think he is very positive and very upbeat about being here and wanting to be here. That's all good.

Were you having contract negotiations with NT Steve McLendon and his agent before word came out that he visited Green Bay?

KC: Quite honestly, Steve is someone we would have identified in the summer as a potential signee. When the interest in Steve picked up with Green Bay, we had the discussion with his agent and it was a very easy negotiation because the player wanted to be here, first and foremost. Sometimes they have to take those trips just to confirm interest in other teams. Again, that's fine and that's well within the rules but Steve was somebody that we had planned on talking to in the summer. When we traditionally get through this period of free agency, the draft and then we'll usually sign future guys to longer term deals in the summer and he was one of those guys.

Are you going to have a lot of wiggle room under the salary cap when June 1 hits? Will that give you room to do some extensions?

KC: Not really. It's not like we're going to hit the lottery because you still have to compensate for these draft picks. The eight draft picks will start counting against the cap once they're signed. That's all part of the monies that we will pick up in June. There is still potential for us to sign a veteran free agent here or there, depending on how we come out of this draft. Other teams will flush some veteran players out and if we can we have to be ready to add a player that we think can help us.

When will you find out what your rookie salary cap is?

KC: After the actual picks.

Can you project that now?

KC: No, because we don't know exactly where we'll be picking. As of now we do, but that may change come Thursday through Saturday.

Do you have to add a RB outside of the draft?

MT: Really it depends on how the draft unfolds and what we do prior to the draft. Obviously, we have a number of days before the draft. Like Kevin has said numerous times, as have I, we're interested in adding to this football team within all the avenues afforded to us within the system. Obviously, that's free agency and the draft and we don't lean one way or the other in terms of utilizing any of those vehicles.

Re: Depth at the WR position in the draft:

KC: It's a good group. There are some vague ones, some small ones and return-capable ones. It's a nice variety. It's something, again, you feel good about looking at that group and knowing that there are certainly guys that can help us but they come in different shapes and sizes as well.

MT: Just like we were talking about the number of secondary people. I think you can say the same thing about wide receivers. It's the nature of the college game over the last number of years. There are a number of guys available in the draft with in-game catch experience. The way the ball is thrown and caught in college football provides a unique reference from an experience standpoint. There are a number of receivers that have caught a lot of footballs in game-like situations. It makes the evaluation an easier one than if you didn't have that visual reference.

Re: Tough to evaluate running backs in college if they don't run an offense like the Steelers:

MT: I think that we have been looking at it now for a number of years. It is getting easier and easier to make the evaluation relative to the NFL game. There are a number of guys playing in the NFL now that have great success that played in similar offenses [in college]. You look at their positives and negatives and their history within the league, and it helps you deal with the potential of projecting some of these guys.

Is this draft different when it comes to guys with potential red flags about them, given everything that has happened with recent draft picks?

KC: No. It's been the same evaluation, the same process. When you try to figure out a player's character, it starts with the reports from college that we get. It follows up with our own personal interviews and background checks. Coach Tomlin and I did a lot of follow-up work this past spring when we visited the pro days. We actually tried to be a little more proactive in trying to meet families. It is something that Coach Tomlin started three years ago. After we draft players, we start to bring their families in to get to know the kids that we drafted. Sometimes you get the opportunity at a pro day and sometimes you don't, depending on where the kid's family lives. We did try to make a conscious effort to extend the program Coach Tomlin started three years ago, visiting with families as a pre-draft thing. I think that would be the only difference. All the background checks and the psychological examinations or interviews that we do is exactly the same.

Re: Visiting with families:

MT: I just think it helps us develop a more complete picture about who and what a player is, and maybe more importantly, what he is capable of being. I think the more you look at where they come from and who they come from, it helps you paint that well-rounded picture.

Re: Status on Heath Miller:

MT: No new news there. Kevin talked about some of the things that we've done to insulate the tight end position. The reacquisition of Matt Spaeth being one of them. David Johnson being another. That being said, I think we are capable of going into the draft and letting the draft come to us if you will at that position and others.

Do you see this draft as being any more critical than previous drafts due to the turnover?

KC: No. Every draft has been the same. We probably did have a few more departures than usual but we still have eight picks. Every year, we expect ourselves to get the right 7-8 players or however many we are picking. When we do, great, but when we don't it hurts. We go in with the expectations like we do every year that the players that we pick will be good picks and good players. But it's really no more critical than any other year, because as I stated earlier, I don't see any players coming in and being immediate impact players. I think if we lined up today with what we have, we will have a chance. We want to continue to add to that and let these players develop at their own pace. If they exceed that and they come in and start like Maurkice Pouncey did or Casey Hampton did, great. But we've had great players that have had to sit and learn. Quite honestly, I would expect this group to be like that. If they exceed that, it's a bonus for us.

Re: Comfort level with the salary cap in season:

KC: You always want to have that cushion built in, because injuries will be a part of it. In the past, we used to plan on 4-6 players per year that we would lose for the season. The past couple of years we have exceeded that. The only thing we can do to prevent it is to make sure we are getting healthy players in the draft. Our own players, we hope that they have rehabbed to the point where they will have the chance to be healthy. But in the event that they aren't, we have to be ready from a cap standpoint. You have to have something, some reserves in the bank to account for that, because every year it's inevitable that you are going to lose a player for the season.

Re: Mike Adams and Marcus Gilbert and what side they will play:

MT: Marcus Gilbert is left tackle-capable as well. I think one of the things that we learned through the trials of the 2012 season is that both of those young men are capable of playing both spots. We will use the spring and the summer to sort out where we play those two at, but both guys have shown that they are capable of being viable left tackles and right tackle-like candidates.

Re: Max Starks and Casey Hampton possibly coming back:

KC: We haven't shut the door on anyone, quite honestly, that was with us last year. We don't know what we are going to come out of the weekend with. There may be still some signees from that group of players. Again, it depends on how we fair out this weekend. I think they would prefer to wait as well, because they could sign a contract and end up behind a first round draft pick. We will keep those types of players in mind as we get through this weekend, and see where things stand on Monday.

Kevin Colbert: Thanks for sticking around. We're happy that the process went, we think, very well for us. We think we've added some good young players that can come in and hopefully make us a better team. Starting off with Jarvis [Jones], we talked about him the other day. We're real excited to have him in. Le'Veon Bell gives us a nice, big, young running back that, as Todd [Haley] explained the other day, can play in all three phases of the game. We look at Markus Wheaton as a speed receiver that can get deep. Shamarko Thomas is a very physical, fast safety. He's not the biggest kid, but he certainly doesn't play that way. He leaves it on the field. I want to make mention, we traded next year's third round pick to get Shamarko Thomas because we viewed him as valuable as a third round pick would be and next year we're anticipating we'll have some compensatory picks. We felt going into this draft if there was somebody available in the fourth round we'd trade a future pick because, again, we anticipate getting some type of picks. Of course, we won't know what those are until next season but we're certain we'll get some compensatories. Landry Jones, this was a unique year. I talked the other day in the pre-draft press conference about the quarterback group. We thought there was some good, young quarterbacks in this group. When you have a franchise quarterback like we do, you really don't get a lot of opportunities to add another young quarterback into the mix. Hopefully, we're never in a position where we're picking a top quarterback high, but when you look at the Landry Jones's of the world, this kid was highly regarded as an underclassman. Of course, he decided to stay and he was available to us in this fourth round and we just thought it was a great opportunity to add a good, young quarterback. It's a critical position and you better keep adding young folks to that spot. Terry Hawthorne, from the University of Illinois, is a big kid. He's very fast, he's very physical. Justin Brown, opportunity to add a big receiver. We had already tried to add the speed receiver, we wanted to get a big receiver. Justin did a nice job after transferring from Penn State. I think as a junior he had 28 catches. As a senior, he had 73 catches and he really became Landry Jones' favorite target there in one season. Vince Williams has been a real good inside backer for Florida State. He was really one of their defensive leaders. He was a real good special teams contributor when he was young. Then Nick Williams, kid out of Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama. Nick was a late bloomer into football. He only played one year of high school football. He played at Samford and he's got the size that we look for in our defensive ends. He can run, he's very athletic and he'll need to learn to play the game at a higher level, but he certainly has the athletic tools to do so. So, with the nine picks, we're at 74, so we can add 16 free agents once the draft is over. We just counted this up and I didn't even know what the breakdown was, but we have five defensive players and four offensive players. Again, we like these picks and we just hope they're the right ones that help us win games.

Mike Tomlin: I'll just add that the process that is going back there in a few minutes after the draft comes to a close is a part of this process and this weekend as well. We have an opportunity to add 16 additional men after the draft and, obviously, given the history around here, you know that we take that very seriously. There may be a future Pro Bowler that gets signed tonight. Obviously, smaller than that, we had two guys that made our team a year ago in Drew Butler and our safety [Robert Golden]. The work's not over for us but it's been a good process. We're pleased to have these guys, but when we leave you guys we'll get back and continue the process of looking at viable guys that can potentially make our football team and help us win here in 2013.

What was it that made you make the trade with a division opponent?

KC: Shamarko was someone that we had thought about the round previous but we decided to wait it out. Last night we made the decision. We had talked about it previously, that we do anticipate some compensatory picks next year and we think we'll get a pretty significant one or two picks, so why not trade one ahead and get a player if you think he's of that value, which we do. We made that decision last night and we started calling all the teams in front of us and as long as he was available, we were going to be willing to make that trade. And also having the fallback that we had some other players that we were going to be looking at with our own pick and quarterbacks were included in that group. When Landry was there, that made it really easy to pick. It was a decision we made last night and we just went through the process, calling all the teams and Cleveland was the one to do it.

Were you surprised that the Browns were willing to make the trade?

KC: No. I'm sure they think it's valuable to them. They went from the fourth round this year to a third round next year and they must have seen the value in it. We're just happy we got the player.

What was it that made you choose Le'Veon Bell out of the running backs that remained?

KC: Le'Veon was just, when you watched him, he was getting five yards every carry. If it was a one-yard run, if he didn't have any room, he always seemed to fall forward for four. You look at his career average, it's right at 5.0. He's a big guy. He can go from being very patient to knowing when to hit a crease. He knows when to insert on those zone run schemes. And he can. He's a big kid that can block and he's got nice, soft hands. He actually volunteered to catch punts later in the season and they trusted him to do it. He only had three, but his hands are that good. So you look at a big, young back that can play in all three phases, but he's especially patient in the run game. And like I said, he knows when to put his foot in the ground and cut up field and when he makes contact, he has a ton of yards after contact. It just seemed that every time he ran the ball, whether it was for a one-yard gain before he fell into contact he always ended up getting contact, so it's second and five. Really, it was very intriguing and he's a young guy. He's very healthy, not for the amount of carries he had last year, but career-wise it's not a great amount. So we're really excited.

MT: And to add to that, I think it's equally impressive what he was able to do given the number of teammates he lost that were in last year's draft. I'm talking about [Kirk] Cousins, the quarterback, and a couple of receivers and a tight end or two also that went in the draft last year from Michigan State. So to come in and be able to run for 1,700 yards with a new quarterback and a new set of receivers, where he truly was the focal point of things. He was able to deliver and they saw him coming and we found value in that as well.

Are you happy with the depth you have?

MT: Again, like I mentioned earlier, we're still back there working. We have 16 slots to fill and we respect what those guys are potentially capable of, so we'll continue on with this process. But what we've done to this point obviously has been pleasing.

Did you try to address the needs you had?

MT: We've done it the way we've always done it to be honest with you. We look at value and the value assessed to guys. It just so happened, particularly early in the draft, that the guys that were the highest on the board happened to be at positions of need. But obviously when you're in the state that we're in, you can take guys just about at every position. And I've said that and Kevin said that, so sometimes it appears that you took need, but obviously we could have used guys at a number of positions throughout this draft.

Is it a fine line between need and drafting the board?

KC: Yes, but where we picked those guys, we never felt that we reached for anybody. They were where we wanted them to be and available when we were willing to take them. We didn't think that we reached for anybody, including Shamarko. Like I said, when you trade a third round pick, be it this year or next year, to move up to get the guy, you have to have him valued at that and we certainly did, so we were willing to make that move. But really all these guys, we never felt that we reached one time.

Re: Almost getting Shamarko in the 3rd round:

KC: Shamarko was under consideration when we were looking at the receiver. You know you need to make a decision, we decided to take Markus. But we were committed to taking Shamarko the next day.

Re: Value on the offense line in this draft. Finding someone like Max Starks:

KC: We didn't see the value when we were making these picks. Last year we invested three-of-nine picks on the offensive line. We will continue to finish out the college free agents and maybe look at some veteran guys too. So we can plug them in.

With a young guy like Thomas do you work a rookie into one specific safety spot?

MT: It depends on what he is capable of and how he takes in information and retains information. Then it depends how he performs with that information. A lot of that will be determined by him.

Re: Talk about how hard it is to start as a rookie linebacker in this system?

MT: I think it's a daunting task for rookies to start in any system and play and perform well. Obviously it is difficult when you have established veteran players like we have with a lot of continuity. We are not going to close the door on him or anyone else on earning an opportunity, and that is what this is about. This is about people taking advantage of opportunities so he'll be given that.

Do you think you have any returners?

MT: We got some guys that have done it in forms and fashions in college. Not anybody we can earmark and say that they are definitive return people.

Are you looking at Antonio Brown as a return man?

MT: Potentially yes.

Re: Ben is at the point in his career where he is ready to take on a mentor role and can help younger guys like Jones and bring him along the system:

KC: It is really not his duty to do that. He is of the experience that he can certainly share his knowledge with the development of a young guy. But it is really not his duty to take that on, but if he is willing to help him. I think Landry can learn from a guy like Ben just by watching him, being around him, being in the meeting rooms, on the practice fields, during games. I think he can serve that but it is really not his duty to mentor the young players. Again you can't neglect that position particularly. You have to have young guns. Whether or not Landry Jones ever plays for us, who knows at this point. When we came into the offseason we wanted to get younger at that position. Even with Bruce Gradkowski, he is a young veteran back-up in our eyes. We wanted to get a young draftee in there, and that's why we took Landry.

Re: Quarterback position:

General Manager Kevin Colbert: Good evening everybody. Once again, we're very pleased to have a player like Jarvis Jones available for us at the 17th pick. He definitely was one of the guys that I talked about the other day as being a special player in this draft. He's a solid kid. He's a great player. He's productive at a major college level. In fact, he's been dominant at the major college level. He plays the run, he chases the ball, and most important he gets after the passer, a highly productive pass rusher in one of the best conferences in the country. It's really just a great honor to have this kid joining our team. We're really excited about it.

Head Coach Mike Tomlin: I share those thoughts and feelings with Kevin in regards to the excitement. It really was a fun and easy evaluation. When you look at the outside linebackers in the 3-4 defenses, generally there is some projection and so forth involved in the evaluation. This was an easy evaluation from that standpoint. He plays in a very similar scheme, he's asked to do things in a manner in which he'll be asked to do it here in Pittsburgh, very little guesswork in that regard made it a fun evaluation and made it a comfortable evaluation. He excelled in what they asked him to do and he'll be asked to do similar things here. So, all in all, we're just very thankful and very excited to have Jarvis.

Was this one of those scenarios where you guys were surprised he fell to you?

KC: Not so much surprised. I didn't know if he would make it because he was one of the guys that we thought was special. Again, with the 3-4 defense, it kind of cuts the market in half as to who is looking for this type of player. So, we knew there was a chance, we were hoping there was a chance, that's certainly the truth. Jarvis didn't work out at the combine. When he worked out at his pro day and he ran the 4.9 we were happy because we knew that we had a chance. We didn't even talk to Jarvis at the combine because we didn't think there was any chance that he'd get to us. When he ran the 4.9, the first thing I did was go over and see his agent and set up the visit because I knew that we had a chance. Then he continued with the workout and it was off the charts impressive. It just verified what we thought of him in college. This kid, when you watch him play, I don't care what he runs. He's a football player in every phase of the game and that was what was really exciting. When the time wasn't quite what others were looking for, we were excited.

MT: When Kevin talked earlier about acknowledging six to eight special guys or guys with special characteristics, he was in that group. So, to get him at 17, obviously, we're excited.

Did your medical staff check him out during his visits?

MT: Certainly.

KC: Absolutely. There was no problem. The kid has played two seasons without an issue at the University of Georgia. Of course, he has to go through a physical and just to be sure we made another check when he came in. Certainly we're very comfortable with his medical status or we wouldn't have made that pick.

Re: How his playing style fits:

MT: He plays the game with a certain disposition that we value, a certain demeanor that we value. Whether he's making a tackle or confronting a block, he does it in a manner that we appreciate. He'll fit in great with our group.

Re: His composure:

MT: He's been through a lot. He's been to the West coast and back. He's dealt with an injury that could've potentially put his career in question. He's been through a lot. Kevin and I remarked at his pro day that he moved around then like a veteran player, he did. That doesn't mean that he's not a rookie, he's going to be a rookie and he'll go through the same thing rookies go through. We're not going to take anything for granted in terms of his growth and development. He did have a mature demeanor around him and it's probably because of his life experiences.

Re: His fit in this defense:

MT: There's been a few times where he put his hand on the ground, but predominantly he's a two-point stance player. He also plays a little bit of rover for them, where he'll stack and play at the linebacker level and in some sub package stuff, like we've done with our outside linebackers in the past. That's what I was referring to earlier when I said it was an easy and comfortable evaluation.

He has very good hands and catches the ball very well out of the backfield. He is a young kid that doesn't have a lot of tread on the tire so to speak. He has a lot ahead of him. We are really excited to bring him in here and make him a part of the mix.

You have added two running backs today, was that a real big need for you?

With Rashard Mendenhall no longer here and with Chris Rainey no longer in the mix, it was a position that we needed to bring in competition. We have two totally different type guys with LaRod and Le'Veon. We are all excited. I think it puts us back in a place where we can have a chance to run the ball and throw the ball out of the backfield successfully.

Is he going to be a guy that needs to carry the ball a lot this year?

I don't think that is a necessity, but when you do have guys that you feel like they can be the guy, which now we have a couple of in my opinion. On top of that we have really good competition again at the position. We have competitive-type guys that I think will blend well with the type of personalities they are.

Re: Immediate impact on this team:

I think running back is a position, probably more so than most, that you have a chance to come in and make an impact. Obviously there's a lot of work ahead of him. He's a young guy, but he's coming from a pro-style offense. A lot of the runs will be very similar to the runs that he was running. So I expect him to get into the mix and be a factor.

What separated Bell from other running backs still left in the second round?

Without getting into the specifics, as the process went on it was pretty clear that this was the guy that we would be most excited about being available when it came to our pick. I think when you see the picks go in as quick as the last two that is usually a good sign from our end.

Was Bell your top-rated back?

In the end, he was. Without getting into specifics, there are a lot of different factors that go into that. He is a young guy that is big. With no disrespect, I drew some Eddie George physical traits to him because he is taller than what you would normally see. He is a good athlete. We love the fact that he catches the ball really well, and he still has that big back presence.

Eddie Lacey had those giant holes, whereas when you watched Bell it seemed like the exact opposite. Would you agree with that assessment?

It depends what tape you put on, but yes I think that Eddie probably had arguably the best offensive line in front of him as you watch the draft, and they have another two that will probably get taken here. I would think that were blocking for him, but he's playing in the SEC. But we try to, and I know Kirby Wilson does this specifically, he tries to put on the roughest game, the games where the back isn't necessarily getting those big holes, so you can see what he's really capable of doing on his own. Because as we know in the NFL the holes are a lot smaller. This is a big guy that can play like a big back, and yet also can get outside some and catch the ball. So as far as we were concerned, three down, every down type back that is young and has a lot in front of him.

You mention young a couple times. How do you see him now, as opposed to what you think he can do?

I just think anytime you're talking about a guy that's 20 years old, when other guys are 23 and 24 coming out, that automatically gives him some upside when you start to plug in some of the physical traits that he has. That's the only reason I stress that it's a young guy. There's a lot of development ahead of him physically and mentally, though he's a mature guy that we were all really impressed by. Kevin and Mike and Kirby got up there to see him in person and we all met with him at the combine. Everybody came away impressed with him that he's a mature guy for his age. So we're excited that he's a Pittsburgh Steeler.

Was getting a back more pressing than getting a receiver?

I think you know the way we do it around here. We're not going to draft for need, which coach and Kevin stress all the time. We're really excited about the player that was available and the fact that he happened to be a running back was a good thing.

When he weighed in at the combine, 230, you guys have him at 244. Is that a wish list or is that what his playing weight was during the season?

No, there were verified weights during the season. I think we might even have had him heavier during the season, some of our scouts that were in there. But I'm sure we'll get him in here and [conditioning coordinator Garrett Giomont] and Mike will evaluate him, Kirby and myself and we'll try to figure out what the best weight for him is, but again to me that's positive, you got a guy who's playing at 245 pounds that is capable of getting his weight down, whether it was to run or for whatever reason. Again, those are factors that we've discussed with him, but I think that's a positive in my opinion. He clearly is a big back in both height and weight if he wants to be.

Did he come to the combine light to run faster?

Everybody is doing it. But again without getting into specifics, we had some conversations with him and I wouldn't say it was necessary for him to run.

Stephen Jackson said he's a back that reminds him of himself, would you agree with that comparison?

I didn't hear that, but I would say that's a good one coming from Stephen Jackson.

Bell has a lot of carries, does he get better as the game goes on? How is his ball security?

He's real good with the football from a security standpoint and I do think that what you see is what you get. He looks like a workhorse back and I think those numbers indicate that he's quite capable of carrying it a bunch. He's not a guy that you'd shy away from giving it to him 30 times a game.

CAREER NOTES

It marked the 25th consecutive game that Wheaton caught at least one pass and his 150-yard effort marked the seventh time he had gained over 100 yards receiving in a game, matching Robb Thomas (1985-88) and James Rodgers (2007-11) for fifth all-time in Oregon State annals...Wheaton finished the Arizona game with a career-high 166 yards on ten receptions in a 38-35 win. His sixth 100-yard receiving performance tied at OSU tied Robert Prescott (1997-2000) for seventh on the school all-time record list. It was also his fourth 100-yard receiving game for 2011, good for sixth on the OSU season-record chart.

2010 SEASON

Wheaton appeared in all 12 games, starting eight contests at split end (came off the bench vs. Louisville, Boise State, Arizona and Washington)...Led the team and tied for seventh in the Pac-10 Conference with 55 receptions on 90 passes targeted to him (61.11%)...Ranked ninth in the league while leading the Beavers with 675 receiving yards (12.27 ypc), as 35 of his grab s (63.64%) gained at least 10 yards, including eight for 20 yards or longer...Produced 40 first downs (72.73%), as he converted 16 third-down grabs and made five of his catches inside the red zone...Scored four times for the passing game, as he also had key receptions to set up 16

As a senior, Wheaton transferred to Chandler (Az.) High School, playing football for Wolves head coach Jim Ewan, helping lead the team to an 8-4 record to finish ranked 13th in the state in 2008...Rated the state of Arizona's sixth-best athlete by Super Prep, he was listed as the nation's 41st-best player by Rivals.com, as that recruiting service joined Scout.com in awarding the youngster three-star prospect status...The All-Fiesta League and All-Division V choice recorded 15 tackles with three pass deflections as a senior, as he also averaged 10.22 yards on nine punt returns and 27.0 yards on 10 kickoff returns...Toted the ball 29 times for 304 yards (10.48 ypc) with two touchdowns on the ground, adding four more scores behind 37 grabs for 736 yards (19.89 ypc) in 2008...Some of his senior season highlights featured three receptions for 61 yards and a 38-yard score, two carries for 16 yards and a 16-yard punt return vs. Ironwood; a 10-yard touchdown catch with 33 yards on four runs and a 23-yard punt return vs. Dobson; 173 yards behind seven receptions and three carries for 25 yards, including a 17-yard score vs. Desert Vista and 115 yards with a 40-yard touchdown on four rushes, in addition to a 20-yard catch, two tackles and a pass break-up in a 56-0 rout of Yuma...Delivered seven tackles (5 solos) vs. Corona del Sol; two catches for 120 yards and a 68-yard touchdown while setting up another score with a 62-yard kickoff return vs. Mesquite, followed by two tackles, a pass deflection, three kickoffs for 63 yards and five grabs for 106 yards, including a 39-yard score...His senior season ended with seven receptions for 129 yards and 17 yards on three end-around carries vs. Hamilton...Before he enrolled at Chandler High School, Wheaton and his brother, Marquese, attended Mountain Pointe (Phoenix, AZ) High School, playing football as a sophomore and junior for Pride head coach Phil Abbadessa...As a 144-pound wide receiver and defensive back, he made twelve catches for 286 yards (23.83 ypc) and three scores in 2006. PERSONAL

Public Health major...Participated in the initial "Beavers Without Borders" trip during spring break of 2011, as he traveled to Guatemala to build a house for a needy family...Son of Katrina and Odis Wheaton...Father played basketball for NAIA Division II Howard Payne University...Brother, Marquese, was a teammate of Markus at Mountaine Pointe High School. He went to Phoenix Community College, earning All-Arizona Community College Athletic Conference honors after recording 39 tackles with three interceptions in 2009. He transferred to Southern Mississippi for the 2010-11 seasons, earning All-Conference USA honors as a senior, when he produced a 41-yard interception return for a touchdown vs. Navy, recovered a fumble vs. Rice that he advanced 75 yards for a score and blocked a field goal that he returned 79 yards for a touchdown vs. Navy in 2011. That year, the field cornerback also sealed a win over Southern Methodist with a pair of fourth quarter interceptions. In 25 games spanning two seasons at USM, he recorded 73 tackles (47 solos) with 2.5 stops for loss, 14 pass deflections and five interceptions...Their cousin is former University of Oregon standout defensive back, Kenny Wheaton (1994-96). Kenny was selected in the third round of the 1997 NFL Draft by the Dallas Cowboys, playing for the pokes from 1997-99. In 2002, he played for the Detroit Fury in the Arena Football League before heading north to Canada, where he played for the Toronto Argonauts from 2003-08. Along with his brother Derrek, they attended McClintock High School, where they played varsity football, basketball, and baseball. At Oregon, Kenny was named the team's outstanding player in 1996, adding All-Pac 10 Conference honors. In 1994, as a freshman, he led the Ducks with 73 tackles (96 solos) and four interceptions for 157 yards that included a 97-yard touchdown, the second-longest runback in school history. He is tied for the Oregon all-time record with three interception returns for touchdowns, adding five thefts for 128 yards and a 71-yard score in 1995 and two for 95 yards that included a 70-yard touchdown in 1996. His 350 yards via interception returns set the school career-record...Wheaton's cousin, Andre Bailey, also played football at McClintock High School and went on to play college football at Mesa Community College before attending the University of Texas-El Paso...Wheaton has also been a long-time member of the university's "Beavers Without Borders" group, which consists of current and former Oregon State student-athletes who have taken trips to Guatemala (Spring Break 2011), Macedonia (Summer 2011) and Ethiopia (summer 2012). On those trips the group assisted a building of a house for needy families. There were matching funds, but many of these student-athletes did their own fundraising for the trips...Born 2/07/91 in Phoenix, Arizona.

Did you understand all the different positions you played?

Yes, sir. With them, like you said, moving me around a lot I have to know pretty much everything out there, know all the concepts and everything about the offense pretty much.

Why didn't you return more kicks in college?

Coming in I struggled. I struggled catching the punts. I, obviously, wanted it real bad. I worked at it and eventually moved up the depth chart in the punt return position. Todd Haley: Good to see everybody again. It keeps a smile on my face. We got Markus Wheaton, a gnarly guy we are really excited about bringing aboard. He is a highly productive receiver out of Oregon State. He is a four-year guy that had great production both as a receiver, and he has also handled the football as a runner a bunch which we also like from a versatility standpoint. He is a good solid football player that brings speed to the team. He is a fast guy make no mistake about it. He's a guy that can stretch the field. He plays inside-out and is a pretty versatile, good, polished football player at the receiver position.

I know his 4.45 40-yard dash time at the combine disappointed him. Does he play faster on tape?

Yes, absolutely. As one of those guys, kind of like Kevin [Colbert] said about Jarvis [Jones] at the combine, when you have guys that you like you aren't rooting for them to run fast and get a lot of attention. I know it probably hurt his feelings and made him feel bad, but we were happy because when you put on the tape he plays fast. He's a fast player and quick. He will be an exciting guy to have around.

Is he similar to Mike Wallace?

A little different skill set than Mike [Wallace] other than the speed. I saw Mike as more of an outside receiver outside the numbers. This guy has played the slot a bunch when he wasn't outside. He is a little wider base, a little more running back build in my opinion. The speed comparison, it's hard for anyone to run faster than Mike, but this guy does play fast.

Is he a returner?

He did some, very little. In our discussions, we think that we would definitely have him back there working at it.

Is his productivity what really jumps out at you? That and his speed?

Yeah, he is a highly productive guy and the numbers aren't huge from a yards per catch standpoint, but he's one of the guys that we thought that when the ball is in his hands he really gets even more exciting. So that leaves the door open to be able to do a lot of things with this guy, which kind of fits with Antonio Brown and Emmanuel Sanders, so I think he will be a good guy to have in that group and we'll get him coached up. He does a lot of different things which is always good. And he's smart and he understands. He is a smart, good football player right now.

How much better do you feel being able to address two obvious needs in the draft?

I feel good. Like I said, anytime I can come in here a couple of times early, that's always good. We need competition and the receiver position was one of the ones going in we knew we wanted to add to the competition. We like the guys that we have here, but you get another young guy in here to compete and push the other guys, that's always a good thing in my opinion.

You have inside-outside, split flankers, with Antonio and Emmanuel and where does this guy fit in?

I think that's one of the positives with Markus, that he can do both. He's a guy that you saw in two back sets outside at the X-position and they also moved him over to the Z. Like I said, he was in the slot. He was in the backfield. So that tells us that he's a smart guy. Anytime a coach feels comfortable moving a guy around a bunch like that, that's good. So especially with what we have, which we have a nice mix right now of inside and outside guys, to have a guy that especially early is contributing on special teams and knows multiple positions including inside and outside spots, I think that's a big positive with Markus, that I think he can probably play both spots, inside and out.

Is this a guy the Steelers like?

It is. Shamarko is an outstanding football player. I think if he had two more inches he would have been in the first round in my opinion; that's how highly I think of this young man. He has size, he has speed, and he has strength. He is very aware on the field. Not only can he play safety, but he can also get up there and play man-to-man on the slot receiver. He has played nickel, and he has played corner at times. He is a very versatile defensive back. I think he is not only going to do well for our secondary, but I think he is going to do well for the special teams as well.

Will his size be a disadvantage?

I don't think so. I am not worried about his size at all. The kid has a 40-inch vertical. That kind of explosiveness gives him great range when it comes to making plays.

Where do you see him on the field? Safety? Corner?

I see him playing safety. The great thing about this young man is if you were in a pinch and you didn't want to put the nickel package out there and you wanted him to play man-to-man on the slot, he could do it. He has done it in big games already against some of the receivers that have been drafted in the first two rounds, and he shut them down. That is the kind of safety I like. That is the kind of safety that the Steelers are looking for. Not only will he cover well, but he will hit you and hit you hard.

Do you see him playing strong safety?

Right now, I think so. I think he is capable of playing both. In our defensive package, our system, the safeties are required to play both anyways. It is really not much of an issue.

What concerns did you have about his concussion history?

The way the game is played is the way he plays the game. He has had concussions before and they haven't been an issue with the medical staff. As you know, our safeties that are currently playing on our team have had issues. It comes with the territory back there because of the distances and the speed at which these guys play. I don't see it as an issue. He is not a head hunter per se, he just makes good strong tackles. Most of his tackles when you watch him, he is wrapping up with his arms and his shoulders so I do like that part about it. I don't think we have a concern about him just leading with his head all the time.

He was kind of a fourth-rounder for a while and then he shot way up the draft board, then he slipped back down. Why do you get the vibe that he was kind of on a roller coaster ride in terms of how the scouts projected him?

I don't know why other teams are afraid of him. I am only speculating, but I think they are afraid of two inches because he has everything else. If the kid was 5'11" it wouldn't have been an issue. He would have probably been in the first two rounds in my opinion.

How do you get a rookie on the field in this system?

I think the biggest challenge is really for me to communicate as simply as possible as I can to all of our defensive backs. That's my job. My job is to get him ready. I think since I've been here, going on my third year, it hasn't really been that much of an issue. We got Cortez Allen ready his first year. Keenan [Lewis] was struggling and I got him ready to go and he was productive as ever. I wish we could have kept him. I don't think this will be a problem with this young man. The reason why I don't think our scheme will be an issue for him, especially after a year under his belt, is because he's played so many positions for Syracuse. So he hasn't been pigeonholed in one position. He's played multiple positions and what that tells me is the kid has some intelligence because you can't just switch a guy from safety in a deep path to safety in the box to nickel-back to corner and him not knowing what he's doing. So I like that flexibility that this kid has.

Do you think that there's truth to the idea that the system Dick LeBeau runs is so complex that it's difficult to adjust to?

I think that on the outside looking in there's a lot of different packages that LeBeau uses but when you really break it all down, it's kind of all the same. I think it's going to take some adjustment. I think for any defensive back coming in there's a language or a terminology adjustment, that's the biggest thing. That will be one of the issues that we'll try to overcome as soon as he gets here.

Is Ike Taylor healthy now?

I've talked with Ike and Ike has been in the building recently and Ike looks as good as he's ever looked. Ike has always been in great shape, so I don't have an issue with Ike at all.

Do you remember a game or two specifically that jumped out at you in terms of Shamarko covering big receivers?

Absolutely. If you look at the USC game, when Syracuse played USC, I noticed that when I was watching film on Shamarko that he was in the nickel position covering Robert Woods, who was drafted in the second round. I said, "Well you play the nickel also." He said, "Yes." I said, "Well how come you were out wide playing Woods at the corner position. Did you play corner?" He said, "No, it was still the nickel, but our coaching staff just wanted me to match up wherever he went." And I thought that was really impressive. Why would you have your strong safety covering one of the better receivers in the draft man-to-man throughout the whole game? Woods had a very hard time getting off the jam with this kid. Not only that, but Sharmarko went on and picked it one time when Woods ran down the seam. For me that was almost a game-changer. Sealed the deal in my opinion.

Did you expect this at all?

I have no clue. I was sitting there watching it and talking to my agent Dave Young. We were going back and forth. He thought it would be between me and a couple of guys, and then I got the phone call. I didn't even know what to say. I'm so overwhelmed and so thankful for the Pittsburgh organization for taking a shot on me and picking me up. I'm just excited to get down there.

How do you feel about coming to a place that has an established quarterback who is still in his prime?

The thing about it is, I am going to go in there and compete as hard as I can and try to win a job. At the end of the day this is going to be a great opportunity for me whether I play quick or whether I have to sit and wait for a couple years. Getting to stand behind Roethlisberger is going to be a huge opportunity for me. He is a guy who has been established in this league for a long time and I get to learn from one of the best quarterbacks to play the game. I'm just really excited to get to work with him and really excited about this opportunity.

Do you know Ben's sister Carlee? She and your wife were on the same team right?

Yes, they played together for two or three years on the same basketball team so obviously my wife is pretty pumped about this whole deal.

What are some of the other teams that considered drafting you? Are you surprised at maybe some of the other quarterbacks in the draft that were picked in the fourth round as opposed to earlier?

It was such a weird draft this year for all quarterbacks. I know a lot of guys, and for me, you're expecting to go earlier, but it was a strange draft. At the end of the day, God had everything in his hands and he knew exactly where you were going to place me and couldn't have placed me at a better organization with this team.

You said you thought it was coming down between you and some other guys for this pick. Who were you thinking?

I really honestly didn't know. All my agent had told me was it was between me and a couple other guys. That was literally what he said. I don't know who else they were thinking about, but I'm really happy that they chose me.

How much contact had you had with the Steelers?

Honestly none. It's funny, I had more contact with the Bills than anybody else, so I didn't really have much, but like I've been saying, at the end of the day, I was just so excited that they chose me and they picked me out.

Do you see yourself as a starter in this league?

Yes. Ever since you're a young kid, you do see yourself as a starter. You see yourself winning Super Bowls. You see yourself doing all these different things in the NFL, so I'm just excited about being there and having an opportunity.

Is it a little bit of a disappointment to come to a place with one of the best quarterbacks in the league and he's only 31?

It's not disappointing at all. I was just happy to get picked up and you have to start your career somewhere. On every single team there's going to be a quarterback that has your job and you're going to go in there, you're going to be respectful and do all these things and compete as hard as you can.

What part of your game do you think is your strength and what part of your game do you think needs the most work?

I think I have a lot of arm talent and then what needs the most work, mobility. Moving and that sort of thing.

You told Jon Gruden that you're better than RGIII. Can you explain that?

I mean just as a competitor standpoint. I don't want to go into games saying I'm not able to compete and that I'm not better than anybody. You don't want to go up there, you don't want to be scared of somebody as a competitor. You do think that you're better than anybody that steps on the field. Now is that reality? I don't know, you'll have to play against guys. You'll have to see different things. But from a competitor standpoint, that's the way I've always thought and that's the way I've been taught and raised.

Is [wife] Whitney's career over now?

Yes. She used up her eligibility. She did get drafted to San Antonio. She won't be cleared to play this year, but she's thinking about doing that next year and you never know. God has a plan for people and for us and for our family on how it's going to work, but right now we're just focused being excited about becoming a Pittsburgh Steeler.

Why the need for a QB now?

We have had great experience in that room with Charlie and Byron. I just think it was time to start grooming a new player. Freshen up the room if you will.

Re: Replacing Ben in the future?

I think you always draft that. I don't think that was the thought process.

Tell us about Landry:

Landry is a productive player, a four-year starter playing big football. He has some of the biggest production I've seen out of any of the QBs in several years. He's a guy that still has a lot of upside. He played in the system that is basically one back; he knows the system very well. He's been easily adaptable in meetings that I've spent with him, so he can understand the pro game. That's going to be very exciting.

Re: Ben as a mentor:

It may be time for Ben to give that experience to somebody else, and to help in the room. I am excited about coaching a young player in the room. There has been a great respect between Byron and Charlie and Ben. I think this gives Ben an opportunity to share his experiences. That is an exciting time. I saw that with Hines when I was in that room.

Does Ben get anything out of that role?

He's got lot of great experiences, he's been the starter. I think anytime that you are communicating that to others you are reaffirming it to yourself. If it takes you a little bit more time in a room to explain a concept that he understands very well to tell a young guy in the room, that just re-confirms to Ben positive things. I think it is always good when you're talking football anytime whether it's outside the media room or the locker room. I just think it gives you an opportunity with a young guy to do that.

Why Landry over some of the other QBs?

I don't know if it's one over the other. Landry is a good fit, and we generally stick to our board. So Landry is in a great spot to be here right now. I have always thought of it as who you get, being a college coach I've never worried about the ones that you didn't get or the ones that slipped away. I'm excited about having Landry.

Re: Any point last year that you felt you needed a younger QB in the room?

I don't know if there was a point where you felt this just wasn't working anymore. They have given us some very good reps here. They have been great compliments to Ben, to me and our offense. So no I don't think that was ever the case. There was never one minute where we decided we had to move forward. I just think it happens.

Re: Differences between Jones and QB Jerrod Johnson from last season:

At the time Jerrod was here, he was young and developing. He was just getting potentially at full strength. He was a quarterback that came here that was still rehabbing his shoulder. I think, without looking back and saying one or the other, you look at it and say it wasn't the right time, and it wasn't time to move Charlie [Batch] or Byron [Leftwich] out. Sometimes timing changes every year.

Was this your one year to make a pro day appearance?

No, because coach Tomlin's been great. Whether I was coaching receivers or quarterbacks, we've always gone out. And they push out so you can be making comparisons and building a library. To me, that's one of the unique things we do. Whether we're in play for a quarterback or whether we're in play for a defensive back, we get a chance to go out and work guys and get a chance to keep comparing, to keep putting guys in perspective where you might see them. How do you feel they rank. And also when you get a chance to get out and visit with guys, you get to see them in their environment. You get to evaluate that. You get to talk to them on your terms and things that you might do, concepts that we might do. How do they adjust to that? I know in this case, I was able to be at Oklahoma's workout. I was able to see and visit with their offensive coordinator, their head coach, who are all friends of mine. I've been at clinics there before with them. Hear what they have to say and see how this youngster has developed in their system. They've had him the whole time. Josh Heupel, his position coach and coordinator, was a very good player in college football too and he loves this kid. But it was easy to see because when you're around them, everyone does and he has some background in Pittsburgh here in general. His wife Whitney played basketball with Ben's sister Carlee and they had been friends and I believe Carlee was in their wedding last summer.

Is Hawthorne fast?

He is fast. What I like about Terry is that he has a lot of upside potential that I see in him. I think he has all the physical tools. He is big. He is fast. He doesn't mind tackling, and he can play press coverage well, kind of in the same way as an Ike Taylor.

Re: Kick-return capabilities:

I like his ability. He's been productive at Illinois. The things that I am watching on tape, I think with some real work, he can be even better.

What about his injury history? I know he had a concussion last year and has missed games all four years.

We will just have to monitor that. From what I can tell anyways, our medical staff didn't have any issues with it. They checked him out. He came on a visit here. I liked visiting with him. I think he's really a good guy to be around. With the current group of guys that we have, I think he will mesh well with them personality-wise. I spent several hours with him that day and got a chance to really get to know him. I think he's going to be fine in terms of being a teammate with the secondary.

Were the other injuries muscular-related or did you get a sense of what they were? Just pulled muscle-type things or anything more serious?

I don't know of anything serious that may become a problem down the line. Obviously anytime someone has even one concussion, you are always concerned about that. But as far as I know, I think he's okay.

He was rated higher as a draft prospect in 2012, what happened?

Just watching it from my perspective, I think that if there is anything I can help him with, it will probably be his technique. I think he has maybe got himself a little bit out of position, and it is partly due to some of the things that I saw with him that I can help clean up. That is kind of where I see the potential in him. Right now, he is just raw. I would like to hone those skills and get him in the lab and really work with him on those things.

Where is Curtis Brown in your plans?

We're hoping that Curtis can turn the corner right now. I have a lot of hope for Curtis. I think he has all the physical tools as well. Curtis' opportunities, for me at least in my own opinion, is to come on strong this year and I think he can do that.

Is staying on the field the biggest issue for Curtis?

He's been banged up. In training camp he came in and he was banged up early and so I didn't get a chance to work with him in the offseason my first year and then when he got to training camp he was really banged up and missed a lot of time. So I'm hoping really that this training camp will be an opportunity for him to really grow.

On Hawthorne previously playing a lot of cover three:

Yes. A lot of man, a little bit of three. His best asset right now is press, bump and run.

Re: Hawthorne's 40 time:

I would say just on average he's a low 4.4 guy.

Re: Josh Victorian being high on of the depth chart late last year:

Josh really was a surprise for us. We needed some bodies really to work the look team for our offense and we brought Josh in specifically for that. He was on a developmental team and because of the amount of injuries we had, Josh was it. He was our starter by default. Like I said before, I had probably two weeks with him to get him ready and his first start was against Dallas in Dallas. I have to give my hat off to him for coming in and really concentrating and getting ready specifically because we didn't have much time with him before that.

Do you plan to take a look at William Gay at safety?

In the past William has played some safety. He's rotated back there based on some concepts that we were working. My first year with him and even in years past when he was here, he could play safety. I'm not counting on him being a down in and down out safety. He's not built for a safety position, but he can do it. Will was a really productive corner for me when I had him here. He started for me both outside on first and second down and on third down as a nickel. He knows the defense in and out and that's why I'm really glad we have him back. He can also tutor the younger guys coming up. We can plug and play Will just about anywhere on the field and he can be productive for us.

Re: Big hit you had at Senior Bowl:

I hit a guard when he pulled around. I was coming down he was coming full speed. I just treated him like a speed bump.

How often do you treat ball carriers like a speed bump?

That's a big part of my game. That's what I love to do. That's how I think I get notoriety. I'm a very physical downhill player. I'm gritty. I love to get out there.

Re: Filling the spot behind Larry Foote:

I actually got the chance to go there and visit [the Steelers]. The coaches were going over it. It's really a beautiful thing when you start to break it down and look at it. I only really got a little piece of it, so I can just imagine what it really is. I only got a chance to digest it. [Coach] Mark Stoops gave me the opportunity to make all the calls [at Florida State], and I handled it pretty well.

VINCE WILLIAMS

Keith Butler: We told Vince Williams he is an inside linebacker for us. We aren't decided yet on what we are going to play him at, the buck or mac position. He is going to provide some depth for us that is well needed. If they had done what I felt like doing we would have taken one in the second round. As I told them, last time we picked first and second with linebackers we won the Super Bowl two years later. We didn't go to it, we won it. I tried to make that argument, it didn't work. It worked for one round, but it didn't work for the second round. Vince Williams will be very competitive for us at inside linebacker. We will find out what we have and how we stack up. We need for Sly to step up a little bit and some of these younger guys that we have, McFadden. Vince will provide some depth in there and give us some good competition in training camp.

Is Sean Spence just gravy if he recovers?

Yes he is. I hope he's gravy. I really do because this kid is a great kid. He's not only a very intelligent football player but he is going to provide some intangibles in our locker room that we desperately need, I think. We're going to ride with him for another year I think. Hopefully his knee will respond and he can play again.

Spence won't be back this year?

I don't think he is going to be. It will be miraculous if he does come back. It will be miraculous if he comes back next year. We are going to take a chance on him and see if he can come back. To me, he is worth every bit of that.

Re: Potential of how well Williams can cover:

The thing that might be a little bit of a drawback is that they took him out on third downs, but they put in another defensive back. They didn't put in another linebacker. They put in another defensive back for him. We'll see. We will make that judgment when we get to training camp whether he is capable of being a three-down linebacker as opposed to being a two-down linebacker.

What type of player is he? Does he run at the ball well?

He runs at the ball well. He gets off blocks well. He destroyed Gutierrez. We try to stay away from players who are not going to be physical. We think that he is all those things. He can get to the ball and he can hit you when he gets to the ball. We'll see how in training camp if he has the ability to cover running backs and stuff like that. Obviously if he is not going to be a three-down football player in college then he is not going to all of a sudden step to the National Football League and be a three-down player. That is something we have to determine in training camp.

Can he play special teams?

Yes.

Re: Williams play that was “talk of the week”:

The thing that attracts us to him is that he will hit you. There are two things you can't teach linebackers in this league. One of them is how fast are you going to be and the other one is will you hit somebody. That is something I have said time and time again. I have always believed this even when I played and from watching the guys I have played with. Two things that I am not going to be able to teach you-- one of them is to hit you and the other one is to run. I think that is something their mother and daddy give them. I can't help them out with that. We'll see.

Re: Talk about Stevenson Sylvester. Make or break?

No doubt for him. He knows that. That is something I talked to him about at the end of the season. I talked to all of them about this at the end of the season. It doesn't matter the reason that you are not on the field. If you are hurt like LaMarr Woodley, he was hurt. It doesn't matter the reason that he wasn't on the field, he just wasn't on the field. We have to remedy where that reason is and the same thing with Sly. Sly was injured. We had little nagging injuries here and there. We had a few of those last year. We have to eliminate those and keep ourselves in position where we are available and can play during the year and not be sitting on the sideline watching the game with me because they have an injury. So we have to do things to try and correct that if we can.

On why the body shapes of the linebackers all the same:

I don't know. You would think as an outside linebacker, you want those guys with long arms and that are 6'6", but if you look at James Harrison and you look at LaMarr Woodley, LaMarr, I mean everybody says he's 6'2", but he's not, he's about 6'1". James Harrison was never close to 6'0". He's probably more like 5'11". He'd say he's 6'0", but he's not. Those guys play with leverage, play underneath you and stuff like that. The lower man usually wins. We don't care how tall they are as long as they can do those things: play low and be able to hit and get off blocks and get to the ball. And that's the thing we try to get out of our linebackers.


Are you starting to worry about your run defense with the loss of some key guys?

We always worry about the run defense. I do. As a linebacker coach you always do because you have to make people predictable, keep them one-sided. One-sided meaning they're going to have to throw the football and we talk about this all the time, that we want to try to get people in positions where they have to throw the football so we know they're throwing the football so we can apply pressure. The play-action stuff in this league, which we got a lot of, it's hard to get pressure in play action because a lot of the time you're defenses are better against the run. So if you can get people in predictable positions where they have to throw the football then you can kind of pin your ears back and rush the quarterback, so we'll try to get them in that position if we can. Now Aaron Smith was a big loss in my opinion. We have to be able to fill that void and I think we will because there's couple of young guys that are coming along. Cam[ron] Heyward is coming along pretty good. Ziggy Hood has some technical stuff that John [Mitchell] has to work with him on. And John knows about that so we're going to try to get those things clarified and work that out and hopefully we'll be good against the run. We have to better at linebacker too. Jason Worlds should be a lot better than he was last year. Everybody talks about Jarvis coming in and stuff like that and is Jarvis going to start his first year? We've never started a linebacker since I've been here. His first year, Jarvis Jones has a wealth of talent and I'm very fortunate to have him. He put up 28 sacks in the last two years in the toughest, in my opinion, the best conference in the land. He's done it. He's been very productive. He's going to come in and compete, but he's not going to be given the position. Some of you think that way. I certainly don't think that way. My thing is Jason Worlds is here. He's the next guy up since James has left and I expect Jason to be better than he ever has been.

On what has effected LaMarr Woodley's production:

Not being on the field. He has to be on the field. And then when he did get on the field, a lot of times people were getting the ball off of him and getting it out. We play against, I believe it was Baltimore last year and [DE Brett] Keisel knocks the crap out of [QB Joe] Flacco the first play and after that Flacco was getting rid of the ball. He hit his back foot and was getting rid of the ball all the time. LaMarr has to get on the field. I've talked to him about that too. We have to do the things that it takes for him to get on the field. Part of that is to make sure his hamstrings are in the top shape that they need to be in for him to play a year. A solid year and not miss any time. We're going to try to do what we can to make sure we remedy that.

Coach Mitchell: Nicholas Williams is a young man from Birmingham, Alabama. He went to Samford University right there. Samford is a little liberal arts college right there in Birmingham. This guy was a heck of a basketball player coming out of high school. He only played one year of football. Pat Sullivan, the ex-Heisman trophy winner, is the head football coach there. Pat Sullivan knew his father, and they asked him to go look at his son. As a basketball player, they looked at him. He went to Samford because the guy had good size coming out of high school, and they signed him. He is a young guy. He is not going to come in here and replace anybody. He is probably not going to play. He is a project. But you can't get guys that are 6'4" 320 pounds that can run and look like a guy that is 310 pounds. I like this guy. He didn't dominate right there in Samford. He only started two years there, but I think his football is ahead of him rather than behind him.

Where will he play?

He is going to be a defensive end.

Have you heard of him before?

Yes, Pat Sullivan had talked to me about this kid for about the last year. I am very close with Pat. He is a guy that we have had our eye on for a good while.

Is it almost easier since he is so raw to teach him your three-four without having to unlearn other things?

I don't care what scheme he played in college. When he comes here he is going to do it the Steelers way. He is going to do it the way we want so it doesn't make any difference to me what he did in college. No matter if he was a first round draft choice, they are going to do it our way.

Did you say he is 320 pounds?

He's 320 pounds. When you look at him you are going to think he is about 310. When I was there back in early March he was 317 and he has been as high as 320. He carries his weight very well. This guy was a heck of a basketball player coming out of high school.

He just played one year of football?

One year in high school. He was a starter at Samford for two years. If you watch him on tape you won't get very excited about him. But if you look at him and you look at the potential that he has, he reminds me of when we signed Steve McLendon here. He's a guy that a lot of you guys didn't think would ever play here. He stayed here in this program and he did it our way. He is going to have a chance to be a good football player.

He's 6'4", 320 pounds?

Yes. He's probably 317. He's lost a little weight, but I would say he's 317.

Will Cameron Heyward have an opportunity to compete with Ziggy Hood?

We're going to play him. He's going to have an opportunity to play on both sides. If you go back and look, he did. He played on both sides last year. So we're going to play him on the left side some, yes.

Are you happy with what you have at nose tackle?

Yes, I'm very happy. I'm very happy. I remember sitting here last year. You guys had a coronation for Alameda Ta'amu. I told you if you look we had a guy who wore number 90 who was going to have a chance to play. I remember that. So I'm very happy with him.

How much did he play?

He played 150 plays. You have Casey Hampton who is a good football player so yes.

Does Nicholas Williams know that he won't play this year?

Yes, he knows that. This guy wants to come somewhere where he will have the opportunity to play down the road. He knows that he only played one year of high school football and Samford is a small university where he started two years. He's excited about having the chance to play pro football in an organization like the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Was Williams at the combine?

Yes. He was at the combine.

Is he the kind of guy who you wanted to take in the seventh round?

What you have to look at as a coach is I don't know how many guys you're going to get next year in the seventh round that are going to be 6'4", 320 that can run. You go back, we took Brett Keisel in the seventh round. Brett Keisel was not 320. Here's a guy that can run. He came here, he played on the special team and when he got a chance to play, he picked up our scheme, did well, the rest is history. I look at this guy, he knows he's not going to play. He's a guy that I like. I think with some coaching, being around other good football players, he's smart enough. Samford is a smart school academically, he's already graduated. I think this guy has tremendous upside. I'm excited about him.
